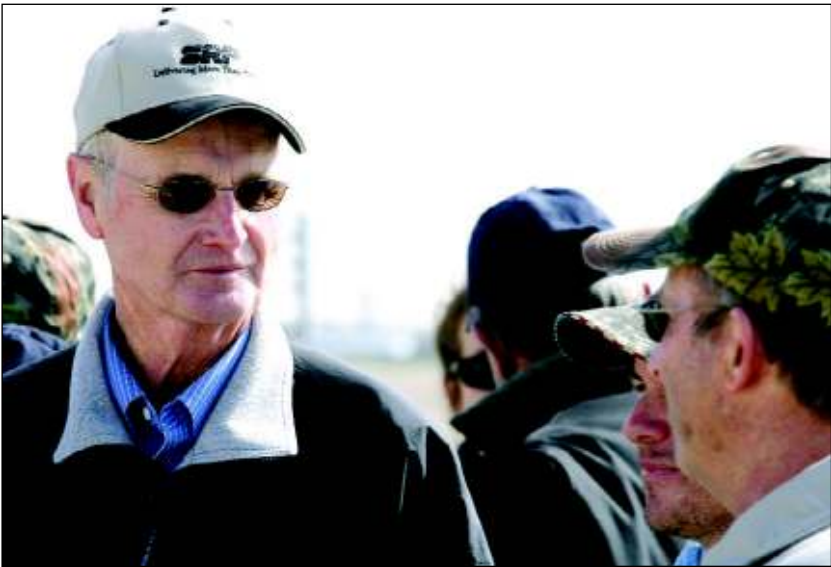

# New trial denied

## Judge turns down Johnson's request

### Case history

**Sept. 2, 2003:** Johnson's parents, Alan and Diane, are found shot to death in their Bellevue home.

**Oct. 29, 2003:** Johnson charged with two counts of first-degree murder and an enhancement for use of a deadly weapon.

**March 16, 2005:** Jury finds Johnson guilty of all charges.

**May 3, 2005:** 5th District Judge Barry Wood denies Johnson's first request for new trial.

**June 30, 2005:** Johnson sentenced to serve two lifetime prison sentences.

**June 26, 2008:** Idaho Supreme Court rejects Johnson's second request for new trial. The U.S. Supreme Court later declines to hear the request.

Convicted murderer Sarah Johnson was denied a new murder trial in a 94-page decision issued Monday by 5th District Judge G. Richard Bevan.

Johnson, 24, is serving two life prison sentences without the possibility of parole for the 2003 murder of her parents, Alan and Diane Johnson, in their Bellevue home. Johnson argued in December that she received poor legal defense, and that new fingerprint evidence should be considered in the case.

But Bevan's decision denies every part of Johnson's request, stating that she and her new lawyers failed to prove that a new trial is necessary. Johnson's court-appointed lawyer, Christopher Simms, vowed to appeal the ruling.

During a four-day hearing in December, Johnson claimed she was convicted because of ineffective legal council during her 2005 trial. In court documents, Johnson claimed her trial concluded with an "unjust verdict due to the cumulative effect of counsel's alleged lack of diligence, failure to investigate the facts and law of the case, chronic tardiness and unpreparedness for court proceedings."

Johnson's petition for a new trial stated that her trial attorneys should have gathered more evidence from the crime scene, including the comforter that covered her mother's

BOISE — An Idaho Falls Republican accused two unidentified House colleagues of ethical lapses in a hearing Wednesday during which lawmakers also killed a bill that would have put strict new prohibitions on where new wind turbines could be built.

The measure would have blocked wind turbines within two miles of improved residential property without the owner's permission. It also would have prohibited counties from approving wind energy facilities whose spinning blades cast a flickering shadow on somebody else's property or a roadway.

Before the 11-8 vote, however, Rep. Janice McGeachin told the House State Affairs Committee that she knew of two lawmakers who hadn't publicly disclosed their personal financial ties to wind projects while voting on a previous measure this session to extend a tax break for wind energy developers. Another panel Republican, Rep. Eric Anderson of Priest Lake, urged McGeachin to speak with House Speaker Lawrence Denney.

# CSI has celebration 24 years in the making

On a night of celebration and reflection, College of Southern Idaho men's basketball coach Steve Gosar summed it up best.

"These guys did what everyone else set out to do this year," Gosar said Wednesday night at CSI Gymnasium where the Golden Eagles celebrated their 2011 NJCAA men's national championship with hundreds of boosters and fans.

It was a celebration 24 years in the making, as CSI's last

men's basketball title came in 1987.

# Twin Falls man charged in police shooting incident

Lee Randall Fife has been charged with three felonies related to a Tuesday morning officer-involved shooting in a southeast Twin Falls.

The 41-year-old Twin Falls man was shot by a Twin Falls police officer after he allegedly attempted to ram police vehicles that had cornered him in a cul-de-sac after a vehicle pursuit that began at 1:18 a.m. He was then sent to St. Luke's Magic Valley Medical Center in Twin Falls.

On Wednesday, Twin Falls County Prosecutor Grant Loebbs said Fife has been charged with eluding a police officer, aggravated battery on a police officer and aggravated assault on a police officer, all felonies. The latter two charges come with weapons enhancements for Fife's alleged use of a car as a battering ram.

## Burley questions cop costs

BURLEY — Burley city officials are again questioning the cost of the law enforcement services they receive from the Cassia County Sheriff's Office.

As city officials prepare for contract negotiations and budgeting for fiscal 2012, the Burley City Council on Tuesday questioned whether the city is receiving

sheriff's services equal to the amount it pays. The city's police department was consolidated with the sheriff's office in 1986.

The city currently pays \$1.53 million to the county for police services, which exceeds the city's expected \$1.43 million in 2012 property tax revenues. The remainder has traditionally been funded through other city revenues, according to the city's last audit.

McGeachin declined to name those she believes are violating House ethics rules, adding she'd be doing some "soul searching" over whether it was her responsibility to raise concerns with them.

"When these issues are so driven by money like this, it clouds people's judgment and drives wedges between communities," McGeachin said. "Sadly, that's what money does. Greed destroys our judgment."

According to Idaho law, public officials are forbidden from taking official action or making a formal decision or formal recommendation concerning any matter where they have a conflict of interest and haven't yet disclosed it. Separate House rules limit activities of representatives with a personal interest until those interests are disclosed, but they may vote upon any issue to which the conflict relates unless they seek recusal.

In a brief interview, Denney said he wasn't aware of lawmakers who stand to benefit directly from the wind industry who voted without declaring a conflict first.

House Minority Leader John Rusche, D-Lewiston, said it should be up to McGeachin to bring her concerns to leadership.

"Our interests are the people's interests," he said. "Anything we can do to reassure that is good."

Flying accusations of malfeasance during the hearing on whether to limit where wind farms can be built underscores just how contentious the debate over this alternative form of producing energy has become in Idaho.

Five years ago, Idaho was a desert for wind power, while now there are more than 400 megawatts of electricity on line, with hundreds more waiting in

the wings as federal and state tax benefits that seek to make the industry more competitive with coal, hydroelectric and natural-gas fired power plants have lured developers including General Electric, Netherlands-based Shell and Great Britain's BP.

Utilities and wind developers spent much of the last three weeks negotiating a compromise on an extension of tax breaks for alternative energy, a bill still going through the Senate.

And after residents of Idaho Falls who feel surrounded by the hundreds of turbines in the hills above town failed to win a moratorium on new wind projects two weeks ago, they brought Wednesday's bill to limit where they could be built.

Connie Clawson, a real-estate saleswoman in Idaho Falls, broke down when telling lawmaker how she'd had four home sales in a subdivision located near wind turbines fall through.

The homes were beautifully prepared, she said. Owners had gone extra lengths to make them more attractive to buyers.

"There is nothing more tempting to the buyer than the smell of freshly baked cookies," Clawson said. When they saw the "monstrous turbines," however, "they marched right out of the house," she said.

Wind industry proponents, meanwhile, argued the restrictions likely would have put a halt to virtually all future projects. For instance, meeting shadow requirements would have been difficult, given long shadows the early morning and evening sun casts over the landscape. And winning agreement from all landowners within a two-mile radius would have invited mischief, said Scott Montgomery, who is developing a 150-megawatt wind farm on 5,000 acres in Bingham County.

"It's an opportunity for that landowner to hold the developer hostage," Montgomery said.

# Malta man pleads not guilty to charges of sexual abuse

BURLEY — A Malta man was arraigned Tuesday in Cassia County 5th District Court on multiple felony sexual charges.

Samuel Boyd Clark, 19, has been charged with two counts of lewd conduct with a minor under the age of 16, sexual abuse of a minor under 16 and sexual penetration by a foreign object for an incident that happened in March 2010.

According to a report filed by the sheriff's office, the alleged victim was home alone with her brother and was scared of Clark, so she went to her room but could hear Clark going through drawers.

Shortly after, Clark allegedly went to the victim's bedroom, grabbed her arms and placed duct tape over her mouth before proceeding to forcibly touch her in a sexual manner.

The victim, who was 15 at the time, said that she was afraid to report the incident at the time because she was afraid of Clark and what he

might do to her if she contacted authorities.

Clark has pleaded not guilty to the charges. The maximum punishment for lewd conduct with a child under 16 is life in prison and a \$50,000 fine; penetration with a foreign object carries a maximum punishment of life in prison; and sexual abuse of a child under 16 carries a maximum penalty of 25 years in prison and a \$50,000 fine.

Clark's pretrial has been scheduled for May 24 at 9:30 a.m., with his jury trial scheduled for June 1 at 9 a.m.

### Assault trial pushed back

The jury trial for a Heyburn man charged with felony assault has been pushed back to June.

Zachary Don Keene, 20, has been charged with assault with a deadly weapon for an incident that happened Jan. 30 near the intersection of 400 South and U.S. Highway 30 in Cassia County.

Court records state that

emergency dispatchers received a call from Justin Olivas, 20, of Burley, at around 3 p.m. stating that Keene had pointed a gun at him and was following Keene's car back to Burley.

When law enforcement pulled Keene over in Burley, they reportedly discovered a knife and an unloaded .22-caliber revolver. Keene and his passenger, Jamie Saldana Jr., 20, of Burley, were taken into custody.

Defense witnesses Autumn Garcia, 18, of Burley, and her boyfriend Tyson Valdez, 19, of Burley, previously testified that it was not Keene, but rather Saldana who pointed the gun at Olivas.

Garcia is a cousin of Olivas, and both she and Valdez were present at the time of the incident.

Keene pleaded not guilty to the charges. If convicted, he faces a maximum penalty of five years of confinement and a \$5,000 fine.


Trial was set to start this week, but will now begin at 9 a.m. June 1.

# Jerome fire chief to expand emergency role

JEROME — Hazardous material is transported through Jerome's city streets on a daily basis, and Fire Chief Mike Hatfield says one accident could mean a catastrophe for those involved.

Much of the Magic Valley's technical equipment and certified staff is based out of Jerome, which led Hatfield to ask the Jerome City Council on Tuesday night for a nod to assume responsibility for managing

### In other business

- **Trailer permit:** The council denied the fire department's request to waive a building permit application and fees to place a trailer on fire training grounds. The department hoped the building could be used for regional trainings and more revenue.
- **Landfill fees:** City Administrator Ben Marchant said the city's operating budget will be greatly affected by an unexpected raise in landfill fees. Milner Butte Landfill is raising its sludge fees from \$3.50 a ton to \$15. This increase will cost the city \$140,000 in operating expenses. Assistant City Administrator Micah Austin said the staff doesn't want to pass that expense on to city residents and is looking into composting costs and permits. More information on the city's response to the fee increases will be shared at the City Council's May 3 meeting.

In a letter Hatfield wrote to the council, he stated that MVERT has lacked direction in recent years. City Administrator Ben Marchant said taking more responsibility for MVERT will ensure safety for Jerome's staff and will raise the bar higher for future MVERT endeavors.

The program is state-funded and performs in a pay-as-you-go manner. Hatfield said a separate account needs to be set up to ensure proper billing when reimbursing costs to maintain and fix current equipment.

Officers in three police vehicles attempted to barricade Fife in Elizabeth Park Circle before he allegedly attempted to ram their vehicles. In response, one officer shot at Fife's vehicle,

striking him.

The officers involved haven't been publicly identified, though Loebes said their names would be forthcoming before the completion of an Idaho State Police and Critical Incident Task Force investigation of the incident. Per Twin Falls Police Department policy, the officer who shot Fife has been placed on administrative leave until the investigation is completed.

Fife is held on \$250,000 bond. Online court records show that he is no stranger to Idaho's court system. Along with more than 25 traffic-related convictions

and three for driving without privileges, he has faced multiple collections-related civil lawsuits.

In Twin Falls County, Fife faces four pending criminal cases for alleged crimes including petit theft, domestic violence, resisting or obstructing officers and motor vehicle violations.

body, and should have established the scientific basis for a blood-spatter analysis. She also stated that her attorneys didn't adequately cross-examine 15 witnesses.

Simms also presented in December new fingerprint evidence found on the murder weapon after Johnson was convicted. The owner of the fingerprints, Christopher Kevin Hill, does not have an alibi for the night of the murder. The jury that convicted Johnson in 2005

was aware of fingerprints on the murder weapon and ammunition, though those fingerprints hadn't been identified at the time.

According to court documents, the jury ruled that even if the person who the fingerprints belonged to was identified, a new trial wasn't likely because of the over-

whelming evidence against Johnson.

In his decision, Bevan states, "The evidence against Ms. Johnson which exists in this record is, indeed, 'overwhelming,'" quoting Judge Barry Wood's 2005 denial of Johnson's earlier request for a new trial. "Thus, the court concludes that the evidence

identifying Mr. Hill's fingerprints is insufficient to make such evidence material, or likely to produce an acquittal."



# Senate supports bill to declare emergency for wolf management

Measure now goes to Gov. Otter

BOISE — Idaho senators Wednesday declared the gray wolf’s presence in the state a disaster emergency, following their peers in the House.

A bill passed with a 27-8 vote seeks to assert Idaho’s right to oversee its wildlife in what’s become a longstanding dispute over wolf management involving the federal government, neighboring states and lawsuits.

The legislation is fairly open-ended: Gov. C.L. “Butch” Otter would have the power to, among other things, direct his Office of Species Conservation to initiate “emergency proceedings” Otter could issue executive orders in response to threats to people, livestock, wildlife or businesses, noting the actions planned to

resolve an issue such as contracting with the U.S. Department of Agriculture’s Wildlife Services.

Proponents have said the bill will allow Otter to enlist local law enforcement agents to help kill wolves.

“When you’re talking about a police power action or a declaration of emergency, that hasn’t really been defined,” said a bill sponsor, Rep. Phil Hart, R-Hayden. “The power’s broad.”

The bill now goes to Otter’s desk.

“The question has been asked: ‘Will this be effective?’” said Sen. Monty Pearce, R-New Plymouth and a sponsor. “If somebody’s got a better idea, I’d love to see it.”

Currently, the predators are protected as an endangered species in Idaho. Across most of the state, individuals and Wildlife Services can shoot wolves preying on livestock or pets under certain circumstances, while larger-scale removal actions require federal approval.

A proposed settlement to

again remove the wolves from the endangered list awaits a judge’s ruling, while bills to do the same thing have also stacked up in Congress.

Sen. Bert Brackett, R-Rogerson, said during testimony Wednesday that his ranching operation — in the Jarbidge area to the southwest of Twin Falls, across the desert from Idaho’s wolf packs — hasn’t lost any cattle or calves. But he supported the bill because he believes it’s only a matter of time before wolves become a problem for him. He used that statement to disclose a potential conflict because of his ranching, as required by the Senate’s rules.

Opponents raised constitutional concerns about the bill, questioning whether it violates the separation of powers by directing the governor through legislative actions.

“I want this to be a process that’s legal and constitutional,” said Sen. Michelle Stennett, D-Ketchum,

adding that it’s important to have a policy in place that doesn’t put the state on the defensive.

Before the vote, the House Resources and Conservation Committee cleared the bill after hearing testimony from people throughout the state voicing concerns about the impact of wolves on livestock, elk herds and safety.

Wolf opponents brought grisly photos of elk and cattle injured and killed in the clutches of wolves.

Longtime anti-wolf activist Ron Gillett of Stanley told the committee he has 10 cabins he rents out to for recreation that families are now avoiding because of their worries about wolves.

“For the last two summers, we have had all kinds of phone calls from people during the summer canceling out of the cabins because they’re afraid to take their children hiking,” he said.

## Interstate delays expected near Heyburn for blasting

Traffic on Interstates 84 and 86 will come to a rolling standstill near Heyburn this afternoon as crews perform rock blasting as part of a repaving project.

The Idaho Transportation Department announced traffic will be slowed to 35 mph at the Heyburn and Raft River interchanges this afternoon as crews prepare for the blast near milepost 4 on I-86. The blast is expected to take place between 4 and 4:30 p.m., after which crews will clear the travel lanes of debris. Pilot vehicles

will return traffic to highway speeds before exiting either end of the construction zone. Excessive debris may lead to longer delays after the blast, but the length of delays isn’t currently known.

Similar rock blasts are scheduled for each day next week on I-86 in eastern Cassia County. Blasting is part of an \$11 million repaving project being completed by Knife River Corp. Northwest of Boise. Traffic is already reduced to 65 mph during work hours and one lane in each direction in the construction zone. Work is expected to be finished in July.

# Lawmakers kill bill to remove cap on opening charter schools

BOISE — A last-minute effort to remove the limit on how many charter schools can open each year in the Gem State died in the Idaho House on Wednesday, ending debate for this session on whether the yearly six-school limit should go away.

The House Education Committee on Wednesday had approved the bill with a 13-4 vote, and it was fast-tracked to the House as the session wound down. It died amid concerns that legislators had been given promotional charter school materials, including bright yellow scarves with the slogan “National School Choice Week.” A 37-31 vote killed the bill after House Minority Leader John Rusche objected to the handouts.

Even so, the state’s longstanding policy discussion about the role and scope of charter schools will likely

continue. Charter schools are public schools that have more flexibility in educational methods than their traditional counterparts.

Ken Burgess, a lobbyist with the Idaho Charter School Network, told the committee that eliminating the yearly cap on new schools will boost the ability of charter schools to successfully seek grants from outside foundations and the federal government.

Burgess used historical data to show that even with the cap in place, most years the state hasn’t hit the six-school limit.

“It is frankly unlikely that you will ever reach or meet the cap of six,” he said.

That cap has been reached twice — in 2005 and 2009. Five each have been scheduled to open in 2010 and 2011.

Foundations considering grant applicants look at rankings of state laws compiled by the National Alliance for

Public Charter Schools, Burgess said. The alliance ranks Idaho 28th out of 40 states with charter schools, plus the District of Columbia.

“That cap of six new schools per year is a significant factor in the lower ranking for Idaho’s charter school law,” Burgess said. “... This cap of six new schools a year is, in fact, a limiting factor.”

Rep. Cliff Bayer, R-Ada and the bill’s sponsor, said he understands the concerns that Rusche brought up, adding that hopefully the issue can be considered on its merits in the future.

He said he doesn’t fault the motivations of those who provided the promotional items.

“It was a misjudgment and I don’t question their intentions,” he said.

## Exam ordered for ex-Aryan Nations lawyer

COEUR D’ALENE (AP) — A former Aryan Nations attorney who police say hired a man to kill his wife and her mother was ordered to undergo a mental health exam.

The order by Chief U.S. District Judge B. Lynn Winmill followed notice by 65-year-old defendant Edgar Steele that he intends to produce expert evidence concerning his mental condition that will have a bearing on the case.

The *Bonner County Daily Bee* reported Wednesday that the examination by a licensed psychologist is set for Friday at Ada County jail.

Steele has pleaded not guilty to hiring Larry Fairfax to kill his wife and her mother, and contends he is the victim of a government conspiracy because of his unpopular views and writings.

His wife, Cyndi Steele, has said she believes her husband is innocent.

Steele is also charged with use of explosive materials to commit a federal felony, possession of a destructive de-

vice in relation to a crime of violence, and tampering with a victim. He has also pleaded not guilty to those charges.

Steele’s trial has been moved to Boise because of extensive pretrial publicity in northern Idaho.

Prosecutors say Fairfax became an undercover FBI informant and secretly recorded conversations in which he and Steele discussed the plot. Steele was arrested as his Sagle home in June.

Steele and his wife both contend those recordings are fakes.

Robert Engle will conduct the mental health examination. Winmill’s order requires that Engle’s written report be finished by April 13. Steele’s trial is scheduled to begin April 26.

The report will cover Steele’s psychological functioning and mental health, and his physical well-being. The report will cover those things currently and at the time police say Steele hired Fairfax.

Steele in 2000 represent-

ed Aryan Nations leader Richard Butler in a federal civil lawsuit brought by two people who claimed they were attacked by the group’s security guards.

# Investigation continues in Idaho fugitive shooting

BUTTE, Mont. (AP) — A man who was shot and injured by an Idaho State Police officer during a traffic stop in February has been extradited to Montana, where authorities say he faces charges for walking away from a Helena pre-release center in October.

Mark Maykopet, 24, was charged with battery, eluding a police officer and being a fugitive from justice after a traffic stop in northern Idaho that led to the shooting death of Maykopet's common-law wife, 40-year-old Christie Little of Butte.

But Kootenai County Sheriff's Lt. Stu Miller told *The Montana Standard* on Monday those charges were dropped because more time

was needed to investigate the Feb. 7 shooting. The charges could be refilled later, Miller said.

Maykopet, also known as Mark Macy Jr., couldn't be held for more than 14 days without a formal charge against him. He was extradited to Montana on a felony escape warrant March 28 and is being held at the Montana State Prison, prison spokeswoman Linda Moody said.

In Idaho, the Kootenai County sheriff's office is investigating whether the shooting was justified, and ISP Cpl. Dan Howard remains on paid leave.

In the police report, Howard said he stopped the Jeep because the driver was

speeding and appeared to be under the influence of marijuana. The Jeep had a paper Montana temporary registration, but no license plates.

When Howard called in the stop, a dispatcher warned him that Maykopet had a felony warrant for escape and that the stop was considered "high risk." Cpl. Sean Lind responded to assist. After Lind arrived, Maykopet drove away and the two ISP units pursued him.

The report said Howard's car became temporarily disabled while chasing Maykopet and by the time Howard restarted his car, Maykopet had turned around and rammed the patrol car.

Howard fired on the vehicle, killing Little and injuring

Maykopet, the report said. Detectives found two guns in the Jeep — a 9mm automatic with an empty 32-round magazine behind the rear seat and a .25 caliber pistol with an eight-round magazine under the passenger seat. The chamber was not loaded.

Maykopet's record includes convictions for car theft, drugs and issuing bad checks. Little's record includes time spent in prison for theft, wire fraud and identity theft.

Little also was wanted for failing to show up for a trial in Butte in October on a forgery charge. She had also spent time in prison for theft, wire fraud and identity theft.

# House, Senate clear bill to close GOP primary

BOISE (AP) — Conservative Republicans are a step closer to their dream of closing their GOP primaries to all but registered party members.

The House, then the Senate voted Wednesday to lock out crossover voters that some Republican stalwarts blame for skewing results of elections after Idaho opened its primaries back in 1972 to all voters.

The bill now goes to the governor.

A federal court ruling in March found Idaho's pri-

mary was unconstitutional. House Speaker Lawrence Denney said the measure addressed the court's findings and was a good compromise.

Democratic Rep. Grant Burgoyne of Boise criticized the bill, saying taxpayers shouldn't have to pick up the nearly \$400,000 cost for the new system.

House Minority Leader John Rusche of Lewiston called this a bill "to address internal squabbles within the Republican Party."

# Indian law and order panel has first meeting in N.M.

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. — A national panel of judicial and law enforcement experts convened Wednesday in New Mexico to begin its part in a massive federal and tribal effort aimed at revamping the justice system across Indian Country.

The nine-member Indian Law and Order Commission was established under the Tribal Law and Order Act signed into law last summer by President Barack Obama. It is charged with conducting a comprehensive study

of law enforcement and criminal justice in tribal communities across the country, and using its findings to make recommendations to Congress and the president.

Jefferson Keel, lieutenant governor of the Chickasaw Nation of Oklahoma and president of the National Congress of American Indians, was among the commissioners meeting in Santa Fe. He said the panel has the potential to be a driving force behind implementing the act, which contains sweeping changes aimed at giving tribes more authority, re-

sources and information needed to combat crime on reservations.

"Safe, strong tribal communities are in everyone's interest," Keel said in a statement, adding that the commissioners all have a "deep experience and a passion to address the issues facing tribal communities."

According to the federal government, violent crime rates on Indian reservations are more than twice the national rate, and there is an epidemic of domestic and sexual violence in Indian Country, along with high instances of child abuse, teen

suicide and substance abuse.

Federal officials have also said there is a proliferation of gang activity on reservations, and yet law enforcement recruitment and retention across Indian Country lag far behind the rest of the nation. Statistics show there is a roughly 40 percent unmet need in staffing for police officers.

The commission will be focusing on these problems, as well as jurisdiction and juvenile justice issues, and the effect of tribal jails and the federal prison systems on reducing crime and rehabilitating offenders.

## AROUND THE STATE

### Man driving on tracks in Idaho rear-ended by train

SAGLE — The Idaho State Police say a Montana man who was driving his heavy-duty pickup truck on the train tracks in northern Idaho avoided injury when the pickup was rear-ended by a passenger train.

The ISP says 40-year-old Lynn Schedlbauer of Libby, Mont., was using a side road running along the tracks about 3:45 a.m. Tuesday when he encountered 3½ feet of water. He drove onto the tracks and continued northbound.

An Amtrak train rear-ended Schedlbauer's 1999 Ford F-350 west of Sandpoint. The pickup was thrown onto the access road. The ISP says Schedlbauer was wearing a seatbelt and was not injured. He was ticketed for trespassing.

An Amtrak spokeswoman says no one on the train was injured, but it was delayed by 2½ hours.

The bill would have restricted ads to the exterior of buses and prohibited ads political or sexually explicit in nature, along with those promoting alcohol and tobacco products.

Supporters like Republican Rep. Reed DeMordaunt, of Eagle, argued the money generated from the ads could help Idaho's cash-strapped school districts. But opponents, including Republican Rep. Julie Ellsworth of Boise, said the advertisements could pose a safety hazard and distract drivers.

Republican Rep. Ken Andrus, of Lava Hot Springs, said school buses were a symbol best left alone.

over non-compliance.

Democratic Sen. Elliot Werk, of Boise, raised concerns Tuesday that the county's local government leaders were encouraging drivers to resist the testing.

Drivers who bring their vehicles back into compliance with the emissions standards could have their registrations reinstated at no charge, under the measure.

### Bill allows ed agency to shed textbook library

BOISE — The state Department of Education would no longer have to keep a library of textbooks being used in Idaho classrooms, under a bill approved by the Idaho House.

Lawmakers voted 59-10 to send the measure onto the Idaho Senate. It deletes a statutory requirement that the department maintain a curriculum library.

Republican Rep. Sharon Block, of Twin Falls, says the department led by public schools chief Tom Luna has better use for the space at the agency's downtown Boise offices, which have been consolidated in recent years to help save money. The materials are also available at Idaho's public universities.

A handful of state lawmakers opposed the measure, saying the education department should maintain a repository of textbooks used in Idaho's schools.

BOISE — An effort to allow ads and corporate logos on public school buses failed in the Idaho House amid concerns it would invite distracted driving.

Lawmakers voted 30-39 on Wednesday to dump the measure, which had previously been revised to alleviate lawmaker anxieties.

### Senate passes auto emissions testing bill

BOISE — Drivers who fall out of compliance with auto emission testing rules can get their vehicle registrations reinstated at no cost, under legislation that passed in the 2011 Idaho Legislature.

The Idaho Senate gave the measure final approval Wednesday. It passed the Idaho House last week.

The bill was spearheaded by Republican lawmakers from Canyon County, where officials have resisted emissions testing for several years, calling the mandatory requirement a government overreach. Lawmakers say the registrations of more than 7,000 drivers have been yanked

# And in the end, hysteria triumphs in Idaho Legislature

On Tuesday, Huckleberries — an Idaho blog of the *Spokesman-Review* newspaper in Spokane, Wash. — posted an online poll that asked readers, “What scares you more: the Idaho Legislature in the Statehouse or wolves in the forest?”

The legislators won, 74 percent to 10 percent.

Just in time for House Bill 343, which would allow the governor to declare a wolf emergency and ask city and county law enforcement officers to hunt down the predators. The House passed it 64-5 on Tuesday and the Senate Resources and Conservation Committee — which used to be the most-respected in the Senate — approved it 7-2 on Wednesday. The full Senate will consider the legislation today.

The bill’s sponsor, Rep. Judy Boyle, R-Midvale, said residents of her west-central Idaho district are scared of wolves. Rep. Lenore Barrett, R-Challis, said, “The wolves eat better than anyone else in Custer County,” and threatened to weep if the House didn’t pass the bill.

It’s reality check time, folks. This state has 705 wolves, or one wolf for every 119 square miles.

No wolves have been documented attacking humans, but the predators kill dozens or hundreds of sheep, cattle, hunting dogs and wild game including deer and elk annually. There’s currently a proposal in Washington, D.C. to lift federal protections from wolves, and an agreement is in the offing to allow the Idaho Department of Fish and Game to resume managing wolf populations.

Any governor would need his head examined if he invoked HB343, sending cops traipsing off into the backcountry while there are real criminals on the streets. But Idahoans need not worry: As state Sen. Elliot Werk, D-Boise, pointed out, the legislation is almost certainly unconstitutional, and if passed by the Senate and signed by Gov. C.L. “Butch” Otter will eventually be thrown out in court.

Far more worrying is the fact that our Legislature has completely abandoned reasoned discourse.

Under every speaker of the House and president of the Senate we can think of — extending back to Pete Cenarrusa and Jack Murphy — lawmakers took pride in not wasting their constituents’ money on hysterical nonsense.

That’s not the case anymore.

**Our view:** Our state has 9 percent unemployment and the public school budget has been cut by \$47 million. Why in the world are lawmakers wasting their time on wolf-management issues Idaho doesn’t control?

# Reality, whether we like it or not

It was a season of fiscal perestroika. Last fall, the Simpson-Bowles deficit commission released a bold report on how to avoid an economic catastrophe. For a few weeks, the think tanks and government offices were alive with proposals to reduce debt and reform entitlements, the tax code and just about every other government program.

The mood did not last. The polls suggested that voters were still unwilling to accept tax increases or benefit cuts. Smart Washington insiders like Mitch McConnell and President Obama decided that any party that actually tried to implement these ideas would be committing political suicide. The president walked away from the Simpson-Bowles package. Far from addressing the fiscal problems, the president’s budget would double the nation’s debt over the next decade, according to the Congressional Budget Office.

But the forces of reform have not been entirely silenced. Over the past few weeks, a number of groups, including the ex-chairmen of the Council of Economic Advisers and 64 prominent budget experts, have issued letters arguing that the debt situation is so dire that doing nothing is not a survivable option. What they lacked was courageous political leadership — a powerful elected official willing to issue a proposal, willing to take a stand, willing to face the political perils.

The country lacked that leadership until just recently. Paul Ryan, the Republican

chairman of the House Budget Committee, has released the most comprehensive and most courageous budget reform proposal any of us have seen in our lifetimes. Ryan is expected to leap into the vacuum left by the president’s passivity. The Ryan budget will not be enacted this year, but it will immediately reframe the domestic policy debate.

His proposal will set the standard of seriousness for anybody who wants to play in this discussion. It will become the 2012 Republican platform, no matter who is the nominee. Any candidate hoping to win that nomination will have to be able to talk about government programs with this degree of specificity, so it will improve the GOP primary race.

The Ryan proposal will help settle the fight over the government shutdown and the 2011 budget because it will remind everybody that the real argument is not about cutting a few billion here or there. It is about the underlying architecture of domestic programs in 2012 and beyond.

The Ryan budget will put all future arguments in the proper context: The current welfare state is simply unsustainable and anybody

who is serious, on left or right, has to have a new vision of the social contract.

The initial coverage will talk about Ryan’s top number — the cuts of more than \$4 trillion over the next decade. But the important thing is the way Ryan would reform programs. He would reform the tax code along the Simpson-Bowles lines, but without the tax increases.

The Ryan budget doesn’t touch Medicare for anybody over 55, but for younger people it turns it into a defined contribution plan. Instead of assuming open-ended future costs, the government will give you a sum of money (starting at an amount equal to what the government now spends) and a regulated menu of insurance options from which to choose.

The Ryan budget will please governors of both parties by turning Medicaid into a block grant — giving states more flexibility. It tackles agriculture subsidies and other corporate welfare. It consolidates the job-training programs into a single adult scholarship. It reforms housing assistance and food stamps. It dodges Social Security.

Ryan was a protege of Jack Kemp, and Kemp’s uplifting

spirit pervades the document. It’s not sour, taking an austere meat ax approach. It emphasizes social support, social mobility and personal choice. I don’t agree with all of it that I’ve seen, but it is a serious effort to create a sustainable welfare state — to prevent the sort of disruptive change we’re going to face if national bankruptcy comes.

It also creates the pivotal moment of truth for President Obama. Will he come up with his own counterproposal, or will he simply demagogue the issue by railing against “savage” Republican cuts and ignoring the long-term fiscal realities? Does he have a sustainable vision for government, or will he just try to rise above the fray while Nancy Pelosi and others attack Ryan?

And what about the Senate Republicans? Where do they stand? Or the voters? Are they willing to face reality or will they continue to demand more government than they are willing to pay for?

Paul Ryan has grasped reality with both hands. He’s forcing everybody else to do the same.

# Gender and getting ahead at Walmart

If you want to know why so few women hold executive positions at Walmart Stores, here’s the answer the Walton Institute gives out to management trainees:

Women aren’t as aggressive at seeking promotions as men.

Not surprisingly, women at Wal-Mart have a different explanation: Management stereotypes employees by gender (see example above).

Women from Florida to Alaska swear in court papers that they wanted to build careers at Wal-Mart, worked extra hard, earned good evaluations and openly sought promotion only to be bypassed by less-qualified men.

So they filed the world’s largest sex discrimination case against the world’s largest employer. How’s that for gumption?

Their case has been going well for them, if slowly, since they filed it 10 years ago. But when it got to the Supreme Court last month, they ran into trouble. How much trouble’s hard to say until the court rules, probably in June.

Given the size of Wal-Mart’s labor force, we are talking about a case that would cover at least 500,000 employees and possibly more than 1 million. Every current female employee can become part of the lawsuit that claims companywide bias against

them, two federal courts in California have ruled.

The class is so humongous, and each woman’s situation so different from another’s, that Wal-Mart says the Supreme Court should disband it and force any aggrieved employee to sue individually. It’s just too big for a court to manage fairly, they say.

And yet, the company’s sheer size, with its gargantuan labor force, can’t be allowed to insulate it from claims that something about its corporate conduct denied hundreds of thousands of employees the pay they would have gotten but for their sex.

Wal-Mart says company-wide policy forbids discrimination, not encourages it. For a class-action lawsuit to prevail, the women have to show corporate involvement. But at Wal-Mart, each manager in its 3,400 stores has near-complete freedom to decide pay and promotions.

So we’re talking about a huge coincidence, apparently. Women in almost every job category, in each of Wal-Mart’s 41 regions make less

than men in the same jobs, by an average of \$5,000, according to the plaintiffs’ statistician. This is true despite findings that women stay with the company longer than men and generally have higher performance ratings.

Gretchen Adams says she was told she was getting top pay at \$26,500, when promoted to deli manager at a Wal-Mart Supercenter in Stillwater, Okla. Then she found out that a man she was training for the same position in Jasper, Ala., was getting \$30,000. It happened again when she trained a man in Cape Coral, Fla., and then in Las Vegas.

Wal-Mart’s statistician challenged the plaintiffs’ figures as being too regional to be useful.

Through classes, meetings and pep rallies at stores, the company’s Bentonville, Ark., home office sends forth its culture to each and every store.

So while the plaintiffs acknowledge decentralized personnel decisions at Wal-Mart, they say that the company’s distinctive and tightly controlled corporate culture plays an indirect but powerful role.

“I’m getting whipsawed here” as to how personnel decisions are made, Justice Antonin Scalia complained to the lawyer for the women.

“On the one hand, you say the problem is that they were utterly subjective, and on the other hand you say there is strong corporate culture that guides all of this.

“Well which is it,” Scalia demanded.

Does he really not understand this?

It could be both. You just might have a corporate culture that allows illegal job discrimination to flourish at the hands of independent store managers. It could happen if management trainers defend the paucity of women in higher ranks and tells trainees women don’t want promotions; if the company sponsors hunting trips as bonding exercises for executives; if the home office doesn’t intervene when its mostly male store management keeps promoting mostly men or ask questions when men are routinely paid more than better-qualified women doing the same work.

For all the discussion of whether a company-wide policy or practice keeps women down, it’s too early in the case to say for sure. A trial will determine that.

But there’s enough for the Supreme Court to allow the class action suit to keep going.

#### ... amateur hour

Lewiston Tribune

If anything gives you pause about school Superintendent Tom Luna's plan to trade teachers for high-tech learning, let it be this: The collective wisdom of the Idaho state Senate rejected it. By and large, people who are still finding their way around the state Capitol put Luna's plan over the top ... The measure — which pulls money from the pool used to pay teachers in order to create a market for online instruction — won 20 Republican votes.

All seven Democrats opposed it. Another eight GOP members joined them.

Among those: Senate Judiciary Committee Chairman Denton Darrington of Declo. He's starting his 15th term in the Senate.

Senate Finance Committee Chairman Dean Cameron of Rupert. He's on his 11th term.

Commerce Committee Chairman John Andreason of Boise. Not only is he launching term 10, but Andreason served as staff director of the Legislature's budget office.

Local Government and Taxation Committee Chairman Joe Stegner of Lewiston. He's on term seven.

Majority Leader Bart Davis of Idaho Falls. He's also beginning his seventh term.

Agriculture Committee Chairman Tim Corder of Mountain Home. He's beginning a fourth term.

Budget committee member Shawn Keough of Sandpoint. She's on term eight. Joyce Broadsword of Sagle, who is in her fourth term.

Assuming they complete their two-year terms, they represent 132 years of accumulated legislative experience.

Among the 20 Republicans who voted for Luna were four newcomers ... a fifth freshman who previously served in the House, and two sophomores.

All told, the 20 members account for 148 years in the Legislature.

So what do these veteran

senators know?

They know Republican dominance is not permanent. They came up in an age of competitive politics. They worked with Democratic governors and Democratic legislators. They remember when the general election held their party accountable ...

That made them cautious — and respectful. They worked across the aisle. Before they ran a bill, they involved the people the legislation would affect. If they couldn't win their support, at least they'd show good faith. Never would they blindsides a group of teachers, parents, school administrators and board members the way Luna did this year with his reform package ...

Some have been through at least two and maybe three difficult budget cycles.

Most of all, they've had time to learn how government works. The people and programs that looked so distant and abstract from the vantage of a private citizen take on real dimensions. As years go by, lawmakers begin to see the dedication of public employees. They see state agencies answering the real needs of ordinary people.

Time was when a junior member of the Legislature deferred to his seniors ... Back in the day, if a newcomer saw a 22-year veteran such as Cameron get up on the Senate floor and outline nine separate detailed criticisms of a major school reform bill, he'd take note.

No longer.

Today's legislative newcomers fear only the Republican primary and corporate campaign cash. The center has no hold on them.

... Coming to office during the Tea Party movement, they see veterans as part of the problem.

So they will plow ahead, taking the rest of us with them right through the looking glass.

(last week). Rep. Judy Boyle, the Midvale Republican and resident Statehouse Little Red Riding Hood, touted a bill to allow Idaho to declare a wolf disaster emergency.

Boyle says Idahoans feel physically and psychologically threatened by the wolves — a message echoed, in less-than-measured tones, in the bill itself. "The uncontrolled proliferation of imported wolves on private land has produced a clear and present danger to humans, their pets and livestock, and has altered and hindered historical uses of private and public land, dramatically inhibiting previously safe activities such as walking, picnicking, biking, berry picking, hunting and fishing."

Not exactly. Wolf attacks are extremely rare — and certainly in relation to the region's population of fearmongering political panderers.

Indeed, this end-of-session mischief has 42 Republican co-sponsors ...

This pack of lawmakers is in a big hurry to allow Gov. Butch Otter to sic local law enforcement officers on wolves. But we suspect deputies and police officers can find more pressing matters of public safety — especially since the wolf population may already be in decline.

According to U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service estimates, Idaho was home to an estimated 705 wolves in 2010, down from 870 a year earlier. The feds say the lower numbers could have been caused, in part, by reduced monitoring efforts in Central Idaho's remote mountains, and the loss of some radio-collared wolves.

Yes, the science is imprecise. But it isn't on the side of the legislators who cry wolf.

#### ... a matter of conscience

Last year, the Idaho Legislature passed a "conscience bill" that granted health care



professionals the right to abstain from doing their jobs if they morally objected to the course of treatment. The focus was on such politically charged issues as abortion, emergency contraceptives and embryonic stem-cell treatments. But along the way living wills and advanced care directives were added to the list, perhaps in a misguided response to the "death panel" fear that arose over national health care reform.

However, those end-of-life decisions were protected under a law the Legislature passed in 2005, and many people pointed out this conflict. Gov. Butch Otter didn't sign the bill, but it became law when he failed to return it to the Legislature in time.

Don't worry, proponents said, it can be fixed next year.

Early in this legislative session it looked like that would be the case, when the AARP made the issue a top priority. The solution could have been easy: Either strip end-of-life mentions from the law or explicitly state that health care professionals could not violate the 2005 law that protected patients' wishes.

One bill did the latter, stating: "... no health care professional shall refuse to follow the patient's or physician's directions" as established by the 2005 law. But that bill went nowhere and was replaced by another that muddled the waters by substituting "physician" for "health care professional."

Opponents rightfully point out that last year's conscience law covers all health care workers and that many small communities don't have physicians. The bill's language unnecessarily complicates matters ...

Otter should veto this bill and make it clear that a definitive version that respects patient freedoms is the only kind he'll sign.

# Less favorable business climate seen in Idaho

The Zions Bank Small Business Index for Idaho in March was 115.0, down from a revised 115.5 for February.

Zions Bank released the report Wednesday.

The lower index rate is associated with less favorable business conditions in Idaho, notably the state's unemployment rate, which is the index's most heavily weighted input.

According to the Idaho Department of Labor the state's unemployment was estimated at 9.7 percent in the most recent month, unchanged from the prior

month but higher than the 9 percent rate measured a year ago.

Idaho's unemployment rate averaged 9.3 percent in 2010, 7.7 percent in 2009, 4.7 percent in 2008 and 2.9 percent in 2007.

The report noted positive personal incomes across the state and nation will benefit small business.

According to the U.S. Bureau of Economic Analysis personal income rose in three major components: earnings, property income and personal current transfer payments, primarily from the government. In 2009 just transfer payments increased.

Total personal income dropped about 2.5 percent nationally in 2009. In 2010, gains in personal income

was nearly 3 percent nationally.

"Modestly stronger gains in total personal income are likely for most states during 2011, assuming no major external shocks impair U.S. economic growth," said report author Jeff Thredgold, of Thredgold Economic Associates and economic consultant to Zions Bank.

"Even stronger gains are likely during 2012 and 2013 as job gains and income gains are expected to return to more traditional levels."

Zions Bank will release its April Small Business Index for Idaho on May 11.

## Custom cabinet maker has work featured in new St. Luke's

Randy Cox has been in the woodworking and cabinet making business for decades but he just completed the largest job of his career.

Cox, doing business as R.J.'s Custom Cabinets, of Filer, built 128 beds specifically designed for use at the new St. Luke's Magic Valley Medical Center.

The Twin Falls hospital is slated to open next month.

The stationary beds sit under windows in the private patient rooms. They were designed to be used as visitor benches during the day and are easily unfolded for use as a bed.

# Ag groups applaud U.S., Colombia free trade deal

Wednesday's announcement that the United States and Columbia reached a free trade deal was welcome news to area agriculture interests.

In the hours following the announcement, touted as a vital part of President Barack Obama's economic agenda, the National Association of Wheat Growers and the National Potato Council released statements applauding the deal.

The US-Colombia Free Trade Agreement was reached after the Columbians agreed to greater protections for workers and union leaders, areas of concern for the U.S. The two countries have been negotiating the agreement for several weeks.

Wayne Hurst, president of the NAWG and Burley wheat producer, said the agreement will boost demand for U.S. and Idaho-grown wheat.

"Columbia will be and has been an important customer of U.S. and Idaho-grown wheat," Hurst told the *Times-News* during a phone interview Wednesday. "This trade agreement is a win-win; not only for the cash it will put in farmers' pockets but for the Columbians as well."

Before the deal can be implemented it must be approved by Congress. The measure is expected to pass as it has bipartisan support.

# GOP plan to cut top tax rate short on details

WASHINGTON — With an ambitious plan that's short on details, House Republicans are calling for big cuts in corporate and individual income tax rates, financed by eliminating scores of credits, deductions and exemptions, many enjoyed by millions of taxpayers.

Their 10-year budget sets an aggressive goal of reducing the top corporate and individual tax rates from 35 percent to 25 percent.

Which tax breaks would be eliminated? Those hard choices wouldn't come for months — maybe not for years. Congress and the Obama administration would have to get serious first

about overhauling the nation's tax code.

Business groups, nonetheless, applauded the proposal unveiled Tuesday by House Budget Committee Chairman Paul Ryan, R-Wis. Democrats called it a giveaway to the rich. Tax experts said it would be difficult to achieve, especially since Ryan's plan also calls for reducing federal spending by about \$5 trillion over the next decade.

Ryan said the tax code is littered with generous tax breaks that could be eliminated to finance lower tax rates for everyone. He envisions a tax system with fewer brackets and simpler rules. He has ruled out an overall tax increase, though experts

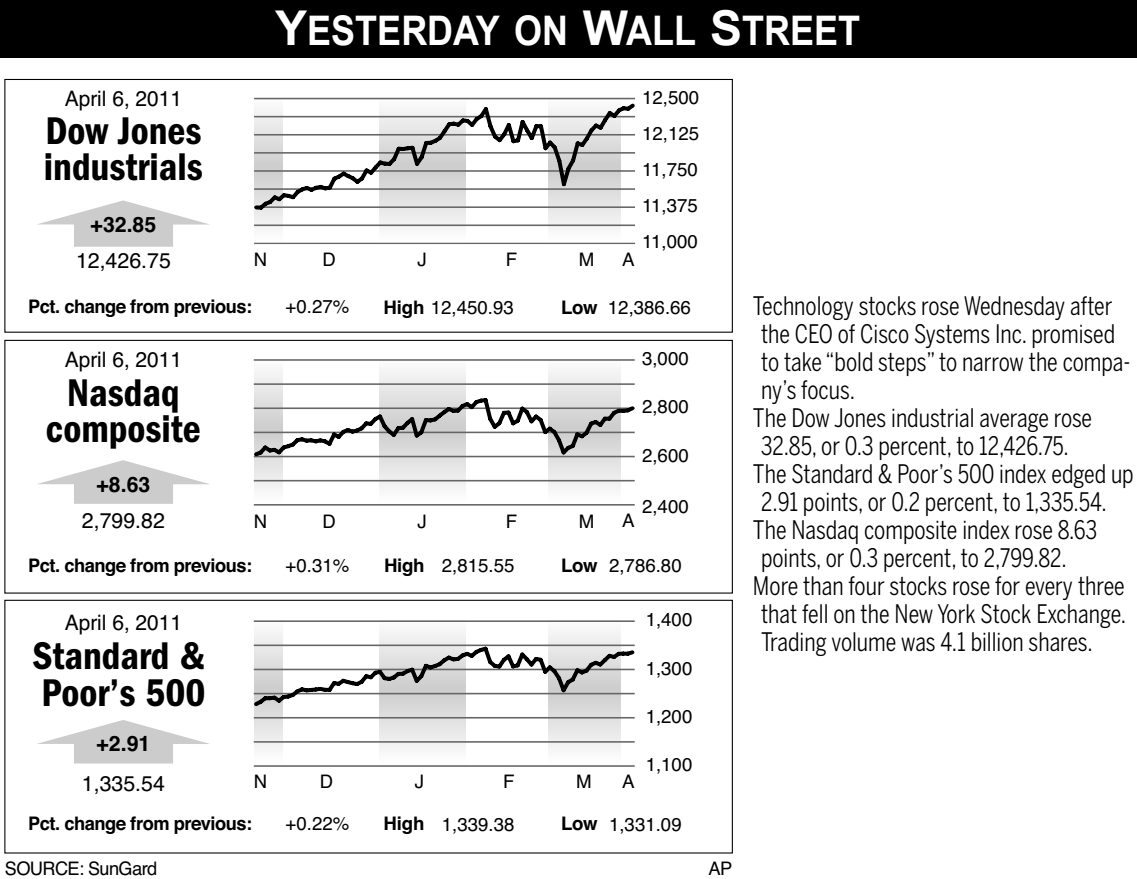

Government shutdown poses big risks to both political parties

WASHINGTON — Democrats and Republicans say the last thing they want to do is to shut down the government. But with budget talks showing little signs of a breakthrough, there are growing worries that a stalemate could hurt the economy's fragile recovery.

Many economists and budget analysts suggest that a government shutdown, if it's lengthy, or even a deal that calls for deep short-term spending cuts could stifle economic growth and lead the country back into recession. Private forecasters already have lowered their growth projections for this year based on surging fuel, food and raw material costs, and tensions in the Middle East and North Africa.

"I think the economic damage from a government shutdown would mount very quickly," said Mark Zandi, chief economist of Moody's Analytics, who has been an economic adviser to both GOP and Democratic lawmakers. "And the longer it dragged on, the bigger the hit to business, consumer and investor

confidence, the greater the odds of a renewed recession." He puts the danger zone at two weeks or longer.

The current spending authority for the federal government expires Friday at midnight, and so far President Barack Obama and his Democratic allies on Capitol Hill have been unable to strike a deal with defiant House Republicans.

The two sides made little apparent headway on Wednesday, though negotiations continued. The Obama administration said it was bracing for a possible shutdown and that early casualties would be a halt in the processing of certain tax refunds and small business loans. National parks would be closed, and the annual Cherry Blossom parade in the nation's capital canceled.

Obama, who had signaled a willingness to bring congressional leaders back to the White House on Wednesday for another round of meetings if necessary, traveled to Philadelphia in the afternoon.

Before leaving, he spoke by phone with House Speaker John Boehner, R-Ohio. Boehner's office said the call

lasted just three minutes and that the speaker told the president he was hopeful a deal could still be struck.

Obama on Tuesday rejected a GOP bid to keep the government open for one more week at the cost of \$12 billion in additional GOP-proposed spending cuts. "There is no reason why we should not get an agreement," Obama said following a White House meeting with congressional leaders.

But Boehner vowed to keep fighting for "the largest spending cuts possible," clearly reflecting an outreach to the GOP tea party wing.

The large tea party contingent elected to Congress in November "did not come here for a political career. They came here for a cause," Ryan said. But even some budget hawks suggest the focus of that cause may be too narrow.

The annual deficit is projected by the White House to reach a record \$1.645 trillion in the 2011 budget year that ends Sept. 30. But trillion-dollar-plus deficits are a direct result of the deepest economic downturn since the 1930s.

# Email marketer at center of breach apologizes

SAN FRANCISCO — The company at the center of a data heist involving Best Buy, Citigroup, and other major brands said Wednesday that the theft of potentially millions of names and email addresses won't significantly slow its email marketing juggernaut.

Epsilon, a subsidiary of Alliance Data Systems Corp., was the victim of a hacking attack that triggered scores of public warnings this week from major retailers, banks and others.

Epsilon sends more than 40 billion emails a year on behalf of more than 2,500 companies, for things like loyalty rewards programs.

In a statement Wednesday, it reiterated that Social Security and credit card numbers weren't compromised. Epsilon president Bryan Kennedy apologized for the inconvenience and the "phishing" emails that victims are receiving.

The company said that only 2 percent of its client base was affected and that its email volumes aren't expected to be significantly impacted. Epsilon said the incident should have "minimal if any impact" on Alliance Data's financial performance.

Epsilon is a big money-maker for Alliance Data, which is based in Plano, Texas. Epsilon turned \$65 million in operating profit last year, and its \$613 million in revenue was 22 percent of Alliance Data's total.

# Government shutdown threat worries Yellowstone businesses

HELENA, Mont. — Business owners dependent on the tourists headed to Yellowstone National Park are concerned about a possible government shutdown closing the park. But if there has to be one, they say, better it happen now when the visitors are few — and they pray it doesn't stretch into the summer.

Congressional negotiators were trying to reach a spending agreement by Friday that would avert a shutdown of most government functions, including operations in national parks across the country. The last such shutdown took place 15 years ago and lasted 21 days.

April is a quiet time in Yellowstone. For much of the month, only the buffalo visit Old Faithful. The northern entrance is the only one open to vehicles before April 15.

The few hardy visitors

# Gbagbo's home in Ivory Coast comes under attack

ABIDJAN, Ivory Coast — Even after airstrikes pounded holes in his garden, even after fighters encircled his home and stormed the gates, Laurent Gbagbo did not budge Wednesday from the bunker where he remains holed up.

The finale of Gbagbo's 10-year claim on Ivory Coast is playing out much like the beginning. The 65-year-old strongman, who made an art of staying in power years past the end of his legal mandate, is now pushing the envelope, fighting for each day, even each hour.

"He will not surrender," said Meite Sindou, a defense spokesman for Alassane Ouattara, the man recognized worldwide as the democratically elected president of Ivory Coast. "We will have to take him."

Wednesday began with the boldest attempt yet to penetrate Gbagbo's inner sanctum as fighters loyal to Ouattara made it as far as the gate of the presidential mansion he has occupied for the last decade. They attacked it with a barrage of fire, and residents reported hearing concussive blasts.

They breached the property's perimeter only to be forced to retreat in the face of the heavy artillery unleashed by the ruler's inner circle of guards.

For four months after winning last November's election, Ouattara pleaded with the international community to intervene and remove Gbagbo by force, arguing he wouldn't leave any other way.

The army, controlled by Gbagbo, has repeatedly used its arsenal of heavy artillery in an attempt to cow areas of the commercial capital that had voted for his opponent. Security forces are accused of opening fire with a mounted machine gun on a group of unarmed women and lobbing 81 mm mortars into a market.

Finally on Monday, United Nations attack helicopters acting on a Security Council resolution bombarded six

arms depots in Abidjan — including a cache inside the presidential compound.

"Obviously they didn't get all of it," said a senior diplomat who requested anonymity because he is not authorized to speak to the media. "When they came after him, he pulled out more stuff. Remember, he had a long time to prepare for this."

Among the preparations was the choice of where Gbagbo would make his last stand. He is believed to be holed up in a tunnel originally built to connect the president's home and the adjacent residence of the French ambassador, Sindou said.

Ivory Coast's first president, Felix Houphouet-Boigny, was reluctant to accept independence from France, a sign of the intimate relationship between this former African colony and its European master.

Even after independence, Houphouet-Boigny maintained a privileged relationship with France — and built the tunnel so he could take refuge inside the ambassador's residence in the event of a coup, said Ivory Coast expert Christian Bouquet, a professor of political geography at the University of Bordeaux III.

In an irony of history, shortly after coming to power in 2000, Gbagbo is said to have severed the umbilical cord between the residences, after accusing France of backing a rebel group that attempted to overthrow him in 2002. Fighters from this same group are now backing Ouattara and carried out Wednesday's attack on the residence.

Gbagbo has attempted to portray the effort to oust him as a neocolonial plot, led by France.

On Wednesday morning, Gbagbo's spokesman in Paris claimed it was French troops — not Ivorians — that had come to kill the ruler.

"France will be held responsible for the death of President Gbagbo, his wife and family members and all those who are inside the residence, which is being bombarded by the French army," said spokesman Tou-

ssaint Alain.

Gbagbo had appeared to be on the point of surrender on Tuesday, sending an emissary to meet with foreign ambassadors in order to negotiate the terms. The diplomat who has been following events closely said the overture appeared to be a foil and that Gbagbo was simply playing for time.

He continued to cling to power Wednesday, despite debilitating losses. The pro-Ouattara force began their lighting advance just over a week ago attacking from the east, west and center. At least 80 percent of the countryside was under their control by the time they entered Abidjan on Monday.

On Tuesday, Gbagbo's soldiers were seen abandoning their posts, some rushing inside a church to tear off their uniforms before re-emerging in civilian clothes. His generals issued orders to stop fighting.

Yet Gbagbo — a former history professor — appears to have calculated his rival's weakness: Ouattara, an intellectual who has spent decades abroad, knows that he needs to take Gbagbo alive to maintain international support, and avoid further alienating the 46 percent of the electorate who voted for Gbagbo in last year's election.

Taking him without harming him is not easy. It means the forces cannot barrel down on the bunker, but need to find ways to pierce through his security perimeter, without aiming fire directly at his position.

From inside his bunker, Gbagbo blasted the world in back-to-back interviews on French TV station LCI and French radio RFI. He said he would never step down, that there was nothing to negotiate and called the operation to oust him an international "game of poker."

Ouattara's spokeswoman Affoussy Bamba said that she was nonetheless optimistic that the end was near.

"He has nothing left. His arsenal is gone. His army has evaporated," she said by telephone from Abidjan. "How much longer can he last?"

## IOWA Synthetic drugs that mimic pot, cocaine, other drugs send thousands to hospitals

INDIANOLA — Until he tried a marijuana look-alike product called "K2," David Rozga's most dubious decision was getting a Green Bay Packers tattoo on his shoulder.

Then the 18-year-old athlete and band standout got high on the fake pot last June and complained to a friend "that he felt like he was in hell," his father said.

Though he had never suffered from depression, the teenager went home, found a shotgun and killed himself — one of at least nine U.S. deaths in the last year that authorities suspect were caused by synthetic products designed to mimic marijuana, cocaine and other illegal drugs.

An Associated Press analysis shows that the substances are increasingly causing users to fall seriously ill, with some suffering seizures and hallucinations.

Available in many head shops for as little as \$10, the synthetic drugs are often packaged as incense or bath salts, but they do nothing to perfume the air or soften water.

## SAUDI ARABIA Defense chief reassures Saudi king that U.S. remains steady friend amid Arab upheaval

RIYADH — Defense Secretary Robert Gates tried to smooth the worst rift in years with Arab ally and oil producer Saudi Arabia on Wednesday, reassuring the Saudi king that the U.S. remains a steady friend despite support for pro-democracy revolutions in the Middle East.

The Saudi king, looking thin after months of medical treatment in the United States and elsewhere, welcomed Gates for what the Pentagon chief later said was a cordial and warm visit.

The hospitality masked deep unease among Saudi Arabia's aged leadership about what the political upheaval in the Middle East means for its hold on power, its role as the chief counterweight to a rising Iran, and its changed relationship with the United States.

In a sign of the depth of the Obama administration's concern about the political earthquake that has shaken the region, including the island of Bahrain off Saudi Arabia's Persian Gulf coast, this was Gates' third trip to the area in the past month.

## NEW YORK Holder, other cabinet officials discuss issues affecting black Americans at Sharpton event

The Rev. Al Sharpton is marking the 20th anniversary of his Harlem-based organization by teaming up with President Barack Obama and top White House officials to grapple with issues affecting black Americans.

The president is scheduled to appear Wednesday evening at the annual conference of Sharpton's National Action Network. Cabinet members spoke earlier at the Manhattan event.

U.S. Attorney General Eric Holder said he'll work with Sharpton's group to alleviate teen violence in black neighborhoods, especially violence involving guns.

## ALASKA 'If you get shot at, you can have a shot': Alaska law would let military drink at age 18

JUNEAU — Alaska is the latest state to weigh in on a long-running argument: If you're old enough to fight and die for your country, you should be old enough to drink a beer.

An Alaska lawmaker who served in Vietnam is pushing a bill that would allow active-duty service members under 21 to drink alcohol as long as they could produce an armed forces identification card. Those under 19 — Alaska's smoking age — would be allowed to buy tobacco products.

"It's not fair that one guy in a fox hole can go home and have a beer while another guy in the fox hole can't," said Rep. Bob Lynn, R-Anchorage. "It's not about drinking, it's not about smoking, it's about equality. If you get shot at, you can have a shot."

But Lynn's bill has received a cool reception from the state's armed forces commanders, who worry it would encourage unhealthy behavior in a military that wants to reduce smoking and curb drinking.



# Police focus on N.C. polygamist sect in 2 killings

DURHAM, N.C. — Police are focused on a small polygamist sect in suburban North Carolina after two members — a 5-year-old boy and a 28-year-old woman — have gone missing and are presumed dead. Authorities believe they were killed by members of the group, but they haven't been able to find the bodies, nor have they been able to locate the suspects for weeks.

Investigators have evidence the boy's mother, Vania Sisk, and Peter Moses Jr., "were directly involved in the murder of a juvenile and an adult," according to court documents. The pair haven't been charged, however.

The investigation began earlier this year when the family of Antoinetta McKoy, 28, reported her missing. They hadn't seen her since early December.

She had moved to North Carolina from Washington, D.C., to start a new life, a family member said, but soon lost touch. When she didn't call on her mother's birthday, the family knew something was awry, said Kevin Shields, McKoy's brother-in-law.

"I'm just hoping they find the body so we can know where to go from there," he told The Associated Press on Wednesday.

Investigators believe McKoy had been living with Moses and Sisk in Durham with a religious sect known as the Black Hebrews. The group believes it descends

directly from the ancient tribes of Israel, and some of the sects — like the one in Durham — practice polygamy.

As police were investigating McKoy's disappearance, they discovered a 5-year-old, Jadon Higganbothan, was missing, too.

Investigators found a former sect member who told them McKoy and the boy had been killed and provided graphic details of the slayings, court documents said.

Police also seized evidence from the sect's homes in Durham and later in Teller County, Colorado. Court documents related to those searches painted a grim snapshot of what happened to the victims.

The former sect member, who was not identified in documents, said Moses became "extremely angry" at the boy in October, grabbed a gun and began pacing around the house. Then Moses called the boy to the basement, and the former member said he heard "loud music and the sound of a gunshot," according to documents.

The ex-member said he saw Moses wrap the body and put it in a suitcase in the attic. A few days later, when the "body began to stink," Moses disposed of the suitcase, the documents said.

The former member told police McKoy was killed in February after a heated argument over car keys. McKoy ran from the house, but she was eventually escorted back inside by two women, according to court documents.

# Wash. soldier in homicide-suicide deployed twice

SEATTLE — A Washington state man suspected of shooting and killing his wife and himself during a police chase was a combat medic who had twice deployed to Iraq, the Army said Wednesday.

Sgt. David Franklyn Stewart, 38, deployed with the 82nd Airborne Division for three months in 2007 and for about a year from late 2008 to late 2009.

Stewart shot and killed himself Tuesday following a high-speed car chase on Interstate 5 near Olympia. His wife, Kristy Sampels, was also found dead in the car of a gunshot wound, and the Thurston County coroner on Wednesday ruled her death a homicide.

Deputies on Tuesday found the couple's 5-year-old son, Jordan Stewart, asphyxiated with a plastic bag at their home in Spanaway. He had been dead for at least 24 hours, and his body showed bruises that were possibly from past abuse, Pierce County sheriff's detective Ed Troyer said. However, investigators uncovered no prior reports of abuse involving the boy.

Investigators spent Wednesday trying to piece together the gruesome events. They said they believed one of the parents killed the boy but they aren't certain which one.

Sampels' 10-year-old daughter was found safe with her biological father in Redmond, Ore.

At the time of his deployments, Stewart was based at Fort Bragg, N.C., with the 505th Parachute Infantry Regiment of the 82nd Airborne Division. He transferred to Joint Base Lewis-McChord south of Seattle in March 2010.

On Facebook pages that

appeared to belong to Stewart and Sampels, they sometimes wrote of the difficulty of being apart during the deployments and excitement at being reunited. The Associated Press could not immediately confirm the authenticity of the pages.

"Little more than 24hrs and im back with my beutiful wife and children," Stewart wrote on Sampels' page on Dec. 11, 2009. "Life is great!!"

Sampels also wrote occasionally about suffering from unspecified medical troubles. The Washington State Patrol initially reported that she appeared emaciated and that she had not been shot; the coroner's office later discovered the bullet hole.

The Facebook page appearing to belong to her said she studied nursing at Central Oregon Community College.

The Army reported that

Stewart listed his hometown as Redmond, Ore. He enlisted in the Army in the summer of 2006.


The 10-mile chase began just before 6 a.m. Tuesday when Stewart passed a patrol car. The trooper pursued the car as spike strips were de-

ployed, shredding the car's tires. The driver sped on, later losing control and colliding with a concrete barrier.


The trooper reported seeing the driver raise a hand to his head, then heard a shot and saw the driver slump over.

A double rainbow arched in the mist of the roaring water and on a nearby overlook a young child pointed.

People chatted but it was difficult to make out what they were saying because of the rushing of water. Some of the visitors leaned against the railing, gazing silently; others pointed their cameras at the picturesque scene before them.

Just another day at Shoshone Falls. It’s estimated that more than 300,000 people visit the falls every year, many of them from out of town.

“There’s a lot more tourists this time of year,” said Dennis Bowyer, director of Twin Falls Parks and Recreation Department.

On Friday, a number of the visitors came from Ada County, attested by the license plates on the cars that filled the parking lot.

“The kids are on spring break and we wanted to get out of Boise,” said Todd Simonson. “It’s the reason we came here. I wanted my kids to see this.”

Simonson, who was at the park with his wife and four children, said he was impressed with the amount of water flow.

“It’s pretty significant,” he said.

Water at Shoshone Falls drops 212 feet — steeper than the drop at Niagara Falls. It is best viewed in spring before water from the Snake River is diverted for irrigation purposes. Idaho Power Co., which manages hydroelectric power plants on the Snake, keeps a minimum of 300 cubic feet per second of water flowing year round. Currently, water is pouring off the 900-foot-wide cliffs at about 5,000 cfs.

Higher flows attract more people, Bowyer said, noting that the best flows happen between April and June. June 1997 was a record month, when the falls flowed at more than 30,000 cfs.

Flows depend on a variety of factors, including spring runoff in the Tetons, he said.

“We’ve got pretty good flows right now,” Bowyer said. “We could get higher flows.”

Pam Lindsay, of Boise, was traveling with her family to Rexburg on Friday when they stopped to see the falls.

# Volunteer opportunities abound with Idaho F&G

**Q: “I was told the Fish and Game had lots of need for volunteer help. Please tell me what I can do.”**

**A:** Springtime with Fish and Game is a bit like planting a garden. You’re hopeful that Mother Nature, good intentions and elbow grease will make the efforts successful.

A couple of important activities occurring right now involve planting native shrub species lost in recent fires in key wildlife areas. Last weekend about 65 volunteers from several 4-H clubs, the Mule Deer Foundation, as well as individual volunteers, planted about 3,500 containerized sage brush seedlings in the Bell Rapids fire rehab site.

the Magic Valley regional office for the schedule and locations.

Another project gearing up is called “Take me Fishing” As the name implies it is a mentoring program designed to get kids outdoors and learn to fish. Department sponsored activities at local fishing holes are often well attended by young anglers eager to learn how to catch their first fish. Angling mentors are badly needed and always welcome.

A schedule of dates, times, and locations is available through the department’s website as well as on flyers at the regional office. Watch for the “Take me Fishing” trailer at reservoirs around the Magic Valley. During sponsored fishing days the trailer is a

self-contained bait and tackle shop supplying all the necessary gear for young anglers. Anyone wishing to assist with the “Take me fishing” activities should contact Kelton Hatch at the Magic Valley regional office.

# Guide instructing veterans on fly tying

SHERIDAN, Wyo. — For longtime guide and fly-tier Gordon Rose, the sport of fly fishing has been both a career and a lifelong passion.

For military veterans like Nathan Hansen, the opportunity to tie flies and catch fish in the Bighorn Mountains is a form of therapy that helps take their minds off their wartime experiences.

In a conference room at Sheridan VA Medical Center on a recent Monday night, nine veterans quietly listened as Rose patiently explained the steps involved in tying an elk hair caddis fly.

Using an overhead screen, Rose described how to create simulated wings from elk hair and to use fluffs of cotton to build the body of the insect, which is a popular meal for trout living in Wyoming waters.

Many in the room had served in Operation Iraqi Freedom or Operation Enduring Freedom in Afghanistan, and none had any fly fishing experience. They carefully watched Rose as he explained the detailed technique involved in fly tying.

Each veteran was equipped with his own materials donated by Rose and other volunteers from the Little Bighorn Chapter of Trout Unlimited.

The veterans are participating in a program Rose launched in March called Sheridan WYO Healing Waters, a local offshoot of a national nonprofit program called Project Healing Waters dedicated to helping disabled military veterans through fly-fishing.

Rose’s program is the first of its kind in Wyoming and serves as a form of recreation therapy for veterans struggling with post-traumatic stress disorder.

“It’s about helping veterans live a fulfilling and contented life outside of combat,” Rose said. “It’s really neat working with these guys and seeing what they’re dealing with.”

A lifelong fly-fishing enthusiast and Sheridan resident who sells custom-tied trout flies through his business, Quill Gordon Fly Fishers, Rose learned about Project Healing Waters from a national news story. Realizing Sheridan would be an ideal location to launch a local program chapter, he contacted recreational therapists at the VA and coordinators with the national office of the Healing Waters program.

Spending his own money on supplies and materials, Rose launched the program three weeks ago and is pleased by the early results.

“I didn’t know if any of them would be back for the second class,” Rose admitted. “But they were all back, plus a couple more, and they made dramatic improvement on their second fly. I think it’s such a terrific diversion that they dive right into it.”

Project Healing Waters includes three parts: fly-tying classes, fly-casting classes, and fly-fishing outings in the Bighorn Mountains this summer.

Hansen, a Navy veteran, served on active duty from 2004 to 2006 and was deployed to both Afghanistan and Iraq. When he returned to the United States, he says he missed the adrenaline rush of combat and struggled to find ways to replace that feeling.

“I was riding my motorcycle too fast and drinking too much,” Hansen said. “Nothing compares to what it’s like over there.”

Hansen added that he’s learning to use activities at the VA like fly-tying and playing piano to help manage his emotions. He said he was surprised how quickly he took to tying flies.

“I usually don’t have patience for these kinds of things,” Hansen said.

In the third fly-tying session, participants were comfortable enough to exchange jokes with Rose, who murmured quietly during his demonstration several times.

“Do you always talk to your flies like that?” one man asked.

“You have no idea,” Rose replied, as laughter filled the room.

She visited previously, but it had been a while. Her description: “It’s beautiful.”

The falls do attract a number of people from the Boise area, said Shawn Barigar, president of the Twin Falls Area Chamber of Commerce. He said the chamber uses the falls as a way to promote other activity in the area.

“When the falls are flowing at higher rates it does draw more people to the community,” Barigar said. “We encourage them to stay a day or two to stay in our hotels, shop our stores, eat in our restaurants and see other attractions ... and not just in Twin Falls, but to make an experience of it. Go to Hagerman or to the City

of Rocks.”

For some locals such as Autumn Seitz, of Twin Falls, it’d been a while since she visited the falls. She brought her children and parents, Harlin and Vickie Summers, who came from Idaho Falls.

Harlin grew up in Rupert and said he remembers tromping through the area of Shoshone Falls as a young man. He and friends would swim in a natural pool at the top of the falls, he said. Later, he’d drive his Harley-Davidson to Dierkes Lake where he would camp.

Things have changed since then, he said, including the added entrance fee to the park. He didn’t mind paying the \$3 car fee to get in, considering what he got out of it: the chance to see the falls at its most beautiful.

The falls are the main reason people visit the park, but once there they usually find other things to do.

A paved trail takes visitors to various lookout points, where they catch different views of the falls; a large park with shade trees and picnic tables offer families a nice reprieve from the summer sun, and nearby Dierkes Lake provides a venue for fisherman to catch rainbow trout and another hiking trail that loops around the lake.

Vickie Summers enjoyed seeing the double rainbow on Friday.

“It’s absolutely breathtaking,” she said. “The sound, the rushing of water; it’s almost unreal.”

# Climbers launch expedition to clear trash from Mount Everest

KATMANDU, Nepal — A team of mountaineers led by a veteran Sherpa guide flew Wednesday to Mount Everest on an expedition to clear away tons of trash left on the world's highest peak.

Since Everest was first conquered in 1953, thousands of people have climbed it, leaving behind the empty oxygen bottles, ropes, tents and other garbage that made their journey possible.

Nepal has since required

climbers to bring down everything they take up the mountain or lose their deposit, but debris from past climbs still litters the slopes.

The team that left Katmandu on Wednesday — led by Apa, a Sherpa who has climbed Everest a record 20 times — plans to bring down 11,000 pounds of garbage during the spring climbing season.

“I want to do this for my country, my people and for Everest,” said Apa, who uses

only one name.

The team hopes to clear 8,800 pounds of garbage from the lower part of the mountain and another 2,200 pounds from near the 29,035-foot summit.

Expedition members, porters and guides of other expeditions will carry the garbage down the mountain, receiving 100 rupees (\$1.40) for every kilogram they haul out.

Ang Tshering, organizer of the Eco Everest Expedition, said this is the fourth

year a cleaning expedition has been held.

Apa first climbed Everest in 1989 and has repeated the feat almost annually. He has campaigned about the degradation he has seen on the Himalayan peaks due to global warming and other issues.

He said when he first began climbing Everest, the trail to the summit was covered with ice and snow. Now, it is dotted with bare rocks. The melting ice has also exposed deep crevasses, making expeditions more dangerous.

## Fire in the hole

A review of emergency fire starters

Everyone knows that starting a fire under favorable conditions at home or in the woods is not much of a challenge. But should you find yourself in wild places under less than ideal circumstances, your ability to quickly start and maintain a fire could literally mean the difference between life and death.

For today's column, I tested and evaluated a number of traditional and innovative new fire starters that you can drop into your backpack for your next day trip afield or integrate into your backwoods survival pouch. Depending on their mode of ignition, fire starters are categorized as chemical flame producers, friction sparkers, or tinder igniters.

### SHOOTING THE BULL

wheel against the flint in-sert.

This lighter will not blow out, even in a strong wind. A great firestarter for tough conditions.

**Friction spark lighters.** A basic system that produces sparks by drawing steel against a bar of flint.

Direct the shower of sparks into your tinder, blow on the smoldering fibers, and you've got fire. Models will require you to manually draw the steel striker against the flint bar or push down on a plunger that elicits the same effect.

My favorite variant is known as the Magnesium firestarter. Simply scrape a small pile of shaving from the solid magnesium bar, place a bed of tinder in close contact, and draw a knife blade down the embedded flint bar. The sparks will ignite the shavings, which burn with a furious flame readily igniting the tinder.

These are wonderful tools — compact, inexpensive, and very effective in any weather or altitude.

**Chemical flame producers.** Think waterproof matches and liquid fuel lighters here.

I really love UCO's Stormproof Match Kit. The set consists of 25 wax-coated matches housed in a sturdy yellow waterproof plastic carrying case. The most unique feature of the matches is that fully 2/3 of their length is covered with flammable material. This provides plenty of burn time for difficult -to-light materials.

A supply of water resistant striking papers is mounted on the side. The UCO kit retails locally for around \$12. Replacement matches and strikers are available.

In the field, I always carry a couple of the inexpensive Bic-type butane lighters both in my pack and on my person. This ensures that should my pack and I separate, I'll still have one or two onboard. My favorite liquid fuel lighter is an elderly Zippo Genuine Windproof Lighter.

Of all metal construction, the Zippo features a chromed fuel reservoir/chimney housing a cotton wick. The fuel permeated wick is ignited by thumbing the steel friction

**Tinder igniters.** The purpose of these firestarters is to produce an intense, sustained flame capable of igniting damp or less flammable materials.

Three items that I find useful are Vaseline-coated cotton balls, wax backpacking candles, and steel wool. Each will produce flames capable of setting most tinder aflame. All are inexpensive and when stowed in plastic film canisters are highly portable.

Take the time to fine tune your equipment and technique and you'll never have to venture afield without your Ole Flame.

## Talking turkey: Hunting tips

**Here are tips** on talking turkey: Spring turkey hunters should learn to imitate the yelps, clucks, purrs and cackles made by hen turkeys. The easiest calls for a beginner to use are box calls, push button calls and slate calls. The most difficult calls to master are diaphragm mouth calls and wingbone calls. The best learning method is through an instructor skilled at calling turkeys, but you can also learn to call by imitating the sounds on an instructional video or audio tape.

Luckily, all turkeys do not sound alike. Listen carefully to the sounds made by real turkeys and try to imitate them. Novice hunters should call sparingly. Gobblers call to attract hens and also to dominate subordinate gobblers.

### Tips

- Don't overcall. If a gobbler is headed in your direction, just let him get close enough for the shot. Eastern turkey hunters who learned spring turkey hunting on Rio Grande-strain birds are particularly bad about overcalling. Eastern birds are not nearly as vocal as a Rio Grande turkey.
- Don't worry if you don't call a gobbler off the roost. Gobblers often roost very near hens and are unlikely to leave live hens that they can see. The same gobbler may respond to your call at midmorning. In fact, most attempts to call turkeys off the roost are unsuccessful.
- Depending on terrain, turkeys are often closer than you think. If a turkey is facing away from you when he gobbles, he sounds farther away. If you hear a turkey gobble and the bird sounds fairly close, make a hen yelp in response. If the turkey gobbles back, you should be able to determine if he's getting closer. Hunters often try to get too close to a gobbling turkey and meet him coming their way.
- Protect yourself from spring dangers. Though rattlesnakes or other poisonous reptiles are common in most turkey woods, insects like ticks, mosquitoes and chiggers are much more common and may spread insidious diseases. Insect repellents with the active ingredient DEET do a good job of protecting you from biting insects. Treat clothing, including socks, boots and

- caps with an insecticide with the active ingredient permethrin to discourage ticks. Don't worry about the chemical smell. Turkeys don't have a sense of smell.
- Wear camouflage, including camo face mask or face paint and camo gloves. Choose a camouflage pattern that blends well in bright green spring foliage. Sit perfectly still when a turkey is looking in your direction. Turkeys have excellent eyesight and they spot movement particularly well.
- Pay attention to where you set up to call turkeys. Try to sit with your back to a tree. The tree helps break up your outline and provides a back rest if you are forced to sit still for a long time. Sit where you have good visibility in the direction you think the turkey will come. Position yourself where you can comfortably shoulder your shotgun for a shot in the logical direction. Turkey pros often use gardening shears to prune branches or other vegetation that blocks shooting lanes.
- Build a blind of natural material or use a pop-up blind if you plan to sit all day at a waterhole, food plot, or strutting grounds frequented by turkeys. Blinds are very effective, especially when used in conjunction with decoys.
- Do not try to shoulder your shotgun or otherwise move if you can see a turkey's head. If you can see the turkey's head, he can see you, and he will notice any movement. Move when the bird has stepped behind a bush or when a strutting bird turns his back on you.
- Use a shotgun with a full choke for maximum range but avoid taking shots much farther than 30 yards. Shoot the turkey in the

- head and neck. Body shots with a shotgun are less effective because of the turkey's heavy feathers.
- Pattern your shotgun before the season to determine which shells work best. Several companies make turkey-sized paper targets that work well for patterning. Most turkey hunters use premium No. 6 shot, but you should experiment with different loads to determine which loads work best with your particular shotgun and choke. Patterning your shotgun is also useful for seeing how the gun performs at measured distances and it provides a chance to shoot at turkey-sized targets and learn how big they appear at various ranges.
- Be careful about shot selection if multiple turkeys are coming to your call. Even the relatively tight pattern of a full choke shotgun will kill more than one turkey if their heads are close together or if one bird is standing behind the other.

### Gear

- A camouflage vest designed for turkey hunting makes an excellent accessory. A turkey vest should include plenty of pockets for storing every kind of turkey call within easy reach. Also a drop-down pad for sitting on wet or rocky ground and a game bag designed to accommodate a 20-pound bird. A hydration system helps on a hot day.
- Turkey decoys. Turkeys can pinpoint your calling location and come to it unerringly. They have extremely good eyesight and will notice anything out of the ordinary. Using a decoy is effective because it provides the incoming

Clayton, who works as the hunting manager at Sportsman's Warehouse in Twin Falls. “Now there are plenty of opportunities.”

Starting Friday, area youth hunters dressed in their best camouflage will head to the Cottonwood Wildlife Management Area near Oakley, and other parts of Unit 54, where they will set up blinds and patiently wait for the turkeys to show up. The following Friday, April 15, the first of two hunts open for adults.

Oakley and the South Hills area have become somewhat synonymous with turkey hunting, since they're the primary places in the Magic Valley where people can hunt and bag the birds.

During the next few weeks, 78 hunters will visit Unit 54. That's how many people received tags from the Idaho Department of Fish and Game to hunt turkeys in the Magic Valley, said Jerome Hansen, supervisor of the Magic Valley

Region office.

Turkey hunting in the Magic Valley is by draw tag only. By comparison, 568 hunters applied for the tags.

Other places to hunt turkeys in the Magic Valley include private lands, Hansen said, but hunters must get permission from landowners before venturing onto their properties.

“Turkeys have really taken to that (Cottonwood) area,” said Rupert resident Tammie Pace of the Magic Valley Gobblers, a chapter of the National Wild Turkey Federation. “We transplanted 15 birds from there last year.”

Birds were transplanted to private lands in the Nat-Soo-Pah area south of Twin Falls.

There are about 200 birds in the Cottonwood area now. They want to maintain about 150, she said.

To help grow turkeys and other wildlife, the Federation plans to put \$10,000 into a habitat project in the South Hills, planting a vari-

ety of fruit trees and other plants that will give animals more forage opportunities.

“We're starting that off as soon as we can get into the mountains,” Pace said.

For now, those who didn't draw a tag will have to find something else to keep them busy during the upcoming hunts. Or they might head elsewhere.

Clayton said many of the hunters he meets in the store usually are serious about their turkeys, some buying camouflaged shotguns with short barrels and other turkey-specific gear. If they don't plan to hunt locally, they usually head north

where turkeys are more plentiful, he said.

No matter where you go, turkey hunting causes spring fever, Hansen said.

“I do a little bit more turkey hunting every year,” he said, “because it's the nearest thing to be outside this time of year. Just being in the woods in the spring is so special. Those early mornings, there's just nothing like it.”

And then to hear a gobbler as it gets closer and closer.

“It's exciting,” he said.

**Question:** Years ago, my father put my name on the deed to his house in case he died. Two months ago he decided to sell the house and move to a retirement community. I was required to sign a Quit Claim Deed as part of the sale. I received no money from the sale. Last month I filed a Chapter 7 bankruptcy on my own. Now my bankruptcy trustee says I committed fraud and wants to recover money from my father or from the people that bought the house. Can this possibly be legal?

**Answer:** The Bankruptcy Code provides that when an individual who is insolvent transfers an interest in property but does not receive reasonably equivalent value, the transfer is a fraudulent transfer and is avoidable by the bankruptcy trustee if the transfer occurred within the two-year period immediately preceding the filing of a bankruptcy. Your interest in your father's house had value, although the amount is unclear. Because you received nothing in return for the Quit Claim Deed, and because you were insolvent at the time, the transfer of your interest was probably a fraudulent transfer. Because the transfer deprives your creditors from receiving the value of your interest in the property, the transfer is likely avoidable and the value of your interest will be collected by the bankruptcy trustee. An experienced bankruptcy would have identified this issue and given you the appropriate advice BEFORE your case was filed.

# Soy lecithin may help alleviate eye twitching

**DEAR DR. GOTT:** A while back, you published an article about eye twitching. I, too, have had eye-twitching problems and did consult a doctor. He suggested getting a shot in my temple, but I declined, it being so close to my eye. I read somewhere that soy was good for the nervous system, so I bought lecithin concentrate, 400 milligrams, and now take one in the morning and one at night. As long as I take them, I do not get the

twitching. If I stop taking them, within a day or two, it starts again. I've been using the lecithin for a number of years now, and just the two tablets are still sufficient. Thank you for your informative column.

**DEAR READER:** There are two main types of

lecithin: egg and soy. Soy lecithin is extracted from soybean oil and used as a food and drug additive, typically an emulsifier. It is becoming more popular as a dietary supplement. It is purported to benefit many conditions, such as high cholesterol, gallbladder disease, Alzheimer's disease, eczema, anxiety and more.

Soy, in general, has not been studied extensively in regards to claims that it will treat, improve, or cure cer-

tain health conditions. Soy protein is known to be a good alternative to animal protein and is beneficial to maintaining health, however.

There are no established dosing guidelines simply because not enough research has been done. Some studies have noted diarrhea, nausea and abdominal pain and fullness as side effects.

If it works for you, stick with it. Others who want to try this should speak with

their physicians first. Be sure to keep track of when the supplement was started and make note of any improvements, side effects or reactions, even if they seem unrelated. This is especially important if you are on other medications, over-the-counter or prescription, as well as other supplements, vitamins or herbs.

**DEAR DR. GOTT:** I read your article about hives. The writer said her problem began after having bilateral

knee replacements. I'm just wondering if the hives could be caused by an allergic reaction to any of the materials used in her knee replacements. Before my knee replacement, I was asked if I had any known allergies to metals, nickel in particular. I wish the writer the best and hope she has found the source of the problem.

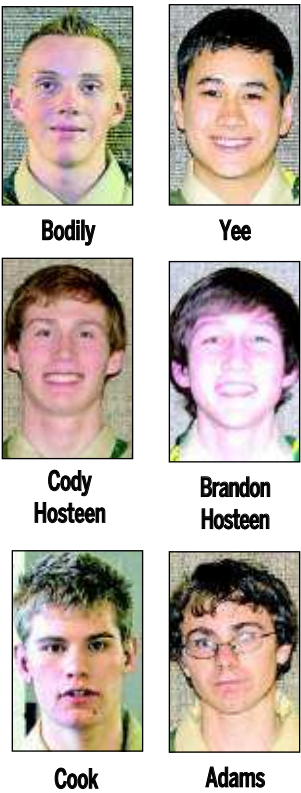
Six young men will receive their Eagle Scout awards at 5 p.m. Sunday at the Burley LDS West Stake Center, 2420 Park Ave.

## Former U.S. rep in Libya to seek Gadhafi's exit

TRIPOLI, Libya — A former U.S. congressman invited by Moammar Gadhafi arrived in Tripoli on Wednesday on a self-described private mission to urge the Libyan leader to step down as rebels and pro-government forces waged near stalemate battles.

Curt Weldon, a Pennsylvania Republican who has visited Libya twice before, said he leading a private delegation and had informed the White House and some members of Congress about his trip. He was in Libya's capital as a White House envoy, Chris Stevens, was meeting rebels in their de facto capital, Benghazi, to gauge their intentions and capabilities.

Gadhafi has been widely excluded from international efforts to broker a peace plan, with rebels insisting that his four-decade rule must end. Weldon would be one of the few high-profile Westerners to meet with Gadhafi since the rebellion began in February.

Weldon, who served two decades in Congress before losing his seat in 2006, was part of a bipartisan delegation that visited Libya in 2004 after Gadhafi agreed to abandon his nuclear program. The seven-member U.S. team included then-Sen. Joe Biden and included an address by Weldon to the Libyan Peoples' General Conference — a pro-Gadhafi forum — to urge greater understanding between Libya and the United States.

Weldon also visited Libya last year to study U.S. business opportunities.

"There is no question that America should play a critical role in helping the Libyans build a new government," Weldon wrote in an editorial published Tuesday in The New York Times. "Sadly, in the years since my first trip, Washington has squandered many opportunities to achieve that goal without bloodshed. And unless we begin to engage with the country's leaders — even those close to Col. Gadhafi — we may again lose our chance to help build a new Libya."

The rebels, aided by U.N.-authorized airstrikes intended to protect civilians from Gadhafi's forces, have maintained control of much of the eastern half of Libya since early in the uprising, while Gadhafi has

### Gadhafi, in letter, asks Obama to end air strikes

WASHINGTON (AP) — Libyan leader Moammar Gadhafi appealed directly to President Barack Obama on Wednesday to end what Gadhafi called "an unjust war." He also wished Obama good luck in his bid for re-election next year.

"You are a man who has enough courage to annul a wrong and mistaken action," Gadhafi wrote in a rambling, three-page letter to Obama obtained by The Associated Press on Wednesday. "I am sure that you are able to shoulder the responsibility for that."

The White House confirmed the letter, but top officials shrugged it off.

"I don't think there is any mystery about what is expected from Mr. Gadhafi at this time," Secretary of State Hillary Rodham Clinton said, repeating U.S. and NATO demands that Gadhafi's forces pull back and cease attacks. She also renewed a demand that Gadhafi step down from power and leave the country.

clung to much of the west. Gadhafi has been putting out feelers for a cease-fire, but he refuses to step down.

Neither government forces nor the rebels have made any serious gains in recent days, and the conflict has shifted to smaller objectives on both sides, such as control of the key oil port of Brega.

Rebels have complained that NATO airstrikes come too slowly to seriously disrupt the pro-Gadhafi troops. But the French foreign minister, Alain Juppe, defended the air campaign, saying the missions are becoming more complicated as Gadhafi's forces position themselves in heavily populated civilian areas to make targeting difficult.

Juppe said airstrikes have destroyed most of Gadhafi's aircraft and armored vehicles, but that his troops are increasingly blending in with the rebels by using pickups and less sophisticated weapons similar to those the opposition uses.

"The military situation in the field is confused and uncertain and the risk of engulfing exists," he said in a radio interview.

## DUELING DIALOGUES

### Politicians squabble over who's being more civil

WASHINGTON — Suddenly everyone in Washington wants to be an adult.

President Barack Obama says he wants to have an adult dialogue on the budget. Republican lawmakers contend they're the ones trying to have a grown-up talk. Both sides are pointing fingers yet both have agreed to repeated delays in completing a budget to keep the government open for the last six months of the fiscal year.

The bickering might seem, well, childish, but the stakes are high as each side tries to win public opinion and display the leadership qualities to attract voters at the ballot box through 2012 and beyond.

The rhetoric heated up this week with Republicans and Democrats jockeying furiously for advantage as the prospect of a government shutdown Friday grew more real. Each day that passes with no deal seems to bring more talk of who's an adult and who's not.

Obama on Tuesday emerged from a meeting with Democratic and Republican leaders and proposed "that we act like grownups."

That same day House Budget Committee Chairman Paul Ryan, R-Wis., released a budget plan calling for dramatic cuts and laid down a challenge to Obama: "Americans are ready for honest talk. They're ready to be spoken to like adults."

When the White House attacked Ryan's plan, House Speaker John Boehner, R-Ohio, jumped in to criticize the president.

"If he wants to have an 'adult conversation' about solving our fiscal challenges, he needs to lead instead of sitting on the sidelines," the speaker said Wednesday.

Then the Republican National Committee added its voice, accusing Obama of ducking a meeting on the budget. "Adults don't say one thing and do another," the committee said.

Later Wednesday it was Obama trying to seize back

the adult mantle at a town hall meeting in Pennsylvania. Voters, he said, want politicians to "act like adults, quit playing games, realize it's not just 'my way or the highway!'"

For Obama, who first called for an adult conversation on long-term fiscal issues at a press conference in February, it's an attempt to put himself above the partisan fray, demonstrate firm leadership in a chaotic world and remind voters of his promise to change the way politics works

in Washington.

For their part, Republicans are trying to set themselves up as the ones who can tackle the tough issues of leading Washington through the economic recovery and bringing down debts and deficits over the long term.

To voters, though, it might sound like the typical Washington back-and-forth, not adult behavior at all.

Yet perhaps for a politician the only thing worse than not acting like an adult, is acting

like one, said Jack Pitney, a politics professor at Claremont McKenna College in Southern California.

"Most people would agree that politicians should act like adults by making tough choices even when they are unpopular. So it's popular for politicians to say that they'll do the unpopular thing. But when they actually do the unpopular thing, they are...unpopular," Pitney said. "The lessons of adulthood are seldom happy ones."

## Sailor, 85, crosses Atlantic on raft with friends

PHILIPSBURG, St. Maarten — An 85-year-old British sailor who dreamed of crossing the Atlantic on a raft as a young boy completed the journey with three friends Wednesday.

The crossing to this Caribbean island, led by Anthony Smith of London, took about two months and

was generally smooth except for damage to two rudders on the large, sail-powered raft.

"Some people say it was mad," he told The Associated Press when he arrived in St. Maarten. "But it wasn't mad. What else do you do when you get on in years?"

The jovial crew said they wanted to raise awareness about the environment and

to prove the elderly are capable of embarking on adventures that are mistakenly considered dangerous. They also aimed to raise money for the British non-profit group WaterAid, which provides potable water to impoverished communities.

A stroke of bad luck paid for the trip, courtesy of Smith, who was hit by a van and broke his hip.

The crew departed from the Canary Islands after bad weather delayed their trip for about a month. Smith delivered a farewell speech — in nearly impeccable Spanish — to a crowd gathered on the dock and then waved goodbye.

## White House says shutdown will delay pay to troops, slow economic recovery

WASHINGTON — The Obama administration warned Wednesday that a federal shutdown would undermine the economic recovery, delay pay to U.S. troops fighting in three wars, slow the processing of tax returns and limit small business loans and government-backed mortgages during peak home buying season.

The dire message, delivered two days before the federal government's spending authority expires, appeared aimed at jolting congressional Republicans into a budget compromise. Billions of dollars apart, congressional negotiators were working to strike a deal by Friday to avert a shutdown by setting spending limits through the end of September. The last such shutdown took place 15 years ago and lasted 21 days.

President Barack Obama

telephoned House Speaker John Boehner on Wednesday, and Boehner's office said the speaker told Obama he was hopeful a deal could be reached.

As the talks continued, the White House sought to put the prospect of a shutdown in terms people would care about, warning even that the beloved National Cherry Blossom Festival Parade in the nation's capital would be wiped out. The Smithsonian Institution and national parks around the country would also be closed.

A shutdown would come at an especially busy time for the Smithsonian. The Cherry Blossom Festival, which concludes this weekend, draws many tourists to an area near the museums. The Smithsonian counts about 3 million visits each April and has already sold 23,000 IMAX movie and lunch combos to school groups for the month.

Under long-standing federal rules, agencies would not

be affected that provide for U.S. national security, disburse most types of federal benefit payments, offer inpatient medical care or outpatient emergency care, ensure the safe use of food and drugs,

manage air traffic, protect and monitor borders and coastlines, guard prisoners, conduct criminal investigations and law enforcement, oversee power distribution and oversee banks.

Mail deliveries would continue in the event of a shutdown. U.S. postal operations are not subsidized by tax dollars.

According to the shutdown scenario described by the administration, the government would have to significantly cut staffing across the executive branch, including workers at the White House and civilian employees at the Defense Department; close to 800,000 workers would be affected. Congress and the federal court system will also be subject to a shutdown.

At the Pentagon, defense officials were finalizing plans that would lay out how the department would deal with a shutdown. But they already have acknowledged that U.S. military troops — including those in war zones — would receive one week's pay instead of two in their next paycheck if the government were to close.

Military personnel at home and abroad would continue to

earn pay, but they wouldn't get paychecks until there was a budget agreement and government operations resumed.

Col. Dave Lapan, a Pentagon spokesman, said that the Pentagon would be open on Monday and would be staffed. He said decisions on which Defense Department employees must report to work would depend on their jobs, rather than where they were based.

Key national security responsibilities, including operations in Afghanistan, Iraq and Libya and earthquake assistance to Japan, would not be interrupted by a shutdown, the Pentagon said.

The CIA also would not close, though it would be drawing down some nonessential personnel to be in compliance with federal law, according to a senior intelligence official, speaking on condition of anonymity to discuss matters of intelligence.

## Succession speculation escalates as North Korea parliament meets

SEOUL, South Korea — North Korean legislators gathered in Pyongyang on Thursday amid speculation that leader Kim Jong Il may appoint his son to a post that would make him the nation's second most powerful man.

As the Supreme People's Assembly convenes a spring session, attention is focused on whether Kim Jong Un will be elected to the National Defense Commission — a move that would further solidify the young man's standing as North Korea's next leader.

Delegates from around the country began arriving earlier in the week for the session, laying bouquets Wednesday at a statue of Kim Jong Il's mother, Kim Jong Suk, according to North Korea's official Korean Central News Agency.

The parliamentary meeting is North Korea's first major national meeting since Kim Jong Un made his political debut in September by winning a key leadership post in the ruling Workers' Party. Since then, he has appeared regularly at Kim Jong Il's side, his father's clear choice as heir apparent.

Election Thursday to the National Defense Commission would be the next step in the path to succession, a process that many believe will be completed in the next year.

April 2012 marks the centenary of the birth of President Kim Il Sung, the former guerrilla fighter who founded North Korea and passed the mantle of leadership to son Kim Jong Il. Pyongyang has promoted 2012 as a significant milestone in the country's history.

However, some question whether the son will ascend that quickly to a major National Defense Commission post only six months after being made a four-star general and assuming senior Workers' Party posts when Kim Jong Il appears to remain in control.

"For Kim Jong Il, handing over a considerable amount of power to his son could mean a weakening of his own power base," said Kim Yong-hyun, a professor of

North Korean studies at Seoul's Dongguk University.

Kim Jong Il, 69, rules the nation of 24 million as the chairman of the National Defense Commission, but the commission's No. 2 post, first vice chairman, has been vacant since his longtime confidant Jo Myong Rok died in November. Jo, a vice marshal of the Korean People's Army and top party official, had held the post for some 12 years.

The National Defense Commission is authorized to formulate key state and military policies, and being named first vice chairman of the NDC would allow Kim Jong Un to start making his own inspection trips to army units, factories and farms.

"There is a high possibility that Kim Jong Un would become the commission's 1st vice chairman and assume the No. 2 spot in the government as well as in the Workers' Party," said Cheong Seong-chang, a senior fellow at the private Sejong Institute in South Korea who has watched the succession issue closely for years.

North Korea's parliament usually meets once a year to approve rubber stamp bills vetted by the Workers' Party. Its infrequent sessions are closely watched for clues to changes in the country's power structure.

Kim Jong Il used a 2009 legislative meeting to make a triumphant return to the public eye after months out of sights following rumors he had suffered a stroke. Last year, he reshuffled top officials.

Legislators may also approve measures aimed at drawing foreign investment and revitalizing North Korea's economy, analysts said.

In the months ahead, North Korea will also likely focus on winning economic assistance and improving ties with South Korea and the United States to help ensure a smooth power transfer, Kim said.

The World Food Program said last month after conducting an extensive survey that more than 6 million North Koreans need outside food aid due to hardships including heavy flooding and a harsh winter.



# Official: Mexican cartels hiring common criminals

CANCUN, Mexico — Drug cartels are increasingly recruiting common criminals and quickly converting them into killers, the head of Mexico's federal police said Wednesday.

Public Safety Secretary Genaro Garcia Luna said new drug cartel recruits can reach the position of hit man in a month, a process that used to

take 15 years.

Garcia Luna said his agency has began combatting common crime as it fights drug cartels in response to the changing nature of organized crime in Mexico.

“For too long the fight against organized crime has been concentrated on the leadership and now it’s important to fight crime at every stage,” Garcia Luna told representatives from more than 100 countries attending the

annual International Conference for Drug Control.

The drug cartels are recruiting low-level lawbreakers such as street drug dealers and robbers, a tactic first used by the brutal Zetas drug gang and now being copied by other cartels.

The Zetas, originally ex-soldiers acting as hit men for Mexico’s Gulf drug cartel before breaking off on their own, have no geographic concentration like other car-

tels and therefore have shown up in disparate parts of the country, authorities said. They operate almost like franchises, sending one member to an area they want to control to recruit local criminals.

Officials at the drug control conference say the Zetas have now spread their reign of terror from the border with the United States to the border with Guatemala — and across it.

Guatemala Security Vice Minister Mario Castaneda said the Zetas are recruiting former elite Guatemalan soldiers and training them in camps in the Central American country.

At least six former “kaibiles” — Guatemalan soldiers trained in counterinsurgency — linked to the Zetas have been arrested in Guatemala, Castaneda said.

Mexico first warned in 2005 that the Zetas were re-

cruiting “kaibiles.”

Guatemalan authorities are also investigating military personnel for allegedly stealing weapons from the army and selling them to drug traffickers, Castaneda said.

“We have documented at least three robberies” of army weapons, he said.

In 2009, Guatemalan police seized 563 grenades and more than 3,800 bullets from the Zetas that investigators said belonged to the army.

## Researchers find superbug gene in New Delhi water

LONDON — A deadly superbug was found in about a quarter of water samples taken from drinking supplies and puddles on the streets of New Delhi, according to a new study.

Experts say it’s the latest proof that the new drug-resistant bacteria, known as NDM-1, named for New Delhi, is widely circulating in the environment — and could potentially spread to the rest of the world.

The superbug can only be treated with a couple of highly toxic and expensive antibiotics. Since it was first identified in 2008, it has popped up in a number of countries, including the United States, Australia, Britain, Canada and Sweden.

Most of those infections were in people who had recently traveled to or had medical procedures in India, Pakistan or Bangladesh.

“This is not a problem that is looming in the future ... there are people dying today from infections that can’t be treated,” said David Heymann, chairman of Britain’s Health Protection Agency. He was not linked to the research.

Last fall, British scientists analyzed more than 200 water samples from central New Delhi, including public tap water and water that collected in the streets. They found the superbug gene in two of the drinking water samples and 51 of the street samples. Researchers found the superbug in 11 different types of bacteria, including those that cause dysentery and cholera.

As a comparison, the scientists also took 70 water samples from a water treatment center in Cardiff, Britain. No superbug genes were found in any of those. The research was paid for by the European Union and was published online Thursday in the journal *Lancet Infectious Diseases*.

Mark Toleman, a senior research fellow at Cardiff University and one of the study authors, said the superbug was being spread through New Delhi’s water supply, but that experts didn’t know how many people were being sickened by it. He guessed about a half million people in New Delhi are now carrying the superbug gene naturally in their gut bacteria.

Indian health ministry spokeswoman S. Sharan said officials hadn’t seen the *Lancet* study and couldn’t comment on it.

Since the superbug was found in the U.K. last year, British officials say there have been about 70 cases of it in the U.K. including a small hospital cluster.

“We have a vested interest in sorting out sanitation problems in India,” Toleman said, adding the West should invest more money in clean water projects in Asia. “Otherwise (superbugs) could filter out from Asia and will spread through the world.”

Other experts weren’t sure how prevalent the NDM-1 superbug would become but were preparing for the worst.

“It’s like asking in the 1980s if a few HIV cases should be a big worry,” said Guenael Rodier, director of communicable diseases at the World Health Organization’s office in Copenhagen. “The fact that (NDM-1) has emerged is worrisome, but forecasting what it will do is very difficult.”

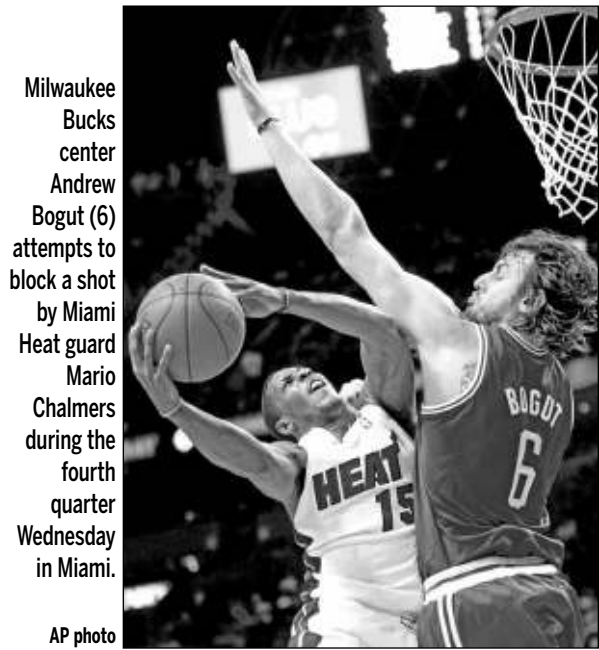

### Bonds' defense rests without calling witnesses

SAN FRANCISCO — Barry Bonds' confident defense team rested its case Wednesday without calling a single witness, just minutes after a federal judge accepted the government's request to dismiss one of the five counts against the home run king.

Prosecutors called 25 witnesses to the stand over 2½ weeks, but the defense needed just one minute to present its side. The jury of eight women and four men barely had time to get settled in the courtroom before being told to return this morning for closing arguments.

"We are expecting that you will get this case for decision tomorrow," U.S. District Judge Susan Illston said to them. "Tomorrow will be the last day."

Once indicted on as many as 15 counts, Bonds will face just four charges when the jury starts deliberations in a court house less than two miles from the ballpark where he set records for the Giants. A decision could come as early as Friday — when the World Series championship flag is raised in San Francisco for the first time.

Faced with a defense motion that Illston was prepared to grant, prosecutors dropped the count accusing Bonds of lying to a grand jury in 2003 when he said prior to that season he never took anything other than vitamins from trainer Greg Anderson. The defense said the government presented no evidence that Bonds was given Tetrahydrogestrinone (THG) and a testosterone ointment, designer steroids known as "The Clear" and "The Cream," before 2003. Bonds testified in front of the grand jury that Anderson told him the substances were flaxseed oil and arthritic balm.

### Judge: Lockout ruling to take 'couple of weeks'

ST. PAUL, Minn. — The federal judge overseeing the NFL players' request to lift a lockout by the owners said it will take "a couple of weeks" to rule.

U.S. District Court Judge Susan Richard Nelson, however, urged both sides to get back to the bargaining table.

Nelson heard arguments from lawyers for the players and NFL owners Wednesday in St. Paul.

The players say their careers are being irreparably harmed by the lockout. The owners say Nelson doesn't have the jurisdiction to issue an injunction while their is a complaint before the National Labor Relations Board.

"We've got to be a more physical team on the field and that goes back to get-

ting really physical during practice," McClellin said. "I think we're doing more of that lately.

"But I also think being successful comes back to paying attention to the little details in our game and listening to what the coaches are trying to tell us," McClellin added. "If we can do that, I think we're going to be all right."

The soft-spoken McClellin is expected to shoulder more of the burden as the leader of the defensive

Neither had made a hole-in-one before. The couple lives in Brazil.

Club manager Ricardo Alberto Rossi said two caddies also witnessed the feat.

### Fenway Sports signs deal with LeBron James

BOSTON — LeBron James is going into business with the Boston Red Sox.

The baseball team's sister company, Fenway Sports Management, says it has signed James to a long-term deal to handle his marketing. As part of the deal, James has obtained a small piece of the soccer team Liverpool in the English Premier League, FSM president Sam Kennedy said Wednesday.

FSM is owned by Fenway Sports Group, which is also the parent company of the Red Sox and Liverpool FC and a co-owner of Roush Fenway Racing.

### BYU's Rose receives new 5-year contract

PROVO, Utah — BYU men's basketball coach Dave Rose probably could have earned more money by leaving but he signed a new five-year contract with the Cougars so he could continue to "build a legacy here."

His new deal will take him through the 2015-16 season.

The announcement was made Wednesday on the heels of the winningest season in BYU basketball history, and unsuccessful attempts by other top programs to lure away the 53-year-old Rose.

The Cougars finished 32-5 and advanced to the NCAA Tournament's round of 16 for the first time in 30 years. Since being hired in 2005, Rose is 159-45 and has led the Cougars to at least 20 wins and a postseason berth each year.

Financial terms were not released, but school administrators acknowledged that Rose is still underpaid for all that he offers.

Yet to be determined is whether Rose will be able to keep his top assistants, including Dave Rice, who is being considered for the top job at his alma mater, UNLV.

### IOC approves women's ski jumping for 2014 Games

LONDON — After an unsuccessful legal battle for inclusion at the 2010 Vancouver Olympics, women's ski jumping won its place Wednesday on the program for the 2014 Winter Games in Sochi.

The International Olympic Committee executive board also approved the addition of men's and women's ski halfpipe, mixed relay in biathlon and team events in luge and figure skating.

"The inclusion of these events ... is sure to be appreciated by athletes and sports fans alike," IOC President Jacques Rogge said. "These are exciting, entertaining events that perfectly complement the existing events on the sports program, bring added appeal and increase the number of women participating at the games."

### Titans, USC settle over Kiffin's hiring of coach

NASHVILLE, Tenn. — The Tennessee Titans have settled their lawsuit with the University of Southern California over Trojans coach Lane Kiffin hiring away an assistant coach just before training camp last July.

The Titans and USC announced Wednesday in a joint statement that settlement terms are private but called it an "amicable" resolution. The lawsuit is expected to be dismissed in a few weeks.

The team sued July 26, a couple days after Kiffin poached running backs coach Kennedy Pola off the Titans' coaching staff a week before Tennessee opened camp.

Then-Titans coach Jeff Fisher, a USC alum, had fired Earnest Byner to hire Pola last offseason and said Kiffin didn't make the customary courtesy call to alert the team of his intentions.

# A Masters with many possibilities

AUGUSTA, Ga. (AP) — On the far end of the course Wednesday, near the only palm tree at Augusta National, Lee Westwood rolled long putts across the fourth green as he practiced alone on a quiet afternoon before the Masters.

Spotting two familiar faces in the crowd, he looked over with a grin and said, "Lost? Bar closed?"

Through the pines and dogwoods, down a steep slope toward the 16th green, players stopped on the edge of the 16th green to the fans' delight and tried skipping shots across the pond and onto the green. On what might be the only day of booing, Graeme McDowell got an earful when his shot sank before it got halfway across the water.

It sure didn't feel like the day before the first major of the year.

But then, Augusta National has a way of putting players at ease with its sheer beauty, when the Masters is more about azaleas and jasmine and enjoying a special place than trying to win a green jacket.

That figures to change on Thursday.

"The Masters has a fear factor, and that's the best thing about this golf course," three-time champion Nick Faldo said Wednesday.

Phil Mickelson will try to join some exclusive clubs when he tees off in the opening round as the clear favorite in the first major of the year. Never has Lefty had so much at stake at one tournament.

He can go to No. 1 in the world for the first time in his career. He can join Jack Nicklaus, Tiger Woods and Arnold Palmer as the only players with at least four green jackets. And he can become only the fourth player to win the Masters in consecutive years.

To show how much he's ready, Mickelson poured in 18 birdies last weekend to win the Houston Open. And

when he arrived at the Masters, one of the first visits he made was to a back specialist.

"This week is the one week where I swing the absolute hardest," Mickelson said. "I've been working out for it. I saw a back specialist just to make sure that my back hangs in there. It feels terrific, but I've been working on it for some time to make sure it's strong enough to withstand the rotational speed that I'm going to be trying to apply this week. Because it's a big advantage if you can move it out there."

Woods, no longer the betting favorite at Augusta for the first time since 1999, is more concerned with a shorter club — his putter. It has kept him from winning the Masters twice in the last four years, and kept him from contending since his return to golf a year ago.

Even so, they remain the two dominant forces.

"The Masters will always start with Tiger and Phil," said Robert Allenby, who will play with Woods the first two rounds. "Their record here and the way they play Augusta make them the two to beat."

The difference this year: They have some company.

PGA champion Martin Kaymer is No. 1 in the world and will try to win his second straight major. He considers the favorite to be Luke Donald, who beat Kaymer in the Match Play Championship earlier this year. Then there's Westwood, who has been no worse than third in four of the last five majors. Throw in the likes of Dustin Johnson, Nick Watney, Rory McIlroy and Paul Casey, and the smallest field of any major suddenly has a long list of contenders.

Some of that is a new generation arriving. Some of that is Woods no longer standing in their way.

## THE ACES ON BRIDGE® Bobby Wolff

Today's deal, from a recent Cavendish tournament, demonstrates that the expert player will frequently break the rules when the situation demands it. In this case, the rule is that when leading a suit, one selects the highest card from a sequence and otherwise leads low.

Whatever no-trump range North-South was using, that South hand seems to fit it. Zia Mahmood duly opened one no-trump and Bob Hamman (North) transferred to two hearts to end the auction. Yes, one no-trump might have been better, but no one did anything silly here.

Marty Fleisher led ace and a second diamond, and Zia won the king and led a heart to the jack and ace. Fleisher continued the good work by leading a third diamond. Zia ruffed in dummy, played a club to the king and ace, then led a second trump. Eric Rodwell (East) won this and could see that he might need to take two spade tricks quickly. So he shifted to the spade 10, hoping for today's lie of the cards. Zia covered with the queen, and when Fleisher played the king, Zia ducked it, assuming Fleisher held both the king and jack. Back came a second spade, and Zia was down whatever he did now. Had Rodwell shifted earlier to the spade jack, Zia would surely have wrapped up eight tricks by covering the jack with the queen and taking dummy's ace at once, assuming the 10 to be on his right.

ANSWER: The combination of the cue-bid and raise from your partner is game-forcing and suggests doubt about strain or level. Since you have an opening bid, six diamonds, and both a heart and a spade control, you have nothing to be ashamed of. Start by cue-bidding three hearts and prepare to bid on past three no-trump if necessary.

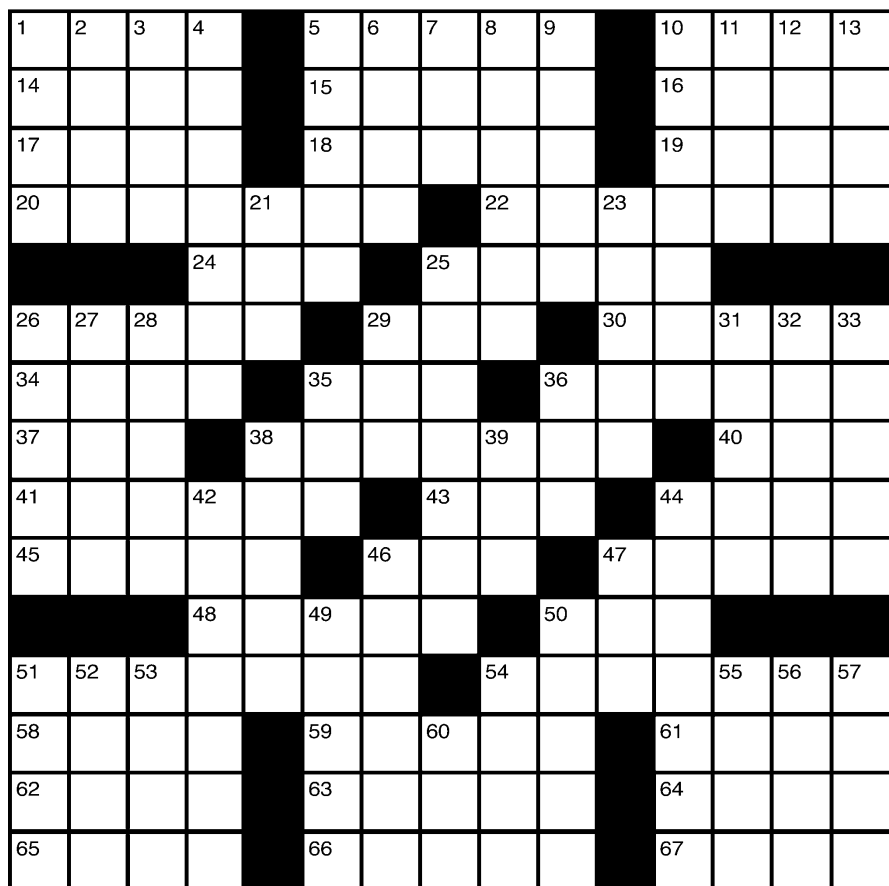

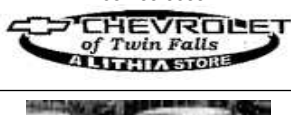
