Valley to see another busy year of roadwork

ITD has \$60M in projects planned

With winter drawing to a close, it's time to look forward to the next season: road construction.

The Idaho Transportation Department is waiting only for the first spell of fair weather to begin resume where it left off in the fall. Magic Valley residents will see a number of improvements, but will need to brace for delays, depending on their routes of travel.

The 25 projects scheduled in ITD's District 4 represent \$60 million in improvements across south-central Idaho, spokesman Nathan Jerke said. They'll bring the completion of a some of this season's projects and high-profile project in Twin Falls, improvements along U.S. Highway 93, and continued rehabilitation of Interstate 84 as it stretches across the Magic Valley.


In Twin Falls, work will soon re-

sume on the Washington Street North widening project put on hiatus for the winter. Workers will finish sidewalks, meridians and the northbound lane between Filer and Falls avenues, and complete the Washington-Falls intersection. Jerke said the remaining construction will take two to three months.

"That's the problem with urban construction," Jerke said. "If we could shut the road down completely, we could finish a lot faster, but we have to keep lanes open."

Some of ITD's biggest construction will happen on U.S. 93 and Idaho Highway 75 between the Nevada border and Stanley.

Board accused of interfering with Wendell head librarian

Some residents air concerns at city council meeting

WENDELL – Libraries may be famous for their quiet atmospheres, but the Wendell Public Library is at the center of a commotion that has some Wendell residents questioning if the library board is hampering the work of its library directors.

Stephanie Green and three other residents shared their concerns at the Feb. 17 Wendell City Council meeting. They also read letters from three more citizens who couldn't attend.

"I'm very concerned with how our library board is treating its library director," she said. "Our library board has done a good job hiring very, very good people and when they do that, they just need to get out of the way and let them

Prior to last spring, librarian Iean Leiardi helmed the library. Green told the council that in the spring, Lejardi told her that she had been asked to resign.

The new library director, Elaine Dalton, was brought on in August after serving as the librarian at Gooding Elementary School. Dalton set to work pursuing goals promoted by the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation, rearranging the library to better accommodate patrons with disabilities and creating areas that cater specifically to children. She headed reading programs for adults and educational activities for children, from preschool to middle-school aged.

Despite this, Green said during her council presentation, Dalton told her she was frustrated with the board after a recent performance review ranked her low on things she didn't know she was supposed to do.

Sharla Dunn told the council she wrote a letter to the library board in October.

"In my business, I travel to maybe 10 or 12 libraries in the Magic Valley selling them books. And I don't have to say very much about the Wendell library board," Dunn said. "They say, 'We're sure

Some ask why rescue effort was called off in Nevada mine death

RENO, Nev. – A worker plunges deep into an abandoned mine shaft. Nearly

200 feet down, video images show he is injured but still breathing, trapped by debris. The century-old shaft,

though, is extremely unstable, its walls crumbling. As one rescuer tries to descend to reach the man, he is hit by a large rock, which splits his hard-hat. Other efforts yield more falling rocks and clear evidence: This is going to be a dangerous mission - maybe too dangerous.

The scenario unfolded underneath Nevada last week, when rescue teams were told to stand down in their bid to reach Devin Westenskow, a 28-year-old father of five, even as they had evidence he was still alive.

But the ethical questions are more universal: How do you balance the desire to save a human being in peril with the equally important priority of keeping emergency workers safe and alive to rescue another day?

"You're playing God in a sense" said Rob McGee, secretary-treasurer of the United States Mine Rescue Association.

McGee said he can't recall a mine rescue operation that was halted while someone was still alive. But, he noted, a rescue gone awry compounds such a tragedy, adding another layer of grief. Only officials on the ground can know how best to proceed, he said.

Of course, such life or death decisions aren't confined to mining accidents. Firefighters and other first responders on the scene of crises face choices on, for example, whether to rescue people in burning buildings.

Steve Frady, a former fire chief in the historic mining town of Virginia City, noted that "people get emotionally tied into these situations, whether they are friends or relatives of victims or onlookers who don't understand the risks simply because they have not been involved in emergency situations ... It's easy to try to second guess what's going on from the outside."

Top officials with the Pershing and Lander county sheriff's departments were closely involved in the rescue effort, and did not offer comment to The Associated Press on details of the rescue effort, including whether one person, or a team, made the final decision to halt the operation. Also assisting on the scene were personnel from Newmont Mining Corp., the U.S. Navy, the U.S. Bureau of Land Management, and the Nevada departments of public safety and minerals.

Schrempp told The Associated Press that the family was told that rescuers were able to get within about 50 feet of Westenskow before they had to pull back early Friday, due to the hazards.

Westenskow, of Evanston, Wyo., had children ranging in age from 1 to 9, and was divorced but engaged to be married, his family said.





Klitschko, Haye agree to fight this summer

Klitschko and WBA holder David Haye have finally agreed to fight, setting up an eagerly anticipated

heavyweight title bout for this summer.

After months of failed negotiations, both boxers confirmed Sunday the fight should take place on June 25 or July 2 at a venue in Germany that is yet to "I am really pleased that we have closed a deal on

this fight," the 34-year-old Klitschko told the Welt am Sonntag newspaper. Haye pulled out of a fight with Klitschko in 2009 with a back injury and talks between the two camps

have collapsed several times since. "I always believed we'd one day fight and I'm glad we've cut through the nonsense and put together the most important fight in the heavyweight division," said the 30-year-old Haye, who plans to retire in October.

'This is the match the boxing world has been calling for since I first decided to step into the heavyweight division, and I feel it is my destiny to fight and beat Wladimir Klitschko. We are the best two heavyweights in the world and it would have been a travesty for us to have never fought."

Haye's camp said the deal, which will unify three of the four recognized belts in the division, was struck with Klitschko on Friday.

"Klitschko is ready made for me. I eat tall, chinny Eastern European heavyweights for breakfast. Wladimir is a fighter that doesn't like to fight," said Have, who won the WBA belt by defeating Russian giant Nikolay Valuev in November 2009 and since then has successfully defended his title twice.

Weaken day care regulation? Not on your child's life

fter years of work, state Sen. Tim Corder, R-Mountain Home, and then-Rep. George Sayler, D-Coeur d'Alene, persuaded the Idaho Legislature to pass and Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter to sign the Idaho's first child-care regulation with

And now, like clockwork, opponents are trying to roll it back.

Our view: On the issue of the safety of children in daycare, the Legislature should not give an inch.

What do you think?

We welcome viewpoints from our readers on this and other issues.

On Thursday, the Idaho House of Representatives passed House Bill 129, which would significantly weaken day care regulation in Idaho. The proposal would do away with strict age-group boundaries in favor of a point-based staffing system that sponsors claim would make it easier for children of different ages to participate in activities and classes together.

If the Senate and the governor agree, kids would be assigned different numerical point values based on their age. A child younger than 18 months old would count for two points, a child 18 months to under 5 years would be one, and children ages 5-12 would be assigned half a point.

Each day care worker could be assigned a maxi-

mum of 12 points or 12 children, regardless of age. Corder thinks that's a lousy idea, and he's right.

"It is irresponsible and dangerous for children," Corder told the *Times-News*. "The Senate version in 2009 and the compromise version last year were focused on the children."

Corder's objection: Too few caregivers looking after too many kids.

"It is a rollback," the senator said, "perhaps even pre-2009."

In retrospect, we should have seen this coming. The bill's sponsors are state Rep. Janice McGeachin, R-Idaho Falls, and Rep. Lynn Luker, R-Boise, supporters of the notion that what happens to your preschooler in day care isn't really any

of the government's business. To be blunt, that's crazy.

There are a few issues - a very few - on which compromise is wrong, and one of them is the safety of children.

If HB129 becomes law, the same sponsors will be back in the next legislative session looking to weaken child care regulation even further.

During the debate over day care regulation, a reporter asked Corder if he thought his regulation proposal would upset day care operators. The senator replied that it was the kids, not the child care vendors, he was worried about.

We wish there were more legislators like him.

The fictitious world of Mike Huckabee

ike Huckabee is supposed to be the Republican with a heart. He's the guy who said Mexicans are people too during the 2008 race for the White House. He's the weight-loss humanist who refused to join that anti-common-sense fringe of his party bashing Michelle Obama for suggesting that children eat more vegetables.

But beneath the veneer of Aw-Shucks-Huck is a public figure, and possible presidential candidate, who has shown a pattern of telling outright falsehoods about himself and the president.

This week, he backstepped from an extraordinary interview in which he had claimed, several times, that President Obama grew up in Kenya. But before that, Huckabee had created a shell of mistruths about a felon he helped to free early when he was governor of Arkansas. This man went on to murder four police officers in cold blood in Washington.

Mike Huckabee has shown a pattern of telling outright falsehoods about himself and the president.

Obama grew up in Hawaii, spent some years in Indonesia, and then went to college in California. He visited Kenya, the home of a father he never knew, in his 20s. Mostly, he was raised by his white grandparents in Hawaii.

Facing a storm of criticism, Huckabee turned churlish. He said he had simply "mispoken" while promoting his latest book of tired homilies. He meant to say Indonesia, not Kenya.

That doesn't wash, given that Huckabee in the same radio interview spun a similar and more elaborate fantasy of how Obama's world view was shaped by the "Mau-Mau" movement in Kenya. If Huckabee meant to say Indonesia, he would have made up something about Obama hat-

ing the colonial Dutch and having a thing against nut-

This colonial construct sounds like something Huckabee picked up from one of the nutty books they promote on Fox.

This is troubling enough for a man who may one day be asked to make momentous decisions based on facts. It also shows that Huckabee will stir the same poison pot about Obama to please a Republican primary base in which half the voters think the president is not an American citizen.

But an even bigger fiction is the one Huckabee tells about the violent felon Maurice Clemmons. Here was Huckabee last month, at an informal gathering of reporters in Washington, after being asked about having granted Clemmons's plea for early release:

"There was a kid who was 16 years old, he committed a burglary, he was aggravated, but not armed. And for that he got 108 years," Huckabee said. "One-hundred-andeight years."

Sounds awful. Only in Arkansas would they put a black teenager away for 108 years for a single burglary. Except it's not true, as a routine check of the record would show.

Clemmons was facing eight felony charges at the peak of a crime spree, not one. He was 17. During a reign of terror, he broke into the home of a cop, stole guns, assaulted and robbed a woman, and broke into the home of state trooper.

In prison, he committed a half-dozen assaults, harassed guards and had sex with inmates as part of a pattern of preying on fellow convicts.

Despite his bad behavior, he would have been eligible for parole after serving 18 years, not 108. But he got out early, serving 11 years, because Huckabee fell for the oldest con ruse in the book.

While saying he was under "the watchful eyes of the Lord," Clemmons assaulted two inmates. "God bless you," Clemmons wrote Huckabee, a Baptist minister, in his plea for mercy. "It is so prayed!"

In that same plea, he claimed to be a model prisoner. In fact, he'd been disciplined 29 times. Had Huckabee checked with prosecutors, prison guards or victims, he would have found grave concerns about letting Clemmons loose on the community. The prison system risk assessment categorized him as "most likely to return to vio-

And he did, sadly, in late 2009, murdering four officers who sat drinking their morning coffee. Clemmons was later killed during a massive manhunt.

During more than 10 years as governor, Huckabee granted twice as many requests for clemency as his predecessors had over 17 years. Some of the most hardened convicts played the religion card, and went on to further violence.

The pattern here raises two major concerns. He constructs alternative views: a convict is saved by Jesus, instead of using Jesus to get out of jail, or, Obama is a bad president because he's not really an American.

The second question is about judgment, always the most crucial thing to consider in a person who wants to be president. If Huckabee can't see past a crude convict ploy to his heart, how can he judge the North Koreans?

Huckabee makes a very good living from his employer at Fox News, and from more than a half-dozen books about values. One of the books is called Character Makes a Difference, and another Dothe Right Thing.

White House tries to calm U.S. Muslims as House hearing nears

STERLING, Va. - The White House took a preemptive step to defuse an emerging controversy Sunday, sending out a top aide to reassure American Muslims that the U.S. government doesn't see them as a collective threat.

McDonough, Denis deputy national security adviser to President Barack Obama, addressed a largely Muslim audience days before congressional hearings into homegrown Islamic terrorism. The hearings, which sparked protests in New York on Sunday, will be led by U.S. Rep. Peter King, R-N.Y., chairman of the Homeland Security Com-

In his speech to members of the All Dulles Area Muslim Society, McDonough said, "The bottom line is this: When it comes to preventing violent extremism and terrorism in the United States, Muslim Americans are not part of the problem; you're part of the solution."

Earlier Sunday, King told CNN's "State of the Union" that al-Qaida terrorists are "attempting to recruit within the United States. People in this country are being self-radicalized."

The Obama administration is clearly worried that the hearings, which begin Thursday, could open a rift with Muslim leaders whose cooperation is needed to foil terrorist recruitment. A message from McDonough's speech was that the Muslim community is vital to a larger strategy of preventing the "radicalization" of American youths.

"Our challenge, and the goal that President Obama has insisted that we also focus on, is on the front end: preventing al-Qaida from recruiting and radicalizing people in America in the first place," McDonough said. "And we know this isn't the job of government alone. It has to be a partnership with you - the communities being targeted most directly by al-Qaida."

Study: Mom's blood test can reveal Down syndrome

NEW YORK (AP) - Scientists in Europe report they were able to diagnose Down syndrome prenatally by giving a simple blood test to pregnant women, an approach that might one day help them avoid the more extensive procedure used now to detect the condition.

The preliminary report published online Sunday in the journal Nature Medicine is the latest of several recent studies that suggest scientists can spot Down syndrome through fetal DNA that has been shed into the mother's bloodstream.

Down syndrome, which results in cognitive delays, is caused by having an extra copy of a particular chromosome. Currently, pregnant women get blood tests and ultrasound to find out if the fetus is at risk for Down syndrome. For a firm diagnosis, doctors take a sample of amniotic fluid or the placenta.

Those sampling procedures involve a small risk of miscarriage. A reliable diagnostic blood test also could give an answer earlier than the standard tests.

Several research teams have published studies suggesting that analyzing the mother's blood can detect Down syndrome in a fetus. There's no commercial test available yet, but at least one company hopes to introduce one in the U.S. within about

RAYNE, La. - As the storm roared toward Pauline Patton's apartment, she peered out the window and saw something she wasn't ready for: A funnel cloud. Suddenly, the power went out. Rainwater poured through the ceiling. And as everything went black, she heard what sounded like a bomb exploding overhead.

Still, residents said the tornado that killed a woman the day before and displaced hundreds could have been much worse. Many have turned their attention to taking care of pets and retrieving essentials left behind while evacuating.

Farewells for 2 space crews and for shuttle Discovery

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. – The space shuttle and space station crews hugged goodbye Sunday after more than a week together, but saved their most heartfelt farewell for Discovery.

On its final voyage after nearly three decades, Discovery, the most traveled rocketship ever, will be retired following this week's return to Earth.

The hatches between Discovery and the International Space Station were sealed Sunday afternoon, setting the stage for the shuttle's departure first thing Monday.

"We're going to miss you," the space station's commander, Scott Kelly, told the six shuttle astronauts "But most of all we're going to miss Dis-

"Discovery has been a great ship and has really supported the International Space Station more so, I think, than any other space shuttle. We wish her fair winds and follow-

ing seas." Shuttle skipper Steven Lindsey nodded in agreement, then shook hands with Kelly. Lindsey noted that all the mission objectives had been accomplished: The new storage unit carried up by Discovery was installed and unloaded, leaving behind an empty, pristine compartment ready to serve its purpose.

Lead flight director Royce Renfrew radioed up congratulations to the two crews, before the hatches slammed shut. He said he was "really proud to take Discovery home at the very top of

her game," and he credited foot-long, the astronauts in large part. 'You guys rock,' he said.

Mission Control gave Discovery's astronauts two extra days at the orbiting outpost. They took advantage of the bonus time to empty the storage unit of all the gear that went up inside it. The bonus days stretched the entire mission to 13 days on top of the 352 days already logged during Discovery's previous 38 missions.

In their last hour together, the 12 astronauts amused themselves in the new 21-

Libyan forces push back rebels

RAS LANOUF, Libya -Rebels seeking to advance toward the hometown of Libyan leader Moammar Gadhafi and open a new front threatening his capital were battered from the ground and air, forcing them to retreat along a stretch of Mediterranean coast vital to both sides.

A bloodied convoy of rebel vehicles retreated from Bin Jawwad, the western front of the rebels' advance in eastern Libva, and regrouped 27 miles to the east in Ras Lanouf, whose oil complex and port the rebels had seized two days earlier.

A sudden counterattack Sunday by pro-Gadhafi forces seemed to stun the rebels, who a few hours earlier had spoken of pushing past Bin Jawwad, which they'd captured the previous day, to lay siege to Sirte, Gadhafi's hometown and stronghold where thousands of pro-government fighters have massed.

Bin Jawwad lies on the fault line between western Libya, controlled by Gadhafi, and eastern regions liberated from Gadhafi by the opposition last month. Gadhafi's forces also aton Sunday.

If the rebels managed to capture Sirte, they would have a relatively clear path to the capital, confronting



rently, in order to reinforce opposition groups battling rooftops and pro-government forces in Tripoli and nearby Misurata, rebel fighters must take a dangerous detour south positions. through the Sahara Desert.

It is equally important for rebels to hold Ras Lanouf, home to an oil refinery and petrochemical complex, a port and a small airport. By holding Ras Lanouf and Port Brega, the rebels control the flow of petroleum in eastern Libya, which rifles. produces three-quarters of the country's oil.

In addition to the fighting in Bin Jawwad on Sunday, an airstrike by government warplanes targeted tacked rebels holding two Ras Lanouf, destroying towns close to the capital three hangars at a small military base.



HAILEY — The players filter onto the court, introducing themselves to competitors they haven't met and shaking hands or sharing man-hugs with those they already know. There's a little joking as they decide which two guys will face off, then the referee tosses the ball into the air, and the game is on. Captains shout from the sidelines, shoes squeak on the polished planks, and cheers go up from the stands as families and friends watch the score.


A player tussles for a rebound and tries to jump up for another point, but doesn't quite make the shot. "Nice hustle," his teammate calls as the 10 men sprint toward the other end of the court, following a stolen ball.

This is adult league basketball, a way that men and a few women - stay in shape and socialize during the winter months in southcentral Idaho. There are varying levels of competitiveness, making the game appealing to players of virtually all shapes and abilities.

"It's a great way to get healthy without knowing it," said Paul Zimmerman of Bellevue. He regularly works out on a stationary bike and elliptical machine at the gym, but enjoys the competitiveness and camaraderie of league basketball. "Play with your heart or go home."

Many league teams are made up of friends or



BREATHE HARD AND GET BUMPED

For most league basketball players, the rewards of play outweigh the risks — but there are definitely both in this fastpaced contact sport.

The primary benefit of basketball is aerobic, because players run back and forth across the court as the ball changes

"At the beginning of the season you'll see guys who are checking in and out of the games a lot more; they're more tired," said Brandy Mason, recreation coordinator for the Twin Falls Parks and Recreation District. "By the end, they're playing a lot longer, they've gotten a little quicker. They're making shots at the end of the season when they couldn't even have gotten it to the basket at the beginning."

Basketball also builds core muscles because there's a lot of bending, twisting and other agility movement, and all that running strengthens the lower body.

Your legs get sore from running so much, your calves," said Skylar Tolman of Hailey, who plays in the Blaine County basketball league, but is also beginning track season at Wood River High School. He said playing with his friends in the league is fun, but there are drawbacks competing against some of the more aggressive teams. "They like to slap and throw knees that aren't seen by the refs," he said. Minor injuries aren't uncommon, said Scott Rogers, director of recreation at College of Southern Idaho, listing every-

thing from bruises to jammed fingers to rolled ankles. There are occasionally more serious injuries, like a broken arm received by one of the college's league players when he came down hard after going up for a basket. He suggests having a supply of ibuprofen, ice and athletic tape on hand if you want to play in the more competitive leagues,

and don't forget your inhaler if you have breathing issues. **Talk to your doctor** before playing if you've had injuries to your ankles, knees, elbows or back — basketball can exacerbate those weaknesses and even cause re-injury, but there are wraps, braces and other ways to minimize potential damage.

(For) bad knees, it's not the best because of the pounding, but you'd be surprised how many braces there are out on the floor," Mason said.

What's new in the world of sports bras

Everyone has a pair of feet, but women have an additional pair of something to worry about while exercising. And they're every bit as tricky to fit, control and probeginning to rival shoes as the most technical of all sporting apparel.

When the Jogbra was born 1977, two jockstraps stitched together were a revelation. These days, the sci-

ence that goes into corralling women's chests is much more extensive, with garments designed to smush in and hold up while wicking moisture, feeling comfortable and - hopefully - looking good.

The best news is for welltect, which is why bras are endowed women. More designers have jumped into the market with gravity-fighting creations, including Athleta, which launched its Signature Sports Bra line in January.

GETTING A GOOD FIT

Straps: If they're digging in or falling off, something's wrong. Keep in mind that racerback styles can't slip. Cup: Measure around the fullest point of the bust and then subtract the rib cage measurement to determine your cup size. Many women opt for a too-large band and compensate with a too-small cup.

Band: Measure the rib cage just under the bust, then add four to get your band size. This should feel more snug than a lingerie bra and fit on the loosest hook. Underwire: Some women refuse to wear underwire for exercise, but it makes the band more secure, which is especially helpful for those with larger chests. Style: Compression bras hug the breasts to the body, while encapsulation bras support each breast separately. The best bets are combos that do both.

SHOPPING SMART

1. Do your chosen activity when you're trying on a bra: run, jump, do downward-facing dog. "Try lying on your back," advises exercise scientist LaJean Lawson, who tests bras for Champion. "You don't want anything

poking you.' 2. Check out the side view. If your breasts are popping out, the cups are too small. If the fabric is wrinkling, they're too big. The band should stay level, and there should be no itchy or hot spots.

3. Repeat this process for your bras at home. The general rule: A sports bra should never celebrate a birthday, though that depends on how much it's worn and how it's treated.

If today's bidding seems startling, it is because we have all become so scientific that the good old-fashioned, purely quantitative way of bidding slams has been allowed to sink into oblivion. But scientific bidding is designed to assist difficult hands — not to distort easy ones. This deal calls for judgment rather than science. There are very few hands that North can hold that will not offer play for a small slam, while it is unlikely that he holds the exact cards needed for a grand slam. The direct jump to slam has the advantage of giving nothing away – and indeed might mislead defenders who expect declarer to have a void, or some other freakish hand.

Against the heart slam, West leads the diamond queen and continues with a second round, which South trumps. The contract is safe provided the spades break 3-3 or the jack comes down. There is an extra chance, that the hand with four spades to the jack also holds the club king. As this may be West, the club ace is played off, a Vienna Coup, then the heart jack is overtaken in dummy for the second diamond ruff, followed by the heart ace and two of the top spades.

Finally all the trumps are run off, reducing to a two-card ending. On the last trump declarer has a spade and the club queen on the board, the Q-10 of spades in hand, and West is squeezed in the black suits.

worth finding out if West has promised "real" clubs or could have just three clubs. If West could be balanced, I'd guess to lead clubs, but if West has guaranteed a real club suit, I'd try my luck with a spade. When East has values and has jumped to two notrump, diamonds don't look like an attractive option. Also note that partner did not overcall in that suit.




