Shoshone finds itself sitting on a glass goldmine

Collector's offer causes city to look anew at antique bottles in basement

SHOSHONE — Shoshone's City Council and library board are looking with fresh eyes at a treasure buried in the basement of their shared building.

Boxes of antique glass bottles from Sage Brush Tonic Co., defunct since 1910, are the shiny items at the center of this debate. A collector recently offered to buy the entire stock, which could number in the hundreds or more.

But sitting on a glass goldmine interests the city officials and library board members less than

preserving Shoshone's history for its citizens.

The council denied the collector's request and temporarily suspended sales of the bottles. That gives the library board time to address the idea that the property donated to them could have become collector's items.

Before the moratorium, the library used the bottles as a fundraiser, selling ones about 4 inches tall for \$2 and others about 7 1/2 inches tall for \$3. Library Director Pat Hamilton said that in her 23 years at the library, bottle sales have brought in a couple of thousand dollars.

The library board plans to write a letter to the council recommending a limit be set on the number of bottles that a single person can buy. The board is also looking into the possibility of a price change.

But for members of the council and the board, the value of the bottles is not measured in dollars, but in their connection to the community.

"Over the years, the library has become the person holding a lot of historical artifacts," Hamilton said. "We consider ourselves the custodians of that material, so it's not something we're going to chuck out the front door so we can raise money to buy one more best-seller."

Boehner, White House clash over budget cuts

WASHINGTON — Washington's two new power players — the speaker of the House and the White House chief of staff — differed in separate television interviews Sunday on how to best to deal with the rising government debt and proposed federal spending cuts, reflecting a realignment in the nation's capital and sharp political differences over a looming battle of the budget.

Speaker John A. Boehner urged the White House to join with Republicans in the next two weeks and agree to major cuts that will lower spending to 2008 levels. Without compromise, he said, the government will once again have to raise its debt limit.

"We want to reduce spending. Period," said the Ohio Republican, making his first appearance as House speaker on the Sunday TV talk shows with an interview on the Fox News Sunday program. President Barack Obama has "got to be willing to cut up the credit cards," he said.

William Daley, the new White House chief of staff, in his first Sunday television appearance, said on CBS's Face the Nation program that his past experience as a businessman tells him that government investments in private enterprise, along with spending cuts, are the best way to spark the economy.

"We all agree there must be cuts to this government," Daley said. With the U.S. debt climbing to record levels, he urged patience, noting that Obama's plan for a five-year freeze in spending would save \$400 billion.

Next month, the White House and House Republicans are scheduled to release separate budget proposals and the political posturing on Sunday suggests they will be vastly different. But the two sides must find some reconciliation soon, as the government is operating on a budget resolution that ends March 4.

Fate of Saylor Creek herd hinges on Jarbidge, BLM

Wild horses tend toward the open range, but sometimes they aren't allowed to stay there, stirring public debate of how best to remove them and where to put the displaced herds.

Wild horse advocates await the delayed Bureau of Land Management release of a possible change to how herds are managed. The BLM requested in June — and

was deluged by — public input to new management proposals Interior Secretary Ken Salazar brought forth in late 2009 to take control of an unsustainable program. They included establishing wild horse preserves to be populated with non-reproducing horses and using fertility control to avoid overpopulation.

With no change yet, herds are still managed according to rigid and sometimes expensive methods. The expense arises when

herds, like the Saylor Creek herd that roamed near Hagerman, are removed from the range.

The 190-head herd was rounded up and moved in August, after the Long Butte Fire destroyed its habitat.

Spokeswoman Jessica Gardetto said the BLM is keeping the horses in Boise corrals at a short-term, daily rate of around \$5.50 per horse while the Jarbidge Field Office finishes an environmental assessment of the herd area.

The BLM has paid around \$850 to stable each horse so far. That figure will increase as the herd will remain in Boise for at least a few more months.

Such costs and public argument over the confinement of wild horses are what drove Salazar's proposals.

Jarbidge Field Office manager Rick Vander Voet said the assessment should be finished in a few

For U.S., Egypt crisis recalls '79 Iran revolution

WASHINGTON — The mounting popular demand that Egypt's all-powerful ruler step aside has suddenly forced the United States to contemplate a Mideast without the guarantee of a bedrock Arab ally — and raised the specter of the

anti-American revolution in Iran a generation ago.

The spiraling turmoil in Egypt is confronting the Obama administration with its most acute foreign policy crisis to date, and officials are toeing a delicate line.

There are appeals to 82-year-old Egyptian President Hosni Mubarak for restraint and reform alongside signals to the protesters that the United States understands their frustration and supports at least some of their goals. In equal measure, the Obama administration is trying to avoid unintentionally aiding a militant Islamic takeover if Mubarak falls.

President Barack Obama called the leaders of Israel, Turkey and other nations worried about what

comes next in Egypt, the most powerful Arab guarantor of Israel's security for more than 30 years.

"The president reiterated his focus on opposing violence and calling for restraint; supporting universal rights, including the right to peaceful assembly, association, and speech; and supporting an orderly transition to a government that is responsive to the

aspirations of the Egyptian people," according to a White House statement describing the calls.

Secretary of State Hillary Rodham Clinton used similar language Sunday about an "orderly transition" to a responsive government. It's the closest Washington has come to hinting that Mubarak may be through.

The cautious U.S. holding pattern over the past several days underscores deep concerns that developments in Egypt will reverberate throughout the Arab and Muslim world from Morocco to Malaysia.

In the immediate area, Iran, Iraq, Lebanon, Saudi Arabia, Syria, Pakistan and Afghanistan, not to mention Israel, are all watching closely for missteps in Egypt, which could portend profound and lasting consequences for U.S. policy in the Mideast.

Fueled by a popular uprising that brought down the autocratic leader of Tunisia but has yet to cause wider alarm, the simmering anti-Mubarak sentiment in Egypt has boiled into a rebellion that might undermine the foundation of the Mideast's fragile stability, the 1979 Egyptian-Israeli peace accord.

But even without such a worst-case scenario, the ripple effects from a radicalized or even destabilized Egypt would be wide. From its control of the Suez Canal to its leading role in trying

to calm tensions between rival Palestinian factions and rein in smuggling to Hamas militants in the Gaza Strip, Egypt has been a key U.S. strategic partner.

The collapse of such an ally would likely embolden U.S. foes around the world, including Islamic extremists in the Persian Gulf, North Africa, Central Asia, South Asia and Southeast Asia, many of whom are fighting secular authority.

As street protests and violence escalated in Cairo and other Egyptian cities on Sunday, Clinton took to the airwaves to appeal for Mubarak to finally heed decades of calls from successive U.S. administrations to open up political and economic space for his people. Dialogue and steps to ensure upcoming elections are credible are critical, she said.

But Clinton, as Obama has also done, stopped short of demanding the departure of Mubarak, a friendly but flawed leader whose government has benefited from tens of billions of dollars in U.S. largesse over the past three decades in spite of his refusal to date to adopt reform.

The U.S. wants "real democracy" in Egypt, Clinton said, "not a democracy for six months or a year and then evolving into essentially a military dictatorship or a so-called democracy that then leads to what we saw in Iran."

address the debt limit," he said. "The American people do not want us increasing the debt limit without significant cuts in spending. ... All he called for is more stimulus spending."

Daley also urged less political rhetoric and more compromise.

"No one wants the government to go into default," he said. "We've seen governments around the world go into default. And considering we are just beginning to come out of this great recession ... trying to use the debt ceiling as some sort of threat or leverage will run the possibility of spooking the markets. And the American people should be quite concerned about that."

Daley said "it will take a tremendous amount" of work to reduce deficits. "We've got to work our way" out, he said. "We got in this hole over many years."

weeks. He may fast-track the report, sending it straight to final comment so the report won't delay the herd's return.

At the time of the gather, spokeswoman Heather Tiel-Nelson said the BLM was considering returning fewer horses and possibly gelding stallions.

No horse in Boise is up for adoption and none have received birth control, but that may change depending on the Jarbidge assessment or the direction of any new herd management strategy.

As the herd awaits its fate, groups have been trying to expand on Salazar's proposals to provide alternatives to avoid any future trips to BLM corrals.

Recent publicity of horse injury and deaths during gathers has prompted more newcomers to push for action, only to learn that federal agencies are constrained by law from acting quickly.

The Saving America's Mustangs Foundation, headed by Madeleine Pickens, has courted the BLM for two years with various incarnations of a wild horse sanctuary. In her recent proposal following the purchase of a 14,000-acre northern Nevada ranch, Pickens offered to take in up to

10,000 horses at an annual cost to the BLM of \$500 per horse. She also intended to use BLM grazing permits.

The proposal, submitted in October, was partly intended to postpone a BLM gather of the Antelope wild horse herd in Nevada this month. BLM spokesman Tom Gorey said the gather "wasn't germane," as a driving factor and Pickens' prospectus was too vague to allow for BLM approval.

"We're still willing to work with her and we didn't reject the proposal outright," Gorey said. "What we're saying is the proposal is unacceptable in its current form."

Neda DeMayo, founder of Return to Freedom and a 12-year veteran when it comes to dealing with the BLM, knows how long it can take before the BLM accepts an idea. She pushed several years for the agency's adoption of PZP, a natural contraceptive.

She also organized the American Wild Horse Preservation Campaign, a coalition of close to 50 groups, which welcomes Pickens' efforts.

"Madeleine (Pickens) is still pretty new to this but she's evolving," DeMayo said.

Adoption is another part of the BLM's management that is problematic, DeMayo

said, because many owners can't handle wild mustangs. So most sanctuaries are for the horses the BLM doesn't keep.

DeMayo said her group adopted 250 horses from the ill-fated Calico herd in California and is in the process of buying 10,000 acres for a sanctuary to keep more.

"Pickens' plan is different because she's talking about providing long-term storage of BLM horses," DeMayo said. "It's a different part of the problem but we support her ideas."

In Idaho, Doro Lohmann, founder of Silent Voices Equine Rescue in Bellevue, said her group has been raising money for its own sanctuary and hopes to have land by the end of the year.

Last year, Silent Voices took in 21 wild horses from the Challis gather in central Idaho that were slated for adoption rather than have them moved to BLM corrals. Twelve are still up for adoption but the group hopes to keep them. Eleven horses were pregnant so the herd has swelled to 31.

"The BLM has been good working with us but we've worked to create a relationship with them," Lohmann said. "We can't work from the outside; we have to get

inside if we want to change the way they're doing things."

Lohmann has also offered the help of local private horsemen rather than using helicopters during gathers. It would be cheaper for the BLM and easier on the horses, Lohmann said.

Depending on the final version of the Jarbidge Resource Management Plan, the BLM may have the first of its own sanctuaries.

The draft of that plan, which would guide management of 1.4 million acres of public land for up to two decades, lists a range of possibilities for herd management.

At one extreme, the BLM would eliminate the herd, managing the area for commercial development.

At the other end is an option for managing a herd of 500 non-reproducing horses, where females receive annual birth control.

"It would basically turn the Saylor Creek area into a sanctuary, where we add horses when others die," Vander Voet said.

However, this won't happen any faster than any other BLM action. With more than 2,000 comments to process, many months will pass before the final RMP is published.

Hamilton said the library raises more funds from the sale of used books than from the sale of antique bottles.

The clear bottles, which turn purple under the sun or other ultraviolet lights, were donated by Sid Smith, owner of Sage Brush Tonic Co. and, at one point, the building that is now City Hall.

City Clerk Mary Kay Bennett was born and raised in Lincoln County. She has memories of the bottles from growing up in Shoshone.

"My dad and Dr. Near used to take them under the X-ray machine and turn them purple," she said.

Bennett's children are the fourth generation to live in Shoshone and also encountered the bottles.

"My kids were given one of these bottles with a gold-en stopper in it when our church turned 100 because they're fourth-generation Episcopalians," she said.

The bottles held a tonic of sagebrush and alcohol concocted to cure baldness. (The library has the recipe.)

Bennett is not the only one with first-hand memories of the bottles, some of which have gone to the Smithsonian Institution in Washington, D.C., and have

survived a fire in Shoshone. City Maintenance Supervisor Aaron Aggeler found one digging once and Mayor J.R. Churchman also owned some at one point, though he said now one of his grown children has them.

"I got my corked ones out of Sid's yard," Churchman said. "He lined his flower bed or driveway with them."

For people wanting to get their hands on some bottles but can't wait for the library board's decision, Sage Brush Hair Tonic glass does pop up in other places — but for a price.

"I know that there were some at the last Arts in the Park," Bennett said. "They were very dark purple, but they were very expensive."

Twin Falls man blamed for bicycle thefts in Ketchum

A rash of bicycle thefts in Ketchum is being pinned on 32-year-old Dean Earl Smith of Twin Falls.

Smith was arraigned on two counts of grand theft and two counts of petit theft Friday in Twin Falls County 5th District Magistrate Court. He was held on \$10,000 bond and faces a Feb. 4 preliminary hearing.

According to the police report, Twin Falls and Ketchum police worked together to track at least eight stolen bicycles, owned by multiple parties, in late 2010. Although eight bikes were mentioned in the police report, Smith is charged with stealing only four, which were valued at \$11,800.

Smith and an alleged accomplice, who has not been charged with a crime, allegedly stole the bikes for the purpose of re-selling them at pawn shops or bicycle specialty shops in Twin Falls. Some bikes were listed and sold through Craigslist.com.

Although the thefts took place in Blaine County, Twin Falls County will prosecute Smith.

Filer woman accused of lottery fraud

A convenience store clerk is didn't scratch a million-dollar ticket, but is heading toward felony prosecution nonetheless.

Debra Lou Nelson, 53, of Filer, was arraigned in Twin Falls County 5th District Magistrate Court Friday for felony lottery fraud. She is accused of taking Idaho State Lottery scratch tickets without paying and redeeming the winning tickets during her shifts at a Twin Falls convenience store.

Authorities with the Idaho State Lottery Enforcement Division investigated Nelson starting in August. Lt. Timothy Vincent, a detective with the agency, claimed he observed store surveillance video showing Nelson removing tickets without paying and cashing out winning tickets on Aug. 15.

A preliminary hearing is set for Feb. 4.

Oversized loads to start rolling Tuesday

MISSOULA, Mont. (AP) — ConocoPhillips will start moving its first load of oversized oil-refinery equipment across northern Idaho and into Montana starting Tuesday, said a spokesman for the oil company.

Bill Stephens said the first of four large loads starting from the port of Lewiston will take four days to cross Idaho on a winding and scenic stretch of U.S. Highway 12 on its way to a refinery in Billings, Mont. The shipment follows months of legal challenges over the Idaho Transportation Department's initial decision to permit the oversized loads and approval of the travel plan.

Earlier this month, Idaho Transportation Director Brian Ness agreed to issue travel permits allowing

ConocoPhillips to start moving the huge loads.

Stephens told the Missoulian newspaper that first load will be joined by a second near Lolo Pass, and the two loads will start a 14-day trip across Montana, beginning Feb. 10 and covering 172 miles from start to finish.

The big rigs are authorized to travel from 10 p.m. to 5:30 a.m. in Idaho, and midnight to 6 a.m. in Montana. They would be parked at roadside turnouts during the day, and likely some nights as well.

In Montana, traffic can be delayed for no more than 10 minutes. In Idaho, delays of up to 15 minutes are allowed.

"They agree that safety's more important than the day you move it," said Jim Lynch, director of the Montana

Department of Transportation, referring to the company. "We're interested not only in the safety of the rigs that are moving down the roadway, but what are the conditions for the motorists that are traveling on the roadway? We want to make sure that we're not creating an unsafe environment for them as well."

The transporters have 24 axles and 96 wheels, carrying the huge loads that weight about 300 tons each. The trucks are 29 feet wide, 28 feet high, and 226 feet long.

Officials said each load will be accompanied by about 30 workers, ranging from law enforcement to flaggers and civilian escorts. On tight corners, workers will walk on the roadway and manipulate dollies that support beams on which the refinery equipment sits.

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3 Idahoans die in Ore. plane crash

BOISE (AP) — Three people from southwest Idaho have died in a small plane crash in eastern Oregon, the Malheur County Sheriff's Department said Sunday.

Wreckage of the single engine Cessna 182 was found about 10 a.m. Sunday morning on the side of a high hill near Adrian, Undersheriff

Brian Wolfe said.

The two men and one woman in the plane were returning from a funeral in Portland, Ore., Wolfe said. The plane left Portland on Saturday, stopped in Ontario, Ore., for fuel, and took off about 8 p.m., he said. The plane was reported overdue when it failed to arrive in Nampa, Idaho, later that day.

Wolfe said there were no distress calls.

The three people on the plane are from the Boise area, Wolfe said. Their names have not been released.

The National Transportation Safety Board and the Federal Aviation Administration are investigating the crash, Wolfe said.

NFC storms to big lead, takes Pro Bowl 55-41

HONOLULU — MVP DeAngelo Hall had one of his team's five interceptions and returned a fumble 34 yards for a touchdown to help the NFC match a Pro Bowl scoring record in a 55-41 victory over turnover-prone AFC in a game that was not nearly as interesting as the final would indicate.

AFC quarterbacks Philip Rivers, Peyton Manning and Matt Cassel each threw first-half interceptions to help the NFC blow open a 42-0 lead in a performance ugly even by the historically low standards

of this game.

Fittingly for this strange contest, center Alex Mack of Cleveland scored the final touchdown on a 67-yard pass play that featured two laterals with 16 seconds left.

Carolina's Jon Beason returned the fifth interception thrown by the AFC, and second by Matt Cassel, 59 yards for the NFC's final touchdown to match the single-team scoring record set in the NFC's 55-52 victory in 2004.

New England coach Bill Belichick, after his Super Bowl favorite Patriots lost to the New York Jets in the divisional playoffs, had to watch his AFC squad muddle through

the one-sided first half.

Pro Bowls are, by their nature, laid-back affairs, seemingly played at half speed by players whose biggest concern is to get on the plane home without injury.

The AFC, though, took that attitude to an uncomfortable extreme early on before coming back to outscore the NFC 41-13.

The NFC led 42-0 after Steven Jackson waltzed through the AFC defense for a 21-yard touchdown — and there still was 4½ minutes left in the second quarter.

Rivers, starting in place of injured Tom Brady, was

picked off twice in the first quarter, the second by Hall.

Manning, in his 11th Pro Bowl, came on briefly in relief and his second pass was picked off. Then Cassel got his chance and quickly joined in the spirit of things, throwing his second pass of the game directly into the hands of Minnesota cornerback Antoine Winfield.

Eagles quarterback Michael Vick started but played only the first quarter, completing 5 of 10 passes for 59 yards.

Adrian Peterson rushed for 80 yards in 14 carries for the NFC, including a 14-yarder to set a Pro Bowl record with four career rushing touchdowns.

Djokovic wins second major title

MELBOURNE, Australia — Novak Djokovic gave his old friend Andy Murray a sympathetic hug and a few consoling words, then got on with the real celebrations.

Djokovic walked to the middle of the court, tossed his racket into the crowd, then stripped off his shirt and shoes and hurled them, too.

The 23-year-old Serb had plenty to celebrate after his 6-4, 6-2, 6-3 win over Murray in the Australian Open final on Sunday night. Djokovic's second Australian title made him only the fourth active player on the men's tour to win multiple majors.

Rafael Nadal and Roger Federer have had a lock on

St. John's stuns No. 3 Duke, 93-78

NEW YORK — Teams that beat Duke have reason to celebrate. Teams that blow Duke out of the building should be able to party all night.

So, how long will the St. John's players be allowed to celebrate Sunday's 93-78 victory over No. 3 Duke — a game that wasn't as close as the final score indicated?

“Coach Lav said we had two hours to celebrate and then we have to get ready for Rutgers,” senior forward Justin Burrell said, referring to first-year coach Steve Lavin and the Red Storm's next opponent on Wednesday.

Two hours? It will take longer than that just to go over the highlight plays of a game that St. John's had won by halftime. Those last 20 minutes were just a formality.

“I felt like we were ready. The guys wanted to play this

game,” Duke guard Nolan Smith said. “We wanted to be here but they came out from the jump ball and kicked our butts.”

It wasn't that St. John's (12-8) beat the Blue Devils (19-2), it was the way it happened.

St. John's was finishing a stretch of eight straight games against ranked teams. This win gave them three wins in that span. It was enough to have Lavin waving his arms to the crowd at a media timeout in the second half.

“You're caught up in the moment of the game and I wanted St. John's fans to come to the party in terms of supporting the players on the court,” Lavin said. “We had this arduous stretch of games and having lost five of six, at that moment it was just wanting to jumper cable the crowd and bring energy for our players because they

deserved a pat on the back and some appreciation for the yeoman's effort and the cohesive brand of basketball they had been playing against the defending national champion.”

The Red Storm, who had lost three straight and five of six, took control early and had a 46-25 lead at halftime. Duke, which came into the game shooting 40 percent from 3-point range, missed its first 10 shots from behind the arc and made one of 13 in the half.

The Blue Devils' overall shooting wasn't a whole lot better as they shot 29.6 percent (8 of 27) in the half — they entered the game shooting 48.1 percent from the field — and they were careless with the ball as well, committing 11 turnovers, one off their season average for a game.

St. John's had a lot to do with how poorly Duke

played, using a three-quarter court trap to force the Blue Devils into low percentage passes that almost all seemed to either be stolen by St. John's or just thrown away.

“It's not an Xs and Os thing today,” Duke coach Mike Krzyzewski said. “I felt we were not ready to compete, we had blank expressions on our faces and guys weren't talking and that's my responsibility. Our program didn't do well today and that is all our responsibilities.”

There was plenty of praise to go around for the Red Storm, who gave the Big East a 6-1 record against teams ranked in the top 10 this season. They were 16 of 28 from the field (57.1 percent) in the first half, well above the 45.2 percent the Red Storm were shooting coming into the game.

“Certainly this will give me a lot of motivation for the continuation of the season, because to win a Grand Slam at the start of the season is the best start you can ask for,” he said. “It means a world to me. I’m still 23. I still have a lot of time to go.”

Top-ranked Nadal came to Australia aiming to win a fourth consecutive major and complete a “Rafa Slam.” He lost in the quarterfinals. Federer came in as the defending champion and lost to Djokovic in the semifinals.

The loss for fifth-seeded Murray continued his horrible stretch in Grand Slam finals — he hasn't won a set in three tries, including losses to Federer last year in Australia and at the 2009 U.S. Open. It also extended the long drought for British men at the majors that dates back to Fred Perry's titles in 1936.

Djokovic and Murray have been friends since they started playing each other at age 11 or 12, and often practice against each other. They're even talking about playing doubles together.

“I understand how he feels. It's his third final and he didn't get the title,” Djokovic said. “As I said on court, I really have big

respect for him and his game, because I think he has everything that it takes to become a Grand Slam champion.”

He thinks the pressure on Murray to break the British drought may weigh the Scotsman down.

“It is in some ways a mental issue when you are facing a situation, playing the finals of a Grand Slam, being so close to winning a title,” Djokovic said. “Every time you get it there, you know, you want to win it badly, but some things go wrong.”

“You're thinking too much. You're worrying too much in your head,” he added. “It's a mental battle, definitely. Bottom line is that this is a very mental sport in the end.”

That's why he took his time to reflect after winning a 38-hit rally in the 10th game with a brilliant backhand that forced an error to set up set point on Murray's serve. He closed his eyes tightly, clenched his fists and let out a scream of a satisfaction.

“Maybe there was a turning point in the whole match, that 5-4 game,” Djokovic said. “I was a bit fortunate, kind of anticipated well and read his intentions and played some great shots and great moments.”

This is what we've been waiting for throughout the season,” said Goedhart. “I've been telling the girls all throughout that we're ignoring our win-loss record, we're ignoring the scoreboard at times and just focusing on putting it all together at the right time and I think we're doing that.”

So throw the regular season out the window. It's tournament time.

“Since I was hired here, from day one, we've preached the importance of the district tournament. We told the team we could go 0-19, but it doesn't matter when we get to the district tournament. It's a clean slate. Everyone starts 0-0,” Ketterling said.

A committee of one: Speaker exiles sales tax bill

If you wonder what’s wrong with the Idaho Legislature, Speaker of the House Lawrence Denney, R-Midvale, provided a vivid example on Thursday. The speaker put the brakes on Idaho’s efforts to tax Internet sales, sponsored by Rep. Leon Smith, R-Twin Falls. Legislation to join the nationwide push had been introduced Wednesday in the House Revenue and Taxation Committee. The vote margin was a relatively comfortable 12-6 — especially considering virtually identical bills have died in the House for the last four years.

Our view: Eighty-seven hundred Idahoans voted for Speaker of the House Lawrence Denney, R-Midvale, in last fall’s election out of 459,000 votes cast statewide. So how come Denney — and Denney only — gets to decide the fate of legislation with widespread legislative support?

But Denney has redirected the bill to the House Ways and Means Committee. This panel rarely meets, and can be used to rapidly scuttle bills that have fallen out of favor with leadership. It’s possible the Internet tax measure could languish there for the rest of the session. Denney, no fan of any taxes, told The Associated Press on Thursday he took this extraordinary step because he wanted to examine what had changed in the debate over taxing Internet sales to merit reconsideration again this year. Gosh, we thought the other 69 members of the House were supposed to have a say in that. Denney, who has killed financial disclosure legislation and a bill regulating the emerging swine and poultry industries, was way out of line on Smith’s bill. This issue has been perhaps the most exhaustively debated in the Legislature over the past several years.

The legislation would join Idaho with the Streamlined Sales and Use Tax Agreement, a 24-state consortium that works with online retailers and vendors across the nation. Smith said Idaho loses an estimated \$35 million each year by failing to collect sales tax on purchases Idahoans make with companies that lack a physical presence in the Gem State. Smith said changes are needed to eliminate an unfair advantage out-of-state businesses hold over local companies that charge state sales tax. The bill wouldn’t initiate any new tax collections on online purchases. Instead, the legislation would be more of a starting point, Smith said. “This is strictly a fact-finding operation to send someone there,” he said. “... It’s only information for us to process so we know whether or not we want to participate in this.” If the bill becomes law, the Idaho Tax Commission could then send a representative to several annual meetings with the consortium. From there, the state would find out what future legislative changes are needed to conform with the consortium’s software that collects the sales taxes — and decide whether to proceed. In short, this legislation might eventually protect Idaho businesses that play by the rules from out-of-state, online competitors that don’t. It’s a travesty that Denney has spiked the bill.

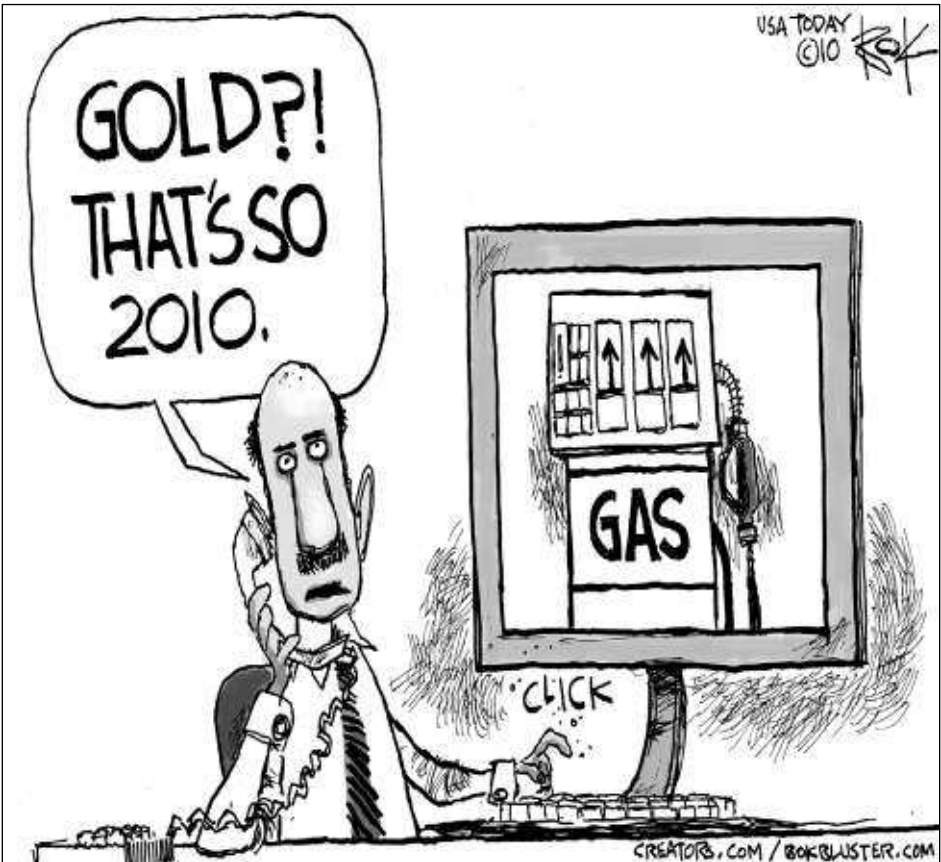
Oil incentives that might actually work? Dream on

Allow me to engage in a little hydrocarbon whimsy: If we had an energy policy, we might create a tax structure that would protect small domestic producers, encourage new production in the U.S. and stop giving tax breaks to the big oil companies that don’t need them. Of course, we don’t have an energy policy, and never have, so instead we give tax breaks to those who shout the loudest while they pursue richer reservoirs overseas.

Earlier this month, the American Petroleum Institute, the mouthpiece of Big Oil, stepped up its lobbying of Congress to maintain tax breaks that the White House wants to eliminate. The API is worried that a penny-pinching mind set among new lawmakers will make the industry a target for the deficit hawks. In a speech in Washington, API President Jack Gerard argued that the move would increase drilling costs and ultimately reduce federal revenue because of lower production. The White House has proposed cutting an array of tax breaks, including those for intangible drilling costs, such as rig repairs and moving equipment, and preventing oil companies from taking the domestic manufacturing deduction that reduces their taxable income. That, according to the study the API commissioned, would generate an additional \$3 billion in federal revenue annually, on average, through 2015, although by 2020 it would begin to result in lower production revenue. If the government wants to boost tax revenue to fight the budget deficit, the API argues, it should open federal areas in places like the

East Coast, the western Gulf of Mexico and parts of Alaska to new drilling. Many of these areas were briefly opened in March, then quickly closed again by President Barack Obama after the Deepwater Horizon disaster in April. API’s job, of course, is to fight for as many oil industry favors as it can, and it isn’t about to let the long-standing tax breaks go without a fight. However, it’s time to rethink incentives for the industry. Big oil companies, after all, enjoy some distinct benefits of drilling in the U.S. For example, they get to book all the reserves. They aren’t required to enter into joint ventures with the government and they get to keep any benefits from rising prices, which isn’t the case in drilling hot spots such as Nigeria or Angola. In other words, drilling here is better than most

other parts of the world. Yet Big Oil persists in seeking its fortunes elsewhere. The large fields needed to make their production economical are now mostly in other parts of the world, and the tax breaks have done little to keep these companies drilling here. In its annual survey of drilling expenditures, Barclays Capital found that energy companies expect to increase spending on exploration and production by almost 11 percent this year, to almost \$490 billion from \$442 billion. International spending accounts for much of that growth, outpacing the spending planned in the U.S. even with the recent boom in shale gas development. Eliminating the tax breaks won’t fall hardest on API’s most prominent members, but on smaller players — companies that operate marginally produc-

ing domestic fields, for example. It makes sense to maintain tax breaks for such production, because we want companies to continue squeezing as much oil as possible from our old fields. The API, meanwhile, is right about the benefits of expanding areas for new drilling. The increased production that’s likely to follow would boost royalty and fee revenue by \$150 billion through 2025, according to its study. That new production also would reduce, slightly, our foreign energy imports and maybe, just maybe, remind consumers that our insatiable thirst for energy can’t remain hidden from our shores forever. That, of course, is probably just another fit of energy policy whimsy.

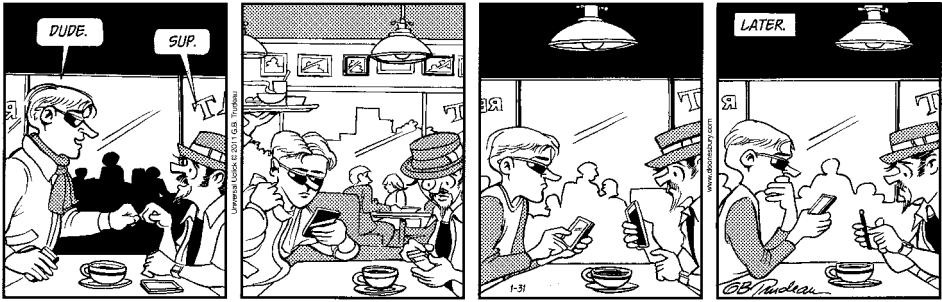
ISP needs to work for citizens of Idaho not global corporations

According to the Magic Valley *Times-News*, Jerry Russell, chief of the Idaho State Police, recently told members of the Idaho Legislature’s Joint Finance-Appropriations Committee that ISP currently has 33 vacancies, including nine vacant positions due to budget cuts and seven officers on military leave. He further stated this situation results in greater overtime costs “because somebody has to respond out there when there’s that call for service, that fatal accident takes place or whatever.” And yet in north-central Idaho, the public is repeat-

edly told by the head of the local ISP unit that the more than 10,000 hours of officer overtime required in 2011 to escort ExxonMobil’s 207 megatons transports from the Port of Lewiston to Lolo Pass should not pose any safety concerns. The public is asked to believe that having six uniformed officers on megatons escort duty for eight or more hours on 207 nearly consecutive nights and hence unavailable for the kind of response to emergencies Jerry Russell described should be of no concern to the public. 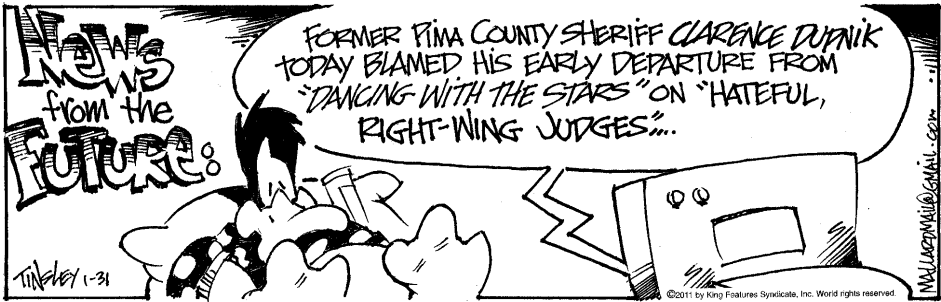

Ivy League case tests New York drug law change

NEW YORK — They were students who juggled an elite education with criminal extracurriculars, dealing an array of drugs from Ivy League dorm rooms and frat houses, prosecutors say.

But beneath the surface of academic success, some of the Columbia University students charged in a campus drug takedown struggled with substance abuse, their lawyers say. Attorneys for two of the five students plan to ask a court to prescribe treatment instead of prison — one of the most high-profile tests so far of a recent overhaul of New York’s once-notoriously stringent drug laws.

The outcome will be watched closely by opponents and proponents of 2009 changes to mitigate what were known as the Rockefeller drug laws. Backers called the lesser punishments a more effective and humane approach to drug crime; critics said they gave drug peddlers a pass.

With the bid for what’s known as “diversion” to treatment, the Columbia bust “is probably the case

that’s going to cause light to be shed on what these new laws mean: When diversion is appropriate, and what the Legislature intended when it cut back so drastically the Rockefeller laws,” said Marc Agnifilo, who represents one of the students, Christopher Coles.

Coles and fellow students Harrison David, Adam Klein, Jose Perez and Michael Wymbs were arrested in December, have pleaded not guilty and are due back in court in March. Authorities called the arrests one of the largest drug take-downs at a New York City college in recent memory, and the prestigious setting made the case a media magnet.

Each student made some of the 31 sales in which an undercover officer bought about \$11,000 worth of marijuana, cocaine, LSD, Ecstasy and prescription stimulants over five months, authorities said. Drugs, paraphernalia and more than \$6,600 in cash were found in the students’ rooms, according to the office of special narcotics prosecutor Bridget Brennan.

Prosecutors have indicated they’re likely to add to the charges, but at least for now,

only David faces mandatory prison time if convicted.

In 1973, Nelson Rockefeller, governor at the time, pushed strict laws through the Legislature that he said were needed to fight a drug-related “reign of ter-

ror.” Critics long complained the laws were draconian and racist and filled prisons with people who needed treatment, not incarceration.

The 2009 revisions took away some mandatory min-

imum terms — after the harshest terms were eliminated in 2004 — and let hundreds of nonviolent drug offenders seek to shorten their sentences. The latest changes also gave judges more latitude to send nonviolent offenders to treatment programs or other alternatives to prison, on the premise that addressing addictions would do more to change some offenders’ criminal behavior than would locking them up.

Coles and Wymbs hope a judge will use that discretion to channel their cases to a special drug court, their lawyers said. Drug court defendants generally undergo a year or more of treatment and may end up with their charges dismissed or reduced to misdemeanors.

To their lawyers, Coles and Wymbs are ideal candidates to illustrate the drug law reform’s rehabilitation-minded message.

Coles, 20, is charged with selling marijuana and pairing in some amphetamine sales with Perez. An anthropology and political science major involved in a campus effort to combat sexual violence, Coles told police he sold drugs to pay tuition, prosecutors said.

But Coles’ lawyer said the student was in the throes of a roughly \$70-a-day marijuana habit. It had become so problematic that his father had called Columbia to express concern, Agnifilo said; a university spokesman declined to comment.

Wymbs, charged with selling LSD and Ecstasy, also has “a demonstrable problem with some substances,” said his lawyer, Michael Bachner, declining to be more specific. A senior applied-mathematics major, Wymbs, 22, worked as a biostatistician for a cancer-research program last summer and plans to apply to graduate school, his lawyer said.

“At the end of the day, Michael Wymbs is better off among us, working to help society, than being labeled as a felon and being ostracized,” Bachner said.

Prosecutors declined to comment on the students’ request. A judge has yet to weigh it.

By law, their bid for treatment depends on showing that drug dependency drove their alleged crimes. But their circumstances also raise delicate questions about how to weigh issues of privilege and promise.

Man arrested in plot to blow up one of nation’s largest mosques

DETROIT — A 63-year-old Southern California man who was traveling with explosives in his vehicle with the intention of blowing up one of the nation’s largest mosques where mourners had gathered for a funeral was arrested in the Detroit suburb of Dearborn, Michigan authorities said Sunday.

Dearborn police said Roger Stockham was arraigned Wednesday on one count of making a false report or threat of terrorism and one count of possessing explosives with an unlawful intent. Stockham had a large but undisclosed quantity of class-C fireworks including

M-80s, which are outlawed in Michigan, Chief Ronald Haddad said.

“I was comfortable with the fact that we had taken him off the street — he isn’t going anywhere,” Haddad told The Associated Press Sunday afternoon. “I think the society he wanted to impact is safe.”

Haddad said Stockham was arrested Monday evening without incident in the parking lot of Islamic Center of America, while a large group was gathered inside. He said police received a 911 call from a resident.

Haddad said authorities believe Stockham was acting alone but still take him “very seriously.” He said Stockham has “a long history of anti-government activities,”

though he declined to elaborate.

The chief said he called the mosque leader, Imam Hassan al-Qazwini, early Tuesday to let him know of the arrest, and later met with Qazwini and mosque board members. He said members shared concerns about copycat crimes if the arrest was publicized, and Haddad said he understood.

“We never want to put something out there that gives someone the ‘how-to,’” Haddad said.

Qazwini informed worshippers about the incident during his sermon on Friday. The Council on American-Islamic Relations’ Michigan chapter issued a news release Saturday night and the police followed Sunday morning.

Mom charged in 2 kids’ slayings out of hospital

TAMPA, Fla. (AP) — A Florida woman accused of killing her teenage son and daughter was released from a hospital late Sunday morning and taken back to jail.

Julie Powers Schenecker, 50, had been receiving treatment for an unknown medical condition that existed before her arrest Friday. She is scheduled to make her first court appearance Monday morning and is being represented by a public defender.

According to an arrest affidavit, Schenecker shot her 13-year-old son Beau in the head twice “for talking back” while they were in the family car on their way to his soccer practice. The report said Schenecker then returned to their upscale home and shot her 16-year-

old daughter Calyx in the face while the girl studied at her computer. Officers found Schenecker drenched in blood on her back porch.

Investigators believe the teens “never saw it coming,” said police spokeswoman Laura McElroy. Both were killed with a .38-caliber pistol. The arrest affidavit said the weapon was purchased five days earlier.

Schenecker’s mother called police Friday morning because she was concerned about an e-mail her daughter sent saying she was depressed. Schenecker’s husband, Parker Schenecker, is a career Army officer attached to U.S. Central Command in Tampa. He was working in the Middle East when the shootings happened.

CAIRO — Opposition figure Mohammed ElBaradei emerged from house arrest late Sunday to join protesters in central Cairo, echoing their demand that U.S.-allied President Hosni Mubarak resign and establishing himself as the face of Egypt’s six-day pro-democracy uprising.

The dramatic nighttime appearance by ElBaradei — the Nobel Peace Prize winner who returned to Egypt last week after the protests began — suddenly placed him at the forefront of a leaderless grass-roots revolt that has brought one of the Arab world’s longest and most entrenched dictatorships to the brink of collapse.

As the banned Muslim Brotherhood and other Egyptian opposition groups said they would support ElBaradei in negotiations for a new government, U.S. President Barack Obama called allies and expressed support for “an orderly transition to a government that is responsive to the aspirations of the Egyptian people,” according to a White House statement.

Mubarak’s days appeared to be numbered, although the 82-year-old leader

showed no obvious signs that he would give up the office he has for nearly 30 years. F-16 fighter jets buzzed protesters in downtown Cairo in a show of intimidation. News services reported that the Egyptian army was sending reinforcements and state television said that the police, who have been absent from the streets since Friday, would resume patrols.

Cairo remained an anxious battle zone: long lines at fuel pumps, markets plucked clean of bread and other staples, shops board-

ed up or looted, banks and restaurants shuttered. Neighborhood-watch groups armed themselves against the marauding gangs that many Egyptians thought had been unleashed by the hated Interior Ministry to sow chaos. Dozens of prisoners reportedly escaped or been freed from jails.

The U.S. Embassy was making arrangements to evacuate American citizens to “safe haven locations in Europe” starting today, and authorized non-emergency staff and the relatives of

diplomats to leave Egypt. The State Department urged Americans to “consider leaving as soon as they can safely do so.”

The death toll in the protests rose to at least 150, according to Al Jazeera, the pan-Arab satellite network whose live broadcasts of Tahrir (“Liberation”) Square have provided the world with a front-row seat to the revolt — and prompted authorities to close its Cairo bureau Sunday. The network continued to broadcast via satellite, however.

Exiled Islamist leader returns to Tunisia

TUNIS, Tunisia — The leader of a long-outlawed Tunisian Islamist party returned home Sunday after two decades in exile, telling The Associated Press in his first interview on arrival that his views are moderate and that his Westward-looking country has nothing to fear.

Rachid Ghanouchi and about 70 other exiled members of Ennahdha, or Renaissance, flew home from Britain two weeks after autocratic President Zine El Abidine Ben Ali was forced from power by violent protests. At the airport, thousands of people welcomed him, cheering, shouting “God is great!” and drowning out his attempt to address the

crowd with a megaphone. Ghanouchi rejected any comparison to more radical figures, including the hardline father of the Iranian Revolution.

“Some Western media portray me like (Ayatollah Ruhollah) Khomeini, but that’s not me,” Rachid Ghanouchi told the AP.

During 23 years in power, Tunisia’s ousted president cracked down on opponents, including proponents of political Islam, jailing them and sending many into exile. As Tunisians protested over corruption and repression, Ben Ali fled to Saudi Arabia on Jan. 14.

With Ben Ali gone, Ennahdha has moved

quickly to carve out a place in the political scene, taking part in demonstrations and meeting with the prime minister.

Some Tunisians fear that a revival of Islam could hurt their hard-won gains and quality of life, or inspire an extremist movement like the al-

Qaida-linked network that has waged an insurgency in neighboring Algeria.

But, while Ennahdha was branded an Islamic terrorist group by Ben Ali, it is considered moderate by scholars. Experts say Ben Ali used a fear of Islamists to seduce Western allies keen for a bulwark against terrorism in a volatile region, and win their blessing despite wide-

spread repression.

Though the ban on Ghanouchi’s party hasn’t officially been lifted, the new interim government has been more tolerant of it.

Ghanouchi said he wants his party to help Tunisia carry out democratic reforms, though he is not interested in standing in elections expected in upcoming months.

“I am not going to run for president of Tunisia, nor as a minister nor as a parliamentarian,” he said in an interview at his brother’s home, where family members celebrated with a festive meal of couscous. Another long-exiled opponent — Moncef Marzouki, a secular leftist and human rights activist — was there to welcome him.

As Sudan makes split official, popular anger sweeps north

JUBA, Sudan (MCT) — Sudan will split into two countries later this year, officials announced Sunday, marking the climax of a decade-long peace process meant to end 50 years of conflict in Africa’s largest country. But political protests raised questions about the north’s stability.

Southerners celebrated their upcoming independence with dancing, but anti-government protesters in the north clashed with police, reflecting a wave of popular anger that has swept across the Arab world in recent weeks.

Student-led demonstrations against Omar al Bashir’s regime in Sudan’s northern capital, Khartoum, are the latest protests against authoritarian governments in the region.

Southern Sudan voted 99.57 percent for separation in the Jan. 9-15 referendum on independence, poll officials announced on Sunday in Juba, the southern capital. Added to a smaller pool of Southern Sudanese voters living in the northern region and across the globe, the final tally for separation is 98.83 percent, according to the referendum commission’s website.

Clinton arrives in Haiti, says U.S. has no plans to suspend aid

PORT-AU-PRINCE, Haiti (AP) — The United States has no plans to halt aid to earthquake-ravaged Haiti despite a crisis over who will be the nation’s next leader but does insist that the president’s chosen successor be dropped from the race, U.S. Secretary of State Hillary Rodham Clinton said Sunday.

Clinton arrived Sunday in the impoverished Caribbean nation for a brief visit. She met with President Rene Preval and earlier met with each of the three candidates jockeying to replace him.

Only two candidates can go on to the delayed second round, now scheduled for March 20. The U.S. is backing an Organization of American States recommendation that the candidate from Preval’s party, government construction official Jude Celestin, should be left out in favor of populist rival Michel Martelly.

The top U.S. official at the United Nations, Susan Rice, said recently that “sustained support” from the United States required the OAS recommendations be implemented. Many Haitian officials, including leaders of Preval’s Unity party and Martelly, interpreted that to mean the U.S. was

threatening an embargo and cutting off aid.

Clinton flatly rebuffed

that suggestion. “We’re not talking about any of that,” she said Sunday.

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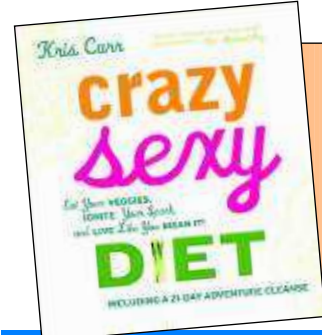
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St. Luke's brings 'anti-gravity' treadmill to Ketchum

KETCHUM — It's not *really* anti-gravity, more like a hovercraft for your lower half.

But for patients at St. Luke's-Elks Rehabilitation in Ketchum and for community members who use the center's new Alter-G "anti-gravity" treadmill, the results are more important than the mechanism.

"I could run again, which I hadn't been able to do for so long," said Jenny Gatehouse of Ketchum, who suffers from Parkinson's disease. In October 2009 she traveled to San Francisco to use an Alter-G machine for two weeks. "My husband and kids said when I got off the plane, I didn't limp anymore."

As much as the physical benefits, relearning to walk more normally boosted Gatehouse's spirits.

"It really builds your confidence, which is huge," she said. So when she returned home, Gatehouse and her family made getting one of the machines in the Wood River Valley a priority.

"They were the energy and vision behind the project," said Megan Thomas, executive director of St. Luke's Wood River Foundation. The Alter-G cost about \$30,000, all raised through private donations including an anonymous matching gift of \$15,000. "Because this was purchased through philanthropy, we're able to charge a really affordable fee."

The Alter-G, developed by NASA, is primarily used in rehabilitation centers for patients with neurological difficulties (like Parkinson's and head injuries), orthopedic challenges like joint replacement, and joint stressors like arthritis and obesity. But it has also been used by elite athletes, including professional football, soccer, and track and field.

To use it, patients or athletes put on large neoprene-like shorts that have a zippered seal at the top. They step into the lowered pressure compartment, then raise the compartment and seal it by zippering it closed. Air is pumped into the compartment, raising the lower half of the body to decrease weight and pressure on feet and legs.

There are only two Alter-G units in Idaho, said Kristin Biggins, manager of the rehab center; the other is at Therapeutic Associates in Boise.

WANT A TASTE OF 'ANTI-GRAVITY'?

St. Luke's-Elks Rehabilitation in Ketchum will hold an open house for the Alter-G, including free testing of the machine, 4-6 p.m. Wednesday. At other times, the Alter-G is available by appointment (call at least a day in advance) for public use for a fee: \$10 for a single drop-in session of 30-45 minutes, or \$50 for a 10-visit punch card. The center suggests that people who have never used the machine get a 20-minute orientation from a therapist for \$40. St. Luke's-Elks Rehab information: 727-8253. Alter-G information: Alter-G.com.

Kasey Fairfield, a physical therapist at St. Luke's-Elks Rehab in Ketchum, said the device is useful for many of her patients. Therapists can use balance boards on a stopped treadmill, have patients do squats, even have them walk up an incline backwards.

"It really is a good tool for therapists. We can be a lot more objective and exact," she said.

For example, on a recent day she assisted Norman Friedman of Ketchum, who has Parkinson's and lower back pain. As she peered through the clear plastic bubble around the treadmill, she advised Friedman to try lengthening his stride.

"I can watch his walking pattern a little better; it's easier to tell what's going on," Fairfield said, comparing the Alter-G to its most common counterpart: therapy in a pool of water. Compared with the water, it's easier for a patient to transfer techniques learned on the treadmill, because the muscle memories developed are closer to natural, ordinary motion. "Hopefully over time it'll carry over to land, without the use of any device."

The Alter-G can also be a better choice than water for patients not far out of surgery, because their incisions don't need to heal before they use it.

The only caution against using the machine is poor circulation with the possibility

for blood clotting, because the device uses increased air pressure around the user's lower half to provide the anti-gravity effect.

Recover from joint replacement — or just feel like Bo Derek

I got a chance to try the Alter-G treadmill at St. Luke's-Elks Rehabilitation in Ketchum, and I must admit it's a very strange sensation.

Once I stepped into the shorts, which are like giant neoprene bike shorts with a short zippered skirt, I got into the machine and zipped the skirt onto its hatch. Then the machine calibrated and began lifting me up. From the control panel in front of me, I adjusted the air pressure (it can support from 20 percent to 100 percent of a user's weight depending on the setting), the speed and the incline.

One user likened it to walking on the moon, but I had a more obscure reaction: Leaning forward and bounce-walking on my toes as my hips were held relatively stable, I felt my shoulders and chest move in a way that made me feel like Bo Derek running on the beach in "10." Though rather less perfect.

Although I don't have any of the conditions this machine is recommended for, and I'm no elite athlete, it was easy to see how relieving your feet and legs of their ordinary weight and pressure could allow you to focus on your body's mechanics. I could more readily and accurately feel the placement of my feet, the length of my stride.

For someone in recovery from surgery, that could be invaluable early rehabilitation, and for an athlete making small adjustments to technique, the impact of those adjustments could be more easily and quickly seen.

At this point in my life I'm not striving for any Olympic gold, so as fun as the Alter-G was, I rather hope I don't find myself with a need to use it.

How to contain family germs

If one member of your family gets a contagious disease such as flu, is everyone else doomed? Not necessarily, public health leaders say: families can take several protective steps. "They won't necessarily completely prevent the spread, but they will help," says Dr. William Berg, director of the Hampton Health District in Virginia.

Isolate the sick person. Best case scenario: the person stays in one room and has just one caregiver; someone with a respiratory illness ideally should wear a mask if around other family members. You also can designate a spot on a sofa or chair for the sick person, preferably at a distance from others.

Buy disposable gloves. When cleaning up vomit or diarrhea, gloves are your best protection. Wash your hands before and after wearing gloves to kill as many germs as possible.

Use hand sanitizers cor-

rectly. Sanitizers don't work as well as soap and water if your hands are visibly dirty. Also, make sure a product contains at least 60 percent alcohol.

Put bags in all trash containers. Don't throw used tissues into an unlined can — but do discard them immediately so they aren't lying around.

Wash soiled items quickly. Clean dirty clothes, towels, sheets and soft toys with soap and hot water.

Clean surfaces well. Use a bleach solution or disinfectant wipes, especially on door knobs, sink faucets, flush handles, television remote controls and other frequently touched items. If you can see dirt, clean that with a paper towel and soap while wearing gloves, then wipe the area down.

Wash hands often. Sick or well, family members need to clean their hands frequently.

Don't share. Make sure the sick person has his own bedding, clothing, dishes and cups at all times.

How to de-stress after work

Carrying anxiety home from the office raises the risk of numerous health problems, including high blood pressure, a weakened immune system, headaches, depression and insomnia. Here are tips from psychologists:

Listen to music in your car. Favorite tunes will help you relax as you transition from office to home.

Don't just flop on the couch. Exercise, spend time outside and interact with family and friends to boost production of feel-good hormones. Or if you can, relax by reading, taking a hot shower or engaging in a favorite hobby.

Think positively. When you reflect on your day, focus on at least one good thing that happened.

Don't bring work home. Sometimes it's unavoidable, but the more your home is a separate sanctuary, the easier time you'll have relaxing there.

Communicate. If you've had an especially tough day,

share that with your spouse and children.

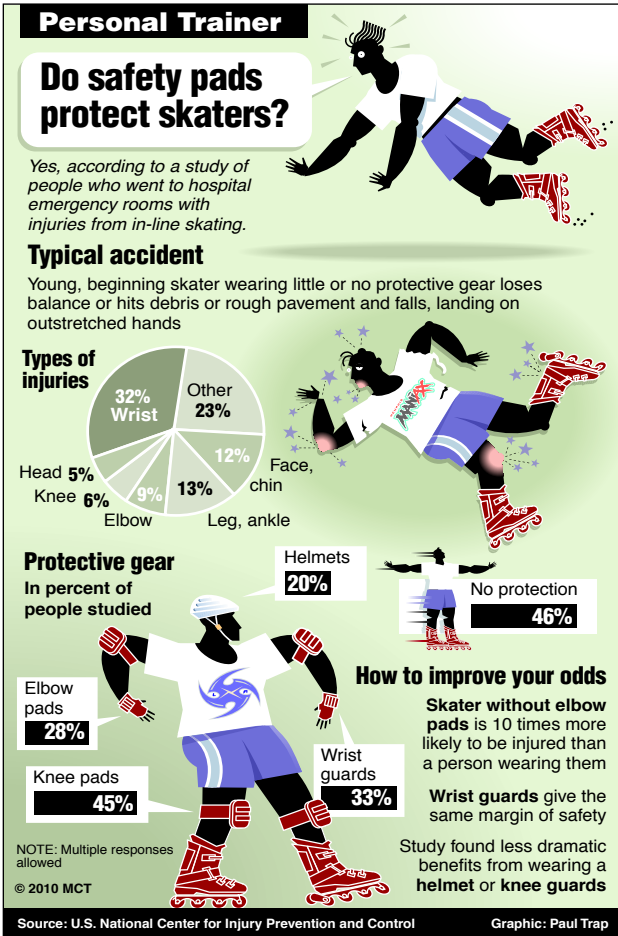
Set boundaries. For example, you might tell your boss that you turn your cell phone and computer off after a certain time each night (if you can).

Don't rely on substances. Too much alcohol actually increases anxiety levels — and puts you at risk for dependence — while the nicotine in cigarettes is a powerful stimulant.

Eat if you're hungry. Low blood sugar causes anxiety and irritability. But stick to nutritious foods, because bingeing on unhealthy treats will only make you lethargic.

Realize your limits. If there's nothing you can do about a work problem at home, tell yourself that fretting is a waste of time.

Take time off. Use your vacation days, take mini-breaks during the day, delegate responsibility and learn to say no if you're swamped. None of that is easy, but otherwise your work — and health — will suffer.



Stop doing crunches

In their new book, "The New Rules of Lifting for Abs," authors Lou Schuler and Alwyn Cosgrove say that the time-honored exercise really isn't efficient.

"They work very little muscle through a minuscule range of motion with minimal effort," Schuler, a journalist and strength and conditioning coach, wrote in an e-mail. "In the same amount of time, you could do a series of

plank-type exercises, which build strength and endurance throughout your core muscles — the abdominals, lower back, hips, and upper thighs — and protect your spine from the types of movements that cause injury?"

Besides, he said, "we already spend much of our time each day flexed forward while we drive, work on laptops or send texts. Why would we go into the gym and do an exercise that exacerbates a problem our work creates?"

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Cancer survivor's diet: Crazy, sexy and effective

When Kris Carr was diagnosed with a rare sarcoma in 2003, doctors told her there was no treatment and no cure. But instead of opting for a watch-and-wait approach, she went with watch-and-live. "That was what I could control — what I eat, drink and think," says Carr, who chronicled the ensuing journey in the documentary "Crazy Sexy Cancer." With her new book, "Crazy Sexy Diet" (\$25, Skirt), Carr hopes to answer people's questions about what she's done to keep her disease dormant.

Q: How much has your lifestyle changed since the diagnosis?

A: (When) I was in my early 30s ... I didn't realize there were consequences. I was a junk food lover, I smoked, I partied, I ran myself into the ground. And I had a laundry list of aches and pains.

Q: You touch on both poop and pee in the book. Why do we need to test our urine with litmus strips?

A: This is really an anti-inflammatory diet, and that requires eating less acidic foods and more alkaline foods. The strips for your pee just provide a snapshot of where you are. I used the pH strips to test my urine in the beginning because I was being a detective about it.

Q: And the colonics?

A: People think it's so radical, but fake food is radical. If you need some help getting it out, get it. You just need to follow it up with probiotics.

Q: What's the purpose of your 21-day adventure cleanse?

A: Most of us aren't making the best choices. This is a plan that you can take for a test drive. Will there be bumps along the way? That depends how crappy your diet is. If you're already eating a healthy diet but want to take it to the next level, maybe you'll find going gluten-free will push you over the edge. Grab that bikini and dive! Or, you can dip your toe into this and just do as much as you're willing.

Q: How do you make these changes without feeling deprived?

A: My theory is to add sunshine and good-

ness to people's lives. My daily juice is green and delicious, not a swamp in a glass. Have a salad with a meal. That's adding, not subtracting. This diet has given me so much, including longevity. So many of the foods we indulge in make us sick. You're really depriving yourself of health.

Q: What's the one thing everyone should start eating immediately?

A: My motto is make juice, not war. That's my medicine. Chlorophyll is your best friend. It douses us in minerals, oxygen, phytonutrients — everything our cells need. I drink 16 ounces in the morning and another 16 ounces in the

afternoon. Since I was diagnosed eight years ago, I've never had a cold.

Q: What's the one thing everyone should stop eating immediately?

A: Fast food. It's going to give you nothing but heartache, literally. If it's made in a laboratory, if it has a shelf life longer than you, it's creating disease in your life.

Q: Why put a section about meditation in a diet book?

A: Stress lowers your pH, causes inflammation and makes your cortisol levels spike. There are places where we might be stuck in stinking thinking, so it's important we spend some time with self-reflection. It's not just what you're eating, but what's eating you. If you have the "perfect" diet but are riddled with stress and anxiety, that's not good. It's not just about health. It's about happiness.

While what Martin has done to himself is tragic, it’s still not too late for him to kick his habit and straighten out his life. This has nothing to do with you, and you should not make it your problem.

THE ACES ON BRIDGE®

Bobby Wolff

With North bidding correctly, South should not end up in an inferior contract of three no-trump. He can foresee that there might be only eight tricks at no-trump — four clubs, two hearts, a spade and a diamond. The no-trump game may be right if the North hand is balanced. But if North holds the diamond ace and the club ace or king, together with nine cards in the two suits, there should be a good play for five clubs. South's major top cards cover three of the four plain-suit losers, leaving only one loser there — the rest can be ruffed out. The only other loser is a high trump.

This picture foreshadows the actual play. The right approach is to ruff South's two spade losers after giving up one spade trick. South must be careful, however, on a heart lead. He ruffs two diamonds in hand while ruffing a heart in dummy, then takes the spade ace and a second spade. East wins to return a trump.

South wins in hand and discovers the bad break. This should not disrupt declarer's ability to make his game, though. To insure his 11 tricks, South must now ruff the third round of spades with the ace. To let East overruff the third spade and lead another trump would be fatal, but this way North saves the trump 10 for the fourth round of spades and makes the game.

ANSWER: It is generally right, when in doubt, to lead from a five-card suit, not a four-carder. Here, although you can lead through dummy's spades, your own spots are so weak that you need partner to have a very good spade suit, in which case he might have been able to double the spade bid. A club lead needs less from your partner, so it would be my choice.

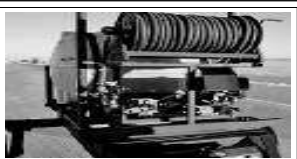

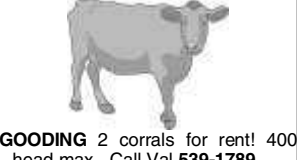

TODAY IN HISTORY

On this date:
In 1606, Guy Fawkes, convicted of treason for his part in the “Gunpowder Plot” against the English Parliament and King James I, was executed.
In 1865, Gen. Robert E. Lee was named general-in-chief of all the Confederate armies.
In 1917, during World War I, Germany served notice it was beginning a policy of unrestricted submarine warfare.
In 1929, revolutionary Leon Trotsky and his family were expelled from the Soviet Union.
In 1944, during World War II, U.S. forces began a successful invasion of Kwajalein Atoll and other parts of the Japanese-held Marshall Islands.
In 1945, Pvt. Eddie Slovik, 24, became the first U.S. soldier since the Civil War to be executed for desertion as he was shot by an American firing squad in France.
In 1950, President Harry S. Truman announced he had ordered development of the hydrogen bomb.
In 1958, the United States entered the Space Age with its first successful launch of a satellite into orbit, Explorer I.
In 1971, astronauts Alan Shepard, Edgar Mitchell and Stuart Roosa blasted off aboard Apollo 14 on a mission to the moon.
In 2000, an Alaska Airlines jet plummeted into the Pacific Ocean, killing all 88 people aboard.

Ten years ago: A Scottish court sitting in the Netherlands convicted one Libyan, acquitted a second, in the 1988 bombing of Pan Am Flight 103 over Lockerbie, Scotland. Megrahi was given a life sentence, but was released after eight years on compassionate grounds by Scotland's government.) Without any fanfare, the state of Georgia hoisted its new flag above its state-house, one featuring a smaller Confederate battle emblem. Michel Navratil, one of the last known survivors of the sinking of the Titanic, died in Montpellier, France, at age 92.

Five years ago: In his State of the Union address, President George W. Bush declared that America had to break its long dependence on Mideast oil and rebuked critics of his stay-the-course strategy for the unpopular war in Iraq. Supreme Court nominee Samuel Alito was sworn in after winning Senate confirmation. The Senate approved Ben Bernanke as chairman of the Federal Reserve. British ballerina and actress Moira Shearer died in Oxford, England, at age 80.

One year ago: The annual World Economic Forum concluded a five-day meeting in Davos, Switzerland, with widespread agreement that a fragile recovery was under way but no consensus on what was going to spur job growth. Roger Federer easily beat Andy Murray 6-3, 6-4, 7-6 (11) for a fourth Australian Open championship. The AFC beat the NFC 41-34 in the Pro Bowl, played ahead of the Super Bowl for the first time. Beyonce collected six trophies to become the most decorated female artist at a Grammy ceremony; Taylor Swift won four Grammys, including album of the year.



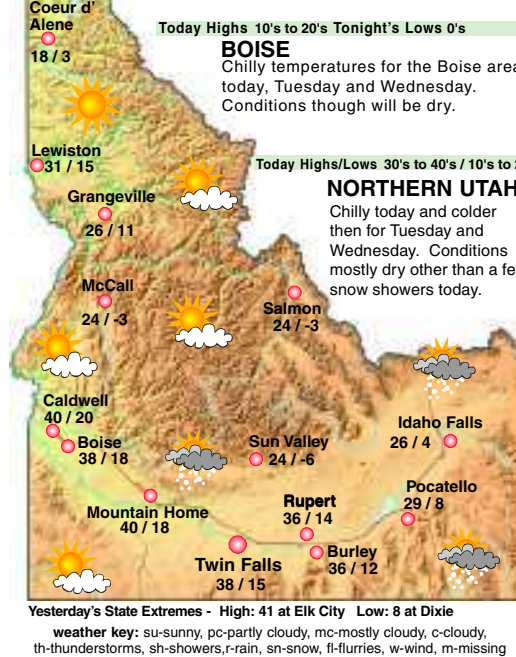

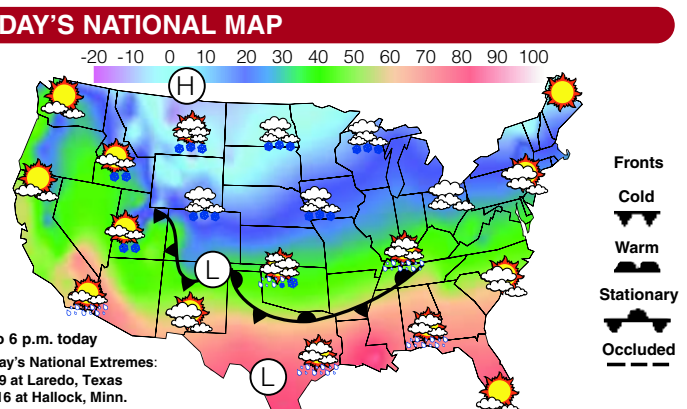
