Local nonprofit urges legislators not to cut funding

Cuts will fall on the backs of low-income families, SCCAP says

The threat of severe budget cuts has prompted a local nonprofit organization to amp up its political facetime.

The South Central Community

Action Partnership invited Magic Valley county commissioners, SCCAP board members and media to a hastily called meeting with representatives of U.S. legislators Friday afternoon to plead their case for needed federal funding.

After President Barack Obama proposed cutting the Community Services Block Grant program by half in his State of the Union address three weeks ago, community action groups began brainstorming strategies for countering

the move. But lobbying Congress is not something they’re acquainted with.

“If you don’t need us, you don’t notice us,” said Mary Chant, executive director of the Community Action Partnership Association of

Idaho. “Our success makes it difficult to articulate to those not in need how much we do, but if we weren’t there, you’d notice.”

Ken Robinette, executive director of SCCAP, was compelled to set the meeting up while he was coordinating with other action groups in Seattle this week. Because there is still a chance to influence the cuts, he said he wanted to share some of the problems that will happen if the cuts go through.

Robinette recalled that years

ago, Rep. Mike Simpson, R-Idaho, told him the president puts the budget out, but Congress sets it. Robinette said community action groups could accept going back to 2008 levels.

“We understand that reducing the deficit is important,” Robinette said. “We’re having a difficult time with the amount of the cuts we’re facing because they’re going to fall on the backs of low-income families.”

Council to hear plan to give fountain a facelift

Charitable group: Cost to taxpayers will be minimal

The Twin Falls City Council will hear Monday about plans to destroy the downtown fountain.

Not out of maliciousness — the Twin Falls Community Foundation is looking to redevelop that area into a new Main Avenue Fountain Plaza, a community service project with minimal taxpayer cost, according to a city staff report. The Twin Falls Community Foundation is footing the bill to develop plans for the proposed plaza, which would be next to the Idaho Youth Ranch downtown.

The foundation will be making the presentation of its plans for the plaza — which will include a new water feature — at the council’s regular meeting at 5 p.m. at the City Council Chambers, 305 Third Ave. E., Twin Falls.

The plaza is still in the idea phase, according to the staff report, and the foundation is seeking the council’s input on the design proposals and its OK for the foundation to continue with its efforts.

Also on the council’s agenda:

- An engineering agreement with Riedesel Engineering for a snow removal equipment building at Joslin Field Magic Valley Regional Airport. The contract would be to design the building, which airport staff estimates will cost \$1.6 million, though the staff is looking for Federal Aviation Administration cash to help pay for it.

- The beginning of a search to replace Mike Hamblin as the Twin Falls Golf Club’s golf professional and manager. Hamblin left the course for a similar job at the Blue Lakes Country Club at the beginning of the month.

A schedule in the city’s staff report has a new golf pro or course management company taking over June 1 or earlier.

- The council will also meet in a closed-door executive session to consider the evaluation, disciplining, dismissal of or to hear complaints against a public employee. During the private session, the council is also slated to discuss labor negotiations or the acquisition of non-public real estate.

CSI paramedics head to 3-week internships in Atlanta

Eleven College of Southern Idaho students will experience the differences between urban and rural emergency responses when the first wave of paramedic students travels to Atlanta for a three-week internship on Tuesday.

The students will work at Grady Memorial Hospital, which sees more than 100,000 patients a year, and will respond to more than a dozen calls a day. The exchange program is six years old.

Gordy Kokx, professor and EMS director, said the students start their field training with the Magic Valley paramedics. The transition to a large, urban environment — one with almost 500,000 people in the city and more than 5 million in the metropolitan area — bolsters their skills, he said.

“What is wonderful about this is the hospital is world-renowned and has been there since the Civil War,” Kokx said. “It’s a blend, and they really get to see the differences as well as figure out where they want to work.”

While the call volume the students will experience is larger in Georgia, the severity of calls is often more critical in rural areas due to a longer drive time back to the hospital.

“You definitely see a radical split,” said Matt Crane, a former CSI paramedic student. “In the West there is this pioneer spirit that says, ‘I’m not calling until I’m dead.’”

Crane said his experience with the Magic Valley paramedics was beneficial, but the call volume is higher in Georgia and the range of incidents helps prepare students for a career in medicine.

“I loved it. I don’t think there is any other place that can match that,” Crane said.

Bad Internet romance kindles love of fighting fraud

Jody Buell thought she was falling in love, but she fell for someone who didn’t exist.

The Burnsville woman didn’t catch on to the scam until she had spent more than \$10,000 on her online admirer.

Instead of sinking into despair, however, Buell decided to get even.

For the past two years, she has been helping other fraud victims get advice, support and fellowship from an online group called romancescams.org. Since the

Yahoo group was founded in 2005, it has helped more than 50,000 people from around the world.

“It’s basically a war,” said site founder Barb Sluppick, a scam victim who lives in Missouri. “They’re battling us for our money. We’re fighting back, but we’re fighting on our own because the government doesn’t seem to want to get involved in this.”

Government officials say the biggest hurdle is that the vast majority of suspects are located outside their jurisdiction, usually

in other countries. The epicenter of the scams appears to be West Africa, particularly Nigeria, where young men reportedly work through the night in Internet cafes perpetrating dozens of frauds simultaneously.

“I’ve had scam victims from around the country getting ahold of us because they can’t find anybody to pick up their case,” said Jim Arlt, interim director of the Minnesota Department of Public Safety’s alcohol and gambling enforcement unit. “I am astounded at really the lack of coordinated effort in this area.”

In the last year, the FBI has received more than 4,000 complaints about dating-site fraud, but the agency has no estimate on the financial impact, FBI spokeswoman Jenny Shearer said.

In some cases, the losses are devastating. An Arizona man who contacted romancescams.org said he was taken for \$1 million, and in August a New York man shot himself after losing \$50,000 to an online scammer.

In Australia, romance scams cost an estimated \$6.5 million in 2009. In the United Kingdom, the losses were estimated at more than \$81 million last year.

In Nigeria, the government’s main anti-fraud agency put a romance scammer in prison for 28 years, but advocates say that hasn’t made a dent in the problem. Ghana still reports about two romance scams a day to its embassy in Washington.

The pictures are alluring. On romancescams.org, the impostors includes curvaceous young women, shirtless men with high-wattage smiles and soldiers in uniform.

Their victims bare their

scars for others to learn from. From “Hopeless and hurt in Texas” came this lament: “The sad part is i did fall in love with him.”

When Buell first joined the group, Sluppick had to moderate her comments because she was still so angry. Now Sluppick considers Buell her second-in-command.

Looking back at her seduction, Buell said she can’t believe she missed the warning signs. She said she decided to tell her story publicly for the first time because she counsels others to feel no shame for being the victims of crime.

“Who in this world does not want or need to be loved?” said Buell, a long-time insurance broker.

In 2008, the popular dating site eHarmony.com matched Buell, 53, with Claude Eichmann, who described himself as a Maryland businessman with an international mining company. Their friendship blossomed by e-mail, instant messaging and phone conversations.

At the time, Buell was searching for a life mate after a breakup. She chose eHarmony because the website appeared to rigorously screen participants. The site, based in Santa Monica, Calif., claims 33 million people have registered with eHarmony since 2000, and it claims to produce the equivalent of 542 marriages each day.

Paul Breton, a spokesman for eHarmony, said he can’t disclose the methods his company uses to weed out crooks. But he noted the site also instructs users to protect themselves by recognizing the signs of a fraud — someone who wants to move too quickly, who draws you

Melaleuca OKs \$1.2M settlement with Utah firm

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — A Utah health and home product company has agreed to pay \$1.2 million to its Idaho Falls-based rival to settle a lawsuit over allegations it poached employees and urged them to breach contracts.

Max International in Salt Lake City was sued by Idaho’s Melaleuca in fall 2009, who contended the Utah company raided its marketing executives and then conspired to have those former workers breach their contracts with the company by recruiting other sales people.

Melaleuca sells about 350 nutritional and household products including lotions, detergents and powdered drinks. Max International sells similar products and uses a similar business model.

The settlement was reported by a story published Sunday in the Post Register.

“Our actions here were vindicated, and the outcome says the actions we tried to seek against Max International were finally realized,” Melaleuca President McKay Christensen told the newspaper. “We

think Max took the right actions here in settling the case, and we’re pleased to have a positive outcome.”

Max co-CEOs, Joseph Voyticky and David Bagley, apologized to the Idaho company, saying it “deeply regrets any actions, if any, by its officers, employees or associates that contributed to any contract violations by former Melaleuca (sales agents).”

Christensen said that, as a condition of the settlement, Max officials agreed to honor Melaleuca’s contracts and nonsolicitation agreements. In January 2010, a federal

judge temporarily barred Max International from recruiting employees at Melaleuca, which has been in operation for 25 years.

At that time, U.S. District Judge William Downes said Melaleuca convinced him that the company was likely to succeed on the merits of its claims.

In 2008, Melaleuca employed about 3,400 and pulled in \$879 million in revenue. Its marketing executives earn commissions on customer sales or by training and motivating other sales staff in gathering new customers.

On Thursday, the students had to pass final practical tests before they were allowed to go on to their internships. The course takes a year and a half to complete, and Kokx said there were 44 applicants for 12 open positions in the nationally accredited program.

Kokx said the schedule in Georgia is rigorous. The students will usually work six days a week at 12-hour shifts. Grady Hospital customarily offers jobs to all of the students when their internship is complete.

“We drop them off in this major city with this amazing culture and it takes some time to adjust,” he said. “Some students have never been east of Pocatello.”

Savannah Thurman, 22, said she was nervous for the internship to start but was looking forward to the leadership roles she will be forced into on a daily basis.

“Right now, we depend on our preceptors to tell us what to do, but being the leader on calls down there will give us a wider range of

experiences,” she said.

Thurman said the diversity in culture and race will also be different compared with her time in Nampa and Twin Falls. Kokx said the experiences help enforce the mission of all emergency medical responders: to help people no matter their background, race or culture.

Anna Sorrell, 22, completed the internship last year and accepted a job with Grady six months ago. She said she likes the urban EMS

better than working in a rural area because of the busy schedule.

“Every call is go, go, go,” she said. “You get a great experience here. It opens your eyes because in class you can slowly work through things but the internship really gets you to click in.”

Board member Roy Prescott, a former Jerome County commissioner, made an impassioned plea for funding SCCAP so it can continue the work it’s done for 44 years.

“Government has the role of helping in those areas where individuals cannot help themselves,” Prescott said. “We’re going to take hits, but 50 percent will close this office down, and if that happens, 30,000 people will show up on the counties’ doorsteps.”

Prescott was referring to

the work SCCAP does with its employment aid and Homeless Prevention Program, which helped 1,200 households last year. Still, at the current funding level, SCCAP was unable to help more than 900 households. That number could skyrocket with a 50 percent budget cut and with continuing foreclosures.

With the poor economy, SCCAP has seen a 23 percent increase over the past two years in the number of people seeking assistance. Without the organization, those people will have to

turn to county agencies, which are already strapped.

Simpson spokesman Linda Culver said she didn’t have a final list of the cuts but she’d keep Robinette and Chant posted.

“It’s all speculation right now because it’s still early in the process,” Culver said. “Monday, the House is supposed to start debating a continuing resolution to fund the rest of the year. What is going to come out of that, we don’t know yet.”

A Twin Falls family lost its trailer home to a quick-moving fire Saturday evening.

The Twin Falls Fire Department responded a little before 7 p.m. to Pioneer Trailer Park, 1515 Kimberly Road, where they found a trailer in flames.

Firefighters quickly put out the blaze — “We had it pretty much knocked down by about 7:05,” said Battalion Chief Brian Cunningham — but the

flames had already moved through the trailer.

“It looks to be a total loss,” he said late Saturday night.

The fire appears to have been caused by unattended cooking, Cunningham said.

No one was injured in the blaze, but it left the family without a home.

“Not only is the trailer a loss,” he said, “but it looks as if the majority of its contents will be as well.”

Idaho Falls group lets older dancers take center stage

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — Kim Hawkes thought she retired her dancing shoes 13 years ago.

She started dancing when she was 5 years old. But after graduating from high school, a busy college life forced her to abandon the activity.

By her mid-20s, she was married and expecting her first child. Life happened. It was too late to dance.

“I wanted to get back into dancing, but who even teaches dance to people my age?” she said. “For a while, I thought my dream was lost.”

Hawkes found temporary solace as a dance teacher. She lived her dancing dreams through her young students until she found The Dance Collaborative, a local dance team for adults.

Idaho Falls dancers Amanda McGavin, 24, and Nicole Klingler, 26, founded the group in September 2009. The nonprofit company auditions professional-level dancers who are 18 and older.

McGavin and Klingler each found it impossible to perform as a dancer in Idaho Falls.

“There are classes for adults, but there’s no other avenue for performing,” Klingler said.

The pair had worked together, teaching and choreographing for a youth competition team. But they also shared a desire to perform, which led them to develop the first dance company in Idaho Falls entirely made of adults.

“This is what I wanted 13 years ago when I graduated high school,” Hawkes said. “I’m proud of myself because I’m 31 and I’ve got two kids and I can do this.”

The Dance Collaborative includes mothers, college students and working women, all hoping for a dancing outlet.

“It’s been awesome just being able to perform and just show your passion to everybody even though

you’re 22 or 25 or 30,” Kayla Larson said.

So far, the group performs in local venues and its dancers are unpaid. But McGavin and Klingler’s future goals include performance tours and salaried dancers.

“In general, a professional company gets paid to go perform at venues,” Klingler said. “Eventually, we’d like to get there. But until then, we’d like to maintain a professional standard.”

While The Dance Collaborative offers a place for older dancers, it also provides additional social opportunities.

Hawkes said she enjoys spending time with fellow dancers after a busy day of mothering duties.

“We can take care of our lives and then dance,” she said. “We’re all so committed that it’s easy to get together.”

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A night of Grammy surprises

Lady Antebellum and Arcade Fire top night of upsets

When it came right down to it Sunday night, passion trumped spectacle every time.

The 53rd Grammy Awards began the evening as a potential victory lap for redeemed rapper Eminem, who led the night with 10 nominations.

Or perhaps a chance for pop provocateur Lady Gaga to show off her latest, Madonna-biting single “Born This Way.”

Or maybe, the Grammys was merely a chance for a nation to wait and see if the Recording Academy was actually insane enough to give Justin Bieber a best new artist prize.

Instead, it was an evening of surprises, not sure things: Canadian critical darlings Arcade Fire won album of the year (frontman Win Butler could be heard saying “What the hell?” before the band took to the podium to

accept), upsetting favorites like Eminem, Katy Perry and Lady Antebellum.

Eminem ended up with only two golden gramophones, including a prize for best rap album; Lady Gaga’s performance was strangely muted and Bieber lost the best new artist Grammy to little-known jazz artist Esperanza Spalding.

“I take this honor to heart so sincerely and I’ll do my damndest to make great music for all of you,” said Spalding, upon accepting

the award, the first jazz artist ever to do so.

The night’s other big winner was Lady Antebellum, who walked off with two of the three big categories: record and song of the year, for “Need You Now.” (The country trio took home five awards overall.) Jay-Z also had a good night, taking three Grammys, including a nod for best rap song. Only 10 Grammys, out of 108 possible trophies, were handed out on the broadcast; the remainder were awarded prior to the telecast.

Miranda Lambert, up for three Grammys, took home one, for best female country vocal performance.

The sprawling, 3 1/2-hour broadcast began on a somber, yet celebratory note, as a clutch of “divas” — among them, Christina Aguilera, seeking redemption for last week’s Super Bowl national anthem flub — paid tribute to the ailing Aretha Franklin, who appeared in a brief video message.

Not all of the collaborations came off so woodenly; one of the night’s indisputable highlights was Cee Lo Green performing his

smash hit with the unprintable name, with some help from Jim Henson puppets and Gwyneth Paltrow. It was a giddy burst of fun that livened up what often felt like an interminable parade of overly-augmented performances. Lady Gaga, who arrived on the red carpet in a translucent egg (no, that’s not a misprint), couldn’t quite muster the drama of her 2010 Grammy appearance, while the highly hyped pairing of Usher and Justin Bieber felt a little too forced.

But there were moments where skill and set design worked in harmony. A folk summit of sorts, featuring Mumford & Sons, the Avett Brothers and Bob Dylan, was a high point, as was Janelle Monae’s crowd-surfing show-stopper. And Arcade Fire, ripping into a track from “The Suburbs,” seemed like nothing less than a purifying scream in the midst of so much mediocrity.

Instead, creativity defeated conservatism — passion winning out over carefully produced spectacle — and a band precious few probably knew about beforehand found themselves holding Grammy gold.

Betty Garrett, actress in film, TV, Broadway dies at 91

LOS ANGELES—Betty Garrett, a comedic actress who was in such MGM musicals as “On The Town” and “Take Me Out to the Ballgame,” a regular on the television series “All in the Family” and “Laverne & Shirley” and a star on Broadway and in Los Angeles theater productions, has died. She was 91.

Garrett died Saturday an aortic aneurysm, said her son Garrett Parks.

Just last Wednesday, Garrett went to dinner with friends and afterward taught a weekly musical comedy class at Theatre West, the non-profit theater she helped found in North Hollywood half a century ago.

“She was a woman of boundless otimism,” said Miles Kreuger, president of the Los Angeles-based Institute of the American Musical. “On the screen and on television there was just a wonderful sense of joy.”

In a 2009 interview with The Times, Garrett reflected on her long career. “People say, how come you’ve lasted this long?” she said. “I say I think it’s because all of my life I have gotten to do what I love to do.”

Born on May 23, 1919, in St. Joseph, Mo., Garrett’s flair for performance was apparent at an early age.

In 1936, a family friend arranged for her to meet famed dancer Martha Graham. Graham recommended Garrett for a scholarship at the Neighborhood Playhouse in New York.

“I graduated from high school at 16 and came right to New York,” Garrett later recalled.

Within a few years, she was landing roles on Broadway. She made her first big splash in “Call Me Mister,” a sketch comedy revue in which she sang the hit song “South America, Take It Away.”

Soon, Hollywood came calling.

A Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer contract sent her west in 1947, and she spent the next several years making musicals, including 1949’s “Neptune’s Daughter” with Red Skelton and “On the Town” with Gene Kelly and Frank Sinatra.

Short on men, retirement home hires dance partners

BOCA RATON, Fla. — Hewitt Bruce extends his hand to a waiting lady pinning for a dance — and someone with whom to share it. He twirls and waltzes and makes exacting steps; she has become the woman to envy. And as one song fades to another, he is off again, never far from making his next sweetheart a little less lonely.

The shortage of men at Edgewater Pointe Estates is a perennial fact of life at retirement communities and nursing homes around the country, where women often outnumber men 3-to-1. Forget finding a mate — finding a man to dance with is tough enough.

Edgewater’s solution? Hire them.

Bruce and another dancing aficionado, Nick Zaharias, are paid to make sure the surplus of women have a chance for a spin on the dance floor. The complex also brings in volunteers from a local college fraternity.

“When you bring a smile to someone’s face and you help them to remember what it was like when they were younger and they were able to dance with their significant other or their husband, of course it’s uplifting,” Bruce said. “You’re really bringing hope to people.”

On this night, a Valentine’s Day celebration just ahead of the holiday itself, the ballroom at Edgewater Pointe is adorned with balloons while candles flicker and the disco ball turns. A musician sings and plays the keyboard, cracking jokes about Engelbert

Humperdinck along the way. And with precision, Bruce and Zaharias wear separate paths through the room, inviting women for a dance.

“At home, I dance with a broom,” said Victoria Schabel, a 90-something resident who has kicked off her shoes to ease her sore feet and whose sparkling gold skirt and blouse shimmered as she danced with Zaharias. “This is better.”

The escorts make small talk with their guests as they sway, and wide smiles often spread across wrinkled faces. Some women, widowed or single and eager to enjoy the music, dance with girlfriends instead. Some are too limited by disability to dance; others try anyway.

“OK, who’s next?” Zaharias asks a table full of women, his arm outstretched.

Zaharias, 72, is a retired product designer who’s taken too many ballroom dancing lessons to count. Bruce, 58, is a retired clinical psychologist whose training in dance led to his gig at Edgewater, and jobs as a dance host and instructor on cruise lines.

Both men are single. Their employment as dancers, while not a norm at retirement communities, points to the demographic imbalance of such homes.

Edgewater Pointe is part of a 23-home chain whose roughly 9,000 seniors are about 70 percent female, the result of longer lifespans among women and less likelihood they’ll live alone. Elsewhere, the numbers are even more lopsided, including the Los Angeles Jewish Home, where men account for just 10 percent of residents.

“I had to live to be 86 years old before I got odds like that,” said Ellis Simon, a retiree there.

Simon has grown used to hearing his name repeated by admiring ladies as he walks through the dining room. At one time, he boasted three simultaneous girlfriends, but two have since died.

“I don’t see how he keeps from getting killed,” said Brett Fielder, the home’s chief operating officer.

Still, men don’t always find what they’re looking for. And women find themselves frustrated with such a small pool to pick from.

Paul Hartman, 90, lives at The Hebrew Home at Riverdale in the Bronx, where he has trouble finding someone who meets his requirements of being “50 to 70 with sex appeal.” He goes to beading classes and has made dozens of pieces of jewelry, but has no one to give them to.

“I’m outnumbered and I’m still lonely as hell,” he said. “There’s not a decent woman to talk to here.”

Just outside the city at Atria Lynbrook on Long Island, 88-year-old Mary Palmeri, a retired nurse, is quick with a joke and wouldn’t mind finding a man who shared her sense of humor and a bit of intellect. But no luck.

“There’s nothing to get excited about,” she said. “There’s no love material.”

Back at Edgewater, the lights are dim and the gold balloons are shaped into a giant heart. Just a few men are sprinkled about, and most of them are married. The ones who aren’t have learned they hold newfound appeal in a place where they’re so outnumbered.

Obama unveiling budget today, includes spending cuts

WASHINGTON — President Barack Obama today will propose a new federal budget that is \$90 billion smaller than the one he offered last year and includes a combination of cuts and revenue increases aimed at chopping \$1.1 trillion from the deficit in 10 years.

The president's \$3.73 trillion spending plan cuts many popular programs,

while increasing spending in selected education and infrastructure programs designed to bolster the nation's economic competitiveness.

It seeks to shrink the deficit from an estimated 7 percent of gross domestic product this year to 3.2 percent in 2015, maintaining it at roughly that level through 2021.

In demonstrating a willingness to make cuts, Obama hopes to seize the initiative in what is certain to

be a long and bruising debate on spending with congressional Republicans, who already have signaled a desire for much sharper cuts. In his budget, Obama made clear he will argue that while reductions are necessary, cutting to extremes is unwise.

"We're eager to work with the Republicans to cut spending and reduce the deficit," said a senior administration official who briefed reporters on the budget on condition of

anonymity. "The debate in Washington isn't whether to cut or to spend. We both agree we should cut. The question is how we cut and what we cut."

Not all of the deficit reduction is in the form of spending cuts. Obama also is proposing an end to tax breaks enacted under former President George W. Bush for the nation's wealthiest earners. About two-thirds of the deficit reduction over 10 years would come from cuts. The rest would come from

revenue increases.

The proposed budget includes a five-year freeze on non-national security discretionary spending, which would save \$400 billion, and the elimination or trimming of dozens of programs.

Obama is proposing to cut \$2.5 billion in heating assistance for low-income people, at least \$1 billion in grants to large airports and \$300 million from Community Development Block Grants, a program

popular with local government officials nationwide.

"This is a very difficult budget," Jacob Lew, head of the White House budget office, said in a CNN interview Sunday. "We're beyond the easy low hanging fruit."

The budget plan also would trim \$78 billion from Pentagon spending over the next five years, eliminating additional transport planes, a Marine amphibious assault vehicle and an alternate engine for the Joint Strike Fighter.

Brief time out from heated discourse ends

WASHINGTON — President Barack Obama? Weak, a socialist and a liar. Liberals? Monsters and a cancer. Former Vice President Dick Cheney? Called a war criminal, "murdering scum" and a draft dodger — by people in his own party.

Just a month after the Arizona shooting rampage led to bipartisan calls for toned-down political discourse, incivility suffused the year's largest gathering of conservatives. Just like at most partisan get-togethers on either end of the ideological spectrum.

The brief political time out is over — if it ever really existed.

"All right, sit down and shut up," Cheney said after being greeted by hecklers when he made a surprise appearance at the Conservative Political Action Conference. Supporters shouted down the insults with a "U.S.A." chant, and a visibly annoyed Cheney brushed off the outbursts.

Such incivility didn't overwhelm the conference, which is a rite of passage for presidential contenders, right-leaning media personalities and grass-roots activists. But it kept popping up throughout the three-day affair in speeches by names big and not so big.

That's not to say liberals would have been any more civil at their own event, and the tone at the conservative gathering was arguably no different from what it's been in the past. After all, it's what these events are for.

On both the left and the right, hard-core ideologues are the ones who attend such conferences, and agendas are set with that audience in mind. Verbal bomb-throwing is the norm from speakers who serve up political red meat to highly partisan crowds that devour it.

This weekend's conference was a sign of a return to normalcy in the wake of the shootings that wounded Rep. Gabrielle Giffords, D-Ariz., and killed six in January. That attack touched off a national debate about overheated political rhetoric. Politicians of all stripes, Obama included, pleaded for a more civil discourse.

The GOP's top elected leaders — House Speaker John Boehner of Ohio and Senate Minority Leader Mitch McConnell of Kentucky — set a respectful

tone in their speeches to the conservative gathering.

So did many of the Republicans likely to run for president.

Indiana Gov. Mitch Daniels, who referred to Obama only once, confronted the issue of "the venomous, petty, often ad hominem political discourse of the day." He urged conservatives to be more thoughtful in their rhetoric.

Yet even as he invoked Ronald Reagan's admonishment, "Remember, we have no enemies, only opponents," Daniels slapped at Democrats: "Our opponents are better at nastiness than we will ever be. It comes naturally." He also told conservatives to embrace a nicer approach — for political gain.

"The public is increasingly disgusted with a steady diet of defamation, and prepared to reward those who refrain from it," he said. "It would help if they liked us, just a bit."

Other likely presidential contenders openly denigrated Obama — his policies, his politics, his ability to lead.

Ex-Pennsylvania Sen. Rick Santorum suggested the president lies. "This is someone who doesn't believe in truth and evil in America," he said.

Minnesota Rep. Michele Bachmann said the country has seen Obama "usher in socialism" and she branded his health care law "the crown jewel of socialism."

Former Massachusetts Gov. Mitt Romney said that under Obama, "an uncertain world has been made more dangerous by the lack of clear direction from a weak president."

It wasn't all personal; some was just business. Yet much of the criticism relied on words and phrases that liberals tend to find offensive and conservatives wield specifically to score political points.

NYC stabbing spree, murder suspect: I'm victim of setup

NEW YORK — A man accused of going on a 28-hour stabbing rampage through the city shouted that he was the victim of a "setup" as he was led from a police station Sunday.

Public defender Michael Baum, who represented Gelman at the arraignment, said he could not shed any light on Gelman's mental state during the time police say he was committing the crimes, but he described his client Sunday evening as "calm" and "rational."

"He's very concerned about the nature of the charges," Baum said. "There are many things he wants to discuss about what happened."

A small throng of Brooklyn residents taunted Gelman from the sidewalk as he was escorted out of a police precinct for his trip to court. The 23-year-old cursed u," Lozito said he told the slasher.

His stepfather, Aleksandr Kuznetsov, intervened and was stabbed to death at their apartment in Brooklyn, police said. Police found the 54-year-old's body in his home. Gelman's mother was uninjured.

but smacked into 62-year-old pedestrian Stephen Tanenbaum, who died from his injuries, police said. He later abandoned the car, engine running, in a private driveway not far from a freight railroad where he once was caught spray-painting graffiti, police Commissioner Raymond Kelly said.

Police hunted him, but he disappeared until just before 1 a.m. Saturday, when police say he confronted and stabbed a livery cab driver in Brooklyn, north of where the other attacks occurred. Shortly afterward, he approached a couple in a Nissan, stabbing the man multiple times in the hand before hijacking the car, police said. Both men survived.

Just after 8 a.m. Saturday, passengers on a southbound No. 1 train in upper Manhattan noticed that a man on the train matched

photos of Gelman they had seen in newspapers.

One passenger on the train got off at West 96th Street, approached officers on the platform and told them that a man fitting Gelman's description knocked a newspaper out of her hand, saying, "Do you believe what they're writing about me?" according to police. Gelman jumped off the train at the West 34th Street station, crossed the tracks and hopped on a northbound No. 3 train, where he sliced a passenger, the police commissioner said. Officers were in the driver's compartment of the train looking for him on the tracks when he made his way up to the driver's door and pounded on it, "claiming that he was the police," Kelly said.

Rondo's triple-double helps Celtics top Heat

BOSTON — LeBron James and the Miami Heat couldn't win in Boston in the regular season. And now they might have to do it in the playoffs.

Rajon Rondo had a triple-double, and James missed a crucial free throw with 12.5 seconds left in the Celtics' 85-82 victory over Miami on Sunday. Boston improved to 3-0 against the Heat this season, taking back the top spot in the East and clinching the potential tiebreaker for home-court advantage in the playoffs.

The teams will play again in Miami on April 10.

"They are the defending Eastern Conference champions. You have to go through them, and they ain't

going to make it easy," Heat coach Erik Spoelstra said. "We understand that this isn't going to be an easy ride for us, and that's where we're at our best."

The Heat eliminated most of a 13-point fourth-quarter deficit and trailed 83-81 with 19 seconds left when they brought the ball in from a timeout and got it to James at the top of the key. He drove on Paul Pierce and drew the foul but missed the first shot, then made the second.

On the ensuing inbound pass, James went into the stands for the ball but merely knocked it to Ray Allen; the Celtics got the ball downcourt to Glen "Big Baby" Davis, who was fouled. Davis hit both foul shots with 6.3 seconds to go, and Mike Miller missed a 3-

point attempt in the final seconds that would have sent the game to overtime.

"They're going to be a different team in March and April, the more important months, when we'll probably have to see them again," said Paul Pierce, who was 0-for-10 from the floor and scored just one point. "It gives us the series in case something happens with a tiebreaker."

The Celtics have won 12 of the last 13 games against Miami, including a 4-1 series victory in the first round of last year's playoffs; they then knocked James and the Cleveland Cavaliers out in the next round. James fled to Miami to join Chris Bosh and Dwyane Wade, but the Heat still haven't been able to beat Boston.

"This is classic, typical

bigger brothers," Wade said. "You've got to get over the hump. We're getting closer and closer, but we're not there yet. It can happen at any time. It can happen in the playoffs."

Kevin Garnett scored 19 with seven rebounds and Kendrick Perkins had a season-high 15 points for Boston, which snapped a two-game losing streak. Rondo had 11 points, 10 assists and 10 rebounds while bothering James enough to force him into four first-half turnovers.

"I thought Rondo just willed us the game," coach Doc Rivers said. "Rondo just took it upon himself that whoever was bringing the ball up he was going to guard and harass. And I thought that changed the game for us."

This should be fun.

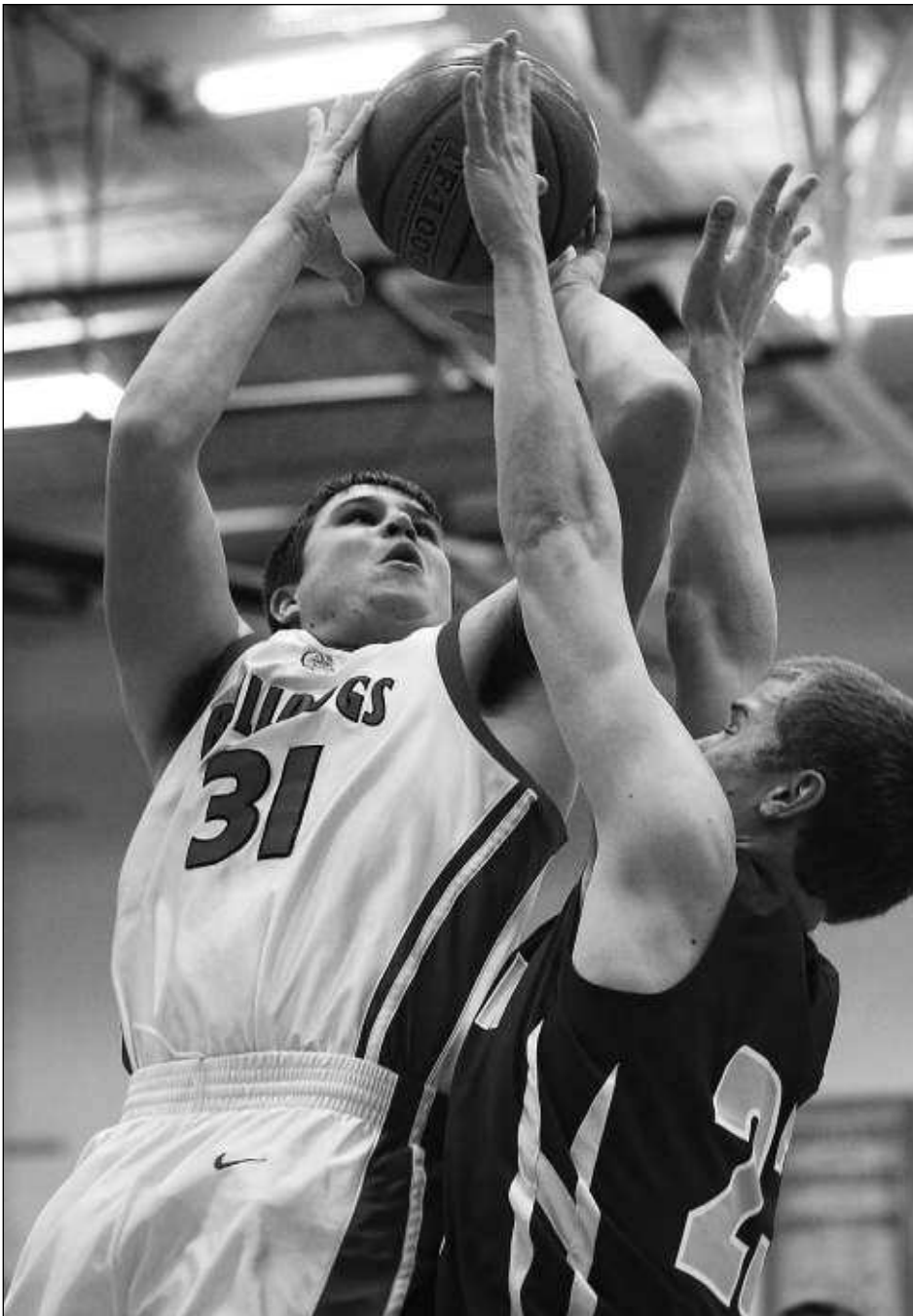

CAFO bill mixes state expertise, local control

They’re not the comprehensive statewide ground rules for large swine and poultry operations that we had hoped for.

But state Rep. Bert Stevenson’s bill to give the state authority to provide an analysis of a proposed confined animal feeding operation site to a county — when the county requests it — is a solid first step toward managing the influx of CAFOs that’s headed the Magic Valley’s way.

The legislation would expand the definition of a confined animal feeding operation in state law for the purposes of site reviews. The bill would include any project considered a CAFO under county ordinances.

According to the eight-term Rupert Republican, the measure is a result of challenges that county officials in the Magic Valley have faced in getting site assistance for CAFO proposals, including for poultry.

“It was determined at that time because the (Idaho State Department of Agriculture) does not regulate poultry or swine, they were not in a position to help with the siting program,” Stevenson told the House Agricultural Affairs Committee last week.

During site reviews, the ISDA, the Idaho Department of Environmental Quality and the Idaho Department of Water Resources act in advisory roles, providing analysis of environmental risks and giving the information to counties.

“All of the counties have their zoning ordinances that are so different that we had to make something that when the county made their request, then if it complied with their ordinance that’s the condition under which they are sited,” Stevenson said.

Also last week, Rep. Jim Patrick, R-Twin Falls, introduced legislation to add some much-needed clarification and define the roles of law enforcement officers and ISDA.

The legislation would shift inspections of complaints about companion animals — dogs, cats, rabbits, birds and recreational horses — to local law enforcement authorities, while leaving ag department employees responsible for livestock inspections including working horses, sheep and cattle.

The poor economy has contributed to cases in which some animal owners don’t have resources to feed or properly care for their animals. That’s increased the work for state inspectors, when somebody complains.

Patrick said he didn’t expect the shift to unduly burden local law enforcement.

“The main goal is just to spell out who is responsible for what,” Patrick said.

Our view: Magic Valley county planners and commissioners need all the help they can get in deciding whether to approve or deny the siting of poultry or swine confined animal feeding operations.

Valentines and dollar \$igns

Happy Valentine’s Day to all those couples with wedding bells in their future.

I have bad news: Your relationship may be doomed.

A harsh statement, and — indeed — an overstatement. But with the approach of Feb. 14, the No. 1 date for marriage proposals, it’s appropriate to grab your attention with an important message: Be certain you’re a “money match.” Couples that are not financially compatible are destined for a rough matrimonial ride. Possibly, a complete wipe-out.

Most Americans already know that approximately half of U.S. marriages end in divorce, creating all sorts of personal and societal problems. But do they realize that the leading source of marital discord is conflict over finances — not sex, not kids, not in-laws, not toilet seats?

A 2008 study by researchers at three universities found that couples don’t necessarily fight most about money, but those fights tend to be the most intense and are most-often

left unresolved.

Yet when it comes to relationships, the notion of financial compatibility is foreign to most Americans. Seriously discussing money is a cultural taboo. Couples will discuss intimate sexual details with a counselor, but “money is the last thing that people want to talk about in therapy. It’s just the way we’re brought up,” notes Lee Slater, a New York-based certified financial planner and past president of the Association of Divorce Financial Planners.

So we hook up with someone with whom we’re emotionally and sexually compatible, wants the same number of kids, shares similar beliefs and maybe even musical tastes and favorite sports teams. But when it comes to figuring out how we’ll financially support a marriage, how we’ll spend and save, when we’ll retire, there’s a big silence.

We figure love will conquer all.

Why sabotage the relationship by reviewing each other’s credit reports, loans and assets? Why hold a “tete a tete” on projected monthly revenue and bills? You don’t see that in movies. You don’t hear it in love songs.

“When the pixie dust is on, you tend to downplay the role of money,” explains Kevin Roth, a marriage and family therapist based in Philadelphia, whose expertise includes couples communication. “Couple can say, ‘When we get married, it won’t matter. But after a year it will surface. Or it will surface right away.’”

That’s why it’s vital for couples to start talking about money before they start talking about engagement.

Here are some early warning signs:

Beyond arguing about the little things, such as who pays for a date or how much to spend on gifts, it’s hard to imagine a couple lasting as spouses if they can’t agree on the cost of their wedding or can’t work out a general, monthly household budget.

Trouble also may be

looming if the partners won’t fully disclose their financial situation. A neutral third-party review, such as respective credit reports, can solve this problem.

Finally, it is important that their money personalities mesh. A spender and a saver must learn compromise for their marriage to survive. Two spenders face gloomier prospects, unless they learn budgeting.

Ensuring you’re a money match before marriage is a mark of being mature enough for marriage. It can go a long way to assuring “‘Til death do us part” won’t be become, “‘Til debt do us part.”

So, this Valentine’s Day, cupid-pierced couples, amid the gift-exchanging and romancing, should whisper these six words: “Let’s talk soon about money darling.”

NASA craft set for Valentine's rendezvous with comet

LOS ANGELES — After a long-distance courtship, a NASA spacecraft is set to meet up with its celestial sweetheart — a comet half the size of Manhattan that had an encounter with another spacecraft not long ago.

The rendezvous between Stardust and comet Tempel 1 occurs on Valentine's Day some 210 million miles from Earth. Hurling at 24,000 mph, Stardust will fly within 125 miles of the potato-shaped comet, snapping pictures along the way.

If successful, it will be the first time that scientists will have before-and-after images of Tempel 1, allowing them to observe any

changes on the uneven surface.

In 2005, Tempel 1 received a not-so-loving visit from another NASA probe named Deep Impact, which fired a copper bullet into the comet on the Fourth of July that sparked cosmic fireworks and excavated a crater. The high-speed crash hurled out so much dust and debris that Deep Impact failed to see the manmade hole even as it beamed back dazzling pictures of other surface features.

Scientists hope to get a second chance with Stardust, which is expected to pass near the 2005 bull's-eye.

"I'm going to be sleepless on Valentine's Day and sending a lot of love to this

comet," quipped mission co-investigator Pete Schultz of Brown University.

Comets, irregular bodies of ice and dust that orbit the sun, are frozen leftover building blocks of the solar system, which formed when a huge cloud of gas and dust collapsed about 4.5 billion years ago. Studying comets could yield clues to the birth of the solar system.

Tempel 1 is not the first comet that Stardust will get cozy with. In 2004, it swooped past comet Wild 2 and captured a bounty of interstellar and comet dust. The probe jettisoned samples to Earth in a capsule that parachuted to the Utah desert — the first time that a spacecraft had fetched particles from a comet back to Earth.

Egypt imposes martial law

CAIRO — Egypt's generals imposed martial law on Sunday, dissolving parliament and suspending the constitution, moves that many of the protesters who helped topple President Hosni Mubarak said were necessary to excise a rotten form of government.

The sweeping actions appeared to have their desired effect of calming the national mood. Under a celebratory facade, Egypt has remained on edge since Mubarak was forced to abdicate Friday, as uncertainty grew over the revolution's next stages.

In a written communique, the Supreme Council of the Armed Forces, led by Field Marshal Mohammed Tantawi, said the military rule was temporary and would last until elections are held, possibly as soon as six months from now. A new set of guiding laws will be drafted by an appointed committee and made subject to a referendum, the military chiefs said.

The parliament disbanded by the military had been a rubber-stamp body dominated by ruling-party members who prevailed in rigged November elections. The constitution had also been skewed heavily in favor of Mubarak's regime.

Opposition figures praised the moves as important first steps toward free elections but urged further measures to sweep away the old guard. Some expressed alarm at an aborted effort by the military early Sunday to clear Cairo's Tahrir Square of remaining protesters. They also criticized a decision by the military rulers to leave Mubarak's cabinet in place.

"By no means can they concentrate on fixing the problems and investigating what happened under the former regime, because they are the ones responsible," said Alaa al Aswany, an Egyptian novelist and democracy activist.

It remains far from clear how quickly elections might be held in Egypt. The well-organized Muslim Brotherhood,

officially banned under Mubarak, has pressed for speedy elections. Some democracy activists have said that it might take much more than six months to prepare the ground for a fair contest.

Some unrest continued in Cairo, as about 500 police officers, demanding higher wages, marched through Tahrir Square and blocked the entrance to the Interior Ministry. Workers at state banks held sit-ins, forcing Egypt's central bank to declare Monday a bank holiday. The antiquities-rich Egyptian Museum reported that two statues of King Tutankhamen and 16 other artworks had been looted.

"Our concern now is security, to bring security back to the Egyptian citizen," Prime Minister Ahmed Shafiq said after presiding over a meeting of the caretaker cabinet. "That sense has been lost since the beginning of the events. It's been coming back, but not as quickly as we hoped."

Before the session, workers removed a huge portrait of Mubarak that had kept watch over the meeting room.

Unlike the police and other domestic

security forces that Mubarak used to brutalize his political foes, the armed forces are seen by many Egyptians as their protectors and saviors. The military permitted the protests to unfold peacefully during the 18-day revolution. Many soldiers and officers made clear that their sympathies lay with the people.

For the near term, at least, the man running the country is Tantawi, 75, a close ally of Mubarak's who served under him as defense minister and commander in chief of the armed forces. The military council's communique said Tantawi would function as Egypt's head of state in international relations.

Retired military officers and analysts described Tantawi as pragmatic and conservative, with no visible political aspirations. They said he has the support of other senior commanders, including Lt. Gen. Sami Enan, the armed forces' chief of staff.

"Tantawi does not have ambitions to run for president. No one in the supreme council has that wish," said Hosam Sowilam, a retired major general and former military college classmate of Tantawi's. "We are military people. We don't want to indulge in any political matters. We want to only participate in defending our territory and preserving the independence and stability of the country."

Over the years, Tantawi has kept close ties with U.S. government and military officials. "He understands the important of this relationship," said Mohamed Kadry Said, a former major general who is an analyst at the Al-Ahram Center for Political and Strategic Studies in Cairo.

Tantawi is also seen as a reliable ally by Israel, which has feared greater instability with Mubarak's departure. The Supreme Council of the Armed Forces has affirmed that Egypt will honor its international treaty obligations, including its peace accord with Israel.

But some military analysts said that despite protestations to the contrary, Tantawi and other generals might find that they enjoy ruling Egypt without any checks on their authority.

'King's Speech' is big winner at UK film awards

LONDON — Royal drama "The King's Speech" was crowned the big winner Sunday at Britain's top film awards — a sign that it may reign again at Hollywood's Academy Awards in two weeks' time.

The made-in-England story of King George VI and his struggle to overcome a stutter won seven prizes, including best picture and acting trophies for Colin Firth, Helena Bonham Carter and Geoffrey Rush.

It had to share the crown jewels with Facebook-founding drama "The Social Network," which took three prizes including best director for David Fincher. Mind-bending saga "Inception" also won three trophies.

"The King's Speech" went into the awards as heavy favorite with 14 nominations — an unexpected British triumph that cost a reported 15 million pounds (\$24 million) to make and has taken many times that at the global box office.

It beat "The Social Network," "Black Swan," "Inception" and "True Grit" to the best picture prize.

Perfectly timed in a year that sees the royal wedding of Prince William and Kate Middleton, the movie tells the true story of George VI, thrust unexpectedly onto the throne by his elder brother's abdication, and his battle to overcome a stammer with the help of an unconventional speech therapist.

Screenwriter David Seidler said he was aston-

ished that this small film about "two men in a room" had been so popular around the world.

"I don't think it's the fascination with royalty," Seidler said. "I don't think it's the ostrich plumes and the gold braid. I think it's the fact that it's a story about changing your destiny."

The British-American writer, who overcame a childhood stammer and has worked on the screenplay for 30 years, said that "for a stutterer ... to be heard is a wonderful thing."

As expected, Firth won best actor for his portrayal of the reluctant monarch. He has already won a best actor trophy at the Golden Globes and is a favorite for an Oscar.

"I like coming here," said Firth, who won the same prize last year for "A Single Man."

"The King's Speech" also took awards for best British film, original screenplay, original music, supporting actor for Rush's turn as speech therapist Lionel Logue and supporting actress, for Bonham Carter's performance as the Queen Mother Elizabeth.

"I think I should thank the royal family, frankly, because they've done wonders for my career," Bonham Carter said.

WASHINGTON — Here's Michelle Obama's advice for couples this Valentine's Day: laugh with your partner.

"So we still find ways to have fun together, and a lot of it is private and personal. But we keep each other smiling and that's good," she added.

It also helps that Obama is "very romantic."

birthdays," Mrs. Obama said last week on "Live! With Regis and Kelly. "He doesn't forget a thing, even when I think he is. I'll have a little attitude, but he always comes through."

"You can't go wrong," she said.

But Mrs. Obama also said they don't fuss too much over the day that's about celebrating love and affection between couples.

Last year, the Obamas spent Valentine's Day at the Camp David presidential retreat in Maryland.

In 2009, their first year in the White House, they went home to Chicago and enjoyed a quiet dinner at Table 52, a traditional Southern restaurant owned by Art Smith, the former chef of Obama pal Oprah Winfrey.

FTD, Groupon get complaints, offer flower deal refunds

A *valentine* to your body

When dressing for your sweetheart, your outfits might have a little sugar (sweet lace), or a little spice (naughty leather). But for yourself, why not try everything nice?

Here are five ways you can treat your body to its own valentine.

Coverage and UPF: a match made in heaven?

Today, many clothes intended for the outdoors are created with additional ingredients to make your activities more comfortable. Hunters, hikers and fishermen might appreciate a shirt with built-in mosquito repellent, while those who work or recreate in the sun could opt for fabrics with built-in ultraviolet protection. UVA and UVB rays can penetrate loosely woven or light-colored fabrics, so clothes with UPF (Ultraviolet Protection Factor; the clothing equivalent of SPF in sunscreen) are usually tightly woven and darker colored, and sometimes infused with titanium dioxide or sewn double-faced for additional protection. They typically cost about \$10 to \$15 more than their non-UPF equivalents, said Heather Stanton, apparel buyer for Sturtevant's in the Wood River Valley. Just don't forget to apply sunscreen where your clothes don't cover.

Victoria's 'secret' could be cotton

Fashion experts are fond of saying that without the right foundation, the outfit will never look as good as it could. And when it comes to intimate apparel, the basics apply to both men and women. The body parts covered by your swimsuit likely aren't exposed to the air too often, so it's important to surround them with fabrics that wick moisture away and allow those bits to breathe. Gynecologists usually recommend cotton panties for women with yeast infections and other such conditions, and the same fabric is also excellent for men's underwear for similar reasons. Whatever fabric you choose, make sure it fits — too big can create unsightly lumpiness under your clothes, and too tight can constrict your skin and joint movement. "You've got to wear them all day, so it should fit when you put them on," said Linda Woods, supervisor of intimate apparel at JC Penney's in Twin Falls. Experts like her can help you find undergarments that fit right, including modifications like comfort straps or extended bands for bras.

Wash that itch right out of your life

If your skin breaks out in bumpy hives or a red, itchy rash, you might be allergic to your clothes. The reactions can take anywhere from a few minutes to half a day to appear and are often a result of additives in fabric softener and laundry detergent, said Dr. Gregory Wickern of Asthma and Allergy of Idaho. Fragrances are the most common culprit — they were even named the "contact allergen of the year" in 2007 by a trade organization — but surfactants can also contribute to problematic laundry products. "Most of the time if it had anything to do with that at all, just going fragrance-free solves the problem," Wickern said, noting that there can be other causes for the allergic reactions that a specialist can diagnose. Steroids, antihistamines and moisturizer can also help some of these conditions, but try switching detergents first.

Find your one true love

Clothes do a lot more these days than keep you warm and covered, flatter your figure and show off your fashion sense. Check out these specialty pieces and you might find the item you've been seeking all your life.

- **If you're** looking to get fit or monitor your vitals, there are clothing brands with built-in heart-rate and respiration-rate monitors. They're not common, so search "smart clothes" online to learn more.
- **Nike's Dri-Fit** and similar materials are extra good at wicking moisture away from your skin, so many athletes opt for those brands to stay cool and fresh.
- **A variety** of braces and straps are available to wear under your clothes (so your friends are none the wiser) that support posture or protect weak spots like your lower back or knee joints.
- **To decrease** your weight on the scale, try adding weights to your outfit — there are fashion-fabric-covered Banglitz bracelets, as well as vests, backpacks, neck drapes, belts, gloves, ankle weights and weighted shoes. Some look like workout gear, while others are designed to be worn under street clothing.

Arch and sole, I fell in love with you

Ladies and gents alike know a pair of high heels can add sex appeal, and they're a great option for special occasions. But for your everyday shoes, comfort should be the goal. "Sometimes people get in a hurry when they're trying shoes on, and say, 'Oh, that feels good,'" when really the shoes aren't that comfortable, said Mike Searle, owner of Hudson's Shoe Store in Burley. "You want a shoe that has nice arch support and a heel cushion with materials in the midsole that's going to give you good shock absorption." Your foot can change a lot, so have it measured at least once a year, he suggested, and be aware that many manufacturers measure a little differently so your ordinary size might not be right for any given shoe. Don't wear the same pair every day, Searle said, and invest in a few quality, comfortable pairs rather than buying many pairs that aren't made well and are less comfortable.

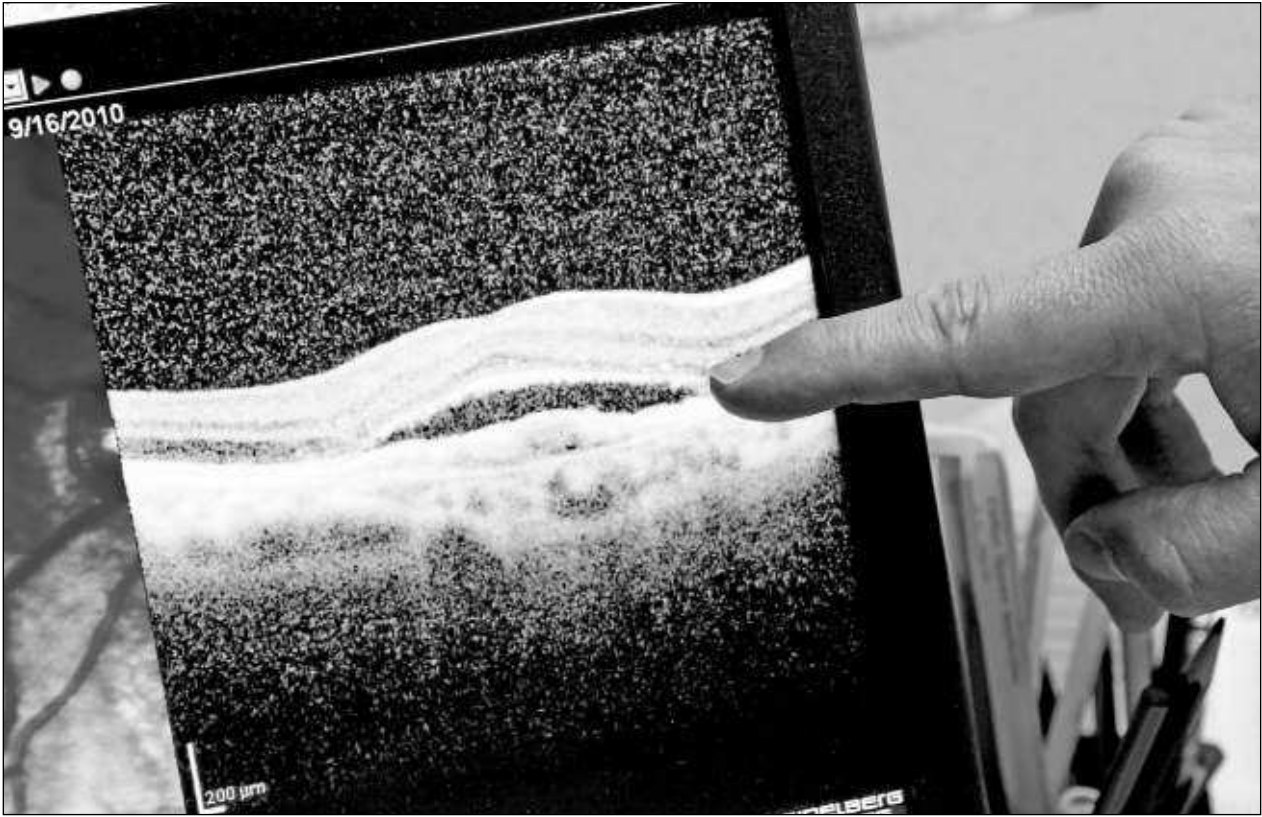

Age-related macular degeneration is growing along with the graying population in America

DALLAS — Jennifer Tyler was driving down a country road in Oklahoma a couple of years ago when she noticed something odd. The telephone poles all had kinks in them. "I thought, 'Wow, what's all that about?'" says Tyler, a Dallas fundraising consultant. "They all had distinctive bends in the middle." She pulled off the road and called a friend. "I knew something bad was happening," she says. "It was nothing I could ignore."

Her friend referred Tyler to Texas Retina Associates. Tyler made an appointment and was diagnosed as having age-related macular degeneration. AMD is a disease that causes significant vision loss in 1.75 million Americans. More than 10 million suffer from various forms of this potentially sight-stealing disease, more than glaucoma and cataracts combined, according to the American Macular Degeneration Foundation. By 2020, as the population ages, that number is expected to double. In addition, says Dr. Karl Csaky (pronounced like chalky) of the Retina Foundation of the Southwest, "more severe forms will be more of an issue." "People who are in their 70s and 80s are extremely active," says Csaky, head of the foundation's Harrington Molecular Laboratory and an ophthalmologist with Texas Retina Associates. "If you had even a relatively small disturbance in vision, that could be extremely devastating in terms of what you're used to doing."

Some vision disturbances, such as difficulty reading small print, are inherent with aging. The lenses of our eyes change and can no longer focus close up, so we rely on reading glasses. Macular degeneration goes beyond the normal aging process. It affects the center of the retina; specifically, the 0.1 percent that's responsible for 99.9 percent of our fine vision, Csaky says. "Unfortunately," Csaky says, "the central part is what gives you quality of life, the ability to read, drive, play golf, to discern faces." He uses the analogy of a camera to explain the difference between normal eye aging and macular degeneration. "The lens of the eye is like the lens of a camera," he says. "Cataracts are when the lens of the camera gets cloudy and the picture gets fuzzy. The solution? Change your lens, which is what cataract surgery is. "In macular degeneration, your film has gotten old. We

can change lenses, put in a special lens, and still have a bad picture because the film is starting to decay." Macular degeneration has no cure, but those involved in studying and treating it point out glimmers of hope: "Though it may cause legal blindness, rendering some victims unable to drive or read, it won't cause total blindness. Most kinds never progress past the initial stage. Diagnosis is not "a death sentence for vision," Csaky says. "Treatments can slow down and sometimes reverse the more severe cases of the condition. Diagnostic tools can catch it in its early stages. To check for it, "We dilate your eyes, use a lens and look for yellow spots (drusen) or pigmentation changes or bleeding," says Dr. Yuguang He, associate professor of ophthalmology at the University of Texas Southwestern Medical Center and a specialist in age-related macular degeneration. "It's not like it takes a blood test or X-ray to diag-

nose. We just look at it." The sooner it's found, the better, he says. "There is a window in which we can do treatments." Most treatments are geared toward the more advanced form called wet macular degeneration. The early stage is called dry, which can progress to late-severe dry and sometimes lead to wet. Progression from the dry form to wet can be rapid. Tyler went to a doctor when she first had symptoms, so he was able to diagnose the disease early. Thus, she's been able to receive a relatively new and often successful treatment: a monthly shot directly into each of her eyes. Although there is no sure-fire way to prevent the disease, studies have shown that eating fish two or more times per week helps reduce the risk, he says. "I take fish oil. I'm 54 years old and take it not only to prevent AMD but also to protect my heart, help my cholesterol. I tell patients, something good for your heart has to be good for your eyes."

Aerobic exercise can increase brain size, keep your mind sharp

Aerobic exercise keeps the aging brain — as well as the aging body — in fighting form. Researchers at the University of Pittsburgh, the University of Illinois, Rice University and Ohio State showed that a program of aerobic exercise, over the course of a year, can increase the size of the hippocampus — a part of the brain key to memory and spatial navigation — in adults ages 55 to 80. The hippocampus is known to shrink in late adulthood, leading to memory impairment. The results were made public by the journal Proceedings of the National Academy of Sciences. They back up earlier research that has shown a correlation between fitness level and brain function. To complete the study, the team recruited 120 older people who didn't exercise regularly. Half were randomly assigned to an aerobic exercise program, walking around a track three days a week for 40 minutes per session. The other half embarked on a stretching-and-weights program. Both groups were carefully coached and monitored. They provided blood samples, performed spatial memory exercises and were given MRIs at the beginning, halfway point and end of the research period.

The group doing aerobic exercise had increases in hippocampus volume: up 2.12 percent in the left hippocampus, and 1.97 percent in the right hippocampus. The stretching group, on the other hand, had decreased hippocampus volume: down 1.40 percent on the left and 1.43 percent on the right. The participants also performed spatial memory exercises. Again, the aerobic exercise group had better function by the end of the year of exercise. Blood tests also showed an increase in the levels of brain-derived neurotrophic factor, a chemical involved with learning and memory, among the walkers. Increases in hippocampal size were associated with increased amounts of brain-derived neurotrophic factor. "We demonstrate that loss of hippocampal volume in late adulthood is not inevitable and can be reversed with moderate-intensity exercise," the team wrote, suggesting that a few laps around the track might be a particularly cost-effective way to treat a widespread health problem — without the side effects of medication. And, researchers said, it's never too late. "Starting an exercise regimen later in life is not futile for either enhancing cognition or augmenting brain volume," the team wrote.

A dumbbell’s guide to CrossFit and weightlifting

You don’t want to anger a weightlifter. So I suggest you keep in mind a distinction the athletes make: There’s “weightlifting” and “weight lifting.” The latter is just picking up heavy stuff, but the former is an internationally recognized sport that dominated the workout world in the early 20th century.

For decades, however, America’s fitness industry has virtually abandoned the athletic pursuit, also known as Olympic lifting, in favor of new equipment, fads and methods. “It is almost a forgotten way to train. People just want to bounce around,” says Greg Haff, vice president of the National Strength and Conditioning Association and an assistant professor at West Virginia University School of Medicine.

So why the shift away from a total-body technique that’s pretty much guaranteed to make you run faster, jump higher and get stronger? “What works usually sells,” Haff says. “But it’s a lot of work.”

To stage a comeback, weightlifting needed an army of advocates who not only didn’t mind the challenge, but relished it. And it seems to have found that through CrossFit, a 15-year-old methodology for producing well-rounded athletes that’s found huge success among law enforcement, the military and, these days, the general population. Devotees can either stick with the “Workout of the Day” posted on the CrossFit Web site, or they can visit a CrossFit-affiliated training facility.

Every single one of them sweats the two “O lifts”: the snatch (a single, continuous motion that requires lifting the barbell from the ground and forcing yourself under it so that you’re standing with your arms locked in extension above you) and the clean and jerk (start by pulling the weight from the ground to your shoulders, then dip and drive the bar overhead, splitting your legs into a half lunge to get the power

to extend your arms upward).

If you’ve never heard of the moves, you’re like most of Allison Jetton’s friends. The 28-year-old Arlington, Va., resident has had trouble explaining exactly what she has been doing during CrossFit classes and personal training sessions the past few months at Balance Gym in D.C.: “People are like, ‘You’re cleaning? You’re dating a jerk?’” But she has fallen for the feeling of raising a hefty barbell over her head — and how it has made her clothes fit.

“Women are usually lined up on treadmills with a magazine aerobicizing themselves to oblivion,” she says. “I tried that. I didn’t find it effective.”

Her trainer, Quint Fischer, hasn’t been involved in the sport that much longer, but he got hooked the same way. “CrossFit was a gateway drug to Olympic lifting,” the 26-year-old D.C. resident says. Less than three years ago, he was doing CrossFit workouts with a buddy, but they were leaving out the O lifts. “I didn’t have the confidence to do it,” says Fischer, who wasn’t about to try hoisting heavy weight without guidance. Now that he’s a certified USA Weightlifting coach, he realizes how smart it was to wait.

“Everything comes down to monitoring,” says Haff, who notes that the injury

rates for weightlifting are low because of the culture of supervision. The lifts take just a few seconds each, but they’re incredibly technical. “And if you learn it wrong at the beginning, it’ll be ingrained,” he adds.

Haff’s main beef with CrossFit, which he praises for resurrecting weightlifting in America, is that it promotes doing high numbers of reps in a set time frame. That, he says, can be a recipe for form falling apart.

To prevent problems, most facilities start newbies off with a piece of PVC pipe, so they’re not concerned about weight at all. It helps people get used to the concept of allowing the hips and legs to create movement, explains Jesse Woody, a weightlifting competitor and coach who runs the barbell club at D.C.’s Primal Fitness (and who trained Fischer). In the gym’s week-long CrossFit intro sessions, one day is devoted exclusively to the O lifts, but Woody always warns that even a month-long class wouldn’t cut it.

Although he has been weightlifting seriously for six years, the 30-year-old admits he’s far from mastery. “As long as I’m capable of doing it, there will still be improvements to be made,” says Woody, which is remarkable when you consider that the sport is defined by just two moves. But each of those can be

broken into a series of steps, including the squat and the dead lift, which combine to create a “giant palette of exercises,” according to Haff. “I’ve tried to stop weightlifting and I get bored,” he says. “Nothing is as boring as bicep curls.”

Even with the explosion of CrossFit, it can still be difficult to find a place with certified coaches and the proper equipment. But that may soon be changing. “People are coming to understand how results-oriented these movements are,” Gary says. Rather than being a rarefied thing people watch on TV every four years, Fischer predicts Olympic lifting will eventually find a place in the everyman — and woman — exercise arsenal.

When that happens, Jetton will finally be able to work out in peace. These days, whenever she’s honing her technique on her own at a health club near home, she gets a lot of stares followed by, “What are you training for?” Jetton always has the same response: “Life.”

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How to select the right sleep-inducing foods

Caffeine is known to keep people awake at night, as are big meals and fatty, sugary or spicy foods. On the flip side, “there is some information that certain foods help with sleep,” says Kathe Henke, laboratory director for the Sleep Disorders Center of Virginia.

Think tryptophan. The brain uses this amino acid to make serotonin and melatonin, substances that promote sleep. Foods high in tryptophan are protein-rich items such as dairy products, seafood, meat, poultry, whole grains, beans, lentils, peanuts, eggs and sesame seeds.

Combine protein with carbohydrates. Complex carbohydrates allow more tryptophan to enter the brain, while protein-rich foods alone may interfere with sleep because they contain another amino acid that perks up the brain. Some smart combinations: peanut butter or grilled chicken on whole-wheat bread or hummus on

whole-grain pita slices. **Add some calcium.** Calcium helps the brain use tryptophan to create melatonin. So have a bowl of low-sugar cereal with milk, a carton of Greek yogurt or some low-fat cheese on whole-grain crackers — or that old standby, a glass of warm milk.

... and magnesium. This mineral plays a role in serotonin production and may also help muscles throughout your body relax. Good sources include almonds, bananas, beans, spinach, soybeans and whole-grain brown rice.

Keep it light and healthy. Big evening meals, especially those high in fat, keep the digestive system churning longer. Sugary junk foods cause blood sugar to spike and then fall rapidly, which can trigger the release of stress hormones.

Grab some cherries. Tart cherries naturally boost melatonin levels, according to research from the universities of Pennsylvania and Rochester. Eat them fresh or dried or have a small glass of cherry juice.

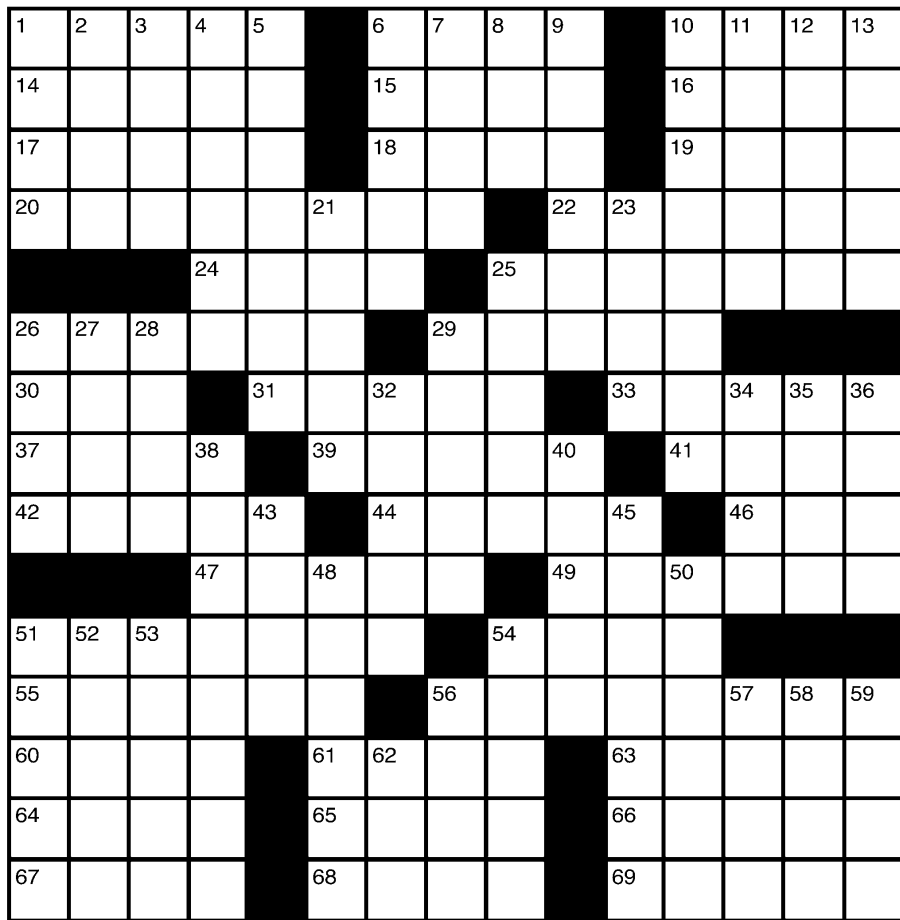

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THE ACES ON BRIDGE®

The NEC tournament in Yokohama takes place over Valentine's Day every year. To mark this year's event, I am using deals from the excellent 2010 bulletin, which can be found online at <http://www.jcbl.or.jp/game/nec/necfest.html>.

Peter Gill contributed a nice play by Brian Senior in today's deal, where he declared four spades doubled. West led a diamond and accurately shifted to a trump. It looks natural to win this cheaply in dummy and lead a club, but the defenders have the upper hand if they win and lead a second diamond. Declarer can crossruff the minor suits to set up the clubs, but will run out of trumps in the process. At the very end, West can keep a master diamond and the heart ace.

Senior figured out that he needed the heart ace onside, come what may. So he took the trump shift in hand and led a heart up. West ducked, and now declarer could win dummy's heart king and lead a club. East could take the club ace and cross to the West hand with a heart for the second trump play, but now declarer was in control and could establish clubs.

Had the defenders played to force declarer at trick five, the fact that the heart trick was in the bag would have made the critical difference. Even though the defenders could in fact have prevailed by winning the heart ace and playing a second trump, that does not detract from Senior's play.

ANSWER: To have a shot to beat this contract, you will need to find partner with close to an opening bid. If he does have that hand, maybe he has stayed silent in this auction because he has some length in dummy's first-bid suit, so lead the diamond nine. At matchpoints a spade might be less "do or die."

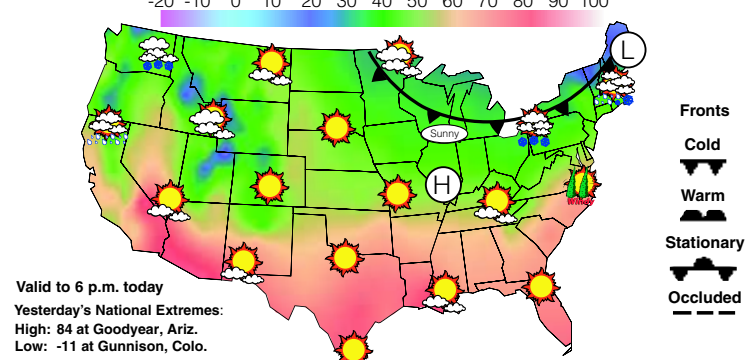
