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## Twin Falls Council to revisit Lazy J rezoning proposal

A rezoning proposal that filled the Twin Falls City Council Chambers with senior citizens concerned about losing their homes last year returns to the council as a public hearing tonight — this time bringing some proposed protections.

Dozens of Lazy J Ranch mobile home park residents and their supporters raised concerns in October that rezoning the property for commercial use would ultimately force them out of their residences along Pole Line Road West. The residents own their homes but rent the space they occupy.

The Twin Falls City Council will discuss a five-year development moratorium for the Lazy J Ranch on Pole Line Road West.

Residents said they put their life savings into the homes and moving them would be more than they could afford.

At that meeting, the City Council rendered no decision, cit-

ing the absence of two councilmen and full citizen representation. Some council members also struggled with their conflicting values of property rights and protecting the elderly.

At the end of December, the representative of the landowners sent the city a letter in an apparent bid to allay some of those fears. The zoning request now includes the prohibition of development on Lazy J land for five years — unless the vacancy rate continues to creep upward to 28 percent. The landowners representative, Gerald Martens, said vacancy was nearing 25 percent at the October meeting.

## Water levels hold steady despite dry January

Warm January temperatures were a slight setback for Idaho's mountain snowpack. But overall, agricultural and recreational water users should still expect a good water year, according to the latest report from the U.S. Natural Resources Conservation Service.

NRCS' monthly stream flow forecast, released Friday, predicts Idaho rivers running at between 85 percent and 130 percent of average across the state. That's despite the warmth that brought rain instead of snow and melted low-level snowpack across the state, swelling rivers and building up reservoirs.

This year's weather continues to be a departure from the past couple of years. So far, the only river basin forecast as possibly facing a shortage of irrigation water is the Little Lost Basin, according to an NRCS water supply index.

However, the report warns, continued drier weather — in particular, if a high-pressure ridge diverting storms from Idaho stays in place — won't do any good for snowpacks, in turn reducing the water outlook. Also, the climate is harder to predict these days than in the recent past, the report notes.

The watersheds that feed the

## Old downtown facility was unsafe, too costly, chief says

JEROME — Between the Jerome Fire Department's Station No. 1 living quarters and its fire engines is a steep flight of stairs and a 50-yard dash across the sidewalk, past the Jerome Police Department's parking lot.

Fire Chief Mike Hatfield said that mad dash is a liability to his firefighters — especially in the winter — and dealing with those

safety concerns and mounting maintenance bills for the old downtown building are things he doesn't want to deal with anymore.

So the department is moving its base of operations two miles south to the city's modern fire station on Yakima Street.

Hatfield said it's a three-minute drive from downtown to Station No. 2 in normal traffic and

1 1/2 minutes with lights and sirens going. For residents on the north side of town, Hatfield said response time will be approximately five minutes — on par with current response time from the downtown station.

"Station 1 is draining me as far as funding goes," Hatfield said. "The infrastructure, the plumbing and female firefighters lack co-ed facilities.

There is no decrease in response time from here and this is a beautiful facility."

City Administrator Ben Marchant said Station 1 was built in 1953 for one fire chief and an all-volunteer staff. But times have changed over the past 58 years and Hatfield said throwing money at an old building to help it accommodate modern needs doesn't cut it.

## Twin Falls fair board, sheriff to gauge security needs of beer garden

The recent approval of a beer garden for the 2011 Twin Falls County Fair brings with it a pitcher's worth of questions regarding fair security.

With alcohol comes the potential for impaired driving and unruly behavior, but Twin Falls County Sheriff Tom Carter, whose office is responsible for security at the annual September event in Filer, said he doesn't anticipate additional security concerns with the addi-

tion of the beer garden.

"The vast majority of people come to the fair to have a good time," he said. "My bigger concern has to do with people getting home."

The fair board voted 4-2 to allow the sale of alcohol on a one-year trial basis and added provisions to limit the sale to arena events from 6 to 10 p.m.

The board included the one-year clause to force a re-evaluation of alcohol sales at the fair before the policy becomes permanent.

The sheriff's office budget for fis-

cal 2011 includes \$27,000 for fair security, which pays for sheriff's deputies and officers from other county agencies to patrol the grounds, parking lot, and arena and escort vendors making large cash deposits. Last year, Carter told the *Times-News* that anywhere from 20 to 26 officers are on duty during the afternoon and evening swing shift, when the number of fairgoers is at its highest.

Carter said he has no plans to change the security detail unless the fair board asks for it. "If they want

more security, I'll need more money to put more people out," he said. "Until I hear that from somebody, I will continue to provide security with the same size staff."

Fair board members Kelton Hatch, Ted Cornie, Eric Lee and Gretchen Clelland have formed a beer committee to address security as one of many issues stemming from the approval. Clelland will chair the committee.

"The priority for me is always for the safety of the people that show up," said Hatch, who voted against

the beer garden. "I'm not saying that having beer will decrease safety, but we'll have to address the concerns and comments that have come in. We want to keep it as fun and family-friendly as possible."

Clelland said that the committee hasn't met yet, but that it will look to the sheriff for guidance.

The 2011 Twin Falls County Fair runs from Aug. 31 to Sept. 5.

“We anticipate it will not have a noticeable effect on our service,” Marchant said.

The city expects to save between \$15,000 and \$20,000 by moving firefighters’ quarters into Station No. 2, and Hatfield said the move will also make department management easier.

A quick glance into the downtown living area offers a bunkhouse feel. Two small bathrooms, only one with a working shower for the five firefighters, make the space usable but far from optimal. If a female firefighter spent the night, a curtain between beds offered the only privacy. There are only four beds, so one firefighter had to sleep

on the couch.

The city will start using the downtown station as office space for human resources and perhaps planning and zoning, Marchant said, adding that plans are in the works and subject to change.

While Marchant said that there is no good time to invest in public facilities, Hatfield knows that it will take something drastic to create action toward funding the construction of a new fire station.

“This is our opportunity to educate the public that a need for a new station is coming,” he said.

City of Twin Falls Community Development Director Mitch Humble said he wasn’t sold on that 28 percent mark, given the current vacancy rate and the sight of more people leaving the property. But determining the value of that promise is up to the City Council, he said.

“This one is kind of a ‘gotcha’ clause in my mind,” Humble said. “(The park) is close to that right now ... That little exception there could sneak up on some folks.”

It’s a situation Humble said he hasn’t seen before: The property owners have the right to rezone the property, the city wants the property rezoned, but the 100-plus people who live there could face direct ramifications of a decision to rezone. But he also pointed out that even if the 28 percent clause was met, there’s no guarantee of immediate development.

“It would not surprise me to see that property looking exactly the same in five years,” Humble said.

Also on tonight’s City Council agenda:

- Scott Andrus will continue his crusade against the state-owned liquor stores with his claim that their window advertisements stimulate excessive demand for their products — an allegation that would put them in violation of state code.

Andrus will ask the City Council to send a formal letter to the Idaho State Liquor Division requesting the advertisements be removed from store windows, or that the division’s director at least appear before the council.

- The council will host a public hearing to accept testimony about a proposal for a \$7.5 million bond to pay for upgrades to the city’s ailing wastewater treatment system. The council has not committed to the bond, but is trying to jump start the process in case a bond is needed.

The newly-formed city Citizen Finance Committee is looking into other options to pay for needed upgrades.

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# Workshop to help parents with math

Order of operations, greatest common factors, polynomials — the language of math has the tendency to leave many parents at a loss when it comes to helping their children with their homework.

Stevens-Henager College hopes to take the fear out of math by offering free classes to parents who want to assist their children in the learning process.

The college, which has a campus in Boise, several in Utah and a satellite campus in Idaho Falls, started a new course last year called “Bridging the Gap: Math 4 Moms and Dads.” The workshop comes to Twin Falls Tuesday and Wednesday at Twin Falls High School.

The class was designed after parents in the Idaho Falls School District realized they needed to become more active with their children’s education after recent budget cuts severed funding for classroom aides.

“We asked parents, ‘What would

make you more comfortable?’ and they said they didn’t feel confident helping their kids with math,” college spokeswoman Angela Hays-Carey said. “Parents just need to be educated; it’s the same math they did in school but with different verbiage.”

More than 200 parents have taken the class, and Hays-Carey said the college plans to expand the classes to include computer education and English workshops.

The workshop starts with beginning math and over the course of two nights builds to algebra. A quick assessment on parenting style and each child’s learning technique is done at the start

of the class.

Shelly Smede, a parent of two girls and the vice principal of Eagle Rock Junior High School in Idaho Falls, took the class in December and said it helped her confidence in helping her daughters with math homework.

“I loved that it was a short class. I would not have had the time to take a three-credit refresher course,” Smede said. “This just gave us the most important things to know.”

She said her 11-year-old often comes home from school and wants Smede to check her worksheets. Now she has the tools to help.

“I have resources to turn to and it gives me a little edge,” Smede said. “I’ve been extremely impressed with the college. I haven’t seen anything quite like this.”

The class provides parents with about \$30 in reference materials to take home with them. The Twin Falls class has room for 25 adults.

# State Capitol restaurant now caters to public

BOISE — Small signs sometimes signal big changes. Such is the case with the 8-by-11-inch “Open to the Public” sign outside the Legislative Dining Room on the Garden Level of the Capitol.

When the 76-seat restaurant opened a year ago, it was exclusively for the 105 lawmakers and invited guests. Legislative staff could order take-out. Six weeks into the 2010 session the rule was relaxed, and the public was admitted from 7 to 11:30 a.m.

That prohibition slipped, too.

“The last couple weeks they said, Don’t sweat it. Don’t discourage anybody,” said Ronda DiGiorgio, who operates the cafe.

When lawmakers convened this year, all limits were lifted and hours extended to 3 p.m. “We’re up 40 percent over last year,” DiGiorgio said.

“We felt like we needed a vendor that was profitable,” said Senate Majority Leader Bart Davis, R-Idaho Falls. “This helps.”

“We didn’t have a big long list of people that wanted the contract,” added House Assistant GOP Leader Scott

Bedke of Oakley.

Was there a list at all? “Let’s just say Ronda was the clear choice.”

DiGiorgio had a one-year contract last year but has since inked a two-year deal. She offers full breakfasts (eggs, hash browns and toast, \$3.99), deli sandwiches (\$6.49), salad bar (\$4.79 all-you-can-eat) and daily specials (varies). Prices are about 10 percent lower than DiGiorgio’s Rooster’s Eatery on Vista Avenue. “We want it affordable,” she said.

Feeding time has been among the toughest adjust-

ments for lawmakers after the \$120 million Statehouse renovation.

“There was a cultural change,” said House Majority Leader Mike Moyle, R-Star, who enjoys the dining room as a place to meet Senate colleagues he otherwise wouldn’t see very often.

Lawmakers lost the intimate lounges adjacent to the House and Senate chambers. At about 400 square feet, they had a handful of tables and good cheap eats. Legislators paid an annual fee of about \$75 and \$3 per lunch. Only lawmakers and family

were allowed.

The small kitchens sometimes helped leaders speed overlong late-morning debates. The aroma of meat loaf, fresh bread or soup could lure the most loquacious lawmakers to the trough.

Privacy also was a plus.

“It was a place where you could spitball legislative ideas in a stream of consciousness,” Davis said. “And you could quickly get the pulse of the Senate. There are other tools to do that, but this dining room makes that harder.”

The open lunchroom is an antidote to other changes after the remodel. The bigger space, private offices, key-coded doors, back hallways and elevators all make it harder to informally find lawmakers for a chat. But in here, everybody mixes.

Recently, Davis lunched with Sen. Shawn Keough, R-Sandpoint, and Reps. Eric Anderson, R-Priest Lake, and Bob Nonini, R-Coeur d’Alene. He had an unexpected visit from Mindy Solomon, an interior decorator from Idaho Falls.

Solomon is part of IDEAL, a group advocating legislation to license her profession. “Occasionally, you get your arm twisted, but that happens in this building,” Davis said.

S Snake River, by far the largest river water source for south-central Idaho, received “widely varying” precipitation in January — some as low as half their norm, others decently above-average. As measured near Heise, the Snake is expected to run at 111 percent of average.

The Wood and Lost river basins attracted special note, but not in a good way. They were the driest area of the state — most garnering less than 20 percent to 50 percent of their normal monthly rain and snow. Moist soil and a possible quick melt when

things thaw later this spring, however, may improve the overall efficiency of the snowmelt, according to the report.

South of the Snake, the Salmon Falls, Oakley and Raft River basins received nearly 90 percent of their

usual precipitation, in most cases rain. Though their snowpacks did drop some, they remain near normal, their reservoirs are about 80 percent of average and stream flows should run from average to 120 percent of average.

For those focused more on running the rivers than tapping them, NRCS also had good news. As measured on Feb. 1, snowpacks overall are positioned for a good season for both those who enjoy peak flows and those seeking a gentler trip in the summer.

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# Boise still mulling panhandling ordinance

BOISE (AP) — Boise Mayor Dave Bieter will decide in the next month or so whether to beef up an existing ordinance concerning what some say is a growing problem of panhandling in the tough economy.

City leaders had planned to release details of a new ordinance late last year and put it on the city council's agenda this spring.

However, the city's legal department is still looking at the proposal and it hasn't been released to the public.

"The mayor wants to see this new version and see what the next steps are, if any," Adam Park, Bieter's spokesman, told the Idaho Statesman.

Boise police say complaints about panhandling are up sharply since 2008, and city officials say most Boise residents want tougher limits.

But Boise officials have also said the current ordinance is nearly impossible

to enforce and is similar to ordinances in other parts of the country that have been successfully challenged in court.

Aaron and Julie Tapia and their 4-year-old son have been panhandling for five months.

Aaron Tapia said panhandling has been "interesting, watching peoples' facial reactions, wondering, will they be rude? Will they be polite?"

He also said it's been "very humbling" but he has few options, and usually takes in from \$1 to \$50 a day.

He said tougher panhandling laws would harm families like his who want to work but can't find a job.

Meanwhile, business owners, workers and customers often run into pan-

perspective, panhandlers do hurt us. Customers get uncomfortable. They don't want to sit outside."

He said he and other staffers have had to call the police.

Police spokeswoman Lynn Hightower said police have noticed more calls concerning panhandlers in public areas, "and an increase on private property where businesses are complaining."

## Hall, Green Bay bring Lombardi trophy home

ARLINGTON, Texas — Forget Lombardi on Broadway. Green Bay has the newest Super Bowl hit: Aaron Rodgers.

Capping one of the greatest postseasons for any quarterback, Rodgers led the Packers to their first NFL championship in 14 years Sunday, 31-25 over the Pittsburgh Steelers. The Packers reclaimed the Vince Lombardi Trophy, named for their legendary coach who won the first two Super Bowls and is making his own star turn in New York these days in the play named after him.

Rodgers, the game's MVP, thrilled his legion of Cheesehead fans with a spectacular six-game string that should finally erase the

bitterness of the Brett Favre separation in Green Bay. He's now equal with Favre in Super Bowl wins, and he extended the Packers' record of NFL titles to 13, nine before the Super Bowl era.

"It's what I dreamt about as a little kid watching Joe Montana and Steve Young," Rodgers said, "and we just won the Super Bowl."

The Packers QB threw for three touchdowns, two to Greg Jennings, and the Packers (14-6) overcame even more injuries, building a 21-3 lead, then hanging on to become the second No. 6 seed to win the championship. Coincidentally, the 2005 Steelers were the other.

Rodgers threw for 304 yards, including a 29-yard touchdown to Jordy Nelson, who had nine catches for 140 yards to make up for three big drops. Rodgers found

Jennings, normally his favorite target, for 21- and 8-yard scores.

"Wow! It's a great day to be great, baby," Jennings said.

Then the favored Packers held on as Pittsburgh (14-5) stormed back.

"We've been a team that's overcome adversity all year," Jennings said, who noted injuries to Charles Woodson and Donald Driver. "Our head captain goes down, emotional in the locker room. Our No. 1 receiver goes down, more emotions are going, flying in the locker room. But we find a way to bottle it up and exert it all out here on the field."

Former Glens Ferry High and Boise State star Korey Hall had a 2-yard reception for the Packers in the first

half. Hall was in on several offensive plays from his full-back spot and also played on special teams for Green Bay.

of them kissed it as Cowboys great Roger Staubach walked through a line of green and gold.

"Vince Lombardi is coming back to Green Bay," NFL Commissioner Roger Goodell said as the silver prize was handed to the team.

After sitting for three seasons, Rodgers took the

Packers to two late-season victories just to make the playoffs as a wild card. Then he guided them to wins at Philadelphia, Atlanta and archrival Chicago before his biggest achievement — against a Pittsburgh team ranked second in defense.

They barely survived a sensational rally by the Steelers, who still own the most Super Bowl rings — six in eight tries. But Pittsburgh failed to get its third championship in six years with quarterback Ben Roethlisberger. Roethlisberger's season began with a four-game suspension for violating the NFL's personal conduct policy. It ended with Roethlisberger standing on the sideline, his head down, hands on his hips, feeling something he never experienced: defeat in a Super Bowl.

"I feel like I let the city of Pittsburgh down, the fans, my coaches and my teammates," Roethlisberger said, "and it's not a good feeling."

Not even a decidedly black-and-gold crowd, with Terrible Towels swirling throughout the \$1.2 billion stadium, could make a difference for the mistake-prone Steelers. Their two biggest defensive stars — Defensive Player of the Year safety Troy Polamalu and outside linebacker James Harrison — were virtually invisible. The offense didn't seem to miss outstanding rookie center Maurkice Pouncey, who was out with an ankle injury, but Roethlisberger only occasionally made key plays until the second half.

The biggest plays were left to Rodgers, Nick Collins with a 37-yard interception

## Rodgers named Super Bowl MVP

ARLINGTON, Texas — Absolutely no need to bring up Ol' What's His Name ever again. Aaron Rodgers is a Super Bowl championship quarterback in his own right.

And the game's MVP, too, an honor Brett Favre, his Green Bay Packers predecessor, never earned.

With precise passes and cool under pressure, Rodgers completed 24 of 39 passes for 304 yards, three touchdowns and no interceptions Sunday night to lead the Packers to a 31-25 victory over the Pittsburgh Steelers for Green Bay's first NFL title since Favre's in the January 1997 Super Bowl.

Rodgers is 27 years old, just

# Patriots' Brady unanimous MVP

DALLAS — Here’s a Brady Bunch for NFL fans: Tom Brady got all 50 votes for MVP.

The New England Patriots quarterback on Sunday became the first unanimous choice for The Associated Press NFL Most Valuable Player Award since the AP began using a nationwide panel of media members who cover the league.

He surpassed himself, too: In 2007, when Brady won his first MVP, he got 49 votes; one voter went for Brett Favre.

“It is always flattering to be chosen for such a prestigious award,” Brady said. “But I also look at it as a team award, as nothing in football gets accomplished without the mental toughness and determination of every player and coach associated with that team.”

“I am very humbled to be a part of an organization where winning comes first, and our goals are based around the success of the team.”

Those successes, including three Super Bowl titles in the last 10 years, are in great part due to Brady’s excellence.

Although he didn’t set nearly as many passing marks as in ‘07, Brady by far was the league’s top performer in leading New England to a 14-2 record, best in the NFL. He had a record streak of 335 throws without being intercepted, and passed for 36 touchdowns with only four picks.

Not that the 33-year-old Brady would compare this season’s Patriots to any others.

“Every team every year is different,” he said, “and over the course of 100 practices and many games a team establishes its identity. Players change, schemes change, opponents change, which is why the game is so exciting year in and year out.”

“The fact that 32 teams start out each year with the same goal is why the popularity of the sport is at an all-time high. The great part about our sport is that nothing comes easy, and wherever you stand at the end of the

year is the exact place that you deserve to be.”

Individually, Brady stands above all others. The only Patriot to win the award, he and Peyton Manning, his rival for the NFL’s best quarterback, have split the last four MVPs.

Brady followed his previous MVP trophy with a lost season, tearing left knee ligaments in the first half of the 2008 opener. His return in 2009 was solid, although hand and rib injuries slowed him.

This year, even with a sore right foot that required post-season surgery, Brady was simply dynamic. He twice threw for four touchdowns in a game and four times had three. Twelve times, he had a passer rating of at least 100.

And he guided a young team in transition to 14 victories.

“Brady is so special because he’s such a great leader and all the players can relate to him,” team owner Robert Kraft said. “These kids (rookies) who come in live in awe of him, but the nice thing is he treats them well.”

“He works very hard, he studies very hard,” Kraft added. “Being a great quarterback isn’t just being very skilled. It’s being able to process information quickly, to make the adjustments, and I think he’s fabulous at that.”

As fabulous as he might have been, Brady, not surprisingly, has some regrets about 2010.

“When the season is over, 31 teams are disappointed about the outcome,” he said. “There is only one champion, and nobody plays this game for second place. The desire and hunger is about winning, which to me never gets old. The motivation to get up and work every day for that goal is something that challenges us all.”

“Our team has very high expectations, and our team will come back this year with the same purpose,” he said. “Whether or not that leads to a championship season will be determined by the commitment each player makes to do their job as best as they possibly can.”

The way Brady does.

as Favre was then. And after bidding his time as a backup until the Packers split with Favre, Rodgers has quickly taken over. This was his third full season as a starting QB, and he was particularly good throughout the playoffs, leading the No. 6 seed Packers to a championship.

“Got to give credit to our defense. This is a great group of men that we put together here, a lot of character, been through a lot together,” said Rodgers, who threw two TD passes to Greg Jennings and one to Jordy Nelson. “It’s just a great to be able to share it with them.”

Don’t forget, Rodgers’ strong performance came against Pittsburgh’s vaunted defense, the one featuring NFL Defensive Player of the Year Troy Polamalu and linebacker James Harrison. The Steelers limited opponents to an NFL-low 14.5 points per game this season, but the Packers topped that by the second quarter.

Rodgers was hardly perfect all game. But perhaps he could be forgiven if he was experiencing some jitters at the start. After all, the guy only played in one playoff game in his career before this season. A Super Bowl debut certainly must jangle the nerves, especial-

ly for a quarterback.

And so Rodgers began the game by overthrowing receivers and generally being off-kilter, completing only one of his first five passes. Then he righted himself and showed precisely why the Packers drafted Rodgers in the first round in 2005 and set upon on a course to let Favre leave so they could count on the kid.

Green Bay’s second drive began with Rodgers overthrowing Jennings. And then? Rodgers couldn’t miss. He went 5 for 5 for 63 yards the rest of that possession, finishing it with a 29-yard touchdown toss to Nelson with a little more than 3½ minutes left in the first quarter.

Rodgers simply raised both arms in the familiar “Touchdown!” signal used by the officials, then briefly embraced guard Daryn Colledge. Rodgers is a generally laid-back guy, and he does not engage in any of that wild running around and helmet-slapping Favre was so famous for when he starred at Lambeau Field.

Roethlisberger, with his two previous Super Bowl championships, was supposed to be the one who wouldn’t be bothered by the grand stage. But while he was throwing two first-half picks, it was Rodgers who shined.

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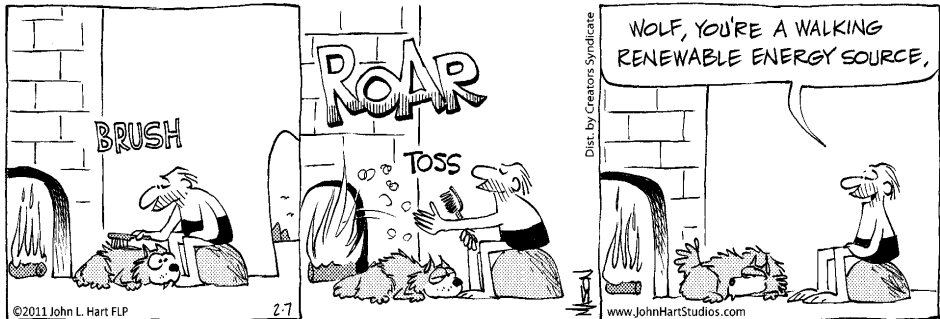
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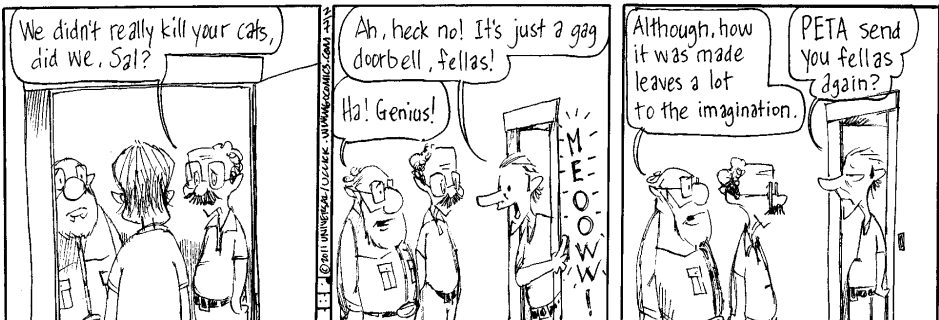

# Beware DEQ budget cuts that bring in the feds

Given all the wrenching challenges over education and Medicaid facing the Legislature, it’s likely that most lawmakers last week paid little heed to the testimony of Idaho Department of Environmental Quality director Toni Hardesty before the Joint Finance-Appropriations Committee.

They should have.

As with every other state, the federal Environmental Protection Agency yields some control to Idaho in environmental permitting, regulatory and enforcement programs.

But maybe not as much in the not-too-distant future.

DEQ is now “precariouly close in several programs” to losing state primacy, Hardesty warned, which would mean the federal government would

step back in to take over the environmental regulation programs in the state; further budget cuts could force that.

Idaho doesn’t want to go down that road. Take Idaho Congressman Mike Simpson’s word for it.

Simpson, a Republican, is the new chairman of the House Appropriations Committee’s Subcommittee on Interior, Environment and Related Agencies. He took the job in large part because of his concerns about the encroaching power of the EPA.

The congressman has tangled for two years with EPA Administrator Lisa Jackson over mandates from

the agency that have saddled small Idaho communities with unreasonable wastewater standards.

Simpson is also critical of the feds’ increased efforts to curtail the dust raised by livestock and grain milling, its “bloated” long-term plan for environmental cleanup of the Silver Valley and oversight of the methane released by cattle.

The congressman is also concerned about EPA’s move to regulate greenhouse gas emissions in the absence of comprehensive climate-change legislation from Congress.

Long story short: If EPA under Jackson sees an opportunity to expand regulation, it’s more than likely to try.

That worries state Rep. Jim Patrick, R-Twin Falls, a member of JFAC.

“The EPA, they don’t come out to try to help you,” he said. “They just fine you.”

DEQ started fiscal year 2009 with a state appropriation of \$18.1 million. For fiscal year 2011, which begins in July, the department is looking at a \$14.2 million appropriation.

For this fiscal year, Gov. C.L. “Butch” Otter has recommended an agency holdback of 7.5 percent, or \$1.1 million. The proposal for fiscal year 2011 reflects a base reduction of \$449,800.

Hardesty, who has 27 positions vacant due to lack of funding and the lowest number of employees in the agency’s history, has furloughed all her workers and of necessity assigned employees to jobs they weren’t hired to do. At the same time, DEQ has taken over primacy from the federal government for the underground storage tank program, oversees field burning, a “brownfields” program, cleanup work in the Coeur d’Alene basin and the drinking water and wastewater loan program.

In short, the department has little margin for error.

Are there higher priorities in the state budget than ensuring that Idaho doesn’t have to yield more regulation to the feds? Sure. But if that happens, the state’s cities, businesses, farmers and dairymen may pay the price.

# We’re teetering on the edge of a new oil crisis

WASHINGTON — The Age of Oil continues; we need to deal with it. The upheaval in Egypt reminds us of lessons that, despite decades of warnings, Americans have consistently sidestepped: the United States and the rest of the world will depend on oil for the indefinite future; global oil markets remain hostage to political crises that cannot be predicted or controlled; and we have not taken the prudent steps that would reduce — though not eliminate — our vulnerability to catastrophic oil interruptions.

Just what Egypt’s crisis will do to oil markets is, as yet, unclear. Driven by cold weather and strong demand from developing countries, oil prices were already increasing before Egyptians took to the streets. After averaging about \$2.80 a gallon for most of last year, U.S. gasoline prices pierced the \$3 barrier in December. Prices rose further on the turmoil, but the gains could be short-lived. Egypt produces only about 700,000 barrels a day. That’s not much compared to global demand of nearly 90 million barrels daily. If all of Egypt’s production halted, it could be replaced because the world now has about 4 mbd of surplus capacity elsewhere.

A greater risk involves oil shipments. The Suez Canal and the SuMed pipeline together now move about 3 mbd between Asia and Europe. If these supplies were blocked, prices would almost certainly rise. But, again, accommodations would be made. Tankers would be rerouted; shipments via other pipelines would increase.

The real flash point would occur if a cascade of political turmoil cut production from major suppliers: Saudi Arabia (present output: 8.5 mbd), Kuwait (2.3 mbd), Iran (3.7 mbd),

Iraq (2.4 mbd) or Algeria (1.3 mbd). This danger will remain no matter how the present crisis ends.

What can we do? Well, two things: decrease oil consumption, preferably by a stiffer gasoline tax; and increase production, preferably by less-hostile regulation. The Obama administration isn’t doing either. Instead, it’s touting a goal of 1 million electric hybrid vehicles by 2015. This is more public relations than policy. The goal is probably unrealistic; first-year sales of the Chevy Volt may reach 25,000. Even if the 1 million is attained, the oil savings would be tiny — perhaps 40,000 barrels a day, about two-tenths of 1 percent of U.S. consumption of 19 million barrels a day. There are already 240 million cars and light trucks using gasoline.

By contrast, lost production from restrictions on drilling in the Gulf of Mexico could total 200,000 barrels a day in 2012, by one government estimate. The administration overreacted to the Deepwater Horizon blowout. There hasn’t been much encouragement of on-shore drilling, either, despite better prospects. In

2009, domestic oil production rose for the first time since 1991, in part because higher prices and new drilling techniques made it profitable to extract once-inaccessible oil. Production in North Dakota’s Bakken field has surged; there are guarded hopes for gains in Texas’ Permian Basin.

A higher gasoline tax would dampen wild swings in fuel prices and push consumers to buy the more-fuel-efficient vehicles that the government is ordering auto companies to make. Americans have traditionally preferred bigger vehicles and, without the prod, might cling to old habits. There is a convergence here between energy and budget policy. An energy tax would help both. It would improve oil security and, with spending cuts, curb budget deficits. Neither the Obama administration nor congressional Republicans seem willing to grasp the possibilities.

None of this will achieve “energy independence,” which has always been a mirage since it was first proposed in the 1970s. Our need for imported oil — now about half our consumption — is simply too great to be overcome by

production increases or efficiencies. But we could temper that dependence and the cost of imports, which routinely exceeds \$250 billion annually.

Barring unforeseen technological breakthroughs, oil isn’t going gently into the night. That’s confirmed by three recent projections of future energy markets: one from the International Energy Agency in Paris; a second from the U.S. Energy Information Administration; and a third from ExxonMobil. All make generous assumptions about gains from energy efficiencies, including vehicles, and expanded renewable supplies. All still conclude that oil will meet a quarter or more of global energy demand for decades. ExxonMobil projects that the number of light-duty vehicles worldwide will grow 50 percent to 1.2 billion by 2030. Most will use gasoline. Two-fifths of the increase occurs in China. Competition for global oil supplies will intensify. We cannot escape that reality, even if we ignore it.

The past action by the county commissioners has been to spend money on a study. There has been a study to see if a regional

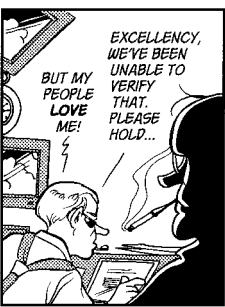
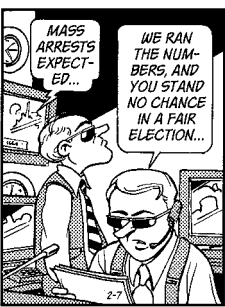
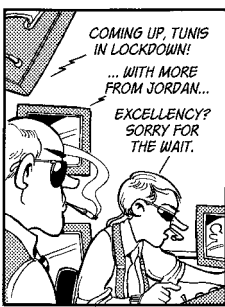

# Two men arrested, charged in fatal shootings at Ohio fraternity house

YOUNGSTOWN, Ohio — Two men angry over a dispute at an Ohio fraternity house party left the gathering and returned early Sunday, spraying bullets into a crowd and killing a Youngstown State University student who was trying to separate two groups, authorities said. Eleven other people were injured, including a 17-year-old with a critical head wound.

The men were arrested and charged later Sunday with aggravated murder, shooting into a house and 11 counts of felonious assault, Youngstown police Chief Jimmy Hughes said. The suspects are in their early 20s and from the Youngstown area, but Hughes withheld their names pending further investigation.

“These guys were in the location for a little while before the shooting occurred,” he said. “Something happened that they

became unhappy. They had some type of altercation.”

The shooting occurred at a two-story brick house in a neighborhood of once-elegant homes, many of which are now boarded up. The house party had been bustling with 50 or more people early Sunday, Hughes said.

“Somebody just got shot!” a caller tells a dispatcher on a recording of the 911 call.

The Mahoning County coroner’s office identified the dead student as 25-year-old Jamail E. Johnson. He was shot once in the head and multiple times in his hips and legs; an autopsy is planned Monday, said Dr. Joseph Ohr, a forensic pathologist with the coroner’s office.

Capt. Rod Foley said Johnson apparently was trying to separate two groups when he was shot.

“(Johnson) was just an excellent, excellent young man, and our loss runs deep,” said Christopher Cooper, a legal officer for

Omega Psi Phi fraternity. The senior had recently traveled to North Carolina for a fraternity program emphasizing manhood and scholarship, Cooper said.

Johnson’s fraternity brothers were trying to decide whether to return to the house, he said. They were “very solemn, very alarmed, very hurt,” Cooper said.

The 11 people who were injured ranged in age from 17 to 31. About half of them were shot in the foot, police said. Two were hit in the abdomen, and the most seriously hurt was the 17-year-old who was shot near one ear.

They were taken to nearby St. Elizabeth Health Center. Eight of them had been treated and released by afternoon, hospital spokeswoman Tina Creighton said. She said she could not release the conditions of the other three.

The university said six of the injured were students.

Members of the university-sanctioned Omega Psi Phi fraternity lived at the house,

YSU spokesman Ron Cole said.

Omega Psi Phi doesn’t own the house, Cooper said.

A neighbor, Rodger Brown, 54, said the house and an adjacent home that has Greek lettering indicating a fraternity often have parties on Friday and Saturday nights but had caused no problems in the neighborhood.

“It’s a nice, quiet neighborhood,” he said.

Ohio Gov. John Kasich planned to meet Monday in Youngstown with YSU president Cynthia Anderson and Mayor Jay Williams to discuss the shootings.

“This is one of those days that every university president across the country, as well as many other officials, always dread,” Anderson said at a news conference on campus.

Anderson said she had been assured by police that there was no threat to the urban campus in northeast Ohio near the Pennsylvania border.

#### Obama says people who hate him don't know him

President Barack Obama says he doesn't take it personally when people say they hate him. And the thing he dislikes most about being president is the constant, intense scrutiny.

"The people who dislike you don't know you. The folks who hate you, they don't know you," Obama said Sunday in an interview broadcast during Fox's pre-game coverage of the Super Bowl. "What they hate is whatever funhouse mirror image of you that's out there. They don't know you."

Asked by Fox News Channel host Bill O'Reilly whether his critics annoyed him, Obama said: "By the time you get here, you have to have had a pretty thick skin. If you didn't, then you probably wouldn't have gotten here."

The 14-minute, live interview sought Obama's views on a range of timely matters, including the unrest in Egypt and the ultimate fate of the new health care law. O'Reilly also probed Obama on lighter topics, including which team would win the NFL championship game and the worst part of his job.

Obama lamented anew about "being in the bubble." He is followed practically everywhere by staff, Secret Service agents and the media.

"It's very hard to escape," said Obama, seated in the Blue Room of the White House. "Every move you make ... and over time, you know, what happens is is that you feel like you're not able to just have a spontaneous conversation with folks. And that's a loss. That's a big loss."

Asked what surprised him after he took office, Obama said it's that he's never asked to solve an easy problem.

"I think that the thing you understand intellectually but that you don't understand in your gut until you're in the job ... is that every decision that comes to my desk is something that nobody else has been able to solve," he said. "The easy stuff gets solved somewhere by somebody else. By the time it gets to me, you don't have easy answers."

#### Reagan celebrated by Nancy, Beach Boys on 100th birthday

SIMI VALLEY — Former first lady Nancy Reagan praised her late husband Sunday, laying a wreath on his grave and singing "Happy Birthday" with the Beach Boys as actors, musicians, former advisers and friends paid tribute to Ronald Reagan on the 100th anniversary of his birth.

Nancy Reagan greeted the crowd of about 1,500 invited dignitaries under a tent on the east lawn of the Ronald Reagan Presidential Library on in Simi Valley.

"I know that Ronnie would be thrilled," the 89-year-old said, looking skyward, "and is thrilled, to have all of you share in his 100th birthday. It doesn't seem possible, but that's what it is."

After a crowd including son Ron Reagan and former Vice President Dick Cheney rose to its feet in applause, she shouted "Happy Birthday Ronnie!"

#### Wrestling team exposed to raccoon pulled from tourney

GRAND FORKS — A raccoon has ended a North Dakota team's bid for a fourth consecutive regional championship in high school wrestling.

The Carrington High School team was pulled from Saturday's tournament when officials discovered the athletes had been exposed to a live raccoon.

Grafton Police Sgt. Anthony Dumas says the team picked up what members thought was a dead raccoon on the way to the tournament in Grafton and stowed in the storage area of their bus. Dumas says when the compartment was opened later, the raccoon "just trotted away."

The animal didn't scratch or bite anyone, but it's not known whether it had rabies.

The Grand Forks Herald reports school officials brought the team home as a precaution. Health officials say there's no risk to athletes who competed against Carrington.

# Egyptian opposition softens demand for Mubarak's immediate departure

CAIRO — The main Egyptian opposition groups eased up on their insistence that President Hosni Mubarak step down immediately, agreeing instead on Sunday to join in talks toward overhauling the country's political system at a more gradual pace while Mubarak remains in office.

The shift suggested that Mubarak and his allies may have succeeded in defusing the fiercest of cries from opponents who had insisted that the president resign as a precondition for any talks. It followed the clearest signals yet from the Obama administration that its call for a quick transition in Egypt did not include a demand that Mubarak step aside before elections this fall.

Among those who joined for the first time in talks with Omar Suleiman, Mubarak's newly appointed vice president, were leaders from the banned Muslim Brotherhood movement, along with a loose coalition of political parties, intellectuals and protest organizers. Suleiman said the government will agree to consider sweeping changes, including constitutional amendments and a possible end to Egypt's three-decade-old state of emergency.

While the meeting itself was a concession to opposition groups, the setting underscored who remains

in charge. The parties gathered around a formal, oval-shaped dais as a portrait of Mubarak gazed down on them.

In a television interview, Suleiman made it clear that the government's willingness to consider the changes was based on an expectation that Mubarak would stay in charge during a drawn-out transition to a new government. Mubarak has insisted that he will not leave before his term ends in September.

“If President Mubarak would say that ‘I’m leaving now,’ who would take over?” Suleiman told ABC. “I think with this atmosphere, that means that the other people who have their

own agenda will make instability in our country.”

The developments did not appear to satisfy the crowds of protesters who have packed Tahrir Square in the heart of the capital for two weeks. Thousands continued to occupy the plaza on Sunday, even as banks, schools and shops reopened across Egypt and traffic jams returned to Cairo's normally anarchic streets.

Many among the protesters said they had no choice but to hold firm. If the demonstrations were to end prematurely, they said, Mubarak and Suleiman would renege on their promises and deploy the feared secret police to round up dissenters.

“All these attempts at putting people to sleep by responding to very marginal demands is just a tactic to gain time,” said Hafez Moussa, 36, a Muslim cleric from the al-Azhar district in Cairo. “As soon as people leave the square, he will take his revenge on all of them.”

Army units have increased their presence in and around Tahrir Square, parking tanks on every street. Although they have allowed the protests to unfold, military officials have gradually imposed obstacles — more checkpoints, more coils of razor wire, limitations on television cameras — and urged demonstrators to go home.

#### Trial opens of 3 Americans on spy charges

TEHRAN — Two Americans accused of spying appeared in a closed-door Iranian court session Sunday to begin trial after an 18-month detention that has brought impassioned family appeals, a stunning bail deal to free their companion and backdoor diplomatic outreach by Washington through an Arab ally in the Gulf.

All three — two in person and one in absentia — entered not guilty pleas during the five-hour hearing, said their lawyer, Masoud Shafiei.

He added that he was barred by Iranian law from giving any further details of the proceedings. But he noted that the judge decided for at least one more session in Tehran Revolutionary Court, which deals with state security cases including some of the high-profile opposition figures arrested in the violent aftermath of Iran's disputed election in 2009.

He described the jailed Americans — Shane Bauer and Josh Fattal — as appearing in good health and said they sat next to him during the trial session. “I hoped the case would have ended today,” Shafiei told The Associated Press. “I now hope they fix the next session for the near future.”

### CAMBODIA

#### Thai, Cambodian troops clash at border

PHNOM PENH — Machine-gun and artillery fire echoed across the frontier between Thailand and Cambodia earlier today as their troops clashed near an 11th century temple in the fourth day of fighting that has killed at least five people.

The crumbling stone temple, several hundred feet from Thailand's eastern border with Cambodia, has fueled nationalism on both sides of the disputed frontier for decades and conflict over it has sparked sporadic, brief battles in recent years. However, sustained fighting has been rare.

Cambodian officials say Thai artillery collapsed part of a wall Sunday at the Preah Vihear temple, a U.N. World Heritage site, but Thai officials have dismissed that account as propaganda, and the extent of damage is unknown.

Cambodian government spokesman Phay Siphon said skirmishes began again early today after halting around midnight. There was no immediate comment from Thai authorities, but an Associated Press reporter in the area said the sound of gunfire and artillery could be heard.

Late Sunday, U.N. Secretary-General Ban Ki-moon said he was “deeply concerned” by the fighting and urged both sides “to exercise maximum restraint,” his spokesperson said in a statement.

### BRITAIN

#### WikiLeaks' Assange faces hearing

LONDON — WikiLeaks founder Julian Assange and his entourage of lawyers, supporters, protesters and journalists are headed back to a London court for a showdown between the secret-spilling computer hacker and Swedish authorities who want him extradited to face sex crimes allegations.

A two-day hearing that begins today will decide Assange's legal fate. It will also keep the spotlight away from WikiLeaks' revelations and on its opinion-dividing frontman.

Assange is accused of sexual misconduct by two women he met during a visit to Stockholm last year. At Belmarsh Magistrates' Court, a high-security judicial outpost beside a prison, defense lawyers will argue that he should not be extradited because he has not been charged with a crime, because of flaws in Swedish prosecutors' case — and because a ticket to Sweden could land him in Guantanamo Bay or on U.S. death row.

#### Thin Lizzy guitarist Gary Moore dies at 58

LONDON — Bandmates say rock guitarist Gary Moore, a former member of influential Irish band Thin Lizzy, has died. He was 58.

Manager Adam Parsons told the BBC that Moore was found dead Sunday at a hotel on Spain's Costa del Sol, where he was on holiday. The cause of death was not immediately known.

Thin Lizzy drummer Brian Downey said Moore's death was a “total shock,” and guitarist Scott Gorham said he was “a great player and a great guy.”

Born in Belfast, Northern Ireland in 1952, Moore was a member of Dublin band Skid Row before joining Thin Lizzy in 1973, playing on tracks for the “Nightlife” album. He left after four months, but rejoined four years later and played on the band's “Black Rose” album before going solo once again. He had a successful solo career, and his accomplished, bluesy playing won plaudits from other musicians.

## RUNNING THROUGH

What to keep in mind when you're lacing up for a chilly run

Short days, icy roads, biting winds.

Winter isn't conducive to running or outdoor workouts. But with a few tweaks to your routine, it's still possible to enjoy a jog around the neighborhood or a sprint on the track.

Elmer Musgrave, girl's track coach for Jerome High School, said many of the student athletes stay inside during winter, opting instead to play basketball, swim and focus on core training to maintain their fitness level.

But long-distance runners like Jasmine Nesbitt often tough it out in the cold weather.

To prepare for the chill, they warm up indoors. Nesbitt said her winter warmup is the same as her summer stretching, but after her run, she makes sure to stretch extra.

Wearing thick, heavy clothes is a good way to overheat, but runners can remove layers when they get too warm. Nesbitt, 15, wears Under Armour and jackets on winter runs. When she gets hot, Nesbitt ties the jackets around her waist.

Another problem: The cold air can make breathing

painful for runners. Nesbitt puts IcyHot on her upper lip, just under her nose, to ease the sharp lung pain.

"It helps," she said. Other girls wrap light scarves around their mouths, Musgrave said.

Twin Falls assistant city manager Travis Rothweiler is cautious about running outside in winter.

"If it's really windy or significantly below freezing, then I'm not going outside,"

Rothweiler said. And if it's icy, forget about it.

"I won't run on ice. I don't want to slip and fall," he said.

On days like that, Rothweiler either rests or turns to an alternative workout, like lifting or finding a treadmill. Running on a treadmill is brutal, he said, but better than slipping on ice.

"Sometimes it's better to find that treadmill in the gym and endure that kind of psy-

chological pain as opposed to the physical pain that will put you out for a longer period of time," he said.

When Rothweiler does brave the chill, he starts off lightly.

"I find the worst thing for me is to break a sweat early, simply because as you tend to get more warm and you sweat more, there's a chance that could turn into cold pretty quick," he said.

Rothweiler has exercise-

induced asthma, which gets worse when the weather is cold. He uses his rescue inhaler before a winter run to open his airways, then takes it with him in case he has problems on the route.

Joey Avila, an 18-year-old sprinter for Jerome High School, said snow isn't a deal-breaker for his outdoor workouts.

"It's just about the equivalent of running in the sand," Avila said. It offers resistance against legs, making it a great workout.

"You just have to be careful where you're going," he said. Ice and deep snow can cause problems. Stick to running in the snow-covered grass, he advised.

What keeps him inside? Wind. That's where the real cold comes from, he said. On those days, he does fast-

paced circuit weight training to keep his heart rate up.

Unlike Avila, Nesbitt stays inside when it's too cold or snowy, opting for the treadmill.

If the weather is really nasty, focus on what you can do inside instead of daydreaming of sunny days. Musgrave gives his athletes an outline of suggested exercises that will keep them in shape during the off-season. Discus thrower and shot putter Tim Wyatt, 17, works on weight lifting and foot drills. Unlike the runners, he sticks to the Jerome High weight room full time when the weather turns rough.

"For winter, I stay in here," he said.

## Leeches make a comeback as medical helpers

BALTIMORE — Marc Miller survived a motorcycle crash in October near his Baltimore County, Md., home, but his foot had been dragged along the pavement and badly damaged. That injury would require both the most advanced medicine and an ancient therapy — leeches.

Trauma doctors at Johns Hopkins, the University of Maryland and other U.S. hos-

pitals routinely use leeches as a temporary measure to keep blood flowing as new vessels grow in a damaged area. The animals kept blood moving in and out of a new skin flap sewn onto Miller's foot. They also can get blood flowing to amputated digits that are reattached. And because the leeches' saliva has a natural anesthetic, some doctors now are looking to use them to ease pain.

"They can be the difference in whether the tissue lives or

dies," Dr. Scott D. Lifchez, who treated Miller and is section chief of plastic surgery at Johns Hopkins Bayview Medical Center, said about the blood-sucking worms.

The U.S. Food and Drug Administration gave its approval to market leeches as medical devices in 2004, though they had been used for many years before then. And their use appears to be growing, said Dr. Ronald A. Sherman, director of the BioTherapeutics, Education

and Research Foundation, which supports the medical use of leeches and other furry, slimy and microscopic animals.

Guide dogs may be the best-known in the category, said Sherman. But others, particularly leeches and maggots that clean wounds, are gaining in popularity. Maggots are used more than 50,000 times a year worldwide, he said.

As for the use of leeches, Sherman said there is no registry or certification board for physicians in the United States, so no one can say how often they are used for medical purposes. At an annual conference hosted by his group, seminars on leeches drew 100 medical professionals last year, more than any other year.

"In other countries, use of leeches has been ongoing for centuries, but in the United States, I would call it a comeback," said Sherman, a retired University of California researcher. "The introduction of leeches for draining blood occurred in the late 1970s, maybe early '80s, but my perception is that it's getting more known."

Records of the use of leeches in medical treatment stretch back many centuries — to a painting in an Egyptian tomb around 1500 BC, according to one study in a medical journal. Bloodletting therapies were popular in Europe during the 17th and 18th centuries, triggering shortages of the animals in some countries. Later, as medical science advanced and bacteria became the focus of treatment, the use of leeches faded. But in the 1970s, their use was revived in microsurgery, the study noted.

Sherman said the primary use today is draining congested blood in damaged appendages or skin flaps. The leeches have a natural anticoagulant that breaks up small clots and keeps new ones from forming. That allows pools of blood to drain and keeps blood flowing freely until new vessels connect.

Doctors direct the blood-suckers to a specific site — Dr. Lifchez uses Vaseline and gauze to nudge them into place. They draw blood for about 15 minutes and fall off once they are full.

The alternative might be losing the appendage or having a more complicated surgery, said Sherman, who also notes the leeches are relatively inexpensive — Carolina Biological Supply Co., one of

two U.S. suppliers, sells a 2-to-4-inch leech, *Hirudo medicinalis*, for \$19.50. (Includes instructions. Sold only to schools and businesses, company marketing materials say.) Leeches USA Ltd. sells them for under \$10 when purchased in bulk. The companies do not release sales information.

Lifchez used a leech every six to 12 hours on Miller over several days while he was in the intensive-care unit. There, nurses could watch over him and the animals. Miller said sometimes he'd alert the staff when a leech was done feeding so it could be properly disposed of.

Circulation problems arise in up to a quarter of cases of free tissue transfer, and the wound can benefit from leeches, Lifchez said.

It was a day or so after Miller's 10-hour operation in October to place the new skin flap — which included some fat and vessels — when it began to look a little purplish.

Lifchez and another surgeon checked to make sure the sutures weren't too tight and the vessel connections were properly done. But still the blood wasn't flowing properly. They did not want to lose the foot, a likely prospect just a couple of decades ago.

The leeches arrived by overnight delivery.

Faced with amputation or more surgery, most patients are receptive to being treated with leeches, Lifchez says. Miller, who had once wanted to be a veterinarian, and his mother, Delores Williams, who is a nurse, both knew about leeches' abilities and didn't need any convincing.

Lifchez said circulation is normal in Miller's skin now. He may need another procedure to remove some fat transferred with the skin, making his foot bulge a bit. That would make it easier for his foot to fit in a shoe.

For now, Miller will remain at home supervised by his mother, who is thankful for the Hopkins team that saved her son's foot — and for Miller's declaration that his motorcycle days over.

## BIOTHERAPEUTIC MEDICINE

Here are established therapies and some in the research phase:

- **Leeches:** The worms suck out pooled blood in areas with bad circulation, and because their saliva contains an anticoagulant it helps improve blood flow. An anesthetic property is also being explored for use as a painkiller for those with rheumatoid arthritis and other painful maladies.
- **Maggots:** Johns Hopkins physician William Baer found in the 1930s that maggots effectively cleaned dead tissue in problem wounds, and though penicillin made them obsolete, they have returned with the growth of antibiotic-resistant bacteria.
- **Service animals:** Guide dogs are well-known, but they also offer hearing and service in emergencies for disabled people. Pets, including horses, also are used to reduce depression and loneliness, and research is expanding into canines that sniff for cancer.
- **Microorganisms:** Some parasitic forms such as bacteriophage may help eradicate infections.
- **Honeybees:** Bee venom, passed on in a sting, contains an anti-inflammatory that may help people with severe pain from rheumatoid arthritis, multiple sclerosis and other maladies.

## THE ACES ON BRIDGE®

One of my main concerns with the administration of bridge is that proper care and attention be taken to foster the development of the game in schools and universities.

In Europe, school championships and girls' championships run at the same time as the Junior European championships. This means talented players in their teens get a chance to meet their peers and develop faster. Over the years I have seen some of the more successful players move through the ranks, representing their countries both at junior level and later in the open events.

In Romania in 2009 the bulletins discussed a nice play produced by Turkey's Ozge Tekin against Italy in the girls' championships.

A spirited auction saw Tekin declaring six clubs doubled on the lead of the spade five. Italy's Giorgia Botta won the ace and switched to the diamond king. Tekin won the ace, drew trumps, and now needed to negotiate the heart suit for four tricks to bring home her slam.

Because East had bid to four spades on her own and probably had diamond strength if not length, Tekin judged her to be short in hearts. So she cashed the heart ace and finessed the nine on the second round of the suit.

She came back to hand with a trump and finessed the heart jack, making 12 tricks for a magnificent score of 1090.

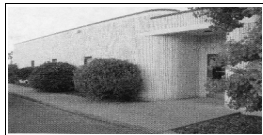

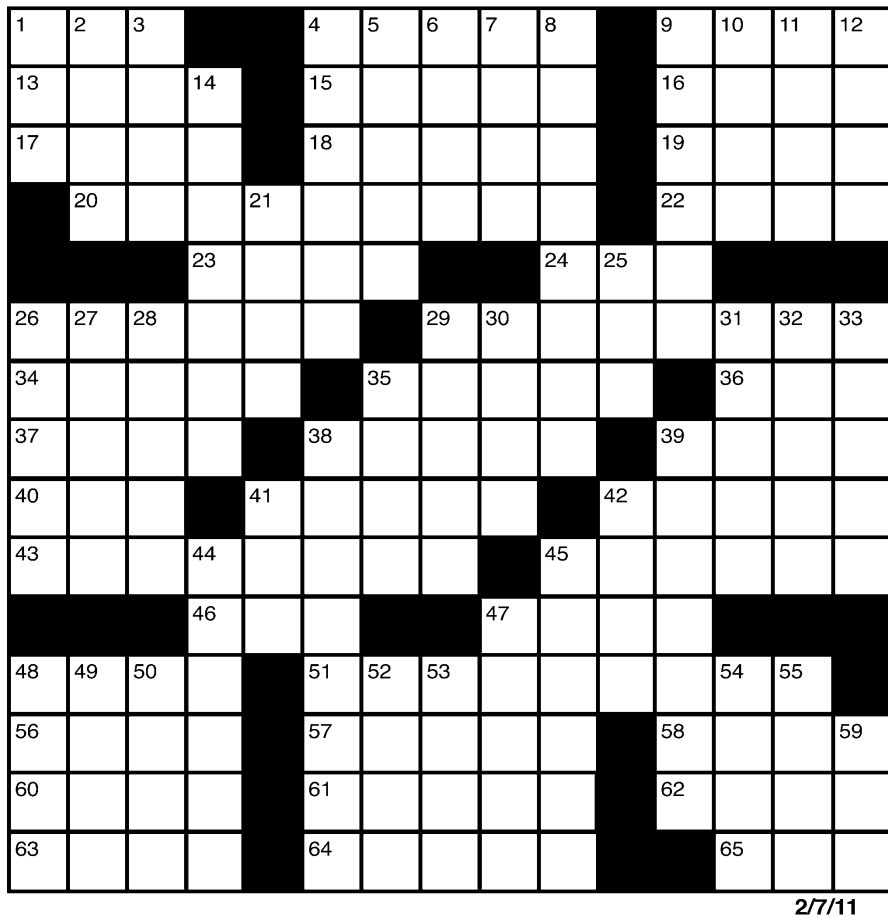

**On this date:**  
In 1857, a French court acquitted author Gustave Flaubert of obscenity for his serialized novel "Madame Bovary."

In 1861, the general council of the Choctaw Indian nation adopted a resolution declaring allegiance with the South "in the event a permanent dissolution of the American Union takes place."

In 1904, a fire began in Baltimore that raged for about 30 hours and destroyed more than 1,500 buildings.

In 1931, aviator Amelia Earhart married publisher George P. Putnam in Noank, Conn.

In 1943, the government announced the start of shoe rationing, limiting consumers to buying three pairs per person for the remainder of the year.

In 1948, Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower resigned as Army chief of staff; he was succeeded by Gen. Omar Bradley.

In 1971, women in Switzerland gained the right to vote through a national referendum, 12 years after a previous attempt failed.

In 1984, space shuttle Challenger astronauts Bruce McCandless II and Robert L. Stewart went on the first untethered space walk, which lasted nearly six hours.

In 1991, Jean-Bertrand Aristide was inaugurated as the first democratically elected president of Haiti (however, he was overthrown by the military in Sept. 1991; he was restored in 1994).

In 1999, Jordan's King Hussein died of cancer at age 63; he was succeeded by his eldest son, Abdullah.

**Ten years ago:** The Senate voted to release \$582 million in dues owed the United Nations. The space shuttle Atlantis blasted off on a trip to the international space station. Jean-Bertrand Aristide was sworn in as Haiti's president, five years after leaving office. Death claimed singer-actress Dale Evans at age 88 and author Anne Morrow Lindbergh, widow of aviator Charles Lindbergh, at age 94.

**Five years ago:** Some 10,000 mourners, including four U.S. presidents, said goodbye to Coretta Scott King during a service in Lithonia, Ga. Abu Hamza al-Masri, a radical Muslim cleric linked to 9/11 plotter Zacarias Moussaoui, was sentenced in London to seven years in prison for inciting followers to kill non-Muslims. Phoenix Coyotes assistant coach Rick Tocchet was charged with financing a nationwide gambling ring based out of New Jersey. (Tocchet later pleaded guilty to promoting gambling and conspiracy to promote gambling and was sentenced to two years' probation.)
