Idahoans' income lags

While earnings
rebound, state still
49th in average wage

Brad and Brian Dey lounged comfortably in a window booth at Norm's Cafe, sipping on soda and waiting for their food to arrive — a hearty plate of breakfast food for Brian and a clubhouse sandwich for his older brother.

The men weren't shy to voice their opinions on Idaho's work force, income or family values. What Idaho needs, they said, are people willing to work hard.

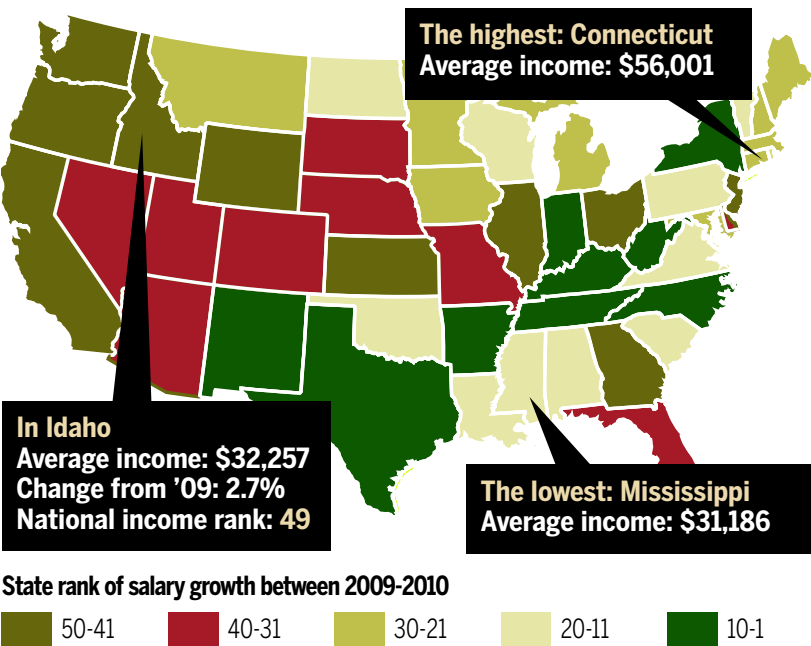
But as Idaho claws its way out of the recession, its residents' per capita income — already 49th in the country — is growing at a slower rate than the national average. A U.S. Bureau of Economic Analysis report released Wednesday showed that total personal income in Idaho increased by 2.7 percent from 2009 to 2010, behind the national average of 3 percent.

That growth brought per capita income in Idaho back to 2008 levels — to about \$32,000 per person.

Does that surprise the Dey brothers? "Not really, it's slowed down a lot," Brian, 48, said, adding that Idaho's population is fairly small, but there are plenty of wealthy people who live in the Gem State, along with a lot of people

who tap into welfare programs.

Brian owns Pebble Ponds Golf Course in Filer and a few other business ventures. Brad is self-employed in construction and assists his brother at the golf course.

"If you aren't willing to be diversified and work, well, there is work out there for people," Brad said. "People don't want to go out and work. If you can live on welfare, why would you work?"

Brenda Miller, waitress at Norm's

Cafe and owner of Miller's Elephant Ears, said a lot of people have been coming into the restaurant to fill out applications.

"We have tons of people who are unemployed that come in or are on welfare," she said. "My budget is tight, so tight. Anything I have left at the end of the month I put it back."

The climb out of the economic pit is

GOP near deal on primaries

Independent voter group will appeal court decision

BOISE — Idaho Republican leaders are close to inking a deal that would limit GOP primary elections to the party's registered voters, long a goal of conservatives who suspect crossover voting that's been allowed since 1972 has produced GOP candidates who fail to hew closely enough to the party line.

The Senate's GOP members met privately on Tuesday on the plan, while House Republicans were expected to meet Wednesday or today.

The bill comes after a federal judge ruled this year that Idaho's 38-year-old open primary system was unconstitutional. According to the draft measure, Republicans would vote in GOP primary races, while Democrats would vote in Democratic primaries. Party leaders — likely the parties' central committees — could allow unaffiliated voters to participate, with their ballot choice becoming a public record.

An independent voter group announced Wednesday it was appealing the court decision.

House Speaker Lawrence Denney said he expects a bill introduction by Friday.

"We are very close," said Denney, R-Midvale.

Two College of Southern Idaho men's basketball players were arrested Tuesday night and charged with marijuana possession.

Jerrold Brooks, a starting guard for CSI's national championship team, and recent transfer Luke Cothron were arraigned Wednesday in Twin Falls County 5th District Court on one count each of misdemeanor possession of a controlled substance.

Both players have been suspended by the school, which on Wednesday of-

fered no comment other than a brief statement.

"Two members of the College of Southern Idaho men's basketball team have been suspended pending further investigation for a violation of team rules," Athletic Director Joel Bate said in a written statement.

Brooks, 19, and Cothron, 20, who was identified in the arrest record as Marquez Donte Cothron, were arrested at about 10 p.m. Tuesday.

According to Twin Falls Police Officer Ruben Muriillo's report, they were found

Idaho Senate moves to ban abortions after 20 weeks

BOISE (AP) — The Idaho Senate passed legislation Wednesday to ban abortions once a fetus has reached 20 weeks.

Republican Sen. Chuck Winder's measure relies on disputed evidence of when a fetus begins feeling pain and cleared the GOP-dominated Senate on a 24-10 vote.

The measure now goes to the House and if it becomes law, Idaho could follow Nebraska in banning abortions after 20 weeks despite an Idaho attorney general opinion that found the bill unconstitutional and doctor concerns that it could force women to deliver babies suffering from rare-but-deadly diseases that leave them little chance of survival outside the womb.

Sen. Joyce Broadsword, of Sagle, was among three Republicans who joined the Senate's seven Democrats in opposition to the measure. Broadsword argued the legislation would result in costly litigation and forced lawmakers to choose between their morals and their legislative ethics.

"We're passing legislation that we know is unconstitutional, that we know we're going to end up in court with," Broadsword said.

In the past decade, Idaho has spent more than \$730,000 to defend restrictive abortion laws that were stricken down by the courts. Those costly rulings have prompted legislative

leaders in recent years to require that abortion-related legislation be reviewed by the Idaho attorney general's office.

Last month, the agency told Winder his measure was "unconstitutional under the Fourteenth Amendment to the United States Constitution insofar as it proscribes some non-therapeutic abortions even before a fetus has reached viability," in an opinion from Steven Olsen, the chief of the agency's civil litigation division.

The constitutionality of Nebraska's law has so far not been challenged in the courts and anti-abortion lawmakers in several other states — Iowa, Indiana, Kentucky, Oklahoma, Minnesota and Florida — are contemplating virtually identical fetal pain legislation.

Proponents say the goal is to go state-by-state to deny abortion doctors a refuge to perform such procedures.

During a hearing in Senate State Affair Committee last week, Winder assembled a group of out-of-state medical and legal experts to convince lawmakers that a fetus 20 weeks after fertilization will suffer during an abortion and that a ban on such procedures will survive the courts.

"I think it's worthwhile for us to consider. I think anytime we're dealing with the life of an unborn we need to consider that," said Winder, of Boise, during the Senate floor debate.

something Idaho Department of Labor Regional Economist Jan Roeser said will take quite a few years.

"We are lagging behind other states and aren't coming around as fast. There was a significant work force laid off in Boise, the housing market crashed," Roeser said. "It's kind of a bleak turnaround. I'm hoping we can find research and development or a way to attract jobs that need higher-skilled, higher-educated people to relocate."

Idaho Department of Labor spokesman Bob Fick said Idaho's been among the bottom U.S. states in national personal income rankings since the 1980s.

"We have relatively low wages and larger families than other states do," he said. "The average annual wage is usually less than 80 percent of the national wage."

That news wasn't something Bethany Boguslawski, 19, of Jerome wanted to hear.

"That makes me want to move. I'm already working two jobs just so I can get out of this place," she said. "My parents are struggling to make ends meet."

Asked if education and the profession her parents chose played into those struggles, Boguslawski shrugged.

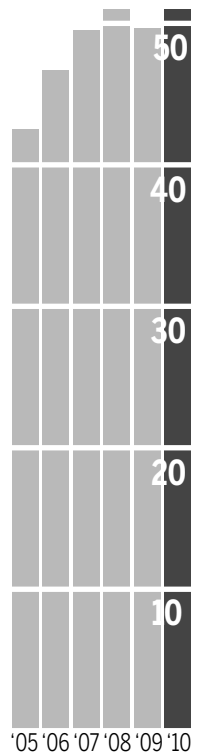
"I hear 'screw the economy' a lot in my house," she said.

Heiner trial vacated

RUPERT — A jury trial was vacated Wednesday for a Minidoka County man who allegedly failed to register as a sex offender and violated his probation after he went on the lam for 40 days in a Utah desert.

A status hearing for failure to register as a sex offender has been set for Dallan Ted Heiner, 42, at 1:30 p.m. April 11, in Minidoka County 5th District Court.

Heiner entered a guilty

plea Monday to the probation violation charge and is scheduled to be sentenced at 1:30 p.m. April 11.

Heiner was given a suspended prison term of up to 20 years and 10 years of supervised probation in January 2010, after he pleaded guilty to felony sex abuse of a child under 16 years old.

Heiner was arrested in September in Monticello, Utah, after his probation officer went to his home and found it vacant and issued a warrant for his arrest.

Angle took the helm of St. Luke's Magic Valley on Monday. He came from a CEO job at a hospital of similar size in Salem, N.J. Before that, he was a medical center vice president in Utica, N.Y., and director of mental health services at another New York hospital.

His last stop actually included many parallels to the Magic Valley, he said: primarily agriculture, not densely populated by New Jersey standards, and mostly made up of pocket communities. But while he said he's comfortable with area demographics, his last job doesn't define him.

"My last stop isn't what I really come from. I come from 20-plus years of experience," he said. "I bring my talents to adapt to the environment. That's what I do. I'm going to bring some talents here to help lead us into the next several years in our state-of-the-art facility."

But before he can lead from the new hospital on Pole Line Road, he will need to get the operation there. He lauded plans laid out by his predecessor, interim CEO Mike Reno, and said his role in the move will be to provide coaching and oversight.

Angle said he was still getting acclimated to St. Luke's, but that he didn't see any changes he needed to make to its operation.

"That's not really my goal at this point in time," he said. "To be very honest and frank, I'm here to support the move, and assist with the doctors and staff going into the next several years as a viable regional medical center that's embracing growth, quality and certainly new service lines for the medical center."

He also wouldn't comment on a scuffle near the

end of his tenure in Salem: According to a story on news website NJ.com, his hospital looked at a plan to close its maternity ward due a stagnant volume of births. Under a license at the Salem hospital, the hospital was mandated to provide care for a majority of births, regardless of the patients' ability to pay, according to NJ.com.

He said it would be more proper for him to defer questions regarding that issue to the Salem hospital.

For the idea of cutting services that weren't financially feasible, he said, "I don't think that is in any CEO's management repertoire. Our goal is to meet the community's needs."

Rod Beck, a former state senate majority leader, was one of the catalysts behind closing the primary. In 2008, Beck was one of the leaders of a revolt at the Idaho State Republican Convention in Sandpoint that ousted former chairman Kirk Sullivan and replaced him with Semanko — largely over Sullivan's opposition to closing the primary election.

Beck said he hasn't seen the bill, but has been given descriptions of how the new primary would work.

"If it is as they say it is, it'll work just fine," he told The Associated Press on Wednesday afternoon.

Larry Grant, the recently appointed Idaho Democratic Party chairman, said he thinks a closed GOP primary will result in more ideologically conservative candidates on Idaho's general election ballots, something he thinks will help win support for Democratic candidates who appeal to a broader spectrum of voters.

Grant said his party's state and federal elections primaries will remain open, though the party will continue to caucus on its presidential nominee.

"They've got loyalty oaths, closed primaries. We believe in open primaries," Grant said. "I think the Republicans are going to get purer in their bloodlines, and hopefully it'll end up making them more conservative. We're Democrats, we like people to vote in elections. We're happy to have everyone they've kicked out come and vote in ours."

On March 2, U.S. District Judge B. Lynn Winnmill threw out Idaho's open primary, saying the right to free association was also founded on the right not to be required to associate with certain groups. In his decision, Winnmill validated evidence presented at trial showing that past primaries were influenced by crossover voting by Democrats and independents.

The New York-based Committee for a United In-

dependent Party announced on Wednesday it was lodging an appeal of Winnmill's decision.

Gary Allen, the group's lawyer in Boise, said Idaho's Republican primary is often the only election that counts, so independents should be able to participate.

"Partisan interests should not take precedence when it comes to participation in the democratic process," Allen said.

According to the GOP plan now being drafted, Republican and Democratic voters would register their affiliation in the first primary in which they voted.

Parties could also conduct registration drives, to rustle up supporters for their side.

The Office of Secretary of State Ben Ysursa, who unsuccessfully defended Idaho's open primary in federal court, said one of its biggest concerns is ensuring the new system includes an orderly process for Idaho's 740,000 registered voters to choose a partisan side.

Little: Idaho needs to prepare for success

BOISE — Even as Idaho struggles with a sour economy, about 70 firms want to expand or move into the state, Lt. Gov. Brad Little said Wednesday.

The state's efforts come against a backdrop of weak state revenues and lawmakers considering providing businesses job-creating economic incentives. Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter's "Hire One Act" bill would give tax credits to businesses that hire an additional person.

Under that proposal, businesses would get a refundable income tax credit of up to 6 percent of the new

employee's wages, based on their rating in the unemployment insurance program. Little said the bill's straightforward approach is a good route.

"You're not picking one company over another," Little said, speaking at an Idaho Press Club-sponsored event. "It's anybody who creates a job."

In the long-term, he said, Idaho needs to be prepared to provide additional services pushed onto states by a federal government struggling with massive debt.

"Those services inevitably are going to be reduced and Idaho has to be in the best

possible shape to handle those reductions as they come across the plate," he said.

That's already happening with public education and Medicaid this session, Little said.

"There's a lot of argument about how that reform should take place, but it is taking place and I think it's proper," he said.

Little said the third reworked bill of public schools chief Tom Luna's education overhaul was changed to reflect concerns about its strictiveness and lack of flexibility. Noting it's a long-term plan, Little said its

kinks can always be fixed later.

"If we run into problems and they need to be changed, they can be changed down the road," Little said.

He said he expects the bill to pass the Senate.

Aside from education and Medicaid-related legislation, another bill Little will need to pass this session concerns closed primaries, after a federal judge sided

with the Idaho Republican Party in a lawsuit that contested the state's existing open primary system for voters.

"I think participation's a very important thing in the electoral process, so maximizing participation is very important," Little said, comparing his view to that of Secretary of State Ben Ysursa, who sought to preserve the open primary system.

Little also said he understands the other side of the argument, as GOP officials

claim independent voters have skewed tallies in the Republican primaries.

"I also concur with the fact that people shouldn't be trying to create mischief in the primary process," Little said.

Kimberly moves ahead on water rates

Rivers hired to work on economy

KIMBERLY — Kimberly's water project surged ahead at Tuesday's City Council meeting.

After months of discussion, the council voted to begin bond repayment in May and switch from a flat rate to a tiered metered payment structure when the fiscal year turns over in October.

The bond repayment and new pricing plan are part of a \$6.6 million project that included installing water meters and revamping or building water towers.

The council had debated when to begin the payment changes since a Utility Advisory Committee presented its fee suggestions in October.

Councilwoman Mitzi Cheldelin proposed a bond repayment of \$16.84 per household be added to the

May bill, making the first payment due June 10. The city's bond repayment is required to start within six months of the project closing, which Public Works Superintendent Rob Wright foresees occurring in June.

City Administrator Polly Hulsey said that about five years ago, the city was unable to make a payment on a different bond.

"That's one of the reasons why we're sensitive to making sure we have enough for those payments," she said.

The proposal also answered questions the council and URA had struggled with, including charging one bond payment per space at the Friendly Village Mobile Estates and one bond payment per household in multiplexes.

The first tiered water bill will be due Nov. 10. The council did not vote on what the tiered prices will be.

Councilman Brandon Hoobler said the fall implementation date will give Kimberly residents time to monitor the amount of water used over the summer

without immediately fearing its expense, as well as help the city gather data to set the metered rate.

In other business, the council voted to hire consultant Mark Rivers of Brix and Co. for \$5,000. Rivers has already contracted with the Twin Falls Urban Renewal Agency to help revitalize its downtown area and will provide similar work for Kimberly under the reduced rate.

Rivers said he plans to focus his efforts in Kimberly on three areas: economic development, beautification, and working with existing businesses and organizations.

Cheldelin said she would prefer to see money and revitalization efforts focused on someone more local than Rivers, who is from Boise.

"Almost all of these ideas are things we already discussed at (the Kimberly Business Owners Association)," Cheldelin said. "I can see \$5,000 being spent a little bit better in this community than hiring an outside consultant."

Mayor Dave Overacre said he saw value in Rivers acting as an objective outsider.

"You got to have somebody kind of facilitating and bringing us all together to flourish," he said.

And KBOA President Lance Godfrey, asked for his opinion, said he liked Rivers' direction.

"Facilitating change is a very difficult thing. However, what I want is what's best for Kimberly and he has some good ideas," Godfrey said.

Cheldelin's was the only vote against the hire.

The council also took the first steps toward forming an urban renewal agency. The proposal had divided the council when it was first introduced. But Cheldelin said she came around after reading Idaho statutes and speaking to a lawyer in Boise about URAs as part of a council workshop. Larry Hall with Region IV Development said it would be best to wait to fully form the Kimberly URA until legislation about the organizations wraps up.

County commissioner advises Wendell to hang on to its land

A proposed building project was again under construction during Wendell's City Council meeting March 17.

The American Legion has approached the city about demolishing the old Wendell High School gym and constructing a one-story event hall in its place. The organization would rent out the larger building with the goal of generating revenue to donate.

Depending on the action, the city could end up paying some of the demolition costs. Previously, the council had looked at whether that would be feasible.

But a letter from Gooding County Commissioner Terrell Williams questioned whether the land under the gym should support an American Legion hall at all. Williams requested that the city retain ownership of the land and consider constructing a building that could contain a senior center, public meeting hall, library or storage for public equipment.

"Irreplaceable city property should not be given away or sold to any special interest group," Williams

wrote. "It should be kept for all citizens to use, regardless of their choices of careers."

Jim Benson, a member of the American Legion, estimated that six of its 175 local members are career military and many of those were draftees.

Instead of being a "special interest group," Benson said, the American Legion works to support the community by donating money to organizations spanning from the Wendell High School wrestling team to providing a weekly lunch for senior citizens.

"Our interest is the community," he said. "I like to say we're in the business of making money so we can give it away."

Benson said that if the council decides not to work with the American Legion, the organization could look into staying at its current hall or building or buying elsewhere.

"If we don't have a new building, it's not like we lose," Benson said. "I can guarantee one thing: The VFW and the American Le-

gion are going to continue to support the community and the citizens of Wendell."

In other business, treasurer Deb Gibbs said she uncovered another bookkeeping problem from the past. Records from 2009 show missing W-2s and W-3s, documents the city is required to file as part of its taxes.

"We've got to re-create and discover where the discrepancies are," she said.

So far, Gibbs is not sure if the mistake will result in fines for Wendell.

A different bookkeeping issue was resolved favorably for the city. A recent meeting set up for citizens with problems on their irrigation bills drew no audience members.

Mayor Brad Christopher, who helped correct problems with the system, said the silence is welcome.

"(This) is exciting because that means we finally got irrigation correct," he said. "A lot of hours were put into that. It's nice to have that done."

Gibbs said about half of the money has already been collected.

Salmonella concerns lead to cantaloupe recall at Costco

About 60,000 cantaloupes distributed to Costco stores, including those in Idaho, have been recalled due to salmonella contamination concerns.

The Idaho Department of Health and Welfare said there are no confirmed Idaho cases linked to the products, but warned consumers to return the cantaloupes to stores for a refund or dispose of them.

The Del Monte cantaloupes were sold between March 10-21, in beige mesh plastic sleeves containing three melons each. The melons may be contaminated with salmonella Panama, a bacteria that can cause serious and sometimes fatal infections in the young, elderly and infirm.

Local control and other Idaho myths

Famously, Ronald Reagan told us that the nine most terrifying words in the English language are, “I’m from the government and I’m here to help.” But nowadays in Idaho, they’re, “As your legislator, I’m in favor of local control.” Could have fooled us.

Our view:
Even as they decry federal meddling, Idaho legislators aren’t shy about telling local governments what to do.
What do you think?
We welcome viewpoints from our readers on this and other issues.

On Tuesday, the Senate State Affairs Committee fast-tracked legislation that would tie the hands of county commissioners and planners trying to make intelligent land use decisions. On Monday, the Idaho House of Representatives passed a bill that would make nutrient management plans by dairies confidential — even from local public officials. Add those to a long list of Boise-knows-best actions by lawmakers. In the past three years alone, the Legislature has:

- Balked at an effort by Gov. C.L. “Butch” Otter to transfer authority of granting liquor licenses at restaurants from the state to cities and counties.
- Scuttled a proposal to allow county assessors to ask buyers what they paid for residential real estate.

- Rejected a bill to permit local highway districts to establish toll roads.
 - Voted down a measure that would allow local governments to fund specific road and bridge projects if a majority of voters approved.
 - Defeated an effort to permit communities such as Ketchum to force high-end developers to help pay for affordable housing.
- The House of Representatives also approved a constitutional amendment that would have made it practically impossible for counties and cities to adopt local-option sales taxes.

Long story short, a majority of lawmakers still think they know better than city council members, mayors and elected county officials. How else to explain House Bill 210, which on the pretext of strengthening the state’s Freedom to Farm law would essentially override local rules concerning the expansion of agriculture operations? But it might do more. The definition of an ag operation in the bill is so broad, it might include slaughterhouses, potato processors and cheese factories. Local officials — notably the Twin Falls and Jerome county commissioners — told lawmakers that the legislation was trying to fix a problem that doesn’t exist, but they were roundly ignored. Which should surprise no one. Even as it battles intrusion by the federal government, the Legislature is calling more of the shots when it comes to local government. That trend accelerated after 2006, when lawmakers shifted much of the funding for public schools to the sales tax from the property tax. That means the really important decisions tend to be made in Boise, not so much locally. Meanwhile, state-mandated tests to a great extent drive what our schools teach and when and how they teach it. In Idaho, you *can* fight City Hall. But the Statehouse? That’s a different matter.

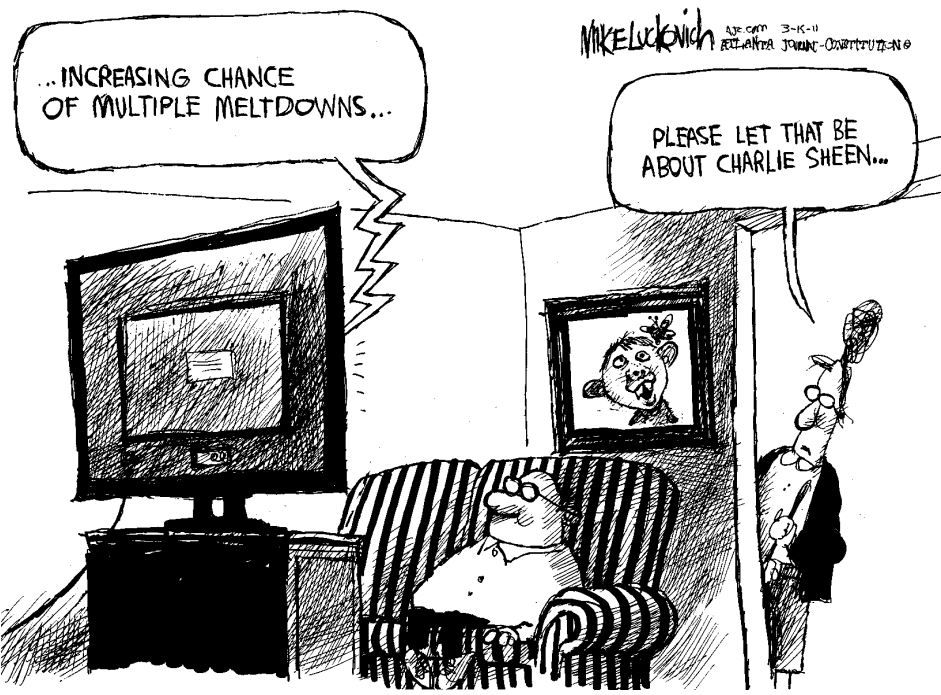
No, you’re not in control so you may as well get used to it

Will rushing out to buy bags of table salt, then shoveling handfuls of it down your throat, really protect you from an impending Japanese nuclear meltdown?

It might make you feel better for a few seconds, until you stroke out. Even so, some folks in China got the strange idea that eating several pounds of iodized salt at one sitting could help shield them from radiation emitted by the nuclear reactors damaged in the recent Japanese earthquake and tsunami. The salt-as-savior rumors raced through China, feeding the Chinese salt-panic, spiking the price by a factor of six, forcing salt purchase limits and driving store employees crazy. “Salt is not available in any of the shops,” moaned Dong Linhua, a 57-year-old factory worker in Shanghai, according to one of the gazillion news reports on the Chinese salt panic. “There have been many people queuing to buy iodized salt in our store,” said a clerk in Guangzhou. “We have to control it. One client can only buy two bags of salt.” But salt isn’t some magic powder or mystical shield. And it won’t stop the Japanese nuclear reactors from getting you. There is real life-and-death science going on in Japan as engineers work on those damaged reactors, risking radiation poisoning. And there is no magic or mysticism in the reactors. The engineers who’ve been working on them wear those thin suits, and there is gamma radiation all around, and for days they’ve been trying to do

what they can. But then there is that other kind of science. Not real science but the belief in science as magic. For some it’s salt. For others it’s a little pill. Yes, it sounds ridiculous, but it’s also human nature, and human nature is often ridiculous. It is ridiculous to think we can exert control over the world, that if we take certain precautions, take that certain pill or eat handfuls of salt, we can somehow protect ourselves from disaster. We know this is false, but knowing and believing are two different things. And even if we laugh at the salt eaters and the pill takers, many of us go through our lives thinking we can exert our own kind of control, that we can somehow shield ourselves and our loved ones from danger. Then the world insists on reminding us that we control nothing. And we realize in those last seconds how powerless we truly are. It could be a car crossing the yellow line. It could be a tsunami. Or it could be cancer. And lest we begin to feel superior to the salt-panicked Chinese, what about Americans rushing to buy up every potassium iodide pill they can grab? It started when U.S. Surgeon-General Regina Benjamin foolishly announced earlier this week that buying potassium iodide was “a precaution” against radiation. She probably didn’t mean to create a panic, but that’s exactly what she did, and many from Hawaii to the West Coast — and even some here in the Midwest — rushed out to get the pills. Other government health officials were forced to “clarify” her comments, saying the pills could even be harmful if taken by people with thyroid

problems and some allergies. It certainly doesn’t help that in almost every news photo, the surgeon general is wearing that ridiculous dress uniform, the one with the shiny sash that makes her look as if she’s in a production of HMS Pinafore. Even President Barack Obama said people on U.S. soil do not need to take any precautions beyond staying informed. “We do not expect harmful levels of radiation to reach the United States, whether it’s the West Coast, Hawaii, Alaska or U.S. territories in the Pacific,” the president said. Then he repeated it. So put your money away. You don’t need to buy those potassium iodide pills. You don’t need the extra salt. And you don’t need that Geiger counter. But it wouldn’t hurt to pray for the thousands upon thousands of people who have died in Japan, for those who are living with the disaster and, especially, for those nuclear engineers in the damaged Japanese reactors, wearing those thin suits, doing what they can. 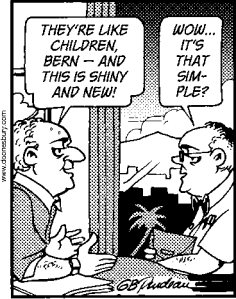
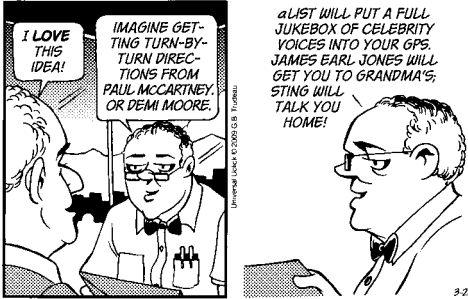

The real March madness

Ten years ago, the Knight Commission on Intercollegiate Athletics proposed that teams should be ineligible for postseason play if they failed to graduate at least half of their players. Today, more than 90 percent of intercollegiate athletic teams meet that minimal academic benchmark, with one notable exception: men's basketball.

Ten of the 68 men's teams in the NCAA tournament are not on track to graduate half of their players. Colleges and universities need to stop trotting out tired excuses for basketball teams with poor academic records and indefensible disparities in the graduation rates of white and black players. And it is time that the NCAA revenue distribution plan stopped hand-somely rewarding success on the court with multi-million-dollar payouts to schools that fail to meet minimum academic standards.

Like millions of fans, I'll be watching the tournament, rooting for my favorites. As a kid on the South Side of Chicago who loved basketball, I got to see the best and the worst of college sports. I spent time on the court with inner-city players who had been used and dumped by their universities. When the ball stopped bouncing, they struggled to find work and had difficult lives. Some died early. The dividing line for success was between those who went to college and got their degrees, and those who did not. If a team fails to graduate even half of its players, how serious are the institution and coach about preparing their student-athletes for life?

The NCAA developed a measure known as the Academic Progress Rate index to track progress toward graduation with real-time data. According to the NCAA, an APR score of 925 (on a scale of 1,000) is equivalent to having 50 percent of a squad's members on track to graduate. This year, the 10 men's basketball teams with APRs below 925 include basketball powerhouses Syracuse and Kansas State. At Kansas State in recent years, 100 percent of white players graduated, but just 14 percent of black players did.

A new analysis, released this week by the Knight Commission, shows the current tournament revenue formula is badly skewed to reward success on the court, with little expectation of success off the court. Each game a team plays in the tournament this year earns more than \$1.4 million for the team's conference.

Over the past five tournaments, the NCAA has awarded more than \$400 million to conferences and their teams for tournament appearances. Nearly \$179 million of that payout — 44 percent of the total — went to teams that were not on track to graduate at least half of their players. By contrast, tournament revenue provides comparatively little funding for educational uses or academic improvement.

When I raised the issue of low graduation rates among men's teams last year, skeptical sportswriters said I didn't understand the realities of big-time college basketball. But every year, the litany of

excuses for why basketball teams cannot graduate most players and still have a championship team is less convincing.

In last year's tournament, the two finalists, Duke and Butler, both had outstanding academic records. This year, eight teams in the tournament graduate 100 percent of both their black and white players: Belmont, Brigham Young, Illinois, Notre Dame, Utah State, Vanderbilt, Villanova and Wofford.

The top-ranked women's basketball teams have even better records. Twenty-two women's teams in this year's NCAA tournament — one in three — graduate 100 percent of their black and white players. The University of Connecticut women's basketball team, which set the NCAA record for consecutive wins this season, graduates more than 90 percent of its players. Meanwhile, the University of Connecticut men's basketball team has an APR of 930, a hair above a projected 50 percent graduation rate. Only 25 percent of its black players earn degrees.

The dramatic improvement in graduation rates among big-time football programs shows that a 50 percent graduation standard is not that difficult to meet and that teams will improve their academic performance to meet higher standards. Five years ago, 23 bowl teams in the Football Bowl Subdivision had APRs below 925. This year, one FBS bowl team had an APR below 925.

The NCAA has made considerable progress in recent years boosting the academic performance of Division I teams. But the bar for postseason play is still too low: In effect, teams must now be on track to graduate fewer than 40 percent of their players for six years running to potentially be ineligible for postseason play. Last year, out of more than 6,000 NCAA intercollegiate sports teams, one squad in men's basketball was banned from postseason play because of a poor academic record.

A decade after the Knight Commission recommendation, coaches of teams with weak academic records should worry not just about getting athletes in a uniform — but also about getting them in a cap and gown.

... what difference does it make?

Idaho Republicans are scrambling to comply with U.S. District Court Judge B. Lynn Winmill's decision to close the GOP primary to all but the party's faithful.

But it's worth asking: How much difference will it make?

Winmill acted on two pre-sumptions:

Democrats were voting in the Republican races and influencing how the party picked its nominees for the fall general election.

Without Democratic interference, the party would move further to the right.

... "choosing ideologically extreme candidates is precisely what a political party is entitled to do in asserting its right of association under the First Amendment" (Winmill wrote)."

Has Winmill examined the primary election results lately? How can Idaho Democrats, who are so hapless in just about every other sphere of Idaho politics, prove to be so blazingly effective in thwarting Republicans in their own primary elections?

If Democrats are voting to nominate a weaker GOP opponent to help their own candidate in the fall, why does Idaho's minority party then field so few candidates in the general election? Last year, they failed to produce an opponent for 47 of Idaho's 105 legislative seats and didn't win a major statewide or congressional office.

Say Democrats are voting merely to nominate a GOP candidate they prefer. Then why aren't they winning? Those hordes of Democrats invading the GOP primary didn't stop the Republican slide toward the right. Last spring, conservatives continued their purge of moderates in the state Senate, ousting four of them ...

The Senate remains independent enough to block some of the zanier stuff coming from the House ... But that body appears willing to go along with plans to gut teachers' collective bargaining rights and to balance the state budget on the backs of public schools, college students and the sick and the poor.

With the approaching legislative redistricting putting even more moderates at risk, it's not hard to foresee a day when the Senate lines up with the House.

An open primary stopped none of that. So how much further to the right can the GOP get? ...



... tax relief on hold

Depending on how you think of it, the Idaho House voted to raise taxes or delayed a tax break. Either way, the grocery tax credit is most valuable to low-income Idahoans. Putting this tax relief on hold for one year is an awful place to scrounge up \$15 million.

But the move mitigates the damage in the 2011-12 budget — staving off some further program cuts that would have a profound effect on low-income Idahoans.

Tax increase or not, there's no debating it's a flip-flop.

In 2008, lawmakers voted to incrementally increase this income tax credit by \$10 a year, in order to better reflect the sales taxes paid on food. They also kept a structure that provides a bigger break to Idaho's poorest residents: \$70 per household member in 2010, compared to \$50 per household member for everyone else ...

The long-range ... plan is to max out the credits at \$100 per person, regardless of income, and \$120 for seniors. But now, staring at a \$92 million shortfall, the House voted overwhelmingly to freeze the grocery tax credits for 2011.

There's no question that many Idahoans could put an extra \$10 to good use. Yes, it is disheartening to see Idaho balance a challenging budget by reneging on promised tax relief... So, no, this isn't our first choice.

... We would prefer to see this money coming from some of Idaho's myriad (and, still, politically safe) \$1.7 billion in sales tax exemptions.

But it's time to face reality. The 2011 Legislature possesses no stomach for standing up to the special

interests that are skilled at procuring and protecting tax breaks ...

... retooled education bill a winner

The Idaho Legislature has appropriately handled the most controversial issue of the 2011 session: State Superintendent Tom Luna's education reform bills.

Plans to increase class sizes and replace more than 700 teaching positions with online classes raised serious concerns among educators across the state — and many parents joined in the objections.

The legislation went through significant changes since it was first introduced in the Legislature last month. The bill triggered strong opposition from teachers, parents and students when it was first raised — and it now allows local school districts to decide how to allocate less state funding.

While Luna's plan was the kind of out-of-the-box thinking education officials need to consider, it's also important to let locally elected school boards make the final decision on how to cut budgets.

In previous bills, the Legislature made collective bargaining and teacher tenure optional, but

there's no indication local school districts intend to shun their teacher union affiliates. Instead, they indicate they want to continue to work cooperatively with their respective teacher associations.

This is a reassuring aspect of the local environment — educators who understand that student achievement is more important than being adversaries.

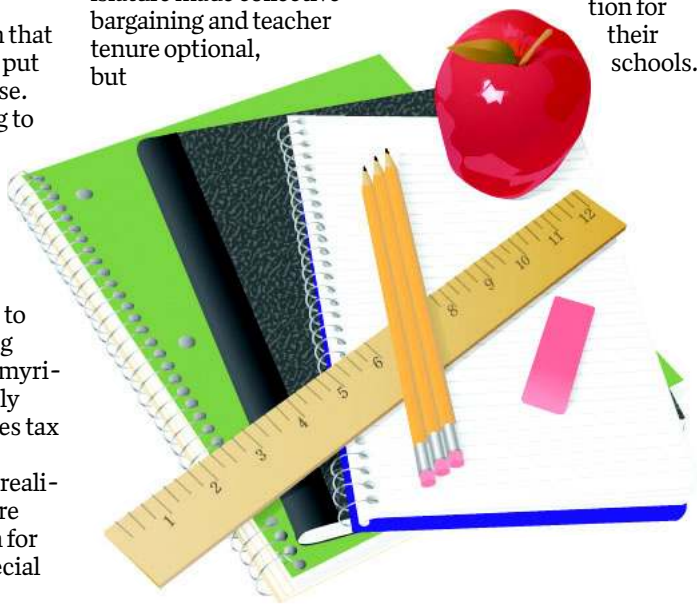
Instead of requiring a certain number of online courses, the new education reform package directs the State Board of Education to draft standards governing the online course requirements and directs a state task force to study the implementation of a program to provide laptop computers to high schools students.

Those ideas have merit and should be considered, but many teachers and school administrators thought the state was moving too fast into a new era.

The revised bill gives school districts the power to adopt some of the Luna reform plan's features while putting off other provisions local board members are concerned about. Plus, they have the newly provided flexibility to decide whether to cut teaching positions, reduce teacher pay or cut the number of days certified personnel have contact with students ...

There was nothing wrong with Otter and Luna coming up with new ideas to reform the state's public school system, but lawmakers have taken the right step by giving locally elected officials the choice to decide

the best direction for their schools.

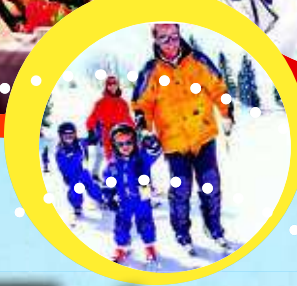

Nullification proponents revive bid with new bill

BOISE— Proponents of nullifying the federal health care overhaul in Idaho have revived their push after a previous bid failed in the Senate earlier this session.

Led by Rep. Vito Barbieri, a Coeur d'Alene Republican, this new effort focuses on blocking "discretionary provisions" in the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act — those portions of the federal law not specifically required or which don't take effect before June 30, 2012.

Barbieri introduced this new gambit Monday in the House Ways and Means Committee, winning a 4-3 party line vote.

Now, he hopes to convince GOP colleagues that this new measure is constitutional.

He's already won at least one convert: Sen. Curt McKenzie, who voted against the first bill, is a co-sponsor of this latest measure.

Democrats oppose revival of this issue.

Retailers want to sell you gadgets, buy them back and sell them again

BALTIMORE — You know that shiny smart phone you bought six months ago? There's an even better one hitting the market right about now. Or how about that flat-panel TV you bought last year. Now they come in 3-D.

With the ever-quicken pace of technological advances, you can be left in the digital dust.

Retailers now have a solution for consumers — and for themselves. They will buy back your old gadget in hopes that you turn around and buy the next best gadget on their shelves.

Under these "buyback" programs, big-box retailers and online merchants give cash or credit for a piece of used electronics. Best Buy, the world's largest consumer electronics retailer, launched its program earlier this year.

"Technology is changing so fast that the consumer a lot of times feels they're being left behind, so they'll postpone buying," said Cynthia Jasper, an expert in buying behavior and chair of the consumer science depart-

ment at the University of Wisconsin-Madison. "So it's a way to make the consumer feel at ease."

For retailers, buyback programs are another way to lure customers into stores to spend on pricey gadgets such as smart phones, laptops, tablet computers and televisions. Retailers also see buyback programs as an alternative revenue stream because they can sell used products through online outlet sites.

One California start-up has put its own twist on the concept. Its vending machine model, called the "ecoATM," is an automated kiosk that accepts used gadgets and pays the consumer in cash or gift cards. The company behind the Redbox movie rental kiosks, Coinstar, has invested in ecoATM, which has already deployed some of the machines in California.

Retail industry experts say the consumer electronics

market is evolving the way markets in used cars or used textbooks did. And if consumers believe their gadgets will retain some value, they might be more willing to upgrade sooner rather than risk the device becoming outdated and worthless, industry experts said.

Many consumers already trade in-and up-their cell phones, as those who lock into contracts are often given

Providing food for firefighters

After hours of battling intense fires there's one thing firefighters need more than a shower and rest: food.

That was the opportunity presented to more than 20 area food vendors on Wednesday, during a set of meetings hosted by the South Central Idaho Interagency Dispatch and Idaho Small Business Administration at the College of Southern Idaho.

"This is a good way for people to diversify their business," said SBA Representative Irene Gonzalez. "Someone may have a restaurant but not know they can do business with the federal government and this opens the door."

The dispatch agency handles firefighting logistics for a consortium of land use agencies like the Forest Service and Bureau of Land Management, and currently works with just a few local vendors, said spokesman Curtis Jensen.

"We're really looking to expand the number of vendors we work with," Jensen said. "These meetings will go over what vendors have to do, like getting identification numbers and how to invoice the cost of meals."

Although vendors are encouraged to complete their paperwork and registration early in the season there is no guarantee the agency will ever call.

"The last couple of years all the forecasters said we were going to have really bad fire years and they weren't," said Susan Brown, Sawtooth National Forest fire business specialist. "We don't really know when or where a fire will strike....but we have to be prepared for when it does happen."

Vendors are paid on a per diem rate, as set by the federal government. Although the rate is higher in the Wood River Valley, rates paid for meals in the Magic Valley are about \$7 for breakfast, \$11 for lunch and \$23 for dinner.

"Vendors can't charge us \$30 for a \$10 meal," Jensen said.

The size of the fire and how long crews have been in the field also determine what kind of meals will be requested.

"We'll likely have opportunity for fire fighters to come in and eat at their restaurant, or having us come by and pick meals up, to having them come out and serve the fire line," Jensen said. "Most of the time, especially with bigger, ongoing fire battles, vendors will have plenty of notice of what we'll need. We won't call up and say, 'Hey, we need 150 meals in 20 minutes, can you do it?'"

Document donations or they don't count at tax time

NEW YORK — If you used a text message to send cash to the Red Cross after the Haiti earthquake, or donated credit card points for relief efforts after the temblor in Chile, you may claim those donations on your 2010 tax return like any other charitable offering.

Here are some rules to be aware of when itemizing charitable donations on your return:

- You must file a Form 1040 and itemize deductions on Schedule A to claim charitable donations.
- If you made a donation to Haiti relief before March 1, 2010, and claimed it on your 2009 return, you cannot claim the same donation for 2010. The earthquake

occurred on January, 21, 2010.

- Donations to religious organizations, nonprofit schools and hospitals, scientific, veterans and service organizations are deductible.
- You can claim out-of-pocket expenses for volunteering, and some transportation costs, but not the value of your time.

- If you made a donation and received a gift or service in return, you can only claim the value of your donation that exceeds the price of the gift.
- If you made an in-kind donation of clothing, furniture or other items, you must have a receipt.

Startup seeks fortune in iPhone bottle opener

SAN JOSE, Calif. — A lot of Silicon Valley mythology centers on the idea of two guys in a garage. Well, this is a story about two guys who actually started their company in a garage.

It's also the story of how mobile and social technology can enable a nutty idea to grow into a business.

It all started in summer 2009, when Clay Baker, a tech company veteran who'd transitioned into industrial design and contracting, took his Range Rover in for its regular servicing at Tom Ramies' Portola Valley Garage.

Knowing Baker had worked at Netscape and other valley stal-

warts, Ramies unveiled his nutty idea: a bottle opener that would fit onto an iPhone. "We could call it the iOpener," Ramies said.

Baker's first reaction: "Dude, just fix my car." Then he started thinking: What if it wasn't just a gadget college kids might buy, but also married to an iPhone app that could let beer drinkers keep track of when they were running low on suds? And told them where to buy more? And let them recommend favorite brews to friends, and maybe even get online coupons from beverage makers?

Next thing he knew, Baker was saying, "Let's get this company started before my wife finds out what I'm up to."

The iOpener's hardly a house-

hold name - the duo says they've sold several hundred units, which consist of a hard shell that encases the phone and features a slide-out opener, but they're in talks with a major big-box retailer. Many of the more high-falutin functions of the BevConX app they've designed have yet to roll out. But to talk to these two middle-age guys is to be reminded of the valley's enduring well of optimism.

They're serious enough that they've both gone full time on the company, and they've recruited a respected techie to help them make inroads among the venture capital crowd.

"What impressed me the

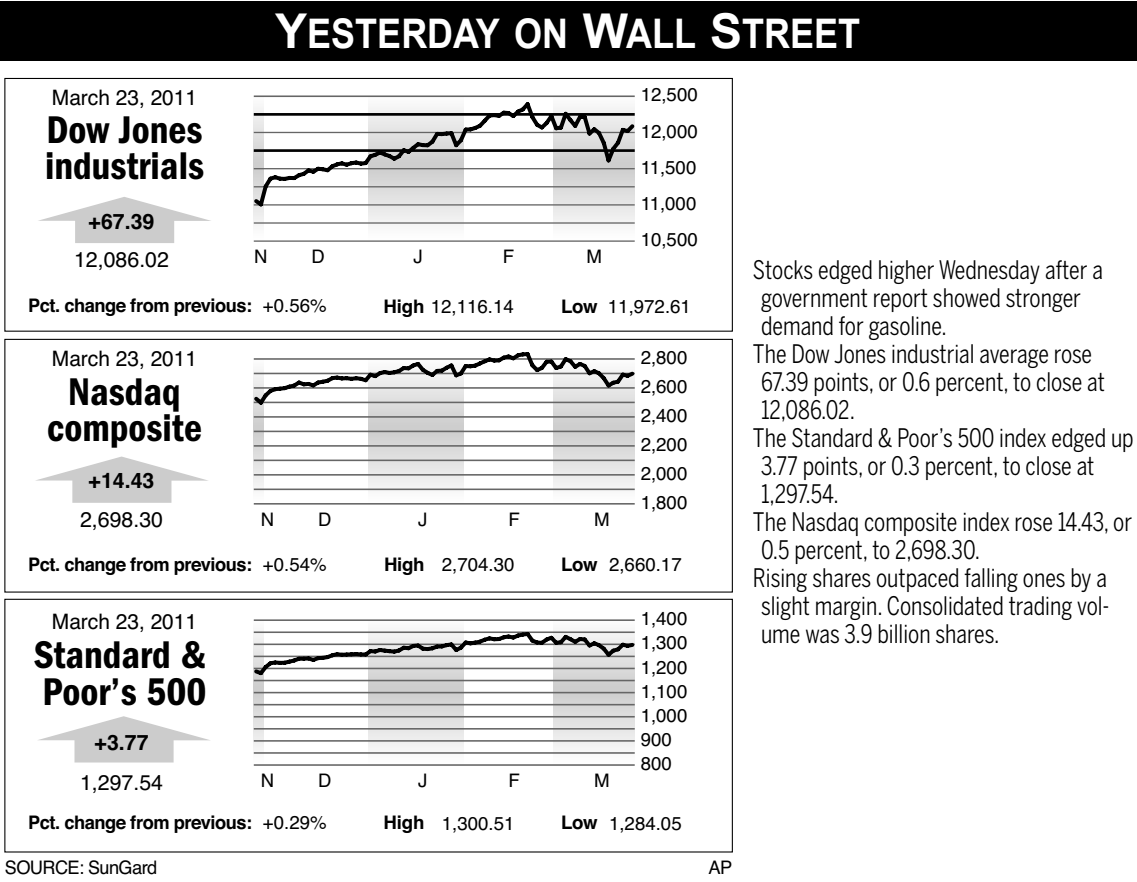

U.S. soldier gets 24 years for murders of 3 Afghan civilians

JOINT BASE LEWIS-MC-CHORD, Wash. — A U.S. soldier who pleaded guilty Wednesday to the murders of three Afghan civilians was sentenced to 24 years in prison after saying “the plan was to kill people” in a conspiracy with four fellow soldiers.

Military judge Lt. Col. Kwasi Hawks said he initially intended to sentence Spc. Jeremy Morlock to life in prison with possibility of parole but was bound by the plea deal.

Morlock, the first of five soldiers from the 5th Stryker Brigade to be court-martialed in the case, will receive 352 days off of his sentence for time served and could be eligible for parole in about seven years, said his lead attorney, Frank Spinner. He will be dishonorably discharged as part of his sentence.

The 22-year-old Morlock is a key figure in a war crimes probe that has raised some of the most serious criminal allegations to come from the

war in Afghanistan. Army investigators accused him of taking a lead role in the killings of three unarmed Afghan men in Kandahar province in January, February and May 2010.

His sentencing Wednesday came hours after he pleaded guilty to three counts of murder, and one count each of conspiracy, obstructing justice and illegal drug use at his court martial at Joint Base Lewis-McChord, south of Seattle.

Under his plea deal, he has agreed to testify against his co-defendants.

Asked by the judge whether the plan was to shoot at people to scare them, or to shoot to kill, Morlock replied, “The plan was to kill people.”

Speaking to reporters after the sentencing, Spinner read

a statement prepared by Morlock in which the soldier apologized for the pain he had caused his victims’ families and the people of Afghanistan and asked for forgiveness from his fellow soldiers.

Spinner speculated that “moral problems and discipline problems” in Morlock’s brigade created an environment that contributed to the killings — an argument the defense presented in court through the testimony of sociologist and war crimes expert Stjepan Mestrovic.

Other witnesses, including Morlock’s mother and his former hockey coach, talked about the devastating effect of his father’s death in a boat- ing accident in 2007. Morlock said he joined the Army hoping to follow in the footsteps of his father, a retired paratrooper.

But, ultimately, Morlock accepted that his actions

were his and his alone, Spinner said.

Responding to criticism that 24 years was too light for three murders, Spinner pointed to Morlock’s willingness to take responsibility for his actions and testify against his co-defendants. “He realized coming into court today the ‘why’s’ were not that important. He’s taking responsibility,” Spinner said.

The plea deal had been in place for nearly two months, so the sentence “wasn’t really a surprise” to Morlock, Spinner told reporters.

Morlock told the judge that he and the other soldiers first began plotting to murder unarmed Afghans in late 2009, several weeks before the first killing took place. To make the killings appear justified, the soldiers planned to plant weapons near the bodies of the victims, he said.

Army prosecutor Capt. Andre Leblanc characterized the crimes as acts of “unspeakable cruelty” by “a few extraordinarily misguided men.”

“We don’t do this. This is not how we’re trained. This is not the Army,” Leblanc said during his closing statement Wednesday.

AROUND THE NATION

ARIZONA Loughner sent to facility in Missouri

PHOENIX — The suspect in the January shooting rampage in Tucson was flown Wednesday to a specialized facility in Missouri to undergo a court-ordered mental evaluation, and his lawyers immediately asked an appeals court for him to be returned.

Lawyers for Jared Lee Loughner said in a court filing that he was taken from Tucson to a federal Bureau of Prisons medical facility in Springfield, Mo. Loughner was ordered transferred to have tests to determine if he understands the nature and consequences of the charges he faces and can assist in his defense.

Loughner, 22, has pleaded not guilty to charges stemming from the Jan. 8 attack that killed six and wounded 13, including Rep. Gabrielle Giffords. She remains at a rehabilitation center in Houston as she recovers from a bullet wound to the brain.

WASHINGTON, D.C. Study blames oil spill on blowout preventer

It was the mystery that wouldn’t go away, long after the oil stopped gushing: Why did the blowout preventer of the drilling rig Deepwater Horizon fail to prevent the blowout of April 20, 2010, which killed 11 people and led to the historic BP oil spill?

The official answer came Wednesday, and it was both strikingly mundane and, at least for critics of the petroleum industry, alarming.

The forensic analysis of the blowout preventer, or BOP, conducted under contract to federal investigators by the Norwegian company Det Norske Veritas, showed that the initial loss of well control and the violent surge of oil and gas up the well caused the drillpipe to buckle and move slightly off center. That fouled the operation of the blind shear rams, the blades designed to close on the drillpipe and shut in the well.

NEW HAMPSHIRE Suspect calls deadly home invasion ‘cool’

NASHUA — A man who admits killing a mother and maiming her daughter in a machete and knife attack said in a taped interview with police that was played Wednesday that he thought the slashing was “cool” and would have killed the girl if he had realized she was still alive.

In a recorded 7-hour statement to police played for jurors Tuesday and Wednesday, Christopher Gribble said he hacked to death Kimberly Cates and thought he had killed her 11-year-old daughter, Jaimie.

Gribble can be heard saying he was certain Jaimie was dead because she wasn’t moving and her head was drenched with blood.

DEATH OF A MOVIE LEGEND Elizabeth Taylor’s top 5 films

Elizabeth Taylor, who died Wednesday morning of congestive heart failure at the age of 79, grew up and matured as a woman and an actress before the eyes of worldwide audiences. One of the few actresses to win two Academy Awards, she gave memorable performances in countless movies over the decades.

Here were five of her best:

- **“National Velvet”**: Taylor was all of 11 when she played Velvet Brown in the 1944 Technicolor classic about a British farm girl who rides her horse “The Pie” in England’s Grand National Race. The velvet-eyed Taylor is charming and delightful in the film. She was also given the horse who played “The Pie.”

- **“A Place in the Sun”**: Taylor was 19 when she was loaned out from MGM to Paramount to star in George Stevens’ haunting 1951 version of Theodore Dreiser’s “An American Tragedy.” She played Angela Vickers, a beautiful heiress who falls in love with the ill-fated George Eastman (Montgomery Clift). Their first screen kiss is still remarkably erotic.

- **“Who’s Afraid of Virginia Woolf?”**: Taylor packed on the pounds and aging makeup to transform herself from one of the screen’s greatest beauties to the frumpy, foul-mouthed Martha in Mike Nichols’ 1966 version of Edward Albee’s play. She won her second Oscar for playing the vulgar wife of a college professor (Richard Burton).

- **“Cat on a Hot Tin Roof”**: Despite the fact that she lost her third husband Mike Todd during the making of this top-notch 1958 adaptation of Tennessee Williams’ play, Taylor turns in a fiery, romantic turn as Maggie the Cat who is frustrated with her former football star husband Brick (Paul Newman). Taylor earned a best actress Oscar nomination.

- **“Suddenly, Last Summer”**: Taylor also earned an Oscar nomination for best actress, as did costar Katharine Hepburn, in this 1959 melodrama based on Williams’ one-act as a young woman who had witnessed the murder of her cousin Sebastian the summer before. The film also marked her last collaboration with Clift. “Suddenly” was directed by Joseph Mankiewicz, who would direct her four years later in the infamous “Cleopatra.”

MASSACHUSETTS Study: Mercury from fish not a heart risk

Ingesting mercury found in most fish didn’t cancel the food’s heart-health benefits, according to a study made public on Wednesday by Harvard Medical School.

Higher mercury exposure didn’t boost the incidence of coronary heart disease, stroke or cardiovascular disease, according to the

study, which examined people’s toenail clippings. The study, published in the New England Journal of Medicine, analyzed toenails because they are a good indicator of the body’s absorption of mercury over the years, researchers wrote.

Eating fatty fish such as albacore tuna, mackerel, sardines and herring may reduce the risk of cardiovascular disease because they have nutrients that can boost heart wellness, according to the study. In adults, mercury is also linked to a risk of heart ailments. The research shows the heart benefits outweigh any drawbacks from exposure to mercury found in almost all fish, according to the U.S. Food and Drug Administration.

IDAHO Energy politics scuttle rebate deal

BOISE — Just when it looked like wind industry lobbyists, Idaho Power Co. officials and the governor’s office had struck a deal over extending Idaho’s sales tax rebates for alternative energy, a little northern Idaho landfill power project intervened to put the package in jeopardy.

The tiny Kootenai Electric Cooperative in Hayden is working with Kootenai County to turn gas produced by garbage at the local Fighting Creek landfill into about 3.2 megawatts of electricity, enough to power about 2,000 homes.

The problem is, Avista Corp., the Spokane, Wash.-based utility, doesn’t want to pay the price Kootenai Electric can demand under a 1978 federal law that requires regulated utilities to buy alternative developers’ power at state-mandated rates. So Avista inserted a provision into the agreement struck late Tuesday aimed at throwing a monkey wrench in Kootenai Electric’s plans.

Rep. George Eskridge, R-Dover and sponsor of the rebate extension, called Avista’s changes a deal breaker Wednesday morning as he strode down the Capitol basement hallway just before the House Revenue and Taxation Committee hearing.

“I can’t support that,” Eskridge told The Associated Press.

House passes tax credit to spur hiring

BOISE — A tax incentive being pushed by Gov. C.L. “Butch” Otter to reward employers who add to their payrolls over the next three years sailed through the Idaho House on Wednesday and is now headed for the Senate.

The Hire One Act drew the backing of top Republicans and Democrats who made a case the time is ripe to encourage businesses to hire new workers, help make Idaho more attractive to relocating companies and do something to help pull the state out of the economic doldrums.

The bill would give employers a series of tax credits worth between 2 percent and 6 percent of a new employee’s annual wage and sets eligibility thresholds based on wages and an employer’s standing with the Idaho Department of Labor for unemployment insurance payments.

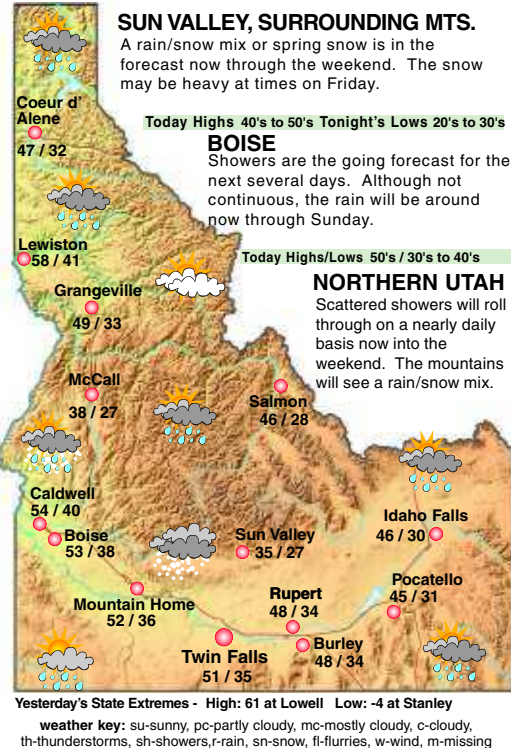

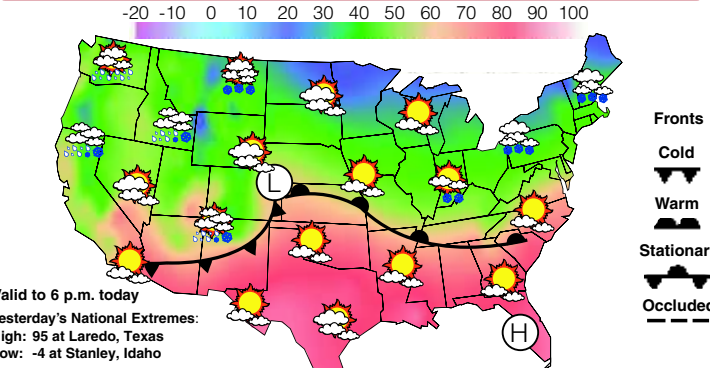

SYRIA Clashes kill 15 in southern Syria city

DARAA — Syrian police launched a relentless assault Wednesday on a neighborhood sheltering anti-government protesters, fatally shooting at least 15 in an operation that began before dawn, witnesses said.

At least six were killed in the early morning attack on the al-Omari mosque in the southern agricultural city of Daraa, where protesters have taken to the streets in calls for reforms and political freedoms, witnesses said. An activist in contact with people in Daraa said police shot another three people protesting in its Roman-era city center after dusk. Six more bodies were found later in the day, the activist said.

Inspired by the wave of pro-democracy protests around the region, the uprising in Daraa and at least four nearby villages has become the biggest domestic challenge since the 1970s to the Syrian government, one of the most repressive in the Middle East.

JAPAN Tap-water radiation raises fears in Tokyo

TOKYO — Radiation leaking from Japan's tsunami-damaged nuclear power plant has caused Tokyo's tap water to exceed safety standards for infants to drink, officials said Wednesday, sending anxiety levels soaring over the nation's food and water supply.

Residents cleared store shelves of bottled water after Tokyo Gov. Shintaro Ishihara said levels of radioactive iodine in tap water were more than twice what is considered safe for babies. Officials begged those in the city to buy only what they needed, saying hoarding could hurt the thousands of people without any water in areas devastated by the March 11 earthquake and tsunami.

ISRAEL Jerusalem blast kills one, wounds dozens

JERUSALEM — A blast Israel quickly blamed on Palestinian militants ripped through a bus stop in Jerusalem on Wednesday, killing a woman, wounding two dozen other people and intensifying fears that a period of relative calm could be ending as hopes for a negotiated peace fade.

Violence has been on the rise, with the knife slaying this month of a Jewish settler family as they slept and the deaths of civilians in Gaza by Israeli strikes Tuesday in retaliation for rocket fire from the Hamas-ruled strip.

Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu warned militants not to test Israel's "iron will," and vowed a tough response to the bombing.

Gadhafi forces roll back; rebels try to organize

BENGHAZI, Libya — NATO ships began patrolling off Libya's coast Wednesday as airstrikes, missiles and energized rebels forced Moammar Gadhafi's tanks to roll back from two key western cities, including one that was the hometown of army officers who tried to overthrow him in 1993.

Libya's opposition took haphazard steps to form a government in the east, as they and the U.S.-led force protecting them girded for prolonged and costly fighting. Despite disorganization among the rebels — and confusion over who would ultimately run the international operation — coalition airstrikes and missiles seemed to thwart Gadhafi's efforts to rout his opponents, at least for now.

U.S. Defense Secretary Robert Gates acknowledged there is no clear end to the international military enforcement of the no-fly zone over Libya, but President Barack Obama said it "absolutely" will not lead to a U.S. land invasion.

From Ajdabiya in the east to Misrata in the west, the coalition's targets included Libyan troops' mechanized forces, mobile surface-to-air missile sites and lines of communications that sup-

ply "their beans and their bullets," said Rear Adm. Gerard Hueber, a top U.S. officer in the campaign in Libya.

He asserted that Gadhafi's air force has essentially been defeated. He said no Libyan aircraft had attempted to fly over the previous 24 hours.

"Those aircraft have either been destroyed or rendered inoperable," Hueber told Pentagon reporters by phone from the U.S. command ship in the Mediterranean Sea.

A doctor in Misrata said Gadhafi's tanks fled after the airstrikes, giving a much-needed reprieve to the besieged coastal city, which is inaccessible to human rights monitors or journalists. The airstrikes struck the aviation academy and a vacant lot outside the central hospital, the doctor said.

"Today, for the first time in a week, the bakeries opened their doors," the doctor said, speaking on condition of anonymity for fear of reprisals if Gadhafi's forces take Libya's third-largest city, 125 miles southeast of Tripoli.

Neither the rebels nor Gadhafi has mustered the force for an outright victory, raising concerns of a prolonged conflict.

Gates said no one was ever under any illusion that the assault would last just

two or three weeks. He had no answer when asked about a possible stalemate if Gadhafi hunkers down, and the coalition lacks U.N. authorization to target him.

Obama, when asked about an exit strategy during an interview with the Spanish-language network Univision, didn't lay out a vision for ending the international action, but rather said: "The exit strategy will be executed this week in the sense that we will be pulling back from our much more active efforts to shape the environment."

Boehner presses Obama to define Libya mission

WASHINGTON — President Barack Obama came under pressure from Republicans on Wednesday to outline the U.S. goals in Libya, where American aircraft and warships are part of an international campaign enforcing a no-fly zone, as lawmakers sought to protect Congress' constitutional role in military decisions.

In a letter to the White House, House Speaker John Boehner, R-Ohio, said while he respected Obama's authority as commander in chief, he complained that the president ordered the military into combat without clearly describing the mission and U.S. role for the American people and Congress. Boehner insisted that certain questions be answered on U.S. strategy, the cost of the operation, the continued support of coalition

partners and whether it was acceptable for Gadhafi to remain in power after the military effort is over.

"Because of the conflicting messages from the administration and our coalition partners, there is a lack of clarity over the objectives of this mission, what our national security interests are and how it fits into our overarching policy for the Middle East," Boehner wrote. "The American people deserve answers to these questions. And all of these concerns point to a fundamental question: What is your benchmark for success in Libya?"

Boehner said he hopes the president will provide a clear and robust assessment of the mission and how it will be achieved. The letter was dispatched to the White House while Obama was en route home from a trip to Latin America that was overshadowed by events in Libya.

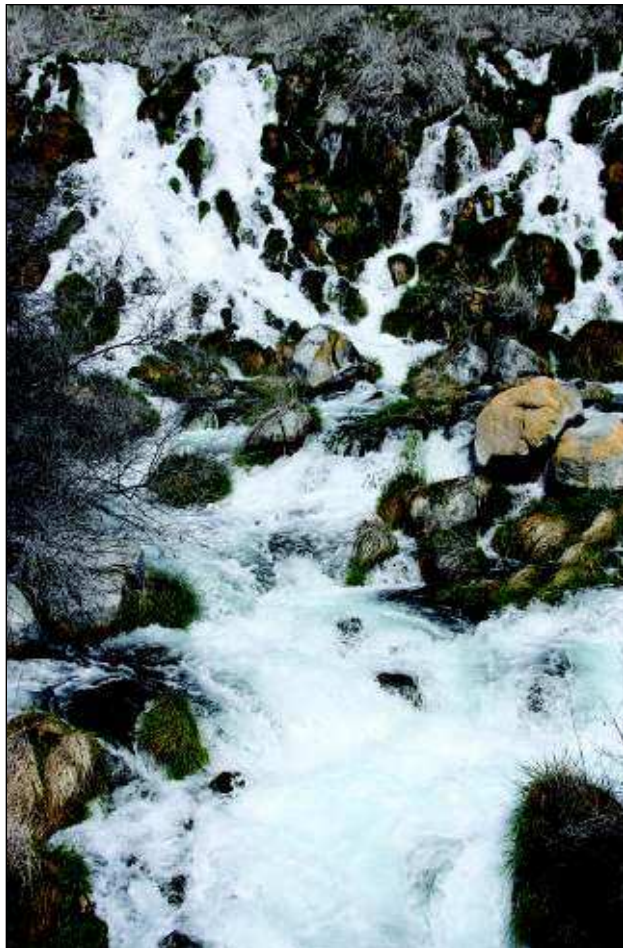

6 things to do at Niagara Springs

HAGERMAN — Water, crystal clear and cold, emerges from the hillside and tumbles down where it vanishes under the road. But not for long; it shoots out the other side near a steelhead fish hatchery.

There are at least six things to see and do at Niagara Springs, located deep inside the Snake River canyon, and viewing the impressive springs for which the site is named is only one.

See the springs

Niagara Springs, which tumbles down the canyon at 250 cubic feet per second, is part of the natural Thousand Springs complex.

The Department of Idaho Parks and Recreation, the Idaho Department of Fish and Game and private-owned fish hatcheries all play a part in making the area a pleasant outdoors escape.

Once inside the canyon, follow the road until you come to the steelhead fish hatchery on your right. The springs will be up ahead to your left.

A pullout and paved trail leads visitors to the springs. Sit in the bench in front of the springs and listen to the roar of water.

If you have an artistic eye, it also might be a good place for family pictures.

Visit the hatcheries

If something smells fishy in the canyon, it's because every year 1.8 million steel-

IF YOU GO

To Niagara Springs: take Interstate 84 to exit 157 and travel about seven miles south. After a sharp left turn, the road descends to the canyon bottom and the WMA entrance. The road is steep, and is not recommended for motorhomes or trailers. Information: Parks and Rec at 837-4505, or Fish and Game at 324-4350.

head are raised at the Niagara Springs Fish Hatchery.

The hatchery is owned by Idaho Power but managed by Fish and Game. A private-owned trout hatchery sits next door.

The steelhead hatchery receives eggs in about May, raises the fish through several stages the rest of the year, and releases them beginning about the end of March, according to fish culturist Doug Young.

The process of growing the fish has come a long way over the years, he said. New technology has helped to streamline work.

"We're kind of speeding things up," he said, referring to the controlled water temperatures that help speed the growing process, "doing in eight months what it takes Mother Nature to do in two years."

Picnic at the park

Follow the road past the hatcheries for about a mile or so, and you'll come to Crystal Springs Park, where fam-

Sun Valley to host hall of fame induction of skiers, snowboarders

SUN VALLEY — The eyes of American skiing will be trained on Sun Valley next week.

The U.S. Ski and Snowboard Hall of Fame and International Skiing History Association — America's two leading organizations dealing with the legacy of skiing and snowboarding — will make history when they meet in Sun Valley to stage a joint Hall of Fame Induction Ceremony coupled with the International Skiing History Association's annual gathering March 27 through April 3.

"It'll be the best party in 75 years of skiing," promised Bernie Weichsel, chairman of the U.S. Ski and Snowboard Hall of Fame. "We have people coming from all over the country to take part in this special vibe."

Sun Valley Resort owner Earl Holding will be inducted into the Hall of Fame — skiing's equivalent of baseball's Cooperstown — at 6 p.m. April 2 at Sun Valley's Limelight Room. Also inducted will be U.S. Paralympian Muffy Davis, a Twin Falls native who grew up racing at Sun Valley before going on to medal at the 2002 Paralympic Games in Salt Lake City.

Inducted along with them will be Olympic downhill racer and skier-cross racer Daron Rahlves, Glen Plake, big mountain skier and ski rocker innovator Shane McConkey, and seven-time national champion Bobby Cochran.

The inductees were selected by a nationwide committee who selected them from about 100 nominees.

"Holding's more than worthy to be in the Hall of Fame — he took Sun Valley and made it fantastic," Weichsel said. "And Muffy Davis

At age 4 Muffy Davis told her mother M.B. that God had made her to be a ski racer. She may have had something there. As a youngster this Twin Falls native, who moved to Sun Valley to get more

race time, grew up racing neck and neck with eventual three-time Olympian Picabo Street. And at 14 Davis was one of three American girls selected to represent the United States in a series of races in Italy with the idea that this was one step along the way to the Olympic team.

But two years later, her Olympic dreams seemed to vanish in a poof when she careened off a cat track leading from Lower Warm Springs to Greyhawk on Baldy during a training run.

Paralyzed with a T-6 injury, she swore she would never ski again unless it was standing on two skis. But after one year off the snow, she realized she missed it too much. And with the help of Marc Mast, an adaptive ski instructor at Sun Valley, she learned to ski a

monoski, which consists of a bucket-like seat mounted on a single ski and controlled by outriggers or small skis on her arms. After graduating from Stanford University in 1995, she tried racing on her monoski, eventually making the U.S. Paralympic team. She medaled four times in the 2002 Paralympics at Salt Lake City, and Sun Valley Resort named a run on Seattle Ridge "Muffy's Medals."

Following the Paralympics she took up residence in Salt Lake City where she worked at the University of Utah Health Sciences Rehabilitation Center while doubling as a motivational speaker. She also made history with three other paraplegics in 2002 when she climbed California's Mt. Shasta using hand-cranked machines called SnowPods. She is married and the mother of a baby girl.

Earl Holding

Neither Earl Holding nor his wife Carol knew how to ski when they wrote out a check for \$12 million to purchase Sun Valley in 1977. In subsequent years, Earl Holding did learn to ski and transformed the Sun Valley into a world-class ski resort with some of the finest snowmaking, high-speed quads,

state-of-the-art groomers and on-mountain lodges. Then, when the 2002 Winter Olympics came calling, he carved out a downhill race course on Snowbasin-Sun Valley's junior sister near Ogden, Utah.

Holding, an engineer by trade, made his fortune with Sinclair Oil and Little America Corp. The most recent Forbes survey listed him as the 362nd richest man on the list of the world's richest billionaires and 115th richest in the United States. He was the only Idahoan to make that list.

He was very hands-on in his early days as he used his knowledge of hydraulics to figure out ways to make snowmaking as near to snow from heaven. When others told him log lodges couldn't support the large picture windows he wanted in his River Run Lodge, he figured out a way to use steel covered with logs to make it happen. "Earl has a saying 'Anything worth doing is worth overdoing,'" said longtime ski instructor Bonnie Wetmore. "And it shows up everywhere you look in Sun Valley."

Interior secretary Ken Salazar going all out for the outdoors

KANSAS CITY, Mo. — With global economic problems, combat in the Middle East and a crisis in Japan, many might think that the conservation movement would temporarily grind to a halt.

Not Ken Salazar, secretary of the U.S. Department of Interior.

Look at history, he'll tell you. Through the years, some of the most significant moves to protect the nation's lakes, rivers and wild lands have come in times of crisis. "It's true we are living

through some very tough times," he said last week in an address at the North American Wildlife and Nat-

ural Resources Conference at the Westin Crown Center hotel.

"But that doesn't mean

we can't accomplish some big things during this time. It's important to look back at the history of this country and our legacy of conservation.

"Some of our greatest moments have come when this country was in crisis."

It started, Salazar said, in the Civil War, when President Abraham Lincoln signed a declaration that allowed the federal government to aside land for recreational use for the first time. That led to the establishment of America's first national park, Yellowstone.

Then at the start of the 20th century, President

Theodore Roosevelt became alarmed at the way the nation's forests, rivers and wild lands were being decimated, and he took action. He called the nation's conservation leaders together and formulated strategies to protect the environment.

Fast forward to the 1930s and the times of the Great Depression and the Dust Bowl. President Franklin D. Roosevelt realized the need for conservation measures and created the Civilian Conservation Corps, which built many facilities at parks, reservoirs and other recreational sites.

Maybe that is why Salazar

is undaunted when he looks at today's problems and considers the opportunities for conservation achievement.

"I would like to remind people that even in these tough times, there is an opportunity for a new conservation ethic. Most nations around the world look at the United States and say, 'That's where we would like to be someday,'" he said. "That's why I am very confident that we have an opportunity to accomplish great things."

Salazar bases much of that

Skiers cram in pre-dawn treks on Mount Glory

JACKSON, Wyo. — In the pre-dawn hours, the street-lights at the top of Teton Pass illuminate the empty parking lot of the popular backcountry trailhead. Shortly before 6 a.m., an old Suburban pulls up and parks beneath the snow banks, which by January have been plowed into 15-foot walls. Two figures emerge from the vehicle and begin changing from shoes to boots and strapping skis and a snowboard onto their backpacks. There is little conversation between them at this early hour. A half-eaten bowl of yogurt and granola sits on the center console of the truck. The duo, Joe Morin and Jeremy Minor, both of Jackson, shoulder their packs, walk to the edge of the Highway 22 and wait for a gap in the first trickle of commuter traffic from Teton Valley, Idaho. After the cars pass, the pair crossed the road, scales the snow bank and begins their

journey up Mount Glory, their headlamps illuminating only the next few steps of the 1,655-vertical-foot bootpack to the summit. Shortly after Morin and Minor disappear into the woods, a few more early-risers pull into the lot and repeat the ritual, setting out before dawn has a chance to crack the horizon. Known as the “dawn patrol,” they are not members of any elite group of extreme riders. They don’t seek notoriety or fame. They just want to ski. And in a town like Jackson, where work is often bookended by skiing, they mean to find a way to cram turns into winter days that already seem too short. For these skiers, having to work at 8 a.m. doesn’t mean they don’t have time to ski. It just means they have to wake up earlier. “You live in Jackson for a reason, and that’s to get up in the mountains,” Morin, who works as a mover in the valley, said. “Sometimes you’ve got to get up early (to ski), but it’s usually worth it.” In the dead of winter, it’s still pitch black at 6 a.m. The dark cloaks the sweeping beauty of the surrounding mountains. After leaving the parking lot, the hikers’ world consists of the tiny pool of light cast in front of them by a headlamp. But on a clear day, by 6:30 a.m. or so, a sunrise from near Glory’s summit is a sunrise like none other. And when an inversion sets up in the area, the clouds that settle into the valley make climbers feel like they’re on top of the world. Just after 7 a.m. on a February morning, Zahan Billimoria skied the south ridge of Glory with his friend, Ian Eastman. There was no fantastic sunrise that day, only a thick blanket of clouds, a gale-force wind and biting cold. The upside was the six-plus inches of new snow that had fallen. Once below the ridge, the wind died down considerably. Billimoria, who often makes pre-dawn runs on Glory or on nearby Taylor Mountain, had to be at work

Things anglers should expect this season

Q “With the warmer spring days I am anticipating some great fishing this spring. Is there any good news about angling around the state?”

A The biggest angling news is the current steelhead season. The Salmon region still has ice shelves along river banks in sections Nos. 15-17 (Middle Fork Salmon River to Pahsimeroi River) but most of the ice jams have broken free. Deadwater is the exception, but with river temps warming it looks as if the ice jam will be broken up and the river open by this weekend. Anglers are still dealing with muddy water conditions down river, but it’s beginning to clear up. Ruts, one lane traffic, and rock slides are affecting driving conditions from the Middle Fork to North Fork Salmon River. Last weekend, section No. 16 (North Fork Salmon River to Lemhi River) was the most productive fishing section at about nine hours per fish. Realize, though, that spring fishing conditions fluctuate according to spring weather. A rain or snow storm can change quickly, changing fishing conditions as well as driving conditions on narrow river roads. The department’s creel survey for the Salmon River below Riggins reveals three hours per fish; however, a friend of mine fished for steelhead last weekend near Whitebird and said success in their group was slow. This year is not expected to be as good for chinook salmon as it was last year, but the 2011 return is on track to be the sixth best year since 1980. The fish are still in the Pacific Ocean, but the number forecast for returning fish is similar to 2008 and 2009. Northwest fish managers estimate that about 198,000

chinook bound for waters upstream of Bonneville Dam will enter the Columbia River this year; last year the number was 315,300. Based on the preseason forecast, Idaho fish managers expect 37,840 hatchery fish and 19,760 wild fish to cross Lower Granite Dam. They estimate about 20,500 fish will return to Idaho hatcheries in the Clearwater, lower Salmon and lower Snake drainages. That means an estimated 2,000 chinook would be available for nontribal recreational anglers in the Clearwater, 4,200 in the lower Salmon and Little Salmon, and about 800 in the Snake River below the Hells Canyon dams. Salmon seasons typically open in late April. Angling for trout in the Magic Valley has also been very good this spring for stocked hatchery catchables. Fishing has been good in the Oster lakes at the Hagerman WMA, Empire ponds north of Buhl, Filer ponds and at Crystal Lake. Don’t forget, Fish and Game Commission will be meeting next week in Boise to set big game regulations for this fall. For those interested in spring bear or turkey hunting and still need a hunter education class, look for schedules on the Fish and Game website. There is no better way to occupy a kid’s time than to take them fishing. Gary Hompland, regional conservation officer for the Idaho Department of Fish and Game, may be reached at 324-4350.

has accomplished so much following her injury.” The other inductees speak for themselves, added Dick Dorworth, a one-time speed skiing champion now living in Ketchum. “Glen Plake is probably the most recognizable guy in skiing with his Mohawk. He’s made a living off that Mohawk because he’s such a good salesman and personality. But he’s the real deal in skiing, too — a kick-ass really strong skier. And he’s a cool guy.”

The pairing of the Hall of Fame with the Skiing Association is historic, said Sun Valley’s Marketing Director Jack Sibbach, because this is the first time the two entities have joined together like this. The two entities tied their celebration into the 75th season anniversary of Sun Valley, which opened in December 1936 as America’s first destina-

tion ski resort. “It makes perfect sense because Sun Valley was the site of so many great events in the sport’s history,” said Weichsel. In addition to the Hall of Fame induction, there will be a special tribute to the Founders of Freestyle Skiing. “You have some of the great freestylers right here in this town — Bobbie

Burns, Charlie McWilliams, Penelope and Pam Street ...” said Weichsel. “And many others will be coming from throughout the nation.” The week will feature a new film festival — the Ishpeming FilmFest — created by the Hall of Fame, Ski and Snowboard Film Institute. table or in the shade of trees. Walk along the dirt road, explore the area’s springs, and see all that Mother Nature offers in this cozy outdoors venue. The park can be your rendezvous point for the next three things on your list.

Cast your lines

You’ve visited the hatchery, which has whetted your appetite for fish. Now try catching your own at Crystal Lake, managed by

Parks and Recreation. There is a fee to enter the park and the lake is handicapped accessible. **Enjoy the wildlife** From the steelhead hatchery downriver to the Clear Lakes bridge is the Fish and Game Wildlife Management Area, said Gary Hompland, regional conservation officer with Fish and Game. The area is a good place to view all kinds of waterfowl, upland game birds and oth-

er wildlife. “The combination of mild winter weather and open water draws waterfowl to the WMA,” according to the Fish and Game website. “Over 5,000 ducks and several hundred Canada Geese winter along this portion of the Snake River annually.” **Hunt, but be careful** The river is open for hunting during waterfowl season, Hompland said. And upland bird hunters can try their luck at pheasant

hunting but they’ll need a WMA permit for that, he said. optimism on an ambitious blueprint called America’s Great Outdoors that he helped draft for President Barack Obama. The plan, which Obama announced last April, will emphasize getting youth involved in the outdoors, bringing the outdoors to urban residents, and protecting public lands and improving conservation efforts through partnerships and cooperative efforts. Among the provisions, outlined in a report that Obama recently released: • The outdoors would be brought to urban areas, where much of the nation’s population resides, through grand urban parks. • Youth would be encouraged to get involved in the outdoors through a Conservation Service Corps, which would provide youngsters with jobs in land and water conservation. • Innovative ways of funding conservation projects, such as partnerships between government, communities and businesses, would be explored. • The America’s Great Outdoors National Recreation Blueways Trails Initiative would be created to give priority to portions of rivers as recreational destinations that would receive aid for restoration and access projects. • A council would be created to ensure that federal agencies collaborate on conservation and recreation projects. “This initiative could play

an important role in the history of conservation in this country,” Salazar said. The leaders of many national conservation organizations agree. Addressing the measures that would get children involved in the outdoors, Larry Schweiger, president of the National Wildlife Federation, said, “By making outdoor time a national priority, we are taking a much-needed step — out the door — to healthier, happier kids. “The nature of childhood has changed, and there’s not much nature in it. This report provides a blueprint to reversing this alarming trend.” Some conservationists, though, are only cautiously optimistic. The plan sounds good, they said, but where will the financing come from? At a time when a House bill already calls for slashing some existing conservation programs, some question how far new initiatives will advance. Some federal officials say that won’t be as big a problem as it might appear. They say new funding wouldn’t be required for much of the program; that revising existing programs to fit the new initiative would take care of part of that problem. Whatever the case, Salazar thinks the new program represents true opportunity in the conservation movement. “We have a chance to make a real difference and establish a new conservation ethic,” he said.



Shed antler hunting begins as snow cover disappears

MILWAUKEE — There are few sights as beautiful as a white-tailed deer moving through a wild landscape.

But a fleeting image is one thing. A solid, three-dimensional gift from Mother Nature is arguably even better.

And when it's acquired as part of a foraging trip in the woods and fields, it's enough to create a new niche in the outdoors world.

It's called shed hunting, or looking for dropped antlers. To a growing legion of men, women and children, there's no better way to spend time outdoors.

"I call it 'treasure hunting,'" said Doug Otto of Greenfield. "Man, it's a thrill."

Otto, 47, grew up in a hunting family and readily admits to being a "whitetail freak." He hunts deer with bow, gun and camera.

But they all take a back seat, he says, to shed hunting.

"It's my passion, OK," Otto said. "No drug in the world could give me the excitement I get walking up on a record-book shed."

Even better, shed hunting is something his family, including wife Mary and 16-year-old son Doug, can do together.

All members of the deer family — including elk and moose — drop their antlers each year and grow a new set.

Antlers have a hormonal influence on many humans. Their mere sight raises heart rates, increases blood pressures.

To find a shed is rare. It's like receiving a gift from nature.

Among the suite of hunting activities in North America, shed hunting is arguably enjoying the greatest growth.

That's a perception based on interviews and anecdotes. No license is required to pick up sheds. No governmental agency tracks the activity.

But it's clear shed hunting in the Midwest has gone from relative obscurity in the 1970s to mainstream awareness in the 2000s.

"The last couple years, it seems to have grown tenfold," said Tom Miller of Lyndon Station, vice president of the North American Shed Hunters Club.

Miller said the club has more than 1,000 members and scorers representing every state and province in North America.

The Lyndon Station-based group documents and publishes records of shed antlers from big-game species across the continent.

The club uses the Boone & Crockett scoring system to judge antlers. Its records include a list of registered sheds as well as information on state laws on gathering, collecting, trading, transporting, crafting and possession of shed antlers.

Miller said a record 3,000 entries were submitted to the club in 2010.

"It's not a secret in Wisconsin, that's for sure," Miller said. "But some areas

of the country are just getting into it."

Miller, 37, grew up near Mauston. He still remembers the day in 1980 he and his older brother, Mark, found their first shed. The antler was a five-point typical that measured about 70 inches. They still have the trophy shed today.

"That was a time when people didn't even think about deer dropping antlers," Miller said. "Now we've got a whole organization devoted to sheds."

The interest in shed hunting is natural. What person doesn't enjoy looking around in woods and fields?

It's also relatively unencumbered by regulations. Although it's not allowed in national parks and certain other properties, it can be practiced virtually everywhere else.

Some very good shed hunting is even found within city limits, areas where no

deer hunting is allowed.

"What we find is people love it because they don't need a license and they can get kids into it," said Miller.

Like what a bird nest or a raccoon track looks like.

Methods of finding sheds vary. Most shed hunters walk and search. Some people use binoculars to survey fields. Some people use dogs.

Some die-hards even use satellite images to track the retreat of snow cover in North America. The best shed hunting often occurs after the snow melts and before the landscape greens up.

Many use it as a means of scouting for deer hunting spots, searching for bedding, feeding and travel corridors.

Some just use it to spice up their hikes in late winter and early spring.

But the ranks of serious shed hunters are growing. People are scheduling vacation days in the spring and going out only for sheds, said Otto.

"There's competition, sure, but I don't let it deter me," said Otto, who has hunted sheds from Southern Illinois to northern Saskatchewan. "I've actually met some very good friends in the woods, looking for sheds. We've got a lot in common."

Otto, who serves as a scorer for the Wisconsin Buck and Bear Club and NASHC, is as devoted as any shed hunter. He actually starts the process in October when he attempts to locate bucks and photograph their racks.

"It's such a free activity," Otto said. "You don't have to worry about scent control or making too much noise like you do when you're doing other deer hunting."

His biggest advice? "You've got to cover ground," Otto said. "I'll walk as much as 30 miles in a weekend."

Otto takes a photograph of each shed he finds before he picks it up. He treats each with reverence.

The Otto family has a collection of more than 300 sheds. Otto can tell the story of each one.

"Wait until this weekend, we might have more," Otto said. "It's time."

Jackson Elk Herd numbers more than 11,000

JACKSON, Wyo. (AP) — The number of elk in the Jackson area remains above the objective, but declining calf ratios in some areas have wildlife managers worried.

The Wyoming Game and

Fish Department says surveys count an estimated 11,500 elk in the Jackson Elk Herd.

However, calf to cow ratios for the herd this year are 20.7 per 100 cows. Biologists

say 25 calves per 100 are needed to sustain a population.

The Jackson Hole News & Guide reports that some outfitters blame wolves for the declining calf ratios. But

conservationists say worries about the calf ratios are overblown.

The Jackson Elk Herd includes elk on the National Elk Refuge and in two other nearby areas.

Bears emerging from their dens in NW Wyoming

JACKSON, Wyo. (AP) — Bears are emerging from their dens in northwestern Wyoming and wildlife managers say it's time for people to consider carrying bear spray again when they're visiting the backcountry.

The Jackson Hole News & Guide reports that several people have reported

seeing bear tracks in Grand Teton National Park and in the Gros Ventre drainage.

Jackie Skaggs is a spokeswoman at Grand Teton. She says people have reported seeing tracks in the Pacific Creek area.

Grand Teton senior wildlife biologist

Steve Cain says mid-March is a good time for people to start carrying bear spray again.

Wildlife officers in Colorado have also reported that recent warm weather has prompted black bears in the state to start stirring from their dens earlier than usual.

The more universe we discover, the more mysteries we find

Modern astronomy began in 1609 when Galileo, pointing his crude, hand-made telescope to the heavens, discovered stars too numerous to count. Instantly, Galileo's universe became a vastly larger place.

Similar revelations came with further technological leaps forward.

William Parsons first detected invisible heat energy from the moon in 1873, and Karl Jansky discovered radio emissions from the galactic center in the 1930s, ushering in the era of multi-spectral astronomy.

The space age brought sounding rockets and satellites with sensors to register X-rays and, later, gamma rays, which the atmosphere absorbs before reaching the

ground. By 1961, astronomical sources of energy across the entire electromagnetic spectrum were under scrutiny, and the universe appeared to be laid bare.

But not for long. By the '70s Vera Rubin and Kent Ford had found even more unseen material, not by detecting new kinds of emissions, but by measuring its effects on the stuff we can see (like stars and galaxies).

Today, observations suggest that invisible dark matter (which apparently neither emits nor absorbs light,

X-rays or any other kind of energy) outweighs normal matter five to one. In other words, our telescopes and satellites can only detect 20 percent of the matter in the universe.

It doesn't end there. In the late '90s, evidence began to emerge that something was pushing the universe to expand at an accelerating pace, like anti-gravity. Because matter and energy are interchangeable — as per Einstein's famous $E=mc^2$ — this so-called dark energy must be included in the inventory of the universe, outweighing normal and dark matter combined, three to one.

The new program at the Faulkner Planetarium — "Dark Matters" — debuts this week with an in-depth

look at the invisible universe and the efforts being made to understand what 95 percent of the universe is made of.

Next column: The "super moon" flap, in hindsight.

Question: Last month I filed a Chapter 7 bankruptcy. 2 weeks ago, I had to have a surgery and I expect the bills to be over \$30,000. I have no insurance. Will my bankruptcy take care of these medical bills?



Answer: As a general rule the only debts that will discharged in a Chapter 7 bankruptcy are those debts that you had already incurred on the filing date of your bankruptcy case. Since the medical debts were incurred after the filing of your bankruptcy case, they will not be discharged. One potential solution is to convert your Chapter 7 bankruptcy to a Chapter 13 bankruptcy. In doing so, you would be required to repay a portion of your debts by making at least 36 monthly payments to the bankruptcy trustee, based on your ability to repay. When you convert a case in this fashion, you can add the debts incurred after the initial filing, and those creditors will be able to share in the distribution of the money you pay to the bankruptcy trustee. Another possibility is to ask the court to allow you to voluntarily dismiss your existing Chapter 7 case and re-file your case as a new Chapter 7 case that would include the new debts. You need to speak to an experienced bankruptcy attorney to advise you on what course of action to take.

Rare chemical abnormality puzzles patient

DEAR DR. GOTT: I would appreciate any information you could give me about hepatic porphyria. I have it and would like to know about treatment.

DEAR READER: Porphyria is a rare, inherited neurodegenerative condition that results in a buildup of chemicals called porphyrins in the body. These are normal body chemicals. What isn't normal is when they build up and affect the nervous system, the skin or both. The condition is from a disruption in the body's production of heme, the non-protein portion of hemoglobin that contains iron. We all have heme in our tissues, with the greatest amounts found in the red blood cells, liver and bone marrow. There are eight enzymes that convert porphyrins into heme. In your condition, an inherited mutation in one of your genes has caused a deficiency that leads to the buildup of porphyrins in the body. You likely received this inherited condition from one of your parents (an autosomal dominant pattern) or from both parents (an autosomal recessive pattern). The interesting thing is that even though you have been diagnosed, you may or may not experience any symptoms. If you are exhibiting symptoms, they may be triggered by exposure to the sun, infection, the use of alcohol, hormonal factors, dieting, excess iron in your system or a host of other possibilities.

Generally speaking, porphyria is divided into two categories — acute and cutaneous. The acute form generally affects the nervous system and often presents with severe abdominal pain, vomiting and constipation, which then progresses to muscle pain, numbness, weakness, diarrhea, seizures, fever, hallucinations, high blood pressure and red urine. This form is rare in people prior to puberty or following menopause. The cutaneous form affects the skin with symptoms of blisters and skin swelling within minutes of exposure to the sun, red-

ness and itching.

Because you have the hepatic form, this implies liver and possibly kidney involvement. While I don't know your specific case, your kidney function could be less than optimal, and your liver may be damaged. The extent of that involvement should determine what your hematologist plans as the next step in your care, which may be as simple as discontinuing medication that acts as a trigger or as complicated as dialysis or surgery. Good luck.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I have a question regarding treatment of a 5-year-old who has been diagnosed with allergies to dust mites and mold. The allergist prescribed Flonase nasal spray and Zyrtec when he's bad. This seems a little extreme, as it is a steroid and the only symptom she presented with was frequent colds. Is there any other treatment?

DEAR READER: I cannot, in clear conscience, recommend the use of the steroid Flonase for a child, primarily because the medication can affect his or her growth at such a vulnerable age.

Furthermore, pediatric Zyrtec (an antihistamine) studies involving 168 children aged 2 to 11 found side effects to be mild to moderate. Studies involving children aged 6 to 11 given doses between 1.25 to 10 milligrams daily found symptoms of headache in 11 percent of users, pharyngitis in 6.2 percent, abdominal pain in 4.4 percent and epistaxis (nosebleeds) in 3.7 percent. As a non-pediatrician, I am not qualified to make such an enormous decision. Speak with your daughter's pediatrician regarding the allergist's recommendations. Children are precious and should be treated with the utmost of care.

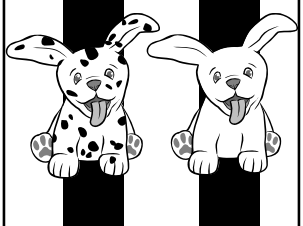

NTSB probing sleeping air traffic supervisor

WASHINGTON (AP) — Two airliners landed at Reagan National Airport near Washington without control tower clearance because the air traffic supervisor was asleep, safety and aviation officials said Wednesday.

The supervisor — the only controller scheduled for duty in the tower around midnight Tuesday when incident occurred — had fallen asleep, said an aviation official, who spoke on condition of anonymity to discuss the incident.

The National Transportation Safety Board is gathering information on the occurrence to decide whether to open a formal investigation, board spokesman Peter Knudson said.

The pilots of the two commercial planes were unable to reach the tower, but they were in communi-

cation with a regional air traffic control facility, Knudson said. That facility is in Warrenton, Va., about 40 miles from the airport.

Regional air traffic facilities handle aircraft within roughly a 50 mile radius of an airport, but landings, takeoffs and planes within about three miles of an airport are handled by controllers in the airport tower.

After pilots were unable to raise the airport tower by radio, they asked controllers in Warrenton to call the tower, Knudson said. Repeated calls to the tower went unanswered, he said.

The planes involved were American Airlines flight 1012 and United Airlines flight 628T, Knudson said.

The Federal Aviation Administration released a statement confirming the incident.

Gosar led CSI (33-4) to the NJCAA national championship with a 72-64 win Saturday over Midland (Texas) College in Hutchinson, Kan.

"I've been contacted and I've been told that I'm a candidate for that position," said Gosar, who said Wyoming has asked him to provide more information about himself. He could make a trip next week to the school's Laramie, Wyo., campus for an interview.

"It's a great honor," said Gosar, "especially when it's your alma mater."

Gosar is a native of

Pinedale, Wyo., and played four seasons at Wyoming before spending two seasons with the

Cowboys as a graduate assistant. He worked as an assistant at Portland State before coming to CSI as an assistant in 2005.

Gosar said the Wyoming post would be his dream job "under the right conditions."

Other candidates include Old Dominion coach Blaine Taylor, who reportedly met with Burman, Wyoming President Tom Buchanan and Associate Athletic Director Matt Whisenant Tuesday afternoon in Virginia.

Murray State coach Billy Kennedy is also considered to be high on Wyoming's list, according to multiple reports.

Burman told Gosar he hopes to have a coach in place before the NCAA Tournament Final Four, which begins April 2.

Bate said Burman told him Wyoming is "evaluating a lot of people and didn't know what direction they were going to go."

BSU offense looks sharp in scrimmage

BOISE — Fans worried about how the Boise State offense is going to adapt in a post-Titus Young and Austin Pettis world should relax if Wednesday afternoon's spring scrimmage at Bronco Stadium was any indication of what the 2011 football season holds.

However, the defense is another matter.

"I'm learning to hate scrimmages as a head coach because I'm mad at somebody all the time," Boise State head coach Chris Petersen said. "That was concerning for our offense to drive up and down the field on our defense like that. That is unlike the defense we play around here like that now."

"Granted, we've got some guys out who are going to be key contributors, but we definitely expected our guys to play harder than they did today."

In the scrimmage that was closed to the public, quarterback Kellen Moore looked sharp in his two drives and hinted at who might be the breakout receiver this fall — redshirt sophomore Gerald Hiwat.

Hiwat hauled in a touchdown pass from Moore and made some clutch receptions, drawing praise from Petersen.

"Geraldo is a guy that we're excited about," Petersen said. "We were excited about him last season. He took a step last fall. He's taken a step in spring ball and by the time fall arrives, we think he's going to be a very good player."

Moore concurred.

"Gerald is going to make some big strides between now and the start of the season," said Moore, whose two drives resulted in a touchdown and a field goal. "It helps him when he goes against Jerrell (Gavins) and Jamar (Taylor) and some physical defensive backs. It's going to help him. He's

got to get used to that style of defense and attack them and make plays."

While Petersen's frustration with the defense was evident, the offensive line was one area that he applauded in the way they maintained protection for Moore.

"Our protection was a lot better than it has been in the previous practices," Petersen said. "And if you give Kellen a little bit of time, he's going to look good."

In the scrimmage, running plays were scarce with Doug Martin held out to prevent the depth at running back from being further pillaged by injuries. However, Vallivue High walk-on Drew Wright continues to impress his coaches and teammates this spring at the running back position.

"I think Drew Wright ran well," Moore said. "It's very difficult to run the ball against our defense. Even on some plays where he got just a couple of yards, he made some good runs."

Boise State has one more practice this week before taking off next week for spring break. The Broncos will host their annual spring game, which will be open to the public, at 5 p.m. Saturday, April 16.

Florida knows the Cougs are more than just Fredette

NEW ORLEANS — Just like everyone else in college basketball, Florida is quite familiar with Jimmer-mania.

Jimmer Fredette's production — 28.8 points, 3.5 rebounds and 4.3 assists per game — is impossible to ignore. If anything, BYU's senior guard is getting stronger, scoring at least 30 points in six of his last seven games.

But second-seeded Florida doesn't buy that third-seeded BYU will be a one-man team when they meet in the NCAA Tournament regional semifinals tonight in New Orleans.

The Gators know from experience.

BYU beat Florida 99-92 in double overtime in a first-round game last season. Fredette scored 37 points, yet what really hurt the Gators was a career-game from reserve guard Michael Loyd Jr., who poured in 26 points.

Now with a second chance, Florida's players say they have plenty of respect for all of the Cougars — even if it's Fredette who is dominating the highlights.

"The game plan isn't just to stop Jimmer," the Gators' Chandler Parsons said.

"They've got a complete team. We had a taste playing against them last year and now we understand just how good they are. We don't have to watch film to understand that. They're strong and they execute."

Florida is almost the antithesis of BYU, with multiple seemingly anonymous options who can hurt opponents during any given game. Four players average at least 11 points and the Gators often use a 10-man rotation.

Parsons, the SEC player of the year, is maybe the best example. The 6-foot-9 senior is averaging 11.4 points, 7.7 rebounds and 3.7 assists, can step out and hit 3-pointers, is a solid defender and doesn't make many bad decisions.

But he's nowhere near the superstar that Fredette has become.

The 6-foot-2 shooting specialist has a well-deserved reputation as a nearly unstoppable scorer. He's shooting 45.5 percent from the field and 40.6 from 3-point range despite constant double teams, but has also proven capable at creating for others.

He's an unassuming superstar, with an easy laugh that keeps teammates loose

Marathon home stretch key to CSI baseball fortunes

Finally, the Golden Eagle baseball team is back in town. Enjoy it while it lasts, though — this is the only chance you may have to see them all year.

When CSI welcomes conference-leading Western Nevada to Skip Walker Field this weekend, the Golden Eagles will open a 20-game home stretch. These are the last remaining home games on CSI's schedule, and fans won't be able to see their team at the Skip again after April 23 unless the Eagles win the league and thereby host the Region 18 Tournament.

The only thing stranger than seeing five straight home weekends on CSI's schedule is seeing perennial power Southern Nevada in the cellar of the SWAC standings, where it sits as of this week.

Doesn't matter how many games of baseball you play, CSI's 2011 slate is a significant faux pas out of the scheduling department.

It's tolerable this season, because these games are at home. Next year — when the schedule is slated to flip in its entirety and force CSI on the road for five straight weeks — not so much.

In either case, it's not fair, on the visitors this season or on the Golden Eagles next.

Major League Baseball teams occasionally play up to 10 or 12 games in a row, around 6 to 8 percent of their 162-game schedule, either at home or on the road. This current conference schedule has CSI hosting 38.7 percent of its

schedule, including all of its conference home games and 20 of its 23 at the Skip overall, in one shot.

The 2011 home stand could provide a huge advantage for the Golden Eagles, particularly toward the end when they host Southern Nevada and Salt Lake in successive weeks. Then they'll be rested and comfortable at home while other teams have to grind it out in normal fashion.

Next season, CSI will have that grueling stretch while other teams get to enjoy the comforts of home during that same five-week period.

When talking about the schedule earlier in the season, CSI coach Boomer Walker said that ideally every team could alternate home and away every weekend. While that's not logistically possible, the sentiment is unmistakable:

Unless Salt Lake (30-6) stumbles and drops games against one of the other five teams, CSI will have to go 23-1 in the second half to win the league, including winning the series in Salt Lake City in two weeks. A tall task, yes, but not one that has the Golden Eagles conceding defeat. "I think the kids know what's ahead of them, and that's what we talk about: keep pace with Salt Lake and hopefully someone somewhere along the way gets hot and beats them and not us," Baumert said. "It's something we talk about, definitely a goal of ours to host the region tournament." The first step starts in Henderson, Nev., this weekend, where CSI takes on a Southern Nevada squad that sits in third place, half a game up on North Idaho but 6.5 behind

the Golden Eagles. CSI's third conference loss came to the Coyotes in St. George, Utah, in February. It was so long ago Baumert called it a distant memory. "We've played pretty well down here the last couple of times we've been here. It almost like it feels like we're playing CSN on the road twice with the second one in St. George, but it's very doable to win four this weekend. But we still have to put in some good work." With Salt Lake headed to Coeur d'Alene this weekend for a series the Bruins should win, but one that's by no means a gimme, this could be the best chance CSI has to gain ground until the decisive road trip on April 8-9. "You're always kind of looking in front of you and make sure that no one's catching up behind you. It's not necessarily a two-team race — the wheels would have to fall off Salt Lake's bus and our bus for North Idaho or Southern (Nevada) to catch us, but you're always looking ahead and looking behind you to make sure no one's catching you," Baumert said. "It's important to get that No. 2 seed (to the region tournament) if you can't get the No. 1 seed. "I think North Idaho and Southern (Nevada) have their best softball ahead of them, so it's important to keep that distance. This could be a weekend where there's some movement."

Former players Flutie, Kelly recall 18-game grind

Doug Flutie remembers feeling how his arm was ready to fall off during his one year in the USFL. Nate Newton recalls how he did absolutely nothing but rest for an entire month after playing his two USFL 18-game regular seasons. And former CFL quarterback Danny McManus can still see the telltale signs of blurry-eyed fatigue that set in on rookies when Week 13 rolled around in Canada with five games still left to play. For those wondering what the effects might be if the NFL expands from 16 to 18 regular-season games, take it from those who've

been through it: It's a grind. "From week to week, game plan to game plan, there's the physical part, but the mental part of the preparation is what wears a guy down," said Newton, a former star offensive lineman, who began his pro career in 1984 with the USFL Tampa Bay Bandits. "You're going to blow a fuse. It's just bound to happen." Newton got a taste of playing an 18-game season before going on to become a six-time Pro Bowl selection with the Dallas Cowboys. McManus, who played for Florida State, spent 17 seasons in the CFL where 18-game schedules have been the norm since 1986. "You'd see it around

Week 13 through Week 16, these guys are just dragging themselves into the locker room," said McManus, who retired in 2006 and is now the head U.S. scout for the Hamilton Tiger-Cats. "There's no doubt it's a grind to go 18 weeks. And we used to do it going 18 weeks straight." Of course, that led to some unorthodox recuperating methods. "The saying we have up in Canada is we ice from the inside out," McManus said, laughing. "And that's because of a lot of that Canadian beer up there. That's the quickest way to get into

the muscles, to ice from the inside out." These are among the sobering messages from several ex-USFLers and CFLers — rounded out by Hall of Famer Jim Kelly, who broke in with the USFL's Houston Gamblers in 1984 before starring for the Buffalo Bills — with firsthand knowledge of playing 18-game seasons. All agreed the expanded schedules required a big adjustment from players. And Kelly even wondered whether the NFL is using the 18-game schedule as a ploy in labor talks, which are now on hold after

breaking down two weeks ago. "It's almost like they're holding it over the players so they at least have something to give back," Kelly said. "This is my personal opinion." Ploy or not, the NFL went into negotiations with a desire to expand its regular season for the first time since going from 14 to 16 games in 1978. In going to 18 games, the NFL would eliminate two preseason games in exchange for adding two regular-season games with the prospect of generating more revenue. NFL players have balked at the proposal. They've complained that an expanded schedule

would increase the risk of injuries and, as a result, have the potential of shortening careers, thus cutting into their money-earning potential and reducing their retirement benefits. Players have also fear how much two more games would cut into their off-seasons, which are already filled with mandatory and voluntary minicamps and workout programs from March to June. The NFL did back off on its proposal in its last offer before talks broke down. The NFL proposed maintaining the 16 regular-season games and four preseason games for at least two years, with any switch to 18 games being negotiable.

Huskies, Aztecs exceed expectations

ANAHEIM, Calif. — Connecticut flew clear across the continent for the next round of the NCAA tournament. San Diego State hopped in a bus and cruised 90 minutes up the interstate. Huskies coach Jim Calhoun and Aztecs coach Steve Fisher have been doing this long enough to realize miles don't matter at this point in the West regional — not compared to the distance both teams already traveled this season to reach this unlikely stage. Two surprisingly successful schools with breakout superstars and respected bench bosses meet tonight at Honda Center, with the winner moving to the brink of the Final Four. "It's been a wonderful, wonderful journey that we've had," Fisher said before the Aztecs (34-2) practiced Wednesday. While second-seeded San Diego State has won more games and moved deeper into the NCAA Tournament than any team in school history behind star forward Kawhi Leonard, UConn's Hall of Fame coach has been thrilled by his freshman-laden lineup's growing maturity around star guard Kemba Walker for the Huskies (28-9), one of just two Big East teams left. "I'm happy. Elated," Calhoun, the notoriously dour New Englander deadpanned. " ... They have the most resilience of any team I've ever coached. We're playing the best basketball right now, and everything that could happen good, has happened good."

Arizona's Williams comes home to play Duke

ANAHEIM, Calif. — The last time Derrick Williams came home to play basketball, things didn't go well for Arizona. The Wildcats arrived in Los Angeles with a two-game lead in the Pac-10 standings and got swept by Southern California and UCLA. Williams scored a season-low eight points against the Trojans before rebounding with

15 points against the Bruins. The Wildcats hung on in their final two games to win the league's regular season title and Williams was named Pac-10 player of the year. Now, the sophomore from La Mirada is close to home again, this time for the biggest game of his college career. The fifth-seeded Wildcats (29-7) play the top-seeded Blue Devils (32-4) in the NCAA West Regional today at Honda Center. Arizona's goal is to knock off the defending national champions, whose .762 winning percentage in the NCAA Tournament is the best ever. "It's never to your advantage going against them in this tournament," second-year Arizona coach Sean Miller said.

Substance, not style, for Butler and Wisconsin

NEW ORLEANS — Butler's Matt Howard took a stroll down Bourbon Street on Tuesday night, experiencing a strip of restaurants, bars and hangouts known for lavish parties and excess. The senior forward knew within minutes that it wasn't his type of place. Too much flash. Too crazy. "It's not my personality, it's not what I like to do," Howard said. Howard, much like the Bulldogs, is more of a stoic, hardworking Midwestern guy. And when eighth-seeded Butler faces fourth-seeded Wisconsin in the NCAA Tournament regional semifinals tonight, there will be a lot of that on the floor at New Orleans Arena. It's worked for both programs. Wisconsin has become one of the most consistent teams in the country, making its fifth run to the round of 16 in the past 11 seasons. Butler is in the midst of a second straight deep run in March that included a trip to the national championship game last season, where the Bulldogs lost to Duke. Bonds' friend: I saw trainer holding syringe

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Barry Bonds looked at the witness stand with a blank expression as a childhood friend and former business partner described how baseball's biggest star walked into the master bedroom at his spring training home along with trainer Greg Anderson, who had a syringe with a needle. A few minutes later, Bonds and Anderson walked out. Steve Hoskins testified in federal court Wednesday that he never saw Anderson inject Bonds. The question for the jury will be whether Hoskins' description, which the defense began to challenge later in the day, is a path toward convicting Bonds of lying when he told a grand jury seven years ago he never knowingly took steroids. Speaking softly and fidgeting a bit in the witness chair, Hoskins gave the first dramatic testimony in the trial of the home-run king, who faces four counts of making false statements and one count of obstruction. Hoskins said he witnessed

scenes of Bonds and a needle-bearing Anderson entering a bedroom once or twice each spring training for three straight years starting in 2000. A partner with Bonds in a memorabilia business, Hoskins said the home-run hitter asked him to inquire about the effects of the steroid Winstrol in 1999, at around the time Bonds was having left elbow surgery April 20. Hoskins said he went to Dr. Arthur Ting, who is expected to testify later in the trial, and brought a sheet of information back to the slugger. Hoskins said he planned to go to Bobby Bonds, the defendant's father and a former major leaguer himself, to express his suspicions. "I was concerned in 1999 after speaking with Dr. Ting about it," Hoskins testified. "In 2003 I was even more concerned because it was getting — it just seemed to be getting out of hand." This was the period when Bonds noticeably bulked up and started posting unprece-

heavier and bigger." Bonds, in a lighter gray suit than previous days and a striped tie, took copious notes during the testimony of Hoskins, who followed federal agent Jeff Novitzky to the stand and became the second witness in a trial expected to last about a month. Both prosecutors and the defense played for the jury portions of a recording Hoskins secretly made of a conversation that took place in front of Bonds' locker in 2003. Hoskins said he put an Olympus digital recorder in a pocket and recorded Anderson "to show Bobby actually what really was going on."

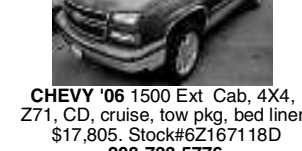

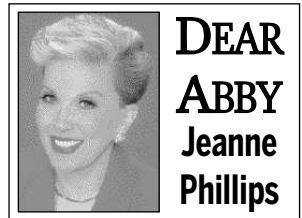
DEAR ABBY:
