Dem lawmakers begin protest tactics

Party sees revenue in hike of cigarette tax, wants hearing

BOISE — Idaho's minority Democrats on Wednesday began their bid to force hearings on their proposals for a cigarette tax hike

and a referendum on public schools chief Tom Luna's education reforms.

Their first move: forcing bills to be read in their entirety, a stall tactic meant to slow progress to a crawl as lawmakers near the end of the 2011 Legislature. The arduous readings continued into the afternoon.

The Democrats say they are forced to resort to these procedural maneuvers to make their point because they are outnumbered 57-13 and the Republican majority has

refused to schedule debate for the proposed education referendum and bill to raise the cigarette tax by \$1.25.

"There's an easy way," said House Minority Leader John Rusche, D-Lewiston, following this first protest salvo. "All we are asking is they give people a chance to be heard on issues that are of great importance to them. We're hoping they realize it's up to them."

Closed primary bill wins Senate approval

New law allows younger Idahoans to give blood

One unit of blood has the potential to impact three lives, according to American Red Cross officials. Thanks to a bill that was signed into law last week, Idahoans as young as 16 will soon be able to change those lives — allowed to give blood with parental permission.

"We want to introduce youth to our programs because they are healthy, young adults," said Debbi Mahler, Red Cross donor recruitment rep-

resentative. "It's a good opportunity for them and it is proven that if they donate in high school, they'll come back and be lifelong donors."

College of Southern Idaho student group Latinos Unidos hosted a Red Cross blood drive for students and community members on Wednesday and Thursday. Andrea Juarez-Tapia, 20, helped out at the sign-in table but wasn't able to give blood after recently getting a tattoo.

About the law

On March 23, Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter signed into law a bill allowing Idahoans age 16 to donate blood to voluntary, non-paying blood drives with parental consent.

Already law: Minors age 17 can donate blood to such drives without parental consent.

Xavier attorney: Fulcher withheld information

Principal was singled out by former board chairman, lawyer says

Xavier Charter School's reasoning for suspending Principal Cindy Fulcher came to light Wednesday in a day-long public hearing to determine whether she'll keep her job at the Twin Falls charter school.

Xavier attorney Diane Tappen said the main source of conflict between Xavier's board and its principal centered on Fulcher's decision to withhold information about a potential hire while she sought trustee approval. Fulcher was placed on paid administrative leave in August and later sued the school's board in an attempt to keep it from firing her.

Tappen presented her case against Fulcher to hearing officer Rich Carlson and a panel of former educators — Kay Jones, Terry Nelson and Mary Gervase — as a provision of an out-of-court settlement of Fulcher's lawsuit. Attorney John Bradley represented Fulcher at the hearing at the Red Lion Hotel Canyon Springs in Twin Falls.

The panel will make a recommendation on Fulcher's employment status, which Xavier's board will still need to vote on in its own public

What's next

Lawyers representing both Xavier Charter School and Principal Cindy Fulcher presented their arguments Wednesday in front of an independent panel that will decide Fulcher's employment future with the Twin Falls charter school.

What's next: Both sides have until 5 p.m. Tuesday to present the panel with post-hearing arguments. The date of the panel's decision is undetermined.

What will the decision will do:

The panel will direct Xavier's board on how to vote when determining if Fulcher is fired or stays at the school. That vote must still occur at a public meeting of the charter school's board.

SCCAP to lay off 20 workers

Loss of stimulus cash hurts organization

The barrage of home weatherization spearheaded by the South Central Community Action Partnership over the past two years is about to end, with the last of its federal stimulus dollars about to be spent.

SCCAP received a more-than \$4 million, three-year contract to weatherize homes of low-income area residents through the stimulus program, starting in 2009. It finished the contract in two years and weatherized 721 homes — more than twice its normal number —

while hiring and training 23 people.

The rest of the stimulus cash zeroes out today, and with it 20 people will lose their jobs weatherizing homes.

"We did what the project was designed to accomplish," SCCAP Executive Director Ken Robinette said. "We put people to work, we gave them new skills they could take to the work force and we reduced energy consumption in older homes."

He said SCCAP is working with the Idaho Department of Labor to find new jobs for the workers. It is also hosting a farewell luncheon for the crew at the Golden Corral today, an event Robinette expects to be somber.

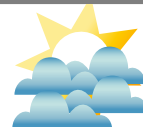

Anniversary flight to Gulf oil disaster site planned

NEW ORLEANS — The owner of the rig that exploded in the Gulf of Mexico nearly one year ago is quietly arranging to fly relatives of the 11 men who died out to the disaster site on the anniversary next month.

Four families told The Associated Press they've been notified in telephone calls and emails about

Transocean's plans for a morning flyover at sea and a private evening memorial service on land.

Shelley Anderson, whose husband was killed, said the helicopter will circle the site a few times and return to shore. Space is being limited to three people per family.

The families would then be flown from Louisiana to Houston for the service. A Transocean spokesman has not commented on the fly-over.

One bill on Wednesday — a normally innocuous measure meant to clarify when somebody is officially medically indigent — took an hour for a House staff member to read before a quick 67-3 approval.

Democrats argue increasing the cigarette tax would reduce smoking rates, especially among youths, and raise about \$50 million to soften the blow of cuts to state education and Medicaid programs.

And with the proposed education referendum, Democrats are demanding the opportunity to debate whether the Legislature should put a 2012 vote before the public on Luna education reforms that seek to increase Internet education, remove teacher job protections and restrict collective bargaining rights.

"There are really good public policy reasons to consider this, and not to be able to present this is really a perversion of the process," Rusche said, contending GOP lawmakers are gutting government in their zeal to pass partisan legislation without giving a big share of Idaho residents a chance to weigh in.

Republicans argue there's no reason to introduce the cigarette tax hike in the House Revenue and Taxation Committee because there aren't enough votes

on that panel to even introduce it.

They called a press conference after this procedural standoff began to chide the Democrats for potentially delaying the session's end, adding \$30,000 each day lawmakers remain in Boise.

Rep. Erik Simpson, R-Idaho Falls, said he came to Boise to hold the line on taxes, not raise them. Democrats lost five seats in November's election, a sign of broad approval for this approach, he said.

"Voters sent us a clear, clear message," Simpson said. "I think we are following through."

And there's little willingness among Republicans to give Democrats a public forum to attack Luna's education reforms that have passed so far on nearly party-line votes in the House.

In fact, Republicans are actually trying to speed up the reforms, introducing a proposal on Wednesday to enact them immediately in a bid to take the wind out of any campaign meant to block them from taking effect before a ballot measure could go before voters in November 2012.

That's an indication that the GOP majority is at least taking the notion of a referendum seriously, but Rep. Bob Nonini, R-Coeur d'Alene and chairman of the House Education Committee, said the matter has been debated thoroughly already.

"It's definitely really important because it is something people really need," she said. "We are working on making this an annual thing. It's been really successful so far."

The group's goal was to get 160 units of blood. Mahler said 250 units are used every day in Idaho to meet hospital needs. Only 38 percent of the U.S. population is eligible to donate due to weight requirements, recent piercings or tattoos, low iron levels or international travel. Of that population, only 8 percent donates blood, according to Red Cross statistics.

Donor Recruitment Manager Jane Stutzman said the Greater Idaho Chapter of the Red Cross anticipates allowing 16-year-olds to give blood will increase donations by 10 percent. Stutzman said 39 other states have passed similar laws for younger donors, adding that many high school students have expressed interest in donating.

The bill passed through both the Idaho House and the Senate unanimously and will go into effect in July.

Mahler said giving blood is easy and only takes an hour to complete the process of pre-screening, donating and recovery.

Audrey DiPietro, a first-time donor, said her experience was extremely efficient and professional. The 28-year-old Twin Falls woman said she would have given blood earlier but lived abroad in the

past and had a few misconceptions of who could donate.

"I will definitely give again, just because of the fact that you are saving possibly three lives because of how they separate blood," she said.

meeting to make formal. The panel's decision isn't expected until after Tuesday's deadline for lawyers from both sides to submit post-hearing arguments.

On Wednesday morning, Tappen claimed that Fulcher withheld from the board information about a recommended hire, identified as former New Mexico teacher Douglas Allen Fisher. Tappen said Fisher's teaching certification was previously revoked as punishment for his viewing of pornographic materials at a school he worked at, a detail she said Fulcher failed to provide the board before it approved his hire. Tappen also alleged that Fulcher allowed Fisher to remain unsupervised in a classroom with students during a visit to Xavier, which Tappen said jeopardized student safety. According to online court records, Fisher has never faced criminal charges for his actions nor been considered a sex offender.

Bradley didn't refute Tappen's claims, but opened his argument by saying Xavier administration was understaffed and Fulcher dedicated upward of 60 hours a week to her job. He emphasized that she created a warm, creative atmosphere for students and teachers. Bradley said Fisher's license had been revoked 12 years earlier and he had gone through extensive counseling, but did not have certification from the state to teach.

Xavier music teacher Kimberly Kokx testified that she had prepared her

choir class for competition, but unfamiliar Idaho High School Activities Association fees and application processing time precluded the class from doing so. Fisher was recommended to Xavier as an adjudicator for the choir to critique and teach them in place of the competition.

Kokx raved about his performance to Fulcher and the two women interviewed him for an open band teacher position on May 5, 2010. Fisher had given them both notice of his revoked teaching certification but said he was led to believe he would be able to get an Idaho license after talking to state officials.

Fulcher thought Fisher would do a good job, Bradley said, and recommended him to the board without informing them of Fisher's decertification because she did not want his information spread around by former Board Chairman Jeff Bulkley.

"Mr. Bulkley was doing everything on earth to get her fired because he didn't like Mrs. Fulcher," Bradley said. "He is a horrible blabbermouth."

Bulkley resigned from Xavier's board in December.

Teresa Berry, current board chairwoman, said the board is responsible for the teachers at the school and the safety and welfare of the students.

"We should have known his certification was revoked. I would have liked more background information," Berry said.

According to Xavier's bylaws, the school board has the power to hire and specify the duties of the school's employees. The bylaws don't mention who, or if anyone is responsible for checking the backgrounds of potential employees.

When asked how Fulcher's decision to withhold information affected the board, Berry said, "I was worrying about whether or not she was providing all of the information. It impacted my trust."

Trust between the board and Fulcher was a reoccurring theme throughout the day.

Kokx said she didn't consider Bulkley trustworthy because she had heard him speak freely of things that should have been kept in confidence. She said Fisher was never left alone with students in the band room on his interview day. Fisher also testified and said the substitute band teacher and a volunteer were present in the room the entire time he was on school grounds.

SCCAP's losses don't stop with personnel: Robinette said the Jerome office will be forced to close also, a direct result of the organization's impending funding crunch. He said the organization felt it was better to put the cost of office rental toward helping community members. He said a roving office, possibly based out of Gooding, is in the works, though its creation is still not guaranteed.

Jerome and other Magic Valley residents can still seek support at SCCAP's Twin Falls and Burley offices.

The overall outlook for the organization is "a little bleak" right now, Robinette said, as funding issues loom beyond just the loss of stimulus cash. The first week in April leads up to a particular question mark as Congress' latest spending resolution is set to expire April 8. Robinette said other federal funding that SCCAP depends on may be on the chopping block.

"On April 1 ... we do not have a contract. April 8, who knows," Robinette said. "We are pretty much at the mercy of Congress."

Former Castleford secretary again faces grand theft charges

Charges of embezzlement are again looming over former Castleford School District secretary Brenda S. Thomson.

Thomson, who handled the books at the district, is accused of overpaying herself \$18,800 over three years and incurring another \$16,000 in fees and lost payments. She was arraigned Wednesday in Twin Falls County 5th District Court on charges of grand theft.

Her original charges were dismissed by prosecutors in October.

Hill pleads to meth trafficking

Jeremy T. Hill will spend his 40th birthday in prison.

The 34-year-old Twin Falls man entered an Alford plea to trafficking in methamphetamine and will spend the next 6 1/2 years in prison. He entered his plea and was sentenced on Monday.

An Alford plea means Hill does not admit guilt, but acknowledges prosecutors have enough evidence for a conviction. He will also pay more than \$10,000 in fines and court fees.

County sheriff's deputies awoke him, he acted suspiciously, according to court records. When Hill's car was searched, deputies found 84.2 grams of methamphetamine.

As part of the plea agreement, a possession charge was dismissed. Hill still faces charges of leaving the scene of an accident and possession of drugs and paraphernalia in Ada County.

Electrician hurt at Jackpot casino

JACKPOT, Nev. — An Idaho electrician sustained severe injuries Tuesday after part of an air conditioning unit she was working on at Cactus Petes Resort Casino started moving.

According to a statement from Elko County sheriff's detective Cpl. Jim

Carpenter, Rebecca Page, 49, of Boise was working on a heating, ventilation and air conditioning unit with two motors. The unit Page was working on was locked out but the other motor turned on, causing the pulley and motor Page was working on to start turning. Carpenter said Page was caught and pulled through the pulley and belts.

Page sustained serious injuries and

was flown to Saint Alphonsus Regional Medical Center in Boise for treatment. She was later transferred to University of Utah Medical Center in Salt Lake City.

As of Wednesday, Page was listed in critical condition. The Occupational Safety and Health Administration is assisting the sheriff's office with the investigation. Page is employed by LEA Electric.

No charges for officers who shot suspect

LEWISTON (AP) — Three police officers won't face charges for shooting a Lewiston bank robbery suspect, the Nez Perce County prosecutor said.

Prosecutor Dan Spickler said Tuesday the officers were justified in firing multiple shots at 69-year-old David L. Payton after the Feb. 3 robbery of a US Bank. Payton was critically injured by at least five gunshots after police say he pointed a .38-caliber gun at the officers and did not listen to their commands.

"They acted very professionally and, in every instance, very strictly within the law of use of deadly force," Spickler said.

The shooting happened about 15 minutes after police say Payton held up the downtown bank at gunpoint and left with about \$3,000.

Police have not said

whether Payton fired any shots. No officers were injured. Police said the money has not been recovered.

Spickler said he based his decision not to bring charges on an Idaho State Police investigation that included video as well as reports of the shooting that occurred on the Lewiston Levee Bypass.

"It was absolutely clear they were justified in using deadly force," Spickler said.

The three men — Lewiston police Lt. Michael Pedersen, Sgt. Ted Piche and Nez Perce County sheriff's Sgt. John Hilderbrand — have returned to work.

The two agencies also conducted internal investigations. Lewiston Police Chief Steven Orr said the investigation found the officers did not violate department policy.

"We did not have any doubts that it would turn

out any other way," said Nez Perce County Sheriff Dale Buttrey.

The Lewiston Tribune reports that Payton has been discharged from a Seattle hospital after a seven-week stay. Orr said Tuesday that Payton is recovering at home.

CSI board takes welcome step toward accountability

Last fall, candidates Bob Keegan and Karl Kleinkopf ran for the College of Southern Idaho board of trustees on the promise of being upfront about the way the school awards contracts.

On Monday, they — and the other three members of the CSI board — delivered.

Trustees approved forming a selection committee to choose who will design and build the college’s planned \$1 million Head Start building in Jerome.

The Twin Falls college and its board have rightly been criticized for lack of transparency in the past when hiring building contractors.

In the spring of 2009, CSI trustees approved a recommendation from the school’s administration to hire builder Starr Corp. and architect/engineer CTA to oversee design and construction of a major new campus building.

Nine other firms or partnerships also submitted proposals for the \$6.5 million wind energy instruction building and a remodel of the Desert Building.

But memos, plans and other documents obtained by the *Times-News* showed that Starr Corp. and CTA were involved in the wind energy building project as early as January 2009, and were being called CSI’s “design-build team” well before the college opened the competition to any others.

Many of the passed-over contractors subsequently said they would not have applied at all if they had known of Starr\CTA’s involvement.

This year, Vice President of Administration Mike Mason said past selection processes showed bias toward firms that previously successfully completed projects for the college. The current trustees expressed a desire to change the selection method previously used for choosing architects and other building professionals.

The new selection committee will consist of Keegan, Head Start Director Mary Marshall, Region IV Development project director Jeff McCurdy and retired CSI employee Darrell Buffalo. Those four will choose a fifth committee member.

At a March 15 board workshop, Idaho Division of Public Works representative Elaine Hill recommended the board choose the Legislature’s preferred process of bidding out each facet of the building’s design and construction.

Board Chairman Thad Scholes said trustees decided to follow Hill’s recommendation and to also use different selection committee members.

The new Head Start building and the Applied Technology and Innovation Center will both use the recommended method.

“We are just looking for assurances,” Scholes said. “I don’t think there was anything wrong with the process before, but we want to be as open as we think we are. We aren’t looking for a different result — just more transparency for the public.”

That’s public accountability as it should be, and it’s a welcome change from past CSI practices.

Perceptions are vital when spending the taxpayers’ money, especially by an institution as central to south-central Idaho’s economy and way of life as CSI. The board’s appointment of the selection committee goes a long way toward reinforcing CSI’s credibility.

The costs of smaller classrooms

That class size should be small is revered like an article of faith in this country. Its adherents include parents, education groups, politicians and, of course, the unions whose ranks it swells. In many states it is even required by law, which has lead to millions of dollars in fines against schools in Florida and a lawsuit against New York City by its teachers union.

Yet small class size is neither a guarantor nor a prerequisite of educational excellence.

The worst public elementary school in Manhattan, 16 percent of whose students read at grade level, has an average class size of 21; PS 130, one of the city’s best, has an average class size of 30. Small class size is one factor in academic success. The question, then, is whether the educational benefits of class-size reduction justify the costs.

Some proponents contend that because research shows reducing class size is beneficial, spending on this should be prioritized over anything that is unsupported by research. That’s a neat rhetorical trick but unsound logic. The absence of research on, say, teacher salaries doesn’t prove that we should pay the minimum wage to teachers to dramatically reduce class size. Research should guide spending decisions only if it measures the benefits per dollar of spending on all alternatives.

At Harlem Success Academy Charter School, where we’ve gotten some of the best results in New York City, some classes are comparatively large because we believe our money is better



spent elsewhere. In fifth grade, for example, every student gets a laptop and a Kindle with immediate access to an essentially unlimited supply of e-books. Every classroom has a Smart Board, a modern blackboard that is a touch-screen computer with high-speed Internet access. Every teacher has a laptop, video camera, access to a catalog of lesson plans and videotaped lessons.

Outfitting a classroom this way costs about \$40,000, or \$13,500 amortized over three years. That’s how much New York charter schools receive per pupil annually, so we can afford this by just increasing class size by a single student.

Add just one more student per class schoolwide, and Harlem Success Academy I gets another \$300,000 in total. With that, we can afford headhunters to find the best principals in the country, business managers to handle the non-instructional administration that would otherwise distract these great principals from driving high-quality instruction, ample professional development for teachers, museum trips for students, etc.

In other words, a 19th-century school can be transformed into a well-managed

21st-century school by adding just two students per classroom. Reducing class size is expensive because most costs vary with class size. Decrease a class from 25 to 24 students and you need to hire 4 percent more teachers as well as build and maintain 4 percent more buildings.

Obsession with class size is causing many public schools to look like relics. We spend so much to employ lots of teachers that there isn’t enough left to help these teachers be effective. According to the city’s education department, New York public schools spend on average less than 3 percent of their budgets on instructional supplies and equipment (1 percent), textbooks (0.6 percent), library books and librarians (0.5 percent), and computer support (0.5 percent). Basic supplies are rationed in absurd ways: A school will pay \$5 million in salaries to teachers who end up wasting time writing on blackboards because the school has run out of paper that costs a penny a page.

This parsimony is particularly unfortunate because, while employees become more expensive every year, technology and intellectual property become cheaper

and better. Instructional software improves, computers become more powerful, good children’s books multiply.

Take e-books. Any parent whose child has gotten hooked on Harry Potter knows that many children are natural, even addictive, readers. They are more likely to read prodigiously if they have immediate and unlimited access to books, so. This can be done by giving students an e-reader stuffed with 100 books. Such devices can be passed on to other students and the long-term cost is no greater than buying books in hard copy.

Overspending on class-size reduction is particularly unconscionable in tough fiscal times. We need to invest in ways that will help teachers be more effective, such as professional development, technology, school leadership and abundant curricular materials. Spending in these areas, already too low, should not be cut further in blind adherence to the cult of small class size.

So why does Cecil promote even more dangerous nuclear projects as a lobbyist? Why did Cecil endorse the first deal change with Butch, which left more than 90 percent of the buried plutonium in this flood zone over our water?

Why is Idaho stuck with the melted Three Mile Island core and importing spent fuel, while Nevada successfully defended its state’s right to not be a waste dump? The answer is simple. Nevada denied the federal government any State Air Quality permit. State Air Quality permits are the only power of denial a state has, and all Republicans and Democrats in Nevada fought to defend their state.

1. Re-insert the requirement for accident analysis into our State Air Quality permits. Deny permits that could exceed the legal annual limit of 10 millirem.

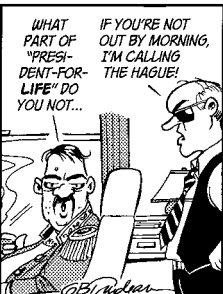
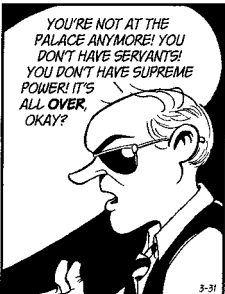
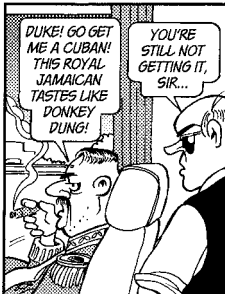

... managing wolves

Environmental groups and the Obama administration agreed (earlier this month) to turn over management of gray wolf populations in Idaho and Montana to the states and lift the species' protections under the Endangered Species Act.

In the future, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service agreed, it will address the delisting of wolves regionally, rather than on a state-by-state basis. If approved by a federal judge, both states could resume wolf hunts, but the animal temporarily keeps its protections in Wyoming, Oregon, Washington and Utah.

The deal also calls for the service to set up a scientific panel to re-examine wolf recovery goals that called for a minimum of 300 wolves in the region, which wildlife advocates say is inadequate.

A recent wolf census found that the number of wolves in the region fell by about 5 percent in 2010, to 1,651. It was the first such decrease in population since the animal was reintroduced 15 years ago.

Despite the losses, we believe wolves have recovered to the point that their protections under the Endangered Species Act could be removed.

However, we believe it should only be done with a responsible management plan that ensures the long term viability of the animal in the region — and we question whether the governments of Idaho and Montana are capable of that.

Both governments have made their disdain for the wolf abundantly clear, and seem to have taken up with the “smoke a pack a day,” “kill ‘em all” and “shoot, shovel and shut up” crowds ...

These aren't people we can trust to manage wolves responsibly.

... closed primaries

Anyone who's seen the picture of General Douglas MacArthur lording over the defeated Japanese on the deck of the USS Missouri at the close of World War II can appreciate the plight of Idaho's moderate Republicans.

The moderates are the guys seated at the table, signing surrender terms.

The terms may be generous in the short term. The long term, however, beckons



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the slow but certain strangulation of the pragmatic, centrist-oriented wing of Idaho's dominant political party.

Already under siege from the ideological faction that gave you bills to nullify the U.S. Constitution and put a gun in every college student's hand, Idaho's moderate Republicans lost the war earlier this month. U.S. District Judge B. Lynn Winmill said the party apparatchiks could close the state's GOP primary to all but card-carrying Republican voters.

Until now, Idaho's primary was open to all — Democrats and independents voted where the action was, in the GOP races. That tended to help moderates, but only on the margins. Even with an open primary, conservatives have whittled down the people they ridicule as Republicans in Name Only.

Introduced in the Senate, the new primary bill offers moderates only a few concessions.

For instance, there's certainty. With the rules of the game now set, they can plan a year ahead for the 2012 primary.

It also eases the way for independents to vote in the primary by allowing unaffiliated voters to register as Republicans at the polls.

For the party hierarchy, the plan makes it harder for a Democrat to get involved in the GOP contests.

It further gives the GOP leadership rather than the state's elected representatives the authority to decide whether to tighten or loosen the rules governing who can participate in the primary.

Here's how it will play out: Armed with more campaign cash and greater familiarity among voters, moderate incumbents have a fighting chance to survive by mobilizing their own GOP supporters and possibly some unaffiliated voters to help them in the primary.

Still, it's a big question how many independent voters



will be so uncomfortable declaring a party affiliation that they will stay home. In a low-turnout election already dominated by the rank-and-file partisans, even a small decline in independent turnout could make a difference.

It goes double whenever a moderate official retires. In a primary race for an open seat, the rules of the game heavily favor the conservative. So over time, you're going to see fewer people such as Sen. Joe Stegner, R-Lewiston, or Majority Leader Bart Davis, R-Idaho Falls, and more people such as Rep. Phil Hart, R-Athol, and Vito Barbieri, R-Dalton Gardens.

Unless, of course, you act ...

But there's absolutely nothing stopping Idaho vot-

ers from emulating Washington, and now California, by adopting a top-two primary. Rather than nominate candidates from each party, voters winnow down the finalists for November.

In the rapidly diminishing places where Idaho's parties are competitive, you would end up with a Democrat and Republican opposing each other in November. In heavily Republican Canyon or Bonneville counties, two Republicans would square off in the fall. In Blaine County or Boise's north end, it's possible two Democrats would go forward into November ...

Don't count on the Legislature to do this. Voters, acting through the initiative process, would have to demand a top two primary ...

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House committee passes tax break for wind power

BOISE — Wind energy developers with projects nearing completion are closer to winning tens of millions of dollars in tax breaks after a legislative committee voted Wednesday to send a bill backed by Idaho Power Co. and other utilities to the House floor.

The measure was approved on a 12-5 vote in the House Revenue Taxation Committee. It includes extending the rebate for geothermal, manure digesters and other alternative energy projects until 2014.

There had been competing bills, with House Majority Caucus Chairman Ken Roberts favoring removing wind from the rebate deal. He argued the industry has firmly established itself in the state, with hundreds of megawatts of projects either on line or due to be built in coming months, potentially boosting costs for ratepayers.

But the advocacy of House Assistant Majority Leader Scott Bedke helped sway the final vote. He spent recent weeks acting as a diplomat between the utilities and wind developers who started on opposite sides but wound up supporting the bill.

The compromise was backed by utilities only because it includes provisions that force all future wind and solar projects to negotiate prices with power companies, rather than demand an attractive, state-mandated rate.

"This is not a pell-mell extension of the wind rebate," Bedke said. "From now on, solar and wind in the state of Idaho is going to be negotiated. It's not going to be forced into someone's portfolio."

The original sales tax rebate was passed in 2005 and will likely result in well over \$50

million in tax breaks, mostly for big wind farms.

With the extension, alternative energy developers that buy equipment to directly generate electricity would get their 6 percent sales tax payments back from Idaho, provided their projects are operating by Dec. 31, 2014.

But wind developers must win contracts for their power by this Oct. 31, meaning projects that aren't nearing completion won't qualify. Wind industry lobbyists told lawmakers that some projects nearing the finish line have been counting on the sales tax rebate — and could be scuttled if the four-month extension isn't approved.

"The projects that are in the queue are projects that calculated their financial and their construction costs based upon both the federal subsidy but also in particular the sales tax rebate," said Roy Eiguren, lobbyist for Exergy Development Group. "It's all back to the calculations that were made at the time the projects were conceived."

In exchange for giving ground on this, utilities demanded limits on the size of future wind and solar projects

that could take advantage of a 1978 federal law meant to promote alternative energy by guaranteeing them a state-mandated rate for their electricity. If this bill passes, they could be no larger than 100 kilowatts, or 100 times smaller than the previous standard, to qualify.

Larger projects will have to negotiate with utilities if they want them to buy their electrons.

Here's why: Idaho Power Co. contends big wind developers like Exergy and its financial partner, General Electric Co., carved up enormous turbine farms into separate-but-interconnected 10 megawatt projects southern Idaho to force their way onto the grid, rather than having to negotiate agreements. Rich Hahn, the Boise-based utility's lobbyist, says this is raising costs for customers.

"We believe this is a better fit," Hahn said, of Wednesday's measure. "It will take into consideration the unique characteristics of the projects. Hopefully, pricing will come out of the process that is beneficial to our customers."

Solar power was included in the new limits due to utilities' fear that that industry's developers could mimic wind farms and divide up their big projects, too.

Closed primary bill wins approval in the Senate

BOISE — The Senate has approved a bill would allow political parties to close primary election participation only to voters willing to register with the party.

The Senate voted 28-7 Wednesday for a bill hammered out by GOP leaders in the wake of a federal court ruling declaring Idaho's 38-year-old open primary system unconstitutional.

The bill now moves to the House, where approval is

also expected. Republicans have long sought to close primary elections only to party faithful to thwart crossover voting they contend has skewed results and influenced the way some candidates campaign.

Democrats denounced some of the bill's features, including a provision would make a voter's party affiliation a public record for the first time in state history.

Opponents also say forcing party registration could force independents to skip primary elections.

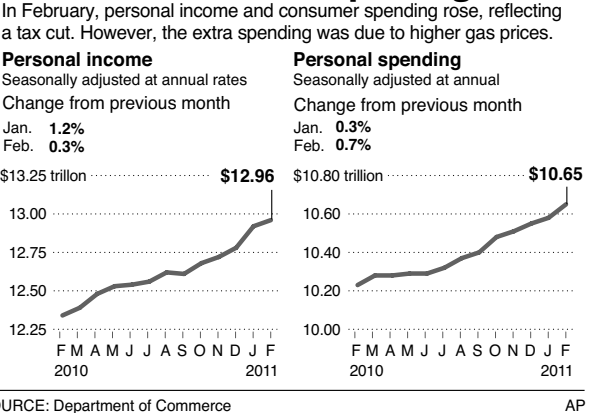

So far, most of tax cut is going down the gas tank

WASHINGTON — Americans are earning and spending more, but a lot of the extra money is going down their gas tanks. Gas prices have drained more than half the extra cash Americans are getting this year from a cut in Social Security taxes. Unlike some other kinds of spending, paying more for gas doesn’t help the economy much. Most of the money goes overseas, and higher prices leave people with less money to buy appliances, computers, plane tickets and other things that can be postponed. “When food and gasoline

prices are rising, it causes people to hunker down,” said Chris G. Christopher Jr., senior economist at IHS Global Insight. Consumer

spending jumped 0.7 percent last month, and personal incomes rose 0.3 percent, the Commerce Department said Monday. Both gains reflected the cut of two percentage

points in the Social Security tax, raising take-home pay. They also illustrated how higher gas prices are stressing household budgets. After adjusting for inflation, spending rose just 0.3 percent. After-tax incomes actually fell 0.1 percent. The Social Security tax cut will give most households an additional \$1,000 to \$2,000 this year. In December, when President Barack Obama signed it into law, economists predicted higher take-home pay would lead to more spending and stronger economic growth. But gas prices have jumped more than 50 cents a

Medicare to pay for prostate cancer drug

WASHINGTON— Medicare officials said Wednesday that the program will pay the \$93,000 cost of prostate cancer drug Provenge, an innovative therapy that gives men suffering from the disease an extra four months to live, on average. The Centers for Medicare and Medicaid said the biotech drug made by Dendreon Corp. is a “reasonable and necessary” medicine. The decision ensures that thousands of men will be able to receive the drug through the federal government. The agency will take comments on the decision for 90 days before making it final. Medicare is legally prohibited from considering price when deciding whether to pay for a new treatment. The Food and Drug Administration approved Provenge last April and in most cases Medicare automatically covers drugs cleared by the agency. But Provenge’s price tag has prompted debate about the cost of medical care and the government’s role in paying for it. The agency’s decision to review Provenge last year prompted outrage from some patients and doctors who said Medicare was looking for a reason to avoid reimbursing for the pricey drug. The infused drug is a first-of-a-kind treatment

in that each dose is customized to work with a patient’s immune system. Seattle-based Dendreon says the price reflects the more than \$1 billion spent researching and developing the drug. Prostate cancer patients point out the average survival time with Provenge is double that of chemotherapy, which is about two months and is marked by significant side effects. “It’s impossible to put a dollar figure on a human life, especially when you’re talking about a drug that has such mild side effects,” said Jim Kiefert, a prostate cancer patient and advocate who was part of the Provenge study. But bioethicists who study health care decisions say Medicare’s ruling on Provenge mirrors the bias of the overall U.S. health system, which emphasizes expensive treatments over basic medical care. Health care costs account for nearly one fifth of the U.S. economy, more than any other country. “We tend to put our health care dollars into very high-tech interventions that produce very marginal improvements,” said Dr. Steven Miles, a professor at the University of Minnesota’s Center for Bioethics. “The problem is that we have created a health care system that is uniquely inadequate in terms of access to primary health care, which is where you get the most bang for your buck.”

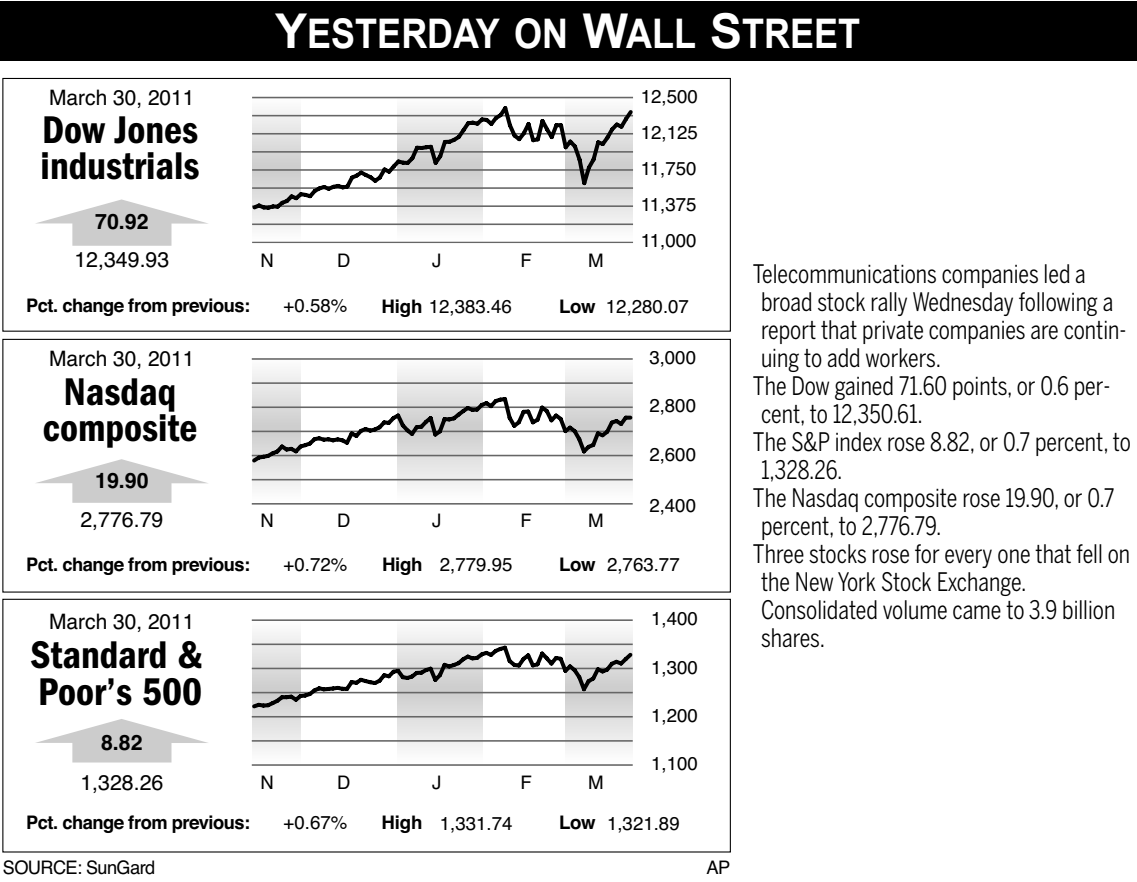

Gadhafi's forces pound rebels

AJDABIYA, Libya — Moammar Gadhafi's ground forces recaptured a strategic oil town Wednesday and moved within striking distance of another major eastern city, nearly reversing the gains rebels made since international airstrikes began. Rebels pleaded for more help, while a U.S. official said government forces are making themselves harder to target by using civilian "battle wagons" with makeshift armaments instead of tanks.

Western powers kept up the pressure to force Gadhafi out with new airstrikes in other parts of Libya, hints that they may arm the opposition and intense negotiations behind the scenes to find a country to give haven to Libya's leader of more than 40 years.

Even as it advanced militarily, Gadhafi's regime suffered a blow to its inner circle with the apparent defection of Foreign Minister Moussa Koussa. Koussa flew from Tunisia to an airport outside London and announced he was resigning from his post, according to a statement from the British government.

Moussa Ibrahim, a Libyan government spokesman in Tripoli, denied that the foreign minister has defected saying he was in London on a "diplomatic mission."

It was not immediately possible to confirm either statement with Moussa or people close to him.

Gadhafi's justice and interior ministers resigned shortly after the uprising began last month, but Koussa would be the first high-profile resignation since the international air campaign began.

Airstrikes have neutralized Gadhafi's air force and

U.K.: Libya's foreign minister to resign

LONDON — Libyan Foreign Minister Moussa Koussa arrived in Britain on Wednesday and is resigning from his post, Britain's government said.

Koussa arrived from Tunisia at Farnborough Airport, about 35 miles southwest of London, the Foreign Office said in a statement, adding that he traveled to Britain under his own free will.

"He has told us that he is resigning his post," the statement said. "We are

discussing this with him and we will release further details in due course."

Moussa Ibrahim, a Libyan government spokesman, denied that the foreign minister has defected saying he was in London on a "diplomatic mission."

"He is on a diplomatic mission. He has not defected," Ibrahim told reporters in the Libyan capital, Tripoli.

It was not immediately possible to confirm either statement with Koussa or people close to him.



Koussa

pounded his army, but his ground forces remain far better armed, trained and organized than the opposition.

The shift in momentum back to the government's side is hardening a U.S. view that the poorly equipped opposition is probably incapable of prevailing without decisive Western intervention — ei-

ther an all-out U.S.-led military assault on regime forces or a decision to arm the rebels.

In Washington, congressional Republicans and Democrats peppered senior administration officials with questions about how long the U.S. will be involved in Libya, the costs of the operation and

whether foreign countries will arm the rebels.

NATO is in the process of taking over control of the airstrikes, which began as a U.S.-led operation. Diplomats said they have given approval for the commander of the NATO operation, Canadian Gen. Charles Bouchard, to announce a handover on Thursday.

Gadhafi's forces have adopted a new tactic in light of the pounding airstrikes have given their tanks and armored vehicles, a senior U.S. intelligence official said. They've left some of those weapons behind in favor of a "gaggle" of "battle wagons": minivans, sedans and SUVs fitted with weapons, said the official, who spoke anonymously in order to discuss sensitive U.S. intelligence on the condition and capabilities of rebel and regime forces. Rebel fighters also said Gadhafi's troops were increasingly using civilian vehicles in battle.

The change not only makes it harder to distinguish Gadhafi's forces from the rebels, it also requires less logistical support, the official said.

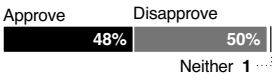
U.S. split on Libya

WASHINGTON — For all the talk of recovery, Americans are growing increasingly pessimistic about the economy as soaring gas costs strain already-tight budgets. But so far, people aren't taking it out on President Barack Obama, a new AP-GfK poll shows.

Even so, the survey highlights a central challenge Obama will face in his campaign for re-election. The president will have to convince a lot of voters who are still feeling financial hardship that things are getting better.

Obama's approval ratings have held steady at around 50 percent over the past month. But the disconnect between negative perceptions of the economy and signs that a rebound are under way could provide an opening for Republicans at the outset of the 2012 campaign.

In the survey, just a sliver of Americans — 15 percent — said they believed the economy had improved over the past month, compared with 30 percent who had thought that in January. Only a third were optimistic of better times ahead for the country, down from about half earlier this year. And 28 percent thought the economy would get worse, the largest slice of people who have expressed that sentiment since the question was first asked in December 2009.

"It's in a poor state," said Billy Shirley, 74, a Democrat from Commerce, Ga. "Everything's going to the bad. Everyone's spending more on gas, food, everything. The prices on everything are going up, and that's hurting the nation."

Recent economic indicators paint a more positive

picture: The unemployment rate, though still high at 8.9 percent, has been declining, and consumer spending and personal income were both up last month. The gross domestic product was growing at an annual rate of 3.1 percent as last year ended.

Americans are acutely focused on their financial well-being, even as turmoil in the Middle East commands international attention. And the foreign unrest is directly affecting them by boosting oil prices. More Americans — 77 percent, up from 54 percent last fall — now say gas prices are highly important to them.

Obama's job-performance ratings haven't suffered as people's attitudes about the economy have shifted over the past month.

Half still approve of how he's doing his job, and half say he deserves to be re-elected. His rating on handling the economy was unchanged: 47 percent approved. In fact, twice as many people said Obama "understands the important issues the country will need to focus on during the next two years" as said that about Republicans in Congress.

Budget talks aimed at avoiding government shutdown resume

WASHINGTON — Congressional negotiators struggling to prevent a government shutdown next week are working on a proposal built around \$33 billion in spending cuts over the next six months — considerably less than tea party activists demanded.

The tentative split-the-differences plan would end up where GOP leaders started last month as they tried to fulfill a campaign pledge to return spending for agencies' daily operations to levels in place before President Barack Obama took office. That calculation takes into account the fact that the current budget year, which began Oct. 1, is about half over.

The \$33 billion figure, disclosed by a congressional aide familiar with the talks, is well below the \$60 billion-plus in cuts that the House passed last month. But it does represent significant movement by Senate Democrats and the administration after originally backing a freeze at current rates.

Tea party-backed GOP lawmakers want more. With

a tea party rally set for Thursday on Capitol Hill, it's unclear how many of the 87 freshmen Republicans elected last fall could live with the arrangement between top Democrats and House Speaker John Boehner, R-Ohio.

Both sides said the figure under consideration is tentative at best and depends on the outcome of numerous policy stands written into the bill. Boehner spokesman Michael Steel said "there's no agreement on a number for the spending cuts. Nothing is

agreed to until everything is agreed to."

The White House said Vice President Joe Biden and budget director Jacob Lew planned to meet Wednesday evening at the Capitol with Senate Democratic leaders.

A Democratic lawmaker familiar with a meeting Wednesday between Obama and members of the Congressional Black Caucus said the administration made it clear that some House GOP proposals restricting the Environmental Protection Agency's regulatory powers

would have to make it into the final bill. In order to characterize the White House's position, the lawmaker insisted on anonymity because the meeting was private.

It's not clear which proposals the White House might accept, but those backed by Republicans would block the government from carrying out regulations on greenhouse gases, putting in place a plan to clean up the Chesapeake Bay and from shutting down mountaintop mines it believes will cause too much water pollution.

While some conservatives appear insistent on the full range of spending cuts, others recognize that compromise is required to win Obama's signature and support from Democrats who control the Senate.

"Compromise on the subject of spending is a tough sell. It doesn't mean it's an impossible sell," said freshman Rep. Steve Womack, R-Ark. "There is a serious mandate to cut spending. Now having said that, I also live in a realistic world and I understand the dynamics involved in having one leg of a three-legged stool under our control."

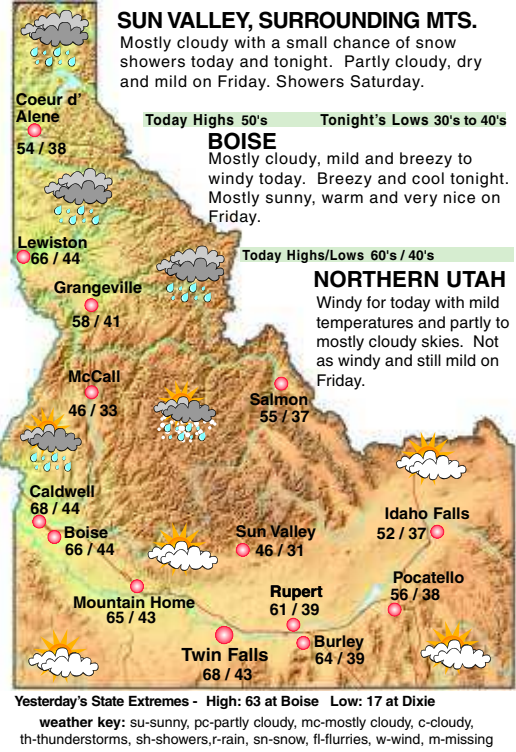

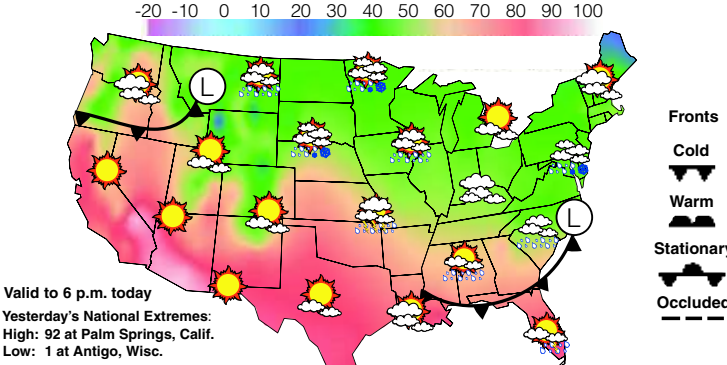

JAPAN
Seafood concerns spreads as record radiation found in waters near Japan's nuclear plant
TOKYO — Fears about contaminated seafood spread Wednesday despite reassurances that radiation in the waters off Japan's troubled atomic plant pose no health risk, as the country's respected emperor consoled evacuees from the tsunami and nuclear emergency zone.
While experts say radioactive particles are unlikely to build up significantly in fish, the seafood concerns in the country that gave the world sushi are yet another blemish for Brand Japan. It has already been hit by contamination of milk, vegetables and water, plus shortages of auto and tech parts after a massive quake and tsunami disabled a coastal nuclear power plant.
Setbacks at the Fukushima Dai-ichi nuclear complex mounted Wednesday, as the plant's operator, Tokyo Power Electric Co., announced that its president was hospitalized. Masataka Shimizu has not been seen since a news conference two days after the March 11 quake that spawned the destructive wave. His absence fueled speculation that he had suffered a breakdown.
Spokesman Naoki Tsunoda said Shimizu, 66, was admitted to a Tokyo hospital Tuesday after suffering dizziness and high blood pressure.
The problems at the nuclear plant have taken center stage, but the tsunami also created another disaster: Hundreds of thousands of people were forced from their homes after the wave drove miles inland, decimating whole towns. The official death toll stood at 11,362 late Wednesday, with the final toll likely surpassing 18,000.

FLORIDA
Killer whale that drowned SeaWorld trainer in 2010 resumes performing at Orlando park
ORLANDO — The killer whale that drowned a trainer last year at SeaWorld in Orlando resumed performing Wednesday for the first time since the woman's death.
Tilikum participated in the marine park's signature "Believe" show before a crowd of thousands, more than a year since drowning 40-year-old Dawn Brancheau during a performance on Feb. 24, 2010.
No trainer has been allowed in the water during the shows since Brancheau's death and they remained out of the pool Wednesday for the performance before the audience filling 5,000-seat Shamu Stadium to capacity.
Orlando resident Wendy Santiago said her family has been attending SeaWorld shows for years and she and her husband, Marcos, and their two children made a point of being present for Tilikum's return. She said the tragedy left her sad though she was pleased to see Tilikum performing again.
"You never can tell with any of these animals — they are wild animals," Wendy Santiago said of the trainer's death. But she added, tears welling in her eyes at the show's conclusion, "I'm happy today that I was able to see him perform."

NEW YORK
Photos of Mercury from orbiting spaceship paint picture of pock-marked planet
NEW YORK — Think the moon has many craters? New photos from the first spacecraft to orbit Mercury show the tiny inner planet has far more impressive battle scars from regular high-speed peltings by space rocks.
NASA's Messenger spacecraft, which began orbiting the planet less than two weeks ago, reveals a pock-marked planet full of craters from pieces of asteroids and comets.
"Mercury has had an exposed surface for at least 3.5 to 4 billion years and some of those surfaces are extremely cratered to the point where there are so many craters they start to obscure one another," said mission chief scientist Sean Solomon.
He said it was surprising how many secondary craters there are. Those are craters created by the falling soil kicked up from space rock collisions.
Those initial space rock crashes "throw out a lot of material in the explosive process," Solomon said.

GREAT BRITAIN
Is someone using a hair dryer? No, it's Smokey the cat, purring away at 73 decibels
LONDON — No need to bell this cat: A gray-and-white tabby by the name of Smokey has cat-apulted to fame with purring so loud it has been recorded at a potentially record-setting 73 decibels.
The British community college that measured the sound said it peaked at 16 times louder than that of the average cat. By some estimates, that is about as noisy as busy traffic, a hair dryer or a vacuum cleaner.
The 12-year-old, ordinary-size feline first came to national attention last month when her owner, Ruth Adams, decided to run a local competition for the most powerful purr. That led to a local radio show appearance, and from there, media coverage snowballed, with the tabloids full of headlines like "Thundercat" and "Rumpuss."
"Sometimes she purrs so loudly it makes her cough and splutter," Adams said on a website devoted to the cat, which was rescued from a shelter about three years ago. Smokey "even manages to purr while she eats."

Suggestions to get you in the mood for spring riding

If you're anything like me, you can't wait for the weather to warm so you can hit the trails with your off-road machine. Some enthusiasts already are riding the trails; others are waiting for the temperatures to climb. To help pass the time, they're prepping their machines. Besides tuning up, however, now's a good time to plan your spring rides. In this edition of Off-Road, I thought I'd share with you a few places to get you started. You already know these areas, of course, but here's why they're fun to ride with your dirt bike or all-terrain vehicle:

Custer Motorway

This 40-mile long historic trail east of Stanley in the Salmon-Challis National Forest is a scenic ride through an area decked with forest and old mines. Riding the trail, which takes visitors on a tour through the Yankee Fork, Custer and Bonanza areas, is a hands-on history lesson. Stop at the 17 interpretive sites between Sunbeam and Challis to learn more about the area and its mines. "Start the ride either from Sunbeam and go up the Yankee Fork," according to StayonTrails.com, "or start in Challis and ride over to the Yankee Fork area." There also are several springs near Sunbeam. It's suggested that you bring plenty of food and water, as there are no services in the area. Directions and information: Salmon-Challis National Forest, 756-5100.

Devil's Corral

For fast, dirty fun close to home you can't beat Devil's Corral. Located northeast of the Perrine Bridge in Jerome County, the 206-acre site is popular for those wishing to kick up some dust after work with their dirt bike or ATV. A number of trails and berms give experienced and novice riders alike the chance to show their stuff. Just be mindful of the canyon's edge, which, in some parts, can creep up on you quickly if you're not paying attention. There is no fee to use the land, but some parts are off limits. Also, be respectful of other users in the area as it also is a popular place for sportsmen who come here to hike or target shoot.

Rock Creek ATV Loop

A fun, scenic ride close to home is the Rock Creek ATV Loop in the South Hills located in the Sawtooth National Forest in Cassia County. The 11-mile ATV loop, which starts at the Diamondfield Jack campground, takes riders through some of the hills most scenic country. From the campground take trail No. 239 and ride north several miles to No. 241, according to Stay on Trails. Then turn right and ride to No. 163. Go left and ride to No. 004; thereafter travel south for several miles until you hit Forest Road No. 500. Turn right to return to the campground. Keep an eye out for song birds and other wildlife as there are many in the area, including bluebirds. Directions and information: Minidoka Ranger District, 737-3200.

Pole Creek

Pole Creek, located in the Boulder-White Cloud Mountains between Ketchum and Stanley near Fourth of July Lake, is another favorite destination. The more than two-hour drive north from Twin Falls hasn't deterred off-road buffs from trail riding the site as often as possible. The area offers trails for all level riders and provides a glimpse into the past with its several mines. You can have your pick of a 5-mile day ride or scouring the more than 100 miles of looped trails. Directions and information: Salmon-Challis National Forest, 756-5100.

Hemingway Butte

Hemingway Butte, which boasts a 2,602-foot mountain summit and more than a handful of 1,000-foot peaks in Owyhee County, has a number of trailheads with access to literally hundreds of miles of roads. Some single track trails are specific for dirt bikes only, while others are used by ATVs. Terrain here is varied, from easy to difficult. According to the Bureau of Land Management, all types of surfaces may be encountered, from sand washes to rocky landscapes. From Hemingway Butte, visitors also may access popular Rabbit Creek and Fossil Creek trailheads. Directions and information: BLM Owyhee Field Office, 384-3300.

Commission sets fall big game seasons

In response to changes in elk populations, the Idaho Fish and Game Commission on Tuesday approved big game hunting seasons that reduce or eliminate antlerless elk tags in some areas.

Meanwhile, big game hunting seasons for 2011 also include increased tag numbers and new hunts in areas with chronic depredation problems.

Among the changes, the 2011 season for white-tailed deer in the Panhandle will return to normal, extending

22 days over what it's been in the past couple of years. The number of antlerless deer tags also has been reduced in poorly performing units and where winter mortality is expected to be high.

New elk seasons reduce or eliminate antlerless elk harvest in zones in decline or below objective, especially where wolf densities are moderate to high. The remaining antlerless harvest on Middle Fork A-tags has been eliminated. And

2011 is the third and final year of the phased-in reduction of Sawtooth zone A and B tags.

In areas where elk are causing chronic depredation problems, antlerless elk tags will be increased.

Only minor adjustments were made to pronghorn tag numbers. Fall controlled hunt tags for black bears were increased and the season length in eastern Idaho was increased by a week in six units. The only change to mountain lion seasons is

an increase in the "dogs prohibited" seasons in the Clearwater region to account for changes to deer and elk seasons in past years.

For whitetails, 200 new extra antlerless deer controlled hunt tags were established to address chronic nuisance and depredation problems.

The outlook for mule deer survival may affect the fall hunts. Of 193 radio-collared fawns and does, only 47 percent of the fawns, and

7 percent of the does, survived through the end of March. That may be the lowest winter survival since Fish and Game started its monitoring program in 1998.

Changes in hunting season in response to surveys and predicted low fawn and adult survival include a decrease of 1,075 any-weapon controlled hunt antlerless tags. Mule deer buck controlled hunt tags were reduced by 150.

Still, all mule deer popu-

lation management units are above the 15 bucks per 100 does objective. And 200 tags were added for antlerless hunts and extra tag hunts to address chronic depredation conflicts.

Fish and Game biologists will continue to monitor survival, and managers may recommend further reductions in controlled hunt tags at the May commission meeting.

Heat, shelter essential to spending an unexpected night outdoors

The scenarios are endless and often generate news stories: A hiker is stranded on a ledge for days and has to ration his cashews and water until rescuers arrive; ice climbers spend an unplanned night out after one is injured; drivers are stranded along a stretch of rural highway during a blizzard.

So the question for any outdoors person, or for those driving down the highway in bad weather or on rural roads, is this: Can they spend an unexpected night out in relative comfort and safety?

That was the scenario undertaken by Steve Cole and his two teenage daughters, Muri and Alex, last week.

A former outfitter and confirmed outdoorsmen, Steve guided his daughters through a night out in a shelter built with two space blankets and a large fire as the only protection against the chill of a 28-degree night. No sleeping bag, no tent.

I tagged along with my Little Brother, Thayne Harris, who is 11. We also built a space blanket shelter and fire under the guidance of an acquaintance, veteran woodsman Dick Hatfield.

Dick had invited me to weather a winter night out a couple of times, but I'm partial to warmth, so I declined. When he guaranteed we'd be relatively toasty, I thought Thayne might like to participate, and agreed.

Here's what we learned:

A space blanket shelter can reflect a lot of heat and block the wind. With a simple setup, one branch secured between two trees, the shelter is fairly quick to assemble with a little rope. The key is to angle the tarp into the prevailing wind and hope the wind doesn't switch directions. Like buying real estate, setting up a shelter is all about location, location, location. Take the time to find a good spot.

Fire is good. Fire is great. But it also takes a lot of wood to keep the fire burning. We located the fire close to the

shelter, about 7 feet from the back of the structure. A log across the end of the shelter kept the fire from creeping under the tarp.

The rule of thumb is to collect a lot of wood, and then double that. Large logs will burn longer and can be fed into the fire like a Yule log — shove in one end and keep moving it into the fire.

Fire is good only if you can get one started. In wet weather, finding dry tinder and fuel can be tough. The key is to always carry a fire starter and an ignition source. We tested several different techniques. Here are some options that are fun to try before you have to use them.

You can start a fire with a 9-volt battery and 0000 steel wool, which is fairly fine. Pull a strand of the steel wool out and touch it to the battery's two terminals. Blow a little and the steel wool will ignite to produce a flame.

Steel matches that we tried varied in how easy they were to strike or their capability to throw a big enough spark to ignite fuel. The key

to making even the worst one work was to have a good fire starter. The most simple, cheap and readily available fire starter is a cotton ball. Fluff it up a little and it will work great. Better yet, coat the cotton ball in petroleum jelly and it will burn about a minute longer than a regular cotton ball. That could make a big difference if you're dealing with wetter fuel. Coat a bunch of cotton balls, stuff them in an old pill bottle and carry them along on outings.

If you need heat while

stranded in your car, here's a simple hand-warming stove you can make that can also be used to heat water:

Take a medium-sized tin coffee can and drill two holes on opposite sides big enough to insert two steel rods or even some old clothes hangers. Size the rods to fit across the can's opening. Place a roll of toilet paper inside the can. Carry along a bottle of isopropyl alcohol or gasoline line antifreeze like HEET.

When needed, pour a cup of the alcohol into the middle of the toilet paper and light. It will burn a long time. If you pack a metal cup, you can use the flame to melt snow for drinking water or to heat water for tea or instant soup. Put the packaged tea and soup in the can and carry it in the trunk of your car and it will be there when you need it.

Remember the old Boy Scout motto: Be prepared. Whether you're taking a short day hike or an hour-long walk, consider how quickly things could change if you had to spend the night out because of an injury or if you became lost. By creating your own basic kit and always taking it along, you could be prepared to weather a survival scenario.

You may not get much sleep, unless someone else is tending the fire, but you will get through in much better shape than if you had not prepared at all. You can also practice, when your life isn't in danger and the weather's not too threatening, to work out any of the kinks in your planning and execution.

Reader frightened by seizure-like symptoms

DEARDR. GOTT: Although I am seeing a neurologist, I want to run my situation by you because I love your column and trust your expertise.

I am a woman in my 20s in good health, not overweight. I try to work out three to five times a week, if not more. I don't smoke or do drugs, but I occasionally drink. I am taking medica-

tion for birth control, anxiety and stress. I have what I would describe as occasional panic attacks. I have a high-stress job and other stresses in my life.

Recently, I felt nauseated and slightly dizzy at work. I also had a mild headache. Since a lot of people in my office were sick at the time, I figured maybe I was getting the flu or a cold. I left to get checked out by a doctor, as the symptoms didn't improve. By the time I made the five-minute drive, I was sure I was going to throw up. I checked in at the office

and quickly went to the bathroom and sat on the floor. After five minutes, I had not thrown up. That was when I realized I could not stand solidly on my own.

Someone came, got me in a wheelchair and to an examining room. That's when my motor skills were affected. My right arm would not stop moving up and

down, and my right leg was also shaking. My speech was affected, reduced to stuttering. They took my vitals, and as I waited for the doctor, my back arched and my body started jerking. I had no control and could not talk. Instead, I mumbled loudly so someone would help me. They thought I was having some panic episode, but it would

not stop. This continued for hours. During all of this, my mind was OK. I knew what was going on and could answer questions. I just didn't have control of the stuttering or of my body movements. I had an EEG and MRI and will get the results soon. Could it have been a form of a partial seizure or

Continued from Outdoors 4 severe migraine that many women get around this age? **DEAR READER:** Yes, it could. Let's discuss seizures first. They are caused by abnormal electrical brain activity that may be provoked by high fever, low blood sodium or magnesium, low oxygen levels in the brain, hypoglycemia (low blood sugar), alcohol, medication withdrawal or may have no identifiable reason. A solitary seizure doesn't imply epilepsy, but even mild forms of a seizure might require treatment because they can occur at inappropriate times, such as when driving an automobile. You may have experienced a partial seizure or a pseudoseizure (psychogenic non-epileptic seizure) that didn't result in a loss of consciousness but manifested in confusion and jerking. Most migraine types in adults, and there are many, are associated with headache; however, a vertiginous migraine associated with recurrent episodes of vertigo with or without nausea, vomiting, photophobia or headache in a setting of positive family history of migraine or previous personal history might support the diagnosis. Other possibilities include a nervous-system abnormality that resulted in seizure-like activity. Infection (specifically meningitis), hormonal changes of the menstrual cycle or medication may be the culprit. Overdose or abrupt withdrawal of many medications can trigger symptoms such as those experienced. Whatever the cause, you need the results of your EEG and MRI so your neurologist can pinpoint why you experienced such symptoms and the best way to prevent them from happening again in the future.

So are familiar faces in new places. Angels outfielder Vernon Wells, Tigers slugger Victor Martinez, Nationals outfielder Jayson Werth and Braves second baseman Dan Uggla are among the stars set to make their debuts.

Old pros Chipper Jones, back from a knee injury that almost finished his career, and Derek Jeter, coming off a down year, also get fresh

starts.

"There's a twinkle in his eye, there's something there," new Braves manager Fredi Gonzalez said about Jones. "Maybe it's getting a taste of the playoffs and a chance we can do it again this year"

Also part of the scene: Mike Mussina and Jim Edmonds, throwing out ceremonial first balls. Mussina will do it at Yankee Stadium, Edmonds gets the honor in St. Louis before the Cardinals host San Diego.

At Kauffman Stadium, where the Royals host the Los Angeles Angels, and other ballparks there will be a collection for the relief efforts in Japan after the earthquake and tsunami.

Stadium workers in Kansas City bundled up against the cold as they got logos, banners and signs ready for the opener. Despite the daunting forecasts, there's always a lot of anticipation.

"Even after all these years, there are still butterflies. Heck, yeah," Reds manager Dusty Baker said. "No matter how long you do this. If you still have the same joy as you did as a kid, you remember the opening day Little League parade. I do. It's the best game."

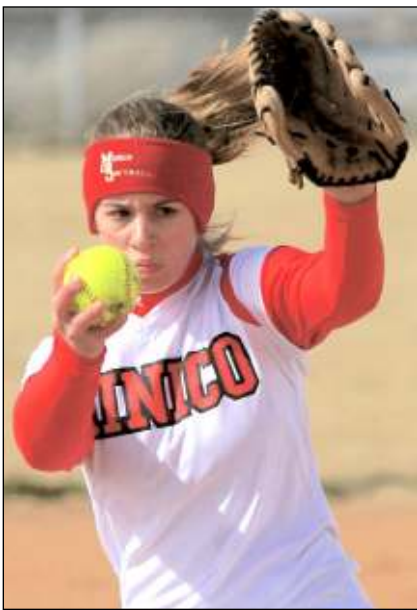

Will Fiesta Bowl stay in the BCS?

SCOTTSDALE, Ariz. (AP) — The Fiesta Bowl ejected its chief executive amid corruption allegations and now faces a new challenge: convincing the BCS to let it stay in the lucrative bowl system used to crown a national champion.

If Fiesta Bowl officials can't, BCS executive director Bill Hancock says the organization has no problem booting them.

"We will not do business with people who do business like that," Hancock said. "We just will not be associated with this kind of behavior."

Pac-10 commissioner Larry Scott added: "We want to send a clear and very strong signal to the public about the standards and values (that) the conferences that make up the BCS stand for."

The Fiesta Bowl released an internal report that uncovered "excessive compensation, nonbusiness and inappropriate expenditures and inappropriate gifts" and fired longtime CEO and President John Junker.

The BCS has set up a task force to help determine if the leaders of major college football want to continue doing business with the Fiesta Bowl. It is in the second year of a four-year deal to be part of the BCS.

The BCS is one of three organizations whose polls crown national champions, the others being The Associated Press and ESPN/USA Today.

The reimbursements, listed as at least \$46,539, are an apparent violation of state campaign finance laws and the charter that allows the Fiesta Bowl its nonprofit status. Arizona state prosecutors are also conducting a probe.

The Fiesta board unanimously fired Junker "for his improper and inappropriate activities documented" in the report.

"The entire Fiesta Bowl family is angered and disappointed by what we've seen in the report and by the actions of Mr. Junker," board chairman Duane Woods told reporters at the event's headquarters in downtown Scottsdale.

"The Fiesta Bowl is greater than a few individuals, and the lesson here really is that we placed too much trust in a single individual," he added. Woods did not take questions.

Junker, in his ubiquitous bright yellow Fiesta Bowl sports jacket, had been the face of the game for three decades, leading it from an upstart event to one of the BCS giants. The others are the Rose, Orange and Sugar bowls.

REPORT: EX-AUBURN PLAYERS SAY THEY WERE PAID

MONTGOMERY, Ala. — Four former Auburn players have told HBO's "Real Sports with Bryant Gumbel" they received thousands of dollars while being recruited by or playing for the Tigers.

Stanley McClover, Troy Reddick, Chaz Ramsey and Raven Gray told HBO for an episode airing Wednesday night that they received cash payments — in book bags, envelopes and even handshakes. Ramsey played at Auburn most recently, in the 2007 season.

Tommy Tuberville, Auburn's coach during the recruitment of all four players, declined comment Wednesday. He is now the head coach at Texas Tech.

McClover said he "felt totally obligated" to play for the Tigers after getting money — he wasn't sure how much — in a book bag. "I almost passed out. I literally almost passed out. I couldn't believe it was true," the former defensive end told HBO. "I felt like I owed them."

McClover said he later received \$7,000 from an unidentified Auburn booster for a 1973 Chevrolet Impala and would get sacks of money, typically \$300 or \$400, after games. He said he got four bags totaling \$4,000 after logging four sacks against rival Alabama in 2004, when he was a first-

team All-Southeastern Conference player.

The Associated Press reviewed an advance copy of the hour-long program. Efforts to reach the four former players were unsuccessful.

"Auburn Athletics respectfully declines to comment on these alleged claims apparently made by a few former football players," a statement from the school said. "Compliance with all NCAA and Southeastern Conference rules is a major emphasis and top priority for all of our athletic programs at Auburn University."

TRESSEL: 'I NEVER LOOKED AT MYSELF AS PERFECT'

COLUMBUS, Ohio — Ohio State coach Jim Tressel apologized for letting people down Wednesday, and acknowledged that some may view him as a cheater in the wake of NCAA violations that resulted in a five-game suspension.

"I suppose there could be some that might feel that way and there might be others who might not," Tressel said. "I don't have a whole lot of control over that."

Tressel, dressed in his trademark sweater vest, declined to discuss the investigation into the rules violations during an almost hour-long news conference.

Ohio State has recommended that Tressel be suspended the first five games of

this season for failing to report that his players sold memorabilia and received improper benefits. Tressel knew about the situation but did not inform his superiors or the NCAA for more than nine months.

The NCAA could accept Tressel's sanctions — which includes a \$250,000 fine taken from his estimated \$3.5 million annual salary — or levy additional penalties.

The players — including star quarterback Terrelle Pryor — were suspended in late December for the first five games of 2011 for accepting improper benefits. All were permitted to play in the Sugar Bowl, however, which the Buckeyes won 31-26 over Arkansas.

MICHIGAN'S HOKE CAN MAKE UP TO \$3.25M PER YEAR

ANN ARBOR, Mich. — Brady Hoke became Michigan's coach more than two months ago without asking how much money he would make. His faith was rewarded.

Michigan athletic director Dave Brandon said Hoke will average \$3.25 million annually — almost five times more than he made last year at San Diego State — if he fulfills the six-year contract signed Monday.

"It's a big job with a lot of expectations and we feel very good about how much

we're compensating him to help us reach those expectations," Brandon said in an interview with The Associated Press.

Hoke will be paid \$2 million this year and his base salary will increase by \$100,000 each season. Hoke will earn a \$1.5 million "stay bonus" after his third year and another \$1.5 million "stay bonus" if he is still leading college football's winningest program in the sixth season of his contract.

FORMER SUMO WRESTLER TAKES ON COLLEGE FOOTBALL

BABSON PARK, Fla. — Soslan Gagloev knows what it means to be at the pinnacle of a country's most-popular sport.

The Russian-born former sumo wrestler was one of Japan's top draws before a marijuana bust and match-fixing scandal ended his career three years ago.

Now he is in Florida at NAIA Webber International University, chasing a dream to play college football. He knows it is a long shot, but believes his sumo skills and personal drive get him a chance to chase his new dream. He wants to follow in the footsteps of former Warriors player Vince Anderson, who became Webber's first NFL player when he suited up for the Tampa Bay Buccaneers last season.

"The altitude — 6,600-feet — really makes it hard," said U.S. Ski Team member Kris Freeman as he gulped for air following his 14-second win over a pair of Canadians in Wednesday's Men's 15K Classic. "I'm used to racing at sea level. But I like it here. The course is laid out nice."

"There's probably very few courses that are harder," said Alexa Turzian, a Sun Valley racer who in 2007 became the youngest U.S. Nordic champion, winning a women's 10K freestyle race at age 18. "It's harder to wax for because of all the hills. You have to be on your toes the whole time — there's a lot going on."

The skiers, who hail from as far away as Norway, Sweden and Japan, have put on quite a show for

spectators as they have tackled the steep hilly Lake Creek trails just north of Ketchum.

Wearing skin-tight uniforms colored various shades of red, purple, blue and yellow, they've careened through staging areas filled with MASH-type tents and waxing tents. They've climbed up Hammer and Coaches Climb, sailed through the North End Narrows and spread out in long lines across Elkhorn Bowl, their arms working like pistons.

"It's simply been electric," said Ted Angle of Hailey.

It's not over, either. Short sprint races start at 9 a.m. Friday at Lake Creek.

"That's a good one for spectators because you have six skiers abreast — a lot of rubbing of shoulders," said spectator Rick Knoebel.

On Saturday skiers will race 600 feet up 6,638-foot Dollar Mountain from Dollar Mountain Lodge — a new race format that has racers chomping at the bit, even as they confess a little nervousness.

Freeman, who has managed to overcome Type 1 diabetes to become one of America's best-ever Nordic skiers, has dominated the men's races, slogging to the national championship in the 50K on a snowy Saturday and winning the 15K classic on Wednesday.

The exception: Tuesday when Sun Valley's Simi Hamilton, a member of the U.S. Ski Team, beat him out in the men's 3.3-kilometer Skate prologue. Hamilton's specialty is the sprint, set for Friday.

Randall has completely dominated the women's races with Sun Valley's Morgan Arritola just

missing the podium with fourth- and fifth-place finishes.

Beau Mills, one of dozens of volunteers who have arrived as early as 5:30 a.m. to set up the course, said she loved watching the racers.

"Watching the mass start and the classic skiing is truly like watching poetry in motion," she said. "And what's really fun is seeing how polite these kids are. They even thank you for helping them pull their bibs off at the finish line."

Kevin Swigert said the hosting of the race gives Sun Valley one more notch in its belt when it comes to calling itself "Nordic Town USA."

"This is one spoke in the wheel establishing us as the world epicenter for human-powered sports," he said.

winning the team roping championship.

NIRA Commissioner Roger Walters told the *Times-News* that the CSI rodeo program has become an example to other programs across the country.

"It's one of our finest programs, and I don't say that often," Walter said. "It's tough to build a good rodeo program. It takes a lot of support, a lot of money and strong leadership to maintain a winning tradition. Birnie and his team have done that, and that's why the team is where it's at today."


But it hasn't been easy for Birnie and assistant rodeo coach Brian Tubbs.

The Rocky Mountain Region is the second smallest region in terms of student athletes, according to the NIRA. But, contrary to other

regions, it's numbers are growing.

"It's certainly more competitive this year," said Dennis Montgomery, director of the Rockie Mountain Region and Weber State's rodeo coach. "It seems like there is a lot of pressure on the programs, so the kids have to be tough and have a good work ethic. Southern Idaho seems to have really pushed that, so now it's a tough program to beat."
