# Former U.S. Sen. James **McClure of Idaho dies**

BOISE - Former U.S. Sen. James McClure, who spent six years as chairman of the Energy Committee and fought to keep Idaho's wilderness areas controlled by the state, has died. He was 86.

McClure, a Republican who served 24 years in Congress, died Saturday, according to the McClure Center for Public Policy Research at the University of

Idaho. His family said he died of complications from a series of strokes.

"Jim McClure set a standard for public servants that will endure for gen-

erations," U.S. Sen. Mike Crapo, R-Idaho, said in a statement Sunday. "His unfailing goodwill and respect for others, together with his essential western conservatism, are still the best model for how to engage today's public policy debates."

U.S. Sen. Jim Risch, R-Idaho, called McClure a "principled conservative" who could work with all people to find solutions on difficult issues.

"Idaho has lost a great statesman," Risch said.

McClure earned a reputation as a nuts-and-bolts legislative craftsman while in Congress and was genial but reserved among most colleagues. He was elected to the U.S. House in 1966, staying there until his election to the U.S. Senate in 1972, where he eventually became the head of the Energy Committee.

After six years in the seat, he lost the chairmanship when the Democratic majority took Congress in 1987. And though he fought to reduce federal control over wilderness in Idaho and throughout the West – hoping to free the land for economic development - in 1980 the federal government created the River of No Return Wilderness over his objections.

Still, McClure's tenure was not without victories. During the Cold War, McClure was instrumental in persuading President Reagan in 1986 to abandon the unratified Strategic Arms Limitation Talks Agreement II in the wake of Soviet violations, according to "Politics



Jeff Gordon celebrates his win in the NASCAR Sprint Cup Series auto race at Phoenix International Raceway on Sunday.



# Lockout could leave NFL rookies with big challenge

**INDIANAPOLIS** Florida defensive back Ahmad Black would prefer to focus on football.

Instead, he's getting a crash course in labor negotiations, lockout rules, even the possible implementation of a rookie wage scale.

These new obstacles are threatening to make the transition from college football to the NFL more complicated than usual, even if the players don't want to admit it.

"Hey, it's better than doing it for free," Black said Sunday at the NFL's annual scouting combine. "I'm going to get a little bit of something (in a contract)." Black, like most of the

329 draft prospects in Indianapolis this weekend, is trying to stay away from the discussion that has overshadowed one of the league's biggest and busiest offseason events. Normally, the discussion in Indv centers on 40-yard dash times and bench press repetitions. This year, the showcase has expanded to multiple venues. There's been a steady stream of meetings in hotel hallways, at the convention center, even at the Colts' complex. Everyone from owners to coaches to agents have been briefed about negotiations that could avert the looming lockout, which could begin Friday.

They're all at different points, but they're going to have to develop. If it's going to be an issue, though, it's going to be an issue for everybody."

That's not necessarily what the players want to hear.

"I don't think it would set us back," Miami cornerback DeMarcus Van Dyke said. "It would make us hungrier when we get into camp. It will probably cut down all the long contracts and just get guys right into camp."

But it could affect how much of an impact the rookies make next season.

Without a playbook and minicamps, the learning curve likely will get steeper. And history has shown how tough it can be.

If the expected lockout begins, teams will be prohibited from communicating with veterans or negotiating player contracts. Free agency will be put on hold and teams cannot cut players from their current rosters.

Rookies, however, will still have their regularly scheduled pro days, still be able to interview with team officials and still get picked in April's draft.

That's when the landscape changes for the rookies.

They will not be able to negotiate deals until a new CBA is in place, and, perhaps more importantly, will not be allowed to get playbooks, go through the usual minicamps or the team's offseason workouts.

Some analysts suggest it's enough to make this a lost draft class. NFL officials disagree.

"It's difficult being a rookie as it is," Kansas City Chiefs general manager Scott Pioli said. "I think it's really up to the individual.

State running back Maurice Clarett didn't even make the

Denver roster after missing two college seasons, and former Southern California receiver Mike Williams, another former first-round pick, had only 44 catches in his first three NFL seasons after sitting out the 2004 season.

The players in Indy want to avoid those mistakes.

# Hall of Fame center fielder **Duke Snider** dies at age 84

Duke Snider, the Hall of Fame center fielder for the charmed "Boys of Summer" who helped the Dodgers bring their elusive and only World Series crown to Brooklyn, died Sunday. He was 84.

Snider died at the Valle Vista Convalescent Hospital in Escondido, Calif., said the National Baseball Hall of Fame and Museum. which announced the death on behalf of the family. Snider had been ill for months. His family said he died of natural causes.

"The Duke of Flatbush" hit .295 with 407 career home runs, played in the World Series six times and won two titles. But the eight-time All-Star was defined by much more than his stats – he was, after all, part of the love affair between the borough of Brooklyn and "Dem Bums" who lived in the local neighborhoods.

Ebbets Field was filled with stars such as Pee Wee Reese, Roy Campanella and Gil Hodges during that 1955 championship season. Yet it is Snider's name that refrains in the ballpark favorite "Talkin' Baseball."

"Willie, Mickey, and the Duke," goes the popular song, which marks its 30th anniversary this year.

Snider wore No. 4 in Dodger blue and was often regarded as the third-best center fielder in New York - behind Willie Mays of the Giants and Mickey Mantle of the Yankees – during what many fans considered the city's golden era of baseball.

"The newspapers compared Willie, Mickey and I, and that was their thing," ago. "As a team, we com-World Series. So we had a

He lost to Campanella by a very narrow margin – it later turned out an ill voter left Snider off the ballot, supposedly by mistake.





# Lots of money at stake in ed reform – and too few answers

ometime today or Tuesday, the Idaho Senate Education Committee will sit down and start deconstructing the centerpiece of Superintendent of Public Instruction Tom Luna's sweeping education reform plan.

It's got its work cut out.

Senate Bill 1113, which was approved by the same committee earlier this month, calls for increasing class sizes in grades 4-12 and cutting 770 teaching jobs in the next two years. It would redirect millions of dollars into technology upgrades, a laptop computer for every high school student, online courses and teacher performance pay.

The legislation was pulled back last week amid concerns in the Senate about raising school class sizes. The other two pieces of Luna's Students Come First initiative — SB1108, reducing Idaho teachers' contract rights, and SB1110, setting up the performance-pay plan — both passed the Senate on Thursday.

Serious questions remain about the provisions of SB1113, and the technology aspect is especially vexing. We wonder how many IT positions have been cut in school districts across Idaho over the past two years and whether the legislation will provide money to bring back enough specialists to make all that expensive new classroom hardware and software work consistently.

And there are potential ethical issues.

Luna's plan would funnel millions of taxpayer dollars to private-sector providers of online courses. As the *Idaho Statesman* and The Associated Press reported earlier this month, the superintendent has long known and worked with individuals who stand to benefit financially from his reform proposal.

Some of them have contributed to Luna's political campaigns.

Consider K12 Inc., a Virginia-based online company with 81,000 students and operator of the Idaho Virtual Academy. In Idaho, IVA enrolls 2,930 students and received \$12.8 million from the state in fiscal 2010. K12, its employees and major stockholders spent about \$44,000 supporting Luna; \$25,000 of that was funneled to an Idaho interest group for independent advertising on Luna's behalf.

K12, whose co-founder and major stakeholder is former junk-bond king Michael Milken, also has financial ties to the J.A. and Kathryn Albertson Foundation, which ran full-page newspaper ads statewide in support of the Luna plan. Former state Sen. Laird Noh, a Kimberly Republican who retired in 2004 after 24 years in the Legislature, told the Statesman he fears privatization will twist policy to the detriment of students. "It reminds me very much of President Eisenhower's warning to beware of the military-industrial complex," said Noh, who clashed with K12 Inc. while in the Senate. "It seems to me that what we're seeing here is the educational-industrial complex that's operating behind the scenes, with people like Rupert Murdoch. They are interested in the millions of dollars, frequently taxpayer dollars, which they can glean through the political process." Under Luna's proposal, school districts could designate the required online courses that students must take, but not the providers of those classes. Yet the districts – and by that we mean the taxpayers – would still have to pay for them. There's a lot of your money on the table here. And it's not clear how it would be spent, and with whom. We agree with Sen. Shawn Keough, R-Sandpoint, that these issues should have been discussed before Luna sprang his sprawling reform package on the Legislature on Jan. 12. So now the Senate Education Committee must act in haste. Let's hope Idaho's taxpayers don't spend the years ahead repenting in leisure.

# If the government shuts down, so be it

he Washington establishment believes that the government shutdown of 1995 was a disastrous mistake that accomplished little and cost House Republicans politically. The facts are exactly the

opposite. While the shutdown produced some short-term pain, it set the stage for a budget deal in 1996 that led to the largest drop in federal discretionary spending since 1969. The discipline imposed by this budget — overall spending grew at an average of 2.9 percent a year while I was speaker of the House, the slowest rate in decades — allowed us to reach a balancedbudget deal in 1997.




This would all have been impossible had Republicans not stood firm in 1995 and shown the American people (and the White House) that we were serious about reducing spending.

This historic success was not an achievement of the Clinton administration. In the summer of 1995, administration officials publicly expressed doubt that our aggressive timeline for a balanced budget was even possible. Instead, the balanced budget was an outcome driven by House Republicans with limited support from skeptical Senate Republicans.

How did it happen? In the spring of 1995, House Republicans passed a constitutional amendment requiring a balanced budget. Seventy-two Democrats joined us, giving us the required two-thirds majority to amend the Constitution. Unfortunately, the Senate failed to reach this threshold by one vote.

At a three-hour leadership dinner shortly thereafter, House Republicans, including Texas's Bill Archer of the Ways and Means Committee, Louisiana's Bob Livingston of the Appropriations Committee and, most important, Ohio's John Kasich of the Budget Committee, agreed that we were at a crossroads. A typical group of politicians would have decided that we had technically kept

our word in the Contract With America by holding the vote on the balanced-budget amendment, so it was now okay to revert to politics-asusual and continue deficit spending.

But we weren't interested in procedural success. We were elected to deliver results. So the House Republican leadership decided that we would voluntarily balance the budget, even without an amendment.

Our constitutional amendment would have set a seven-year deadline to balance the budget. We adopted the same timetable and created a plan that would end deficit spending by 2002. As we developed the reforms and spending cuts, Sen. Connie Mack, R-Fla., and Rep. John Porter, R-Ill., encouraged us to be smart rather National Institutes of Health and increased defense and intelligence funding.

The crisis came late in 1995, when the Clinton White House and Senate Democrats set out to test our seriousness. They made a calculated, cynical decision to use the threat of a presidential veto — which would close the government — to insist that we drop our balanced budget.

Those who claim that the shutdown was politically disastrous for Republicans ignore the fact that our House seat losses in 1996 were in the single digits. Moreover, it was the first time in 68 years that Republicans were reelected to a House majority – and the first time that had ever happened with a Democrat winning the presidency.

Neither these historic achievements nor this historic win would have been possible had Republicans not stood firm and showed the country that we were serious about keeping our commitments. Work to keep the government open, unless it requires breaking your word to the American people and giving up your principles. Becoming one more promise-breaking, Washington-dominated, sellout group is a much worse fate — politically and ethically — than having the government close for a few days.

House Republicans should give President Obama the opportunity to sign significant spending reductions and keep the government open, or to veto their cuts and close the government. Similarly, they should give Senate Democrats a chance to accept real spending reductions or make clear that it is their stubborn liberalism that is closing the government.

Another shutdown of the federal government is not an ideal result, but for House Republicans, breaking their word would be far worse.



#### WISCONSIN **Officials decide not** to evict protesters from Capitol

MADISON – Wisconsin authorities backed away Sunday from a threat to evict hundreds of labor-rights demonstrators who have occupied the state Capitol for nearly two weeks.

Union members, students and activists staged the sleep-in to dramatize opposition to Republican Gov. Scott Walker's attempt to eliminate collective bargaining for most government workers.

The state Department of Administration had announced Friday that the Capitol would close at 4 p.m. Sunday for cleaning and reopen at 8 a.m. Monday. As the deadline approached, some demonstrators left. But hundreds remained, preparing for arrest.

About 7 p.m., Capitol Police Chief Charles Tubbs said the remaining protesters could stay the night as long as they otherwise continued to abide by laws.

The Capitol sleep-in has been almost uniformly peaceful, with only a few arrests on minor charges, Tubbs said. Many police are sympathetic to the protesters' cause, although most public safety employees are exempt from the bill.

#### **CALIFORNIA** 'King's Speech' wins best-picture Oscar

LOS ANGELES — "The King's Speech" has been crowned best picture at an Academy Awards ceremony as precise as a state coronation, the monarchy drama leading as expected with four Oscars and predictable favorites claiming acting honors.

Colin Firth as stammering British ruler George VI in "The King's Speech" earned the bestactor prize Sunday, while Natalie Portman won best actress as a delusional ballerina in "Black Swan."

The boxing drama "The Fighter" claimed both supporting-acting honors, for Christian Bale as a boxer-turned-drugabuser and Melissa Leo as a boxing clan's domineering matriarch.

"The King's Speech" also won the directing prize for Tom Hooper and the original-screenplay Oscar for David Seidler, a boyhood stutterer himself.

Cain won 22 percent support from the audience in Phoenix at the summit organized by the Tea Party Patriots. He was followed by Minnesota Gov. Tim Pawlentv and Paul among those casting ballots in person.

Paul had the most votes overall, thanks to a swell of support from online voters. Between the two sets of results, there were about 1,600 votes. Paul gathered more than one-third of them.

Pawlenty and former Alaska Gov. Sarah Palin each had 9 percent overall. Cain, Paul and Pawlenty were the only three to speak at the three-day summit.

#### OREGON Congressman explains mental health issues

PORTLAND - An Oregon congressman whose erratic behavior has recently prompted calls for his resignation said Sunday that some of his actions could be attributed to a reaction to mental health drugs.

U.S. Rep. David Wu told The Associated Press, however, that it does not explain the behavior documented in reports over the last month, which included sending his staff photos of himself wearing a tiger costume.

Wu said he was hospitalized after his 2008 campaign for symptoms that were later diagnosed as a reaction to common mental health drugs. A spokesman, Erik Dorey, identified them as the sleep-aid drug Ambien and a generic form of Valium, which he said Wu used for anxiety and stress.


Wood River Valley for almost ents. wonderful 97 years. Woodrow Wilson was president of the United States when she was born.

#### LIBYA Gadhafi loses another city to Libyan opposition

BENGHAZI Moammar Gadhafi's tenuous grip on Libya was further loosened when the city closest to the capital fell under the control of rebel forces, leaving Tripoli encircled by opponents determined to topple the dictator's 41-year regime.

Zawiya, a city of 210,000 just 30 miles west of Tripoli, was shaping up to be a potential focal point for clashes as anti-government forces with tanks and antiaircraft guns massed throughout the city center Sunday, and Gadhafi forces surrounded the outskirts with tanks and military checkpoints, residents said.

From the east, small bands of armed men traveled in the direction of the capital from Benghazi. the city that gave birth to the 11day uprising.

"This standoff may drag on for some time, and it may become much, much uglier," said Paul Sullivan, a regional expert at Georgetown University who has studied Libya for years. "The international community is going to continue to be placed in a very difficult position."

#### **NEW ZEALAND** Infant is first quake victim laid to rest

CHRISTCHURCH - A 5-monthold boy was laid to rest Monday at the first funeral for victims of New Zealand's devastating earth-

quake, as the death toll rose to 148 and the government said the economic cost could be \$15 billion.

Dozens of family and friends gathered at a small chapel in the stricken city of Christchurch for Baxtor Gowland, who was sleeping at home when he was struck by masonry shaken loose by the magnitude 6.3 quake last Tuesday. He died in a hospital, the family said in a statement read to The Associated Press by the child's great-uncle, Peter Croft.

Inside the chapel, a slideshow of the smiling infant's photographs flashed on a screen, as Sarah McLachlan's song "Angel" echoed throughout the room.

Authorities have named just eight victims of last week's disaster – Gowland and another infant among them.

#### MEXICO Forces nab 2 more suspects in slaying of U.S. agent

MEXICO CITY – Mexican authorities on Sunday arrested two alleged members of the Zetas drug cartel they say are linked to the killing of a U.S. immigration agent, including a boss of the man suspected of carrying out the attack

Mexican marines arrested Sergio Mora, an alleged regional leader of the Zetas, in the northern city of Saltillo, along with five other suspects, the navy said in a brief statement.



Between 6 percent and 8 percent of men and 15 percent to 18 percent of women experience migraines each year, according to the World Health Organization. Statistics vary country to country: In Turkey, 10 percent of men and 22 percent of women experience migraines, while in Asian countries, 3 percent of men and 10 percent of women do.

Why do women have it worse? Blame it on the hormones.

The medical community is still trying to understand migraines, said Dr. Bradford Talcott of Eastern Idaho Neurologist Associates in Idaho Falls. It does know a migraine isn't just а headache: The signature pain is more of a symptom of a bigger neurological event that can also cause nausea, sensitivity to light and sound, numbness, temporary paralysis and aphasia.

The causes of migraines aren't known, but Talcott said most of his colleagues believe hyperactive nerves in the brain are to blame. Some people are genetically predisposed, Talcott said, and a migraine can occur when those nerves are set off by triggers like alcohol or lack of sleep.

Eckles, of Filer, has had migraines since he was 4.

"I am talking about loss of half of my eyesight for about an hour, followed by pain that is so intense that even the bones I have broken in my life do not compare," Eckles, 35, wrote in an e-mail to the Times-News. The migraines hit about once a month and put him out of commission for up to three days at a time. He tries to sleep through the pain and nausea, and spends his time in a dark room to minimize the pain.

She visited an allergist to confirm her suspicions and found she was allergic to latex. Many foods. like avocados and cantaloupe, cause reactions in people who have latex allergies. Once she eliminated those fruits and vegetables from her diet, she felt instantly better.

Eckles takes metoprolol, which doesn't work as well as he hoped it would. After years of meds, he still can't find a treatment that works well for him.

"Basically every migraine medication that has been available through the public, I've tried," Eckles said in a Thursday phone interview. The best he can do is try to sleep through it in a dark, quiet room – the same approach Megan Burr takes.

Tolman takes Topamax and gets regular shots. Neck massagers and eating ice cream also provide a little relief.

They take the edge off, she said, but don't prevent the headaches completely. It's frustrating, Tolman said, but her son and husband help her get through the painful episodes.

And knowing she's not alone helps Tolman cope.

"It's just nice to hear from others who have it," she said. "You start feeling like you're crazy."

#### TAKING TREATMENT

There are as many migraine treatments as there are triggers. The Times-News spoke to three southern Idahoans who treat migraines about the approaches they take:

Dr. Bradford Talcott of Eastern Idaho Neurologist Associates said many people find relief with over-the-counter medicine such as Excedrin and Aleve. If those don't help, it's time for a trip to the doctor for a prescription, the Idaho Falls neurologist said. Lifestyle changes are also important, and they vary patient to patient. If you suffer from migraines, Talcott said, consider seeing a neurologist first. Visit his website at theheadacheguru.com. Dr. Brady Wirick of Idaho Chiropractic Neurology in Idaho Falls

advises many of his patients to stop eating dairy, soy and gluten. Wirick, a board certified chiropractic neurologist, also encourages them to consume more vitamin D, glutathione and fatty acids. Most migraines are related to autoimmune conditions, Wirick said, so getting the body's immune system in order is the best way to fight migraines. Visit his website at idahofallsmigrainedoctor.com.

Julie Willimott, owner of Snake River Acupuncture, bases her practice on Eastern medicine and emphasizes treating the root of the migraine instead of masking the symptoms with painkillers. The licensed acupuncturist analyzes each client's energy channel, then tries to clear what she calls blocks in energy pathways in the body. She then assesses lifestyle to find potential triggers.

'I can have 100 migraine patients and treat everyone totally different with great results," Willimott said.

They have apt names such as Unwind, iChill and Dream Water, and offer such flavors Berry-Berry Tired, as Snoozeberry and Lullaby Lemon. They're the inverse of energy drinks. Consumers can wake up with Red Bull and then wind down with Slow Cow.



But can consumers trust these fruity concoctions to give them their z's?

According to Steven M. Scharf, director of the Sleep Disorders Center at the University of Maryland in Baltimore, the answer is a resounding maybe.



The Situation Statement has been revised to include aquatic nuisance species, recharge, cloud seeding, climate change and federal mandates and court decisions. Aquaculture facilities are now included under the Situation Statement for CAFO's. Item 19 under Policy Statements pertaining to water usage and diversions has been deleted. A section on aquatic nuisances species has been added which includes goals, objectives and strategies for preventing the introduction of these species. This section calls for education of the public, law enforcement, sportsmen and recreational groups. It also promotes the development of boat and equipment cleaning stations at recreation areas in the region. The Hydro Power situation statement has been updated and a new strategy AO1.a has been added to ensure there are no negative impacts to water quality from modifications to existing facilities. The Private, Municipal and Industrial waste treatment section has been revised to include commercial enterprises and the term "Middle Snake river" used throughout this section has been revised to "waters of the region". Goal B, Strategy BO1.b has been added requiring commercial and light industrial land uses to use municipal waste treatment systems unless there is insufficient capacity and what a developer must base their plans on when constructing private systems. BO1.c has been added calling for increased monitoring and enforcement of regulations for certain commercial and light industrial uses. BO1.f has also been added encouraging continued monitoring for pharmaceuticals in ground waters of the region. Goal C with objectives and strategies has been added to this section dealing with the development of heavy industry in the region. The purpose of this Goal is to protect surface and ground water quality within the region as it relates to heavy industry development. A waste treatment plan must include a contingency plan and assure there will be no negative impact from the escape or discharge of pollutants. This goal also calls for the construction of monitoring wells, Proper handling of commodity storage and solid waste landfills, dust and smoke stack remediation plans. The Field Agricultural Situation Statement has been updated to reflect the current number of farms, number of acres farmed and economic data. The goals, objectives and strategies of the Field Agricultural section has minor changes to correct spelling and phrases. Strategy BO2.g was added to promote research and the use of approved genetically engineered crops to reduce the use of pesticides and fertilizer. The Animal Agriculture Situation Statement has been changed to reflect current economic information for livestock operations. The definition of a Concentrated animal feeding operation (CAFO) has been changed to the definition used by the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA). A definition of an animal unit has been removed from the plan as each member county has their own definition of an animal unit. Strategies BO1.a, b, d, e, f and g have been eliminated and incorporated under new Strategies BO1a, b and c. BO1e is new and encourages monitoring for pharmaceuticals in ground and surface water. BO1f is also new and encourages increased monitoring and enforcement of regulations for chemical storage, mixing, application, waste disposal and spills including fuel storage. The Ground Water Recharge Situation Statement has been changed to reflect current information and recognize the Comprehensive Aquifer Management Plan (CAMP) in the recharge portion of the plan concerning the Eastern Snake Plain Aquifer. Strategy AO1.d was eliminated under ground water recharge since the concern was already covered by strategy AO1c. In the Definition Section the definitions for Chemical, Nutrient, Organic and Sediment Contaminates are removed and replaced by a definition for Contaminates as defined by the EPA. Both minor suits look far too committal, and since dummy rates to have four spades, I'd be very reluctant to lead that suit around to an honor in declarer's hand — though it could be our side's best lead if my partner has a very strong spade holding. I would expect a heart lead to be more passive, so that would be my choice.
