## Motorists reminded to yield before turns at Falls, Washington

Officials say bags over signals are meant to 'discourage' left turns By friclassen
Times-News witer
Crossing the Twin Falls intersection of Washington Street North and Falls Avenue West can be confusing.
There's that stubby temporary ers, which leaves those hoping to turn left actually glancing right to check the light. The partially reconstructed roads feature enough terrain changes to make a night-
time east-west crossing at speed feel like a brief rock-crawling adventure.
And then there are those bags over the left-turn signals. They showed up in October, when the city of Twin Falls announced it would "temporarily eliminate"
thoseleft turns until the contrac those left turns until the contrac-
tor overhauling Washington Street shut down for the winter. Officially, the bags now "discourage" left-hand turns from Washington onto Falls. Unofficially, they've discouraged more than a few drivers who' ve been a crisis of conscience over their impending left turn.
Things will get better when the $\$ 6.5$ million project to widen Washington is completed this summer. Until then, Idaho Transportation Department spokesman Nathan Jerke said
drivers should slow down and drivers should slow down and
yield to oncoming traffic before making a left-hand turn at the making a left
intersection.
Jerke said putting the bags in place keeps traffic control constant at the intersection through the rest of the construction process. The alternative, he said,
would require traffic control to whift depending on the work going on, further muddying traffic patterns.

## Unknown Schwartzel wins Masters

AUGUSTA, Ga. - The finishing touch of a most amazing Masters was Charl Schwartzel slipping into
a green jacket. Until that moment a green jacket. Until that moment late Sunday afternoon, everything

To all my readers who claim they have never played a squeeze, New York's Cavendish Duplicate Club recently presented a great opportunity for simply drawing trumps, taking finesses and cashing winners, to produce an unusu al squeeze that would have been worth a 95 percent board. Few took the opportunity
Say you declare four hearts on a trump lead. (Yes, a diamond is best for the defenders.) You
should decide to take ruffs in the Should decide to take ruffs in the tablish the club jack and nine for tablish the club jack and nine for
diamond discards, whereas you cannot usefully establish the you monds.
So you win the heart cheaply in hand, cross to the spade king, lead a club to the queen, cash the
ace, and draw a second round of ace, and draw a second round of trump with the jack. A club ruff
establishes the suit, and now you overtake the trump king with the ace to cash the club jack.
With 11 top winners there can
hardly be any harm in leading out hardly be any harm in leading out the top trump now, just in case. pitches a diamond, declarer discards a spade and runs three diacards a spade and runs three dia-
mond tricks. If he pitches the spade 10, declarer discards a diamond and leads a spade to the jack, queen and ace, with the spade nine for his 12th winner. It The trap on the hand on a diamond opening lead is that you must win the ace at trick one, or your entries to hand become fatally entangled.
