T.F. man questions liquor signs in store

Scott Andrus was driving home after a day of plane rides when he saw the Old No. 7 sign - an ad for his formerly preferred brand of whiskey that led him to consider breaking his monthslong sobriety.

"I drove by that sign and thought, 'Why don't I go in and just grab me a bottle?"" recalled Andrus, who hasn't had a drink since April and freely acknowledges a past drunken driving charge and other alcohol-related

problems.

The sign on a stateowned liquor store set off some research on his part, which led to an e-mail exchange with Jeff Anderson, director of the Idaho State Liquor Division, which manages the liquor stores. Andrus pointed to a section of Idaho Code regarding the division that reads "it shall not attempt to stimulate the normal demands of temperate consumers."

Andrus argued the neon liquor signs violate that code – stimulating his desire to buy a bottle. Anderson said it

"The (Idaho State Liquor Division) shall so exercise its powers as to curtail the intemperate use of alcoholic beverages. It shall not attempt to stimulate the normal demands of temperate consumers thereof, irrespective of the effect on the revenue derived by the state from the resale of intoxicating liquor." (23-203(g))



"I don't have this whole huge 'Don Ouixote tilting at windmills' thing," he said. "But the state does not have to indulge in people's temptations."

However, he also thinks it's hypocrisy for the state to sell liquor and advertise it, but then "punish people terribly" for alcohol-related crimes.

Anderson said he thinks an unreasonable enticement of liquor would be

more akin to sandwich boards in the street, or large flashing signs advertising sales and prices. He said his department also agrees with Andrus on tamping down on irresponsible use.

"We have taken Mr. Andrus' comments seriously. We appreciate all feedback, positive and negative," he said. "We take our responsibility seriously. In this particular instance, we don't agree with Mr. Andrus' interpretation of the signs."

Tools to cope with temptation are everywhere.

Some car owners are voluntarily using a technology developed for convicted drunk drivers - ignition locks attached to in-car breathalyzers.

Shelley Snyder, marketing coordinator for Intoxalock, said about 1.5 percent of the company's clients are voluntary, which includes parents imposing the setup on their young drivers.

"I know that isn't a lot, but it is growing at a slow, steady pace," she said.

One of Intoxalock's competitors, Guardian Interlock Systems, said its figures are slightly higher: 5 to 7 percent of clients are drivers voluntarily installing the equipment, with about 2 percent intended for use by teens.

Also gaining ground are clients using the system permanently after they've completed court-ordered monitoring - about 1 percent of Guardian's clients in 2010, compared with none the year before.

"We hope not to see these people again," said David Contreras, Guardian's vice president of operations. "It's

Kimberly council members hold off on water-rate vote

KIMBERLY – Though the Kimberly City Council did not vote Tuesday to adopt a rate for metered water billing, council members and the Utility Advisory Committee discussed new details about its implementation.

Ignorning past mistakes condemns Idaho to repeat them

(Editor's note: This editorial was published by the Lewiston Tribune on Dec. 21)

tate Rep. Ken Roberts, R-Donnelly, says the 2002 bipartisan commission that rewrote Idaho's political map was a "mess."

State Rep. Tom Loertscher, R-Iona, is even more emphatic. He's angling to give that job back to lawmakers.

Between them, Roberts and Loertscher have ignored - or chosen to forget – at least three decades of history. You know what happens when people take that path.

After each census, Idaho grafts a growing and shifting population to legislative and congressional district boundaries. It

assigns that task to a six-member commission, three Republicans, three Democrats.

And who gave that all-important political job to a group of appointees?

The Legislature. Not by a slim margin either.

Setting up the citizen commission required a change in Idaho's constitution. In 1994, two-thirds of the lawmakers endorsed the idea just to present it to the voters for approval.

Drawing legislative and congressional districts can make or break a candidate. Politicians like districts that

are filled with supporters and exclude everyone else. They abhor anything that even smacks of competition. And the last thing they want is to be thrown into a contest with another incumbent.

Now why would two-thirds of lawmakers voluntarily hand over this power to someone else?

Because two years earlier, lawmakers drew up their own districts. Former state Rep. Pam Ahrens, R-Boise, likens the process to self-administered surgery. For 30 days, the legislative session bogged down. Legislators weren't doing your business. They were too busy doing their own. When it was over, members stayed angry with one another. So not much else got done.

As bad as that was, it pales in comparison to the previous decade. After lawmakers drafted, implemented and got elected on a 1982 redistricting plan, the Idaho Supreme Court threw it out. Lawmakers couldn't serve their own interests without violating the state constitution. The courts imposed their own plan - creating seven new super districts, most of which included several counties - and expanded the Legislature from 105 members to 126.

Going to a citizen commission in 2002 was never intended - as Loertscher suggests - to remove partisan politics from the process. Morning, noon and night, the commission's members were bombarded with debates and proposals meant to help this individual legislator or that political objective.

But it did eliminate blatant self-interest from holding the pens



Obama and members of Congress took those actions knowing that debt - and the interest that must be paid on that debt has being growing out of control.

"At the end of fiscal year 2008, debt held by the public (federal debt) amounted to \$5.8 trillion equal to 40 percent of the nation's annual economic output (gross domestic product, or GDP), a little above the 40-year average of 35 percent," noted the Congressional Budget Office. "Since then, the debt held by the public has shot upward, surpassing \$9 trillion by



the end of fiscal 2020 - equal to 62 with a second tax cut under his percent of GDP, the highest percentage since shortly after World War II."

Alan Greenspan, former chairman of the Federal Reserve, favors repealing the 2001 and 2003 Bush tax cuts.

In an interview on 60 Minutes, former Reagan budget director David Stockman agreed: "We have now got both parties essentially telling the big lie with a capital 'B' and a capital 'L' to the public: And that is why we have all this government, 24 percent of GDP, this huge entitlement program, all the bailouts. And yet, we don't have to tax ourselves and pay our bills. That is delusional."

It's even more delusional when compared to other industrialized nations.

According to the Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development, the combined local, state and federal taxes in the United States are among the lowest in the industrialized world. As a percentage of GDP, only two developed countries – Turkey and Mexico have lower taxes.

A similar pattern emerges when looking at corporate tax rates. Of the industrialized countries, only four - Austria, Iceland, Germany and Turkey - have lower corporate rates.

When President George W. Bush signed the first tax cut in 2001, he said: "Tax relief will create new jobs, tax relief will generate new wealth, and tax relief will open new opportunities." Two years later,

belt, Bush said, "By speeding up the income tax cuts, we will speed up economic recovery and the pace of job creation."

But that didn't go as advertised.

"The economy boasted 132 million jobs in June 2001, the month that the first of the Bush tax cuts was signed into law," wrote Michael Linden and Michael Ettlinger of the Center for American Progress. "Three years later, in June 2004, there were just 131.4 million jobs. The economy did not add a single new job during the three years under the Bush tax cuts. The next three years were better than the first three as the private sector struggled back to its feet following the first Bush recession."

Without reducing taxes, Bill Clinton amassed a much more impressive record.

["]President Bill Clinton, after raising taxes in 1993, oversaw an economy that went from 111 million jobs in August of that year ... to 129 million jobs six years later - an increase of 16.2 percent, and more than three times better than under the Bush tax cuts," Linden and Ettlinger wrote.

When Obama signed a temporary extension of the Bush cuts into law, he said they would "grow our economy" and "create jobs for the American people."

That produced a better legislative session. In 2002, lawmakers remained focused on writing laws and passing budgets. Reapportionment was not on the agenda.

It also produced a better political map. Perfect, it was not. Because the commission starting drawing lines from the northern border and finished in the southeast, Loertscher's constituents ended up in an odd shaped district that stretched from the Wyoming border to the Utah state line.

Still, it passed judicial review - which meant a vote in Bear Lake County counted as much as one in Lewis County – and was a step forward for many urban dwellers. For the first time, their voices weren't filtered through a rural-dominated district that opted to elect cowboys with no sympathy for schools, city services and local control.

None of this is to suggest the process in 2012 is going to be smooth. With more population coalescing in the Treasure Vallev and Panhandle, people in north-central Idaho and the Magic Valley are going to lose legislators and political influence.

Cities will get more representation.

People in the sticks will get assigned to even-larger legislative districts stretching for hundreds of miles.

Republicans, who control 80 percent of the legislative seats, are going to press their advantage. The three Democrats on the redistricting commission are going to push back.

Lurking in the background will be the prospect of a court challenge.

What's the alternative? Only people who didn't live through or learn from the same old redistricting mistakes would hand this job back to the politicians.



received my Medicare card the other day, recognizing my 65th birthday and making me part of one of America's biggest problems. By this, I mean the burden that the massive baby-boom generation will impose on its children and the nation's future. There has been much brave talk recently, from Republicans and Democrats alike, about reducing budget deficits and controlling government spending. The trouble is that hardly anyone admits that reaching these goals must include making significant cuts in Social Security and Medicare benefits for baby boomers.

If we don't, we will be condemned to some combination of inferior policies. We can raise taxes sharply over the next 15 or 20 years, roughly 50 percent from recent levels, to cover expanding old-age subsidies and existing government programs. Or we can accept permanently huge budget deficits. Even if that doesn't trigger a financial crisis, it would probably stunt economic growth and living standards. So would dramatically higher taxes.

Yet, neither political party seems interested in reducing benefits for baby boomers. Doing so, it's argued, would be "unfair" to people who had planned retirements based on existing programs. Well, yes, it would be unfair. Indeed, it's hard to imagine a worse time for cuts. Unemployment is horrendous; eroding home values and



retirement accounts have depleted the elderly's wealth. Only 19 percent of present retirees are "very confident" of having enough money to live "comfortably," down from 41 percent in 2007, reports the Employee Benefit Research Institute.

But not making cuts would also be unfair to younger generations and the nation's future. We have a fairness dilemma: Having avoided these problems for decades, we must now be unfair to someone. To admit this is to demolish the moral case for leaving baby boomers alone. Baby boomers - I'm on the leading edge – and their promised benefits are the problem. If they're off-limits, the problem is being evaded. Together, Social Security, Medicare and Medicaid represent two-fifths of federal spending, double defense's share.

Solutions are clear. Social Security's eligibility ages (66 now for full benefits and 62 for reduced benefits) could be gradually raised. Benefits could be cut for wealthier retirees. At 65, new Medicare beneficiaries could pay some or all of their insurance costs until they reached eligibility for full Social

Security benefits. Even then, better-off recipients could pay higher premiums. These and other changes should start soon – in a few years once the recovery strengthens.

Confession: I've written columns like this for years. Little has changed. Medicare premiums for wealthier recipients (income thresholds: \$85,000 for individuals. \$170.000 for couples) have increased modestly, affecting about 5 percent of beneficiaries. But politicians fear making major changes. They dread an assault from the AARP, the main senior lobby, and the rage of millions of retirees and near-retirees. Public opinion is hostile. It's high on reducing deficits and low on changing the programs that create the deficits.

Just because this is an awful time to discuss these questions does not mean they shouldn't be discussed. The longer we wait, the more acute our fairness dilemma grows. We can't deal with it unless public opinion is engaged and changed, but public opinion won't be engaged and changed unless political leaders discard their self-serving hypocrisies. The old deserve dignity, but the young deserve hope. The passive acceptance of the status quo is the path of least resistance – and a formula for national decline.

Five myths about school lunch programs

resident Obama signed the Healthy, Hunger Free Kids Act earlier this month to improve both access to and the quality of school food, and it contains many provisions that will help in Michelle Obama's campaign to end childhood obesity within a generation and a few that may actually hurt it. The fight over how and what we feed our kids at school is a complex one; clear thinking about what we need is often hampered by persistent myths.

1. School meals are free for the children who really need them.

This is certainly the intent of the National School Lunch and Breakfast programs, which offer free and reduced meals to children, based on their families' income, as well as full-price meals to any student. Currently, students are eligible for free meals if that income is below 130 percent of the federal poverty line - \$23,803 for a family of three, for instance - and for reduced-price meals if it is somewhat higher - up to \$33,874 for that family of three.

Unfortunately, these thresholds are unrealistically low, especially in areas with high living costs. The 2008 Household Food Security survey by the U.S. Department of Agriculture found that more than a fifth of households with the most severe form of food insecurity - in which children themselves sometimes went without meals - had incomes above the cutoff for reduced



price school meals. 2. Most students who don't participate in the National School Lunch Program eat a healthy lunch brought from home.

Even if eligibility for free lunch is problematic, students can always brown-bag it, right? That's not what I've seen in school cafeterias across the country.

In the USDA's most recent comprehensive study of school food, 62 percent of students chose the school lunch and about 10 percent of the students brought lunch from home on the day being surveyed.

What happened to everyone else? Some did not eat lunch (4 percent of elementary students and 8 percent of high schoolers). Others bought food from a la carte options in the cafeteria, left the campus to purchase food, or bought from vending machines or school stores.

3. Kids won't eat vegetables.

heart of many school menus - kids won't eat anything green, so we shouldn't waste time and money trying. It's true that it's a challenge, but a number of schools are systematically disproving this myth.

Kids will eat vegetables, even in the cafeteria, though they are far less likely to do this if they can purchase salty snacks and sweets from a display near the cash register, a vending machine or a snack bar.

4. Schools need to sell junk foods to break even.

Most cafeterias have them: pizza, chips, french fries and cookies for sale alongside healthy meals that are federally reimbursable. The food service directors I have interviewed uniformly believed that they must sell such items in order to break even and that the a la carte sales were subsidizing the official, federally regulated school

Junk food sales don't even pay for themselves: On average, they bring in just 71 percent of the costs associated with offering them. Thus, school districts wind up diverting to a la carte sales substantial portions of the federal cash reimbursements intended to subsidize healthy meals.

5. Higher federal nutrition standards will ensure healthy eating.

Take a look at what happened last time Congress mandated higher nutrition standards for school food. In the mid-1990s,

Congress decided that school meals should comply with the Dietary Guidelines for Americans, which specified that no more than 30 percent of calories should come from fat. In an effort to comply, many schools eliminated

whole milk, but then found their meals falling below the calorie minimums set by the USDA. They couldn't afford to add another fruit or vegetable, so many schools began offering sweetened, flavored milk, replacing the now-forbidden calories from fat with calories from high fructose corn syrup.

The new standards, developed by the Institute of Medicine, call for a dramatic reduction in sodium to be phased in. This might work well if sodium were simultaneously reduced in the foods sold at corner stores and fast-food restaurants, but without such changes everywhere, it could actually lead to a drop in participation as school meals become more healthy.



Idaho PUC accepts **Intermountain Gas** planning document

State regulators have accepted a five-year plan by Intermountain Gas Company that forecasts an annual increase of 1.75 percent in the company's peak-day gas loads through 2015.

Intermountain Gas, like other regulated utilities, is required to file the plan with the Idaho Public Utilities Commission.

The commission accepted the plan, but said Intermountain Gas should make a greater effort to involve the public, cities and counties.

The Sun Valley Lateral, which serves about 4 percent of Intermountain's Idaho customers, will require a future upgrade to the existing pipeline system to meet growth in that area, the IRP states.

The Idaho Conservation League filed comments, stating that Intermountain needs to encourage more conservation and efficiency programs to avoid building new infrastructure and to mitigate price volatility in natural gas markets.

In its order, the commission said Intermountain should consider conservation programs that "have the potential to be cost-effective in promoting and enticing energy savings." Intermountain Gas serves about 305,000 residential, commercial and industrial customers throughout southern Idaho.

Baby boomers fear outliving Medicare

WASHINGTON – The first baby boomers will be old enough to qualify for Medicare on Jan. 1, and many fear the program's obituary will be written before their own.

A new Associated Press-GfK poll finds that baby boomers believe by a ratio of 2-to-1 they won't be able to rely on the giant health insurance plan throughout their retirement.

The boomers took a running dive into adolescence and went on to redefine work and family, but getting old is making them nervous.

Now, 43 percent say they don't expect to be able to depend on Medicare forever, while only 20 percent think their Medicare is secure. The rest have mixed feel-

Yet the survey also shows a surprising willingness among adults of all ages to sacrifice to preserve Medicare benefits that most Americans say they deserve after years of paying taxes into the system at work.





Rummaging around for 1and 2-cent postage stamps when postal rates go up is heading the way of the Pony Express. Beginning in January, all new stamps good for 1 ounce of first-class mail will be marked as "forever."

The move is designed to help customers cope with postage increases, a U.S. Postal Service official told The Associated Press on Tuesday. The official requested anonymity to discuss a policy that hasn't been announced formally.

Postmaster General Patrick R. Donahoe plans to announce the new policy Jan. 14, the official said.

The Postal Service says that 28 billion Forever Stamps have been sold, bringing in \$12.1 billion. The stamps without denominations account for 85 percent of its stamp program, the service savs.

The Postal Service sought a 2-cent increase in postage rates for 2011, but the Postal Rate Commission rejected the request. The Postal Service lost \$8.5 billion in the year ending Sept. 30, even after trimming more than 100,000 jobs in recent years, and estimates it will lose \$6 billion to \$7 billion in the next year.

TEXAS Police: Cop slain trying to protect child

ARLINGTON — A rookie police officer responding to a domestic violence call in suburban Dallas was shot to death trying to protect an 11year-old girl from her mother's gun-wielding ex-boyfriend, a department spokeswoman said Wednesday.

Tiara Ellis Richard said Arlington officer Jillian Michelle Smith, 24, was shot by Barnes Samuel Nettles on Tuesday night as she sought to shield the girl from the 38-year-old man after he entered the apartment of Kimberly Deshay Carter, 29. After shooting Smith, Nettles shot Carter to death in a back bedroom, then returned to the living room, where he killed himself, Richard said.

"It appears (Smith) was moving in the direction of the child in an effort to protect her and, in that process, she was shot," Richard said, citing the girl's statement and forensic evidence.

According to Richard, Smith was shot about 20 minutes after arriving at the apartment. Nettles had left the apartment but returned while Smith was there taking the report, she said.

It's unclear who reported the shootings to police, Richard said. The 11-year-old girl was unharmed and staying with relatives, the spokeswoman said.

CALIFORNIA Defense might claim Jackson killed self

LOS ANGELES – The defense for the doctor facing trial for involuntary manslaughter in Michael Jackson's death will suggest the singer actually killed himself, a prosecutor said during a hearing Wednesday.

"I do think it's clear the defense is operating under the theory that the victim, Michael Jackson, killed himself," said Deputy District Attorney David Walgren.

'They don't want to say it but that's the direction in which they are going.

The statement came at a hearing where a lawyer for Dr. Conrad Murray clashed with the prosecutor over who should test residue from two syringes found in Jackson's bedroom.

Defense attorney J. Michael Flanagan declined to comment on any theories of defense outside court and said lawyers were still investigating the case.

A preliminary hearing is scheduled to begin Jan. 4 after which Superior Court Judge Michael Pastor will decide if there is sufficient evidence to hold Murray for trial. The issue of residue in the syringes is unlikely to be brought up in that hearing, attorneys said.

FLORIDA Feud over Ex-Venezuelan leaders's body ends

MIAMI - Capping a series of events straight out of a telenovela, the mistress of charismatic and controversial former Venezuelan president Carlos Andres Perez agreed Wednesday to honor his estranged wife's wishes and allow his body to be buried in his homeland.

Perez's longtime partner, Cecilia Matos, and the couple's two adult daughters had planned to bury him in South Florida after a Mass on Wednesday.

But less than 24 hours before the ceremony, lawyers for wife Blanca Rodriguez de Perez went to court and convinced a Miami-Dade Circuit Court judge to issue an order stopping it.

One of his daughters with Matos, Maria Francia Perez, told The Associated Press on Wednesday that his body will remain at the funeral home until it can be sent back to Venezuela. She was not sure when that would happen.

'Returning him is a manner of offering a tribute to him," she said. "Carlos Andres Perez moved on to belong, now to Venezuela and to all Venezuelans."

Rodriguez, who lives in Venezuela, maintained that she had the right to decide what happened to Perez's body because, while the two were separated, they never legally divorced. She also claims Perez left no written instructions regarding his remains.

Their daughter, Carolina Perez, told The Associated Press in Caracas: "They're still married, and the law is very clear in Venezuela and in the United States: When the person dies, the one who has the right to reclaim the body is the spouse, and we exercised that right."





break the law just increased, thanks to the Idaho Department of Fish and Game's new four-legged enforcement tool – a 1-year-old black Labrador named Pepper.

Pepper is part of a five-year pilot program to help track poachers and assist in search and rescue. He also will help promote conservation efforts by visiting area schools and other groups, said handler Jim Stirling, a conservation officer with Fish and Game.

The program is funded by donations from sportsmen's groups, he said.

About 18 other states have similar K-9 programs, Stirling said, but Idaho

The chances of catching those who will be the first that he knows of in the West. Pepper was donated in November to Fish and Game by Rich Regnier, owner of Hagerman-based Mill Iron Kennels.

Stirling and Pepper will attend training at the end of January in Indiana. He hopes to have Pepper working at full capacity by early spring.

Hooked on hunting

Outdoorsmen, get your gear ready. According to early predictions, 2011 could be a good year for fishing and upland game hunting in south-central Idaho.

Though we won't know until spring, if nesting conditions continue to be good we could see a "boom" in upland game populations, said Gary Hompland, regional conservation officer for Idaho Department of Fish and Game.

"Conditions look to be pretty good with some of the recent settling of snow," Hompland said.

Population numbers likely will be best for quail, gray partridge and pheasant, he said.

It's also still too early to tell about fishing, as a good prognosis depends on spring water levels, said Regional Fisheries Manager Doug Megargle.

"But we're on a good track with the snowfall and moisture we've been getting," Megargle said. If south-central Idaho continues to receive plentiful snowpack and high moisture levels, he said, it should make a good year for fishing.

Something else for 2011: Anglers should check out the new fishing regulations handbook, formatted in a new style and with new rules, including all-year fishing at some waters.

Enhanced technology

Getting lost just got more fun with 2011 Global Positioning Units.

One GPS manufacturer, Garmin, has released a new program called BirdsEye. Similar to Google Earth, BirdsEye is a detailed, photo-based map of the entire globe. Images are supplied by DigitalGlobe and allow users to overlay them with vector images. Images, at many places in the U.S., can be viewed at zoom levels of 12 miles to 20 feet.

The units are more accurate than anything on the market to date, said Josh Anderson, a sales associate at Sportsman's Warehouse in Twin Falls. He teaches a GPS class on the third Saturday of each month at the store.

"Some of the units are programmed with topo maps," he said. "Some units have an external and internal memory ... it gives me more versatility."

As nifty as these devices are, they'll definitely make a dent in your wallet or purse. Prices start at \$299 up to around \$599, Anderson said.

"That can be a lot of money for your first unit," he said. "But after you see what they can do and what you want to do with them, it's easier to buy a more expensive one next time."

BirdsEye is a harbinger of more technology to come. Technology changes about as fast with GPS units as it does with computers, Anderson said, noting that GPS units are one of the store's top-selling items. He expects the trend to continue in 2011, perhaps more so because of BirdsEve.

Anderson offers one piece of advice: Have a backup plan. He carries along a paper map and compass on his outdoors trips.

"These are electronic devices and can still break down," he said.

Protecting wildlife from stray cats

"I have a neigh-• bor that has been • acquiring stray ASK THE cats and turning them loose along the canal bank. They are devastating the game birds and other wildlife in the area. Isn't this against the law?"

• Game laws have • very little authority over pets running at large, except for dogs chasing or harassing big game animals.

If it could be proven your neighbor released a domestic cat to the wild that killed numerous protected birds, over the course of an extended period of time with knowledge of the owner, and no attempts to



This would be a difficult Idaho Fish and case to successfully prosecute due to the difficulty of proving knowledge and negligence by the owner as well as the inherent fondness of the public for cats as pets.

Idaho Depart of Agriculture laws contain several statutes related to cruelty to animals and are focused on improper care or treatment of domestic animals. Taking a domesticated animal and turning

these animals are killed by automobiles while scavenging for road-killed wildlife.

In Idaho law, the term "cruelty" has several meanings, one of which includes "abandonment" and another "To subject to suffering, inflict unnecessary cruelty ... " One may be able to conclude the release of a domestic animal to the wild to fend for itself is "unnecessary cruelty."

Without regard to Idaho law, releasing domestic cats to become feral or "wild" is unethical and a blatant disregard for the value of the pet as well as Idaho's true wildlife. The environmental fishandgame.idaho.gov. damage and loss of bird numbers as well as bird

animals, wild or domestic, suffer. To release domestic pets into the environment to "live off the land" is selfish and disrespectful to faithful pets, subjecting them to malnutrition and often an agonizing death. It is also irresponsible for pet owners to subject our dwindling wildlife populations to unnecessary losses by an effective-introduced predator.

BAILEYVILLE, Ill. _ Kevin Henze harvested a deer last month while bow hunting.

It may not seem like big news for a lifelong hunter, but it is for a man who a year ago thought his hunting days were over - forever.

Using trekking poles while hiking may take a load off

Hiking is great exercise, but all that climbing up and down can result in some sore muscles. Add some trekking poles, however, and that soreness could be lessened, a study found.

Researchers from the United Kingdom took 26 men and 11 women who were physically active to the highest peak in England and Wales for a day hike. About half the study participants used trekking poles on the ascents and descents, while the rest used no poles and acted as group. control а Otherwise, the groups were similar - they hiked together, so times were comparable.

Everyone also carried a day pack and ate the same food.

Average heart rates for the two groups on the ascents and descents were about equal. But differences showed up for rates of perceived exertion, a measure of how hard people think they're working, based on monitoring functions such as heart rate, perspiration and breathing. Those with the trekking poles had significantly lower RPE than the control group on parts of the ascents, while there were no differences in RPE on the descents.

Those with poles had less muscle soreness than those in the control group. The pole group also showed a reduced loss of strength and a speedier recovery right after hiking, as well as one and two days afterward, compared with the control group.

The study appears in the January issue of the journal Medicine & Science in Sports & Exercise.

Feeding spot gives close views of elk

NORTH POWDER, Ore. – A bull elk swaggers through a curtain of falling snow, shaking his majestic 35-pound antlers as a warning to others in the herd to get out of its way.

"The shocking thing is to see these elk out in the open," says high school soccer coach Anthony Washington, 37, of Baker City, Ore., who is watching from another T&T Wildlife Tours wagon with his wife, Amanda, and 3-year-old son, Antonio.

About 70 Rocky Mountain elk gather daily at Anthony Creek, an Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife feeding site at 4,100 feet elevation along the base of northeastern Oregon's craggy Elkhorn Mountains. The department feeds the big animals to prevent them from raiding the haystacks of nearby ranchers.

T&T owners Susan Triplett and Alice Trindle, both of Haines, expect to take 1,500 visitors among the elk this vear.

The elk herd ranges from gangly 300-pound calves to magnificent bulls tipping the scales at 1,000 pounds or more. Cow elk often weigh about 650 pounds.

Trindle and Triplett see many of the elk year after year and even give nicknames to some. Among this herd, some elk may live 15 years.



Variety is the key to a successful vegan diet

DEAR DR. GOTT: I

would like you to give us interested readers your opinion on the vegan diet.

There are members of my family who have taken on this way of eating for well over a year now. Yes, indeed, they have lost a lot of weight on it, but my concern is what it is doing or rather not doing for the body. Their color seems pale to me, for one thing, and when they come to my house, they eat whatever I have with gusto.

DEAR READER: I'm a bit confused. If they eat whatever you prepare, they are either being kind or they aren't true vegans. This diet excludes all animalderived ingredients such as



meat, eggs and dairy products. Many vegans prefer not to eat any foods that use animal products as part of the processing, such as refined white sugar.

The diet includes soy milk, tofu, peanut butter, rice, beans, fruits, nuts, vegetables and grains. Almost all foods, with the exception of alcohol, fats and sugar provide some necessary protein to the daily diet. Keep in mind that because the habit is so

popular, producers are now manufacturing hot dogs, cheeses, mayonnaise, iced cream and countless other items – all without the use of animal products.

People may make the decision to become vegans for a variety of reasons, such as health, weight loss or for the environment. Because the diet is relatively free of saturated fats and cholesterol, it's an easy way to lose weight. The diet lacks vitamin D. A simple means of combating this is through exposure to sunlight. Calcium can be obtained through the inclusion of fortified orange juice, dark leafy green vegetables, tofu processed with calcium

sulfate and more. In fact, orange juice fortified with calcium will provide 300 milligrams in one 8-ounce glass. The Recommended Daily Allowance for adults between the ages of 19 and 50 is 1,000 milligrams per day, an easy goal to achieve when dairy is part of the diet.

The key to a successful diet is variety. Those who follow it religiously can enjoy stir-fried vegetables, whole-wheat breads, dates, apples, frozen fruit desserts, tofu lasagna, soy iced cream, veggie burgers and a great deal more. I don't know about you, but it sounds good to me. Therefore, while it's not my choice, I must accept that

some people prefer to follow veganism.

I do recommend a person check with his or her physician before making the dramatic change. People should make sure that they receive adequate vitamins and minerals daily and should undergo blood tests periodically to determine that they are neither anemic nor vitamin deficient. If so, dietary modifications or supplements might be appropriate. A physician or nutritionist can answer any questions.

3 suicide **bombers** used to kill Iraqi cop


BAGHDAD (AP) - Police commander Lt. Col. Shamil al-Jabouri knew al-Qaida wanted him dead. He was renowned in the tense northern city of Mosul for his relentless pursuit of the terror group, and insurgents had tried at least five times to kill him for it.

On the sixth attempt, al-Qaida left little to chance.

As al-Jabouri slept Wednesday morning on a couch in his office, three men wearing police uniforms over vests laden with explosives slipped through an opening in the blast walls surrounding the compound where his building stood, police said.

Police manning one of at least four observation towers surrounding the compound shot one of the attackers in a yard and his vest exploded. Under the cover of that blast, police said, the other suicide bombers two charged about 100 yards and made it into al-Jabouri's single-story building.

They detonated their vests simultaneously – one at the door of al-Jabouri's office killing the commander instantly and injuring a policeman sleeping in a trailer nearby. The two blasts brought the whole building down, burying the slain commander under the rubble, police said.

Donor in first successful transplant dies in Maine

PORTLAND, Maine dying twin brother 56 years ago in what's recognized as the world's first successful organ transplant, has died of complications following heart surgery. He was 79.

Herrick died Monday at the Augusta Rehabilitation Center in Augusta, said his wife, Cynthia. He had been in deteriorating health since his October surgery, she said.

at what is now Brigham and Women's Hospital in Boston. The 5 1/2-hour operation on Dec. 23, 1954, kept Herrick's brother alive for eight years and was the first successful organ transplant, according to the United Network for Organ Sharing. Lead surgeon Dr. Murray said. Joseph Murray went on to win a Nobel Prize.

The operation proved that transplants were possible and led to thousands of other successful kidney transplants and ultimately the transplant of other organs. Doctors had tried a handful of transplants worldwide without success up to that point, said Murray, who Cynthia Herrick. "There went on to perform another 18 transplants between identical twins.

"This operation rejuvetransplantation," Murray, 91, told The Associated Press in a phone interview from his home in Wellesley, Mass. "There were other people studying transplants in four or five different countries, sold their farm and moved but the fact that it worked to a house in Belgrade.

Herrick was raised on a Ronald Lee Herrick, who family farm in Rutland, donated a kidney to his Mass., where he graduated high school. He later served in the U.S. Army.

At 23, Herrick was glad to give up a kidney if it would help his brother, who was dying from chronic nephritis, an inflammation of the kidneys. Murray thought the odds of a transplanted organ being accepted would be enhanced since they were identical twins.

Before the operation, Herrick gave a kidney to many people opposed the his twin brother, Richard, idea of transplanting a body organ, equating it with desecration of a body. Others felt it was unethical to operate on healthy humans, and respected editors of medical journals wrote that it was contrary to the Hippocratic Oath's vow to never do harm to anyone,

But Herrick never wavered and the operation went on as planned with no complications. Richard Herrick met his future wife, Clare, in the recovery room, where she was a nursing supervisor.

Jazz promoter Billy Taylor dies

Taylor died Tuesday of a heart attack in Manhattan, said his wife, Theodora Taylor. "He enjoyed his life," she said. "Music was his love."

Taylor Though he had a spanned decades, and played with luminaries such as Charlie Parker, Dizzy Gillespie and Miles Davis, Billy Taylor was probably best known as a tireless jazz booster, educator and broadcaster.

Dr. Taylor, as he preferred to be called, was the first black to lead a television studio orchestra in the 1950s. He helped found Jazzmobile in the 1960s - which beganas mobile, outdoor concerts on a parade float to bring free music to inner city neighborhoods. He was host of a popular jazz show on National Public Radio from 1977 to 1982.

And, in what he later called one of his more significant accomplishments, he profiled musicians for CBS' Sunday Morning show winning an Emmy Award in 1983 for a piece on Quincy Jones.







NFL fines Favre \$50K for 'failure to cooperate'

EDEN PRAIRIE, Minn. - Brett Favre was fined tially higher level of discipline." \$50,000 by the NFL for failing to cooperate with its investigation of inappropriate messages and lewd photos he allegedly sent to a former Jets game-day emplovee.

Commissioner Roger Goodell "could not conclude" that Favre violated the league's personal conduct policy based on the evidence currently available to him.

The league said forensic analysis failed to establish that the 41-year-old Minnesota Vikings quarterback sent objectionable photographs to Jenn Sterger. "The review found no evidence to contradict the statements of both Favre and Sterger that they never met in person, nor was there anything to suggest that Sterger engaged in any inappropriate conduct," its statement announcing the fine said

The NFL said its sole focus was on whether Favre violated workplace conduct policy, not to "make judgments about the appropriateness of personal relationships."

Goodell determined Favre was "not candid in several respects during the investigation resulting in a longer review and additional negative public attention for Favre, Sterger and the NFL," the league said. The NFL's investigation began in early October.

The commissioner also told Favre that if he had found a violation of the league's workplace conduct policies, he would have imposed a "substan-

Favre's fine will help fund a new training program on workplace conduct around the NFL. Goodell said in a memo sent to clubs Wednesday, though for the multimillionaire QB the penalty is a pittance. Even while sitting out of Tuesday's game at Philadelphia because of post-concussion symptoms, Favre essentially earned \$50,000 over about five minutes of action.

Favre's NFL record for consecutive starts was snapped at 297 after he sprained throwing shoulder kept him out of a Dec. 13 loss to the New York Giants. He then sustained a concussion against Chicago on Dec. 20. He may be playing his last game on Sunday, when the regular season ends, if he is healthy.

There was no immediate comment from Favre or his agent, Bus Cook.

WASHINGTON - Ralph Friedgen soaked in the chants and fought back a few more tears. He gave a parting gift to his alma mater - the highest point total Maryland has ever posted in a bowl game - then followed it with a parting shot at the administration that fired him.

Already the Atlantic Coast Conference coach of the year, already the engineer of the second-biggest regular season turnaround in the country, Friedgen ended his 10year run with the Terrapins on Wednesday with a 51-20 victory over East Carolina in the Military Bowl.

"It's been real surreal," Friedgen said. "To be honest with you, I'm a little bit overwhelmed by it. I really had no idea that people even thought that much of me."

Patrolling the Maryland sideline one last time, holding his customary playsheet and wearing a white cap with game as Maryland coach. the word "Terps" in red, Friedgen wound up a 9-4 season and a 75-50 Maryland decade that includes a 5-2 record in bowl games. 





THE ACES ON BRI

Today's deal comes from "Masterpieces of Defense" by Julian Pottage, a writer who has demonstrated imagination and creativity in constructing bridge problems of all sorts. I wholeheartedly recommend his book.

Put yourself in the West seat and cover up the South and East cards to re-create the real-life problem you might be facing. A strong no-trump opening bid by South and a Texas transfer by North sees you defending four spades. You lead the heart three, and partner plays king, ace and the five, declarer following three times. What now?

The first question is whether your side might have a minor-suit ace to cash. You should assume that the answer is no — if you can trust your partner. The point is that if your partner had a minorsuit ace, he should have cashed it at trick three and not left you to guess what to do.

Assuming that to be true, where else might a defensive winner come from? Obviously, if partner has a natural trump trick, he will get it whatever you do, so try to determine when your play might make a difference. The answer is that if partner has precisely K-9-x of spades, you might be able to build a trump trick for him.

Your only legitimate way to achieve the trump promotion is by continuing with a fourth round of hearts. Whatever declarer does now, East must make a trump trick (provided he remembers not to overruff the spade queen).




