Blue Angels set to soar back to T.F.

Navy pilots to blur skies over Joslin Field in 2012

The blue-and-gold aeronautic acrobats of the U.S. Navy Blue Angels will swoop through the Magic Valley again in July 2012, the city of Twin Falls announced Wednesday.

The show squadron will fly in "Air Magic Valley" at Joslin Field, Magic Valley Regional Airport on July 28 and 29. Event details will be hashed out in coming months, Air Magic Valley Chairman Phil 25,000 people to the airport.



T.F. Rotary pledges to build CSI-to-canyon walking trail

Standing on a field still covered with ice and under gray skies, Rotarians Jim Ponzo and Chris Scholes talked about how nice their club's new trail will be — especially when temperatures rise above freezing. The Twin Falls Rotary Club

recently got the Twin Falls City Council on board with its project, a milestone in what has thus far been a two-year effort by the club. The final product approval and the blessing of will create a walking trail that CSI and its foundation, which

follows the Perrine Coulee from the College of Southern Idaho to the Canyon Rim Trail at Pole Line Road.

"As soon as you get this part done, you can walk from CSI to the mall without hitting traffic," said Scholes, head of the Twin Falls Rotary Club's new projects committee. "That's pretty slick."

The project has no set completion date — the club still needs an OK to build on wetlands, final engineering

Mild flu season still holds risk of H1N1

Influenza viruses are beginning to make inroads into Idaho's population, but people can still shield themselves with a shot.

The first three months of the year are usually the peak of the flu season and that year. According to the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, flu cases were just sporadic in Idaho until local outbreaks increased during the week after Christmas.

Health officials confirmed the season's first Idaho case of H1N1 on Wednesday in

Students Come First" is a plan to overhaul education with three main components. They are:

The 21st century classroom:

Provide \$50 million in the next two years for classroom technology; laptops for each ninth-grader starting in 2012; online course requirements for high school students; state covers dual-credit course costs in a student's senior year if they meet graduation requirements early. Public colleges and universities could operate charter schools.

 Effective teachers/principals: Restores the salary grid that was cut last year; raises minimum salary for new teachers from \$29,655 to \$30,000; ties pay to teacher performance; phases out tenure with rolling two-year contracts for new educators. Performance evaluations would be partially tied to academic growth.

 Transparent accountability: Parental input would be used for teacher evaluations; salary negotiations would be public; school district financial information would be online.

"We were kind of budgeting on faith that it would break even," Twin Falls County Commission Chairman George Urie said of the 2008 show. "This time we can actually plan for it, budget for it."

Lessons from an Arizona tragedy

n the wake of the mass shooting in Tucson Saturday, reaction was swift and came from all sides of the political spectrum and all corners of the country. President Obama referred to the shooting as an "unspeakable tragedy" and "a senseless and terrible act of violence (that) has no place in a free society." Republican U.S. Sen. John McCain of Arizona said those responsible for the shootings "deserve and

will receive the contempt of all decent people and the strongest punishment of the law."

Arizona's Republican Secretary of State Ken Bennett said, "We have no room for violence in our political culture." Democrat Janet Napolitano, Homeland Security secretary and former Arizona governor, echoed those remarks by saying "there is no place in our society or discourse for such senseless and unconscionable acts of violence." Republican House Speaker John Boehner called it a "senseless attack" and GOP Rep. Ben Quayle of Arizona said he was "deeply shocked and saddened by the tragic shooting incident." Senate Majority Leader Harry Reid, a Democrat, said "this is a sad

day for our country, and acts of senseless violence such as this one affect us all." Our headline in the *Times-News* Sunday morning used the term "nation stunned."

We wonder. After a few days — or at most a couple of weeks — how big an effect will this shooting really have on our lives and those of the other 300 million-plus Americans? How long-lasting were the consequences of the Fort Hood, Texas, mass shooting in November 2009? How about the workplace shooting that killed nine in Manchester, Conn., last August, or the domestic dispute in Kentucky last September that left six people dead? What about the campus shootings at Columbine High School or Northern Illinois or Virginia Tech?

We think that we should be affected; that some action could or should have been taken in the past to prevent these shootings. We want to be outraged and shocked — and for the briefest of moments we are — and then tomorrow happens and we move relentlessly on with our own lives. We rush to assign blame to those who should have done something, but stop short of taking action to prevent it in the future.

The Second Amendment, which we and most Americans cherish, means that those who choose to abuse the privileges the Constitution affords U.S. citizens can do so. Courts have determined that fully automatic weapons and explosives can't be owned by everyone. But it's still a difficult tradeoff between freedom and security.

If debate about a possible solution to the endless string of mass shootings occurs – and we think that it should – it must be a serious one. It needs to elevate above the naïve fortune-cookie wisdom of "Guns don't kill people; people do." The debate must be entered into by intelligent men and women who do not try to pretend that the those who authored the words protecting "the right of the people to keep and bear arms" in 1791 may not have imagined the day when those arms would include a Glock 19 semiautomatic handgun.

The debate must not be reactive, but must occur. The choices are to do something or to do nothing. Doing "something" is fraught with freedom issues that we don't really want to consider, but doing nothing seems to relegate mass shootings to the "it's the cost of doing business" category.

Following Saturday's events in Tucson, no one was quoted as saying what we all know to be true but are secretly afraid to admit — that without change these shootings are inevitable and that there will be more of them.

Tighter belts mean later bumps

he tighter belts being worn of late are leaving less room for baby bumps. According to data released in December by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, births for 2009 continued the downward trend begun in 2008, and 2010 data indicate more of the same. Falling birthrates often breed anxiety: Who will do the work; who will pay the Social Security taxes of the future? But in reality, the declining baby rates prompted by the recession. many experts say - actually bode well for women, their families and the nation.

That's because, while the birthrate declined 3 percent overall, the underlying story is delay. And delay is good.

For the second year running, younger women are putting off kids in much greater numbers than older women. Births to teens declined 6 percent, and births to women age 20 to 24 fell a big 7 percent. After that, the decline diminished, coming in at 4 percent for those 25 to 29, 2 percent for the 30 to 34 group and 1 percent for those 35 to 39, while the rate for women 40 to 44 rose 3 percent for the second year running. This recessioninduced delay piggybacks on a trend toward delay that's grown steadily since the 1970s.

Most everyone agrees that the teen birthrate decline — to an all-time U.S. low — is great news. Fewer births to teens mean that more young women can finish growing up themselves, complete their educations and go on to better work, so they can better support and guide kids when they have them later.

Similar dynamics apply

for people in their early 20s, but beyond that point analysts waffle on how much delay is good. We've heard for years about the risk of infertility as women age. What we don't hear much about is why women wait. Just as recession has long been effective birth control, economics is a big factor behind delay even in good times. Like teens, women also face a trade-off between wages and babies.

For more than three

decades, increasing numbers have addressed this problem through delay into their late 20s, 30s and 40s. Holding off on kids, women have discovered, provides a shadow benefits system in a nation whose policies aren't very family friendly. Waiting to have children until we've finished our educations and established ourselves at work translates into higher wages long-term. Gaining job experience and your employer's trust pays off in more of the flexibility that helps families thrive. In addition, kids benefit from increased maternal education and clout. And, handily, the later your age at first birth, the longer you're likely to live, so chances are good you'll see your kids

The average age at first birth for U.S. women is 25 –

and rising. Female college grads have first kids on average at 30, and women with graduate degrees start even later. Though financial concerns are not the only reason for delay, they're significant. The new birth data confirm that older women feel both better able to afford kids and a sense of urgency about having them pronto.

The better wages linked to delay allow women to afford luxuries such as licensed child care for their kids, as opposed to the lessgood care that most families rely on. That's nice for them, but the bigger gain is at the broader level.

Delaying children has allowed a "trickle up" of women into policymaking roles in business and government. As a result, for the first time in history, women are getting a say in the shaping of the nation's rules and priorities. Women's presence in the business world has led to more family-friendly work options. Once a critical mass of female policymakers who support families is achieved, they should make it easier for all parents, at whatever age they start their families, to combine raising a family with fair wages and a career. The women delaying now could make it less necessary for women to delay in years

to come. But we're not there

The current birthrate drop, rather than offering an occasion for anxiety, offers an opportunity to consolidate the gains for women, for their future families and for the nation. Looking forward, we need policies that make it more worthwhile for younger women to delay even in non-recessionary times, by, for instance, helping them succeed in school. In addition, we need to ensure that women at all levels are paid fairly so that they can afford families at the time that is right for

There is a silver lining in the economic clouds: More women will be in better positions to support their families when they have them down the line and will have more of the clout that gets their voices heard on all the issues that matter to themThe ripple effect of recession-induced delay will be that many of the women held back from having kids now will have them later, continuing the rise in the birthrate to later moms for some time. That's a good

Idaho's only privately run prison, the Idaho Correctional Center, is facing some pretty disturbing accusations. Referred to by many as "Gladiator School," the lockup has been sued for failing to protect inmates from brutal vio-

Here's a quick refresher course:

- In 2009, inmate Marlin Riggs filed a civil case against the prison after he was beaten so badly in his cell that he suffered permanent facial deformities.
- Late last year, inmate Brian Robert Spaude filed a lawsuit accusing staff of dereliction of duty leading to his assault in the prison's dining hall.
- Attorneys for former inmate Hanni Elabed are negotiating a settlement regarding brain damage he suffered after being beaten by another inmate for several minutes while guards stood and watched.
- Three former guards at the prison provided sworn affidavits claiming that staff at the prison — from the warden down to the

guards — failed to protect inmates, and in some cases put them in situations where they knew the inmates would be assaulted.

- A surveillance video released to The Associated Press late last year shows Elabed being attacked, begging for help, while guards stood and watched.
- The American Civil Liberties Union filed a motion last week claiming inmates who are assaulted are written up for trying to defend themselves during attacks. The group also claims guards may be deliberately opening the wrong cell doors, allowing inmates to attack each other.

The Idaho Correctional Center, run for profit by the Corrections Corporation of America, has of course denied many of the claims against it. And in America, any person or group is innocent until proven guilty in a court of law. These very serious claims need to go through the legal system and all sides must be given their chance to state their

But it's also true that the claims and evidence against the prison are mounting. It's hard to dispute video-

Once we get to the bottom of what's really going on at "Gladiator School," we need to either be absolutely sure such incidents aren't ever going to happen, or Idaho needs to end its contract with Corrections Corporation of America. Simple as that.

In 1951, Nampa native Herbert Littleton died after throwing himself on a grenade to save the lives of fellow Korean War soldiers.

Fifty-eight years later, the 111th Congress paid tribute to the Medal of Honor recipient by renaming Nampa's post office in his memory.

The bill, sponsored by then-Rep. Walt Minnick, D-Idaho, is now notable for one somewhat less significant reason. Idaho's congressional delegation sponsored 52 bills in 2009 and 2010. Only this one bill passed.

A 1-for-52 track record does not exactly inspire awe. But the statistic requires some context. Federal lawmakers introduced 10,788 bills and joint resolutions in 2009-10, and 344 were signed into law – roughly a 1-in-31 success rate.

Instead of simply knocking Idaho's batting average, we're more interested in mourning a big opportunity that got away.

After nearly a decade's work, 2010 looked like it could be the year for Rep. Mike Simpson's Boulder-White Clouds wilderness bill. Having secured impressive, consensus support at home, the 2nd District Republican also had bipartisan backing on Capitol Hill. All four members of the delegation were on board, and on April 30, Idaho

Republican Sens. Mike Crapo and Jim Risch introduced the bill in the Senate.

They signed on to a common-sense compromise to preserve grazing rights in wilderness areas; maintain off-road vehicle access on the popular Germania Creek trail; and provide land-rich but tax-starved Custer County with more than \$2 million in grants for economic development, a community center, EMT services and health clinics. They supported a balance that would create 332,775 acres of Central Idaho wilderness, but allow multiple use on 131.616 acres that are now in public lands limbo and managed as de facto wilder-

The bill was strong, but Simpson's political coalition went soft. After Gov. Butch Otter voiced 11thhour objections, Risch bailed ... conveniently ignoring years of work on the ground and reneging on his own long-standing support of the bill ...

... the bill's future seems unclear. The delegation could be at an impasse; Minnick's successor, Republican Rep. Raul Labrador, has voiced opposition to the bill. Congress is at a partisan deadlock, and the 2012 presidential race is more imminent than nonpolitical junkies would like to believe — simple realities that don't bode well even for an Idaho public lands bill that is unlikely to register on the national radar.

The cities of Sun Valley and Ketchum have focused the new Sun Valley Marketing Alliance on marketing and the Sun Valley Chamber of Commerce on managing a visitor center.

The area now lacks any group designated to collect and disseminate local business data or to analyze it.

For example, the cities collect local-option tax data. The state collects lodging

tax information and tracks employment. Friedman Memorial

Airport tracks the number of flights and the numbers of passengers that pass through the terminal.

The Chamber of Commerce is still collecting current lodging and condo occupancy reports and putting out forecasts. It may also be tracking the number of visitors it serves and the number of calls it receives requesting travel information.

In its previous incarnation, the chamber assembled all the data and also acted as a clearinghouse for general information on tourist-based economies and what factors might be affecting them.

Today, the data aren't being assembled in one place and thus can't help inform decisions by local businesses or the cities ...

Because the cities are wholly dependent on the health of the local economy and are fully in control of the business-generated tax revenues that constitute half their budgets, they should fill the void and take on the responsibility of assembling important local economic indicators for public consumption.



Pharmacist accused of breaking conscience provisions

BOISE - A nurse practitioner at a Planned Parenthood of the Great Northwest office in Idaho has filed a complaint with the state pharmacy board, contending a pharmacist abused a new health care conscience law to deny a patient medication.

Lawmakers during the 2010 Legislature passed a measure to allow healthcare workers to opt out of providing assistance for abortions, emergency contraception or end-oflife care in some instances. if it violated their conscience.

In the complaint made public Wednesday, the nurse practitioner contends a Walgreens pharmacist in Nampa, Idaho, in November balked at filling a prescription for a drug that helps control bleeding after childbirth or abortions, then hung up the phone when asked for a reference for a pharmacist who would fill the prescription.

Last year's law defines "health care services" that could trigger conscience provisions as "an abortion, dispensation of an abortifacient drug, human embryonic stem cell research, treatment regimens utilizing human embryonic stem cells, human embryo cloning or end of life treatment and care."

The nurse practitioner, who wasn't identified, contends the drug in question - methergine fits none of those categories. "Methergine is not an

abortifacient and it serves multiple purposes in postpartum care," the practitioner wrote in her complaint. "I believe the pharma-

cist wrongly applied the conscience protections... Not filling the prescription could have placed my patient in grave danger," the complaint added.

The patient eventually received the prescription from another pharmacy.



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Obama says polarized nation needs healing

TUCSON, Ariz. - Summoning the soul of a nation, President Barack Obama on Wednesday implored Americans to honor those slain and injured in the Arizona shootings by becoming better people, telling a polarized citizenry that it is time to talk with each other "in a way that heals, not in a way that wounds." Following a hospital bedside visit with Rep. Gabrielle Giffords, the target of the assassination, he said: "She knows we're here, and she knows we love her."

In a memorably dramatic moment, the president said that Giffords, who on Saturday was shot point-blank in the head, had opened her eyes for the first time shortly after his hospital visit. First lady Michelle Obama held hands with Giffords' husband, Mark Kelly, as the news brought soaring cheers throughout the arena.

Speaking at a memorial at the University of Arizona, Obama bluntly conceded that there is no way to know what triggered the shooting rampage that left six people dead, 13 others wounded and the nation shaken. He tried instead to leave indelible memories of the people who were gunned down and to rally the country to use the moment as a reflection on the nation's behavior and compassion.

"I believe we can be better," Obama said to a capacity crowd in the university's basketball arena — and to countless others watching around the coun-

"Those who died here, those who saved lives here - they help me believe," the president said. "We may not be able to stop all evil in the world. but I know that how we treat one another is entirely up to us."

In crafting his comments, Obama clearly sought a turning point in the raw debate that has defined national politics. After offering personal

Snowstorm buries parts of Northeast

HARTFORD, Conn. -The third winter storm in three weeks buried parts of the Northeast in more than 2 feet of wet, blowing snow Wednesday, smothering highways, halting trains and plunging thousands of homes and businesses into cold darkness.

The storm, which iced over much of the South before sweeping up the East Coast, wreaked havoc on transportation across New England.

In Massachusetts, Gov. Deval Patrick declared a state of emergency and mobilized the National Guard. He said the storm brought more snow and a wetter kind of snow than officials expected, leaving more than 100,000 people without power or heat by noon.

Maria Rivera, 60, slept overnight in a food court booth at a travel plaza where works on the Massachusetts Turnpike in Natick. She said the person providing her ride home to Worcester could not make it in the storm, and she had to be back for her Wednesday shift.

"I have to work," she said. "I have to pay my bills."

In New York, where city leaders took heavy criticism for their slow work after a Dec. 26 blizzard, officials rolled out a massive response that quickly cleared the streets. They also received some help from nature, with only 9 inches of snow falling in Central Park — well short of 20 inches in last month's storm.

This time, the deepest snow fell farther north.

The roof of an apartment building in Norwich partially collapsed under the weight of the snow, forcing 10 people from their homes. State troopers, working double shifts on orders of the governor, responded to about 900 spinouts, fender-benders and stranded vehicles.

By early afternoon, New Fairfield had 28 inches of snow, and Danbury had 24 inches. The 22.5 inches recorded at Bradley International Airport set a one-day record for snowfall in the Hartford area.

Quinn promises to quickly sign 66% Illinois tax hike



BRAZIL Torrential rain, mudslides in Brazil kill 257

RIO DE JANEIRO — Summer rains sent tons of red mud and torrents of water rushing down mountainsides in towns outside Rio, enveloping homes of rich and poor alike and killing at least 257 people in 24 hours. Some survivors clung to trees to escape the water and landslides.

Rescuers used heavy machinery, shovels and bare hands to dig through debris in a search for survivors Wednesday. It was not immediately clear how many people were rescued. At least 50 remained missing, and officials feared that figure would rise.

In Teresopolis, a town 40 miles north of Rio, the rain overflowed creeks and flash floods swept over already water-logged

mountainsides. Brick and wooden shacks built on hillsides stripped of trees, washed away in surging earth and water, leaving behind only a long trail of rusty red mud.

AUSTRALIA Flood rebuilding task 'of postwar proportions'

BRISBANE — Floodwaters washing through Australia's third-largest city crested Thursday just shy of a record but high enough to submerge entire neighborhoods and cause damage one official likened to the aftermath of war.

One man died in Brisbane after being sucked into a storm drain by the muddy waters, Queensland state Premier Anna Bligh said. Thousands of homes were swamped, and officials told residents it will be days before many of them can return to their houses. Others were told their homes will never be habitable again.

TUNISIA Riots reach Tunisia's capital, curfew imposed

TUNIS — Tear gas and stone-throwing youths reached the heart of Tunisia's once-calm capital Wednesday as rioters desperate for jobs defied their autocratic president in escalating unrest that poses his biggest challenge in 23 years in power.

The army deployed armored vehicles around Tunis, and the government imposed a virtually unprecedented curfew to try to quell protests over unemployment and political repression that began more than three weeks ago in a central Tunisian town. Outside the capital, at least two deaths were reported from police fire Wednesday.

The demonstrations have set off clashes with police as they spread around the country, leaving at least 23

The rioting stayed outside the capital until Wednesday, when the interior minister was fired and clashes broke out hours later, intensifying an unprecedented sense of uncertainty about the future of Tunisia's government.

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
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

Nordic center offers snowshoes as way to see the outdoors

Visitors to the Sun Valley Nordic Center can strap on a pair of snowshoes and step back into

The Historical Snowshoe Treks are offered from 1 to 3 p.m. Saturdays and Sundays at the Nordic Center a halfmile north of the Sun Valley Lodge.

There, Katherine Pleasants greets snowshoers with an admonition to close their eyes before they begin their trek along Trail Creek and through the wooded groves that dot the Sun Valley Golf Course.

"Now, pretend that you're just getting off the train that brought visitors to Sun Valley nearly 75 years ago in 1936," she said as she begins describing the tanned Austrian ski instructors that greeted guests then.

Pleasants is a yoga instructor and history buff who has led historical snowshoe tours at Galena Lodge and historical walks around Ketchum during the summer.

She began offering historical snowshoe treks at the Sun Valley Nordic area last winter.

"It's so accessible for the guests staying here. And it's so rich in history," she said.

That said, Sun Valleyarea residents are beginning to take note of the snowshoe treks, as well. Among them, Inger Vida. Coleen Baldwin, Leslie Silva and Liane Mynatt. who joined Pleasants one sunny afternoon last

week. Equipped with ski poles for balance, the three followed Pleasants as she plowed through footdeep snow along a snowshoe trail leading away from the posh Sun Valley

Club restaurant. "Look, there's a sleigh going through the trees, just as it would have done in 1936," she pointed, as the group watched a sleigh full of men, women and children decked out in lap blankets being pulled by Clydesdales to the historic Trail Creek Cabin.

Pleasants stops within view of Proctor Mountain, which boasts one of Sun Valley's original chairlifts.

She pulls some historical photos out of her pack and describes how Union Pacific Magnate Averell

Sun Valley's Historical Snowshoe Tours are held from 1 to 3 p.m. Saturdays and Sundays and by request. Pre-registration is suggested at 622-2250. Cost is \$35 for adults — free for children under 6. Snowshoes are available for rent at the Nordic Center (\$15 for adults, \$13 for children).

Pleasants prattled on about Sun Valley's early guests, which included Gary Cooper and Ernest Hemingway.

Then she described how Otto Lang traded filmmaker Darryl Zanuck ski lessons to learn about the film industry, eventually going on to become a filmmaker.

And how a Swedish

hockey player named Leif Odmark decided he wanted to visit "this enchanted place" when he had a couple days off from playing hockey in Chicago.

Odmark had no idea that Sun Valley wasn't just a hop skip and jump from Chicago, Pleasants said. And to make matters worse, he found him stuck in a blizzard when he got to Twin Falls. He became the hometown hero there after he volunteered his long wooden skis to ski in search of a missing Twin Falls man.

Odmark eventually settled down in Sun Valley, founding one of the first Nordic touring centers in the United States.

Pleasants informs her trekkers that they can burn between 800 and 1,000 calories an hour snowshoeing — certainly enough to make up for the big chocolate chip Sun Valley cookie a couple of the women ate earlier.

Trekkers burn up bonus calories for trekking up a short hill to see Hemingway memorial, she added.

"These tours are wonderful for the curious," said Vida. "The weather, the company - everything is fabulous. And I like to be around Katherine — she's so up."

The outing also provides a nice way to meet new friends throughout something other than skiing, added Baldwin.

Silva agreed: "It's so wonderful for those who don't ski. And Katherine is just full of knowledge."

Ice fishing: Frigid weather brings out the fishermen

COLUMBUS, Neb. – The colder the temperatures the better for those who enjoy spending part of the winter on the ice.

Many have been waiting for ponds and lakes to freeze over so they can go ice fishing. The winter sport brings many to the outdoors, and now is a good time to enjoy the hobby, said Don Gabelhouse with the Nebraska Game and Parks Commission.

Several fishermen have been bundling up and heading outside with rods and tackle for the past several days. That will only gain steam throughout January, Gabelhouse said.

"If you have the right equipment, it's almost easier than open water (fishing) at times. It is almost mysterious, romantic, drilling a hole and watching the fish come through the hole," Gabelhouse said.

There are popular spots for the sport. Many are

"Farm ponds are real good, some pits and smaller lakes are too," Gabelhouse said. He suggests visiting website forums to find the waters that are producing the best and worst luck for area fishers. Fish that have been biting include pan fish the Sandhills there are northern pike and yellow perch. Channel catfish have also been caught. A number of lakes were stocked with others. trout in the fall and winter, so there is a good chance at catching those, too.

That is why the Game and Parks Commission suggests fishermen should carry an ice pick around their necks. If you fall through the ice, the pick can be used to help pull yourself from the water. Also, all fishermen should keep with them a long piece of rope for emergencies.

A fishing permit is needed for those who are 16 and older. Permits can be obtained online at outdoornebraska.ne.gov or at sporting good stores.

How to gain peace of mind when going afield

"I do a lot of back-country hiking and hunting. Can you suggest some things I can do to help give my wife 'peace of mind' and prepare for a first-aid emergency?' A. This topic area is huge but I will highlight a few suggestions. Backcountry survival is an area rich with educational opportunities as well as gadgets and technology. First, I would advise you to take one of the basic firstaid classes offered at the College of Southern Idaho, St. Luke's Magic Valley

Regional Medical Center, or

and first aid. A backcountry survival or first-aid kit is another item everyone should carry. There are many commercial kits available for purchase at outdoor retailers, but I prefer to personalize my kit with items of my choosing. Kits can range in size from a Band-Aid box to a tackle box, depending on the availability of space and weight. I carry one contained in a small coffee can in my elk hunting pack.

With the advent of cellular telephones and additional cell towers, some weekend warriors can rely on cell phones to call for help when necessary. For serious backcountry visitors a satellite telephone, often referred to as "sat phone," is another way to stay in contact with the outside world. Most commercial outfitters and raft guides carry a sat phone for emergency purposes. Fish and Game employees working in the backcountry or conducting aerial surveys always carry a sat phone. Remember these devices rely on batteries; spare batteries are as important as the phone itself.

Sat phones cost around \$1.200 and require a monthly fee similar to a cell phone. Calls utilizing the satellite service cost about \$1 per minute — cheap for emergencies but expensive for social calls.

A less expensive innovation also using satellite technology is called a SPOT Satellite Personal Tracker. This small device costs about \$150 at local sporting

goods retailers. Two levels of tracking service are provided at an additional charge of up to \$150 per year. With the premium tracking service the location of the SPOT device can be tracked using a personal computer by persons you select on Google Earth. In case of emergencies there are two levels of alerts the carrier can send to responders; an "SOS" for lifethreatening emergencies, and a "need help" for nonlife threatening emergencies. The units also have a "check-in, I'm OK" as well as a second message that can be set up in advance by

the SPOT device carrier. A friend of mine relayed an experience one of his backcountry pilot friends had last summer. On takeoff from a backcountry air strip, he experienced mechanical failure and crash-landed, destroying the plane and injuring the pilot. Within two hours of activating the "SOS" feature on the SPOT device the pilot was in a rescue aircraft being transported to a medical facility. This kind of response is something unheard of before the advent of SPOT and Global Positioning System (GPS) technology.

A couple of important reminders: the new technology only works when it's with you, so don't leave it in the truck. Also, these gadgets rely on batteries and can fail. Extra batteries and a plain old map and compass are cheap insurance.

Lastly, a couple of real simple "old-school" things that can be tremendously important: Tell someone where you're going, your route of travel, what vehicle you'll be driving, and when you expect to return.

A survival book I read some years ago said, "an important part of surviving a backcountry emergency isn't so much about being found by rescuers; it's about staying alive long enough to be found."



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Get your daily dose of astronomical splendor

f all the sciences, astronomy offers some of the most beautiful images of the natural world. And, as technology and telescopes improve, eye-popping space scenes are becoming available at an accelerating pace.

While there are numerous sites across the Internet to satisfy the web-surfing astronomy fan, one of the best is the Astronomy Picture of the Day (apod.nasa.gov).

The World Wide Web was not quite four years old in the summer of 1995, when NASA astronomers Robert Nemiroff and Jerry Bonnell launched APOD.

Since then, the site has featured a daily celestial image that combines the beautiful with the intriguing, accompanied by a short description. APOD also holds the distinction of being one of the first websites to make extensive use of hyperlinked text; its concise captions, written for non-experts, are loaded with useful links.

A given day's entry might feature the latest shot from space telescopes like Hubble, Spitzer (infrared), or Chandra (X-ray), surface views from Mars rovers, or stunning photos of terrestrial landscapes crowned by auroras, meteors, or atmospheric ice crystal displays capture by talented amateurs.

You can subscribe to APOD as an RSS feed for your home page or mobile device, and if you miss a day, every entry is archived back to day one.



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

nswer: Federal law does not require you to have an attorney to file a bankruptcy. However, your creditors WILL be represented by attorneys. You will also have to deal with the Bankruptcy Trustee, an individual paid a commission to take your property away for the benefit of your creditors. In fact, there are very few non-lawyers, no matter how smart, that could prepare and file a bankruptcy case on their own that complied in every respect with all the bankruptcy laws and rules of court. BEWARE! The consequences of saving money by representing yourself could be far more expensive than the cost of retaining a first-rate bankruptcy attorney. On your own, you could unnecessarily lose some things you own AND possibly have your bankruptcy discharge denied.

Blind students put their skills to the test

Blind students from around Idaho will participate in the National Idaho Braille Challenge this week, starting with an event today at the Idaho School for the Deaf and the Blind in Gooding.

I am uninformed but was surprised a specialist would not have heard of it, either. Can you fill in the blanks? **DEAR READER:** The use

of ambulatory blood-pressure monitoring (ABPM) for 24 hours has gained greater acceptance for several reasons. A situation known as white-coat hypertension occurs in up to 32 percent of patients, and this particular testing unit can monitor the condition. It can also delineate circadian variations in readings and pick up on drug-induced orthostatic hypotension and episodic primary hypertension.



There are instances where high-blood-pressure readings appear to have no known cause; however, with the capability of 24hour monitoring, it stands a better chance of identification.

Primary hypertension, as indicated above, is defined as that which occurs with no known cause. It occurs in up to 95 percent of people with high blood pressure. Secondary hypertension with a known cause occurs in up to 15 percent of people with high blood pressure. and may result from a kidney or hormonal disorder, the use of specific

drugs, hyperthyroidism and ing. Go with it, and get to other conditions.

Blood pressures vary and increase with age. Systolic pressure (the first number) increase until about the age of 80. Diastolic (the second number) increases until the age of 55 or 60. Then these levels stabilize or perhaps decrease. Smoking, a sedentary lifestyle, stress, eating too much salt, obesity and numerous other conditions can aggravate the condition.

My guess is that your physician is attempting to zero in on whether you have white-coat syndrome, whether your readings are consistently lower at home, or whether extenuating undefined circumstances cause the problem. The monitoring device is harmless and should provide the answers the doctor is seek-

DEAR DR. GOTT: How do I get rid of nail fungus? Is there a home remedy? I have had it on my big toenail for years, following a pedicure, and it's now on two of my fingernails.

DEAR READER: Home remedies include soaking the toes or fingers in

warm water to make the nails softer and easier to cut. Trim the nails, and remove as much of the debris as possible. Apply a petrolatum/menthol salve around the top and under the tip of the nail twice daily. The process may take a month or more but is worth a try. Apply decolorized iodine

to affected dry nails twice daily. Again, this will take some time but offers another option. Oregano oil applied to

affected clean, dry nails once or twice daily with a cotton swab has been purported to work.

Consider purchasing over-the-counter Miranel, an antifungal remedy that permeates nails and promotes faster eradication of

"Now we just need to go out and prove it," said Declo coach Lawrence Gillette.

The good folks at IWN admit that their rankings "have no bearing on district or state seedings, officially. They are for entertainment purposes only." Historically, though, the rankings have been fairly accurate in gauging the top wrestlers in the state.

Declo, which last won a state wrestling team title in 1998, seems to have the mat men to make a run at this year's state tournament, which will be held Feb. 24-26 at the Idaho Center in Nampa.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF JEROME, IDAHO, REPEALING SECTION 13.28.050 RULE 4 OF THE JEROME MUNICIPAL CODE; AMENDING THE JEROME MUNICIPAL CODE BY REQUIRING ALL OWNERS OF REAL PROPERTY TO HAVE ULTIMATE RESPONSIBILITY FOR PAYMENT OF FEES AND CHARGES FOR UTILITY SERVICES; AND PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, the City of Jerome operates potable water, and wastewater collection and treatment systems for the benefit of its residents and property owners; and

WHEREAS, user fees, including deposits, are assessed by the City to defray costs related to the operation of those systems; and,

WHEREAS, current provisions of the Jerome Municipal Code ("JMC") require that the users of water and/or waste water collection and treatment services from the City bear the entire financial responsibility for such fees; and

WHEREAS, a review of delinquent payment records for water and wastewater collection and treatment accounts has demonstrated that many delinquent and uncollectible accounts have been incurred by users who were occupying the real property being served, but who were not the owners of the real property: and

WHEREAS, making the owners of the real property being served with water and/or wastewater collection and treatment ultimately responsible for such accounts will provide a more effective means of collecting fees for such services, thereby promoting the general welfare of the

BE IT THEREFORE ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF JEROME, IDAHO, AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1: Section 13.28.050, Rule 4, of the Jerome Municipal Code, is amended to read as follows: 13.28.050: RULE 4; BUILDING OWNER HAS ULTIMATE RESPONSIBILITY FOR WATER SERVICE CHARGES:

Owners or lessees of buildings containing one or more stores, apartments, or any other division of like or similar character, all of which divisions are served from one tap, are held responsible for the entire water charges. If the owner or lessee desires to cease being responsible for the water bills for such places and desires that the occupant of each division shall be responsible for his respective water bill, such transfer of responsibility will not be accepted or recognized by the city until the plumbing arrangements of the building are so arranged by the owner, lessee, or their agents, as to permit the city, to its satisfaction, to serve each division or occupant, separate from the other occupants, in the same building. Where the owner, lessee, or consumer, declines to pay the water charges, and also refuses to make the necessary plumbing changes to conform to the above requirements, water service will be discontinued until the provisions of this rule are complied with. Owners of real property being provided domestic water service by the City shall be ultimately responsible for all deposits, fees and charges for such services, irrespective of whether the owner is the occupant of the real property or is otherwise a consumer as referenced in this chapter. All applications for domestic water service may be made by the owner or occupant of the real property to be provided the services. Monthly bills shall be sent to the person who has made the application for domestic water service, irrespective of whether he is the owner. If the account was opened in the name of a person who is not the owner, and has become delinquent, the owner of the real property to which the services have been provided shall be mailed a notice of termination of services at least ten (10) days prior to actual termination, which notice must also set forth the amount of all delinquent charges and fees. All fees and charges not paid by the date of termination shall be the responsibility of the owner of the real property. This section shall not be construed to alter provisions of this title which require notices of termination to the

person who has made application for the services.
Section 2: Section 13.24.010 of the Jerome Municipal Code is amended to read as follows:

13.24.010: DEFINITIONS:

For the purposes of this chapter, the following words and phrases shall have the meanings respectively ascribed to them by this section: CONSUMER: When used in these rules and regulations or in the application for service, means the person using or desiring to use water

service DELIVERY OF WATER SERVICE: The maintenance by the city at the point of delivery of service pipes at the approximate pressure in the form

specified in the application. EXTENSION: A branch from, or continuation of, an existing main or service pipe, or both, including any increase of capacity of any existing

extension, or the changing of any main or service now installed.

HAULERS AND CARRIERS: When used in these rules and regulations, and in the application for service, refers to any person receiving water from any "premises", as defined in this section, other than the premises so occupied by such person, by hauling, carrying, or by any other means or device; provided, however, that the city is at all times ready and willing to serve the premises occupied by the haulers and carriers under the rules and regulations set out in this chapter.

MONTH: (Except where the calendar year is stated) means the approximate monthly period intervening between meter readings, upon which the consumer's demand and consumption are computed and bill rendered.

OWNER: The person or entity who owns the fee simple title of real property being provided water service. POINT OF DELIVERY: The point where the city's taps or pipes are connected with those of the consumer. Unless otherwise specified in the

application for service, or in the city's schedules, such connection will be at the property line of consumer's premises. PREMISES: As contemplated in these rules, means a property which cannot be completely divided in its present utilitarian condition through

A. A building under one roof, owned by one party and occupied as one business or residence; or

- B. A combination of buildings owned by one party or one common enclosure, occupied by one family or business; or
- The one side of a double house having a solid vertical partition wall; or
- A building owned by one party, of more than one apartment, and using in common one hall and one entrance; or
- E. A building owned by one party having a number of apartments or offices, and using in common one hall, and one or more means of entrance. RULES ON FILE: These rules and regulations are obtainable at the offices of the city, and are a part of the schedules, rates and tariffs of the city, and apply without modification or change to the city and each and every consumer whom the city serves, and are subject to change only

by amendment in the manner provided by law. WATER SERVICE: The furnishing of water for the purpose specified in the application for service.

YEAR: (Except where the calendar year is stated) means each year, the period intervening between the date corresponding to the effective date of the contract and the same day the following calendar year. (Prior code §27-1)

Section 3: Section 13.20.020 of the Jerome Municipal Code is amended to read as follows:

13.20.020: MONTHLY CHARGES; SCHEDULE:

The monthly wastewater collection and treatment service charges for each property owner <u>or user of real property</u>, or user, domestic, commercial, or industrial in nature, shall be determined by the cubic feet of water used plus a fixed administrative fee. Monthly bills shall be sent to the person who has applied for water service to the real property, irrespective of whether they are the owner. The owner of real property to which wastewater treatment and collection services are provided shall be ultimately responsible for the payment of all deposits, charges and fees required by this chapter which are not paid in full at the time water or wastewater treatment services are terminated to that real property. Each owner of real property to which wastewater treatment and collection services is provided shall receive written notice of termination of water service to such real property at least ten (10) days prior to the termination of such services, which notice shall also contain the amount of all delinquent charges and fees. This provision shall not replace the requirements elsewhere in this title for notices to be provided to the person who has made application for such services. The following rate schedule shall determine service charges and fees

A. The city administrator, or his designee, shall classify all residential, commercial, and industrial users into appropriate user classes according to the user's wastewater strength. Service charges for residential and commercial users shall be derived from the rate schedule stated in this

The monthly wastewater collection and treatment service charge for each property owner or user, domestic, commercial, or industrial in nature, whose water consumption is not metered shall be fixed by the city council based upon the rate established in the rate schedule above and the cubic feet of water discharged into the collection system as determined by the city administrator; provided, however, that in the case of single-family residential dwellings, with unmetered or unavailable water discharge data, cubic feet discharge shall be deemed to be four hundred (400) cubic feet per month for dwellings with less than three (3) permanent residents, and eight hundred (800) cubic feet per month for dwellings with three (3) or more residents.
 - C. Each nonresidential property owner or user not serviced by a public water supplier with water, but having a private well or water supply, shall install and maintain at his or its own expense a water meter capable of measuring the total gallons per day of water being used. The meter
 - 1. Be approved by the city administrator prior to installation;
 - 2. Be installed within sixty (60) days of the receipt of approval for installation;
 - 3. Be situated on property accessible to the city, its agents or employees daily between the hours of eight o'clock (8:00) A.M. and six o'clock (6:00) P.M.
 - D. Industrial user fees shall be computed on a monthly basis using the average monthly flow from a city meter if all water used by such facility goes through the city meter and the average monthly BOD developed by Jerome wastewater treatment sampling schedule (minimum 3 composite samples per week), to establish classification.
 - 1. In the event that all water used is not metered, then the monthly average flow based on the required continuous flow monitoring system at outfall of user and monthly average BOD will be used.

Section 4: Section 13.04.04 of the Jerome Municipal Code is amended to read as follows:

13.04.010: DEFINITIONS:

or the purposes of this chapter, the following words and phrases shall have the meanings respectively ascribed to them by this section: BOD: The quantity of oxygen utilized in the biochemical oxidation of organic matter under standard laboratory procedure in five (5) days at twenty degrees centigrade (20°C), expressed in parts per million by weight.

BUILDING DRAIN: That part of the lowest horizontal piping of a drainage system which receives the discharge from soil, waste, and other drainage pipes inside the walls of the building and conveys it to the building sewer, beginning five feet (5') outside the inner face of the building

BUILDING SEWER: The extension from the building drain to the public sewer or other place of disposal.

CITY ADMINISTRATOR: City administrator or representative of the city administrator.

COMBINED SEWER: A sewer receiving both sewage and surface runoff. COMMERCIAL USER: Any place of business, manufacturing facility, or other enterprise not primarily used as a residence, connected to the city

sewage collection system, and which does not meet the definition of an industrial user. GARBAGE: Solid wastes from the preparation, cooking, and dispensing of food, and from the handling, storage, and sale of produce.

INDUSTRIAL USER: Any user connected to the city's wastewater treatment facility which meets or exceeds one or more of the following criteria: A. A flow rate of 0.025 million gallons per day during any one day or a flow that will average over 0.025 million gallons per day for a monthly

B. A five (5) day BOD discharge rate exceeding thirty (30) pounds in any one day. C. A TSS discharge rate exceeding thirty (30) pounds in any one day.

INDUSTRIAL WASTES: The liquid wastes from industrial processes as distinct from sanitary sewer.

NATURAL OUTLET: Any outlet into a watercourse, pond, ditch, lake or other body of surface or ground water.

OWNER: The person or entity who owns fee simple title to the real property being provided with wastewater collection and treatment services. PERSON: Any individual, firm, company, association, society, corporation, or group.

pH: The logarithm of the reciprocal of the weight of hydrogen ions in grams per liter of solution.

PROPERLY SHREDDED GARBAGE: The wastes from the preparation, cooking and dispensing of food that have been shredded to such

degree that all particles will be carried freely under the flow conditions normally prevailing in public sewers, with no particle greater than onehalf inch (1/2") in any dimension.

PUBLIC SEWER: A sewer in which all owners of abutting properties have equal rights, and is controlled by public authority.

RESIDENTIAL USER: Any single- or multiple-dwelling unit connected to the city sewage collection system. SANITARY SEWER: A sewer which carries sewage and to which storm, surface, and ground waters are not intentionally admitted.

SEWAGE: A combination of the water carried wastes from residences, business buildings, institutions, and industrial establishments, together with such ground, surface and storm waters as may be present.

SEWAGE TREATMENT PLANT: Any arrangement of devices and structures used for treating sewage.

SEWAGE WORKS: All facilities for collecting, pumping, treating, and disposing of sewage. SEWER: A pipe or conduit for carrying sewage.

SLUG: Any discharge of water, sewage or industrial waste which in concentration of any given constituent or in quantity of flow exceeds for any

period of duration more than fifteen (15) minutes and more than five (5) times the average twenty four (24) hour concentration or flow expected during normal operation

STORM SEWER OR STORM DRAIN: A sewer which carries storm and surface waters and drainage, but excludes sewage and polluted

industrial wastes. SUPERINTENDENT: The city, or its authorized deputy, agent, or representative.

SUSPENDED SOLIDS: Solids that either float on the surface of, or are in suspension in water, sewage, or other liquids; and which are removable by laboratory filtering. JSER: The person occupying or in possession of the real property to which wastewater treatment and collection services are provided and/or

the person who has made application for the domestic water services provided to that real property. WATERCOURSE: A channel in which a flow of water occurs, either continuously or intermittently.

Section 5: This ordinance shall be effective following passage and publication as required by law.

ORDINANCE NO. 1275

AN ORDINANCE OF THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BURLEY, IDAHO, AMENDING TITLE 10, CHAPTER 3 OF THE BURLEY CITY CODE RELATING TO PENALTIES FOR FAILURE TO LISENCE; AMENDING THE PENALTIES ASSOCIATED WITH FAILURE TO LISENCE DOGS; SETTING FORTH THE PROCESS OF PROVIDING NOTICE TO VIOLATORS; PROVIDING FOR A REQUIRED KENNEL LICENSE FOR THE KEEPING OF MULTIPLE DOGS AND FOR PENALTIES FOR VIOLATIONS THEREOF; AND, PROVIDING THAT THIS ORDINANCE SHALL BE IN FULL FORCE AND EFFECT FROM AND AFTER ITS PASSAGE, APPROVAL, AND PUBLICATION ACCORDING TO LAW.

WHEREAS, the City of Burley does recognize the value of promoting and protecting public health, safety, and general welfare by providing for the regulation of dogs and cats within the City of Burley: and.

WHEREAS, the City of Burley desires to amend the penalties and provide clarity regarding the process association with penalizing noncompliance with tag and collar license registration requirements in City Code;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BURLEY, IDAHO AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1: That Section 10-3-3 of Burley City Code shall be amended as follows:

10-3-3: TAG AND COLLAR; REGISTRATION DATE AND **RENEWAL; PENALTIES:**

Upon the payment of a license fee the clerk shall issue to the owner a license certificate and a tag of a metallic, plastic or other similar substance for each dog or cat so licensed. The size and shape of the tag shall be as determined by the animal control supervisor¹, and shall have stamped thereon the number corresponding with the number of the certificate. In case a tag is lost or destroyed, a duplicate will be issued by the clerk upon presentation of the receipt showing the payment of a license fee and the payment in an amount established by a resolution adopted by the Burley city council for each such duplicate. The dog or cat tags shall not be transferable from one dog or cat to another and no refund will be made on any license issued because of death of the dog or cat or the owner's leaving the city. The tag must be affixed to a collar on the dog's neck at all times. Display of cat tags shall be in the discretion of the owner. Licenses shall be purchased when the a dog or cat is two (2) months of age and shall be purchased annually prior to January 1. Licenses shall expire December 31 of each year. If a dog license is not purchased or renewed within thirty (30) days from the date required herein a penalty of twenty five dollars (\$25.00) in addition to the license tax would shall be imposed by the city clerk at the time of registration. It is the duty of the owner or keeper of the dog or cat to prove the age of the dog or cat and in cases where the animal control supervisor or officers cannot determine by examination the age of the dog or cat, or absent competent proof to the contrary, all animals shall be presumed to be over two (2) months of age.

Any owner of a dog or cat who fails to license his or her animal and/or display said license as set forth in Section 10-3-2 and this Section 10-3-3 shall, in addition to being required to purchase or renew a license and pay any applicable late penalty, be in violation of said City code and shall be notified by a citation or notice of violation personally served or posted at the residence of the offender. The notification will require the owner of the dog er cat to appear at the Burley city clerk's office on or before a date set forth on the notice. The owner may appear by mail or in person. At the time of appearance the owner may admit the violation and pay a fine of twenty five dollars (\$25.00), to the City of Burley, as part of the administrative collection of animal control violation penalties, or may deny the violation. If the owner fails to appear, the owner of the dog or cat shall be sent a written notice requiring appearance within a period of ten (10) days. Thereafter, any owner failing to report, or denying the violation, shall be charged with an infraction. If an infraction is charged, any owner violating said sections shall be guilty of an infraction and shall be punishable by a fine of fifty dollars (\$50.00) excluding court costs and fees. All other violations of Title 10 Chapter 3 herein shall constitute a general

misdemeanor as set forth in Burley City Code 10-3-9(I). Section 2: That there is hereby added to Burley City Code a new

provision to be titled 10-3-10: 10-3-10: KENNEL LISENCE; APPLICATION; KENNEL **RESTRICTIONS; PENALTIES:**

A. Kennel License; Application: It is unlawful to keep, maintain or possess upon the premises of any one household more than five (5) canines two (2) months of age or older in an incorporated area of the city unless the owner, or person in charge thereof, first obtains a kennel license. Such kennel license shall only be permitted and issued in accordance with the terms and provisions of the City Zoning Ordinance; provided, however, that notice of any public hearing required on any application for a kennel license shall be mailed to all abutting property owners within the boundary line of an area determined by the intersection of lines drawn six hundred feet (600') at right angles out from and parallel to all sides of the tract whereupon such kennel is to be erected or maintained. Where dedicated street rights of way are encountered, they shall be included in establishing the six hundred feet (600') boundary line around the

B. License Fees: A kennel license shall be issued when the applicant pays the annual kennel license fee as established by the Board plus the annual tag fee for each canine two (2) months of age or older to be kept in the kennel, provided the requirements established in this Section have been fulfilled.

C. Location: No kennel shall be established within one hundred fifty feet (150') of any dwelling house other than that of the kennel owner; provided, however, that a kennel license may be issued to establish a kennel within one hundred fifty feet (150') of a dwelling house other than that of the kennel owner upon consent of all property owners within three hundred feet (300') of the kennel.

D. Condition; Noise: Said canine kennel shall be kept at all times in a clean and sanitary condition and the canines shall be reasonably restrained from annoying the neighborhood or the general public by loud, frequent, or habitual barking, yelping or howling

E. Penalties: Any violation of the provision of the requirements of Burley City Code 10-3-10 shall constitute a misdemeanor. <u>Section 3:</u> This ordinance shall be effective upon approval and publication as required by law.

ORDINANCE NO. 1077

BILL NO. 561

AN ORDINANCE OF THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF JEROME, IDAHO, REQUIRING A DELINQUENCY PENALTY OF TWENTY PERCENT (20%) TO BE PLACED UPON ALL DELINQUENT DOMESTIC WATER AND WASTEWATER COLLECTION AND TREATMENT ACCOUNTS; ESTABLISHING A \$75.00 RECONNECT FEE FOR RESTORATION OF DOMESTIC WATER SERVICE; PROVIDING FOR SEVERABILITY OF PORTIONS OF THIS ORDINANCE; DEFINING TERMS; REPEALING EXISTING CONTRADICTING PROVISIONS OF THE JEROME MUNICIPAL CODE; ESTABLISHING THAT FUTURE PENALTY AND FEE MODIFICATIONS MAY BE AMENDED OR REVISED BY RESOLUTION PASSED BY A MAJORITY OF THE FULL CITY COUNCIL; EXTENDING THE TIME PERIOD FOR RETENTION OF DEPOSITS FOR WATER OR WASTEWATER SERVICES; REVISING THE METHOD UPON WHICH SUCH DEPOSITS SHALL BE COMPUTED; AND PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE

WHEREAS, the City of Jerome operates domestic water and wastewater collection and treatment systems for the benefit of its residents and its service area; and

WHERAS, the City of Jerome has historically experienced a substantial number of domestic water accounts which become delinquent, requiring such services to be terminated, which in turn has required an increasing amount of City resources to process and collect delinquencies and to provide the turn off for such water services; and

WHEREAS, it is deemed necessary to provide penalties and termination fees to generate revenues to defray the costs being incurred and further to discourage late payment, thereby promoting the general welfare of the City's residents by making the funds for the operations of the systems self-BE IT THEREFORE ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF

JEROME, IDAHO, AS FOLLOWS: Section 1: That the Jerome Municipal Code ("JMC"), is amended by the addition of a new Section

13.56.010 as follows:

"13.56.010: PENALTY OF 20% PLACED ON DELINQUENT ACCOUNTS: A delinquency penalty computed as twenty percent (20%) of any outstanding Jerome City domestic water or wastewater collection and treatment account balance which is delinquent as of the 15th of each month shall be placed upon any and all delinquent such accounts. For purposes of Title 13 of the Jerome Municipal Code, the terms "delinquent" or "delinquency" shall mean any amount billed for water or wastewater collection and treatment services that has not been paid within twenty-five days of the date of billing for such services. The date of billing shall be the first business day of each month.

Section 2: That the JMC is amended by the addition of a new Section 13.60.010 as follows:

"13.60.010: RECONNECTION FEE OF \$75.00 SHALL BE PLACED ON UNPAID ACCOUNTS: A

reconnection fee in the amount of \$75.00 shall be required from the responsible party, as provided elsewhere in this Title, for reconnection of water services terminated, for non-payment of a

domestic water or wastewater collection and treatment account."

Section 3: Section 13.28.530, Rule 52 of the JMC shall be amended to read as follows: "13.28.530: RULE 52; BILLS; SERVICE RESTORATION CHARGES:

Where service is discontinued terminated for nonpayment of delinquent bills, the city, as a condition of restoring the service, shall charge the consumer responsible party as provided in schedule 9 on file in the effice of the city clerk other provisions of this Title, a reconnection fee. No employee or officer of the city shall have the right to waive the charge provided for in this rule." Section 4: Section 13.20.090 of the JMC is amended to read as follows

"13.20.090: BILLING; WATER SERVICE DISCONNECTION UPON NONPAYMENT OF DELINQUENT CHARGES; RESTORATION RECONNECTION FEE:
The city elerk treasurer shall bill each sewer user at the same time each such user is billed for

domestic water consumption and such charge shall be included on such water bill and shall show the amount due for sewer service for the preceding month. If any person neglects to pay his sewer charge within the time provided for payment of water bills as provided by Chapter 28 of this Title, limited for the payment of water bills, or shall fail or refuse to pay such sewer charge the city shall cause the water supply to such person by the city to be turned off from the premises of such delinquent being served, and before the water shall be again turned on all delinquent sewage charges must be paid in full, together with the sum of one dollar, in addition to the charges provided in schedule 9, a copy of which is on file in the office of the city clerk, for the expense of turning the water off and on. a new deposit as required by Section 13.28.410, and the reconnection fees and late penalties required by Chapter 28 of this Title." Section 5: Section 13.20.025 of the JMC is hereby amended as follows:

It is established that a deposit charge shall be paid by all new users of the wastewater treatment system. A "new use", for purposes of this section, shall be deemed to be any person or entity being serviced by the Jerome wastewater treatment system for the first time. A deposit charge as fixed from time to time by resolution of the council shall be collected from each new user with a classification of two (2) or less, prior to service being provided. Users with a classification of three (3) or more will be charged a deposit equal to one and one-half (1½) times the estimated monthly bill. Upon a user ceasing to be serviced by the system, any balance remaining of the deposit shall be returned to the user upon proof of payment of all charges and fees through the date of final use; provided, however, that the deposit shall in any event be returned to the user upon timely payment in full of all user charges for six (6) twelve (12) consecutive months. (Ord. 937 §2, 2003: Ord. 875 §1, 1999: Ord. 722 §5, 1990: Ord. 668 §2, 1984: Ord. 643 §2, 1981: prior code §23-41) Section 6: Section 13.28.410 of the JMC is hereby amended as follows:

The city shall require deposit from all consumers, except those referred to in section <u>13.28.400</u> of this chapter, rule 39, to secure the payment of all bills as they mature. Such required deposit for consumers shall be a sum as fixed from time to time by resolution of the council. Deposits for all other classes of service shall not exceed the amount of an estimated sixty (60) ninety (90) days' bill of the consumer. Upon a user ceasing to be serviced by the system, any balance remaining of the deposit shall be returned to the user upon proof of payment of all charges and fees through the date of final use. The deposit shall also be returned to the user upon timely payment in full of all user charges for a eix (6) twelve (12) consecutive month period. In the event the water service to an account is shut off for reason of non-payment and the deposit has already been returned, a new deposit shall be required at the time services are restored. (Ord. 937 §1, 2003: Ord. 875 §1, 1999: prior code §27-6)

Section 7: Section 13.28.460 of the JMC is hereby repealed in its entirety.

Section 8: Severability. If a part of ordinance is invalid, all valid parts that are severable from the invalid part remain in effect. If a part of the ordinance is invalid in one or more of its applications, the part remains in effect in all valid applications that are severable from the invalid applications. Section 9: Future Rate Modification. All rates and fees established under Section 13.20.025; Section 13.56.10 and 13.60.010 of the Jerome Municipal Code may be amended or revised in the

future by a resolution passed by a majority of the full City Council. Section 10: This ordinance shall be effective following passage and publication as required by law. PASSED BY THE COUNCIL this 4th day of January, 2011. SIGNED BY THE MAYOR this 5th day of January, 2011. CITY OF JEROME, IDAHO

"We all have a few failures under our belt. It's what makes us ready for the successes.

When this deal came up in a local duplicate, several North-South pairs tried to cash in on four spades by East-West, doubled. This was hardly unreasonable, but with the heart suit lying beau-tifully for East-West, there was no

defense to the game.
Of course, North-South could do much better than that. Say you reach five diamonds after West overcalled in spades and East made a pre-emptive raise to three spades, leaving you room to ex-plore the hand more fully. Plan

Many declarers won and immediately tackled clubs while they still had entries to the dummy in trumps. A good idea, but it did not work today. East won an early club and knew that continuing spades was fruitless. His heart sĥift let West cash two winners in

Yes, if he had ducked the opening lead! Now he can discard a club on the spade ace and establish the clubs without letting East get the lead to play a heart through. Best defense is a trump at trick two, but declarer has enough entries to the board in diamonds to bring home 11 tricks. He wins the diamond shift, plays off the black aces, ruffs a club high, goes to the diamond 10, and ruffs a club high again. Then he goes back to the diamond queen to run the clubs and discard three of his four heart



DEAR ABBY: My

husband's sister, "Irma," has hurt us with her words and actions many times. When the drama is over, she will suddenly send an e-mail saying she "misses" my husband and me. I do not want to seem like an unforgiving person, but I'm tired of this repeated behavior. My husband and I feel we're better off not socializing with her and my bother-in-law, but if I respond to her e-mail, it just opens the door for yet another incident. How can we clear the air but not leave ourselves open for another attack?

feelings are understandable, but this is your sister-in-law - so you can't dodge her forever. This doesn't mean you must see her often. When you do, take an emotional step backward and treat her with the same respect - and degree of closeness that you would any other acquaintance. When she acts out, absent yourself.

The woman appears to have poor impulse control and a high degree of volatility. And that's a subject that husband might approach (privately) with his brother-in-law and you should stay away from. Your brother-in-law might be more receptive to the message if he hears it from his wife's brother.

DEAR ABBY: I have been spending more time than usual in doctors' offices now that I care for my elderly father. Lately, a lot of these offices have added TVs to their waiting rooms.

The sets are invariably tuned to 24-hour news channels on which combative people yell at each other. I think this is a bad choice for sick people. 
