## Recession slows hazardous-waste growth in Idaho

One silver lining of the poor economy may be less hazardous waste in Idaho.

The Idaho Department of Environmental Quality recently reported that last year saw fewer additions to the state's mounting collection of hazardous waste, both generated in-state and imported from other states and countries.

Though Idaho generated

slightly more waste last year than in 2009, the amount of waste generated in each of the last two years was the least of the decade. The information came from an annual DEQ report on the topic.

Hazardous waste includes substances or chemicals that are toxic, flammable or radioactive. Most come from businesses and industries such as automotive shops or dry cleaning.

Last year, Idaho generated more than 5,000 tons of hazardous waste, according to the DEQ re-

### PCBs PILING UP

Idaho is one of the few states that accepts waste containing polychlorinated biphenyls, which the U.S. banned in the 1970s. PCBs — once commonly found in coolants and insulating fluids — are associated with cancer, thyroid toxicity, and effects on immune, reproductive, nervous and endocrine systems. Usually, fewer than 10,000 tons of PCB waste is exported to Idaho each year. But in 2010, that amount jumped to almost 10 times that — all from a federal cleanup after General Electric capacitor manufacturing plants discharged as much as 1.3 million pounds of PCBs into the Hudson River in New York state.

port. That's half the amount of waste generated in 2000.

The total might have been even

less but for the radioactive waste generated at the Idaho National

Laboratory. Three times as much

radioactive waste — more than 1,000 tons — was added at INL last year than in the previous year.

U.S. Department of Energy spokesman Brad Bugger said the INL plant processed more waste from the Hanford nuclear facility in Washington state. Once the waste is processed, it must leave the state within six months under a settlement agreement between Idaho and the federal government.

## T.F. County seeks new home for court records

Twin Falls County needs a new place to store court records.

County Clerk Kristina Glascock, 5th District Trial Court Administrator Linda Wright and 5th District Administrative Judge G. Richard Bevan met with the county commissioners Friday morning to make their case to move thousands of court records out of the basement of the Marvin Hempleman Building at 246 Third Ave.

A written proposal highlighted

that the county could better serve the public's request to review records by keeping the archives closer to the Theron W. Ward Judicial Building, which is next to the old courthouse on Shoshone Street.

Glascock is offering up her current spot on the second floor of the old courthouse.

"My office would be a great location," she told the commissioners.

One criticism of the archive's current location is the condition of the basement itself. The basement

of the Hempleman Building has flooded in the past and ventilation is poor, making for unfavorable working conditions for records clerks. Also, the building basement is not secure for holding confidential files which are not open to the public. Bevan estimated that 10 percent of the records are confidential.

The county is continuing discussions with many other departments about how to best utilize the county-owned buildings that St. Luke's Magic Valley Medical Center is set to vacate this

summer. One suggestion from Commissioner Leon Mills is to look at space in the Shoshone Street clinic. The sheriff's office has already renovated the basement for use but much will be available when various St. Luke's services leave.

"Hold your breath for six months, and we'll evaluate where everything will go," Commissioner Terry Kramer said.

## Council to consider repair projects for Eastland Drive

A plan to fix Eastland Drive — at estimated costs of up to \$6.6 million — will come before the Twin Falls City Council today.

City staff proposes seven projects to fix the failing sections of the road, from Elizabeth Boulevard to about Bowlin Lane. The city's current budget didn't include costs for any of the projects, meaning an amendment would need to be drafted and voted on at another meeting, if the council accepts the

proposal today.

The staff report sent to the council suggests paying for the work by tapping reserve cash from other city funds, though the re-

serves don't exceed \$6 million.

The work proposed in the report is to rebuild only failing sections, though it also includes the option of repaving the entire widths of Eastland in certain portions. The first option is estimated to cost between \$3.8 million and \$6 million; the second option, repaving entire widths of the failing roads, brings the estimate to between \$4.3 million and \$6.6 million. The estimates' ranges represent favorably low and unfavorably high bids coming in for the projects.

The projects would push planned Eastland work ahead by several years. The idea of a complete rebuild of the road, similar to what happened with Washington Street last summer, floated around late last year, but would cost about \$17 million.

Also on the agenda:

- The appointment of Calvin Palmer to the Twin Falls Housing Authority board and the reappointment of Laveta Younger as a commissioner for the housing authority.

## Heider finding his place in Senate

Freshman legislator from Twin Falls wins praise from veteran colleagues

BOISE — Sen. Lee Heider's first legislative session hasn't been a slow-moving one.

The freshman Republican state senator from Twin Falls has committee assignments that put him in the thick of some of the Legislature's high-profile issues.

For example, he's on the Joint Finance-Appropriations Committee in a year when state budget-makers are trying to sort out a \$92 million spending reduction. In a year when lawmakers are weighing an overhaul of Medicaid, he's also on the Senate Health and Welfare Committee.

Two months into a grueling session, he still grins with enthusiasm when speaking about the experience so far — even when he mentions getting up before 5 a.m. so he can get to the statehouse for an early start.

"Even though I'm a little voice from Twin Falls, Idaho, and I'm a new guy, I have a voice," said Heider, a former Twin Falls city councilman.

Heider's not one to give long speeches. But he doesn't shy away from debate or tough questions, either.

He opposed an effort — which later failed — in JFAC to divert money from the Pristine Springs purchase away from the state's aquifer management plan and into the state's general fund.

He's also offered insight to his new compatriots.

Sen. Bert Brackett, R-Rogerson, bent Heider's ear with some questions on urban renewal bills since Heider has experience in that area from his city council days.

"He's a quick study," Brackett said.

Sen. Denton Darrington, R-Declo, echoed that.

# Japan’s quake stirs memories of 2008 temblor in Wells

WELLS, Nev. (AP) — The devastating earthquake in Japan is stirring bad memories for residents of a small northeastern Nevada town rocked by a temblor three years ago.

Wells residents are still rebuilding after a magnitude-6 quake damaged hundreds of homes and business buildings on Feb. 21, 2008, the Deseret News of Salt Lake City reported.

The quake also closed businesses and schools, but no serious injuries were reported.

“We’re slowly getting back into it, but every time something like Japan happens, it makes a lot of people here nervous,” said Matthew Holford, president of the Wells Chamber of Commerce.

Residents say many buildings have been repaired but buildings in the heart of the downtown have gone unrepaired due to a lack of money. The quake reduced part of Wells’ historical district to rubble.

The town, located along Interstate 80 about 60 miles from the Utah line, didn’t have enough damage to qualify for federal assistance.

“It’s sad, but the people who own these buildings do not have the money to go and clean up what needs to be done,” said resident Yvonne Stuart.

She was inside her home when the quake struck, Stuart said, and Japan’s quake brought back memories of it.

“It was like a freight train, except it was worse,” she recalled. “Everything started crashing. There was glass breaking and walls shaking.”

Now, there are emergency preparedness classes in Wells, and many residents say they know what to do the next time another quake hits.

“I think we all got prepared the very next day, and we’ve all stayed prepared,” said Denny Stanhope. “A lot of people are still buying generators, stacking away a little bit extra food, a little more of the essentials, and having some type of plan together.”

Seismologists called it the state’s most destructive quake since a series of powerful temblors around Fallon in 1954, including one of magnitude-7.1.

Some credit for reductions in other waste goes to businesses adopting more environmentally friendly practices and better recycling, said DEQ hazardous waste analyst Rene Anderson. But the lower amounts over the past few years are mostly due to economic factors.

“Less business means less waste,” Anderson said.

That observation appears to apply nationwide. Idaho accepts a lot of the nation’s waste, and the amount shipped into the Gem State has also dropped off in the past couple of years.

But it still dwarfs what

Idaho itself produces.

In 2010, Idaho accepted more than 400,000 tons of waste from 43 states and Canada. That’s the equivalent of around four fully loaded aircraft carriers.

In 2008, the amount of waste that came into Idaho was the equivalent of an armada twice that size and included shipments from as far away as Kuwait.

According to the DEQ report, all the waste imported into Idaho goes to a treatment facility near Grand View, run by U.S. Ecology Idaho since 2001. That first year, it had contracts with only 22 states and brought in half of what it did last year.

# San Francisco learns to live with coyotes

SAN FRANCISCO — Armed with a camera and a sturdy pair of boots, Janet Kessler spends most of her days roaming through lush parklands in pursuit of some of San Francisco’s most unlikely inhabitants — the city’s increasingly visible population of coyotes.

“They are my passion,” said Kessler, a 35-year San Francisco resident who has been observing and photographing coyotes in four city parks. “It’s this contradiction of an urban, settled environment and wild animals, and I find it thrilling.”

Wildlife researchers estimate that about a dozen coyotes live in San Francisco, with the first sighting in decades reported in 2001 in the Presidio, a federal park and residential neighborhood located on the city’s northern tip.

The coyotes’ ability to adapt to life in the country’s second-most densely populated major city has intrigued experts and provoked even far-fetched theories about how they came to set up residence in a city surrounded by water on three sides.

Although some view the coyotes as a hazard to pets and children, many residents have welcomed their presence, even when they stray boldly onto the streets.

“In recent years, we’ve had hawks, owls, coyotes return to this area, and it’s good to see wildlife coming back,” said John Wilk, who lives in the Diamond Heights neighborhood adjacent to Glen Canyon Park, one of the most well-known coyote habitats. Wilk said he’s had four coyote sightings on local streets and in the parking lot of the Safeway supermarket near his home.

San Francisco filmmaker Melissa Peabody was inspired to make a documentary about the coyotes after reading about one that had taken up residence a block from her house, on Bernal Hill, a 24-acre patch of na-

tive grassland bounded by residential neighborhoods. Her 2008 film, “San Francisco—Still Wild at Heart,” examines how coyotes impact urban ecosystems.

“This coyote had to find its way through a challenging and dense urban landscape to get to a beautiful but modest park, where it could take a breather,” Peabody said. “It drew my respect, my sympathy and my curiosity.”

Lt. Le-Ellis Brown, who keeps track of coyotes for the city’s Animal Care and Control agency, says reports of attacks on humans are virtually nonexistent, though they have been known to chase unleashed dogs and prey upon the occasional cat. He said about half the calls the agency receives about coyotes are complaints related to the callers’ pets, while the rest are reports of coyote sightings.

“I think a lot of people know it’s kind of cool to see a coyote,” Brown said.

But others who frequent the parks or live near coyote habitats say the animals are an unwelcome addition to the urban landscape.

Holly Davidson, a resident of the Presidio, said she frequently encounters coy-

otes in neighbors’ yards when out walking with her yellow Labrador and 3-year-old son.

“These days we see them all the time. They are everywhere and have become an aggressive pest,” she said.

“There are people whose attitude is, ‘Get them out of here,’” said Sally Stephens, chair of San Francisco Dog Owners, a nonprofit with about 900 paying members. “I know people who have modified their use of the parks by coming at times of day when coyotes are less likely to be out and about.”

But Stephens said she thinks most people — including most dog owners — are either unaware or accepting of the coyotes. The city has done a good job educating residents about the dangers of allowing dogs to roam off-leash in coyote habitats and the importance of maintaining a safe distance from the animals, she said.

A mated pair of coyotes living in Golden Gate Park were shot and killed by officials from the U.S. Department of Agriculture four years ago after they reportedly charged a pair of dogs. Animal control later said the coyotes appeared to have been regularly fed by hu-

mans, which is illegal in San Francisco.

Nine days after the shootings, a coyote pup was found dead nearby after apparently being hit by a car.

The urban coyotes’ origins have been a source of considerable speculation. Some wonder whether they were planted by humans to help manage the city’s populations of feral cats, gophers and other small animals. Others suggest they always have been there and have only become more visible as the city eliminates protective brush and plant life from the parks.

Initially, wildlife experts assumed the coyote spotted in 2001 traveled to the Presidio from the south — the only side of the city not bordered by water. But researchers from the University of California, Davis and the U.S. Geological Survey obtained a blood sample from the animal that revealed it came from a population based at least 12 miles north of the Golden Gate Bridge.

While it was conceivable that a human transported the animal to the city, the most likely explanation was that it crossed the bridge on its own, the researchers concluded.

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# Bonner County aims civil action at landowners

SANDPOINT (AP) — Commissioners in northern Idaho’s Bonner County have authorized litigation against more than 20 landowners who have built structures without first getting required permits.

Officials said civil litigation rather than criminal prosecution is a better way to deal with residents who ignore land use ordinances. Planning Director Clare Marley said judgments and fines in criminal court don’t always lead to compliance with the county’s land use code.

“It gives us better options with abatement,” Marley told the Bonner County Daily Bee.

Also targeted for litigation by county commissioners are two landowners who have enough derelict vehicles to qualify as junkyards under county code.

The two properties with derelict vehicles are at the center of acrimonious neighborhood disputes, the newspaper reports.

The county’s planning department said that records show Baldy Mountain resident Leon Ford Atkinson has had 10 to 20

vehicles on his property over the years, leading to complaints from neighbors who say the property is an eyesore, as well as concerns about leaking fluids.

Atkinson said the county doesn’t have authority to regulate the use of his private property.

At another property in the Upper Pack River Valley, up to 30 vehicles are on Michael George Gervasi’s property. Neighbors have complained.

Criminal action concerning another property classified as a junkyard has failed to yield results, county officials said.

Sagle resident Frank William Wolfram, 61, was convicted last fall of maintaining an unpermitted use on land he owns. He was given one month to rid his property of vehicles and scrap materials. He also received a suspended 90-day jail sentence.

In February he was ordered back to court to explain why no progress had been made on cleaning up the property. A bench warrant was issued for his arrest after he failed to appear in court.

# 3 oil tanks burn near Gillette, no one hurt

GILLETTE, Wyo. (AP) — A cluster of large oil tanks caught fire east of Gillette over the weekend and sent flames a hundred feet into the air, officials said.

The blaze broke out around 5 p.m. Friday about 20 miles from Gillette near the Crook County line, Campbell County Fire Department division chief Dale Izatt said.

He told the Gillette News-Record that three tanks caught fire. Each was used to store about 500 barrels of oil.

When firefighters arrived, one of the tanks already had exploded and sent a large plume of smoke into the air. Another blew up an hour later.

Izatt said he and his fire crew ran for cover when they

heard a loud hissing noise emanate from one of the tank’s pressure release valves.

“It sounded like a train coming through,” he said. “There was never a loud bang. (But) there was a loud whoomph.”

The flames shot at least a hundred feet into the air, and “all you saw was fireball,” Izatt said.

No one was hurt in the blaze, which investigators say was sparked by a faulty electric motor.

Ultimately, firefighters decided to let the oil burn.

Campbell County Sheriff’s dispatch officials told The Associated Press early Sunday that they didn’t have details on the blaze and didn’t know if it was still burning.

“He seems to not be timid,” Darrington said. “He asks good questions.”

During last week’s Medicaid overhaul hearing, Heider asked a witness concerned about cuts what the alternatives should be. He’s been in public hearings that draw emotional testimony by the hundreds.


“It tugs at your heart-strings at times, and yet without that you wouldn’t be as informed and you would not be as capable to make a decision,” he said.

He also stresses the need to ask questions.

“The first question I ask lobbyists is: ‘Who would oppose this bill or who would be in favor if you’re opposed?’ And they’re not afraid to bring that out. There are always two sides to every issue.”

Heider also brings a variety of experiences, from being a member of a ski patrol to heading a dive team, to the Senate Resources and Environment Committee. His dive team even lugged out boxes of radioactive waste from an overturned truck along the Snake River in Declo in the 1980s, a memory that came back during a discussion of hazardous waste.

Now a retired real estate broker, Heider, 64, said this is the right stage of life to be in the Legislature.

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# Mourners pay final respects to last World War I doughboy

WASHINGTON (AP) — Wearing a black POW-MIA beret and a vest emblazoned with “Vietnam Veteran,” Charles D. White stood and saluted the flag-draped casket holding the body of Frank Buckles, the last American veteran of World War I.

White, who walks with a cane, then turned around stiffly and marched away.

Buckles will be buried Tuesday with full military honors at Arlington National Cemetery. Visitations were being held Sunday and Monday at Joseph Gawler’s Sons Chapel in Washington, and starting Tuesday morning, Buckles’ body will lie in repose at the cemetery’s memorial amphitheater.

Buckles enlisted in the Army at 16 after lying about his age. He died last month at his home in Charles

Town, W.Va., at age 110.

A slow but steady stream of friends, veterans and others filed past Buckles’ casket Sunday afternoon. His relatives were not there.

White and two friends, Donna Collis and Marvin A. Stickel, drove to the visitation from Martinsburg, W.Va. They are planning a candlelight vigil later this month to raise money for Buckles’ daughter to use for memorial efforts.

White, a 64-year-old former Navy SEAL, said the government hasn’t done enough to honor veterans of World War I and other conflicts.

“Washington could do more than what they’re doing if they wanted to,” he said. “We all know that.”

Buckles’ daughter, Susanah Flanagan, had wanted her father to lie in repose in

the U.S. Capitol, but Congress failed to approve that plan as politicians clashed over how best to honor Buckles and the 4.7 million other Americans who served in WWI.

### OSU, KU, Pitt and Duke get top seeds for tourney

Ohio State, Kansas, Pittsburgh and defending champion Duke have been awarded the top seeds in this year's NCAA tournament, an expanded version of March Madness that will include 68 teams.

The Buckeyes defeated Penn State 71-60 in the Big Ten tournament final on Sunday and were named the top seed in the entire field. They'll play in the East region.

The tournament — and America's most-celebrated office pool — starts Tuesday with the first of four first-round games — the "First Four," as it's being called by the NCAA. Two of those games will pit the last of 37 at-large teams to make it into the field, an increase of

three teams over years past.

Kansas is the Big 12 champion and will play in the Southwest, while Pitt earned a top seed despite losing in the quarterfinals of the Big East tournament and will play in the Southeast.

Duke beat North Carolina to win the Atlantic Coast Conference tournament and edge out Notre Dame for the last No. 1 seed. The Blue Devils, seeking to become the first repeat champion since Florida in 2006-07, will have to travel West to make the Final Four; that regional is set for Anaheim, Calif.

The tournament concludes with the Final Four in Houston on April 2 and 4.

In the East region, Ohio State will open against the winner of an opening-round game between 16th seeds Texas-San Antonio and Al-

abama State. No. 8 George Mason will play No. 9 Villanova. No. 4 Kentucky will play No. 13 Princeton and No. 5 West Virginia will play the winner of a First Four matchup between No. 12 seeds UAB and Clemson.

No. 2 North Carolina will play No. 15 Long Island and No. 7 Washington will play No. 10 Georgia, a bubble team. No. 3 Syracuse will play Larry Bird's alma mater, No. 14 Indiana State and No. 6 Xavier will play No. 11 Marquette, one of four Big East teams in the East region.

In the West, Duke will start its journey near home in Charlotte, with a second-round game against No. 16 Hampton, while No. 8 Michigan will play No. 9 Tennessee. No. 5 Arizona will play No. 12 Memphis, the Conference USA cham-

pion, and No. 4 Texas plays No. 13 Oakland.

No. 2 San Diego State plays No. 15 Northern Colorado and No. 7 Temple meets No. 10 Penn State, which made the tournament despite 14 losses. Rounding out that part of the bracket, No. 3 Connecticut, the Big East tournament champion, plays No. 14 Bucknell and No. 6 Cincinnati plays No. 11 Missouri.

In the Southwest, No. 1 Kansas will open play against No. 16 Boston University and Lon Kruger will lead No. 8 UNLV against a team he used to coach, No. 9 Illinois. No. 5 Vanderbilt will play No. 12 Richmond and No. 4 Louisville will play No. 13 Morehead State.

## Despite tradition, current Minico baseball team has much to prove

RUPERT — In the past eight seasons, the Minico High baseball team has a .765 winning percentage (186-57) and seven state tournament trophies, including the 2005 and 2009 championships.

That type of success can put pressure on the current Spartan squad, but that's just how they like it.

"We're trying to keep on the legacy that all the guys have put before us," said senior Suede Denker. "Of course they've had success, so we put in the work, plus a little more. We're going to have success and we're going to be competing for a state championship. We have the talent to do it with the kids returning. We have the team, the talent and the drive."

Minico returns six starters from a team that went 22-12 last season. However, the Spartans' streak of five consecutive district titles came to an end as conference newcomer Twin Falls took it away. At state, Minico and Twin Falls shared the 4A third-place trophy after the final day of the state tournament was rained out.

Casey Christiansen, Minico's best hitter and pitcher from a year ago, returns for his senior season. The ace has a career 2.09 ERA with 137 strikeouts to only 23 walks. At the plate, Christiansen is a career .442 hitter with 70 RBIs. In 190 career at-bats, he has struck out just 15 times.

But if Minico is to have much success this season, someone not named

Christiansen will need to step up and deal on the bump.

"Casey is a proven guy. After that we've got a ton of potential as far as arms on the staff, but potential has never won a single game," said Minico head coach Ben Frank, now in his ninth season at the helm. "We've got potential to be pretty solid behind Casey, but we've got to see some of those guys prove themselves for a few starts in a row."

Among the pitchers who will get a chance to prove themselves are Denker, K.J. Redder, Slade Winnmill, Brayden Winnmill, Sager Nevarez, Nate Hanks, Andrew Frank and Jordan Nessen.

"I think we're a little better than we were last year, both defensively and offensively. And I think we're going to end up being better on the bump, too," Frank said. "I think some of those guys are going to come up pretty big for us."

Offensively, Minico has four of its top seven hitters back, although last year's team batting average dropped off significantly from that of the 2009 state title team's.

"The difference between this year and last year is there was no senior leadership last year," Redder said. "This year we had all the seniors here, and almost the whole varsity team was here, at every single offseason workout."

Added Denker: "We have experience and depth this season. We didn't have much depth last season. We know what we're doing

## Celtics stifle Bucks in Boston



## Nick Watney wins at Doral on 18th; Tiger Woods finishes 10th

DORAL, Fla. — Nick Watney wound up in another duel at Doral, this one with a much sweeter ending.

Watney poured in two key putts for par along the back nine of the Blue Monster on Sunday, then hit two fearless shots on the 18th and finished with a birdie for and a 5-under 67 to win the Cadillac Championship by two shots over Dustin Johnson.

It was the third victory of Watney's career, and by far the biggest.

The 29-year-old American captured a World Golf Championship, and earned a measure of redemption on the Blue Monster. It was two years ago when Watney battled Phil Mickelson shot-for-shot on the weekend, only for his 30-foot

birdie putt on the last hole to stop one turn short of a chance at a playoff.

This time, Watney left nothing to chance.

With a one-shot lead playing the 18th — where he had put his tee shot into the water on Saturday for a double bogey — Watney drilled his drive over 300 yards down the middle of the fairway, and hit his approach to 12 feet above the hole. He pumped his fist when it fell for birdie, knowing that Johnson would have to hole out from the fairway to tie him.

Johnson had to settle for a shot into 8 feet, and typical of his final round, he missed the putt for a 71.

"I'm not sure it owed me one," Watney said at the trophy presentation. "I think I settled the score. If

you keep working hard, you get back in that situation. And luckily today, I was able to do a little better."

Francesco Molinari, who won the last World Golf Championship in stroke play last November in Shanghai, closed with a 69 and tied for third with Anders Hansen (67), who will move into the top 50 and now has to stay there the next two weeks to get into the Masters.

Tiger Woods matched his best score of the year with a 6-under 66, and when Rory McIlroy dunked his tee shot into the water on the 18th hole and made bogey, that enabled Woods to tie for 10th.

It was his first top 10 in an official PGA Tour event in

# No. 5 Duke beats No. 6 UNC 75-58 in ACC final

INDIANAPOLIS — Jared Sullinger had 15 points and 11 rebounds and No. 1 Ohio State defeated Penn State 71-60 in the Big Ten tournament final on Sunday.

Sullinger, the tournament's most outstanding player, averaged 16.3 points and 14 rebounds in the tournament to help the top-seeded Buckeyes (32-2) repeat as champions.

William Buford scored 18 points and Jon Diebler added 15 for the Buckeyes, who also won the league's regular-season title.

Talor Battle scored 24 points and Jeff Brooks added 19 for Penn State (19-14), which reached the final for the first time. The Nittany Lions, who haven't reached the NCAA tournament since 2001, were trying to become the first team since Iowa in 2001 to win four consecutive games to claim the title.

The Nittany Lions had allowed 45.3 points per game

in their three tournament wins, but Ohio State surpassed that total with 13 minutes remaining. The Buckeyes shot 64 percent in the second half.

The Buckeyes won their seventh straight game and became the second team in conference history to play in the final three straight years. They became the first repeat tournament champion since Michigan State in 1999 and 2000, and both of those teams reached the Final Four.

**NO. 5 DUKE 75, NO. 6 NORTH CAROLINA 58**

GREENSBORO, N.C. — Nolan Smith had 20 points and 10 assists and Duke ended North Carolina's run of big comebacks at the Atlantic Coast Conference tournament.

Kyle Singler added 11 points for the Blue Devils (30-4), who won a record 19th tournament title. In the

first finals meeting between the rivals in a decade, second-seeded Duke led by 18 points in the first half and never let the top-seeded Tar Heels (26-7) build any momentum for a third straight tournament escape.

North Carolina had rallied from 19 down in the final 10 minutes to beat Miami on a last-play layup in the quarterfinals, then rallied from 14 down to force overtime and beat Clemson in the semifinals.

Smith was selected tournament MVP.

Seth Curry had 11 points, including a crucial 3-pointer after the Tar Heels had pulled within nine.

Duke shot 62 percent in the first half and 50 percent for the game. The Blue Devils held the Tar Heels to 34 percent shooting.

Harrison Barnes struggled a day after scoring a tournament freshman record 40 points against Clemson, finishing with 16 points to lead the Tar Heels.

**NO. 15 KENTUCKY 70, NO. 12 FLORIDA 54**

ATLANTA — Brandon Knight scored 17 points, MVP Darius Miller hit two crucial 3-pointers and Kentucky cruised to another Southeastern Conference tournament title.

The 12th-ranked Gators (26-7), the regular-season champs, had a miserable day shooting, especially guards Kenny Boynton and Erving Walker. They combined to go 7 of 26 from the field, their woes epitomized in the closing minutes when they put up back-to-back airballs trying desperately to bring Florida back.

Kentucky (25-8) streaked into the NAAs with its sixth straight win, second straight SEC tournament crown and 27th title overall — more than every other school combined.

# Lawmakers have no business legislating wildlife management

There’s a reason why there’s a buffer — the Idaho Fish and Game Commission — between the Legislature and the state’s professional wildlife managers. For the first 39 years of the Idaho Department of Fish and Game’s history, legislators, county commissioners, the governor and just about anyone else with political influence could and did call up the state game warden and tell him how to do his job.

And who to hire. Every time Idahoans got a new governor, they got a new Fish and Game Department from director down to conservation officers, with little regard for any qualifications in managing wildlife.

**Our view:** Politicians make policies; the Idaho Department of Fish and Game should be left alone to manage the resource.

**What do you think?** We welcome viewpoints from our readers on this and other issues.

And it goes without saying those local game wardens sometimes took their orders from someone other than their supervisors at Fish and Game. Finally, Idahoans had enough. In 1938, they began signing petitions for a voter initiative to turn management of Fish and Game over to a board of commissioners, appointed by the governor but independent in their management. That fall, the measure passed by a 3-to-1 margin. The following year, the commission hired its first professional director and implemented a merit system for choosing employees. In the 72 years since, governors — Phil Batt and Dirk Kempthorne in particular — have occasionally tried to chip away at the independence of the commission, but by and large politicians have been kept out of game management.

But now, they’re knocking on the door again. Angry over federal actions regarding wolves in Idaho, some lawmakers have begun to propose legislation telling Fish and Game when it can and can’t cooperate with the feds. The latest is state Sen. Monty Pearce, R-New Plymouth, who wants Fish and Game barred from helping enforce road closures on federal land.

As more and more off-road vehicles hit the trails and leave their mark, road closures are often enacted to protect big game or habitat. Fish and Game, obviously, has a vested interest in cooperating with the feds in doing that.

Some Idaho sportsmen are furious about federal management of Idaho’s backcountry, including efforts to shutter some trails or areas long coveted by motorized ORVs. Pearce’s bill would prohibit Fish and Game from enforcing — or entering into an agreement with — agencies such as the Forest Service when it comes to federal laws or rules governing roads on federal land.

Trouble is, that’s a game management decision, not a policy decision. And the agency’s conservation officers are far more qualified to make that call than Sen. Pearce is.

As Fish and Game clearly demonstrated during its recent tenure of managing wolves in Idaho, this is a professional agency that understands the resource, respects sportsmen and landowners, and avoids stepping into politics. Pearce should let Fish and Game do its job.

# Oil at \$100 kills brain cells, impairs thinking

It must be the noxious fumes or the stratospheric prices because crude oil crossing the \$100 threshold makes normally thoughtful individuals funny in the head. The early symptoms of high oil price syndrome, or HOPS, can be easily be masked or confused with a more generalized form of lazy economic thinking.

For example, those afflicted with HOPS start making assertions that higher oil prices are inflationary, as if relative price changes can morph into an economy-wide rise in prices without help from the central bank.


HOPS sufferers aren’t beyond doing a quick 180, pronouncing higher oil prices to be deflationary because they sap consumer demand.

Which is it? When oil prices aren’t standing in for the central bank, the ultimate arbiter of all things monetary, they’re doubling as the tax man. HOPS sufferers claim oil prices are a tax on the consumer, even though the effect is nothing like a tax, which drives a wedge between consumers and producers.

Finally, higher oil prices devastate the economy and destroy jobs. What happens to producers’ profits? I find myself getting light in the head from all this nonsense. For my own peace of mind, I need to set the record straight. Here goes.

### No. 1. Sometimes a cigar is just a cigar

For folks who use the term “inflation” interchangeably with higher prices — as in wage inflation or commodity inflation — they are not the same thing. A higher price for oil and/or other com-



modities is a higher relative price until ratified by the central bank.

What does the central bank have to do with it?

Inflation is a monetary phenomenon: too much money chasing too few goods and services.

Where does the money come from?

In the United States, it comes from Ben Bernanke, chairman of the Federal Reserve, and his trusted band of governors and district bank presidents.

To be more accurate, it comes from the New York Fed’s Open Market Desk, which buys Treasury securities (generally) from a group of primary dealers at the direction of the Fed’s policy committee.

Higher oil prices don’t cause inflation.

### No. 2. Zero Sum Game

Higher oil prices are always viewed as a negative because they crimp consumer purchasing power.

It’s not a one-way street. Wealth is transferred from consumers to producers and recycled.

Higher prices act as an incentive for oil exploration. Exxon Mobil Corp. buys new drilling equipment and hires more workers. Those dollars go

back into the economy, they don’t suck life out of it.

Because the U.S. imports about half of its crude oil, some of those profits end up in the pockets of the Saudi royal family and other Middle East potentates.

What do they do with them? They spend them on U.S. goods and services. They buy U.S. stocks, bonds, trophy real estate and F-16 fighter jets.

This doesn’t happen simultaneously, of course. But to portray every dollar of oil profit as a net drain on the economy is inaccurate.

### No. 3. Taxing thought

The claim that oil is a tax on the consumer is one of the most common talking points during every oil-price spike. It also happens to be dead wrong.

An excise tax raises the price to the consumer, who will demand less, and lowers the price received by the producer, who will supply less. The result is dead-weight loss.

The recent increase in oil prices qualifies as a supply shock — a decline in Libyan oil production and expectations of further disruptions in Middle East supply — on top of what was al-

ready a demand-driven rise as the world economy recovered. Crude oil had already breached the \$90 a barrel mark at the end of last year, well before Egyptians took to Tahrir Square in January to demand that President Hosni Mubarak step down.

A supply shock results in higher prices and a lower quantity demanded. It’s only taxing if you think about it incorrectly.

### No. 4. Mo’ money

The Fed needs to respond to higher oil prices, HOPS victims say.

Bad idea, especially if “respond” means print more money. That was the medicine applied in the 1970s. The result was higher inflation and slower growth, which created a problem for those who thought there was a trade-off between the two.

“Respond” could have another meaning for those who think higher oil prices are inflationary — tighten policy. HOPS victims will have to sort that one out before they decide on a recommended course of action.

# Second explosion hits stricken Japan nuke plant

SOMA, Japan — The second hydrogen explosion in three days rocked Japan's stricken Fukushima Dai-ichi nuclear plant Monday, sending a massive column of smoke into the air and wounding six workers. It was not immediately clear how much — if any — radiation had been released.

The explosion at the plant's Unit 3, which authorities have been frantically trying to cool following a system failure in the wake of a massive earthquake and tsunami, triggered an order for hundreds of people to stay indoors, said Chief Cabinet Secretary Yukio Edano.

The blast follows a similar explosion Saturday at the plant's Unit 1, which injured four workers and caused mass-evacuations.

Japan's nuclear safety agency said six workers were injured in Monday's explosion but it was not immediately clear how, or whether they were exposed to radiation. They were all conscious, said the agency's Ryohei Shomi.

Earlier, Tokyo Electric Power Co., which operates the reactor, said three workers were injured and seven missing.

The reactor's inner containment vessel holding nuclear rods was intact, Edano said, allaying some fears of the risk to the environment

and public. TV footage of the building housing the reactor appeared to show similar damage to Monday's blast, with outer walls shorn off,

leaving only a skeletal frame.

More than 180,000 people have evacuated the area in recent days, and up to 160 may have been ex-

posed to radiation.

Earlier Monday, pressure had jumped inside Unit 3, forcing the evacuation of 21 workers. But they returned to work after levels appeared to ease.

Associated Press journalists felt the explosion in the tsunami-devastated port town of Soma, some 25 miles north of the reactor. They reported feeling the faint rumble a blast and the ground shaking.

At the time, sirens were wailing as rescue workers were in the midst of evacuating all those in the city to high ground due to a tsunami warning. That turned out to be a false alarm.

Officials have confirmed about 1,800 deaths from the earthquake and tsunami — including 200 people whose bodies were found Sunday along the coast — and said more than 1,700 were missing and 1,900 injured.

The death toll seemed certain to get much higher after a report from Miyagi, one of the three hardest hit states. The police chief estimated that more than 10,000 people were killed there, police spokesman Go Sugawara told The Associated Press. Only about 400 people in the state of 2.3 million have been confirmed dead so far.

## Central bank injects funds as Japanese stocks dive

TOKYO — Japan's central bank says it is injecting a record 15 trillion yen (\$183.8 billion) into money markets to stabilize the financial system after a devastating earthquake and tsunami.

The figure is more than double the 7 trillion yen the Bank of Japan had announced earlier Monday.

The emergency move comes as the Tokyo stock market plunged nearly 6 percent, and worries grew about the economic impact of Friday's earthquake and tsunami.

Central bankers are gathering Monday for a one-day policy board meeting.

The benchmark Nikkei 225 stock average dropped 464.88 points, or 4.5 percent, to 9,789.55, extending losses from Friday. The earthquake hit shortly before markets closed for the weekend.

Worries about the economic impact of the disaster triggered a plunge that hit all sectors. The broader Topix index was down 5.4 percent. Shares of several major companies were overwhelmed with sell orders and had yet to trade.

Among those, the Tokyo Electric Power Co. was set to fall by double digits as it struggled with malfunctioning nuclear reactors and a power shortage that led the company to announce rolling blackouts in parts of Tokyo and its suburbs. Toyota Motor Corp., the world's biggest automaker, slid more than 7 percent.

The Bank of Japan moved quickly to try to keep financial markets stable. By flooding the banking system with cash, it hopes banks will continue lending money and meet the likely surge in demand for post-earthquake funds.

## Libyan rebels flee key oil town as Gadhafi's forces advance

BENGHAZI, Libya — Forces loyal to Libyan leader Moammar Gadhafi pushed deeper into rebellious eastern Libya on Sunday, overrunning an important oil town while forcing lightly armed rebels back toward the opposition stronghold of Benghazi.

Rebel fighters fled Port Brega, site of a strategic refinery complex and oil terminal, under heavy bombardment and tried to hold back government forces rapidly advancing on Ajdabiya, about 95 miles south of Benghazi.

The fall of Port Brega is a serious blow to the rebel force, facing a government onslaught that has loosened the opposition's grip on eastern Libya.

Just eight days ago, rebel fighters routed pro-Gadhafi forces in Port Brega and another strategic oil city, Ras Lanuf, and spoke of taking the battle to Tripoli, the capital, far to the west.

The steady advance of Gadhafi's fighters behind

airstrikes and rocket attacks puts pressure on rebel leaders in Benghazi to stop or slow the government's assault up the Mediterranean coastal highway before it reaches the opposition stronghold.

Panicked rebels in Ajdabiya blocked reporters from driving farther southwest toward Port Brega. Many said they lacked the firepower to slow the government's assault.

"Gadhafi is on his way to Ajdabiya," said Masoud Bwisir, a car wash owner fighting for the rebels, from the city's western gate. "How can we stop him? He has tanks, planes. He fires at us from boats in the sea. Our guns are weak against him."

Rockets slammed down late Sunday afternoon on the western outskirts of Ajdabiya as a cleric raised a bullhorn and called for warriors among the boys and young men in the city.

"If you have a weapon and want to fight, please come," he said as rebels dug trenches and positioned anti-aircraft guns.

## Yemen clashes and Bahrain chaos as protests deepen

DUBAI, United Arab Emirates (AP) — Yemeni police firing from rooftops wounded more than 100 in a protesters' camp Sunday and anti-government demonstrators paralyzed Bahrain's capital as unrest deepened in two of Washington's most critical allies in the region.

The ruler of Oman, another key Western partner, shifted some lawmaking powers to officials outside the royal family in what an analyst called a historic change.

Meanwhile, Saudi authorities tolerated 200 activists demanding the re-

lease of detainees in defiance of stern warnings of crackdowns on pro-democracy rallies.

The range of responses — from attacks to appeasement — underscored the different gambits at play. Some regimes are looking to battle their way out while others turn to rapid reforms in a bid to quell dissent inspired by groundswell for change across the Arab world.

Yemen's president, Ali Abdullah Saleh, has increasingly turned to confrontation after protesters rebuffed his offer to bow out with elections in 2013.

Near Sanaa University, an encampment of demonstrators came under twin attacks: police firing from rooftop positions, and a ground assault by security forces and government backers armed with clubs and knives. Mohammad al-Abahi, a doctor in charge of a makeshift hospital near the university, said more than 100 people were injured, including 20 from tear gas inhalation.

In the southern Aden province, it was the protesters on the offensive — storming a police station and seizing weapons after police fled, witnesses said.





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# Clinton official resigns after WikiLeaks flap

WASHINGTON — Chief State Department spokesman P.J. Crowley quit on Sunday after causing a stir by describing the military’s treatment of the suspected WikiLeaks leaker as “ridiculous” and “stupid,” pointed words that forced President Barack Obama to defend the detention as appropriate.

“Given the impact of my remarks, for which I take full responsibility, I have submitted my resignation” to Secretary of State Hillary Rodham Clinton, according to a department statement attributed to the office of the spokesman. In a separate statement released simultaneously, Clinton said she had accepted the resignation “with regret.”

Crowley’s comments about the conditions for Army Pfc. Bradley Manning at a Marine Corps brig in Quantico, Va., reverberated quickly, from the small audience in Massachusetts where Crowley spoke, to a White House news conference Friday where Obama was asked to weigh in on the treatment of the 23-year-old believed responsible for the largest leak of classified American documents ever.

Manning is being held in solitary confinement for all but an hour every day, and is stripped naked each night and given a suicide-proof smock to wear to bed. His lawyer calls the treatment degrading. Amnesty International says the treatment may violate Manning’s human rights.

Crowley, who retired as colonel from the Air Force in 1999 after 26 years in the military, was quoted as telling students at a Massachusetts Institute of Technology seminar on Thursday that he didn’t understand why the military was

handling Manning’s detention that way, and calling it “ridiculous, counterproductive and stupid.” Crowley also said “Manning is in the right place” in military detention.

A day later, Obama was asked about Crowley’s remarks at a news conference. He replied that he had asked the Pentagon whether the confinement conditions were appropriate and whether they met basic standards. “They assure me that they are,” the president said. He declined to elaborate when pressed on whether he disagreed with Crowley’s assessment.

Crowley’s resignation statement said that his comments about Bradley’s pre-trial detention “were intended to highlight the broader, even strategic impact of discreet actions undertaken by national security agencies every day and their impact on our global standing and leadership. The exercise of power in today’s challenging times and relentless media environment must be prudent and consistent with our laws and values.”

In her statement, Clinton said Crowley, 59, who was a spokesman for the National Security Council in President Bill Clinton’s White House, “has served our nation with distinction for more than three decades, in uniform and as a civilian.” She said his service was “motivated by a deep devotion to public policy and public diplomacy.”

Although Clinton had warm words upon Crowley’s departure, he never got along with the secretary’s inner circle. He was well-liked by the press corps, but his often unusually blunt remarks from the State Department podium got him into trouble and he had not traveled with Clinton on overseas trips in more than a year.

# Man swept to sea in Calif. sought new beginning

KLAMATH, Calif. — Leaving his teenage drug abuse behind in Oregon, Dustin Weber was seeking a new beginning along California’s rugged far northern coast, happy to be in the land of his mother’s heritage, the Yurok Tribe.

Yet before Weber could get a proper start, the 25-year-old was swept out to sea at the mouth of the Klamath River by a tsunami surge generated thousands of miles away by the earthquake off Japan’s coast. Rescuers were unable to reach him Friday and called off their efforts; he is presumed dead, though his body has not been found.

His would be the first death of a person on the West Coast by a tsunami since 1964, when 11 people in nearby Crescent City died from the surge created by an earthquake in Alaska.

“His life was always challenged with drug issues and being Indian,” said his mother, Lori Davis, of Bend, Ore., after searching miles of beach with family members and friends for her son’s body.

“One of the things we fight most is drugs and alcohol. He’s been clean and sober for a long time. I just feel like, you know, finally he was so happy. He has never been this happy in a long time,” she said. “There have been so many times he was so close to death from other issues in his life. You

know, it just doesn’t make sense to me.”

Dustin was born in Bend, and his parents separated when he was 5. He lived with his father, who works for a grocery chain. His mother remarried, then divorced again.

Blaise Butcher and Shawn Wilcox were friends with Dustin since they were little kids, building forts, fishing, snowboarding, and riding dirt bikes. “He liked music, sports cars, motorcycles, car shows,” said Butcher. “He liked everything from hip hop and rap to a little bit of classical music.”

Bend was hit hard by the Great Recession. Home to a ski resort, dozens of golf courses, fly fishing in the Deschutes River and spectacular views of the snowcapped Cascade Range, it grew from a little timber town to a four-season resort area when people had money to buy second homes. The wood products mill that once sustained it with blue-collar jobs became a shopping center catering to people with money to burn. When the mortgage money dried up, so did the Bend economy.

But Dustin was a hard worker, and when other people lost their jobs, he kept his on a landscaping crew, said Wilcox.

Over the years, there were car wrecks that should have taken Dustin’s life. But he survived them all.

“I think there were three where he just completely cheated death,” said Butcher.

# Two Va. deputies fatally shot, suspect killed

VANSANT, Va. — A gunman opened fire on sheriff’s deputies investigating a possible robbery at a rural salvage yard on Sunday, killing two and injuring two others before being killed in a shootout, Virginia State Police said.

One of the Buchanan County deputies had life-threatening injuries and the other was in serious condition, state police said.

Buchanan County Sheriff Ray Foster called the shooting “one of a kind” for his department but declined to say anymore.

The owner of Roger’s Service Center in the southwestern Virginia community of Vansant told police that his business was being robbed and he had blocked the suspect’s vehicle with his own.

State Police Sgt. Steve Lowe said when deputies and state police arrived about 2 p.m., someone started shooting at them. Two deputies were hit and died at the scene. Police did not release what sort of weapon was used, but Lowe said the suspect shot from long range.

The other two deputies were shot when they arrived at the salvage yard.

State police and other officers found the suspect about two hours later and after “some sort of engagement”

they shot and killed him, Lowe said.

“I’m not sure what the confrontation was when they encountered him,” Lowe said. “Apparently he was identified as the right person.”

Lowe said he didn’t know if the man fired on police, or if he was armed at the time.

## Mentoring in motion

### Girls' program emphasizes exercise as route to self-esteem

KETCHUM — The girls lined up at one end of the Hemingway Elementary gym, toes poised, listening for the next question. “Who likes chocolate chip cookies?” Nearly every girl sprinted out, toward the other end of the room, where she found a mentor to high-five before running back. “Who likes Justin Bieber?” Squeals echoed through the gym, but fewer girls made the sprint this time.

That’s a good thing, said Mary Clare Griffin, a Girls on the Run coach. As she distributed orange and apple slices and pretzel sticks to the participating girls for a healthy snack, she said that the mentoring program helps these girls define themselves as they wish, rather than allowing society to dictate boy-crazy self-consciousness to the tweens.

“In addition to giving them the confidence to run, it’s engendering positive self-esteem, which is so crucial at this age for these girls,” Griffin said. “There’s nothing greater that you can give to a kid than their belief

in themselves, that they are special.”

For the past nine years, Girls on the Run has been in the Wood River Valley, sponsoring two 10-week sessions a year for girls in grades three through eight. Participation is voluntary. The program balances traditional mentoring, including self-esteem-building activities, and fun exercise.

Each session, the girls work toward a physical activity goal they set for themselves, which could be anything from being able to walk for 10 minutes without breathing hard for the least active, to running three miles without stopping for

the most fit. The sessions culminate with all the participants from each school’s group running or walking a 5K together.

“I really like it because sometimes I’m not very happy. Running, it just makes me feel better,” said Maya Lizano, 8, of Ketchum.

Citalli Maza, 10, of Ketchum, said the program has changed her attitude about exercise. “I used to not like to run, and Girls on the Run made me want to run more often,” she said. Maza used to get side stitches when she picked up her pace, but by the time she

The Wood River Valley chapter launched in 2002 and has grown to serve about 70 girls during each of two annual sessions; some girls participate in multiple sessions. The groups meet twice a week for 10 weeks, culminating with a 5K run or walk, and are open to girls in grades three through eight.

## How weight loss changed a Rupert woman’s life

When Courtney Kehrher of Rupert visited her doctor in June, she was not a happy person.

At 23, she was 4 feet 10 inches tall, weighed 199 pounds and had a sore on her leg that would not heal. After blood work and tests, she was diagnosed with Type 2 diabetes.

Kehrher’s doctor referred her to Lori Johnson, a registered and licensed dietitian and certified diabetes educator at Minidoka Memorial Hospital. The Rupert hospital and Cassia Regional Medical Center offer diabetic classes together, Johnson said, with the location trading off every month.

Today Kehrher is down to 148 pounds and is a much happier person — thanks to medical nutrition therapy, diabetes education and acute weight management.

“The thing we want to emphasize the most is to not take it off too fast. For safe weight loss, you have to do it slow. When you lose more than two pounds a week, you lose muscle and firmness,” Johnson said.

Johnson gave Kehrher a pedometer and suggested she walk 10,000 steps a day. Kehrher also kick boxes with a video and dances with a Wii game.

“I just started Zumba on Wii,” she said.

Shortly after Kehrher started her lifestyle changes, her doctor found her blood glucose had already dropped to normal readings. If she keeps doing what she’s doing, she might be able to go off medication entirely. The sore on her leg has healed.

Her goal is to get down to 100 pounds.

#### New woman

Kehrher’s grandmother, Linda Kehrher, and her mother, Robin Kehrher, have noticed a difference physically and mentally.

“She has a better attitude,” Linda said.

“She is more active and confident,” said Robin, who does video exercises with her daughter and has lost 45 pounds herself.

Courtney Kehrher “has really come out of her shell. She was so quiet when I first met her, and now she just glows, has eye contact with people and is more outgoing,” Johnson said.

Kehrher went from a waist circumference

of 43 1/4 inches to 34 inches.

“I used to wear women’s 16-18 extra-large pants,” she said. “Now I am wearing 13 junior.”

#### Inches matter

Johnson gets five to seven new referrals a day. Some prove to be success stories, others fall by the way.

“People are different. Some are very compliant, others are middle of the road, and still others are totally non-compliant.”

## The perils of ranch dressing

I’m willing to bet you have a bottle of ranch dressing in your fridge right now. I know I do.

But I’m not especially proud of that fact.

Ranch has for several years been the most popular dressing in the land, according to the Association for Dressings and Sauces. It’s also the top dressing choice at U.S. restaurants, according to Mintel International Group. People, including my 14-year-old son, dip just about anything in the creamy, garlicky sauce, from baby carrots to pizza crusts.

But tasty as it may be, ranch dressing, full of fat and spiked with sodium, isn’t the best nutritional bargain.

I’ve been letting that slide at home.

I got to thinking about ranch in December when, as part of the fanfare surrounding President Obama’s signing of the Healthy, Hunger-Free Kids Act, folks at the White House offered a week’s worth of school lunch menus that had been reworked with an eye toward making them more healthful. Four of the new lunches featured low-fat ranch dressing.

The menus pair it with grape tomatoes, green pepper strips, baby carrots and broccoli. The idea, of course, is to encourage kids to eat more veggies, and who’s not in favor of that? School nutrition experts and cafeteria workers know that just plopping vegetables or fruit on a tray without doing something to make them palatable to kids results in heaps of uneaten produce in the trash bin. That’s a big waste of food, money — and opportunity.

Oakland, Calif.-based Hidden Valley Ranch has long marketed its signature product as a means of getting kids to love vegetables. There are some reasons to be concerned with this approach. One is that kids topping broccoli with ranch know there’s a vegetable under there, but they might not fully taste it. Hence, they may never develop a zeal for broccoli that’s not been doused in dressing.

Also, ranch dressing, especially when its fat is reduced, is packed with sodium, says dietitian and American Dietetic Association spokeswoman Sarah Krieger. A two-tablespoon serving of Hidden Valley’s light ranch contains 290 milligrams of sodium;

**Continued from H&F 1** finished last fall's session, she was able to run the entire 5K, her mother said. Perhaps predictably, the girls said the most fun things about the program were the activities and meeting new friends, while their mothers were quicker to talk about the mental and emotional benefits.

Lori Nurge of Ketchum said she appreciated that the program covers topics like healthy eating, avoiding illegal drugs and supporting peers in their positive choices. "It ... tells you to be nice to others, that looks don't matter and all these other important things," said her daughter, Jenna Nurge, 9.

The mentors, all volunteers, also benefit from the relationship.

"It goes both ways. It's such a good use of your time," said Sandy Letzing of Ketchum, who was encouraged to join Girls on the Run by her co-workers at the city's fire department. She hopes she'll be a good role model. "If they see me running, and think I'm cool, maybe they'll want to run too."

Mentor Carla Bruce of Ketchum volunteered because she wants her niece, who is a participant, and her niece's peers to have a better start toward confi-

dent womanhood than she had.

"I didn't have a lot of confidence or support in my home," Bruce said. With a similar opportunity to build self-esteem at that age, she said, "my life would have taken an entirely different path. I'd be curious as to where I'd be right now."

Back in the Hemingway Elementary gym, the girls were running laps, laughing because each time they passed a friend or a mentor, they peeled a sticker off a sheet printed with that person's name, and slapped it on her back or arm. "Happy Heather," "Sweet Sharom," "Jumping Juliana" — all positive adjectives the girl or woman chose for herself.

"They all show something about the person," said coach Heather Miller. "Whatever adjective it is, whatever your name is, it's all good."

As the meeting wound down, the girls' faces were flushed, but most were also curled into grins. They gathered their bookbags, waved goodbye to new friends and headed for home — and maybe a run around the block.

**Continued from H&F 1** Sometimes fear of illness makes them decide to take on a weight-loss program," Johnson said.

She said people often refer more to their scales than their tape measures — not a good idea.

"We now focus more on inches rather than the number of pounds you lose. Muscle is more dense than fat. The scales will say you weigh more, but you have actually lost inches and that is really good," Johnson said. "Visceral fat is the fat around your middle and is close to your organs. It can increase your risk for diabetes, hypertension, heart disease and more."

The American Dietetic Association suggests a measurement around the middle of less than 35 inches for women and less than 40 inches for men, Johnson said.

## Produce on the plate

Changing her eating habits has been the most difficult for Kehrner.

"It's really been hard for her because she has never liked fruits and vegetables," Linda said. "Giving up snack Ramen noodles was the hardest."

Kehrner switched to whole-wheat products and eats meat and spinach salad. She seldom rewards herself.

"If she does really, really good after she's seen the doctor, we go buy a pizza and she allows herself two pieces," Linda said.

"What really has helped her is she has kept a food journal, and she is really loyal about it," Johnson

# Pets: Not just good for your mood but also good for your health?

I grew up in an apartment building that didn't allow pets, so I was slightly nervous when my husband, Jamie, and I adopted a dog nearly a decade ago. But it didn't take long before the aptly named Scrappy won me over, with her soft, floppy ears, oversize paws, clumsy playfulness and penchant for curling up on my feet. In fact, she quickly became a beloved member of the family, despite her unfortunate habit of running away and rolling around in foul-smelling messes.

Clearly, Scrappy brought a lot of happiness into our home, but Jamie has always insisted that having her around actually made him feel better: less anxious, for one thing, and much more relaxed.

A small body of research suggests that my husband was right. "We know that pets can have a positive health impact on people who feel positively about them," says Erika Friedmann, a professor at the University of Maryland School of Nursing and president of the International Society for Anthrozoology, whose members study human-animal interaction.

Friedmann's seminal 1980 research found that heart disease patients with pets had better one-year survival rates than similar patients without pets. More recently, studies have

shown that pet ownership is associated with reduced stress, lower blood pressure, fewer doctor visits, less loneliness and increased social connectivity, and higher levels of physical activity.

Still, the findings haven't all been positive: Research published in a Scandinavian psychiatric journal followed 424 patients admitted to the hospital with acute coronary syndrome and found that pet owners — cat owners, in particular — were more likely to be readmitted or die within a year than patients who did not have cats. And the role of Fido or Fifi in childhood asthma and allergies remains an especially gray area, with some studies reporting that having a family pet early in life can trigger the development of these diseases, and others

showing that the presence of an animal is a protective factor.

The confusion continued last fall, with the publication of a long-term study of 636 children in the Journal of Pediatrics. Researchers showed that kids with dog allergies were less likely to develop eczema by age 4 if they lived with a dog during their first year of life. The exact opposite was true for children who were allergic to cats and grew up with a cat in the house: They had a significantly increased risk of developing eczema later on than similar children who had no cat.

There's clearly a need for more — and better — scientific evidence about the link between pets and health.

"There is some good, solid research out there — a lot of tantalizing small studies

— but there are also some methodological flaws with evidence for the positive effects of pets," says James Griffin, a scientist at the National Institute of Child Health and Human Development. One major limitation he cites is the difficulty of running "blind" studies, since people know when they are interacting with an animal. "That said, there are also a lot of methodological flaws in (studies) not showing that association or showing negative effects."

NICHD has created a partnership with the Waltham Centre for Pet Nutrition, a division of foodmaker Mars, to encourage better research on human-animal interaction; there are currently seven such studies under way. "We need to know what are the underlying mechanisms that are actually behind these potential health benefits," says Griffin.

He notes, for example, that early research suggests a possible release of the hormone oxytocin, which can lower stress hormone levels, when people are around their dogs and possibly other pets. "This shows that at the physiological level, there's a response that corresponds with the bond people feel with animals. It's also related to stress reduction, which is thought to be what underlies some of the strong findings with the cardiovascular system, like heart attack recovery ... But we need to know more."

**Continued from H&F 1** Kraft's light ranch is even worse, with 440 mg of sodium. The government's latest recommendation on daily sodium consumption is 1,500 mg.

Still, Krieger, who helps kids ages 8 to 12 manage their weight and develop better eating habits, stands by including the dressing in diets, saying it "can be a great vehicle" for getting vegetables into children's mouths. The key, as always, is portion control. A few tips:

- **At home**, help your child

measure two tablespoons of dressing onto his plate, then put the bottle back in the fridge. You'll both be surprised at how little dressing that is (less than half of a 3-ounce Dixie cup).

- **Remind** your child that the dressing's for fresh vegetables only. No fair dipping french fries or chicken nuggets in it!

- **Be aware** that Hidden Valley's lunchbox-friendly tub of light ranch dressing holds 2 1/2 servings, for a total of 725 mg of sodium and 200 calories.

WHEREAS, Ordinance No. 180, approved by the Mayor and City Council December 9, 1986, set forth the hours for the sale of alcoholic liquor between the hours of 7:00 AM and 1:00 AM, seven (7) days a week, excluding sale of liquor on Christmas Day and state and federal primary and general election days; and WHEREAS, Codified Chapters of the Municipal Code 4-3-1, <u>Beer</u> , 4-4-1, <u>Liquor</u> , and 4-5-1, <u>Wine</u> , alcoholic beverages as enumerated between the hours of 7:00 AM and 2:00 AM; and WHEREAS, the internal inconsistency in the Ordinances and the Codified Chapters of the Municipal Code dictate the requirement for a set hour for the sale of beer, wine and liquor by the drink in order to maintain consistency and uniformity; and WHEREAS, Idaho Code Section 23-927(2) allows for any city, by ordinance, to allow the sale of liquor by the drink on a Sunday, Memorial Day and Thanksgiving, and may also extend until 2:00 AM, the hours of sale of liquor by the drink; and WHEREAS, the Mayor and City Council, by previous enactment, have determined that the sale of beer, wine, and/or liquor by the drink shall not exceed 1:00 AM of the hours of sale by the drink allowing for the sale of same on Sunday, Memorial Day and Thanksgiving, pursuant to Idaho Code Section 23-927(2) BE IT THEREFORE ORDAINED by the Mayor and Council of the City of Hazelton, Jerome County, Idaho as follows: <b>Section 1. DEFINITIONS.</b> The following words or phrases used in this Ordinance shall be given the following meanings: A. License shall mean a license issued by the City of Hazelton for the resale of alcoholic liquor, beer and/or wine. B. Licensee shall mean any person, business, firm, corporation or association to whom or which a license has been issued. <b>Section 2.</b> Hours for the sale of alcoholic liquor, beer and/or wine, sold by the drink, may be sold between the hours of 7:00 AM and 1:00 AM, seven (7) days a week. <b>Section 3.</b> Certain days that alcoholic liquor, beer and/or wine sold by the drink cannot be sold: Christmas Day and state and federal primary general election days. <b>Section 4. VIOLATIONS-MISDEMEANORS.</b> A violation of any provisions of this Ordinance by any agent, employee, servant or other person in any way acting on behalf of the Licensee shall be presumed to be a violation of the Licensee. Any person violating any provisions of this Ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be fined not more than Three Hundred Dollars (\$300) or be imprisoned for not more than ninety (90) days, or face both fine and imprisonment. <b>Section 5. REVOCATIONS.</b> The issuer of an alcoholic liquor, beer and/or wine license may revoke the same if, upon a hearing thereon after reasonable notice thereof to the Licensee served personally or by certified mailing upon the Licensee or left with a person employed or apparently employed by the Licensee upon the premises, the issuer finds that the Licensee has violated any provisions of this Ordinance, such issuer shall by registered mail, in writing notify the other issuers of retailers licensed for said premise, stating facts sufficient to identify such Licensee, and the date and grounds of revocation. <b>Section 6.</b> Hazelton City Ordinance No. 180, Hazelton City Ordinance Codified Chapters 4-3-1, <u>Beer</u> through 4-3-9; Hazelton City Ordinance Codified Chapters 4-4-1, <u>Liquor</u> through 4-4-10; and Hazelton City Ordinance Codified Chapters 4-5-1, <u>Sale of Wine</u> through 4-5-11, are hereby repealed in totality so as not to be in conflict hereof. Further, any resolution or ordinance in conflict with this Ordinance governing the sale of beer, wine or liquor are hereby repealed. <b>Section 7.</b> This ordinance shall be in full force and effect, from after its passage, and approval by the Mayor and City Council, and publication as provided by law. THE ACES ON BRIDGE®

All this week’s deals come from last year’s spring national tournament in Reno, marking this year’s event currently taking place in Louisville, Kentucky.

Take a look at all four hands of this deal from the first qualifying session of the Lebhar IMP Pairs. As you can see, North and South have four “top” losers in four spades — and yet the most common result achieved by North-South was plus-620 in four spades. Of course, at some tables, East-West went overboard in hearts, but at many more tables, the defenders could not work out how to untangle their winners against four spades, and the real problem took place at trick one.

Take a look at East’s problem at trick one. Everybody knows “third hand plays high,” so why did so many Easts duck their heart ace and allow South’s king to score?

The answer is that East was worried that declarer might have three hearts to the king, and playing the ace would give South a free discard. That is true, up to a point, but take a second look at that North hand.

If there are any club losers, they are fast ones — either the ace and king are missing or they aren’t. And East has no diamond honors. What trick could possibly go away on that “bonus” discard? The right defense is for East to cash both aces and play a second club. Mrs. Guggenheim wouldn’t have gotten it wrong!

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
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
