The mold infestation at the Martin Street apartment wasn't a horror story of fuzzy, splotched walls, but it was bad enough for state Health and Welfare officials to move out the handicapped resident.

It was also bad enough that the cost would have kept any other mentally ill patient from making use of the transitional housing, which the local branch of the Idaho Department of Health and Welfare makes available through a partnership with the Valley House homeless shelter. That changed when REE-Construction stepped up to remove the mold, and in a move surprising to the Health and Welfare officials, even started

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Airline passenger traffic rises slightly at Friedman Memorial

KETCHUM (AP) - The number of travelers going through Friedman Memorial Airport in the Ketchum-Sun Valley resort area increased 2 percent this winter season compared to last year, officials say.

Officials tell the Idaho Mountain Express that the modest increase isn't bad considering a dry spell during January and February that may have caused some skiers and snowboarders to stay away.

"Travel to and from Sun Valley was consistent with years past," said Wes Horrocks, spokesman for SkyWest Airlines in St. George, Utah. "We at SkyWest are always pleased with the performance of the Salt Lake-Sun Val-



ley route. The success of the route and the support we receive from the community are important to us."

He said that overall numbers were down in December with 308 fewer passengers boarding in Hailey compared to the previous December.

In January, however, passenger traffic was up 9 percent compared to the previous year.

SkyWest plans to keep its seven daily flights between Salt Lake City and Sun Valley through March, then drop to five flights. The summer schedule, Horrocks said, hasn't been finalized. He said flights will likely increase as demand reaches its peak in July.

Seattle-based Horizon Airlines had a 7 percent improvement this winter compared to last year. The company's nonstop service from Los Angeles and Seattle ended as scheduled on March 20. Flights are set to resume for the summer season on May 27 and continue through Sept. 5.





"The accident could have been a lot worse if they were filled as densely as ours are," said Edwin Lyman, a physicist with the Union of Concerned Scientists.

The Nuclear Regulatory Commission, which oversees commercial reactors in the U.S., has launched a 90-day review of reactor safety and plans a deeper long-term examination of its regulations. The pools, considered by outside experts the most important nuclear energy safety issue, almost certainly will be part of that.

The U.S. now has about 65,000 tons of nuclear waste spread from the East Coast to the West Coast and from the northern woods to Mexican-border states. With growing anxiety, experts have debated the waste's short-term vulnerability to accident or terrorist attack and its long-term potential to leak into the environment through political neglect.

"U.S. operators are going to have to go back and rethink their decisions because of what happened in Japan," said Kevin Crowley, director of the board on radioactive waste management at the National Research Council, which advises the U.S. government.

Crowley led a 2005 study that reported that overloading the U.S. pools put them at risk if they were to lose cooling. The study considered a terror-

The industry says there is nothing to worry about.

"We believe the pools are safe," said Rod McCullum, director of used-fuel programs at the Nuclear Energy Institute, the industry's primary trade group. "It is not necessary to move the fuel. You don't gain a considerable amount of safety by moving to dry casks."

McCullum said that the U.S. pools have multiple layers of safety, including redundant cooling systems and leakage monitoring, though he declined to say

He said that fixing the fuel pool problem is a key step toward safer U.S. nuclear plants.





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Medicare rise could mean no Social Security COLA

WASHINGTON - Millions of retired and disabled people in the United States had better brace for another year with no increase in Social Security payments.

The government is projecting a slight cost-of-living adjustment for Social Security benefits next year, the first increase since 2009. But for most beneficiaries, rising Medicare premiums threaten to wipe out any increase in payments, leaving them without a raise for a third straight year.

About 45 million people – one in seven in the country – receive both Medicare and Social Security. By law, bene-raises. On the other hand, ficiaries have their Medicare most don't get pay cuts, ei-Part B premiums, which cover doctor visits, deducted from their Social Security payments each month.

HOW YOU MIGHT BE AFFECTED

WASHINGTON (AP) — Rising Medicare premiums threaten to wipe out increases in Social Security payments next year, leaving millions of retired and disabled Americans without a raise for the third straight year. 

'It never gets old," Bulldogs senior Matt Howard said.



Idaho's bitter division over ed reform won't go away anytime soon

n the spring of 1990, the debate over what was at the time the most restrictive abortion bill in the nation roiled Idaho and deeply polarized the state's citizens.

But it was nothing like the spring of 2011. Superintendent of Public Instruction Tom Luna's third and final education reform bill passed a deeply di $vided\,state\,Senate\,on\,Thursday\,and\,\bar{a}ppears\,headed\,for$ approval by the House of Representatives and Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter. It's hard to find any Idahoan these days without a strong opinion about the initiative, which eliminates teacher tenure, restricts bargaining rights, institutes merit pay and anticipates a vast investment in

Then-Gov. Cecil Andrus' veto of the abortion bill diffused the issue, but this year's controversy will linger. That's because every school district in Idaho and every student, teacher and parent — is going to be affected by its consequences.

State Sen. Dean Cameron, R-Rupert, in debating against Luna's third bill on Thursday, articulated some

 Consolidation of least-efficient school districts, and that means you, Magic Valley. The legislation will eventually cut \$10.8 million in funding from schools in seven counties — Twin Falls, Gooding, Lincoln, Shoshone, Payette, Canyon and Bingham.

Multi-year reduction in salary-based state funds,

• More entitlements. The three new entitlements Cameron said the bill creates in state law: online learning, dual credit for early graduates, and mobile computing devices for all high school teachers and students.

• **Unfunded mandates.** "... this bill does lock us in and does bind future legislators," Cameron said. "The bill contains inflators and deflators.... It ties the hands of (the Joint Finance-Appropriations Committee) and future legislators."

• Local control. "This bill lacks flexibility to school districts," Cameron said. "All the time it's giving flexibility, it takes money away."

Then there's the matter of committing the Legislature to come up with \$38 million the state doesn't have to fund merit pay next year. And the fact that local school districts will find themselves paying for technology with money that used to go to teachers.

Finally, there's the issue of class sizes — the major sticking point when this legislation was first introduced in January. They will almost certainly go up in many districts.

It's a fair bet that at the moment, at least as many Idahoans oppose the Luna reform initiative as support it. Wait 'til next year.

We need to start paying for war

et's get one thing straight: Wars cost money. Even the small ones. Already, the United States has spent hundreds of millions of dollars firing tomahawk missiles into Libya. Analysts say that the total price tag for the operation, if everything goes well and there's no escalation, could easily exceed a billion dollars. That's peanuts compared with our \$3.8 trillion budget. But it's not nothing.



A billion dollars, for instance, is more than 40 times the total NPR subsidies that inspired House Republicans to convene an emergency session of the Rules Committee to speed cuts along to the floor of Congress. That's not to say saving the lives of Libyans isn't a better investment than supporting All Things Considered, but it's real money, and because it's going to tomahawk missiles in Libya, it can't go to something else.

But for more than a decade now, we've waged war as if it were free, keeping our wars off the budget and, rather than paying for them as they were fought, slapping them on the national credit card. Paying as you go, after all, is hard. It forces you to make decisions about competing priorities. When you don't pay up front, those decisions become easy. And war should never be easy.

But before we can start paying for war, we need to account for it properly. You might recall Lawrence Lindsay, director of President George W. Bush's National Economics Council, being taken to the woodshed for estimating the costs of the Iraq War at \$200 billion when the administration was trying to sell the invasion as a \$50 billion venture. Both those numbers were tossed around like they were price tags for

the entire war. They weren't. They were estimates of its first six months. That's one way we lowball the costs of war: estimating them only a few months at a time. The Congressional Budget Office now says the tally is likely to total a trillion dollars.

Even that estimate, however, is far, far too low. It primarily counts "direct costs" what will be spent on soldiers and supply chains and weaponry over the course of the war. But what about the long-term care for veterans who return with brain injuries or mangled limbs? Or the expense of replacing the equipment that is destroyed or worn down in combat? What about the costs to the broader economy when the price of oil soars?

A few years ago, Harvard budget expert Linda Bilmes and Nobel Prize-winning economist Joseph Stiglitz set out to construct a more holistic estimate of the costs of the Iraq War. They ended up nearer to \$3 trillion, and they were trying to be conserva-

don't pay up front, those decisions become easy." tive. For those playing along at home, that's about equal to every dollar of debt Bush piled up in his eight years as president.

Honest budgeting serves a purpose beyond making sure revenue matches spending. "My Nobel Prize was in the economics of information," Stiglitz said in a 2008 speech presenting these findings. "Information affects decisions." The debate leading up to these exchanges can be hot, emotional and polarizing. The numbers on the page and the trade-offs they demand – are as close to rational as the political process can get. That's the point of them. By forcing us to make the tough decisions, they help us make good decisions.

Gordon Adams, a senior White House budget official for national security, points out that historically the practice of paying for war through off-budget legislation called "emergency supplementals" was governed by a few clear standards: They had to be modest, unanticipated expenditures for conflicts that were not expected to run long. The Bush administration turned them into massive, predictable expenditures serving two of the longestrunning wars in American history - and didn't even allow them to distract us from tax cuts.

Two simple reforms to the process would go a long way toward giving the American people - not to mention Congress — the information necessary to make wise decisions about war. First, cost projections should be required for a range of scenarios - not just optimistic estimates of a quick war with no casualties, but pessimistic estimates of a long war requiring a grinding occupation.

Second, war has to cost money while it's being fought. The way we decide whether something is worth it is to test whether we're willing to pay for it. If a war is not worth a tax, or spending cuts, then perhaps it is not worth doing at all. It's understandable that the administration might need to act before offsets can be found, but only for the early days of a conflict. After that, it should have the money in



QUAKE OFF JAPAN SPARKS ALERT

NEW YORK (AP) — A magnitude-6.5 earthquake shook eastern Japan off the quake-ravaged coast on Monday morning, the U.S. Geological Survey reported, prompting Japan to issue a tsunami alert.

There were no immediate reports of damage or injuries, but the Japan Meteorological Agency announced that a tsunami of up to 1.6 feet may wash into Miyagi Prefecture.

The tsunami alert was localized to Japan. The U.S. Pacific Tsunami Warning Center said no wave was expected in Hawaii or on the U.S. west coast.

The alert was prompted by a quake that the U.S. Geological Survey measured at 7:23 a.m. Monday Japan time near the east coast of Honshu.





BRUSSELS - NATO will assume command of all aerial operations in Libya from the U.S.-led force that has been conducting air strikes against Moammar Gadhafi's forces, officials said Sun-

NATO jets on Sunday already began enforcing the no-fly zone, Secretary-General Anders Fogh Rasmussen announced. Diplomats said the full transfer of authority would take several

"NATO allies have decided to take on the whole military operation in Libya under the U.N. Security Council resolution," Fogh Rasmussen said in a statement. "NA-TO will implement all aspects of the U.N. resolution. Nothing more, nothing less."

The North Atlantic Council - the alliance's top body - took two hours to approve a plan to expand a previously agreed mission to enforce the U.N. arms embargo and no-fly zone. It agreed to protect civilians from attack - which effectively means bombing Gadhafi's forces if they are threatening to harm the civilian population.

The U.N. authorized the operation after Gadhafi launched attacks against anti-government

protesters who demanded that he step down after 42 vears in power

"In the past week, we have put together a complete package of operations in support of the U.N. resolution by sea and by air," Fogh Rasmussen said.

After eight days of strikes on Libyan targets, Washington is eager to quickly hand off responsibility for the air offensive to the alliance.

New radiation machine gives Magic Valley cancer patients new options

When Fay Parrott received radiation for breast cancer 11 years ago, her treatment lasted nearly two months. The once-a-week radiation targeted her breast area and lymph nodes in her throat.

Although the treatment successfully got rid of the cancer, there were longterm complications.


"They moved a few degrees away from my throat and caught the shoulder," the Buhl woman explained. Eventually, Parrott had to get a shoulder replacement.

But starting this spring for some Magic Valley cancer patients, the time and complications associated with radiation treatments could be reduced. Mountain States Tumor Institute at St. Luke's Magic Valley Medical Center has acquired a new linear accelerator machine that uses Novalis technology to deliver concentrated doses of radiation to kill tumors in less time. The new linear accelerator, made by Varian Medical Systems, is scheduled to be available when St. Luke's new Twin Falls hospital opens in May.

During traditional radiation therapy, tumors are targeted with circular beams of low doses over the course of several weeks. With the Novalis technology, the radiation beams change shape to fit the sometimes abnormal tumors, and higher doses mean less time spent in the tumor institute. The same machine can do both lowdose traditional radiation therapy and the high-dose targeted radiosurgery, depending on a patient's needs. The machine can also do both stereotactic radiosurgery, or precise, localized treatment within the brain, and stereotactic body radiation therapy, or treatment for tumors within the body.

Twin Falls' current linear accelerator, at MSTI's current location, can do only radiosurgery, while another machine takes care of the traditional radiation therapy.

The new linear accelerator already installed at the hospital under construction – will join the one MSTI already uses. The tumor institute plans to use the current linear accelerator to treat patients for a few weeks after the new hospital opens this spring. Then it will be dismantled, brought to the new hospital and rebuilt, giving doctors even more options to treat cancer patients.



Smith didn't have exact numbers on complications but said they're uncommon.

The Novalis technology isn't for every oncology patient. In some cases, traditional radiation's smaller doses over a longer time may be the better option. Lopshire declined to give examples, saying that it depends on the location and size of the tumor.

"It is a patient-by-patient, case-by-case decision," he said.

Future docs may have to pass new breast exam test

CHICAGO - Women often find it somewhat mysterious to do a breast exam. It also can be mysterious to medical students, says a Chicago researcher who has a \$1.8 million federal grant to design the first physical test to measure how well future doctors examine breasts by touch and find possible can-

She says doctors don't want to talk about it, but they all know a colleague who's missed a cancer during a breast exam, or they've missed one themselves. Pugh, 45, is a surgeon with a doctorate in education and a patent in sensor technology. Her team includes experts in mechanical engineering, computer science, statistics and medical education.

"What if there were a test and you had to meet a minimum level of proficiency before you could do breast exams and say you're competent?" she asks. That might lead to better exams and more accurate diagnoses, she says.

That's fine during the day screen light was designed to mimic the tones of daylight. But my screen time lasts long after dark. And that's the problem.

Humans respond to darkness by producing melatonin, the hormone that regulates the sleep cycle. But our lightsensitive pineal gland near the center of the brain responds to blue light by suppressing melatonin, causing us to wake up.

At 45, DeEtte Sauer was a dead woman walking.

She was morbidly obese, her heart disease so serious a doctor warned her to expect "an event at any time." Eaten up by her marketing career, struggling to raise three kids, she smoked, drank and never.

ever exercised. Sauer remembers a vacation when - at 5-foot-5 and 230 pounds - she couldn't make it onto a small boat for a day out with her family. "That's when it hit me. I was an elected cripple. I had done it to myself?"

She got busy, slowly shedding the weight through sensible eating and exercise. She began to walk around her Houston neighborhood, then she discovered the pool. Now 69, the woman who once had a supermom complex is a competitive, medal-winning senior swimmer.

"It literally saved my life," Sauer said, adding that her best event is the butterfly -astroke she learned at age 62.

To trainers with lots of clients well beyond 50, Sauer is the holy grail, somebody who works hard and efficiently, taking care to avoid injury while maintaining motivation, strength and endurance through careful workouts. Getting fit later in life is one thing, they said, but staying that way at 60, 70 and 80 is another.

"Going from running to walking, going from the treadmill to the elliptical as we age. It can be really frustrating, mentally debilitating," said Chris Freytag, a yoga and Pilates instructor and contributing fitness editor for Prevention magazine.

"Even for me. I'm 45 and say oh God, I can just see it coming. There's going to be some wear and tear. That doesn't mean I have to give up, but I have to make some changes."

Tor Helness of Norway and Geir Helgemo have been ranked as one of the best pairs in the world for 15 years. But Tor's other regular partner is not nearly as well-known, his wife, Gunn.

At the 2nd European Open Championships in 2005, Gunn and Tor swept the field in the mixed events. In the most recent Open Championships, held in Antalya, Turkey, Gunn unerringly found the only defense to defeat South's three-no-trump contract, arrived at after South had shown length in clubs and control in spades.

Gunn, on lead, chose a low spade, which went to the three, queen and king. Had declarer won the trick with the ace, West might have been left in doubt as to the location of the spade king. However, if it was East who possessed the diamond ace, winning with the spade king was maybe the right choice.

The point is that declarer has eight tricks on top, and if a ninth could be sneaked through before the defenders could signal the location of their assets, the game would come home.

At trick two, declarer did indeed lead a diamond. Gunn Helness was quick to rise with the ace, and just as quick to return the correct technical card to break the contract — the heart jack. This is the "surround" play, made on the assumption that South held the heart 10, as he did (whether doubleton or tripleton). Whatever declarer did, the defenders could run the heart suit on defense.

ANSWER: Your diamonds suggest you try to take tricks in that suit, rather than risk setting up a heart discard for declarer. If you do lead a diamond, there is a lot to be said for leading the queen. For sure, if it holds, you ought to know from the sight of dummy what to do next. If instead you lead a heart, the seven is the right card here, since partner knows you rate to have more than two cards in that suit.
