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## House passes health care overhaul nullification

BOISE — Idaho House Republicans pushed their effort to nullify the federal health care overhaul toward the Senate on Wednesday, despite Democratic objections that the measure is unconstitutional.

The vote was 49-20, with seven Republicans — including Twin Falls' Leon Smith and Burley's Fred Wood — joining 13 Democrats in opposition.

### What's nullification?

The bill would make it illegal for Idaho officials to enact provisions of President Barack Obama's 2009 health care reform, including its mandate that residents buy health insurance.

Idaho is the first of 11 states considering nullification efforts to pass a bill in one legislative chamber, according to the Los Angeles-based 10th Amendment Center. The GOP-led effort invokes the spirit of 200-year-old state sovereignty doctrine found unconstitutional by the U.S. Supreme Court.

### What's the next step?

The bill, H. 117, now passes into the GOP-controlled Senate, which will ultimately decide if it moves to the desk of Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter.

If it makes it to him, the governor doesn't seem likely to reject it. Otter has already spoken of nullification as one tool among other efforts to maintain or increase local control of Idaho issues.

### What does it mean to me?

If passed, a taxpayer-funded legal battle between Idaho and the federal government could follow. Idaho has spent between \$6,000 and \$7,000 to join a lawsuit over health care reform, according to the bill's statement of purpose and fiscal impact.

The bill's sponsors say Idaho will incur up to \$228 million in initial costs to meet the federal mandate, with unknown future costs.

If Idaho effectively opts out of health care reform, it stands to lose billions in federal health care funding.

## STINKER: Few details emerge from armed robbery

Tuesday night's Stinker Station heist marks the sixth reported armed robbery in Twin Falls within the past year.

According to Twin Falls police, a white male in his early 20s entered the Kimberly Road convenience store at 9:50 p.m., brandished a handgun and stole an undisclosed amount of cash and a carton of Marlboro cigarettes.

The suspect stands at least 6 feet tall and was wearing black jeans and a black hooded sweatshirt with three white stripes on the sleeves.

The last convenience store robbery in Twin Falls happened in April 2010 at the Oasis Stop 'N Go on Addison Avenue. The robber, Johnny Moore IV, was captured that night and later convicted. Moore used an Airsoft gun, which resembled a semiautomatic pistol, to steal approximately \$400.

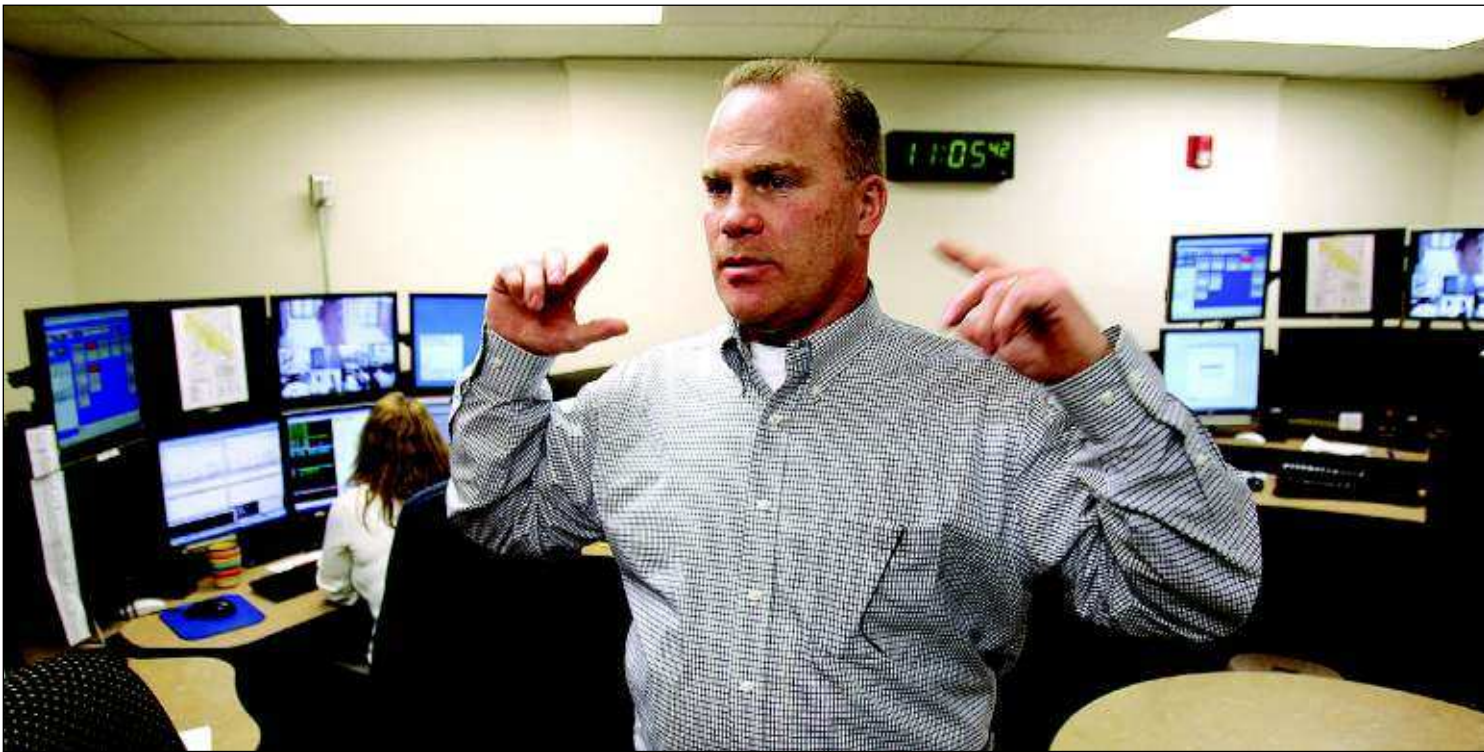
Twin Falls police are also investigating three open bank robbery cases, all of which occurred in the last six months. The Bank of America branch on Shoshone Street was robbed in August by a man who claimed to have a gun, though no witnesses actually saw a gun. The Blue Lakes Boulevard U.S. Bank branch was hit in December, and five weeks later the First Federal Savings Bank on Falls Avenue West was targeted. Police suspect that the last two bank holdups were perpetrated by the same individual.

Elsewhere in the Magic Valley, the year-old armed robbery of Ridley's Family Market in Gooding also remains unsolved.

According to Idaho State Police, 248 robberies were reported statewide in 2009. More than 100 of the robberies statewide involved use of a firearm.

## As population grows, police seek improved communication

Twin Falls' incoming chief of police wants to keep better contact with the city's residents.

Capt. Brian Pike takes over his new job on March 1, but the department is already trying to be more interactive with the public it serves.

"We've had a lot of comments and discussions with the community via our Facebook page," he said Wednesday while leading a media tour of police headquarters. "This week, we're playing around with Twitter."

The department wants to use social networking to better inform the public on current events, such as Tuesday night's Stinker Station robbery, and share crime prevention tips.

"We're trying to open up a dialogue with the community," Pike said.

Pike, Capt. Matt Hicks, Capt. Bryan Krear, Crime Prevention Officer Luke Allen and Lt. Craig Stotts met with the media Wednesday to offer an inside look at how the department works and how it can serve the public.

Allen is leading a major push to educate area residents and businesses on crime prevention. He's available to discuss myriad crime prevention topics beyond what the department can address online.

A focus on crime prevention is important, Pike said, as the department serves a growing population without much prospect of growing itself as Idaho crawls out of a recession.

The Twin Falls Police Department currently employs 102 people, with 18 in investigations — led by Hicks — and 39 patrol officers in Pike's department. His position will be replaced upon his official promotion to chief next month, when he takes over for retiring Chief Jim Munn Jr.

Aside from officers, dozens of employees provide support services in the department's records room, three-desk dispatch center and the evidence room, which houses thousands of items gathered

in investigations. The room accommodates everything from drugs to sexual assault evidence and guns — anything from semiautomatic pistols to shotguns and, on Wednesday, a Thompson submachine gun reminiscent of

Prohibition-era gangster hey-days.

The department handles as many as 850 investigations per year, Hicks said, and approximately 50,000 calls for service to both the city's 911 and non-emergency 311 lines.

"We're equipped to handle a population of 40,000," Hicks said. It is expected that the 2010 U.S. Census, due to be released this spring, will show that approximately 42,000 call Twin Falls home. In addition, thousands more enter the city daily to work, shop and play.

## Jerome sewer overload pinned on dairy spill

For more than a month, a section of the North Side Canal system has doubled as a sewer.

This week, the city of Jerome plans to have wastewater treatment back under control after its system was overloaded by a local dairy.

Jerome City Manager Ben Marchant said a local dairy had "an unfortunate incident" on Dec. 30, when a large amount of calcium was spilled into the city sewer system. The calcium clogged filter membranes in the wastewater treatment plant, shutting down the facility, Marchant said.

"It's taken six weeks, at great expense, to strip the membranes of the calcium buildup," Marchant said. "The expense will go back on the industry, so it shouldn't affect ratepayers."

In the meantime, raw effluent has poured into the North Side Canal Co.'s J Canal. Marchant said

## Father of Utah music group charged

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — The patriarch of a prominent family musical group has been charged with sexually abusing his three daughters in a stunning revelation that was followed four days later by the father running his Porsche off a 300-foot embankment into an icy stream.

Keith Brown, whose daughters are part of The 5 Browns, survived the crash and faces one first-degree felony count of sodomy on a child and two second-degree felony counts of sexual abuse of a child, according to Fourth District Court records obtained Wednesday.

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# Urban renewal bills move to House floor

BOISE — Urban renewal reform seems to be having a bit more luck this legislative session.

Four out of six urban renewal bills heard in the Idaho House Local Government Committee on Wednesday were sent to the House floor with a favorable recommendation. The other two weren't rejected outright, but were sent to the House with the ability to make further amendments.

Urban renewal agencies, though praised as a vital economic development tool, have critics who say they need more oversight, checks and balances. That's because they spend property tax dollars that would otherwise go to other taxing entities ranging from cities to library and highway districts.

Urban renewal agencies get their money primarily

through tax-increment financing, which allows the agencies to collect any increase in assessed property tax value within their boundaries after their formation.

The bills sent to the House would put tighter requirements in place. There would be additional public hearings, affected tax entities could opt out of participating and keep their revenue, and commissioners would be voted into office, not appointed.

Local urban renewal officials from Twin Falls, Jerome and Ketchum testified.

Melinda Anderson, executive director of the Twin Falls Urban Renewal Agency, told lawmakers she supported parts of the legislation, like increasing review time for proposed projects from 30 days to 60 days and getting consent from agricultural landowners to include them in a URA.

But she raised objections

to the bill requiring voter approval for taking on debt, saying that when potential economic development projects arise, there's a need to move quickly.

"I don't believe any business would wait long enough for an election," she said.

Scott Bybee, administrative director of Jerome's urban renewal agency, said his organization focuses on "nuts and bolts projects" that bring in curbs, sidewalks, and powerlines.

He said the infrastructure improvements have encouraged companies to come in, and stressed the value of urban renewal.

Gary Marks executive director of Ketchum's urban renewal agency, said his has been used to work with resort developers. The resulting benefits included new jobs and sales and income tax revenues.

More legislation is still ahead for the committee.

There's also a bill that

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would repeal urban renewal and halt the growth of future projects. Existing districts could continue.

Rep. Leon Smith, R-Twin Falls, also has a bill that wasn't heard. The committee chairwoman, Rep. Lenore Hardy Barrett, R-Challis, said it overlaps with the other legislation, though she likes its requirement for urban renewal districts to give annual financial information each year to cities.

That part could become a separate bill.

## Burley LID waits

### Progress on district for sidewalks stalls

BURLEY — Progress on a plan to give Burley property owners an economical way to fix their sidewalks stalled in the Burley City Council on Tuesday night.

After discussing forming a voluntary local improvement district to offer residents a group rate on sidewalk fixes, councilmen voted to count Tuesday's discussion as a first reading of the ordinance, with approval possibly coming later.

The city would chip in 10 percent of total improvement costs, up to \$150,000. Property owners would potentially save by contracting the work out through a large-scale bid process.

They'd also be able to repay the city in monthly installments.

Former Mayor Jon Anderson told the council he'd have been interested in participating in a project like the LID before he completed his repairs and asked how participants would be chosen if interest in the project is high.

"I was always concerned about what would be fair if the city started this project," he said.

City Attorney Kelly Anthon said participation in the voluntary LID will be on a first-come, first-served basis. Optimally, he said, it will be used in conjunction with the city sidewalk ordinance to make sure areas in disrepair are fixed.

"This is the only idea put forth that makes sense," resident Neil Richie said. "I think you should get it passed."

# More than 100 compete in Burley competition

BURLEY — Nattily dressed in skirts or ties, more than 100 students proudly defended their history projects before a panel of judges Wednesday during the 15th Annual National History Day in Idaho competition in Burley.

Burley Junior High School eighth-grader McKay Ger-

ratt said he felt like his interview went fairly well after he endured a round of questions from a trio of judges.

"There is a lot of competition," Gerratt said.

The themed event was open to students from seven Magic Valley counties, though only those from Mini-Cassia participated. College of Southern Idaho history professor Russ Tremayne was one of 30 who

judged exhibits that ranged in topic from the "Oakley Canal Project" by Minico High School student Kami Blacker to Rupert Elementary School student Jessica Juarez's "The Failure of Immigration Laws."

"A lot of teachers choose not to get involved because they have too much to do," Tremayne said of judging the projects. Event co-coordinator Colleen Parkin said teachers have such limited cur-

riculum hours that it's hard to take on additional projects.

"Until students are required to take history exams statewide there is just not that huge of an emphasis," Parkin said.

Fellow co-coordinator Melody Wysong said organizers would like to see more districts participate and encourage their students to complete the projects, which take an average of 15 to 20 hours.

the plant could still extract large solids from the sewage in settling ponds, leaving just fluid. Neighbor Josh Bateman said the canal, which runs almost through his backyard, has run half-full with strong-smelling black fluid.

"It's not just the sewage that worries me; people throw a lot of stuff in their toilets," Bateman said. "One of my neighbors is sick but he doesn't know why and the horses are getting sick. We didn't ask for this."

North Side Canal Co. Manager Ted Diehl said the city had approval from the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency to run treated wastewater down the canal, which discharges into the Snake River upstream from Thousand Springs.

The canal company has holding ponds at the canal's

end. Marchant said he'd heard talk of diverting the effluent into the ponds but didn't know to what extent that had occurred.

Diehl said the company would discuss Thursday whether or when to empty the ponds.

The canals are otherwise empty during the winter. Diehl said he'll turn canal water on in March, so sewage has to be cleaned up by then.

With the wastewater plant's filters operational, treated water will begin flowing through the canal, though it won't be enough to clean out six weeks of contamination. City Waterworks Superintendent John

Boyd started sending a chlorine wash down the canal on Tuesday, Marchant said.

"Typically, that's not allowed but they have allowed the use of chlorine to mitigate health hazards," Marchant said.

The "they" is the EPA, which was informed of the problem in the first or second week of January, said David Domingo of the EPA's Region 10 Office of Compliance and Enforcement. Domingo said the EPA is waiting to see how it will respond after receiving the city's required report.

"We sent a letter to the city last week and they have a few weeks to respond," Domingo said. "We want to be sure we

know what happened so it's too premature to say what we'll do."

The Idaho Department of Environmental Quality is co-operating but its minimal involvement has consisted of educating callers, said Regional Water Quality Manager Sonny Buhidar.

Marchant said the city received the EPA letter and he will respond soon, sending along documentation of the other instances when the treatment plant had spills.

"Unfortunately, these things take time," Marchant said. "In the meantime, we ask that people and animals stay out of the canal until we can get it cleaned up."

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# Small plane flips at Magic Valley airport

A small personal aircraft flipped over while landing at Joslin Field, Magic Valley Regional Airport on Wednesday morning, sending its passenger to the hospital with a minor injury and closing the runway for less than two hours.

The plane, a single-engine Piper Cub, was trying to land at about 9:20 a.m. with

a southern crosswind between 25 and 35 mph when it flipped, Airport Manager Bill Carberry said. Carberry was hesitant to blame the wreck directly on the winds, citing the possibility of a Federal Aviation Administration investigation into it.

“The pilot is an excellent pilot and he was trying to navigate those winds and he lost control,” Carberry said, adding that the winds were

certainly a contributing factor.

Pilot Mike Walker and an unidentified passenger were both walking around after the wreck, Carberry said. The passenger had a cut on his head and was taken by ambulance to St. Luke’s Magic Valley Regional Medical Center. Twin Falls firefighters stationed at the airport were the first to respond.

Carberry said it took less

than 90 minutes after the wreck for the area to be cleared and the runway reopened.

“(The wreck was) unfortunate,” Carberry said. “I’m really proud of our emergency responders and they did a good job handling this.”

He said lighter planes, such as the Cub, have a more difficult time navigating heavy winds than larger commercial planes. In general, Carberry said he does-

n’t see a lot of wrecks or accidents at his airport.

“It’s rare that we have aircraft accidents,” he said. “We have all kinds of operations and it’s uncommon to have any kind of aircraft accidents.”

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# Jerome revisits building new municipal facilities

JEROME — Cramped quarters, safety concerns and ever-present threats of plumbing failure have added Jerome’s city hall, police station and downtown fire station to a growing list of city facilities in need of more than renovation.

Jerome City Administrator Ben Marchant told the City Council on Tuesday that it’s time to revisit the discussion of pursuing a bond option to build new municipal facilities. City officials said it will be important to gather citizen input during the coming months as that discussion continues.

Marchant said that while there’s never a good time to start the process, now may

be as good a time as ever, thanks to current low interest rates.

“How can we best deliver municipal services in a modern way when the buildings we are in were not made for the number of employees? How much longer can we afford to wait?” Marchant asked the council. “We can’t revive them and we can’t renovate them.”

Councilwoman Marjorie Schmidt said employees in each building work in environments with many “Band-Aid” fixes — closets used as makeshift offices and once-temporary building moves that morphed into long-term solutions.

“We’re not just doing nothing. We’ve tried to make it work,” Schmidt said. “We’ve been putting Band-

Aids over a gaping wound.”

But city funding concerns don’t end with buildings. This year, the city cut the \$8,000 it typically funds for its Fourth of July fireworks show and now seeks public input on other ways to fund the celebration.

“It’s the only one the city traditionally funded but it had to be cut this year,” Marchant said. “We would like to know what people would like to see done.”

Jerome Chamber of Commerce Executive Director John Melone said the chamber is interested in spearheading fundraising efforts but needs public support.

# Shoshone examines noise complaints

SHOSHONE — The Shoshone City Council on Tuesday received an update on the rewriting of its noise ordinance. The effort has become pertinent with the completed community center at the Lincoln County Fairgrounds.

City Clerk Mary Kay Bennett said the center, located in a residential area, has caused more than one headache.

“It’s attracted some parties that were very loud,” Bennett said. “We’ve had some rodeos that are very loud, encompassing the whole town with their noise.”

Everett Aplet, a retired engineer, has been helping the city with research connected to the rewrite. He identified a couple of distinctions to include in the new version of the ordinance. Those include allowing police officers to respond to noise based on whether it is clearly audible or by using an instrument to measure the sound.

“The officer can have a choice,” Aplet said. “So it can be up to his discretion because there may be times when he doesn’t have the time to get an instrument.”

Aplet also suggested including verbiage in rental agreements for the fairgrounds and other public areas that the renter is responsible for any noise complaints. Such an agreement for the fairgrounds, of course, would be up to the site’s actual managers.

“We have to talk to the fair board because in talking to the (county) commissioners, it’s all up to the fair board who rents it,” Aplet said.

The city will hear the first draft of the new ordinance at its next meeting, with a final draft arriving the following meeting.

The council also heard a presentation by Vern Johnson of Lincoln County Saddle Up. Johnson’s organization supports various service groups, including a

farmer’s market that aims to start a food bank and the Lincoln County Historical Society.

Johnson approached the council to alert members to his organization’s ability to help with projects around Shoshone, he said.

“If you guys have projects,

we may not be able to help you out a lot right now, but there will be money one day. If we can pitch in and help, we will,” Johnson said.

City Maintenance Supervisor Aaron Aggeler said Johnson’s group could help eradicate weeds and paint the skate park.

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# Officials identify man who died in jail

(AP) — Twin Falls County officials have released the name of an inmate who died in the county jail.

Officials say 56-year-old Hardy Albert Vermandel of Billings, Mont., was found dead of an apparent suicide at about 3 a.m. Tuesday. Officials have released no further information.

Vermandel was arrested by Twin Falls police on Montana warrants for felony drunken driving, officer obstruction and driving without privileges. He was booked into jail Monday.

Vermandel was arrested May 29 and charged with his eighth DUI after a crash in Yellowstone County.

At the time, he was on probation for two previous felony DUIs and criminal endangerment for hauling a horse trailer the wrong way on Interstate 94 and crashing into a Treasure County sheriff’s patrol car in 2000.

## The Republicans’ clown princes of climate change

In 1957, the Soviet Union launched the first Earth-orbiting satellite, and the United States was shocked to discover that it had fallen behind in the space race. In response to the “Sputnik crisis,” Republicans and Democrats in Congress worked together to create NASA and dramatically increased funding for science and technology education and research.

Twelve years later, Neil Armstrong became the first human to walk on the moon.

Today, America faces another crisis that requires a major scientific and technological response: climate change. Of course, this crisis is not limited to the United States, but we can use our unparalleled capacity for innovation to lead the way. And just as it did half a century ago, Congress has a chance to take decisive action.

So how are Republican congressional leaders responding?

Here’s what Texas Rep. Ralph Hall said last fall: “I’ve had people tell me if we had all the money in the world, put it in Texas Stadium, people couldn’t change nature’s future one iota.” Hall, who is 87, was already a state judge when Sputnik launched. What did he say then? “I’ve had people tell me it’ll take a lot of work and money to match that, so there’s no use trying?”

Hall’s attitude isn’t surprising given his close ties to the oil and gas industry, which has consistently tried to block progress in the fight against climate change. But he isn’t just another oil state climate contrarian with his



head in the sand. Now that the Republicans have a majority in the House, he is the new chairman of the House Committee on Science and Technology, which oversees federal funding in these fields.

Unfortunately, he says he will use his new power not to advance science but to obstruct it. Hall has said he plans to investigate “Climategate,” the phony scandal whipped up by climate change deniers. In 2009, hackers illegally gained access to computers at a university in England and released thousands of e-mails from top climate scientists. Climate contrarians claimed a handful of the e-mails showed that scientists had muzzled dissenting views and distorted data. Over the past year, five independent investigations found those allegations to be false.

Even when Hall tries to seem reasonable, he’s not. “I’ve never said it’s outrageous to even think about global warming. I want some proof,” he said last December. “I’m going to subpoena people from both sides and try to put them

under oath and try to find out what the real facts are.”

But there are no longer two sides. Asking for further proof about climate change is now the same as asking for more proof that smoking causes cancer.

Hall’s first moves as chairman don’t bode well. For his vice chairman he picked Jim Sensenbrenner, R-Wis., who last year called climate change a “massive international scientific fraud.” He chose Rep. Paul Broun, R-Ga., to be chairman of the Subcommittee on Investigations and Oversight. Speaking at a John Birch Society event last year, Broun suggested that the idea of climate change is part of a conspiracy to “destroy America.”

Several House committees, including Hall’s, likely will hold hearings on the climate e-mails and the climate “debate,” and are already trying to stop the Environmental Protection Agency from using the Clean Air Act to limit heat-trapping emissions from power plants and other large industrial sources.

Instead of attacking the EPA and holding bogus hear-

ings, Hall and his fellow climate change deniers should follow the lead of an institution that doesn’t fool around when it comes to clear-eyed planning for the world as it is, not as we wish it to be. The U.S. military — an institution that even Rep. Broun would admit is not a bastion of soft-hearted liberals — has identified global climate change as “an accelerant of instability” that could have “significant geopolitical impacts” that “may spark or exacerbate future conflicts.” That was the conclusion of the February 2010 *Pentagon Quadrennial Defense Review*.

The rest of the world is waiting for the United States to move. The responsible course is for Hall and his fellow congressional leaders to begin mobilizing American science and technology to find climate solutions. That strategy worked in 1957, and it can be a big part of the solution today.

## Meet Gov. Walker, the Mubarak of Wisconsin

In Egypt, workers are having a revolutionary February. In the United States, by contrast, February is shaping up as the cruelest month workers have known in decades.

The coup de grace that toppled Hosni Mubarak came after tens of thousands of Egyptian workers went on strike beginning last week. By Friday, when Egypt’s military leaders apparently decided that unrest had reached the point where Mubarak had to go, the Egyptians who operate the Suez Canal and their fellow workers in steel, textile and bottling factories; in hospitals, museums and schools; and those who drive buses and trains had left their jobs to protest their conditions of employment and governance. As Jim Hoagland noted in *The Post*, Egypt was barreling down the path that Poland, East Germany and the Philippines had taken, the path where workers join student protesters in the streets and jointly sweep

away an authoritarian regime.

But even as workers were helping topple the regime in Cairo, one state government in particular was moving to topple workers’ organizations here in the United States. Last Friday, Scott Walker, Wisconsin’s new Republican governor, proposed taking away most collective bargaining rights of public employees. Under his legislation, which has moved so swiftly through the newly Republican state legislature that it might come to a vote today, the unions representing teachers, sanitation workers, doctors and nurses at public hospitals, and a host of other public employees, would lose the right to bargain over health coverage, pensions and other benefits.

(To make his proposal more politically palatable, the governor exempted from his hit list the unions representing firefighters and police.) The only thing all other public-sector workers could bargain over would be their base wages, and given the fiscal restraints plaguing the states, that’s hardly anything to bargain over at all.

You might think that Walker came to this extreme measure after negotiations with public-sector unions had reached an impasse. In fact, he hasn’t held such discussions. “I don’t have anything to negotiate,” Walker told the *Milwaukee Journal Sentinel* last week. To underscore just how accomplished he considered his feat, he vowed to call in the National Guard if protesting workers walked off the job or disrupted state services.

Now, it’s not as if our states don’t have fiscal crises to address, and Walker insists that it’s Wisconsin’s empty till that has driven him to curtail workers’ rights. But

there are other options. Democratic governors such as California’s Jerry Brown and New York’s Andrew Cuomo have proposed scaling back public services, pay and benefits without going after workers’ fundamental rights to bargain.

American conservatives often profess admiration for foreign workers’ bravery in protesting and undermining authoritarian regimes. Letting workers exercise their rights at home, however, threatens to undermine some of our own regimes (the Republican ones particularly), and shouldn’t be permitted. Now that Wisconsin’s governor has given the Guard its marching orders, we can discern a new pattern of global repressive solidarity emerging — from the chastened pharaoh of the Middle East to the cheesehead pharaoh of the Middle West.

## All you need to know about why things fell apart

A surprising number of my fellow citizens appear to be unaware of my service these past 18 months as a member of the Financial Crisis Inquiry Commission.

Thus it may come as news that I have declined to sign the report issued by the majority, or the dissent by the three-member minority, or even the dissent from their dissent, written by the now-immortal Peter J. Wallison. I hereby dissent from the dissent from the dissent. My dissent is different from all those other dissents, which is why I am dissenting.

The task is not a simple one. In limiting me to a mere two pages at the end of their 633-page book, the majority and the other dissenters have suppressed not only several apt metaphors, but deep truths.

Here, in a far-too-brief executive summary, they are:

### Wall Street’s shifting demographics

In the commission’s report Federal Reserve Chairman Ben Bernanke describes recent events as “the worst financial crisis in global history, including the Great Depression.” The event, in other words, was unprecedented. To understand an event that has never before occurred, we must logically begin with those factors that have never before been present. On Wall Street, the most obvious such factor is women.

Of course, the women who flooded into Wall Street firms before the crisis weren’t typically permitted to take big financial risks. As a rule they remained in the background, as “helpmates.” But their presence clearly distorted the judgment of male bond traders — though the mechanics of their influence remains unexplored by the commission (on which several women sat).

They may have compelled the male risk takers to “show off for the ladies,” for instance, or perhaps they merely asked annoying questions and undermined the risk takers’ confidence.

At any rate, one sure sign of the importance of women in the financial crisis is the market’s subsequent response: to purge women from senior Wall Street roles. Wall Street’s gender problem is, for the moment, of merely academic interest.

### The moral collapse of the American working class

AIG head Robert Benmosche has recently pointed out that the reason his firm has enjoyed such great success is precisely because it has avoided selling insurance to the large number of Americans who believe, as Benmosche put it, “that the government is responsible for what happens to me.”

The CEO of JPMorgan, Jamie Dimon, has often

called our attention to the outrageous amount of banker bashing by Americans outside the financial sector, who seek to blame their troubles on others.

Wall Street leaders now understand that they made a mistake, one born of their innocent and trusting nature. They trusted ordinary Americans to behave more responsibly than they themselves ever would, and these ordinary Americans betrayed their trust.

Amazingly, these ordinary Americans don’t even appear to feel guilty for their actions. Like wild animals that have lost their fear of humans, they continue to wander down from the hills to rummage through our garbage cans for sustenance.

### The Chinese

The willingness of this remote and curious people to sell us goods at ridiculously low prices is disruptive. It encourages our poor to believe they can afford many items which they should not be able to, for instance. And the vast number of dollars these same Chinese people willingly lend to us at absurdly low rates of interest places an unfair burden on our financiers, who must find someplace to put them.

### Impersonal historical forces

The most distressing aspect of the commission’s report is its attempt to blame actual human beings for the financial crisis: fraudulent CDO managers, greedy ratings companies, Wall Street bond traders and, especially, Wall Street CEOs. Think about this: If everyone on Wall Street is guilty, how can anyone be? If no one on Wall Street saw it coming, how can anyone be expected to have seen it?

Anyway, as several Wall Street CEOs tried patiently to explain to the commission, the details were never their responsibility. Martin Sullivan, the CEO of AIG in the three years leading up to its near collapse, even went so far as to prove that he had no idea how much he’d been paid (\$107 million).

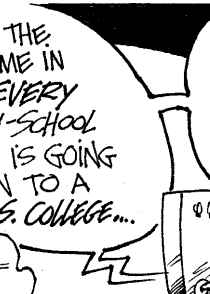
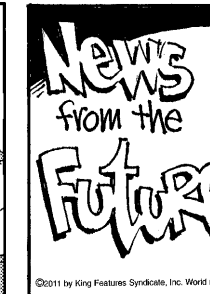
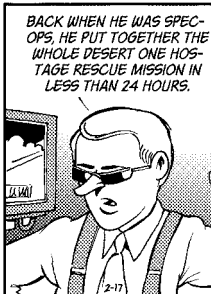
The commission proved incapable of grasping the point: the rare man capable of running a big Wall Street firm remains focused on the big picture. And in the big picture, from the point of view of their firms and their earnings potential, the so-called financial crisis was a blip. They’ve already forgotten about it.

And they assume that, eventually, you will, too.

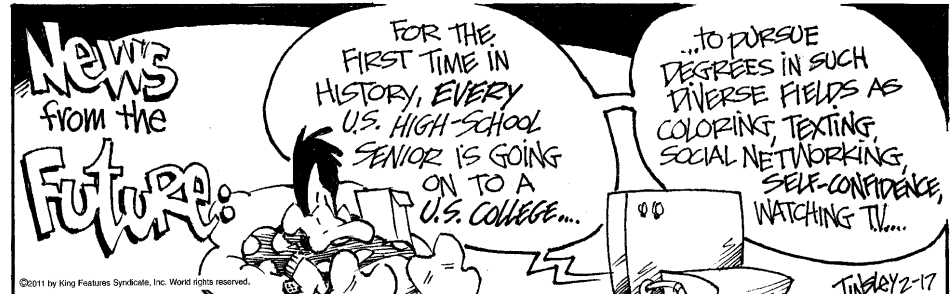

### ... rush to judgment

The Senate Education Committee was expected to vote this week on Idaho Superintendent of Public Instruction Tom Luna's education reform proposal, but that's been delayed. Based on the feedback Luna and state lawmakers have received in the past couple of weeks, the superintendent wisely realizes that it's not perfect.

Luna, who deserves a lot of credit for boldness, said the basic pillars will remain, but some alterations ... will make the bill stronger.

The Idaho Legislature deserves an A+ for hearing so much testimony from both sides of Luna's proposal that would overhaul education, as it exists today.

Luna also deserves credit for understanding the realities of a fiscally conservative Legislature. Sure, he could pound a podium and angrily demand lawmakers raise taxes to increase funding to education, then scream and cry and stomp his feet when they don't. And if you know anything about the Idaho Legislature, you know it won't raise taxes.

Luna has accepted the

reality that public education isn't going to get the kind of funding it did a few years ago. So he proposed a plan that would eliminate 770 teaching positions in the state and increase class sizes by about 1.5 students per class, on average.

The first draft would increase pay a bit for starting teachers but also tie some of that pay to performance, and would make it easier for veteran teachers to be removed. Older students would be required to take some courses online and would be issued laptop computers.

Let's face it, there's a lot to digest in Luna's proposal. It was dropped on the Legislature — and Idahoans — without a lot of public conversations. There's a lot of confusion about what it will do.

The "Students Come First" program is very controversial, and should have been unveiled a couple of months ago.

Increased class sizes across the board are a legitimate concern. But sadly, with more budget woes, Idaho may not have a choice. Students may be crammed into classrooms.

Increasing technology in the classroom is also a great idea. But it also raises questions. What kind of maintenance and replacement costs should we realistically expect?

What happens to local control?

Where's the proof that the reform will pay off in the end?

Everyone must agree that the funding picture is not going to get better anytime soon unless there's a tax increase. The education funding is a critical first step to establishing the state's budget because it takes such a large chunk out of the coffers. But it can't be rushed ...

The proposal should be tweaked to reflect the feedback. And it should be adopted if it truly puts students first.

Lawmakers must understand the potential ramifications of implementing such a drastic overhaul even if it means the proposal is tabled for a year.



### .... a fool's errand

Legislators are gambling with the health insurance of 223,000 of their most vulnerable constituents.

All to continue an unnecessary and legally flawed crusade against federal health care reform.

Their fool's errand — passing a state law that would purport to "nullify" a federal law — jeopardizes all federal funding for Idaho's cash-strapped and ever-growing Medicaid program.

Let's take a moment to process the hypocrisy.

Many Idaho lawmakers are most upset at health care reform's "individual mandate:" the requirement that Americans purchase insurance. Yet these same lawmakers believe their oath of office allows them to summarily tell nearly a quarter of a million Idahoans to go without health coverage. The folly is exceeded only by the sheer arrogance of it all.

Arrogance is never pretty, especially in politics. And it was in full display (last week) as the House State Affairs Committee gave its recommendation to the "nullification" bill ...

They were warned. They were told that passage of the nullification bill could jeopardize Idaho's federal funding for Medicaid. Nearly \$1.2 billion for 2011-12 — and every last dime gambled on the "nullification" gambit.

Says who?

It all starts with none other than Roger Vinson, the Pensacola, Fla. -based federal judge who became a hero to health care reform critics nationwide when he

sided with Idaho and 25 other states in declaring the law unconstitutional. In his Jan. 31 ruling, Vinson also asserted that states can "exit the (Medicaid) program altogether."

... assistant chief deputy attorney general Brian Kane said nullification could have "the practical and legal effect" of rejecting federal Medicaid funding. This, in turn, "could create an intense burden on the state's budget."

To put it mildly, Idaho receives about 70 percent of its Medicaid money from the federal government. A program without a match ceases to be a program.

... opting out of federal Medicaid funding represents an unfathomable worst-case scenario. When the full House votes on nullification this week, Idahoans' lives could hang in the balance. It is that simple. And just that scary ...

### ... no reflection needed

Idaho legislators don't dare sneeze, much less order lunch, without first clearing it with a third-party review.

So why are they in such a rush to revolutionize the biggest — and arguably the most vital — service state government delivers — the education of your children? Lawmakers typically refer changes — some big and others not-so-big — to a study.

If it involved rewriting state code, they assigned the matter to an interim committee. That's how you got the public records law in 1990. It was an interim study group that preserved Idaho's death penalty after the Supreme Court struck it down earlier in the decade. And an interim panel laid the groundwork for the expanding home-owner's exemption and shifting basic school support off the property tax.

If it meant reorganizing a state agency or retooling a branch of government,



they often referred the issue to the Office of Performance Evaluation. That's the shop that reviewed the pros and cons of requiring the more than 110 Idaho school districts to merge into more efficient units.

And if the question before them involved that most dreaded of political topics — who is going to pay more taxes — lawmakers and governors formed a task force to delve into it. The most recent example involved Gov. C. L. "Butch" Otter's failed attempt to win lawmaker

approval for fuel taxes and vehicle registration fees to augment Idaho's depleted road and bridge budget.

Here's why: It buys time ... Pass a flawed bill today and you'll spend the next year or two cleaning up the wreckage, not to mention explaining away the mistakes. 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# Deere's profit jumps on strong sales

ST. LOUIS — Deere & Co., the world's largest maker of agricultural equipment, said Wednesday its quarterly net income more than doubled as rising crop prices encouraged U.S. farmers to buy new farm machinery and plant their fields fencepost to fencepost.

The company also raised its earnings prediction for the fiscal year. Deere's shares showed a gain of less than 2 percent in midday trading after rising as much nearly 4 percent shortly after the

market opened.

The Moline, Ill. company earned \$513.7 million, or \$1.20 per share, for the fiscal first quarter ended Jan. 31, up from \$243.2 million, or 57 cents per share, a year earlier.

That beat analyst expectations of 97 cents per share, according to a survey by FactSet.

Total revenue rose 27 percent to \$6.12 billion. Equipment sales in the United States and Canada leaped 35 percent in the quarter. Outside those core regions, sales were up 22 percent for the quarter.

Sales were helped by a 2 percent increase in prices.

Deere's sales increase was driven by demand for heavy farm equipment, with revenue for four-wheel-drive tractors and large combines rising more than 50 percent. Such machines can cost hundreds of thousands of dollars, but a boom in crop prices has left U.S. farmers flush with cash.

The global price of corn and wheat has roughly doubled since July, while soybeans jumped 56 percent. That's encouraged farmers to plant crops on every possible acre of soil, said Susan

Karlix, Deere's manager of investor communications. Farmers feel confident in forking over cash, or taking on debt, to buy new Deere equipment as global crop prices continue to climb.

"Our order books are strong," Karlix told analysts during a conference call. Even demand for used Deere tractors and rentals has jumped, she said.

Deere said construction demand is up as well. Construction and forestry sales climbed 81 percent, and the unit turned an operating profit in the quarter from a loss in fiscal 2010.

# Pursuing with passion

## Burley man turns hot rod hobby into fledgling business

BURLEY — Gary Warner has loved working on classic cars and hot rods since he was a teenager.

Turning his pastime into a business, though, was Warner's wife's idea.

"I was just doing projects on the side," he said.

Five years later, Warner says he is close to paying off his initial \$110,000 capital investment and he is earning enough to keep his son, Sonny Warner, on payroll.

"This what I really enjoy; I have all my life," Warner said. "It's a family business. My wife does all the paperwork and billing. I wouldn't be able to do it without their support."

It hasn't been easy, he said, and in retrospect, using credit cards to finance the up-front cost of building a large shop and purchasing additional tools and supplies probably wasn't the best idea.

"With the economy down, people aren't spending money on things like this," Warner said. "These kinds of projects are a luxury, not necessity."

In the meantime, Gary's Hotrods and Harleys is building a name for itself.

Warner is positioning his business to capture the emerging market that will come once people start spending money again.

That market won't likely include merely southern

# GOP weighs expansion of E-Verify system

WASHINGTON — In an early indicator of how congressional Republicans will legislate on immigration, House GOP leaders are expanding an inquiry into an enforcement program that allows employers to check the immigration status of employees.

The E-Verify program has long been championed by Rep. Elton Gallegly, R-Calif., chairman of the House immigration subpanel, which will hold a hearing about it Thursday.

Many business owners believe that Gallegly and other House Republicans want to make E-Verify, currently a voluntary program for companies, mandatory. Critics, many of them farmers, warn that such a move could destabilize the agricultural economy, which is heavily dependent on undocumented immigrants, and jeopardize millions of jobs held by American citizens that are upstream and downstream of farm labor.

Supporters of E-Verify say that, with minimal effort, it ensures that jobs are filled only by U.S. citizens and those foreigners legally authorized to work.

After he was named chairman of the immigration subcommittee, Gallegly noted that "making E-Verify universally mandatory would ease the cumbersome and easily manipulated I-9 process employers now use to

screen employees. It would also greatly reduce the number of illegal immigrants in the American workforce."

Gallegly was referring to a form known as the I-9 which employers are required to have employees fill out. It requires documentation that the employees are allowed to seek work. The document requires employees to provide a Social Security number and other documentation pertaining to employment authorization. With E-Verify, employers run the information through federal databases to identify people not legally authorized to work.

"I have a real mixed reaction from my members," said Randel Johnson of the U.S. Chamber of Commerce. "Some find it workable and others do not."

"With some companies, it is the logistical problem of having a computer on your construction site" to run the online queries, he added. "If you are running a small business, there is aversion to a new system that will make things more complicated."

Rep. Lamar Smith, chairman of the House Judiciary Committee, said illegal workers are taking jobs that could help lower unemployment among legal residents.

"With unemployment at 9 percent for 21 months,

# Perspective, not histrionics, needed to advance budget debate

WASHINGTON — Imagine that a year ago the president had proposed to begin dealing with the government's budget deficit, and the urgent need for infrastructure investment, by raising the federal gas tax by 60 cents a gallon, from its current level of 18.5 cents. You can almost hear the howls of protest and

condemnation, with dire warnings about how it would bring auto sales to a grinding halt, force entire swaths of rural America into bankruptcy and plunge the

economy back into recession. Oil industry economists would surely have projected the loss of millions of jobs.

That didn't happen, of course, but guess what: Over the past year, the average price of a gallon of unleaded gasoline in the United States actually increased by the same 60 cents, according to AAA.

Instead of that money — as much as \$100 billion — going to the U.S. Treasury for deficit reduction and infrastructure, it went straight into the pockets of Arab sheiks, Russian oligarchs, global commodity speculators and oil company shareholders.

During that same period, private businesses created 1.2 million jobs and recorded

near-record profits, stock prices rose by more than 20 percent and auto sales were brisk enough that General Motors recently handed out \$4,000 profit-sharing checks to each of its unionized workers.

History will also record that, during that same time period, not one politician that I am aware of took to the floor of the House or

Senate to denounce this "job-killing" 23 percent increase in the price of gasoline.

The purpose of this real-life fable is to provide a bit of perspective to the bitter and contentious debate that is about to begin here in Washington over taxes and spending. The outcome of

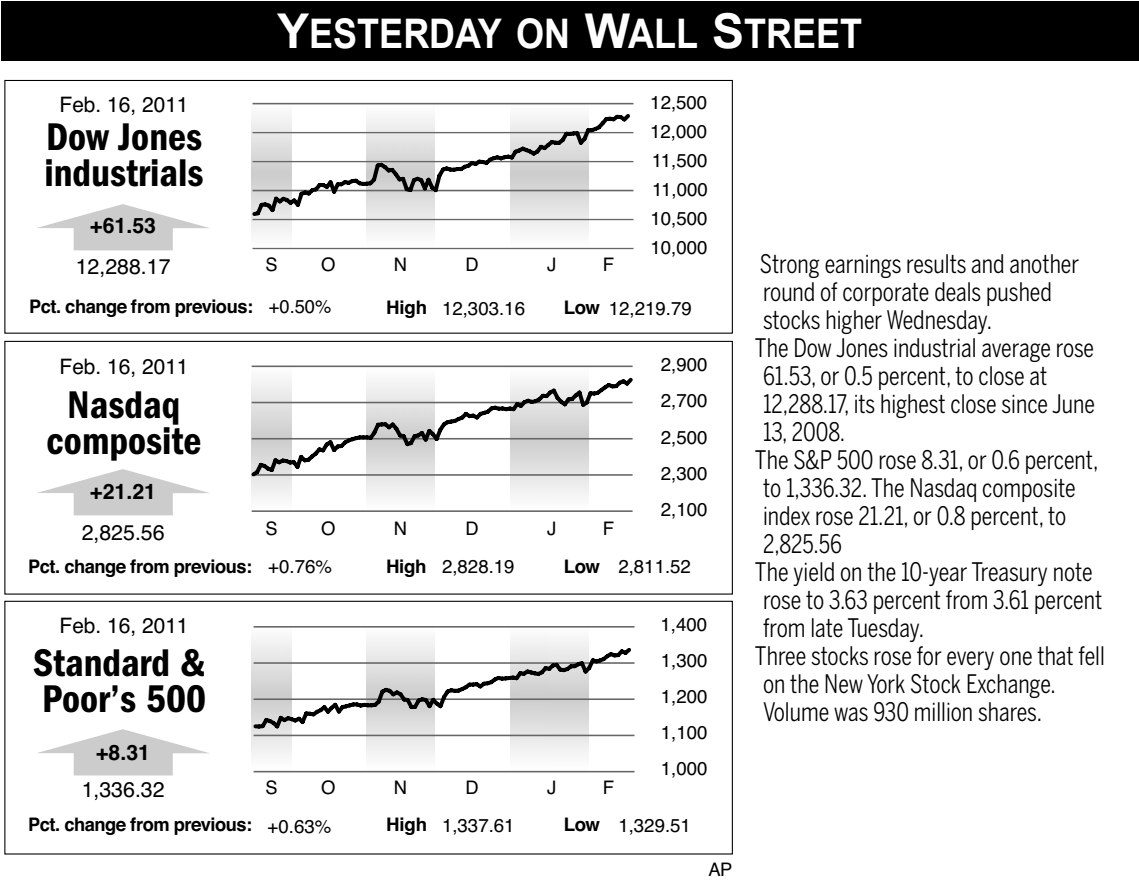

# Obama, GOP freshmen win in jet engine budget fight

WASHINGTON — Determined to reduce deficits, impatient House Republican freshmen made common cause with President Barack Obama on Wednesday, scoring their biggest victory to date in a vote to cancel \$450 million for an alternative engine for the Pentagon's next-generation warplane.

“Right here, right now was a surefire way to reduce spending,” declared Rep. Tom Rooney of Florida, a second-term lawmaker whose summons to cut money from the F-35 fighter jet was answered by 47 Republican newcomers. Speaker John Boehner and other House GOP leaders back the funding.

The incursion into the defense budget occurred as the Republican-controlled House debated legislation to cut federal spending by more than \$61 billion through the end of the current fiscal year. Nearly all of the reductions are aimed at domestic programs, ranging from education aid to nutrition, environmental protection and farm programs.

Obama has threatened a veto if

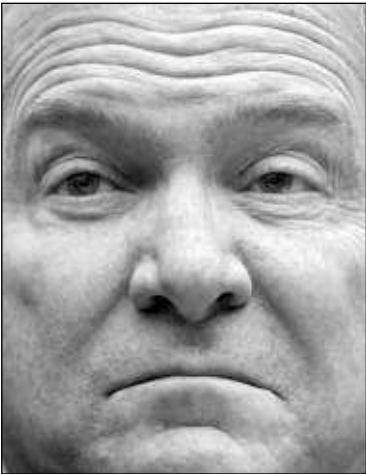
the measure reaches his desk, but he and the GOP newcomers were on the same side when it came to the engine for the F-35, the costliest weapons program in U.S. history. The House vote was 238-198.

Two successive presidents as well as the Pentagon brass have tried to scrap funding for the alternative engine, arguing it is a waste of money. In a measure of his opposition, Defense Secretary Robert Gates told a House committee earlier in the day that overall costs could reach \$3 billion, and he vowed to “look at all available legal options to close down this program” if lawmakers fail.

Strictly by the numbers, the vote was a bipartisan one, with 110 Republicans and 123 Democrats supporting cancellation of the funds, while 68 Democrats and 130 Republicans wanted to leave them in place.

But that breakdown obscured the change wrought by the voters last fall. A similar vote in May ended in defeat for opponents of the alternative engine.

At the time, Democrats controlled the House, and only 57

Republicans voted to cut off funds. Many of today's first-term Republicans were mere candidates for office, campaigning with the support of tea party activists and promising to cut federal spending. “Give these new freshmen credit.

They went against their own leadership,” said Rep. John Larson, D-Conn., also a foe of the alternative engine.

“No federal agency is exempt,” said freshman Rep. Tim Griffin, R-Ark., who said the second engine “is militarily unnecessary and a wasteful use of extremely limited and precious taxpayer dollars.”

Apart from spending cuts and the defense budget, the broader legislation before the House contains funding needed to keep the government operating normally after current authority expires on March 4.

House passage is expected by week's end, although debate has turned into something of an exercise in human endurance as Republicans live up to their pledge of free-flowing discussion and numerous amendments.

Lawmakers debated proposed changes to the bill well after midnight and into the early hours of Wednesday, and arrangements were in place for the House to stay in session as late as 3 a.m. on Thursday before adjourning for a few hours and returning to work.

More than 400 proposed

changes were stacked up and could be voted on, ranging from the sweeping to the tightly targeted.

Rep. Tom Price, R-Ga., wants to go big, cutting an additional \$45 billion from the bill, to be taken across the board from domestic programs.

Rep. Darrell Issa, R-Calif., has one proposal to block the Department of Health and Human Services from studying “the concurrent and separate use of malt liquor and marijuana among young people,” and another to make sure the National Science Foundation does not research whether “video games improve mental health for the elderly.”

The ultimate fate of the alternative engine wasn't sealed by the day's vote. Supporters of the project are likely to try and preserve it when the Senate debates its version of the bill. Gates' spokesman, Geoff Morrell, said the defense chief viewed the House vote as “one step, although a very important one, on the path to ensuring that we stop spending limited dollars on unwanted and unneeded defense programs.”

## AROUND THE WORLD

### WISCONSIN

#### Thousands protest anti-union bill at Capitol

MADISON — Thousands of teachers, students and prison guards descended on the Wisconsin Capitol on Wednesday to fight a move to strip government workers of union rights in the first state to grant them more than a half-century ago.

The Statehouse filled with as many as 10,000 demonstrators who chanted, sang the national anthem and beat drums for hours. The noise in the rotunda rose to the level of a chainsaw, and many Madison teachers joined the protest by calling in sick in such numbers that the district — the state's second-largest — had to cancel classes.

The new Republican governor, Scott Walker, is seeking passage of the nation's most aggressive anti-union proposal, which was moving swiftly through the GOP-led Legislature.

If adopted, it would mark a dramatic shift for Wisconsin, which passed a comprehensive collective bargaining law in 1959 and was the birthplace of the national union representing all non-federal public employees.

### NEW YORK

#### Somali pirate gets 33 years in prison

A Somali pirate who kidnapped and brutalized the captain of a U.S.-flagged merchant ship off the coast of Africa in 2009 was sentenced to more than 33 years in prison Wednesday by an emotional judge who told him he deserved a stiff punishment for leading a crew of armed bandits bent on committing “depraved acts.”

U.S. District Judge Loretta A. Preska choked up as she read at length from letters written by Capt. Richard Phillips and traumatized sailors who were aboard the cargo vessel commandeered by Abdiwali Abdiqadir Muse.

The recent spate of piracy on the Indian Ocean and elsewhere “is not a Disneyland-esque problem,” she quoted Phillips, of Underhill, Vt., as saying. “These are not Johnny Depps. They threaten seamen's lives, repeatedly. ... They deprive us of the rights that they themselves complain about.”

Another officer from the ship, Colin Wright, appeared in person to urge the judge to impose a lengthy term. He recalled being shot at and held at gunpoint by Muse and three other pirates.

“What happened to us was terrible,” said Wright, 44, of Galveston, Texas. “I'm not the same person I was and I never will be.”

### EGYPT

#### Democracy advocate critical of military

CAIRO — Egypt's new military rulers came under criticism Wednesday from a leading democracy advocate as well as from youth and women's groups for what they say is a failure to make decisions openly and include a larger segment of society.

Five days after ousting Hosni Mubarak in a popular uprising, Egyptians continued protests and strikes over a host of grievances from paltry wages to toxic waste dumping. They defied the second warning in three days from the ruling Armed Forces Supreme Council to halt all labor unrest at a time when the economy is staggering.

The caretaker government also gave its first estimate of the death toll in the 18-day democracy uprising. Health Minister Ahmed Sameh Farid said at least 365 civilians died according to a preliminary count that does not include police or prisoners.

Democracy advocate and Nobel laureate Mohamed ElBaradei called on the council to include civilians in a transitional presidential council to be entrusted with setting the course toward democracy.

### FLORIDA

#### Girl found dead, brother burned in truck

FORT LAUDERDALE — A state worker made the alarming discovery: a 10-year-old boy in the front seat of an exterminator's red pickup alongside a busy interstate, convulsing from seizures, dripping in chemicals so toxic they sickened rescue workers who helped him. Nearby, the boy's father lay on the ground, unresponsive and doused in gasoline in what he later told police was a futile attempt to kill himself.

The most horrifying find would come hours later because the truck was too toxic to search — the deteriorating body of the boy's twin sister, wrapped in plastic bags, wedged between chemical containers in the enclosed pickup bed.

The boy was in critical condition Wednesday, his burns getting worse and doctors unsure of what chemical was used. His father, Jorge Barahona, was also in the hospital. He faces aggravated child abuse charges, but more charges were expected.

### CALIFORNIA

#### Borders files for bankruptcy reorganization

LOS ANGELES — Giant bookseller Borders Group Inc., battered by poor sales, continuing financial losses and heavy debt, filed for bankruptcy protection Wednesday and said it will close about 200 stores of its 642 stores and lay off about 6,000 of its 19,000 workers.

All the stores that will be closed are underperforming superstores, Borders said.

In a filing in U.S. Bankruptcy Court in New York, the company listed \$1.29 billion in debt and \$1.27 billion in assets. The company owes millions to book publishers, the largest amounts being \$41.1 million to Penguin Group, \$36.9 million to Hachette Book Group and \$33.8 million to Simon & Schuster.

Borders President Mike Edwards said in a statement that reduced customer spending, negotiations with vendors and a lack of liquidity has made it clear that the company currently “does not have the capital resources it needs to be a viable competitor and which are essential for it to move forward with its business strategy to reposition itself successfully for the long term.”

## Police attack Bahrain protest camp; 2 dead

MANAMA, Bahrain — Riot police firing tear gas and rubber bullets stormed a landmark square occupied by anti-government protesters Thursday, driving out demonstrators and destroying a makeshift encampment that had become the hub for demands to bring sweeping political changes to the kingdom.

The main opposition group Al Wefaq said at least two people were killed in the pre-dawn assault on Pearl Square, which was littered with flattened tents, trampled banners and broken glass. There was no official word on deaths or injuries.

After police regained control of the plaza, they chased protesters through sidestreets and put a ring of vehicles around the area with blue lights flashing in the darkened city just as the

dawn call for prayers sounded.

The blow by authorities marked a dramatic shift in tactics. It appeared Bahrain's leaders had sought to rein in security forces after clashes Monday that left at least two people dead and brought sharp criticism from Western allies, including the U.S. — which operates its main naval base in the Gulf from Bahrain.

Police held back Wednesday as tens of thousands of protesters crowded into the seaside square, dominated by a 300-foot monument to Bahrain's history as a pearl diving center.

After the crackdown early Thursday, protesters who were camped in the square described police swarming in through a cloud of eye-stinging tear gas.

“They attacked our tents, beating us with batons,” said Jafar Jafar, 17. “The police were lined up at the bridge overhead. They were shoot-

ing tear gas from the bridge.”

Hussein Abbas, 22, was woken by a missed call from his wife, presumably trying to warn him about reports that police were preparing to move in.

“Then all of a sudden the square was filled with tear gas clouds. Our women were screaming ... What kind of ruler does this to his people? There were women and children with us!”

The Egypt-inspired protests began Monday as a cry for the country's Sunni monarchy to loosen its grip, including hand-picking most top government posts, and open more opportunities for the country's majority Shiites, who have long complained of being blocked from decision-making roles or key posts in the military.

The uprising's demands have steadily grown bolder. Many protesters are calling for the government to provide more jobs and better housing, free all political

detainees and abolish a system that offers Bahraini citizenship to Sunnis from around the Middle East as a way to close the population gap with Shiites, who account for 70 percent of the population. Many of the newly minted nationals get jobs in security forces to further cement the number of presumed loyalists protecting the ruling system.

Increasingly, protesters are also chanting slogans to wipe away the entire ruling dynasty that has led Bahrain for more than 200 years and is firmly backed by the Sunni sheiks and monarchs across the Gulf.

Although Bahrain is sandwiched between two of OPEC's heavyweights, Saudi Arabia and Qatar, it has limited oil resources and depends heavily on its role as a regional financial hub and playground for Saudis, who can drive over a causeway to enjoy Bahrain's bars, hotels and beaches.

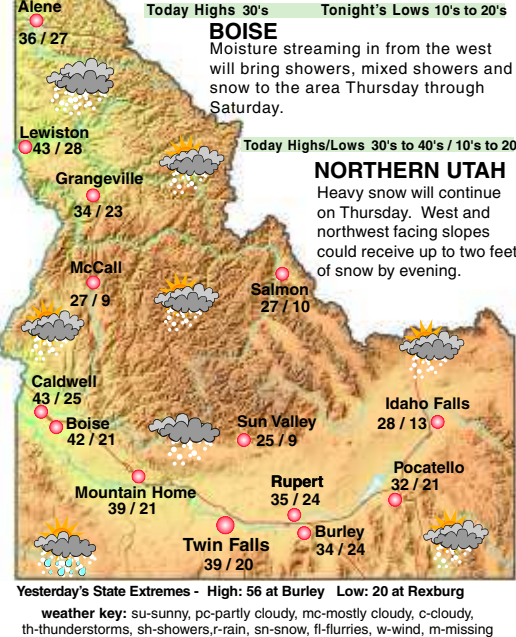

# Idaho House votes to nullify health reform law

BOISE — House Republicans voted Wednesday in favor of nullifying the federal health care overhaul, despite an Idaho attorney general's opinion and Democratic objections that the measure is unconstitutional.

The vote was 49-20 to send the measure to the state Senate. Democrats opposed the bill, joined by seven Republicans.

Republican Rep. Vito Barbieri of Dalton Gardens, the sponsor, told lawmakers that the health law is a tentacle of federal encroachment that Idaho must stand up to and oppose. Barbieri also cited wolves and the Environmental Protection Agency, which many Idaho Republicans also see as intrusive, as

examples of an overreach by Washington, D.C.

Idaho's bill declares the federal Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act unconstitutional and forbids enforcement of penalties against residents. It also prohibits Idaho state and local governments from enforcing the federal law and also bars them from taking federal money — or using their own resources — to put the measure into effect.

"The bottom line is, we're directing the state agencies to stop spending time and money," Barbieri said.

Idaho has already been granted at least \$1 million under the health care law, with \$730,000 going to the Department of Health and Welfare to help establish health insurance exchanges. Under the

Democrat-backed health reforms passed last year, states must establish insurance exchanges offering a choice of plans operating under common rules to boost competition.

"We will wait to get direction from the Legislature and/or governor if the nullification bill passes," said Health and Welfare spokesman Tom Shanahan on Wednesday. "We have not received any guidance on this to date."

At least 10 other states — Maine, Montana, North Dakota, Nebraska, New Hampshire, Oklahoma, Oregon, South Dakota, Texas and Wyoming — are considering nullification measures, according to the 10th Amendment Center, a Los Angeles-based states' rights group pushing such bills.

Separately, a U.S. District Court

judge in Florida has ruled the federal law is illegal in a lawsuit brought by 27 states, including Idaho. Other federal courts have ruled more favorably for health care reform. It's likely the law will be reviewed by the U.S. Supreme Court.

House Assistant Minority Leader Scott Bedke, R-Oakley, suggested that Idaho would follow whatever the justices ultimately decide, but until then needed to do everything in its power to keep agencies from forging ahead.

"It's easier to stop now than it is to unwind," Bedke said, adding he was piqued by foes who compared this push to the Southern secession that kicked off the Civil War. "To say this is Fort Sumter, or dissolution, or the beginning of the end, that's on some level offensive to me," Bedke said.

Democrats, including Minority Leader John Rusche, argued nullification violates lawmakers' sworn oath to uphold the U.S. and state constitutions.

And Reps. Eric Anderson of Priest Lake; Tom Trail., of Moscow; Max Black of Boise; Fred Wood of Burley; Leon Smith of Twin Falls; Jeff Nessel of Lewiston; and George Eskridge of Dover were the Republicans who opposed the bill.

Leading these GOP dissenters, Anderson said he was against the health insurance overhaul signed by President Barack Obama last year, but said basic civics tells him the future of the union depends on allowing the Supreme Court to weigh in, not letting individual states decide on their own when and if Washington, D.C., had gone too far.

## AROUND THE WEST

### MONTANA Defying feds, Montana won't wait to kill wolves

BILLINGS — Defying federal authority over gray wolves in his state, Montana Gov. Brian Schweitzer on Wednesday encouraged livestock owners to kill wolves that attack their animals — even in areas where that is not currently allowed — and said the state will start killing off packs that hurt elk herds.

Schweitzer told The Associated Press he no longer is willing to wait for federal officials to resolve the tangle of lawsuits over wolves, which has kept the animals on the endangered species list for a decade since recovery goals were first met.

"We will take action in Montana on our own," he said. "We've had it with Washington, D.C., with Congress just yipping about it, with (the Department of) Interior just vacillating about it. What we see in Washington, D.C., is motion masquerading as action."

State wildlife agents and ranchers killing wolves already occurs regularly across much of the Northern Rockies, where 1,700 of the predators roam parts of five states. Rules against killing wolves have been relaxed by federal officials over the past decade.

Livestock owners in southern Montana and Idaho have authority to defend their property by shooting wolves that attack their cattle, sheep or other domestic animals. And federal agents regularly kill wolves in response to such attacks, with more than 1,000 shot over the past decade.

But Schweitzer is moving to expand those killings beyond what the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service has so far allowed, including to parts of Montana where ranchers are not allowed to shoot the predators.

### IDAHO Lawmaker's push to honor Bergdahl hits snag

BOISE — A bill to govern how flags honoring U.S. prisoners of war and soldiers missing in action should be flown at public buildings hit a snag in the Idaho Senate after a state lawmaker objected to the order in which the flags would fly under the measure.

Sen. Michelle Stennett, D-Ketchum, is

championing the legislation to help remind residents an Army soldier from her central Idaho district remains in Taliban hands. Spc. Bowe Bergdahl was taken prisoner June 30, 2009 in Afghanistan.

Stennett's bill, which conforms to federal law, sets how the black POW-MIA flag should be flown and says that with one mast, it would fly below the U.S. flag but above Idaho's flag. This order didn't sit well with Sen. Mitch Tornyanski, R-Boise, who spoke against the legislation Wednesday. Tornyanski says it's not appropriate to fly the POW-MIA flag above the Idaho flag.

### Simpson disappointed in plan to cut INL funds

IDAHO FALLS — U.S. Rep. Mike Simpson is disappointed by part of a GOP proposal to fund the federal government that cuts more than \$100 million from the Idaho National Laboratory's main source of research money.

The laboratory last year received \$466 million of its \$1 billion budget from the U.S. Department of Energy's Office of Nuclear Energy, the Post Register reported. The Republican proposal put forward last week would cut the office's overall budget from \$774 million to \$655 million.

"Addressing the size and scope of our federal deficit will mean cuts in virtually every federal program, including the programs I strongly support," said Simpson, historically a staunch INL backer. "It is important to remember that as a percentage of its budget, the reductions in nuclear research are smaller than in other areas of the DOE budget."

### NEVADA House votes BLM budget cut after horse roundups

RENO — The U.S. House has approved an amendment on a voice vote that would cut \$2 million from the Bureau of Land Management's budget in protest over the agency's wild horse roundups.

Indiana Republican Dan Burton says his amendment is intended to send a signal to agency officials that most Americans want the mustangs treated more humanely on public lands across the West.

## Anti-union bills pass despite labor opposition

BOISE — Legislation aimed at weakening the leverage of labor organizations in Idaho passed another hurdle Wednesday despite opposition from union workers who flooded the Capitol this week to testify against the two bills.

"We're not bad people, we're just working-class people," said pipefitter J.D. Day. "This is legislation that's going to hurt a lot of union families."

The first bill seeks to prohibit so-called "project labor agreements" that require contractors to forge pacts with unionized workers as a condition of winning a government construction job. Dean Haagenson, owner of Contractors Northwest Inc., said such agreements exclude nonunion shops like his from projects.

But labor groups say the proposed changes are unnecessary and adding the prohibitions would be an invitation for lawsuits.

Under the second bill, unions would be prohibited from using dues to subsidize member wages to help union-shop contractors win projects. These subsidies, known as job targeting programs, can reduce a union contractor's overall costs and allow it to submit a more competitive bid.  
Supporters of outlawing the practice say it artificially manipulates the market and they want to level the playing field.

Lawmakers on the House State Affairs Committee voted to send both bills to the full House with a recommendation they pass.





# Eagle tree

## Tree near Wendell becomes incredible sight for eagle watchers

WENDELL — Every winter day at sunset, bald eagles come to roost in a large cottonwood tree just outside a small cafe and store along West Point Road.

Passers-by stop to watch the birds. Others, who've been by here before, bring their cameras. Those who see the eagle-filled tree for the first time are surprised by how many they find.

"We thought maybe they were crows. Then I got up there and saw one," said Wally Bernard of Twin Falls. He and his wife, Wanda, were passing through recently on their way home from Wendell when they noticed the tree.

"We'd never seen anything like that before," he said, noting they counted 53 birds.

Jeannine Arredondo, owner of West Point Service, said she's counted more than 100 birds during the coldest part of the season.

The birds have been coming to the tree for years, but more so during the past four years, Arredondo said. They start gathering in early December and stay around until about mid-March. Though there are other trees in the area, they seem to like best the largest of the bunch that sits northwest of the store.

There are a number of possibilities why the eagles come back to the same tree, said Grainger Hunt, senior scientist at The Peregrine Fund in Boise.

"It's probably a good area for foraging or loafing," he said. "They might just be there in an elevated area watching the countryside for food."

Hunt said eagles like to put on weight this time of year. They breed earlier than other birds, which might be another reason why they come back to the same tree: there could be tradition involved, Hunt said.

The eagles might have



come from as far away as Canada, he said; some might be local.

Arredondo said she thinks golden eagles also perch in the tree, but Hunt said that's unlikely because golden eagles are usually solitary birds. Young bald eagles, he said, look like golden eagles.

"I think they just like us," Arredondo said about why the birds come back every year. "They like to pose for us."

She said she's seen the road

lined with tripods as people try to capture images.

The eagles have never caused any problems and actually have helped business, said Arredondo's son, Tim Quinlan. People who stop to see the birds often come inside the store for a quick purchase.

Problems arise only if people try to cross the fence for a closer look. That's a no-no, he said. The tree is on private property.

You probably won't find

many birds in the tree during midday. But one by one, they start filling the tree in late afternoon. They leave the tree again at sunrise.

With spring approaching, Arredondo isn't looking forward to the eagles leaving.

"It's something that's so soothing to watch," she said. "I wish they'd stay all summer."

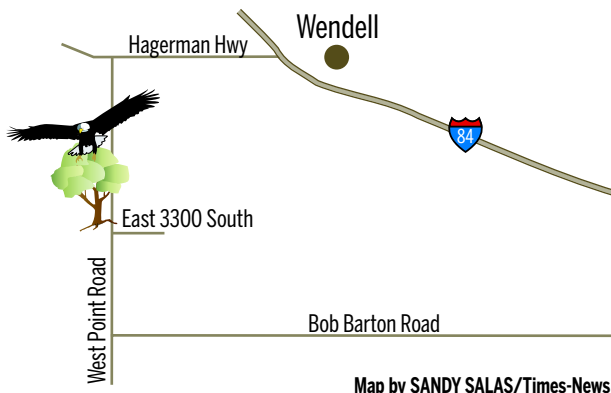

# Hike around Dierkes Lake is a close, refreshing getaway

KIMBERLY — A ball of fire, high in the heavens, stood against the backdrop of blue sky. And in a little corner in eastern Twin Falls County, the Earth felt its warmth.



Dierkes Lake groaned.

Groaned, and made other sounds that trying to describe in a word leaves one dumb.

I thought of bed springs.

"It sounds like an old mattress I used to have," I deadpanned to Josh Palmer.

He laughed.

The ice that coated Dierkes Lake ever since Jack Frost came to town late last year was releasing its grip. The lake was thawing.

to cast their lines for rainbow trout. But during the interim when the ice begins to melt — when the shore is still frozen but not hard enough to step upon — people leave their fishing poles at home and come to the lake for other activities. One of them is hiking.

Palmer and I visited the lake Feb. 3, hoping to interview ice fishermen. But since the ice was unsafe that

day, anglers wisely decided to stay home, and we decided to trek around the lake. It was a first for both of us.

We started on the dirt road south of the lake, which headed to the east end where the trail narrows and rock walls begin. From here we caught a full view of the lake, and continued to hear its noisy protests against the sun. A split ran down the middle of the ice, attesting to

the havoc the sun was causing to it.

...

In the midst of the ancient rock walls are modern, wooden stairs that take hikers to the top of the canyon where the trail continues along the cliff.

We climbed the stairs. The city installed them in the early 1990s, Dennis Bowyer,

director Twin Falls Parks and Recreation Department, said in a later phone interview.

A wooden fence separates the trail from houses that dot the rocky fields beyond. We followed the trail, mindful of not coming too close to the edge, until we encountered another set of stairs that led us down to an expansive field on top of the canyon between Dierkes Lake and

the Snake River.

We looked out over the deep canyon and the green water below, admiring the rustic beauty.

We walked on, following the dirt path that kept us in the shade of rock walls that now were to our left as we headed west on the trail that eventually would, in a loop, take us back to Dierkes.

# Bill aims to make cougar hunting with dogs a permanent program

OLYMPIA, Wash. — Fifteen years after Washington voters banned using dogs to hunt cougars, lawmakers want to set permanent hunting seasons allowing licensed hunters to use hounds to track the cats.

The proposed bill, sponsored by Rep. Brian Blake, D-Aberdeen, is the latest step in a seven-year process of chipping away at the 1996 ban through a pilot program aimed at testing cougar hunting seasons with dogs.

The original three-year program has been extended twice so far.

Representatives from the Fish and Wildlife Commission say the pilot program has resulted in a 75 percent decline in confirmed complaints about

cougars killing pets or livestock, or causing other problems.

Still, opponents of the bill say the use of hounds is cruel and inhumane, and is not being limited to public safety concerns.

“Essentially, we’re concerned that this is going to allow sport hunters to use this as an excuse” for using dogs, said Jennifer Hillman, western regional director of the Humane Society of the United States.

The Fish and Wildlife Commission established the pilot program in 2004 and extended it through 2011 to protect public safety and manage cougar populations in six affected counties.

The bill would essentially make it permanent by letting the commission determine cougar hunting seasons, set quotas on cougar

kills and decide who is permitted to hunt cougars, be it licensed hunters, state agents or contracted hunters.

Statewide Initiative 655 passed in 1996, prohibiting the use of dogs in cougar hunting but allowing exemptions for public safety and livestock depredation incidents.

Donny Martorello, a section manager for the agency, said hunters are most likely to take young female cougars due to population demographics. Such uneven pressure on females is risky for population management, he said.

Dogs tree cougars and give hunters time to identify the sex and age of the cats. Because Fish and Wildlife sets seasonal quotas on how many female and male cougars can be killed, the use

of hounds helps balance the harvests, Martorello said.

Chelan, Okanogan, Ferry, Stevens, and Pend Oreille counties were included in the original pilot program. In the extension, Klickitat County requested to opt-in as well. Blake’s current bill would allow for similar opt-in requests when cougar populations exceed a community’s tolerance.

Blake said his main objective is to restore population management tools to wildlife professionals. Using dogs will also help teach cougars to stay away from urban areas.

“I think I would rather save lives ahead of time and use this program to manage the population and teach cougars that humans and dogs are something they don’t want to be around,” he said.

Mud was intermittently dispersed along the trail, and around us thick bushes of sage. In some places when the trail became more difficult to discern, more markings of modern man helped us find our way: painted arrows — some pink, others yellow — pointed the way we should go to get back to the lake and the parking lot.

Nobody else was at the lake when we first arrived, but now we started to see people on the trail.

The trail is about 1.6 miles, Bowyer said, and is used by people from all over the valley.

One person we met was Dave Wright. It wasn’t the first time the Jerome resident used his lunch break to hike parts of the trail.

“I like to get out and get some fresh air,” he said.

Dierkes is a relatively close site that helps cure cabin fever, he said, noting that sometimes when he has more time he’ll bring his bicycle.

“This is a nice place to hike,” Wright said.

# Ruger’s fabulous mighty mini

Without a doubt, the AR-15 platform is one of the most popular semi-automatic weapons systems in the world today. This brings smiles to the faces of its civilian and law enforcement proponents, but summons forth scowls and howls of protest from its anti-gun antagonists.

Interestingly, many of the features that make the AR so practical at the range and in the field — muzzle breaks, pistol grips, adjustable butt stocks, ability to receive high-capacity magazines — will likely make it a target under President Obama’s promised assault weapons and high capacity magazine ban.

If you are in the market for an AR or any high-cap magazines for your firearms, you probably shouldn’t procrastinate your purchases too long.

On the other hand, if your heart is set on buying an accurate military-styled semi auto and you wouldn’t be insulted to pay only half the asking price of a new AR, you may want to take a hard look at Ruger’s family of Mini-14, 6.8, and Mini-30 rifles.

The original .223 Remington-chambered Mini 14 was introduced in 1974 and has been a steady seller for the company ever since. Train loads of the relatively inexpensive guns found a home in pickup trucks for plinking, dispatching diseased or injured livestock, blasting varmints and self defense. Law enforcement agencies on tight budgets snatched up the reliable little carbines for use as patrol rifles, bridging the gap between their short-range service weapons and their long-range sniper rifles.

Never one to rest on his laurels, Bill Ruger introduced in 1982 an improved version of the Mini-14, known as the Ranch Rifle. Upgrades included a folding aperture rear sight and receiver mounting slots for the company’s proprietary scope rings. The massive

extractor was modified to toss empty brass below a mounted scope.

My favorite, the Mini-30, first hit dealers’ shelves in 1987. Answering the call for a medium-range round of greater diameter for enhanced stopping power, the Mini-30 was reamed for the most infamous battle round of our day, the 7.62x39 Russian. For the first time, Ranch Rifle fanciers had a carbine entirely capable of taking deer and antelope at short/medium ranges, and in the opinion of many — a superior man-stopper. Ruger upped the ante in 2002 with the introduction of the potent 6.8mmSPC round Ranch Rifle.

Recent upgrades include heavier, stiffer barrels for improved accuracy; refined peep and front sights; a choice of stock and metalwork finishes on the Ranch Rifle; a specialty Target version, and a new Tactical platform. Like the company’s 10/22 rimfire, the number of aftermarket accessories fashioned for the Mini line are legend.

# Be wise when horn hunting

“Are there rules about picking up shed antlers?” Idaho code allows anyone to pick up and keep naturally shed antlers from wild big game animals. Those antlers can also be lawfully bought and sold. Rules about picking up and possessing the heads or horns of big horn sheep that have died of natural causes are much more restrictive.

The males of all deer, elk and moose grow and shed their antlers each year. A growing hobby is the hunting for shed antlers in late winter and early spring.

Historically, many people have enjoyed a gorgeous spring day afield looking for sheds to be used in flower beds and gardens. Hunting for sheds now has become very competitive and, for some, a lucrative business, leading unscrupulous hunters to chase animals on motorized vehicles to try to get their antlers to drop off.

A significant issue that comes about from hunting “sheds” is the use of motorized vehicles and the amount of disturbance to wintering wildlife during the pursuit of shed antlers.

Wintering wildlife are vulnerable to disturbance. Chasing type disturbance for antler collecting or trying to get close for a

photo has its greatest impact in spring when animals are utilizing their last fat reserves for survival. Energy expended to escape a motorized vehicle or dogs running at large during this time of year is an unnecessary drain on the energy fuel tank and can be fatal.

An additional issue also related to the use of motorized vehicles for hunting sheds is the heavy rutting of roads and trails as well as the destruction of cross-country travel during extreme wet spring conditions.

Many landowners prohibit motorized vehicle use on their private property during this time. State and federal land use rules vary so I recommend sportsmen contact their local Bureau of Land Management, U.S. Forest Service or Idaho Department of Lands offices for the motorized vehicle use rules in the area where you’ll be hunting sheds.

# Man is zealous about his crow hunting

HUTCHINSON, Kan. — Bob Aronsohn may be the only Kansas resident you'll ever meet who moved to the state because of crows.

That's right, crows. Aronsohn, you see, is an avid crow hunter. And when he was living in Long Island, N.Y., he read all about the giant crow roosts Kansas had and how they were virtually untouched by hunters. So he just had to travel here and see for himself.

"Back in the late 1960s, we called Fish and Game, and they told us about this giant roost at Medora (Kan.)," said Aronsohn, 62. "They estimated there were 2 million crows at that one roost."

"The landowners didn't want them around because they were causing all kinds of damage to their crops. So when we came out here, everyone we talked to gave us permission to hunt."

"Our first time out, we shot 126 crows, and we thought we were in heaven. Before that, if we shot 20 to 30 birds, we thought we were doing great."

Those first hunting trips were all it took to get Aronsohn to move to Kansas in 1974.

Some might think that's a bit unusual, considering that crows aren't exactly the glamour species of American hunting.

Pheasants and quail, perhaps. Deer or turkeys, maybe. But crows?

Aronsohn admits that he is definitely in the minority

when it comes to his passion for hunting the large black birds. But he sees many advantages in hunt-

ing crows.

"I like to shoot," he said. "I don't want to stop when I get to six (a reference to the

Kansas limit on ducks).

"There's no limit on crows. The only limit is the number of shells you bring."

And Aronsohn brings a lot. It's not uncommon for him and a partner to shoot dozens of crows in a day. Landowners are happy; they've gotten rid of birds they consider pests. And Aronsohn is happy, too. He has taken part in his idea of a dream hunt.

"There isn't another bird that I would rather hunt than the crow," he said. "I got started when I was a kid, and I've never given it up."

"Just to see hundreds of birds coming in on you and getting a chance to do all of that shooting, that's what's always kept me going."

How serious is Aronsohn about crow hunting? Visit his home in Hutchinson and you'll see.

He has a miniature museum in his basement, complete with old calls, decoys, pictures and signs. One of those signs from the 1930s read, "Warning. Explosives. This crow roost to be bombed by Game and Fish Dept," referring to efforts to eradicate huge concentrations of crows.

Looking for more proof of Aronsohn's passion over crow hunting? Consider this story from 1985.

"My dad got this invitation to attend a dinner in Washington, D.C. and meet President Reagan," he said. "He was allowed to bring a couple of guests, and he asked me."

"But I told him I couldn't go. It was in October and the crows were flying."

"A man has to set his priorities."

Fall has always been a

magical time for Aronsohn. While others head to the duck blind or tree stand, Aronsohn heads to agricultural areas in search of crows.

The birds migrate to the region in mid-October, he said. By the end of the month, "there are zillions of them," he said.

He has a routine to his hunting. He usually tries to scout, looking for areas the crows are using. Once he has permission to hunt land the birds are using, he will set up a blind somewhere between where the crows are feeding and their watering holes.

He tosses crow decoys in the nearby trees, then uses either a mouth call or an electronic caller to bring the birds in. When they arrive, the action can be fast and furious.

Some people will eat the crows. Not Aronsohn. But he says the birds don't go to waste. The way he looks at it, he is setting up a buffet line for other wildlife.

"Raccoons, possums, coyotes, foxes, they'll all feed on the dead birds," he said. "I can shoot crows and come back a week later and not see a trace of them, except for a few feathers."

After years of hunting crows, Aronsohn has attracted a following. He has several videos and DVDs on the market, and he is always getting calls from hunters, asking for advice or checking to see if they can visit his museum.

"There aren't that many of us who hunt crows," he said. "But other hunters don't know what they're missing."

# As sledding injuries rise, experts urge children to wear helmets

DETROIT — Nine-year-old Bailey Knight wasn't wearing a helmet as she zoomed down a snow hill on a plastic sled.

Bailey was at a church camp north of Delton in west Michigan, sledding a hill that has been popular for winter-time fun for about 25 years. On her second trip down on Jan. 22, Bailey lost control and went up and over a banked curve. She crashed head-first into a light pole, fracturing her cheekbone in three places.

"Her nose was completely crushed and was pushing back against her brain," said her mother, Kim Knight, 36, of Otsego, Mich. "She also had little tears in the lining of her brain."

She was taken to C.S. Mott Children's Hospital in Ann Arbor, Mich., where she underwent 18 hours of facial reconstruction surgery.

Bailey is one of 11 children who have been admitted to Mott over the past two months after suffering serious injuries from sledding — two times more than in a normal year — according to Mott's Injury Prevention Program Manager Amy Teddy.

The rise has prompted officials at the hospital to urge people to use helmets while sledding.

"Serious sledding injuries are popping up all over the state," Teddy said. "We have been lucky at Mott. We haven't had any deaths, but we don't want to wait. We want to make the public aware now."

Mark S. Molitor, a Mott pediatric trauma surgeon, has handled several of the injured children cases, which have ranged from mild

concussions to Bailey's facial surgery. He said some of the head injuries could have been prevented or lessened by using a helmet. "If you are doing an activity where you can bonk your head," Molitor said, "you should wear a helmet."

Knight says she's hopeful her daughter's story may help others avoid similar injuries.

"It never dawned on me that Bailey should maybe wear some type of head gear for this," Knight said. "This hill was designed for sledding. I never thought about it. If we can help somebody else by telling Bailey's story, to bring awareness, we will do it."

Since 2007, 32 pediatric patients have been admitted to Mott for serious injuries

sustained while sledding. More than a third of those injuries have occurred this winter. That statistic also doesn't count the kids taken to the emergency room and who are treated and released.

"I don't think anything has strongly influenced these numbers other than the conditions have been favorable for people to be out sledding," Teddy said.

Teddy urged children to wear bike helmets. "They don't make sledding helmets," Teddy said. "I don't think it's necessary to go out and get ski helmets. Just use your standard bike helmet or multi-sport helmet that your kids will wear when they are riding a bike."

After her surgery, Bailey was on a ventilator for two days. "Somehow, the Lord

was with us and heard our prayers because she seems to be healing really good now," Knight said.

Bailey is home now but will be out of school for about eight weeks.

"Her incision goes from one ear to the other ear over the top of her head like a head band," Knight said.

She has some lingering problems. Her sense of smell was damaged and may not come back. "To lose your smell was minor in comparison to what could have happened," Knight said.

Bailey celebrated her 10th birthday on Jan. 30. She posed for a picture holding a cake with plastic tubes up her nose.

"She's been a real trouper," Knight said. "She has hardly cried at all."

# Bison hunt license applications due Feb. 28

JACKSON, Wyo. (AP) — The Wyoming Game and Fish Department reminds those seeking to hunt bison in Wyoming this fall that the application period ends on Feb. 28.

The Jackson region is the only region offering a hunt at this time and licenses cost

\$402 for residents and \$2,502 for nonresidents. The process for acquiring a license is largely the same as other big game species in Wyoming, but there are some differences.

Like most hunts with a limited number of licenses available, a computerized

random draw is conducted to determine which applicants will get to hunt. However, rather than receiving a license directly in the mail, success-

ful applicants are mailed a letter notifying them that they can purchase a license at the Jackson Regional Office if they choose.

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**Question:** My attorney told me I qualified for Chapter 7 bankruptcy, but she recommended that I file a Chapter 13 case instead. Under chapter 13, I would have to make monthly payments to the bankruptcy trustee, so why would I want to do that?

**Answer:** Chapter 13 cases offer more flexibility. For example, if you are behind on your mortgage payments, your mortgage company could start foreclosure in a Chapter 7. In a Chapter 13, you would be able to make up the back payments over time, and if you have a 2nd mortgage, you may be able to completely remove it in a Chapter 13. If you owe more on your car than it's worth, you may be able to reduce the interest and loan balance to match actual value in a Chapter 13. In a Chapter 7, your only choices are to keep paying for the car, or to surrender it. If you are divorced, you may be able to get rid of payments to your ex that were assigned to you as part of a Property Settlement if you file a Chapter 13. If you owe back taxes, you can pay them off over time in a Chapter 13. In a Chapter 7, the IRS may still be able to levy and garnish. Also, many people feel better about themselves by making partial repayment of their debts through a Chapter 13 plan. An experienced bankruptcy attorney can quickly determine whether a Chapter 13 case can benefit you in any of these ways.

# Getting warm isn’t easy without adequate circulation

**DEAR DR. GOTT:** My hands and feet are cold winter and summer. My doctor has tested my thyroid a couple of times, but nothing comes of it. I’m 86 years old, had a mild stroke and, before that, a heart attack. My pills are warfarin, simvastatin, atenolol and furosemide. Can you help me get warm?

**DEAR READER:** Hands and feet become cold to the touch when they fail to receive an adequate supply of oxygenated blood. When a person is exposed to lower temperatures, the small arteries of the arms and legs narrow as a means of shunting heat to the remainder of the body where it is most needed. While the most common reason for this to occur is outdoor exposure or from sitting in a cool room, there

may also be an underlying health problem, such as a thyroid condition, Raynaud’s, arterial disease, circulatory inadequacies and more.

Raynaud’s is spasm of the small arteries of the hands and feet, which can result from exposure to cold or emotional upset. Relief might be found through discontinuing smoking or by taking prescription vasodilators (medications that expand blood vessels). Arterial disease, atherosclerosis, coronary artery disease and a host of other medical conditions and circulatory problems in which

blood flow is reduced to the limbs because of narrowed arteries may cause the condition. Treatment involves discontinuing tobacco, maintaining a healthful diet, reducing cholesterol levels, prescription medications such as those you are on and moderate exercise.

My thought is that your medication (likely the atenolol) regimen is triggering your cold hands and feet. Speak with your physician regarding all your medical conditions and prescription drugs. Perhaps a minor modification in dosage or switching to other brands will provide relief.

Then, while sitting, flex your fingers from an outward position into a fist several times a day. Rotate your feet and ankles in a circle several times to the right, then to the left. Stretch your

toes forward, and relax them. Play solitaire, knit, or find other means to improve circulation. If someone in your home smokes, restrict him or her to the back porch or out-of-doors so you don’t have to inhale it. Review your diet, and eat well to provide proper nutrients to your system. Wear warm slippers.

If a thyroid condition has been ruled out, ask whether other testing might reveal other causes of your poor circulation. If questions remain, see your cardiologist.

**DEAR DR. GOTT:** A year ago, I was diagnosed with a geographic tongue. I’ve been seen and treated by three naturopathic doctors, have had two different mouth-washes and use lozenges with no results. No one seems to know a cause or treatment. Do you have any knowledge or suggestions?

**DEAR READER:** Benign migratory glossitis (geographic tongue) is a condition in which red, irregular patches appear on the tongue’s surface, giving it a roadmap-like appearance. It is benign, doesn’t cause health problems, and isn’t cancerous; nor does it carry

infection. The patches may heal and move to another location of the tongue. There may be an associated burning sensation and minor pain.

Treatment can include antihistamine or anesthetic mouth rinses, OTC pain relievers or corticosteroids.

Avoid offending substances such as tobacco products, spicy and salty foods, alcohol and tooth-paste products that contain whitening and tartar-control additives.

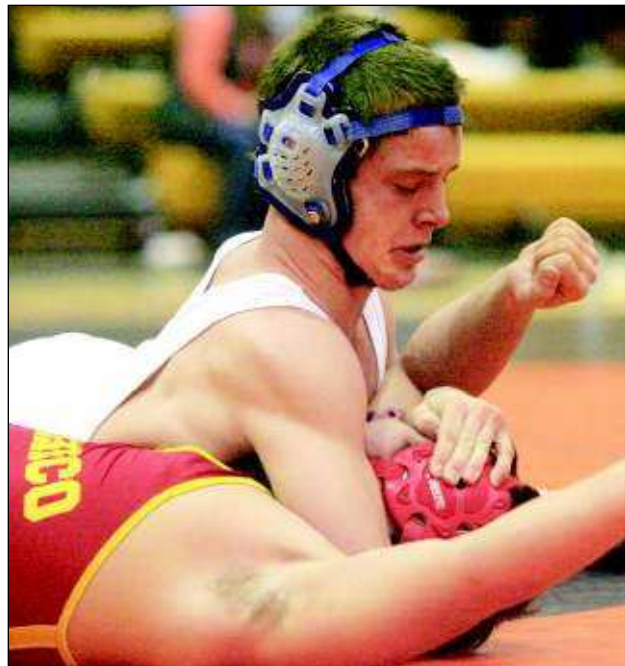
JEROME — When Justin Gardner took over the Minico wrestling program this season, he knew the expectations were high.

## Armstrong officially off bike — 'Retirement 2.0'

Lance Armstrong is calling this one "Retirement 2.0."

Almost a month after finishing 65th in his last competitive race in Australia, and nearly six years removed from the last of an unprecedented seven straight Tour de France titles, the 39-year-old cyclist made clear there is no reset button this time.

This time, he's leaving professional racing behind for good.

"Never say never," Armstrong laughed at the start of an exclusive interview Tuesday with The Associated Press, then quickly added, "Just kidding."

His retirement ends a comeback effort that failed to produce an eighth title or diminish talk that performance-enhancing drugs helped his career. The timing has as much to do with his growing responsibilities and family as it does with the physical limitations time has imposed. He's tired, and tired of being hounded. Armstrong will miss competing — let alone

dominating a sport like none before him — but not the 24/7/365 training regimen that made it possible.

"I can't say I have any regrets. It's been an excellent ride. I really thought I was going to win another tour," Armstrong said about his comeback attempt in 2009, four years after his first retirement. "Then I lined up like everybody else and wound up third."

"I have no regrets about last year, either," he added, despite finishing 23rd. "The crashes, the problems with the bike — those were things that were beyond my control."

Armstrong spoke to the AP in a telephone interview and in a videotaped interview from his office in Austin, Texas.

Armstrong zoomed out of relative obscurity after a life-threatening bout with testicular cancer to win his first tour in 1999, then set about recalibrating both the popularity of his sport and how much influence athletes can wield as advocates for a cause — in his case, on behalf of cancer survivors and researchers worldwide.

Earnhardt didn't think it

"It comes down to next week, winning a state title," Ramirez said. "That's what I've wanted all year long and that's what I'm going to get."

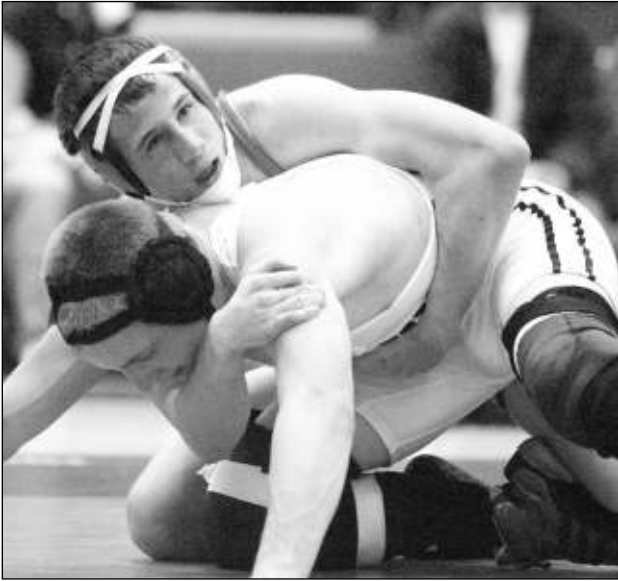
The state wrestling tournament is Feb. 24-26 at the Idaho Center in Nampa. The top three district finishers in each weight class qualified.

# Tour of Utah to start in Park City

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — The 2011 Tour of Utah will start in Park City for the first time after being elevated this year to one of the top three professional stage races for road cycling in North America.

Event organizers unveiled six host venues on Wednesday and also indicated four of the top international teams have been extended invitations to compete Aug. 9-14.

Those include Team RadioShack, home for defending Tour of Utah champion Levi Leipheimer; HTC-Highroad, the No. 1 team in the world; Team Garmin-Cervelo, home of world champion Thor Hushovd; and BMC Racing Team, new team for 2010 Tour of Utah prologue winner Taylor Phinney.

Phinney was unable to attend Wednesday's press conference held at the state capitol because he was competing in the Tour of Oman. But his renowned cycling father spoke about the opportunity to see some of the best riders in the world.

"I was 15 when I saw my first bike race (in Colorado)," said Davis Phinney, who went on to become the first American to win a stage in the Tour de France and a bronze medal in the 1984 Olympics. "I was a little kid in search of a hero, in search of a dream. Watching those guys fly by, I was hooked."

He said having the Utah race in the same month as Lance Armstrong's Tour Challenge in Colorado makes it enticing for the best teams in the world to race in both.

"You may not have some of the best sprinters in the world because this is a hard race," Davis Phinney said of the 400-mile race that includes 30,000 feet of climbing. "But you will see some of the best riders period, potential (challengers) in the Tour de France."

The opening prologue starts in Park City. The first two stages, Aug. 10-11, are in Ogden and Provo.

Stage 3 is an individual time trial set for Aug. 12 at Miller Motorsports Park in Tooele.

Stage 4 is a circuit race in Salt Lake City on Aug. 13 and the final stage is a road race Aug. 14 from Park City to Snowbird Ski Resort.

Teams will compete for \$116,000 in prize money — up from \$45,000 in previous years.

"This year you'll see the best riders in the world descend upon Utah," said Steve Johnson, CEO for USA Cycling. "But many of these riders are American."

The Tour of Utah began as a three-day event in 2004. The Utah Cycling Partnership, owned by family members from the Larry H. Miller Group of Companies, purchased the event in 2007 and relaunched it in 2008 as a five-day race.

Since then it has become known as America's Toughest Stage Race, and is sanctioned both by USA Cycling and the Union Cycliste Internationale. It has been elevated to a 2.1-rated event on the UCI American Tour.

Of the 30 sanctioned races on the UCA American Tour in 2011, the Tour of Utah joins the Pro Challenge in Colorado and the Tour of California as the only top-rated stage races in North America.

A maximum of 15 professional teams, with eight riders per team, will be invited to this year's Tour of Utah.

"It was a great race in Utah last year," said Leipheimer, who finished 13th overall in last year's Tour de France. "The 2011 Tour of Utah is a must-see race for U.S. fans, where you'll find the best cycling athletes in the world competing across one of the most scenic regions in the world."

## Pujols deadline passes with no deal

JUPITER, Fla. — The St. Louis Cardinals made Albert Pujols what they said was their best offer.

It wasn't enough.

So get ready, baseball: Pujols seems headed for the open market next fall.

The deadline Pujols set for the Cardinals to reach a new contract agreement passed Wednesday with no deal, making it likely the three-time MVP will become a free agent after the World Series. The Cardinals said they will respect Pujols' wishes and not request more talks during the season, unless their first baseman surprisingly changes his mind.

"A difference of opinion in determining Albert's value simply could not be resolved," said Pujols' agent, Dan Lozano.

The Cardinals would not reveal their offer, though it was believed to be somewhere around \$200 million for eight years, possibly with an opportunity for Pujols to obtain an ownership stake in the franchise once his playing days are complete.

When — and if — talks resume, it's unclear if St. Louis will increase its offer to Pujols' liking.

"We explored a number of different things in the negotiation," Cardinals chairman William DeWitt Jr. said at a news conference. "Without

getting specific in what those were, there was discussion about other things that could be part of the contract. ... You can be sure that we explored a number of different avenues."

Pujols will make \$16 million this season in his contract's final year, with \$4 million of the money deferred with no interest. A nine-time All-Star, Pujols is the only player in major league history to hit 30 or more home runs each of his first 10 seasons — all with the Cardinals, the franchise he's previously said he wants to remain with for the rest of his career.

**BREWERS, WEEKS AGREE AT \$38.5 MILLION**

MILWAUKEE — After a

record-breaking season, the Milwaukee Brewers took the risk that Rickie Weeks' injury-plagued career is firmly in the past.

Weeks agreed to a \$38.5 million, four-year contract with the Milwaukee Brewers on Wednesday that contains a 2015 option which could increase the total value to \$50 million.

"We are thrilled that Rickie has chosen to remain a Brewer," general manager Doug Melvin said. "He has become one of the best lead-off hitters in the game today; possessing speed, plate discipline and power. His aggressive style sets the tone for our offense."

Weeks, the No. 2 overall draft pick in the 2003 ama-

teur draft, was a day from an arbitration hearing after saying last month he would end long-term contract talks with the team when he reported to spring training.

### JUDGE ALLOWS BONDS CONVERSATION RECORDING IN TRIAL

SAN FRANCISCO — A federal judge in the perjury case against Barry Bonds on Tuesday decided to allow an audio recording in which, prosecutors say, the baseball star's personal trainer discussed his steroids use.

Bonds' lawyers had asked the judge to exclude the recording from his upcoming trial on charges that he lied to a grand jury when he said he never knowingly took performance-enhancing drugs. They argued that since the personal trainer, Greg Anderson, is refusing to testify, there's no way to authenticate the topic of discussion.

But prosecutors plan on calling to the witness stand Stevie Hoskins, Bonds' childhood friend and former business partner. Hoskins says he secretly recorded the conversation in March 2003 to convince Bonds' father that his son was taking steroids.

The trial is scheduled to start March 21.

was doing is the best thing to do. So he thought we were kind of lazy.

"Tons of moments like that ... where we would be lazy, do something goofy, and Dad would just get so mad for us not taking things more seriously."

Those are the memories of Dale Earnhardt's son has chosen to share in the days leading up to Friday, the 10th anniversary of his father's death on the last lap of the Daytona 500. He's chosen to keep to himself the personal thoughts, feelings and heartache that accompany that violent afternoon, and the decade of difficulties it created for NASCAR's most popular driver.

Try as he might, he can't replicate the success of his father. He's stuck in the shadow. He goes by "Dale," and that's what his circle calls him, but he's just "Junior" to most people.

He can't please a rabid fan base, much of it inherited, that demands a championship.

Worst of all, he can't shake the pressure that comes from being the namesake of an icon who was polarizing in life but has become mythical in death.

It clearly weighed on him in his preseason appearances, each one a peppering of questions about his father. With a blank stare and monotone answers, he patiently sat through every session, trying to be respectful but making it so very clear he can't wait for the anniversary to pass. He seemed tired — almost absent — but insisted he's "happy inside."

But he also acknowledged that appearances no longer paint a picture of the care-free, beer-drinking rock star who was such a stark contrast to his blue-collar father.

"I'll see these videos of me from five years ago, definitely a more jubilant, cheerier guy," said Earnhardt, who

mangled his pole-winning car in practice Wednesday, colliding with Jimmie Johnson and sliding into the wall in a crash that moves him to the back of Sunday's field. "I think I've become more reserved, maybe due to how I've seen me be judged or analyzed. I've sort of changed my outward approach a little bit toward everybody.

"But I'm telling you, if I can get back to the racetrack and I can win a race and run well, it'll get a whole lot easier."

And that's the true burden — the losing, the failure — that he's faced the last five years.

He has won just three races since 2005, and none the last two years. He's been to Victory Lane only once since his ballyhooed 2008 move to Hendrick Motorsports, a marriage that paired the most marketable driver in NASCAR with the winningest team.

Only Earnhardt has yet to challenge for a title, has missed the 12-driver Chase for the Championship the last two years, and takes a 93-race losing streak into Sunday's Daytona 500.

Before an accident in Wednesday's practice wrecked his pole-winning car, he was slated to start first, which raised hope that the prodigal son could end his miserable slump in the biggest race of the NASCAR season. Eyebrows were immediately raised at how the stars seemed to be lining up, with ESPN executives on the defensive after commentator Tony Kornheiser intimated on his "Pardon the Interruption" show that the fix is in by NASCAR to get Earnhardt to Victory Lane on the anniversary of his father's death.

"I can tell you for sure that ESPN doesn't agree with what he said," said Rich Feinberg, the network's vice president of motorsports.

International Cycling Union President Pat McQuaid had high praise for Armstrong.

"His contribution to cycling has been enormous, from both the sporting point of view and his personality. All sports need global icons and he has become a global icon for cycling," said McQuaid, speaking to The Associated Press by telephone from the Tour of Oman. "The sport of cycling has a lot to be thankful for because of Lance Armstrong."

Along the way, Armstrong also became one of the most controversial figures in the evolving battle against doping in sports. He claims to be the most-tested athlete on the planet during his career. Armstrong came back clean every time, and vehemently denies ever using performance-enhancing drugs.

Even so, he remains shadowed by a federal investigation into the sport launched last year following accusations by former teammate and disgraced 2006 tour champion Floyd Landis that Armstrong used drugs and taught other riders how to beat testing. Though the probe is continuing, lawyers

familiar with the case told the AP recently that any possible indictments are a long way off.

"I can't control what goes on in regards to the investigation. That's why I hire people to help me with that. I try not to let it bother me and just keep rolling right along. I know what I know," Armstrong said. "I know what I do and I know what I did. That's not going to change."

What won't change, either, is his tenacious campaigning to raise funds and awareness in the fight against a disease his doctors once believed would keep Armstrong from competing at anything more strenuous than gin rummy.

That was 1996. A year later, he set up the Livestrong Foundation and raised \$10,000. In the intervening years, Armstrong used his story, his celebrity and hard work to sell millions of those ubiquitous plastic yellow wrist bracelets and enlist lawmakers in Texas and global policymakers on the scale of Bill Clinton in the cause.

By the end of last year, despite tough economic times, the foundation had raised nearly \$400 million total. But the real heavy lifting may just be beginning.

# NFL franchise tags: Who gets them

NEW YORK — While the league and union play a game of chicken over a new collective bargaining agreement, the 32 teams also are playing tag.

As in applying franchise tags to key players.

It's another contentious issue for both sides, with the owners saying they have the right to franchise players before the CBA runs out March 3, and the NFLPA claiming with no agreement for the 2011 season, how can anybody be franchised? While the merits are debated, an impressive group of stars, including Peyton Manning and Michael Vick, will have been tagged by Feb. 24.

By applying the exclusive franchise tag, a team must pay the player the average of the top five salaries at his position. Manning, naturally, would get such a big paycheck anyway — he's almost certainly headed for the most lucrative deal in NFL history at around \$23 million should he remain Indianapolis' franchise player.

More likely, the Colts will reach a long-term deal with

the four-time MVP that probably will be his final NFL contract.

Baltimore's Haloti Ngata, the NFL's best nose tackle, will get around \$12 million — if the tags stick.

Barring a new CBA in the next two weeks, the union will continue to fight on this issue, even though some of its members will collect a windfall from being tagged.

### VICK CANCELS APPEARANCE ON WINFREY'S SHOW

CHICAGO — Philadelphia Eagles quarterback Michael Vick will not be appearing on "The Oprah Winfrey Show" after all.

A show spokesman said Wednesday representatives of the NFL star called late Tuesday to cancel his appearance for personal reasons. The daytime talk show host's interview with Vick was set to air Thursday, Feb. 24.

The interview was to cover Vick's time in prison, his work with the Humane Society and his return to the NFL.

Vick missed two seasons and served 18 months in federal prison for a dogfighting operation based on his property in Surry County, Va.

### REDSKINS' BANKS HAD COLLAPSED LUNG FROM STABBING

WASHINGTON — Washington Redskins kick returner Brandon Banks suffered a collapsed lung when he was stabbed outside a nightclub, and efforts to keep the lung inflated have delayed his discharge from the hospital.

James Gould, Banks' agent, on Wednesday released the most detailed statement yet concerning Banks' condition. Gould said the knife nicked Banks' left lung when Banks and a friend were stabbed in downtown D.C. early Saturday.

A tube had been inserted to inflate the lung, but the lung wouldn't stay inflated when it was removed. Gould said if the lung doesn't respond by Friday, then a procedure using a scope will be performed to repair the lung.

Smith offered a simple solution to all three: "You win. I think at the end of the day, winning is a very important criteria."

In theory, increasing the field by three should help cut down on teams feeling slighted by being left out. The reality is there will always be complaints on selection Sunday.

The new format has already spawned some new jargon. The teams fighting for those precious final spots are now on the "soft bubble."

## THE ACES ON BRIDGE® Bobby Wolff

Today's deal comes from the finals of the NEC tournament, held in Japan last February. Over the years some eyebrows have been raised when I criticized the use of MUD leads (middle, up, down) from three cards. I accept that it may occasionally be useful to know that your partner has led from an honor. But, more frequently, when you lead the middle card, partner might not interpret your holding till it is too late. Watch one of the world's top pairs experiencing this problem.

Both tables reached three no-trump, and both declared it the wrong way up. Both Wests led a spade, and both declarers found the correct technical move of rising with dummy's spade queen, forcing East to win the trick and thus cut himself off from the long spades. Had declarer not inserted the spade queen, he would have had no chance, whatever he did.

So far, so technically competent; but the difference was that in one room Agustin Madala as East knew from the lead of the spade five that his partner had at most two spades. He shifted to a diamond and found his partner with the perfect hand to defeat the game. In the other room Adam Zmudzynski had to deal with the possibility that his partner had started with either the 5-4 or 8-5-4. He guessed wrong, continuing spades. Declarer won in hand, set up first a heart, then a diamond winner, and claimed nine tricks.

This will allow your partner to double the opponents with three trumps if appropriate. Having shown you are at the top end of your range, you can leave the decision to your partner from here on.
