## Urban renewal

Districts draw critics, supporters, wide-ranging ideas

### By Ben Botkin Times-News writer

BOISE – Some believe it's one of Idaho's best tools to aid economic development.

Others want the state's urban renewal law to be repealed.

In-between are those who see a need for more checks and balances, greater voter involvement and more transparency in the way urban renewal districts deal with taxpayer dollars. Wide-ranging ideas intended to reform the urban renewal system took center stage Wednesday at the House Local Government Committee, where seven legislative proposals were unveiled.

Similar bills were held up last

year in a different House committee, Revenue and Taxation.

Urban renewal agencies get their money primarily by taxincrement financing, which allows the agencies to collect any increase in assessed property tax value within their boundaries after their formation.

Usually initiated by cities, but technically free-standing entities, the agencies are created to provide a source of revenue as incentives to developers.

That's where the money - and the debate - comes into play.

Critics, including those in the Legislature, contend that urban renewal agencies lack the same oversight as other government bodies that handle tax dollars. And they spend tax money that would otherwise flow to other taxing agencies like cash-strapped school districts, cities and counties.

It's a topic that can raise passions.

"Pardon me," said Rep. Robert Schaefer, R-Nampa, pausing for a moment in his proposal to repeal the law to prevent new projects. "I get a little bit exercised about urban renewal."

He got emotional when referring to an Idaho Freedom Foundation report in which the advocacy group showed that the state's urban renewal agencies took in \$52.3 million in property taxes in 2009.

"I get a little bit tight in the throat when we talk about that kind of money," said Schaefer.

Urban renewal does have legislators who see value in it. Rep. Elfreda Higgins, D-Garden City, said she's pleased with how her community's urban renewal district has helped blighted areas.

"It has certainly made life better for the people who live in that area," she said.

## States say preparation key to usefulness

BOISE – In the 19th century, students used slate and chalk to work through lessons. Today's primary learning tools are a bit more advanced and increasingly come with power cords.

Under Superintendent of Public Instruction Tom Luna's tech-heavy proposal to overhaul Idaho public education, ninthgrade students' toolkits would include state-funded laptop computers starting in fall 2012. But education officials in other states with similar programs already in place say just providing the new technology isn't enough to bolster student achievement.

Districts need to prepare teachers to infuse their daily lessons with technology to take advantage of the tools, they said. Idaho State Department of Education officials say that's why the \$4.7 million ment in states with laptop pro-

### 4,100 lose power in malfunction

About 4,100 residents of Jerome and Twin Falls counties temporarily lost power Wednesday afternoon, apparently due to a malfunctioning substation.

Eden, Murtaugh, Jerome, Hazelton, Hansen, Kimberly and Artesian City were all without power, according to an outage message line operated by Idaho Power. Three crews were sent to investigate the problem at about 1:15 p.m., Idaho Power spokeswoman Stephanie McCurdy said. The power was restored at about 2:45 p.m.

"Our crews got out there as quickly as possible, as we usually do," McCurdy said, adding met, Staff Sgt. Dennis Pullin said late that the utility was especially concerned about getting heaters turned back on in the below-freezing temperatures.

PLACERVILLE, Calif. (AP) - A school janitor was arrested Wednesday in the killing of a Northern California elementary school principal who was hailed as a role model for other educators

No children were hurt in the latemorning shooting in the office at Louisiana Schnell Elementary School in Placerville, but one student may have witnessed the shooting, Police Chief George Nielson said.

Principal Sam LaCara, 50, died in the attack, Nielson said.

Authorities said they arrested janitor John Luebbers, 44, at his home about an hour after launching a manhunt. Investigators were trying to determine a motive for the shooting about 50 miles east of Sacramento.

LaCara, who died at Marshall Medical Center, was called a dedicated

leader by Bob Wells, executive director of the Association of School California Administrators.

"Sam has been a role model to school leaders for his dedication to students and to public schools," Wells said. LaCara had served as a

treasurer of the group.

Nielson was asked by reporters if Luebbers had been laid off. The chief said that possibility was part of the investigation, but he was uncertain about Luebbers' employment status.

## Idaho lawmakers eye Rights of Child pact

BOISE - Idaho's Republican-dominated Legislature is taking aim at a global children's rights treaty the United States has amendment to the Constitution to protect parental rights as a buffer against it.

The 20-year-old treaty has been ratified by every United Nations member except the U.S. and Somalia. But Idaho lawmakers are among American critics who are so worried they are support-Constitution that says parents have a "fundamental right" to raise their children without government interference.

"I think it's necessary to send a message," said House Majority Leader Mike Moyle, R-Star. "We want them to know that we're concerned about it."

Moyle is co-sponsoring a resolution with House Education Committee Chairman Bob Nonini to support the parental rights amendment to the states. amendment to the Consays the children's right treaty "would drastically alter this fundamental right of parents to direct the upbringing of their children."

Nonini introduced the resolution in the House under the Constitution and Education Committee, ratification of the treaty in where it passed on a 14-3 Congress was a long shot. vote on Wednesday. It now goes to the full House for consideration. "This presents an oppor-

tunity for us to do some-thing tangible to support the families of Idaho," Nonini said.

Opponents of the treaty contend it would enable the government and U.N. officials to interfere with yet to ratify, backing an parental authority. 

## Why Idaho won't privatize liquor sales

ifty years ago, the only economic forecasting tool then-Gox. Robert Smylie needed was the sales report from the Idaho State Liquor Dispensary. It told the governor not only how much spirits the state monopoly had sold the previous month, but how each brand was selling. If business was brisk in rot-gut, Smylie understood

times were tough. But if lots of folks were buying Johnnie Walker, the governor knew the state would have money to spend.

In the years since, liquor revenue has developed into the most recession-proof source of income Idaho state government has. So although the state could get out of the booze business, it's simply not going to happen in our lifetimes.

Nor should it.

State Rep. Maxine Bell, R-Jerome, commissioned a study by the Legislature's Office of Performance Evaluations on the feasibility of privatization. OPE says it could be done — probably netting the state a short-term profit.

The study found that Idaho could make just as much each year by having privatized liquor sales and imposing an excise tax on liquor as it makes now through state sales; last year, that figure was \$47 million, and it's been growing each year.

Plus, in the first year of privatization, the state could garner tens of millions in one-time funds by selling off its liquor, stores, warehouse and other assets. That would hold true even if it just privatized retail sales, and kept the state warehouse, distribution and pricing system.

Idaho now has 66 state-operated liquor stores and 100 mostly smaller contract stores, where private operators sell liquor for the state in exchange for a percentage of the sales. The state could save about \$700,000 a year by converting 13 of the state liquor stores to contract stores, the report found.

The money from liquor sales in Idaho goes mostly to the state's general fund, cities and counties. A slice also goes to courts, substance abuse treatment, schools and community colleges.

The OPE report listed questions to consider, including whether selling liquor is "a core function of state government," and whether direct state involvement in liquor sales curtails the "intemperate use of alcohol."

# A bipartisan agreement to stay corrosively partisan



ASHINGTON -If historians ever have to pinpoint the day that America lost the future, they're likely to look to Jan. 27. That was when Majority Leader Harry Reid and Minority Leader Mitch McConnell took to the floor of the Senate to announce an agreement on fixing the increasingly sclerotic, polarized, dysfunctional body they lead. Their agreement? Neither of them would fix it. Both promised not to change the rules of using a majority vote for at least four years. Nor did they set up an alternative process for taking a good, long look at why the Senate has begun to make a Beverly Hills divorce look courteous and functional. They just . . . moved on.



This came a few days after President Obama's State of the Union address, in which he exhorted Americans to make the tough decisions necessary to "win the future." That would take "sacrifice and struggle," he said. It would mean overhauling, among other things, the public sector. "We can't win the future with a government of the past," he warned.

But when it came to offering specifics, the president whiffed. He settled for a laugh line about regulating salmon rather than a coldeyed appraisal of the gridlock and misaligned incentives of the body that serves as the board of directors for the United States of America. How well they work matters much more than who regulates what we put on our bagels. As an explanation of what stands



between America and "winning the future," Obama's speech wasn't good enough. He dodged the real problem.

Two weeks before Obama's address, however, Sen. John Kerry delivered the speech that Obama should have given. Like Obama, Kerry emphasized that "developed and developing countries are making far-reaching choices to reshape their economies and move forward in a new and very different global era." Like Obama, Kerry intoned that "we as a people face another Sputnik moment today." Like Obama, Kerry argued that "unprecedented levels of investment in science and technology, engineering and R&D" had provided the foundation for American leadership in the 20th century, and would be required to build on it in the

21st. But Kerry's explanation of the way our political system is impeding our efforts to adapt to a fast-changing future and meet the obstacles in our path was much more ambitious, and much more precise. "On issue after issue," he said, "enduring consensus has been frayed or shredded by lust for power cloaked in partisan games." He noted the individual mandate began as a Republican idea, that capand-trade was a favored policy of the first Bush administration, that treaties that were much more far-reaching than START once passed with 90 or 95 votes.

The grim reality, he said, is that "in the 21st century where choices and consequences come at us so much faster than ever before, the price of Senate inaction isn't just that we will stand still; it isn't just that America will fall behind; it's that we will stay behind as we cede the best possibilities of this young century to others who are more disciplined."

The problem facing our system is that the minority has both the electoral incentive to see the majority fail and, using the Senate's rules, the power to make it fail. Far from encouraging bipartisanship, this encourages a particularly virulent strain of partisanship: In a world where the majority can govern with or without you, you have a strong incentive to participate constructively in the process. In a world where the majority can't govern without you, and won't be reelected if they can't govern, you have a strong incentive to walk away from the process. Success for the majority means electoral failure for you.

That's not how successful companies are run, as Pfeffer notes. And it's not how other countries are run. Indeed, for a long time, it's not even how we were run. For much of the 20th century, our political system showed very little polarization. The filibuster was rarely deployed, party-line voting was uncommon and consensus was much closer at hand.

But those days are over. Congressional leaders freely admit, as House Speaker John Boehner did, that this is "not a time for compromise." We have a legislative system built for a political system from another time.

Gox. C.L. "Butch" Otter agreed, noting that the state constitution requires the state to further "temperance and morality," and said that makes state liquor sales a "proper role of government for Idaho." Plus, he noted that the state has lower consumption levels than states where liquor is more widely available, and said Idaho's state liquor division is "a stable and reliable source of ongoing revenue for the benefit of all Idahoans."

Otter is right that Idaho has a vested interest in controlling access to liquor. And regulatory philosophy aside, the indirect costs of privatization could be steep in the form of higher law enforcement and court expenditures, more drunk drivers, damaged families and underage drinking.

For taxpayers, Idaho's liquor monopoly is an unalloyed blessing. The system isn't broken, and it doesn't need fixing.

### ... second career, big pension

Pssst. Want to cash in on the best deal in Idaho? Here's how.

Get elected to the state Legislature.

Sure, it's only a part-time job. You work about 90 days a year while the Legislature is in session and get paid a base salary of \$16,116 a year, plus expenses.

Then line up a cushy appointment making a fiveor six-figure salary running a state agency.

Do that for at least 42 months and you'll land a comfortable retirement.

Lawmakers who do this get credit for years of legislative service multiplied by the higher salary. In other words, a 10-term politician who earns \$85,000 during four years at an administrative post draws a pension as if he'd spent all 24 years at the top job.

It's a special arrangement these small-government conservatives, who pinch pennies when it comes to public schools or health care for the poor, cut for themselves.

The latest example is outgoing state Sen. Robert Geddes, R-Soda Springs. Blatantly in the hunt for a top-level appointment – he had purchased a home in Boise and relinquished his post as Senate president before any job opened -Geddes just landed a post at the state tax commission, succeeding the scandalized Royce Chigbrow of Boise. He will earn \$85,447 a year.

Had he stayed in the Senate. Geddes would have settled for a state pension of about \$240 a month. Assuming he remains at the tax commission through the end of July 2014, Geddes will draw a monthly retirement check of at least \$2.777.

He's far from unique: • Department of Insurance Director Bill Deal. Now entering his fifth year, Deal earns \$97,323. That tenure plus the 16 years he labored in the Legislature entitles him to a monthly pension check of \$3,244. • Department of

Agriculture Director Celia Gould. She's also beginning her fifth year at her \$106,620 job. The eight terms Gould spent in the House combined with her current salary equal a monthly pension of \$3,554.

• Idaho Public Utilities Commission member Jim Kempton. If he stays three more months at his \$92,167a-year post, this former five-term House member will be able to draw a \$2,073 monthly retirement check

And that's just a sample.

The practice became ubiquitous when Phil Batt reclaimed the governor's office for the GOP in 1994 ... Batt filled his administration with Republican legislative talent. But he also tried to end the retirement perk.

Nowhere else in government is someone allowed to credit years at a part-time iob toward a full-time pension. For example, a smalltown mayor who latches onto a top state job gets a pension based proportionately upon what he earned in both positions.

So there you have it. If you want to cash in on public service, here's how.

Of course, it means getting your hands a bit dirty. You'll have to put up with charges of hypocrisy and cronvism.

But hey, that hasn't bothered anyone yet.

### ... the energy tax rebate

Idaho's top-rung political echelon is "shocked" at this unexpected turn of events: One of the tax breaks created for business has actually paid off in totally unexpected ways.



A 6 percent sales tax rebate created in 2005 for alternative energy developers has created a boom in turbine wind power farms in the state. Instead of the modest forecast of \$2.13 million in lost yearly sales taxes on energy, Idaho could pay \$47 million in rebates over the next two years.

A chagrined Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter and legislators of both parties face a dilemma.

The state faces a \$185 million budget deficit that could be eased if the energy sales tax rebate is canceled or modified. However, ending the rebates would send energy developers scurrying to nearby states that have no sales tax.

The answer is easy: Keep the rebate for now. It's an invaluable economic development tool. That conclusion is supported by a Boise State University study to be released soon that concludes that long-term benefits will exceed the tax rebates ...

To take away an incentive that is working would be lousy economics and a major step backward for Idaho in 21st-century industrial planning.

This is one tax break that makes economic sense and wasn't just a reward for special interests.

Idaho legislators are again considering a ban on texting and talking on handheld cell phones while driving ...

talking on a cellphone or texting while driving is about as dangerous as being drunk behind the wheel.

So, with some 30 states having passed these laws already, it should be pretty clear that they help improve traffic safety by reducing crashes.

Except that they don't. In fact, a study out in September found that - if anything – passing these laws increases traffic accidents.

The study is by an arm of the Insurance Institute for Highway Safety, no apologist for unsafe driving.

Adrian Lund, institute president, said, "Noncompliance is a likely reason texting bans aren't reducing crashes. Survey results indicate that many drivers, especially younger ones, shrug off these bans. Among 18-24 year-olds, the group most likely to text, 45 percent reported doing so anyway in states that bar all drivers from texting. This is just shy of the 48 percent of drivers who reported texting in states without bans."

Why would crashes increase?

'Clearly drivers did respond to the bans somehow, and what they might have been doing was moving their phones down and out of sight when they texted, in recognition that what they were doing was illegal," he said ....

Perhaps the answer here lies in technology: Require automakers to render cell phones unusable in a moving vehicle.

That day, Mount Sinai officials compelled Cenzon-DeCarlo to help doctors perform an abortion late in the mother's second trimester. This forced participation violated personal convictions she told the hospital about when she was hired five years earlier.

Cenzon-DeCarlo's ordeal began one of the most striking and important "conscience" cases in modern times. Indeed, her case will help determine whether the Obama administration intends to enforce the nation's "conscience laws" in the places where Americans receive health care.

It's a sleeper issue. And it deserves much wider attention.

Conscience laws occupy an interesting place in U.S. history. Legislators usually frame such measures in religious terms, with specific and limited application.

Most of us know the law traditionally has recognized a narrow category of conscientious objection, under which an American may be exempted from compulsory military service. A conscientious objector is defined as someone against participating in all wars, not just some wars. Typically, a granted exemption will require alternative service in a noncombatant role.

Congress recognized something similar just last year in passing the health care bill. Although it doesn't include a general religious exemption from the mandate that individuals purchase health insurance, the law provides two exemptions for members of specific faith communities.

The federal conscience regarding particular practices in health care originated with legalization of abortion nationwide in 1973. Congress foresaw controversial ramifications of the Supreme Court's Roe v. Wade decision that year.

Idaho, successfully offered amendments to protect the conscience rights of health care providers in such situations. In 2004, the late Rep. Henry Hyde and former Rep. Dave Weldon, a physician, added a third conscience protection to the annual spending bill for health and human services.


This patchwork of laws expressed a noble, and in fact civilizing, idea. If our nation is to live with its deepest differences over issues as contested as abortion, cloning and assisted suicide, we must provide room for individuals to avoid participating in practices that offend their moral or religious sense.

These situations aren't the same as compulsory service in wartime, where an arguable claim exists on the service of every citizen. Instead, each is an elective, controversial practice.

The defect in this patchwork is lack of clear guidance on enforcement. In 2008, the Bush administration attempted to fix the problem by making clear that alleged violations could be referred to the Office of Civil Rights at the Department of Health and Human Services and investigated like other federal civil rights complaints.

In March 2009, though, the new Obama administration suspended these regulations. Administration lawyers recently told a federal court that they soon will resolve the situation.

Almost no one expects full reinstatement of the rules. It's possible the administration will direct the Office of Civil Rights to cease all investigations, including Catherine Cenzon-DeCarlo's case, and accept no more com-

BLACKFOOT (AP) -Seeking a quick end to a high-profile hazing case, a judge set March trial dates for two former Blackfoot High School athletes charged with misdemeanors involving alleged locker room bullying.

Seventh District Court Iudge Charles Roos on Tuesday set a March 8 trial for Nathan Walker and a March 22 trial for Logan Chidester.



## **Feds prepare for Yellowstone bison slaughter**

BILLINGS, Mont. - Disease testing began Wednesday on hundreds of captured bison from Yellowstone National Park, with federal officials saying those that test positive for brucellosis could be shipped to slaughter this week.

Twenty-one more bison were captured Tuesday as the animals migrated out of the snow-packed park to find food at lower elevations in Montana. That brought to more than 300 the number of bison being held in corrals near Gardiner, and livestock agents were driving another 38 toward the site Wednesday.

Conservation groups appealed to Montana Gov. Brian Schweitzer for the animals to be spared, but the governor told The Associated Press that his hands were tied by an agreement with the federal government that sharply limits where Yellowstone bison can roam.

"We can't unilaterally change that" agreement, he said as he also defended the Montana Department of Livestock, which faces criticism for opposing increased leniency for bison.

to Montana," he said. "We don't want to put our livestock industry at risk."

The impending slaughter stands in stark contrast to recent initiatives to expand bison habitat in some areas outside the park. Those efforts have been frustrated by the animals' tendency to wander and political opposition from Montana's livestock industry and its supporters.

Roughly half of the park's bison, also known as buffalo, have been exposed to brucellosis, which causes cattle, bison and some other animals to prematurelv abort their young.

With more bison expected to exit Yellowstone due to a harsh winter and the corrals capable of holding only 400 animals – a park spokesman also indicated that even bison that test negative for the brucellosis might not be released as originally planned.

"There are a lot more bison in the park than we could conceivably hold," Yellowstone spokesman Al Nash said. "The question that no one can answer is what will the rest of the winter see in terms of bison movement."

## Report: U.S. unlikely to reach goal of 1 million electrics on the road by 2015

President Obama's goal of putting 1 million plug-in electric cars on the road within four years is unlikely to be met because automakers are not planning to make enough cars due to uncertain consumer demand, auto industry leaders concluded in a report being released Wednesday.



## Much of nation's recent growth may have been a mirage

ASHINGTON – Last weekend, I was invited to sit in on an unusual retreat attended by top political, business, labor and civic leaders in Massachusetts. Although that state is in better economic shape than most others, it is facing most of the the same problems – anemic job growth, looming budget crises for state and local governments and widening inequality of incomes and educational achievement. The purpose



of the gathering was to create a sufficient sense of urgency about those problems to overcome the inertia, political squabbling and special interest lobbying that inevitably stand in the way of doing something. After a few presentations, it didn't take participants long to conclude that one issue seemed to be at the root of all the others: a steep, relentless rise in health-care costs that has crowded out other publicand private-sector investments. Until medical costs are contained, they concluded, there would be no money for anything else.

You have to give them credit – while the rest of the country will spend the next year stuck in a Talmudic debate about the

constitutionality of requiring all Americans to buy health insurance, Massachusetts has already achieved universal coverage and is moving on to controlling costs. And judging from the weekend discussion, I'd wager that by the time Massachusetts settles on a plan to reform its healthcare delivery and payment systems, the rest of us will still be parsing the meaning of the "necessary and proper" clause and the Supreme Court's holding in Lochner

vs. New York.

The movers and shakers in Boston aren't the only ones who have focused on health-care costs as the central economic issue. Tyler Cowen, an engaging and peripatetic economist at George Mason University, has just published a short but important new e-book, "The Great Stagnation," that attempts to explain the slow growth and the rising inequality that have characterized the U.S. economy over the past 35 years. (Full

disclosure: I'll be joining Cowen on the GMU faculty starting next fall, although not in his department.)

Cowen's thesis is that the period of 3 percent annual growth in incomes that stretched back to the 19th century ended in the middle of the 1970s as the pace of innovation slowed. Before the slowdown, he argues, industrial economies realized rapid income and productivity gains by picking



So far, he notes, the Internet has generated far less income and far fewer jobs than earlier innovations – think of the automobile – and the benefits it has yielded have been confined largely to the upper end of the income scale.

For me, however, the more intriguing argument in "The Great Stagnation" is that much of our recent growth may, in fact, have been a mirage. It is no coincidence, he writes, that during the recent decades of slow growth in incomes and productivity, three of the fastest-growing sectors of the economy have been education, financial services and health care. And while government statistics show productivity in those sectors growing at the same pace as the rest of the economy, other data suggest otherwise.

Although the United States spends at least twice as much on health care, per person, as other industrial countries do, Americans do not live any longer and

education has doubled in recent decades, average scores on standardized math and reading tests have remained about the same.

And what does the average American have to show for all that innovation and job growth in financial services over the past 20 years? A series of booms and busts that has left stock prices roughly where they began.

For Cowen, the central economic reality of the past three decades is that median household incomes have barely budged, even after adjusting for inflation and other factors. And his hypothesis is that too much money and talent and effort have gone into sectors where real productivity gains are hard to find. Once Americans became rich enough to satisfy ourselves with the basic necessities of life, it was only natural that we would decide to spend our additional income – our marginal dollars - on health care, education and financial services. We now discover, however, that each of those marginal dollars has generated less than a dollar of real value.

It is unlikely that the movers and shakers in Massachusetts last weekend were aware of Cowen's book or focused on longterm productivity trends. But they understood full well the roots of our current stagnation. When incomes were growing rapidly, it probably didn't matter if the fruits of that growth were sometimes unevenly distributed and unwisely invested. But now that innovation has slowed, and with it income growth, those realities can no longer be ignored.

## **Feds end** prisoners' bogus tax refunds

ALBANY, N.Y. - A new agreement aims to stop federal prisoners from filing for and collecting millions of dollars in bogus tax refunds from their cells.

Pressure from U.S. senators in New York, Ohio, Minnesota and Florida in January led to an agreement signed Wednesday between the Internal Revenue Service and the federal Bureau of Prisons to break down bureaucratic and regulatory barriers to end the practice. The memorandum of understanding struck between the two agencies overcomes legal obstacles that hindered their own efforts and paves the way for states to make similar agreements that apply to their prisons.

"The impasse needed to end, and today it's over," Sen. Charles Schumer of New York said Wednesday, adding that the agencies responded quickly. "This agreement means that prisoners will no longer be able to bilk taxpayers out of millions of dollars? Sen. Amy Klobuchar of Minnesota said the agreement effectively cuts through unnecessary red tape to "stop felons from scamming the system."

"It's shocking that inmates are ripping off the taxpayers right under the government's nose," said Sen. Bill Nelson of Florida.

The case shows "government agencies need to work together to prevent tax fraud wherever it occurs, but especially when we're being bilked from behind bars," said Sen. Sherrod Brown of Ohio, where roughly half of the 1,500 fraudulent inmate tax returns in 2009 came from a single prison, the London Correctional Institution in central Ohio.

The senators pushed the agencies to cooperate after a federal audit showed the practice continued, despite a 2008 law aimed at stopping it.

The Bureau of Prisons and the IRS, however, had already been cracking down on the scheme and made several arrests and recoveries of refunds.



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## **Cairo erupts as Mubarak supporters attack protesters**

CAIRO - Barely 12 hours after Egyptian President Hosni Mubarak said he would step down at the end of his term, a club-wielding mob chanting his name overwhelmed pro-democracy protesters in Tahrir Square on Wednesday, hurling stones and gasoline bombs at the people who have demanded that Mubarak resign immediately after nearly 30 years in power.

The apparently choreographed onslaught – the pro-Mubarak forces had massed outside the square for hours and came equipped with slogans and knives – opened a violent new chapter in Egypt's day-old uprising and ninedefied President Barack Obama's call for a transition to a new government. The running battles continued for hours in the shadow of the famed Egyptian Museum, home to the country's priceless antiquities, whose rooftop one Mubarak the museum and formed a Molotov cocktails at demonstrators.

GUADALAJARA, Mexico - Suspected drug cartel gunmen hurled grenades, burned vehicles and blocked streets in a rapid series of attacks in Mexico's secondlargest city, authorities said Wednesday.

## **Powerful cyclone strikes Australia's northeast**


CAIRNS, Australia – A massive cyclone struck northeastern Australia early Thursday, tearing off roofs, toppling trees and cutting electricity to more than 170,000 people – the most powerful storm to hit the area in nearly a century.

As the sun rose after a night of furious winds and torrential rain, police advised residents to remain indoors until officials could assess the safety of returning to the streets.

Cairns police superintendent Brian Connors said teams of technical experts from power, utilities and transport departments were conducting damage assessments.

"They're doing that as rapidly as they can ... so they can give us the all clear damage across Queensland the coast and inland. to let people onto the roads and back to their homes," he said.

The eye of Cyclone Yasi roared ashore just after midnight at the small resort town of Mission Beach in Queensland state, battering the coast known to tourists as the gateway to the Great

## Castleford offers more to see than iconic rock

CASTLEFORD - You can talk to yourself in Balanced Rock Canyon. A voice mimicking your own will answer back.

"Hello," I shouted.

"Hello-hello-hello-hello," was the response.

Josh Palmer tried it by clapping his hands. "Clap-clap-clap," was what we heard in return.



We were having fun creating echoes in the canyon.

We were on adventures in the outdoors the sky

was gray. But the wind wasn't blowing this time, and even if it were we had the canyon walls to protect us.

Balanced Rock Canyon, nestled in a dip along 3700 North in Castleford, is an impressive creation with its steep walls, interesting rock formations and dark caves.

We accessed the trail at Balanced Rock Park, a cozy setting lined with grass, picnic tables and shade trees, making it a nice spot for family gatherings. Just make sure to watch children, as Salmon Falls Creek is nearby. During fishing season, anglers cast their lines for trout.

South of the park, next to the creek, is the trail and the hike is easy without many inclines. The only bummer is that our hike was cut short after about a half-mile or so, where we encountered a rock wall. But the journey there

and back was worth it.

Eye-catching rock formations - some covered in moss, others dotted with holes - fill parts of the landscape.

"I think this is my favorite hike so far," Josh said, referring to the few hikes we'd been on together over the past few weeks.

The canyon appeared to have been pieced of the walls. We saw bird nests in these with all kinds of interesting formations. crevices, and imagined other creatures lurking nearby, unseen.

"Why do I feel as if a million eyes are watching us?" I asked Josh.

"They probably are," he replied.

At one point, Josh thought he saw an animal looking at us from a cliff. It turned out to be a tumble weed.

We obviously had animals on the brain, for we talked about encounters with cougars and rattlesnakes. We were thankful for the chilled weather that kept the snakes away. The only wildlife we saw were the birds.

The canyon is a good place for birding, especially raptor viewing. We saw them in the sky above, their coos and caws echoing loud and long in the canyon.

The sounds here - such as the semis that roar their way along 3700 North near the park's entrance, the raptors' shrieks and our own voices - seemed distorted, almost haunting, as their vibrations bounced back and forth along the rocky walls.

Balanced Rock Canyon is named, of course, for the iconic rock that sits on a hillside not a mile west of the park's entrance.

The 48-foot tall, 40-foot wide monolith appears to be balanced on a base little more

I'm going to suit up to brave the elements, I'd rather go bunny hunting.

Nowadays whenever I feel the need for a weekend outdoors adventure, I grab a rimfire rifle and head for the lava flows just outside of town.

My favorite hunting method is to slowly work the edges of the basalt flows hoping to catch a glimpse of a cottontail napping on a rimrock ledge just above its burrow. Not all that long ago when my vision was better, an old Remington Nylon 66 and a well-used Ruger single-six revolver were my favorite carry guns. Nowadays with compromised vision and creeping senility, I depend on a scoped rifle to help me more consistently connect with head shots at the typical 30-50 yard ranges.

Until last year, I had generally been satisfied with the performance of my Winchester Super-X and Federal High Velocity .22 LR ammunition. The accuracy was there in spades, but even a carefully placed head shot would send the rabbit kicking and cartwheeling around. Dramatic for sure, but this drama sometimes presented a problem. More often than I'd like to recall, a fatally wounded cottontail would reflexively kick itself back into its burrow or down into a crevasse where it couldn't be retrieved. This really bothered me because I feel a strong obligation to harvest all the game that I kill.

The solution seemed obvious; hit 'em with more horsepower. But I don't really like to use a shotgun for this style of rabbit hunting and the small caliber centerfires are too powerful for the suburban areas that I hunt. The answer to my



bunny hunting dilemma arrived in the form of the .17 HMR cartridge.

Developed by the bulletmaking giant, Hornady Manufacturing, working in conjunction with the Marlin and Ruger firearms companies, the diminutive .17 HMR set the rimfire world on its ear when it was introduced in 2002. The basic case was simply fashioned by necking the standard .22 WMR down to .17 caliber. Crimping either a 17grain polymer-tipped or 20-grain hollow point jacketed bullet over a suitable charge of Hodgdon Lil' Gun powder resulted in the "fastest rimfire in history" - with velocity between 2,300-2,500 feet per second. That easily trumps the .22 LR's 40-grain bullet running at about 1,300 fps and the .22 WMR's hottest 30+grain loads smoking out at around 2,200 fps.

Now all of these numbers look great on paper, but what about its real world performance? In a word: impressive. Last year, I bought a beautiful CZ 452 bolt gun at an unbelievable price. It is incredibly accurate and when the 17- or 20grain bullets connect with a rabbit ... it's all over. The impact and violent upset of the minuscule bullet stop the rabbit literally in its tracks. There is no postmortem kicking and jumping and I have not lost a single rabbit.

So when cabin fever strikes this month, grab your .17 HMR and head for the lava flows. It'll be good for what ails you. Good hunting!

• "Is there a cure for • the cabin fever blues?" • How about getting A: out your fishing rod and wetting your line in a nearby pond? Clear Springs Foods in mid-January donated numerous large rainbow trout for local ponds. These five-pound average fish were stocked into Crystal Lake, Empire pond, and the Filer ponds. Also. Idaho Trout Processors will be donating more of those big yellow trout in March.

These fish typically go to waters that don't freeze, as stocking fish through the ice sometimes results in the fish dying from temperature shock. Therefore, keep in mind Crystal Lake, Filer Ponds and the Empire ponds, which typically don't freeze during the winter and have warmer water temperatures because of the influence of spring water. Also, some ponds on the Hagerman Wildlife Management Area will open March 1, and should be a good bet to get a big tug on the line.

Perhaps this is the year you will try fishing through the ice. If you have a power ice auger, you can drill as many holes as you like, but you can only fish with up to five poles, even if you have a two-pole permit.

If the fish are biting, about two poles is all you'll need. Some waters in eastern Idaho have different regulations, so check them out before you head out. Also, make sure the ice is thick enough to support you after all those holiday treats.

If you are ice fishing for perch, lower your line to the bottom and lift it up a couple inches. Perch tend to congregate near the bottom in the winter months. Also, although many fishermen like to use small ice-fishing poles for fishing, I actually prefer to use a small bobber and set it up on the snow mound created when you drill vour hole.

The perch will tug the line, knocking the bobber into the water. Perch are very soft biters in the win



wrap around. I have a bunch of these made with four-tosix pound test monofilament, with a weight and a couple hooks about three feet apart and a small bobber on the line. Then put them in a 5-gallon bucket on the kids sled and head out to a likely area. The bucket doubles as a seat.

I usually tip a size 8 hook with a small piece of nightcrawler and lower it to the bottom for perch. For trout, I use a combination of nightcrawler/powerbait/marshmallow, depending on what is "hot" for the day. Trout usually feed about eight to 20 feet under the ice, depending upon how deep the water is, but I have caught many trout right off the bottom while fishing for perch.

If you don't have a power auger, borrow one. Otherwise, take along your teenage kids or your football playing friends to drill the holes for you. If you're lucky, you can take over somebody else's holes that just left. I look for holes with some evidence that fish were caught there, such as blood or fish parts.

Don't forget to dress warm and wear some waterproof boots and pants or raingear to stay dry. Also, that hunting blind you used this fall can double as an ice-shack to keep you out of the wind.

Ice fishing is really a great sport to abolish the cabin fever blues of mid-winter. It doesn't cost a lot of money, and once you get some fish on the ice, you'll forget how cold it is.

Now that the football season's over, get off that couch and try your luck on the ice. If you've never done it before, talk to your fishing friends and they can get you started. Folks on the ice are generally a cheerful bunch willing to help a beginner. You just have to get out there I'll see you on the "hard" water. Good luck fishing!

PRESCOTT, Ariz. Dorothy Swehla did not become an avid hiker until she reached her early 50s. time over the past three their decades.

As for her diet, Swehla has plenty of fruit in it and consumes meat only in moderation. She enjoys golfing and gardening, and keeps 12 fruit trees in her yard, which she still trims herself.

"I'm lucky, but I work at it, and I watch what I eat," she said of her health. "I will keep hiking as long as I

the closing, my sister and I had to sign"Quit Claim" deeds. I'm filing bankruptcy using a paid bankruptcy petition preparer, and I need to know if my dad's death will need to be reported in the paperwork."

**Answer:** Judy, please accept my condolences for your father's death. When you file a bankruptcy, the bankruptcy trustee will liquidate your property that is not exempt under Idaho law. The money he receives will be distributed to your creditors. If you transferred away ownership of any property prior to the filing of your bankruptcy, and you did not receive equivalent value for the property, the trustee is authorized to retrieve the property, or its value, and distribute that money to your creditors. In Idaho, when a person dies without a will, his property is divided among his heirs according to law. Since your dad's home was his separate property, you and your sister inherited a share of the home. When you signed the deed, you transferred away your share without receiving equivalent value. The trustee will collect your share from your stepmother. This is a good example of why debtors should always seek out an experienced bankruptcy attorney to represent them.

Art Van Holland was fresh out of high school and casting about for a challenge when he enlisted in the U.S. Navy.

## **Addressing non-traumatic bone fractures**

DEAR DR. GOTT: I have been taking Boniva for almost five years. Could I or should I stop now? I've heard there is some discussion about this. I'm 74. Your opinion, please.

**DEAR READER:** Boniva is prescribed to slow bone loss, increase bone mass, and treat or prevent osteoporosis in women, a condition in which bones become thin, weaken, and are subject to easy fracture.

The Food and Drug Administration issued a warning to physicians and their patients on Oct. 14, 2010, regarding an increased risk of bone fractures of the thigh with bone-strengthening bisphosphonates such as Boniva, Fosamax and Actonel. The report went on



to indicate it remains unclear whether drugs in the category trigger thigh fractures, but because of the potential connection, labeling now warns of the possibility. It is understood an individual who falls or is in an automobile accident might experience a fracture, but these findings suggest breaks without any degree of trauma involved. Rarely, osteonecrosis (destruction and death of bone tissue) of the jaw has been linked to bisphosphonate use.

At this stage, there are no

guidelines as to how long a patient should remain on the drugs, but the FDA stated the fractures "may be related to the use of bisphosphonates for longer than five years, but patients should continue treatment unless directed otherwise by their physician."

My guess is that you have undergone testing such as a DEXA (dual energy X-ray absorptiometry) that measures the density of bones in areas most commonly affected by osteoporosis. Other tests less commonly used include computerized tomography (CT) or ultrasound sonography, which utilize high-frequency sound waves to view internal structures. If it is time for another X-ray, your

physician can determine whether the Boniva is working for you. If both of you feel it's time for a change, ask whether 1,500 milligrams of calcium combined with 600 IU of vitamin D might be an appropriate substitute. This is a tough call only you and your prescribing physician can agree upon.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I am 89 and in good health, but I no longer have a sense of smell. Can it be restored?

DEAR READER: The answer depends on the cause. Some causes result in temporary loss, while others, unfortunately, result in permanent loss. If you have had a recent cold, sinus infection or hay fever, the condition will likely clear on its own within a reasonable period of time. If you suffer from nasal polyps, a tumor or nasal deformity, surgical correction may be necessary to remove the lesions or correct the abnormality and may restore your sense of smell. Medical conditions

such as diabetes, Huntington's disease or hormonal disturbances should be ruled out.

Speak with your primarycare physician for his or her opinion. If you don't meet with success, request a referral to an otolaryngologist (ear-nose-and-throat specialist), who can help you sort through this annoying problem. Good luck.

### **Relatives say** Cuban woman marks 126th birthday





BOISE - While many of the top-tier college football programs around the country counted up the number of stars assigned to their newly-signed recruits Wednesday, Boise State celebrated its new unheralded crop of "Boise State guys" on national signing day.

Despite Boise State's impressive record in head coach Chris Petersen's tenure, Petersen denied recruiting was getting easier for him – but he's still signing the types of players he can groom into stars.

"The number one question we keep getting asked is if it's getting easier for us with all the winning, but the answer is, 'No, it's not? It's getting tougher," Petersen said.

"But I think when we look down this list, we feel very strongly about these kids. For us, it's about getting good kids that are good football players who can fit into our culture."

One of the signees that garnered some considerable buzz when he first announced his commitment to Boise State was quarterback Jimmy Laughrea, a 6foot-2, 197-pound quarterback out of Rocklin, Calif. He is expected to make a serious bid for the starting job in 2012 after Kellen Moore graduates.

Boise State coaches also spoke highly of Taylor Loffler, a 6-foot-4, 200-

pound safety from Kelowna, British Columbia, and expect him to make an immediate impact. Loffler, who was courted by some other PAC-12 schools, has liked Boise State for a while after becoming a fan while living in Montana.

## THE ACES ON BI

A deceptive declarer tries not only to persuade a defender to take a trick when he shouldn't, but also to duck at the wrong moment.

Sometimes the target is not specifically to gain a trick by this maneuver, but to gain a tempo or to keep an opponent off play. An example is today's deal, where against four hearts the defense starts with a spade to the ace, followed by the spade queen.

You should take the spade king and decide on a plan. You may think everyone knows how to take a trump finesse — but the right play is actually to lead a low heart from hand at trick three! Why? Well, if the heart finesse is onside, you are only looking at an overtrick. The key distribution is when West has the heart king, in which case the club ace is clearly wrong. You want to sneak a heart trick through, after which you will cash the heart ace and run diamonds. When West has 3-3-3-4 shape, he will only be able to ruff the fourth diamond, by which time one of vour club losers will have vanished.

Is it easy for West to rise with the heart king on the first trump? I do not think so, and I have seen all 52 cards. And note that if East has the heart king, you may surrender an unnecessary heart trick but the contract is now safe. The defense can get only one club trick for sure.

Since you barely had your raise to three diamonds and have only four hearts, retreat to four diamonds as quickly as decorum will permit.

In 1811, American newspaper editor Horace Greeley was born in Amherst, N.H.

In 1865, President Abraham Lincoln and Confederate Vice President Alexander H. Stephens held a shipboard peace conference off the Virginia coast; the talks deadlocked over the issue of Southern autonomy.

In 1913, the 16th Amendment to the Constitution, providing for a federal income tax, was ratified.

In 1924, the 28th president of the United States, Woodrow Wilson, died in Washington, D.C., at age 67.

In 1930, the chief justice of the United States, William Howard Taft, resigned for health reasons. (He died just over a month later.)

In 1943, during World War II, the U.S. transport ship Dorchester, which was carrying troops to Greenland, sank after being hit by a German torpedo; of the more than 900 men aboard, only some 230 survived.

In 1959, An American Airlines Lockheed Electra crashed into New York's East River, killing 65 of the 73 people on board.

In 1966, the Soviet probe Luna 9 became the first manmade object to make a soft landing on the moon.
