T.F. teens take robot to state competition

call themselves "Newton's Brothers" in honor of the famed scientist Isaac Newton.

The team of six teenage boys has used Newton's accomplishments as inspiration over the four months they've spent tackling their biggest scientific challenge yet. Their boxy metal robot stands 18 inches tall and finally received a name on Tuesday night, when the boys gathered for the last time before they take their creation to the University of Idaho in Moscow for a robotics competition on Saturday.

"Prism?" Twin Falls High School junior Mark Sneddon asked his teammates.

"Yeah, Newton discovered the prism and light," said Roman Terry, another TFHS junior. "Out comes the rainbow?

The teens aren't terribly opposed to the descriptor "nerd" and a few throw out words usually relegated to the deep recesses of the dictionary. But the six well-spoken sophomores and juniors are quick to point out their involvement in high school sports, two contrasting pursuits that share some terminology.

"It was a bit difficult at first. We had a big learning curve to get over because we are a rookie team," Sneddon said of the robot project. "But everyone has stepped up to work together."

Sneddon said some of the crew volunteered at a LEGO robot competition at the Herrett Center for Arts and Science in November and learned about the First Tech Challenge, a robotics competition for high school students. Sneddon has acted as the project manager - his team includes Terry, Dakotah Doshier,

Rep. Patrick proposes reducing sportsmen's fees for injured vets

BOISE - Disabled veterans from across the U.S. may be given one more reason to visit the Gem State for hunting excursions.

Rep. Jim Patrick, R-Twin Falls, introduced legislation Wednesday to reduce the fees vets from outside Idaho pay for sportsman licenses and tags in Idaho. Ultimately, Patrick's proposal to House Resources and Conservation Committee would provide hundreds of dollars of savings for each veteran's trip

and enhance the financial ability of nonprofit groups that want to give vets a taste of Idaho hunting.

The bill would give the same rates to non-Idaho veterans that Idaho's disabled veterans receive. To receive the discount, veterans would need to participate in a hunt sponsored by a qualified nonprofit organization that works with disabled veterans.

Patrick has worked on the issue with Monte Bruhn of Buhl, who last year started Doug Bridges Memorial Hunts, an organization

CSI streamlines transfer process

The agreement is a one-page document – simple in its text to signify the seamless transition for students who earn a CSI associate degree and now will be granted junior standing with up to 70 transfer credits at C of I.

ELKO – After being thrice rejected in his quest to open a northern Nevada brothel, George Tate might have given up.

But the Twin Falls man kept returning to Elko, Nev., to prove his finances were legitimate, and finally Police Chief Don Zumwalt and city councilmen approved his brothel license application late Tuesday night.

"City code is clear about the qualifications of a financial records to the brothel license applicant," Zumwalt said. "You can't Zumwalt. Zumwalt said Tate's criminal background is basically "squeaky clean" and added that city officials only questioned his finances. When Tate first visited Zumwalt nearly four months ago, he carried "loads of cash," the police chief said, to prove his financial solvency.

"I kind of took it at face value and we kept tabling (his request)," Zumwalt said. "I told him we want legitimate business owners, not guys coming in here with just cash."



face fines after 2014. Constitutional scholars and the Idaho attorney general have said legislative attempts to nullify the law are unlikely to survive legal challenges. They say Idaho is better off pursuing the case in court, where a federal judge in Florida has already ruled against the overhaul even as other courts have ruled more favorably. It's likely bound for U.S.

Supreme Court review. David Gray Adler, a constitutional scholar who directs the University of Idaho's McClure Center for Public Policy Research, has said there's nothing in the U.S. Constitution to support that nullification is a lawful means of opposing the federal government. Idaho Assistant Chief Deputy Attorney General Brian Kane has written that states can't "pick and choose" which federal laws to follow.


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Skier dies at Sun Valley Ski Resort

Male wasn't wearing helmet



Dialing back public kindergarten a dumb idea

n 2007 – at taxpayer expense – state Rep. Steve Thayn, R-Emmett, spent five months chairing an interim task force of the Idaho House of Representatives on family issues.

Its recommendations — which were mostly Thayn's, not his committee's — were so farfetched that House Republican leaders stripped them from the panel's final reports to lawmak-

So it's no surprise that Thayn is the author of the silliest notion so far put forward in the 61st Legislature: cutting two-thirds of the \$50 million the state now appropriates to kindergartens, and leaving \$17 million to be used to prepare at-risk students to enter first grade. School districts now receiving money for 36 weeks of kindergarten would only get enough money for

By slashing funding for kindergarten, Thayn says the state could save \$30 million that could then be used to plug holes in the state education budget for grades one through 12.

But if the Legislature follows his suggestion, there will be many other holes to fill.

Our state is already shamefully neglectful of early childhood education. Idaho is one of only 12 states that doesn't provide state funding for prekindergarten classes. While federal dollars

are available for pre-kindergarten classes with special-needs children, there's nothing in place for all youngsters under 5.

Study after study has shown that kids who go to pre-school and kindergarten do better in school later, earn more money when they grow up, and are less likely to get into trouble with the law than those who don't.

The scheme to cut kindergarten comes just weeks after Idaho lawmakers adopted the Common Core Standards which includes about 90 skills kindergarten pupils are expected to master — including the ability to read grade level texts independently and be able to count to 100 - before moving on to first grade.

Opponents of state-funded early childhood education cling to the Father Knows Best argument that early education is the responsibility of parents, not taxpayers.

Maybe in 1951, but not in 2011. There are 74,179 single-parent households in Idaho. Fiftyone percent of kids under 6 live in a home where the parents work, and 18 percent of Idaho children under 6 live below the federally defined poverty level.

That's about \$22,350 a year for a family of four. We'd love to know how those moms and dads are supposed to pay for private schools, if they want their children to attend kindergarten. Or for the additional child-care expenses that gutting public kindergarten programs would require.

It boils down to this: Idaho can pay for early childhood education now, or it can pay much more for prisons and remedial education in college later.

Second blizzard howls through Okla., Ark.

OKLAHOMA CITY -Another powerful blizzard howled through the nation's midsection Wednesday, piling up to 2 feet of new snow on parts of Oklahoma and Arkansas still struggling to clean up from last week's epic winter of 1923-24. storm.

The blowing snow brought traffic to a halt, and the National Guard was summoned to rescue stranded motorists. Subzero wind desperately to protect their herds.

As the storm barreled out of the Plains, it took aim at the Deep South, which was expected to get up to five inches of snow. At least two late Tuesday, about 50 traffic deaths were blamed on the system

night shelter at a truck stop Interstate 44 and U.S. Highway 69, about 60 miles northeast of Tulsa.

"We have a 20-acre parking lot," said owner Katrina Franks. "But it's just utter chaos trying to get them started and keep them mov-

ing." Truck driver Mike Mallory was hauling chemicals from Houston to Iowa when he pulled into the Big Cabin Travel Plaza as the weather worsened.

"It was a rude awakening when I got up this morning," Mallory said. "I can't even see the tollway from the parking lot."

The heaviest snow was concentrated in the northeast corner of the state, where the towns of Colcord and Spavinaw got 22 and 23 inches, respectively. The deepest snow was reported near the village of Jay, with 25

inches. The fresh snow was especially troublesome in Tulsa, where many roads were still impassable from last week's record 14-inch snowfall. The previous storm kept students out of school for at least six days. Mail, bus and trash



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service were only recently until Oklahoma, then it went head of cattle.

Five more inches of snow fell Wednesday in Tulsa, according to the National Weather Service. That raised the city's total for the winter to 25.9 inches, breaking the previous seasonal record of 25.6 inches, set during the

More than 275 National Guard soldiers were deployed in Humvees from armories across the state to search for stranded motorists.

"A Humvee can get chills forced ranchers to work through a lot, but we have some snow drifts that are 5 to 6 feet high," said state Emergency Management spokeswoman Michelann Ooten.

UN VALLEY — The moon was beginning to peek over the bald foothills that stand guard over Trail Creek as I turned my Subaru into the parking lot of the Sun Valley Nordic Center.

I loaded my classic cross country skis and boots and my snowshoes and Sorels into my arms and trudged over, unsure of which I would end up using.

"Come with us," encouraged a snowshoer. "The more the merrier." Looking around, I didn't see any

Nordic skiers. It had rained a little the day before, making tracks a little icy and presumably scaring the skiers off. So I strapped on my snowshoes and joined one of the groups heading out on what was the Sun Valley Nordic Center's first Full Moon Ski and Snowshoe Tour.

Stay away from milky-colored ice; clear ice is strongest

The fish was a rare find, a type of freshwater cod called burbot.

The truth about the 13th zodiac sign and 'wrong' horoscopes

t's rare that I'll defend astrology. But the recent brouhaha over a "new zodiac sign" and how "your sign may be wrong" deserves some clarifica-

First, is there a new zodiac sign, Ophiuchus? Astronomers note that the sun's apparent motion carries it through 13 constellations annually, not 12. From Nov. 29 to Dec. 17, the sun stands before Ophiuchus's stars, but only according to the constellations' borders established by astronomers in 1929. The astrologers' zodiac comprises 12 equal segments, one for each of the traditional signs.

Second, is your zodiac sign wrong? True, on a given date, the sun doesn't stand among the same stars it did two millennia hence. That's because the Earth wobbles like a top, with its axis tracing a 26,000-year circle. Thus, the vernal equinox (AKA the "first point of Aries") is now in Pisces, on its way toward Aquarius (whose "dawning" is still centuries away – or not; astrologers can't agree). However, astrologers say signs merely mark 12 equal segments of the sun's annual circumnavigation of the zodiac starting on the vernal equinox, with no particular

connection to the stars. And that's where they lose me. Even allowing that Earth's orbital position on the day of my birth influences whether or not I'd make a good stock broker, astrologers want to have it both ways. Admittedly,

Climate outlook grim for wolverines in western states

CHEYENNE, Wyo. -New computer modeling reinforces that climate for another high-elevation species, the wolverine.

A warmer climate could reduce the winter and spring mountain snowfall that helps protect wolverine young, Synte Peacock, a Research in Boulder, Colo., said Tuesday.

Things you should know about ATV legislation and hunting

"What's this new • four- wheeler • legisla tion I'm hearing about and what are the issues with Fish and Game?"

I will explain the • Fish and Game issues and then the proposed legislation. This issue has developed a political life of its own with what appears to be a lot of misunderstanding.

The department has the motorized vehicle hunting rule. In effect, it prohibits both motorized crosscountry travel and use of motorized vehicles on trails while hunting. Exceptions to this rule were made for mobility-impaired sportsmen, game retrieval, hunters using motorized vehicles to pack in camps and hunting on private property.

The MVR was developed in 2002 in response to complaints and conflicts between hunters using motorized vehicles off-road and hunters on foot or horseback. Since then, the technology of motorized vehicles has improved, allowing more hunters to access previously secured big-game habitats rarely visited by sportsmen. This improved access by motorized vehicles to secure areas has resulted in increased vulnerability of big game animals to hunter harvest. The loss of security areas for animals roughly translates into fewer mature bucks and bulls available to hunters,



and has created a continuing conflict between motorized and non-motorized sports-

and Game's rule is designed to restrict offroad motorized vehicle use for hunting and only applies to those who are in the act of hunting. The definition of "hunting" is thoroughly defined by state law and it requires more than simply carrying a firearm on an OHV. Nonhunting motorized vehicle users are not affected by this law and this rule in no way creates "defacto wilderness" or affects an individual's Second Amendment right to bear

arms. The Fish and Game Commission has implemented the MVR in 31 biggame management units south of the Salmon River. In the Magic Valley big game management units 45, 47, 49, 52, 52A, 53 and 56 are included in the MVR. About 50 percent of hunters contacted at department check stations in the fall utilize an offhighway vehicle. The majority of hunters generally support restrictions on the use of OHVs for hunting as long as they are allowed

for game retrieval. Some ATV enthusiasts view the Commission's rule to regulate the use of motorized vehicles as an aid to hunting as intrusive to all ATV riders. Others say the rule is discriminatory.

In a way, many hunting and fishing rules do discriminate. For example, seniors, juniors, handicapped and military personnel are treated differently from the rank and file sportsmen because they are given a break on the cost of licenses and tags. Non-residents are required to pay a substantially higher price for licenses and tags. Hunters with a handicapped vehicle permit are one of the groups exempt from the MVR. Many other rules restrict firearms, archery equipment, and muzzle loaders as well as

hunting hours and seasons. Non-motorized sportsmen call the MVR rule a "blessing," enabling them to find places to hunt away from roads without the nearby hum of vehicle activity. They quote research on how motorized vehicle restrictions help facilitate movement by big animals back into areas with roads, thus allowing more animals to stay nearer roaded areas and thereby available to sportsmen hunting by foot.

The proposed legislation would prohibit Fish and Game from recognizing vehicle use as an aid to hunting, thereby nullifying the department's motorized-vehicle hunting rule. For the Fish and Game

Commission to maintain general big game hunting with relatively abundant big game herds, significant restrictions on season length and changes in timing would be required to avoid over-harvesting populations. If off-road vehicle use degraded habitat suitability and availability, the future could also include a steady transition to more restricted hunting oppor-

hunts. Unrestricted motorized vehicle use by hunters would also likely result in a deepened conflict between motorized and non-motorized sportsmen.

The proposed legislation would allow all properly licensed OHVs to travel offroad throughout most of the lands managed by the Idaho Department of Lands and the Bureau of Land Management. This is because most of these areas have no restrictions for offroad vehicle use. The Sawtooth and Boise national forests have both implemented travel plans that designate roads and trails open or closed to motorized vehicles.

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luestion: To save money, my wife and I filed our own Chapter 7 bankruptcy and now the bankruptcy trustee wants to seize my daughter's car because my name is on the title. Is this legal?



nswer: In Idaho, it is well established that if your name is on the title to a car, then you have an ownership interest in that car. When you file a bankruptcy, all the assets you have an ownership interest in become part of your bankruptcy estate and can be liquidated for the benefit of your creditors UNLESS THE ASSET IS EXEMPT under state law. Idaho law provides a generous list of exemptions to protect the common types of property items most people own. However, you and your wife are entitled to only one automobile exemption each. Apparently, you used the exemptions on the cars you and your wife drive, leaving your daughter's car unprotected. Even at this late stage, it might be possible to realign your exemptions to protect all or a portion of the value of your daughter's car. If that is not possible, there are other options including (1) negotiating a cash payment with the trustee in lieu of seizure, and (2) conversion of your case to a case under Chapter 13 of the Bankruptcy Code. You should call an experienced bankruptcy attorney right away.

Hope for victims of granuloma annulare

DEAR DR. GOTT: I would like to know of any effective treatment for granuloma annulare.

DEAR READER: This is a chronic skin condition that presents with raised red or flesh-colored lumps that generally appear on the hands, feet, knees and elbows. The lesions often disappear within two years without treatment; however, they may reappear at a later time, and the cycle will repeat itself. The skin may itch, but this is uncommon. When the condition becomes widespread, ringlike patterns may appear over the body and itching becomes more common.

Your primary-care physician or a dermatologist can often diagnose the condition through visual examination. When questions remain, a skin biopsy for examination under a

microscope might be done, or a KOH test might be considered. This simply involves scraping the skin onto a glass slide for the purpose of collecting dead cells that will ultimately be mixed with potassium hydroxide (KOH) to identify or rule out fungal infection.

Should you choose to treat your granuloma annulare, this might be accomplished through corticosteroid creams, ointments or injections, cryotherapy (freezing) or light therapy. For generalized granuloma annulare, some physicians prescribe topical calcineurin inhibitors. System treatments include hydrox-

ychloroquine, isotretinoin or dapsone. Speak with your physician to determine which treatment might be best. Good luck.

DEAR DR. GOTT: For years, I thought I was suffering from narcolepsy. I can barely stay awake at work, and when I'm home, I do nothing but sleep. This has gotten progressively worse over the past three or four years. I just recently found out that my B12 level is at 149, and my primary-care physician thinks that is the cause of the hypersomnia. I'm getting B12 shots every other week for two months and then will get shots once a month. After three shots, I feel no better. I'm missing out on life because I'm just too tired to do anything.

Walgreens carries a sublingual B12 supplement, which I am tempted to take. Do you think it will help? Is

there some other factor that could be causing me to feel this way? Any suggestions you can give me would be greatly appreciated.

DEAR READER: Vitamin B12 deficiency would cause a number of significant signs, including fatigue, before it would cause true narcolepsy, a chronic sleep disorder. People suffer daytime drowsiness and drop off to sleep at inappropriate times without warning. They may awaken feeling refreshed, fall asleep again, and repeat the pattern. Sleep paralysis may occur, accompanied with vivid dreams and an inability to speak or move during falling asleep or waking.

Diagnosis might be accomplished through polysomnography at a sleep center, a sleep latency test that determines how long it takes a person to fall asleep,

detailed sleep records and a sleep history presented to your doctor.

Vitamin B12 deficiency is relatively rare because the body stores several years worth at a time and a healthful diet to include seafood, milk, cheese and eggs is readily available; however, those with pernicious or megaloblastic anemia, Crohn's, celiac or Grave's disease, lupus and excessive alcohol consumption, as well as vegetarians, vegans and the elderly, may be at increased risk.

Oral B12 tablets are reported to contain more of the vitamin than is available through injection; however, they are not absorbed as well as the injectable form. I recommend you speak with your primary-care physician to be assured this method is appropriate for you. You should also undergo routine lab testing and perhaps X-rays to rule out other conditions to explain your fatigue. Only then can you get to the bottom of the issue.

NY congressman resigns after shirtless photo story

CLARENCE, N.Y. - A married New York congressman accused of sending a shirtless photo of himself to a woman abruptly resigned Wednesday, saying he regretted actions that had hurt his family and others.

The gossip website Gawker reported Wednesday that Rep. Christopher Lee, a two-term Republican with a young son, had emailed the photo to a woman he met on the Craigslist classified-ads website.

Lee said in an e-mailed statement that his resignation was effective immediately. The statement offered no confirmation or details of a Craigslist posting.

"I regret the harm that my actions have caused my ior, acknowledging he He has a business backfamily, my staff and my constituents," Lee said in a statement posted on his congressional website. "I deeply and sincerely apologize to them all. I have made profound mistakes and I promise to work as hard as I can to seek their forgiveness."

Lee said the challenges faced in western New York, where he serves the 26th Congressional District, and across the country are "too serious for me to allow this distraction to continue, so I am announcing that I have resigned my seat in Congress effective immedi-

CALIFORNIA Lohan pleads not guilty to felony theft charge

LOS ANGELES — Lindsay Lohan pleaded not guilty Wednesday to felony grand theft of a \$2,500 necklace the most serious charge yet filed against the troubled starlet who has wrestled with drug and alcohol abuse for years.

"You're in a different situation now that a felony has been filed," Superior Court Judge Keith Schwartz scolded Lohan after she entered the plea through her attorney. "Everybody else has to follow the law. You're no different than anyone else. So please, don't push your luck."

Saying it appeared Lohan had violated her probation in a 2007 drunken driving case, Schwartz set bail at \$40,000 and warned that if she was accused of breaking the law while free, he would have her held without bail.

Lohan, 24, posted bail and was released about an hour after the hearing. She spoke little during the arraignment, except to acknowledge her name and that she understood the charge and possible consequences.

Lohan could face up to three years in state prison if eventually convicted of stealing the necklace in January from a Venice Beach store.

EDEN PRAIRIE, Minn. — The Minnesota Vikings' lottery scratch-off game was a resounding success in its first year, and now the team hopes to use some of the money generated to help pay for a new

The Vikings partnered with the Minnesota State Lottery and the NFL on a Vikings-themed scratch game just before the team reported to training camp in late July. The \$10 game has cleared \$12 million in total sales, making it one of the most successful games in the state.

'This is a great reminder of the strength of the Vikings brand, and we hope the team's partnership with the state lottery continues in the future," Vikings vice president of sales and marketing Steve LaCroix said.

The team has been in a years-long fight at the state capitol to get a new stadium to replace the outdated Metrodome, a pursuit that has only intensified since the dome's roof collapsed under the weight of heavy snow in December. The collapse forced the Vikings to move one home game to Detroit and play another outdoors at the University of Minnesota's TCF Bank Stadium in the final month of the season.

Costs for a new stadium could approach \$900 million, depending on a roof and other amenities. That would mean roughly \$40-60 million a year in public funds would be needed to help pay for the project, a percentage of which the Vikings say could be gained from the lottery game.



Section 1. Title 17.11 entitled "REQUIRED IMPROVEMENTS" is hereby amended by adding Title 17.11.015 entitled "BUILDING REQUIREMENTS FOR COMMERCIAL BUILDINGS"

Section 2. Title 17.11.015 of the Kimberly Municipal Code should be added in its entirety and the following inserted:

17.11.015.

EXTERIOR APPEARANCE OF BUILDINGS AND **STRUCTURES**

A. Primary exterior materials shall conform to the requirements OPEN: found in this Chapter.

B. Secondary materials used on the façade of a building are those that comprise less than ten (10) percent of an elevation area. Permitted secondary materials are all primary materials, aluminum or other metal, cedar or similar quality decorative wood, stucco, EIFS, or other materials as approved by the Planning and Zoning Administrator or his/her designee.

C. All buildings with a footprint of less than ten thousand (10,000) square feet shall incorporate a pitched, gabled, mansard, hipped, or otherwise sloped roof. All sloped roofs shall have a three (3) in twelve (12) inch minimum slope. Wood shingles are prohibited

D. All buildings with a footprint of ten thousand (10,000) square feet and greater shall incorporate sloped roof elements including, but not limited to pitched roofs on towers or arcades, sloped awnings, or sloped parapets. The sloped elements shall be provided along a minimum of sixty (60) percent of each wall's length. All sloped roof elements shall have a three (3) in twelve (12) inch minimum slope. Wood shingles are prohibited.

E. In the CG, CI, CB, and RP Zoning Districts, an articulated parapet wall or cornice may be used in place of the sloped roof as required in Section 17.11.015 (C) and (D) above.

F. All buildings shall be designed to incorporate a form of

architectural articulation every thirty (30) feet, both horizontally along each wall's length and vertically along each wall's height. Acceptable articulation may include the following:

Canopies, awnings, or porticos;

- Recesses/projections;
- Arcades; · Arches:
- Windows will follow the IBC Section 2406.3 which will require safety/tempered glazing for most windows within 18¡E of the floor.
- Architectural details (such as tile work and moldings) integrated into the building facade;
- · Articulated ground floor levels or base;
- Articulated cornice line;
- Integrated planters or wing walls that incorporate landscape and
- Offsets, reveals or projecting rib used to express architectural or structural bays;
- Accent materials (minimum fifteen (15) percent of exterior facade):
- · Varied roof heights: or
- Or other architectural features approved by the Director of PUBLISH: February 10, 2011 Planning, or his/her designee.

G. All buildings shall be architecturally finished on all three sides with the same materials, detailing, and features. The wall which faces the opposite (rear) a public right-of-way of a building, may be architecturally finished to match the remainder of the building in color only. (See definition of "Front" in Zoning Ordinance)

H. Windows shall have a maximum exterior visible reflectivity of twenty (20) percent, unless otherwise approved by the Planning and Zoning Administrator or his/her designee. The intent of this provision is to prevent the safety hazard of light reflecting from the windows on to adjacent roadways.

I.All retail/commercial buildings with facades greater than two hundred (200) feet in length shall incorporate wall plane projections or recesses that are at least six (6) feet deep. Projections/recesses must be at least twenty five (25) percent of the length of the facade. No uninterrupted length of facade may exceed one hundred (100) feet in length. This requirement does not apply to buildings developed and occupied entirely for office

J. All buildings within a common development, as shown on a Concept Plan or Preliminary Site Plan, shall have similar architectural styles, materials, and colors.

1. Conceptual facade plans and sample boards shall be submitted with the Preliminary Site Plan application for all nonresidential uses. The purpose of the conceptual facade plan is to ensure consistency and compatibility for all buildings within a single development. Facade plans will be used only to ensure minimum standards are met.

2. A final facade plan and sample boards shall be submitted with the Final Site Plan application for all non-residential uses. Facade plans will be used only to ensure minimum standards are met.

.. All primary exterior materials shall be of natural texture and

M. Corporate identities that conflict with the building design criteria shall be reviewed on a case-by-case basis and approved by the Planning and Zoning Administrator or his/her designee. The applicant may appeal the decision to the Planning & Zoning Commission and City Council using the appeal procedure in Chapter 17, Section 17.13.010.6 of this Ordinance.

Exposed conduit, ladders, utility boxes, and drain spouts shall be painted to match the color of the building or an accent color. Natural metal finishes (patina) are an acceptable alternative to

2. EXTERIOR CONSTRUCTION OF MAIN BUILDINGS

A. The exterior facades of a main building or structure, excluding glass windows and doors, in the CG, CI, CB and RP Zoning Districts shall be constructed of one hundred (100) percent masonry, unless otherwise specified in this Ordinance. Cementatious fiberboard is considered masonry, but may only constitute fifty (50) percent of stories other than the first story. Cementatious fiber board may also be used for architectural features, including window box-outs, bay windows, roof dormers, garage door headers, columns, chimneys not part of an exterior wall, or other architectural features approved by the

Plan Reviewer. Wood roof shingles are prohibited. B. Metal buildings are permitted in the RP Zoning District upon review by the Planning & Zoning Commission and approval by the City Council subject to:

1. The maximum height of metal buildings is thirty five (35) feet;

2. The lot on which the building is constructed must have frontage only on streets with fifty (50) feet of right-of-way or greater;

3. The lot containing a metal building shall be three hundred (300) feet from all Zoning Districts except Light Industrial

4. The wall of the building facing the street must be one hundred (100) percent masonry, or stucco and

5. Other walls of the building visible from a street must have trees planted on thirty (30) foot centers within twenty five (25) feet of the building.

D. Exterior construction of maintenance buildings for golf courses, public or parochial schools, churches, or the City of Kimberly may be metal upon issuance of a Special Use Permit. Exterior construction of buildings used for agricultural purposes in conjunction with a school may be metal upon issuance of a Special Use Permit.

If an expansion or an addition to an existing metal building is not greater than ten (10) percent or seven thousand (7,000) square feet, whichever is greater, the masonry requirements shall not apply to the expansion or addition to the existing metal building.

The City Council may approve materials which are equivalent to, or exceed, the standards set forth in Chapter 17, Section 17.11.015 above

A SUMMARY OF ORDINANCE NO. 582 AND CHAPTER 17 OF TITLE 8 OF THE KIMBERLY **MUNICIPAL CODE**

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF KIMBERLY, IDAHO, REPEALING CHAPTER 17 OF TITLE 8 OF THE KIMBERLY CITY CODE; ENACTING A NEW CHAPTER 17 OF TITLE 08 OF THE KIMBERLY CITY CODE PROVIDING FOR AND AREA OF CITY IMPACT AND THE ADMINISTRATION THEREOF; AND PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

The City of Kimberly, Idaho and the City Council of the City of Kimberly, pursuant to Idaho Code Section 90-901A hereby publishes a summary of Ordinance No. 582 and a new Chapter 17 of Title 8 of the Kimberly City Code.

A summary of the ordinance providing for an Area of City Impact

The ordinance provides for the geographic Area of City Impact to include all area that is in the south half of Sections 16, 17, and 18 of Township 10 South Range 18 East, along with Sections 19, 20, 21, 28, 29, and 30 of Township 10 South Range 18 East, B.M., Twin Falls County. It provides for the governing plan for the Area of Impact which is the Kimberly Comprehensive Plan, Title 8 of the Kimberly City Code, and Area of Impact map. The Twin Falls County Commissioners appoint and authorize the City of Kimberly, its agents, and employees to enforce and administer the provisions of Title 8 of the Kimberly Code, and to charge and collect fees for the administrative duties. Further the Kimberly Planning and Zoning Commission is appointed to administer Title 8 of the Kimberly City Municipal Code in the Area of Impact.

Persons directly aggrieved by a final decision regarding real property in the Area of Impact may appeal to the Board of Twin Falls County Commissioners.

can be a cruel time for many young people, especially those deemed "outcasts" by their peers. I had a friend in high school who truly suffered. I made it my mission to make sure he felt he had a friend and wasn't completely alone. I hung out with him at lunch, at the library on weekends, and tried to include him in activities I was involved in. I defended him to those who called him names, and although I was younger than he, I felt like his protector.

Now, eight years later and living in different states, we are still friends. He told me recently that I was the only reason he didn't attempt sui cide in high school. He said I had saved his life by just taking a few moments out of my day to say hello or hang out with him. At the time I didn't realize the lifeline I was extending.

LUCY IN OAKLAND, CALIF. **DEAR ABBY:** My teenage

son was similarly "invisible" to most of his classmates and it led to deep depression and anxiety. He is now at a school with other kids who have social learning disorders – a broad that class includes Asperger's syndrome and a general failure to observe and respond to social cues.

If Dan falls into this category, he needs the help of both the adults and teens in his life. There is also effective therapy available for social learning disorders, and a decent school counselor should be able to help Dan and his parents find it.

MOM OF A FORMERLY INVISIBLE TEEN **DEAR ABBY:** Dan might

be autistic, which could explain his behavior. I have an autistic son who is high functioning. His social skills seem immature and he appears "geeky." People have shunned and teased him because of it.

After managing to develop some friendships in band (which, by the way, has some of the best geeky kids who accept others) and a church high school group, his social skills improved. But he needs those kids who overlook his quirkiness and befriend him to help him build confidence. They do exist; you just have to sometimes search for them. If Dan starts feeling more accepted by others, it may lessen his dependence on "Overwhelmed."



THE ACES ON BRIDGE®

Bobby Wolff

Today's hand, from the 2006 Bonn teams tournament, illuminates a brilliant and imaginative defense by Tom Townsend, a regular on the English team.

At one table Colin Simpson received a club lead and had no difficulty in bringing home his threeno-trump contract, given the kindly lie of the opponents' majorsuit cards. He unblocked hearts, then led a spade toward the dummy. When West won his king and returned a low club, that allowed declarer an easy route to nine tricks.

Townsend, at the other table, also led a club against the notrump game. Declarer unblocked the hearts, then led a spade toward dummy. Winning perforce, Townsend appreciated that declarer held most, if not all, of the hidden high-card points. So he switched to the diamond jack. This ruse needed his partner, David Gold, to hold the 10, but without that card, there would have been no defense.

Declarer, reading West for the diamond J-10 and East for the ace, was not inclined to smell a rat. He won in hand with the king, then played another spade toward dummy. Back on lead, Townsend saw his plan through by leading the diamond three. The eight from dummy lost to Gold's 10, and Gold returned a diamond to Townsend's ace.

West now fixed declarer firmly in dummy by returning his last heart, and Gold took the setting trick with the spade jack — from a hand that at the outset looked unlikely to take even one trick, let alone two.

ANSWER: The simple answer is to raise to three spades, with invitational values and four trumps. Not unreasonable, but in my view your scattered queens and singleton in partner's first suit are not worth more than a raise to two spades. Conversely, had my partner opened one diamond instead of one club, I would jump to three spades, expecting to have a more useful hand for my partner.

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



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
