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Bomb scare

T.F. police destroy suitcase left near propane tanks

A brown plastic suitcase left next to propane tanks Wednesday prompted a bomb scare that led to the closure of the northeast corner of the intersection of Addison Avenue and Washington Street, next to the Swensens Market.

Twin Falls police responded to a call about the suspicious suitcase shortly after 1 p.m. and had it destroyed by shortly after 2 p.m., which reopened the roads. The suitcase ended up being non-threatening, but with its proximity to the propane tanks at the store, it was better safe than sorry, police said.

"That's the reason we treated it like a suspicious package, instead of just something that someone left behind," said Twin Falls Police Bomb Technician Lucas Allen. "We have to treat it like an event."

Another bomb technician suited up to check out the package, Allen said. He used a disruptor, a low-impact tool designed to separate vital components in bombs without setting them off, to destroy the suitcase.

A customer at Swensens saw the package Wednesday afternoon and reported it.

"(Swensens employees) didn't want to touch it, which is a good move," Allen said. "If you are

Blaine Co. Sheriff to resign

Blaine County Sheriff Walt Femling announced Wednesday that he will resign as sheriff on March 1.

Femling, who has served as sheriff for 24 years, cited health concerns behind his "difficult" decision to resign before the completion of his term.

"It has been an honor to serve the citizens of Blaine County as their Sheriff for 24 years, an experience that has been so rewarding for both me and my family," Femling said in a written release. "I am not leaving for another job, or leaving Blaine County, so I hope to stay engaged in our community in the future."

Femling has been involved in a wide range of issues over his years in office, in recent years taking over law enforcement in Ketchum and overseeing construction of a new county jail.

Fewer fields

Recently reduced federal support has left biologists concerned for a subspecies of grouse that calls Idaho's deserts home.

Federal officials are celebrating the 25th anniversary of the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Conservation Reserve Program, established by the 1985 farm bill. But the program this year is conserving less land and the Columbian sharp-tailed grouse may feel the pinch.

CRP was created to reduce soil erosion, improve water quality and preserve wildlife by encouraging farmers to convert environmentally sensitive land from crop production to wild vegetative cover.

While the program has saved thousands of tons of topsoil and millions of acres of wetlands, its boon to wildlife has been irreplaceable during decades of increasing development in the West. Wild vegetation in fields and borderlands provides forage and cover for everything from

deer to myriad birds.

Idaho Department of Fish and Game biologist Jeff Kettner said Idaho supports the majority of the nation's Columbian sharp-tailed grouse. Kettner said the population began to decline in the mid-1980s, just about the time the CRP began. Petitions to list the subspecies as endangered popped up in 1995 and 2004. But the grouse is hanging on and Kettner credits CRP with its survival.

CRP allowances peaked in 2007, with almost 37 million acres

leased. That dropped to 31 million as of October 2010, a reduction required by the 2008 farm bill. More importantly, the acreage was redistributed because the bill reduced the amount of land per county that could be under CRP contract to 25 percent.

A subprogram of CRP, called State Acres for Wildlife Enhancement, preserves habitat of specific species but takes a part of that 25 percent.

That meant big changes in Idaho,

Local driving instructor challenges McDonald's commercial

While McDonald's restaurants get plenty of attention for their food — "Billions and billions served" — a recent commercial made a local driver's education teacher take notice.

Debbie Cottenware has taught the finer details of driving to students in three different states for the past 23 years. She's watched as young high school students learned to drive on ice and parallel park in tight spots. She's also had a front seat to many driving trends of the past two decades, including a decided shift away from the advice most drivers older than 20 were given.

The "10 and 2" hand position many of us grew up learning as correct has given way to "9 and 3" or even "8 and 4," Cottenware said, as the positions help prevent injuries related to air bag inflation during crashes.

McDonald's officials apparently hadn't received that memo before they shot a recent com-

mercial. In it, a teen driver gets his license, prompting his father to suggest a trip to McDonald's in celebration. As the rest of the family noshes on burgers, the momentarily distracted teen driver is admonished by his father to keep his hands at "10 and 2."

Cottenware said it's a great commercial that promotes awareness in the car. But when it comes to following regulations, Cottenware said Mickey D's is a little

behind the times.

"I'm not telling them anything bad because we (driver's education teachers) don't talk that much about eating and drinking in the car," she said. "He's driving with both hands on the wheel, which is good, but let's put them in the right place."

Cottenware called the local McDonald's owners, Bill, Donna and Darren Kyle, to see what could be done about changing the commercial

to show correct hand placement. They referred her to their regional marketing company in Seattle and after a series of e-mails and phone calls, Cottenware said she received a response informing her that the driving position would be updated in future McDonald's commercials.

The *Times-News*'s calls for comment directed to McDonald's regional corporate office in Seattle were not returned.

Cottenware gathered information from AAA and the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration to prove her points.

"It's changed with the evolution of air bags," she said of proper driving position. "They deploy at 200 miles per hour and if your thumbs are wrapped around the wheel they will break. The air bag moves hands out where the chemicals are released so your arms will be burned."

She hopes that changing the "10 and 2" reference will help promote safer driving habits.

Cottenware teaches in Hansen, Carey and at the Professional Driving School in Twin Falls. While she got into teaching driver's education by accident, she said she found her niche there.

"You don't have to have nerves of steel but you do need patience and common sense," she said.

Burley man charged with sex crimes resigns as teacher

The Cassia County School District has accepted the resignation of a former teacher charged with child sex crimes.

Michael Scott Brinkerhoff, 42, tendered his resignation as a drama and English teacher at Burley Junior High School in December, according to a district official.

He was charged in August with felony child enticement and sexual abuse of a child younger than 16 for allegedly creating a fictitious Facebook persona to engage in sexually charged online conversation with an underage female student. Brinkerhoff pleaded not guilty to the charges and is scheduled for a March 7 jury trial, preceded by a March 1 pre-trial conference.

dealing with (something) suspicious, call us and we'll come out and take a look at it."

Allen said that even if the owner of the suitcase came forward, he or she couldn't be charged with anything:

There appeared to be no intent of sparking a bomb threat.

Allen said the police department receives about 20 to 30 calls annually to have explosives removed or suspicious packages checked out.

Sheriff's Lt. Jay Davis said Wednesday afternoon that Femling's announcement was "very, very hard to hear" when he told his employees earlier that day.

"It was an emotional moment for all of us," Davis said. "He has been the best sheriff that I have ever known. He's just going to be missed."

Femling wasn't immediately available for further comment Wednesday afternoon.

He was last re-elected to his post in 2008 for a four-

year term.

As an elected official retiring mid-term, his successor will be appointed by the Blaine County Commission from nominations by the county Republican Central Committee, as laid out in Idaho Code. Femling is a Republican.

especially in seven southeastern counties that harbor sharp-tailed grouse. Some of those had as much as 45 percent of their land in CRP, so the resulting loss of habitat was great.

Some counties, including Cassia, Oneida and Franklin, saw small increases in CRP acreage but not enough to offset larger losses elsewhere. As of October, Bannock and Power counties had each lost more than 30,000 acres of CRP land.

Kettner called it a big loss because some of those fields had been in CRP for a long time and were established habitat.

"That region is the stronghold of the sharp-tailed grouse, and in the last two years it's seen a loss of 150,000 acres of CRP land," Kettner said. "That's a pretty big blow after so much habitat has been lost to overgrazing, human settlement and other disturbance."

Concerned with the added loss of habitat, IDFG recently awarded a grant to a University of Idaho graduate student to track grouse pop-

ulations more directly over the next few years.

"There's this belief that that birds responded after the CRP was put in place," Kettner said. "It would be nice to be able to show a direct link between habitat and birds."

Lance Phillips, executive director of the Farm Service Agency's Twin Falls County office, said there could be another round of CRP enrollment this year, especially with another 12 million acres of CRP land about to expire nationwide. Kettner hopes more land won't be lost in southeastern Idaho.

Scientist haunted by misuse of drugs he invented

WASHINGTON — David Nichols studies the way psychedelic drugs act in the brains of rats. But he's haunted by how humans hijack his work to make street drugs, sometimes causing overdose deaths.

Nichols makes chemicals roughly similar to Ecstasy and LSD that are supposed to help explain how parts of the brain function. Then he publishes the results for other scientists, hoping his work one day leads to treatments for depression or Parkinson's disease.

But Nichols' findings have not stayed in purely scientific circles. They've also been exploited by black market labs to make cheap and marginally legal recreational drugs.

"You try to work for something good, and it's subverted in a way," Nichols said. "I try not to think about it."

Now the 66-year-old chairman of the Purdue University pharmacology department is speaking out in one of the world's most prestigious scientific journals to describe an ethical struggle seldom discussed by brain researchers.

"You can't control what people do with what you publish, but yeah, I felt it personally," he said in a phone interview, explaining

that his struggles are probably somewhat similar to those faced by the inventor of the machine gun, although not as severe. The journal Nature published his essay online Wednesday.

"What if a substance that seems innocuous is marketed and becomes wildly popular on the dance scene, but then millions of users develop an unusual type of kidney damage that proves irreversible and difficult to treat, or even life-threatening or fatal?" Nichols wrote. "That would be a disaster of immense proportions. This question, which was never part of my research focus, now haunts me."

Nichols has studied psychedelic drugs for more than 40 years, concentrating on serotonin. That's a basic chemical "that goes to every part of the brain. It's involved in appetite, sleep, sex, aggression, you name it," Nichols said in the interview with The Associated Press. "It really plays a key role in

brain activation, the difference between being awake and being asleep."

Nichols estimates that at least five of his compounds — out of hundreds — have been turned into street drugs.

His drug work used to be a joking matter. People would ask him if he needed human test subjects, and he would respond: "No, it's just rat stuff."

"I never thought of these getting out of the lab," he told the AP. Sure, the field includes research into LSD and other hallucinogens, but Nichols never imagined his work escaping the lab and causing death. The worst would be maybe someone getting high on stuff they shouldn't, he figured.

"Every time we make a molecule now, I do think, 'Is this the one that's going to be a problem?' I never used to think that before," Nichols said.

One chemical was so potent that "I just stopped and said, 'We're not going to

study this one. This stuff would hit the market big-time,'" he said.

That wasn't the case almost 20 years ago, when he developed something similar to Ecstasy — but not nearly as potent. Back then it was a little-known street drug. He published his study, found little interest from pharmaceutical companies in his chemical, called MTA, and moved on.

But somebody in the illicit world of drug abuse read his research and synthesized that drug into tablets for street use. It was eerily called "flatliners." But it really didn't provide much of a high. "Flatline implies that you're brain dead," Nichols said. "Why would anyone take it?"

People did. They took too much. Their brains were flooded with serotonin, and they died. The first time Nichols was told about it, only two people had died.

At least five or six people died from that first drug. A second drug, a hallucinogenic called bromo-dragonfly, has killed two others.

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Police: Man steals cop car in attempt to be deported

Resident alien charged with 4 felonies in theft

Guadalupe Cruz Vasquez wanted to get out of the

country, but he may be forced to stay a few years longer. The resident alien is being charged with four felonies in Jerome County for allegedly stealing a police car late Monday after Jerome police told him they couldn't deport him. Aside from Vasquez's legal status in the country, the police department isn't equipped to

deport anyone, said Lt. Kevin Haight with the Idaho State Police, the investigating agency. Deportation is a federal matter, he said. "Fifteen or so minutes after that, he stole the police car," Haight said. "Our belief, the premise that we're running on, is that he did that so he could accomplish what he was trying to accomplish."

Vasquez, 38, will be arraigned Friday in Jerome County 5th District Court. The county clerk's office said any talks of deporting him will likely be later in the court process. Police allege Vasquez broke a window in a Jerome police car, which had its keys in it, and took off. Almost two hours later, he was

stopped and arrested in Carey, about 60 miles away. The vehicle had two police firearms in it, police said. As a result, Vasquez is being charged with two felony counts of grand theft of a firearm, along with felony grand theft auto and burglary. It doesn't appear Vasquez tried to access either weapon, said Jerome Police

Chief Dan Hall. "Obviously nobody likes to get a car stolen, but the way all the law enforcement agencies promptly responded to the situation made for a speedy recovery," Hall said. "I'm just very thankful and appreciative that it came to a rapid end with no one injured and no major property damage."

Winner steps forward in Wash.; Idaho in suspense

EPHRATA, Wash. — The suspense over who bought the two winning tickets in the \$380 million Mega Millions lottery focused Wednesday on two small towns nestled just 125 miles apart in the snow-covered Pacific Northwest. One was sold at a Safeway supermarket in eastern Washington and the other in Post Falls, Idaho. Washington Lottery Communications Director Scott Kinney said the Washington ticket was sold to a retired man who plans to bring his family to claim his winnings on Thursday. But no one in Idaho has come forward yet to claim the prize. Each ticket is worth \$190 million, paid in 26 annual installments. The prospect of winning the second biggest jackpot in history drew huge interest across the country as thousands of people lined up to buy tickets in the 41 states and Washington, D.C., where the lottery is held. A day after the drawing, all eyes were on a region where most of the nation's frozen french fries are produced, and on the similarity between the winning digits and the ones used by a character on the television show "Lost." The winners had to match five regular numbers plus the "Mega ball." The winning numbers were 4, 8, 15, 25 and 47, with the Mega ball number of 42. Four of the six winning numbers matched numbers that were prominently featured throughout the popular series — 4, 8, 15, 16, 23 and 42. Video producer Ryan Jones of New York said he and a co-worker pooled their money to buy 10 tickets, but he returned to the grocery store to buy an 11th entry just to play the "Lost" numbers. Mega Millions said 25,587

tickets matched three of the winning numbers, plus the bonus number — so anyone who played the "Lost" numbers won \$150 per ticket. "When the numbers popped up, I did have a moment where I thought: 'You know, I could take this money and run, just get far away from Sarah and not share it with her,'" Jones said. Jones added he decided to share the prize. Character Hugo "Hurley" Reyes became a multimillionaire on "Lost" when he won using numbers repeated by a former Navy seaman who became a patient in a mental institution. Hurley was also a patient.

Jerome landlords stuck with utility bills

JEROME — The Jerome City Council on Tuesday passed a controversial ordinance placing responsibility for unpaid utility bills in the hands of landlords. Council members voted 3-1 to suspend their rules and move ahead to a vote on the ordinance that evening, then approved it with another 3-1 vote. The ordinance is meant to address a rising number of delinquent utility bills over the past year. It puts ultimate responsibility for paying utility-related fees and charges on property owners rather than their tenants. In 2008, the city turned

over \$6,776 in delinquent accounts to collections. Last year, that amount increased to \$13,443. City Administrator Ben Marchant said 85 percent of delinquent bills come from renters. And while the amount owed is less than 1 percent of the city's yearly budget, council members said it was an important issue to resolve. About nine landlords attended the meeting. Sandra Capps, property owner and real-estate agent for NorthPointe Realty, asked the council to delay its vote until members had more information on the number of bills from homes in foreclosure. "I think a lot of the bills are

from foreclosures and people walking away. There were 84 foreclosures in 2010," Capps said. "Our real-estate market is so poor right now that I think this is just another nail in the coffin." Councilman Chris Barber spoke against the ordinance. "It's just not fair. No one wants to pick up an unpaid bill," Barber said, arguing there was not enough statistical information to approve the change. "We need to find a better vehicle to correct this problem." A second ordinance passed Tuesday placed a 20 percent delinquency penalty on late utility bills and establishes a reconnect fee of \$75 for restoration of services.

Mayor John Shine said the second ordinance makes a number of changes to discourage delinquent bills. In the case that a tenant does leave without paying their final bill, landlords will not be charged the penalty fees. Shine said landlords will be alerted if a tenant does not pay on time, to decrease the amount that is finally owed. Landlords also have the right to ask for an extra deposit to cover delinquent bills if they so choose, Shine said. In other business, John Lothspeich was sworn into the position of city attorney, taking over for Rob Williams III, who had served as city attorney for 33 years.

Wildfire agreement paid off for Shoshone

SHOSHONE — Shoshone Fire Chief Steve Stock reported Tuesday that the fire department ended the year quietly. "We had a really dull October, November, December, which is good in our business," he told the Shoshone City Council at its regular meeting.

Stock also said that while preparing his end-of-the-year report, he found that many calls his firefighters responded to fell under a mutual aid agreement with the U.S. Bureau of Land Management. Responding to wildfires helped earn the department extra money. In the future, he said, he would like to earmark any similar income for purchasing personal protection equipment.

In other business, the council looked at a bid for creating a new pushplov for the city's loader. Council members had previously decided to purchase a new blade for the loader and then transfer the older blade on to the backhoe. The new blade will be similar to the current one, but 2 feet wider and possibly with wheels on the bottom to prevent wear on the blade.

"Basically, it's just going to be very similar to the one we have," city Maintenance Supervisor Aaron Aggeler said. The council approved \$5,000 for the blade. Also, Mayor J.R. Churchman asked City Clerk Mary Kay Bennett to look into why the city of Shoshone pays itself for utility bills. The council voted to stop the practice if legally feasible.

Here’s to lawmakers who push the envelope

In editorially endorsing a legislative candidate last fall, the Idaho Statesman came up with an intriguing term: The Boise newspaper said it was looking for "outcomes-based" lawmakers. That's about right: The 105 legislators who will start work Monday at the 61st Idaho Legislature can be divided roughly between those who are looking for solutions to Idaho's formidable challenges and those who are in Boise to vote their ideology.

Fortunately, south-central Idaho has more than its share of "outcomes-based" lawmakers:

Our view: For 120 years, Idaho has been a state of pragmatists. Now more than ever, we need that characteristic in our legislators. **What do you think?** We welcome viewpoints from our readers on this and other issues.

state Rep. Fred Wood, R-Burley; Rep. Scott Bedke, R-Oakley; Rep. Maxine Bell, R-Jerome; Sen. Dean Cameron, R-Rupert; Rep. Leon Smith, R-Twin Falls, Rep. Rich Wills, R-Glenns Ferry, and Rep. Wendy Jaquet, D-Ketchum, to name a few. They understand that however difficult times are in Idaho, lawmakers must look beyond their personal views to what's best for the state in the long run.

Wood is a perfect example. The Cassia County physician is as philosophically conservative as they come in Idaho, but he realizes that government isn't going away. So he championed - and largely wrote - the constitutional amendments approved by the voters in last November's election that will give hospitals, airports and municipal power authorities the ability to expand their borrowing authority without leaving property taxpayers holding the bag.

A member of the Joint Finance-Appropriations Committee, Wood has been integral in drafting the budgets over the past few years for the Idaho Department of Health and Welfare, state government's second-largest agency after education. This year, when drastic cuts in Medicaid services for adults are inevitable, he's the ideal person to have in the position of trying to balance scarce resources with critical needs.

Pragmatism is a long tradition among south-central Idaho legislators. Former state Rep. Celia Gould, R-Buhl, now the director of the Idaho Department of Agriculture, started her legislative career as the successor to and admirer of very conservative House Speaker Tom Stivers, R-Twin Falls. But in her 16 years in the House, Gould became one of the most thoughtful and nuanced lawmakers, able to keep faith with her conservative philosophy but recognize the occasions when only the state could rise to the occasion.

Idahoans have long elected legislators to make difficult decisions, not just to vote no. That hasn't changed just because times are tough.

An idea for Washington: Accomplish something

Unless something big and unexpected happens, 2011 will be consumed by a debate over the size of government. Republicans will launch a critique of big government as part of their effort to cut spending. Democrats will surge to the barricades to defend federal programs.

This debate will be contentious, but I hope it's not rude to mention that it will be largely beside the point. National destinies are not shaped by what percentage of GDP federal spending consumes. They are shaped by the character and behavior of citizens. The crucial issue is not whether the federal government takes up 19 percent or 23 percent of national income. The crucial question is: How does government influence how people live?

There have been cases when big government has encouraged virtuous behavior (in the U.S. during World War II), and cases when big government has encouraged self-indulgence and irresponsibility (modern Greece). There have been cases when small government was accompanied by enterprise and development, and cases when small government has led to lawlessness, corruption and distrust.

The size of government doesn't tell you what you need to know; the social and moral content of government action does.

The best way to measure government is not by volume, but by what you might call the Achievement Test. Does a given policy arouse energy, foster skills, spur social mobility and help people transform their lives? Over the years, America has benefited from policies that

passed this test, like the Homestead Act and the G.I. Bill.

Occasionally, the U.S. government has initiated programs that failed it. The welfare policies of the 1960s gave people money without asking for work and personal responsibility in return, and these had to be replaced. The welfare reforms of the 1990s involved big and intrusive government, but they did the job because they were in line with American values, linking effort to reward.

Over the past few decades, Americans have waged political war as if all that matters is the amount of money going into federal coffers. The fights have been about “cutting government” or “raising revenue.” But amid this season of distraction the entire society suffered a loss of values and almost nobody noticed until it was too late. Both business and government started favoring consumption and short-term

comfort and neglecting investment and long-term growth.

If we're going to reverse this tide, it might be useful to put the Achievement Test back at the center of politics. This would help focus the national mind on the fundamental challenge: moving from a consumption-dominated economy oriented around satisfying immediate needs toward a more balanced investment and consumption economy. It might also cut through the gridlocked trench warfare between big-government liberals and small-government conservatives.

Reframing the argument around achievement wouldn't end partisan division. Democrats and Republicans differ on what makes an economy productive. But it would allow for horse-trading.

As part of the budget process, Republicans could champion the things they

believe will enhance productivity and mobility. Many of these will mean making sure people have the incentives to take risks and the freedom to adjust to foreign competition: a flatter, simpler tax code with lower corporate rates, a smaller debt burden, predictable regulations, affordable entitlements.

Democrats could champion the things they believe will enhance productivity and mobility. Many of these will mean making sure everybody has the tools to compete: early childhood education, infrastructure programs to create jobs, immigration policies that recruit talent, incentives for energy innovation.

The two agendas sit in tension, but they are not contradictory. As the parties argue, it should be possible to take items from both and ram them into a package that cuts consumption spending in order to make investment spending more affordable.

How big will the resulting government be? That is a secondary issue.

Chicago politics on the Potomac River

No matter how you rearrange President Obama's inner circle, it still looks, smells and tastes like a rotten Chicago deep-dish pizza.

Ready for the latest topping on this moldy old pie? It's a possible chief of staff slot for Wall Street banker/lawyer/wheeler-dealer William Daley, brother of outgoing Chicago mayor/machine politics mastermind Richard M. Daley, whose retirement paved the way for former Obama chief of staff and Chicago mayoral candidate Rahm Emanuel. Phew.

The White House is reportedly looking to manufacture a “pro-business” aura with Bill Daley, who holds a “corporate responsibility” executive office at J.P. Morgan and once headed the U.S. Chamber of Commerce — the latter, a left-wing hate object and Obama punching bag leading up to the midterms.

But the Beltway-based Chamber of Commerce is too often a fair-weather statist

lobbying organization. It supported the TARP all-purpose bailout, the auto bailout and the bottomless, pork-filled stimulus package, all of which have forcibly redistributed money from taxpayers and small businesses to politically connected special interests.

Daley has about as much real experience creating jobs as Da Boss now sitting at 1600 Pennsylvania Ave. — which is to say, less than a thimble full. In 2009, the head of Chicago's sanitation department implicated Daley in a hiring corruption scheme tied to his brother's mayoral administration. The official was convicted; Daley shrugged off the federal probe. “Even if it happened — and I'm not saying it did — things were different. There was nothing illegal about

that stuff.”

Instead of distancing himself from the favor-trading Wall Street fat cats who have earned the ire of both anti-bailout Tea Party activists and anti-corporate liberals, Obama remains wedded, embedded and indebted to the worst kind.

Bill Clinton, the man who appointed Daley to the Fannie Mae board, also appointed Emanuel to the Freddie Mac board of directors at a time when its oversight manager called the quasi-governmental agency “so pliant” that it enabled rampant book-cooking. Freddie Mac's stock skyrocketed; its CEOs helped themselves to massive bonuses. Emanuel's hometown paper, the *Chicago Tribune*, exposed how Emanuel's “profitable stint” during this corruption-plagued period entailed almost no work:

The board met no more than six times a year. Unlike most fellow directors, Emanuel was not assigned to any of the board's working

committees, according to company proxy statements. Immediately upon joining the board, Emanuel and other new directors qualified for \$380,000 in stock and options plus a \$20,000 annual fee, records indicate.

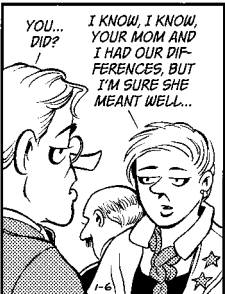
On Emanuel's watch, executives told the board of a plan to use accounting tricks to mislead shareholders about outside profits the government-chartered firm was then reaping from risky investments. The goal was to push earnings onto the books in future years, ensuring that Freddie Mac would appear profitable on paper for years to come and help maximize annual bonuses.

And now the torch may be passed in an endless Windy City circle, from Daley to Emanuel, from Emanuel to Daley, with Obama. 'Round and 'round it goes in Chicago on the Potomac.

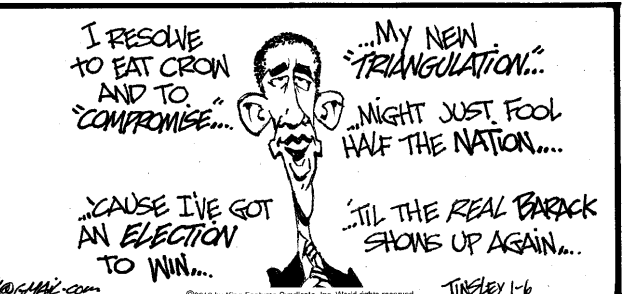

Anonymity and the dark side of the Internet

In McIntyre v. Ohio Elections Commission (1995) the Supreme Court overturned a statute requiring any person who prints a notice or flyer promoting a candidate or an issue to identify the communication's author by name. Justice John Paul Stevens, writing for the majority, grounded his opinion in an account of meaning he takes from an earlier case: "The inherent worth of . . . speech in terms of its capacity for informing the public does not depend upon the identity of its source, whether corporation, association, union, or individual." Or, in other words, a writing or utterance says what it says independently of who happens to say it; the information conveyed does not vary with the identification of the speaker.

There are at least two problems with this reasoning. First, it is not true that a text's meaning is the same whether or not its source is known. Suppose I receive an anonymous note asserting that I have been betrayed by a friend. I will not know what to make of it — is it a cruel joke, a slander, a warning, a test? But if I manage to identify the note's author I will be able to reason about its meaning because I will know what kind of person composed it and what motives that person might have had.

In the same way, if I am the recipient of a campaign

message supporting a candidate or a policy, my assessment of what I am reading or hearing will depend on my knowledge of the sender. Is he, she or it an industry representative, a lobbyist, the ACLU, the Club for Growth? The identity of the speaker is part of the information and is therefore part of the meaning.

The practice of withholding the identity of the speaker is strategic, and one purpose of the strategy is to avoid responsibility and accountability for what one is saying. Anonymity, Martha Nussbaum, a professor of law and philosophy at the University of Chicago observes, allows Internet bloggers "to create for themselves a shame-free zone in which they can inflict shame on others." The power of the bloggers, she continues, "depends on their ability to insulate their Internet selves from responsibility in the real world, while ensuring real-world consequences" for those they injure.

Nussbaum is writing as a co-editor of, and contributor to, a new set of essays on the dark side of the Internet titled The Offensive Internet. The question that drives the volume is "what

can be done about irresponsible information" spread by the Internet, a medium that allows slander to "be done with a few keystrokes, with complete anonymity, and ... with no fear that the Internet provider on whose website the slur is found will somehow be held responsible for incorrect ... or defamatory statements"? In the course of the volume the Internet is characterized as a cesspool, a porn store, a form of pinkeye, a raunchy fraternity, a graffiti-filled bathroom wall, a haven for sociopaths, and the breeder of online mobs who are no better than "masked Klan members" in their determination to "interfere with victims' basic rights."

The authors make these charges against the background of the standard honorific description of the Internet: it is the ultimate realization of "the marketplace of ideas," that non-physical space dedicated "to the emergence of truth." Cass Sunstein invokes this hoary metaphor only to call it into question. Rumors cascade, Sunstein explains, when someone relies on what someone else has said and then spreads a falsehood as truth. The Internet multiplies the effect exponentially: an "initial blunder . . . can start a process by which a number of people participate in creating serious mistakes." Rather than producing truth, the free and open marketplace of the Internet "will lead many people to

accept damaging and destructive falsehoods," and unless there is "some kind of chilling effect on false statements," the "proper functioning of democracy itself" may be endangered.

An unconstrained marketplace of ideas is often said to facilitate informed decision-making by providing all the information, even erroneous information, that is out there. But how, asks Brian Leiter in a powerful essay, is the process of deliberation helped by the anonymous poster who reports falsely "that Jane Doe has herpes" and announces "that he would like to sodomize her?" The Internet and the real world, Leiter concludes, "would both be better places" if Internet providers were held accountable for the scurrilous and harmful material they disseminate.

How might that be managed? The answer given by the authors in this volume involves the repeal or modification of Section 230 of the Communications Decency Act, which says that no provider of an Internet service shall be treated as the publisher of information provided by another. That is, the provider is not liable for what others have said, and courts have interpreted that section as immunizing providers even when they "have knowledge that [a statement] is defamatory or invasive of privacy." Saul Levmore suggests

that immunity might be conditioned on the willingness of a provider either to take down a message after notice of its falsity or defamatory character has been given, or "to enforce non-anonymity" and thus open the way for an injured party to seek redress. The law, writes Anupam Chander, "should allow the individual to find information to lead her to the person who committed the privacy invasion." As it is now, with an expansive reading of Section 230, the law no longer puts any obstacles in the way of the sociopath who, traveling on the Internet, can go anywhere and spray venom that lasts forever.

But, as Geoffrey Stone reminds us in his essay, putting obstacles in the way of anyone's speech has been frowned on by the Supreme Court ever since New York Times v. Sullivan (1964), which holds that, at least as regards public officials, debate should be uninhibited and wide open even if it is "vehement" and "caustic" and contains both "factual error" and "defamatory content." In subsequent decisions, the category of "public officials" was widened first to include "public persons" and then to include persons who wander into the ambit of a public event, in short, almost everyone.

The idea is that false and defamatory speech openly published will provoke

counter speech and lead to correction; the truth will ultimately prevail. But how- ever likely that happy outcome may be in the world of books and newspapers, the special conditions and powers of the Internet conspire against it and the more likely outcome is the one prophe- sied by Alexander Pope in the final lines of The Dunciad: "Light dies before thy uncreating word . . . / And universal darkness buries all."

What is remarkable about this volume is that the legal academics who make the arguments I have rehearsed are by and large strong free-speech advocates. Yet faced with the problems posed by the Internet, they start talking about "low value" speech and saying things like "autonomy resides not in free choice per se but in choosing wisely" and "society needs not an absence of 'chill,' but an optimal level."

Perhaps the most amazing statement is made by Daniel J. Solove when he declares that "the law is hampered because it overprotects free speech." The conventional first-amendment wisdom is that free speech cannot be overprotected, but that wisdom is put on trial by these thinkers.

The paradox of America's unborn

The American entertainment industry has never been comfortable with the act of abortion. Film or television characters might consider the procedure, but even on the most libertine programs (a Mad Men, a Sex and the City), they're more likely to have a change of heart than actually go through with it. Reality TV thrives on shocking scenes and subjects — extreme pregnancies and surgeries, suburban polygamists and the gay housewives of New York — but abortion remains a little too controversial, and a little bit too real.

This omission is often cited as a victory for the pro-life movement, and in some cases that's plainly true. (Recent unplanned-pregnancy movies like Juno and Knocked Up made abortion seem not only unnecessary but repellent.) But it can also be a form of cultural denial: a way of reassuring the public that abortion in America is — in Bill Clinton's famous phrase — safe and legal, but also rare.

Rare it isn't: not when one in five pregnancies ends at the abortion clinic. So it was a victory for realism, at least, when MTV decided to supplement its hit reality shows 16 and Pregnant and Teen Mom with last week's special, No Easy Decision, which followed Markai Durham, a teen mother who got pregnant a second time and chose abortion.

MTV being MTV, the special's attitude was res-

olutely pro-choice. But it was a heartbreaking spectacle, whatever your perspective. Durham and her boyfriend are the kind of young people our culture sets adrift — working-class and undereducated, with weak support networks, few authority figures, and no script for sexual maturity beyond the easily neglected admonition to always use a condom. Their televised agony was a case study in how abortion can simultaneously seem like a moral wrong and the only possible solution — because it promised to keep them out of poverty, and to let them give their first daughter opportunities they never had.

The show was particularly wrenching, though, when juxtaposed with two recent dispatches from the world of midlife, upper-middle-class infertility. Last month there was Vanessa Grigoriadis's provocative New York Magazine story "Waking Up from the Pill," which suggested that a lifetime on chemical birth control has encouraged women "to forget about the biological realities of being female ... inadvertently, indirectly, infertility has become the Pill's primary side effect." Then on Sunday, The New York Times Magazine pro-

vided a more intimate look at the look same issue, in which a midlife parent, the journalist Melanie Thernstrom, chronicled what it took to bring her children into the world: six failed in vitro cycles, an egg donor and two surrogate mothers, and an untold fortune in expenses.

In every era, there's been a tragic contrast between the burden of unwanted pregnancies and the burden of infertility. But this gap used to be bridged by adoption far more frequently than it is today. Prior to 1973, 20 percent of births to white, unmarried women (and 9 percent of unwed births over all) led to an adoption. Today, just 1 percent of babies born to unwed mothers are adopted, and would-be adoptive parents face a waiting list that has lengthened beyond reason.

Some of this shift reflects the growing acceptance of single parenting. But some of it reflects the impact of Roe v. Wade. Since 1973, countless lives that might have been welcomed into families like Thernstrom's — which looked into adoption, and gave it up as hopeless — have been cut short in utero instead.

And lives are what they are. On the MTV special, the people around Durham swaddle abortion in euphemism. The being inside her is just "pregnancy tissue." After the abortion, she recalls being warned not to humanize it: "If you think of it like [a person], you're

going to make yourself depressed." Instead, "think of it as what it is: nothing but a little ball of cells."

It's left to Durham herself to cut through the evasion. Sitting with her boyfriend afterward, she begins to cry when he calls the embryo a "thing." Gesturing to their infant daughter, she says, "A 'thing' can turn out like that. That's what I remember ... 'Nothing but a bunch of cells' can be her."

When we want to know this, we know this. Last week's New Yorker carried a poem by Kevin Young about expectant parents, early in pregnancy, probing the mother's womb for a heart-beat:

The doctor trying again to find you, fragile, fern, snowflake. Nothing. After, my wife will say, in fear, impatient, she went beyond her body, this tiny room, into the ether- ... And there it is: faint, an echo, faster and further away than mother's, all beat box and fuzzy feedback. ...

This is the paradox of America's unborn. No life is so desperately sought after, so hungrily desired, so carefully nurtured. And yet no life is so legally unprotected, and so frequently destroyed.

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Officers: Meridian man abducted wife, killed mother

BOISE — A Meridian man is being held without bail after authorities say he tied up his wife, forced her into the trunk of his car, put their infant in the back seat and drove to his mother's home, where he ate dinner with his mother and then stabbed her to death.

Michael James Lee of Meridian was arraigned Wednesday on a first-degree murder charge in the death of 46-year-old Lynn Marie Blake. He was arrested Tuesday night at his moth-

er's home in Eagle, about 15 miles northwest of Boise.

Authorities were called to the scene after Lee's 20-year-old wife, still bound in chains, escaped from the trunk of the car and ran to a nearby house for help, Ada County sheriff's spokeswoman Andrea Dearden said in a release.

Lee also faces kidnapping, aggravated assault, felony injury to a child and other charges. During a brief court appearance, he was ordered held without bail in the Ada County Jail, where he worked for two years before being fired in January 2010.

Dearden said Lee and his wife were at their home in Meridian on Tuesday when he threatened her with a knife, assaulted her and bound her with tape and chains. He then forced her into the vehicle's trunk and drove her and their 4-month-old daughter to his mother's house, Dearden said.

Investigators said Lee brought his baby into the house but she was uninjured.

A 56-year-old woman also lives at the house, and she

told investigators that Lee and his mother had dinner and the three talked for about an hour, having "normal conversations," Dearden said.

The woman, a friend of Lee's mother, said she then decided to lie down. She told police a noise woke her, and when she came out, she found Lee holding two knives and standing over his mother, who had multiple stab wounds, Dearden said. Dearden said the woman suffered non-life-threaten-

ing facial wounds in an ensuing confrontation with Lee.

Meanwhile, Lee's wife was able to escape from the trunk of the car using the emergency latch, and she ran to a neighbor's house to call for help, Dearden said.

"The neighbor didn't understand what was happening," Dearden told the *Idaho Statesman*. "It was chaotic."

Sheriff's deputies and Eagle police responded to find the friend of Lee's mother running from the house, holding the infant and yelling for help, Dearden said.

Police took Lee into custody without incident. Blake was transported to St. Alphonsus Regional Medical Center, where she later died.

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Ada County commissioner hires detective to investigate colleague

BOISE (AP) — A newly elected Ada County commissioner has hired a private detective to investigate a sitting commissioner.

Vern Bisterfeldt hired the detective last month to investigate Sharon Ullman.

"There's no secret about it," Bisterfeldt told the *Idaho Statesman*. "I did it for a very

good reason. I have the documentation."

Bisterfeldt said e-mails he received prompted him to hire the detective, but he won't elaborate about the e-mails. He also won't say what the detective found, if anything.

"You'll just have to wait and see," he said. "When I get

to the bottom of it, I will either have something or I won't."

"There's nothing to dig up on me," said Ullman. "Actually, I welcome it. When I heard about it, I thought, OK, good. As people will tell you, I don't even jay-walk."

Ullman and Rick Yzaguirre

will be joined by Bisterfeldt when he's sworn in Monday.

"Maybe Vern will feel more comfortable with me if he recognizes that we are both in this for the same reason — we want to help the public," Ullman said. "I truly believe that about him."

Bisterfeldt, a former city police officer, said he wants

the city and county to work together. "I am trying to go in there and do a good job and not cause a lot of problems, but I was not the one that started it," said Bisterfeldt, refusing to elaborate.

Ullman said she found out about the investigation when a friend told her about being contacted by the investigator.

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AROUND THE STATE

IDAHO N. Idaho lawmaker to miss part of 2011 Legislature

BOISE — A Republican state lawmaker from northern Idaho will miss at least the first three weeks of the legislative session while she undergoes cancer surgery.

Rep. Marge Chadderdon of Coeur d'Alene says her surgery is scheduled Friday and her daughter, Julie, will fill in for her in the legislature.

Chadderdon tells The Spokesman-Review that she expects to return after three weeks, even if she has to undergo chemotherapy.

The 74-year-old fourth-term lawmaker says her cancer was detected just a few weeks ago during routine screening tests.

Prosecutors drop charges in Blackfoot hazing case

BLACKFOOT — The Bingham County attorney has dropped felony charges against all five former Blackfoot High School athletes accused of hazing classmates last year, including one defendant who was on the Boise State football team last year.

Prosecutor Randy Smith said Wednesday the decision to drop the felony charges of forcible sexual penetration by use of foreign

object was made after reviewing the case with witnesses in recent days.

But Smith said he still intends to pursue misdemeanor charges against Nathan Walker, Logan Chidester, Anthony Clark, all 19, and an unidentified minor. Clark, a freshman at Boise State, was suspended by coaches last month when the allegations surfaced.

A fifth defendant, 19-year-old Tyson Katseanes, pleaded guilty Wednesday to misdemeanor principal battery as part of a plea agreement. He is scheduled to be sentenced Thursday, and under terms of the deal could get 20 hours of community service and one year of probation.

Boy gets ticket after being hit by car

BOISE — Boise police have cited a 12-year-old boy with failing to obey a traffic signal after he was hit by a car while running to catch the bus.

Police say the boy suffered minor scrapes and bruises in the collision at about 7:15 a.m. Wednesday.

Witnesses told police the car had a green light when the boy ran across Veterans Memorial Parkway against the "don't walk" signal and into oncoming traffic.

The driver of the car told police she didn't see the boy until she hit him. Witnesses say the boy was thrown onto the hood of the car and then to the road.

The boy told police he was trying to catch a bus. The citation carries a \$56.50 fine.

Kamiah man arrested after standoff

KAMIAH — Idaho County officials say a Kamiah-area man who "was very unhappy because of a family situation" has been taken into custody after a nearly 10-hour standoff.

Sheriff Doug Giddings tells the Lewiston Tribune that the man, whose identity he did not know, was in the custody of Nez Perce Tribal Police on Wednesday.

Giddings says no one was ever seriously threatened, even though the man fired a gun at one point. He says the man was tearing things up and being obnoxious and noncooperative, but officers were able to talk him into surrendering.

Sheriff: Shots fired at E. Idaho wind farm

BOISE — The Bonneville County sheriff's office says bullets fired at a wind farm in eastern Idaho have caused nearly \$5,000 in damage.

The sheriff's office says BP Wind Energy reported earlier this week that a wind turbine had been shot at twice, resulting in damage to wiring and other equipment.

The damage was first noticed on Dec. 22. Authorities say the vandalism

at the wind farm near Ammon amounts to a felony that is punishable by up to five years in prison and a \$1,000 fine.

Lewiston police sending text alerts

LEWISTON — Police officers in Lewiston have begun sending out text messages with information on crimes and accidents within the northern Idaho city's limits.

The city's website provides updates from the police depart-

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ment to subscribers, who can now also receive alerts from law enforcement on their cell phones.

Police Cpl. Eric Kjorness says police hope to expand the program to include more information on crimes, along with requests for help solving cases.

Northwood Place rentals now open

Development provides 32 units of affordable housing

KETCHUM — Vitus Development, together with the Ketchum Community Development Corporation (KCDC), has announced the completion of Northwood Place, a 32-unit development providing affordable housing at 101 Park Circle, Ketchum.

Units include 12, one-bedroom facilities; 14, two-bedroom units; and six three-bedroom units.

All housing is rent and income restricted for households with incomes equal to or less than 60% of area median income. Residents must meet income requirements to qualify.

Idaho Housing and Finance Association assisted financing for the development.

“Federal stimulus funding administered by IHFA was vital to the completion of this development,” said Gerald Hunter, IHFA President and Executive Director in a press release.

IHFA administered \$7.5 million in Tax Credit Exchange funds and \$230,000 in Tax Credit Assistance Program (TCAP) funds for development.

These funds, part of the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act, allowed construction to begin in 2008-2009.

The development boosts several sustainable features incorporated into each of the five garden style, wood-frame buildings and will help ensure resident’s energy costs remain manageable.

A system of pre-fabricated wall panels will maximize the energy efficiency of the buildings by as much as 30 percent.

Drought tolerant landscape will reduce water usage and a geothermal heat exchange system generates energy for a snow melt system. A sizeable solar installation off-sets much of the common area electrical consumption.

Units are equipped with ENERGY STAR appliances, natural flooring and non-formaldehyde cabinets, and non-toxic paints and adhesives were used during construction.

“Addressing the affordable housing issue in Ketchum has been a long path and Northwood Place is the first major achievement in that effort. Vitus truly enjoyed working with the KCDC and the City of Ketchum to make Northwood a reality and a great success,” said Gregory M. Dunfield, Director of Vitus Development in a release. “Residents who have moved in have been drawn to the quality of new construction, amenities, and green features that Northwood Place offers, and are excited to participate in the spirit of sustainability prevalent in Ketchum.”

Residents are already calling Northwood Place home since move-ins began in November as units were finished; only seven units remain vacant.

Idaho consumers to receive \$300,000 refund from Florida credit counselor

BOISE — The Idaho Department of Finance announced a settlement Tuesday in which Florida-based GHS Solutions agreed to refund \$303,218.23 to Idaho consumers who contracted with the company while it did not hold an Idaho debt and credit counselor license.

In addition, the company paid \$15,000 in penalties, attorney fees and investigative expenses as a sanction for conducting unlicensed debt and credit counseling activity in Idaho.

The settlement requires the company make restitution available for distribution to affected Idaho consumers by June 1.

The department found that since at least July 2008 GHS Solutions provided debt settlement services to at least 143 Idaho consumers.

The company required that consumers open a savings account to be used for debt settlement purposes, and to pay fees to the company for its services. “That type of business activity requires a license under the Idaho Collection Agency Act,” Department of Finance Director Gavin Gee said in a statement.

Personal touches help online craft market flourish

LOS ANGELES— Charles Scott bypassed the malls and the jewelry district in downtown Los Angeles in shopping for an engagement ring. Searching for something out of the ordinary, he surfed onto Etsy.com and started clicking through photos of handcrafted diamond rings.

Using the online marketplace’s “shop local” function, Scott found a Pasadena, Calif., jewelry maker whose handmade Moroccan-inspired wares caught his eye.

“I wanted to not have to go to a store and haggle with someone who sells diamonds all day,” said Scott, who lives nearby in Los Angeles’ Silver Lake neighborhood. “I had my heart set on finding a local artisan.”

What evolved was a unique experience in these days of impersonal retailing, one that emphasized old-

fashioned customer service.

In Scott’s case, the jeweler helped with his last-minute request — he was popping the big question in only a few days — by personally delivering a sample ring to his office and then hand-delivering the custom-made piece a week later.

Even after the jeweler, Valerie Kronsburg, received her payment, she checked back to make sure Scott and his fiancée were pleased.

“A lot of times you get these people who are fantastic artisans but incredibly curmudgeonly, sort of like you’re doing them a favor by dealing with them,” Scott said. The purchase on Etsy was one of those “pleasantly opposite experiences.”

Etsy is among the largest of the online retailers that hosts and manages the sales of members’ handmade and vintage goods.

Victor Domine, spokesman for the Craft & Hobby Association, said that all signs are pointing to contin-

ued, robust growth in craft-making, a \$27.4 billion industry in the U.S. in 2009. Etsy is dwarfed by online giants such as Amazon.com Inc. and eBay Inc., but the 5-year-old privately held company said it celebrated its best holiday season ever last year.

The New York company

tallied \$273.2 million in sales through November, well ahead of 2009’s total sales of \$180.6 million, Etsy spokesman Adam Brown said. December was on track to be Etsy’s biggest month ever, both in dollar volume and in items sold; nearly

Private company reports U.S. added 300,000 jobs in December

NEW YORK — Companies added nearly 300,000 jobs in December, according to an unofficial count by a private payroll firm — more than in any month in the past decade. The news raised hopes that the government’s official report Friday on last month’s job creation could be a blockbuster.

Some economists expressed skepticism about ADP’s monthly figures because they often don’t track the official government employment data. Others said that the report’s estimate of job gains was so high that it at least reinforced evidence that hiring

is picking up as employers gain more confidence.

Diane Swonk, chief economist at Mesirow Financial, says the ADP numbers sug-

gest the Bureau of Labor Statistics could report Friday that the economy created more than 300,000 jobs last month. Economists

have been predicting fewer than half as many — 145,000.

It takes about 125,000 new jobs a month just to keep up with population growth and hold the unemployment rate — now 9.8 percent — stable. It takes up to 300,000 new jobs a month to reduce the unemployment rate significantly, economists say.

The report is just the latest sign that the job market might be turning around at last. The Labor Department said last week that the number of people applying for unemployment benefits has fallen to its lowest point in two and a half years. The staffing firm Challenger, Gray & Christmas said

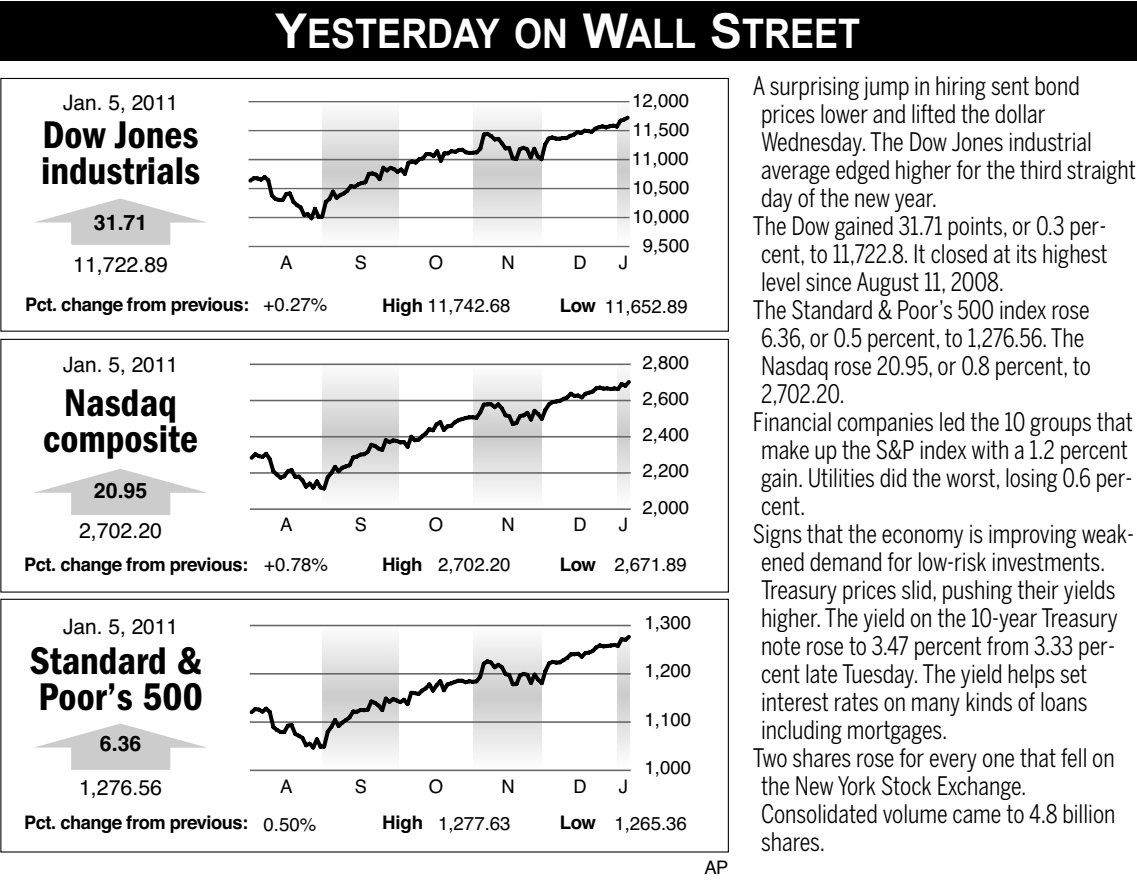

A surprising jump in hiring sent bond prices lower and lifted the dollar Wednesday. The Dow Jones industrial average edged higher for the third straight day of the new year.
The Dow gained 31.71 points, or 0.3 percent, to 11,722.8. It closed at its highest level since August 11, 2008.
The Standard & Poor's 500 index rose 6.36, or 0.5 percent, to 1,276.56. The Nasdaq rose 20.95, or 0.8 percent, to 2,702.20.
Financial companies led the 10 groups that make up the S&P index with a 1.2 percent gain. Utilities did the worst, losing 0.6 percent.
Signs that the economy is improving weakened demand for low-risk investments. Treasury prices slid, pushing their yields higher. The yield on the 10-year Treasury note rose to 3.47 percent from 3.33 percent late Tuesday. The yield helps set interest rates on many kinds of loans including mortgages.
Two shares rose for every one that fell on the New York Stock Exchange. Consolidated volume came to 4.8 billion shares.

Omaha teen shoots school principal, assistant, kills self

OMAHA, Neb. — The son of a police detective opened fire at a Nebraska high school Wednesday, fatally wounding the assistant principal and forcing panicked students to take cover in the kitchen of the building just as they returned from holiday break.

The gunman, who had attended the school for no more than two months, also wounded the principal before fleeing from the scene and fatally shooting himself in his car about a mile away.

Authorities declined to speculate about why the suspect, identified as 17-year-old Robert Butler Jr., targeted the administrators.

Vice Principal Vicki Kaspar, 58, died at a hospital hours after the shooting, police said. Principal Curtis Case, 45, was listed in stable condition.

“I can’t think of a nicer person. I can’t see how anyone would be cross with her,” John Manna, who lives two blocks from the school, said of Kaspar earlier Wednesday. Manna said he knew Kaspar because his older son graduated from high school with her son in 1996.

Jessica Liberator, a sophomore at Millard South High School, said she was in the cafeteria when another administrator “rushed in to tell everybody to get in the back of the kitchen.” She said she started to cry

when students heard a knock on the kitchen door and a cafeteria worker yelled for everybody to get down. It was a false alarm. Nobody came in.

She huddled with Brittany Brase, another sophomore. Asked whether they were best friends, Brase said, “No, not really.” But, she added: “She’s my best friend now. These things bring you together.”

Butler had transferred in November from a high school in Lincoln, about 50 miles southwest of Omaha.

In a rambling Facebook post filled with expletives, Butler warned Wednesday that people would hear about the “evil” things he did and said the school drove him to violence.

He wrote that the Omaha school was worse than his previous one, and that the new city had changed him. He apologized and said he wanted people to remember him for who he was before affecting “the lives of the families I ruined.” The post ended with “goodbye.”

A former classmate of Butler’s from Lincoln confirmed the Facebook post to The Associated Press and provided AP with a copy of it.

Conner Gerner said he remembered Butler as being energetic, fun and outgoing. Gerner said Butler sometimes got in trouble for speaking out too much in class, but he did not seem angry.

GOP takes charge

A divided 112th Congress is sworn in

WASHINGTON — The House and Senate have a split personality by design, but Wednesday’s debut of the 112th Congress revealed a stark contrast between the two chambers that could define the direction of every major debate over the next two years.

At one end of the Capitol, a House brimming with fresh faces and ambitious goals was sworn into office, its exuberant new Republican leaders pledging to derail President Obama’s agenda and dramatically scale back the government.

At the other end, a more somber Senate convened, its Democratic majority intact — albeit much smaller after the November elections. Whereas many of the House freshmen are new to politics, the 13 senators in the class of 2010 are a more seasoned lot. Their first order of business: a debate of filibuster rules.

The two lawmakers sworn in to lead the House and Senate are archetypes of the moment. Rep. John Boehner, R-Ohio, the son of a bar owner, rode the tea party wave to one of the biggest midterm election victories in recent history and is eager to deliver in the form of repealing health-care reform and making deep cuts to federal programs. Immediately after Boehner, 61, accepted the speaker’s gavel from Nancy

Pelosi, D-Calif., now the minority leader, the House began debating changes to budget rules that would force spending reductions.

“Hard work and tough decisions will be required of the 112th Congress,” Boehner said in his acceptance speech. “No longer can we fall short. No longer can we kick the can down the road. The people voted to end business as usual, and today we begin to carry out their instructions.”

The new Senate leader is the old Senate leader, Harry Reid, D-Nev., the son of a miner, who narrowly won a fifth term in November against a tea party opponent. As he opened the new Senate, Reid, 70, pleaded

for his Republican colleagues to end what he called their obstructionist ways, setting the tone for coming battles over deficit reduction, the war in Afghanistan, health-care reform and taxes.

“The most important change we can make in the 112th Congress is to work better and more closely as teammates, not as opponents — as partners, not as partisans — to fulfill our constitutional responsibility to pursue a more perfect union,” Reid said.

The day’s crescendo came shortly past 12 p.m. MST, after the formal roll call vote for the gavel concluded with Boehner receiving 241 votes and

Pelosi 173, ending her historic four-year reign as the nation’s first female House speaker.

Pelosi — whose fate has been sealed since Nov. 2, when Democrats lost 63 seats and the majority — held two grandchildren on her lap as the House clerk called the name of every member.

Pelosi strode to the speaker’s chair for a final speech, congratulating Boehner but also proclaiming a victory in pushing a progressive agenda. “I now pass this gavel and the sacred trust that goes with it to the new speaker. God bless you, Speaker Boehner,” she said to cheers from the chamber.

Gibbs’ departure begins retooling of Obama’s staff

WASHINGTON — President Obama’s departing chief spokesman said Wednesday that a “pretty major retooling” of White House staff will unfold over the next several weeks, giving Obama “different and fresh perspectives” as he enters the second half of his four-year term.

“As a president you can’t take a

year off to recharge,” Gibbs, 39, a member of Obama’s tight-knit inner circle, told reporters just hours after announcing his own plans to leave the White House by early next month. He said he’ll assist Obama in his re-election efforts but that the time was right for him to return to private life, spend more time with his family and recharge.

There is “a bubble in here to some degree,” Gibbs said of presidential

life, an inescapable creep of insularity. “So I think it’s important to put people around him that have the fresh perspective, that have come into a different job or have come into the administration after having not been here for a couple of years.”

More big changes are expected within a matter of days.

A new economic adviser to replace Larry Summers is to be named Friday, Gibbs said.

ARIZONA Man in custody following shopping center shootout

CHANDLER — A shootout at an upscale shopping center in suburban Phoenix sent shoppers fleeing and prompted a mall lockdown Wednesday as the suspect who had exchanged gunfire with officers holed up in a fast food restaurant, authorities said.

The suspect surrendered Wednesday afternoon and no injuries were reported, officials said.

Hours after the noon-hour, parking lot gun-battle, authorities reopened the Chandler Fashion Center following a search that had been made to confirm only one suspect was involved in both the shooting and the standoff.

“Thankfully, nobody was shot and nobody got hurt,” Chandler police Sgt. Joe Favazzo said.

The mall reopened at about 5 p.m. Wednesday after police SWAT teams with dogs finished their search.

Wounded deputy fired over press statements

PHOENIX — An Arizona sheriff’s deputy shot during a confrontation with marijuana smugglers in April was fired Wednesday for statements he later made to a weekly newspaper.

Pinal County deputy Louie Puroll came under scrutiny after he was slightly wounded in what he described as an ambush in the desert about 50 miles south of Phoenix.

The shooting came amid growing national debate over Arizona’s tough immigration law, and it raised questions about whether Puroll had staged the incident to publicize drug and human smuggling.

Sheriff Paul Babeu closed the investigation and pronounced Puroll’s version of events accurate in October.

Puroll then gave a series of interviews with the Phoenix New Times, and reportedly told the reporter he had been approached by members of a Mexican drug cartel several times over the years and they had offered to “make it worth my while to look the other way out in the desert if I bumped into them.”

The story also quoted him as saying that he didn’t arrest the men, call for backup or report the alleged encounters, among other comments.

Babeu suspended Puroll after the story appeared, and launched an internal review of his actions. He formally terminated Puroll after being presented with the probe’s findings.

TENNESSEE One dead in explosion at ammunition plant

OAKLAND — A series of explosions ripped through an ammunition plant Wednesday afternoon, killing one worker and injuring a firefighter while shells fired off for about an hour afterward.

Ed Gaugh, emergency management director for Fayette County, said a 34-year-old male employee died in the blast and subsequent fire at the Kinematics Research plant, which makes shells for pistols and rifles. The worker’s name was not immediately released.

Oakland Police Chief Rick Jewell said at one point a large front door of the building blew off and a white fireball came out.

“It was scary; we just got out of the way,” he said.

“It was a pretty horrific explosion. Rounds were going off for one solid hour. It sounded like continuous machine gun fire.”

The building was left standing but was gutted and riddled with holes.

Jewell said the plant housed several thou-

sand rounds and gunpowder. Witnesses said debris shot into the air during several explosions spanning a half-hour.

Fire crews could not get close to the building because of the danger. One firefighter was slightly injured, apparently hit by a bullet or fragment of some kind.

Cliff Davidson, owner of AAA Collision next door, said he heard a boom and went outside. “Not long after that, there was a rat-a-tat-tat and a pop pop pop pop,” he said.

The fire was brought under control about 90 minutes after the first blast was reported around 1:45 p.m. The cause is not yet known.

TEXAS Houston Ship Channel closed after animal fat spill

HOUSTON — Workers with the U.S. Coast Guard and the Texas General Land Office used pitchfork and fishnets Wednesday to pierce, corral and remove chunks of beef fat clogging the Houston Ship Channel, shutting down nearly a mile of one of the nation’s busiest marine arteries.

No ship traffic was delayed, however, because the spill occurred at the end of the waterway, said Richard Brahms, a spokesman with the Coast Guard.

Some 15,000 gallons of animal fat poured into the channel through a storm drain on Tuesday after an onshore storage tank owned by agricultural company Jacob Sterns and Sons leaked 250,000 gallons of the greasy substance, Brahms said.

Unlike oil, beef fat doesn’t create a colorful sheen on the surface of the water that can be skimmed off, Brahms said.

“When it hit the water it instantly thickened,” Brahms said. “It turned into a thick patie, which is pretty much what we’re cleaning up now.”

Workers are using fishnets to corral the fat, then pitchforks to lift 1-foot-by-1 foot chunks of the cream-colored debris, officials said. Animal fat is often used in cosmetics, soaps, pet food and a variety of other products.

The Coast Guard hopes to complete the job later Wednesday, Brahms said. At the latest, the channel will reopen to ship traffic by early Thursday.

The cause of the tank leak is being investigated, Brahms said.

Presidential panel: Massive oil spill could happen again

WASHINGTON — Decisions intended to save time and money created an unreasonable amount of risk that triggered the largest offshore oil spill in U.S. history, a disaster that could happen again without significant reforms by industry and government, the presidential panel investigating the BP blowout concluded Wednesday.

The commission findings — the result of a probe requested by President Barack Obama after the April 20 rig explosion — described systemic problems within the offshore energy industry and government regulators who oversee it.

Poor decisions led to technical problems that the commission, and inquires by BP and Congress, have identified as contributing to the accident that killed 11 people and led to more than 200 million gallons of oil spewing from BP’s well a mile beneath the Gulf of Mexico.

BP, Halliburton and Transocean, the three key companies involved with the well and the rig that exploded, each made individual decisions that increased risks of a blowout but saved signifi-

cant time or money.

But ultimately, the Deepwater Horizon disaster came down to a single failure, the panel says — management. When decisions were made, no one was considering the risk they were taking.

In one example cited by the commission, a BP request to set an “unusually deep cement plug” was approved by the then-Minerals Management Service in 90 minutes. That decision is one of the nine technical and engineering calls the commission says increased the risk of a blowout.

“The blowout was not the product of a series of aberrational decisions made by a rogue industry or government officials that could not have been anticipated or expected to occur again. Rather, the root causes are systemic, and absent significant reform in both industry practices and government policies, might well recur,” the commission concluded in a 48-page excerpt of its final report, obtained by The Associated Press. A final report is due to the president Jan. 11.

Interior Department spokeswoman Kendra Barkoff said the report focused on areas in which the agency in charge of offshore drilling has already made improvements.

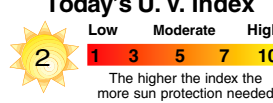
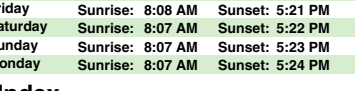

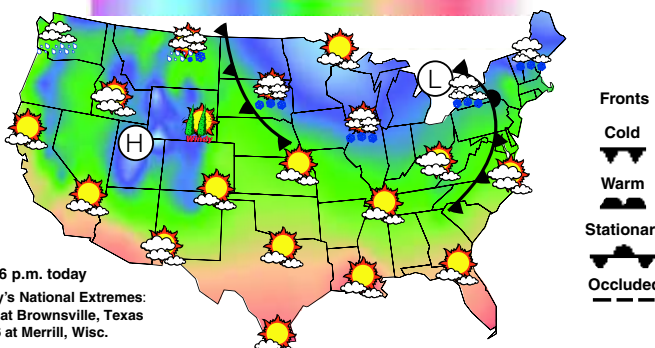

ISLAMABAD — The increasing radicalization of Pakistani society was laid bare Wednesday when the nation's mainstream religious organizations applauded the murder of provincial governor Salman Taseer this week, while his killer was showered with rose petals as he appeared in court.

Taseer, 66, the governor of Punjab, the country's most heavily populated province, was assassinated Tuesday by one of his police bodyguards after Taseer had campaigned

to ease Pakistan's blasphemy law. Religious groups threatened to kill others who questioned the blasphemy statute, which is designed to protect Islam and the Prophet Muhammad from "insult."

Pakistan is a key partner for the U.S. in the global fight against terrorism, but waves of fundamentalism have produced an increasingly intolerant and anti-American country, making the alliance with Washington hugely unpopular.

While terrorist acts are generally associated with an extremist fringe, the gunning

down of Taseer appears to have significant support that reached into the heart of society.

And in an odd dichotomy, the slaying also is limiting the already restricted levels of free speech in Pakistan even as the hate speech by the clergy, including calls for Taseer's murder before his assassination, goes unpunished.

For 30 years, Pakistan's powerful military have had a policy of supporting Islamic militant groups, and propagating a hard-line religious culture to feed the jihad. Some analysts think that

protection has caused moderates to stay silent.

"The state has become weak because it has supported non-state actors," said Khaled Ahmed, an analyst based in Lahore. "There are many centers of power as a result."

The accused killer, Mumtaz Qadri, appeared Wednesday in court, unrepentant, where waiting lawyers threw handfuls of rose petals over him and others in the crowd slapped his back and kissed his cheek, as he was led in and out of the court room under heavy security.

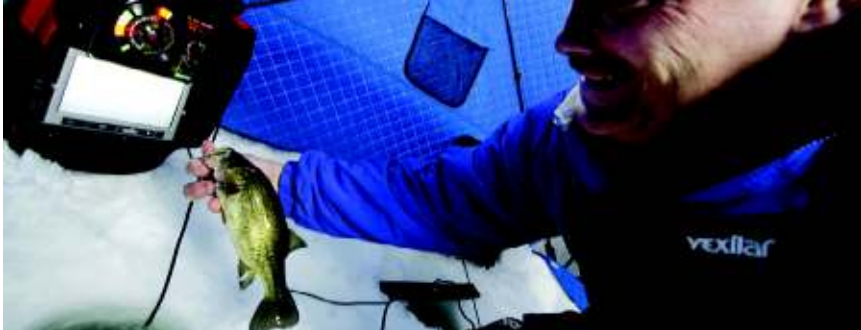

Things learned from a once-stranded snowmobiler

You read the news story when Brad Craig, a snowmobiler from Twin Falls, became stranded in the South Hills. You read about when he was rescued. Now read what he tells the Times-News about the ordeal and what he's learned from it.

Night was coming on, but there was still time for one more ride. At least, that's what Brad Craig thought.

Craig, 43, went with family and friends on Dec. 26 to ride snowmobiles in the South Hills. By late afternoon they were packing up, ready to leave. All, that is, except for Craig. He told them he wanted to go for one

more ride, no big deal. He promised them he'd make it back to his pickup by sunset.

His family and friends left, but he never did. Instead, he became stranded in the wilderness for two nights where snow and freezing temperatures taxed his body and mind. He suffered mild hypothermia and frostbite, he said Tuesday evening while working in his garage. But he's thankful to be alive.

In his garage, a fire burned in a small stove. Craig was getting ready to work on his snowmobile, which had gotten banged up a week before. He still plans to ride, but he'll do things differently next time.

Stranded

Craig and his party had

parked in the Diamondfield Jack parking lot above Magic Mountain Ski Resort.

When Craig went for his last ride of the day, he headed to Monument Peak about six miles southeast of Diamondfield Jack. He stepped off his machine but forgot to place the parking brake, causing the snowmobile to tumble downhill where it hit a tree in a drainage area. He went to retrieve the machine. It started, but he couldn't get out of the drainage.

"It took me a couple hours just to go a few hundred feet," he said.

By this time night was on, and temperatures had fallen.

Staying warm

Craig, who carried a GPS

unit, said he knew where he was. He wasn't lost, but stranded. And cold.

He stayed behind trees to block him from wind. He'd tear branches off the trees to stand upon, keeping his feet off the snow, and then lean against the tree to rest.

"I slept like that several times," he said, "moving from tree to tree."

He tried to build a fire using a rag and gasoline from the snowmobile, but he never had any luck. The rag was too wet. He tried drying it with his machine's muffler, but the snowmobile eventually ran out of gas. A friend had given him a magnesium lighter for Christmas, but it did him no good. He didn't have it with him.

A great year for SNOW

Resorts report higher skier count, excellent conditions

SUN VALLEY — It's a black and white ball at southern Idaho ski resorts this year, but not one that requires tuxedos. White is everywhere due to early and heavy snowfalls, while black is on the ledger sheets thanks to skiers responding to the great conditions.

While the specific numbers of skiers, snowboarders and tubers at area resorts this year haven't yet been counted, resort managers say their sense is that the 2010-2011 season will be between 5 and 20 percent higher than the previous year, depending on the mountain.

"Cross your fingers, things are going very well this season, and we want to continue the momentum," said Jack Sibbach, spokesman for Sun Valley Resort, which last year had more than 400,000 skier days. "We are above that pace this year to beat that, but it's still early. We don't want to get too excited, we

need to keep up the good work."

Across the region, higher numbers are in part attributable to the snow, which began falling fairly early and has continued with great snow-sports conditions reported at all the resorts.

"It's a La Nina year, and when we have that situation we get a lot more moisture in this area," said Larry Davenport, general manager of Soldier Mountain near Fairfield, which last week reported 38 inches at the base and 58 at the top. "We're way ahead of what we had all last year."

And it's not quantity over quality, skiers are reporting.

"It's a cold snow and the people up here, even our ski patrol, say this is the best," said Gary Miller, owner of Magic Mountain Ski Area south of Hansen, describing the deep powder that he said is the nicest seen in that resort's five-year history. "Our attendance is up; the skiing is off the hook."

Magic opened on Dec. 4, two weeks before it usually has, while Soldier opened on Dec. 18. Pomerelle, near Albion, opened the day before Thanksgiving, and Sun Valley on Turkey Day, with all of its runs open by Dec. 19.

At Sun Valley, some of the

increased lift ticket sales may be due to the building last year and expansion this year of a terrain park at Dollar Mountain, and the construction of a skiercross and boardercross course.

"It's a demographic we didn't speak to much in the past few years because we didn't have the product," Sibbach said, noting that the new terrain has been featured in extreme sports movies and magazines. "The word's getting out with the younger crowd. That's been very successful for us and it should grow."

We accessed the trail at a parking spot near Centennial Waterfront Park in Twin Falls. The first thing that caught our attention, besides the cold wind, was gun blasts we heard in the distance from a nearby gun range. Next it was the patches of snow and ice along parts of the trail that, if we were not careful, could have caused us a few slips onto our butts.

As when hiking any trail, you have to pay attention to where you step and what's around you. It wasn't long before we noticed there were a lot of interesting things around us — things we wouldn't have seen by hanging out in the newsroom or a restaurant at lunchtime.

So what did we see? Waterfalls, geese, interesting rock formations, icicles, small streams, cattails and other noticeable plants, and a multitude of waves on the Snake that, if you twisted your eyes at them just right, created an optical illusion.

Besides being in good company, the best thing for me was the air. It was cold, but it was fresh.

"Man, this beats being inside all day," Palmer said.

I agreed. Instead of putting on calories at lunch, we were taking them off with our hike.

Before long, we came to some stairs that led down where the trail continued. We followed, being careful to maneuver around rock, through mud and over ice. We stopped at several places to record video and take in nature's surroundings.

The Perrine Bridge loomed up and ahead of us, and we continued along the trail. As we neared, there was a sound like ghosts as the wind crept through the behemoth structure above us, where more daring souls than we, when weather is warmer, jump with parachutes. Their target, the open field east of the bridge where an American flag honors BASE jumpers.

Now we heard the flapping of the flag.

We had reached the end of the trail — named in honor of Frank W. Mogensen, who, having died in 1994 at age 69, is remembered for his work with Twin Falls Boy Scouts. We guessed we had walked a little more than a mile. We still had to get back, though, making it at least two miles by the end of our excursion.

You might not be able to walk the entire trail on your lunch break — OK, this was a working break for us — but even walking part of it is better than sitting inside, even when the temperature is only twentysomething degrees.

A layman's guide to hearing protection

Although mild hearing loss is a natural consequence of living to an advanced age, the intent of this column is to inform sportsmen about the greatest manageable threat to our precious sense of hearing: noise-induced hearing loss.

THE CAUSES

Our hearing acuity is threatened whenever we expose ourselves to sounds that are either too loud or too close or that last too long. The trick, experts say, is to prevent some types of sounds from ever reaching our sensitive inner ears and to limit our exposure time to other types of noise.

So how do we judge if a particular type or intensity of sound is damaging? As a general rule, you need to protect yourself from any sound that you must shout to be heard over, any noise that physically hurts your

ears, makes them ring, or that leaves you feeling somewhat deafened afterwards.

Intensity of sound is measured in decibels (dB). Whispered words come in at 0 decibels. Normal conversation registers around 60 dB; snowmobiles and chainsaws irritate us with about 100 dB, while gun shots, jet engines and the like assault our ears with 140 or more dBs.

Audiologists warn that the damage threshold for individual sounds begins at 140 dB, and that sustained noises of 85 dB or more will cause permanent hearing loss in most individuals.

Ready for a shocker? The lowly .22LR that we fire by

the hundreds without any ear protection at all rings out at more than 140 dB per trigger pull in a rifle. Now, imagine how our muzzle-braked, fire-breathing magnum handguns, rifles and shotguns assault our delicate inner ears!

THE SOLUTIONS

To protect our hearing we need to control the amount of noise entering our heads. This can be accomplished with either ear plugs or ear muffs. Be advised, both devices rely on obtaining an air-tight fit, so pick a set that fits you perfectly.

While bulky ear muffs are the customary choice for bench and competitive shooting, the individual soft foam, neckpiece or silicone plugs are more practical in the field. Unfortunately, although they are effective at limiting gun shot noise, they

also leave you deaf to the sound of a flush, the movement of a buck through the brush, or the rustling of aspen leaves in the wind.

To compensate, another line of plugs evolved with an integral electronic or mechanical “noise-baffling” device. In my experience, the low-end

mechanical/electronic models don’t work and the top-end electronic versions, as typified by the Walker’s Game Ear, are inordinately expensive.

THE WINNER

I recently discovered my “miracle ear” in the form of

EarPro’s EP3 Sonic Defender ear plugs (www.surefire.com). Fashioned of hypoallergenic medical grade polymer, the double flange ear canal stems are offered in three sizes for a custom fit. More importantly, the concha-shaped (outer ear) outer portion incorporates the patented Hocks Noise Braker Filter that converts damaging sound wave energy into an undetectable amount of thermal (heat) energy within the plug.

Retailing for a miserly \$13 a pair, Sonic Defenders allow you to enjoy normal conversations and natural background sounds, while protecting your hearing from ear-splitting gun fire.

They are a wonderful product; take a pair into the duck blind and be amazed. Good shooting!

“Everything was back at the truck,” he said. “I was just going for a short ride, it was supposed to be no big deal.”

Found

At about 10:45 p.m. the next day, a Monday, Craig started walking toward an area where he knew there often were snowmobilers.

In the meantime, others were searching for him.

Lt. Daron Brown of the Twin Falls County Sheriff’s Office was on vacation when he received word — about 10:30 p.m. Dec. 26 — that a snowmobiler had gone missing in the South Hills. He sent a deputy ranger to verify that Craig’s truck was abandoned in the hills, and when that was confirmed, a cursory search on groomed trails ensued. When Craig didn’t turn up, the search began in earnest.

About 50 people, including Craig’s family and friends and members of the Twin Falls County and Cassia County search and rescue teams, helped in the 36-hour ground and air search. Craig said he had

seen the helicopters and heard some of the searchers’ snowmobiles Monday. Rescuers found his footprints on a main trail and followed them until they found Craig at about noon Tuesday.

“I can’t believe the number of people, the outpouring of people who risked what they had to find me,” Craig said. “Everything from prayers to going out on their own snowmobiles looking for me. It’s really amazing when you stop to think about it. All the people that were there, I just thank everybody.”

Things learned

Craig, who was lost for two nights in the freezing temperatures of the South Hills, has a story that he now can tell his grandchildren. Unfortunately, not everyone who becomes lost in the wild is as lucky.

So what did Craig, who’s been riding snowmobiles since childhood, learn from his experience? Always plan for the unexpected by packing gear appropriately, including food and water, and never ride alone.

“I’ll be a lot more prepared and I’ll never leave my truck without at least some basics,” he said. “I’ll never ride alone again.”

As for search and rescue, each case is different, Brown said.

“Cases are prioritized depending on the urgency,” he said, “if there are medical conditions involved, the age of the victim, health conditions.”

Brown said he won’t be an armchair judge.

“He knew exactly where he was, this gentleman had a GPS,” he said. “And he stayed with his snowmobile, which is something we advocate also. He needed to get where he could be seen. I can’t chastise him for what he did.”

Brown echoed what Craig said: Never ride alone.

Safety as priority

There are several things snowmobilers should do to make sure their outdoor excursions are safe and happy ones, said Jonathan Okerlund, an off-highway vehicle trainer for the Idaho Department of Parks and Recreation. The department

offers classes throughout the season on avalanche and snowmobile safety, including one scheduled for Jan. 28-29 in Twin Falls. He offers a few tips:

- Tell someone. Snowmobilers should never venture into the wild alone. If you do, be sure to tell a family member or friend where you are going and when you plan to return, Okerlund said.
- Dress in layers. You obviously can get too warm by wearing too much clothing, but then again you can always take it off. “But if you get cold,” Okerlund said, “you can’t put anything on that you don’t take with you.”
- Bring gear. Okerlund said there are at least three things every snowmobiler should carry with them: a shovel, probe and beacon. These tools are important if you were to get stuck in snow or become trapped in an avalanche. More avalanches over the past 10 years — 302 in all, countrywide — have been caused by snowmobilers than other outdoor users, Okerlund said.

Brown said he’d recommend carrying flares or a flare gun and matches, something with which to build a fire.

- Know your mountain. Most avalanches occur at angles of 30 to 45 degrees, he said. They often are caused when becoming stressed. Having too many snowmobiles at one time on a slope is a no-no. The more weight placed upon a slope increases the likelihood of an avalanche. To decrease the chances, make sure only one snowmobile at a time uses a slope.
- Check conditions. Check weather and avalanche conditions before heading out.

To learn more about snowmobile safety, consider attending the Parks and Recreation safety class at 7 p.m. Jan. 28 at Action Cycles ‘N Sleds, 2540 Addison Ave. E., Twin Falls. Participants on the following day will head to the Diamondfield Jack Snow Play Area to practice search and rescue techniques, such as locating a lost beacon and survival skills.

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Technology improves underwater cameras to help find, but not necessarily catch, fish

PRIOR SMITH, Minn. — “Look at all the fish down there!” exclaimed Tom Zenanko, sounding like a kid who just discovered presents under the Christmas tree. “There’s literally hundreds of them!”

The small sunfish and crappies swam among the weeds 10 feet below the ice of Prior Lake. But Zenanko had a portal to the underwater world: He watched the action with an underwater TV camera and monitor as he jigged for fish in a portable shelter.

Underwater camera systems, invented about a dozen years ago right here in Minnesota, have become almost as common as jigs and minnows in ice fishing houses. They’ve added a new dimension to ice fishing, have likely helped some anglers catch more fish and have provided hours of entertainment for thousands of anglers hunkered in ice fishing houses.

“I don’t think ice fishing would be where it is today without the camera,” Zenanko said. “It’s the greatest education tool to get kids involved in ice fishing. It’s entertained millions of people.”

Zenanko believes the cameras also have helped anglers better understand the seldom-seen world below the ice.

“It’s almost beyond our comprehension,” said Zenanko, 53, of Shakopee, who helped develop a new underwater camera for Bloomington-based Vexilar Inc., the famed maker of sonar fish-finders. “The lake is literally alive; it’s living, breathing life down there. It’s absolutely beautiful.”

Thirteen years ago, the Minnesota Legislature almost banned the newfangled devices, which had just come on the market. The Department of Natural Resources opposed them, too. Former state Sen. Bob Lessard of International Falls argued that the underwater camera took technological fishing advancements too far.

“When does something cease to be a sport?” he asked in 1998. “Part of fishing is the unknown. The death knell of fair chase is using the camera in the act of catching a fish.”

But the DNR eventually backed down, as did legislators.

“I knew you can’t fight technology,” Lessard said last week. But Lessard and others

also say the fears that underwater cameras would lead to overfishing of lakes was unfounded.

“Has it hurt anything? No,” Lessard said. “It’s more of a fun thing, like watching deer feed.”

Jeff Zernov, 58, of Brainerd is considered the father of underwater TV cameras. He was at the forefront of the dispute back in the 1990s when he launched his Aqua-Vu camera system, considered the first self-contained underwater viewing system. He recently sold his Nature Vision company but remains active in the underwater camera industry.

“Has the camera had any measurable or definable impact on the resource? The answer is probably yes and no,” Zernov said. “Some of the issues raised back then, like selectively harvesting only the biggest fish, is a fact. I know guys who do that. You can watch fish come up and pull the bait away from smaller ones and target the larger fish. It’s had that impact.”

But, Zernov said, other

technology has had a much greater impact on helping anglers catch fish, including GPS and mapping programs, which allow anglers to find fishing hot spots. (“It’s turned everyone into a great fishing guide,” he said.) And sonar fish-finders likely help anglers catch fish more than underwater cameras do.

“If anything, the Vexilar (fish-finder) is the unfair advantage,” Zenanko said. “It can help catch fish in any environment, at any depth, at any time of day.”

And both Zernov and Zenanko say that if the DNR determines the cameras or other technological advancements are impacting a lake’s fishery, it can impose bag limits or other restrictions.

“We want people to catch fish,” Zenanko said.

The multimillion-dollar underwater TV camera industry has gone through growing pains. It exploded in the late 1990s after Zernov launched his Aqua-Vu system. Zenanko calls Zernov “one of the great geniuses of our electronic age.” “He cre-

ated all this excitement,” Zenanko said.

Other companies rushed into the business. Prices fell to less than \$100 for some units. “They were toys,” Zenanko said. “They didn’t work very well, and then they went in the dumpster.”

But the cheap cameras hurt the industry.

“The camera market literally imploded,” Zenanko said.

Companies collapsed. Zernov sold off Aqua-Vu in 2009. Now, there are a handful of major camera makers, including Aqua-Vu, MarCum, Vexilar and cFish.

Vexilar plunged into the underwater camera business in 2010, said Zenanko, who works in marketing and sales for the company.

Today’s underwater camera systems are far superior to the early ones.

“There’s been a quantum leap in technology that allows them to be lighter, more compact and 10 times more energy efficient,” Zenanko said.

Vexilar’s basic unit sells for around \$500. A combination TV camera-sonar fish-finder unit sells for about \$800. Most high-end camera systems are between \$300 and \$500, Zenanko said.

Various brands offer different features. “Everyone tries to have a bell or whistle that makes them different,” he said.

Back at snow-covered Prior Lake, Zenanko watched a school of sunfish and crappies gather below at his tiny jig tipped with a maggot. While he saw lots of fish, getting them to bite was another matter. Several came up, mouthed the bait, then spat it out.

“You can see ‘em, but the fish still have to bite,” he said.

Make sure licenses contain correct info

Q: “I was recently contacted by a conservation officer who was curious why the driver’s license information on my hunting license showed my driver’s license had expired. The officer verified my driver’s license was current, but it had not been updated on my hunting license. Am I required to make sure this information is updated each time I purchase a new hunting license?”

A: Yes and No. When you sign your name on the bottom of the license you are affirming that the information on the license is true and correct, so ultimately you are responsible to make sure all the information printed on your sporting license is accurate.

Additionally, vendors are instructed to inspect a current Idaho driver’s license to verify your identity, update your personal information, and verify your residency status.

When vendors fail to update current driver’s license or personal information on newly purchased sporting licenses, several important errors or omissions can occur.

It is crucial that sportsmen check the licenses, permits and tags they are issued at any vendor to make sure they receive what they intended. There are numerous instances when a license in someone else’s name was issued or the wrong tags or permits were issued.

Conservation officers also contact sportsmen each year that claim they intended to purchase a special permit or big game tag but the sportsman overlooked or failed to verify its purchase. If you catch these errors at the time of purchase the vendor can easily correct them.

Sportsmen must also verify their current physical and mailing addresses on the license. This is especially important when

purchasing special permits such as the federal waterfowl stamp/permit. When this permit is issued by the license system at a vendor, it is valid for 30 days. After 30 days the hunter must possess the federal waterfowl stamp signed across the face in ink. The federal waterfowl stamp is mailed to the sportsman at the address listed on his hunting license.

The department also uses the mailing address for surveys, special notification of rule changes or notification by mail of successful drawing on controlled-hunt applications.

Use of an expired driver’s license to purchase a sporting license is a tip-off for any conservation officer that the subject may have moved out of state and may no longer be an Idaho resident. This is a significant violation, defrauding the people of Idaho out of thousands of dollars for wildlife management activities.

License vendors are instructed to inspect a valid Idaho driver’s license for each sporting license purchased to verify identity and residency. It is also the sportsmen’s responsibility to inspect their new license for accuracy and make sure you inform the vendor of any changes to update your driver’s and personal information on your new sporting license. Your signature at the bottom of the license affirms the information on the sporting license is correct.

Grizzly bear deaths near Yellowstone rise in 2010

BILLINGS, Mont. — Grizzly bear deaths neared record levels for the region around Yellowstone National Park in 2010, but government biologists said the population remains robust enough to withstand the heavy losses.

An estimated 75 of the protected animals were killed or removed from the wild, according to a government-sponsored grizzly study team. That equates to one grizzly gone for every eight counted this year in the sparsely populated Yellowstone region of Montana, Wyoming and Idaho.

The deaths were blamed primarily on grizzlies pushing into inhabited areas, where bears get into trouble as they search out food in farmyards and from the big game herds also stalked by hunters. Despite those conflicts, researchers recently reported the population topped 600 animals for the first time since grizzly recovery efforts began in the 1970s.

“The population will continue to grow with the mortalities we’re seeing now,” said Chris Servheen, grizzly bear recovery coordinator for the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service.

Trapped and hunted to near-extinction last century, grizzly numbers have slowly rebounded since they were declared a threatened

species in 1975.

An estimated 1,500 of the animals now roam woodlands and mountain ranges in the northwestern U.S. and the adjacent Canadian provinces of British Columbia and Alberta. The Yellowstone-area population remains robust enough to withstand the heavy losses.

In 2008, an estimated 79 Yellowstone-area grizzlies died or were removed — the most since they were listed as threatened. Deaths declined in 2009 before spiking again this year.

Most of the bears were killed by wildlife agents or hunters after attacking livestock, acting aggressively toward humans, damaging property or seeking human food.

Only three natural deaths were recorded.

“In general, if you were going to make a bet on whether a bear died because of people versus natural causes, it would be people,” said Chuck Schwartz, a U.S. Geological Survey biologist who leads the multi-agency grizzly bear study team. “Eighty-five-plus percent of independent bears that die, die because of people,” he added.

Hunting grizzlies remains illegal, but at least 15 were killed this year by hunters who shot them in self-defense or after mistaking them for black bears.

Over the summer, two adult bears were killed by government wildlife agents after the animals attacked and killed humans — the first fatal maulings in decades in the region. Three cubs captured after one of those attacks, near Cooke City, Mont., were later placed in a Billings zoo.

The deaths included an estimated 47 adult male bears — roughly twice the number of deaths the government considers sustainable. Female and cub deaths were within sustainable limits.

The male grizzly mortality threshold must be exceeded three years in a row to trigger an official review of government management practices. Nevertheless, Schwartz said representatives of state and federal

agencies will meet in the spring to decide what additional steps could be taken to curb bear deaths.

The estimate of 75 dead or removed bears comes from extrapolations by researchers who assume not all deaths are recorded. Forty-seven deaths and removals were listed as “known and probable,” generally meaning there was either a carcass or other evidence of dead bear.

The rise in bear deaths in 2010 coincided with a recent decline in two dietary staples for some Yellowstone bears — cutthroat trout and nuts from whitebark pine cones. The trout are being crowded out by nonnative fish, while whitebark pine has been ravaged by pine beetles that have thrived in recent years with milder winters.

Is Teflon-coated cookware really safe?

DEAR DR. GOTT: My wife is systematically discarding all of our Teflon-coated pots, pans and utensils in response to a perceived concern that Teflon is a health risk. Furthermore, we are significantly reducing our purchases of canned goods because of the plastic lining or thin film placed inside cans. Plastic ware is also being replaced with glass. Are there any realistic or measurable health issues associated with Teflon and plastic to justify such a concern?

DEAR READER: I had to research the topic carefully because of so many conflicting views on the subject. Let's determine whether we can make some sense of the findings.

In January 2005, CBS's Healthwatch covered the Teflon issue, reporting that

people throughout the United States could face “a potential risk of developmental and other adverse effects” from exposure to low levels of a chemical used in making the non-stick substance Teflon.

The EPA issued a draft assessment of the possible risks of perfluorooctanoic acid and its salts, known as PFOA, or C8. The agency emphasized its assessment was preliminary and that there were significant uncertainties in its quantitative assessment of the risks of PFOA. Studies performed on animals revealed that PFOA is carcinogenic in rats, but the potential

hazard for humans is less certain. The assessment suggested that the chemical targets the liver of rodents and went on to indicate PFOA could raise cholesterol and triglyceride levels in people. DuPont, the maker of Teflon, retaliated, reporting their study failed to disclose any health problems. They further stated their study failed to find an association between elevated PFOA blood levels and liver function, blood counts, prostate cancer, leukemia or multiple myeloma.

Health Watch Center indicates Teflon has received a bad rap of late. The connection between Teflon and serious health problems is tenuous. PFOA is used in the manufacture of the coating, rather than being found in the final product. So it seems coated

products can be safe to use as long as we buy good-quality products, don't heat pans to very high temperatures (above 500 F), and use wooden or plastic spoons and spatulas when stirring or turning foods.

Nonstick coatings may begin to deteriorate at temperatures above 500 F. Coatings may decompose and emit fumes. DuPont indicates that Teflon will not decompose until temperatures reach about 600 F, and cooking anything at that temperature would burn food beyond any edible state.

There was an issue a few years ago about birds dying from the inhalation of cooking fumes, regardless of whether it was nonstick or otherwise. Birds have extremely sensitive respiratory systems and should not be in the kitchen or cooking

area, so this cannot be blamed on DuPont.

Stainless steel, a combination of several metals, includes nickel, chromium and molybdenum. Should the stainless steel become pitted, those metals have the potential to enter foods. Anodized aluminum, copper, ceramic or other glass cookware may be safe alternatives, but the most widely used one appears to be cast iron. Minimal iron seeps off the utensil and into food products, but the body needs iron to produce red blood cells. It's a safe additive, according to the Food and Drug Administration. The list goes on and on.

Take precautions by using plastic or wood spoons and spatulas when using your nonstick pans so as not to compromise the surfaces, and keep cooking

temperatures within a reasonable range.

As far as canned goods and plastic are concerned, I don't believe there is an issue, despite several highly popular e-mails claiming freezing or heating foods in plastic can cause cancer. To the best of my knowledge, no reputable source has ever confirmed this; however, be sure to use only approved plastic containers in the microwave or freezer, as they have received FDA approval for this purpose.

Guard says Jackson’s doctor told him to hide evidence

LOS ANGELES — Michael Jackson’s doctor ordered a security guard to remove an IV bag apparently containing the anesthetic propofol from the stricken pop star’s bedside and then told arriving paramedics he had administered only a mild anti-anxiety drug, witnesses testified Wednesday.

The guard, Alberto Alvarez, told a Superior Court judge deciding whether there is enough evidence to try Dr. Conrad Murray for involuntary manslaughter that before instructing him to call 911, the physician told him to gather up medical paraphernalia, including vials and an IV bag containing “a milk-like substance.”

Propofol, the surgical drug the coroner said caused Jackson’s death, is a opaque white liquid sometimes called “milk of amnesia” and it is at the center of the case against Murray, a 57-year-old cardiologist. The doctor acknowledged to police two days after Jackson’s death that he administered propofol to help Jackson, a chronic insomniac, fall sleep.

Rainier police chief killed during struggle with suspect

RAINIER, Ore. — The popular police chief of a small Oregon town was shot to death Wednesday while investigating a report of an attempted car theft at a strip mall, authorities said.

The suspect was wounded by gunfire shortly afterward when several officers rushed to the scene.

The killing of Rainier Police Chief Ralph Painter, 55, stunned the town of 1,800 along the Columbia River, which had never before lost an officer in the line of duty.

“Ralph Painter has been here for over 20 years and worked his way up through the ranks from police officer to sergeant to police chief,” said Mayor Jerry Cole. “It’s like the dream job, or dream town, for a police officer. He’ll be missed greatly.”

Cole said Rainier’s police force consisted of Painter and four other officers, and it was

not unusual for the chief to respond to a call. “We’re a small agency, and we use every resource available.”

Painter has a son in law enforcement, Cole said.

“It’s just a sad day for Rainier,” he said.

The suspect was not identified Wednesday. Columbia County Sheriff Jeff Dickerson said he’s not believed to be from Rainier. Authorities said he was hospitalized.

At a news conference, Dickerson would not say how the suspect was armed, or whether Painter was shot with his own weapon. He said he didn’t know who fired the round that hit the suspect.

Painter went to the Rainier Sound Authority shop, a car audio dealer, about 10:45 a.m. because “a person there was trying to take a vehicle that did not belong to him,” the sheriff said.

“When he arrived, he confronted a suspect,” Dickerson said. “The suspect fired a shot at the chief and struck

him, and he died as a result of the injuries.”

Witnesses said other officers from a variety of agencies arrived at the strip mall quickly, eventually numbering as many as 30.

The officers ordered a man to drop a weapon and fired multiple shots into the Sound Authority building, said John Harper, who is opening a tobacco store.

“The cops just unleashed on him,” he told the Longview Daily News.

The Rev. Jeff McCracken of the Rainier Assembly of God church described 20 to 30 police cars converging on the strip mall and a man “kinda wandering around” a late 1960s Chevelle.

“They started yelling at him to drop the weapon, which we hadn’t seen because he was on the far side of the vehicle,” McCracken told AP Radio in a phone interview. He said he told people in the church to get down.

Alomar and Blyleven elected to Hall of Fame

NEW YORK — After a narrow miss last year, Bert Blyleven told voters they finally got it right by sending him into the Hall of Fame along with Roberto Alomar.

And he took the opportunity to talk about baseball's dark past — the Steroids Era.

All-Star sluggers Rafael Palmeiro, Jeff Bagwell, Mark McGwire and Juan Gonzalez didn't come close in Wednesday's election. No telling if they ever will,

either, after Hall voters sent a clear message: The drug cloud isn't going to cover Cooperstown.

"The writers are saying that this was the Steroids Era, like they have done Mark McGwire," Blyleven

said after finally making it to the Hall on his 14th try. "They're kind of made their point."

Blyleven was chosen on 79.7 percent — it takes 75 percent approval by the Baseball

Writers' Association of America to reach the shrine. The great curveballer won 287 games, threw 60 shutouts and ranks fifth with 3,701 strikeouts. He was down to his next-to-last try on the ballot.

"It's been 14 years of praying and waiting," Blyleven said in a conference call.

"And thank the baseball writers of America for, I'm going to say, finally getting it right."

Alomar was picked on 90 percent of the ballots. The 12-time All-Star won a record 10 Gold Gloves at second base, hit .300 and helped the Toronto Blue Jays win titles in 1992-93.

Palmeiro, McGwire, Bagwell and Gonzalez fared poorly, with BBWAA members reluctant to choose bulky hitters who posted big numbers in the 1990s and 2000s.

"Guys cheated," Blyleven said. "They cheated themselves and their teammates. The game of baseball is to be played clean. I think we went through a Steroid Era and I think it's up to the writers to decide when and who should go in through that era."

A lot of them have already decided.

"I will not vote for any player connected with steroid use, because I believe cheaters shouldn't be rewarded with the sport's highest honor," Susan Slusser of the San Francisco

Chronicle said in an e-mail.

"We are asked to consider character when casting Hall of Fame votes and I don't believe those who used performance-enhancing substances meet that standard," she said. "They cheated to get ahead, plain and simple, creating an imbalance in the game and a mess for the voters. They can enjoy the big contracts they earned as a result, but they won't get my vote."

Bagwell got 41.7 percent in

Homeless man's voice prompts job offers

CLEVELAND (AP) — With a deep, refined voice, Ted Williams simply asked for help to get off the streets. He's been heard.

Left homeless after his life and career were ruined by drugs and alcohol, Williams has been offered a job by the NBA's Cleveland Cavaliers and is being pursued by NFL Films for possible work. He and his compelling tale became an online sensation after *The Columbus Dispatch* posted a clip of Williams demonstrating his voiceover skills by the side of the road.

"This has been totally, totally amazing," Williams said in a phone interview with The Associated Press on Wednesday, his voice choking with emotion. "I'm just so thankful. God has blessed me so deeply. I'm getting a second chance. Amazing."

Williams was contacted Wednesday by the Cavaliers,

who have offered him a position that could include announcing work at Quicken Loans Arena, the team's downtown facility. Williams said the team has offered him a two-year contract and said they would pay his living expenses.

"I can't believe what's going on," said Williams, a father of nine, adding he feels like Susan Boyle, the Scottish singing sensation who became an overnight star. "God gave me a million-dollar voice, and I just hope I can do right by him."

It's been a whirlwind for the golden-voiced man, who was recently living in a tent and whose past includes a lengthy list of arrests. He has served time in prison for theft and forgery and has been cited with numerous misdemeanors, including drug abuse.

Williams was most recently arrested on May 14.

He pleaded guilty to a first-degree misdemeanor theft charge. In court records, his address is listed as "Streets of Columbus."

Upon learning of Williams' criminal history, the Cavaliers said their offer still stands.

"We believe in second chances and second opportunities," said Tracy Marek, the team's senior vice president of marketing. "The gentleman deserves an opportunity to explain certain situations. We're not jumping to conclusions. It's not fair."

Cavaliers spokesman Tad Carper said exact details of the team's offer and their plans to help Williams with housing were still being worked out.

The Cavaliers did not know much about him, but were touched by Williams' ordeal.

"When you know some-

thing's right, you just have to launch," Marek said. "One of the big things that we talk about here, with our organization, is how important urgency is — when you see something that feels good and seems right. The important thing that we wanted to do is to let Ted know that we have something here for him."

During a timeout in the first quarter of Wednesday night's game against Toronto, the Cavaliers put a picture of Williams on their giant scoreboard and urged fans to send him messages at www.wewantedwilliams.com.

"We hope Ted accepts our offer," said Cavaliers announcer Olivia Sedra.

The 53-year-old Williams will appear Thursday on NBC's "Today" show. According to a network spokesperson, he was on his way Wednesday night to see his 90-year-old mother,

who lives in Brooklyn and has stood by him during his battles with addiction.

"She has always been my best friend," he said, crying. "When I was a kid, she would take me down to Radio City Music Hall and on the subway. I'm just glad that she is still around. I prayed that she

would live long enough that I could make her proud and see could her son do something other than stand along the side of the road with a sign asking for money"

Julia Williams is thrilled her only child is turning his life around. She can't wait to see him.

Auburn, Oregon sport unstoppable offenses

SCOTTSDALE, Ariz. (AP) — All this talk about the unstoppable offenses set to be unleashed by No. 1 Auburn and No. 2 Oregon in the BCS title game is enough to make a defensive coordinator's head spin.

After fielding who knows how many questions Wednesday about what's expected to be a wild night at the University of Phoenix Stadium in nearby Glendale, Oregon's Nick Aliotti summed it up like this:

"Here's what I think. I think that there's going to be a game on Jan. 10. Cam Newton is going to play for Auburn in a very high-powered offense. I think that LaMichael James and

Darron Thomas et al. is going to play for Oregon in a high-powered offense.

"There's going to be two defenses that have to get on the field at some point in time and the one that does the best job of stopping the other team's offense is probably going to win.

"How that's going to happen," Aliotti paused for almost 4 seconds, "I don't know."

That old conventional wisdom about defense winning championships doesn't seem to apply to Auburn and Oregon.

For the first time in the 13-year history of the Bowl Championship Series, neither team playing for the

national title will finish the season ranked among the top 10 defenses in the country. In nine of the previous 12 BCS championship games, both teams ended the season ranked in the top-20 nationally in total defense.

The Ducks ranked 25th in the nation and third in the Pac-10 in total defense, allowing 331.5 yards per game. Pretty good, but it's coach Chip Kelly's fast-paced, spread offense, averaging 537 yards per game (second best in the country),

that draws most of the attention.

"I think Oregon puts a lot of pressure on the opposing team off the mere fact that they have an explosive offense, so they are going to put up points," Newton said. "You go from a team in the first quarter trying to be balanced to the second quarter and third quarter just trying to keep up with their offense."

Auburn's defense is ranked 55th nationally — roughly the middle of the pack — but offensive coordinator Gus

Malzahn's unit has more than made up for any issues on the other side of the ball.

"Every time the offense takes the field, we expect to score," Auburn quarterback-turned-receiver Kodi Burns said. "Coach Malzahn instills that in us."

Auburn averages 497 yards per game, with Newton leading the way on the ground and through the air. The Heisman Trophy winner was the Southeastern Conference's leading rusher with 1,409 yards and he threw for 28 touchdowns and 2,589 yards.

"He's a great athlete, performs really well under pressure and the biggest thing is he's a double-threat, he can

throw the ball and he can run," Oregon defensive lineman Brandon Bair said.

Malzahn, who in just six seasons has gone from high school coach in Arkansas to one of the hottest head coaching prospects in college football, doesn't call Auburn's offense a spread.

"We're a two-back, run, play-action team with an emphasis on going fast and throwing the ball vertically down the field," he said. "We go from the shotgun which probably makes people think it's a spread."

And, yes, the Tigers also like to pick up the pace. They don't quite go as fast as Oregon, but they don't dilly-dally between plays, either.

Rich Rodriguez out at Michigan after 3 seasons

Harbaugh, Miles, Hoke are among rumored candidates

ANN ARBOR, Mich. (AP) — Michigan hired Rich Rodriguez to take college football's winningest program to another level.

He did just that, and it cost him his job.

Rodriguez was fired Wednesday after going 15-22 in three disappointing seasons, including an 0-6 record combined against rivals Ohio State and Michigan State, and staining the proud program with a handful of NCAA violations.

"Michigan is not used to this," said athletic director Dave Brandon, who met with Rodriguez on Tuesday and again Wednesday before announcing the firing.

"I believe this is the best decision for the future of Michigan football," Brandon said. "We have not achieved at the level that I expect."

Rodriguez, who was highly successful at West Virginia before arriving in Ann Arbor, was just 6-18 in Big Ten play and 11-11 at home. The school will buy out the final three years of Rodriguez's contract for \$2.5 million, bringing its overall cost in hiring and firing him to \$12.5 million.

Brandon said he will immediately begin a search for a replacement amid speculation that candidates might include Stanford coach Jim Harbaugh, a former Wolverines quarter-

back, and former Michigan assistant Brady Hoke, now San Diego State's head coach. A SDSU spokesman said Michigan hadn't asked for permission to talk to Hoke.

Harbaugh has declined to comment about the Michigan job and a Stanford spokesman would not say whether Michigan had asked for permission to speak with him. His brother, Ravens coach John Harbaugh, said he thought "the Michigan thing is done now."

Another potential candidate, LSU coach and ex-Michigan assistant Les Miles, said he likes his current job with the Tigers.

"I very much enjoy where I'm at," Miles said Wednesday during a Cotton Bowl news conference. "I don't think anybody has any reason to be concerned in any way."

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Elway ready to restore Broncos' image

ENGLEWOOD, Colo. — Hall of Famer John Elway has been summoned by the Denver Broncos for one more comeback, this time as the team's chief football executive.

The beloved quarterback who led the Broncos to five Super Bowls and back-to-back championships before retiring in 1999 returned to the team's Dove Valley headquarters Wednesday to begin restoring the franchise's tarnished image and bring back its winning ways.

Team owner Pat Bowlen said he expects Elway to lead the Broncos to more Super Bowls and joked this time, Elway can tell him: "This one's for Pat!"

Elway said he was thrilled to be part of the Broncos again, declaring: "My greatest asset is my competitiveness ... I will give it everything I can to return this team back to the way it was."

Three coaching candidates are in line for interviews: Perry Fewell, Eric Studesville and Mike Mularkey, and Elway said he would call Jim Harbaugh as soon as he got upstairs to his office to try to schedule an interview with Stanford's coach, too.

Elway will interview Mularkey, the Falcons' offensive coordinator, in Atlanta on Friday night before returning to Denver for interviews Sunday with Fewell, the New York Giants' defensive coordinator, and Studesville, who went 1-3 as Denver's interim head coach following Josh McDaniels' Dec. 6 ouster.

Elway's title will be executive vice president of football operations in a reshaped front office, and chief operating officer Joe Ellis becomes team president. Brian Xanders will go from the general manager in name only to one who's empowered in the new organizational chart.

Baalke had been the team's vice president of player personnel since March.

TITANS WON'T BRING VINCE YOUNG BACK IN 2011

NASHVILLE, Tenn. — Titans owner Bud Adams says it's time to let Vince Young go and for the franchise to find its next quarterback.

The Titans released a statement Wednesday night in which Adams said Young won't be on the team's roster next season, but he's still evaluating the coaching staff.

"We have two critical decisions to make, the direction of the coaching staff and the

future at the quarterback position. They are separate issues to me and will be dealt with separately," Adams said.

Adams is the owner who wanted Young drafted No. 3 overall out of Texas in 2006 and said on draft day that "VY is my guy." But with his general manager and senior executive vice president traveling to Houston to meet with Adams on Monday, the 88-year-old owner decided Young no longer is the quarterback for his franchise.

Young is 30-17 in his five NFL seasons, but only 13-14 against teams finishing a season at .500 or better.

SAINTS RB PIERRE THOMAS OUT FOR THE PLAYOFFS

METAIRIE, La. — The defending champion Saints will have to try to repeat without their top two power running backs.

Pierre Thomas, one of the stars of last season's Super Bowl run, was placed on injured reserve on Wednesday because of his injured ankle. The Saints made that move only one day after placing leading rusher Chris Ivory on injured reserve because of a left foot injury that occurred during Sunday's regular season finale.

"That's tough," quarter-

back Drew Brees said of the loss of both running backs this week. "You can't deny that just because of the physical presence they bring and obviously their productivity."

JETS APPEALING NFL'S \$100K FINE FROM TRIP INCIDENT

FLORHAM PARK, N.J. — The New York Jets aren't writing the NFL a \$100,000 check just yet.

The team is appealing the hefty fine issued by the league last week for violating rules when assistant coach Sal Aloisi ordered players to form a sideline wall, then tripped Miami's Nolan Carroll during a punt return last month.

Meeting with the media for the first time since the fine, special teams coordinator Mike Westhoff said Wednesday he didn't want to comment, but revealed the Jets were appealing it by calling it "an unresolved issue."

After Westhoff's comments, team spokesman Bruce Speight confirmed the Jets are appealing the fine, calling it "a typical course of action whenever you receive a fine." He added that conversations between the team and the league would remain confidential.

his first year on the ballot. His career stats are among the best for first basemen since World War II — .297 batting average, .408 on-base percentage and .540 slugging percentage. He hit 449 home runs, topped 1,500 RBIs and runs and ran the bases hard. He was Rookie of the Year, NL MVP and a Gold Glove winner.

Bagwell never tested positive, there were no public allegations against him and he was adamant that he never used illegal drugs.

Still, many voters and fans aren't sure yet how to assess the huge numbers put up by the game's top hitters.

"That stuff's going to happen in this era," Bagwell said on a conference call. "People are going to have suspicion in the era I played in."

"People are going to think what they want to think. If they don't think that anybody was good in this era, then that's fine. Like I said, I'm one of the first ones to come up in that era. I'm OK with it," he said. "There's

nothing I can do about it."

Palmeiro was listed on just 64 of a record 581 ballots (11 percent) in his first try despite lofty career numbers — he is joined by Hank Aaron, Willie Mays and Eddie Murray as the lone players with more than 3,000 hits and 500 home runs.

But Palmeiro failed a drug test and was suspended by Major League Baseball in 2005. The penalty came a few months after he wagged his finger at members of Congress and told them: "I

have never used steroids. Period."

Former Rep. Tom Davis was the chairman of the House committee that held the March 17, 2005, hearing on steroids in baseball at which Palmeiro made that statement and McGwire refused to "talk about the past."

"The baseball writers are weighing the steroid thing. It's still got to play out, but at this point they seem to have factored that it into their decisions," Davis said in a telephone interview Wednesday.

THE ADDITION OF A NEW SECTION 10-4-23,
PROVIDING FOR THE RB RESIDENTIAL BUSINESS ZONE

The RB zoning district is intended to allow conversion of residential structures located on arterial and collector roads in areas of transition to an appropriate mix of residential, light retail and service commercial uses that provide good transitions with nearby residential uses and neighborhoods. 

In 1838, Samuel Morse and Alfred Vail gave the first successful public demonstration of their telegraph, in Morristown, N.J.

In 1861, Florida militia-men seized the federal arsenal at Chattahoochee.

In 1912, New Mexico became the 47th state.

In 1919, the 26th president of the United States, Theodore Roosevelt, died in Oyster Bay, N.Y., at age 60.

In 1942, the Pan American Airways Pacific Clipper arrived in New York more than a month after leaving California and following a westward route.

In 1950, Britain recognized the Communist government of China.

In 1967, U.S. Marines and South Vietnamese troops launched Operation Deckhouse Five, an offensive in the Mekong River delta.

In 1982, truck driver William G. Bonin was convicted in Los Angeles of 10 of the "Freeway Killer" slayings of young men and boys. (Bonin was later convicted of four other killings; he was executed in 1996.)

Ten years ago: With the vanquished Vice President Al Gore presiding (in his capacity as president of the Senate), Congress formally certified George W. Bush the winner of the bitterly contested 2000 presidential election.

Five years ago: Al-Qaida's No. 2 official, Ayman al-Zawahri, said in a videotape that a recent U.S. decision to withdraw some troops from Iraq represented "the victory of Islam." Hugh Thompson, Jr., a former Army helicopter pilot honored for rescuing Vietnamese civilians from his fellow GIs during the My Lai massacre, died in Alexandria, La., at age 62. The 115-year-old Pilgrim Baptist Church of Chicago was gutted by fire. Velvet-voiced singer Lou Rawls died in Los Angeles at age 72.

One year ago: James von Brunn, a 89-year-old white supremacist charged in a deadly shooting at Washington's Holocaust museum, died in North Carolina, where he'd been held while awaiting trial. British Prime Minister Gordon Brown fended off a challenge to his leadership from within his own ruling Labour party just months before general elections.

One of the things that really surprised them was learning cell phone calls don’t just go from one phone to another. All text messages and calls are transmitted through cell phone towers, which route the calls or texts to the company’s server. All sent messages and photos are stored on the provider’s server. This means pictures deleted from the phone are never really deleted – and text messages and photos never go away. They still exist in the virtual world.

Should those pictures become the center of a court case, the information is subject to “discovery.” With the right equipment, law enforcement can retrieve deleted photos from anyone’s cell phone.

“Don’t Want to Lose Him” needs to clearly understand she might be prosecuted for producing, distributing and possessing child pornography.

THE ACES ON BRIDGE®

Bobby Wolff

At the Dyspeptics Club the players approach the game in the same way they approach life. North, the cynic, is constantly waiting for catastrophe to strike; East is careful and cautious, as befits an accountant. West strides like Johnny Head-in-Air at full speed into the nearest puddle. Meanwhile, South, who was born with a silver spoon in his mouth, believes nothing bad will ever happen to him and is constantly surprised when things go wrong.

For example, in today's deal, where he (South) had reached three no-trump in double-quick time, he went down almost as fast. He won the opening spade lead, cashed the club king while noticing that both opponents had followed, and heaved a premature sigh of relief before leading a club to dummy's jack. The finesse held, but the 4-1 break meant that although South could set up a long club, he could never reach it. With no material for a ninth trick anymore, all South could do was concede down one and wait for his partner's inevitable criticism. Was the criticism justified?

Yes, it was. When West follows to the second club (even if he deviously selects the club queen at his second turn), South should resist temptation and duck the trick. By surrendering one club trick, he ensures taking four tricks — all he needs for the contract. When East shows out on the second club, declarer can take the marked club finesse against West, then run the suit.

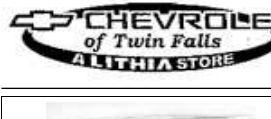
ANSWER: Experts use a balancing call of two no-trump here as strong and natural — about 19-21 points — describing your hand to a tee. With a balanced 16-18, you would double and bid no-trump cheaply; with 12-15 or so, you would bid one no-trump. This last bid shows less than it would in direct seat, as would all simple balancing actions. The only other sensible choice would be to double, then jump in no-trump.

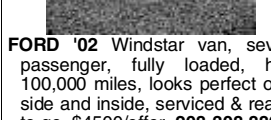

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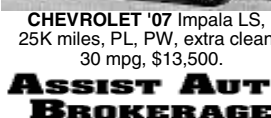
