Student growth is on fast track in Shoshone

The Shoshone School District will extend its school weeks by two hours to allow for more intensive learning as it pushes for improved standardized test scores and overall student achievement.

The school was mandated by the state to increase student achievement due to low test scores and \$100,000 in start-up money was given to the district by the Idaho State Department of Education to provide longer school days and allday kindergarten. Students will start the new semester Wednesday, and after the normal school day is over, elementary and middle school students will be directed to different classes based on their Idaho State Achievement Test scores. Monday through Thursday, students will dedicate a half-hour to remedial work and enrichment activities, depending on their academic needs. "The (program) will definitely give students an extra boost," said Michael Perry, secondary valley.com or 735-3204.

The mountain pine outbreaks typically subside in an average of 12 years. Lazarus acknowledged that the visual impact of the beetle kill – the hillsides full of dead. red-needled trees - looks bad to the untrained eye. However, because the beetles only target trees of a certain size, there are plenty remaining to repopulate the forest over time.

From mining cabin to **Sun Valley treasure**

Ketchum library marks 56th year

KETCHUM - On Wednesday, a petite Japanese woman saddled with briefcases made her way to the regional history department of The Community Library, to thumb through its Ernest Hemingway collection for a story for a men's magazine in Japan.

Next Tuesday, a Swedish interviewer has scheduled an appoint ment to interview librarian Sandra Hofferber regarding the man whom some regard as America's most famous author.

Neither might have ever made their way to the area had it not been for 17 women who decided Sun Valley was one page short of paradise without a library.

On Wednesday, hundreds of people flocked to the library to raise a toast to the women who founded it 56 years ago, and tour the facility for Founders' Day.

The story of the library began on Sun Valley's golf links – hole No. 7, to be exact - when three women bemoaned the fact that they had nothing to read, with neither a bookstore nor a library in Ketchum.

A few months later, in January 1955, the women enlisted 14 others and each put up a dollar to rent a miner's cabin with no heat,

electricity or running water. Then they plumbed the town's closets to start a thrift store, hoping they could make \$40 a month to buy a couple of books here and there.

The first day, they made \$101. with one customer even buying an ashtray on the counter that had not been for sale, recalled the late Clara Spiegel, according to an oral history the library recorded. A visitor from Kalamazoo, Mich., talked Yale University into donating 400 duplicate books from its collection, and a library was born.

"The offspring of mothers of the library couldn't even wear clothes out or fully grow into them before they were whipped off and taken straight down to the thrift shop," recalled Ketchum resident Michael Engl.

Today the library is considered one of the premiere private libraries in the Northwest, according to Executive Director Colleen Daly.

It boasts the regional history department with more than 10,000 historical photos, the largest collection of ski instructional and historical books in the Intermountain West, mine inspector reports dating back to the 1800s, Ketchum freight company ledgers, and more than 6,000 negatives that former librarian Dottie Taylor rescued from the wastebaskets of the Union Pacific Railroad museum in Omaha, Neb., in 1982.

Computer opponent could make two 'Jeopardy!' champs deep blue

YORKTOWN HEIGHTS, N.Y. -The clue: It's the size of 10 refrigerators, has access to the equivalent of 200 million pages of information and knows how to answer in the form of a question.

The correct response: "What is the computer IBM developed to become a 'Jeopardy!' whiz?'

Watson, which IBM claims as a profound advance in artificial intelligence, edged out gameshow champions Ken Jennings and Brad Rutter on Thursday in its first public test, a short practice round ahead of a million-dollar tournament that will be televised next month.

Storm brings flood threat to Wash., Oregon

PORTLAND, Ore. (AP) A Pacific storm sweeping the Northwest through brought heavy rain to Washington state and Oregon over the weekend, causing multiple landslides that shut down roads across the region and threatening to top rivers already swollen with snowmelt.

Oregon transportation officials on Sunday closed U.S. Highway 20, also called Santiam Highway, near Cascadia in central Oregon after a landslide brought about 150 cubic yards of mud, rock and debris into the road. Landslides also closed sections of three southwest Washington highways, including State Route 14 near Cape Horn, State Route 411 near Hazel Dell Road in Kelso and State Route 508 at Bear Canyon.

Kyle Foreman, Grant County's public information officer, said two people were injured when their cars were struck by a rockslide about two miles north of Soap Lake in Washington state. The rockslide also forced the closure of State Highway 17.

"It's a big deal. We have a lot of history with them," Bears star linebacker Brian Urlacher said after a 35-24 victory over Seattle set up an NFC championship game matchup with Green Bay. "We don't like them, they don't like us."

Jay Cutler ran for two touchdowns and threw for two as Chicago (12-5) pounded the Seahawks from the outset. The Bears' built a 28-0 lead, but it was against the first division winner

Reds to their first playoff appearance in 15 years, winning the NL MVP award for a breakthrough season

The first baseman earned a raise, and boy, did he get one.

Votto has agreed to a \$38 million, three-year contract with Cincinnati, buying out his arbitration years and giving the reigning NL Central champs some short-term budget security.

A person familiar with the negotiations told The Associated Press about the deal on Sunday on condition of anonymity because the contract had not yet been announced.

Votto was a first-time All-Star in 2010, finishing second in the NL in batting average at .324 and third in homers (37) and RBIs (113). He led the NL in slugging percentage (.600), topped the major leagues in on-base percentage (.424) and had 16 stolen bases in 21 chances.

He made \$525,000 last year and was eligible for arbitration for the first time.

Now 27, Votto didn't become a major league regular until two years ago. Following the death of his father in August 2008, he went on the disabled list and missed 21 games the following year partly because of depression and anxiety.

He was a runaway winner in the MVP balloting by the Baseball Writers' Association of America, receiving 31 of 32 first-place votes and 443 points. Cardinals first baseman Albert Pujols was second with the remaining first-place vote.

Born in Toronto, Votto became the third Canadian-born MVP, following Colorado's Larry 118. He also tied Matt Holliday for the team batting Walker (1997) and Minnesota's Justin Morneau lead at .312. (2006).

Pujols sheds no light on contract

ST. LOUIS — Albert Pujols repeatedly has said he wants to spend his entire career with the St. Louis Cardinals. Staring at a spring training deadline for contract negotiations, the team chairman remains hopeful the three-time NL MVP will get his wish.

Pujols declined Sunday to provide any kind of update on negotiations. His agent has said he will cut off talks at the start of spring training if an agreement is not in place, and general manager John Mozeliak confirmed the deadline on Saturday.

A representative of Pujols' agent stood to the slugger's left and deflected questions on the topic at Sunday's news conference before the first baseman held a two-hour, sold-out autograph session at the team's Winter Warmup.

"Do you want to bring all that into the clubhouse all year, like you guys have been doing the last couple of years?" Pujols said. "No. I respect my teammates more than this contract.

"That's why you have to set some deadline on this, and that's it."

Neither side would offer a sense of how the talks

director Brian Bartow stepped in and said Pujols agent had set ground rules for the news conference.

Chairman Bill DeWitt said the Cardinals' payroll for next season projects to "well above \$100 million," which is the highest ever for the franchise and includes \$16 million for Pujols' option year. DeWitt said Pujols was irreplaceable, both as a talent and as the face of the franchise.

'That's all wrapped into one. He's an iconic player because he's such a great player." DeWitt said. "He's proven year in and year out that he's one of the greatest players to play the game.

"He's never had a bad year and has lifetime totals that are incredible. You can't go out and find an Albert Pujols."

DeWitt said the best word to characterize the Cardinals' stance was hopeful.

'We want him to be with us," DeWitt said. "Until something happens one way or another, there's not a lot to say beyond that."

Manager Tony La Russa said he'd stay out of the talks.

"I'm not going to say a word," La Russa said. "Let them work it out.'

Signing free agent Lance Berkman to a \$8 million contract signaled a willingness to spend after the Cardinals missed the postseason three of the last four years.

'Sometimes you have to seize the moment, and we did," DeWitt said. "You go for it."

Pujols led the National League with 42 homers last season and won his first league RBIs title with

"If the Cardinals want to say something in the paper and talk about our business, then they can say something," Pujols said. "Myself I think I'm more professional than that.

"If we want to get something done, we'll get it done and everybody's going to know when we get it done.'

No deal by the start of spring training would not necessarily mean Pujols will be moving on. The Cardinals could sign him after next season and DeWitt expressed confidence that Pujols would not let it affect him on the field.

"If we don't sign him in the next four weeks, that doesn't mean he's not going to be a Cardinal," DeWitt said. "We'd love to sign him tomorrow, or whenever."

Pitchers and catchers report to Jupiter, Fla., on Feb. 13 with the first workout the following day. The full squad is due into camp by Feb. 18.

"Obviously it's something the organization probably doesn't want hanging for the whole season," Berkman said. "Clearly you're talking about the best player in baseball, probably the best hitter in the history of baseball.

'I'm not sure how you go about taming that tiger."

Pujols noted that speculation regarding his future, and whether the Cardinals are willing to pay top dollar for the three-time NL MVP, has been swirling for several years. The Cardinals have four other players making more than \$10 million a year in outfielder Holliday and pitchers Chris Carpenter, Adam Wainwright and Kyle Lohse.

"You guys have the opportunity to be writing about this over the last two years," Pujols said. "So what else is there to say? I think everybody knows I want to be a Cardinals and what else is there to say?"

The three-time NL MVP, who turned 31 on Sunday, has played his entire 10-year career in St. Louis. Pujols was to be honored as co-man of the year along with Wainwright at Sunday night's dinner for the St. Louis chapter of the Baseball Writers Association of America.

Pujols says he's in better shape than in recent seasons when he was hindered by injuries, and excited about the changes the team has made. Pujols underwent surgery on his right elbow after the 2008 and '09 seasons.

"I feel great," Pujols said. "Hopefully I can stay healthy all year.'

Why is Idaho taxing apples, tomatoes and potatoes?

n Idaho legislator wants to give you a break at the checkout counter for eating healthy. Rep. Lynn Luker, R-Boise, is sponsoring legislation that would exempt fruits and vegetables from the state's

6 percent sales tax. He would pay for it by capping the grocery tax credit at \$90, instead of \$100.

Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter proposed delaying an increase this year in the grocery tax credit, which is now \$70 for the lowest-earning Idahoans and \$50 for everyone else. Otter said freezing it would save \$15 million, helping fill the hole in the state's budget.

Idaho is one of only 14 states to tax food, and at 6 percent the rate is the second-highest rate in the nation behind Mississippi.

For years, lawmakers have talked about exempting different grocery items - or food altogether – from the sales tax.

In 2006, the Legislature — at the behest of then-Gov. Jim Risch — cut property taxes by \$260 million and raised \$200 million more by increasing the sales tax from 5 percent to 6 percent.

Thereafter, the tax burden fell heaviest on the poorest Idahoans.

Risch and some legislators advocated taking the sales tax off food.

But in 2007 Idaho's economy began to falter and the Republicans lost their nerve. The sales tax on food amounts to nearly \$190 million a year. A less expensive alternative, GOP leaders determined, was to increase Idaho's grocery tax credit.

Lawmakers passed a plan that would immediately boost the \$20 per person credit on state income tax returns and keep boosting everyone's credit by \$10 per year until it hits \$100.

Trouble is, many Idahoans who need relief most earn too little to file income tax returns.

And the sales tax rate remains the same for bananas as it is for Doritos.

Luker's proposal would be a good first step toward rationalizing Idaho's sales tax on food and might eventually lead to its repeal.

Which would be healthier for everyone.

he Left apparently has taken to heart the admonition of former White House Chief of Staff Rahm Emanuel to "never let a serious crisis go to waste."

In the aftermath of the Tucson tragedy that killed six and wounded 14 others. the Left has attacked talk radio, Fox News, Sarah Palin and anyone else it can smear. Never mind there is not a shred of evidence that the accused gunman, the mentally disturbed Jared Lee Loughner, ever watched Glenn Beck or listened to Rush Limbaugh.



Even if Loughner had watched and listened to conservative media, what does that prove? Millions do, but they don't go on a shooting rampage. What do other murderers and terrorists watch on TV or listen to on the radio? Why isn't the media they consume a matter of interest? Answer: Because it doesn't further the Left's agenda.

Since the Left lost its monopoly of the U.S. media, it has repeatedly tried to suppress speech it doesn't like. Thus, we hear calls by Democratic Rep. James Clyburn of South Carolina for the resurrection of the Fairness Doctrine. Rep. Robert Brady, Pennsylvania Democrat, reportedly plans to introduce legislation that would make it a federal crime to use language or symbols that could be perceived as threatening or that incites violence against a federal official or member of Congress. Who would police that and based on what standard?

In the 1980s, when conservative groups tried to "clean up" the bad language, sexual references

and violence on TV, the Left cried "censorship." When conservatives campaigned against pornography and "music" that encouraged violence against women and racial epithets, they were told a healthy First Amendment required that even the most offensive speech be tolerated. It was the same argument used to allow the burning of the American flag at political protests. But the Left is intolerant of speech it disagrees with and so wishes to censor what it cannot overcome with superior argument.

Eric Burns wrote a book titled Infamous Scribblers: The Founding Fathers and the Rowdy Beginnings of American Journalism.

Compared to 18th-century journalism in America, today's media are tame. Burns writes of the Gazette of the United States (born on April 15, 1789, while the Constitution was being ratified) that its editor. John Ferling, "one of America's Fenno, was an ardent supporter of the federalism represented by George Washington and Alexander Hamilton. Fenno's newspaper served as a counter-

weight to the Republican slant of the National Gazette.

Burns sums up Fenno's iournalistic philosophy: "He would cajole his readers, deceive them when necessary, rile them when advisable; he would praise public officials and other newspaper editors who agreed with his positions and drub those who did not, assailing their intelligence, their character, their patriotism; and he would publish the records of legislative proceedings that advanced the federalist agenda while either ignoring or deriding or sometimes even falsifying documents to the contrary."

Such things were to be found on the "news" pages, not the opinion page. Entire newspapers were opinion pages. To have a page designated "opinion" would have been redundant.

The 1790s were, according to historian John most passionate decades." The nation's journalism. notes Burns, could not help but reflect the heat.

One paper, named the Philadelphia Aurora,

engaged in what Burns describes as "journalistic savagery ... not caring about accuracy or even the illusion of it." The Aurora published a series of letters supposedly written by George Washington while he was encamped at Valley Forge during the winter of 1777-1778. The letters "portrayed Washington as a lukewarm patriot at best, a loyal subject of George III at worst, and at least a skeptic concerning independence."

It would have been a great story if true, but Washington wrote no such letters. That didn't bother Benjamin Franklin Bache (Ben Franklin's grandson and the owner of the Aurora), who was not about to retract something that served his anti-Washington political ends.

Iournalism survived. even displaying responsibility on occasion. The public can sort out the good from the bad and ugly. They don't need politicians doing it for them.

U.S. Rep. Giffords' condition improves

TUCSON, Ariz. – In yet another sign of significant recovery during a remarkable week, the gravely U.S. wounded Rep. Gabrielle Giffords was upgraded from critical to serious condition Sunday after a procedure to remove her from a ventilator was successful.

Doctors have been positive, and at time almost giddy, in describing her progress since she was shot point blank in the head Jan. 8.

Giffords responded from the moment she arrived at the emergency room, at first just squeezing a doctor's hand. Then she raised two fingers. She opened her unbandaged eye shortly popular community outafter President Barack Obama's bedside visit Wednesday. Then, more milestones – which doctors said were all indicative of higher cognitive function – were achieved, all with her husband, astronaut Mark idealism and warmth, Kelly, at her side.

Kelly asked her to give him a thumbs-up if she could hear him. She did more than that. She slowly raised her left arm. By the end of the week, she had moved her legs and arms.

At the hospital, more than 100 people were gathered the Tucson supermarket amid the sea of get-well balloons and cards when the emerged about one of University of Arizona put out a statement upgrading her condition.

"Oh, that's great news," said Jean Emrick, a 50-year resident of Tucson. as a violinist played in the back-

because the tracheotomy done a day earlier was hospital uneventful, spokeswoman Katie Riley said. A feeding tube was also put in Saturday, and doctors speculated that they might soon know if she could speak.

Few people survive a bullet to the brain - just 10 percent - and some who do end up in a vegetative state. It is even more rare for people with gunshot wounds to the head to regain all of their abilities, and doctors have cautioned that the full extent of Giffords' recovery remains uncertain.

Giffords and 18 others were shot when a gunman opened fire at a meet-andgreet she was hosting outside a supermarket in her own hometown. Six people died, including Giffords' reach director, Gabe Zimmerman.

At funeral services for Zimmerman Sunday, Kelly told the some 700 people gathered that his wife was inspired by Zimmerman's according to the Arizona Republic.

"Gabby and I spoke often about Gabe. She loved him like a younger brother," Kelly said. "I know someday she'll get to tell you herself how she felt about Gabe."

Meanwhile, a week after massacre, more details shooting victims who police said became distraught and was arrested during a televised town hall meeting.

Poll: Opposition to health care law eases

WASHINGTON - As lawmakers shaken by the shooting of a colleague return to the health care debate, an Associated Press-GfK poll finds raw feelings over President Barack Obama's overhaul have subsided.

Ahead of a vote on repeal in the GOP-led House this week, strong opposition to the law stands at 30 percent, close to the lowest level registered in AP-GfK surveys dating to September 2009.

The nation is divided over the law, but the strength and intensity of the opposition appear diminished. The law expands coverage to more than 30 million uninsured, and would require, for the first time, that most people in the United States carry health insurance. The poll finds that 40 percent of those surveyed said they support the law, while 41 percent oppose it. Just after the November congressional elections, opposition stood at 47 percent and support was 38 percent.

IRAN **Rights group decries** 'execution binge'

DUBAI, United Arab Emirates Iranian authorities have unleashed an "execution binge" with an average rate of one person hanged every eight hours since the beginning of the year, a rights group monitoring the Islamic Republic said Sunday.

"The Iranian Judiciary is on an execution binge orchestrated by the intelligence and security agencies," stated Aaron Rhodes, a spokesman for the International Campaign for Human Rights in Iran.

A statement by the New Yorkbased group said at least 47 prisoners have been hanged since Jan. 1, including a reported Kurdish activist accused of fighting against the state. It said other jailed Kurds also are at risk of facing the gallows for alleged links to a groups battling for greater rights for Iran's Kurdish minority.

Most of the others executed were convicted of violent crimes such as murder.

The group said the actual number of people put to death this year could be higher because Iranian authorities may not make public all executions.

Rights groups and media reports say at least 179 people were executed in Iran last year.

BRAZIL Housing sought for survivors of deadly mudslides

TERESOPOLIS - Days after mudslides wiped out whole neighborhoods, many residents continued to live in homes in threatened areas, unwilling to join the thousands crowded into shelters despite the ever-present danger to their lives.

Rali Oliveira da Silva, 35, spent several years building a home for his family in Cascata do Imbui, saving little by little for the cement, the bricks, the paint. The house was still standing Sunday, but its cement patio now hung precariously over a yawning precipice, the empty space left by a slide that killed most of his downhill neighbors.

Survivors who lost everything and those clinging to homes on unstable ground face an uncertain future as they try to rebuild lives torn apart by the landslides that struck mountain towns outside Rio de Janeiro and killed at least 626 - a death toll that rises every day as more bodies are pulled from the mud.

Municipal, state and federal officials were responding Sunday, setting up a center to register missing persons; distributing 35,000 free cell phones donated by a telecommunications company; and announcing immediate plans to relocate some 2,500 people housed at a packed gymnasium to 18 smaller, better organized shelters at churches, Oliveira da Silva knows his warehouses and other spaces.

TUNISIA Former government figures arrested

TUNIS — Heavy gunfire erupted in the heart of Tunisia's capital Sunday as the army appeared to be closing in on stalwarts of the regime driven from power last week and the interim government prepared to name a new Cabinet free of any major figures linked to deposed President Zine el Abidine Ben Ali.

Former Interior Minister Rafik Belhaj Kassim was taken into custody in his hometown of Beja, about 60 miles west of Tunis, a day after the arrest of Ali Seriati, former chief of the presidential guard, state television reported. Both men led security apparatuses seen as tools of repression under the former regime.

HAITI **Ex-dictator 'Baby** Doc' Duvalier makes surprise return

PORT-AU-PRINCE - Jean-Claude Duvalier, the once-reviled dictator of Haiti known as "Baby Doc," made a surprise return to this country Sunday evening, ending almost a quarter-century of exile and sending out shockwaves of speculation over his motives and intentions.

He arrives at a critical moment for a country still struggling to recover from last year's catastrophic earthquake, and now locked in a political crisis that has left it unable to elect a new president.

It was not clear whether Duvalier, who has been living in Paris, plans to try to step into the political void. Though the former dictator was widely scorned when forced into exile in 1986 - a transition hailed as the end to the ruthless dynastic rule of the Duvalier family – a small group of supporters has recently sought to rehabilitate his image and revive his National Unity political party. Duvalier could attempt to capitalize on Haiti's current misery by emphasizing the relative stability of the dictatorship years.

Small breaks from sitting can aid heart health, study says

sitting down, such as standing for phone calls or walking to see colleagues, may trim office workers' waistlines and help their heart and metabolic health, a study suggests.

The more breaks people took, the smaller their waists and the lower the levels of a blood marker linked to inflammation, the research, published by the European Heart Journal, showed.

The study is the first to look at the effects of remaining sedentary on the heart health of a broad swath of the population. The research tried to capture how much people moved as part of their daily routines, said the lead author, Genevieve Healy, a research fellow at the University of Queensland, Australia.

"What we found was the more sedentary people were, the more sitting and the more reclining people did, the worse off they were in terms of cardio-metabolic function and inflammation, such as waist circumference, blood fats, lower levels of good cholestion called C- reactive protein.

The longer people were Taking small breaks from inactive, the higher their levels of blood fats and markers of insulin resistance. The more breaks they took, even those as short as a minute, the smaller their waists were. The most active quarter had waists that were 1.6 inches smaller than the least active quarter, Healy said.

When the study broke down the results by ethnicity and gender, they found that Mexican-Americans were the most active but had the highest levels of blood fats. Women were more likely to be sedentary but took more breaks and had a more favorable cardio-metabolic profile.

While the exact biological mechanism isn't clear, the researchers believe that contracting large posture muscles "flushes out the bad stuff," Healy said.

Small breaks can't replace regular exercise, such as walks at lunchtime, Healy cautioned. "One little break can't cure the world."

### TODAY IN HISTORY

#### On this date:

1562, In French Protestants were recognized under the Edict of St. Germain.

In 1893, the 19th president of the United States, Rutherford B. Hayes, died in Fremont, Ohio, at age 70. Hawaii's monarchy was overthrown as a group of businessmen and sugar planters forced Queen Lili'uokalani to abdicate.

In 1917, the United States paid Denmark \$25 million for the Virgin Islands.

In 1945, Soviet and Polish forces liberated Warsaw during World War II; Swedish diplomat Raoul Wallenberg, credited with saving tens of thousands of Jews, disappeared in Hungary while in Soviet custody.

In 1950, the Great Brink's Robbery took place as seven masked men held up a Brink's garage in Boston, stealing \$1.2 million in cash and \$1.5 million in checks money orders. and (Although the entire 11member gang was later caught, only part of the loot was recovered.)

In 1971, the Baltimore Colts defeated the Dallas Cowboys 16-13 in Super Bowl V, played at the Orange Bowl in Miami.

In 1977, convicted murderer Gary Gilmore, 36, was shot by a firing squad at Utah State Prison in the first U.S. execution in a decade.

In 1989, five children were shot to death at the Cleveland Elementary School in Stockton, Calif., by a drifter, Patrick Purdy, who then killed himself.

In 1994, a 6.7 magnitude earthquake struck Southern California, killing at least 72 people.

**In 1995,** more than 6,000 people were killed when an earthquake with a magnitude of 7.2 devastated the city of Kobe , Japan. Ten years ago: Faced with electricity an crisis, California used rolling blackouts to cut off power to hundreds of thousands of people; Gov. Gray Davis signed an emergency order authorizing the state to buy power. Five years ago: The U.S. Supreme Court protected Oregon's assisted-suicide law, ruling that doctors there who helped terminally ill patients die could not be arrested under federal drug laws. Hostage American reporter Jill Carroll appeared in a silent 20-second video aired by Al-Jazeera television, which said her abductors had given the United States 72 hours to free female prisoners in Iraq or she would be killed. (Carroll was freed unharmed on March 30, 2006.) California executed convicted killer Clarence Ray Allen a day after his 76th birthday. One year ago: President Barack Obama appeared at a rally in Boston for Democratic senatorial candidate Martha Coakley, who was running in a special election. (Coakley ended up losing to Republican Scott Brown.) Pope Benedict XVI paid a visit to a Rome synagogue, where he and Jewish leaders sparred over the World War II-era record of Pope Pius XII. Erich Segal, author of the best-selling novel "Love Story," died in London at age 72. At the Golden Globes, top honors went to James Cameron's "Avatar" as well as the TV series "Glee" and "Mad Men."
