Salgado sentenced to life in prison

Aberdeen man won't be eligible for parole until 2028

By Laurie Welch Times-News writer

BURLEY – An Aberdeen man was sentenced to life in prison

Tuesday for murdering a Rupert parole until 2028. man and brutally beating his alleged 2009 drug deal.

Gerry Salgado, 23, pleaded guilty Tuesday to felony first-degree murder, aggravated assault and an enhancement for using a deadly weapon in the Sept. 19, 2009, shooting of Liopoldo Amezcua, 25, and beating of Estela Castro, 46, both of Rupert.

"We expected him to plead female companion during an guilty but didn't expect him to be sentenced yesterday," Cassia County Prosecutor Al Barrus said Wednesday.

Because Salgado had agreed to the sentence in the plea agreement, Barrus said, 5th District Judge Michael Crabtree went ahead and sentenced him Tuesday. methamphetamine were

Steven Henson is among a handful of soldiers with the Idaho Army National Guard 116th Cavalry Brigade Combat Team serving in Baghdad, Iraq, who sent their holiday wishes home this week through a series of videos posted on the Defense Video and Imagery Distribution System website. The 25-year-old soldier is completing his second tour of Iraq, joined by nearly 3,000 guard members from Idaho, Oregon and Montana.

PHILADELPHIA — He sees you when you're sleeping, he knows when you're awake, and he knows how many followers you have on Twitter.


Not long ago, there were two ways to tell Santa Claus what you wanted for Christmas: sitting on

ITD ditches 4-way stop for dangerous intersection in favor of slower speeds

Slower speeds, not a four-way stop, are now the Idaho Transportation Department's solution to the crash-ridden intersection of U.S. Highway 20 and Idaho Highway 75.

ITD announced earlier this month that the intersection, located just below Timmerman Hill in Blaine County, would become a four-way stop to reduce the number of high-speed injury accidents there. But the state agency said in a Wednesday press release that concerns from county officials prompted a change of

Now, ITD will reduce the speed limit on Idaho 75 to 45 mph for

about a half-mile on each side of the intersection as soon as weather permits. Narrowed lanes and rumble strips will also be installed in the spring. Existing flashing beacons at the intersection will be upgraded, a no-passing zone will be extended and larger "Cross Traffic Does Not Stop" signs will be put up on U.S. 20.

U.S. 20 drivers already have to stop at the intersection.

ITD will still monitor the intersection and be ready to take further steps if necessary, according to the release. And a long-term plan to rebuild and improve the site is still on the agency's to-do list, though any changes would depend heavily on available funds.

"With assurances from Blaine County Sheriff Walt Femling to enforce the speed reduction, we believe this can be an effective measure in reducing the severity and number of vehicle crashes," ITD District Engineer Devin Rigby stated in the release. "This doesn't change our level of concern for safety at the intersection. ITD will continue working for the best solution to reduce collisions at Timmerman Junction."

Possible pardon for Billy the Kid raises ire in New Mexico

(AP) — Descendants of Old West lawman Pat Garrett and New Mexico Territorial Gov. Lew Wallace are outraged that Gov. Bill Richardson is considering a pardon for Billy the Kid, Wallace never offered a pardon, and a petition seeking one is tainted because it comes even telling a reporter that from a lawyer with ties to fact in an interview on April Richardson.

The issue centers on whether Lew Wallace, governor of the territory from 1878 to 1881, promised a pardon in return for the McGinn, who submitted a Kid's testimony in a murder case against three men. J.P. Garrett, of Albu-

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. querque, who with other Garrett descendants met with Richardson in August to oppose a pardon, said there's no proof Gov. Wallace offered one - and he may have tricked the Kid into testifying.

"The big picture is that Wallace obviously had no intent to pardon Billy -28, 1881," he wrote Witt. Sheriff Pat Garrett's "So there was no 'pardon was a pardon 'trick,' in that Wallace led Billy on to get his testimony."

> William Wallace, of Westport, Conn., said his ancestor never promised a pardon and that pardoning the Kid "would declare Lew Wallace to have been a dishonorable liar."

Billy the Kid, also known shot to death by Sheriff Garrett in July 1881.

Richardson said The Kid is part of New Mexico history and that he has been interested in the case for years.

"Just think of all the good receiving around the world on this," the governor said. "It's fun."

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Burley council vote goes to dogs

City loosens limit on canine companions

BURLEY - The Burley City Council voted 5-1 Tuesday to loosen the collar on the city's dog ordinance and allow residents to house five licensed dogs per household instead of two.

Councilman Vaughn Egan voted against the ordinance. The ordinance includes an amendment put-

ting in place a new kenneling policy for city dwellers. The decision came after

some fiery discussion by the councilmen and one patron in the audience who held up a sign claiming the family's dogs are licensed and part of the family. The ordinance will regu-

late kennels in the city triggered by the presence of six dogs in a household, with puppies older than two months counting toward the total number of dogs. Egan said the council did-

n't know how many households had multiple dogs until the city started enforcing the dog licensing ordinance this year. Egan said before enforcement only 200 to 240 dogs in the city were licensed each year. That number has now jumped to 1,470.

"Some people have texted Santa that aren't so happy with Santa," said Drew Olanoff, who plays Santa on a text messaging system. "They've been a little rude. I've let them know that would be considered bad behavior. You really shouldn't talk to Santa like that."

The increased use of electronic services to reach Santa Claus reflects another reality of life outside the North Pole. Some major post offices, including Philadelphia, say they're handling far less mail directed to him. Chicago has handled about 10,000 letters to Santa this year, down from 15,000 to 20,000 in 2009.

So tech services are finding they can get a promotional boost from Kris Kringle without renting a red suit and a white beard. Most of them are in their first few years and use the gimmicks to show the power of their techologies.

Portable North Pole, a project launched by Montreal-based video Web developer UgroupMedia, sends kids personalized videos from Santa – even those who deserve a lump of coal. Tell the site your kid hasn't been so good, and the video Santa peers over his glasses and tells the child: You're on my naughty watch."

Another site, TextSanta.net, expects to send out close to 100,000 texts this year.

You climb aboard the "cage" on the Silver Shaft, which operates like a highspeed elevator. Rock walls, encased in concrete, whiz by. When the cage stops with a rattle and a shake, you're 4,900 feet below the Earth's surface, deep in the Bitterroot Mountains, where the rock is shot through with silver veins.

The Lucky Friday is already one of North America's deepest hardrock mines. Now, the 62year-old mine is about to get much deeper.

Owner Hecla Mining Co. is sinking a new shaft to depths of nearly 9,000 feet. It will allow the mine to go after richer silver deposits.

"We know what's under us is a terrific ore body, and we're not willing to walk away from it," said Mike Dexter, the Lucky Friday's general manager.

Hecla officials have known about the high-grade deposit for years. But until metals prices rebounded, sinking the new shaft didn't pencil out. Silver prices have averaged \$20 per ounce this year the highest level in 30 years.

"Paying for this stuff," Dexter noted, "is easier at \$20 silver as opposed to \$5 silver."

The new shaft could cost as much as \$200 million, ranking it among the Inland Northwest's largest construction projects.

"That's pretty serious money," said Mike Taylor, the city of Spokane's director of engineering services. In comparison, Spokane County's new sewage treatment plant has a \$167 million price tag.

The shaft work is creating a mini-boom in Idaho's historic Silver Valley, where the Lucky Friday is one of two remaining silver mines.



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

A federal judge on Tuesday unsealed the grand jury indictment, which was filed Nov. 16.

The Lewiston Tribune reports the initials "T.C." and the name "Freddy B" appeared amid the graffiti spray painted on the pictographs, which archaeologists believe are at least 2,500 years old. If convicted, the men each face criminal penalties up to \$20,000 and two years in prison under the federal Archaeological Resources Protection Act of 1979.



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

For serenity, nothing beats a winter hike

SOUTH OF HANSEN -If you're seeking serenity this season, try a winter

I ventured to the hills last Thursday afternoon and set my boots upon a trail. It was cold, but mostly it was serene.

The only sounds were birdsongs, snow falling from bushes and branches, and the rush of a stream that, despite ice on the banks, had yet to freeze. Does cold weather make sound carry farther? It seemed like it on this bright but chilly day in the South

A sunny, blue sky prompted my hike at Rim View Trail, a 10-mile long trail that winds up the mountain where the view is better.

Watch for a parking area on your right as you head up the canyon toward Magic Mountain Ski Resort. A sign reads "Rim View Trail." To the left is another parking area and a trail called Third Fork.

When starting out at Rim View I felt a sense of deja vu. I had seen this setting before – snow-covered trees, a bridge crossing the gentle stream, a trail leading into the snowy hillsides. But this was my first visit. Where had I seen it before? And then it occurred to me: Though it probably wasn't

reminded me of something I had seen on a winter puzzle or Christmas postcard a scenic winter wonderland.

I stopped on the bridge to admire the setting and the sounds. A few icicles hung from rocks, and I noticed I was not the first to cross the bridge this season. Other boots had stomped here before mine. I followed their path that began my journey into the hills.

Before long I came to the first information sign, standing forlorn in its winter surroundings. I tried to wipe the snow from its top but it was crusted hard, so I moved on as the trail made its first turn to go up the hillside.

I made several stops to admire the view including the fields dotted with tall thistle, barren except for their coats of snow, that looked like sentinels guarding the hillsides through winter's long sleep.

tain. Before long, fields of sage brush and thistle give way to pine trees and quaking aspen.

I noticed animal tracks in the snow. One set obviously was from a small creature or bird that had made designer zig-zag patterns, as if it had been playing a game of tic-tac-toe.

Be mindful, this trail is not a loop so if you walk all the way to the end you still have to hike back, making it a 20-mile hike instead of a 10-mile trek.

At the pace I was traveling — stopping for pictures, viewing animal tracks or pondering nature's beauty it would have taken me all day to hike the trail. But it's December and days are shorter. It was time to head back.

Besides, although my winter boots were sturdy, my feet were beginning to feel cold.

Style of skis allows for faster travel

GRAYLING, Mich. – When I started skate skiing about 15 years ago, I followed the dictate of Admiral David Farragut at the Battle of Mobile Bay in 1864: "Damn the torpedoes, full speed ahead!"

Eventually I learned to relax on the new skis, probably the most important step toward success, and was rewarded with being able to fly along the trails at close to twice the speed I could manage on my classic skis.

Ever since, I've alternated between the classic style and skating on cross-country outings, but I have to admit that the latter is more fun.

Classic skis have slick glide wax on the tips and tails and use sticky kick wax on a short a bottom section under the skier's foot to create the traction needed to drive the skiers forward. (No-wax skis use an ingrained fish-scale pattern in the plastic instead of wax.)

Skating skis are covered with slick glide wax from tip to tail, and they move by the skier driving the inside edge against the snow at about a 45-degree angle to the direction of travel. The skier rolls slightly from side to side, leaving V's in a herringbone pattern on the snow.

Because the skier uses the full edge of the ski for propulsion, skate skis are straight from end to end and lack the hourglass side-cut midsection that helps classic skiers turn corners.

Skate skis are thinner across than classic skis, but this makes them less stable, especially on downhill sections. I still fall occasionally on skating skis when negotiating downhills that give me no problem on classic skis.

Skate skis usually are 6 inches shorter than a classic ski, and are stiffer and have

Among its many victims, taxidermists - some of them — have been stuffed by the weakened economy. In many part of the U.S., the craft is practiced by fewer men (and they are mostly men) today than was the case a few years ago.

The sky is littered with stellar letters

elating constellations' pictures to their constituent stars demands a fertile imagination. Most sky watchers simply seek familiar star patterns unrelated to their mythological affiliations. And what's more familiar than the alphabet?

Beginning around 6 p.m., look east for three bright stars in a vertical line; as Orion the Hunter rises, his belt makes a fine capital "I." Directly above Orion's "I" is a bright red star, the lowermost end of a letter "V" lying on its side (the head of Taurus, the Bull).

Around 6:30, look due south, where brilliant Jupiter shines. Currently just above Jupiter, and a little to the right, is a faint circlet of stars - one of the tethered fish of Pisces, which makes a fine "O." One outstretched hand's breadth to the right of Jupiter is a tight "Y" of four stars—that's the water jar borne by Aquarius.

At 7 p.m., look high in the north for a misshapen "M." These are the stars of Cassiopeia, the Queen (who becomes a low-flying "W" in late spring).

Look to the northwest around 9 p.m. and you'll see Deneb, the brightest star in Cygnus, the Swan. Deneb forms the topmost star of the Northern Cross, which stands on the horizon like a giant lowercase

Morning sky watchers can look west around 7 a.m. for the bright star Procyon. One hand span above it is a large, faint inverted "Y," the carapace of Cancer, the Crab.

Parks officials try new approach in releasing cubs

HELENA, Mont. – Erik Wenum can hardly see inside the small plywood box. where two orphaned black bear cubs at the state's wildlife shelter in Helena are acting like teenagers trying to be rousted before noon. They just want to sleep, but Wenum's got other plans for

Holding a small flashlight and a long pole with a sharp needle on the end, he kneels down and jabs one of the cubs. The bear, astonished at this abrupt and ignominious wake-up call, runs out of the box and into another one nearby, then back to the first box, then back to the other. They grab the cub by her back paws and the scruff of her neck, and hoist the 95pound female onto a small cart and drag it through crusted snow into the shelter, where she's measured, tagged, weighed and dewormed one last time. The cub doesn't know it, but she's only hours away from running free, as part of a new procedure FWP is trying.

Typically, for winter releases FWP builds dens in remote areas, then uses snowmobiles to transport cubs to the dens and tucks them in for the winter, notes Thomas Baumeister, FWP state education program manager

But it's a lot of work, and they were finding that the cubs often moved to a different den. Recent warm weather, as well as unexpected late season snowfalls. also were stymieing the denning efforts.

"We would hang onto the bears until May or June, and eventually they would become habituated; they knew when we were coming with food," Baumeister said. "So now we're kicking them out and they can sleep for three or four months in the wild, then wake up and wonder if this was just a bad dream. It's almost like a reboot."

Wenum notes that they've previously done both "hard" releases, where they release the bear from a trap, then shoot it with bean bags or rubber bullets, and "soft" releases, where they just raise the door to the trap and the bear comes out. But this is the first time they're doing the soft releases just as the bears' bodies are preparing to hibernate.

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
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
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nswer: The filing of a bankruptcy creates an "estate". All assets that exist on the date of filing become part of the estate and can be liquidated for the benefit of your creditors unless the assets are exempt under state law. Idaho law provides sufficient exemptions so that most Idaho debtors do not have any assets liquidated. However, the Bankruptcy Code specifically identifies inheritances that you become entitled to within 6 months after filing your bankruptcy case as property of the estate just as if the inheritance had existed on the date your case was filed. The Bankruptcy Court would not approve dismissal because your creditors are entitled to the money in your estate. Since Idaho law does not exempt your inheritance, uncle Donald's bequest to you will be used to pay the claims of your creditors and to pay administrative expenses of your case. After the expenses and claims are paid, the rest of the money will be returned to you.

Get answers about statins

DEAR DR. GOTT: I am a 71-year-old female in good health. I take 40 milligrams of diltiazem, and my blood pressure is under good control. A recent blood test revealed my cholesterol to be 286, my HDL 82, LDL 188 and triglycerides 81. My doctor prescribed 40 milligrams lovastatin, but I would prefer not to take this medication. My total cholesterol has been 200 or higher since I was 40, and my HDL has been over 80. May I have your opinion?

DEAR READER: Highcholesterol levels in the blood are considered to be a major risk factor in the development of coronaryartery disease, heart attack and stroke. When choles-

terol accumulates in the walls of the arteries and combines with cellular debris, plaque forms, impairing the flow of blood. Eventually, clots may form, the arteries become blocked and problems occur.

There are two primary types of cholesterol – good and bad. The good is known as the HDL (high-density lipoproteins), and the bad is LDL (low-density lipoproteins). According to the American Heart Association, total cholesterol of under 200 is desirable and puts a person at a substantially lower risk for heart disease. Levels between 200 and 239 are borderline, signifying a person has twice the risk of someone below 200. HDL levels for men lower than 40 and 50 for women signify a major risk factor for heart disease. Levels of 60 and higher are extremely good, with lower probability of heart disease. LDL readings lower than 100 are optimal. Triglyceride levels vary according to age and gender. Levels under 150 are considered to be normal. Levels beyond that are borderline to

While your total cholesterol is higher than the rec-

ommended figure, your HDL without outside assistance. is exceptionally good. Your LDL puts you in a borderline-high bracket. Because extenuating factors such as family history come into play, your primary-care physician or cardiologist should make the decision as to the appropriate level for optimal health.

If diet is to blame, this is relatively simple to modify. Cut out ice cream, butter and other high-fat foods. Reduce your consumption of cheese, eggs and whole milk. Stav away from tropical oils in cookies and pastries. If inactivity is to blame, speak with your physician about a program of exercise. If heredity comes into play, then you may be doing all you can

A number of over-thecounter cholesterol-reducing products are available. Ask whether a trial might be appropriate.

If your physician has given you a statin drug to inhibit your liver's natural production of cholesterol and you are opposed, make another appointment to discuss the matter. I don't blame you for expressing concern. There has been a lot of controversy surrounding the side effects of statin drugs. Get answers, and be guided by what he or she says. Ultimately, the decision should be yours.

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



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

Flesh-eating fungus taking toll on bats

The killing season has begun.

Hordes of bats recently flew into abandoned mines and caves for their annual winter hibernation – and more than likely, wildlife biologists said, tens of thousands won't fly back out.

A flesh-eating fungus has stalked and killed them for at least four years. More than one million bats from at least seven species are estimated to have died from a disease called white nose syndrome for the way it covers their snouts like baby powder. This year, as white nose sweeps west from Northeast states such

Virginia Pennsylvania to Oklahoma, scientists are bracing for the worst.

"The worry is great, tremendous," said Greg Turner, an specialist in endangered mammals who works for the Pennsylvania Game Commission. Although white nose syndrome has been spotted in numerous Virginia caves, it hasn't yet had a profound impact on the beloved Virginia big-eared bat.

But the most common resident of the Washington region, the little brown bat, is barely hanging on. And two other species - the tricolored bat and the northern long-eared bat — are expected to become extinct.

"I'm seeing 100 percent mortality of those two species," Turner said. "We will have a 99 percent reduction of the little brown bat?"

Last winter, two-thirds of Pennsylvania's more than 2,000 caves and 4,000 abandoned mines were affected by white nose syndrome, Turner said. This bats, northern long-eared environment.

expect that "all the sites we know of will have white nose;" Turner said.

Although most people might not mourn the demise of bats, perhaps because of the creatures' unearned reputation as a nocturnal bloodsucker, a major decrease in their numbers could pose a substantial ecological risk.

Each bat eats half its weight in insects every night, according to Wildlife Magazine, published by Defenders of Wildlife. They especially crave big crunchy moths that lay worm-producing eggs in corn.

Without bats, billions of bugs would go uneaten, and farmers and loggers might be forced to use more pesticides to protect trees and crops, potentially driving up the price of produce and further damaging the ecology. Homeowners might one day find more gypsy moths than usual threatening to destroy a beloved oak.

White nose syndrome was first discovered in a cave near Albany, N.Y., but it took years for scientists to identify its source. "It's not been recorded in history," said Jeremy Coleman, national white nose syndrome coordinator for the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service.

Studies later showed that it was part of a mild-mannered genus of fungus called geomyces. The most familiar member of the genus is the fungus commonly known as "athlete's foot."

In 2009, scientists determined that more malevolent strain, geomyces destructans, was praying on little brown bats, big brown bats, Virginia big-eared bats, Indiana bats, eastern small-footed

winter, game officials bats and tri-colored bats, Coleman said.

Geomyces destructans and the American bats it targets share a preference for cold weather. When bats hibernate, their hearts beat once a minute, and their bodies cool to a temperature the fungus craves.

It is a horrible death. Scientist Gudrun Wibbelt compared their suffering to burn victims. "It makes holes in the surface of the skin" as it burrows in, said Wibbelt, a veterinary pathologist in wildlife diseases for the Leibniz Institute for Zoo and Wildlife Research in Berlin.

The same type of fungus is found on European bats, but scientists don't know why European bats survive and American bats die. Wibbelt said. Scientists also don't know how geomyces destructans found its way caves in Northeastern United States. One theory is that human explorers tracked it in and the bats passed it to each

The fungus moved along the northern Appalachian trail, a passage rife with trees, crops and gypsy moths that figure to flourish and possibly destroy food and plants even more as their main predator is diminished, Wibbelt said.

"Bats have a huge impact on pests, which is very important for forestry and agriculture;" Wibbelt said. "Studies on bats in Texas showed that they reduce the need for pesticides."

Scientists don't know how to stop geomyces destructans. Last winter. the states of New York and Vermont trucked in healthy bats from Wisconsin for an experiment to determine if they were infected by their

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


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

Obama signs 'don't ask, don't tell' repeal

WASHINGTON – President Barack Obama signed a new law Wednesday that will allow gays for the first time in history to serve openly in America's military. And to re-enlist.

Framing the issue as a matter of civil Fund. rights long denied, Obama said that "we are a nation that welcomes the service of every patriot ... a nation that believes that all men and women are created equal."

Repealing the 17-year-old policy known as "don't ask, don't tell" in a ceremony that was alternately emotional and rousing, the president said "this law I'm about to sign will strengthen our national security and uphold the ideals that our fighting men and women risk their lives to defend."

The new law ends a policy that forced gays to hide their sexual orientation or face don't ask don't tell.

Tail end of storm gives state one final lashing

LAGUNA BEACH, Calif. – Axl Dominguez awoke early Wednesday to a bumping sound and looked out the window to a scary sight: plastic trashcans floating down the flooded

And then the water came rushing into his house.

"We didn't have time to get anything. It happened really fast," the 15-year-old said, shivering in shorts, a mud-splashed sweat shirt and bare feet as he waited to go with his family to an evacuation center. "Water started coming in from all the walls. Then the wall fell and we got out through the window."

The tail end of a storm that dumped rain on Southern California for nearly a week gave the region one final lashing, burying houses and cars in mud, washing hillsides onto highways, flooding urban streets and threatening Mexico by Thursday and could reach the Gulf dozens of canyon homes.

Inflatable boats were used to rescue dozens of motorists and homeowners from flooded streets, hotels and hillsides, while others

refused to leave their homes as filthy water and mud sliced through their neighborhoods.

The storm weakened as it moved eastward, but floods still washed away homes in Arizona and inundated parts of Nevada and

The storm turned the final days before

Christmas into a nightmare, and left some residents fearful that more and bigger mudslides could strike the wildfire-scarred hillsides in suburban Los Angeles even after the skies cleared.

Officials on Tuesday ordered evacuation of 232 homes in La Canada Flintridge and La Crescenta, suburbs of Los Angeles below steep hillsides that burned in 2009 and where mudslides inundated homes and backyards in February.

The area is where the Station Fire charred 250 square miles above suburbs tucked below the San Gabriel Mountains.

"The ground is so saturated it could move at any time" and the threat will remain for several weeks, said Bob Spencer, spokesman for the Los Angeles County Department of Public Works.

Senate OKs nuke arms deal

WASHINGTON - The Senate on Wednesday ratified an arms control treaty with Russia that reins in the nuclear weapons that could plunge the world into doomsday, giving President Barack Obama a major foreign policy win in Congress' waning hours.

Thirteen Republicans broke with their top two leaders and joined 56 Democrats and two independents in providing the necessary two-thirds vote to approve the treaty. The vote was 71-26, with Sen. Ron Wyden, D-Ore., showing up just two days after cancer surgery.

Obama praised the strong bipartisan vote for a treaty he described as the most significant arms control pact in nearly two decades.

"This treaty will enhance our leadership to stop the spread of nuclear weapons and seek the peace of a world without them," he told reporters at a White House news conference.

The accord, which still must be approved by Russia, would restart onsite weapons inspections as successors to President Ronald Reagan have embraced his edict of "trust. but verify." Russian Foreign Minister Sergey Lavrov said Moscow welcomed the vote but still needed to study the accompanying Senate resolution.

Vice President Joe Biden presided over the Senate and announced the vote. Secretary of State Hillary Rodham Clinton observed the vote from the Senate floor. Both former senators had lobbied furiously for the treaty's approval.

Congress passes aid package for 9/11 responders

WASHINGTON - After a lastminute compromise, Congress passed legislation Wednesday to provide up to \$4.2 billion in new aid to survivors of the September 2001 terrorism attack on the World Trade Center and responders who became ill working in its ruins.

The House passed the bill on a 206-60 vote Wednesday about two hours after the Senate cleared it on a voice vote as lawmakers raced to wrap up their work before Christmas. President Barack Obama has said he is eager to sign the measure, though some supporters of the bill have criticized him for not getting more involved in the fight.

The package provides \$1.5 billion to monitor the health rescue and cleanup workers and treat illnesses related to ground zero. It also reopens a victims' compensation fund with \$2.7 billion.

2 firefighters dead, 17 injured in Chicago blaze

CHICAGO – As fires go, the one that broke out Wednesday in a small vacant building on the city's South Side was likely to be pretty routine for the Chicago Fire Department.

Instead, it caused the deaths of two firefighters, trapped under debris with two others when a wall and roof collapsed, and injured

In an eerie coincidence, it happened on the 100th anniversary of the Union Stock Yards fire, which killed 21 Chicago firefighters when a wall collapsed and stood as one of the nation's worst tragedies for firefighter deaths until 9/11.

The call about the trapped memorial service Wednesday honoring the Stock Fire Department spokesman said a wall also collapsed. Yards fire victims.

WASHINGTON - When the lame duck session of Congress started more than a month ago, President Obama looked defeated and deflated, publicly acknowledging the "shellacking" his party had taken in the November midterm elections.

Now, a six-week session that was expected to reflect a weakened president has turned into a surprising success. On Wednesday, Obama signed into law the repeal of the military's ban on openly gay service members, and the Senate approved a new nuclear treaty with Russia that the president had declared a top priority.

Those accomplishments come after Obama successfully negotiated a free trade agreement with South Korea, reached a deal with Republicans that extended unemployment benefits and prevented a tax hike for millions of Americans and signed a bill that will make school lunches healthier.

U.S. readies order for **Gitmo** detainees

WASHINGTON - The Obama administration is preparing an executive order that would formalize indefinite detention without trial for some detainees at the U.S. military prison at Guantanamo Bay, Cuba, but allow those detainees and their lawyers to challenge the basis for continued incarceration, U.S. officials said.

The administration has long signaled that the use of prolonged detention, preferably at a facility in the United States, was one element of its plan to close Guantanamo. An interagency task force found that 48 of the 174 detainees remaining at the facility would have to be held in what the administration calls prolonged detention.

"We have a plan to close Guantanamo, and this detainee review process is one element," said an administration official who discussed the order on condition of anonymity because it has yet to reach the president.


However, almost every part of the administration's plan to close Guantanamo is on hold, and it could be crippled this week if Congress bans the transfer of detainees to the United States for trial and sets up steep hurdles to the repatriation or resettlement in third countries of other detainees.

Officials worked intensively on the executive order over the past several weeks, but a senior White House official said it had been in the works for more than a year. If Congress blocks the administration's ability to put detainees on trial or transfer them out of Guantanamo, the official said, the executive order could still be implemented.

"I would argue that you still have to go ahead because you can't simply have people confined to a life sentence without any review and then fight another day with Congress," the administration official said. "One of things we're mindful of is that you can't have a review conducted by the same people, in the same process, who made the original decision to detain. You have to have something that is different and is more adversarial, which the Bush administration never had."

Under the system established by the previous administration, Guantanamo detainees could go before military review panels with "personal representatives;" also military officers, who explained the process but could not act as lawyers. The system envisioned under the executive order would be more adversarial and would allow detainees to challenge their incarceration periodically, possibly every



Minico tried to run time off the clock, but the Rams locked down defensively and forced three turnovers that allowed them to take the lead with under a minute to play.



Auburn QB Newton named AP's college Player of Year

AUBURN, Ala. – Cam Newton lifted Auburn from the back of the Top 25 to No. 1 in the nation.

The Heisman Trophy-winning quarterback led the Tigers into the national title game against No. 2 Oregon with a mix of flair and poise and enough highlight reel plays to widely split the vote among a handful of coaches and teammates asked for their favorite.

Newton has already raked in the Heisman Trophy and Davey O'Brien and Maxwell awards for his spectacular season. He added AP Player of the Year to his collection on Wednesday.

An NCAA investigation into Newton's recruitment, which threw his eligibility into doubt during November, had no effect back is one that has the abilities on how he played down the stretch — or the voting for the AP

award. It was about as lopsided as the Heisman vote.

Newton received 51 votes from the 60-member AP football poll panel. Boise State quarterback Kellen Moore received three, Stanford quarterback Andrew Luck got two and four ballots went unreturned.

In less than a year, Newton has gone from the obscurity of junior college to helping transform a team that went 8-5 last season and started this one ranked No. 22 to a perfect Southeastern Conference championship.

It wasn't all about the big plays, though. Offensive coordinator Gus Malzahn said he was more impressed by Newton's leadership in repeatedly bringing the team from behind, including a 24-0 deficit at Alabama.



The 70-year-old Brown had been upset with the makeup and effort of his team for weeks. The Bobcats (9-19) had lost three games by 31 or more points in 10 days before Tuesday's fourth-quarter meltdown against Oklahoma City.

Givens and his sons, Scott and Rod Givens, who are the co-CEOs of the investor group, did not attend news conference representative said they were traveling.



YESTERDAY ON WALL STREET



Major stock indexes edged up to two-year highs on Wednesday after a report showed that the U.S. economy grew faster than previously thought over the summer.

The Commerce Department said the country's gross domestic product rose at an annual rate of 2.6 percent between July and September, a small increase from its earlier estimate of 2.5 percent.

The Dow Jones industrial average rose 26.33 points, or 0.2 percent, to close at 11,559.49. The S&P 500 index rose 4.24, or 0.3 percent, to 1,258.84. Both indexes closed at their highest levels since July 2008. The Nasdaq composite index gained 3.87, or 0.2 percent, to 2,671.48. It was the highest close for the Nasdag since Dec. 28, 2007.

Rising stocks outnumbered falling ones by three to two on the New York Stock Exchange. Consolidated volume was 3.6 billion shares.

December is shaping up to be a good month for stocks. The S&P 500 has risen 6.6 percent this month and the Dow has gained 5 percent. On Tuesday, the S&P 500 closed above the level it reached on Sept. 12, 2008, the last trading day before the collapse of Lehman Brothers at the height of the financial crisis.

THE ACES ON BRIDGE®

Some deals that require nothing more subtle than basic technique nonetheless can be surprisingly difficult until you see the point.

In today's deal from the Dyspeptics Club, South was at the helm in three no-trump. He started well when he ducked the opening spade lead and won the second. Then he took the club finesse, won the spade continuation, and ran off his club winners before taking the losing diamond finesse. Alas for him, West had two spades to cash — down one.

North snapped his pencil and muttered something uncharitable about bridge in the slow lane. Was he right to be upset?

I can understand his frustration, although I suspect I might have been sympathetic to an inexperienced partner who had made the same mistake. Nevertheless, South had a blind spot, the point being that he needed to establish both minors, but also had to keep the danger hand (West) off lead once spades had been established.

The right approach on winning the first top spade is to play the diamond ace followed by the diamond queen, not caring who takes the trick. As it happens, West wins the diamond king and plays a third spade to your ace. Now South can run the club queen. East can take his king when he likes, but cannot prevent declarer from scoring three clubs, three diamonds, two spades and one heart.

ANSWER: When you passed initially and made a minimum raise of clubs at your second turn, you essentially denied holding more than about a six-count. Now that partner has made a try for game, you cannot treat your hand as a minimum anymore. In context, your values must be enough to give partner a play for game, so bid five clubs.

– KAYE IN ALABAMA **DEAR KAYE:** That's true. What bothered me about the letter from "Turkey Eater" was the idea that his brother expected him to cater the entire Thanksgiving dinner to his nieces' preference to eat vegan. If the writer had said he had been asked to ensure there were dishes that would not inflame (literally) his nieces' serious medical condition, I would have answered differently.

What has surprised me about the comments I have received from readers about that letter has been the amount of prejudice and anger expressed against vegetarians by more than a few. But read on for some responses from vegans:

DEAR ABBY: I am a vegan in a meat and potatoes family. For 15 years I have spent every holiday and family gathering listening to them degrade my food choices and try to "convert" me back to my "senses." I have never expected them to cook for me. I always pack my own foods since they are unwilling to branch out and try new foods. When I have brought a dish, they all loved it, as long as they didn't know it was vegan and

that I had prepared it. I find many people are resentful if we host a dinner party with only vegan food. They expect us to accommodate them by cooking meat, but feel we should fend for ourselves at a function they hold. I encourage people to please get over the stigma of vegan/vegetarian and sample something new once in a while. If I can endure every family gathering taking place at a steakhouse, I don't think it's unreasonable to have one night when they experience how tasty food without

meat in it can be. RACHEL IN SEATTLE **DEAR ABBY:** I am 31 and have been a vegetarian my entire life. I come from a meat-loving family and have never insisted they change an entire meal to accommodate my eating habits. Instead, I take food I know I will eat and share it with everyone else. "Turkey Eater's" vegan relatives should realize they're in the minority. If they each brought a vegan-friendly dish or two, they'd have three to six things to choose from - and that's plenty.

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





Cassia electronic communications policy a sensible first step

here aren't a lot of good options available to school districts trying to protect students from potential sexual harassment by teachers through cyberspace.

So the Cassia County School District's tough new electronic communications policy, imperfect as it might be, is about the best the school system can do under the circumstances.

Last week, the Cassia County School Board unanimously approved the policy that defines inappropriate communication as any contact that would be viewed as "offensive, derogatory, sexual, lewd in content, threatening, harassing, discriminatory, simple fraternization or sugges-

tive in nature," regardless of whether an employee or student initiated it.

Employees are prohibited from discussing student information on social networking sites and the policy instructs them to include a disclaimer in their online interactions stating that their views are their own, not those of the district.

The policy's approval follows a year that saw two male teachers within the district accused of using electronic communication to engage in illegal, sexually charged interactions with underage female students.

One of these incidents involved former Burley High teacher Chad Burnett, 28, who was sentenced in September to up to 12 years in prison for crimes related to a sexual relationship he had

with a student at the school. According to court records, Burnett and a 17-year-old girl sometimes sent as many

as 250 text messages to each other a day, which allegedly included explicit photos of both the student and Burnett.

Will the district's new policy constrain communication between teachers and students? To some extent, probably. But a certain amount of

circumspection isn't a bad thing. The large majority of teachers have boundaries they respect in dealing with students, and if the new Cassia policy accomplishes nothing else it will clarify those limits.

Social networking and instant electronic communication have transformed our culture in ways we don't yet comprehend. Defining that change, much less regulating it, is very much a work in

In the meanwhile, the Cassia County School District's is a good beginning.

75 years of Sun Valley

How a Ketchum hay field became an upscale ski resort

By James Varley

n 2011, the Sun Vallev Company will be celebrating the 75th anniversary of the opening of its famous Idaho resort. We have William Averell Harriman - "Honest Ave," Time magazine once called him — to thank for creating

At the time, Harriman was chairman of the board of directors for the Union Pacific Railroad.

The 44-year old sportsman son of a railroad magnate, Harriman had become aware of the growing popularity of skiing in the U.S.

Some called it a "mania," noting that more than 8,000 Americans had gone skiing in Austria that year, and many others had visited Banff and Lake Louise in Canada. Austrian Count Felix Schaffgotsch, an expert skier, and friend of Harriman, sold him on the idea that the United States needed a ski resort like Switzerland's St. Moritz, or one of the others in central Europe.

The 29-year old count, was studying American banking methods at one of the Harriman family's other businesses.

Harriman convinced the Union Pacific's president, Carl Grey, that the count should be asked to find some good skiing terrain on the railroad's western routes, worthy of development to increase passenger ridership. Schaffgotsch agreed to do it, if the company would pay his expens-

In November 1935, the count began his search, accompanied by an assistant traffic manager for the railroad, and a friend, Count Hans

Edwein Wilczek, also of Austria. They examined Mount Rainier first, Schaffgotsch telling the locals that he had come to the U.S. because of the reports he had heard about the fine skiing on their mountain.

A few days later, at Mount Hood, his story was that he had four months of leisure on his hands, so he was looking at a lot of skiing areas.

The search continued with stops at Yosemite, the San Bernardino Mountains, Zion National Park, Lake Tahoe and then Brighton and Alta in Utah. Not one of the sites was deemed adequate — they were too far from the railroad, had too much rain, were too close to a city, etc.

Interestingly, during an interview with a Salt Lake *Tribune* reporter, Schaffgotsch disclosed his political leanings, expressing great praise for Adolph Hitler for having rid Germany of slums and beg-

Next, the counts were met at Pocatello by Bill Hynes, the traveling freight agent out of Boise, and they looked around eastern Idaho and Jackson, Wyo.

Schaffgotsch liked the Jackson area, but Wyoming officials wouldn't guarantee to keep Teton Pass open.

Schaffgotsch was headed East to report to Harriman when Ioe Stemmer, Idaho director of highways, suggested to Hynes that the count have a look at Ketchum. A wire to Schaffgotsch brought him back and, on Jan. 16, 1936. he was driven north from Shoshone in a blinding snowstorm. After having skidded off the road while going down Timmerman Hill, Hynes called Stemmer and the latter arranged for a snowplow to lead them into Ketchum.

After spending several weeks there, checking out the slopes, the Austrian concluded that the huge Ernest F. Brass ranch just outside Ketchum on Trail

Creek Road would be an ideal spot for Harriman's ski resort. Its 3,388 acres were adjacent to the Sawtooth National Forest and the valley was sheltered from cold northern winds by the tallest peaks in the Sawtooth range, providing almost perfect skiing conditions through most of the winter.

ground. Schaffsgotch joined the Germany army before

World War II and was killed on the Eastern Front.

In early February, Schaffgotsch wired Harriman saying "I have found it! Come and see for yourself." Within a few days Harriman arrived at Ketchum in his private rail car with four women — his wife, his daughter, Mrs. Marjorie Oelrichs Duchin and Mrs. William S. Palev. wife of the president of CBS.

In 1986 - at age 94 -Harriman vividly remembered getting off the car, and skiing to the Brass ranch on the fine powder snow.

"I fell in love with the place then and there," he said.

Harriman quickly obtained approval from the Union Pacific board of

A Newspaper Association of America article from 2007 defines the publisher's job as one that "oversees the overall management of operations, technology, advertising, circulation,

production, and business office activities and is responsible to a large degree for the profit and loss operations of the paper." More simply stated, the publisher of a newspaper is really its general manager. I'm not the owner nor am I the editor or one of the folks who run the press (thank heavens). I am the person at the Times-*News* who has overall responsibility for growing our total readership, better connecting with readers of all ages through current and not-yet-created print and digital products, increasing the number of advertisers who use us regularly, and -

as a natural consequence of doing these things - growing our bottom line. Yikes! Perhaps it was better before I reminded myself of all these things.

Seriously, I couldn't be happier to be the *Times*-News' new publisher. I get to work with a great group of people in a community that I really like, doing exactly what I like to do – and I get paid to do it. I do get to work with the real Editor — as soon as I hire one — and, they'll be the person with overall responsibility for the news, feature, business and sports content of the *Times-News* and Magicvalley.com. directors to build the resort. The only member known to have had objections was William Ieffers. Unlike Harriman, this son of Irish immigrants had worked his way up the railroading ladder, from call boy to vice-president. Once, when he was a general superintendent, Jeffers had personally run a rotary snowplow for 120 hours to open the main line in his area.

Improvements in service and equipment Jeffers could understand, but he had no use for such luxury as was being proposed for the ski resort.

Allegedly, a disgusted Jeffers told Harriman: "The only thing I ever did with snow was to shovel it the hell off the track. Now you want to play with it." Schaffgotsch left Ketchum for a time but returned about March 18, accompanied by Count Wilczek and Charles M. Proctor, a former Dartmouth ski racer and coach of the 1928 U.S. Olympic ski team. They stayed in cabins at Bald Mountain Hot Springs.

The following day, as reported by the Times-News. Proctor said that he and two associates had bought the Brass property for about \$40,000, and that they planned to establish a winter resort with toboggan and ski "slides," and a rink for hockey. Schaffgotsch confirmed that a deal had been made and that work on a hotel would begin May 1.

Events would show, in fact, that what they had done was obtain an option to buy the Brass ranch, subject to a survey and other conditions.

The citizens of Ketchum were elated, having anxiously awaited a hired a chubby 38-year old Irishdecision ever since the count had first come to their town. They turned out en masse the evening of March 23 at the Odd Fellows Hall for a reception and buffet in honor of their three visitors. Schaffgotch responded to a welcoming address, "in his usual genial and charming manner," outlining his plans for the future of Ketchum. He said that he was working with the "eastern capitalists" who had recently come to town to confirm his choice. Some of them were Union Pacific offi-

cials, but that, as a corporation. the railroad was not financially interested.

The count said the planned 100-room hotel would be built of stone and logs and would be finished by December.

Two days later the Austrian counts were in Boise, having dinner with Gov. C. Ben Ross at the Owyhee Hotel and telling him about the resort Schaffgotch and 10 associates were planning to build. The counts were "regular fellows: just like the rest of us," said Ross after the brief visit.

Meanwhile, Charles Proctor had been left in Ketchum to continue the training he had been giving eight boys from Ketchum and Hailey to be instructors and guides for skiing parties. He had also been selecting sites for the ski

In early April, Jeffers and other Union Pacific bigwigs came to look at the Brass property, and they were followed by a crew of engineers from Omaha and Salt Lake City who surveyed the ranch and the planned ski courses. After this, the option to buy was exercised and the ranch became railroad property.

A building contract was signed with the J. J. McNeil Company of Los Angeles and, on May 23 a special railroad car arrived in Ketchum bringing the chief engineer and chief architect of the Union Pacific and Lawrence McNeil. The exact location of the building was agreed upon, test holes were sunk to determine the nature of the foundation and, a few days later, work began on the

Sometime in July, Harriman American named Steve Hannigan to publicize the as-yet nameless resort. As the famed columnist Damon Runyon admitted, Hannigan was one of the most successful press agents in the country because he knew how to get attention from the newspapers for his clients, without resorting to gimmicks. As events proved, he would certainly do so for Averell Harriman.

Completed road projects make travel easier

I am a member of Boy Scouts of America Troop 65 here in Twin Falls. The following letter is part of the requirements necessary to complete my Communications merit badge. Thank you for printing it.

I would like to take this opportunity to say that now that the road construction on Pole Line Road and Washington is done, those roads are very good. 

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
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
