## New CEO takes over hospital

St. Luke's Magic Valley Medical Center will open its new hospital with a permanent CEO at the helm.

St. Luke's Health System, the administrative body for the various St. Luke's hospitals, announced Wednesday that after an 11-month selection process, Jim Angle will take over March 22 as permanent CEO in Twin Falls.

More than 200 candidates applied for the position.

Angle cut his teeth as a hospital administrator in New York and New Jersey and has been a manager in several medical areas, including behavioral health services and geriatrics. Since 2006, he was the CEO of the Memorial Hospital of Salem County in Salem, N.J., after serving a year as the assistant CEO.

Angle is coming in during the final phases of construction of the

new medical center, scheduled to open May 21. But he is no stranger to construction, having overseen the building of a new emergency department at Salem County in 2005 while he was assistant CEO.

Angle replaces Mike Reno, who has served as interim CEO since last April. Reno, a consultant with RWD Technologies out of Baltimore, Md., has also been helping St. Luke's Health System adopt

## Idaho House OKs campus firearms bill

Issue hinges on constitutional rights and safety

BOISE — The House passed a bill Wednesday that would eliminate the right of public colleges and universities to regulate firearms on campus, except in student housing.

Debate on the bill, which passed with a 41-28 vote, was far-ranging. It encompassed questions about constitutional rights of gun owners, the need to avoid a Virginia Tech-style massacre and the rights that individual institutions should have to set their own policies.

On the one side are lawmakers who say that the constitutional right to own guns falls to the wayside because of school regulations — they say the bill eliminates the rights of legal firearms owners to carry weapons and defend themselves.

“Gun-free zones don't work,” said Rep. Erik Simpson, R-Idaho Falls, the bill's sponsor. “Every couple years in this country, this is tragically proven.”

Simpson said that the legislation would make it easy for firearms owners to quickly intervene when attacks on

## T.F. Co. courtrooms overhauled

Judge G. Richard Bevan's courtroom is back in business.

Microphones were hooked up Monday while everyone from courthouse security to clerks helped arrange chairs and hang the U.S. and Idaho flags to finish the remodel of Courtroom 1 — Bevan's

courtroom — in time for a Tuesday trial.

Both Bevan, who is the 5th Judicial District's administrative judge, and District Judge Randy Stoker's courtrooms at Twin Falls County's Theron W. Ward Judicial Building were recently re-wired and remodeled as part of an upgrade to accommodate the modern way trials are conducted. The floors were trenched to install

new wiring, which supports the courtrooms' audio/visual systems. As digital media becomes more commonplace, it is not uncommon for an attorney to present video or photographic evidence through use of a computer hooked to a projector.

“It's helpful for the jury to see evidence,” Bevan said, noting that jurors used to see items like photographs at the

end of the trial during deliberations.

The audio system also allows for the recording of court proceedings through microphones on the judge's bench, witness box and attorney's table.

The project began in August and was completed in an off-and-on manner as judges took

## ‘Gustnado’ touches down as windstorm crosses M.V.

Wind blows out car windows, pushes parked car in Twin Falls

A cold front pushed through the Magic Valley Wednesday afternoon, blowing out power for up to 1,400 Idaho Power customers — though for most, just for less than an hour.

A small tornado, called a “gustnado” by the National Weather Service for its lack of accompanying thunderstorm, touched down about 10 miles southwest of Jerome. The only reported damage was to Idaho Power lines as tree branches were blown around, and minor damage near Harrison Elementary School in Twin Falls.

# Burley’s new waste treatment facility’s cost is covered

BURLEY — Taxpayers will not bear the cost of building Burley’s planned \$14.3 million industrial wastewater facility.

Instead, a combination of grant funding and fees for industrial wastewater customers will cover the two-phase construction of the system. While the city doesn’t have a timeline for the facility’s completion, it’s meant to eventually handle nearly 3 million gallons of waste per day generated from business at the city’s industrial park in Heyburn and other new industrial customers.

On Tuesday, Burley City Councilman Jay Lenkersdorfer requested a break-

down of the plant’s costs from City Administrator Mark Mitton.

“I thought it would be appropriate, since we approved a \$695,000 (engineer) contract a few weeks ago, that we learn how this project will be funded,” Lenkersdorfer said.

Mitton said fees charged to industrial users will be adjusted to pay for the wastewater plant, adding that, “Obviously for them, the more people who come into the plant, the more the costs will be spread out.”

The plant’s construction will bring Burley’s handling of industrial waste into federal compliance. Its current industrial system is linked into the city’s municipal system to provide a temporary

compliance fix.

Mitton said the industrial user fees will pay any additional costs incurred at the municipal plant. He said when the Gem State Pro-

cessing plant comes online next month, the sewer project will be pushed out of its initial phase and into its planned “Phase 1.”

While the city has \$1.49 million in Environmental Protection Agency grant funding available to spend on the plant, it’s still working to build up a 45 percent match for the funding. The remaining \$4.85 million for the project’s first phase will need to be paid through a loan or a revenue bond the city will need to seek a judge’s confirmation to issue.

User fees would repay the bond amount. Mitton said costs will be spread out between three current industrial customers, though that number could increase by the time the plant is actually built.

Houston-based Natural Chem Group plans to construct a plant in Heyburn after company officials purchased the anaerobic di-

gesters from the bankrupt Renova Energy Inc. ethanol plant in November.

Mitton said the company will create biogas by diverting wastewater from Gossner Foods Inc. and Gem State to its digesters. Wastewater will then be turned over to the industrial plant.

“It goes over there loaded with nutrients and comes back with all the food value taken out,” Mitton said. “It doesn’t really increase the (wastewater) volume.”

Councilman Denny Curtis questioned whether the process would increase the phosphorus load on the wastewater plant.

“They’ll take out as much as they can, because we’ll be charging them for what comes back,” Mitton said.

## Burley Council suspends public comment period

BURLEY — Burley’s mayor broke a tie vote by the City Council Tuesday, once again suspending the meeting’s public comment period.

The three-minute comment portion was re-established in August after a five-minute comment period was suspended in 2009 by former Mayor Jon Anderson.

Councilmen Casey Andersen, Gordon Hansen and

Denny Curtis voted in favor of suspending the comment period, while Councilmen Steve McGill, Jay Lenkersdorfer and Vaughn Egan voted to keep it intact.

The forum has recently been used by citizens who criticized the mayor or councilmen.

“My opinion is the council and the community would be served well by having those who are interested in addressing the city go through the proper processes of being placed on our agenda,” Hansen said.

The school’s fire alarm went off when a nearby power transformer blew, and the wind was gusting hard enough to blow out some teachers’ car windows, school district spokeswoman Beth Pendergrass said. It even pushed two unoccupied vehicles together, according to city police dispatchers.

Power outages in northern Twin Falls affected a golf course, fishery, sewage plant, shopping centers and a long-term care facility.

Traffic signals were also affected.

The Twin Falls airport recorded wind gusts of up to 55 mph; the Burley airport recorded gusts of 58 mph.

In the Mini-Cassia area, where high winds cut power to half of Minidoka County just one week ago, only about 80 Idaho Power customers lost service. Those affected, in Oakley and Burley, were only so for about 30 minutes, spokeswoman Stephanie McCurdy said. Cassia and Minidoka county emergency dispatchers said they heard of no other reported power outages in their areas.

Winds gave way later in the day to snow flurries in

vacation, attended conferences or reworked their court calendars. Stoker’s courtroom was finished first, while Bevan’s was wrapped up on Monday, following a closure of two straight weeks.

In addition to the electrical work, the judge’s bench, jury box and witness box in each courtroom were also

rebuilt.

“We decided on a facelift while we were at it,” said 5th Judicial District Trial Court Administrator Linda Wright.

For Bevan, one of the changes was more than cosmetic. While Stoker’s bench is in the left corner of his courtroom, allowing him a better view of the witness and jury boxes, Bevan’s bench is parallel with the back wall. His bench must remain this way, as the five

members of the state Supreme Court use his courtroom when making their annual trip to Twin Falls.

Work is not 100 percent complete, as Bevan said there are plans to include wheelchair ramps to the jury box and witness stand. Also, the audio system in his courtroom needs some tweaking, he said. The microphone on his bench works for recording but isn’t amplifying his voice, a prob-

lem for an admittedly quiet speaker.

The Judicial Facilities Fund paid for the \$48,000 job, fuelled by a \$15 fee attached to every new civil filing in the county, not taxpayer dollars.

Wright said they’ll start saving again for future projects. In the years to come, as more legal literature goes digital, plans may call for shrinking the law library, possibly freeing up workspace for court clerks.

campus break out, saying much can happen in the minutes leading up to police arriving.

But critics, pointing to opposition from all of Idaho’s public colleges and universities, say that the change would increase the danger on campuses.

On the House floor, Rep. Wendy Jaquet, D-Ketchum, referenced a letter sent to legislators by 11 survivors and 56 family members of victims in the 2007 Virginia Tech massacre.

The letter urged lawmakers to reject the legislation, saying that after replaying the events, they believe adding more people and guns to the event would have made it more dangerous.

The College of Southern Idaho also opposes the legislation, which still needs to pass the Senate.

Tim Yenne, 33, a criminal justice and pre-law CSI student from Hazelton, has a concealed weapon permit and said he can see both sides of the issue. While he understands the concerns of those opposed to guns on campus, Yenne said that those with permits have to go through background checks and be responsible.

“They know the dos and don’ts, and if it’s concealed

and nobody is flaunting it, to be honest I don’t see the issue with it,” he said.

CSI President Jerry Beck told lawmakers in a letter that the change would only add to the confusion, with police unable to distinguish between the perpetrators and legally armed citizens.

Votes among south-central Idaho were mixed.

Rep. Maxine Bell, R-Jerome, said the decision should be up to colleges and universities, which already have the right to allow firearms on campus.

Laws already restrict firearms in other places like banks and public schools, said Rep. Leon Smith, R-Twin Falls.

Rep. Stephen Hartgen, R-Twin Falls, said he supported it, noting that the state constitution gives the Legislature the authority to regulate concealed firearms.

He said: “To have individual policies on campuses seems to me to probably not be the right way to go. So I think the constitutional issue to me was the overriding argument in favor of the bill.”




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# Dairy industry pushes bill that allows more CAFO secrecy

BOISE — An Idaho House committee Wednesday supported a move to seal off more data related to confined-animal feeding operations from the public eye, making it harder for the public to tell if state regulations are enforced.

A bill proposed by Rep. Judy Boyle, R-Midvale, would put all dairy nutrient management plans — and related proprietary business information — out of the public's eye.

The plans essentially detail what becomes of animal waste produced at the dairies, which if not properly disposed of can pollute groundwater and soil.

Most waste plans are already hidden from public review, for facilities that participate in a state management plan program. This bill would more broadly affect reports of facility compliance inspections carried out by the Idaho State Department of Agriculture.

The proposal has reignited a familiar debate about what should be public and what should be considered a private business affair.

Last year, a similar law closed off waste management plans for cattle feedlots.

## RIGHT TO KNOW?

A sample dairy inspection report shows how a House bill would change what the public can see in dairy inspections. Here are the details:

**Still open:** The dairy's name, address, number of animals and some violation information, including the cause, would remain public.

**No longer public:** Parts of the inspector's notes with details considered proprietary, including whether fields exceed phosphorus thresholds and the amount of waste and where it's spread. Visit [Magicvalley.com](http://Magicvalley.com) for examples of the changes.

This proposal also comes on the heels of a critical report on the dairy industry, much of it based on inspection data, presented recently to House lawmakers by the Fruitland-based nonprofit watchdog Idaho Concerned Area Residents for the Environment.

Boyle said the bill is not intended to hide non-compliance issues. It is intended to give the dairy industry the same degree of records privacy that the beef industry

enjoys, she said.

The other parts of the inspection reports have a "lot of business information" that should be confidential, she said at a House Agricultural Affairs hearing, before the committee voted to send the bill to the full House.

In an interview with the *Times-News*, Bob Naerebout, head of the Idaho Dairyman's Association, said that while the organization supports the legislation, it also believes in sound environmental practices. He also pointed to the industry's investment in environment-based research projects.

The public would still be able to tell when ISDA notes a violation, Naerebout said. And he made clear his displeasure with ICARE's use of public records — noting he only listened to its presentation and has not reviewed the group's report.

"It is directly because of ICARE and how they handled records of people who didn't even have violations that this bill came forward," he said.

The problem, critics say, is that ISDA allegedly doesn't note all violations. Alma Hasse, executive director of ICARE, said her study concluded that nearly one-third of dairy CAFOs reviewed have compliance issues,

even if the inspector marked them as compliant, based on notes on issues such as phosphorus levels.

She expressed worry about the law impacting the public's right to know, adding that the feedlot law passed last year has made it impossible to provide a similar analysis of the beef industry.

Other industry groups, including Milk Producers of Idaho and Food Producers of Idaho, testified Wednesday in support of the bill.

ICARE aside, other groups have concerns.

Courtney Washburn of the Idaho Conservation League said at Wednesday's hearing that the waste plan information allows the public to look for causes of contamination.

Kenton Bird, director of the School of Journalism and Mass Media at the University of Idaho, said in an interview: "If this bill passes, it would be a significant setback for the public's right to know about the activities of a state agency, and that's the Department of Agriculture and how well the agency is doing its job."

Of the existing exemptions for proprietary records, he said: "In my humble opinion, there are already enough loopholes to drive a milk truck through."

## Rec center meeting draws supporters

Of all the words used to describe the first meeting of the Twin Falls Recreation Center Committee, enthusiasm was the most common.

Several of the 17 members already volunteered to go fact-finding on what made other recreation centers and districts in the Intermountain West successful, while others offered to start looking for available grants.

The results of those individual missions are expected to be shared at the committee's meeting next month, which will still be an early step in a process that may yet conclude bringing a recreation center or district to Twin Falls isn't practical. The committee's ultimate goal is to explore the different possibilities for a city of Twin Falls Recreation Center, from size to ownership

and operation, or the practicality of forming a recreation district, which would need to go before voters as a new taxing district.

The seventeen members represent groups ranging from the Twin Falls Salvation Army to St. Luke's Health System, with ideas ranging from conservative to pie-in-the-sky, member-at-large Chris Clark said, adding that the balance will be a boon to the end result.

"It was great to have such a mixture, so those who are aiming really high can be reined in a bit and those who want it smaller can be enticed to go a little bigger," he said.

City Councilman Greg Lanting, one of three council representatives, said he felt a lot of sentiment of "go big or go home," in the early discussions, though a key to any rec center's feasibility will be how self-sufficient it is. Councilman Will Kezele,

another representative, echoed that, saying several folks wanted a center big enough to attract athletic tournaments, but the end result will probably be dictated by the dollars that can be wrangled.

Parks and Recreation Director Dennis Bowyer emphasized that any possible center or district is still early in the process. But he was hopeful for the committee, based on its enthusiasm.

"I see this committee some day making a recommendation," he said. "But maybe it will be a recommendation for (the center) to be completely private, or maybe a recommendation to be a partnership with some other entity (than the city), or maybe it will be a recommendation to form a recreation district."

# Idaho’s Legislature won’t take no for an answer

Idaho’s lawyer-in-chief is one of the best in the business. Just ask his fellow attorneys general.

Last summer, the Conference of Western Attorneys General gave Idaho Attorney General Lawrence Wasden its “Courage in Public Service Award,” explaining that he “has acted with courage and integrity to uphold the office of the attorney general, above and beyond the high standards always expected of its occupants.”

**Our view:** It’s full speed ahead at the Legislature, whether legislation is unconstitutional or not. **What do you think?** We welcome viewpoints from our readers on this and other issues.

So why isn’t the Legislature listening to him? Wasden and the lawyers who work for him have been asked for a series of advisory opinions about proposed legislation during the current session. Then lawmakers have pretty much done what they wanted to do, heedless of the legal consequences.

The latest example came Wednesday, when the Senate State Affairs Committee approved a bill sponsored by Sen. Chuck Winder, R-Boise, that would prohibit abortions in Idaho after 20 weeks. That, despite the fact that

no Idaho abortion provider does the procedure after 16 weeks.

At Winder’s request, Deputy Attorney General Steve Olsen issued two opinions. Both said Winder’s legislation was unconstitutional.

So soon, Mr. and Ms. Taxpayer, you’ll be stuck with the tab for defending a lawsuit Idaho is certain to lose.

Another legislator asked Deputy Attorney General Clay Smith if the language in Winder’s bill would allow a rapist who has impregnated a woman to sue the mother-to-be. The answer was yes.

Last month, the House of Representatives passed legislation — later killed in the Senate — that would have prohibited Idaho’s participation in the year-old national health care law. Deputy Attorney General Brian Kane issued two opinions that said the nullification bill wouldn’t stand up in court.

Then this week, Rep. Vito Barbieri, R-Dalton Garden — a lawyer who doesn’t have a license to practice law in Idaho — introduced legislation that would peel off staff and funding from the attorney general’s office to create an Office of Legislative Counsel.

That’s ridiculous. Barbieri is shopping around for a lawyer who’ll tell him what he wants to hear, not what’s right.

Idaho taxpayers will spend \$15.8 million this year on the attorney general’s office. Seems to us they should be able to expect the Legislature to listen to what Wasden has to say.

# Myths about nuclear energy

Explosions. Radiation. Evacuations. More than 30 years after Three Mile Island, the unfolding crisis in Japan has brought back some of the worst nightmares surrounding nuclear power — and restarted a major debate about the merits and the drawbacks of this energy source.

Does nuclear energy offer a path away from carbon-based fuels? Or are nuclear power plants too big a threat? It’s time to separate myth from reality.

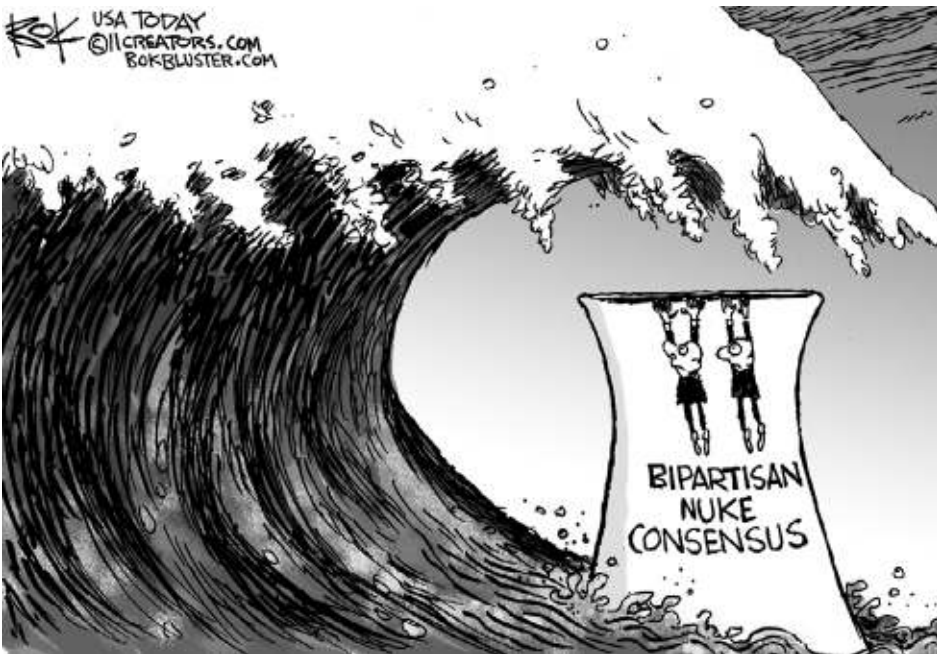
**1. The biggest problem with nuclear energy is safety.**

Safety is certainly a critical issue, as the tragedy in Japan is making clear. But for years, the biggest challenge to sustainable nuclear energy hasn’t been safety, but cost.

In the United States, new nuclear construction was already slowing down even before the partial meltdown at Three Mile Island in 1979; the disaster merely sealed its fate. The last nuclear power plant to come online started delivering power in 1996 — but its construction began in 1972. Today, nuclear power remains considerably more expensive than coal- or gas-fired electricity, mainly because nuclear plants are so expensive to build. Estimates are slippery, but a plant can cost well north of \$5 billion. A 2009 MIT study estimated that the cost of producing nuclear energy was about 30 percent higher than that of coal or gas.

**2. Nuclear power plants are sitting ducks for terrorists.**

It’s easy to get scared about terrorist attacks on nuclear plants. After the Sept. 11, 2001, attacks, a cottage industry sprung up around the threat, with analysts imagining ever-more horrific and creative ways that terrorists could strike nuclear facilities and unleash massive consequences.

There are certainly real risks: Nuclear expert Matthew Bunn, of Harvard University, has pointed out that well-planned terrorist attacks probably would produce the sort of simultaneous failures in multiple backup systems that Japan’s reactors are experiencing. But it’s much harder to target a nuclear power plant than one might think, and terrorists would have great difficulty replicating the physical impact that last week’s earthquake had on the Japanese plants. It also would be tough for them to breach the concrete domes and other barriers that surround U.S. reactors. And although attacks have been attempted in the past — most notoriously by Basque separatists in Spain in 1977 — none has resulted in widespread damage.

**3. Democrats oppose nuclear energy; Republicans favor it.**

Yes, the GOP base is enthusiastic about nuclear energy, while the Democratic base is skeptical. Moreover, many Republican politicians support assistance to the industry such as loan guarantees for nuclear developers, while many Democrats oppose them. But the politics of

nuclear power have changed in recent years, mainly because of climate change.

Democrats have become more open to nuclear power as a large-scale zero-emissions energy option. Secretary of Energy Steven Chu has been enthusiastic about the nuclear option. When asked to compare coal and nuclear energy in 2009, Chu responded: “I’d rather be living near a nuclear power plant.”

Yet although Democrats may have become more accepting of nuclear power, few became fully enthusiastic. Japan’s tragedy may make many reconsider their stance.

**4. Nuclear power is the key to energy independence.**

When people talk about energy independence, they’re thinking about oil, which we mostly use in vehicles and industrial production. When they talk about nuclear, though, they’re thinking about electricity. More nuclear power means less coal, less natural gas, less hydroelectric power and less wind energy. But unless we start putting nuclear power plants in our cars and semis, more nuclear won’t

mean less oil.

**5. Better technology can make nuclear power safe.**

Technology can increase safety, but there will always be risks with nuclear power. The Japanese reactors at the center of the current crisis use old technology that increased their vulnerability. Next-generation reactors will be “passively cooled,” which means that if backup power fails like it has in Japan, meltdowns will be avoided more easily. Other lower-tech improvements, such as stronger containment structures, have also mitigated risk.

But what happened in Japan reminds us that unanticipated vulnerabilities are inevitable in any highly complex system. Careful engineering can minimize the chance of disasters, but it can’t eliminate them. Operators and authorities will need to make sure that they’re prepared to deal with unanticipated failures even as they work to prevent them.

academy graduates, remember, keep that “jockey box” cleaned out, just in case. Thanks for your friendship and many great memories.

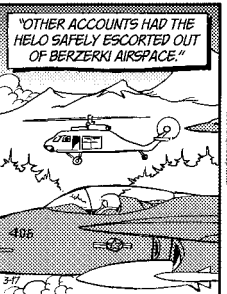

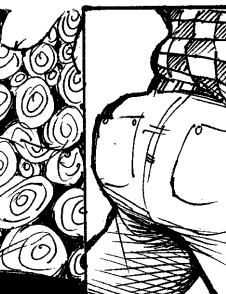

# Japan begins air drop on stricken reactor

## INL weighs in on effects of Japan's nuclear crisis

The failure of three nuclear facilities after Friday's earthquake and tsunami in Japan have raised questions about airborne radiation and the safety of nuclear energy.

Idaho National Laboratory Director John Grossenbacher was confident that a similar disaster could not happen in Idaho. INL has two reactors, Grossenbacher said, but they are test reactors, not power reactors like those in Japan.

To guard against the danger of radiation moving over the Pacific from Japan, the Environmental Protection Agency recently announced it would deploy additional electronic monitors to measure radiation in the air.

Public reaction has reflected some panic, with pharmacies in western cities experiencing a run on potassium iodide, a chemical that blocks radiation from entering the thyroid.

"There's no credible mechanism that could throw the radiation into the air high enough to be car-

ried this far," Grossenbacher said. "Chernobyl sent radiation into Europe but that involved an incredible steam explosion and fire that drove the radiation up."

In the unlikely event of a strong earthquake in southeastern Idaho, Grossenbacher said, the state's test reactors pose less of a threat because they have less nuclear fuel and they operate at lower temperatures and pressures, so they emit radiation particles less forcefully.

Grossenbacher said the earthquake didn't cause Japan's nuclear problems; the facilities shut down as they should have when the tremor hit. The problem was that the tsunami which followed the quake knocked out the power that was needed to cool the reactor cores.

Nothing is fail-safe, he said, so people shouldn't worry about nuclear energy. "If we look at our energy choices and we weigh them in a rational manner — that is cost versus environmental impact over a long period of time — I think that nuclear energy is extraordinarily competitive," he said.

ZAO, Japan — Japanese military helicopters dumped loads of seawater onto a stricken nuclear reactor Thursday, trying to avoid full meltdowns as plant operators said they were close to finishing a new power line that could restore cooling systems and ease the crisis.

U.S. officials in Washington, meanwhile, warned that the Fukushima Dai-ichi plant in northeastern Japan may be on the verge of spewing more radioactive material because water was gone from a storage pool for spent nuclear fuel rods.

The troubles at several of the plant's reactors were set off when last week's earthquake and tsunami knocked out power and ruined backup generators needed for their cooling systems, adding a major nuclear crisis for Japan as it dealt with twin natural disasters that killed more than 10,000 people and left hundreds of thousands homeless.

A Japanese military CH-47 Chinook helicopter began dumping seawater on the damaged reactor of Unit 3 at the Fukushima complex at 9:48 a.m., said defense ministry spokeswoman Kazumi Toyama. The aircraft dumped at least four loads on the reactor, though much of

the water appeared to be dispersed in the air.

The dumping was intended both to help cool the reactor and to replenish water in a pool holding spent fuel rods, Toyama said. The plant's owner, Tokyo Electric Power Co., said earlier that the pool was nearly empty, which might cause the rods to overheat.

The comments from U.S. officials indicated there were similar problems at another unit of the Dai-ichi complex.

U.S. Nuclear Regulatory Commission Chairman Gregory Jaczko said at a congressional hearing in Washington that all the water was gone from a separate spent fuel pool at the plant's Unit 4. Japanese officials expressed similar worries about that unit, but that it was impossible to be sure of its status.

Emergency workers were forced to retreat from the plant Wednesday when radiation levels soared, losing precious time. They resumed work after radiation levels dropped, but much of the monitoring equipment in the plant is inoperable, complicating efforts to assess the situation.

"We are afraid that the water level at unit 4 is the lowest," said Hikaru Kuroda, facilities management official at Tokyo Electric Power Co. But he added, "Because we cannot get near it, the only way to monitor the situation

is visually from far away."

Japanese officials raised hopes of easing the crisis, saying early Thursday that they may be close to bringing power back to the plant and restoring the reactors' cooling systems.

The new power line would revive electric-powered pumps, allowing the company to control the rising temperatures and pressure that have led to at least partial meltdowns in three reactors. The company is also trying to repair its existing disabled power line.

Tokyo Electric Power spokesman Naoki Tsunoda said the new power line to the plant is almost finished and that officials plan to try it "as soon as possible," but he could not say exactly when.

### PAKISTAN Lawyer says 'blood money' bought CIA contractor's freedom

ISLAMABAD — A murder case against an American CIA contractor that had threatened already troubled U.S.-Pakistani relations came to an abrupt end Wednesday after \$1.4 million in "blood money" was paid to the families of the two men he was accused of killing, according to the contractor's lawyer.

A Pakistani court ordered Raymond Davis' acquittal after the families agreed to forgive him. Davis, who had been in custody since January, immediately left Pakistan. The families of the dead men were secretly relocated inside Pakistan as part of the agreement, Pakistani officials said.

Under the court-ordered release, Davis neither admitted his guilt nor conceded that he didn't enjoy diplomatic immunity, a major point of contention between the U.S. and Pakistan, according to his lawyer and a senior Pakistani official.

The U.S., however, agreed as part of the settlement to notify Pakistan's Inter-Services Intelligence agency of all CIA personnel in the country. The ISI apparently was unaware that Davis, officially an administrative officer at the U.S. consulate in Lahore, actually worked for the CIA when he killed the two men, whom he said were trying to rob him.

### S. CAROLINA Police: Man kills woman, 2 children

RED BANK — As his relationship of several months crumbled, Chancey Smith devolved into a drunken depression Tuesday night. A friend called 911 to warn that the 32-year-old, armed with a semi-automatic handgun, was on his way to his estranged girlfriend's South Carolina home and had said he intended to hurt her.

Deputies rushed to the scene, arriving only moments after they believe Smith shot 27-year-old Amanda Peake and her two young children before turning the gun on himself.

Peake's relatives struggled Wednesday to cope with the death of the young mother they described as outgoing and full of life.

Lexington County deputies say Smith shot her, then her 9-year-old son Cameron and finally her 6-year-old daughter Sarah inside the family's home in the community of Red Bank around 10 p.m. Tuesday. Deputies say Smith then shot and killed himself.

### WASHINGTON Petraeus says son served in Afghanistan

Challenged by a congressman to "be honest" about how long U.S. troops might have to fight in Afghanistan, Army Gen. David Petraeus revealed that he has a personal stake in ensuring that the U.S. war objectives are met — his son, Stephen, whose recent combat tour was kept "very quiet."

In an emotional exchange with Rep. Walter B. Jones, R-N.C., Petraeus said "if I ever felt that we couldn't achieve our objectives," he would be "very forthright" not only with his superiors in the military chain of command but also with President Barack Obama and members of the Congress.

Noting that Obama has said the U.S. will have combat troops out by the end of 2014, with the Afghan government in position to provide its own security, a skeptical Jones said he could imagine a senior military leader coming before Congress in 2015 and pleading for more time and more sacrifice.

Petraeus replied: "I may not be at this table, probably won't be, in 2015, but I'll tell you that my son is in uniform, and Lieutenant Petraeus just completed a tour in Afghanistan, which thankfully we were able to keep very quiet, and left in November after serving as an infantry platoon leader."

### Clinton: No interest in job after 2012

Secretary of State Hillary Rodham Clinton said Wednesday she does not want to stay in her job if President Barack Obama wins a second term in 2012.

The nation's top diplomat also firmly said she neither has plans to mount another White House bid

nor interest in other posts, such as vice president or defense secretary.

Clinton, visiting Cairo, was asked whether she would stay on in a second Obama term. She also was asked if she would like the jobs of president, vice president or defense secretary. She offered single word responses to each: "No."

### GEORGIA U.S. life expectancy surpasses 78 years

ATLANTA — U.S. life expectancy has hit another all-time high, rising above 78 years.

The estimate of 78 years and 2 months is for a baby born in 2009, and comes from a preliminary report released Wednesday by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

About 2.4 million people died in the United States in 2009 — roughly 36,000 fewer deaths than the year before.

Deaths were down for a range of causes, from heart disease to homicide, so experts don't believe there's one simple explanation for the increase in life expectancy.

### KENTUCKY Ali asks Iran to free two American hikers

LOUISVILLE — Boxing champ Muhammad Ali is seeking the release of two American hikers by Iran by lobbying the country's supreme leader in a way that few American dignitaries can: as a brother in Islam.

Arguably the most prominent U.S. Muslim, Ali made his simple, behind-the-scenes appeal to Ayatollah Ali Khamenei in February and released his letter to The Associated Press on Wednesday.

The letter asks Khamenei to release Josh Fattal and Shane Bauer, who have been held on espionage charges since July 2009, when they were arrested while hiking in northern Iraq near the Iranian border.

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# Soggy weather slows early planting

Wet weather may be keeping tractors out of fields, but growers aren't getting too antsy — yet.

Although it's not uncommon for growers to be seeding spring wheat or barley in the Twin Falls area by mid-March, growers in Mini-Cassia often don't get started until April.

Some fields around Ru-

pert still have snow in the fencelines and ditches.

With much of February dry and warm weather in early March, many growers were getting grain drills ready as they waited for fields to dry. But with rain in the forecast all week, it's likely to be late March before they get started in earnest.

"We'll take more water and put it in the bank," said Travis Jones, executive director for the Idaho Grain

Producers Association. For individual growers, planting is often a mad dash; viewed on a state level it's actually a marathon from when growers in the west of King Hill get started in late February until barley growers in southeastern Idaho finish in late May.

"We've got a month-and-half to two-and-a-half months left to get the crop in the ground," Jones said. "We're not late yet."

Many growers took advantage of good weather in late February to fertilize their winter wheat crop and are grateful that the moisture is bringing the nutrients to the plants' roots.

Soil temperatures are still cool at 35 to 40 degrees at the 2- to 4-inch depth last week in Kimberly. That's warm enough for grain to germinate, if the soil was dry enough to plant. Steve Hines, University of Idaho

extension educator for Twin Falls County, says winter wheat is starting to break dormancy. He hasn't heard of any problems with winter kill, but doesn't think the winter was cold enough to cause problems.

Sugar beet growers used to start planting in mid-March if fields were dry enough, but genetically modified seed is more expensive than seed was five or ten years ago. That's delayed early planting

a bit to reduce the potential for replants.

While they are hopeful that the early February decision by the U.S. Department of Agriculture to partially de-regulate Roundup Ready sugar beets and allow them to plant the genetically modified crop this spring, growers remain cautious. No one wants to begin planting a crop that a court may later say is illegal and can't be harvested.

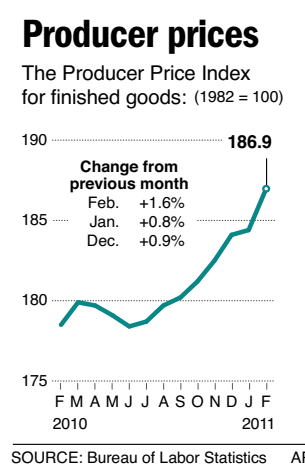

# Higher prices for food are about to get much worse

WASHINGTON (AP) — Americans are noticing higher prices at the grocery store, and it's about to get worse.

Food prices at the wholesale level rose last month by the most in 36 years. Cold weather accounted for most of it, forcing stores and restaurants to pay more for green peppers, lettuce and other vegetables, but meat and dairy prices surged, too.

The big questions are how long food prices will keep rising and how high they'll go.

The impact is already visible. Wendy's, paying higher prices for tomatoes, now puts them on hamburgers only by request. Starbucks and Dunkin' Donuts have raised prices because they pay more for coffee beans. Supermarkets warn customers that produce may be of lower quality, or limited.

"It has thrown the whole industry into a tizzy," says Dan Bates, director of merchandising for the produce division of grocery chain Supervalu Inc.

Food prices rose 3.9 percent last month, the most since November 1974. Most of the increase was because harsh winter freezes in Florida, Texas and other Southern states, which damaged crops.

At the same time, global prices for corn, wheat, soybeans, coffee and other commodities have risen sharply in the past year. That's raised the price of animal feed, which has pushed up the cost

of eggs, ground beef and milk.

Paul Ashworth, an economist at Capital Economics, says his firm has warned since last summer that spikes in commodity prices would eventually work their way down to wholesalers and consumers, "and here it is. There is plenty more to come over the next few months."

Crop prices began to increase last summer, after droughts slammed harvests in Russia and several other countries. Sharp growth in new world economic powers like India and China has also increased demand.

Overall, the producer price index, which tracks price changes before they reach the consumer, rose 1.6 percent in February, the Labor Department said Wednesday. That's double the rise from the previous month and the biggest increase since June 2009. The index is adjusted to account for seasonal variations.

More expensive food means people have less money for the casual spending that helps the economy grow and create jobs. And it adds to growing concerns about inflation down the road, still a worry two years after the Great Recession.

Many economists expect food prices to keep rising through the end of the year. Consumer food prices will be about 5 percent higher this fall than the previous time last year, according to RBC

# Netflix vying for first rights to TV series

SAN FRANCISCO — Netflix Inc. is trying to buy the Internet streaming rights to a 26-episode drama starring Kevin Spacey before the series is shown on a television network.

If the deal is completed, it would mark a bold step in a new direction for Netflix's popular video subscription service. Netflix currently boasts more than 20,000 titles in its streaming library, but most of them are previously aired TV series and older movies.

The talks were reported earlier by Deadline.com. A person familiar with the negotiations on Wednesday confirmed Netflix's interest in the series, called "House of Cards." The person spoke on condition of anonymity because a deal hasn't been reached.



Should it win rights to "House of Cards," Netflix would emerge as an even more serious threat to pay-TV channels such as HBO. Netflix began the year with 20 million subscribers. Some analysts believe that by the end of this year the service could be as large as HBO, which is believed to have about 28 million subscribers.

As it has grown, Netflix has become more nettlesome for long-established TV services because some households are reducing or canceling their cable TV subscriptions as they find more to stream over high-speed Internet connections.

Time Warner Inc.'s HBO has consistently refused to sell Netflix the streaming rights to its original programming, such as "The Sopranos" and "The Wire," because it doesn't believe the extra money from licensing fees would offset the cost of helping a rival.

Now it appears Netflix wants to become more like HBO and other pay-TV channels such as CBS Inc.'s Showtime by gaining the exclusive rights to TV series.

"House of Cards" is a high-profile project backed by the production company Media Rights Capital II LP. Besides featuring Academy Award winner Spacey in the starring role, the series pilot will be directed by one of Hollywood's most respected filmmakers, David Fincher. His credits include directing "The Social Network," an Oscar nominee for best picture this year.

Even as he has insisted he doesn't want to produce its own programming, Netflix CEO Reed Hastings has been aggressively bidding for the exclusive streaming rights to more content in an effort to reduce the postal expenses of Netflix's DVD-by-mail option.

Without providing specifics, the person familiar with the "House of Cards" talks said Netflix is offering to pay less than \$100 million for 26 episodes of the series.

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**Can't afford your property taxes?**  
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Some homeowners qualify for Idaho property tax relief and have until April 15 to apply for the two programs available.

The Idaho Property Tax Reduction (Circuit Breaker) program reduces property taxes on a homeowner's primary, up to much as \$1,320.

To qualify, people must earn less than \$28,000.

The Idaho Property Tax Deferral program, allows homeowners (making no more than \$40,000) postpone payment on taxes.

To qualify for either program applicants must: be a legal Idaho resident and over 65 years-old, or blind, a widow(er), former prisoner of war or hostage or disabled.

# Apple iPad 2 even slicker, but perhaps not worth the upgrade

So you might not be able to eat an iPad, as someone pointed out last week to the president of the New York Federal Reserve, but there is enough to salivate over in the new iteration of the market-defining tablet computer. The Fed official got a lot of flak last week for saying that even though food prices were rising, at least the cost of the new iPad was the same. Prices range from \$499 to \$829.

The general design of the device has not changed much either, although it has begun to look more like earlier versions of the iPhone, with gentle curves, as opposed to the boxier iPhone 4.

There are some notable tweaks: a new dual-core A5 chip, a gyroscope, a couple of cameras and the option of Verizon for 3G service in addition to AT&T. Oh, and there is a new color — the apparently elusive color, white. (Still no white iPhone 4 has surfaced, though reports promise its debut this spring.) Most impressive is what Apple has managed to replicate with the launch of a moderately modified device —

"I used to cook for my friends and neighbors. I can't do that anymore," she says.

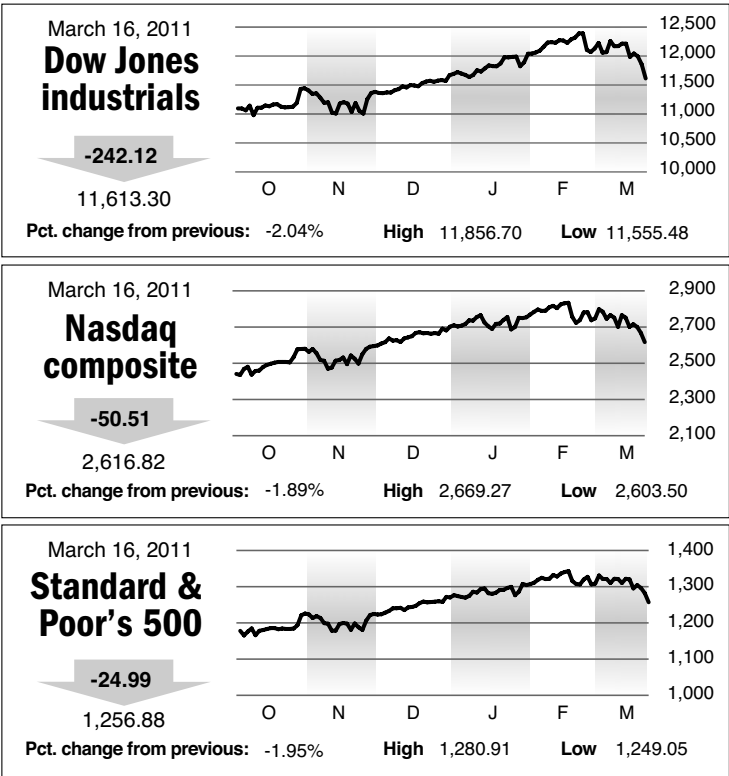

"By 20 weeks, pain receptors have appeared throughout the body," Salvacion said. "It is also my opinion that the fetus would be subjected to intense, excruciating pain, occurring prior to fetal demise, from abortion procedures used in the second and third trimester."

# HANDCRAFTED FOR HUNTING

## Buhl man cuts out a niche with knife-making business

BUHL — A knife is a knife — unless the blade won't hold an edge and ends up being tossed in a drawer.

Reed Critchfield, owner of Sawtooth Knife Co., has encountered this situation many times in the more than 20 years he's been selling his handmade hunting knives at craft fairs or other venues around the country.

"You can buy a hunting knife for \$9 but you get what you pay for, and you still have a \$9 knife," he said. "People come up asking if I will sharpen something that won't hold an edge and I tell them I can't sharpen a beer can either."

The 76-year-old Buhl craftsman started learning about knives from his father who, too old for active service during World War II, worked as a fireman at Camp Rupert. As time went by he was able to develop a rapport with some of the inmates and one of the German prisoners began showing him how to make knives using saw blades.

One of his prize possessions is one of the blades his father made while working at the prison camp. The handle is fashioned from the clear Plex-

iglass windshield of a downed aircraft.

"Up here on Mount Harrison, during the Second World War, a B-24 (Liberator) crash landed into the mountain. So dad went over with a bunch of guys and took part of the windshield and made this handle from it," he said. "It was one of the knives the German showed him how to make."

Critchfield made his first knife at age 15 but set the skill aside to serve a stint in the Navy. He followed that with a 40-year government career working in the metrology science of calibration. He didn't return to knife making until just before retiring in 1994.

High carbon tool steel, like that used in older sawmill blades and plainer blades, will rust if not cared for but holds an edge better than stainless steel and continues to be his preferred material.

"On the Rockwell Hardness C scale ball bearings are about 60 and a file is 56, but you want this to be about a 50 or 52," Critchfield said. "You want it soft enough you can sharpen it but hard enough you can hold an edge."

The process of creating a knife begins with tracing a series of outline patterns onto a saw blade, cut out using a plasma cutter. He then takes the 15 to 30 individual blanks from each saw blade and slowly grinds them down using a variable speed sander.

"When you start getting down where the knife edge is, you want to slow the speed down so it won't get too hot and take the temper out of the steel," he said. "You'd burn up the knife, your edge will get

just so sharp before falling away and you'll have a notch in your blade."

Critchfield estimates that taking a knife from the basic 3/16-inch or 1/4-inch saw blade blank to the polish of a finished product complete with deer, elk or moose antler handle, requires about 14 hours of labor. An antler handle is applied to the knife tang with the same method used by Native Americans. They are boiled and then driven on while wet and allowed to dry. This process, combined with an antler's adhesive nature, works together in creating a tight bond.

"The way you can tell if a knife has real antler and not a fake epoxy is to stick it in water," he said. "Antler becomes tacky or sticky and improves your grip, while the epoxy will just get slick. I often have a sign in the booth saying I'll trade for antler."

Whether a section of antler was taken from the right side or left side of the rack will also dictate a right-handed or left-handed knife. Critchfield encourages potential buyers to find a handle that feels comfortable in their hand.

"A lot of people buy a knife where the handle is too small for their hand," he said. "I've got a bear paw with thick fingers and you felt how awkward that right-handed knife was in your left hand, so something like this will go a long way in determining if you continue to use a knife."

Critchfield said blade prices are normally kept at between \$75 and \$85, which includes a leather sheath. But he also will produce special projects by commission. He has sold to chefs in New York, a cook from Washington state and black powder sportsmen who buy the knives to hang on walls under their guns.

For several years now, Filer resident Dewitt Miles has been supplying sheaths for Sawtooth knives as a way to keep busy in his retirement.

"I probably started in '96 or '97 and only construct a couple or three dozen or whatever he needs," Miles said. "But

they give me something to do when the weather is bad and I can't get outside to work."

Critchfield says his oldest son seems to be the only one of five children with an interest in the family knife-making tradition but his knowledge is still being passed on to a younger generation.

"In the last five years I've been teaching the Boy Scouts here at the LDS Church how to make knives and one boy made the knife, took it to the Twin Falls County Fair and

got a blue ribbon out of it. That made me quite proud," Critchfield said. "I also had a young man I taught who came back four years later with a show at CSI and made me feel pretty good."

# Fishing with history and snagging some perspective

COUNCIL GROVE LAKE, Kan. — Born in 1930, Miles Brooks has seen a sizable part of American history.

These are the good ol' days for what's really important in his life.

"We have a lot better fishing now than we used to," said Brooks, of Manhattan, Kan. "Used to be all we had was bull-heads and catfish in creeks and rivers. Now we're really lucky to be in Manhattan because we've got Council Grove, Tuttle Creek and Milford (Lakes) so close."

Brooks then went on to name about 10 other lakes his family fishes on a fairly regular basis and the many species they pursue.

On a recent Tuesday he fished for crappie at Council Grove, letting his son, Gary, pilot the boat that's rigged with the latest electronics and stuffed with bags and boxes of lures and rods and reels made from space-age materials.

That's a far cry from the way he started fishing.

"We used to mainly set lines or fish with (cane) poles," said Brooks, who started fishing with his father as a youngster. "My first fishing rod was a steel rod about four feet long. Some friends and I built our first boat in high school. There were six of us who hunted and fished together for about 50 years. Only two of us are left now."

Like many who grew up in the depression, Brooks takes extra special care of his gear. Lures are organized and stored. His boat is 16 years old and has been used to

drive through ice and towed thousands of miles.

It looks much newer and shows little wear because of Brooks' frequent attention.

Brooks throws little away. He has more than 50 rods and reels hanging in his garage at home.

Much of his fishing now is with his son and/or grandson, Jared Brooks.

A week before they were on Council Grove, using electronics to search for schools of gamefish feasting on schools of baitfish in submerged brush or along drop-

offs in about 20 to 25 feet of water.

On that trip they'd caught white bass until they were literally tired of winding them up. That's saying something.

"White bass are probably my favorite fish to fish for. You can catch a lot and they really fight," Brooks said. "I've always thought they're a great fish to get a kid started."

They also caught about 50 crappies that day once they tired of white bass.

Fishing was slower on this day.

## Outdoors survey to begin April 1

Hunters, anglers, bird watchers and other outdoor types will be asked to participate in the 12th National Survey of Fishing, Hunting and Wildlife-Associated Recreation, conducted by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service.

The survey, which begins April 1, has been conducted every five years since 1955 and will involve 53,000 households from across the country.

Funded by a grant program, the survey provides the only comprehensive statistical database available on participation and expenditures for hunting, fishing and wildlife-watching in all 50 states.

The information is collected by the U.S. Census Bureau, primarily through telephone interviews to be conducted April to June and September to October. Interviews will continue January-March 2012.

Those contacted will be asked about their participation and expenditures in several categories of wildlife-associated recreation. The results will be available in a national report and in 50 individual state reports.

"The last survey published in 2006 revealed 87.5 million Americans enjoyed some form of wildlife-related recreation and spent more than \$122.3 billion pursuing their activities," said Hannibal Bolton, assistant director for the Service's Wildlife and Sport Fish Restoration program. "The survey is a critical information resource for federal and state wildlife agencies, outdoor and tourist industries, local governments, planners, conservation groups, journalists and others interested in wildlife and outdoor recreation."

## Proper concealed carry protocol

The Second Amendment guarantees that a law abiding American citizen has the right to keep and bear arms. Most states have enacted legislation allowing their legal residents to participate in some form of concealed carry. That's the good news.

The bad news is that the lack of a uniform national policy confuses and intimidates a lot of folks and discourages them from exercising this uniquely American right. Realistically, this confusion is likely to persist until some sort of national reciprocity bill is forged and passed by Congress.

In the meantime, it is imperative that you school yourself in the legal restrictions and requirements of all the jurisdictions you intend to visit while carrying concealed. Some excellent resources are available to assist your study. One popular option is to enroll in a certified concealed carry class. There you will receive detailed instruction on both legal and ethical issues, as well as safe gun handling procedures. They are well worth the expense.

If you decide to forego these classes, you can get the information you need from your local permitting authority (usually the sheriff's office or police department) or by searching a number of excellent online sites. I highly recommend the NRA website ([www.nraila.org](http://www.nraila.org)) for detailed state-by-state concealed carry requirements. Its weekly cable program, the American Guardian, also is a great resource.

For this column, I decided to go right to the source. I interviewed a number of area sheriff's deputies and police officers — the folks that you initially will deal with on concealed carried matters.

Each officer asked me to relay to you the proper protocol for responding to a routine traffic stop. They told me that "no stop is routine and that any stop can be potentially lethal for them." Here is the appropriate procedure to follow:

- When you are request-

ed to pull over, immediately apply your turn signal and pull over at the first safe location.

- Open the driver side window and other windows, if they are darkly tinted (weather permitting, of course).

- Have all the necessary documentation within easy and readily visible access (license, registration, proof of insurance, and concealed carry permit).

- Keep both hands on the top of the steering wheel as you wait for the officer to approach your vehicle.

- Wait for the officer to initiate the presentation of your papers.

- At this point, inform the officer that you have a valid concealed carry permit and if you are currently in possession of one or more firearms. Please inform the officer of all weapons on your person or within the vehicle ... in this case, surprises are not good.

- The officer can and may have you give them possession of your weapon(s) while he/she conducts the investigation. Inform the officer that you will comply with the request by word and action.

- Keep one hand on the steering wheel, if possible, and slowly retrieve the weapon and safely hand it off. You may be asked to step out and place your hands on your vehicle for this procedure. Readily comply.

- When the investigation is finished, replace the weapon as instructed, thank the officer, and resume your business.

Learn the rules, cooperate with law enforcement personnel, and enjoy your Second Amendment right for self protection.

land birds

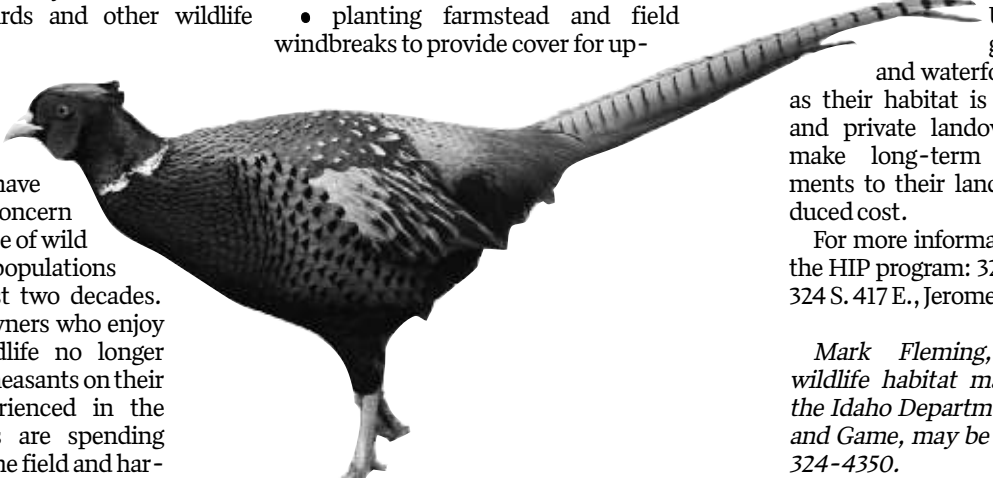
- planting small winter food plots or leaving a small plot of an existing field unharvested

Upland game birds and waterfowl benefit as their habitat is improved, and private landowners can make long-term improvements to their lands at a reduced cost.

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# Beetles clean up on European trophy mounts

DULUTH, Minn. — The steel building where Allen Edberg works on furs is lit by only two light bulbs dangling on long cords from the ceiling. When you enter on a bright winter day, you will need to pause to let your eyes adjust.

Edberg, a trapper, is at his table, working on a beaver hide. He puts it down and walks to a large chest freezer in one corner of the dirt-floored room.

“They’re in here,” says Edberg, 47, of Fredenberg Township north of Duluth.

Oh, yes, they are. Edberg lifts the lid of the freezer, which is unplugged and not freezing anything. In the bottom of the freezer lies a deer skull with a nice set of antlers attached. Crawling all over the white bone of the skull are beetles. Dermestid beetles. Hungry dermestid beetles that are eating any remaining flesh on the deer skull.

“I just got ’em this last summer,” Edberg says.

He bought the beetles for exactly this purpose, to clean the skulls of deer for European mounts, a form of deer mount that has become popular with Minnesota hunters. In a European mount, the antlers and skull remain intact, mounted as one. The mounts are more economical than the traditional “shoulder” mounts done by taxidermists in which the antlers are mounted on the head and cape of the deer.

“It went a little nuts,” Edberg says. “I’m backed up like you can’t believe.”

Edberg’s beetles are busy. They crawl up the buck’s nostrils, trundle along the buck’s teeth, creep in and out of the buck’s eye sockets.

## A family thing

A few of the beetles are adults, but most are larvae representing several beetle generations. Itty-bitty beetles 1/16th of an inch long.

Larger larvae a quarter-inch long. Adults up to half an inch long.

The bottom of the freezer is littered with the discarded exoskeletons of growing larvae, which resemble small-ish husks of sunflower seeds. Edberg keeps the freezer at an un-freezer-like 80 degrees.

A beetle lives about

30 days, Edberg says, laying eggs every two to four days. It is the larvae of young beetles that do most of the flesh-eating work, he says.

The beetles can clean up a deer skull in about a day and a half, Edberg says. He finishes it by applying a paste of hydrogen peroxide. He charges \$55 for a European mount. The average price of

a shoulder mount is about \$525, said Randy Bowe of Bowe Taxidermy in Duluth.

Bowe charges \$95 for both European mounts and standard antler-on-a-plaque mounts, he said. European mounts are a matter of taste, he said.

“Some people say, ‘I don’t want a skull in my house.’ Some people really like

them,” Bowe said. “They’re something new on the market. They’re getting more popular.”

For a true trophy buck, most hunters still prefer a shoulder mount, he said.

Bowe doesn’t use beetles to clean his skulls for European mounts, he said.

“I haven’t invested in the beetles,” Bowe said. “I don’t want them in my shop. I boil and bleach.”

## Starter kit

Edberg ordered a starter kit of dermestid beetles from Montana last summer. The kit, with one starter colony of insects, cost about \$400, he said. He fed them beaver skulls, bobcat skulls, mink and muskrat skulls. Edberg has access to plenty of skulls.

“Once they were eating up to a quarter-pound a day, I could put a (deer) head in there,” he said.

Clearly, if your olfactory system is working properly, you can detect one downside of hanging out near a colony of dermestid beetles at work.

“They stink,” Edberg says.

That aroma, and having to feed the beetles during the off-season, is too great an inconvenience for many who

do European mounts. But if you search Google for “dermestid beetles,” you’ll find that it’s a healthy industry.

The dermestid family of beetles, widespread native to the United States, also are used by museums to clean skulls for display. They are used in forensics because the arrival of dermestid beetles can indicate how long an organism has been dead.

Edberg isn’t sure how many European mounts he has done for hunters.

“Tons,” he says.

He understands the appeal of European mounts.

“I’ve got mounts in the house, too,” he says, “but how many can you afford to do?”

While Edberg fleshes and stretches hides that he and others have trapped, his beetles chew silently in the freezer. Edberg has assigned them not only buck skulls, but bear skulls, an alligator skull, muskrat skulls and skunk skulls.

“I’m doing a wolf skull for the Lake Superior Zoo,” he said.

Edberg isn’t sure how many beetles he has now.

“Thousands,” he says. “I’ll probably break them up into four or five colonies this summer.”

# Minnesota anglers brave thin ice in quest for Lake Superior ’loopers

MOUTH OF THE FRENCH RIVER, Minn. — The French River tumbles over a cobblestone flat as it enters Lake Superior. The current has created a crescent of open water in the big lake.

Beyond that open water, on ice just 3 inches thick, four anglers are jigging for Kamloops rainbow trout on this March afternoon. To get to this ice, they have walked a makeshift bridge of two logs spanning a 3-foot gap of open water.

It’s worth it, they say, for a shot at the big rainbows swimming beneath them.

“By my tally, 17 have been caught here today,” says Ross Pearson, one of the anglers.

Two beautiful rainbows lie on the ice near his fishing hole. Two females, each between 4 and 5 pounds. One is dusky, the other amber, each bearing the rainbow’s characteristic rose streak down its flanks.

About 15 feet away, Forrest Overby is trying to catch his 40th Kamloops rainbow of the winter/spring season. He has caught three fish, 4- to 5-pounders, which is his limit.

Beneath the 3-inch ice lies just 3 feet of clear Lake Superior water. Lake Superior’s ice is never completely predictable, but even if this layer of congealed and refrozen ice were to drift away or break, the anglers could walk to shore.

“I don’t feel the need to be going out over my head as long as there are fish swimming in 3 feet of water,” Pearson says.

As a precaution, he’s wearing chest waders, too.

After four seasons of sub-par Kamloops rainbow fishing, this spring seems to be more like the good old days, anglers say. Pearson, a reg-

ular Kamloops angler, says he’s seen some 20-fish days. He’s talking about the entire catch of a group of anglers.

Overby, too, is happy with this year’s action.

“Excellent,” he says.

It is a good day to be a Kamloops rainbow angler. The sun has some punch to it now, and the temperature is pushing 40. If it weren’t for a steady southwest wind, the day would be downright balmy.

Thanks to the wind direction, the ice seems to be staying mostly in place, rather than, say, drifting toward Wisconsin. The two logs are still in place over the strip of open water. The river makes a whispering sound as it flows over a riffle into the lake.

And the rainbows are still moving.

“I just saw one swim by,” Tim Isaacson, another angler, says, peering down his hole. “A nice big hen.”

Not much later, Pearson sets the hook on another fish. Like the average Kamloops rainbow returning to the French to spawn, it’s a good one. He plays it for perhaps five minutes on a rod he has made himself.

Finally, he reaches down to pull it through his fishing hole. A skilled and veteran Kamloops angler, Pearson has done this a few hundred times.

Carrying the fish in one hand, Pearson walks to the inside edge of the ice pack, sits down and drops his legs into the water. He wades to shore to deliver the rainbow to his friend, Pete Lundberg of Duluth. Pearson also hands Lundberg the two fish he has caught previously.

As it turns out, this is not just a good day to fish for ’loopers. It’s also a good day to watch. A guy never knows what he might take home for supper.

# Yellowstone foundation announces new grant funding

YELLOWSTONE NATIONAL PARK, Wyo. (AP) — The Yellowstone Park Foundation has announced \$350,000 in new funding for projects inside the national park.

The grants include \$100,000 to launch a pro-

gram to improve safety when park visitors are watching bears and other wildlife along park roads.

Another \$85,000 will fund the first year of a five-year raptor study. The study will count owls, golden eagles and other birds of prey

in the park.

A \$15,000 grant will establish a program to monitor white-nose syndrome, a disease that has devastated bat populations in the eastern U.S.

Yellowstone Superintendent Dan Wenk says the

grants will be invaluable to help the park’s wildlife biologists, rangers and other staff do their jobs.

The Bozeman, Mont.-based foundation has been the official fundraising partner of Yellowstone National Park since 1996.

## F&G forecasts chinook season

Chinook salmon season, while not as good as last year, is on track to be the sixth best year since 1980, according to the Idaho Department of Fish and Game.

The fish are still in the Pacific Ocean, but the forecast for numbers of returning fish are similar to 2008 and 2009.

About 198,000 chinook bound for waters upstream of Bonneville Dam will enter the Columbia River this year; last year the number was 315,300. Of those, 66,400 hatchery fish and 24,700 wild fish are predicted to head up the Snake River.

Last year’s actual return was 134,200 hatchery fish and 35,600 wild fish.

Based on those preseason forecasts, Idaho fish managers expect 37,840 hatchery fish and 19,760 wild fish

to cross Lower Granite Dam. They estimate that about 20,500 fish will return to Idaho hatcheries in the Clearwater, lower Salmon and lower Snake drainages.

Fish managers estimate that about 7,300 would return to hatcheries in the Clearwater drainage; 11,200 to hatcheries in the lower Salmon and Little Salmon rivers; and 2,000 to hatcheries in the Snake River below Hells Canyon dams.

That means an estimated 2,000 chinook would be available for non-tribal recreational anglers in the Clearwater; 4,200 in the lower Salmon and Little Salmon; and about 800 in the Snake River below the Hells Canyon dams.

In years past, chinook seasons have opened in late April.

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Answer:

Unfortunately, there is no such thing as a "medical" bankruptcy. However, you probably qualify to be a debtor in a case under Chapter 7 of the Bankruptcy Code. In a Chapter 7 case, you would be required to schedule all your debts, but you could reaffirm your secured debts, such as your mortgage and car loan. Reaffirmation would have the effect of removing those loans from your bankruptcy discharge. With regard to your unsecured debts, you may choose to voluntarily repay any debts you want. For example, if it were important to you to retain the good will of a particular doctor or other creditor, you might want to continue paying that creditor. Credit card debts are another matter. Most credit card companies will close your account whether you continue to pay them or not. You should speak to an experienced bankruptcy attorney for more detailed information.

# Patient questions cardiologist's methods

**DEAR DR. GOTT:** I learned I had mitral-valve prolapse (MVP) about 40 years ago and have had it monitored ever since. I am now 65 and otherwise healthy. I have always had spells where my heart would start beating real fast, but they have been more recent lately, occurring almost once a month.

About four years ago, my cardiologist put me on 20 milligrams lisinopril daily. My blood pressure is 135/80. Since then, we moved from California to Arkansas. Last month, a new doctor took me off lisinopril and prescribed 60 milligrams diltiazem twice a day. He re-

ferred me to another cardiologist. The new cardiologist wants me to start taking 240 milligrams Pradaxa instead and suggested I undergo valve repair ASAP.

The surgeon he is referring me to repairs by splitting the breast and putting a ring around the valve. My research shows newer and less intrusive methods for repairing mitral valves (like the MitraClip). Can you refer me to a doctor in Arkansas that

does these new procedures? What do you think about the procedure and starting the Pradaxa?

**DEAR READER:** *The New York Daily News* ran an article on this subject almost a year ago, following years of apparent successful use in Europe. Reports were the tiny medical clip might literally save millions of Americans from open-heart surgery. Mitral regurgitation affects more than 8 million people in the United States. The clip is reported to be far safer than surgery and nearly as effective. In fact, a study presented at an American College of Cardiology conference at that time found

more complications (sixfold) from surgery than experienced by those who got the clip. It is important to note that the company that manufactures the MitraClip funded the study; nevertheless, doctors called it a turning point for advanced procedures.

Here's the glitch. While the clip is commercially available in Europe, from what I can understand, it has yet to receive FDA approval in the United States, even though the procedure has been performed numerous times here under FDA protocol. Without FDA approval, insurance companies might not cover the proce-

sure, and there might be restrictions.

The system includes a catheter-based device delivered to the heart through a blood vessel in the leg. It is designed to reduce significant regurgitation by clipping together the leaflets of the mitral valve. Repair with the clip is performed by physicians in the catheterization laboratory. Because the heart beats, there is no need for heart-lung bypass-machine involvement.

This is a highly personal decision and shouldn't be made lightly and without the advice of your physicians. If the procedure is as good as it sounds, your recu-

peration will be minimal, and your body will be less traumatized; however, it may not be available to you. Ask your physician for a referral to a cardiologist for a

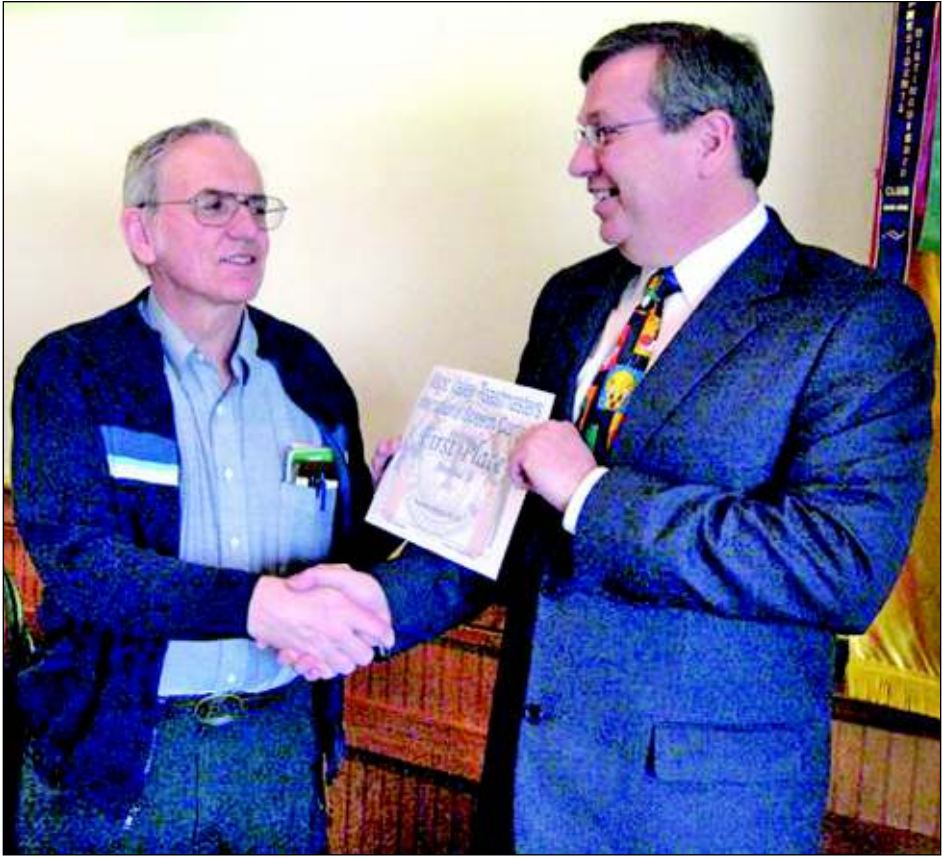

Charlie began a collection of beer bottles in 1976, and was noted as having the largest collection of bottles west of the Mississippi. His mom once stashed a few different beers from different countries into her luggage during her travels to bring to Charlie for his collection. Charlie fought his cancer with dignity and humor to the very end, often saying to people, “I’m dying to see you.” When the skies were gray, he would say that “yes, but the sun is shining somewhere.” Charlie loved black licorice; he enjoyed watching John Wayne movies, and his favorite catch phrase was, “Damn it, Jim.” Recently, he became interested in watching the Military Channel and Oprah Winfrey each night with his sister.

Charlie is survived by his sister, Peggy Hurd of Jerome, Idaho; and his brother, Kenneth Hall of Mesa, Ariz.; five nephews; and one niece. Charlie was preceded in death by his parents, Hilary Hall and Helen Imhoff; and two sisters, Jeanie Berg and Barbara Hall Shine. Charlie had no children.

## 4 New York Times journalists feared missing in Libya

Four New York Times journalists who were covering the conflict in Libya were unaccounted for Wednesday and are feared missing, the newspaper said.

The journalists include Anthony Shadid, a veteran Middle East correspondent who won two Pulitzer Prizes for foreign reporting as a Washington Post reporter.

The Times identified the other journalists as Stephen Farrell, a reporter and videographer; and photographers Tyler Hicks and Lynsey Addario.

While reporting for the

Times in Afghanistan in 2009, Farrell was kidnapped by the Taliban and held hostage before being rescued by British commandos.

All four of the journalists have worked extensively in the Middle East, the Times said.

Times editor Bill Keller said the four were last seen by other journalists as they were covering the retreat of rebel forces from Ajdabiya, heading toward the rebel stronghold of Benghazi.

“There’s some speculation that they were stopped at a Libyan government checkpoint, but we don’t know yet,” Keller said.

## Mexico confirms use of U.S. drones in drug war

The Mexican government confirmed Wednesday that it had authorized the use of U.S. drones to collect intelligence on several occasions, a new sign of the two countries’ intensifying cooperation against the drug cartels threatening Mexico.

The statement from Mexico’s presidential office said the drones had been requested for “specific occasions and events” and had been operated under the supervision of its government.

But until now, the flights were secret, apparently out of concern about a possible backlash in Mexico. Mexican politicians and the public

have historically been highly sensitive to U.S. involvement in the country.

The use of the drones was first reported by the New York Times, which said the Pentagon began sending high-altitude, unarmed drones deep into Mexico last month.

The Mexican government statement did not specify which U.S. agency was running the drones, and presidential spokesman Alejandro Poiré did not return a call for comment.

The U.S. government has flown drones on the American side of the border for years. American officials have publicly hinted that the United States shares infor-

mation from those flights with Mexico. Those drones are operated by the Department of Homeland Security.

On Wednesday, asked about the latest disclosure, one senior U.S. official said: “It’s been a process of cooperation over time, and so

some suggestion that this is 10 days old wouldn’t be accurate.” The official spoke on the condition of anonymity because of the sensitivity of the matter.

CSI men hold off Redlands, advance at NJCAA tourney

HUTCHINSON, Kan. — The Golden Eagles played 20 minutes of good basketball in their first-round NJCAA Tournament game against Redlands (Okla.) Community College. The other 20 minutes nearly cost them their national championship dreams.

The College of Southern Idaho men's basketball team watched a 22-point lead completely evaporate before holding off the upset-minded Cougars 78-72 Wednesday afternoon at the Hutchinson Sports Arena.

The win advances CSI to a 7:30 p.m. (MDT) quarterfinal game today against Tallahassee (Fla.) Community College. But that matchup nearly didn't materialize thanks to a furious Redlands' rally.

"We were complacent coming out of halftime and they came out and were aggressive and just took it hard at the rim," said CSI head coach Steve Gosar. "They did it twice in a row and we weren't guarding and we weren't competing and that momentum swung their direction really quick."

Redlands (20-12) was aggressive offensively and used a 2-2-1 full-court press and a 2-3 zone to stifle CSI's offense. It took only five minutes of the second half for Redlands to trim a 43-23 deficit to single digits.

"I think our zone bothered them a little bit," said Redlands coach Yaphett King.

More than a little. CSI shot 58 percent in the first half, but

## Vandals tripped up in CIT's first round

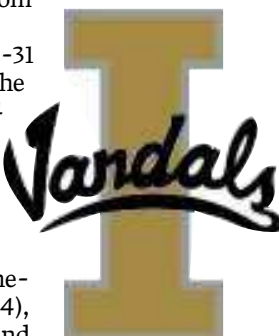

# NFL players still at work – lifting on their own

Work, work, work. Even during a lockout

Right about now, many NFL players normally would be preparing for offseason workouts at their teams' facilities. Nothing more complicated than lifting weights, running, stretching, massages.

This hardly is a normal year, though, and with the league having locked out the players, those practice venues are off-limits. And while March isn't the most critical time for pro football — it is, after all, nearly six months before kick off of opening weekend — as the labor stoppage continues, the need for teammates to gather together will grow.

Browns quarterback Jake Delhomme met former Cleveland teammates punter Dave Zastudil and safety Nick Sorensen at a local recreation center on Tuesday. The trio spotted for each other while lifting weights and spent time in between sets discussing family matters and the labor situation as some of the

gym's members took note of the celebrity visitors.

Wide receiver Greg Camarillo of the Vikings got an LA Fitness membership in Miami.

"I've been trying to fit in with the regular gym-goers, which is interesting because I'm trying to work out to create physical strength and stamina while other guys are trying to work out to look good in the mirror," he said. "There are guys in there for two or three hours without a single drop of sweat on them. I'm curious what they're up to, but it works."

For NFL veterans, meanwhile, getting fit is part of the, uh, job.

"Every player understands what is involved in our profession," says Colts center Jeff Saturday, a member of the NFLPA's executive board. "We have to be working out and staying in shape. However, how players decide to do that is their individual right."

They are doing so at places such as St. Vincent Sports Performance in Indianapolis and Elite Performance Factory in Westlake Village, Calif.,

which have been planning for just this scenario since last August — seven months before the lockout happened.

St. Vincent, a hospital-affiliated facility, began upgrading its equipment to replicate the inside of an NFL complex, particularly when several teams visited SVSP as they evaluated training bases they could recommend to players.

Most important to Ralph Reiff, the director of St. Vincent, is providing a venue that makes the players comfortable, and that fits the medical needs of those rehabilitating injuries.

"We found out for the players, much like any other citizen who loses a job in the United States, there is a lot of anxiety in that," Reiff says. "Not only the loss of revenue, but the change in lifestyle and disrupting of the daily pattern. He can't go to Lambeau Field to work out or to the Colts' complex to get treatment, and there's some anxiety around that. Things that were under control in your life are now out of control. We have tried to make that tran-

sition easy in a very uncertain environment."

Earlier this week, Reiff says 11 NFL players were at St. Vincent, including Patriots receiver Deion Branch, Colts linebacker Gary Brackett and Panthers punter Jason Baker. He has also noticed an increase in players coming off season-ending injuries.

"With the lockout, the medical staff and anyone who receives compensation from the team organization, they can't have any contact with the athletes," Reiff says, "so the athletes who would typically be going in for medical care on a daily basis can't do that anymore. They had to find alternative locations to do it."

They've found those locations across the country. Outside of Los Angeles, former NFL tight end Billy Miller runs Elite Performance Factory, which regularly has the likes of Reggie Bush, Marques Colston and Keith Rivers on hand. Miller talked to one NFL organization that he won't identify about sending all of its players to his facility for workouts during a lockout.

LEGAL NOTICE OF REVISED CATEGORICAL EXCLUSION  
FOR THE CITY OF KIMBERLY DRINKING WATER SYSTEM  
IMPROVEMENT PROJECT

The Idaho Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ) has determined that the City of Kimberly Drinking Water Improvement Project, Twin Falls County, Idaho conforms to the Rules for Administration of the Drinking Water Loan Program (IDAPA 58.01.20) and Chapter 5, of the Drinking Water Loan Handbook of Procedures, by which the project is eligible for a Categorical Exclusion. Accordingly, Phase 1 and Phase 2, priority 2 and priority 3 distribution system improvements of the project are exempted from further substantive environmental review requirements.

The proposed drinking water improvements will address water source, water supply, and water storage issues. An additional well will be added to the city's existing water supply system. The city is also proposing the construction of two new storage tanks, improvements to the distribution system, and the installation of a water metering system. The specific project improvements include:

- Development of well #7 located at the Kimberly City Park.
- Construction of a well house next to well #7, including the pump-to-waste discharge pipe.
- Replacement of the existing Redwood Storage Tank with a new 660,000 gallon tank at the existing location.
- Construction of an additional 880,000 gallon storage tank at one of two locations. The first location is the northeast lot of the intersection of Monroe and Ash Streets. The second location is at the City Park near the well #7.
- Installation of water meters and replacement of service lines from the mains to the water meters.
- Upgrading the existing supervisory control and data acquisition (SCADA) system.
- Installation of standby generators at well #7, the City Hall booster pump station, and the Redwood booster pump station.
- Phase 1 distribution system upgrades including waterline replacements on Center Street West, Banning Street, Maxine Street, and Van Buren to Pine Street.
- Phase 2, priority 2 distribution system upgrades include waterline replacements on east Center Street, Main Street, Ash Street, Emerald Drive, east of the City Hall pump station, the completion of some of the dead end lines, and the completion of the 10-inch connection in the southern residential area.
- Priority 3 distribution system improvements include replacing the remaining 4 inch lines with larger diameter mains, looping the dead end lines, and connecting all fire hydrants to 6-inch mains or larger.

DEQ has determined that this project is consistent with criteria for issuing a Revised Categorical Exclusion for the following reasons:

- The proposed facility improvements are solely directed toward minor rehabilitation of the existing facilities and construction of new ancillary facilities.
- The facility improvements will not provide the capacity to serve a population that is projected to grow at a rate 25% in excess of the 20-year population growth rate expectations for the state as a whole according to the Idaho Division of Financial Management projections, and be expected to change the current system's population by greater than 500 estimated residential units (ERUs).
- There will be no significant effect on the quality of the human environment either individually, cumulatively over time, or in conjunction with other federal, state, local or private actions as a result of this project.
- There will be no direct or indirect affects to (a) cultural resource sites; (b) endangered or threatened species or their habitats; (c) environmentally important natural resource areas such as floodplains, wetlands, important farmlands, aquifer recharge zones; or (d) other resource areas identified in DEQ's guidance.

Short term impacts may occur during project construction that include temporary disruption of the distribution system, increased noise, increased dust pollution, increased potential for stormwater runoff, and disruption of localized traffic conditions. The project contractor is responsible for managing the temporary disruptions of the system as follows:

- Air Quality: Temporary dust pollution impacts will be controlled as a condition of the construction specifications in accordance with the DEQ Rules for the Control of Air Pollution in Idaho, IDAPA 58.01.01.651 (rule). The rule states that reasonable precautions for dust control and suppression include using water or chemicals, applying dust suppressants, covering trucks, paving, and removing materials. In addition to the rule requirements, it is recommended that a dust prevention and control plan be implemented during construction of the project that includes DEQ Best Management Practices (BMPs) to minimize dust pollution for fugitive dust control.
- Cultural Resources: If archeological artifacts and human remains are inadvertently discovered during construction, ground disturbing activities shall cease and the State Historical Preservation Officer must be notified.
- Stormwater: Stormwater runoff shall be handled through an Environmental Protection Agency Stormwater Construction General permit and development of a Stormwater Pollution Prevention Plan (SWPPP). The SWPPP and stormwater BMPs will be implemented prior, during and after project construction to reduce the potential for erosion from runoff.
- Any other appropriate BMPs, wherever possible, to avoid or minimize impacts from other construction activities.

Overall, completion of the proposed project will have long term positive effects by reducing leaks, conserving water, improving fire flows, providing additional water supply and water storage. The proposed project will protect public health.

THE ACES ON BRIDGE®

Bobby Wolff

This week's deals all come from last year's spring nationals at Reno, marking the current event taking place right now in Louisville.

On this deal from the first qualifying session of the North American Pairs-A, Allan Popkin of St. Louis earned a near-top. Popkin, playing with his wife, Nancy, stayed out of what appeared to be a very playable slam. However, with the spade honors offside, 11 tricks seem to be the limit on normal play.

Against three no-trump, West led the diamond nine, taken in dummy with the 10. Popkin played a spade to the queen and West's king. He won the diamond continuation in hand and played three more rounds of the suit, pitching a spade and two clubs from dummy. East discarded two spades and a club; West, a heart.

This persuaded declarer not to repeat the spade finesse. Instead, Popkin cashed the spade ace, and now, to guard hearts, East had to unguard clubs. But next came three rounds of hearts, which squeezed West in the black suits in the three-card ending. The perfect nonsimultaneous double squeeze for 12 tricks earned the Popkins 23.5 out of 25 match-points.

Very nicely played — but was there anything the defenders could have done? Yes, indeed. When West won the first spade, he should have shifted to a top club. This disrupts the timing, since now dummy has to abandon one of the menaces in the majors, or to discard the club that is the entry to the South hand.

**ANSWER:** Your partner is bidding out his shape and suggesting a singleton heart in a 4-1-3-5 pattern. You cannot bid no-trump now but actually appear to have some useful holdings in the black suits, so should not sign off in four clubs. Having already denied four spades, you should bid three spades now, to help partner work out where your honors are.
