It's one of the things Forster, the FHS speech teacher, said brings the team together, along with hours of dedicated work and encouragement from the team, faculty and community.

Forster said the skills learned in the speech classroom are things students take with them for the rest of their lives.

"Analytical skills, the ability to communicate effectively, know your audience and the writing is amazing. That is where the whole faculty comes into this program," she said. "It wouldn't be the same without that support."

About two hundred students from across the Magic Valley competed in the district speech competition April 2 and are now

Motorists reminded to yield before turns at Falls, Washington

Officials say bags over signals are meant to 'discourage' left turns

Crossing the Twin Falls intersection of Washington Street North and Falls Avenue West can be confusing.

There's that stubby temporary traffic signal for eastbound drivers, which leaves those hoping to turn left actually glancing right to check the light. The partially reconstructed roads feature enough terrain changes to make a night-time east-west crossing at speed feel like a brief rock-crawling adventure.

And then there are those bags over the left-turn signals. They showed up in October, when the city of Twin Falls announced it would "temporarily eliminate" those left turns until the contractor overhauling Washington Street shut down for the winter.

Officially, the bags now "discourage" left-hand turns from Washington onto Falls. Unofficially, they've discouraged more than a few drivers who've been lodged behind someone suffering a crisis of conscience over their impending left turn.

Things will get better when the \$6.5 million project to widen Washington is completed this summer. Until then, Idaho Transportation Department spokesman Nathan Jerke said drivers should slow down and yield to oncoming traffic before making a left-hand turn at the intersection.

Jerke said putting the bags in place keeps traffic control constant at the intersection through the rest of the construction process. The alternative, he said, would require traffic control to shift depending on the work going on, further muddying traffic patterns.

Idaho groups grant wishes of terminally ill

BOISE — Their requests are often touchingly simple. A home-cooked meal.

A fishing trip with grandsons who live out of state.

A spa visit and professional photos that can be given to family members.

These are some of more than a dozen wishes that have been fulfilled — or will be soon — by the Meridian-based No Regrets Foundation, established in November to be a kind of Make-A-Wish Foundation for terminally ill grown-ups.

"Family members of sick and dying patients are so overwhelmed with so many things," said Dr. Mylynda Massart, a family practice physician who is on the board of No Regrets. "I think the foundation can come in and fill in so many different gaps."

"People can draw upon us as a resource," Massart said. "There's no wish too small, and no wish too big. It needs

Future of a forgotten people

Ache leads to great interview

Follow *Times-News* writer Melissa Davlin on her trip to report in Nepal's refugee camps, where Bhutanese refugees are preparing to resettle in Twin Falls. From Davlin's latest blog post:

“My interpreter, Jeewan, and my host father, Bedu, marched me down to the doctor. ... I had no choice, they said — stomach issues often indicate bigger, and potentially dangerous, health issues in Nepal, and they didn't want me to get worse. Besides, they added, Dr. Rai had been King Jigme Singye Wangchuck's physician before fleeing Bhutan in 1991, so you can trust him.

Suddenly, I had another reason to visit the doctor. After he gave me a checkup, he agreed to sit down for a quick interview later that day. ... Dr. Rai wouldn't talk about his experiences with the royal family, however. Instead, he discussed his passion for repatriation. For him and like-minded refugees in the camp, returning to Bhutan is the only acceptable solution. While most Bhutanese refugees are eager, or at least willing, to resettle in other countries, Dr. Rai sees the resulting diaspora as glorified human trafficking, and a threat to his people's culture. If everyone had stayed and demanded that they return to Bhutan, he reasons, the government would have to oblige.

hundreds of people offering to volunteer or provide services since she began promoting it on Facebook.

"We've had pilots say they'll do a private lesson. Restaurants donating food. Horseback-riding sessions offered," Carter said.

Carter has friends who are working to open chapters of No Regrets in other areas, including Twin Falls, Portland and San Francisco.

"I've definitely seen the need out there," said No Regrets board member Sarah McDaniel, owner of All About Home care. "There are not a lot of services out there that I've seen that do something like this."

At least one other Treasure Valley organization dedicates itself to granting wishes to terminally ill adults — Boise-based non-profit Wish Granters Inc. was launched last July.

Doug Raper, executive director of Wish Granters, said the group had granted 10 wishes and is currently working on five more. He says wishes have included family trips to the Oregon Coast, meeting the Boise State football team and restoring a cherished car.

"We don't only give wishes for the individuals. We help to make memories for their families," said Raper, who previously worked for Make-A-Wish and Wishing Star.

Recently, the No Regrets Foundation moved into office space in Meridian donated by Jason Hawke of J.P. Turner.

One of the inspirations for No Regrets was Carter's grandmother — Madalene Ammerman Montgomery — who died from lung cancer in 2006. "Mema," as her grandchildren called her, had worked as a registered nurse in Texas.

"She was amazing and extremely selfless," Carter said. "My mema was very religious and was always volunteering her (time) and efforts at church and as much in the community as she could."

At the end of her life, Montgomery spoke of things she wished she had done, including travel.

"I would have loved to have been able to get all of our family back together to be with her one more time,"

Carter said. "She loved to cook meals, and that would have been her last wish."

Carter, 33, who grew up in Twin Falls, lives in Boise with her husband, Dave, and their two young children, Jack, 4, and Vivian, 18 months.

She is a University of Idaho grad and has worked at Alzheimer's and hospice facilities in the Treasure Valley. She is currently marketing director for an assisted living facility in Nampa.

Early last year, Carter began to research what she needed to do to create a nonprofit to aid terminally ill adults and their families. In November, she assembled an executive board made up of professionals involved in some aspect of health care, elder care or hospice.

Lisa Douda, 33, an acquaintance of Carter's from high school, is working to get the Twin Falls chapter going. A former restaurateur and caterer, Douda said she became interested in end-of-life care after her father became ill with cancer in 2005.

She later became a volunteer with the nonprofit Friends of Hospice. Now employed as community resource director for Assisting Hands Home Care, Douda said she'd been thinking of a similar idea when she found out about No Regrets.

"There are these wonderful programs out there for children, as there should be," she said. "People forget that because you're older doesn't mean there isn't things you wish you could do."

"I hope we're giving people the opportunity to go out on their own terms," Douda said.

One teen dies, another hurt in crash near Buhl

BUHL — A young man died Sunday morning when the car he was driving apparently crashed into a tractor and then an outbuilding.

Twin Falls County Sheriff's deputies arrived at the scene of the one-vehicle crash at about 8 a.m. Sunday, with the crash believed to have happened several hours earlier, according to a sheriff's department media release.

The driver was dead when the deputies arrived, according to the release. The passenger was transported by air to St. Alphonsus Medical Center in Boise with serious injuries.

Both vehicle occupants

are younger than 18 years old, according to the release. No names were released.

The car, a 2000 Crown Victoria, was found crashed into an outbuilding at North 1400 East and East 4400 North near Buhl, according to the sheriff's department. The car appears to have been heading southbound on a side road when it missed a stop sign, crashed into a tractor and then hit the outbuilding.

The property owner discovered the wreckage Sunday morning and alerted the sheriff's department.

The crash is still being investigated, with alcohol and speed suspected to be factors, according to the release.

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Cassia Alternative High School prepares for annual food drive

BURLEY — Nearly 100 Cassia Alternative High School students gathered Friday to listen as the director of a Burley mission told them about hunger in their community.

The school is launching its fourth annual food drive with a goal to raise 2,000 pounds of food for The Helping Hands Mission and other Mini-Cassia charities.

Student Ricardo Jacuinde said he helped deliver food to the mission after the school's food drive last year.

"There were piles of food all over," Jacuinde said. "I think it's good. It's good helping other people."

Helping Hands Director Cody Thornton said he meets a lot of homeless people through the mission that operates primarily as a food bank. He told students at the alternative school that most are homeless because they rebelled against society.

"Don't let rebellion take your life,"

Thornton said, adding that many people are embarrassed to ask for the mission's help.

"So many of them have been pushed back so far, they don't know how to express themselves," Thornton said.

The tax-exempt mission receives no government funding and hands out about 70 food boxes to the hungry each week.

"This is a good thing for these young people to become involved in,"

Thornton said.

Cassia Alternative teacher Julie Nannenga said all three Burley elementary schools will assist the alternative school with this year's food drive.

Students will canvass neighborhoods and leave empty grocery bags and instruction tags on doorsteps. The bags will be picked up the following day.

"Kids don't understand that it's not just homeless people who need the services of the food bank," Nannenga said.

Nannenga said there is a valuable lesson to be learned for someone who volunteers their services to the community and does not expect anything back.

"I think it's a good opportunity for helping out the community, and I've been taught to help out," said student Derek Maxwell.

"It will be continued because that intersection will see some major work in the coming weeks, as well as lane restrictions," Jerke said. "There'll be times when there'll only be one lane in each direction at that intersection."

Washington's northbound lanes still need to be recon-

structed, which will represent the biggest change drivers will notice before the project wraps up, hopefully in early July, Jerke said.

With road construction season just starting up, Twin Falls Police Department Staff Sgt. Dennis Pullin said it's too early to see any shifts in city traffic, but added that drivers need to be aware of

coming changes.

"I'd just want to get the message out to slow down, pay attention, keep in mind that it's somewhat confusing when things are under construction," he said.

While recent snow has slowed progress, Jerke said the next thing people will notice along the Washington project is work at the inter-

section of North College Road, where crews will update the stormwater system. Also, at the south end of the project, some blasting to remove rock is a couple weeks out, after traffic is shifted onto the southbound lanes.

Pool, golf course management on Twin Falls council's docket

Another entity wants to take over pool from YMCA

A new operator for the city golf course and the question of whether the city pool should have a new operator will come before the Twin Falls City Council tonight.

The Golf Selection Committee recommended new management for the course, to replace Golf Pro Mike Hamblin, who left the job in February for a similar position at Blue Lakes Country Club. The recommended replacement is not named in the council's agenda.

The council will also decide if it wants to go through a search for new management

at the city pool or if it wants to keep the YMCA as the manager. According to a city staff report, there has been "serious interest" from another entity to run the pool.

The council will also hear a presentation on spending at the pool. In the past four

years, the city has spent more than \$1 million on the pool, including capital improvements. Since 2008, the city has also spent more than \$200,000 to balance the pool's books between revenue and spending.

Also on the council agenda is a presentation by Southern Idaho Economic Development Organization Executive Director Jan Rogers about her group's "Operation Facelift" initiative, which seeks private donations to revamp downtowns throughout the Magic Valley, Twin Falls included.

Unknown Schwartzel wins Masters

AUGUSTA, Ga. — The finishing touch of a most amazing Masters was Charl Schwartzel slipping into a green jacket. Until that moment late Sunday afternoon, everything else at Augusta National was up for grabs.

The roars came from everywhere, for everyone, and never stopped.

Tiger Woods made up a seven-shot deficit in nine holes — too bad it was the front nine. Geoff Ogilvy ran off five straight birdies. Rory McIlroy matched the greatest collapse in Masters history with a stretch of holes not even Greg Norman would want to watch.

It was so wild that eight players had at least a share of the lead on the back nine.

Schwartzel emerged from all this madness with a magical touch of his own. He became the first Masters champion in its 75-year history to finish with four straight birdies, giving him a 6-under 66 for the best final round by a winner in 22 years.

The green jacket ceremony wasn't so much a celebration as a chance for everyone to catch their breath.

"There's so many roars that go on around Augusta," Schwartzel said. "Especially the back nine. It echoes through those trees. There's always a roar. Every single hole you walk down, someone has done something. And I'd be lying if I said I wasn't looking at the leaderboard."

At times, it was nearly impossible to keep up.

There was a five-way lead at the top at one point, and only the final hour sorted it all out.

Schwartzel didn't have the lead to himself until he knocked in a 10-foot birdie putt on the 17th hole, then put just the right touch on a memorable Sunday with one final birdie putt that only counted toward the final margin.

He won by two shots over Adam Scott and Jason Day, a pair of Australians who didn't drop a single shot on the back nine.

"Just an exciting day," Schwartzel said. "So many roars, and that atmosphere out there was just incredible. A phenomenal day."

Indeed, this final round had it all.

There was the fist-pumping charge by Tiger Woods that was slowed by two putts he missed from inside 4 feet. There was Luke

McIlroy has disastrous final round

AUGUSTA, Ga. — Rory McIlroy stood slumped over on the 13th tee, head buried in the crook of his elbow. There was still golf left to be played, but for a long moment he didn't move, as if he didn't want to face further punishment from a course that had suddenly turned on him.

The collapse that began just a few holes earlier was now officially complete with a tee shot into the creek. The Masters that was his at the beginning of the

day would belong to someone else.

And as he finally lifted his head, McIlroy looked for all the world like he wanted to cry.

"I realized then that I didn't

Donald, dumping his tee shot into the pond at No. 12 only to make four birdies over the last six holes, chipping in on the last one.

And then there was McIlroy, whose 80 in the final round might be remembered as much for the classy way he handled it all.

Still leading by one shot as he headed to the back nine, McIlroy hit a tee shot next to the cabins left of the 10th fairway and twice hit a tree to make triple bogey. He three-putted from 7 feet for bogey on the 11th, four-putted from about 12 feet on the next hole and

buried his head into his forearm as the shock began to settle in.

McIlroy had the highest final round by a 54-hole leader since Ken Venturi in 1956. Not since Jean Van de Velde at Carnoustie had someone lost at least a four-shot lead going into the last round of the major.

Alger and his brother, Tegan, partnered to finish third in team roping on Friday and won the event on Saturday. Alger leads the boys all-around standings after two weekends with 87 points, Clint Lawson of Kimberly is second with 42 and Tegan Alger sits in third place with 41.

Colton Baratti of Filer easily captured the bull-riding win on Friday with a 73-point ride and scored 69 points to beat the 62-point ride by Layne Ward from Raft River on Saturday. Stetson Anderson of Burley managed to stay aboard Little Red for the full eight seconds and secured 51 points for the first successful saddle bronc ride of the year Saturday afternoon.

On the girls side, the grounds were a bit challenging for the barrel racers but McKenzie Zollinger of Oakley was able to claim the win on Friday night, circling the pattern in 17.820 seconds and clocking an even better time of 17.454 on Saturday for a second win.

Jessica Laumb of Burley was the fastest in breakaway on Friday at 3.04 seconds, but Laumb was even faster Saturday afternoon at 2.92.

Freshman Cara Vierstra and Filer rookie teammate Bandlee Tubbs are new to high school rodeo, but so far they have handled anything thrown at them.

MIAMI — If this was an Eastern Conference semifinals preview, then the Miami Heat and Boston Celtics showed what to expect.

Few pleasantries.

Pushing and shoving.

And maybe a Game 7 in Miami.

LeBron James scored 27 points, Dwyane Wade added 14 and the Heat moved closer to the No. 2 seed in the East playoffs Sunday by beating the sliding Celtics 100-77.

"It was a playoff-atmosphere type of game, from the fans to both teams' approach to what the game meant," Wade said. "It had that feel."

Miami moved a game ahead of Boston, trimming its magic number to clinch the second seed to two. The teams will finish second and third in some order behind Chicago in the East and are slotted to play in the conference semifinals.

"We'd like to play them, I can tell you that," Celtics coach Doc Rivers said. "And we may have to if we want to go somewhere."

Chris Bosh added 13 points and eight rebounds for Miami, which had been 0-3 against Boston this season, though Heat coach Erik Spoelstra cautioned against overstating the win's importance.

"We proved we can beat them tonight,"

Mariners drop 7th straight

SEATTLE — Just getting back on the Safeco Field mound was an accomplishment for Erik Bedard after nearly two full years away.

Now, if only his performance was better.

The Mariners' polarizing left-hander made his first home start since July 2009 on Sunday, but it wasn't a performance Bedard will remember fondly. He was gone by the fourth inning, and the Mariners were on their way to a seventh straight loss, 6-4 to the Cleveland Indians.

It's been a miserable week for Seattle, which hasn't led at any point. The Mariners were playing from behind again on Sunday after Asdrubal Cabrera's first-inning homer when Bedard made a mistake on a 1-2 pitch.

"Every team goes through stretches. Obviously it's magnified early.

We're going through a tough stretch now," Seattle manager Eric Wedge said. "Hopefully you find out a lot about yourself when you do go through these stretches. We'll find out more because it is early in the season."

What the Mariners learned about Bedard on Sunday could be concerning.

He showed signs of progress during spring training and his first start last Monday at Texas provided hope after he went five innings and allowed just three earned runs in his comeback from major shoulder operations that cost him most of the past two seasons, including all of 2010.

Sunday was certainly a step back. Not only was Bedard hit hard, but he made mistakes during favorable counts and failed to crack 90 mph on the stadium radar gun most of the afternoon. He allowed two homers

and three doubles and threw 83 pitches in four innings. The 10 hits off Bedard were his most since he gave up 10 to Minnesota in 2007.

"It's been a year and a half since I've thrown so it might take a little while. I'm working hard and trying to get back as quick as I can," Bedard said. "The location is not there 100 percent, but it's getting there. I'm working on it. Hopefully it comes fast."

If there was optimism for Seattle, it came from an offense that rallied late and scored more than three runs for the first time in four games. Seattle got a two-run homer from Ryan Langerhans and solo shot from Michael Saunders in the seventh to pull within 6-4.

But that was as close as the Mariners could get. Cleveland relievers Rafael Perez, Tony Sipp and Chris Perez shut down Seattle for the second straight night.

have a chance," McIlroy said. "Once I hit that tee shot left on 13, I was done."

The turnaround was as sudden as it was shocking. One moment, he's poised to be the second youngest ever to win a green jacket; the next, he's in desperate need of a hug.

Four shots up to start the day, he shot a fat 43 on a back nine that winner Charl Schwartzel got around in 32 strokes. The 80 he shot was 10 strokes higher than his score the day before, and 15 strokes more than his 65 in the first round.

Instead of being compared to Tiger Woods, McIlroy will now be forever be linked to Greg Norman. Instead of celebrating a victory, he was left to wonder how it could have all gone so bad so fast.

His final round score was the worst of a third-round Masters leader since Ken Venturi in 1956. The lead he squandered was the biggest of a third-round leader in a major since Jean Van de Velde's famous debacle at the British Open.

And it all started because he aimed just a bit too far left

on the 10th hole.

"I felt really comfortable on that tee shot all week," McIlroy said. "I just started it a little left."

McIlroy was a stroke ahead when the tee shot that will live in Masters lore hit a tree down the left side of the 10th fairway and ricocheted toward some cabins that Augusta National members use to entertain friends and clients. It went so far off line that veteran golf writer Dan Jenkins said he had never seen anyone hit it there in the 61 Masters he has covered.

McIlroy managed to get his next shot into the fairway, but his fairway wood to the green went left and he hit a tree when he tried to pitch it close. When he finally managed to get the ball in the hole he had made a triple bogey that knocked him out of the lead, though not out of the tournament.

McIlroy took care of the rest with a 3-putt on the 11th hole and a disastrous 4-putt on No. 12 before the tee shot into the creek on 13 formally sealed his fate.

"For 63 holes I was leading this golf tournament. Just a

We’re eating our seed corn, and politicians haven’t noticed

Clearly, legislators can’t be trusted to save the future of Idaho agriculture. Maybe it’s time for producers to tackle the job.

In the just-concluded legislative session, lawmakers cut the budget for the University of Idaho for the third straight year — and hence the budget of the all-important College of Agriculture and Life Science.

CALS is the research and development arm of Idaho agriculture. Quite literally, it’s the edge Idaho ag has in national and international markets.

Since 2009, CALS has eliminated vacant positions, cut spending, and slashed its workforce, eliminating some 70 jobs — nearly a one-fifth of the college’s 405 positions — to meet a 22 percent reduction in state funding of its Agricultural Research and Extension budget during fiscal years 2010 and 2011. State funding dropped by \$5.6 million to \$22.6 million in fiscal 2011, and it will fall more in the coming year: Legislators have mandated a 7.6 percent cut overall of high ed for fiscal 2012.

If you think that doesn’t matter to Idaho’s economy, you’re dreaming.

Idaho ag generates \$21 billion in total sales and 156,600 jobs.

Seems to us that CALS can’t wait any longer for the politicians.

A small revenue enhancement could be charged either through income tax forms or at the point where the commodity enters the first point of sale, with exemptions for home or very small producers. A small amount spread throughout ag would allow CALS to provide the advantage Idaho ag has enjoyed for decades.

We’re in danger of losing that advantage if the Legislature continues its march to the sea at the expense of higher ed. We believe there would be broad support throughout ag for a tax going for a specific program that has proven itself time and time again.

Ask any farmer or rancher.

In a perfect world, politicians would value CALS for what it is — the difference between prosperity and stagnation in Idaho’s dominant industry.

But maybe that’s asking too much.

You pick: Low taxes or Medicare benefits?


Rep. Paul D. Ryan, R-Wis., chairman of the House Budget Committee, won praise from his fellow Republicans last week for proposing a federal budget that would reduce the deficit by slashing spending in almost every domestic program.

Some of the praise was exaggerated; Ryan’s plan has holes in it, just like President Obama’s budget. Ryan proposes an overhaul of the tax code, but doesn’t offer any specifics except for lower tax rates. It doesn’t suggest any fixes for Social Security, even though he says fixes are needed.

But on one major point, Ryan has done a great service. He has made it clear that if you’re serious about cutting the federal deficit, you have to make a choice: low taxes or guaranteed Medicare coverage. You can’t have both.

That may come as unwelcome news to millions of Republican voters, including Tea Party adherents who helped Ryan’s GOP win its majority in the House. Polls have shown that most Tea Party folks are just like everyone else: They want lower taxes and they want to keep their benefits.

Ryan has opted for low taxes. On that count, he’s the most orthodox of conservative Republicans. He doesn’t just want to keep George W. Bush’s tax cuts for upper-income taxpayers forever; he also wants to cut the top indi-

vidual tax rate from 35 percent to 25 percent, paid for by — well, he doesn’t say. He’d repeal an upper-income surtax in Obama’s health-care law. And he’d lower the corporate tax rate (a goal Obama shares).

The one thing he doesn’t propose is increasing any taxes to help close the deficit. He believes in the supply-side article of faith: Lower taxes will solve every economic ill.

With no increases in tax revenue on the table, Ryan balances the budget with exactly one tool: deep cuts in domestic spending (though he spares the defense budget).

His biggest cuts come from programs that serve the poor, including nutrition, student loans and especially health care. His plan argues that those cuts aren’t intended merely to shrink the deficit, but also “to ensure that America’s safety net does not become a hammock that lulls able-bodied citizens into lives of complacency and dependency.”

But he also takes aim at Medicare, the health insurance program that covers everyone who reaches the age of 65. It’s here that Ryan has been praised for his courage at taking on one of the third rails of American politics — al-

though almost everyone who has ever looked at the federal budget (including Obama and Ryan) agreed long ago that the deficit can’t be mastered without controlling the growth in Medicare costs.

This presents a potential dilemma for Ryan and his Republican colleagues, who spent much of last year denouncing Obama for trying to reduce future Medicare spending in his healthcare law. Now they have to explain why it’s right for Republicans to squeeze Medicare when it was wrong for Democrats to do it.

Ryan’s proposal for Medicare would scrap the current, government-run “fee-for-service” insurance system beginning in 2022. Instead, it would offer a federal subsidy to help senior citizens buy private health insurance. Low-income seniors and participants with preexisting conditions would get bigger subsidies than healthy, high-income seniors. But the subsidies would be limited; they would cover a smaller share of the cost of health insurance than Medicare does today, according to the Congressional Budget Office, meaning out-of-pocket costs would rise. And Ryan would raise the age of eligibility from 65 to 67.

In rough terms, this would be Obamacare for the old:

government-subsidized access to private health insurance. That’s not inherently a bad idea; Would-be Medicare reformers in both parties have been talking about it for decades. Ryan noted last week that his plan was based on one he drafted with Alice Rivlin, the doyenne of Democratic budget hawks.

Only one problem with that claim: Rivlin doesn’t like Ryan’s new proposal.

“This budget plan is quite different from anything I would recommend,” Rivlin said.

Rivlin still likes the idea of adding more private insurance options to Medicare. But she wants to keep the fee-for-service plan too and give seniors their choice. And she thinks Ryan’s plan is based on an unrealistically low estimate of future health care costs, meaning the subsidies would end up too low unless Congress intervened to increase them — wiping out the savings that the plan was intended to produce.

And, on the most fundamental question, she thinks Ryan took a wrong turn by ruling out tax increases.

“We need more tax revenue,” she said.

Currently in the United States, there are more than

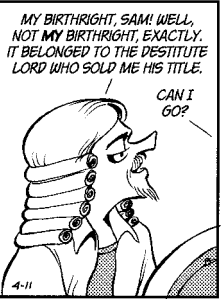
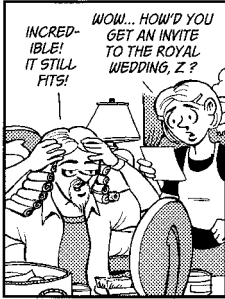

WASHINGTON

Obama's new approach to cutting deficit to include reducing entitlements

President Barack Obama this week will lay out a new approach to cutting the nation's soaring debt, proposing reductions in spending on entitlements such as Medicare and Medicaid and renewing his call for tax increases on the rich.

In an effort to go on the offensive in the battle over government spending, Obama will look for cuts in "all corners of government," senior adviser David Plouffe said on several Sunday talk shows.

But contrasting the president's approach with what Republican leaders have put forward, Plouffe said Obama would use a "scalpel" and not a "machete" as he seeks to preserve funding for education and other areas he sees as crucial to the country's long-term economic success.

Still, Plouffe said Obama is committed to doing more to slash the fast-rising cost of Medicare and Medicaid, to roll back George W. Bush-era tax cuts for those earning more than \$250,000 and to even discuss changes to Social Security.

IOWA

Tornado wrecks large part of small town

MAPLETON — A tornado that struck Saturday evening damaged more than half of Mapleton, a town of 1,200 in western Iowa. Mayor Fred Standa said Sunday. He estimated about 20 percent of the town was "almost flat."

The huge, centuries-old trees the town was named for had been pulled out of the ground and wrapped around houses and tossed on top of cars, Standa said. In one case, a huge motor home had been flipped on its side. "It's not a pretty sight," Standa said. "It's something nobody has seen in this town."

The tornado destroyed 12 to 15 blocks in the southwest corner of Mapleton when it struck about 7:20 p.m. Saturday. Monona County Sheriff Jeff Pratt said. It destroyed about 100 homes and has displaced an estimated 500 to 600 residents, he said.

The tornado was on the ground for three-and-a-half miles and measured three-quarters of a mile wide at one point, according to the National Weather Service office in Valley, Neb.

TEXAS

Hot, dry weather stokes raging wildfires

FORT WORTH — Firefighters on Sunday continued battling out-of-control wildfires scorching nearly 400 square miles across the state, including a West Texas blaze that narrowly missed a historic frontier Army cavalry fort and a top astronomical research facility.

A fast-moving wildfire had spread to more than 60,000 acres Sunday in Jeff Davis County and destroyed about 40 homes in Fort Davis before it raged north and east. The blaze that started Saturday night in Presidio County missed the McDonald Observatory, which was used as an evacuation shelter, said assistant director Anita Johnson.

Local residents said the fire also missed Fort Davis National Historic Site, a U.S. Army cavalry fort built in 1854, according to the Texas State Historical Association.

Bob Dillard, a former Jeff Davis county judge, the county's top elected official, said firefighters spent Saturday evening pouring water on the Fort Davis bank and other downtown businesses, while residents toiled to save their homes in the town 200 miles southeast of El Paso. But by early Sunday after the fire took down the electricity, the water shut off and the 1,100 residents evacuated, Dillard said.

NORTH DAKOTA

Red River flood fight shifts north of Fargo

FARGO — The Red River Valley flood fight shifted Sunday from the cities of Fargo and Moorhead, Minn., to rural areas north of the north-flowing river, which crested Saturday night in Fargo at its fourth highest level in recorded history.

Fargo officials said the metropolitan area appears to be in good shape, but urged residents not to travel outside the city. About 60 miles of roads were closed in Cass County, where Fargo is located, and another 10 miles of roads were washed over, officials said. Interstate 29 north of Fargo was closed for about 25 miles.

Some tributaries of the Red River were at record levels.

"In the southern part of the valley, it's quiet," Fargo Mayor Dennis Walaker said Sunday. "In the northern part of the valley, especially in Cass County, they're having extreme problems."

About 425 National Guard members were on duty in Cass County and were ready to help with evacuations if needed, North Dakota Gov. Jack Dalrymple said Sunday.

IVORY COAST

UN, French fire on Gbagbo residence

ABIDJAN — United Nations and French helicopters fired rockets on strongman Laurent Gbagbo's residence on Sunday in an assault the U.N. said was to retaliate for attacks by his forces on U.N. headquarters and civilians.

U.N. Secretary-General Ban Ki-moon said he had authorized the strikes, accusing Gbagbo of using heavy weapons against Ivory Coast civilians and the U.N. forces trying to protect them.

Residents from nearby neighborhoods reported seeing two U.N. Mi-24 attack helicopters and a French helicopter open fire on the residence, where Gbagbo is holed up in a bunker. The residents couldn't be named for fear of reprisal.

LIBYA

African Union says Gadhafi accepts peace 'road map'

AJDABIYA — South African President Jacob Zuma said Sunday that Libyan leader Moammar Gadhafi had accepted a "road map" for ending the conflict that pits his forces against rebels determined to end his four-decade rule.

Zuma, who according to news reports led a delegation of African Union leaders in a meeting with Gadhafi in his compound in Tripoli, did not disclose details of the cease-fire proposal. He also didn't specify whether Gadhafi himself or his adjutants had accepted the African Union plan.

The road map calls for making it easier to get humanitarian supplies to besieged areas and start-

ing a dialogue between the rebels and Gadhafi's regime, The Associated Press reported.

Zuma said the delegation, which plans to meet the rebel leadership Monday in Benghazi, had completed its mission with Gadhafi. He called on the North Atlantic Treaty Organization to halt its airstrikes against the Tripoli regime's forces.

SYRIA

Government seals port city with tanks

CAIRO — Violent protests continued to roil Syria on Sunday as human rights activists reported that President Bashar al-Assad was using soldiers and tanks for the first time against demonstrators and sealing off the port city of Baniyas.

A day after the Interior Ministry warned that the regime's leaders were losing patience with the nearly month-long revolt, four people were killed in the seaport north of Tartous as security forces and rooftop snipers opened fire on hundreds of demonstrators outside the Al-Rahman mosque, according to human rights workers who have been in touch with residents. Others reported that the military had ringed the city.

"I spoke to someone telling me he saw tanks going to the city," said Nadim Houry, a senior researcher with Human Rights Watch's Middle East and North Africa division.

PERU

Leftist ex-officer vs. Fujimori in runoff

LIMA — An anti-establishment military man who promises to redistribute Peru's wealth won the most votes in Sunday's presiden-

tial election and will face the daughter of imprisoned former President Alberto Fujimori in a runoff, unofficial results showed.

Keiko Fujimori, 35, could end up beating Ollanta Humala in the June 5 runoff as he was the only candidate who advocated altering Peru's free market-oriented status quo by giving the state a greater role in the economy.

The ex-army lieutenant colonel also won the first round in Peru's 2006 presidential vote but was defeated 53 percent to 47 percent by Alan Garcia in a runoff widely seen as a rebuff to Hugo Chavez, who had openly backed him.

This time, Humala distanced himself from the leftist Venezuelan president, while Fujimori backed away from vows to pardon her father she made two years ago when he was convicted of approving death squad killings and sentenced to 25 years in prison.

VIETNAM

Bob Dylan jams in former Saigon

HO CHI MINH CITY — Bob Dylan, whose anti-war anthems made him the face of protest against a war that continues to haunt a generation of Americans, finally got his chance to see Vietnam — at peace.

The 69-year-old Dylan took to the stage in the former Saigon on Sunday, singing such favorites as "A Hard Rain's a-Gonna Fall" and "Highway 61 Revisited."

Only about half of the 8,000 seats were sold to a mix of Vietnamese and foreigners who danced on the grass in the warm evening air as Dylan jammed on guitar, harmonica and the keyboard at RMIT University.

With more than 60 percent of

the country's 86 million people born after the war, many young people here are more familiar with pop stars like Justin Bieber.

Still, Dylan's music during the tumultuous 1960s touched thousands of people in both nations.

"Bob Dylan's music opened up a path where music was used as a weapon to oppose the war in Vietnam" and fight injustice and racism, said Tran Long An, 67, vice president of the Vietnam Composers' Association. "That was the big thing that he has done for music."

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CENTERED ON YOU, THE PATIENT

Medical home is a term you'll hear more in the coming years, and it doesn't refer to a place you might live if you need health care.

Instead, think along the lines of an Internet browser homepage — it's designed to help you coordinate all your treatment and make it easier for you to access practitioners and specialists. Medical homes are also aimed at saving money, improving efficiency of care, and encouraging the shift toward electronic records.

"One of the biggest benefits is it will improve patients' care because it will improve communication between health care deliverers and patients," said Dr. Mary Barinaga, Idaho assistant clinical dean for WWAMI, the Washington, Wyoming, Alaska, Montana and Idaho medical education partnership.

"I'm very enthusiastic about the whole concept of the patient-centered medical home; it'll allow us to deliver health care in a more efficient and cost-effective manner," she said. "It's really a win-win proposition for not only we health care providers, but our patients and actually the nation, because it'll keep costs down."

In practice, this might mean that when a patient recognizes the symptoms of, say, a urinary tract infection, she can call a nurse line or send an email to her doctor to get the needed prescriptions instead of scheduling an office appointment. This would use less of the doctor's time, costing both the patient and the provider less money while getting the patient the treatment she needs more quickly.

Pilot program success

How doctors would be compensated for this shift in services hasn't been worked out, but it could be similar to how the medical home concept works for Medicaid patients under the Healthy Connections program.

Medicaid pays Healthy Connections providers a set amount per patient per month — between \$2.50 and \$3.50, depending on the patient's needs and what services are provided — whether the doctor sees the patient that month or not.

"We would hope the per member, per month fee would be enough to offset any additional expenses they have,"

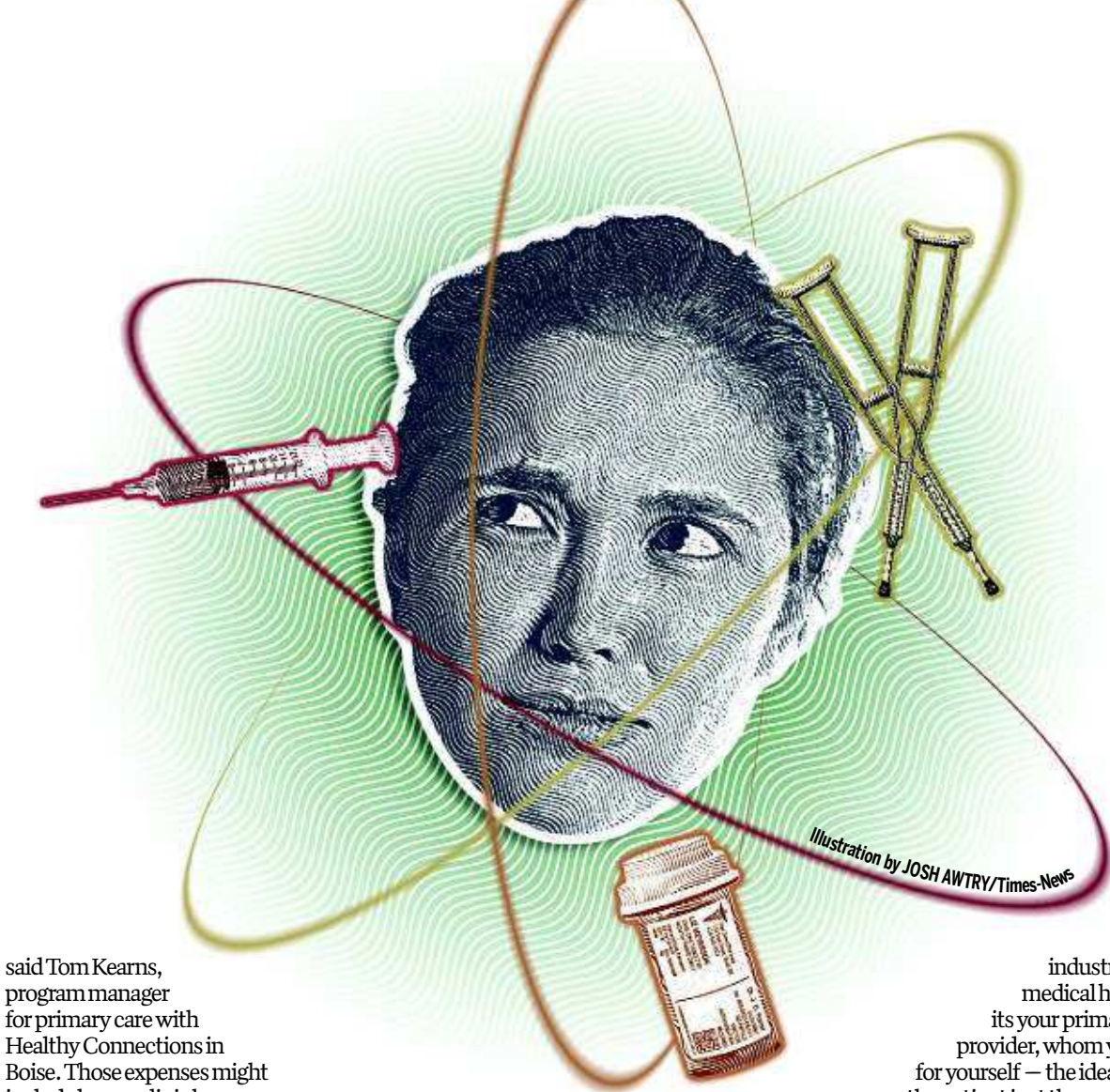

said Tom Kearns, program manager for primary care with Healthy Connections in Boise. Those expenses might include longer clinic hours, a nurse phone line, or salary for a case manager.

But in return, the doctor's time is freed up from tasks that can be done by other health care professionals, allowing for greater focus on the patients most in need.

Kearns said the medical home model has provided Medicaid patients, who traditionally have had a hard time accessing care, more choices in primary physicians and specialists. It has been so successful that Healthy Connections estimates that 90 percent of Idaho primary care providers are signed up to participate. Kearns noted that a misconception remains that participating physicians would be required to take on Medicaid patients; the providers can limit whom they see.

In addition to the statewide implementation of medical homes for Medicaid patients, there have been a few small pilot programs, including at St. Alphonsus Regional Medical Center in Boise and at safety net clinics throughout the state. These were created through the Idaho Medical

Home Collaborative, an initiative launched by Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter in 2010.

"Building partnerships. Fostering more cooperation between the public and private sectors. Doing more with less," Otter said in his January State of the State address, referring to the Collaborative and other initiatives. "All that is part of what must be a cultural change in our policies and our programs throughout state government — a change in how we set our priorities and how we approach challenges."

Larger medical home pilots are expected to launch this year in Idaho, with data returned in two to three years, said Neva Santos, executive director of Idaho Academy of Family Physicians, who is on the Collaborative board.

"The ... hard part is going to be demonstrating; people want to see data before they buy into something," Barinaga said. "It's a really huge paradigm shift."

The major concerns

If the idea of a single individual coordinating care

seems familiar, that's because it echoes the "gatekeeper" concept that was part of HMOs starting in the mid-1980s.

"Gatekeepers became a way to not allow patients to access a specialist or certain procedures," said Rod Barton, administrator of Cassia Regional Medical Center.

In part, that was because the gatekeepers were part of the insurance industry and had pressure to keep costs down, often resulting in patient dissatisfaction or even significant negative outcomes for patients.

Barton said he is watching and waiting to see what results from the medical home pilots.

Gatekeeping "started off as a great idea; it got twisted a bit and turned out to be not very good. We've been burned before and need to see how it (the medical home concept) unfolds," he said. "I'm always aware there are unintended consequences"

So what's the difference between an HMO and a medical home? Under HMOs the gatekeeper was in the insurance

industry. With medical homes, it's your primary care provider, whom you pick for yourself — the idea is that the patient is at the center of all decisions.

So far, the insurance industry seems to be on board with medical homes in Idaho, with several major companies at the table as part of Otter's Collaborative.

"For our members to be able to have a centralized location where their care can all go through is super-helpful to them," said Josh Jordan, corporate communications specialist for Blue Cross of Idaho.

As long as a large percentage of providers are participating in the system, he said, Blue Cross doesn't believe access to specialists will be a concern for patients. The Collaborative is also trying to figure out exactly how payment systems would work — for patients, providers and insurance companies — while other issues will be addressed as they emerge.

"It's a relatively new concept, and relatively complex to get everyone on the same page working toward the same thing," Jordan said. "There are several challenges, none of which are insurmountable?"

Barton said he anticipates issues might arise if patients

go outside their local system — which in rural Idaho is already well coordinated, because there are comparatively few providers, who usually know each other and communicate easily.

"The problem with that is if I need to go to Salt Lake for surgery, I'm not in the Burley system any more," Burton said, posing an example where a Cassia County heart attack patient comes to the Burley emergency room, then is flown to Utah for treatment. "Now it becomes, who do you pay, the Burley hospital because that's where it started, or the Salt Lake hospital because that's where the patient went? ... There's more questions than answers right now?"

Making the most of resources

Idaho is notorious for having few doctors, both primary care and specialist, which is made more challenging by the state's rural nature and its size.

Medical homes, Barinaga said, could ease that shortage by using nurse practitioners, physicians' assistants, dietitians and other non-physician caregivers to supplement care. They often don't do so now because doctors' offices are paid when a patient visits the physician; under a medical home model the monthly fee or a similar payment structure would support those other caregivers.

"It's going to make it easier for people to practice with

Girls who 'Grrrr'

Sports, outdoors help you be your best, Olympic skiers tell teens

SUN VALLEY — Olympic gold medalist Chandra Crawford had just finished a week of grueling cross-country ski competition, including a punishing climb up Sun Valley's 6,600-foot Dollar Mountain.

But before she and six fellow Olympians could take off their skis, there was one more thing they had to do: motivate and inspire the next generation of young women.

How did they do that? With hula hoops and games of pull-the-tail-off-the-skier. By skiing backwards and doing a few downward-facing-dog yoga poses in the snow.

The Olympians and 16 other ambassadors on skis decked themselves out in feather boas, unmatched striped stockings, bright suspenders and crazy hats this month as they took 70 girls ages 7-19 onto the cross-

country ski trails near Ketchum for a day that Crawford dubbed "Fast and Female."

Crawford, of Canmore, Alberta, started the event in 2005 to build confidence and leadership in girls while impressing on them that being involved in sports and outdoor recreation is a tremendous tool for achieving one's personal, as well as athletic, best.

The nonprofit organization hosted similar events in Maine and Alaska this year, as well as several in Canada.

"I had one mother tell me that her daughter was kind of down after moving to a new school. But all she had to say was, 'Fast and Female,' and her daughter put her shoulders back," Crawford said. "Good female role models made a huge difference in my life, and I want these girls to know someone with amazing stories."

The smiles and enthusiasm

with which the leaders greeted their young charges were contagious.

"It doesn't even have to involve skiing," said Kelley Sinnott, a coach for the Sun Valley Ski Education Foundation. "It can be about joining and getting involved in something, living a positive, happy, healthy lifestyle."

The girls munched on bananas as Crawford and Kikkan Randall, the American Olympian who had just been crowned the national 30K champion, gave them a pep talk.

"The first goal is to spread the love. That means no matter what sport you're doing, you have to never ever quit and you stay active and build an amazing body," Crawford told them. "The second goal: Dominating the world!"

Randall recalled deciding she wanted to go to the Olympics as a little girl.

"As cool as the Olympics are to watch on TV, walking in

front of 80,000 people is even more amazing," she said. "Your dream may be going to the moon. The important thing is to set goals for yourself."

Out on the snow Olympic racer Holly Brooks gave each girl a couple of "tails" to affix on Velcro belts as she led them on a fast-paced game of tag on skis. Without the girls realizing it, she was teaching them cross-country ski skills, such as crouching in a good athletic position and taking fast, tiny

steps around a corner.

Crawford and her cohorts led the girls in a spirited dance-athon on skis, encouraging them to bust a few of their own moves.

Sun Valley Olympian Morgan Arritola and World Cup racer Liz Stephen led them through an obstacle course that included skiing in and around a line of orange cones, through a forest of ski poles, ducking into a canvas-topped tunnel and side-stepping over poles.

Biathlete Sara Studebaker led a biathlon-inspired relay race, throwing tennis balls at targets.

And Randall coaxed them up and down a steep hill, showing them how to get in a racer's crouch for stability and to minimize wind drag by not putting their poles straight up in the air.

"We're fast and female!" she shouted. "Let me hear you 'Grrrr' as you attack that hill!"

Seven-year-old Kaia Jensen beamed at the bottom: "I like that I can go downhill without crashing."

As the girls took a lunch break, Randall shared how she originally wanted to be like Picabo Street and "bomb down those mountains." But after trying alpine skiing and snowboarding, she found she was best at cross-country skiing.

"The reason I ski is because I love it. But also because I like to push myself and be the best I can be," she told them. "I worked hard and took good care of my body and I got to go to the

Salt Lake City Olympics at a younger age than people expected. And when I got there, they took us into a big warehouse the size of a gym and gave us a shopping cart and I got to go around and fill it full of gear. So find something that you love to do and set goals so you can be the best."

Crawford enlisted several of the girls to pretend to be ski racers as she acted out how a German racer had pushed her, causing her to fall in one of her early races.

"You choose your response. You can choose a positive voice," she said.

Crawford then told how she turned up the volume on that little voice in her head that said, "You can do it," as she raced against that

same German in the 1.1-kilometer sprint at the 2006 Winter Olympics in Torino, Italy.

"I passed that German gal veering weirdly wide. And crazy fast. And I won!" she said.

The buzz continued long after the girls had skied back to the parking lot to meet their parents.

"It was the greatest girl power movement since the women's rights movement," said 16-year-old Brooke Lawrence.

"The speeches were really inspirational and not just for cross-country skiers," said Kailey Wilt, 14.

"I'm going to practice the national anthem. I might need it someday," said 7-year-old Ebi Bell.

more common sense rather than that face-to-face need to keep the lights on," Barinaga said. And with that additional compensation, medical students might be more likely to choose family practice rather than one of the higher-earning specialties. It could even attract them to Idaho. "When they're going out and looking for a practice, they'll look for places that have this (medical home model) dialed in, because they know it's a good model of care."

Emergency room visits would likely decrease, because patients will have more choices — including after-hours options — about where and when to access care. They might be able to get a prescription for pneumonia on Friday night, for example, instead of ending up in the emergency room on Sunday night with a systemic infection.

Fundamentally, medical homes are aiming to get back to the best parts of that old

country doctor, who made house calls and took care of all of a family's medical needs.

"He took out your tonsils, delivered your babies, cared for your runny nose and also your heart attack. As we've become more specialized, that's become the disconnect," Barton said. "We don't want to go back to the days when one doctor did all of that — specialists have their role —

(but) the medical home would be that coordinated focal point."

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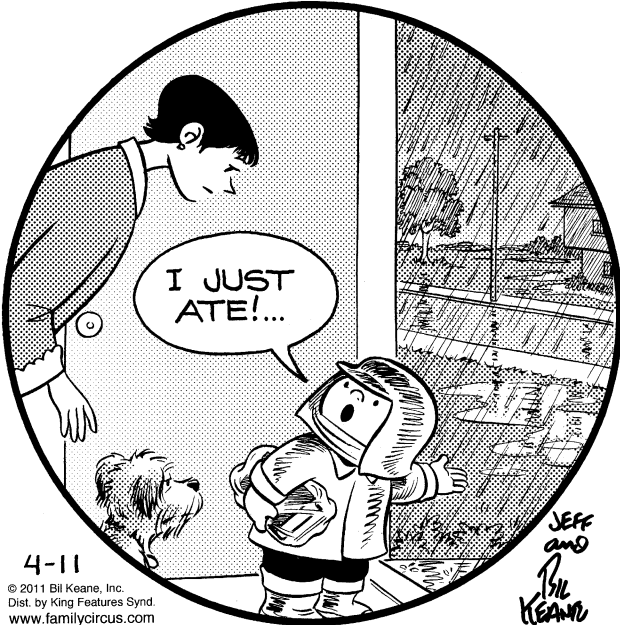
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DEAR ABBY: For years I have wondered about this every time I have gone to a funeral and have ridden in the procession to the cemetery.

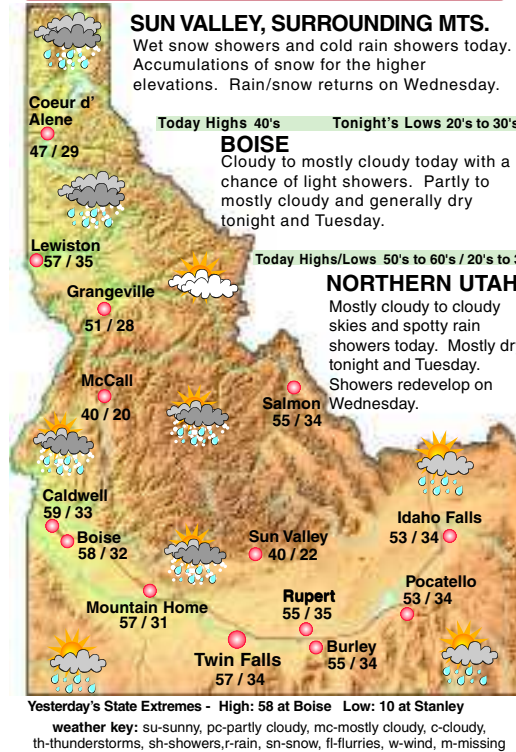

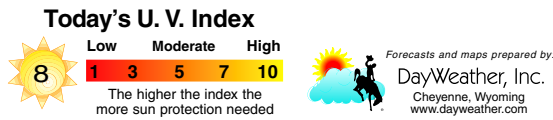

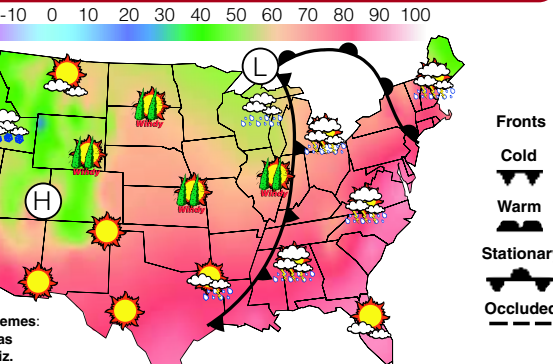
