CSI gets \$4.4M for new tech center

The College of Southern Idaho received a \$4.4 million federal grant Wednesday to help bring a nearly \$7 million technology center to Twin Falls.

The Applied Technology and Innovation Center will provide a consolidated home for CSI's renewable energy programs. Currently, courses for the college's environmental technology and wind energy programs are housed across on- and off-campus facilities.

The 29,600-square-foot, energy efficient center will provide training to students in a wide array of renewable energy generation techniques and green construction. CSI officials also plan to

include a wing for the college's auto-body program. CSI President Jerry Beck said he anticipates the building will be located on the south side of North College Road, near the Health Sciences and Human Services Building.

Wednesday's grant came from the U.S. Economic Development Administration.

Twin Falls Mayor Don Hall, who also serves as the college's law-enforcement instructor, said the project will help the Magic Valley reach the forefront of technology — adding it will assist in meeting demand for trained professionals in sustainable, green jobs.

"The College of Southern Idaho's Innovation Center project is another great example of partnering to create economic oppor-

tunities for our community," he said.

Beck said the college will fund its nearly \$2.5 million portion of the facility out of its plant facilities fund. He added that CSI will likely have to re-open the bidding process to choose a contractor for the project. CSI requested and received contractor bids for the facility in 2008, though the project stalled during a federal review triggered by questions about the college's bid process.

Beck said he wished the grant had been awarded sooner, but added there is no better time than now to create new jobs and show teaching innovation. He expects construction to take 18 months.

Bill would exempt end-of-life decisions from conscience law

BOISE — End-of-life decisions are often made well before the end comes.

Legislation introduced Wednesday by Rep. Leon Smith, R-Twin Falls, would keep those decisions in the hands of those facing this question: If I enter a vegetative state, do I want to die or continue on life support?

Smith's bill, if passed, would amend a law passed by the Legislature last year that gave health care professionals the right to opt out of providing any care they object to based on religious, moral or ethical principles.

Smith's legislation was introduced in the House Judiciary, Rules and Administration Committee.

The 2010 legislation, known as the "conscience law," prompted concerns that a comatose patient's end-of-life wishes could be pre-

empted by health professionals who cite the new law and refuse to pull the plug on life support.

"I know that I've had over a hundred contacts and probably approaching 200 people that are concerned that their living wills won't apply anymore or can be pre-empted," Smith said.

Living wills allow patients to outline their wishes in advance in case they end up in a vegetative state or can't speak for themselves. To end life support, two doctors need to certify that the patient is in a vegetative state and will not survive.

Smith's legislation doesn't call for eliminating the conscience law. Instead, it adds a sentence that says no health care professional can refuse to follow a patient's or physician's directions that conform with the "Medical Consent and Natural Death Act," the existing state law that regulates the medical profession's role in end-of-life decisions and care.

Andrus: Idaho set up to become nuclear waste site

BOISE (AP) — Former Democratic Gov. Cecil Andrus said he's troubled by a new deal that would allow even small amounts of nuclear waste to be shipped to eastern Idaho.

Andrus was instrumental in negotiating an agreement in 1995 with the federal government to limit nuclear waste shipments coming into the state for any reason.

In a Jan. 11 letter obtained by the *Idaho Statesman*, Andrus raises questions with Gov. C.L. "Butch"

Otter about a new agreement that clears shipments of small amounts of waste to the Idaho National Laboratory for research.

The new agreement essentially makes Idaho a final destination for nuclear waste, Andrus said.

"The good news is the Department of Energy has found a place to store nuclear waste," Andrus said. "The bad news is it's between Idaho Falls and Arco."

Groups strive to meet Jarbidge comment deadline

Tuesday was a night for meetings about how to manage 1.4 million public acres in the Idaho desert.

The U.S. Bureau of Land Management is still taking public comment on a draft resource management plan for the Jarbidge area in the southwest-

ern Magic Valley.

With less than two weeks to go in the comment period, interested parties were scrambling to either compose their thoughts or raise support for prepared comments.

Jarbidge Field Office Manager Rick Vander Voet said the BLM has already received more than 100 letters and 2,600 e-mails, and he anticipates more in the waning

days of the comment period.

The Jarbidge Coalition for Multiple Use held a three-hour open house to encourage the public to back its comments. A couple of dozen people wandered the KMTV Community Room at any one time during the event, reading posters of the coalition's proposed comments and listening to speakers from member groups, including the

Magic Valley ATV Riders, 71 Livestock Association and Sportsmen for Fish and Game.

"Eight days ago, there was no coalition, and on Feb. 1, it will cease to exist," said 71 Livestock spokesman Gus Brackett. "We encourage people to join because instead of sending out a lot of comments, we want to send out one comment with a lot of names on it."

Brackett said the coalition didn't invite environmental groups to join because members wanted to focus more on land-user groups such as the ranchers and sportsmen. Included were suggestions to increase grazing, maintain motorized access and avoid actions that hurt economic endeavors.

Burley child molester gets 15 to 50 years in prison

BURLEY — A Burley man will spend 15 to 50 years in prison after he was sentenced for child sex charges Tuesday in Cassia County.

Fifth District Judge Michael Crabtree sentenced Jeremy Dean Wilkinson, 34, to three to 10 years in prison on each of five felony charges of lewd conduct with a child under 16. The sentences will run consecutively.

Crabtree also ordered Wilkinson to pay his victim a \$5,000 civil penalty for each charge, along with \$1,500 to Cassia County.

Wilkinson was found guilty of the charges during an August trial and pleaded guilty to an enhancement charge for being a persistent violator. The victim’s adoptive mother said the scars her daughter — Wilkinson’s stepdaughter — has from the incidents will be carried throughout her life.

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Burley eyes sidewalk repairs

BURLEY — The Burley City Council unanimously voted Tuesday to develop a way for city property owners to receive a group rate and multi-year payment plans for sidewalk repairs they make voluntarily.

An ordinance, if approved, would form a city-wide local improvement district that property owners could opt into to fund up to \$150,000 in improvements to the city’s

sidewalks, gutters and driveway approaches. The city would fund 10 percent of total project costs, covering a variety of involved fees. Property owners would have a limited time to opt into the district and up to 10 years to pay for their projects, with an option to receive a discount if they pay in full within 30 days of completion.

“I think this is a good plan,” Councilman Gordon Hansen said.

The council plans to hold a

Feb. 15 public hearing on the district, despite Councilman Vaughn Egan’s protest that it is too widespread.

City Attorney Kelly Anthon pointed out that the voluntary district would be different than a traditional LID, in which costs for improvements are added to the property tax of everyone within the district. He called it the most appealing sidewalk-repair option for the city.

While the city has hinted at enforcing its existing

sidewalk ordinance to require property owners to fix deteriorating sidewalks on their property, Anthon said that’s not the intent of this ordinance.

The city could, however, choose to open smaller districts in the future and use them in conjunction with the existing ordinance to nudge property owners toward fixing their crumbling sidewalks, with the group savings as incentive.

“The two will go hand in hand,” Anthon said.

The college’s 2-year-old renewable energy programs have capacity for 70 students and Instructional Dean Todd Schwarz said there’s a current waiting list of 150 students. While the new center won’t increase enrollment capacity, Schwarz said having a centralized home will be beneficial.

“The primary advantage

is consolidation of space designed specifically for the programs involved,” Schwarz said.

The new facility may also help the college add short-term programs and community education courses on wind energy, Schwarz added.

Joe Herring, president of the private, nonprofit economic development consultant Region IV Development, said the \$4.4 million represents the

Otter, a Republican, said the 880 pounds of used fuel coming to the lab annually under the new agreement was being used for research and will count toward existing limits set in the state’s 1995 nuclear waste agreement with the federal government.

That agreement requires the federal government to remove all 300 tons of spent fuel at the lab by 2035, or pay the state \$60,000 a day if it fails to do so.

“What this agreement does is simply set forth the process by which spent commercial fuel research can occur, recognizing and adhering to all of the limits and deadlines of the 1995 agreement,” said Jon Hanian,

Otter’s spokesman.

Andrus, however, said the change, combined with the federal decision not to store nuclear waste at the Yucca Mountain site in Nevada, means Idaho will end up storing more nuclear waste.

In his letter, Andrus said he also finds it troubling the state is willing to get tough with the federal government on wolves and health care reform but has decided not to take a stand on allowing new sources of nuclear waste to come to the state.

Andrus teamed with former Republican Idaho Gov. Phil Batt to forge the original agreement limiting nuclear waste shipments to Idaho, fearing radioactive and toxic Cold War garbage shipped to the 890-square-mile nuclear reservation from sites including the Rocky Flats nuclear weapons plant near Golden, Colo., would spread to the Eastern Snake Plain Aquifer and eventually the Snake River.

Batt supports the new agreement made by Otter.

“I think it’s a good deal for Idaho and a good deal for the nation,” Batt said. “We are a part of the United States and should be working together to achieve energy independence. This is not a partisan issue.”

Andrus said the old agreement allowed small amounts of nuclear waste for research into Idaho with a deadline for it to be removed.

John Grossenbacher, Idaho National Laboratory director, said the procedure was expensive and made long-term research programs difficult to set up — problems eliminated with the new agreement.

“The agreement gives us much more flexibility,” said Grossenbacher. “We can do our job much more effectively.”

The AARP has been one of the main opponents of parts of the conscience law. Spokesman David Irwin said that when Idaho AARP members were polled on issues, they ranked the conscience law and its implications for end-of-life care as second in importance only to the state budget.

“People don’t enter into living wills or advanced directives lightly,” Irwin said. “Our members were appalled that their wishes could be refused.”

AARP launched the

Patient’s Rights Hotline to connect members with their legislators on the issue. Irwin said 65 percent of Idaho voters are 50 and older, and many contacted their legislators prior to the current session.

While encouraged by Smith’s bill, Irwin said AARP would prefer removal of the phrase “end-of-life treatment and care” to adding another sentence in the law. Irwin said some other bills will be introduced that do just that, including

one from Rep. Tom Trail, R-Moscow.

“It’s a good sign that more legislators are standing up on their own on this issue,” Irwin said. “They’ve heard from their constituents who want them to stand up for patients’ rights.”

The Idaho End-of-Life Coalition, an advocacy group for end-of-life issues, hasn’t taken a formal stand on the conscience law, but President Cheryl Simpson-Whitaker said members strongly support respecting people’s expressed decisions for care at the end of life, including those in their advanced directives.

Patty Strunk, director of Hospice Visions in Twin Falls, said hospice groups also respect the principle of the patient’s right to choose.

Bomb found at MLK event rattles Spokane

SPOKANE, Wash. (AP) — Investigators pursued what they described as promising leads Wednesday in a chilling bombing attempt at a Martin Luther King Jr. Day parade, in which someone left a backpack filled with sophisticated explosives on a bench.

An official familiar with the case said the bomb had a remote detonator and the ability to cause mass casualties. It was defused without incident Monday but unnerved residents of Spokane, especially those who took part in a parade whose theme was steeped in peace and nonviolence.

The official spoke on condition of anonymity because he is not authorized to release information about the investigation.

The FBI said it has no suspects. But Frank Harrill, special agent in charge of the Spokane FBI office, said Wednesday investigators are following up on “fruitful leads” they’ve received from the public. He declined to elaborate.

Harrill said the black Swiss Army backpack has been shipped to an FBI lab in Quantico, Va., for analysis. In addition to the bomb, the backpack contained two T-shirts that authorities were analyzing for clues.

Monday’s parade route was changed after the bomb was found, and most of the several hundred people who marched in the annual event did not know about the device, said Liz Moore, one of the marchers.

“No announcements were made at all,” Moore said. “It seems like a specific effort was made not to alarm people.”

Harrill called the bomb an act of domestic terrorism.

The bomb was spotted by three city employees about an hour before the parade was to start, Harrill said. They looked inside, saw wires and immediately alerted law enforcement.

The bomb was carefully placed on a metal bench with a brick wall behind that would have directed shrapnel toward Main Street, where marchers were expected to pass, investigators said.

No one has claimed responsibility for planting the bomb, Harrill said.

The FBI released a photo of the backpack as it offered a \$20,000 reward for information from the public. Also released were pictures of the T-shirts found in the pack. There was a gray T-shirt with writing for the Stevens County Relay for Life race last June. Stevens County is just north of Spokane County. The other dark T-shirt said “Treasure Island Spring 2009.”

Investigators are seeking anyone who took photographs or video in the area between 8 a.m. and 11 a.m. Monday.

Officials have praised as heroes the city workers who spotted the backpack.

Spokane County Commissioner Mark Richard, who spoke at the King celebration and did not learn of the bomb until later, expressed concern about the number of people who could have been injured or killed if it had detonated.

“Hundreds of people, including children, gathered to celebrate and recommit their lives to the cause of human rights,” Richard said.

The attempted bombing on the day set aside to honor the slain civil rights leader raised the possibility of a racial motive in a region that has been home to the white supremacist group Aryan Nations.

“The confluence of the holiday, the march and the device is inescapable, but we are not at the point where we can draw any particular motive,” Harrill said.

Spokane has 200,000 residents and is about 100 miles south of the Canadian border.

Another explosive device was found March 23 beside the Thomas S. Foley U.S. Courthouse in downtown Spokane. No arrests have been made in that investigation, and agents didn’t know if the two incidents were related, Harrill said.

The Spokane region and adjacent northern Idaho have had numerous incidents of anti-government and white supremacist activity during the past three decades.

The most visible was by the Aryan Nations, whose leader Richard Butler gathered racists and anti-Semites at his compound for more than two decades. Butler went bankrupt, lost the compound in a civil lawsuit in 2000 and died in 2004.

In 1996, white supremacists placed a pipe bomb outside City Hall in Spokane. The bomb exploded, blowing out a window and sending nails and screws across the street.

In December, a man in Hayden, Idaho, built a snowman on his front lawn shaped like a member of the Ku Klux Klan holding a noose. The man knocked the pointy-headed snowman down after getting a visit from sheriff’s deputies.

T.F. man faces six felony counts of sexual battery

A Twin Falls man on probation for a 2010 drug conviction faces new charges related to a sexual relationship he allegedly had with a 16-year-old Wendell girl.

Robert Benjamin Brackett, 42, was charged Tuesday in Twin Falls County with six felony counts of sexual battery of a minor age 16-17 and felony second-degree kidnapping.

Brackett allegedly engaged in sexual activity with the minor in his Twin Falls home on multiple dates in December and January. He also allegedly detained the female at his home during a Jan. 9 argument.

According to a Twin Falls police report, Brackett’s alleged victim correctly identified a tattoo and scar on Brackett’s lower torso.

Brackett was arraigned Tuesday in Twin Falls County 5th District Court, held on \$100,000 bond and ordered to have no contact with his alleged victim for eight months. If found guilty of the charges, he faces up to 25 years in prison for each conviction.

He is scheduled for a Jan. 28 preliminary hearing.

If it’s found Brackett violated his probation for a 2010 possession of a controlled substance conviction, he could face a related four-year suspended prison sentence.

Former Kimberly custodian sentenced

A former Kimberly Middle School custodian was sentenced Tuesday to serve four years’ probation for a felony injury to a child conviction.

William A. Palmer, 45, was accused of placing a “love letter” inside the locker of a student at the school in April 2010 and charged with sexual abuse of a minor under 16. He entered a plea deal with the state that amended the charge to injury to a child.

Palmer’s sentence, handed down in Twin Falls County 5th District Court, includes a prison term of up to nine years if he fails to meet the terms of his probation. He will also be required to pay court costs, a \$500 fine, perform 100 hours of community service within the next year, and submit a DNA sample and thumbprint to the state.

Shoshone updates rental rates, weighs health co-op

SHOSHONE — Shoshone City Clerk Mary Kay Bennett called the City Council’s attention Tuesday to updating a decade-old city billing rate.

Bennett suggested raising the price of city equipment rentals. The city uses these rates when it needs to charge out bids or projects, or when matching grant funds with manpower. City Maintenance Supervisor Aaron Aggeler said the rates are also used to bill citizens when the city puts in a new sewer or water line for them.

“We use it quite a bunch actually,” Aggeler said.

Bennett noticed the current prices, which haven’t been changed since 2001, while working on Americans with Disabilities Act compliance.

The council will need to approve a formal resolution before the new rates take effect. But council members voted to raise the rates by about \$10 to \$15 each — in some cases, by a little less than Bennett’s proposal.

Aggeler said the maintenance department will continue to perform some of the city’s current work, such as hauling away truckloads that citizens load themselves or helping people unable to do their own work, without charge.

The council also discussed joining a cooperative that could help lower the city’s health insurance costs in the future. Joining would cost Shoshone \$3,600 for the first three years, but would align the city with other communities in Montana, Utah, Nevada and Idaho. The co-op aims to bargain for lower insurance costs with the weight of a large group behind it.

“I’m a firm believer in a co-op in trying to keep insurance costs down because we’re just like an individual insurer,” Councilman Dale Sluder said.

The council voted to sign the joint powers agreement, pending contract approval by the city attorney. The city will also need to pass a resolution at a future meeting to make the arrangement official.

Now comes the hard part for new tax commissioner

Idaho Gov. C.L. “Butch” Otter on Tuesday picked the person he needed to appoint to the Idaho Tax Commission.

State Sen. Robert Geddes, R-Soda Springs, who stepped down last month after 10 years as president of the Senate, is as close to ethically bullet-proof as Idaho politicians come. Well-liked by most Republicans and Democrats in Legislature, Geddes is a conservative who can talk to those with whom he disagrees politically.

More to the point, his 14 years representing Caribou, Franklin, Teton, Bear Lake and Bonneville counties in the Senate have passed without a whiff of scandal.

Geddes, an environmental engineer by profession, replaces Royce Chigbrow, a former Gooding resident who resigned on Jan. 7 after news reports of favorable treatment of Chigbrow’s friends and family members.

Chigbrow’s problems first surfaced more than two years ago, when a tax commission auditor named Stan Howland filed a whistleblower complaint alleging that commissioners cuts sweetheart deals with out-of-state corporations to reduce their taxes.

Our suggestion to Geddes: Invite Howland in for a chat at the earliest opportunity.

Howland told reporters and legislators Tuesday that the tax commission doesn’t have adequate internal controls, which is the gravest sin in accounting.

He estimated that Idaho could lose \$50 million to \$100 million in state tax revenues in 2011 due to secret compromise deals, plus another \$20 million to \$30 million a year in future years. Howland, who’s now retired, detailed a list of changes he said are needed in Idaho’s tax-settlement process, ranging from less secrecy to restoring restrictions on when cases can be settled.

Howland and most of the Democrats in the Legislature favor revamping the tax commission to put an executive director in charge and transforming the four commissioners — by law, two Republicans and two Democrats — into his or her board of directors. That’s how Nevada and Utah do it.

There used to be tax commissions, often called boards of equalization, in most states. But many states have opted to make tax collections an executive function of government. Washington, Oregon, Wyoming and Montana, for example, have revenue departments whose director is appointed by and directly accountable to the governor.

The professionalization of tax collection in surrounding states means that the standards of which Howland speaks — effective internal controls, for example — have been internalized. While there’s an appeals process in Washington, Oregon, Wyoming and Montana, bureaucrats make those decisions — not a panel of citizens designated by the governor.

The evidence is pretty clear that Idaho’s way of administering taxes is too subjective and too arbitrary, and that the basic rules of accountability and transparency are too often neglected. That must change, whether the governor and the Legislature opt to keep the structure of the tax commission as it is, or change it fundamentally.

HOW OTHER STATES DO IT

- **Nevada** — The governor appoints eight state tax commissioners, who in turn hire an executive director.
- **Utah** — Like Idaho, Utah has a four-member tax commission appointed by the governor and divided equally among Democrats and Republicans. The tax commissioners hire an executive director, who manages the agency.
- **Oregon** — The state scrapped its tax commission in 1969 and it became the Oregon Department of Revenue. Its director is appointed by the governor.
- **Wyoming** — As in Oregon, taxation is administered by a state agency — the Department of Revenue — and not a commission.
- **Washington** — Like Oregon and Wyoming, Washington has a Department of Revenue whose executive director is appointed by the governor.
- **Montana** — The state’s 39-year-old Department of Revenue is run by a director appointed by the governor.

Recessions are not only depressing, they’re downright boring. I don’t mean to make light of the real financial hardship many Americans are facing. Unemployment is at 9.8 percent. One in every 492 homes received a foreclosure notice in November. Those are devastating figures. And even for those who are still employed, still making the rent or the mortgage payment, hard times are taking a psychic toll.



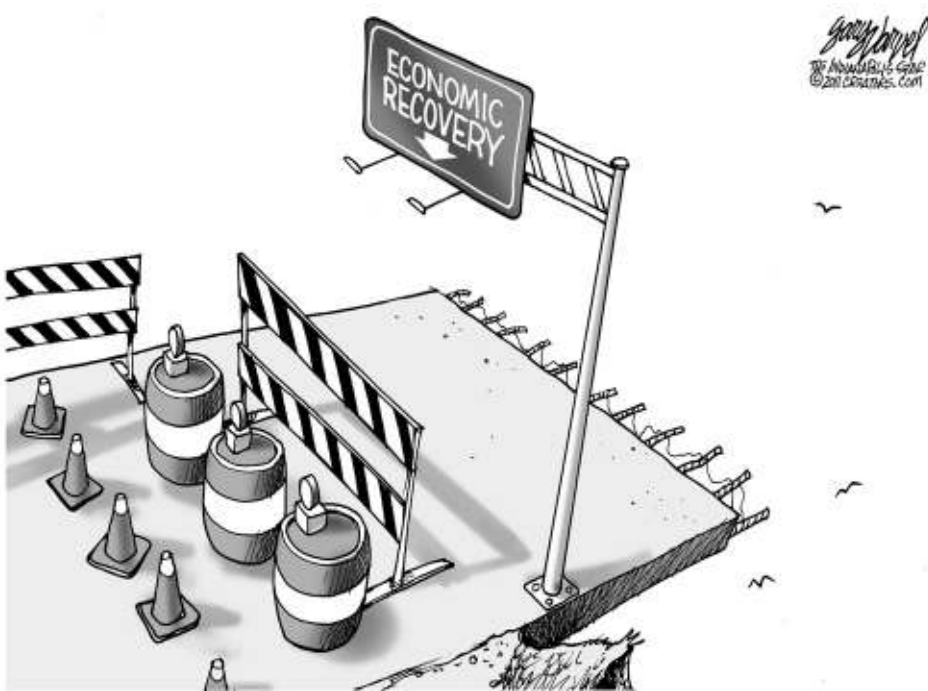

Even for the luckiest among us, living through an economic downturn feels a little bit like renting a high-performance car and having to drive it in first gear, or walking on proverbial eggshells while chatting with a cranky relative, or taking a stroll around the block with a sprained ankle.

Hard times, in other words, are a bore: They slow us down, reign us in, and otherwise keep us waiting anxiously for the other shoe to drop.

Back when this whole mess started in late 2007, a cadre of cultural critics trotted out their high-minded arguments about how a little belt-tightening would be good for our consumerist souls. They reckoned a recession would teach us to cling more firmly to our friends and loved ones as well as force us to rediscover the simple, wholesome, meaningful things in life.

Though that assessment may have made us feel better at the time, those critics were dead wrong. The gospel that money is somehow bad for your soul, to paraphrase Albert Camus, is little more than spiritual snobbery.

That said, it’s true that a mature capitalist society has to have all sorts of cultural memes to remind the public just how dangerous excessive materialism can be. Without mantras like “love of money is the root of all evil” or religious dictums that teach us that it’s better to give than receive, we’d probably devolve into a society of amoral money grubbers. (OK, OK, we’d devolve further into a society of amoral money grubbers.) But the point is, because the scramble for dollars is the primary organizing principle of our society, we seek relief from the pressure by telling ourselves that money isn’t as important as we actually think it is.

Over the past decade or so, social psychologists have conducted research that reinforces the folk wisdom that tells us money can’t buy happiness. A 2010 study out of Princeton actually pinpoints a \$75,000 annual income as a benchmark of happiness. The more an individual’s

income falls below that, the less happy he’s likely to feel. But no matter how much more than \$75,000 he makes a year, he’s not likely to feel any deeper sense of daily contentment.

Unfortunately, what such studies don’t measure is the happiness we derive from dreaming about that money and scheming about how to get it. For all of our complaints about the rat race, it turns out it can be fun. The marketplace is still the primary arena in which we realize our dreams.

Ironically, President Franklin D. Roosevelt, who was born into wealth, summed up the importance of the quest for money in our psyche better than anyone. He preached that “happiness is not in the mere possession of money; it lies in the joy of achievement, in the thrill of creative effort.”

By keeping us in idle and dampening our imaginations, recessions kill that thrill and diminish that joy. With less money flowing, fewer loans being given out

and job openings scarce, we spend more energy trying merely to survive or to hang on to the gigs we have rather than devising plans to jump to more exciting ones. Particularly in a culture that prizes hope, change and reinvention, I can’t imagine a predicament quite as enervating.

What’s worse is that far from freeing us to think of weightier matters, this recession bogged us all down in myriad prognostications about the economic future and all the ups and downs of the latest financial news.

It turns out we’re more obsessed with money when there’s less of it floating around. So much for discovering the “important things” in life.

The Great Recession and its aftermath have made the world a narrower, less interesting and less dynamic place. We’re all hoping the economy improves in the new year. We need the money, but we also need the excitement of possibilities, the optimistic embrace of risk and the unknown to reenter our lives.

of Drivers Education” for the state of Oregon. I have always known her as a dedicated, hard-working educator whose honesty and integrity are above reproach.

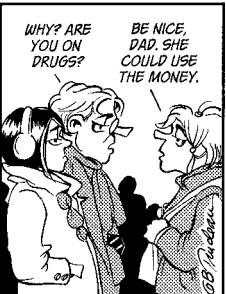
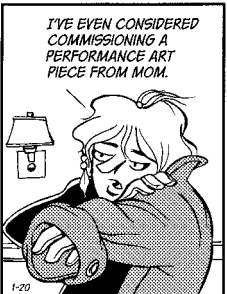

Luna wants to spend \$514 million during five years on reforms, including more laptop computers and online learning in the classroom by 2013. To pay for it, Luna moves more students into fourth- through 12th-grade classrooms and moves 770 teachers out.

He’s glossing over a few details, however.

For instance, Luna says the class size in Idaho is

18.2 students. That’s only an average. You can have a special ed class with eight students and an advance calculus course with 15. On the other side is a high school band class with 50.

So you’re likely to find 25 students in a sixth-grade classroom or 27 in a ninth-grade science course.

By moving the average up to 19.8 students, the school superintendent is advocating a 9-percent increase.

Which means that same sixth-grade teacher will have 27 students to contend with.

And that ninth-grade science instructor now has nearly 30.

Says Luna, it won’t matter ...

Tell that to the high school teacher who is inundated with after-school meetings because with three or four new students, she now lacks the time to deal with questions during a 50-minute class.

And tell that to the parents of the two extra children in each class who can silently pass through a more crowded school system unnoticed.

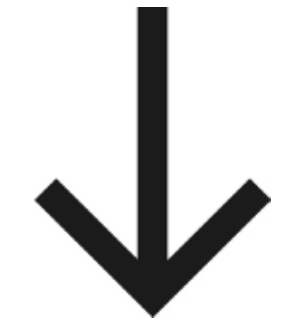
Technology can work wonders ... (but) can a laptop computer accomplish all that? ...

In three campaigns in eight years, Luna has never quibbled about his desire to break up tenure and institute merit pay for teachers. Any educator who is surprised at his latest batch of reforms in that sphere wasn’t paying attention.

But where on the campaign trail did he hear support for replacing human minds with computer chips?

Voters delivered a different verdict last year with their ballots and their checkbooks. Facing a round of state budget cuts, patrons in Idaho’s beleaguered districts volunteered to pay more property tax to avoid firing teachers and crowding their children into fewer classrooms ...

Luna clearly has ideas and ambitions that outstrip Idaho’s meager resources. What he lacks, however, is a mandate

- Cut Medicaid spending for vulnerable adults by \$85 million.

 - Raise college tuition, again, by at least 10 percent.
 - Cut income tax rates by \$374 million between 2013 and 2023.
 - Spend less per pupil than we already do.

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Idaho's mental health services fall victim to economy

BOISE — The economic downturn has left deep scars on Idaho's public services for the mentally ill, including efforts to help some of the state's most-vulnerable children.

Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter's recommended budget for the Idaho Department of Health and Welfare's mental health services division during the next fiscal year, which begins July 1, is about \$32.4 million. That's down 4.6 percent from the current fiscal year and a full 19 percent less than in 2008.

"The budget holdbacks have been felt largely in personnel," said administrator Kathleen Allyn, who reported to the Idaho Legislature's budget writing panel on Wednesday.

The division has laid off or left unfilled 35 full-time positions to assist adults with mental health problems, and another 14 positions to help Idaho youth.

Limited funding and staffing have forced her agency to prioritize, Allyn said. At the top of her list are intervention services for

people in imminent danger to themselves or others. At the bottom, services for people who don't have any form of insurance.

About 450 people in the past year have been referred out of state mental health programs to private providers amid the staffing cuts and budget holdbacks in 2009 and 2010, Allyn said. The agency identified these clients because they had insurance, including Medicaid, out of about 4,000 open cases, she said.

Sen. Diane Bilyeu, D-Pocatello, said she's concerned about how well the state is following up with clients who were cut from the system, citing a shooting in eastern Idaho.

A man was shot and wounded last year while leaving a Pocatello coffee shop that was near the home of the alleged gunman, who police say recently had been removed from a state mental health program.

Allyn could not talk about that case, she said, but told lawmakers that her agency did follow-up with clients who were dropped from the state's mental health care programs.

Buffalo roam again

Spared slaughter, some wild bison migrate into Montana

CORWIN SPRINGS, Mont. — For the first time since the 1800s, a small group of wild bison were herded Wednesday through fresh-fallen snow to reach their historical grazing grounds north of Yellowstone National Park.

As pronghorn antelope and mule deer scattered to avoid the procession, park employees and state livestock agents on horseback pushed the 25 bison about ten miles down the Yellowstone River valley. It took about three hours to reach an open meadow in the Gallatin National Forest, where the animals will be allowed to remain until spring.

The move could provide at least some relief from government-sponsored mass slaughters of the iconic Western animals, often called buffalo. Past winter journeys by bison seeking to graze at lower elevations have been blocked over fears that a disease carried by some could infect cattle.

During the last major migration, in 2008, 1,600 Yellowstone bison were killed — about a third of the park's total.

Yet progress toward ending the slaughters remains tenuous. Deep snow in Yellowstone's interior has set the stage for another major migration this year, meaning hundreds of bison could yet be captured and killed.

"It seems like the progress is slow, but it's slow because it's so complex," said Colin Campbell, Yellowstone's acting superintendent. "In all reality, there will always be limits, like there are with any wildlife species."

Wildlife officials said the Forest Service land where the 25 bison will be allowed to roam is roughly 2,500 acres, or less than four square miles. If this year's "test" operation goes well, the number of bison allowed eventually could be increased to 100.

Access to the land came at a steep price: Government agencies and private conservation groups paid more than \$3 million to establish a bison travel corridor through the Royal Teton Ranch, a sprawling property just north of Yellowstone

owned by the Church Universal and Triumphant.

Electrified fencing now lines the dirt road that passes through the ranch — a reminder that the newfound tolerance for bison in Montana has its limits. Critics dubbed the route the "corridor to nowhere" because bison that attempt to migrate much farther will be turned back or killed.

One bison advocate watching Wednesday's herding operation warned that it would establish a scent trail other bison could follow to their doom.

"You can't treat bison like livestock. This is a wild animal and they've set up a livestock operation" said Stephany Seay with the Buffalo Field Campaign.

To keep close tabs on the animals, they received ear tags, radio collars and, for females, tracking devices implanted in their vaginas in case they abort their young. The disease some bison carry — brucellosis — can cause animals to prematurely abort. No bison-to-cattle transmissions have been recorded.

Prior to European settlement an estimated 60 million bison roamed North America, from Canada to northern Mexico. They were hunted to near-extinction by the end of the 19th century, with only about 300 survivors remaining.

Yellowstone was the first place the species was restored in significant numbers. But as the herd rebounded, fears over the disease brucellosis grew more acute. Since the 1980s almost all bison that attempted to leave the park in search of food at lower elevations were killed, or hazed back into the park.

Drug probe leads to felony charges

BOISE — The U.S. attorney's office in Idaho says a yearlong drug and weapons investigation in Canyon County has led to the arrest of nine people on felony charges and the seizure of drugs, firearms and cash.

The nine people who face felony charges, including seven who are suspected of being illegal immigrants, were taken into custody Friday as law officers from 10 federal, state and local agencies served search warrants in Nampa and Caldwell.

Officers seized approximately five pounds of methamphetamine, marijuana, 28 firearms, two bullet resistant vests, over \$30,000 and about 10 vehicles.

ISU moves up in ranking system

POCATELLO — Idaho State University has moved up in an important ranking system and as a result will be able to get grants more easily and attract better faculty and students, the school's president says.

Arthur Vailas in an announcement on Tuesday said the school moved from Doctoral Research University to the category of Research University-High in rankings made by the Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching.

"This reflects really mostly upon the outstanding contributions and work of the faculty within the university," Vailas said.

The foundation ranks universities based on undergraduate instructional programs, institution size and setting, level of research activity and graduate instructional programs.

"If I were going to give a thumbnail sketch of Idaho State

University and its research, I would start by saying it's a Research-High university," said Pamela Crowell, vice president of research and economic development.

The Carnegie Foundation lists 98 other universities at Research University-High. The next and final step is Research University-Very High, held by 108 universities.

The University of Idaho in

Moscow also holds the Research University-High status.

Group buys ranch for pheasant habitat

BOISE — A conservation group dedicated to protecting habitat for pheasants has acquired a 2,700-acre ranch in southeast Idaho that will one day be open to public hunting and recreation.


Pheasants Forever officials say

they closed a deal on the land near the small town of Hamer. The property is also located between the Camas National Wildlife Refuge and the state managed Mud Lake Wildlife Management Area.

In buying the property, the group has essentially connected more than 21,000 acres of wildlife habitat on one management block.

Banks: Fewer consumer loans are going bad

NEW YORK— Americans are starting to get their household finances in order. In an encouraging round of earnings reports, major banks say fewer mortgages are going bad, credit card defaults are down and more people are paying the bills on time. One of the nation's largest consumer lenders, Wells Fargo, said Wednesday that 29 percent fewer loans went bad in the last three months of 2010 than the year before. And late payments on loans considered likely to default declined for the first time since 2008. Late payments on credit cards issued by Bank of America, JPMorgan Chase and Citigroup also improved at a record pace at the end of last year, according to an analysis by Barclays Capital. The reports are a sign that Americans are feeling more comfortable about their finances. Personal spending powers about 70 percent of

the U.S. economy, and most economists say a fiscally fit consumer is critical to a strong economic recovery. “There are signs of stability and growth,” said JPMorgan CEO Jamie Dimon. The bank news comes after a holiday shopping season in which spending was the strongest since 2006, and auto sales grew 11 percent last year, the first gains since 2005. Taken together, the spending indicators are the “strongest showing for consumers since the peak years of the last expansion,” and signal that the economy is “near a threshold of self-sustaining growth,” analysts at Citi Investment Research & Analysis said in a report earlier this month. Economists and policymakers are waiting for signs that the economic recovery can power itself rather than rely on outside supports, like the Fed's decision to buy

hundreds of billions of dollars in government bonds to drive down interest rates. The recent bank results are fueling that optimism. Citigroup said loan losses fell 11 percent from the previous quarter as more of its customers kept up with payments. It was the sixth straight quarter of declining losses, allowing the bank to release \$2.3 billion from the reserves it sets aside for bad loans and helping it to report a profit. JPMorgan and Wells have also reported bigger profits because they could release loan reserves. Fewer customers were late on their monthly mortgage payments. The portion of Citi's home loans that were 90 days overdue fell to 2.1 percent from 2.7 percent. And the bank set aside \$4.8 billion for future losses, the lowest since the spring of 2007 and a sign it is more hopeful about the recovery. Despite the encouraging

trends, banks are still reluctant to loosen lending. Credit reporting agency Transunion estimates that 8 million Americans who had credit cards a year ago don't have them now, either by choice or because they were cut off. Banks slashed credit lines and closed millions of credit card accounts in response to regulations passed after the financial crisis. Individuals, too, are hesitant to borrow even when they have access to credit. Federal Reserve data show that total revolving debt held by U.S. consumers — mainly credit cards — fell to just below \$800 billion in November, the lowest since September 2004. Each of the three biggest banks — Citi, JPMorgan and Bank of America, which are also the three biggest credit card issuers in the country — reported significant declines in card balances in the fourth quarter. Banks have been especially reluctant to resume lending to risky customers. The

Idaho Power seeks changes to irrigation program

The Idaho Public Utilities Commission is taking comments through Feb. 9 on an application by Idaho Power Company to make changes to a voluntary load control program offered to irrigation customers. Under the program, Idaho Power turns off specified irrigation pumps during peak load times between June 15 and Aug. 15. In exchange for allowing the company to interrupt service, participating irrigators receive a monthly monetary payment in the form of a credit on June, July and August bills. The company wants to expand the hours of interruption from the current 1 p.m. to 8 p.m. to 1 p.m. to 9 p.m. Customers who accept an extended interruption period will receive a higher payment, according to the company's application. 2010 was second worst year for home construction

WASHINGTON— U.S. homebuilders are coming off their two worst years in more than a half-century, and the outlook for this year is only slightly better. Economists say it could take three more years before the industry begins building homes at a healthy rate. In the mean time, the housing downturn is dragging on the broader economy, with one-quarter of the jobs lost since the recession began in the construction field. Builders normally help lead the economy out of a recession. Construction projects fuel growth and that leads to more hiring. But a year and a half after the recession officially ended, builders are struggling to compete in markets flooded with unsold homes — many of them foreclosures that are depressing prices.

“Housing in the past has always been one of the key drivers getting the economy back on track. It is not going to happen this time because there is a huge glut of homes out there,” said Patrick Newport, U.S. economist at IHS Global Insight. Homebuilders broke ground on a total of 587,600 homes in 2010, just slightly better than the 554,000 started in 2009, the Commerce Department reported Wednesday Those are the lowest annual totals on records dating back to 1959. And the pace is getting worse. The Commerce Department reported Wednesday that builders started work at a seasonally adjusted annual rate of 529,000 new homes and apartments last month. That's a drop of 4.3 percent from November and the slowest pace since October 2009.

Nintendo 3DS goes on sale in March

No glasses required for 3-D handheld

NEW YORK — Promising to usher in a new era in 3-D entertainment, Nintendo says its glasses-free handheld 3DS will go on sale on March 27 in the U.S. for \$250. That's the same price that the revolutionary Wii console cost when it went on sale in 2006. The president and chief operating officer of Nintendo of America, Reggie Fils-Aime, said Wednesday the 3DS is a “truly unique experience that doesn't exist anywhere else.” “This is a different kind of

Something you haven't experienced before. Not in theaters, not at trade shows.” Fils-Aime told a crowd of journalists, bloggers and analysts in New York City. “Of course, there are no glasses.” The gadget features a touch screen on the bottom and a 3-D screen on top. It has three cameras, one facing the user and two facing outward. The latter two let you take 3-D photos, which can be instantly displayed on

the screen. There's also an accelerometer and a gyroscope. These track players' movements and how they tilt the screen, so they can play games with motion-based capabilities or see the 3-D games from different angles. A “Mii Creator” uses photos you take of yourself to instantly create a cartoon avatar based on your image. Then you can adjust it as you like. The 3DS includes new social features, including “StreetPass,” which lets users exchange game information with other 3DS users nearby. For example, your Mii avatar or game high scores can appear on your friend's 3DS if they have also chosen to activate this feature. Nintendo Co. said more than 30 games will be available for the 3DS by early

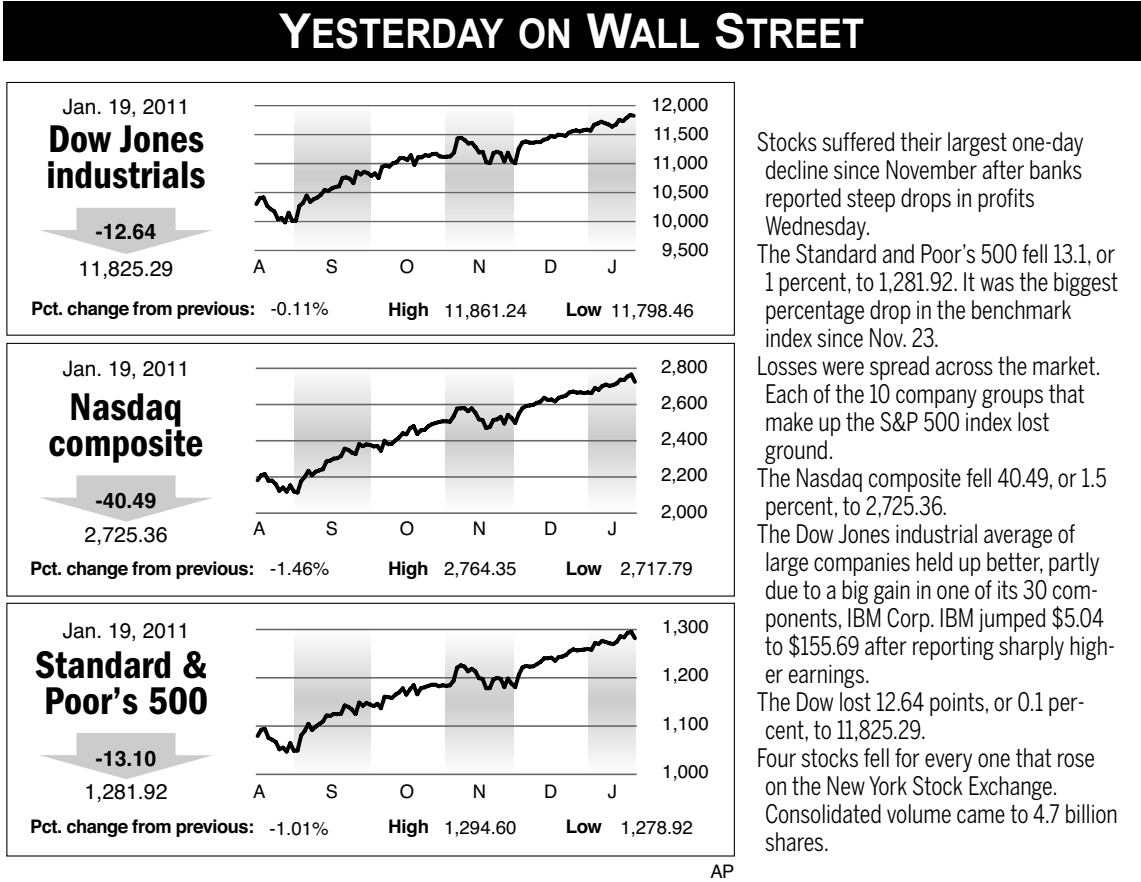

Abortion doctor charged with killing woman, 7 infants

PHILADELPHIA — A doctor whose abortion clinic was described as a filthy, foul-smelling “house of horrors” that was overlooked by regulators for years was charged Wednesday with murder, accused of delivering seven babies alive and then using scissors to kill them.

Dr. Kermit Gosnell was also charged with murder in the death of a woman who suffered an overdose of painkillers while awaiting an abortion.

In a nearly 300-page grand jury report filled with ghastly, stomach-turning detail, prosecutors said Pennsylvania regulators ignored complaints of barbaric conditions at Gosnell’s clinic, which catered to poor, immigrant and minority women in the city’s impoverished West Philadelphia section.

Prosecutors called the case a “complete regulatory collapse.”

“Pennsylvania is not a Third World country,” the district attorney’s office declared in the report. “There were several oversight agencies that stumbled upon and should have shut down Kermit Gosnell long ago.”

Gosnell, 69, was arrested and charged with eight counts of murder in all. Nine of Gosnell’s employees — including his wife, a cosmetologist who authorities say performed abortions — also were charged.

Prosecutors said Gosnell made millions of dollars over three decades performing thousands of dangerous abortions, many of them illegal late-term procedures. His clinic had no trained nurses or medical staff other than Gosnell, a family physician not certified in obstetrics or gynecology, prosecutors said.

At least two women died from the procedures, while

scores more suffered perforated bowels, cervixes and uteruses, authorities said.

Under Pennsylvania law, abortions are illegal after 24 weeks of pregnancy, or just under six months, and most doctors won’t perform them after 20 weeks because of the risks, prosecutors said.

In a typical late-term abortion, the fetus is dismembered in the uterus and then removed in pieces. Prosecutors said Gosnell instead delivered many of the babies alive.

He “induced labor, forced the live birth of viable babies in the sixth, seventh, eighth month of pregnancy and then killed those babies by cutting into the back of the neck with scissors and severing their spinal cord,” District Attorney Seth Williams said.

Gosnell referred to it as “snipping,” prosecutors said.

Prosecutors estimated Gosnell ended hundreds of pregnancies by cutting the spinal cords, but they said they couldn’t prosecute more cases because he destroyed files.

“These killings became so routine that no one could put an exact number on them,” the grand jury report said. “They were considered ‘standard procedure.’”

Defense attorney William J. Brennan, who represented Gosnell during the investigation, said: “Obviously, these allegations are very, very serious.”

The grand jury report came out a day after new Republican Gov. Tom Corbett took office. Spokesman Kevin Harley pledged that Corbett’s administration, through his new health secretary, would do more to oversee such clinics.

“What needs to be done is regulators, whether on the local or state or federal level, need to properly regulate, inspect and do their jobs,” Harley said. “The safety of our citizens should be first and foremost.”

Federal grand jury indicts Arizona shooting suspect

PHOENIX (AP) — A federal grand jury on Wednesday indicted the suspect in the deadly Arizona shooting rampage that wounded U.S. Rep. Gabrielle Giffords.

The indictment against Jared Loughner, 22, accuses him of attempting to assassinate Giffords and trying to kill two of her aides.

It does not include two murder charges listed in an earlier criminal complaint for the deaths of Giffords aide Gabe Zimmerman, 30, and U.S. District Judge John Roll, 63.

Those are potential death

penalty charges. A statement from the U.S. attorney for Arizona, Dennis Burke, said those require a more painstaking process under Justice Department rules.

Burke said the initial indictment issued by a grand jury in Tucson was just the beginning of federal legal action against the 22-year-old Tucson resident.

Six people were killed and 13 wounded in the Jan. 8 attack at a grocery store in Tucson as Giffords held a meet-and-greet with constituents. State charges are pending.

U.S. House votes to repeal Obama’s health care law

WASHINGTON — Swiftly honoring a campaign pledge, newly empowered Republicans pushed legislation to repeal the nation’s year-old health care overhaul through the House Wednesday night, brushing aside implacable opposition in the Senate and a veto threat from President Barack Obama.

The 245-189 vote was largely along party lines, and cleared the way for the second phase of the “repeal and replace” promise that victorious Republicans made to the voters last fall. GOP officials said that in the coming months, congressional committees will propose changes to the existing legislation, calling for elimination of a requirement for individuals to purchase coverage, for example, and recommending curbs on medical malpractice lawsuits.

Republicans also intend to try to reverse many of the changes Democrats made to Medicare Advantage, the private alternative to the traditional government-run health care program for seniors.

Like the repeal bill itself, these other measures will require Senate approval and a presidential signature to take effect, and the prospect is for months of maneuvering on the issue.

Debate across two days leading to the vote was markedly restrained, as lawmakers in both political parties observed self-imposed vows of civility in the wake of the shooting rampage in Arizona that left six dead and Rep. Gabrielle Giffords wounded.

But there was no mistaking the significance many first-term Republican law-

makers attached to a day they had long waited for, finally getting a chance to speak and then vote on the House floor against a law they had campaigned for months to repeal.

Rep. Jeff Duncan, R-S.C. said the legislation produced by Obama and congressional Democrats was a “job-killing, socialistic” approach to health care. Rep. Frank Guinta of New Hampshire, who defeated a Democratic incumbent last fall, said it was misguided, needing repeal.

“The American people have soundly, soundly rejected the Democrats’ government takeover of health care,” said Rep. Sandy Adams of Florida.

Rep. Steve Southerland, also of Florida, said the law imposes a crushing tax burden on businesses, and he predicted “1.6 million jobs will be lost by 2014 due to this mandate” to require many businesses to provide coverage for employees. Both Floridians won their seats by turning out Democratic incumbents. “This is not symbolic. This is why we were sent here,” added Rep. Michelle Bachman, of Minnesota, a third-term conservative with strong support among tea party activists.

On the short end of the vote, Democrats challenged Republican claims and highlighted politically popular elements of the bill that would be wiped out if repeal took effect.

Rep. Jim Moran, D-Va., accused some Republicans of “the height of hypocrisy” by voting to repeal a vast expansion of health care at the same time they had signed up for coverage for their families through a government-organized program available to lawmakers.

Rep. Frank Pallone, D-

N.J., said that despite claims of employment loss, the economy had added jobs in each of the past 10 months.

In one of the most animated speeches of two days of debate, Rep. George Miller, D-Calif., said repeal would return power to

insurance companies. “Has anybody, any family in America, any single mother, any spouse, any child, any grandparent met a more bureaucratic system than the American health insurance system? There is no more bureaucratic system.”

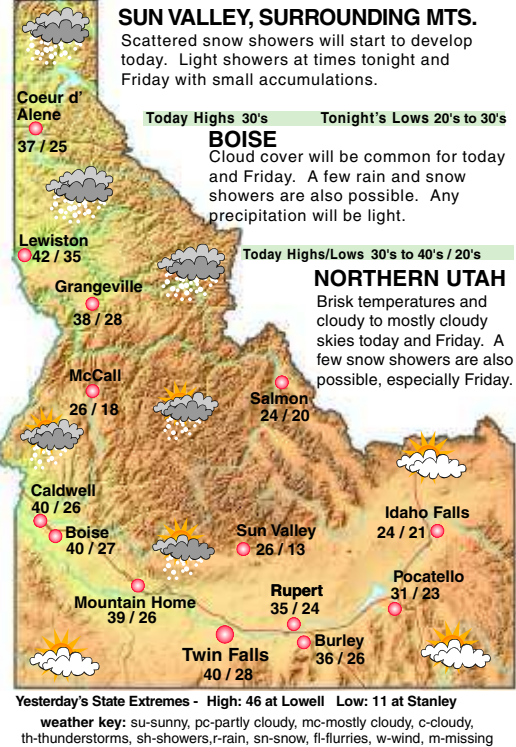

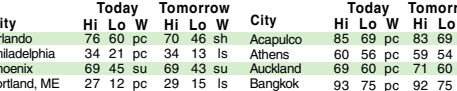

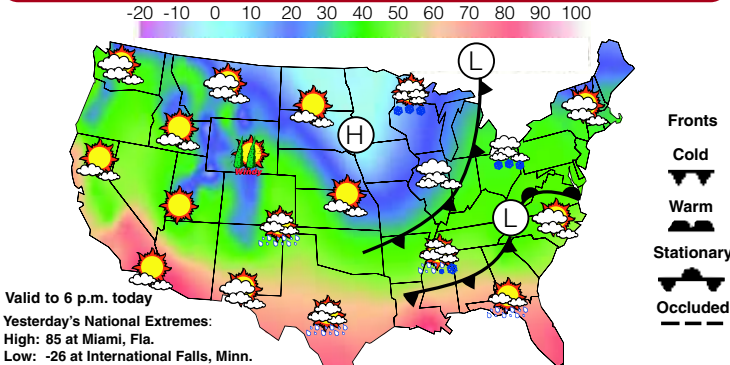

With Obama, Hu admits China needs help on human rights

WASHINGTON — In a rare concession on a highly sensitive issue, Chinese President Hu Jintao used his White House visit on Wednesday to acknowledge “a lot still needs to be done” to improve human rights in his nation accused of repressing its people.

President Barack Obama pushed China to adopt fundamental freedoms but assured Hu the U.S. considers the communist nation a friend and vital economic partner.

Hu’s comments met with

immediate skepticism from human rights advocates, who dismissed them as words backed by no real history of action.

Hu contended his country has “made enormous progress” but provided no specifics.

Still, his remarks seemed to hearten and surprise U.S. officials, coming during an elaborate visit that centered on boosting trade and trust between the world’s two largest economies.

More broadly, Hu and Obama sought to show off a more mature and respectful relationship, not

the one often defined by disputes over currency, sovereignty and freedoms. Hu said he wanted even closer contact with Obama; Obama sought again to embrace China’s rise, and the two men shared some unexpected laughs.

The Chinese president was treated lavishly, granted the honor of the third state dinner of Obama’s presidency. He was welcomed in the morning to the sounds of military bands and the smiles of children on the South Lawn; he was capping the evening at a black-tie White House gala of jazz musi-

cians and all-American food.

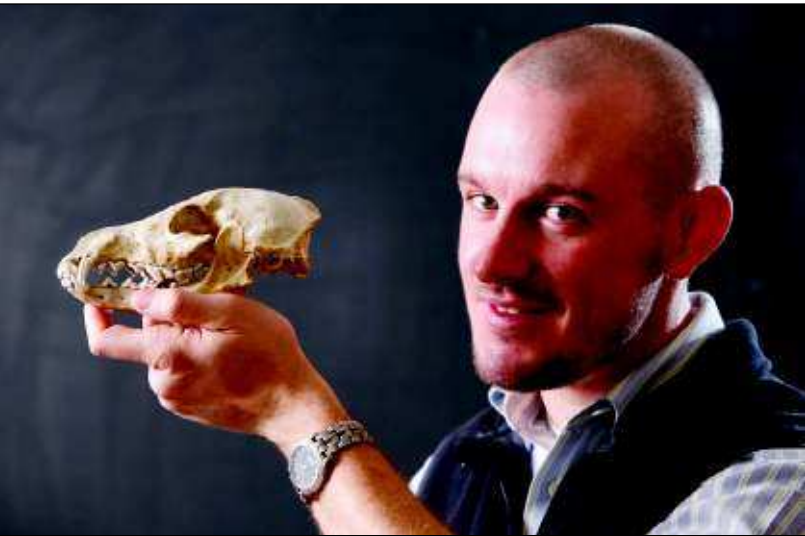
Eager to show progress, particularly with the unemployment weighing down his country, Obama said the nations sealed business deals that would mean \$45 billion in U.S. exports and create roughly 235,000 jobs. The package included moves by China to expand U.S. investment and curtail theft of intellectual property.

China’s human rights record is poor and worsening, with abuses ranging from censorship to illegal detention of dissidents to executions without due process, according to the U.S. government. At a packed news confer-

ence — one designed to underscore the freedom of speech on Obama’s home turf — Hu was pressed to defend his country’s treatment of its people. He initially did not answer, saying he never heard the question translated, although the White House said that it was.

When prodded a second time, Hu defended his country’s promotion of human rights. But then he added that China is enduring challenges as it develops and “a lot still needs to be done in China in terms of human rights.” He said China stood to gain from other countries’ input, saying: “We’re also willing to learn.”

Old dog, new tricks

Study identifies 9,400-year-old mutt

PORTLAND, Maine — Nearly 10,000 years ago, man’s best friend provided protection and companionship — and an occasional meal.

That’s what researchers are saying after finding a bone fragment from what they are calling the earliest confirmed domesticated dog in the Americas.

University of Maine graduate student Samuel Belknap III came across the fragment while analyzing a dried-out sample of human waste unearthed in southwest Texas in the 1970s. A carbon-dating test put the age of the bone at 9,400 years, and a DNA analysis confirmed it came from a dog — not a wolf, coyote or fox, Belknap said.

Because it was found deep inside a pile of human excrement and was the characteristic orange-brown color that bone turns when it has passed through the digestive tract, the fragment provides the earliest direct evidence that dogs — besides being used for company, security

and hunting — were eaten by humans and may even have been bred as a food source, he said.

Belknap wasn’t researching dogs when he found the bone. Rather, he was looking into the diet and nutrition of the people who lived in the Lower Pecos region of Texas between 1,000 and 10,000 years ago.

“It just so happens this person who lived 9,400 years ago was eating dog,” Belknap said.

Belknap and other researchers from the University of Maine and the University of Oklahoma’s molecular anthropology laboratories, where the DNA analysis was done, have written a paper on their findings.

The paper has been scientifically reviewed and accepted, pending revisions, for publication in the American Journal of Physical Anthropology later this year, said editor in chief Christopher Ruff.

There are archaeological records of dogs going back 31,000 years from a site in Belgium, 26,000 years in the Czech Republic and 15,000

years in Siberia, said Robert Wayne, a professor of evolutionary biology at UCLA and a dog evolution expert. But canine records in the New World aren’t as detailed or go back nearly as far.

For his research, Belknap — who does not own a dog himself — had fecal samples shipped to him that had been unearthed in 1974 and 1975 from an archaeological site known as Hinds Cave and kept in storage at Texas A&M University. The fragment is about six-tenths of an inch long and three- to four-tenths of an inch wide, or about the size of a fingernail on a person’s pinkie.

He and a fellow student identified the bone as a fragment from where the skull connects with the spine. He said it came from a dog that probably resembled the small, short-nosed, short-haired mutts that were common among the Indians of the Great Plains.

Judging by the size of the bone, Belknap figures the dog weighed about 25 to 30 pounds. He also found what he thinks was a bone from a dog foot, but the fragment was too small to be analyzed.

Malad Gorge offers short, scenic excursion

HAGERMAN — Our ears felt as if they were going to fall off, that's how cold we were when we visited Malad Gorge Jan. 6. We, as in *Times-News* Online Manager Joshua Palmer and myself. Neither of us had brought ski caps, which we regretted when the wind whipped us.

We walked onto the footbridge — Josh with the newsroom's video camera, me with my SLR — and stopped to look at the Devil's Washbowl. But ol' Lucifer wasn't bathing on this chilly day in south-central Idaho. The washbowl was frozen.

We walked across the bridge to a paved trail that took us several yards to a kiosk sign, and where another view of the Devil's Washbowl presented itself. The view was better here, for we could see how the water, now frozen, formed a path down the canyon.

We admired the steep 250-foot drop of the canyon. If ever you bring children here, make sure to keep a close eye on them. Stay on the foot-path, away from the fields that lead over the edge.

We admired the geology of the area.

Malad Gorge was formed thousands of years ago when "immense flows of water from alpine glaciers and high levels of precipitation sent waters cascading over the Snake River Canyon directly into the Snake River," reads a sign at the site. "Weak joints in the basalt walls gave way to these rushing waters at the mouth of Malad Canyon, concentrating the channel into a narrow canyon. These concentrated flows began to retreat and deepen over many years, following a zig zag direction that eventually created not one, but three canyons before diminishing to ... water levels found today?"

The Malad River, which enters the Snake River in Hagerman, received its name in 1824 when a Hudson Bay fur trapper named Alexandria Ross visited the area. About 37 members of Ross' party fell ill after eating locally-trapped beaver. They assumed the local wildlife survived on poisonous plants

and, because of the sickness incurred after eating the beaver, named the water "Riviere aux Malade," or "Sickly River."

Later, the gorge and its rocks became a favorite hiding place for outlaws.

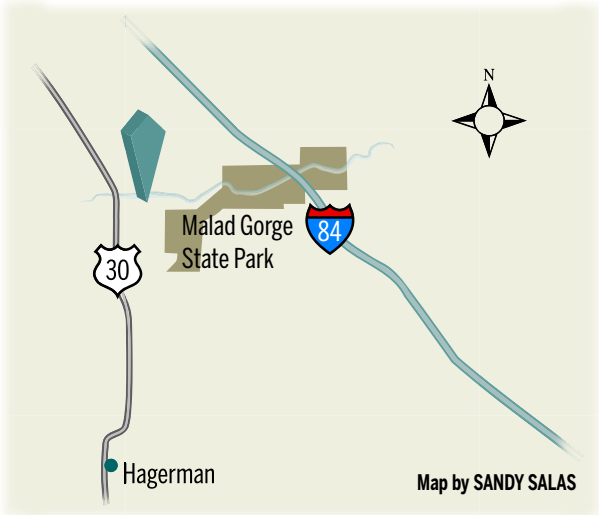
We didn't see any outlaws on our visit, but we did read a map that described the canyon leading toward the Hagerman Valley. Let's go there, we decided. Maybe once inside the canyon, instead of on top of it, the wind wouldn't find us.

We entered the other end of the canyon off Highway 30 in Hagerman, greeted by an Idaho Power Co. hydropower project. The power company operates two projects in the area: Upper Malad Project and Lower Malad Project, located within two miles of each other. The annual average combined generation of the project is 168,733 megawatt hours, "enough to power more than 13,750 residential customers," according to information on the company's website.

We drove past the first project, careful on the narrow road, and parked next to Malad River. Rocks greeted us from all around, and as we hiked farther up the road we noticed how clean and clear the river appeared. We knew it was cold, though it wasn't frozen. Icicles hung to rocks here and there.

Farther on we noticed water on the opposite side of the dirt road. Water gushed from the mountain-side: Malad Springs. I decided to see how cold the water was, and when I reached my hand into it was surprised by how warm it felt.

F&G fills bellies, educates on aging animals

JEROME — The imagination's the limit when it comes to participating in the Idaho Department of Fish and Game's chili dinners.

A number of home-made chilies, each made with a different game meat, were available to try at the department's third annual chili feed last Thursday at the Magic Valley Regional Office. It didn't take long for the rows of tables set up to host the event to become filled with hungry outdoor enthusiasts.

If you can think of a particular chili, it was probably there for the tasting.

Jerome resident Carl Nellis, who last year brought bison chili, this year made a pot of goose chili. At home, he often makes other varieties, depending on the season, he said — elk, moose, bear and, his favorite, lion.

"It's light-colored, like pork," Nellis said about the meat. "And it's very bland tasting, so you can do a lot with it."

The night wasn't all about filling bellies. Fish and Game officers presented a number of topics — from the department's new K-9 program to conducting age tests on fish and big game animals.

How do biologists tell the age of a fish, for instance? By analyzing scales, the ear bones inside a fish's head and the hard part of fins, said Regional Fisheries Manager Dough Megargle.

Why is determining age important? It helps biologists to understand the growth rate of fish, their survival and recruitment rates, and to better gage habitat resources.

As for big game, antlers are not a viable way to tell the age of a horned animal, said Fish and Game biologist Regan Berkley.

"You can get a relative age of an animal (by an antler) but they're not very accurate," she said.

A more accurate method is analyzing teeth, she said.

The chili feed, complemented by educational slideshows, has become a popular event for Fish and Game. A number of people returned to the slow cookers to refill their bowls or to try new flavors. The event attracts outdoor enthusiasts from all over the valley.

Hagerman resident Ashley Clifford won first place in the chili contest. Phil Mai of Burley was voted second place and Kyle Alberti of Twin Falls earned third place.

Famous Yellowstone elk herd suffers unexpected decline

BILLINGS, Mont. — An acclaimed elk herd in Yellowstone National Park took a major hit last year, with biologists saying almost one in four of the animals were lost, mainly to predators and hunters.

As recently as 1994, the northern Yellowstone elk herd was the largest in North America with almost 20,000 animals that migrated between the park and parts of southern Montana.

But those numbers have plummeted sharply since wolves were reintroduced 15 years ago, adding to threats that already included mountain lions and grizzly bears.

Figures released Wednesday showed the Yellowstone herd down to a minimum of 4,635 elk. That's a 24 percent drop from last winter, and wildlife officials said the decline was unexpected because the herd in recent years showed signs of stabilizing.

"Either we counted them poorly this year, predator effects were stronger, the big snow event made us miss more elk, or more elk were harvested," said Park Service biologist Doug Smith. "Usually the best answer in ecology is all of the above."

He said there was no reason to suspect a continued decline, and that a smaller herd is healthier in some ways because it gives the animals room to thrive.

Bill Hoppe, an outfitter near Gardiner, said harsh weather in the park in late

November pushed many of the animals to lower elevations in Montana. He estimated several hundred bull elk from the herd were killed by hunters in the last part of the season — one of the most successful harvests in years.

Yet in the 1990s, several thousand elk were killed in some years. Hoppe believes the herd's best days are gone, and a local hunting industry that already was ailing will collapse.

"There's coyotes and there's wolves and there's bears and there's mountain lions. (The elk) may come back, but it's going to be slow," said Hoppe, who is also president of a group called the Friends of the Northern Yellowstone Elk Herd.

The Park Service has no set population target for the

herd, but the latest count falls below those of Montana Fish Wildlife and Parks.

The state's elk management plan calls for 3,000 to 5,000 elk in parts of Montana just north of the park, said Fish, Wildlife and Parks spokesman Ron Aasheim. This year's count included 2,236 outside the park.

Aasheim said state officials would review whether hunting restrictions need to be tightened in future years to help bolster the herd. Yet it's uncertain how much could be done. Harvest limits for reproducing female elk were down to just a few dozen north of the park this year, versus almost 3,000 a season at their peak.

Park biologist Smith said the long-term decline was indisputable, with 70 percent

of the herd gone since wolves were reintroduced to the park from Canada in 1995.

Conservationists credit wolves with helping restore balance to the ecosystem, in part by reducing the size of a herd some had said was far too large at its peak.

Smith declined to weigh in, saying that was before his time at Yellowstone. But he pointed out controversy has long followed the northern Yellowstone herd.

"Yellowstone is one of the most predator rich environments in North America and that has an effect on elk," he said. "But the biggest criticism when I got here in 1994 was there were too many elk. Now we're getting criticism there's too few elk. The Park Service does not specifically target a population size."

Celebrating 100 years: John Browning's Colt model 1911

Like a good journalist checking the facts, Josh also reached his hand into the water.

"Oh my gosh, it is warm," he said.

I thought about it.

"Maybe the water feels warm because our hands are so cold," I said. We did bring gloves, but it was difficult to operate our cameras with them on.

We walked on, and noticed sites for kayakers to launch their craft.

Finally we came to the end of our hike: a chain-link fence that blocked further access with its sign of NO TRESPASSING.

Visitors can access the river up to the fence, but not beyond for safety reasons, said Stephanie McCurdy, a spokeswoman for Idaho Power. She said there've been instances of falling rock and the road isn't the best.

"We definitely understand that people want to use that area, but we have to consider safety first," McCurdy said.

Snowbikers seek access to Yellowstone winter

JACKSON, Wyo. (AP) — Advocates of nonmotorized winter use say Yellowstone National Park should allow snow bicycles on groomed trails.

Snow bicycles are similar to mountain bikes but with fatter tires.

Tim Young, of Friends of Pathways, says the prohibition against snow bicycles is a knee-jerk reaction on the part of the Park Service to a little-understood form of winter recreation.

He tells the Jackson Hole News & Guide that a snow bicycle is comparable to a cross-country skier.

Yellowstone spokesman Al Nash says there's concern that snow bicycling will cause safety issues because snowmobiles and snow coaches use the same trails.

Yellowstone is drafting a new winter-use plan, and Nash says the park welcomes any comment on the snow bikes.

Winter doesn't keep anglers out of the water

PUEBLO, Colo. — It was an ugly day along the Arkansas River, with the mercury at 26 degrees and an icy fog that made life feel wet and much colder.

That didn't stop Larry Meyer from wading into the frigid water for a day of fly-fishing. It was, after all, his 60th birthday, nasty weather be damned.

"It breaks up the winter and gets you ready for spring," shouted Meyer, of Palmer Lake, to this reporter, who stood — drier and warmer, but far from toasty — on the dry bank. "It's a way to get out and enjoy nature and get away from things."

"But the main reason I do it in winter," he added, "is because there are fish."

Armed with better gear and warmer clothing, a growing number of anglers are pushing fly-fishing beyond the traditional boundaries, into the icy depths of Colorado winters. The fish are just as big as in summer and the crowds are lighter, though popular spots, like this stretch of the Arkansas below Pueblo Reservoir, can still see heavy use — chilly Wednesday morning in late December.

"Word has gotten out," said Michael Seraphin, spokesman for the Colorado Division of Wildlife in Colorado Springs. "Fly-fisherman are a hardy bunch and they're a dedicated bunch and they enjoy the fact they can catch fish in an area so close to the Front Range."

Of the half-dozen anglers braving the elements this day, four were from El Paso County.

"Just the diehards," said angler Jonathon Kleis, an employee and fishing guide at the shop Angler's Covey, when asked what percentage

of anglers fish year-round. "It's a good chance to find solitude and fish the places that usually get pounded."

"If you are dressed for the occasion, it can be a really enjoyable experience," he said.

Indeed, the weather can present that biggest challenge to winter fly-fishing. Dress in layers and stay out of the water as much as possible. But with rivers running at their lowest levels of the year, that's not always possible, so make sure your waders are in good shape, and take frequent breaks. Take de-icer spray for your rod.

Winter angler Joe Frasca said he rarely notices the cold.

"When I'm fishing, I block out everything. I don't realize I'm hungry. I don't realize I'm thirsty or cold. But you do have to bundle up," he said.

You'll also need to find a place where winter has not turned the river into an un-fishable skating rink. The best spots are tailwaters, areas below dams where water released from the bottoms of reservoirs keeps the river a few degrees

warmer. Fishing licenses are good until the end of March, so you won't need a new one for winter.

The consensus among anglers is that the fish themselves don't seem to be any more catchable in winter than in summer, though with fewer anglers on the river, you can have them more to yourself. Also, since fish diets are limited in winter, you will only need a couple different midges and nymphs for a day of fishing.

For Kleis, the hardest part is tying the miniscule knots with hands trembling or numb from the cold. If you can do it on a winter's day, he said, you can do it anytime, anywhere. And he vastly prefers winter fly-fishing to ice-fishing, because the former is much more active, with a constant casting to keep the blood flowing.

So, does he ever get too cold or start to question why he thinks it's fun to stand in a river in Colorado in December, when he could be warm and dry?

"If the fish aren't biting," he said. "If they are biting, you have stuff to look forward to."

The health benefits of going afield

Q "I know there are numerous health benefits to hunting and fishing. Can you help me with this kind of information to help a friend?"

A The health benefits related to hunting can be divided into physical benefits and mental benefits.

The strenuous walking required for hunting big game or upland birds provides numerous fitness challenges such as aerobic conditioning, balance and flexibility training. Hunting also provides strength training when carrying hunting gear such as a firearm, a bag of decoys, or packing out game meat.

A recent comment from a local pheasant hunter complimented the department for releasing pheasants at the Niagara Wildlife Management Area. The hunter was convinced his regular exercise, which included hunting for pheasants on the WMA, in addition to his prescribed medication, was responsible for a dramatic decline in his cholesterol.

From personal experience, I always feel exhilarated after a good day of chukar hunting, even after being humbled by my lack of shooting prowess. A day of bow hunting also is filled with shooting rotten

stumps, further improving distance estimation and upper body strength and stamina.

A second and perhaps even more important health benefit from hunting is the tremendous mental benefit obtained from a day afield. Aside from the vitamin D obtained while in the sun, spending time hunting in Idaho with special hunting companions significantly improves one's mental well-being.

Those special hunting companions range from special people in your life to special animals such as a hunting dog or saddle horse or mule.

That primal inter-connectedness a hunter feels to nature is only surpassed by relationships established between grandparents, parents and grandchildren when hunting or fishing.

Now's the time to take a kid fishing!

Relief for this reader with no tears

DEAR DR. GOTT: I am in great pain with dry eyes at night. I am 90. I use a lot of eyedrops and have to use warm compresses to open my lids at night. Do you have any information you can share?

DEAR READER: Dry eyes are rather common as people age. The condition occurs when the normal tearing process fails to provide sufficient moisture for your eyes. The condition is known as keratoconjunctivitis sicca. Tears are a combination of electrolytes, water, fatty oils and proteins. In your case, an imbalance is occurring. Dry eyes can burn or sting. You might experience blurred vision that worsens as the day progresses, sensitivity to light and susceptibility to cigarette smoke or the wind

when you are outside.

Those people most likely to develop dry eyes are postmenopausal women, those with damage to the tear glands (perhaps from inflammation or radiation), those 50 and older, people who have had laser eye surgery, a history of diabetes, rheumatoid arthritis, Sjogren's syndrome, a thyroid disorder, a vitamin A deficiency and more.

Medications to include decongestants, antihistamines, pain relievers (such as over-the-counter ibuprofen or naproxen), blood-pressure remedies

and others can be the culprit. Beyond that, excessive demands on the eyes from computer work, dry air and wind can complicate or cause the problem.

You will have to determine what is causing the problem. For example, if you are on a medication with dry eyes as a potential side effect, a modification to another product or change in dosage might help. If an autoimmune disorder such as Sjogren's syndrome or rheumatoid arthritis is to blame, perhaps a visit to a rheumatologist might be in order. There are medications available such as antibiotics, those prescribed for corneal inflammation, eye inserts that act as artificial tears and more. You might consider adding omega-3-

rich fish such as salmon and tuna or omega-3 supplements to your regular diet. Research has indicated this could help.

Last but not least, avoid situations that worsen your situation. If, for example, you drive a car and have the heat blowing toward your face, divert the vent so you stay warm but don't have the direct exposure. If you walk frequently, wear eye protection such as glasses or goggles to keep the wind from striking your eyes. If the air in your home is dry, add a humidifier. And of course, avoid tobacco smoke. There's help for you. Get to the root of the problem, and take the necessary steps.

DEAR DR. GOTT: Now that the flu season is here, could you please print a

word about my pet peeve — clerks and cashiers who cough in your face when handling groceries or those that spit on their fingertips to ease opening plastic bags? Even young school children have learned to cough into their elbows.

DEAR READER: And the word is GROSS! Everyone is aware how easily germs are spread through telephone receivers, doorknobs, shopping-cart handles, TV remotes and droplet spray from a cough or sneeze. The interesting thing is that the very people who do the dastardly deed are those who complain when someone does it to them.

Your point is well-taken. We all need to practice a few good habits and manners. Courtesy and consideration of others is paramount.

Vatican: 1997 Irish abuse letter ‘misunderstood’

VATICAN CITY — In a new round of damage control, the Vatican insisted Wednesday that a 1997 letter warning Irish bishops against reporting priests suspected of sex abuse to police had been “deeply misunderstood.”

The Associated Press on Tuesday reported the contents of the letter, in which the Vatican’s top diplomat in Ireland told bishops that their policy of mandatory reporting such cases to

police “gives rise to serious reservations of both a moral and canonical nature.”

The newly revealed letter, obtained originally by Irish broadcaster RTE from an Irish bishop, has undermined persistent Vatican claims, particularly when seeking to defend itself in U.S. lawsuits, that Rome never told bishops not to cooperate with police.

An Irish government-ordered investigation into decades of abuse cover-ups in the Dublin Archdiocese concluded that Irish bishops

understood the letter to mean they shouldn’t report suspected crimes.

And victims groups say it’s a “smoking gun” that shows that the church enforced a worldwide culture of concealing crimes by pedophile priests of which Rome bears ultimate — and legal — responsibility.

“The letter confirms that the cover-up goes as far as the Vatican, that Vatican officials knew exactly what was going on, and that they proactively sought to deter Irish bishops from cooper-

ating with civil authorities in Ireland,” said Andrew Madden, a former Dublin altar boy who was raped repeatedly by a priest, Ivan Payne, in the 1980s.

“This letter also documents how the church remained of the view that it is a law unto itself, how its rules and regulations regarding the handling of a criminal offense take precedence over civil society’s laws,” said Madden, who in 1995 became the first victim in Ireland to go public with a lawsuit against the church.

Tunisia calms as government rejects old guard

TUNIS, Tunisia — Tunisia’s new government said Wednesday it has freed all the country’s political prisoners and also moved to track down assets stashed overseas by its deposed president and his widely disliked family.

Tensions on the streets appeared to be calming as the administration tried to show it was distancing itself from the old guard.

Hundreds of protesters led a rally in central Tunis demanding that former allies of deposed President Zine El Abidine Ben Ali stop clinging to power. Later, about 30 youths in the capital broke a curfew and set up camp near the heavily guarded Interior Ministry, bringing mats, food and water for an overnight sit-in. Police didn’t bother them.

In recent days, police had fired tear gas and clubbed protesters.

The U.N. said more than 100 people have died in the unrest that surrounded Ben Ali’s ouster.

He fled to Saudi Arabia

on Friday after 23 years in power, and a caretaker government is now struggling to calm this moderate Muslim nation on the Mediterranean Sea, popular among European tourists and seen as an ally in the West’s fight against terrorism.

Some 33 members of Ben Ali’s family have so far been taken into custody while trying to leave the country, as was the Senate president, national TV said.

Ben Ali’s longtime prime minister, Mohamed Ghannouchi, kept his post and is trying to convince Tunisians a new era has arrived — even if the composition of the interim government has many faces from the old guard.

Interim President Fouad Mebazaa went on television and promised to live up to the people’s revolt, which he called a “revolution.”

“Regarding security, you have certainly noticed that it has improved,” he said. “We have discovered the leaders of the chaos, and have stopped the gangs and those who put fear in the hearts of people. The situation is moving toward stability.”

But Duvalier, whose reasons for coming back to Haiti remain murky, stayed sequestered in his room at the upscale Hotel Karibe in the hills above downtown Port-au-Prince and spoke publicly only through his lawyers. Shortly after his arrival at Port-au-Prince’s airport, his longtime companion Veronique Roy told reporters he would stay for just three days.

Last Thursday, after the Minico boys basketball team played poorly but still beat winless Wood River 49-33, I entered the Spartans' locker room seeking interviews. The place was a quiet as a library and as somber as funeral. You would have thought Minico had lost by 16.

Some players sat with blank stares. Others threw items into their bags with frustration.

I could be wrong, and I'm no psychologist, but perhaps Minico needs to take a deep breath. Chill out. It's one bad game — if you can call a 16-point win a "bad" game.

With players on Hill, union leader goes to Roger Goodell

WASHINGTON (AP) — NFL Commissioner Roger Goodell and union executive director DeMaurice Smith spoke face-to-face in New York on Wednesday, while more than a dozen current or former players were on Capitol Hill for face time with lawmakers and congressional staffers.

Union spokesman George Atallah characterized Wednesday’s session between Goodell and Smith as “an effort to advance the bargaining,” rather than a formal negotiating session toward a new labor contract. Atallah would not discuss the substance of the meeting in any detail.

NFL spokesman Greg Aiello declined to comment via e-mail — and, indeed, would not even confirm that the two leaders were meeting.

The league and union acknowledged last week that they have not held a large-group bargaining session since November. The present collective bargaining agreement — it was agreed

to in 2006, but owners activated an opt-out clause — expires in early March, and the union expects owners to lock out the players.

At an owners’ meeting in Atlanta on Tuesday, Goodell complained that “there’s not enough communication” between the sides. Also in Atlanta, Jeff Pash, the league’s lead labor negotiator, took a swipe at the union by saying: “If our focus is going to be on litigating, on decertification, on meetings in Washington, on media events, it will be hard to get a deal done.”

The union has held team-by-team votes to approve decertification, which would allow the players to file an antitrust lawsuit against the league if there is a lockout. The union also has filed two claims with a special master — one accuses the league of improperly assuring itself of TV revenues even if there are no games played next season; the other accuses teams of



collusion in conspiring to restrict players’ salaries last off-season.

On Wednesday, 13 current NFL players and three former players headed to the Hill, trading in helmets, pads, uniforms and cleats for pin-striped suits, colorful ties and leather shoes.

“The players are aware that the antitrust exemptions exist as a gift from Congress. The players are aware that the NFL has non-profit status that’s been given as a gift from Congress. So, look, we’re not asking for anything. The players have been clear about that,” said Atallah, the union spokesman. “Every business in America, especially a \$9 billion industry, has a presence on the Hill. This is not negotiating through Congress. This is just players and employees sharing their issues with people that should care.”

Joe Briggs, the union’s counsel for public policy and government relations,

wanted to make clear: “We’re not asking for members of Congress to get involved in this fight at all.”

The union has made previous trips to the Capitol, bringing players around to offices for meet-and-greet sessions.

Arizona Cardinals running back Jason Wright sounded, well, just happy to be there.

Calling Wednesday’s visit to Congress “a neat little trip,” Wright explained: “We’re not here to accomplish anything; we’re here to meet people.”

Before players dropped by his office, Rep. Lamar Smith, a Texas Republican who is the chairman of the House Judiciary Committee, released a statement making it clear he doesn’t think lawmakers should get involved with the NFL labor talks.

“That is a business dispute,” the statement said. “The owners and players are both literally and figuratively big boys and do not need Congress to referee every dispute for them.”

Jets' Sanchez is a goofy, big-game quarterback

FLORHAM PARK, N.J. (AP) — Mark Sanchez strolled out of a restaurant and pulled a fast one on his future coach.

It was a moment, back in 2009, when Rex Ryan knew he needed the goofball kid with the golden arm from Southern California to lead the New York Jets.

Sanchez had just finished a pre-draft workout with the team and had dinner with Ryan, owner Woody Johnson and general manager Mike Tannenbaum, among others. Afterward, they walked to the parking lot together.

“My car’s on the far side of the restaurant and they’re walking to their car,” Sanchez recalled Wednesday. “Right next to their car is a motorcycle, so I said, ‘All right, I’ll see you guys later.’

Sanchez snatched the helmet off the bike and was about to hop on when he realized — by the stunned look on their faces — that he had them.

“I was just messing around,” Sanchez said with a huge grin. “I felt that comfortable with them.”

Ryan lives and leads by not taking himself too seriously. What better match than to pin his Super Bowl hopes on a quarterback who’s just like him.

For the second straight season, Ryan and Sanchez are a win away from their ultimate goal — the Super Bowl.

“A lot of times, a guy can think he’s a good competitor, but when you get on the biggest stage, not so much,” Ryan said. “He’s such a huge competitor, but the bigger the stage, the more he wants

to play.”

And, it’s where Sanchez has excelled. He doesn’t have the impressive career numbers of Tom Brady, Peyton Manning, Philip Rivers or Carson Palmer, but he has sent all four home in the playoffs the past two seasons.

What’s more, he’s already got one thing on Broadway Joe: Sanchez ranks first in Jets history with four career playoff victories — all on the road — and will have more postseason road wins than any other quarterback in NFL history if he can lead New York (13-5) to a win over Ben Roethlisberger and Pittsburgh (13-4) in the AFC championship game Sunday night.

“This is his time to shine,” Ryan said. “That’s just the way Mark is.”

Sure, he makes fans hold their breath at times, but he has already established himself as a winner with a confidence that belies his age — 24 — and limited time in the

NFL. More than just the playoff victories, Sanchez has shown he can win games late in regulation, in overtime or with the odds stacked against him.

“He’s a good quarterback in my eyes,” Steelers linebacker James Farrior said. “He does a great job of managing their football team and doesn’t do anything to lose the game. We definitely give him a lot of respect.”

He’s also a pretty popular guy, with advertising executives panting at the prospect of getting Sanchez to endorse their product. He has kept those to a minimum for now, but as one former Jets quarterback knows, if you win in New York, you’re a winner everywhere.

“Mark and I were both gifted with our quick feet and having the physical abilities to do things, but the mind comes into play so much,” Joe Namath said recently. “He’s wrestling with himself at times, like we all do, and he’s got a lot of

things going on in that head of his. But so far he’s handled things beautifully.

“I want to congratulate his father because Mark had some good leadership early on, boy,” Namath said. “You think it’s a gift, but I think it’s a skill that he’s honed and that he’s working on.”

Nick Sanchez, a former firefighter, still travels to all of his son’s games and watches from high in the upper decks of stadiums. Mom, Olga, taught him not to take anything for granted from the time he played Pop Warner football to Mission Viejo High School to USC. Sanchez’s older brothers, Nick Jr. and Brandon, always posed a challenge — at the dinner table, fighting for that last roll or on the basketball court, taking a hard charge.

“They’ve all taught me to be competitive and taught me to lead from an early age,” Sanchez said. “It just seems natural here.”

That’s how it’s been for Sanchez from the moment he came to the Jets. Ryan has often said he acknowledges that his legacy will be tied to Sanchez and how he performs. And, that suits both just fine.

“You’re the quarterback of a multimillion-dollar franchise,” Sanchez said. “You’re the face. You’re the guy, and you need to wear it and own it, and be it at all times. And that’s whether you’re at the podium or at home studying your plays, or whatever it is, or you’re out with the guys.”

Notes: CSI remained No. 12 in the NJCAA rankings, which boast a new No. 1 in undefeated Connors (Okla.) State College. The SWAC has three teams in the poll, including North Idaho College at No. 17.

Nadal breezes into 3rd round at Australia Open

MELBOURNE, Australia (AP) — Rafael Nadal extended his Grand Slam winning streak to 23 matches with a 6-2, 6-1, 6-1 win over American qualifier Ryan Sweeting to reach the third round of the Australian Open.

The top-ranked Nadal is aiming to be the first man since Rod Laver in 1969 to hold all four Grand Slam titles at the same time.

He’s conceded only four games en route to the third round, sealing his win over Sweeting today with another of his rifling forehands.

After retiring with an injury in the quarterfinals at the last Australian Open, Nadal rebounded to win the French, Wimbledon and U.S. Open.

Nadal hit some shots that Sweeting could barely believe, including an ace to finish the first set and forehand on set point in the second when the Spaniard’s curling shot caught the baseline for the winner.

“I feel good. Today the serve started to work much better,” Nadal said. “Only one (bad) moment, when the sun came in my eyes,” Nadal said. “It was a positive victory for me, an

important victory.”

Kim Clijsters showed why she’s fast becoming a hot favorite for the women’s title by beating Carla Suarez Navarro 6-1, 6-3.

“She is a tough player. She’s tricky. The balls bounce so much different than for my first round,” Clijsters said. “I was just happy with the way that I played. I tried to play both sides of the court, tried to be aggressive and dictate the points. And it worked.”

Joining Clijsters in the third round from the bottom half of the draw were No. 10 Shahar Peer, who beat

Sorana Cirstea 6-3, 6-2 and No. 22 Flavia Pennetta, who beat Lourdes Dominguez 6-2, 6-2.

Seventh-seeded Jelena Jankovic lost 7-6 (3), 6-3 to China’s Peng Shuai, continuing an unimpressive streak of seven losses in eight matches. It was former world No. 1 Jankovic’s worst result at a major since the 2009 U.S. Open.

While Clijsters has advanced with ease, Venus Williams has had a challenging time.

Williams injured a muscle between her stomach and groin Wednesday as she

twisted for a volley. She needed a medical timeout after losing the first set. She was on the verge of tears, and apparently elimination. But she refused to stop playing, something she has never done in a Grand Slam match.

The seven-time Grand Slam winner rallied to take the next two sets and defeat Sandra Zahlavova of the Czech Republic 6-7 (6), 6-0, 6-4.

Roger Federer faced a more familiar problem — Gilles Simon. He’s one of only three men on tour with a winning record against the Swiss great. Federer raced to a two-set lead in a second-round night match, and seemed in the clear. He had never while lost so far ahead in a Grand Slam tournament.

Then Simon, who beat Federer twice in 2008 on hard courts in their only two previous encounters, started to take more risks, moving the 16-time Grand Slam champion out of his comfort zone. But Federer persevered, finishing off a 6-2, 6-3, 4-6, 4-6, 6-3 victory on his fifth match point.

“I’m happy I survived a scare like today,” he said.

Said Staley: “He was smart. I made a mistake getting my elbows locked and that cost me the match.”

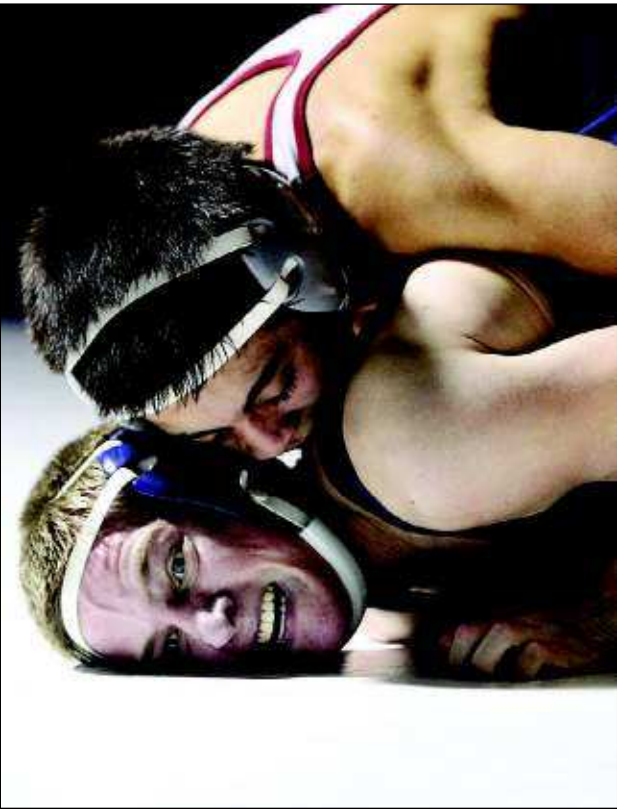

ORDINANCE NO. 535
AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF HEYBURN, IDAHO DECLARING AN EMERGENCY MORATORIUM FOR THE PERMITTING OF ABOVE-GROUND BULK FLAMMABLE LIQUID OR GAS STORAGE TANKS BASED ON FINDINGS, DECLARING AN EMERGENCY AND PROVIDING FOR EFFECTIVE DATE FROM AND AFTER ONLY ONE READING.
WHEREAS, there exists in the City of Heyburn locations where above-ground flammable liquid or gas tanks could be constructed, such as Blocks 49, 144, 145, 149, 150, 185, 186, 188, 189, 190, 198, 199, 205, 206, 207, 212 and 214 original Heyburn Townsite; and
WHEREAS, such locations could be too close to major highways, residences, schools and non-industrial uses and current law of separating such uses is inadequate to provide for the protection of the City; and
WHEREAS, the City Council, after due deliberation, has found that more restrictive provisions may be needed in the City's Zoning Code as to the location of such facilities, in the best interests of the City, its safety, well-being and protection and that an emergency moratorium on the permitting of such tanks is needed to protect the City;
NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BE THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HEYBURN AS FOLLOWS:
Section 1: Findings
1. The City Council finds that the current provisions in Zoning Code contained in Title 8, specifically in the Schedule of Official Schedule of Zoning Regulations contained in Heyburn Code Section 8-5-2 under "Trade and Wholesale" in the subsection "Bulk storage, flammable liquids and gases" are inadequate to deal with the safety concerns associated with such above-ground bulk storage tanks. Those concerns include:
A. The tanks can presently be located too closely to major highways, residences, schools and major traffic areas. A larger buffer area is most likely needed as well as more effective containment structures to contain potential spills. Study needs to be undertaken as to the minimum size required to be effective.
B. The provisions for containment structures as contained in the present codes are deemed inadequate and further study is needed.
2. The City Council hereby finds that to allow the present construction of any above-ground flammable liquid or gas bulk storage tanks is a potential danger to the City until more comprehensive investigation and further regulations are considered and implemented. For purposes of this ordinance, above-ground bulk storage tanks are those greater than 1,320 gallons in size. The construction of such tanks under current regulations constitutes an imminent peril to the public health, safety and welfare of the City.
3. Therefore, an emergency, as defined in Idaho Code Section 67-6523 exists and it is appropriate and in the best interests of the City that there be imposed a moratorium as to the construction of any above-ground bulk flammable liquid or gas storage tanks until appropriate investigation and study can be accomplished and a new or amended ordinance regarding same can be implemented, which ordinance will set new standards for the location and construction of such tanks, which will occur not later than 182 days from the effective date of this ordinance.

Section 3: MORATORIUM

1. There is hereby imposed a moratorium on the construction of above-ground bulk storage tanks for the storage of flammable liquids and gases.
2. During the said moratorium, no building permits or special use permits will be issued for the construction of such above-ground build storage tanks for flammable liquids and gases nor can such tanks be otherwise constructed.
3. This moratorium will be in effect for not more than 182 days from the effective date of this ordinance.
4. For good cause, the City Council can issue a permit for construction of bulk storage tanks for flammable liquids and gases where all safety concerns of the City have been met by the applicant.
Section 4: Effective date
The City Council having by authorizing motion and vote waived the rule of requiring three separate readings of this Ordinance, by title and in full, therefore this ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its first and only reading, passage, approval and publication.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF HEYBURN, MINIDOKA COUNTY, IDAHO, ANNEXING CERTAIN REAL PROPERTY NORTH OF 21ST STREET LOCATED GENERALLY BETWEEN “O” STREET AND MAC’S AVENUE, IN MINIDOKA COUNTY AND CONTIGUOUS TO THE CITY OF HEYBURN; AND DESIGNATING THE ZONING FOR SUCH LAND AS “CL” (COMMERCIAL LOCAL) AND “RM” (RESIDENTIAL MEDIUM) AND, PROVIDING FOR ADOPTION WITH ONLY ONE READING; AND PROVIDING FOR EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, the land described below, located North of 21st Street, generally located between “O” Street and Mac’s Avenue (the “Subject Property”), is contiguous to the City as set forth on the area map attached as Exhibit “A”; and

WHEREAS, Kim B. Christensen petitioned to have land owned by him annexed into the City which land comprises part of the Subject Property; and

WHEREAS, Lawrence Burch previously obtained a preliminary plat for the development of most of the balance of the Subject Property (in excess of 50% of the Subject Property) in order to develop the land for both residential and commercial purposes and Lawrence Burch appeared at the City Council hearing on March 10, 2010 and consented to the annexation; and

WHEREAS, the said Subject Property may likely be developed for residential and commercial uses in the future; and

WHEREAS, the owners of at least fifty percent of the such Subject Property have requested annexation and the City can proceed with the annexation as a “Category B” type of annexation as set forth in Idaho Code Section 50-222 (3) (b); and

WHEREAS, the City has determined that the most appropriate zoning district designations for the said Subject Property would be “CL” (Commercial Local) and “RM” (Residential Medium); and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the laws of the State of Idaho and the ordinances of the City, public hearings were held pursuant to public notice as follows: before the Heyburn Planning and Zoning Commission on January 11, 2010 at 7:00 P.M. and Commission reported its recommendations to the City Council at its March 10, 2010 regular meeting; and a public hearing was conducted before the Heyburn City Council on March 10, 2010 at 7:00 P.M.; and both bodies did invite and take public comment and received documents which were all admitted to the official record of the proceedings and were also duly reviewed; and

WHEREAS, the Planning and Zoning Commission, after due deliberation, recommended to the Council that such petition for annexation be granted and that the entire forty acres of the Subject Property be annexed and zoned as CG (“Commercial General”); and the City Council after due deliberation, agreed that the entire forty acre tract should be annexed and that such zoning designation is in the best interests of the City, its growth, economic development and is consistent with the City’s Comprehensive Plan; and

FURTHER, consistent with the foregoing, the City makes the following further findings and conclusions:

1. The Subject Property is contiguous to the City of Heyburn and is within the City’s Area of Impact.
2. The Subject property has been laid off in lots and blocks of less than five (5) acres as contemplated in Idaho Code Section 50-222 (5) (b) (ii).
3. The Subject property may be annexed pursuant to Idaho Code Section 50-222 (3) (b) as a “Category “B” since the Subject Property contains less than one hundred (100) separate private ownerships and platted lots of record and where landowners owning more than fifty percent (50%) of the area of the subject private lands have consented to annexation prior to the commencement of the annexation process.
4. The City has domestic water and sewer facilities adjacent to the Subject Property.
5. The property owner of the Subject Property has requested to be annexed into the City and has petitioned the City to be annexed.
6. Plan of annexation was published as required by Idaho Code Section 50-222 (5) (b) (iii).
7. The Subject Property is located on 21st Street and therefore as such the Subject Property has great potential for residential and commercial development.
8. The Subject Property can be served now or in the future by all of the City’s municipal utility services.
9. The City has adequate means to provide law enforcement as needed in the subject property.
10. The City’s current Comprehensive Plan encourages that the City’s economy should be enhanced with further commercial development and this annexation would aid in fulfilling that planning goal.
11. Annexation of the Subject Property at this time is in the best interests of the City so that the City can continue to plan and make further arrangements to provide municipal utilities and develop appropriate roads and other infrastructure to serve the Subject Property all in order to provide for orderly development of the Subject Property as an area of mixed residential and commercial uses.
12. The current use of the Subject Property is agricultural. The petitioner has requested that the land be zoned commercial. The City finds that CL (“Commercial Local”) is most appropriate use for the South four hundred feet of the property and the remainder should be designated “RM” (Residential Medium”).

Section 1: The following described land (the Subject Property) is hereby declared to be annexed to and incorporated into the City of Heyburn as a part of said City; and, the city limits of the City of Heyburn being enlarged to encompass such land within its borders:

The SE¼SE¼ of Section 9, Township 10 South, Range 23 East, Boise Meridian, Minidoka County.

Section 2: The said Subject Property should be and hereby is zoned as follows: The South FOUR HUNDRED FEET shall be and is designated “CL” (Commercial Local) and the balance of the property shall be and is designated “RM” (Residential Medium”). Such designation as to such land shall be deemed an amendment to the City’s Official Zoning Map.

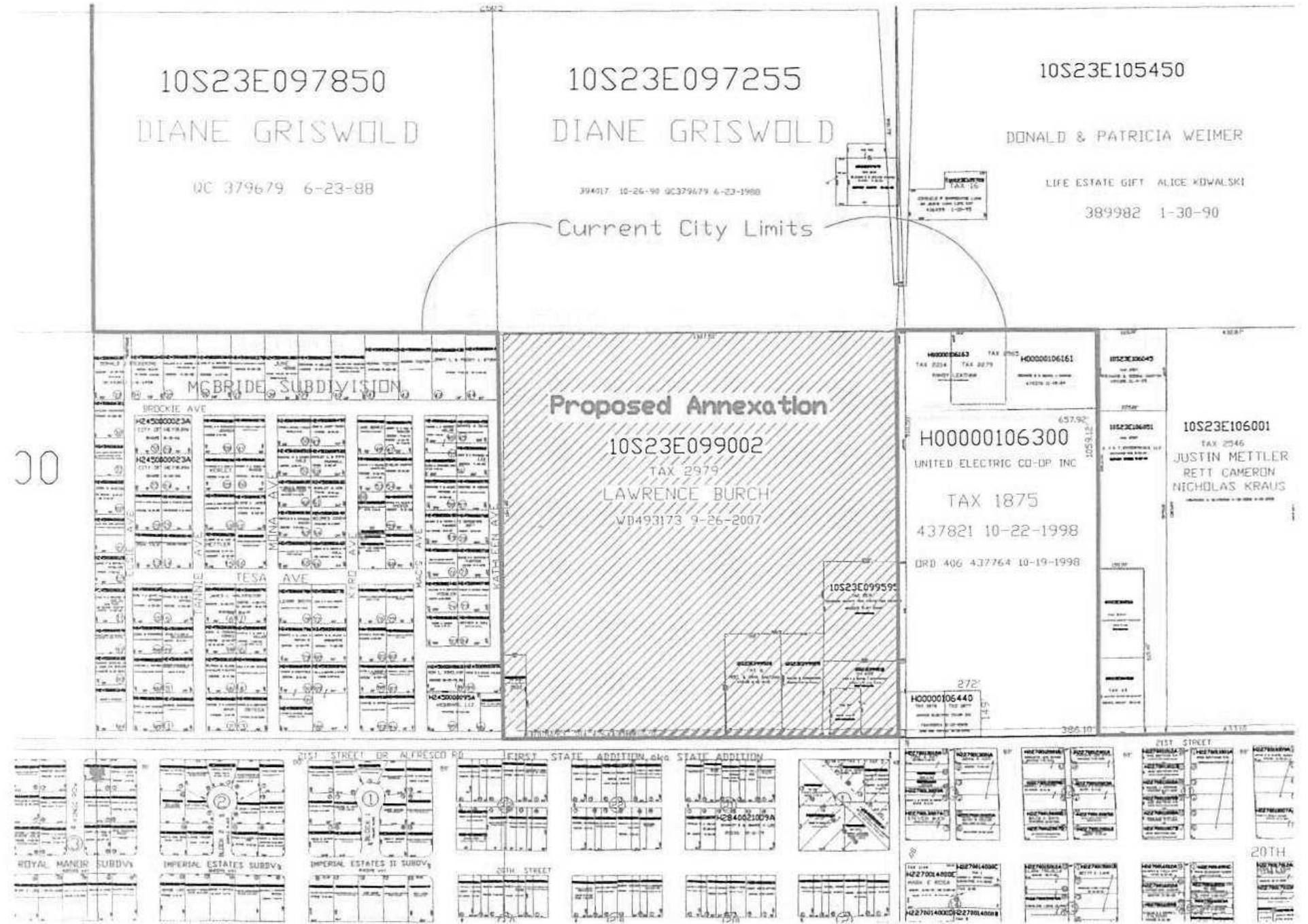

In 1942, Nazi officials held the notorious Wannsee conference, during which they arrived at their "final solution" that called for exterminating Jews.

In 2009, Barack Obama was sworn in as the nation's 44th, as well as first African-American, president.

Ten years ago: George Walker Bush became America's 43rd president after one of the most turbulent elections in U.S. history. Hundreds of thousands of protesting Filipinos forced President Joseph Estrada to step down; Vice President Gloria Macapagal-Arroyo was sworn in as the new president. 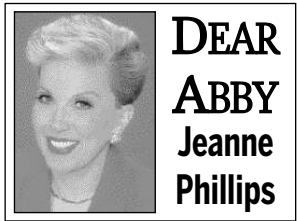

He's convinced that it adds little to our electric bill, but it bothers me that every single light is left burning. I realize there is a cost difference between incandescent and fluorescent lighting, but leaving all the lights on seems unnecessary and wasteful to me. Could you please "shed some light" on our argument?

DEAR LIT UP: According to the Renewable Energy Policy Project (REPP) in Washington, D.C., leaving a 100-watt incandescent bulb on for 12 hours a day for one month will add \$40 per year to your electric bill. Multiply that by the number of bulbs in your home and it can add up quickly.

Fluorescent bulbs use fewer watts than incandescent bulbs, but turning them on ages the filaments – so if they'll be turned on again within a minute or two, leave them on. (This is not a recommendation to leave fluorescent bulbs burning constantly, just a suggestion that if they won't be needed after a few minutes, to turn them off.)

LED bulbs are more expensive to buy, but they last longer, use less wattage and emit brighter light. However, when the illumination is no longer needed, they, too, should be extinguished.

P.S. Since your husband has money to burn, why not invest in motion sensors so he'll have light wherever he goes without inflating your energy bills?

In today's problem from last year's Bermuda tournament, imagine that the devil has tempted you to give up on sensible contracts such as heart part-scores, or even the relatively practical contract of three no-trump, where you would have nine fast winners if the defenders could not cash five tricks first. Consider the hand first as a single-dummy problem in four hearts by looking at just the North-South cards.

Obviously, the defenders could have meanly cashed two diamonds and shifted to a spade to leave declarer without a prayer. Fortunately, your inelegant auction has left them in the dark about your hand, so they lead a top diamond and shift to a trump. Make the most of your escape!

With nine top winners but no realistic chance of a squeeze, you need to take advantage of your club spots to generate an extra winner for your side. The best way to do that is to draw two rounds of trumps ending in dummy, then play a club to the 10.

While leading the king and running the 10 lets West cover from a three-card or two-card holding, thus needing another card well-located, the indicated line wins whenever East has honor-third or honor-doubleton in clubs, as well as when a defender has Q-J-x, without needing to guess what to play on the third round of the suit.
