- \$39.1 million in immediate cuts to 25 different service items.
- Eliminate the Medicaid fee-for-service model in favor of a managed, justified care approach.

BOISE - State lawmakers are considering legislation that would tighten the eligibility and accountability for Medicaid amid a backdrop of declining state revenues and federal expansion of the program.

Walking Wednesdays help Kimberly kids stay active

KIMBERLY – This isn't your granddaddy's walk to school - uphill both ways in the snow.

On the contrary, the walk from Kimberly City Park to the elementary school is a quick, half-mile jaunt school officials are determined to make fun.

More than 200 students skipped along the route from the park to their school Wednesday. Some wore colorful hats. while others donned skirts made of red, white and black tulle in honor of the Walking Wednesdays' theme, "Crazy for Kimberly."

Kimberly School District officials temporarily locked down school buildings and offices Wednesday afternoon, in response to an unidentified person posing as a student. District Superintendent Kathleen Noh said the imposter entered the high school with a backpack, posed as a student, and later fled the school.



BOISE – A federal judge on Wednesday declared Idaho's 38year-old system for holding open primaries unconstitutional and handed conservatives in the state Republican Party a victory in their bid to make sure only registered party faithful take part in primary

The ruling by U.S. District Judge B. Lynn Winmill deals specifically with Republican primary elections and paves the way for the GOPcontrolled Legislature to begin working on changing state law to regarding rules for casting ballots in those early nominating con-

The decision was cheered by Republican party leaders, who for years have complained the open primary system allowed Democrats and independents to cross over and skew results in some of most competitive primary races.

"This decision will allow the Idaho Republican Party to decide how to conduct its primary elections," Republican Chairman Norm Semanko said in a statement. "We only ask, and have a right to expect, that members of the Democrat Party or other political parties will not choose our candidates for us."

Idaho Democrats said voters will ultimately be the biggest victims in a future of closed primaries.

"Once again, the Republican Party is purging their ranks and requiring a loyalty oath to participate in the voting process. The Democratic Party welcomes all those voters across the state who have now been thrown out by the Republicans."

County seeks bankruptcy after legal loss

BOISE (AP) - Boise County is seeking federal bankruptcy protection in the wake of losing a federal lawsuit and getting slapped with a \$4 million judgment in the case.

County leaders say bankruptcy may be the only way they can continue to deliver services and maintain their lawsuit appeal.

In December, a federal jury sided with a developer seeking to build a treatment center and school for teens diagnosed with mental illness or substance abuse issues. Attorneys accused the county of working with neighbors who opposed Alamar Ranch and taking steps to undermine it during the approval and permitting process.

Jerome High students delay protest for test

JEROME - Even though she was itching for action, one Jerome sophomore decided the best way to rally behind her teachers was to stay in class — at least until testing finished.

Celsey Kidd was joined by a handful of co-conspirators at the spirit rock near Jerome High School on Wednesday. A few carried signs protesting Superintendent of Public Instruction Tom Luna's proposed education reform while the parking lot filled with the staccato of honking horns.

Celsey had proposed a full-fledged student rally for Wednesday, but Principal Eric Anderson tempered her enthusiasm.

"I read in this morning's newspaper that she was planning a walkout and was concerned because this is testing week," Anderson said. "I said we couldn't support them, but if they had to leave class, Friday would be a better day."

Anderson told Celsey walking out on class doesn't support the teachers who are trying to finish testing. So Celsey agreed to shift the protest to Friday, which is the last day of the trimester.

"We'll have everyone meet at the rock, I'll explain why we're doing this, and we'll march to the courthouse," Celsey said. "Not everyone knows what's going on because they're just into being themselves."

Anderson said the protesters will be marked absent, but as long as the students have prior parental approval, the absences will be excused.

Celsey had the full support of her mother, Lisa Kidd.

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Buhl protest leads to meeting with mayor

Unconstrained by a testing schedule, up to 200 Buhl High School students marched Wednesday morning to Buhl City Hall for an audience with Mayor Tom McCauley. City Clerk-Treasurer Robin Filiaga said the group was nice, but was still upset with Luna's pro-

"They think the reform will cause more people to drop out, that their quality of education will suffer and they want teachers there to help them out," Filiaga said. "We heard them out, but it's a difficult situation because the decision is not in our hands." Filiaga said she took notes during the 10-minute exchange and will send them and the mayor's observations to Gov. C.L.. "Butch"

Lisa said Celsey's grandmother was a teacher and had taken part in protests in the 1960s, so the leaf didn't fall far from the tree.

"Celsey is trying to organize marches statewide using Facebook and she's calling it 'Freedom Friday,'" Lisa said. "My generation never did anything, so I'm trying to get all the parents out to support these kids."

ferome mulls rezone requests

Two public hearings were held at the Jerome City Council on Tuesday night to discuss pros and cons of rezone requests.

The council approved a rezone request from Eastside Group to change the Glen Eagle Commercial Subdivision from a commercial permit to a mixeduse permit. It will allow for stricter restrictions on businesses in the subdivision.

Assistant City Administrator Micah Austin said the rezone allows flexibility for future growth.

"This opens up options for this type of development. Now there can't be automotive shops put in or anything with smoke or fumes," Austin said, adding that the area on the east side of town would allow for a business like a private school.

The second rezone request was denied by the council in a 3-1 vote. The switch would have allowed Keystone Construction and Development Inc. to start a second phase in Maple Ridge Subdivision, located off of Tiger Drive. The request had come before the council last year in June, but was pulled and changes were made to soothe concerns of neighbors and

IN OTHER BUSINESS

Government building funds: The council approved \$12,330 to be used in the first phase of the city's development plan for municipal government buildings. The money will be used for preliminary architectural services in the hopes of passing a bond to build a new police station, fire department and city hall. **Police technology:** The council also voted to support the police department's application for an Idaho Transportation Department enhanced data systems grant. It would provide 12 patrol cars with electronic ticketing machines. If the police department receives the grant for \$41,190 it would come up with \$10,298. City Administrator Ben Marchant said the ticketing system would provide cost savings and time savings in the



In 2012, Idaho's **GOP** nominees may be none of your business

efore Wednesday, there was an Idaho Republican Party. Now there's an Idaho Republican Club. U.S. District Judge Lynn Winmill ruled that Idaho's open primary system is unconstitutional, at least with respect to primaries held by the GOP.

That was a big victory for the conservative wing of the state Republican Party and its goal of making sure registered Republicans - and only registered Republicans — take part in primary elections.

The judge's decision ended a federal lawsuit that pitted Republican against Republican. In this case, the state party and its chairman Norm Semanko sued the Idaho Secretary of State, Republican Ben Ysursa, to dismantle the 38-year-old primary sys-

Winmill sided with party officials who complained GOP primaries were tainted by Democrats and independents who crossed over to influence re-

Party lawyers claimed those voters also infringed on the First Amendment right to free association because the open primary lumps GOP faithful in the same pool as non-members.

So beginning in the 2012 primary — unmolested by contrary opinions — Republicans will nominate whom they will.

And keep in mind that the current state GOP platform stipulates loyalty oaths by candidates to the 2010 state Republican platform, which among other things demanded the repeal of the 17th Amendment to the Constitution and said Idahoans should be able to pay their taxes in gold.

Moderates and Democrats? They can take a hike. All of which is intriguing, since the Idaho Public Policy Survey taken by Boise State University in November and December showed that — for the first time in the poll's 20-year history — independents outnumbered Republicans.

It's doubtful that most of the earnest GOP advocates of closing the primary realize it, but the direct primary — and especially the open primary — over the past 121 years has been central to the evolution of Idaho's brand of independent, thoughtful, honest politics.

It made it possible for the likes of William Borah, Frank Church, Robert Smylie, Cecil Andrus, Ben Ross, Doc Robins and Phil Batt to rise to positions where they profoundly shaped Idaho history.

And, of course, producing a Legislature that's now 81 percent Republican.

But now, the open primary has been replaced by a

biennial litmus test. Wednesday was a sad day for democracy in Idaho.

- 1919 Republican-controlled Idaho Legislature repeals direct primary; for next 12 years, candidates are chosen by party con-

or a man who won of-fice talking about change we can believe in, Barack Obama can be a strangely passive president. There are a startling number of occasions in which the president has been missing in action — unwilling, reluctant or late to weigh in on the issue of the moment. He is, too often, more reactive than inspirational, more cautious than forceful.

Each of these instances can be explained on its own terms, as matters of legislative strategy, geopolitical calculation or political pru-

He didn't want to get mired in legislative details during the health-care debate for fear of repeating the Clinton administration's prescriptive, take-ours-orleave-it approach. He doesn't want to go first on proposing entitlement reform because history teaches that this is not the best route to a deal. He didn't want to say anything too tough about Libya for fear of endangering Americans trapped there. He didn't want to weigh in on the labor battle in Wisconsin because, well, it's a swing state.

Yet the dots connect to form an unsettling portrait of a "Where's Waldo?" presidency: You frequently have to squint to find the White House amid the larger landscape.

This tough assessment from someone who generally shares the president's ideological perspective may be hard to square with the conservative portrait of Obama as the rapacious perpetrator of a big-government agenda. If the president is being

simultaneously accused of overreaching ambition and gutless fight-ducking. maybe he's doing something right.

Maybe, or else Obama has at times managed to do both simultaneously. On health care, for instance, he took on a big fight without being able to articulate a clear message or being willing to set out any but the broadest policy prescriptions. Lawmakers, not to mention the public, were left guessing about what, exactly, the administration wanted to see in the measure and where it would draw red lines.

That was not an isolated case. Where, for example, is the president on the verge of a potential government shutdown - if not this week,then a few weeks from now?

Aside from a short statement from the Office of Management and Budget threatening a presidential veto of the House version of the funding measure, the White House - much to the frustration of some congres sional Democrats - has been unclear in public and private about what cuts

would and would not be acceptable.

By contrast, a few weeks before the shutdown in 1995, Clinton administration aides had dispatched Cabinet members and other highranking officials to spread the message that cuts in education, health care and housing would harm families and children. Obama seems more the passive bystander to negotiations between the House and Senate than the chief executive leading his party.

He performs best on a stage that permits the grandest sweep. He rises to the big occasion, from his inspiring introduction to the public in his 2004 Democratic convention speech to his healing words in the aftermath of the Tucson shoot-

The president has faltered, though, when called on to translate that rhetoric to more granular levels of specificity: What change, exactly, does he want people to believe in? How, even more exactly, does he propose to get there? "Winning the future" doesn't

quite do it.

My biggest beef is with the president's slipperiness on fiscal matters. Obama has said he agrees with some of his fiscal commission's recommendations and disagrees with others. Which ones does he disagree with? I asked this question the other day of Austan Goolsbee, the chairman of the Council of Economic Advisers.

Here's what I got: "The view espoused by some of the ... commission that we ought to do Social Security 100 percent off of benefit cuts for sure he doesn't agree with." But of course, the plan that 11 of the commission members endorsed did nothing of the sort.

I was unfair to Goolsbee because I asked him a question he didn't have the leeway to answer. You can't blame the aide for ducking when the boss fudges.

Where's Obama? No matter how hard you look, sometimes he's impossible to find.

In a misguided attempt to micromanage cities, the Idaho Legislature will make itself the enemy of economic recovery in the state if it guts urban renewal

The phrase "urban renewal district" conjures up visions of crumbling buildings and scarred streets with dark alleys populated by addled druggies and

Yet, that's never been the face of decay in Idaho com-

munities. The reality has been more genteel, with old downtowns becoming decimated by commercial development on the outskirts

Idaho's laws allow cities to create urban renewal districts and agencies to recoup property taxes generated by new developments that would otherwise be

spent outside the city.

... A developer invests in building new structures or rehabilitating old ones. As a result, property values in the urban renewal district rise, yielding higher property tax revenues, a portion of which goes to the URA. The agency borrows money to construct roads, bridges, parks, parking garages or other related structures and uses its share of tax revenue to pay off the loans.

Everyone wins. URAs spur development by offering incentives in the form of improved infrastructure whose costs might otherwise fall on existing city taxpayers. Developers profit and cities get economic development and jobs.

URAs cannot live forever and can last only 24 years, so all taxing districts eventually realize higher tax revenues as the result of urban renewal.

What's wrong with all this?

Well, the law works, which apparently chafes legislators who prefer to keep cities poor and government ineffective.

The proposals to "im-

prove" URAs by forcing a public vote on every proposed project, populating governing boards with elected rather than appointed officials, and preventing city council members from serving on the board look oh-so-reasonable on their face. In practice, they would have the intended effect of gumming up operations and rendering URAs useless ...

Idaho doesn't have an educator sitting atop its school system.

It has a politician. For that, you can thank the state's Republicans.

And its Democrats. Much has been said about current school Superintendent Tom Luna's credentials or lack thereof.

Luna famously got a degree from an online college, Thomas Edison State College in New Jersey, to qualify for the post. But he hasn't spent one day as a classroom teacher or administrator.

Not long ago, that would have barred Luna from seeking the job. Besides a college degree, Idaho law required its top school administrator to have devoted at least three years as a teacher or administrator.

In 1993, legislators from

both political parties were talking about seeking the job. Neither had spent time in the profession, so lawmakers removed the obstacle in their path.

It's not the first time politicians have meddled with the job.

A quick trip through Idaho history shows the scope and duties of Idaho's school superintendent are not fixed.

There has been a tug of war between the State Board of Education and superintendents.

Lawmakers also have toyed with the idea of eliminating the superintendent's position or making it an appointee of the state board.

The Legislature's intervention in 1993 ushered in 16 years of turmoil. First came Republican Anne Fox, who flamed out ... Four years later, Marilyn Howard restored competence to the job. But as the state's lone Democratic official, she became a target for partisan GOP appointees on the state board.

In 2006, Luna became the first non-educator to win the post ... Ask them and they'll tell you Luna doesn't speak for them ...

Idaho has dozens of politicians involved in debating, tweaking and passing new education policies.

It has only one superintendent of public instruction to advocate on behalf of and then lead — the people who have to do the real work.

It's a crucial difference. What you get, at the schoolhouse level, is drift. Luna can propose policies at the Statehouse. But lacking credibility or trust from teachers and administrators, he has had a difficult time getting anything implemented...

If Idaho wants a politician running the schools, turn that job over to the governor. The chief executive can, in turn, hire his own director of education. If voters don't like the results, they can get a new governor.

If they want a professional administrator, have the State Board of Education hire a state schools superintendent in much the same way the board now appoints presidents at the college and universities

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
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

Bill to extend jobless benefits clears House

BOISE — The Idaho House passed a measure to extend federal unemployment benefits for year, despite opposition from more than two dozen Republicans.

The measure, which carries a technical change to make Idaho eligible for extended federal unemployment benefits, passed 41-28.

Rep. Marv Hagedorn, R-Meridian, was among GOP lawmakers who railed against runaway government spending and tried to defeat the legislation to extend these benefits for longtime unemployed workers who have been unable to secure a job.

Hagedorn said: "It's time to lead the horse away from the trough and make him go to work."

House Minority Leader John Rusche, D-Lewiston, countered that as much as Idaho lawmakers would like to send a message about deficit spending, they shouldn't do it on the backs of unemployed families.

Bill would strengthen Right to Farm Act

BOISE — A bill headed to the Idaho House would make it easier for farmers to enlarge their feedlot operations, but more difficult for opponents to challenge those plans in court.

The House Agricultural Affairs Committee signed off on legislation Wednesday to bolster Idaho's Right to Farm Act. It now goes to the full House.

Supporters say it will protect agricultural operations such as feedlots from local ordinances that regulate farms. But opponents say the measure would shield corporate farms from nuisance lawsuits and severely reduce local government control on the growth of feedlot opera-

The measure was brought to the House committee last week and amended to delete a section that would require people who bring nuisance claims against agricultural operations to pay full legal fees if they lost the dispute.

Senate backs bid to rein in Washington

Right now, states can already call for a convention, but not a specific amendment. They've never actually done this, out of fear it would create a chaotic, runaway process where Congress could consider broadly overhauling the Republic's founding docu-

GRANTS PASS - One of the young wolves from the Imnaha pack in Northeastern Oregon that was recently fitted with a radiotracking collar has been found dead, the Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife said Wednesday.

There were no signs of foul play, and the carcass was shipped to Washington State University to determine the cause of death, the department said.

Steve Pedery of Oregon Wild, a conservation group, said it was possible that the stress of being tranquilized for the radio collar fitting may be a factor.

He said while they support fitting wolves with radio collars to prevent conflicts with livestock, there are other, less expensive steps - such as electric fences and flagging around stock pens that are not being taken.

Department wolf coordinator Russ Morgan said tranquilizing wolves and fitting them with radiotracking collars is always risky, and they take all precautions to protect the animals. He said this young female had been observed the next day doing fine and had traveled a long distance before dying.

'This is a surprise," he said from La Grande. Morgan added that flagging and fencing and other steps to protect livestock from wolves were being taken.

SAN FRANCISCO - Apple Inc. Chief Executive Steve Jobs took a break from his medical leave Wednesday to introduce the company's new iPad, an upgraded tablet that could help the company fend off a slew of rivals in the burgeoning tablet-computer market.


"We've been working on this product for a while and I just didn't want to miss the day," Jobs said shortly after receiving a standing ovation.

Oil jumps to more than \$102 per barrel

NEW YORK - Oil prices settled above \$102 per barrel for the first time since September of 2008 as fighting escalated in Libya and petroleum demand grew in the U.S.

Libya, a major oil exporter to Europe, has been embroiled in an uprising that has shut down oil production in many parts of the country. Forces loyal to Libyan leader Moammar Gadhafi used airstrikes in a battle against protesters for control of a key oil installation in the eastern half of the country.

Analysts are concerned that the rebellion will endanger Libya's oil



Fed chief steps back into political matters

WASHINGTON - Before he took charge of the Federal Reserve in 2006. Ben Bernanke vowed to steer clear of political issues. Nowadays he seems to have

an opinion on everything.


The latest example came Wednesday, when the Fed chief told Congress that a House Republican plan to cut \$61 billion in federal spending this year would cost the economy jobs.

Private economists have suggested the damage would be worse. Mark Zandi, chief economist at Moody's Analytics, has estimated the GOP plan would cost the economy 700,000 new jobs by the end of next year. Bernanke says that figure is too high.

Housing remains the economy's main weak spot, the report showed.

"Overall sales and construction remained at low levels across all districts," the survey said. The St. Louis region said sales are still declining.

Tourism improved in the Richmond, Atlanta and San Francisco areas, while it slowed in Kansas City, partly due to severe weather. New York reported slower business at hotels and said Broadway theater attendance dropped.

The region-by-region survey is based on information collected from the Fed's 12 regional banks on or before Feb. 18. Known as the "Beige Book," the survey provides a more in-the-trenches look at the overall economy than broad statistics.

Study says 50-year-old with diabetes will die 6 years sooner than someone without

NEW YORK — A 50-year-old with diabetes dies six years sooner than someone without the disease, and not just from a heart attack or a stroke, new research suggests.

The large international effort to measure diabetes' toll found the disease also raises the risk of dying prematurely from a host of other ailments, even breast cancer and pneumonia.

"It's quite a wide sweep of conditions," said Dr. John Danesh of Cambridge University in Britain, who led the team of researchers. While most people think of heart problems, diabetes surprisingly "appears to be associated with a much broader range of health implications than previously suspected."

Putting the six years lost in context, he said, long-term smoking shortens life by 10 years.

The analysis used pooled medical information for 820,900 people from nearly 100 studies done mostly in Europe and North America. The results are published in Thursday's New England Journal of Medicine.

Sirhan Sirhan denied parole in RFK killing

COALINGA - A California board denied parole Wednesday for Robert F. Kennedy's convicted assassin, Sirhan Sirhan.

A panel of two California parole board commissioners concluded after a four hour hearing that Sirhan hadn't shown adequate remorse or understanding of the crime that was mourned by a nation.

Sirhan, now 66, spoke at length and expressed sorrow, but said he doesn't remember shooting Kennedy or five other victims on June 4, 1968, in the kitchen of the Ambassador Hotel, where Kennedy stood moments after claiming victory in the California presidential primary.

"Every day of my life, I have great remorse and deep regret," he said at the hearing at Pleasant Valley State Prison in Coalinga.

He pleaded with the panel to give him a date for release, saying he wants to "get lost in the woodwork" and live out his life.

The panel chairman, Mike Prizmich, and the deputy commissioner, Randy Kevorkian, told Sirhan he must seek further self-help courses, come to terms with the crime and show evidence of his improvement when he gets his next parole hearing, which will be in five years.

Woman survives 35-mile ride on van hood

MANTECA — The woman desperately gripped a windshield wiper blade, her body splayed across the hood of the minivan as it raced down a Northern California freeway in the middle of the night, reaching 100 mph, witnesses said.

With the temperature hovering in the low 30s, Christopher Michael Carroll drove 35 miles from Manteca to nearby Pleasanton on Saturday with his wife clinging to the hood, prompting 911 calls from at least two alarmed witnesses, police said.

Carroll, 36, was being held without bail Wednesday at the San Joaquin County Jail on charges of attempted murder, kidnapping and domestic assault, according to sheriff's department records.

Carroll got into the family's minivan around 12:30 a.m. Saturday after he and his wife had an argument at their Manteca home, said police spokesman Rex Osborn.

'She kind of goes with the van to try to stop him, gets up on the hood and is hanging on to the wiper blade," he said. "She obviously didn't think he would keep driving."

Scientists declare eastern cougar extinct

ALLENTOWN - The "ghost cat" is just that. The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service on Wednesday declared the eastern cougar extinct, confirming a widely held belief among wildlife biologists that native populations of the big cat were wiped out by man a century ago.

After a lengthy review, federal officials concluded there are no breeding populations of cougars — also known as pumas, panthers, mountain lions and catamounts — in the eastern United States. Researchers believe the eastern cougar subspecies has probably been extinct since the 1930s.

Wednesday's declaration paves the way for the eastern cougar to be removed from the endangered species list, where it was placed in 1973. The agency's decision to declare the eastern cougar extinct does not affect the status of the Florida panther, another endangered wildcat.

Some hunters and outdoors enthusiasts have long insisted there's a small breeding population of eastern cougars, saying the secretive cats have simply eluded detection — hence the "ghost cat" moniker. The wildlife service said Wednesday it confirmed 108 sightings between 1900 and 2010, but that these animals either escaped or were released from captivity, or migrated from western states to the Midwest.



Gadhafi loyalists attack oil center in Libya's east

BREGA, Libya – Ground and air forces loyal to Moammar Gadhafi attacked this key oil terminal city in eastern Libya Wednesday, but were repulsed by a motley army of volunteer fighters who flocked to this strategic coastal town as word of the assault spread.

Hospital officials here said at least six people had been killed in the fighting, and witnesses showed a video purportedly of an injured Libyan Army soldier being treated at the hospital. At least 10 rebel fighters who returned to Ajdabiya were being treated for gunshot wounds at that city's hospi-

The purpose of the pro-Gadhafi forces' attack was unclear — in addition Bre ga's oil terminal, the attackers also targeted the city's university - but the battle followed what's become a strange pattern: After hours of fighting, Gadhafi's better-armed and -trained loyalists withdrew without taking control of their likely objective.

In the western city of Zawiya, fighters said they faced a major assault by Gadhafi's forces Monday night, only to have them back down.

"It was like they were surveying the place. We don't understand what they are doing," Tarek Zawi, 19, a fighter, said Wednesday by telephone from Zawiya after calling the turmoil an interhearing about the fighting in nal matter for Libya. Brega.

The battle for Brega, however, buoyed the spirits of man of the Senate Foreign ton testified. the disorganized rebels who flocked here after days of mounting frustration at their inability to topple Gadhafi, who remains firmly in control of the capital, Tripoli, about 500 miles west.

In a speech as the Brega battle unfolded, Gadhafi urged his followers to fight for Libya "inch by inch." He blamed al-Qaida for the unrest and said that army commanders had defected to the rebels because "terrorists" had forced them to do so at gunpoint. He denied that government forces had attacked peace protesters.

"This is the Libyan people, standing in defiance, backing their own symbolic leader," Gadhafi said, as his supporters in the room cheered as if on cue.

Meanwhile, in Cairo, the Arab League, meeting for the first time since the region exploded in a collective protest movement that in six weeks has forced out the leaders of Tunisia and Egypt and threatens several others,

Two U.S. airmen killed in Frankfurt airport shooting

FRANKFURT, Germany – Two U.S. airmen were killed and two others were wounded at Frankfurt airport Wednesday when a man opened fire on them at close range with a handgun, the first such attack on American forces in Germany in a quarter century.

President Barack Obama called the shooting an "outrageous act."

The alleged assailant, identified as a 21-year-old Kosovo man, was taken immediately into custody and was being questioned by authorities, said Frankfurt police spokesman Manfred Fuellhardt.

Family members in Kosovo described the suspect as a devout Muslim, who was born and raised in Germany and worked at the airport.

Neighbors want county to red flag riders

Landowners complain about motocross track

By Andrew Weeks Times-News writer

A group of landowners are upset that a motocross track near their homes is still operating five years after Twin Falls County denied its owners a conditional use permit.

The residents complain that the track southwest of Filer, which sits on about seven acres of a 40-acre spread owned by Randy and Sally Williamson, is a nuisance and violates planning and zoning ordinances and right to farm laws.

"The motocross track does not meet county code," said Shadow Seaman, a neighbor of

Seaman and about a dozen others visited the Twin Falls County Courthouse last week, asking commissioners and the county prosecutor to take the matter seriously.

"Basically, they (the county) have been exercising it as a squeaky wheel," Seaman said. "That's the way they've treated it. They've basically said, 'We're glad you came in and voiced your opinion. The county prosecutor will get to it when we get to it? As citizens, we're looking at this as six years later."

In a Sept. 8, 2005, public hearing, Twin Falls County Planning and Zoning denied the Williamsons a conditional use permit at their property, approximately 3750 N. 1900 E., near Filer, noting that the track was not an allowed use or conditional use in the agricultural zone.

The Williamsons filed an appeal, and on Nov. 16, 2005, county commissioners upheld the planning and zoning decision.

According to the commissioners' findings: "While a motocross track may be good for the County in a recreational sense, it would be incompatible with

Randy Williamson said the track was built for his grandsons and their friends, who ride the motocross circuit. It is not a commercial track, even though he'd like to use it as such. He operates the track under guidelines, which, among other things, designates that users must "exercise safety and courtesy" to neighbors when visiting the track.

"We've followed the guidelines pretty close," he said, noting that he believes the complaints are turning into "a neighborhood witch hunt."

Seaman, who was appointed spokesman of the residents group, said the point his group is making is that the track, regardless of who or how many people use it, is not an allowed use for agriculture land.

"That is our position as neighbors," he said, noting the track causes noise disturbances, traffic and dust pollution in an area near cattle

Williamson said the track has never bothered his own cattle. County prosecutor Grant Loebs said the residents have been to his office a number of times.

"The county is trying to handle it for them," he said. "We've been trying to broker an agreement for some time. Their attitude is they don't want an agreement brokered, their agreement is their way or no way."

The attorney's office previously dismissed charges arising in 2008 that the track was a public nuisance.

Loebs said Tuesday his office is looking into whether a lawsuit enforcing the zoning division is applicable, and whether Williamson's actions constitute a direct refusal to comply with the county.

"If it is an approved use, he can do what he's doing for as long as he wants," Loebs said. "If it's not, then he shouldn't have been doing it in the first place." Seaman said all it takes is a look at county codes.

The Planning and Zoning Commission, when it denied the Williamsons their request, said Title 8 sections 8-6B-1, 8-6B-3, 8-7-1, 8-7-7 A-E ap-

"Right now we still have faith the county will still uphold the zoning laws that are in place," Seaman said. "I understand that the county feels this is not a high priority issue for them but it's getting to the point, almost six years later, that things need to take place. That's what we're holding onto, that the county will uphold the laws that are in the books."



Here's how to find the rod that's right for you

DALLAS - When the average angler walks into a well-stocked tackle store, he is faced with rows of fishing rods in various lengths, actions and configurations. They cost from \$50 to \$500, and the most expensive rod may not be the best rod for the job.

The following is a question and answer on bass fishing rods with Rick Pope, president of Temple Fork Outfitters, a Dallas company that started building high-quality fly rods at bargain prices and expanded into other fishing markets.

Pope is a serious angler whose design team includes two legendary anglers -Lefty Kreh and Gary Loomis.

Though TFO is best known for its fly rods, the company offers about 35 casting and spinning rod

models suitable for bass fishing. Most of them cost about \$100 and are flying off the shelves at dealers across the country. In many areas, you can find them at Bass Pro Shops, Cabela's and Fishin' World. You can see them online at

www.tforods.com. How do you go about selecting a good bass

Length, action (where Hthe rod bends) and power (how much it bends) are the fundamental issues. Price is a major consideration for most.

Is a \$500 rod better than a \$100 rod? Some believe so, and I A like side lock 20-gauge shotguns, but my Remington 870 pump performs just as well. Components influence price more than rod blank construction. From a pure performance standpoint, most find it difficult

as universally linked.

What do you do other than pick up the rod and feel the action (without a reel, line or lure) to determine if the rod will suit you while fishing?

A Balance, tip lightness (a sensitivity indicator) and overall weight certainly influence me the most. Wiggling a rod can give some insight into recovery speed (damping), and the tradition of bending a rod on the floor or ceiling can help predict both action and power.

Bottom line is that there is no good substitute for fishing with a rod.

Does everybody offer warranties for rods these days and how good are

they? All of the Dianace School All of the Dianace All of the branded rod have some form of "limited" warranty. With conventional rods, it is usually a replacement offer at a greatly to see price and performance reduced price. Warranties

Pay attention to new fishing rules brochure

"I saw an angler over the weekend on Rock Creek above the National Forest boundary. I stopped to inform him the area was closed to fishing. He told me in the new regulations Rock Creek is no longer closed during the winter. What's this all about?"

A I'm sorry to inform you, but the angler you talked with was correct. The new fishing regulations brochure for 2011-12 went into effect in January.

There are several notable

items in the new brochure. The first thing you'll notice is the brochure is organized by region. If you want to fish in the Magic Valley region, go to the Magic Valley section.

At the top of that section, in addition to a map of the region is "General Fishing Season" rules, bag and possession limits. It reads, "All Waters Open All Year, except as modified in the Magic Valley Special Rules." It also lists the general bag and possession limits for each game fish species in Magic Valley area waters.

In the following section all the areas within the Magic Valley that have special angling rules (that are not open to fishing yearround) are listed. The section begins with a reference list allowing anglers to quickly check to see if their specific waters have special rules. If your desired angling area is not listed, the region's general rules apply. If your desired area is listed then search the special rules on subsequent pages



Specifically, Rock Creek above the highline canal that used to be closed through the winter is now open to fishing year-round because it is not listed as an area with special regulations.

There are a couple items of caution. Each region has its own general bag

> and possession limits listed in the brochure and they could be different between regions

For example, the Panhandle Region has a 15 fish kokanee limit, while the

Clearwater Region has a 25 fish kokanee limit, and the Magic Valley Region has a six fish kokanee

Another thing to be aware of is that some regions list special rules by drainage, which may include many different streams not specifically named in the special regulation section.

Fisheries biologists worked hard utilizing many types of public input to improve this fishing brochure. Comments have been positive about the changes, suggesting the brochure is more easily understood.

Right-to-carry laws: Second Amendment in action

'd like to preface today's column by expressing a heartfelt "thank you" to the legislators and Second Amendment advocacy groups that have adopted a proactive strategy and are introducing legislation designed to protect and enhance our basic constitutional rights. In particular, I to focus attention on concealed carry provisions.

Concealed carry or CCW (carrying a concealed weapon) refers to the practice of carrying a concealed handgun or other weapon on your person or in your proximity while in public. Currently there is no federal residents to carry a handor national statute granting this privilege to all law abiding U.S. citizens, but



48 states have laws on their books extending this right to their legal residents. The lone exceptions are Wisconsin and Illinois, though in practice Hawaii is also a "no issue" state.

The states allowing civilian carry do so under one of three statutory provisions: Unrestricted, shall-issue, or may-issue. Unrestricted carry allows law-abiding gun without a permit. Only Alaska, Arizona and Vermont currently exercise this

option, but Utah and South Carolina have forwarded legislation for this permitting choice. This option is currently being championed in the Wyoming legislature (and recently introduced here in Idaho) under the title of Permitless or Constitutional Carry. Its intent is to allow all law abiding residents to exercise their constitutional right to keep and bear arms without the expense or stipulations of obtaining a special permit.

Shall-issue states require the issuance of a permit to any applicant who meets the specific criteria of the law. The granting authorities must and shall issue the permit if the individual

meets all of the legal requirements. This frees the process from any possible discrimination or prejudice by the granting authority.

Typical requirements include proof of residency, minimum age, submission of fingerprints, passing a computerized background check, successfully completing a handgun/firearms safety class and payment of the required fee. Thirtyeight states currently exercise this option.

The may-issue jurisdictions requires a permit, and the granting of these licenses is partially at the discretion of local authorities, usually the sheriff's office or police department. In addition to meeting the

state-level criteria, the applicant must convince the local granting authorities of their genuine need to carry concealed.

Requests for personal or family defense are not automatically accepted as sufficient need. A no-issue jurisdiction is just that - one in which no private citizens are allowed to carry a concealed handgun. Wisconsin, Illinois, and the District of Columbia enforce this statute.

Though technically mayissue states, Hawaii and New Jersey, as well as certain cities and counties in California and New York are in practice no-issue areas.

Any person considering applying for a concealed

carry license should not only carefully research their local and state requirements and limitations, but those of other municipalities and states they may visit while armed. This will keep you free from many legal entanglements and therefore cannot be understated.

I just filled out the simple one-page application and I'm heading back to the sheriff's office tomorrow with a check for \$60 for finger printing and a background check. I'll let you know how it goes.

Big fish must be handled with care

DALLAS — As soon as the weather warms up, more than a million sport anglers will dust off their fishing gear and take advantage of Texas' abundant water and equally abundant game fish.

Many anglers will keep a few fresh fish to eat, and there's certainly nothing wrong with that, as long as you abide by the legal size and daily bag limits.

The majority of anglers practice some form of catch-and-release fishing, however. Nearly every popular game-fish species is protected by a minimum size limit. Fishermen have learned that it doesn't hurt, vation sense to release large

Big fish aren't as good to eat as their smaller counterparts. From the stand- fish. point of conservation, trophy-sized fish are important because everybody would like to catch one (or supporting the fish's conmore), and it takes years to grow a large fish. The bottom line is sportsmen have rolls the fish's lip out and too much time invested in a big fish to kill the fish.

Careful management leads to lake sturgeon comeback

ON LAKE WINNEBAGO, Wis. - America's greatest conservation success story might not be the return of the eagle, the wolf or the peregrine falcon. More likely it's a fish, and a disagreeable-looking one at that, the lake sturgeon.

Or what Wisconsin's Menomonie Indians call na-

Paradoxically, the rebirth of these 150-million-yearold critters in this huge lake has depended on people who love nothing more on a winter's day than to send a razor-sharp spear into chilled water, hoping to stick a stur-

So it has been as long as people have lived on Winnebago's shores, or along the banks of rivers flowing into

Late last month, on Winnebago, Paul Muche of Fond du Lac, Wis., was in a shanty staring into a large watery hole. The sturgeon's 16-day season was winding down, and relatively few people were on the ice, in part because 20 pickups had dropped into the lake during a recent warm spell, and one spearer had died.

Still, peering into the water in Muche's shanty, waiting for a sturgeon to appear, was mesmerizing, in an anxious sort of way _like staring at a TV test pattern while waiting for a real live monster to leap from the screen and grab you.

Karen Rediske, Muche's aunt. She too was transfixed by the water, and it returned her reflection. Hanging nearby were spears, 8 feet or so in length, their sharp steel tines submerged beneath the water, an important detail if a sturgeon appeared.

"When a fish swims into the hole, you don't want to around too much," Muche

As popular as deer hunting is in Wisconsin, sturgeon spearing hereabouts is Lake Winnebago. equally so. More lifestyle than sport, it's equipmentintensive: Four-wheel-drive pickups. Long-barred chain saws. Shanty heaters. Portable LP tanks. Decoys. And, of course, spears. All are needed.

"The spears are made by different people around the lake," Muche said. "Each is a little different."

nswer: The only people who cannot file a bankruptcy under the new law that could file a bankruptcy under the old law are those who have filed a previous bankruptcy and not enough time has elapsed to permit another filing. Under the old law, 6 years had to pass between the filings of Chapter 7 bankruptcies. Under the new law, the period is extended to 8 years. Under the new law, those who cannot file another Chapter 7 case because not enough time has elapsed, may still be able to file a Chapter 13 case where they repay a portion of their debts through a Chapter 13 plan. The new law also incorporates a "Means Test" where the debtor's household income is compared to the state median income for the same sized household. Because of this new test, some higher earning debtors may be prevented from filing a Chapter 7 bankruptcy case, but in most instances, they can still file a Chapter 13 case. The new bankruptcy law requires additional disclosures and documentation that sometimes make the preparation of a case more time consuming, but the new requirements do not prevent debtors from seeking financial relief through bankruptcy. A consultation with an experienced bankruptcy attorney will quickly identify any potential issues in your case, including whether you might be required to file a Chapter 13 bankruptcy case instead of a traditional Chapter 7 case.

Dandy-Walker patient has uncontrolled seizures

DEAR DR. GOTT: My 20-year-old granddaughter was diagnosed with Dandy-Walker syndrome at the age of 2. By the time she was 12, she had mild hydrocephalus and petit-mal seizures. We have tried antiseizure medications, which have not worked. Some meds have put her in a mental-health facility. She was also given Haldol, which made her catatonic.



She had an acute reaction. She has a pediatric neurologist, but I feel that without any progress, this is as far as he can go. She has been going to him since she was

She was withdrawn from

all medications two weeks ago, and all that she has been prescribed for a headache before her seizures was Tylenol and Ativan, which she takes following a seizure. She had three seizures on Saturday and one on Sunday. Thank you for any help you can provide.

DEAR READER: Dandy-

Walker syndrome is a rare congenital brain malformation that involves the back of the brain and the fluidfilled spaces that surround it. The brain contains four ventricles, which are filled with cerebrospinal fluid. Features that generally occur in early infancy include enlargement of only the fourth ventricle, partial or complete absence of the portion of the brain be-

tween the two cerebellar hemispheres and the formation of cysts near the internal base of the skull. For older children, features and symptoms can include convulsions, unsteadiness, jerky eye movements, a bulge at the back of the skull and problems with nerves that control breathing, the face, neck and eyes. The primary treatment for the condition is the placement

of a shunt positioned in the brain to help drain excess cerebrospinal fluid to the peritoneal cavity, where it is absorbed into the body. Some children recover completely following shunt placement. For others, a lesser degree of progress is seen. Up to 90 percent of all Dandy-Walker patients have hydrocephalus, an





BOISE — Boise State issued a response Wednesday to an article in the March 2 edition of Sports Illustrated entitled "College Football and

Crime.' The article states that members of the 2010 Boise State football team were charged with 16

criminal offenses over the past five years. Of those charges, Boise State officials said three have been dismissed, six were traffic related, five were alcohol related, one was for trespassing and one was for battery. None of the charges in the

Serena Williams' absence from tennis could stretch to almost a year after two new health scares a blood clot in her lungs followed by a hematoma have added to her injury

Her agents confirmed Wednesday that Williams was diagnosed with a pulmonary embolism last week and later needed treatment for a hematoma. The 13-time Grand Slam champion hasn't played an official match since winning Wimbledon last July because of a foot injury she sustained not on the court sult of treatment for "a but at a restaurant.

Her latest health problems have been "extremely hard, scary and disappointing," Williams said in a statement. "I am doing better. I'm at home now and working with my doctors to keep everything under control. I know I will be OK, but am praying and hoping this will all be behind me soon.

"While I can't make any promises now on my return, I hope to be back by early summer. That said, my main goal is to make sure I get there safely."

People magazine first reported on Williams' condition, quoting spokeswoman Nicole Chabot as saying Williams underwent "emergency treatment" Monday for a hematoma suffered as a re- ed Kim Kardashian.

The search warrant was issued Tuesday to Bank of America for documents connected to Wichard and his Califor-

nia-based firm, Pro Tect Management LLC, since January 2009.

Investigators say that Pro Tect paid \$1,000 to reimburse a high school assistant coach, who had paid for former Tar Heels defensive lineman Marvin Austin's flights to and from California in March 2009, according to a probable cause affidavit filed with the search warrant.

In addition, Pro Tect paid \$915.40 to a travel agency to cover changes to Austin's flight itinerary, according to the affidavit.

The affidavit also alleges Wichard failed to register with the state as a sports agent despite having "several phone conversations" with Austin starting in January 2009. North Carolina Secretary of State

Elaine Marshall's office launched an in-

vestigation after the NCAA began look-

ing into possible agent-related benefits in North Carolina's football program. "It's fair to say this is a definitely a step forward in the investigation," Marshall spokesman George Jeter said

The NFL Players Association suspended Wichard in December for nine months for his role in the UNC probe. Howard Silber, an attorney for Wichard, didn't immediately return a call and e-mail seeking comment on the search warrant.





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

THE ACES ON BRIDGE®

"Hypocrite reader — my double — my brother!"

— Charles Baudelaire

Stuart and Gerald Tredinnick are one of two sets of twin brothers who have represented Great Britain successfully. Among other things they were part of the team that won the world junior championships 20 years ago.

Here is Gerald at work in five diamonds. Knowing that they had at most one spade trick to take on defense, West started off by leading the spade queen to try to retain the lead. Then, worried that declarer might be able to set up some hearts, West switched to the club jack, which ran around to declarer's king.

Declarer now played the heart ace and king, cashed the diamond ace, and played a diamond to dummy's king. He then ruffed a heart, ruffed a spade, ruffed a heart, and played a low club. When West played the 10, Gerald ducked. With nothing left but spades. West had to give declarer a ruff and discard. South ruffed in dummy, discarding one club from his hand, and then discarded his last club loser on dummy's fifth heart.

Nicely played, but declarer would have needed to see through the backs of the cards if West had continued with a second spade at trick two. At trick three, declarer must play a club from dummy himself. Now come the heart ace and king, followed by a finesse against the diamond jack!

This enables him to ruff a heart, cross to the diamond king, and ruff another heart before playing a low club to reach the same position as before.

ANSWER: It is a part of normal modern bidding style for responder to be able to find out more about opener's hand here with a forcing bid of two diamonds known as "New Minor." This acts like Stayman, asking opener to show three-card support, or four cards in the unbid major. If you are playing this convention, two hearts by you is natural and weak, denying invitational values, and therefore ideal.
