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Education experts: Regroup, move on, work together

Local control, smart use of technology and clear expectations are key, they say

Deal.
That's the word from a business-based education reform group.
Superintendent of Public Instruction Tom Luna and Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter succeeded in removing much of teachers' collective bargaining power, ending "tenure," and enacting a "pay-for-performance" plan giving bonuses to staff in schools testing in the top 75 percent statewide. Individual teachers are not eligible for the \$2,000 payments, which will be awarded based on group performance.

But lawmakers rebuffed the plan's most ambitious aspects — technology mandates, cutting teaching jobs and raising classroom sizes.
After lawmakers end the session, "We will then have whatever education reforms we're going to get this year with whatever level of reduced resources," said Vince Hannity, president of the Idaho Business Coalition for Education Excellence.
"The larger task, though, still stands before us," said Hannity. "In the interests of improving student achievement, which all agree should be our goal, education stakeholders must now come to-

Lawmakers revive push for guns on campus

BOISE — Lawmakers who have revived a push to allow firearms on Idaho's college campuses may have engaged in a game of "ready, fire, aim" by not clearing it with the governor first.
The governor's opposition three years ago helped torpedo a nearly identical bill. "He had concerns then, I believe he has concerns now," said Sen. Curt McKenzie, a Nampa Republican behind the 2008 effort to allow concealed weapons on campuses.
McKenzie's legislation three years ago was designed to curtail attempts by cities and counties

Dietrich coach recovering from surgery

Acey Shaw, head girls basketball coach at Dietrich High School, is recovering from brain surgery at the University of Utah Hospital in Salt Lake City.
Since leading the Dietrich Blue Devils to the Class 1A Division II state championship on Feb. 19, Shaw has experienced flu-like symptoms, dizziness, blurred vision and the slowing of his motor skills.
Doctors diagnosed him with meningitis, and on Tuesday,

A new look for school

Do school uniforms level the playing field?

Daniel Boyer looked down at his outfit and shrugged.
His blue button-down shirt was tucked into khaki pants and a belt ran around his waist. He adjusted his coordinating blue tie and stood a little straighter.
"I kind of like dressing like this better. It's comfy," Boyer paused and then flashed a smile. "It makes me look good."
Boyer, 17, likes wearing a uniform every day to North Valley Academy Charter School in Gooding, and he even wears a tie a couple times a week for good measure.
He said uniforms are beneficial — easy to put on in the morning without much thought, and the act of dressing for success every day is good preparation for job inter-

views or the professional world.
A dress code in charter and private schools is nothing new, but now Twin Falls School District is considering implementing the practice at Bridge Academy, an alternative middle school.
Bridge Academy Principal Jim Brown presented the idea to the TFSD board on March 7 and said he expects the policy to pass and start as a pilot program.
Brown said he constantly has to deal with clothing issues — everything from baggy pants that sag around derrièrès clad in bright boxers to female students' low-cut

shirts and spaghetti straps.
"Uniforms take away an opportunity for students to make poor choices," he said. "Peer pressure is so big at this age. It creates a level playing field."
While the students at Bridge may not be thrilled about the idea, Brown said he sees the advantage to moving toward a stricter dress code.
The cost for parents to dress their children would be less, he said. The school district offers vouchers to low income families to buy clothes at Deseret Industries, and the polo shirts and sweatshirts would be sold through the school for a low price since they are purchased in bulk. Brown

said after students leave the school, the shirts could be donated to be used by someone else.
North Valley Academy Principal Gayle DeSmet said behavioral issues at her charter school are few, and she said the uniforms take away any prejudice against clothes or speculation on family income.
"Kids want to dress for success. I

know they perform better in class," DeSmet said.

North Valley student Dustin Turner, 16, said the uniforms took a little getting used to but he doesn't mind them now. He said individuality isn't an issue for students since they can display their personalities through actions and words.

"He swaggers," DeSmet said with a good-natured grin.

Turner said he wants to enlist in the Army after he graduates, so the uniforms are a bit of a preparation for him. He buys his polo shirts everywhere, from American

Eagle to Deseret Industries.

"Every kid is way more respectful of teachers here. I mean, we all have our moments, you know," Turner said, attributing that respect in part to the strict dress code.

Richard Powell, father of a Bridge Academy student, said he is in favor of the proposed dress code.

"There are students who can't afford certain types of clothing because of the economic crunch," he said. "Kids come to school with these attitudes. What they wear on the outside shows how they are feeling on the inside."

\$62 million shortfall projected for K-12 schools in fiscal 2012? In essence, what would you do that doesn't cost more money, in fact costs less money?"

Five respondents, including the education deans at Boise State University and the University of Idaho, balked at the question's assumption that more money isn't an option.

"My recommendation is that we ask Idahoans to increase their taxes, on a very limited basis, to cover the gap between our current funding levels and our current budget shortfall," said U of I Education Dean Corrine Mantle-Bromley. "I believe that we could agree to a short term tax on soda, cigarettes, and alcohol."

Former Democratic Sen. Gail Bray, who taught history and economics in Boise schools for a decade, said reform isn't free. "These changes require money," she said. "To think that reducing the number of teachers, increasing class size and resorting to 'on-line' classes is a reasonable way to free up money so worse cuts don't further eviscerate schools is bizarre."

Meridian Schools Superintendent Linda Clark proposes a task force on 21st-century learning to set goals and identify funding. "This task force should focus beyond the current question of 'mobile devices' to examine research and best practices for teaching and learning that blends the best instruction with the best tools," she said.

Once the Legislature adopts new targets, Clark said districts should be required to set goals and timelines and evaluate progress. Districts should be required

to use state dollars as outlined in the plans, she said.

Jim Shackelford, who retired from the Idaho Education Association after 31 years in 2008, said Idaho must weather the fiscal storm but be ready for the inevitable economic rebound. "Will we act surprised and continue our one-trick-pony approach based on the ideas of whoever happens to be the political leader of the moment?" he asked. "Or will we be ready to move forward with focus and energy? Now is the time to create a comprehensive, ambitious plan for the next decade and beyond."

Shackelford urged educators, trustees, parents and community leaders to unite in crafting a plan. "How much more successful and inspiring that would be than what's happening now?"

The IBCEE, founded in 2003 to bring business savvy and support to education reform, said it's ready to do just that, in part by fostering local control that adapts to the needs of communities.

"Whatever opportunities arise, IBCEE stands ready to join with all stakeholders, to facilitate and assist in any way possible, in implementing the first significant Idaho education reform in recent memory."

"Change is hard," offered the Albertson Foundation, which has given away \$400 million since the 1990s and took out full-page newspaper ads in support of Luna's proposals in January. "It doesn't feel good when you're in the middle of it, and there are no short cuts that work. Nevertheless, it's the right thing to do if we want improvement, and it's the right thing to do if we want a world-class education system for Idaho."

ABOUT THE EDUCATION BILLS

• **Senate Bills 1108 and 1110** have passed through the Legislature and were signed by Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter on Thursday. One adds a merit-based pay system for teachers, eliminating tenure, and the other revamps how teacher contracts and labor negotiations play out.

The bills have become law, but the changes have yet to unfold in local districts. For example, teacher evaluations won't be based on student achievement until after June 30, 2012.

• **Senate Bill 1113** was revised and re-introduced Friday. Among the changes, gone is the initial bill's elimination of 770 teaching positions, replaced with a focus on giving local school districts control over how to cope with reduced state funding.

What's next: The bill awaits a vote in the Senate Education Committee to move to the Senate floor.

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CRMC staffers get disaster training

BURLEY — Three staff members at Cassia Regional Medical Center recently learned how to handle many types of disasters during training at the Homeland Security Center for Domestic Preparedness in Alabama.

The CDP is operated by the Department of Homeland Security's Federal Emergency Management Agency.

CRMC emergency responders Michele Pond-Bell, Doug Adams and Mikhael Carraway completed the training — three other staff members were diverted from the CDP due to inclement weather. They will be sent back in June to complete their training.

Pond-Bell, who is the nursing administrator at CRMC, said in a phone interview Friday that they flew to Atlanta on Jan. 8 during one of the worst storms the area had seen in years.

Although their bus was diverted for a couple of days, they were able to take a crash course and complete the training.

"I think this is a tremendous benefit for the commu-

nity," Pond-Bell said. "Whether a rural hospital or an urban hospital, we all operate under the same emergency plan."

Pond-Bell said they trained alongside people from across the nation, including a New York SWAT team.

They learned how to manage their internal resources like personnel, supplies and power, and how to contact

resources on a state and national level for help if their supplies become limited.

Pond-Bell she would like to return for additional training, especially the bio-terrorism and hazmat training, which use a toxic environment to give responders hands-on experience in preventing, responding to and recovering from real-world incidents.

"Some of us would really

like to go back for that," Pond Bell said.

Pond-Bell said they also learned how to evaluate the hazardous risks for the area. In Mini-Cassia, the main risk comes from the weather.

"In severe weather we could lose access to certain places or have a bus go off the road," Pond-Bell said. "It helps us identify what our risks might be for this area so we can prepare for those."

Shaw, 36, underwent surgery after experiencing swelling in his brain.

"Acey is my best friend in coaching," said Richfield girls basketball coach Steve Kent. "He's a really nice guy and everyone around here is worried about him and thinking about him, and I hope he gets better."

Dietrich beat Kent's Richfield team 55-51 in triple overtime for the state title.

"Dietrich is our number one rival, but it's as friendly a rivalry as you can get. I'm

Shaw and his wife Jalyn are awaiting the results of more tests. To help with medical costs, family friend Teresa Smith has set up the Acey Shaw Benefit Fund through Wells Fargo Bank.

"Every little bit helps," Smith said. "A lot of people love Acey so much in this community. We just wanted to give back for all that he has given to Dietrich."

to regulate guns in public places. The bill passed, but a provision to strip college presidents of the authority to ban concealed weapons on campus was scrapped under pressure from university administrators and Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter.

McKenzie argued then that his proposal was designed to clarify what the Idaho Constitution already allowed.

This year, Idaho lawmakers have resurrected the guns-on-campus debate with legislation to prohibit Idaho's universities from banning firearms everywhere on campus except in undergraduate residence halls. Guns would be allowed at athletic events.

McKenzie chairs the Senate State Affairs Committee, which will serve as the next battleground for the measure after it passed the Idaho House on Wednesday.

"I do intend to hold a hearing," McKenzie said.

Supporters contend the measure will boost safety at the schools because letting students and faculty carry guns heightens the chances they could help prevent a violent crime.

Texas lawmakers are considering similar legislation this year to allow guns on campus, adding momentum to a national campaign to open colleges and universities to firearms. Utah is the only state to pass such a broad-based law, while Colorado gives colleges the option, and several have allowed handguns.

Idaho law now gives universities authority to prohibit firearms. Boise State University, Idaho State University, the University of Idaho, Lewis-Clark State College and community colleges have adopted their own gun bans.

While the schools have testified against this year's legislation to allow firearms on campus, the governor has yet to publicly weigh in.

Spokesman Jon Hanian confirmed Otter met with the bill's sponsors.

"He wanted to know their reasons for bringing the legislation," said Hanian, who declined to give specifics on the meeting, as did lawmakers.

But since legislation has to clear the governor before becoming law, it doesn't exactly bode well for the bill if Otter's 2008 concerns linger.

Rep. Erik Simpson (R-Idaho Falls) introduced the measure in the Idaho House two weeks ago. Simpson, who was not part of the 2008 Legislature, said he didn't know the specifics of the legislation three years ago.

"Boy, I wish I had been here then, it would have been nice to have that context of what happened a few years ago. It might have helped

more or less in my preparation," Simpson said. "I knew this had been attempted in the past and, as far as my bill was concerned, I felt like I had a legitimate compromise."

The compromise is it allows the schools to maintain gun bans in undergraduate dorms, Simpson said.

The debate has inspired the passions from lawmakers on both sides.

Supporters argue campus gun violence, such as the 2007 mass shootings at Virginia Tech, show the best defense against a gunman is students who can shoot back in defense.

But opponents contend it will only accelerate conflict and leave students and faculty in fear, not knowing who might pull a gun over a poor grade, a broken romance, a drunken fraternity argument or an altercation at a football game.

"One can only imagine a college classroom or a campus administrative situation where heated arguments about strongly held political beliefs or disputes about grades or even parking issues result in the use of a concealed weapon," said Rep. Cherie Buckner-Webb (D-Boise).

Another lawmaker talked about a letter she had received opposing the Idaho

legislation from Lori Haas, whose daughter Emily Haas was injured in the Virginia Tech shootings.

But a supporter of the bill, Rep. Phil Hart (R-Athol), recounted a dramatic story of a woman at the University of Utah hospital who gotten a restraining order against a man she had previously been involved with. The woman contemplated buying a gun to protect herself from the man, but ultimately decided to carry a whistle, Hart said.

"Shortly thereafter, he met her in the parking lot of the University of Utah hospital and he killed her," Hart said.

Where some lawmakers provided cautionary tales, others said it boiled down to the Second Amendment.

Majority Caucus Chair Ken Roberts (R-Donnelly), said the legislation was about "protecting the very rights that made America free from the beginning."

"I want to live in a country and in a state where the citizens are armed," Roberts said during debate on the House floor. "It's one of the basic facts that keeps America safer today than any other nation in the world, it's because the citizens are armed. Behind every blade of grass and over every hill there's a citizen that has their own weapon to protect themselves."

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Four people sign up to run for three school seats in Blaine County

Don Nurge has declared his candidacy for Zone 5, Dahlgren’s current seat. The zone encompasses Sun Val-ley and east Ketchum.

T.F. council to chime in on new fountain plaza

A proposed new fountain plaza in downtown Twin falls may inch closer to re-ality at today’s city council meeting.

City Parks and Recreation Director Dennis Bowyer will fill the council in on the overwhelmingly positive feedback the ren-ovation sketches for the Main Avenue Fountain Plaza recieved at an open house last month. City staff estimates more than two dozen folks showed up to see the plans, and all but one supported it.

The Twin Falls Commu-nity Foundation is bankrolling the design phase of proposed changes to the fountain area. It wanted council feedback on the proposal before moving forward with final drawings and cost esti-mate.

The only issue raised by city staff in its report is the potential long-term main-tenance costs of a redeveloped plaza, which remains a question mark.

Also on the city council’s agenda:

- A discussion on the an-nual financial report from the YMCA, which manages the city pool. According to the report, the YMCA/City Pool operated at about a \$20,000 deficit last year.
- The YMCA’s contract to manage the pool will end in August.

CSI finish with four event titles on home dirt

A busy three days of rodeo at the Eldon Evans Expo Center in the Shawn Davis Arena came to a close Saturday night with members of the College of Southern Idaho claiming titles in team roping, bareback, saddle bronc and breakaway at the 35th Annual CSI Intercollegiate Rodeo. In addition to the four event winners, CSI had 13 other cowboys and cowgirls qualify for the Saturday evening short round. Topping off the weekend was J.D. Johnson of CSI who proved that he is multi-tal-

ented by teaming with CSI teammate Brock Casperson to walk away with the team roping title and tying for first place in saddle bronc. Johnson and Casperson recorded a solid time of 9.1 seconds placing them in third place after the first round and roped their short round steer in 9.5 seconds giving them a cumulative time of 18.6 seconds for the win. Johnson qualified for the short round in saddle bronc riding Rook for 65 points on Friday night and tied for the highest scored ride of the weekend on Saturday with 75 points on Suzie Q for a total of 140 points to tie for the champi-

onship with Brock Winn of Utah Valley University. For his efforts in saddle bronc and team roping, Johnson won the title of men's all-around. Likewise, Chuck Povey of CSI literally dominated the breakaway and put the pressure on the other ropers with outstanding runs of 2.9 and 3.5 seconds, respectively, and placing first in the average with a cumulative time of 6.4 seconds. HUTCHINSON, Kan. — Just hours before his team was to play for the NJCAA championship, College of Southern Idaho head coach Steve Gosar went for a jog in the rain. He walked back into his hotel lobby, saw this reporter sitting on a nearby couch and sat down. He expressed just one wish for his team in Saturday night's title game: "I just want us to play our game," said Gosar. He wanted that for two reasons. First, so his team, win or lose, could leave Hutchinson knowing it had left it all on the floor. Second, because the Golden Eagles had yet to

play their game in Hutch, despite winning three games to advance to the title tilt. Gosar got his wish. "We saved our best for last," he said after his team's 72-64 win over Midland (Texas) College gave the Golden Eagles their first JUCO crown since 1987. The credit, as usual with Gosar's group, was wide spread. Tournament MVP Pierre Jackson netted 22 points in the title win, capping a week that saw him average 24 points per game, six above his season average. Point guard Darius Smith shook off a bumpy week and got back to orchestrating CSI's offensive show, recording five assists and zero turnovers. Jerrold Brooks drained a couple big 3s, Fabyon Har-

ris provided a spark off the bench, Mitch Bruneel came up with timely buckets and hustle plays and Kenny Buckner ruled the paint, getting 12 points and nine boards. "We've got confidence in our whole team," said Buckner. "Everybody stepped up." "I don't know if we played our best game, but we did what we had to do to win the championship," said Bruneel. Now the challenge is defending the title, a task Brooks said will come down to "dedication and a lot of hard work." But the building blocks are there for another magical run next season. "We start with a good group of freshmen," said Gosar. "We only have four sophomores on this team."

But those four — Jackson, Smith, Buckner and reserve guard Issiah Grayson — will leave big shoes. "We've just got to try to find some guys to replace those sophomores," said Gosar. "We'll bring in some good character kids that play so hard. That makes our job easier." Guys like team captains Jackson, Smith and Buckner. Guys who bought in to the team concept. Guys who meshed into a cohesive unit that led the nation in assists per game. Guys whose chemistry was obvious on and off the floor. Simply put, the 2010-11 Golden Eagles were a special group, one that will long be remembered. "I'm going to miss this team," said Jackson. He's not alone.

Busch sweeps Bristol again

BRISTOL, Tenn. — Kyle Busch can't be beat at Bristol Motor Speedway. Busch beat Carl Edwards and Jimmie Johnson off pit road after the final stops Sunday, then held them off over the closing 60 laps to win the Sprint Cup Series race at the Tennessee bullring. It gave Busch a sweep of the weekend — he also won the second-tier Nationwide Series race on Saturday — and his fifth consecutive victory at Bristol dating back to a three-race sweep last August.

He's now won five Cup races at Bristol, which ties him with older-brother Kurt in NASCAR's top series, and has 11 victories spanning the three national series. Busch, who drives a Toyota for Joe Gibbs Racing, dedicated the win to the manufacturer and its employees in Japan still trying to recover from the March 11 earthquake and tsunami. Edwards settled for second and lamented not pushing Busch harder after the final restart with 37 laps remaining. Busch, Edwards and Johnson pulled away from the field, and Edwards had several opportunities to move Busch's No. 18 Toyota out of the way. But Edwards, in a Ford for Roush Fenway Racing, figured he'd have plenty of chances closer to the finish, so he tried for a clean pass as he and Busch raced side-by-side for several laps. Busch eventually pulled away, and Edwards never had another shot. "I thought we'd be better matched with him, but he took off, and I just couldn't get back to him to race," Edwards said. "My gut told me there was going to be another caution. If I had known that was the only shot I had, I might have raced a little harder." Johnson, the defending race winner, finished third

CLEVELAND — David Lighty made all seven of his 3-pointers and scored 25 points, Jared Sullinger added 18 after informing one of George Mason's players "it's over" and top-seeded Ohio State made 16 3s to advance in the NCAA tournament with a jaw-dropping rout. With thousands of fans chanting "O-H-I-O" at every opportunity, the Buckeyes (34-2) took apart the eighth-seeded Patriots (27-7), who created some March mayhem a few years ago and hoped to follow Butler's lead by taking out a No. 1 seed in this tourney. Ohio State destroyed any upset plans and moved closer to its first national title

since 1960. The Buckeyes will meet Kentucky (27-8) in the East regional semifinals Friday in Newark. Ohio State is 5-0 in NCAA tournament matchups with the Wildcats. After falling behind 11-2, the Big Ten champions used their devastating inside-outside attack to post the most lopsided tournament victory in school history. William Buford scored 18 and freshman guard Aaron Craft had 15 assists for Ohio State. Cam Long scored 16 points to lead George Mason, which played without Luke Hancock, one of its best players. The sophomore guard had food poisoning and remained with a trainer

at the team's hotel. **ARIZONA 70- TEXAS 69** TULSA, Okla. — Derrick Williams' three-point play with 9.6 seconds remaining lifted Arizona to a 70-69 win over Texas in the third round of the NCAA tournament Sunday. The fifth-seeded Wildcats (29-7) led by as many as 13 in the first half and were up for most of the game before J'Quan Brown's jumper put the No. 4 seed Longhorns ahead 69-67. Williams misfired on a tying attempt with 14.5 seconds remaining, but Texas (28-8) was called for a five-second violation on the inbounds play to give Arizona one more chance.

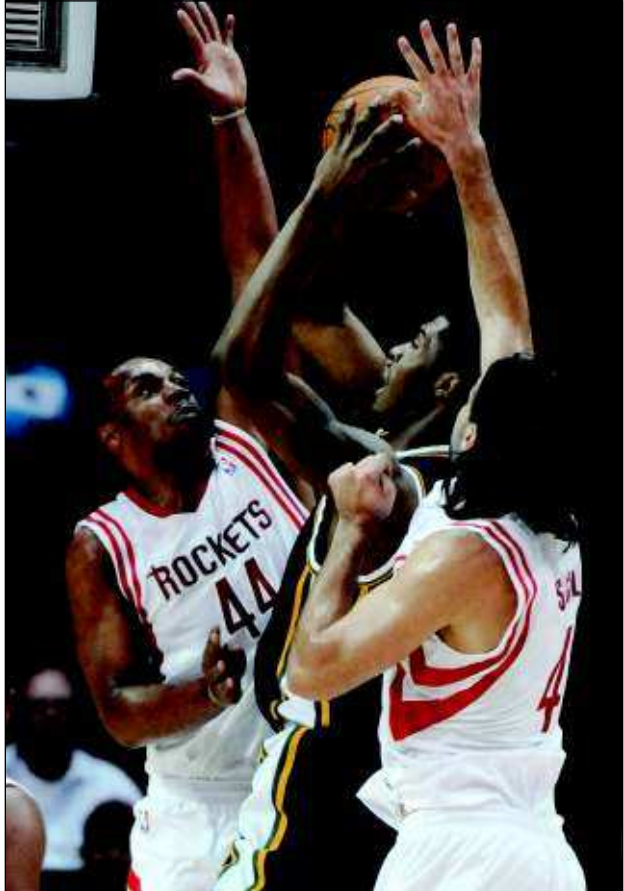

Reaping the whirlwind from the Great Tax Shift

Pull out your property tax bill from 2005, if you still have it. Compare the number on the bottom line to your most recent notice.

Chances are they aren’t far apart. That wasn’t supposed to happen.

When the Legislature in 2006 cut property taxes by \$260 million and raised \$200 million by raising the sales tax a penny, then-Gov. Jim Risch promised long-term relief for homeowners. To accomplish that, he and lawmakers effectively shifted most education funding to the state.

“We destabilized our educational funding when we did that,” said Sen. Tim Corder, R-Mountain Home.

Then came the Great Recession and sales tax receipts plummeted. As the Legislature cut the education budget, school districts went to patrons to

make up the difference in the form of supplemental levies. More than three-fourth of the 115 districts in the state now have them.

In 2006, supplemental levies brought in \$78.7 million to Idaho school districts. Last year it was \$136.3 million.

And if you own a home, a farm or a business, you picked up the tab.

If the previous funding structure were still in place — the much-derided Maintenance and Operation Levy — it would have generated \$302 million more than Idaho schools will have this year, according to the Idaho Tax Commission.

That’s an amount equal to 25 percent of the state’s budget for public schools.

So why not return to the good old days of the M&O? Gov. C.L. “Butch” Otter and the Republican leadership in the Legislature won’t hear of it.

“The vast majority of Idahoans supported that change and with good reason,” Otter, Speaker of the House Lawrence Denney and then-Senate President Robert Geddes wrote in the *Lewiston Tribune* last year. “Now with property values down along with the economy, reversing it would shortchange schools and impose a crushing burden on local property taxpayers who already are struggling at a time that we’re trying to revive — not suffocate — Idaho’s economy.”

Under the present system, the burden on taxpayers might not be crushing yet — but it’s moving closer. Superintendent of Public Instruction Tom Luna predicated his sweeping education reform proposals — which include eliminating teachers’ jobs and raising class sizes — on the notion that Idaho can no longer afford the public school system it has.

We used to be able to.

How to raise government spending by cutting it

Let’s say that for every dollar you gave me, I gave you a crisp \$10 bill in return. Good deal, right? Almost too good. But before you start to ask questions, I’ll remind you that this is my thought experiment. Perhaps I just love dollar bills. Or perhaps I just love you. At any rate, there are no strings attached, and you can take advantage of it more than once.

Now let’s say that you’re in debt and you need to get your finances in order. Do you start handing me more dollar bills? Or fewer?

If you’ve got any sense, you’ll give me more. Converting dollar bills into \$10 bills is an excellent way to pay off your credit card. Except, it seems, if you’re a House Republican.

On March 1, House Republicans voted to cut \$600 million from the budget of the Internal Revenue Service for the remainder of 2011, and they want even deeper cuts in 2012. Perhaps that doesn’t surprise you: Republicans don’t like spending — at least when they’re not in power — and they don’t like taxes. Why would they fund the IRS?

Well, as the Associated Press reported, “every dollar the Internal Revenue Service spends for audits, liens and seizing property from tax cheats brings in more than \$10, a rate of return so good the Obama administration wants to boost the agency’s budget.” It’s an easy way to reduce the deficit: You don’t have to cut heating oil for the poor or Pell grants for students. You just have to make people pay what they owe.

But deficit reduction is not the GOP’s top priority. It’s a bit lower on the list, somewhere between “get Styrofoam cups back into Congress” — an actual push the Republicans took up to

thumb their nose at Nancy Pelosi’s environmental policies — and make *Sesame Street* beg for money. In fact, if you listen to Speaker John Boehner, he’ll tell you himself. “The American people want us to focus on creating jobs and cutting spending,” he has said. And that comment wasn’t a one-off.

Cutting spending is related to, but in important ways different from, cutting deficits. For one, it rules out tax increases. That’s how Republicans can lobby to make the Bush tax cuts permanent, at a cost of \$4 trillion over 10 years, and yet say they’re fulfilling their campaign promises by making much smaller cuts to non-defense discretionary spending. If you add up what Republicans have offered since the election, the policies they’ve endorsed would increase deficits but also decrease spending, at least in the short term. The IRS example shows that spending cuts don’t always reduce the deficit. But it’s worse even than that: Spending cuts don’t always reduce government spending.

There are three categories

of spending in which cuts lead to more, rather than less, spending down the line, says Alice Rivlin, former director of both the Congressional Budget Office and the Office of Management and Budget. Inspection, enforcement and maintenance. The GOP is trying to cut all three.

Let’s begin with the costs of cutting inspection — for example, the Food and Drug Administration and the Agriculture Department. Together, the agencies are charged with ensuring that the nation’s food is safe. That’s increasingly crucial as our interconnected, industrialized system makes contaminated food a national crisis rather than a local problem. In recent years, we’ve seen massive recalls stemming from E. coli in spinach, salmonella in peanut butter and melamine in pet food. Each required the recall of thousands of tons of food and alerts to consumers who, in many cases, were screened or treated.

The problem was bad enough — and the people and pets sick enough — that Congress passed a bipartisan food-safety bill during last year’s lame-duck session.

But now Republicans want big cuts in the agencies’ budgets, meaning fewer inspectors and a higher chance of outbreaks and food-borne illness. And those don’t come cheap. They show up in our health care costs, disability insurance and tax revenue, not to mention in the pain and suffering and even death they cause.

There are all sorts of reasons Republicans are being penny-wise and pound-foolish. Cutting \$100 billion in spending in one year sounded good on the campaign trail but turned out to be tough in practice. Curtailing the IRS and cutting the Department of Health and Human Services — and, particularly, its ability to implement health-care reform — is a long-term ideological objective for Republicans.

Whatever the reason, the effect will be the same: a higher likelihood of pricey disasters, an easier time for fraudsters, and bigger price tags when we have to rebuild what we could’ve just repaired.

Given these numbers and the political aims and ideology of the Muslim Brotherhood represents a major domestic threat to our nation.

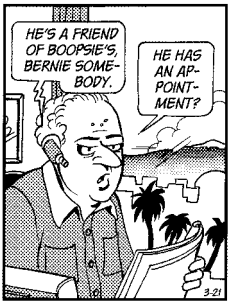
Unfortunately, the lightweights in the White House think differently.

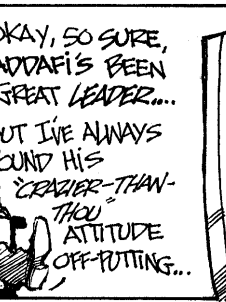
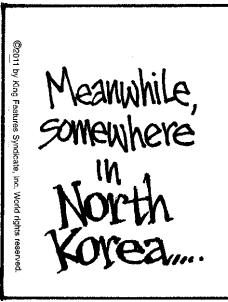

In wake of deadly crash, New York sting takes 14 tour buses off road

ALBANY, N.Y. — A sting operation by New York state transportation investigators and law enforcement a week after a horrific fatal tour bus crash included a single stop in Manhattan in which all 14 tour buses pulled over were ordered off the road, state officials said Saturday.

State investigators reported nine “major issues” Friday night with the drivers, including lack of an updated log book required to show how long a driver has been behind the wheel, an official familiar with the investigation told The Associated Press. The state Department of Transportation investigators found 10 major vehicle issues and 40 minor infractions, the official said.

The official spoke on the condition of anonymity be-

cause of the sensitivity of the continuing sting operation involving police statewide.

Gov. Andrew Cuomo directed the operation at DOT checkpoints as part of his order to investigate the Bronx crash of the tour bus, which was serving casino customers, while stepping up enforcement of all tour buses statewide.

State Department of Transportation spokesman Deb Rausch confirmed to the AP that the 14 buses stopped Friday were put out of service because of various violations against the driver and concerns about the safety of the buses.

“This is quite extraordinary,” she said.

New York City police, which participated in the sting, reported that 54 criminal summonses were issued Friday night in Manhattan, with eight buses towed away because of safety violations. Other buses

ordered out of service were driven away by qualified drivers.

There was no data immediately available on the other checkpoints elsewhere in New York City or the rest of the state.

Rausch said the stepped up enforcement on top of the 160,000 bus inspections the state does annually will continue through March 30.

On Saturday, relatives of the passengers who died in the crash held a Buddhist ceremony at the accident site. A lane of Interstate 95 was closed for about an hour and a bell tolled at the ceremony.

The bus was returning March 12 to Manhattan’s Chinatown neighborhood from an overnight trip to a Connecticut casino when it tipped over and was sliced by a pole along the road.

AT&T to buy T-Mobile, creating wireless giant

LOS ANGELES — AT&T’s surprise \$39-billion acquisition of T-Mobile USA Inc. could lead to more consolidation in the U.S. wireless industry, leaving the market with just two dominant providers — and the prospect of higher rates and fewer choices for consumers.

If approved by regulators, the newly expanded AT&T Inc. would have 130 million subscribers, allowing it to leapfrog arch-rival Verizon Wireless and its 94 million customers to become by far the nation’s largest wireless carrier. Sprint Nextel Corp. would be a distant third.

The potential market shift could force Verizon to consider making a large acquisition itself, analysts said, possibly including Sprint. But Sprint itself may snap up one or more of the many smaller providers, such as U.S. Cellular and MetroPCS.

“This move by AT&T is likely to start a chain reaction of consolidations in the U.S. market,” said Dan Hays, who tracks the telecommunications industry for PRTM, an international consulting company.

Such a trend probably would drive up mobile service rates and reduce the number of phones and tablet computers available to wireless subscribers, he said.

AT&T asserted that the deal would increase competition and lower prices, citing a government study that said the average cell phone bill price had dropped over the last decade, a period in which there were several large telecom mergers.

“The U.S. wireless industry is one of the most fiercely competitive markets in the world and will remain so after this deal,” AT&T spokeswoman Lauren Harris said.

AT&T also claimed that the merger would allow it to accelerate the spread of faster, next-generation wireless service — often called 4G — to more of the country. Because AT&T and T-Mobile already use similar technology for their existing cellular networks, the two would be able to more efficiently deploy the new technology, they said.

But critics of the deal warned that cheaper options could dry up if there were just three or fewer players left in the market.

“When you have two companies control almost the entire market, you’re almost back to reassembling the Ma Bell monopoly” when the old AT&T dominated local and long-distance service before it was broken up by federal regulators, said S. Derek Turner, research director for Free Press, a Northampton, Mass., nonprofit public interest group that focuses on media policy.

2 Bush officials in running to be next head of the FBI

WASHINGTON (AP) — Two officials who worked for President George W. Bush, including one who threatened to resign to block legally questionable anti-terror surveillance, have a realistic chance of being asked to head the FBI, according to people familiar with the search.

James Comey and Kenneth Wainstein served in sensitive national security-related posts at the Justice

Department in the Bush administration. That could make for interesting confirmation hearings before the Senate Judiciary Committee if President Obama selects either to succeed FBI Director Robert Mueller.

The Obama administration faces an expanded Republican minority in the Senate with the votes to seriously complicate the confirmation prospects of any nominee.

U.S., French and British forces expand Libya bombing campaign

TRIPOLI, Libya — U.S., French and British forces blasted Libyan air defenses and ground forces, drawing intense volleys of tracer and antiaircraft fire over Tripoli on Sunday on the second day of a military campaign that will severely test Moammar Gadhafi’s powers of survival.

Late Sunday, smoke billowed from Gadhafi’s massive Bab Azizia residential compound shortly after a massive, earth-shaking explosion. Rounds of antiaircraft and tracer fire lit up the night for the third time in less than 24 hours.

Immediately afterward, the streets of the capital erupted with car horns and chanting and celebratory gunfire in a show of support for Gadhafi, whose armed loyalists retain a tight grip on the streets.

A Libyan military official announced a 9 p.m. ceasefire by the country’s armed forces, but U.S. officials scoffed at the declaration.

“Our view at this point is that it isn’t true or it’s been immediately violated,” said national security adviser Tom Donilon, briefing reporters in Rio de Janeiro on Sunday night. “So we’ll continue to monitor Gadhafi’s actions, not just his words.”

After focusing on air defenses in the first hours of the campaign, U.S. and coalition forces expanded their strikes to include attacks on Libyan ground forces that threaten civilians or are able to shoot down planes enforcing a no-fly zone, a senior U.S. military official said.

The assault cheered the rebels, who had seized control of large areas of the country as they sought to build on months of discontent across the Arab world but in recent days found themselves retreating in the face of Gadhafi’s superior firepower.

Gates: US expects to hand off lead on Libya in ‘days’

ON BOARD A MILITARY AIRCRAFT (AP) — U.S. Defense Secretary Robert Gates said Sunday that the U.S. expects to turn control of the Libya military mission over to a coalition — probably headed either by the French and British or by NATO — “in a matter of days.”

In his first public remarks since the start of the bombings, Gates said President Barack Obama felt very strongly about limiting America’s role in the operation, adding that the president is “more aware than almost anybody of the stress on the military.”

“We agreed to use our unique capabilities and the breadth of those capabilities at the front of this process, and then we expected in a matter of days to be able to turn over the primary responsibility to others,” Gates told reporters traveling with him to Russia. “We will continue to support the coalition, we will be a member of the coalition, we will have a military role in the coalition, but we will not have the preeminent role.”

Kadafi declared he was willing to die defending Libya and, in a statement broadcast hours after the attacks began, condemned what he called “flagrant military aggression.” He vowed to strike civilian and military targets in the Mediterranean.

On Sunday morning, Kadafi returned to state television airwaves, vowing, “We will win the battle,” and

“oil will not be left to the USA, France and Britain.”

“You are transgressors, you are aggressors, you are beasts, you are criminals,” Gadhafi said. “Your people are against you, there are demonstrations everywhere in Europe and the U.S. against this aggression on the innocent Libyan people. The people are with us. Even your people are with us.”

Government spokesman

Mousa Ibrahim told reporters that 48 people were killed by the allies’ strikes and 150 others were wounded near targets in Tripoli, Tajoura, the Gadhafi stronghold of Surt, rebel-held Misurata and the eastern town of Zuwara.

“If Libya goes down, the whole Mediterranean shall go down, the whole of Africa, the north of Africa,” Ibrahim said. “We are arming our people, men and women. We will not allow Libya to be lost like Palestine, like Iraq, like Somalia, like Afghanistan.”

Authorities took journalists to what they described as Tripoli’s seaside “martyrs” cemetery in attempt to substantiate official claims of the dead and injured.

Journalists were met with the anger of hundreds of protesters screaming anti-American slogans and chanting boisterously in support of Gadhafi. Regime supporters, most of them from the neighborhoods of Tripoli that are political strongholds of Gadhafi, flooded the cemetery grounds for the mass funeral, which was broadcast live on state television.

Japan’s disaster toll rises to 18,000 deaths

FUKUSHIMA, Japan — The toll of Japan’s triple disaster came into clearer focus Monday after police estimates showed more than 18,000 people died, the World Bank said rebuilding may cost \$235 billion and more cases of radiation-tainted vegetables and tap water turned up.

Japanese officials reported progress over the weekend in their battle to gain control over a nuclear complex that began leaking radiation after suffering quake and tsunami damage, though the crisis was far from over, with a dangerous new surge in pressure reported in one of the plant’s six reactors.

The announcement by Japan’s Health Ministry late

Sunday that tests had detected excess amounts of radioactive elements on canola and chrysanthemum greens marked a low moment in a day that had been peppered with bits of positive news: First, a teenager and his grandmother were found alive nine days after being trapped in their earthquake-shattered home. Then, the operator of the overheated nuclear plant said two of the six reactor units were safely cooled down.

“We ... are very close to getting the situation under control,” Deputy Cabinet Secretary Tetsuro Fukuyama said.

Still, serious problems remained at the Fukushima Dai-ichi nuclear complex. Pressure unexpectedly rose in a third unit’s reactor,

meaning plant operators may need to deliberately release radioactive steam. That has only added to public anxiety over radiation that began leaking from the plant after a monstrous earthquake and tsunami devastated northeastern Japan on March 11 and left the plant unstable. As day broke Monday, Japan’s military resumed dousing of the complex’s troubled Unit 4.

The World Bank said in report Monday that Japan may need five years to rebuild from the catastrophic disasters, which caused up to \$235 billion in damage, saying the cost to private insurers will be up to \$33 billion and that the government will spend \$12 billion on reconstruction in the current national budget and much more later.

The safety of food and water was of particular concern. The government halted shipments of spinach from one area and raw milk from another near the nuclear plant after tests found iodine exceeded safety limits. Tokyo’s tap water, where iodine turned up Friday, now has cesium. Rain and dust are also tainted.

Early Monday, the Health Ministry advised Iitate, a village of 6,000 people about 19 miles northwest of the Fukushima plant, not to drink tap water due to elevated levels of iodine. Ministry spokesman Takayuki Matsuda said iodine three times the normal level was detected there — about one twenty-sixth of the level of a chest X-ray in one liter of water.

EGYPT Voters say ‘yes’ to speedy elections

CAIRO — Repressed for decades, the Egyptian people have spoken: They want a democratic government to go along with their revolution, and they want it fast.

On Sunday, judicial officials reported that 77 percent of those who cast ballots in a historic referendum Saturday voted “yes” on constitutional amendments to speed Egypt’s transition from military rule to credible parliamentary and presidential elections.

About 18 million out of more than 45 million eligible voters went to the polls or 41 percent, below the optimistically high estimates officials had issued Saturday but still a remarkable display of democratic vigor as Egyptians embraced their first chance since the colonial era to participate in a political process whose outcome wasn’t essentially rigged.

The constitutional changes, drafted by a military-appointed panel of legal experts, will encour-

age the formation of political parties, restrict future presidents to two four-year terms, rein in executive powers, and limit emergency rule to six months, subject to parliamentary approval.

HAITI Haitians go to polls to choose new leader

PORT-AU-PRINCE — Haitians scarred by decades of poverty, political corruption and natural disasters cast ballots Sunday for president in hopes a new leader could do what others have not: Replace homes and schools in the earthquake-devastated capital, improve education and create some optimism for the future.

Voters chose between Michel “Sweet Micky” Martelly, a popular musician who has never held public office, and Mirlande Manigat, a former first lady and senator and longtime fixture on the political scene. Voters formed what for the most part were orderly lines, some shrugging off delays of three hours. Preliminary results

are expected March 31.

BRAZIL Obama visits Rio’s rebuilding City of God

RIO DE JANEIRO — Residents of Cidade de Deus climbed to their roofs or waited for hours Sunday at a basketball court just to catch a glimpse of the first American president to visit their embattled neighborhood.

President Obama toured the favela, a squatter settlement created in the 1960s when authorities displaced thousands of residents closer to the center city, on the second day of his Latin American trip. In an address later on Sunday, he spoke of his desire not only to make U.S. and Brazil partners in the new century but also to “strengthen friendship between our nations.”

“We believe, too, that in nations as big and diverse as ours ... democracy offers the best hope that every citizen is treated with dignity and respect ...” he said.

Acupuncture more popular, better understood in the Magic Valley

Juanita Thompson of Richfield had suffered from lower back pain for two decades. But when her massage therapist and physician each suggested acupuncture, she was skeptical.

"I guess I just didn't know what to expect, and I didn't know how sticking needles in would do anything," she said. But the pain prompted her to consider it. "If I was doing much walking or working, it felt like someone was following me with a two-by-four, hitting me. ... I was leery on acupuncture, but anything to get rid of the pain."

When she arrived at Jon Paul Morse's office in Twin Falls, Thompson thought she'd lie face down on a table, and that the needles would hurt. Instead he had her roll up her sleeve and gently tapped the needles into places near her shoulder, elbow and thumb.

It's "a lot less painful than going to the dentist," she said. Best of all, she no longer has to take narcotic pain pills. "I felt like I got 10 years of my life back. I have more energy; I just can't say enough about it."

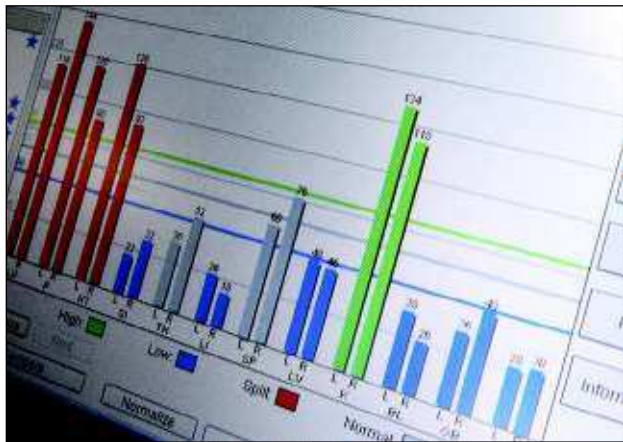
Thompson is one of the south-central Idahoans turning to the traditional Eastern art and science of acupuncture to treat a variety of conditions — from migraines to arthritis to weight loss to tobacco addiction.

Most acupuncturists here have a specialty; many have practices that are busy enough that if a patient's request doesn't fall within that

WHAT IS ACUPUNCTURE?

Acupuncture dates back 3,000 years and was developed in China, according to WhatIsAcupuncture.net. It is based on the concept that energy, known as qi or chi, flows through the body, and when those energy pathways are disrupted, disease and pain can result. Acupuncturists insert fine needles in certain places along those pathways to realign them, easing pain and illness. They may also use electromagnetic pulses, heat, suction or friction.

Twin Falls licensed acupuncturist Jon Paul Morse said clinical researchers have been increasingly investigating the science behind acupuncture, with some results supporting the millennia-old theories. He said that equally important, however, are the outcomes for patients who try it. "With most situations, they're just astonished," he said, describing his specialty in patients who have neurological or orthopedic issues. "I'm not trying to say it's a panacea for everything, but I have the benefit of seeing that reaction over and over."

Andreason's condition has continued to improve; her bi-weekly visits have tapered off to once every four to six weeks.

"I'm sold on acupuncture; (Manning) has helped me immensely. As long as it's going the way it is now, there's no way I'm going to go and have knee replacement," Andreason said.

Manning said he is seeing

The top green vegetables for your health

Green vegetables top the list of good-for-you veggies: They're great sources of fiber and vitamins A, C and K, plus scads of other vitamins and minerals, and are typically low in calories. Remember them as you aim for the new dietary guidelines' recommendation to fill half your plate with vegetables at every meal.

I asked Alexandra Postman, editor in chief of Martha Stewart's *Whole Living* magazine and an editor of "Power Foods" cookbook, and Jim White, spokesman for the American Dietetic Association, for their top picks. I was surprised and pleased by how many familiar favorites they named. Here's their guide to the most nutritious choices in the field of green.

Asparagus

This member of the lily family is bursting with folate: According to Postman, asparagus has more of this nutrient than any vegetable (the majority of which contain some). Folate helps your body do away with homocysteine, an amino acid that contributes to cardiovascular disease. To that long-term benefit, add these two shorter-term effects that may make asparagus your favorite: White points out that asparagus can have "a mild laxative effect" and also serves as a diuretic, helping your body remove excess water and thus avoid bloating.

Tip: You can eat asparagus raw if you shave it thin with a vegetable peeler. Or enjoy it lightly steamed, grilled or roasted. According to "Power Foods," "Most of asparagus's nutrients are left intact, even after it is cooked."

Per cup, raw: 27 calories, 2.8 grams of fiber.



Spinach

Dark leafy greens such as spinach (along with dark romaine, collard greens and kale) are great sources of Vitamin K, which is "essential for blood clotting and bone healing," Postman says. A cup of spinach delivers nearly twice (181 percent) the vitamin K you need daily. That nutrient also may help decrease inflammation in the body, Postman says; inflammation is thought to be at the root of many diseases, including cancers and cardiovascular disease. Although spinach is often touted for its iron content, Postman notes that the vegetable also contains oxalic acid, which limits the body's ability to absorb all that iron.

Tip: Spinach fresh from the garden is optimal; the stuff you buy in bags in the produce section may have lost nutrients during shipping and the time it sits on the shelf. Frozen spinach may be a better nutritional bet, Postman advises, as it's typically flash-frozen at its peak.

Per cup, raw: 7 calories, 0.7 grams of fiber.



Artichokes

These armadillo-looking items, members of the aster family, not only deliver loads of magnesium, folate and potassium, but also a dynamite dose of fiber. Postman's a big fan because artichokes help the liver produce bile, which helps your body process fatty foods, and because they promote muscle function. And get this: Postman says that artichokes may "stimulate sweet receptors. Eat some artichoke," she suggests, then drink water. "The water will taste sweet," she says.

Tip: Rather than canceling out steamed artichokes' nutrition by bathing the leaves in butter or hollandaise sauce, try dipping the leaves in heart-healthy olive oil or broth.

Per medium 'choke: 60 calories, 6.9 grams of fiber.



Broccoli

Postman and White agree that broccoli can't be beat. It is very high in fiber and delivers a potent package of Vitamin C — 135 percent of what you need in a day — plus potassium and iron, Postman says. White adds Vitamin K and folate to that list. Like other green cruciferous vegetables (such as Brussels sprouts, kale, cabbage and bok choy), it contains nitrogen compounds known as indoles, which, Postman says, have been shown to prevent stomach tumors. Eating broccoli may help reduce the risk of other cancers, too, by virtue of its being rich in carotenoids, antioxidants that are thought to "sponge up free radicals that promote cancer," Postman explains. Broccoli is also "very high in calcium for a vegetable," she adds, "though some will quibble" that not all the calcium it contains is easily absorbed by the body.

Tip: For broccoli and other green vegetables, steaming is the best way to retain nutrients; boiling, microwaving or stir-frying may leach some away.

Per cup, raw: 31 calories, 2.4 grams of fiber.



Celery

Not exactly a dark-green vegetable, celery makes both Postman's and White's lists because it delivers at least its share of nutrients per calorie. White says celery serves up fiber, folate, Vitamin A and Vitamin C — "a lot of the same nutrients found in other green vegetables" but in easy-to-eat style. "It's a great snack to cut up and enjoy," he says. Postman agrees: "It's a great source of fiber, and it's a vehicle for healthy spreads."

Tip: Use celery as a "vehicle" for healthful toppings such as almond butter, peanut butter and raisins, or refried beans.

Per cup, raw: 16 calories, 1.6 grams of fiber.

more patients because of the higher profile of acupuncture in popular media. Even in Idaho it's become an accepted, rather than fringe, treatment.

"I've had people say, 'I saw it on Oprah,' or 'I saw it in a magazine,' but most of my practice is word of mouth," Manning said. And although not many patients are covered for acupuncture by their insurance, they're willing to try it for cash. "More and more people, their deductibles are so high, they're shopping (around for treatment options) more than ever. They want to find what works best and is the least expensive."

Dana Henry, a licensed acupuncturist and yoga teacher who practices part time in Twin Falls and part time in Ketchum, said that in Magic Valley she sees primarily people with issues resulting from physical labor, especially dairy and beet farmers. Up north, she's one of four acupuncturists who are called on when someone at St. Luke's Wood River Medical Center requests the treatment as part of the hospital's integrated medicine program.

"That's a huge step, that the Wood River Valley was open to that," she said, lamenting that St. Luke's Magic Valley has not yet launched a similar program.

Although some acupuncturists focus exclusively on that treatment, many have combined practices that include chiropractic, holistic therapies or other approaches.

Mark Dunlap, a naturopath

and certified acupuncturist who owns Acupuncture Works in Burley, said the mixed nature of his practice has kept the business afloat. But compared with two decades ago when he began practicing, many more Idahoans are interested in learning about acupuncture, he said.

Dunlap is eager to share information with whomever asks, quick to launch into detail about the Surround the Dragon method and the Meridian Therapy method; he noted that the latter now incorporates modern tech-

nology and software to quantify what the original Chinese practitioners figured out millennia ago.

In Burley, he said, the patients who are quickest to accept acupuncture are those with Hispanic heritage. "You don't have to go back as many generations in that culture to find the old ways," he said, describing the place of non-Western, home-remedy concepts in many of their ancestral societies.



On this date:
In 1685, composer Johann Sebastian Bach was born in Eisenach, Germany.
In 1804, the French civil code, or the “Code Napoleon” as it was later called, was adopted.
In 1907, U.S. Marines arrived in Honduras to protect American lives and interests in the wake of political violence.
In 1940, a new government was formed in France by Paul Reynaud, who became prime minister, succeeding Edouard Daladier.
In 1957, President Dwight D. Eisenhower and British Prime Minister Harold Macmillan began a four-day conference in Bermuda.
In 1960, about 70 people were killed in Sharpeville, South Africa, when police fired on black protesters.
In 1965, more than 3,000 civil rights demonstrators led by the Rev. Martin Luther King Jr. began their march from Selma to Montgomery, Ala.
In 1972, the Supreme Court, in *Dunn v. Blumstein*, ruled that states may not require at least a year's residency for voting eligibility.
In 1981, Michael Donald, a black teenager in Mobile, Ala., was abducted, tortured and killed by members of the Ku Klux Klan. (A lawsuit brought by Donald's mother, Beulah Mae Donald, later resulted in a landmark judgment that bankrupted one Klan organization.)
In 1985, police in Langa, South Africa, opened fire on blacks marching to mark the 25th anniversary of Sharpeville; the reported death toll varies between 29 and 43.

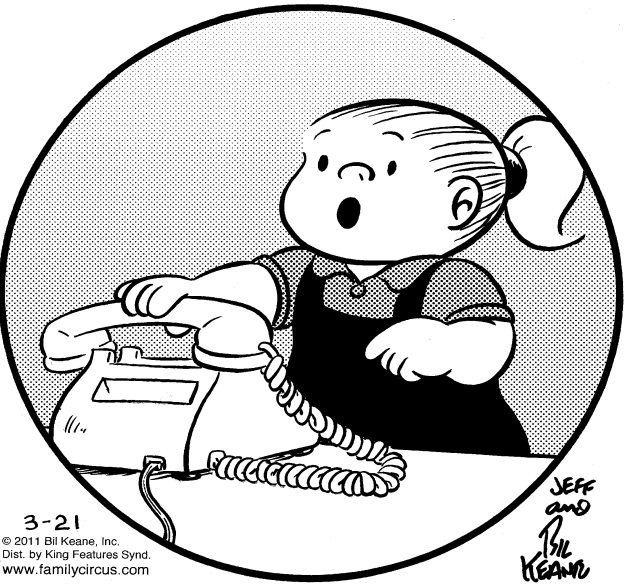
Ten years ago: Space shuttle Discovery glided to a predawn touchdown, bringing home the first residents of the international space station. The Supreme Court ruled that public hospitals could not test pregnant women for drug use and turn the results over to police without the women's consent. The U.S. ordered 51 Russian diplomats to leave, in retaliation for Russia's use of an FBI spy, Robert Hanssen.

Five years ago: President George W. Bush predicted American forces would remain in Iraq for years and that it would be up to a future president to decide when to bring them all home. But defying critics and plunging polls, Bush declared, “I’m optimistic we’ll succeed.” Sgt. Michael J. Smith, an Army dog handler at Abu Ghraib, was convicted at Fort Meade, Md., of abusing prisoners. (Smith was sentenced the next day to 179 days in prison.)

One year ago: Frustrated with the pace of action to overhaul the country's immigration system, thousands of immigrant rights supporters descended on the nation's capital, waving American flags and holding homemade signs in English and Spanish. France's long-flailing political left made a big comeback, crushing President Nicolas Sarkozy's conservatives in regional elections.

South opens a strong no-trump, but North, with an essentially balanced hand, has no interest in a slam, no matter what his partner has. North shouldn't worry about the small doubleton spade, but simply bid three no-trump and hope his partner can make it. Against three no-trump, West leads the spade three and East plays the king. Plan the play.

There are two sensible options: the first of them is to duck the spade king as well as the next spade. Then you win the third spade and lead the club king and a second club. If you can set up the clubs for four tricks without letting West on lead, you will make your game. And you may also survive if clubs are 4-1 and East has both diamond honors, with the spades originally 5-3. I rate this line at something less than 60 percent. Not bad — but can you do better?

Yes, you can. There is a far surer route to nine tricks. The best approach is to win the spade ace at the first trick, cross to dummy with a heart, and run the diamond 10.

If West could win diamond with the jack and did not play back a spade, you would be able to repeat the diamond finesse in comfort. If West clears the spades, you will get to test the clubs before repeating the diamond finesse. This line succeeds at least three times out of four.

ANSWER: In auctions of this sort, if the choice is between going active with a diamond lead and passive with a trump lead, I tend to favor the active lead. Incidentally, the heart lead is not as passive as you might think; a lead from three small hearts would be far less likely to cost a trump trick.
