"(Last year), she sat through the whole thing — three and a half hours," Boyer said.

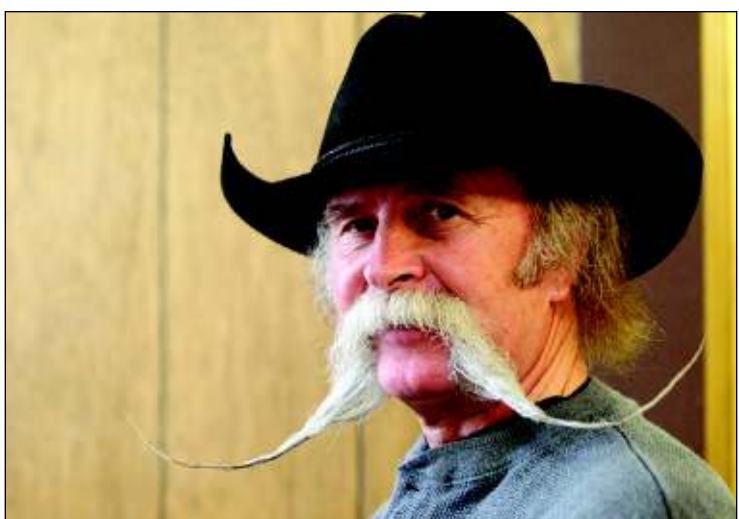
The pair were among many who turned out for this weekend's event. The fifth year of the gathering brought plenty of veterans to listen to tales of hunting down

Goodbye to federal funding for 2012 campaigns

NEW YORK — A cornerstone of U.S. politics since the 1970s, public funding of presidential campaigns may soon go the way of other relics of the era like long sideburns and lava lamps. Neither President Barack Obama nor any of the leading 2012 Republican contenders is expected to accept federal matching funds and the limits they impose.

In fact, opting to take public money to finance a presidential campaign this year is likely to be seen as the mark of a loser.

"I would be shocked if they took matching funds. I don't think that it's a successful model this time, or in the future," says GOP strategist Carl Forti. He's been an adviser to former Massachusetts Gov. Mitt Romney and helped run American Crossroads, an independent group that raised millions to defeat Democratic candidates in 2010.

Obama's record-breaking fundraising in the 2008 campaign allowed him to abandon the public system in both the Democratic primaries and the general election. With his success as a benchmark, top-tier Republican candidates now are planning to go it alone.

The president, who has no primary race, may become the first candidate to raise \$1 billion for the general election in 2012.

Republicans in a wide field must battle each other for the party's private donors. But the emergence of free-spending independent political groups — since the Supreme Court in 2009 cleared the way for unlimited corporate spending in campaigns — is expected to help close the imbalance between Obama and the GOP. Several of the Republicans also have immense personal wealth.

Justice Department appeals judge's ruling against federal health care law

ATLANTA — The federal health care overhaul's core requirement to make virtually all citizens buy health insurance or face tax penalties is constitutional because Congress has the authority to regulate interstate business, the Justice Department said in its appeal of a ruling that struck down the Obama administration's signature legislation.

The government's 62-page motion filed Friday to the 11th Circuit Court of Appeals argued that Congress had the power to enact the overhaul's minimum coverage requirements because it is a "rational means of regulating the way participants in the health care market pay for their services."

The motion also warned other pieces of the overhaul, including a law that blocks insurers from denying coverage to people because of pre-existing conditions, would be "unworkable" without a

citizens buy health insurance or face tax penalties. U.S. District Judge Roger Vinson of Florida agreed in a Jan. 31 ruling that said President Barack Obama’s entire health care overhaul is unconstitutional. It is considered the most sweeping ruling against the health care law.
Vinson ruled against the overhaul on grounds that Congress exceeded its authority by requiring nearly all Americans to carry health insurance, an idea dating back to Republican proposals from the 1990s but now almost universally rejected by conservatives.
His ruling followed the same reasoning as one last year from a federal judge in Virginia who struck down the insurance requirement. But while the first judge left the rest of the law intact, Vinson invalidated provisions that range from Medicare discounts for seniors with high prescription costs to a change that allows adult children up to age 26 to remain on their parents’ coverage.
At the center of Vinson’s ruling and the government’s challenge is the legality of the requirement that Americans carry health insurance except in cases of financial hardship. Those who cannot show they are covered by an employer, government program or their own policy would face fines from the IRS when the program takes effect in 2014.
Vinson ruled that lawmakers do not have the power to penalize citizens for not doing something, but the Justice Department said he overreached.
The government disputed Vinson’s claim that Congress can’t penalize someone for not buying health care coverage, saying the requirement was a “quintessential exercise” of the legislative branch’s

powers. It said the judge “impermissibly substituted its own judgment for that of the elected branches” by declaring an insurance requirement can’t be imposed until people actually seek medical care.
“Common sense, experience, and economic analysis confirm the testimony to Congress that a ‘health insurance market could never survive or even form if people could buy their insurance on the way to the hospital.’”
Some states, including Alaska, have cited Vinson’s decision in refusing to cooperate with the health care law. But the judge issued another ruling in March ordering states to continue implementing the law while the case makes its way through the courts.
Other states that joined Florida in filing the lawsuit were: Alabama, Alaska, Arizona, Colorado, Georgia, Indiana, Idaho, Iowa, Kansas, Louisiana, Maine, Michigan, Mississippi, Nebraska, Nevada, North Dakota, Ohio, Pennsylvania, South Carolina, South Dakota, Texas, Utah, Washington, Wisconsin and Wyoming.
So far, three federal judges have upheld the law, while Vinson and the Virginia judge ruled against it. It now seems certain that the broad health care challenge will be resolved only by the Supreme Court.
A randomly selected three-judge 11th Circuit panel is set to consider oral arguments about the case in June. Vinson, for his part, has acknowledged that the 11th Circuit could disagree with him.
“It is likely that the Court of Appeals will also reach divergent results and that, as most court-watchers predict, the Supreme Court may eventually be split on this issue as well,” he wrote in a March 3 ruling.

No time limit on court fines, state Supreme Court rules

BOISE (AP) — The Idaho Supreme Court has reversed a lower court’s decision and ruled there is no statute of limitations when it comes to court-ordered fines, monetary penalties or restitution for someone convicted in a criminal case and who signs a parole agreement.
Justices made the ruling in a case involving an Idaho man who contended he didn’t have to pay Shoshone County \$33,000 in fines because too much time had passed since the fines had been imposed.
But justices ruled last week in favor of the county and Collection Bureau Inc. The justices said that the parole agreement signed by Jim Dorsey, who was convicted in 2001 of manufacturing methamphetamine, served as written acknowledgement of his debt to the county.
“No statute of limitations applies to the collection of a fine, monetary

penalty or restitution provision contained in a judgment of conviction in a criminal case,” Justice Jim Jones wrote.
The county turned the fees over to Collection Bureau Inc. in 2008, leading to court wrangling and eventually the Idaho Supreme Court.
“Hopefully this will set a standard that we can go after the fees when criminals get out of jail,” Peggy DeLange-White, Shoshone County Clerk, told the Shoshone News Press.
Money collected from fines pays for police work, jail costs, and other expenses involved in prosecutions.
“All this stuff costs, and it seems like these criminals get away and don’t have to pay the fine.” DeLange-White said. “There is a lot of money out there that we never get to collect.”
DeLange-White said the county in 2007 turned over about \$940,000 in fines to Collection Bureau Inc., and

received about \$157,000.
“Counties are sitting on uncollected revenue because of lack of resources to pursue it, or they may think that it’s uncollectable after five years,” said Mark Clark, owner of Collection Bureau Inc. “There is a whole segment of fines they have written off and there’s still much to be collected.”
The Idaho Supreme Court noted that the amount of fines handed out in Idaho is in the millions of dollars.
“Our tenacity in protecting Shoshone County’s right to collect criminal fines benefits all public agencies, many of which do not have the resources to pursue collection actions,” Clark said. “Uncollected fines deny justice and in this economy, when public agencies are facing extreme financial pressures, uncollected fines harm taxpayers and the public. Public entities have a duty to go after them.”

Study starts on proposed Boise convention center

BOISE (AP) — A study has begun to determine whether building a new convention center in downtown Boise is feasible.
The Greater Boise Auditorium District is paying Conventions Sports Leisure of Minneapolis \$8,000 to conduct the study that began last week and could take up to nine months to complete.

“This study will really help us determine what can be developed and its configuration,” Pat Rice, auditorium district executive director, told the Idaho Business Review. “Right now, our product isn’t sufficient to accommodate large events.”
The group is looking at building the 150,000-

square-foot convention center on a 5-acre parcel bordered by Front Street, Myrtle Street, 11th and 13th streets. Rice said the current convention center, called the Boise Centre, has just 80,000 square feet only competes for 20 percent of the convention market. The bigger convention center could compete for 50 to 60

percent of the market, he said.
John Kaatz of Conventions Sports Leisure said Boise is “behind the curve” when compared to convention centers in cities of similar size.
“It’s about creating a certain brand and awareness about Boise, but it has to be done right,” Kaatz said.

Presidential candidates of both parties once relied on money from the U.S. Treasury as an indispensable part of their budgets. Indeed, the ability to qualify for matching funds was considered an indication of a candidate’s strength after the system was put in place following Watergate-era fundraising abuses. The system was intended to reduce candidates’ dependence on large contributions from individuals and groups.
Money for the program comes from a voluntary \$3 checkoff on Americans’ income tax returns. The fund currently contains \$195 million, which can be used only for presidential primary and general election campaigns and to subsidize the major parties’ nominating conventions.

Over time, the program began to weaken. George W. Bush refused public funding in his 2000 and 2004 presidential primary campaigns but did accept the money in the general election. Several candidates in both parties opted out in the 2008 primaries, but others did accept matching funds, including Democrat John Edwards.
Arizona Sen. John McCain, the 2008 GOP nominee, turned down matching funds for the primaries but then took them in the general election — a move that severely hindered his ability to compete financially with Obama.
For this year’s serious GOP candidates, refusing federal funds will be both liberating and daunting.
By refusing matching funds, candidates are potentially forfeiting a lot of money. Edwards received nearly \$13 million in matching funds in the 2008 primary, and Joe Biden, now the vice president, accepted over \$2 million for his primary run. McCain, the winner of the GOP nomination that year, accepted \$84 million in federal funds for the general election, but that barred him from any private fundraising. Obama opted

out of the system and raised \$264 million.
For the general election this time, a qualifying party’s nominee would get just under \$90 million and would be prohibited from raising more privately. For the primaries it’s more complicated: Qualifying candidates can receive a federal match of up to \$250 for each contribution from an individual and must abide by both state spending limits and an overall spending limit of around \$50 million.
Among the likely Republican candidates:
• Romney, a multimillionaire, turned down public funds in 2008. He raised \$66 million and lent his campaign \$44 million before eventually dropping out.
He’s expected to enter the 2012 field soon and has begun assembling a list of “bundlers” who have been asked to raise \$25,000 apiece. He has told donors he hopes to take in \$50 million for the primaries — less than his 2008 run but an ambitious figure nonetheless. He has not indicated how much of his personal fortune he will commit.
• Former House Speaker Newt Gingrich hopes to raise \$30 million for the primaries, his advisers say. Gingrich has long solicited funds for several organizations including the independent American Solution for Winning the Future, which raised and spent \$28 million in 2010.
• Mississippi Gov. Haley Barbour has a strong na-

tional fundraising base from his years as a lobbyist and as chairman of the Republican National Committee and Republican Governors Association. His advisers say he plans to refuse federal matching funds and has set a goal of raising \$55 million for the primaries.
• Minnesota Gov. Tim Pawlenty hopes to raise about \$25 million for the primaries. Advisers say they don’t believe he would accept matching funds. Pawlenty’s campaign has deployed a 16-member national fundraising team aimed at starting an aggressive fundraising push April 1. He also has raised \$4 million for three separate political action committees.

Freshmen turn in Top 10 rodeo performances

Several freshmen kicked off the opening weekend for the District VI high school rodeo season, held Friday and Saturday at the College of Southern Idaho, with strong showings and sporting high potential.

The bright star for the cowgirls was Raylee Reeves from Minico, who works four events and made top showings in each event. Reeves had first place finishes both Friday and Saturday in poles and a first in barrels on Saturday. Reeves clocked in with a 21.242-second run on Friday in poles and an even

better time on Saturday of 20.910 seconds. Reeves captured her win in barrels by rounding the clover-leaf pattern in 15.315 seconds. She also finished the weekend with a third in barrels on Friday and a seventh in breakaway and 10th in goats on Saturday.

A couple of familiar names of past District VI participants, Tubbs and Vierstra, also made their presence known as Bandee Tubbs and Filer teammate Cara Vierstra kicked off their high school rodeo careers.

Tubbs was destined to pick up the sport from her family. Her brother, Bailey, was a standout rough stock rider in high school

and now rides for CSI and is one of the top college saddle bronc riders in the nation. Her father, Brian, is one of the CSI rodeo coaches and was a rough stock cowboy in the past.

"My nerves were crazy on Friday," said Tubbs, who finished the weekend with a sixth in breakaway, a pair of fourths in poles and an eighth in barrels. "I could have done better Friday, but it helped me focus more on Saturday. I felt a little added pressure because my brother was so good. Breakaway is my favorite event because I practice it the most and feel the most confident in it."

Cassie and Katie Vierstra were

successful cowgirls in the district and led the way for little sister Cara, who looks to be following in their footsteps after recording a seventh and eighth in goats and a ninth in breakaway.

On the boys side, brothers Cody and Coy Surret, from Castleford, were in neck-to-neck competition and finished with six Top 10 finishes. Cody placed third in calf roping both nights and picked up a third in steer wrestling, while Coy was fourth and sixth in calf roping and third in steer wrestling.

McKenzie Zollinger of Oakley was one of a seasoned group of returners from last year to be a double winner. After turning in a time

of 8.68 seconds to win goats on Friday night, Zollinger bettered her time on Saturday by more than a second with a run of 7.64.

Brogan Parkin of Minico and Garrett Alger of Filer highlighted the boys competition by finishing first each night in calf roping and steer wrestling, respectively. Parkin roped in times of 12.47 and 13.07 seconds and Alger wrestled in 5.34 and 8.85 seconds.

Colton Baratti of Filer managed to stay aboard Colt 45 for the full eight seconds and secured 53 points in bull riding on Saturday.

Harvick wins with late-race charge

MARTINSVILLE, Va. — It was supposed to be a showdown between Denny Hamlin and Jimmie Johnson, the only two drivers able to win at tricky Martinsville Speedway of late.

Instead, the end of Sunday's race became a battle among the unexpected.

First it was Kyle Busch, a master at seemingly every short track except this one, in the lead. Then, with a bump to get to the front came Dale Earnhardt Jr., loser of 99 consecutive races. But closing quickly was Kevin Harvick, driving for a Richard Childress Racing team that hadn't won at Martinsville since 1995.

The race went to Harvick for the second consecutive week in another come-from-nowhere victory. He passed Earnhardt with four laps remaining, and knew denying NASCAR's most popular driver the win might not have been, well, popular.

"As I was catching him, I'm like, 'Man, I'm going to be the bad guy here,'" Harvick said. "I've got to do what I've got to do. I know the fans want to see him win. I want to see him win. It would be great for the sport and I think today went a long way to showing how competitive (Earnhardt) can be and that's what we need. We all need him to win."

"But I'm not going to back down."

Earnhardt settled for second and still has not won since Michigan in June 2008, his first season with Hendrick Motorsports. But he's running much better this season, and Sunday pushed him to eighth in the standings, the highest he's been since Texas this time last year.

"I am frustrated. I got close," Earnhardt said. "I ain't won in a long time. I was thinking at the end I was meant to win the damn race."

Busch was third. And the favorites? Well, they were nowhere near the leaders during the action-packed final 20 laps.

Hamlin and Johnson had combined to win the last nine races at Martinsville, and ran most of the day as if one of them would again make the trip to Victory Lane. Both failed to finish inside the top 10.

Johnson was flagged for speeding on pit road late, finished 11th, and was irritated with NASCAR over what he thought was a bogus penalty.

"I wasn't speeding," he insisted. "They didn't like how it looked, the way I managed my timing lines. There is just no way. It won't do me any good to have a conversation (with NASCAR), it isn't going to matter."

Huskies, Bulldogs to battle for national title

HOUSTON — Butler coach Brad Stevens loves an underdog, whether it's his team back in the Final Four or Connecticut making an unprecedented five-games-in-five-nights run through the Big East tournament.

Wait, what? A Big East team as an underdog? The coach at tiny Butler cheering for big, bad UConn?

Welcome to the bizarre world of college basketball

in 2011 — a sport where not only is anything possible, but where nothing quite makes sense. A sport in which the story of a small school from a small conference making a run to a title is no more rare than that of the late-season magic conjured by a power program with one of the nation's best players.

Butler and Connecticut will meet Monday in the national title game — the eighth-seeded Bulldogs trying to finish the deal after coming oh-so-close last

season and the third-seeded Huskies (31-9), led by Kemba Walker, talking about shocking the world with their 11th straight victory after a regular season that foreshadowed none of this.

"We were all rooting for UConn because it was a great story," Stevens said, "a lot of fun to follow."

As is Butler, the team from a 4,500-student campus in Indianapolis that practices at Hinkle Fieldhouse, used as the backdrop for the classic movie "Hoosiers" — the based-

on-reality melodrama in which tiny Hickory High stares down the biggest schools in Indiana and wins the state championship. On its second try.

What seemed impossible in that movie is becoming more the norm, at least in the college game. Last season, Butler (28-9) came one desperation heave from toppling Duke to become the first true mid-major to win the championship. This season, Butler wasn't even the biggest longshot at the Final Four. That was VCU,

an 11th seed that fell to the Bulldogs in Saturday's semifinal.

As recently as 2008, the NCAA tournament landed all four No. 1 seeds in the Final Four. This year, there wasn't a single 1 or 2 for the first time in the 33-year history of seeding.

UConn coach Jim Calhoun said this has been the natural progression since the NCAA started limiting scholarships and new NBA rules triggered a flood of

Djokovic continues winning streak

KEY BISCAYNE, Fla. — The target of Novak Djokovic's most vicious forehand was a wooden ball box, and the swing produced an angry thud.

He disposed of another uncooperative racket by flinging it to the concrete, drawing jeers from an otherwise supportive crowd.

After that Djokovic fared better, as did his equipment. He staged his second comeback victory over top-ranked Rafael Nadal in as many weeks, this time to win the Sony Ericsson Open, 4-6, 6-3, 7-6 (4).

Djokovic remains ranked No. 2, but he heads into the clay-court season with a 26-match winning streak that includes four tournament titles. His record of 24-0 in 2011 is the best to begin a year since Ivan Lendl started 25-0 in 1986.

Sunday's win ranked with the most impressive. On a sunny, 85-degree afternoon, Djokovic

swapped shots with the sport's most physically punishing player for nearly 3½ hours.

It was Djokovic who looked fresher at the finish.

"Such a close match," the Serb said. "To win against the No. 1 player of the world in a tiebreak in the third set, it's just incredible."

He whacked a cross-court winner on the final point, then jumped with glee and signaled to encourage more cheers from the roaring crowd. It's a familiar routine: His also won finals this year at the Australian Open, Dubai and Indian Wells.

"What he's doing is unbelievable," Nadal said. "First thing, he's very good; second thing, he's playing with big confidence. When you're winning, it's easier to keep winning."

Nadal hasn't won a tournament since Tokyo in October, but Djokovic is not ready to claim he deserves the No. 1 spot.

Utes tab Nets assistant as new coach

SALT LAKE CITY — The University of Utah hired New Jersey Nets assistant Larry Krystkowiak as their coach Sunday, picking him to lead the Utes into the Pac-12 Conference.

The move came three weeks after athletic director Chris Hill fired Jim Boylen following consecutive losing seasons. Krystkowiak, who was traveling Sunday, will be introduced today.

The 46-year-old Krystkowiak has been an assistant with the New Jersey the past eight months. He played for the Jazz in 1992-93 as part of nine injury-plagued NBA seasons after being drafted in the second round (28th overall) in 1986 by the Chicago Bulls.

This will be Krystkowiak's fourth head coaching job.

He was fired in 2008 after going 31-69 in one-plus season coaching the Milwaukee Bucks. He also went

42-20 with a pair of NCAA tournament bids in two seasons at Montana, and was 37-16 with the Idaho Stampede in 2003-04, leading them to the CBA title game.

The hire is an important one for Hill, now on his third coach since Rick Majerus departed.

Hill gave Boylen a contract extension after a 2008-09 season that saw the Utes go 24-10 and win a share of the Mountain West Conference regular-season title. Because of that extension, Boylen is receiving a \$2 million severance package.

Hill also hired Ray Giacoletti, but fired him four years ago after a 54-40 mark.

Neither could match the success of Majerus, a fan favorite and cult figure during 14-plus seasons at Utah. Under Majerus, the Utes qualified for the NCAA tournament 10 times, advancing to the regional semifinals twice and the national championship game in 1998.

Evans, Kings sink slumping Utah

SACRAMENTO, Calif. — Tyreke Evans had 24 points and 10 assists to help Sacramento end a two-game losing streak and continue Utah's freefall with a 106-97 win Sunday.

Rookie DeMarcus Cousins added 17 points, nine rebounds, six assists and five steals before fouling out in the game's final minute for the Kings. Francisco Garcia had 17 points and Marcus Thornton scored 15.

Notre Dame was 0-3 against its Big East rival this season but they had all the answers this time for the Huskies, who lost for just the second time in three seasons. Notre Dame had already beaten Tennessee in the NCAA tournament, ending a 20-game skid against the Volunteers. Now they have knocked out the two-time defending champions.

Moore finished with 36 points, including 12 straight as she tried to rally the Huskies from a 12-point deficit in the final 6 minutes,

but it wasn't enough.

TEXAS A&M 63, STANFORD 62

INDIANAPOLIS — Texas A&M's defense was good enough to take down two No. 1 seeds.

They'll find out Tuesday if it's good enough to win a national title.

players who would come to college for one year, then declare for the draft.

"It's as close to parity as there can be," Calhoun said. "It certainly can occur in a tournament a lot more than it could playing a Saturday night, then Big Monday. It's just the nature of things. ... The one-and-done thing, walking the tightrope is a hard thing, a very difficult thing."

If anyone can say they've mastered it this season, it's UConn. Led by Walker, the junior guard on the verge of becoming the best player to ever put on a Huskies uniform, Connecticut won five games in five nights against Big East competition to win the postseason tournament.

A remarkable accomplishment in any conference, but especially the Big East — the 16-team behemo-

moth that placed a record 11 teams in the tournament this year. Maybe because of the grueling nature of its regular season, the Big East wore down and had a terrible showing, only moving two teams into the second weekend.

But Connecticut is still standing, a testament to Walker's playmaking ability (he's averaging 25.5 points during this 10-game winning streak) and Calhoun's ability to adjust on the fly to the fatigue that has predictably set in.

"Our code has been very simple: 'The hell with it, let's just go play basketball,'" Calhoun said. "Well, we wouldn't be doing all the things we did last night defensively to Kentucky if we just kind of rolled the thing out there. We worked very hard on it. But we worked on it in a different way."

"It's the best four months in my life, but it's only the start of the season," he said. "It's a bit early to talk about getting that top spot in the rankings. Rafa is definitely the best player in the world now. If I want to have the No. 1 ranking, I need to play consistently well throughout the whole year."

Djokovic also overcame a one-set deficit to beat Nadal in the Indian Wells final two weeks ago and is 8-0 against top-10 opponents this year. He's the first man to win Indian Wells and Key Biscayne back to back since Roger Federer in 2006.

Nadal fell to 0-3 in Key Biscayne finals.

"Maybe I was a little bit more nervous than other days," Nadal said, "maybe because I never won here,

and this is the third chance."

Djokovic earned his second Key Biscayne title. When he won in 2007, it was the biggest victory of his career.

He has since collected two Grand Slam championships, and as the victories mount, his popularity rises. Although he played against a Spaniard in a region with strong Latin ties, more than half of the capacity crowd of 14,625 seemed to favor Djokovic.

Fans frequently chanted "No-le! No-le!" — his nickname. In response came chants of "Ra-fa! Ra-fa!" Serb and Spanish flags dotted the colorful stands.

"Any support is welcome," Djokovic said, "especially in these very close matches. The atmosphere was amazing."

Mickelson wins Masters tuneup in Houston by three

Lefty heads to Augusta to defend title, win 4th green jacket

HUMBLE, Texas — Phil Mickelson feels pretty confident about his game heading into the Masters.

The defending champion at Augusta outdueled Scott Verplank on Sunday to win the Houston Open by three shots, his first victory since earning his third green jacket last April.

And it comes with a notable distinction.

The win moved Mickelson's world ranking to No. 3, while Tiger Woods dropped to No. 7. It's the first time Mickelson has been ahead of Woods in the ranking since the week before Woods won the 1997 Masters for his first major championship.

"It feels really good for me to have played well and gained some momentum heading into next week," Mickelson said. "I needed to have a week where I kind of put it together."

The 40-year-old Mickelson shot a 7-under 65, the lowest closing score by a winner this year, to finish at 20 under.

He was 16 under over his final 36 holes, after tying the course record with a 63 on Saturday, his lowest round in two years. He won for the fifth straight time when he's shot 64 or better in at least one of the rounds.

"I've been saying all year, 'I'm playing well, but I'm not getting the scores out of it, and I'm just kind of having a lapse of focus,'" he said. "It was a great week in that regard, and great for getting momentum heading in next week."

Tour rookie and second-round leader Chris Kirk (67) tied Verplank (68) at 17 under.

Lefty is hoping he can repeat some history at Augusta this week. The 39-time tour winner is the last player to win the week prior to a Masters victory, capturing the BellSouth Classic in 2006 before earning his second green jacket. The Houston Open became the run-up event to Augusta in 2007.

While many top players, including Woods and world No. 1 Martin Kaymer sat out this week, Mickelson saw no

disadvantage in coming here and trying to win. Anthony Kim won last year and finished third at the Masters.

"I think it's nothing but a plus to be able to gain some momentum," Mickelson said. "Especially given that I haven't had the results and the scores that I wanted earlier in the year. It gives me a little bit of momentum."

The victory came with an emotional tug for Mickelson. Dr. Tom Buchholz, a radiation oncologist at the M.D. Anderson Cancer Center in Houston, has been treating Mickelson's wife, Amy, and mother, Mary, who were diagnosed with breast cancer in 2009.

Buchholz and about 30 members of his staff were in the gallery all weekend, and Mickelson gave Buchholz the flag from the 18th hole after his round.

"Houston has become a special place for Phil and Amy," Buchholz said. "They're two fantastic individuals, and it's truly been a privilege to have become part of their lives. Tremendously meaningful to me, to be part of this story."

LEHMAN PULLS AWAY TO WIN CHAMPIONS TOUR TITLE

SAUCIER, Miss. — Tom Lehman made things look easy while taking the lead at the Mississippi Gulf Resort Classic. Holding on for the victory proved a little more difficult.

Lehman won his second Champions Tour title of the season Sunday, closing with a 3-under 69 at Fallen Oak.

Lehman, who won the Allianz Championship in February, started the day with a one-stroke lead over Jeff Sluman and bogeyed the first hole to briefly fall into a tie.

LEWIS WINS 1ST LPGA TITLE AT KRAFT NABISCO

Amid Idaho’s budget trainwreck, an ongoing Medicaid disaster

Even in private sector-friendly Idaho, there comes a time when enough is enough. A new report by the Legislature’s Office of Performance Evaluations shows that problems with the state’s Medicaid payment system could cost Idaho several million dollars in advanced payments to providers that may not be returned. That’s in addition to lowered reimbursements from the federal government because of delays in payments.

Among OPE’s recommendations is that the Idaho Department of Health and Welfare, which oversees the Medicaid program, slow down payments to Molina

Our view: It’s time that Idaho took a harder line on Molina Healthcare’s misfeasance in handling payments to Medicaid providers.

Healthcare, a private company it hired to process Medicaid claims from health care providers. It’s about time. Molina’s trouble-plagued Idaho operation went on line last June and triggered payment delays for doctors, hospitals and other Medicaid providers. That led Gov. C.L. “Butch” Otter to promise fixes to the system and the payments. OPE has made several recommendations, including encouraging Health and Welfare to delay payments to

Molina, a Long Beach, Calif.-based managed care firm, until the company gets its act together.

According to the *Idaho Reporter*, the state has already paid Molina and Unisys — which initially won the Medicaid management contract and was later bought by Molina — \$18.6 million for the system and Molina has billed the state another \$9.1 million for operating costs. The contract runs through 2014.

Medicaid provides insurance to more than 200,000 Idahoans who are children from low-income families, have disabilities, are elderly, or are pregnant and low-income. Molina’s system handles 125,000 claims a week, making an average of \$25 million in payments to providers. Typically, health care providers provide services to people on Medicaid, then bill the state.

The delays last summer led Health and Welfare to cut checks to providers for \$117 million as interim payments that would be repaid as providers submitted Medicaid claims in subsequent months. Almost \$50 million has been paid back to the state, but more than \$16 million is unlikely to be repaid by a June 30 deadline, according to the *Idaho Reporter*. OPE says Health and Welfare is having trouble collecting more than \$2 million from providers who have gone out of business or are no longer asking for Medicaid dollars.

This in a state that’s about to slash \$35 million more in Medicaid funding, which will almost certainly force other providers out of business.

According to OPE, Molina’s system had almost 20,000 claims waiting more than a month at the start of the year. By paying those claims in 2011 rather than 2010, Idaho’s Medicaid program gave up 3 cents on every dollar. As of last week, there were almost 19,000 such claims from providers for \$16.2 million in Medicaid money. If all those claims get paid in after today, the state would miss out on \$324,000 in federal money.

The advent of the new Molina system last June coincided with a DHW policy to delay some payments to providers in an effort to keep its budget balanced, since June is the last month in the state government’s fiscal year.

Molina has responded by nearly doubling its support staff. The number of pending claims has dropped by more than half since September and providers calling Molina about issues are spending less time on hold.

So why didn’t Molina bring its A-game last June? A publicly traded company, Molina has annual revenue of \$4.1 billion, net income of \$55 million and 4,200 employees. Clearly, it has the resources to fix its Idaho problem.

Health and Welfare, the Legislature and the governor are responsible for the fact that it hasn’t done so yet.

Trying to see past emotion of immigration debate

Tony Garza, the former U.S. ambassador to Mexico, has the best explanation I’ve heard about why our country can’t do anything about immigration. Americans on all sides are stuck in their emotional responses to the changes immigration causes, and we can’t get to the point that reason guides us.

For some, emotions run high because they see American culture changing around them. Signs in Spanish, advertising stores catering to Hispanics. Latinos dominating schools. New census data showing one in six Americans today is Latino only intensifies those feelings.

Others believe the law is out to get them. Workplace raids, leading to relatives’ deportations. State officials joining the rush to round up illegals and send them packing. Some Hispanics feel tattooed with a permanent target.

The rational response should be to modernize America’s immigration laws so they make clear people can’t come here illegally but that we long have been a welcoming society. People who really want to come here deserve a chance to work, learn English, pay taxes and, yes, even earn citizenship.

But we can’t get even that far because most of us largely respond from the gut. Before we can approach this debate with new policy proposals, we must understand why people respond so viscerally.

The way beyond the emotional phase starts with assimilation, which is a fancy term for figuring out how people from different backgrounds can live side by side.

Assimilation has been one of America’s preeminent challenges. As in the past, it’s answered through finding ways that people share similar experiences.

In my father’s generation, the Army did that, and, in

many ways, it still does. The military throws together people from many backgrounds and gives them a common purpose.

Public schools are another way to get people side-by-side. The day after Garza spoke to a law school audience at Southern Methodist University, I watched black, brown and white kids at my children’s school celebrate Texas during a school pageant.

There they were, elementary kids from all backgrounds dressed in white cowboy shirts, blue jeans or skirts, bandanas and cowboy hats, singing and dancing to Deep in the Heart of Texas. Then came a group of kids learning English and Spanish simultaneously, explaining in each language what various Texas cultural

icons meant: Longhorns, the Lone Star flag, even chili. Talk about your melting pot. My eyes teared up, thinking that if, somehow, we could find more ways to sit cheek-by-jowl, we could get past the visceral part of the immigration debate. Because here, for one night in a Dallas public school, people from various points on the ethnic compass celebrated common, historic symbols.

Let me share one more public school experience. A few days earlier, I taught a class at an under-performing middle school. The demographics were as you might guess in a state where half of the school-age population is Hispanic. In short, plenty of poor Latino kids.

Truthfully, this school was not where I expected to

find our future leaders. But after an hour listening to some sixth-graders debate like authentic legislators, I wanted to run some of them for office.

There was young Daniel in the back, wearing glasses and pontificating like Daniel Webster. Near him sat Derrick: funky hair, full of confidence and discussing the gross domestic product.

As this immigration debate goes forward, I want to remember young Daniel and Derrick. They may not supply all the policy answers, but step one in breaking through the emotional logjam is recognizing that our future is tied up with them, too.

Quran riots spread
to turbulent east

JALALABAD — Demonstrators battled police in southern Afghanistan's main city on Sunday and took to the streets in the turbulent east for the first time as Western pleas failed to halt a third day of rage over a Florida pastor's burning of the Quran.

An officer was shot dead in a second day of clashes in the city of Kandahar, said provincial health director Qayum Pokhla. Two officers and 18 civilians were wounded, he said.

In Jalalabad, the largest city in the east, hundreds of people blocked the main highway for three hours, shouting for U.S. troops to leave, burning an effigy of President Barack Obama and stomping on a drawing of a U.S. flag. More than 1,000 people set tires ablaze to block another highway in eastern Parwan province for about an hour, said provincial police chief Sher Ahmad Maladani.

The violence was set off by anger over the March 20 burning of the Quran by a Florida church.

Abidjan tense,
awaiting final battle

ABIDJAN — Residents barricaded themselves inside their homes Sunday, blanketing windows and pushing furniture against doors as this country on Africa's western coast tensely awaited the final battle between the two men who claim the presidency.

Fighters backing the internationally recognized president, Alassane Ouattara, amassed at a tollbooth on the city's northern edge, preparing for the final assault. Their leader was declared the winner of last November's election, but Ouattara has not been able to assume office because outgoing president Laurent Gbagbo is refusing to yield power.

Water has been cut off to much of Abidjan, and on the empty streets, a handful of women with basins could be seen hurriedly crossing the waterfront highway to reach the lagoon. Men ventured out with plastic bags to scoop up water, holding the bags high in the air to signal to soldiers in firing positions that they were not armed.

Security breach
grows at retailers

NEW YORK — Best Buy Co., TiVo Inc., and Walgreen Co. are the latest in a seemingly endless string of companies to warn over the weekend that hackers gained access to customers' files, including email addresses.

The companies all use the same marketing and communications vendor, Epsilon. It's a leading marketing services firm that sends more than 40 billion emails annually and has more than 2,500 clients including seven of the Fortune 10. Epsilon, based in Dallas, issued a brief statement on Friday saying "a full investigation was under way" following the discovery of the breach of some customer client data.

The company said that information obtained was limited to names and email addresses and that "no other personal identifiable information associated with the names was at risk."

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Cracks found in 3 more Southwest planes

YUMA, Ariz. — Inspectors have found small, subsurface cracks in three more Southwest Airlines planes that are similar to those suspected of causing a jetliner to lose pressure and make a harrowing emergency landing in Arizona, a federal investigator said Sunday.

Southwest said in statement that two of its Boeing 737-700s had cracks and will be evaluated and repaired before they are returned to service. A National Transportation Safety Board member told The Associated Press later Sunday that a third plane

had been found with cracks developing.

The cracks found in the three planes developed in two lines of riveted joints that run the length of the aircraft.

Nineteen other Boeing 737-300 planes inspected using a special test developed by the manufacturer showed no problems and will be returned to service. Checks on nearly 60 other jets are expected to be completed by late Tuesday, the airline said.

That means flight cancellations could continue until the planes are back in the air. About 600 flights in all were canceled over the weekend.

NTSB board member Robert Sumwalt said Boeing was developing a "service bulletin" for all 737-300 models with comparable flight cycle time as the Arizona jet, which was 15 years old and had about 39,000 take-off and landing cycles.

There are 931 such models in service worldwide, 288 of which in the U.S. fleet.

Boeing's bulletin would strongly suggest extensive checks of two lines of "lap joints" that run the length of the fuselage. The NTSB has not mandated the checks.

Friday's flight carrying 118 people rapidly lost cabin pressure after the plane's fuselage ruptured — causing a

5-foot-long tear — just after takeoff from Phoenix.

Passengers recalled tense minutes after the hole ruptured overhead with a blast and they fumbled frantically for oxygen masks. Pilots made a controlled descent from 34,400 feet into a southwestern Arizona military base. No one was seriously injured.

The tear along a riveted "lap joint" near the roof of the plane above the midsection shows evidence of extensive cracking that hadn't been discovered during routine maintenance before the flight — and probably wouldn't have been unless mechanics had specifically looked for it — officials said.

U.S. extends airstrike role
in Libya through Monday

WASHINGTON — The U.S. agreed to NATO's request for a 48-hour extension of American participation in coalition airstrikes against targets in Libya and U.S. lawmakers cautioned Sunday the allies need to know more about the rebels fighting Moammar Gadhafi's forces before providing them with weapons.

Two weeks into the assault on Gadhafi, Republican lawmakers expressed concern that a stalemate could leave him in control of portions of Libya and with access to stockpiles of chemical weapons.

The U.S. is shifting the combat role to Britain, France and other NATO allies, but American air power is still in demand. Air Force AC-130 gunships and A-10 Thunderbolts and Marine Corps AV-8B Harriers will continue to attack Gadhafi's troops and other

sites through Monday evening. These aircraft are among the most precise in the American arsenal.

After Saturday, no U.S. combat aircraft were to fly strike missions over Libya unless NATO officials specifically asked and authorities in Washington gave their approval. NATO assumed full control last week from the U.S.-led international force for all aspects of the operation in Libya as authorized by U.N. resolutions that include an arms embargo, enforcing the no-fly zone, and protecting civilians from Gadhafi's forces.

In an emailed statement, NATO spokeswoman Oana Lungescu said Sunday that "poor weather conditions over the last few days" were the reason the alliance made the request. She would not elaborate. "This is a short-term extension which expires on Monday," she said.

A senior U.S. military official said heavy cloud cov-

er over Libya late last week curtailed allied airstrikes. Gadhafi took advantage of the lull, pushing east into the port cities of Ras Lanouf and Brega, the official said on condition of anonymity to discuss sensitive military planning. The 48-hour extension is intended to roll back the progress made by Gadhafi's army, the official said.

A decision yet to be made by the Obama administration is whether to arm the rebels with the firepower they need to take and hold ground against Gadhafi's forces.

Rep. Mike Rogers, R-Mich., the chairman of the House Intelligence Committee, said there may be strains of al-Qaida within the rebel ranks and that the coalition should proceed with caution before arming them.

"We know they're against Moammar Gadhafi remaining in power, but we don't know what they are for," Rogers said.

New study supports
fixing heart valves
without surgery

NEW ORLEANS — Cardiologists are reporting a major advance: A long-awaited study suggests that many people with a bad aortic valve, the heart's main gate, can avoid open-heart surgery and have a new one placed through a tube in an artery instead.

There is a downside — a higher risk of stroke — and uncertainty about how long these valves will last.

Still, doctors predicted that if the new valve wins federal approval, patients would embrace it as they did balloon angioplasty, which has allowed millions to have clogged arteries fixed without an operation.

"The fact that it's not open-heart surgery sells itself, and the rest gets lost in the mix," said Dr. Craig Smith, heart surgery chief at Columbia University and New York-Presbyterian Hospital.

He led the study and gave results Sunday at an American College of Cardiology conference in New Orleans.

Dr. Michael Crawford, chairman of the meeting and cardiology chief at the University of California, San Francisco, called it "a historic event" that would dramatically change practice. "As good as surgery is, patients just don't want it," he said.

The aortic valve can stiffen and narrow with age, making the heart strain to push blood through it. Severe cases are treated with surgery to replace the valve, but that's risky for many older people who have this problem. Without an operation, half die within two years.

The study tested a way to wedge in a new valve with-

out surgery. Dr. Edward McNulty, a cardiologist at the University of California, San Francisco, explained how it works:

Through an artery in the groin or the chest, "a new heart valve is literally crimped on a balloon and advanced across the narrowed, older, diseased heart valve. The balloon is inflated and the new valve left in place."

A test of this gentler approach in people too sick for surgery found it greatly improved survival, doctors reported last fall. The new study involved nearly 700 people eligible but at high risk for surgery.

Their median age was 84, and they were randomly assigned to get valves replaced through surgery or the new way. Here's how much people dread this optice. "As good as surgery is, patients just don't want it," he said.

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Engineers pin hopes on polymer to stop nuclear leak

TOKYO — Engineers pinned their hopes on chemicals, sawdust and shredded newspaper to stop highly radioactive water pouring into the ocean from Japan’s tsunami-ravaged nuclear plant Sunday as officials said it will take several months to bring the crisis under control, the first time they have provided a timetable.

Concrete already failed to stop the tainted water spewing from a crack in a maintenance pit, and the new mixture did not appear to be working either, but engineers said they were not abandoning it.

The Fukushima Da-ichi plant has been leaking radioactivity since the March 11 tsunami carved a path of destruction along Japan’s northeastern coast, killing as many as 25,000 people and knocking out key cooling systems that kept it from overheating. People living within 12 miles of the plant have been forced to abandon their homes.

The government said Sunday it will be several months before the radiation stops and permanent cooling systems are restored. Even after that happens, there will be years of work ahead to clean up the area around the complex and figure out what to do with it.

“It would take a few months until we finally get things under control and

have a better idea about the future,” said Nuclear and Industrial Safety Agency spokesman Hidehiko Nishiyama. “We’ll face a crucial turning point within the next few months, but that is not the end.”

His agency said the timetable is based on the first step, pumping radioactive water into tanks, being completed quickly and the second, restoring cooling systems, being done within a matter of weeks or months.

Every day brings some new problem at the plant, where workers have often been forced to retreat from repair efforts because of high radiation levels. On Sunday, plant operator Tokyo Electric Power Co. announced it had found the bodies of two workers missing since the tsunami.

Radiation, debris and explosions kept workers from finding them until Wednesday, and then the announcement was delayed several days out of respect for their families.

TEPCO officials said they believed the workers ran down to a basement to check equipment after the magnitude-9.0 earthquake that preceded the tsunami. They were there when the massive wave swept over the plant.

“It pains us to have lost these two young workers who were trying to protect the power plant amid the earthquake and tsunami,” TEPCO Chairman Tsunehisa Katsumata said in a statement.

More families adopting HIV children

The immediate task might be coaxing a toddler into one more swallow of nasty-tasting medication. Longer term, there are tough choices to be made about telling that child — and the surrounding community — why those daily doses may be needed for the rest of his or her life.

While most adoptions present challenges, there’s a distinctive set of them facing parents who decide to adopt children living with HIV. A twice-daily medication regimen, lingering prejudice and fear, uncertainty about the child’s longevity and marriage prospects.

Yet the number of U.S. parents undertaking HIV adoptions, or seriously considering them, is surging — from a trickle five years ago to at least several hundred. Most involve orphans from foreign countries where they faced stigma, neglect and the risk of early death.

“I can’t think of a more significant way to make an impact than to do this,” said Margaret Fleming, a 74-year-old Chicagoan whose nine adopted children include three HIV-positive first graders.

“These kids were, in many ways, the modern-day lepers,” she said.

Ignorance and bias related to HIV haven’t vanished in the United States. But the stigma is steadily lessening, especially compared to many of the other countries that are home to an estimated 2.5 million children with the disease.

At forums and over the Internet, parents who have adopted HIV-positive kids are offering advice and encouragement to those who might follow suit. In February, Bethany Christian Services — the largest U.S. adoption agency — unveiled a detailed educational package about HIV adoptions to help the growing number of interested parents make informed decisions.

“We didn’t feel we could ethically place these kids without some really solid education for these families,” said Sara Ruiter, Bethany’s international services coordinator.

dinator. “There are some very unique, chronic challenges that we want to be on the parents’ mind.”

One of the most difficult challenges, for many families, is deciding whom they will tell about the adoptive child’s HIV status. Health care providers must be informed — otherwise, under federal and state confidentiality laws, it’s entirely optional whether parents notify school officials, neighbors, or anyone else.

As a result, families’ approaches vary widely — some are totally open while others, fearful of stigma, guard the information so tightly that even the child may be kept in the dark for many years.

“Once your child’s status is disclosed, you cannot ‘take it back,’ so careful consideration and thought should be given to this important issue,” Bethany advises.

For Tim and Annette Franklin, of Bridport, Vt., the decision to be open about their adopted daughter Gedeleine’s HIV status was intended to make clear it’s nothing to be ashamed of.

“We were concerned that by being overly secretive, we would be contributing to the stigma,” said Tim Franklin, a Congregational minister.

“Inevitably, in families where there are secrets, the secrets end up being destructive,” he said. “We felt it’s going to come out, and we want to control the way it happens, rather than it coming out in a bad way.”

Gedeleine, who will turn 4 in May, was living in a Haitian orphanage when the catastrophic earthquake struck there on Jan. 12, 2010. Already in the adoption pipeline, she was airlifted to Florida 11 days later with dozens of other children, then taken to her new home in rural Vermont.

There have been moments where Gedeleine balked at taking the twice-daily dose of three HIV medicines. But her parents, who have four biological children ranging in age from 8 to 19, say the adoption has been a heartwarming

success overall, to the extent that they are now completing arrangements to adopt an HIV-positive boy from Ethiopia.

The arrival of 13-year-old Ephrem will speed up the timetable for the Franklins to tackle one of the other distinct challenges of HIV adoptions — having frank discussions with the child about the impact of their status on any future sexual relationships, and the need to be honest with any partner.

“We’ll have to find out what he knows about sexuality, what he knows about his disease, what values he’s been exposed to,” Tim Franklin said. “One of the things we’ll try to help him understand is that he has a responsibility to other people.”

Like the Franklins, Ryan and Stacy Vander Zwaag of Mears, Mich., have decided to be open about the HIV status of their newly adopted 2-year-old daughter, Luisa, who just arrived from Colombia on March 19. They even have a detailed section about HIV on the family blog.

“We did not have to tell anyone,” the Vander Zwaags write. “But we believe God has given us this opportunity to educate others about the precious children like Luisa (and adults too) that are living with HIV and AIDS and help raise awareness and truth instead of ignorance and fear.”

Luisa joins a household bustling with the Vander Zwaags’ four biological sons, aged 5 to 13, and daughter Anaya, almost 4, who was adopted from Guatemala in 2008.

The boys were briefed in stages about their new baby sister — first being told she had a blood disorder, then getting the full story that she had HIV. There were specific instructions about precautions to take if Luisa bled from an open cut, but the overall message was one of reassurance that the disease can’t be spread through casual contact.

Ryan Vander Zwaag, the

youth pastor at a Baptist church, said he and his wife had talked about adoption ever since they married right out of high school. The more they learned about the vast numbers of HIV-positive orphans, the more interested they became in bringing one into their family. Fears about exposing their own family to health risks and prejudice gradually faded as they read articles, attended a conference, and spoke with other parents who had undertaken HIV adoptions.

“It’s not that hard,” said Stacy Vander Zwaag. “And there are so many kids who would die without it.”

Luisa was in that category, her parents said. A doctor told them she would almost certainly have died soon had she stayed in the Colombian foster home where she was placed as an infant.

“She was removed from her parents because of medical neglect,” Ryan Vander Zwaag said. “It was nothing she did. It was choices her mother and father made that got her infected with HIV.”

Sleep apnea no fun for sufferers or their kin

Peter Manschot woke up in a hotel room and found his wife, Emily, sleeping in the bathroom.

"I felt really bad," says Manschot, 63, of Novi, Mich. "She was curled up with blankets and whatever pillows she could scrounge, trying to make a bed out of the bath tub."

It was the only place she could sleep because he was snoring so loudly.

Manschot's snoring was a symptom of a much bigger problem. He is among the estimated 18 million Americans with obstructive sleep apnea, a chronic condition in which the airway is blocked during sleep. It prevented Manschot from breathing and caused him to snore.

"Basically, I was waking up 30 or 40 times an hour," Manschot says. Doctors evaluated him, and "they said on a scale of 1 to 10, I was a 12. They could hear me down the hall with the doors closed."

The prevalence of sleep apnea is expected to grow with the rise in obesity and the aging population, because age and weight are two factors that increase the chances of developing the chronic condition in which the back of the throat relaxes and the airway becomes blocked.

For some, surgery can alleviate the problem. For others, the use of a continuous positive airway pressure (CPAP) machine opens up the airways and allows for more normal breathing dur-

A sealant appointment can prevent some kid cavities

Here's a low-cost way to protect your kids' teeth — and perhaps reduce the time they'll spend in the dentist's chair later.

An April 16 clinic in Twin Falls will provide dental sealants and fluoride treatments for elementary schoolchildren. Students in grades two through six are eligible for the reduced-fee services. The clinic will cost \$5 to \$20 per child, depending on the number of sealants applied.

The clinic — sponsored by College of Southern Idaho, Regence Caring Foundation for Children and South Central Public Health District — will run from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. in CSI's Health Science and Human Services building, at 397 North College Road, room 187. Use the building's east entrance.

Sealants prevent the most common type of tooth decay in molars. The chewing surfaces have many deep pits and grooves — hard to clean with a toothbrush — in which cavity-causing bacteria hide. Plastic coatings painted on the teeth seal the pits and fissures.

"Placing sealants is painless and easy for children," said Susie Beem, dental health coordinator for South Central Public Health. Sealants won't prevent decay between teeth, in the front teeth or on tooth roots, however.

Adolescent medicine: A specialty for teen patients

Laurel Carignan was filling out some insurance paperwork in her pediatrician's office recently when she overheard a conversation between her 12-year-old daughter, who was chatting with a toddler in the waiting room, and a nurse who had just walked into the room. "The nurse comes up to her and says, 'Are you the mom?'" recounted Carignan, whose daughter is as tall as an adult. "If you need evidence that we probably don't belong (at the pediatrician) anymore, there you go."

Luckily for Carignan and other parents, there's somewhere else to take kids who are in the phase between childhood and adulthood. A specialty known as adolescent medicine, or teen medicine, fills the gap for parents and young people who feel out of place in the brightly decorated waiting room of the pediatrician's office, but unready for the primary care physicians and specialists who see mostly adults.

Adolescent medicine is an official sub-specialty of pediatrics, with board certification. But it's relatively little-known, and has only about 500 board-certified practitioners around the country, said Margaret Blythe, an adolescent medicine specialist who is chairwoman of the adolescent committee for the American Academy of Pediatrics.

The specialty has its own association: the Illinois-based Society for Adolescent Health and Medicine, which aims at care for young people ages 10 to 25, and carries out education, research, clinical services and advocacy activities. SAHM issues position papers on topics that affect adolescents such as sexually transmitted diseases, vaccinations, and nutrition that are of particular interest to doctors who care for young people. Some regular pediatricians make a point of talking with teenage patients without parents or caregivers listening in, but those private chats between doctor and patient are an essential compo-

nent of adolescent medicine.

"We always spend time alone with the teen," said Blythe, a professor of pediatrics at Indiana University School of Medicine in Indianapolis.

"This is a time frame in life where we know a lot of kids are going to be making decisions that impact their health, regardless of what the family wishes or wants them to do," Blythe said. "We're really trying to spend some time to answer questions they have that they find totally embarrassing."

Parents are sometimes surprised to find themselves on the other side of the exam room door, but most accept the time has come for their child to talk to the physician alone, Blythe said.

"A parent that is really understanding of teenage life appreciates this," she said.

Carignan, of Boise, said it was her son, a tall 17-year-old who is active in sports, who first asked her if he could start seeing a new physician. It happened about a year and a half ago in the waiting room of the pediatrician he had been seeing for 11 years, around the time the two of them had seated themselves on an undersized plastic couch. The walls were accessorized with colorful borders showing soccer balls and dolls.

"It was awkward," Carignan said. "He was like, 'I don't want to go here anymore.'"

Study: Children raised on farms less prone to asthma

Children raised on farms don't suffer from asthma as much as their city- and suburb-dwelling counterparts, according to a paper published online in the New England Journal of Medicine. But it's not necessarily because of the fresh air, full sun and hard work, researchers say — it's because of the germs.

Scientists had known that many of the things associated with farm life — unpasteurized milk, exposure to animals such as cows and pigs, and hay — helped kids grow up with stronger constitutions, perhaps because they were being exposed to harmless, even beneficial, bacteria along the way. To test this hypothesis, the researchers analyzed samples of house dust to look at the

microbes within.

They showed that children on farms, where the bacteria population is far more diverse, were 30 percent to 50 percent less likely to have asthma than children who didn't live on farms. The wider the range of microbes in the houses, the less likely it was that the children would suffer from asthma.

Also, those who lived on farms were much less likely

to have atopy — an umbrella term for certain types of hyperallergic sensitivity, including hay fever, asthma and eczema. But the drop in atopy was linked to a certain group of bacteria, not to the range of microbes.

Among the possible explanations for the findings: that the beneficial bacteria that live around farms could be staving off some of the harmful bacteria that exacerbate asthma.

that her husband is now sleeping through the night — it means, she is, too.

Untreated sleep apnea can increase the risk of high blood pressure, heart attack, stroke, obesity and diabetes.

Neither the CPAP machine nor surgery helped Tom Norgiel, 50, of Walled Lake, Mich.

For years, he'd searched for a way to get a good night's rest.

He was diagnosed about eight years ago with moderate obstructive sleep apnea. Doctors tried to treat the problem with a CPAP machine, but he didn't like using it. Some people find the masks uncomfortable and the machines too loud.

About five years ago, Norgiel had surgery to try to improve his breathing at night. Surgery usually involves shrinking, stiffening or removing excess tissue in the mouth and throat or resetting the lower jaw, according to the National Institutes of Health. "I had implants put into my mouth," Norgiel says. "It supposedly makes your soft palate more rigid."

But it didn't help. Then, Norgiel visited Dr. Bruce Luria, a dentist who makes a dental device that looks like a mouth guard. The appliance forces Norgiel's jaw forward slightly, pulling his tongue from the back of his throat and opening up the blocked airway.

"When I have that thing on, I don't snore a bit," Norgiel says. "It's like night and day. "It's made a huge improvement for me. I sleep a lot longer."

The use of dental devices to treat sleep apnea is growing in popularity, according to Sheri Katz, the president of the American Academy of Dental Sleep Medicine, a national organization that provides training and resources for dentists and orthodontists who treat sleep apnea.

And that popularity is expected to surge even more. Beginning this year,

Medicare is going to consider coverage for custom-fabricated dental devices to treat mild and moderate cases of sleep apnea — although a pay structure has yet to be determined.

Many insurance companies also cover at least some of the cost of these devices.


"If a patient is covered for CPAP, most insurance companies will cover oral appliance therapy under the right protocol," Katz says. "It's also covered for people who have severe sleep apnea and have failed to use CPAP."

For people who have no trouble with the CPAP treat-



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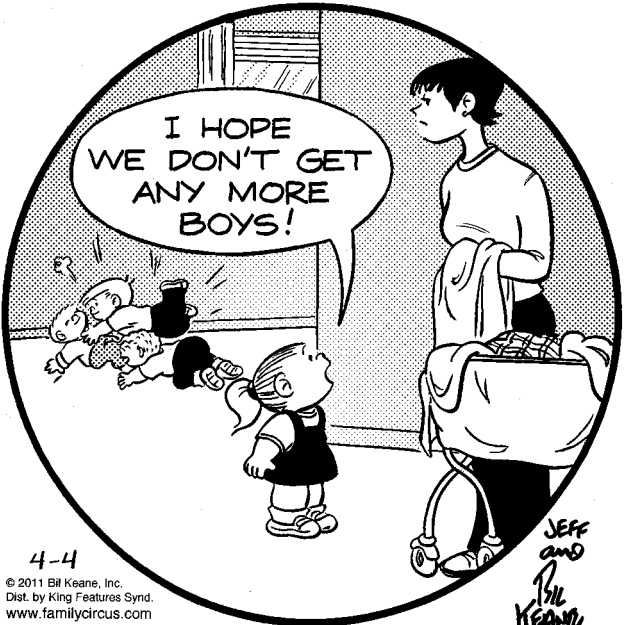

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THE ACES ON BRIDGE® Bobby Wolff

“If I ever do a mean action, it must be in some interval betwixt one passion and another.”

In today's deal you play four spades with only two top club losers, but nothing close to 10 winners. Moreover, West finds the most effective attack when he leads a trump, preventing you from ruffing two losers in dummy. If the defenders can get a second round of trumps in early, you appear to be running short of tricks.

It would be easy to assume that you need the heart finesse to have a chance of making your contract, but that would be to ignore dummy's long diamonds. However, considerable care has to be taken to insure that you can bring the diamond suit in without running into trump trouble. You must win the trump lead in dummy to guarantee that you have enough high trumps in hand to cope with the threat of a bad diamond break. You win the spade 10 at trick one, then take the diamond ace and the heart ace. Next you cross to dummy with the diamond king to ruff a diamond in your hand with a high trump.

Then come a spade to the jack and a second diamond ruff with a high trump. Now you concede a heart, can arrange to ruff either a club or heart low in dummy, then draw the last trump and take your long diamond for your 10th winner.

If you try to be economical and win the first trump lead in your hand, you will go down. West scores a trump trick one way or another.

ANSWER: This sequence suggests your partner believes that an alternative lead to a spade will set three no-trump. (Had he wanted a spade lead, he would have simply passed.) Since neither red suit looks like a plausible candidate, try your luck with a club lead, the only practical alternative.

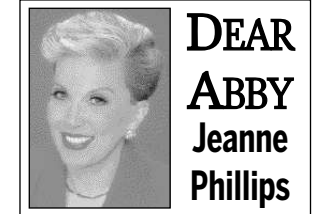

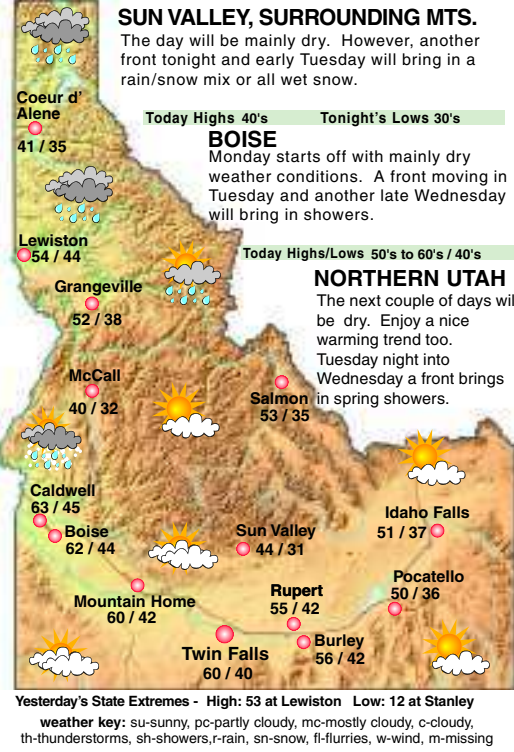

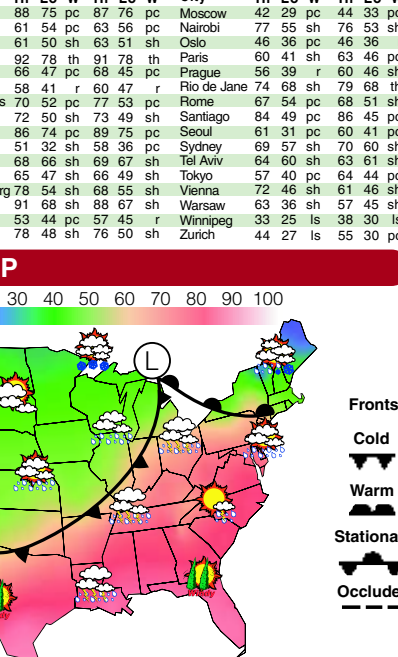
