New guidelines would
temper wind energy
development effects

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service wants wind energy to benefit people without endangering animals.

The FWS recently released a draft of its voluntary guidelines for land-based wind energy project development in an effort to encourage responsible selection of project locations.

The tougher guidelines could affect the China Mountain wind farm proposed for southern Twin Falls County, among others in Idaho, because they define "mitigation" as avoiding potential wildlife problems. Many of the proposed turbines for that project are closer to sage grouse breeding grounds than what scientific studies recommend.

A stakeholder committee spent three years developing the recommendations FWS used to fine-tune a five-tiered process for project developers to follow. Supported by a scientific review, the

Lawmakers mull changes to day care

BOISE — Changes could be ahead for the day care business — and they don't involve diapers.

The Idaho House Commerce and Human Resources Committee voted 9-2 Wednesday to send a bill to the House floor that would give day care providers more flexibility. The wide-ranging bill changes how day cares determine staffing levels and strengthens employee background checks before they're hired.

Day care owners from Twin Falls support the legislation, saying it's needed to keep costs down and allow them to better serve different age groups. Currently, day cares are required to base their staffing on the number of youngsters they serve in five separate age groups. The proposal would eliminate that requirement.

EVEL KNieVEL'S LEGACY

Will son follow father?

No contact between daredevil Knievel, T.F. Chamber in 6 months

With only 4 1/2 months before Robbie "Captain" Knievel's proposed jump over the Snake River Canyon, the stuntman's event is up in the wrong kind of air.

Knievel swept through town in May, camera crew in tow, to meet with local government officials and tourism groups about re-enacting his father's attempted canyon jump on this year's Fourth of July weekend. Evel Knievel tried to jump the canyon in 1974 using a rocket-powered "skycycle," but didn't make it across.

May was at least the second time since the early 1990s that Robbie Knievel visited Twin Falls, pledging to make the jump.

Now, Twin Falls Area Chamber of Commerce CEO Shawn Barigar said he hasn't heard from Knievel's camp since August. And all of the work to be done for a jump is up to the daredevil, he said.

"As we left it with Robbie when he was in town, and our communications after that, the ball was kind of in his court to come up with a plan, the various processes in that, and filing the applications with the various agencies he needs for that," Barigar said.

Those agencies include the city and county of Twin Falls, likely along with the state of Idaho and the U.S. Bureau of Land Management.

Twin Falls Mayor Don Hall said he hadn't heard anything from Knievel since the May visit.

The city still expects to one day acquire the elder Knievel's jump site, which is currently privately owned. Hall

said he would still be interested in a jump proposal, depending on the conditions.

"I think it's an interesting proposal for the area, if it's managed right," Hall said. "I think it'd be an economic boon to the area. And of course I'm a child of the '70s, so I think it'd be kind of cool."

Twin Falls County Commissioner Terry Kramer said he also hasn't heard a word about a jump since Knievel's initial presentation.

Also quiet has been Knievel's online presence. A website that formerly trumpeted a potential canyon jump now states it's "under construction." VFT.org, a website devoted to flat-track motorcycle racing, lists a massive lot of Knievel items — motorcycles, show suits and a 28-foot tour trailer among them — up for sale, with Knievel's e-mail address as the contact.

Knievel's manager, Jeff Lowe, did not return phone messages left this week by the *Times-News*.

Twin Falls County Commission Chairman George Urie noted in May that Knievel seemed to expect local entities to do the heavy lifting for the event. Urie also said he didn't expect the county to put up any money for it.

Barigar said he thinks there is still willingness in the community for the jump, but only when a plan is in place.

"Truthfully, I think it would be a great opportunity for the community to capitalize on a piece of history," Barigar said. "We'll just have to wait."

School reform bill sent back for more work

BOISE — The biggest piece of a plan to reform Idaho's public schools was returned Wednesday to the Senate Education Committee, where it narrowly passed on a 5-4 vote last week.

The legislation would boost technology in the classroom, require students to take online courses and bump up the minimum teacher pay to \$30,000 while also increasing classroom sizes to pay for a bulk of the reforms. The plan would require Idaho to shed about 770 teaching jobs as more courses are taught online and class sizes increase.

The legislation was pulled from the Idaho Senate calendar at the request of Senate Education Committee Chairman John Goedde.

"We still have a little work to do on this," Goedde said. "We tried and it didn't quite get there, so we're going to try again."

Public schools chief Tom Luna's sweeping overhaul was unveiled at the start of the 2011 session and introduced in Goedde's committee in early February with backing from Republican leadership. The committee eased the online course requirements and made other changes amid opposition from parents, teachers and some lawmakers.

Luna also clarified that schools don't have to increase classroom sizes, which is expected to pay for a bulk of the reforms, but could lower teacher pay instead.

Downtown T.F. plaza plan draws support

David R. Mead remembers when the original fountain in downtown Twin Falls went in four decades ago — he was one of its orchestrators, after all.

Kids playing in the splash park and sandbox, the community push for complete downtown revitalization and the summer evening concerts like the ones now: All things he remembers fondly, and all things that have gone away or changed with the flow of time.

Now, he is one of more than a dozen folks who supported redeveloping the Main Avenue Fountain Plaza in Twin Falls, a plan that would replace the current fountain with amphitheater-style seating and install a new splash park, among other new features.

"My memory says no, we can't tear down the fountain," Mead said at a city-hosted open house on the development plans. "Reality says yes, it's time for a change."

guidelines intend to preserve the habitat and populations of endangered and at-risk species.

Included are multi-year pre- and post-construction studies, consideration of noise disturbance, and developer collaboration with FWS before proceeding through each tier of development.

“We’re supportive of green energy,” said FWS spokeswoman Alicia King. “We just want it to be in the right place. Producers usually want that, too.”

In Idaho, wind turbines could threaten the greater sage grouse, identified by FWS as a candidate for endangered species protection. So the guidelines are welcomed by Idaho Department of Fish and Game biologists, who can serve in an advisory role on some projects.

Fish and Game staff biologist Mike McDonald said his department isn’t consulted on all projects; it depends on whether the land

is public or private, and who the overseeing agency is.

“We encourage proponents to look at the guidelines, and most have been fairly good about it,” McDonald said.

McDonald said China Mountain’s developer, RES Americas, consulted with Fish and Game when examination of the project’s proposed site began in 2008. But subsequent wildfires have made habitat east of the project more critical to sage grouse survival.

“It was always critical but now, it’s even more so,” McDonald said.

The FWS document says that even though the guidelines are voluntary, those who follow them will receive leniency if prosecuted for the loss of threatened species.

King said FWS is asking during the comment period whether the guidelines should be mandatory.

“Many would like to see them mandatory but we want input from all the stakeholders on whether they would be open to that,” King said.

Kimberly water bills will include usage tally

KIMBERLY — Kimberly residents will get a personalized look at the town’s new metered water in the mail this week.

Public Works Superintendent Rob Wright told the City Council Tuesday that all the city’s new water meters are installed and reporting data. A reading of one month’s usage will be included when the next utility bills are sent out.

“That is your complete last month usage,” Wright said. “This month, you should see an actual consumption.”

Kimberly residents will still pay the current water

rate, but the month’s worth of readings will be a helpful resource when the council sets a new tiered rate.

Wright said any very high readings on the bills probably stem from a leak.

Other Tuesday council decisions could lead to some new sights around Kimberly.

The council gave the go-ahead for Pheasant Cove Dental to put up a sign larger than city ordinance allows. Kimberly’s planning and zoning board had previously denied Dr. Kent Allen and Dr. Shannon Widmier’s request to put up a 32-square-foot sign. They appealed to the council.

“I look at this sign — it’s not a huge sign — it’s a professional sign. I think we

ought to let him put it up,” Councilman Burke Richman said.

Mayor Dave Overacre said the planning and zoning board made the right decision by deciding according to city ordinance, but he was also in support of allowing the sign’s installation.

“Sometimes I think we do need to be more flexible and maybe refresh, redraft our ordinances and really make them ours,” he said.

Another project that could reshape the way part of Kimberly looks came from 17-year-old Austin Park. Last fall, the council heard Park’s suggestion for his Eagle Scout project of turning an existing cement pad in the Stonegate subdi-

vision into a basketball court.

“It’s just a way to get children off and away from the streets,” Park said.

After watching the pad become a pond after winter rains and snows, Park decided to move his project from Stonegate to Diamond Park. Park already had a local construction company lined up to donate manpower and was working to get equipment donated. The city agreed to donate the cost of cement.

“I think this will be great,” Councilwoman Lee McKinlay said. “A lot of kids go to this park already. It will be a little farther for the Stonegate kids, but they’ve got bikes.”

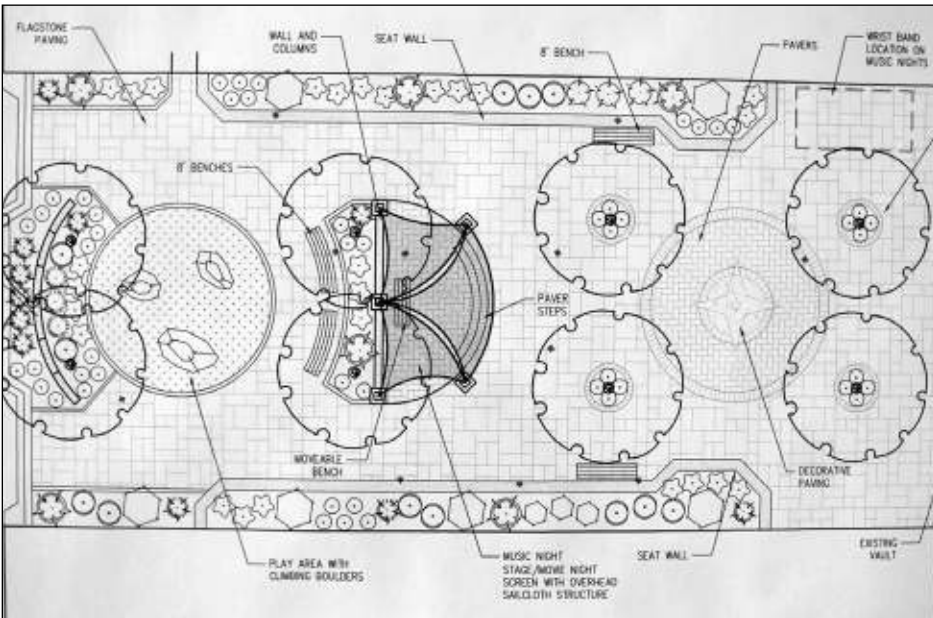

The nonprofit Twin Falls Community Foundation paid for the five different conceptual drawings presented Wednesday at the open house for community members’ input. It’s now up to the Twin Falls City Council to approve a drawing so the foundation can move forward with cost estimates. The nonprofit is paying for all the design work.

City Parks and Recreation Director Dennis Bowyer said he’ll try to get the proposal and the public comments surrounding it before the council by the end or March or early April.

The majority of the comments were supportive of change — any change, really — in downtown Twin Falls that may bring more people to it. Some proposed restrooms near the plaza; others suggested murals on the walls. Someone even proposed painting a portion of one wall into a useable movie screen.

“People are interested, everyone a little differently,” Foundation President Terry McCurdy said. “We had a couple of people so excited, and they just want anything to happen.”

McCurdy said he’s discouraged by the current downtown scene — “it has

some potential; it has a good feel” — and his goal is to revitalize the area and bring new life into it.

It’s an idea all the written, anonymous comments left at the open house agreed with. But that’s not to say revitalizing the fountain area has 100 percent support.

“What we have now looks good. It’s not broken,” Carter Killinger said at the open house. “Let the charity’s money be spent elsewhere.”

Gena Anderson, owner of Right on Track Child Care Center in Twin Falls, said she’s had to cut staff wages to meet the current requirements and keep her business open.

“That’s been really hard to tell staff members, ‘I can’t pay you what you’re worth,’” she said.

Testifying on behalf of three Twin Falls day cares, including Immanuel Lutheran Child Development Center and Jazzy’s Early Learning Center, An-

derson said changes are needed to ensure that quality day care choices remain.

The proposal would do away with the strict age-group boundaries in favor of a point-based staffing system that would make it easier for children of different ages to participate in activities and classes together.

Here’s how it would work: Children would be assigned different numerical point values based on their age. A child younger than 18 months old would count for two points, a child 18 months to under 5 years would be one, and children ages 5-12 would be assigned

half a point.

Each day care worker could be assigned a maximum of 12 points or 12 children, regardless of age.

Cindy Biberos, owner of Jazzy’s, said the changes would benefit more than centers’ bottom lines. For example, bright toddlers could be included in activities geared for older children, she said.

The bill also adds three types of felonies — those involving domestic violence, controlled substances and grand theft — to the list of crimes that disqualify day care applicants from receiving a license for five years af-

ter conviction.

Local legislative supporters of the bill include the committee chairwoman, Rep. Sharon Block, R-Twin Falls, and committee vice-chairman, Rep. Stephen Hartgen, R-Twin Falls.

Block said the bill does a good job of addressing flexibility and safety concerns, while factoring in the needs of day cares of different sizes and settings.

Two Democratic lawmakers, Reps. Phylis King of Boise and Shirley Ringo of Moscow, were opposed.

Lawmakers work to bolster Idaho anti-bullying law

BOISE (AP) — Lawmakers are working to strengthen the state’s anti-bullying law in the wake of a high-profile hazing case in eastern Idaho.

The bipartisan bill arrives in the 2011 Idaho Legislature

as five former Blackfoot High School athletes face charges involving alleged bullying incidents.

The measure would require schools to disseminate information about bullying to employees, parents and

students. Schools would also provide ongoing training for employees, who would be expected to intervene on behalf of students who are targeted.

Repeat offenders of the anti-bullying law could face

a misdemeanor for a third violation.

The bill cleared the Senate Education Committee Wednesday but was put up for amendments amid concerns that definitions in the legislation were too vague.

Republican leaders in the Idaho Senate said earlier this week they were working to further calm anxieties over the proposed overhaul, with increased classroom sizes among the chief concerns, in order to secure its passage.

The legislation is the largest of three school reform bills Goedde’s committee sent to the Senate floor amid strong opposition from the state teachers union and other groups.

The bills that remain in

the Idaho Senate would introduce merit pay and award bonuses for teachers who take on hard-to-fill positions or leadership roles, while also phasing out tenure for new educators, who would instead be offered one- to two-year contracts following a probationary period.

The legislation would also restrict collective bargaining agreements to salaries and benefits.

While Senate Bill 1113 is being returned to the Senate Education Committee, the two other bills in the reform package will be taken up on the Senate floor today, Luna said.

“This is another positive step toward reforming education in Idaho,” Luna said in a statement. “If there are improvements that can be made to Senate Bill 1113, we are open to those ideas. This is how the legislative process works, and I look forward to working with the Senate to pass this reform package.”

Valley House celebrates expansion

A collaborative effort among Magic Valley businesses, charitable grants and volunteers provided the Valley House Homeless Shelter with a new community room to host meetings and a variety of classes for its clients.

The addition was finished in November and Sharon Breshears, executive director of Twin Falls County's only homeless shelter, said the new room provides ample space for the 60 to 70 people who stay each night to meet and learn lessons to help their quests for independence.

Each shelter resident is required to take responsibility for personal chores, and attend a variety of classes that focus on topics from budgeting and parenting to drug awareness and Bible study.

Mike Schutz, Valley House board member, said the privately funded shelter provides help to people of all ages. Last year it served 560 people.

Money to build the 1,000 square feet of meeting area and office space was donated by Glanbia Foods. Room furnishings were bought with money from the First Federal

Charitable Foundation. "This is just a dream come true to serve our clients better," Breshears said.

Buhl schools examine budget

BUHL — Buhl School Board trustees supported the district's upcoming supplemental levy vote and approved a revised budget at their regular meeting Tuesday evening.

Nearly \$211,000 in federal funding meant to preserve teacher jobs will give teachers 3 1/2 days more for a stipend under the revised budget.

"You've got to thank the feds," said board Chairman Jim Barker. "It's a nice surprise."

Not so nice was the rest of the budget picture. Superintendent Byron Stutzman presented the board with projections for district and state revenue losses.

Since 2008, he said, the district has already reduced and saved \$787,000. However more cuts are necessary. Its 2010-11 general fund appropriation has been reduced by 18 percent.

Looking at five-year projections, the district received \$7.4 million in 2009. By 2012, its budget may be down \$1.4 million from that.

"My projections for loss of revenue for fiscal year 2012 is somewhere between \$400,000 to \$500,000. It all depends on what the Legislature does with the Luna legislation," Stutzman said, referring to an education reform proposal by Superintendent of Public Instruction Tom Luna.

"... Just cutting extracurricular activities is not enough. We'll have to look at cutting staff if we don't pass a levy. The cuts will tear the district apart if we don't get additional funding."

Also Tuesday, the board supported Buhl's Parent Teacher Network hosting its annual Math-a-thon, its top fundraiser, this spring.

PTN President Claudette Shriver said the group had considered postponing the Math-a-thon to the fall so funds could be raised and spent in the same school year. However, she said, there was concern the fundraiser would be lost because contributions would go elsewhere. Last year, the PTN raised \$37,000.

Popplewell Elementary School Principal Ron Anthony had also proposed

consolidating funds with the PTN event and buying supplies for teachers.

The group turned down the idea, but Anthony told the board Tuesday that some sort of "checks and balances" are needed. He cited a teacher buying a \$200 easel when the school already owns one.

"We need to look at our policy," Anthony said, later noting his school's and the PTN's "great working relationship."

Trustees backed the PTN's teacher allocation because "it motivates the teachers," said Jackie Frey.

Anthony also submitted an Adequate Yearly Progress restructuring plan for the board's approval. If the elementary school does not meet AYP this year, the plan will be implemented next school year. He noted improvement in his students' reading, math and language.

Speaker Denney, Right-to-Farm and the arrogance of power

Lawrence Denney, a Republican farmer from Midvale who will turn 63 on Friday, has lived in Idaho all his life. He's been speaker of the Idaho House of Representatives since 2007. And he has represented Adams, Payette, Washington and Canyon counties in the House of Representatives since 1997 and previously from 1991-92. So how could Denney have paid so little attention to what's been happening to land use in Idaho during that time? The speaker on Tuesday introduced revisions to Idaho's Right-to-Farm Act that include protections for confined animal feeding operations in all their manifestations. House Bill 166 would extend the activities that are covered under the definition of "agricultural" and more clearly state that any ordinances that outlaw the defined agricultural activities are void. You read that right: Existing county laws regulating CAFOs and any other agricultural activity could be invalidated. Many Magic Valley county commissioners think that's misguided. We believe it's daylight madness. Under Denney's bill, any group tried to eliminate an agricultural facility under a "nuisance" claim and it was found the facility was recognized and permitted, the group would be required to pay all legal fees. As agricultural land has been developed over the past 30 to 40 years, almost all 50 states have passed right-to-farm laws of varying degrees. The laws were intended to protect family farms from nuisance suits as long as the farms were established before subdivisions were put in place and as long as the farm's activities did not "jeopardize public health and safety."

"The food producers are all on board," said Denney's spokesman, Roger Batt. Then food producers haven't been talking to local elected officials. Jerome County Commissioner Cathy Roemer pointed out last week that commissioners must maintain a balance between all county residents. Since Jerome is an agricultural county, residents have to accept certain conditions that come along with agricultural production but producers also should be good neighbors. "At its face, this bill appears to be overly broad," Roemer said. "It may be whittled down by the end of the legislative process." Thanks to more sensible people in the Idaho Senate, we think that's a safe bet.

Our view: Speaker of the House Lawrence Denney proposes to let agricultural operations in Idaho do pretty much anything they want, whether or not they affect their neighbors. What do you think? We welcome viewpoints from our readers on this and other issues.

Shrinking government demands sharing pain

Over the past few weeks we've begun to see the new contours of American politics. The budget cutters have taken control of the agenda, while government's defenders are waging tactical retreats. Given the scope of the fiscal problems, it could be like this for the next 10 or 20 years. No place is hotter than Wisconsin. The leaders there have done everything possible to maximize conflict. Gov. Scott Walker, a Republican, demanded cuts only from people in the other party. The public sector unions and their allies immediately flew into a rage, comparing Walker to Hitler, Mussolini and Mubarak. Walker's critics are amusingly Orwellian. They liken the crowd in Madison to the ones in Tunisia and claim to be fighting for democracy. Whatever you might say about Walker, he and the Republican majorities in Wisconsin were elected, and they are doing exactly what they told voters they would do. It's the Democratic minority that is thwarting the majority will by fleeing to Illinois. It's the left that has suddenly embraced extralegal obstructionism. Still, let's try to put aside the hyperventilation. Everybody now seems to agree that Walker was right to ask state workers to pay more for their benefits. Even if he gets everything he asks for, Wisconsin state workers would still be contributing less to their benefits than the average state worker nationwide and would be contributing far, far less than private sector workers. The more difficult question is whether Walker was right to try to water down Wisconsin's collective bargaining agreements. Even if you acknowledge the importance of unions in representing middle-class interests, there are strong arguments on Walker's side. In Wisconsin and elsewhere, state-union relations are structurally out of whack. That's because public-sector unions and private-sector unions are very different creatures. Private-sector unions push against the interests of shareholders and management; public-sector unions push against the interests of taxpayers. Private-sector union members know that their employers could go out of business, so they have an incentive to mitigate their demands; public sector union members work for state monopolies and have no such interest. Private-sector unions confront managers who have an incentive to push back against their demands. Public-sector unions face managers who have an incentive to give into them for the sake of their own survival. Most important, public-sector unions help choose those they negotiate with. Through gigantic campaign contributions and overall clout, they have enormous influence over who gets elected to bargain with them, especially in state and local races.

States with public-sector unions tend to run into fiscal crises. There is little relationship between excellence and reward, which leads to resentment among taxpayers who don't have that luxury. Yet I think Walker made a strategic error in setting up this confrontation as he did. The debt problems before us are huge. Even in Wisconsin they cannot be addressed simply by taking on the public-sector unions. Studies done in North Carolina and elsewhere suggest that collective bargaining only increases state worker salaries by about 5 percent or 6 percent. That's not nearly enough to explain current deficits. Getting state and federal budgets under control will take decades. It will require varied, multipronged approaches, supported by broad and shifting coalitions. It's really important that we establish an unwritten austerity constitution: a set of practices that will help us cut effectively now and in the future. The foundation of this unwritten constitution has to be this principle: make everybody hurt. The cuts have to be spread more or less equitably among as many groups as possible. There will never be

public acceptance if large sectors of society are excluded. Walker's program fails that test. It spares traditional Republican groups (even cops and firefighters). It is thus as unsustainable as the current tide of red ink. Moreover, the Constitution must emphasize transparent evaluation. Over the past weeks, Walker increased expenditures to pump up small business job creation and cut them on teacher benefits. That might be the right choice, but if voters are going to go along with choices such as these, there is going to have to be a credible evaluation process to explain why some things are cut and some things aren't. So I'd invite Walker and the debt fighters everywhere to think of themselves as founding fathers of austerity. They are not only balancing budgets, they are setting precedent for a process that will last decades. By their example, they have to create habits that diverse majorities can respect and embrace. The process has to be balanced. It has to make everybody hurt.

Charge ought to be attempted murder

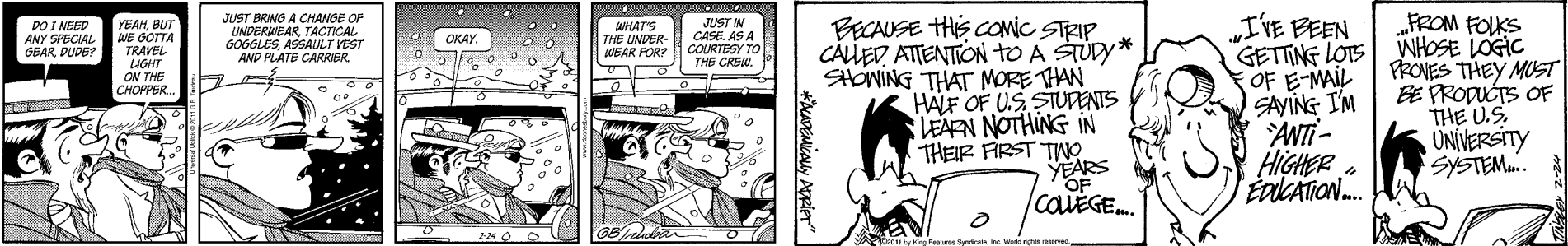

.... cut-rate schools

Lewiston Tribune

Calling Idaho schools chief Tom Luna. Have you checked your state Constitution lately? Your present course is veering dangerously toward violating it. Key to the schools superintendent's reform package of enrolling more students in online programs, giving them laptop computers and extending merit pay to exceptional teachers is pulling \$100 million out of the classroom. Luna would reduce the teaching ranks by 770 and trim another 230 administrative and staff positions. That, he says, would increase the average class size from 18.2 students to 19.8. He just relented a bit. If local schools decide they'd rather keep class sizes

smaller by employing more teachers, they can just pay those teachers less All of which just widened the gap between Idaho's smallest, poorest and rural school districts — and those larger, urban networks with more resources. Here's why: The classroom average falls harshest on smaller communities. In the cities, you can have 25 seniors attending an English class. But in the towns, you may find only eight seniors attending that same class — because there are only eight high school seniors in that school. They still need a teacher. ... when the state cuts the teaching pool, mega districts such as Boise would be able to juggle more kids into a classroom. But small communities ... are locked in. They have neither the excess of kids nor teachers. They'll have to settle for less — either lower-paid teachers or a more limited curriculum. Meanwhile, larger schools with the tax base and local support can pass supplemental property tax levies enabling them to pay teachers more or to hire enough instructors to avoid classroom crowding. Many smaller districts depend on the state's paltry appropriation. So as the Luna reforms take shape, expect to see students in well-heeled districts such as Blaine County, Boise, Idaho Falls, Lewiston and Moscow attending less-crowded classrooms. And these districts will be able to compete for the best teachers.

Rural Idaho will be left behind. Again. There's just one glitch. Idaho's Constitution ... obligates the Legislature to "establish and maintain a general, uniform and thorough system of public, free common schools"... Every time a gap between rich and poor schools expands, somebody looks over this provision and files a lawsuit. The state came close to ceding control of its schools to the courts in the 1970s. As another legal challenge gathered momentum in the 1990s, lawmakers frantically cobbled together a package to keep the courts at bay. They created a standard for staffing the schools and for paying teachers, regardless of where they were employed. And it succeeded — until lawmakers started dismantling the plan with tax shifts and earmarks. Now it's Luna's turn. How long do you think it will take before someone starts reading the Constitution again — and decides it means what it says?



... compassionate conservatism?

Conservatives took the November election results

as a mandate: to cut a state budget already reduced by 20 percent and not increase taxes. But we wonder: would Idahoans have so empowered the political right if they had heard Danny and Shirley Lukers' story, or how budget cuts will impact thousands of Idahoans like them? ... the Lukers are in rough shape. Danny has cerebral palsy. Shirley is jobless. The Lukers get by with help from your tax dollars. Those monies are allocated to the Idaho Division of Vocational Rehabilitation, which filters a portion to Development Workshop in Idaho Falls. That organization pays a salary to counselor Pat Payson. His job is to help folks like the Lukers find work. State leaders are talking about cutting Medicaid by a minimum of \$25 million. Add in the federal match, and Idaho stands to lose \$84 million. That will filter down to Development Workshop and its clients. ... in the past three years, Development Workshop has lost approximately 20 percent of its state funding. As a result, its clients receive less counseling and life skills training, where they learn how to manage their money or plan meals, things most of us are fortunate enough to take for granted. Rugged individualism is fine for those capable of standing on their own two feet. Relying on families and churches is an option for some. But what of those people whose families can't help? Who belong to no church? Do we really intend to cast them aside, to tell

them that because of an election with a historically low voter turnout and very little, if any, discourse about those at the bottom of the food chain, we're going to collectively shrug our shoulders and quote Ezra Taft Benson's *Proper Role of Government* as we shove them out the door? ...



... unfriending Idahoans

If you're wealthy, straight, don't belong to a union and have no disabilities, the Idaho Legislature likes you. But if you take part in any social services, are gay or lesbian, have disabilities, belong to a union or live in the wrong area, most state lawmakers don't like you. Lawmakers certainly don't like teachers. If they did, Idaho Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter wouldn't be singing the praises of public schools chief Tom Luna's plan to get rid of more than 700 teachers. The fact that even school board members and school administrators have called Luna's plan unacceptable means nothing. The idea of enlarging classroom sizes to pay for Luna's "reforms" indicates Idaho doesn't care

about its children, either ... Medicaid recipients and supporters recently gathered at Friendship Square in Moscow to protest planned cuts to funding that supports those with developmental disabilities. Senate Minority Leader Edgar Malepeai, D-Pocatello, introduced a measure to include adding people who are gay, lesbian and transgender to be protected under Idaho's Human Rights Act. This addition was rejected in 2007, and Republican Sen. Curt McKenzie, who chairs the Senate State Affairs Committee, said he has no plan to schedule a hearing on the bill introduced during the 2011 session that would ban workplace and housing discrimination based on sexual orientation or gender identity. He said this year, like recent years, there's not enough support among Idaho's conservative lawmakers to move the bill forward. In a small state like ours we like to picture ourselves as neighborly, the kind of people who watch out for, and take care of each other. We expect our lawmakers to do the same. Instead, the state only watches out for those with money, who don't need an education, who aren't disabled, who are straight ... That sure leaves a lot of us out in the cold.

Retirement next egg? What retirement nest egg?

As the debate over the federal deficit heats up, Americans are going to hear a great deal about "greedy geezers" who are supposedly bankrupting the nation with Social Security and Medicare. Politicians will no doubt be more circumspect than former Wyoming Sen. Alan Simpson, who, as the Republican co-chairman of the federal deficit commission, described Social Security as a "milk cow with 310 million tits." The myth underlying these attacks (including Simpson's misogynist bovine metaphor) is that most old people don't need their entitlements — that they are affluent pickpockets fleecing younger Americans. This image of prosperous geezers and crones is just not accurate. The notion of an aging population well prepared to take care of itself — not only in its relatively healthy 60s and 70s, classified by sociologists as the "young old," but throughout the "old old" 80s and 90s — is a delusion that threatens to undo 75 years of social progress that began

when President Franklin D. Roosevelt signed the Social Security Act in 1935. No generation stands to lose more from this fantasy than baby boomers, whose oldest members turn 65 this year. Because of financial losses in what will surely be known to history as the Crash of 2008, many boomers — especially older ones with less time to recover — may enter retirement in a worse financial position than their parents. According to a report by the Center for Economic and Policy Research, a liberal Washington think tank, households headed by boomers between the ages of 55 and 65 lost about half of their wealth between 2004 and 2009 as a result of the real estate collapse and the shrinkage of 401(k) retirement accounts.

A decent old age requires more than health care. Both higher taxes and more personal saving will be needed to support longer lives, however unacceptable that dual reality may be to political purveyors of unreason. If we are not going to kill Granny, we must support many more boomer Grannies.

Where's the justice and kindness in Lazy J situation

We seniors at Lazy J are suffering major financial, physical and emotional loss at the hands of a few greedy individuals that are not willing to compensate us for the losses they have caused. At the City Council meeting earlier this month, Linda Wills, owner of Lazy J, claimed the taxes and expenses for operating the park have risen so much they are going to lose money if they keep the park open. Therefore, we have been notified that they will be closing the park. This in spite of the fact she said there was no debt on Lazy J. I struggled with her statement and did some research. They have about 120 homes each paying \$375 to \$400 monthly space rent. That is about \$45,000 per month income. Their taxes were \$25,307.54 in 2010 which is about \$2,100 a month. Their water is between \$2,500 and \$5,800 a month (seasonal adjustments). There are garbage collection expenses and insurance. They have part-time office help and a part-time maintenance worker. If you estimate

\$15,000 a month expenses (being generous), that leaves \$30,000 a month income. How can that be considered operating at a loss? Even if the profit was half that, who wouldn't like \$15,000 a month income? The owners and developers stand to make millions on this land, or they wouldn't forfeit this much monthly cash flow. Yet, they are unwilling to help the vulnerable senior residents which stand to lose thousands of dollars as well as their homes. Many of the seniors are in no physical condition to move out of their homes themselves and they have no money to hire help. Many do not have \$5,000 to have their home demolished or the \$10,000 to have the newer ones moved. Many cannot afford the rent money to replace their homes yet they make too much to qualify for subsidized housing if it was available here. I suspect that before this is over, the stress, despair and depression this has caused will bring down the final curtain for some of the more fragile seniors. Rich investors scoop up cheap homes, new buyers miss out

WASHINGTON — Home sales are starting to tick up after the worst year in more than a decade. But the momentum is coming from cash-rich investors who are scooping up foreclosed properties at bargain prices, not first-time home-buyers who are critical for a housing recovery.

The number of first-time buyers fell last month to the lowest percentage in nearly two years, while all-cash deals have doubled and now account for one-third of sales.

A record number of foreclosures have forced home prices down in most markets. The median sales price for a home fell last month to its lowest level in nearly nine years, according to the National Association of Realtors.

Lower prices would normally be good for first-time home-buyers. But tighter lending standards have kept many from taking advantage of them. With fewer new buyers shopping, potential repeat buyers are hesitant to put their homes on the market and upgrade.

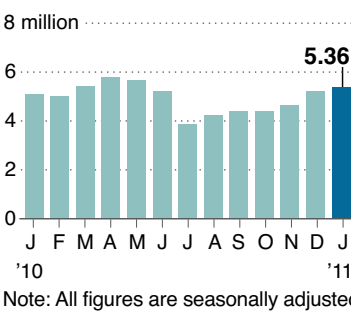
Cash-only investors are most interested in properties at risk of foreclosure. They can get those at bargain-basement prices.

“The cash-rich investors can come in and get foreclosed properties at incredibly favorable prices,” said Paul Dales, senior U.S. economist for Capital Economics. “The average Joe can’t take advantage because they simply cannot get the credit to buy.”

Sales of previously occupied homes rose slightly in January to a seasonally adjusted annual rate of 5.36 million, the Realtors group said

Wednesday. That’s up 2.7 percent from 5.22 million in December.

In southern Idaho, Realtor Tami Gooding said investors are definitely in the market but owner-occupied housing sales are more common.

“Investors are always on the lookout,” Gooding said.

Although the number of properties purchased by investors are tracked in some market areas those transactions aren’t recorded locally, said Gooding, who works with Canyonside Irwin Realty in Twin Falls.

She said markets hit the hardest by the housing bubble, like Las Vegas, are places where investors are more likely to find deeply discounted homes and properties.

“Our area didn’t see much of the outrageous and false increase in property valuation,” Gooding said. “The market is correcting and we’ve seen prices decrease slightly but home won’t be losing value like they are in some parts of the country.”

Nationally, even with active investors, the sales pace remains far below the 6 million homes a year that economists say represents a healthy market. And the number of first-time home-buyers fell to 29 percent of the market — the lowest percentage of the market in nearly two years. A more healthy level of first-time home-buyers is about 40 percent, according to the NAR.

Foreclosures represented 37 percent of sales in January. All-cash transactions accounted for 32 percent of home sales — twice the rate from two years ago, when the trade group began tracking these deals on a monthly basis. In places like Las Vegas and Miami, cash deals represent about half of sales.

In the three states where foreclosures are highest, at-risk homes make up at least two-thirds of all sales. In Florida, 63 percent of sales in January involved homes that were at risk of foreclosure, according to a Campbell/Inside Mortgage Finance survey. And in Arizona and Nevada, a combined 72 percent of sales involved those homes at risk of foreclosure.

The median down payment rose to 22 percent last year in at least nine major U.S. cities, according to a survey by Zillow.com, a real estate data firm. That’s up from 4 percent in late 2006 — as the housing bubble began to burst. The cities included some of the nation’s hardest hit markets — Las Vegas, Phoenix and Tampa, Fla. — as well as areas that are rebounding, including San Diego and San Francisco.

FUEL FEAR

Fuel costs rise as unrest adds ‘fear premium’ to price

When fuel prices topped \$4 a gallon in 2008 Chris Thompson almost traded in his gray Jeep Cherokee for an economy car.

At the time, softening fuel prices changed his mind.

With the cost of regular unleaded currently climbing Thompson is once again pondering the benefits of ditching his four-wheel drive.

“It really sucks. Every time I fill up it costs more,” Thompson said. “I remember when I could fill up for under \$30 bucks. Today, it cost me almost \$50. It’s ridiculous.”

According to AAA Idaho, the average price for a gallon of regular unleaded fuel soared 14 cents over the past two weeks. Idaho’s average price is \$3.10 a gallon. The U.S. average is at \$3.16 a gallon.

Oil prices hit \$100 per barrel Wednesday as forces loyal to Libya’s Moammar Gadhafi clashed with protesters, expanding their control over parts of that OPEC nation.

In afternoon trading West Texas Intermediate crude for April delivery was up \$3.48, or 3.7 percent, at \$98.90 per barrel on the New York Mercantile Exchange.

Prices climbed as high as \$100 earlier in the day, hitting triple digits for the first

time since Oct. 2, 2008.

Analysts say concerns about violence in North Africa and the Middle East have added a “fear premium” of about \$10 per barrel of oil. The rise has pushed retail gasoline prices higher in the U.S. despite ample supplies in most parts of the country.

The rebellion in Libya, a country that has the most oil reserves in Africa, follows uprisings in other North African countries that have ousted leaders in Tunisia and Egypt.

As protests widened in Libya, French oil giant Total said it started to wind down its oil production in the country, which produced an average of 55,000 barrels per day last year. That follows

Deadline looms for organic producer conservation funding

Idaho organic producers and businesses transitioning to organic production may qualify for funding from the Idaho Natural Resources Conservation Service.

Applications are being accepted, through March 4, by the NRCS from producers who carry out conservation practices consistent with an organic system plan.

To get funding you must apply and qualify for the Environmental Quality Incentives Program.

For example, funding is available for projects as compost facilities, seasonal high tunnels, organic vegetative and fabric mulches and mechanical treatments to improve grazing land.

Labor Department expands access to training opportunities

The Idaho Department of Labor’s Workforce Development Council has earmarked additional money to finance on-the-job training for disadvantaged adults.

The \$250,000 commitment from the Workforce Investment Act program supplements a \$625,000 federal grant the department received last fall.

The department hopes the infusion of funds will jump-start re-employment of workers who lost their jobs to foreign competition.

“With the help of this federal

grant, 31 dislocated workers are already back on the job, and another 70 will begin receiving paychecks in the coming year,” Department Director Roger B. Madsen said in a press release. “This additional money extends the assistance to adult workers who face serious obstacles in finding employment through traditional means.”

Eligible private sector employers are reimbursed for at least 50 percent of the wages they pay to qualified new employees during the on-the-job training period, which runs up to six months depending on the occupation and the trainee’s skill level.

To qualify, jobs must pay at least \$10 an hour. Preference is granted to jobs including employer-sponsored benefits.

“After weathering the worst recession in a generation, Idaho em-

ployers are beginning their return to profitability, and these on-the-job training initiatives are ways to help them begin having an impact on unemployment,” Madsen said. “If a business contacts the department about eligibility, Labor consultants are ready to complete the process for the employee’s enrollment.”

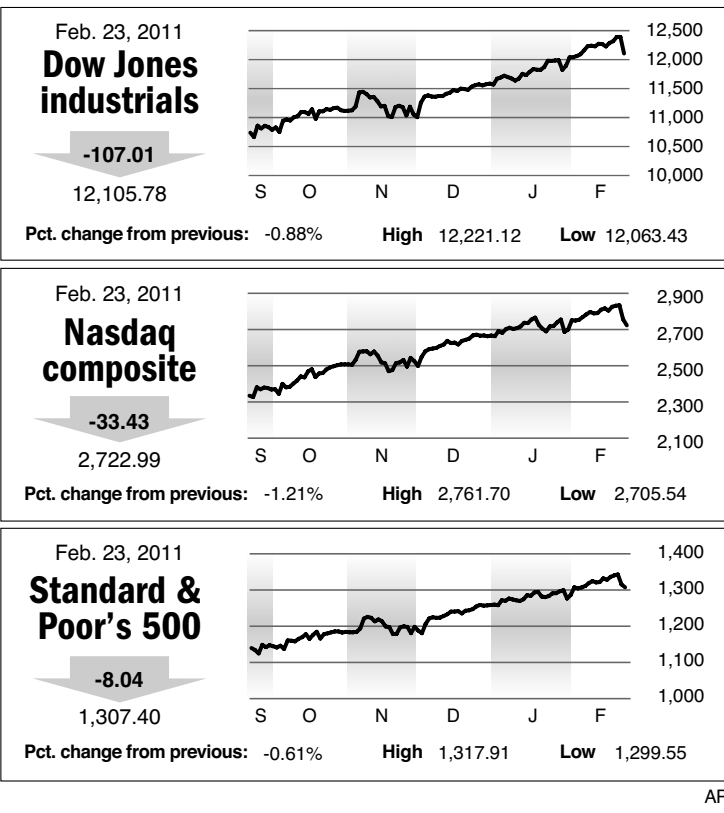

Stocks had their worst two-day pullback in six months after clashes in Libya sent oil prices to two-year highs. The Dow Jones industrial average lost 107.01 points, or 0.9 percent, to 12,105.78. The Dow has fallen 285.47 points, or 2.3 percent, over the last two days. It was the largest drop since August 12. The S&P 500 fell 8.04, or 0.6 percent, to 1,307.40. The Nasdaq composite fell 33.43, or 1.2 percent, to 2,722.99. Each major index has gained more than 10 percent over the last three months, leading some analysts to say that the situation in Libya is giving traders an opportunity to sell and lock in profits after the market's recent run-up. Two stocks fell for every one that rose on the New York Stock Exchange. Consolidated volume came to 5.8 billion shares.

New Yellowstone chief says bison a priority

BILLINGS, Mont. — Yellowstone National Park’s new superintendent said Wednesday that dealing with 525 bison captured for disease control would be among his top priorities — and that park workers would continue feeding the animals while negotiations continue over their fate.

Daniel Wenk, a 58-year-old career federal employee, arrives at a tumultuous time for Yellowstone, which was established in 1872 as the world’s first national park. He replaces Suzanne Lewis, who retired in October after eight years at the helm of the 2.2-million-

acre park.

Recent years have brought a sharp increase in visitors, with a record 3.6 million people coming to Yellowstone in 2010. Yet administrators are grappling with some of the same high-profile disagreements that have lingered for decades, including whether bison should be killed when they attempt to migrate outside the park and how many snowmobilers should be allowed in from neighboring Idaho, Wyoming and Montana.

In an interview with The Associated Press, Wenk said he has scheduled a March 8 meeting with Montana Gov. Brian Schweitzer in part to discuss Yellowstone’s iconic but disease-plagued

bison herds.

Because many bison carry brucellosis, they generally are prohibited from leaving the mountainous park under a federal-state agreement. As a result, thousands of bison that have entered Montana in search of food at lower elevations have been shot or captured and shipped to slaughter.

Wenk, who spent the last few years as the Park Service’s deputy director for operations in Washington, D.C., said the service has no plans to act unilaterally to resolve the bison dilemma.

“We all want to find a solution to this,” he said. “That’s not a decision one party will make; that’s a decision that needs to be

made collectively.”

Schweitzer last week blocked plans to ship hundreds of the animals to slaughter — an abrupt reversal of the state’s prior endorsement of the practice. The Democratic governor said he was sending a message to federal officials that their approach on bison has failed.

The periodic mass bison slaughters over the last decade have drawn sharp criticism from wildlife advocates and some members of Congress. Patricia Dowd with the National Parks Conservation Association said Wenk has the opportunity to “be creative” in crafting a new plan for the burly animals.

“People go to Yellowstone to see wild bison. Even the National Park Service logo has a bison on it,” Dowd said. “They’re a huge part of Yellowstone, and the status quo isn’t working.”

Park officials acknowledge the corrals they are using to temporarily hold the animals are near or at capacity. And a park biologist has predicted that hundreds more bison could attempt to leave the park by winter’s end.

Asked how long the park could hold the 525 animals already captured, Wenk said: “That’s totally dependent on what the rest of the bison do. ... Speculating on my part now would be irresponsible.

Ford to recall 150,000 F-150 pickups over faulty air bags

WASHINGTON — Under government pressure, Ford Motor Co. said Wednesday it will recall nearly 150,000 F-150 pickup trucks to fix air bags that could deploy without warning, a fraction of the vehicles the government contends should be called back and repaired.

The recall covers trucks from the 2005-2006 model years in the United States and Canada for what the Dearborn, Mich., company calls a “relatively low risk” of the air bag deploying inadvertently.

The government, however, has urged Ford to recall 1.3 million F-150s from the 2004-2006 model years, citing 98 injuries from air bags deploying accidentally. The recall is being closely watched because Ford’s F-Series pickup truck is the best-selling vehicle in America.

Ford’s leaders have made safety a cornerstone of the company’s revitalization, but the truck recall represents the latest safety issue to confront the automaker.

Ford has recalled more than 600,000 Windstar minivans in the U.S. and Canada since August to fix rear axles that can corrode and break, an issue still under investigation by the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration. During the past decade, Ford recalled more than 10 million vehicles, including the F-Series pickup, to repair a cruise control switch system that was linked to engine fires.

A Transportation Department spokeswoman

said the agency was reviewing Ford’s response to see if the F-150 recall was adequate. If the government determines that the recall is too limited, it could seek a rare public hearing to decide whether Ford should widen its safety action.

The last such hearing was scheduled in September 2009, after a New York school bus manufacturer resisted a recall. The company decided to issue the recall before the hearing.

“Scheduling a hearing is very rare, and car companies need to take it seriously,” said David Kelly, who served as NHTSA’s chief of staff and acting administrator during the Bush administration. “At the end of the day, the companies are going to do what NHTSA wants them to do, and they’re just delaying the inevitable.”

NHTSA has been investigating the air bag issues for more than a year. In May, Ford told the government that the problems didn’t “present an unreasonable risk to vehicle safety” because there was a low rate of alleged injuries and the air bag warning lamp provided an “obvious warning” to drivers.

Ford told NHTSA in May that some drivers reported injuries that included burns from contact with the air bag, bruises, neck and back pain and minor cuts. “Two customers reported broken or chipped teeth and two reported fractures of the extremities (elbow or arm),” wrote James Vondale, director of Ford’s automotive safety office.

Americans, Turks among the thousands fleeing Libya

ANKARA, Turkey — Foreigners fled the chaos in Libya by the thousands, with Americans and Turks climbing aboard ships, Europeans boarding evacuation flights and North Africans racing to border crossings in overcrowded vans.

Two Turkish ships whisked 3,000 citizens away from the unrest engulfing Libya as Turkey cranked up its largest-ever evacuation, seeking to protect an estimated 25,000 Turkish workers in Libya. More than 200 Turkish companies are involved in construction projects in Libya worth over \$15 billion, and some construction sites have come under attack by protesters.

The safety of U.S. citizens was a prime concern after failed attempts earlier this week to get them out by plane. But hundreds of Americans safely boarded a 600-passenger ferry at Tripoli’s As-shahab port on Wednesday for the five-hour journey to Malta, a Mediterranean island south of Italy.

Over a dozen countries — including Russia, China, Germany and Ukraine — sent planes in to help their citizens escape an increasingly unstable situation.

Tripoli airport was chaotic and overflowing with stranded passengers, said Carlos Dominguez, who flew from the Libyan capital to Madrid. He said people could not buy tickets online and Libyan Airlines was accepting only cash.

“The doors are locked and you can only get in if you have a ticket,” he said.

Swarms of Egyptians who had lived in Libya were locked outside the airport, he said, “lying on the sidewalks with blankets and children” and all their belongings, even television sets.

“The army treats them very badly,” he added.

Passengers arriving in Rome and Malta also described scenes of chaos and violence at Tripoli’s airport, with people pushing and shoving to get onto the few flights taking off Wednesday.

day and Libyan police and security agents kicking and beating them.

“One of my fellow passengers was actually beaten up quite heavily and kicked on,” said Steffan Arnersten, a 42-year-old Swede who works as a managing director at a technical consulting company. “He’s quite wounded.”

Sharon, a Maltese arriving home aboard the only one of three scheduled Air Malta flights to make it out Wednesday, said the situation at the airport was desperate.

“It was just terrible. People fighting for their lives, scrambling over people, pushing, shoving, kicking, everything. It was a mess.”

Irina Kuneva of Bulgaria said tensions in Tripoli were rising sharply after strongman Moammar Gadhafi’s defiant speech hinting at civil war with protesters in eastern Libya.

“He said people should either do what he tells them or there will be a civil war,” she told reporters Wednesday as she arrived in Sofia on an evacuation flight. “People are very scared.”

Two Turkish ships left the eastern Libyan port of Benghazi on Wednesday escorted by a navy frigate, heading to Turkey’s Mediterranean port of Marmaris, where a soup kitchen and a field hospital were set up and buses were brought in to transfer evacuees. Turkey also sent two more ships to Libya and flew 250 more Turkish citizens back home.

Passengers cheered and whistled as the two ferries carrying 3,000 Turks docked at Marmaris earlier today. Exhausted but relieved the passengers hauled suitcases and large carrier bags off the Orhan Gazi-1 ferry, the first to arrive.

The passengers are mostly construction workers employed by more than 200 Turkish companies involved in construction projects in Libya, worth more than \$15 billion. Some 30 foreign nationals were also on board. Turkey began evacuating some 25,000 Turks after several construction sites the east of the country were raided and looted during protests last week.

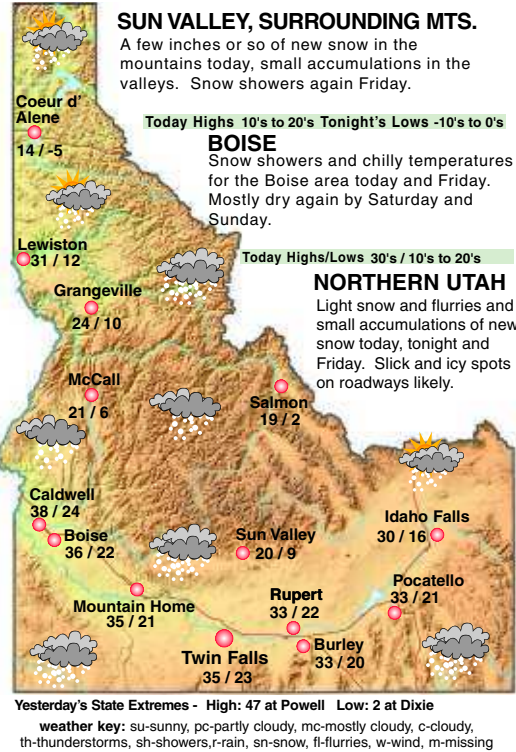

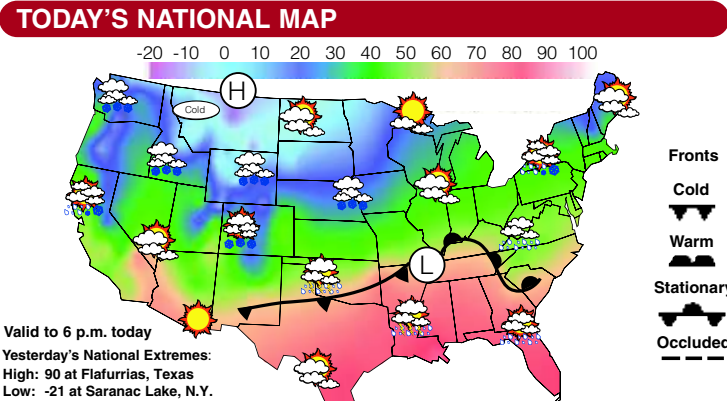

NZ earthquake toll at 76 dead, 238 missing

CHRISTCHURCH, New Zealand — Rescuers broadened their search of collapsed buildings in New Zealand's quake-shattered city of Christchurch on Thursday, as hopes faded of finding any more survivors in the hardest-hit office blocks downtown.

Police said Thursday that up to 120 bodies may still lie trapped in the tangled concrete and steel that was the Canterbury Television building, where dozens of students from Japan, Thailand and other Asian countries were believed buried when an English-language school collapsed along with other offices.

The official death toll from Tuesday's 6.3-magnitude temblor stood at 76, based on the number of bodies that have been recovered from throughout the city and brought to a special morgue. The missing were listed at 238 — though officials stressed that many of those may be safe but not yet accounted for.

"We know there are more bodies yet to be recovered and we are in the process of doing that," police Superintendent Dave Cliff told a news conference Thursday.

Prime Minister John Key declared the quake a national disaster and analysts estimate its cost at up to \$12 billion.

The damaged buildings in and around Christchurch numbered in the thousands, including many of the older structures in Lyttelton, a port town just southeast of the

city and closer to the quake's epicenter. Residents there wandered through the dusty, brick and glass-covered streets, pausing to offer each other hugs and ask the ubiquitous question: "How's your house?"

"It was just horrific," 63-year-old teacher's assistant Kevin Fitzgerald said of Tuesday's quake. "I thought the devil was coming up out of the earth."

The popular Ground deli and cafe was in ruins, hugs slabs of its walls lying on the sidewalk in a jumbled pile. Glass shopfront windows had been blown out

In Christchurch, hundreds of foreign specialists — from the U.S., Britain, Japan, Singapore and Taiwan — arrived to bolster local police and soldiers and allow teams to fan out further afield to smaller buildings not yet checked.

"Now we've got the capability of going out and doing searches in areas where there may still be people trapped that hitherto we haven't been

able to address," Civil Defense Minister John Carters said.

Christchurch police superintendent Russell Gibson said that the last survivor had been pulled out at 2 p.m. Wednesday, and no one had been found trapped in the rubble since. Gibson said the operation had become one of body recovery, though he rejected suggestions that rescuers were abandoning hope of finding anyone alive.

The rescue effort had been concentrating on the Canterbury Television, or CTV, building, and one other downtown block that crumbled to the ground when the temblor struck shortly before 1 p.m., at the height of a busy Tuesday.

Police said Wednesday they had given up hope of finding more survivors at the CTV building and work there shifted from rescue to recovery. Teams pulled four mangled bodies from the rubble overnight, Cliff said earlier today.

He said that "between the late 60s and 120 bodies, at the upper limit," were still in the building.

The King's Education language school, in the CTV building, released a list today on its web site of 141 students and teachers associated with the facility, with at least 37 mostly Asian students missing and presumed in the building.

At least 10 other Asian students were injured and hospitalized, two of them severely injured. The status of an additional 44 teachers and students was unclear.

The Japanese government said 27 Japanese were missing in the quake zone.

JP Morgan analyst Michael Huttner conservatively estimated the insurance losses from the quake at \$12 billion. That would be the most from a natural disaster since Hurricane Ike hit Texas and Louisiana in 2008, costing insurers \$19 billion, according to the Insurance Information Institute.

Key said the New Zealand economy could withstand the impact of the quake, the second to strike Christchurch since September.

"Christchurch's economic activity will be much less for a while," he said. "The government will be doing everything it can to economically get Christchurch back on its feet."

Tuesday's quake was less powerful than the 7.1 temblor that struck before dawn on Sept. 4 that damaged buildings but killed no one. Experts said Tuesday's quake was deadlier because it was closer to the city and because more people were about.

LIBYA Uprising spreads in cities closer to capital where Gadhafi militiamen clamp down

BENGAZI — The scope of Moammar Gadhafi's control was whittled away Wednesday as major Libyan cities and towns closer to the capital fell to the rebellion against his rule. In the east, now all but broken away, the opposition vowed to "liberate" Tripoli, where the Libyan leader is holed up with a force of militiamen roaming the streets and tanks guarding the outskirts.

In a further sign of Gadhafi's faltering hold, two air force pilots — one from the leader's own tribe — parachuted out of their warplane and let it crash into the eastern Libyan desert rather than follow orders to bomb an opposition-held city.

International momentum was building for action to punish Gadhafi's regime for the bloody crackdown it has unleashed against the uprising that began Feb. 15.

WASHINGTON Gov't to no longer defend constitutionality of law banning recognition of same-sex marriage

In a major policy reversal, the Obama administration said Wednesday it will no longer defend the constitutionality of a federal law banning recognition of same-sex marriage.

Attorney General Eric Holder said President Barack Obama has concluded that the administration cannot defend the federal law that defines marriage as only between a man and a woman. He noted that the congressional debate during passage of the Defense of Marriage Act "contains numerous expressions reflecting moral disapproval of gays and lesbians and their intimate and family relationships — precisely the kind of stereotype-based thinking and animus" the Constitution is designed to guard against.

The Justice Department had defended the act in court until now.

Obama condemns violence in Libya, dispatches Clinton for international talks

President Barack Obama on Wednesday condemned the violence in Libya as "outrageous ... and unacceptable" and said he was dispatching Secretary of State Hillary Rodham Clinton to Geneva for international talks aimed at stopping the violence.

Obama said he was studying a "full range of options" to pressure Libyan leader Moammar Gadhafi's regime to halt attacks against Libyans as violent clashes spread throughout the North African country. He said the options included possible sanctions that the U.S. could take with its allies as well as steps it might take by itself.

"We are doing everything we can to protect American citizens," Obama said in brief remarks at the White House, his first public comments after days of violence in Libya. He appeared with Clinton after the two conferred on the situation at the White House. Clinton is traveling to Geneva on Monday for talks on Libya.

Youth visit machine shop in next phase of dune buggy project

Machines grind, sparks fly. They stop, and then:
“Is that too much,” Rachell, a petite 14-year-old wearing goggles and gloves, asked her dad.
“Oh no, you got that right on the nose,” James Allinen replied.
Four other girls, members of the Jerome-based motocross LBZ Racing Team, gathered near but behind the line of sparks at Goold Manufacturing & Machine in Twin Falls. Each of the girls took turns using the hand-held grinder to cut off metal from a part of their dune buggy.
The girls have been a part of the project ever since they came up with the idea last fall to restore and sell a dune buggy to raise money for a youth center. The buggy is still in the restoration stage.
The non-profit center would be similar to a Boys and Girls Club or YMCA, Allinen said, but with a motocross theme. It would offer counseling, tutoring and promote a drug-free lifestyle by getting

them involved in off-road sports.

CROSSING THE FINISH LINE

Correspondent — and hundreds more — participate in Boulder Mountain Tour

SUN VALLEY — Gulp. I'd won a prize in a drawing but I was not sure it was a prize I relished.

A box of chocolates would have been nice.

An invitation to enter the 32-kilometer Boulder Mountain Tour sounded like torture.

But my name had been selected in a drawing of those who entered the Blaine County Recreation District's challenge to ski 200 or more kilometers. And so here I was with an opportunity to ski North America's oldest cross-country ski marathon — one of 13 in the prestigious American Ski Marathon Series.

A racer I am not.

I pitched for my Idaho Statesman softball team for 23 years and quarterbacked my college flag football team for four. But ball control doesn't get you across the finish line.

And while I would make a decent endurance horse, I don't have a single fast-twitch muscle in my body.

I don't own anything in Lycra or Spandex. My 12-year-old skis are like plowhorses. I have one speed. I prefer to ski the outside of curves rather than the faster insides because I like the untouched corduroy on the outside.

I'm perfectly happy to cruise down hills. And I know only one skate ski technique — the V1 that Bill Koch — the first American to win an Olympic medal in Nordic skiing — had shown me while I was interviewing him on the windswept logging road that comprises Bogus Basin's Nordic ski area.

Being a reporter has always given me an excuse not to do the Boulder.

"I have to cover it," I'd tell people, as I prepared to watch the Olympic racers who come from around the world each year to race.

And I've often helped set up the course in sub-zero temperatures just as the frosty dawn was breaking at Galena Lodge.

Maybe it was time for me to see what goes on between the lines, I told myself.

Fine and well, until JoAnn Levy stopped me in my tracks.

"What are you doing to train?" asked Levy, who at 70 has raced in every one of the 36 Boulder Mountain races.

Double gulp. "Ah....."

I'd seen Gabriele Andersen, the Swiss skier best known for making a valiant effort to cross the finish line in the 1984 L.A. Olympics, go up and down the same hill at the Sun Valley Nordic Center over and over as she prepared for the race. But other than that, I didn't have a clue.

But I still had a week to go, I told myself. So I asked Muffy Ritz if I could join one of her VAMPS ski groups for a clinic.

Ritz, who had missed making the U.S. Olympic Nordic team by mere seconds, graciously invited me to join the Super Tramps, a group of uber-women intent on covering the 20-mile track that runs from Galena to Sawtooth National Recreation Headquarters in mach speed.

Rebecca Rusch, America's current mountain bike champion, told us how we needed to spend 50 minutes warming up before we ever started the race.

"I balked at first," she said. "I said I've got to save myself for the race. But if you don't do this beforehand, you'll use the first half-hour of the race to warm up. You might as well be race ready!"

"You want to time your warm-up so you're at the starting line sweaty," added former ski racer Karoline Droege. "If you're warm, you're less likely to be injured. You can react better to falls and you're not so apt to get a cold muscle tear"

The coaches paraded us out on the snow with an exhortation to start out slow before cranking up our speed to what they called Levels 2, 3, 4 and 5.

I could keep up fine for the first two levels, but I had no idea how to go faster.

"Why can't I kick it up a notch?" I asked Coach E.J. Harpham.

"You need some wax on your skis," she replied. "You need to make your V's smaller. You ski on your right side, just bringing your left side along for the ride. ... And ... And ..."

With a couple days left before the race, there wasn't enough time to make any changes but one — I could get my skis waxed.

The next day, I strapped on my ankle bracelet that would trigger the timing at the finish line, fielding a few pointers from Melissa Franzen of Minneapolis, Minn., as I put it on.

"Your first race? Mine, too," said Melissa.

"Her first Boulder," corrected her husband Jeff. "She's done the 50K American Birkebeiner 30 times."

I put on my skis and commenced my warm-up on skate lanes that were already icy, thanks to several hundred pair of skis shooshing along them.

Then I took my place at the back of the mass start, trying to keep from sliding backwards on the slight hill for 20 minutes as several other waves of racers started in front of us.

"What did you do to train?" I asked 31-year-old Cindy Dondero, who was doing her first Boulder.

"I pulled my child around all winter," she said.

Just about that time, the air gun blasted, signaling the start for our wave. I began pushing myself with my poles to the spot where we could begin skate skiing, wishing

that I had done a few push-ups to strengthen my arms.

I hadn't finished double poling down the start of the course before a couple skiers crashed trying to get to the corner. Boxed in by other skiers, there was no where I could go.

Finally, the two skiers got up and I was on my way — the last skier to get out of the starting area.

We crossed the highway heading onto the Harriman Trail. I found myself climbing past other skiers on the hills only to have them pass me on the downhill as I proceeded extra cautiously.

We hit our first sign: "25 kilometers." That's more information than I need to know, I thought. I'd rather have a sign that said "7 kilometers," indicating how far I've come, rather than be reminded of how far I have to go.

At Prairie Creek we hit the first of four aid stations. I stopped, hopeful that a couple bites and a swoosh of liquid would keep me from hitting the wall that racers had warned me about.

I stuck a half banana on one side of my mouth and a brownie in the other, washing the two down with a cup of warm Head energy drink and resumed skiing.

Immediately, nausea washed over me and I felt as if I was going to throw up. No time for that, I told myself as I continued to plug along.

By now, a few banana peels, energy gel packets and even a couple broken ski poles were littering the path. Don't have to worry about slipping on a banana peel, I thought. Not when I'm already on slippery snow.

As the downhill became more mellow, I began to relax. Bad move. My skis skidded out from underneath me as I tried to make a sharp turn on ice as hard as an ice rink. I careened off the course, leaving an indentation of my butt in the snow alongside a couple others.

Next curve the same thing happened. Back to being conservative, I thought.

"11:25," called out a man sitting on a lawn chair near a summer cabin area, signaling that I'd been out there for an hour. "You're doing good."

Tricia Swartling who was racing in her 15th Boulder, had told me earlier in the morning that her teenage daughter Maggie Williams thinks about how hard it is while she's racing.

"But it's a good hard," Williams said. "It makes you

feel so good at the end."

At my singular pace, it didn't feel hard. Instead I felt kind of numb as I moved steadily down the track. I wished I could do a little cruising. But I didn't.

Another aid station up ahead. A woman sitting on the side of the track held out a bottle of beer, which I ignored.

Muffy Ritz teaches her VAMPS how to grab a drink while still skiing and then pitch the cup. But these volunteers weren't holding the cups out where I could do that so I had to make another stop.

I got to the half-way point where a couple hundred more skiers waited to start the Half-Boulder. Just as I did, race officials turned the sit-skiers loose.

"Get over! Get over!" screamed a Paralympian who insisted on passing me just as I was passing another skier on the track wide enough for two.

By this time, the snow was beginning to get slow and grabby. But I pushed on, grateful that I knew this area like the back of my hand thanks to the countless times I'd skied with my dog here.

"1 K" The sign was a welcome beacon. Then, before I knew it, I was over the finish line, completing the course in just over two hours — an hour behind Nordic gold medalist Billy DeMong and the other skiers who had crossed the finish line first.

At the finish line, I grabbed a cup of pumpkin soup, another half-banana, shared in a few stories about the race, then started to board the bus back to Ketchum. Then I thought better of it.

My husband was out there skiing the 15K Half-Boulder on his slower classic skis. And with the party winding down, I didn't want him to have to ski across the finish line alone.

I hitched a ride 10 kilometers up the road to Cathedral Pines, then set out in search of him.

I found him with two other classic skiers in the woods near Murphy Bridge and together we scooted our way down the trail.

By the time we got to the finish line, the tents had been taken down, the soup kitchen packed up.

I would have felt a letdown. But Michael wasn't fazed. He speeded up a tidbit, stuck his ski out over the finish line as he's seen racers do in previous races. Then he grinned from ear to ear.

"That was a great ski," he said. "I want to do that again."

local people," said Goold, referring to the reason why he became involved with the project. "It's good for the kids to see this stuff, where it comes from, what it does. Kids are forgetting about this stuff."

The girls said they're enjoying the experiences their project provides.

"It's nice to be a part of something on a team," said Amber Fultz, 15, of Jerome.

"This is something to help us out not only educational-ly but gives us something to work on for the community," added 15-year-old Maria Burlington, also of Jerome.

Allinen said he'd like to see more boys get involved.

Yeah, said Burlington, with a smile.

Allinen said the buggy — they call the machine a YamahaDuner — will be decked with Yamaha and other

Question: I handled my own bankruptcy case and it is closed. I'm trying to refinance my house, but the bank says there is a lien against my house in favor of one of a creditors I listed in my bankruptcy. What can I do?



Answer: Your creditor sued you and received a court judgment that was then recorded in your county, creating a lien on your home. Although the underlying debt was discharged in your bankruptcy, the lien remains and must be paid or otherwise cleared before your home can be refinanced or sold. In Idaho, you are entitled to a homestead exemption that protects the equity in your home from your creditors. If the judgment lien impairs your exemption, it could have been removed while your bankruptcy case was still open. In order to remove the lien now, your case will need to be reopened, then you will have to file the appropriate motion and documents. This can be a time consuming and expensive process. An experienced bankruptcy attorney can handle this matter easily. It's unfortunate, but what you saved by not using an attorney for your bankruptcy is probably less than you will spend reopening your case and removing the lien now. Bankruptcy is complex. Visitors explore West Yellowstone and its wild nature on snowmobile

WEST YELLOWSTONE — Everything must adapt to survive a Yellowstone National Park winter.

The bison did it millennia ago when they evolved huge heads and shoulder muscles to plow snow off the grass. Randy Roberson did it in 2003, when the National Park Service changed the rules for winter visitor travel.

Roberson owns Yellowstone Vacations, a family business that links hotels, snowmobiles, snow coaches and tourists. He grew up in West Yellowstone, and for 33 years has ridden the shifting economics that left many old motels and restaurants boarded up.

“After 2003, our numbers dropped terrifically,” Roberson said of the winter limits. Where once 13,628 snowmobiles passed the West Yellowstone park entrance in January, now the entire park quota is 318 a day, distributed among all park entrances. Another 78 snow coaches are allowed in daily. That translates to about 420 snowmobile riders (some people ride double) and 1,000 tourists in the coaches.

The difference, both in the town and in the park, is dramatic. West Yellowstone is now allowed 130 snowmobiles a day, and with all those machines powered by quiet four-stroke engines instead of the older, smoky two-stroke models, the atmosphere has

literally changed. It's no longer a cloud of blue exhaust.

“The air is a lot clearer, and it's a lot quieter,” Roberson said. “Even the hard-core snowmobilers tell us how much better it is.”

Many winter visitors like Larry and Pam Schumacher of Riverside, Calif., plan a multi-day trip to West Yellowstone, with one day carved out for exploring the park. The other days are spent riding trails outside the boundary or seeing West's township attractions.

“This is our first trip out here,” Larry said outside the Branding Iron Inn on a bright blue Friday morning. “We drove up in a group of eight. It took two days.”

“We're just going to follow the leaders,” Pam said of their riding skills. It would be the Schumachers' first time on snowmobiles, although other

trip members had done it before.

“Our friend said there used to be hundreds of them in town,” Pam said. “You could hear them all the time.”

“This is the first time he hasn't heard snowmobiles in the morning,” Larry said.

There are 300 miles of groomed trail outside the park, mostly on old logging roads. Those routes are wide open to touring, racing and other kinds of snowmobile activity. They go over the Continental Divide into Idaho. But the big selling point remains a trip into Yellowstone itself, where off-road riding is prohibited.

Just getting to West Yellowstone delivers a hit parade of winter weather weirdness.

“The colder it gets, the less wind we get,” Roberson said. “It got to 35 below a couple days this year. I've seen it at 60

below. But by 10 or 11 a.m., when the sun gets out, it's worth it. You've got the blue skies, and everything's covered with frost — it's all right.”

Because a guide must lead any winter visitor into the park, West Yellowstone mornings have something of a reveille routine around 8 a.m. Snow coaches make the rounds from hotel to hotel, picking up riders. Outside the snowmobile rental shops, renters gather for safety briefings. Once everyone's on a machine, some tour groups rally in a parking lot near the entrance to practice starts and stops before heading into the park.

Yellowstone has always been generous with its scenic wonders, but winter concentrates the experience even more so. That's because most of the roads follow the park's rivers, and the rivers (helped out by numerous hot springs) rarely freeze. So herds of elk and bison stick close to the water.

Just minutes past the entrance gate, a six-by-six bull elk tends to hang out along the Madison River. He browses on grass and moss he finds along the banks. Many more elk use the same tactic farther upstream, but guide Scott Johnson said this is the only big bull that regularly stays close to the border.

Trumpeter swans and their gray-feathered cygnets mingle with Canada geese on the open water, watched over by the occasional bald eagle. As the road enters Madison Canyon, groups of bison become common.

Omar Khayyam calculated the year's length to within 20 seconds

This year February will have 28 days, but next year it will have 29, as proscribed by the arcane rules established by Gregory XIII's papal bull in 1582. Previously, the Julian calendar had attempted to reconcile the fact that the year does not comprise a whole number of days by adding a leap day every four years. The Gregorian calendar, like its predecessor, adds a leap day every four years, but to better approximate the solar year's true length of 365.242190 days, it skips

three leap days every four centuries, resulting in a year length of 365.2425 days, on average.

As impressively small as this error is, a more accurate calendar was devised 500 years earlier by Persian polymath Omar Khayyam.

Today, Khayyam is best remembered as the author of hundreds of quatrains of poetry, known as the Rubaiyat (e.g. “A loaf of bread, a jug of wine, and thou”). Eclipsing Khayyam's poetic prowess, however, are his accomplishments in mathematics and astronomy.

In addition to codifying the principles of algebra in a text that remained in widespread use through the Middle

Ages, Khayyam devised an accurate calendar, instituted in Persia in 1079. Khayyam's calendar added a leap day every four years, but reset the four-year cycle every 33 years, resulting in an average year of 365.242424 days.

While the Gregorian calendar gains an extra day every 3226 years, Khayyam's calendar loses a day, but only after 4269 years.

A further revision to the Gregorian calendar, proposed by 19th century English astronomer John Herschel, skips one leap day every four millennia, reducing the Gregorian calendar's error below Khayyam's. But, by the time 4000 AD rolls around, the increase in the day's length (due to Earth's slowing rotation) will have become sufficiently large to render Herschel's modification superfluous.

Next column: Mercury's first satellite.

Federal officials address a sand wedge issue

IMPERIAL SAND DUNES RECREATION AREA, Calif. — Freed from the confines of Washington, Interior Secretary Ken Salazar on Sunday kicked up his heels in California's Mojave Desert, where he raced across undulating dunes in a suped-up sand rail.

And, perhaps as a reminder of the gridlock he left behind on Capitol Hill, Salazar's vehicle became mired in the sand as he attempted to surmount a steep dune.

The daredevil antics were driven by a serious intent: to reach out to a constituency often antagonistic to federal officials and their management of public lands in the West. To that end, Salazar and Bob Abbey, director of the Bureau of Land Management, toured the Imperial Sand Dunes Recreation Area on a busy holiday weekend.

The pair came to mend political fences by stressing that motorized recreation fits into

the Obama administration's vision of “America's Great Outdoors,” a conservation and health initiative rolled out last week that is heavy on land preservation.

“When we talk about the great outdoors, this is the kind of recreation we are talking about,” Salazar told a group of off-road enthusiasts, raising his voice to be heard above the deep rumbles and high-pitched whines coming from fleets of “sand toys” racing past near the town of Glamis.

That message of inclusion is seldom heard here, a 160,000-acre BLM-managed recreation area for jeeps, dirt bike riders and dune buggy drivers. Also known as Algodones Dunes, the area for years has been the focal point of legal wrangling between off-roaders seeking more acreage to explore and environmentalists demanding protection of the dunes' sensitive plant and animal species.

The Imperial Sand Dunes also carry the lingering repu-

tation as one of the most dangerous off-road recreation areas in the United States. A Thanksgiving weekend gathering draws more than 200,000 people and has led to homicides, traffic fatalities and mass arrests.

Bill Jones, president of the American Desert Foundation, which promotes safe

and environmentally conscious off-roading, said the “criminal element” that used to run roughshod has been largely driven out.

“There were just a bunch of guys out here who thought laws didn't apply to them,” Jones said. “There were areas that were very dangerous. It made families stay away.”

Football player diagnosed with turf toe

DEARDR. GOTT: What is turf toe? Does this happen just to athletes or can anyone get it? How is it treated? One of the football players from the Indianapolis Colts had this condition, and I am curious as to just what it is. Thank you for the information.

DEARREADER: Simply put, turf toe is the overextension of the big toe. When this occurs, there is pain at the bottom of the toe and damage to the ligaments in the area that connects the big toe to the foot. The purpose of ligaments in this area is to prevent excessive movement and allow proper range of joint motion. There are essentially three types of injury, ranging from mild to severe. The first involves stretching of the ligaments and joint; the second involves a partial tear; and the third and most severe is a

complete tear. In the past, the condition was rather uncommon; however, with the use of artificial turf becoming so popular on football, soccer and rugby fields, the incidence of injury has increased. Runners also subject their toes to similar issues when they lean forward and push off from a starting line at the beginning of a race. When a shoe sticks to the fake grass, the body lunges forward, a foot jams to the front of a cleated shoe, and the toe can extend beyond its normal range. One incident can cause turf toe, but numerous injuries multiply the probability

of damage. Symptoms include localized pain, swelling and restricted movement. Mild conditions may produce minimal damage to the toe. More severe cases will result in damage of the area of bone beneath the surface of the joint, to the cartilage or to both. These are the injuries that can be observed on X-ray. Treatment involves the use of ice, tape or bandage to restrict movement, and pain relief through NSAIDs (nonsteroidal anti-inflammatory drugs). Contrast baths of cold then hot water can be successful when used during early stages of the injury. With treatment, the injury commonly heals in three to four weeks. **DEARDR. GOTT:** I am 60 years old. I have noticed an increasingly foul body odor.

Truly, it is embarrassing. My skin seems to have an almost rotting, sewer-like odor. This is not vaginal but a distressing internal and external odor. I smell like something is rotting inside me. Can you offer any ideas about this? **DEARREADER:** Body odor and sweat stem primarily from our body’s sweat glands. The body has up to 4 million sweat glands, broken into two types — eccrine and apocrine. Eccrine glands open onto the surface of the skin. When body temperature rises, our autonomic nervous system stimulates eccrine glands located over most of the body. They secrete fluid onto the surface of the skin, where it cools and evaporates. Eccrine glands regulate our body temperature. Apocrine glands are located in the groin, scalp, armpits,

breasts and other locations of the body. They secrete a fatty sweat that is forced to the skin’s surface, where bacteria break it down. It is often this breakdown of bacteria that causes odor. Beyond this, medical conditions such as diabetes, liver or kidney disease, hyperhidrosis, hyperthyroidism and low blood sugar can be to blame. It may help to keep a journal of activities, foods and periods of stress to share with your doctor. Perhaps relaxation techniques, weight loss if appropriate, diet change, daily use of antibacterial soap, underarm shaving, deodorants or antiperspirants, and meticulous attention to hygiene might help. Avoid garlic, curry and other spicy foods that make sweat more pungent. Remove your shoes and your socks when at home. If

you have calluses or patches of dry skin on your feet, remove them with a pumice stone. Bacteria thrive on dead skin. Change your socks daily. Add alcohol or white vinegar to a cup of water to rinse your underarms when you bathe. If you bathe instead of shower, add a few drops of rose water to the tub. Apply baking soda to your underarms and feet. If you use over-the-counter herbs or prescription medication, ask your physician if they are contributing to the odor.

Dwayne McDuffie, comic book and animation writer, dies at 49

LOS ANGELES — Dwayne McDuffie, a highly respected comic book and animation writer who was a co-founder of Milestone Media, a landmark company that created a multicultural comics line that introduced black superheroes such as Hardware and Static, has died. He was 49.

McDuffie died Monday, a day after his birthday, of complications after undergoing emergency heart surgery at Providence St. Joseph Medical Center in Burbank, said Gary Miereanu, a publicist for Warner Home Video.

As a comic book writer, McDuffie had stints working on DC's “Batman: Legends of the Dark Knight” and “Justice League of America,” and for Marvel's “Fantastic Four.”

As a television writer, story editor and producer for animated series, he had credits on “What's New, Scooby-Doo?” “Teen Titans,” “Static Shock,” “Justice League,” “Ben 10: Alien Force” and “Ben 10: Ultimate Alien.”

He also wrote the screenplay for “All-Star Superman,” an animated film released Tuesday by Warner Home Video, and the second of three he wrote for the series, “DC Universe Animated Original Movies.”

“Dwayne McDuffie left a lasting legacy on the world of comics that many writers can only aspire to,” Dan DiDio, co-publisher of DC Entertainment, said in a statement.

“He will not only be remembered as the extremely gifted writer whose scripts have been realized as comic books, in television shows

and on the silver screen, but as the creator or co-creator of so many of the much-loved Milestone characters including Static Shock.

“The industry has lost a true talent.”

McDuffie launched his career in 1987 as a special comics editor for Marvel Comics.

At Marvel, he wrote for Spider-Man and other major characters and co-created the limited series Damage Control, about a company that repairs the property damage caused by battles between superheroes and super-villains.

In 1992, two years after leaving Marvel to freelance full time as a comic book writer, McDuffie co-founded Milestone Media, whose comic books were distributed by DC Comics.

When he was a child in Detroit, McDuffie recalled

in a 1996 interview with The Detroit Free Press, “there were only two comic strips that had black leading characters. When we got together to form our company, there were still only two — 20 years later. We felt there should be more diversity.”

In addition to celebrating diversity, the Free Press reported that McDuffie also wanted to subtly teach important lessons and values, as well as having his characters confront the kind of problems faced by his readers.

“I try to put superheroes in situations where being strong, or being able to fly or fight aren't the answers,” McDuffie said. “We've dealt with teen pregnancy, abortion, racism and anti-Semitism. Being able to hit somebody harder doesn't help you deal with that.”

"I'm happy for her," said CSI head coach Randy Rogers. "What a tough kid to come back from a knee injury and knee surgery. ... You can see it in her eyes how bad she want it."

Jazz guard traded to Nets in three-team deal

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — The New Jersey Nets finally landed a big-name All-Star in a blockbuster trade that gives them point guard Deron Williams and sends rookie Derrick Favors and point guard Devin Harris to the Utah Jazz.

The Jazz also will receive the Nets' first-round pick in 2011, which could be a lottery pick, cash, and Golden State's 2012 first-round draft pick.

“I feel Deron Williams is the best point guard in the NBA,” Nets general manager Billy King said in officially announcing the blockbuster deal Wednesday afternoon.

“I spoke with Deron and he's excited about it. He understands where we are and where we want to go. In this league, you win with point guards. Jason Kidd turned this franchise around when he came and we feel Deron can do the same thing.”

The Nets now hope Williams will sign a contract extension with them, which they can offer this summer. If so, he would become the face of their franchise when they move into their new arena in Brooklyn for the 2012-13 season.

The 6-foot-3 Williams was selected third overall in the first round of the 2005 NBA draft by Utah from Illinois. He is in his sixth NBA season and holds career averages of 17.3 points, 3.2 rebounds and 9.1 assists.

In 439 career games, including 406 starts, he has shot .466 from the field, .358 from 3-point range and .808 from the free throw line. In 44 career postseason games, Williams has averaged 21.1 points, 3.7 rebounds, 9.6 assists and 1.2 steals.

The deal came two days after the Nets failed to land Carmelo Anthony, who was acquired by the New York Knicks as part of a blockbuster deal with the Denver Nuggets.

Jazz CEO Greg Miller said he made the move because of a “gut feeling” that he wouldn't be able to sign Williams to a long-term

deal after next season.

“If you look at what happened with Phoenix, Toronto and Cleveland ... they all lost their marquee player and had very little if anything to show for it,” Miller said. “This trade allows us to be competitive now and beyond the 2012 season.”

Asked how he would be able to market a team in Salt Lake City without a star, Miller said with “classic Jazz basketball.”

“It's lunchpail, work boots ... and everybody's got to overachieve, which we've been known to do for many years,” Miller said. “And who knows, we may have a star player before any of us realizes it.”

Harris, a former All-Star point guard, and Favors, the No. 3 pick in the draft, were part of the package the Nets were offering the Nuggets all season for Anthony.

“Everybody was talking about getting longer and athletic and when are you going to get one of these guys,” said Jazz GM Kevin O'Connor, who hinted that he may not be done dealing before Thursday afternoon's trade deadline. “We got one now (in Favors) and we'll see how he progresses. He's not a finished product but at least it's somebody we can build on.”

Both GMs said they discussed a deal several weeks ago, but it only came to fruition after the Nets lost out on Anthony.

O'Connor acknowledged cash was part of the deal and that the maximum that can change hands is \$3 million.

The Jazz were a perennial contender with Williams, but his reputation took a hit when Hall of Fame coach Jerry Sloan retired one day after clashing with him during a game.

Sloan, reached Wednesday morning at his second home in Illinois, was aware of the trade but didn't want to say much.

“I have no reaction to what the Jazz are doing. We wish him well,” Sloan said of Williams. “We wish the Jazz well. Good luck to Deron.”

Woods knocked out in first round

MARANA, Ariz. (AP) — The slow road back for Tiger Woods took another detour Wednesday when he followed a clutch birdie with a shocking shot into the desert and lost to Thomas Bjorn in the first round of the Match Play Championship.

It was only the second time that Woods, the No. 3 seed, had been eliminated in the first round.

But this was stunning even to Woods.

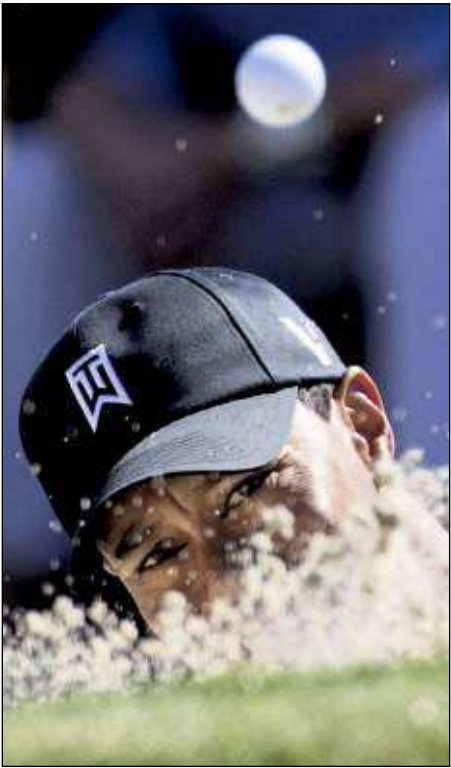
Moments after he made an 8-foot birdie putt on the 18th hole to extend the match, he hit a 3-wood so far to the right that it landed in a desert bush. It took two shots just to get it back onto the grass. After badly missing an 18-foot bogey putt, he conceded to Bjorn.

"I blew it," Woods said.

Twice he had simple chips on the back nine and failed to convert them into birdies, losing his lead on the 13th and falling behind on the 15th. He missed a 10-foot birdie on the 17th that he figured he should make "every time."

And then came No. 1, the first extra hole.

"It's easy to put the ball in the fairway and I couldn't

even do that," Woods said, so visibly upset that he was stumbling over his words.

The other top seeds didn't have that much trouble.

Top-ranked Lee Westwood never trailed in his 3-and-2 victory over Henrik Stenson, while PGA champion Martin Kaymer had the shortest match of the opening round, a 7-and-6 win

over 19-year-old Seung-yul Noh of South Korea.

Phil Mickelson, the No. 4 seed who only decided to play this World Golf Championship two weeks ago, won 6-and-5 over Brendan Jones.

Woods had some company in going home early.

The Americans had four of the top 10 seeds at Dove

Mountain, and Mickelson is the only one left. Matteo Manassero, the 17-year-old Italian, became the youngest winner in this tournament with a 2-and-1 victory over eighth-seeded Steve Stricker, while Jim Furyk (No. 10) continued his struggles in losing to Ryan Palmer, who was making his Match Play debut.

The wild first day finally ended with a record eight matches going into extra holes, and four others going the distance. Of the 32 players remaining, 13 are Americans, 13 are Europeans and two each are from Australia, South Africa and Asia.

Coming off the worst season of his career, most of that from the crisis in his personal life, Woods does not appear to be making quick progress. Through three tournaments this year, he has failed to crack the top 20.

Woods keeps talking about needing more repetition as he works on a new swing, although he is not playing more tournaments. Asked if he might add the Honda Classic, Woods replied, "Probably now is not the time to ask me right now."

Fredette, No. 7 BYU fight past Colorado St.

PROVO, Utah — Jimmer Fredette overcame 9-for-26 shooting to score 34 points and Brandon Davies added 14 points and 15 rebounds to lead No. 7 BYU over Colorado State 84-76 on Wednesday night.

Fredette and Davies combined to score 26 points from the free throw line in a rough game that featured 52 fouls and 69 free throws. Fredette hit 14 of 16, while Davies was 12 of 16 from the line. BYU also had a 48-29 rebounding edge.

The Cougars (26-2, 12-1 Mountain West Conference) took a 14-point lead midway through the first half before the Rams (18-9, 8-5) got within 48-46 in the second half. Andy Ogide had 25 points and eight rebounds, and Adam Nigon added 14 points for CSU, including four 3-pointers.

NCAA pegs Pearl, Kiffin, Tennessee for violations

KNOXVILLE, Tenn. — The NCAA says both Tennessee basketball coach Bruce Pearl and former football coach Lane Kiffin committed recruiting violations and failed to promote an atmosphere of compliance of NCAA rules within their programs.

Following its 22-month investigation of the athletic program, the NCAA notified Tennessee of a dozen rules violations by the coaches, their assistants and the university itself in a letter released by the school on Wednesday. Kiffin, who is now at Southern California, received a separate notice of the allegations against him.

Tennessee's baseball program was included in the investigation, but was not accused of any violations.

The university has until May 21 to respond to the NCAA's allegations and is expected to appear at a June 10-11 meeting of the Committee on Infractions. A final decision by the NCAA and any sanctions likely

would come several weeks after that.

Pearl has been charged with unethical conduct after misleading NCAA investigators in a June 14 interview about hosting high school juniors at a cookout at his house on Sept. 20, 2008, and phoning John Craft, father of recruit Aaron Craft, during the probe in an effort to influence Craft's statement to investigators about the cookout. Craft is now a freshman at Ohio State.

Kiffin and his assistants are also accused of making improper phone calls to recruits even after Tennessee officials had warned them against making such phone calls. Kiffin made impermissible phone calls to recruits from Jan. 3-9, 2010, just days before ending his 14-month tenure at Tennessee and leaving for USC. Among the recipients of the calls was Seantrel Henderson, who signed with USC after Kiffin was hired but was later released from his commitment.

A STATISTICAL ANOMALY: CALTECH WINS LEAGUE GAME

PASADENA, Calif. — The end of Caltech's 310-game conference losing streak spanning 26 years was so big, even school president Jean-Lou Chameau rushed the court to celebrate.

A day later, the two old-time scoreboards in tiny Braun Gym remained lit up with the result: Home 46, Visitor 45.

Call it Revenge of the Nerds.

The Division III Beavers beat Occidental College in their season finale Tuesday night, giving Caltech its first Southern California Intercollegiate Athletic Conference victory since Jan. 23, 1985, when the Beavers defeated LaVerne 48-47.

The hero of the game was Ryan Elmquist, who hit the first of two free throws with three seconds left. He missed the second and Occidental snagged the rebound, but a desperation shot from beyond half-

court missed.

Elmquist, a senior from Woodbury, Minn., had a game-high 23 points, nine rebounds and four blocked shots playing all 40 minutes of his final college game. Todd Cramer added 10 points and seven rebounds as one of two other starters who also played the entire game.

Today's Highlight:
On Feb. 24, 1761, Boston lawyer James Otis Jr. went to court to argue against "writs of assistance" that allowed British customs officers to arbitrarily search people's premises; citing English common law, Otis declared: "A man's house is his castle!" (Although Otis lost the case, his statement provided a source of inspiration for American independence.)

TODAY IN HISTORY

On this date:
In 1582, Pope Gregory XIII issued a papal bull, or edict, outlining his calendar reforms. (The Gregorian Calendar is the calendar in general use today.)

In 1711, the opera "Rinaldo" by George Frideric Handel premiered in London.

In 1803, in its Marbury v. Madison decision, the Supreme Court established judicial review of the constitutionality of statutes.

In 1821, Mexican rebels proclaimed the "Plan de Iguala," their declaration of independence from Spain.

In 1863, Arizona was organized as a territory.

In 1868, the House of Representatives impeached President Andrew Johnson following his attempted dismissal of Secretary of War Edwin M. Stanton; Johnson was later acquitted by the Senate.

In 1920, the German Workers Party, which later became the Nazi Party, met in Munich to adopt its platform.

In 1942, the Voice of America went on the air for the first time.

In 1961, the Federal Communications Commission authorized the nation's first full-scale trial of pay television in Hartford, Conn.

In 1981, Buckingham Palace announced the engagement of Britain's Prince Charles to Lady Diana Spencer. A jury in White Plains, N.Y., found Jean Harris guilty of second-degree murder in the fatal shooting of "Scarsdale Diet" author Dr. Herman Tarnower. (Sentenced to 15 years to life in prison, Harris was granted clemency by New York Gov. Mario Cuomo in Dec. 1992.)

Ten years ago: In an amicable first meeting held in Jerusalem, Secretary of State Colin Powell and Russian Foreign Minister Igor Ivanov pledged a constructive approach to dealing with Iraq, missile defenses and other points of policy discord. Mathematician and computer scientist Claude Shannon, whose theories about binary code became the basis for modern mass communications networks, died in Medford, Mass., at age 84.

Five years ago: Suicide bombers attempted to drive explosive-packed cars into the world's largest oil processing facility in Saudi Arabia, but were foiled by guards who opened fire, detonating both vehicles; al-Qaida claimed responsibility. Julia Mancuso won gold in the women's giant slalom at the Turin Olympics. Death claimed actors Don Knotts in Los Angeles and Dennis Weaver in Ridgway, Colo.; both were 81.

One year ago: Testifying before Congress, Toyota CEO Akio Toyoda apologized personally and repeatedly to the United States and millions of American Toyota owners for safety lapses that had led to deaths and widespread recalls. Trainer Dawn Brancheau was dragged to her death by a killer whale, Tilikum, at SeaWorld in Orlando, Fla.

Three of the players who habitually make up the rubber game at the Dyspeptics Club have long believed that South is an accomplished practitioner of the black arts. What else but witchcraft could explain the rock-crushers that he picks up with such frequency?

South's complacent response — that he simply gets more out of his cards — frequently makes North choke on his medicinal vodka and tonic. And deals such as today's weaken South's case.

He declared three no-trump on the lead of a low club to East's king and a club continuation. Winning the second club, South next took the heart finesse. West won, ran the clubs, then exited with a diamond. South took this in hand, cashed the heart ace in case the jack fell, then took the rest of the diamonds, eventually trying the spade finesse. When it lost, South lamented that an unlucky combination of circumstances had defeated him. North snorted and caustically commented that perhaps a 100 percent line had not been good enough for him. Can you see what he was getting at?

North had fractionally overstated his case, but nonetheless the contract could not be defeated as the cards lay. The winning line is for South to take the second club, cash two rounds of diamonds, then exit with a club. West can take his winners, but must then lead a major suit and concede the ninth trick.

With strong trump support and three apparently working honor cards, not to mention a ruffing value, do not hang back by raising to three spades. Since you know you want to play in game, just up and bid four spades.
