Schools celebrate funding approval

Questions linger for Cassia Co. after \$41.5M proposal fails

By Amy Huddleston Times-News writer

Three Magic Valley public school districts are thanking voters for their support in passing desired supplemental levies.

While school districts in Gooding, Jerome and Twin Falls celebrated the passage of locally approved funding, Cassia County school officials were left wondering how to continue after voters dumped proposed funding for new buildings for the third time.

Twin Falls voters approved \$7.5 million in new funding for the Twin Falls School District. Superintendent Wiley Dobbs said he would have liked to see more voters, but said he was thankful for the support of those who participated.

"We are pausing today to thank our community members," Dobbs said. "We are grateful they did this in a time when our economy is weak. This is just one piece of the puzzle, and now we know we can count on our supplemental levy funding, because we know we will be cut at the state level."

Cassia County School District's proposal for \$41.5 million to build three new schools and update other facilities failed for the third time since 2008. Superintendent Gaylen Smyer said he was disappointed and didn't know if the board would pursue another vote in the near future. "Given the circumstances, I can see where people didn't feel like they had the confidence to commit to a bond like that," he said.

BOISE - Idaho is just one signature away from tying teachers' pay to their accomplishments.

But how to fund the \$38 million plan remains uncertain.

The House passed with a 44-26 Wednesday vote a bill that puts a merit-pay plan in place starting in the 2012-13 school year. It's the second part of Superintendent of Public Instruction Tom Luna's threepiece "Students Come First" education overhaul to pass both the House and Senate.

The existing system, which pays teachers based on their education level and years in the classroom, is "arcane" and based on a "19th-century model," said House Education Committee Chairman Rep. Bob Nonini, R-Coeur d'Alene. "It doesn't work," he said. "It doesn't recognize excellence."

The bill would allow teachers to earn up to \$8,000 in yearly bonuses tied to academic growth of students in

How a DNA database works

A swab of an individual's mouth is taken. usually by staffers with the Idaho Department of Correction or probation and parole personnel, and sent to the ISP laboratory. The lab runs the DNA profile, which consists of a series of numbers that can be compared against other DNA profiles for potential matches. A sample is assigned a bar code for tracking

in the database, without the felon's personal information. If there's a match, the bar code is run in a separate database to obtain the person's identification. Other states can search the national FBI database, but cannot view the DNA profile itself unless there is a potential match.

Bill would protect farms from nuisance suits

JEROME - Dean Dimond has no difficulty imagining in the Idaho Supreme Court, how a massive feedlot could affect his livelihood. He has only to gaze across the fence line on his farm in the heart of Idaho's dairy country to envision the dust and odors a farm big enough to handle 13,000 cows could generate.

Dimond, 38, who raises cattle, hay, grain and corn on 450 acres near Jerome, is one of a handful of residents fighting a

proposal to put a confined animal feeding operation, or CAFO, next to his land.

While their case is pending state lawmakers are considering legislation to make it more difficult for citizens to file lawsuits to stop the expansion of such feedlots or protest farming methods that create noise or stir up dust and offensive odors. Lawmakers in several other states are con-

sidering similar measures.

Teachers continue anti-reform rallies

Protesters converged upon Twin Falls City Park, linking arms and waving signs at passing motorists. Downtown Buhl became another

rallying grounds for protesters, and Kimberly educators participated in an early morning demonstration.

Jerome educators planned to wear black on Wednesday, and human chains were also planned in Burley, Hailey and Ketchum. But things were all quiet at Burley High School Wednesday afternoon, despite a Tuesday announcement by the Idaho Education Association that educators would "surround the school in Cassia County" with a human chain.

The bodies of two eastern Idaho residents were found Wednesday in the wreckage of an airplane that crashed in southern Twin Falls County.

Danny Summers, 55, of Sugar City, and Jodi Wyatt, 47, of Rexburg, were found dead Wednesday afternoon by Twin Falls County Search and Rescue members. Their bodies have not yet been positively identified, but they were believed to be the aircraft's occupants.

Summers' Douglas Aircraft A-1 Skyraider took off from Wendover, Utah, at approximately 4 p.m. Tuesday. It was reported missing about two hours later, when it failed to arrive in Idaho Falls.

Trial set for man accused of grand theft

A May trial is set for James J. Johnson, accused of stealing a 2006 Nissan pickup from a Twin Falls residence in September.

Johnson, 30, of Twin Falls, was arraigned in Twin Falls County 5th District Court Monday, where he pleaded not guilty to felony grand theft, along with additional charges added upon his arrest in January: domestic violence, burglary and three counts of operating a vehicle without the owner's consent.

According to online court records, Johnson has prior convictions for misdemeanor battery – four from 2008 and one from 2007 and misdemeanor driving under the influence.

Campuses should be about learning, not about fear

ineteen months ago, after a 19-8 football loss to Boise State in Bronco Stadium, University of Oregon running back La-Garrette Blount punched BSU linebacker Byron Hout and knocked him to the ground. And he did so on national television.

The incident took place in a section of the stadium filled with Bronco fans, but to make things worse BSU replayed the punch several times on a giant screen in the stadium's north end. As the crowd of 34,127 jeered, Blount - escorted off the field by an Oregon assistant coach - got into another confrontation with Bronco supporters.

By any standards, things got ugly. Think how much worse they might have been had state Rep. Erik Simpson, R-Idaho Falls, had his way.

Simpson wants to prevent Idaho college and universities from banning guns on campus, including at football and basketball games. The House State Affairs Committee is scheduled to take action on his bill today.

Our view: Why, exactly, do students on Idaho colleges campuses need to be packing heat?

Simpson's GOP House colleagues, Carlos Bilbao of Emmett, thinks it's a lousy idea.

"I attend all the home basketball and football games," Bilbao said Wednesday at a hearing on the bill. "There has always been some kind of an altercation. The Boise Police have done an excellent job. ... I'm not going to vote for your bill for this reason: I don't want to sit next to someone that's carrying a gun. These altercations, when they do occur, get into fisticuffs, and it does take two policemen to spread them. And if one guy has a gun, I can

assure you that they'll probably pull the gun out....I can't see that, unless you put sideboards on - no guns at athletic games."

We're amazed that Simpson learned so little from the massacres at the University of Texas at Austin, Seton Hall University, Northern Illinois University and Virginia Tech over the past four years.

"My concern is the safety of our campus, so that's the way I look at this issue," John Uda, executive director of security at Boise State and a former FBI agent. "I could not find the compelling information that would lead me to be for this bill. During the past 15 years, people have been 60 times less likely to be murdered on a college campus than in society. ... The odds are one in a million."

Uda says the crime rate on his campus is low. "Will adding guns to this equation lower crime rates even more?" he asked. He noted that some students have mental health issues, or use drugs or alcohol. "Students undergo a tremendous amount of personal development during their college years. ... Adding a weapon to a university environment will serve as an accelerant for conflict, not a deterrent."



Here's another: People otherwise inclined to support the president have noticed that in certain respects, he's the Nowhere Man.

Rush Marcus of The Washington Post wrote that we're living through the "Where's Waldo Presidency." Obama, she wrote, can be "strangely passive" and "unwilling, reluctant or late

He gave only scanty marching orders to Congress on health care. With his recent budget, he abdicated on the deficit and entitlement reform. He all but ignored the recommendations of his own deficit reduction commission.

More recently, he has had little to say about the uprising in Libya and what he said, he said late. Americans have watched as European countries have taken the lead in the scramble to devise effective options to aid the rebels.

The Marcus column could well be a harbinger - a notice to others in the media that it's now acceptable to begin unloading their own frustrations with this president.

Despite all this, many Republicans surveying their party's prospects for 2012 remain cautious or downright

notoriously tough to unseat. Obama will draw from a very deep campaign war chest. He'll be campaigning with the full trappings of his office, which comes with a large retinue and a big im-

pressive airplane. "Republicans underestimate President Obama at their own peril," former Bush adviser Karl Rove told Politico. Still, Rove rated Obama only a "slight favorite."

What has Republicans most worried is the lack of a clear champion. It's very early, but the contenders most often mentioned have obvious liabilities.

Mitt Romney was beaten last time out by John Mc-Cain, a deeply flawed candidate, and as governor, implemented an Obamacare precursor – the disastrous Massachusetts health plan.

Mike Huckabee doesn't

whatever you think about Sarah Palin, she has high negatives and remains divisive.

The candidates you'd like to see in the race aren't running, at least not yet: Gov. Chris Christie of New Jersey, former Florida governor Jeb Bush and Gov. Mitch Daniels of Indiana.

In short, this is a worrisome picture for Republicans, and it would be a shame if heavy hitters like Christie or Daniels sit this one out.

Obama may be formidable, but he's not unbeatable. In two years, unemployment will probably remain high, Obama will still be playing defense on health care and taxes and more voters are likely to be fed up with the Where's Waldo Presidency.

Memo to candidates still playing coy: 1. Victory is a real possibility. 2. Carpe diem.

Education numbers don't add up

I really enjoyed Monday's (March 1) editorial but my question is: How many classes are those 2,930 students taking? \$12.8 mil for 2,930 students works out to just over \$4,500 per student, which I understand is slightly more than our current schools get to teach a student for a whole year.

First, I think that is an important point to single out. Second, my understanding is most virtual academy students are taking one to two classes at a time which would mean if all those students were taking two classes each semester that would mean the virtual academy is receiving more than \$4,500 per student to teach four classes per year. Our traditional schools are teaching at least 10 classes per year per student for slightly less money.

Another way to look at it is if the same money was spent on traditional classrooms, my math works out

to more than \$130k for 98 classes of 30 students, if that money was spent on traditional classrooms. Now that is a lot of money for a 30-student classroom that I'm sure no school would turn down.

I would challenge the Times-News staff to compare apples to apples and really find out how many classes were taught to those 2,930 students for \$12.8 million. To be honest I can't believe more people are not looking at what an atrocious misuse of our tax dollars that appears to be.

Idaho could use a bill that regulates texting while driving. The last thing it needs is a bill that badly regulates (some) texting while driving.

Unfortunately, a 2011 model of texting legislation falls into that the mushy latter category.

Here's the business end of House Bill 141, sponsored by Rep. Marv Hagedorn, R-Meridian: "No person operating a motor vehicle shall use a hand-held electronic device that causes such person to be distracted or otherwise fail to exercise due care."

The bill is on hold for a possible rewrite. Let's just say there's ample room for improvement.

Consider the message Hagedorn's bill would send to young drivers – which, ostensibly, is one of the main purposes of passing a texting law.

First, it says that texting is OK as long as the driver manages to "exercise due care." Implying, of course, that someone actually possesses the multitasking skills to pull this off.

Second, it says the Legislature isn't serious about passing a texting law. If lawmakers really want to address the documented link between texting and road risks, they'll find language that provides some deterrent to drivers and some direction to law enforcement.

This legislation does nei-

ther. If, indeed, this turns out to be the best the Legislature can muster, you can expect to see more cities follow Twin Falls and Hagedorn's hometown of Meridian, by passing local texting ordinances.

Texting while driving has proven to be a sticky issue. Some lawmakers want a standalone ban, or language worked into attentive-driving law. Some lawmakers think the inattentive driving ban is sufficient. Consequently, this proved to be the last issue considered – and tabled - by the 2010 Legislature.

Lawmakers have had 11 months to figure out a way to get this right. And for 2011, the clock is ticking.



... the Legislature stinks

Cattle droppings may get more protection from the Idaho Legislature this year than education funding.

Why? Because Boise knows best.

The misnamed expansion of Idaho's Right to Farm law would gut the ability of county elected officials to control siting and expansion of feedlots and other industrial farms that produce noxious odors and sometimes pollute groundwater.

The bill would also make it so onerous for opponents to challenge industrial farming in court that few in their right minds would attempt to do so.

The bill got out of committee and will be taken up soon by the full House.

Anyone who drives to Twin Falls along state Highway 75 or has had the pleasure of visiting small communities along the Snake River knows that the stench that emanates from indus-

trial farming operations brings tears to the eyes.

It's a stench that has manifested itself in the last decade as industrial agriculture displaced small family farms, fouled the air, threatened the purity of groundwater and dropped values of nearby properties.

The legislators who brought this bill, including House Speaker Lawerence Denney, want to override the power of elected officials in communities whose residents breathe the same air and drink the same water into which the industrial ag operators release cattle and crop wastes.

What's next? A "Right to Bury Nuclear Waste Anywhere" bill?

While legislators are solicitous of cattle, kids aren't getting the same respect.

With a vote of 16-3, the Idaho Revenue and Taxation Committee weighed in against trusting elected school board officials in Blaine and three other counties to manage school funding.

The committee voted to overturn a law that allows the counties to maintain a permanent school tax override levy, which, in the Blaine County School District, accounts for 60 percent, or \$29.5 million, of the operating budget.

The new law would require that the levy go to the voters once every two years, destructively destabilizing programs and the district's ability to attract and retain good teachers.

The committee rejected three hours of testimony opposing the bill and agreed with an Idaho Farm Bureau representative who said voter control was more important than certainty in school funding.

If both the agriculture and education bills pass, Idaho could become known for protecting industrial-sized piles of polluting cow manure while endangering good education. The state hates federal intrusions on its power, but thinks nothing of handcuffing cities, counties and schools. It just stinks.

... sell the governor's mansion

In 2004, Idaho icon and French fry mogul J.R. Simplot donated his hilltop mansion in north Boise to the state of Idaho to use as its official governor's residence. It was a generous gift. But

sometimes, even the most well-intentioned gifts get returned. It's time for the state to do just that with the governor's mansion.

Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter doesn't even live there. He lives on his ranch near Star. So the residence sits vacant. And given Idaho's geography and independent spirit, one has to wonder if any future governor would live there. It's difficult and inconvenient to get to, for starters.

It's also a money pit that's costing hundreds of thousands of dollars a year to maintain - for nobody. Annual costs are estimated at \$200,000, and there are also liability issues for kids who use the steep slopes beneath the house for winter sledding, according to an Associated Press report. The state has paid for five years of upkeep on an empty house, and \$310,000 in private dona-



tions has been used to fund renovations. The taxpayerbacked fund established to maintain the property is estimated to be gone in five vears.

But selling it right away isn't as easy as it might seem. The terms of the deal Idaho agreed to when it took the land from Simplot stated that if the state sells it, Simplot's family gets 60 days to match any offer. Should the offer be \$2.1 million or less, the family could reclaim the property without paying a thing.

In the summer of 2007, the mansion made "headlines" when vandals used a herbicide to burn the image of a 60-foot-tall phallus into the grass beneath the mansion.

The state had been giving its governor a \$4,500 monthly housing stipend to pay for his housing, but Otter stopped accepting that two years ago.

It's time for the state to unload the property. Even if it means handing it back to the Simplots. Let's stop paying for maintenance and upkeep and eventually get that property on the tax rolls so that it's bringing in money to Idaho – not wasting it.




NEW YORK – Walgreen Co. said Wednesday it is leaving the pharmacy benefits management business, selling that operation to Catalyst Health Solutions Inc. for \$525 million in cash and freeing it to focus on its ple. drugstore network, the largest in the United States.

The companies expect to complete the deal by the end of June assuming regulators approve. The pharmacy benefits management business, known as Walgreens Health Initiatives, has never approached the size of Care-



The S&P index lost 1.80 points, or 0.1 percent, to close at 1,320.02. The Dow Jones industrial average dipped 1.29, or less than 0.1 percent, to 12,213.09. The Nasdaq composite fell 14.05, or 0.5 percent, to 2,751.72.

Declining stocks narrowly outpaced rising ones on the New York Stock Exchange. Consolidated volume was 3.7 billion.



WISCONSIN **Senate Republicans** bypass Democrats on collective bargaining

MADISON - Republicans in the Wisconsin Senate voted Wednesday night to strip nearly all collective bargaining rights from public workers after discovering a way to bypass the chamber's missing Democrats.

All 14 Senate Democrats fled to Illinois nearly three weeks ago, preventing the chamber from having enough members present to consider Gov. Scott Walker's so-called "budget repair bill" - a proposal introduced to plug a \$137 million budget shortfall.

The Senate requires a quorum to take up any measures that spend money. But Republicans on Wednesday split from the legislation the proposal to curtail union rights, which spends no money, and a special conference committee of state lawmakers approved



LIBYA **Oil installations set** ablaze as battles rage

RAS LANOUF – A giant yellow fireball shot into the sky, trailed by thick plumes of black smoke Wednesday after fighting between rebels and forces loyal to Moammar Gadhafi set two oil installations ablaze and inflicted yet more damage on Libya's crippled energy industry.

In the west, Gadhafi claimed victory in recapturing Zawiya, the city closest to the capital that had fallen into opposition hands. The claim could not immediately be verified; phone lines there have not been working during a deadly, six-day siege.

State TV showed a crowd of hundreds, purportedly in Zawiya's main square, shouting "The people want Colonel Gadhafi!" but the location of the rally could not be independently confirmed.

Western journalists based in Tripoli were taken late Wednesday to a stadium on the outskirts of Zawiya that was filled with Gadhafi loyalists waving green flags in a similar scene, complete with fireworks. Libyan TV cameras filmed the celebrations as food, drinks and cooking oil were distributed.

Government escorts refused journalists' requests to visit the city's main square.

WASHINGTON, D.C. Senate rejects GOP, Democratic budgets

The Democratic-led Senate on Wednesday emphatically rejected a budget-slashing House spending bill as too draconian. It then immediately killed a rival Democratic plan that was derided by moderate Democrats as too timid in its drive to cut day-to-day agency budgets.

The votes to scuttle the competing measures were designed, ironically, to prompt progress. The idea was to show tea partybacked GOP conservatives in the House that they need to pare back their budget-cutting ambitions while at the same time demonstrating to Democratic liberals that they need to budge, too.

White House budget director Jacob Lew said the votes should turn a page and that talks between the administration and Republicans are likely to become more productive. Outdoors writer stomps his boots upon Third Fork

HANSEN - What started out as a blue-sky day turned overcast by the time I stomped onto Third Fork.

The gray atmosphere didn't prevent me from accomplishing my intended goal: to hike part of the miles-long loop nestled between mountains in the South Hills.

It was the snow and mud that prevented me from hiking farther than I did.

But I was on the trail for a couple of hours, stopping now and then along the way to rest and capture video.

Visitors who use Third Fork park in a large gravel parking lot next to a small stream. Picnic tables are lined up against the banks. At the far end of the lot is a sign that reads



"Third Fork Trailhead," and to its right is the trail.

I began my hike the way others do - passing the wooden sign, another rusted kiosk sign, a bird house. The

grew larger the farther I walked, especially on inclines where the sun had a difficult time hitting the trail.

I almost slipped several times as I ascended and descended these small hills, but my boots provided a strong grip and I maneuvered the trail without any mishaps.

As I've had the habit of doing on most any hike, my mind wandered as I took in the surroundings. I looked ahead and saw two crosses standing guard on the trail. But as I neared I realized these weren't the kind of crosses vou'd find in cemeteries. One cross marked the main trail. the other an alternate route.

"Let's see what's down there," I said. Since I was hiking alone, I was talking to my video camera.

The path led downward to the river that now was several yards to the right of the trail. A bridge takes hikers across the river and along another hillside. I stopped at the bridge, but eventually turned back to the main trail.

One of the things I enjoy about living in south-central Idaho is the opportunity to explore all sorts of outdoor venues, to experience nature in many of its varieties.

The South Hills is unique in that it offers a mix of blandlooking ranges, open fields with a little more personality, and mountains full of character.

Iditarod leaders beating record pace

ANCHORAGE, Alaska -Four-time defending champion Lance Mackey led a charge onto the Farewell Burn Monday night as the Iditarod Trail Sled Dog Race ripped off a blistering pace on the first full day of mushing.

Mackey rolled through the Rohn checkpoint near sunset and headed toward the Farewell Burn with 15 dogs still in harness. The Fairbanks, Alaska, musher often stops to rest not far out of Rohn.

His friend Hugh Neff of Tok, Alaska, – who has bat-tled Mackey in the Iditarod and, particularly, the Yukon Quest for years – gave chase 29 minutes later.

But the early speed of the 39th Iditarod was startling. Mackey made the 48-mile run from Rainy Pass to Rohn at a jaw-dropping average speed of 13.2 mph. While the run is largely downhill, it includes a notoriously nasty section through the Dalzell Gorge replete with sharp switchbacks. It has brought more than one musher to tears, and ended dozens of races through the years.

Giving Mercury a satellite was not an easy task

Trange as it may seem, Mercury one of the closest planets – is also one of the least visited. But for good reason.

Mariner 10, the only spacecraft to visit the innermost planet, flew past three times in the 1970s, returning our only clear views of the planet's cratered surface. Next week, if all goes well, Mercury will gain its first satellite.

Getting there wasn't easy. After launch, the MESSENGER probe had to gain 40,000 mph to pace Mercury. It did so, in part, by zipping low over Earth (once), Venus (twice), and Mercury (three times) over six years, stealing a little energy from each planet to boost its speed.

The nail-biting moment will come next Thursday night, when MESSENGER's main engine will fire for 15 minutes, expending nearly a third of its fuel to slow down enough for Mercury's gravity to pull it into orbit. After that, it will circle the planet every 12 hours, surveying Mercury's surface, magnetic field, gravitational field and space environment.

Earth-watching satellites have a relatively easy time of it, maintaining a relatively constant distance and returning images for weather prediction and monitoring the planet's activity.

But at Mercury, the closer sun appears 11 times brighter. MESSENGER hides behind a multi-layer sun shield to protect its delicate electronics from the blistering heat. Worse, Mercury itself pours heat into space at the temperature of a pizza oven, so MESSEN-GER will follow an elongat-



O "I was at the Niagara WMA last week and talked with a department employee about all the vandalism on WMAs and fishing access areas. Is there anything I can do to help the department avoid having to spend my license and tag fees fixing those things destroyed by vandalism? This just irks me to no end!"

You have hit on a sub-A ject that drives all of us in the department and most sportsmen crazy.

Last weekend vandals broke into the shop at the Niagara Wildlife Management Area. Aside from general mischief such as spraying fire extinguishers inside the shop, they destroyed the incoming electrical connection when they cut the electricity.

They also stole several power tools, personal equipment, a chain saw, and then drove a brand new department ATV into the stream. They destroyed the entrance to the shop when they crushed the door knob and drove a heavy piece of steel through the door.

Earlier this winter at the Dog Creek Reservoir fishing access, vandals shot out several windows in the newly



installed restroom facilities, tore up several fishing docks and left burned and unburned pallets full of nails in a camp fire in the parking area.

The last several weeks state and federal employees drained several of the Oster Lakes at the Hagerman WMA so they could clean up the trash that had been deposited over the years in the lakes. Employees spent more nesses can report this vanthan 100 hours working in the Oster Lakes.

Over the past weekend department employees discovered where someone had deposited nearly a pickup load of beverage bottles, glass containers and other miscellaneous trash in the newly cleaned area.

A while ago the department was rebuilding a fishing access and boat ramp along the south bank of the Snake River near Kelly's Orchard when vandals stole a department utility trailer full of hand and power tools. The trailer was chained to a tree. The chain was cut and the trailer and its contents taken. Neither the tools nor the trailer have ever been located.

The point of this week's column is to make the public aware that a significant amount of sportsmen's dollars goes to replace and repair damaged department facilities and equipment.

I also am hoping this column may enlighten some who are using these areas and witness suspicious activity, or the kind of damage described above, to contact local authorities.

uestion: About two years ago, I bought a new car from a local dealer. Because I'm 70 years old and a widower, I had the car titled in my name and my son's name. I had heard that titling the car in this way was a good

way to pass the car to my son when I die without his having to go through probate. My son had to file a personal bankruptcy a few months ago, and his bankruptcy trustee is trying to take my car. Can the trustee do this?

nswer: This is a very complicated area of bankruptcy law, but essentially, your son's name on the title to your car gave him an ownership interest in the car. His ownership interest is an asset of his, and along with his other assets, it has become part of his bankruptcy estate. Unless your son can exempt the value of his ownership interest in your car, the trustee can take the car, sell it, and distribute the money to your son's unsecured creditors. You or your attorney should contact the trustee and try to negotiate an arrangement where you can pay the trustee a sum of money in return for keeping the car. The lesson to be learned here is that you should NEVER put another person's name on the title or deed to property you own unless you are absolutely sure that the other person is financially solvent and will not be filing a bankruptcy. Idaho's Probate Code provides for an abbreviated probate procedure where property can be passed to your heirs after death very quickly and inexpensively. Therefore, placing your heir's name on a title or deed is usually unnecessary.

What's the difference between hamartoma and hematoma?

DEAR DR. GOTT: I spoke with a friend recently who said she was diagnosed with a hamartoma in her chest cavity. I corrected her and said she likely had a hematoma, but she was convinced she heard her doctor correctly. Can you tell me the right word?

DEAR READER: Without knowing your friend and her medical condition, I can only assume she is correct. I will outline the differences between the two words.



A hamartoma is a benign growth composed of an abnormal mixture of epithelial and mesenchymal elements. It is a part of any tissue that either grows faster or without the usual organization of its neighbor cells. It results from faulty development.

Their growth is limited, so they are not actually tumors, even though they are often referred to as such. They are more common in men than women, and most people so diagnosed are smokers. Growths vary in size from 1 to 9 centimeters and consist of lobules of cartilage, fat, fibromyxoid tissue and, on occasion, smooth muscle and bone. The growth of these lesions is extremely

slow, perhaps 3 millimeters

per year.

hand, develops from injury such as from a fall or banging one's arm or leg against a hard object. Blood vessels under the skin tear, blood leaks into the surrounding tissue, and a bruise or contusion results. The lesion will often turn purple, dark red, yellow/green and a variety of colors as the blood is absorbed back into the body. The process can take up to four weeks. There are some that do not reabsorb and

A hematoma, on the other need to be removed by a physician. If not removed, they may calcify. In an extremity, they cause pressure to build and cut off circulation.

> Generally speaking, bruises are not a cause for concern, and a person is generally fully aware of why a hematoma develops. Older adults, on the other hand, have less fat under the skin, and they tend to bruise easily. Aspirin and anticoagulants can cause bruising.

Disorders that cause bleeding or a clotting disorder include hemophilia, thrombocytopenia, lupus, liver disease, leukemia and other less common disorders.

Because your friend referred to her chest cavity, she likely has a harmless hamartoma. My guess is her physician will continue to monitor it on a periodic basis to ensure it does not change in appearance.







No trouble spotting hypocrisy in college sports

or all the justifiable criticism of those who run big-time college athletics, you've got to give 'em this: They don't make much of an effort to hide the hypocrisy.

The bowl system is convoluted and unfair? Sure, but the major conferences couldn't care less since they're the ones benefiting at the expense of the little guys.

The student part of student-athlete is nothing but a ruse? Of course, but English 101 is irrelevant as long as they can dunk a basketball or throw a football like a laser.

And now, our latest offering from a septic tank of a system that's unlikely to be flushed out in our lifetime.

Ohio State coach Jim Tressel was suspended for two games Tuesday after it was learned he had been tipped off nearly a year ago about a federal investigation

into questionable activities involving some of his players, including a memorabilia-for-tattoos arrangement with a very seedy parlor owner.

Problem is, Tressel didn't bother telling anyone about it, even though that very requirement is underlined in his contract. He'll also get a \$250,000 fine, a public reprimand (whatever that means on top of a suspension and fine) and have to make a public apology, no doubt ghostwritten by some combination of lawyers and public-relations folks.

"I plan to grow from this. I'm sincerely saddened by the fact that I let some people down and didn't do things as well as I possibly could have," Tressel said, tears welling in his eyes. Cry me a river.

This is nothing more than a slap on the wrist.

Why did the school decide to sit Tressel for only two games, while the players involved in the illicit behavior,

including star quarterback Terrelle Pryor, received a five-game ban from the NCAA? Why does the Ohio State coach serve a lighter sentence than former Georgia receiver A.J. Green, who got a four-game ban in a totally unrelated and seeminglv more minor case – selling a bowl jersey to put a little cash in his pocket?

Because this is college athletics, where doing what's right is usually way down on that honey-do list, certainly far behind whatever it takes to keep the money rolling in to those school coffers. (Which, of course, is why the players must remain pure amateurs, or at least work out their own side deals without getting caught.)

The Ohio State players got caught bartering football memorabilia for money and tattoos. Their coach knew

about it. Yet, the thing that surely took precedence over all that ugliness was Tressel's record on the field: 106-22 in a decade of coaching the Buckeyes, including a national championship back in 2002.

There was absolutely NO chance that Ohio State might actually do the very thing it had a right to do under Tressel's contract: Fire him for failing to report any information related to violations of NCAA, Big Ten or Ohio State bylaws and rules. Heck, according to athletic director Gene Smith, that step wasn't even seriously considered.

Why?

Have you not been listening? Remember, this is college athletics, where the overriding consideration is nearly always the bottom line. Tressel's program has made tens of millions of dollars for Ohio State. Might as well ride that gravy train a

NEW YORK — Serena Williams still has blood clots in her lung but hopes to return to tennis this summer after recovering from a pulmonary embolism, which she called the "scariest moment in my life."

The 13-time Grand Slam champion spoke on NBC's "Today" show Wednesday from Los Angeles, saying she hasn't left her house much since going to the hospital nearly three weeks ago.

"I had a lot of swelling in my leg, which really is a telltale sign of an embolism, and I could not breathe," Williams said.

She said doctors couldn't find anything in her leg and then ordered a CAT scan of her lungs.

'That's when they found several blood clots," Williams said. "They told me that they had to check me in immediately or else ... it wasn't going to be a good result."

Treating the blood clots required Williams to inject herself with a blood thinner, she said. Feeling a need to get out, she didn't let her condition deter her from attending several Oscar parties.

"I had been through so much in the past eight months," she said. "Just really kind of low on energy, but I was like 'I've got to do something, kind of just to get my spirits up.'



Both the defenders and declarers at the Dyspeptics Club are constantly under the scrutiny of their colleagues. The kibitzers tend to believe that it is better to comment and misanalyze than stay silent and be thought a fool.

On today's deal the kibitzer commented afterwards that a good opportunity had gone begging. Was he right — and if so, what was the chance?

Against three no-trump West led his fourth-highest heart to East's ace. South followed low, put in the heart 10 on the second round, and West took his queen and cleared the suit. South won in hand, crossed to the club king to take the diamond finesse, then took his extra chance of finding the spade queen doubleton to create an entry to dummy. When that didn't work, declarer's one remaining chance was to drop the diamond king. No luck — and declarer finished up with just seven tricks.

Let's replay the deal on the lead of the heart six. When East follows with the ace, the rule of 11 shows South that West has all the top hearts. Whether hearts are 4-3 or 5-2, declarer cannot win more than one heart trick.

But that is not the full story. To create an extra entry to dummy, declarer drops his heart king under the ace! Now South can reach the North hand one more time by making best use of dummy's heart jack to repeat the diamond finesse and bring home his game.
