Sorting out Idaho's mail system

A different journey may be ahead for the 545,000 pieces of mail that flow daily from all corners of south-central Idaho through the U.S. Postal Service's mail processing center in Twin Falls.

The Postal Service is considering the possibility of consolidating its Twin Falls mail processing operation with Boise, officials said Wednesday. The potential merger is part of the service's nationwide downsizing effort, as mail volume has tumbled by 20 percent since

2007, much of it lost due to the popularity of the Internet over "snail mail."

Before knowing if savings would come of a merger, the Postal Service will complete a study that looks at the Twin Falls and Boise operations and factors like the volume of mail, power costs, and involved transportation. This study will look only at the mail-processing side of the postal service and whether local mail can be routed to Boise for sorting without increasing delivery time.

State data: Severe child abuse reports up

BOISE (AP) — State officials say newly released data show a spike in the number of severe child abuse cases last year, at a time when many families were suffering from the effects of the recession.

The number of cases of life-threatening injury suffered by children increased by 9 percent, with the biggest leap coming from the state's southwest, according to a report Tuesday by the Idaho Department of Health and Welfare. The data tracked a 15 percent increase in the Nampa/Caldwell area and a 13 percent spike in Boise compared to 2009.

State officials did not identify specific reasons for the increase in those serious cases, but Tim Sanders, clinical supervisor for the welfare department's regional office, said the economy could be a factor.

"I think that one of the reasons we receive many referrals are because of poverty and family stress due to economic conditions," Sanders said.

The agency tallied more than 7,500 total reports of child abuse or neglect in Idaho last year, a total that was on par with 2009. Of those, 1,730 cases

If pumps fail, sewage may reach creek in minutes

\$2.75M upgrade would shield against EPA violations

As horses grazed in Rock Creek Canyon south of the old hospital, some lying on the spring-green grass, the Rock Creek Lift Station churned away.

The four pumps were in the process of forcing millions of gallons of the most potent sewage in Twin Falls out of the canyon and toward the wastewater treatment plant near the Snake River. If two of the pumps were to go offline for any reason — up-keep or breakdown — it would be a matter of minutes before sewage overflowed from the station and its surrounding lines, seeped over the field with the horses and started filling the creek.

Aside from the nastiness associated with the word sewage, it would also bring in oxygen-gobbling microorganisms, enough to potentially suffocate fish in the water.

That would be on top of daily fines from the Environmental Protection Agency

Airport cost stirs funding worries in Blaine County

HAILEY — Last week, consultants advising Blaine County and its partners on the plans to build a replacement for Friedman Memorial Airport in Hailey came forward with an unfortunate surprise.

"A couple months ago, we were talking about an airport that would cost roughly in the range of what the St. George (Utah) airport cost or less — \$130 million to \$160 million," said County Commissioner Larry Schoen.

But because those initial figures hadn't included utilities, equipment, and soft costs like those for design and management, the figure the consultants presented was much higher — about \$285 million, which adjusted out along the timeline of the project, would end up totaling about \$326 million.

Washington St. N. scheduled for short closure for blasting

Twin Falls' Washington Street North, from Caswell and Filer avenues, will be closed for about five minutes at about 10 a.m. for test rock blasting.

Drivers are asked to find an alternate route if possible.

An Idaho Transportation Department release said the test blast is the start of excavation for a storm drain. It's the first blast of several to create a trench about 20 feet deep for a 36-inch storm drain pipe that will connect to an underground drainage tunnel north of Filer Avenue. Future blasts haven't been scheduled, according to ITD.

The westernmost south-bound lane will remain closed during working hours for the next week as crews form and pour concrete for a sidewalk. Drivers should prepare for additional lane closures near the

blast zone.

Orofino-based DEBCO Construction is the contractor for the federally funded, \$6.5 million project sponsored by the city of Twin Falls and administered by ITD.

That number assumes the draft environmental impact statement from the Federal Aviation Administration, due in late May, would prefer the potential site near the Lincoln County line, and not the more expensive one near the Camas County line.

Those are figures that raise more questions than they answer. Chief among them: Where would the money come from?

More from taxpayer pockets?

The consultants offered a breakdown of their best guess. They suggested the FAA might be willing to pony up as much as \$192 million, or about 59 percent of the total cost.

Previously, it was assumed that the sale of the existing airport land would be the next-highest source of funding, followed by a bond on the revenue the new airport would generate, possibly supplemented by a bond on property taxes in the county.

With the new, higher cost estimates, a potential bond would be a much bigger piece of the pie, which has commissioners concerned.

Even if taxpayers voted to approve a bond that could approach \$45 million over 20 years — and that's a big if — it would tie the county's hands for two decades regarding smaller bonds for things the county might need.

“We heard pretty loudly from the community that they hope to do this without a bond,” said Commissioner Angenie McCleary.

Commissioners suggested that certain expenses could be taken on by other entities; airplane condos and T-hangers, for example, might be infrastructure the general aviation community could help pay for.

Peppcorn gets new trial on sex charges, remains jailed

RUPERT — Former Cassia County teacher James Fredrick Peppcorn Sr., convicted by a Twin Falls County jury of child sex crimes against family members in 2008, has won a new jury trial for two felony charges.

An Idaho Court of Appeals decision released Tuesday vacated Peppcorn's convictions for rape and lewd conduct with a child under 16, while holding up convictions for lewd conduct and child sex abuse charges.

The four charges span two separate cases, with the Idaho Court of Appeals vacating one charge per case.

Peppcorn, 71, will remain in prison on a life sentence for the upheld lewd conduct charge, becoming eligible for parole in 2028, according to the Idaho Department of Correction. He is also serving a 15-year sentence for the sex abuse conviction.

“In my opinion, with this new ruling they could not in good conscience let him go, so they split the decision. I think it was a compromise,” said Utah resident Paul Greenwood, the father of one of Peppcorn's child

victims. “There should be some outrage at this.”

Peppcorn taught school in Cassia County from 1966 until his 1994 retirement and was a Boy Scout and church leader. The criminal charges stem from incidents involving now-adult family members between 1992 and 1995,

but courtroom testimony was allowed from other alleged victims spanning back 30 years.

Both vacated convictions were challenged based on a federal rule that prevents prior crimes or acts from being used as evidence of character to convict someone of a crime, unless they be directly linked to the crime through motive, preparation, or other related factors.

According to the Court of Appeals opinion, Peppcorn correctly argued that the district court erred during his trial by permitting evidence of other alleged incidents of sexual misconduct with minors. The court concluded the errors were harmless on two of the convictions but necessitated a new trial for the other two.

and the forced shutdown of food processing due to lack of water flow, city of Twin Falls Public Works Director Jon Caton said.

While city staff is not fretting over an any-minute-failure scenario, it is working toward building a shield against the potential disaster: a \$2.75 million redundant system that will pick up the slack in case of pump failure or if pumps need to be shut off for repairs.

The cost is tucked into an \$8 million bond being considered by the Twin Falls City Council that would also pay for upkeep to the wastewater treatment plant, which will keep the city

within environmental regulations for river discharge.

“We can't do the level of maintenance (on the lift station) that we should be because we don't have the redundancy,” Caton said.

He points to the wet wells, where the sewage flows through on their way to the pumps, as an example: corrosive gasses given off by the sewage have eaten at the cement well walls, in some places by as much as four or five inches. Repairing the wet wells means shutting down two of the pumps, the same number that would put flows over capacity.

Caton said the redundant system won't add any capacity aside from having newer, more efficient equipment, though it will make upgrading capacity easier.

City Manager Travis Rothweiler said the wastewater treatment plant and the lift station have been topics at the city for years — both were incorporated into a long-term plan about 18 months ago. Debt is just one option being considered to pay for the system, and nothing is yet set in stone, though some debt likely will need to be taken on, he said.

A council decision on how to pay for the lift station and wastewater treatment plant upkeep could happen next month, he said. A judge approved the bond as “ordinary and necessary” at the beginning of April. The decision is currently in a 42-day appeal window.

The Twin Falls sorting center directs all mail delivered across south-central Idaho to local post offices and beyond.

Of the 99 postal workers in Twin Falls' two offices, about 40 clerks assist with the behemoth task of sorting mail. Three rumbling sorting machines flip the mail along conveyer belts at the Postal Service's Fillmore Avenue processing center, running parcels past a scanner that reads the mailing address. From there, workers put the mail in different boxes based the location.

Stressing that no final decision has been made, Twin Falls Postmaster Bill Reese said it's not known how many, if any, employees might be affected by a consolidation. That's because

workers have other clerk duties besides sorting, and the post office doesn't yet know what consolidation would look like.

Reese said he's spoken with employees about the upcoming study, which didn't come as a surprise given the Postal Service's nationwide steps to slim down amid the declining mail volume.

“Because of the publicity of all these closings and people losing jobs throughout the post office nationwide, I don't think anybody was taken by shock,” he said.

If consolidation becomes

a reality and leads to employee reductions locally, the Postal Service's collective bargaining agreement offers help with relocation and transfers to different positions.

“That's all down the road if it does happen,” Reese said.

There's no deadline for the public to submit comments on the proposal, but officials expect to know more within about six weeks, said spokesman Brian Sperry.

If the idea still looks doable after the study, the postal service will hold town hall meetings to hear the public's comments and concerns before making a final decision.

Contrary to the perception, the Postal Service doesn't receive tax dollars and relies on revenue generated by stamp sales and its other services. In 2010, the it lost more than \$8.5 billion, up from a \$3.9 billion loss in 2009. That's created a need for a system-wide look at operations.

Follow Times-News writer Melissa Davlin as she returns from her trip to Nepal's refugee camps, where Bhutanese refugees are preparing to resettle in Twin Falls. From Davlin's latest blog post:

“I'm back in the Seoul airport ... As I wrap up my trip, all these comforts highlight how far behind Nepal is in its development. ... The country is sorely lacking in infrastructure — sanitation, traffic laws, building code enforcement, clean water and consistent electricity ... Nepal's government is weak, ineffectual and absorbed in party disputes, and is struggling to take care of its 30 million citizens. Social problems abound, including prostitution, child labor, hunger and mismanaged orphanages. On the surface, it makes sense for Nepal to absorb the Bhutanese refugees who streamed into the country 20 years ago. They speak the same language, practice the same religion, wear the same dress. But the country can't take care of the 30 million citizens it has now. Nepal will get there, but it's going to take time.”

lion, up from a \$3.9 billion loss in 2009. That's created a need for a system-wide look at operations.

“As a result of the volume loss, we have more facilities, equipment and people than we need to process a declining volume of mail,” USPS Salt Lake District Manager Ken McArthur said in a statement. “We have to reduce the size of our network because we are no longer receiving enough revenue to sustain its cost.”

It's not the first time the Postal Service has examined its Twin Falls operations. It did a similar study in 2005, finding then that consolidating mail processing wasn't a workable idea.

But much has changed since then, including the decline of mail — nationwide and locally.

involved children in imminent danger, up from 1,594 reported in 2009.

“We are very concerned about the increase in severity of child welfare situations we are being called in on,” department program manager Shirley Alexander said.

Department officials said it is important to stop or prevent abuse by alerting officials before situations get to the severe and life-threatening phase.

“Anybody in the community who has reasonable suspicion that a child is either being abused, neglected or abandoned, they have a right and responsibility to call that in,” Sanders said.

Emily Simnitt, Department of Health and Welfare, said calls for suspected abuse cases are encouraged and confidential.

“It can be uncomfortable. You might think you're being nosy, but if that child's in a home where they're being abused or neglected, they need the whole community to advocate for them and to watch out for them,” Simnitt said.

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Kimberly gearing up for new water rate system

KIMBERLY — After voting on dates to roll out its new tiered water rate and bond repayment at its last meeting, Kimberly City Council revisited the water project Tuesday to refine some details.

The tiered rate and bond repayment, which go into effect in October and May, respectively, are tied into a \$6.6 million project that rebuilt or beefed up city water infrastructure and installed water meters.

Shirley Cunningham,

manager of the Friendly Village Mobile Estates, represented her business and asked the council to reconsider its plan to charge one bond payment per lot at the park, including any empty lots.

“(The park owners) are very concerned about the new water rates that they’ll be facing on empty lots,” Cunningham said. “They don’t feel they can absorb that without a rental increase, and they don’t want to do a rental increase if they can help it.”

Cunningham said she is working with the Lazy J

Ranch in Twin Falls to try and fill the 35 empty lots at Friendly Village before the new rates set in. Lazy J residents have been concerned about the future of their homes, as the property that houses the community has been rezoned for commercial use by 2016.

Kimberly Public Works Superintendent Rob Wright has also been working to address issues the new metered system will bring to light before it hits citizen’s wallets. The software that helps Wright’s department manage the meters flags water usage that could signal a

leak. Wright has been working to notify citizens whose homes may be unwittingly dispersing water, and supplying steps to help them plug up any holes.

“The program is smart enough that it realizes then there is continual usage,” Wright said. “We have some that are 89 gallons an hour. In the course of a month, that can add up significantly.”

Monitoring leaks will become part of the public works department’s scheduled moving forward.

In other business, Planning and Zoning Director Jenny Nickerson and Wright

are looking at creating a master park plan for Kimberly. The planning and zoning board had considered devising a master plan before Nickerson worked for the city, but it was put on the back burner until now.

Part of the park plan will emphasize creating a larger, central park instead of adding more of what Nick-

erson called “pocket parks.” Focusing picnic lawns and baseball diamonds in one area could help the city cut down on maintenance costs.

“The more pocket parks we have, obviously the more maintenance we have,” Wright said. “If we have a big, centralized park, we won’t be running around as much.”

Buhl OKs Sunday liquor sales

BUHL — With a 3-1 vote on Monday, Buhl City Council passed an ordinance that will allow liquor to be sold by the drink in town on Sundays.

Councilman Regie Finney and Council President Pam McClain said the ordinance will keep business in the city. Councilman Kyle Hauser disagreed, saying many Buhl residents supported him.

Comments from citizens were mixed. A letter from Rick Martin, a trustee of the Freewill Baptist Church, urged the council to vote against the ordinance.

A.J. Gray of T.J.’s Lounge said the city could see a corresponding drop in drunken driving if residents don’t have to leave town for Sunday drinks. Currently, Ridley’s Food & Drug can sell a bottle of liquor on Sundays, but establishments that have liquor licenses can’t sell stiff Sunday drinks.

“Businesses are to make people’s lives better, and I do not see how selling alcohol on Sundays will make anyone’s life better,” said resident Scott Caster. “Keep it the way it is.”

Terry Cook said he believes in choice, and said the city should let its residents choose whether they will drink.

“Why should Sunday be any different?” he asked.

Sunday drink sales will be in effect once notice is published in the *Buhl Herald*.

In other city business

City Engineer Scott Bybee said the rate committee has formed recommendations to the council for meeting utilities budget shortfalls. There will be changes to Buhl’s monthly rates to “make it fair and equitable.”

Many properties in town

are not paying what they should be, he said.

“For instance, one water line serving two homes but only paying one fee,” said Bybee.

While city costs increase, Bybee said utility rates haven’t been adjusted for a long time.

Bybee recommended charging bond repayment for recent infrastructure upgrades to all properties in town, including unoccupied properties.

“Many people in town think we are already losing residents because of our high usage rates, when our rates are actually among the lowest in the state,” Bybee argued. “Our bill looks larger because the revenue bond is billed with the utility bill.”

Approximately 1,500 users could see a monthly increase of as much as \$10.

“Most will not see a change, but some will,” Bybee said.

The council held a public hearing and approved a motion to amend the city’s fis-

cal 2011 budget to include “unanticipated grants,” said Mayor Tom McCauley.

The police department’s budget increased with a \$2,000 donation, and the parks and recreation department received a \$65,000 grant for a pocket park.

How to save a trillion dollars

In the scheme of things, saving the 38 billion bucks that Congress seems poised to agree upon is not a big deal. A big deal is saving a trillion bucks. And we could do that by preventing disease instead of treating it.

For the first time in history, lifestyle diseases like diabetes, heart disease, some cancers and others kill more people than communicable ones. Treating these diseases costs a fortune, more than one-seventh of our GDP.

But they're preventable, and you prevent them the same way you cause them: lifestyle. A sane diet, along with exercise, meditation and intangibles like love prevent and even reverse disease. A sane diet alone would save us hundreds of billions of dollars and maybe more.

This isn't just me talking. In a recent issue of the magazine *Circulation*, the American Heart Association editorial board stated flatly that costs in the U.S. from cardiovascular disease will triple by 2030, to more than \$800 billion annually. Throw in about \$276 billion of what they call “real indirect costs,” like productivity, and you have over a trillion. Enough over, in fact, to make \$38 billion in budget cuts seem like a rounding error.

Similarly, Type 2 diabetes is projected to cost us \$500 billion a year come 2020, when half of all



Americans will have diabetes or pre-diabetes. Need I remind you that Type 2 diabetes is virtually entirely preventable? Ten billion dollars invested now might save a couple of hundred billion annually 10 years from now. And: hypertension, many cancers, diverticulitis and more are treated by a health care system that costs us about \$2.3 trillion annually now — before costs double and triple.

It's worth noting that the Federal budget will absorb its usual 60 percent of that cost. We can save some of that money, though, if an alliance of insurers, government, individuals moves us towards better eating.

The many numbers all point in the same direction. Look at heart disease: The INTERHEART study of 30,000 men and women in 52 countries showed that at least 90 percent of heart disease is lifestyle related; a European study of more than 23,000 Germans

showed that people with healthier lifestyles had an 81 percent lower risk.

Can we afford it? Sure. Dr. David Ludwig, a Harvard-affiliated pediatrician and the author of *Ending the Food Fight*, says, “The magnitude of the deficit is small when you consider costs of nutrition-related disease; the \$4 trillion that the Republicans want cut over a decade is about the same as the projected costs of diabetes over that same period.”

In last week's issue of the *Journal of the American Medical Association*, Ludwig made a number of concrete suggestions, like restructuring subsidies, regulating the marketing of food to children and adequately funding school lunch programs.

His most novel ideas use existing and future technologies to help the food industry retain profits while producing less junky products: devising a method of

preserving polyunsaturated fats, for example or making bread with real whole grains instead of refined ones.

“I'm not arguing that the food industry should be philanthropic,” he says. “Its purpose is to make money. But the goal of the government should be to encourage industry to make money by producing more rather than less healthful foods.”

The best way to combat diet-related diseases is to change what we eat. And if our thinking is along the lines of diet improved deficit reduced, so much the better. If a better diet were to result only in a 10 percent decrease in heart disease, that's \$100 billion project savings per year by 2030.

This isn't just fiscal responsibility, but social responsibility as well. And the alternative is not only fiscal catastrophe but millions of premature deaths.

Spreading wealth the correct way

During the 2008 presidential campaign when candidate Barack Obama told “Joe the Plumber” that he wanted to “spread the wealth around,” it sounded to a lot of conservatives like socialism: “From each according to his ability, to each according to his need,” in the words of Karl Marx.

There is a kind of wealth spreading, however, that ought to meet the political litmus test of conservative Republicans, liberal Democrats and radical Independents. At a time of high unemployment, too many layoffs and too few new jobs in the private sector (230,000 jobs were created last month, according to the Labor Department, but unemployment continues to officially hover at just under 9 percent and Gallup calculates it, without seasonal adjustment, at 10.0 percent), it is disheartening to see so many CEOs having recovered enough from their personal recession to pay themselves salaries and benefits that would have shamed the super-rich in America's Gilded Age.

USA Today reported last week in a story on CEO compensation that “three-quarters of CEOs got raises — and, in many cases, the increases were substantial.” Employee pay, on the other

hand, effectively stalled. Median CEO pay, reported the newspaper, increased 27 percent last year, meaning the average CEO received \$9 million in 2010. Even in a struggling economy, I wager most people could get by on \$9 million a year. In a strange twist, General Electric, whose chairman Jeffrey Immelt now advises President Obama on job creation, paid no taxes last year, despite earning \$14 billion. But that's another column.

Unlike my liberal friends, I don't obsess about how much money other people make. Whatever compensation someone can negotiate is fine with me. Whether a person is “worth” their pay is a subjective matter and open to debate.

The moral issue in executive pay is whether management deserves these high salaries while employees are laid off, or denied pay increases.

Last April the *Baltimore Sun* reported that Stanley Black and Decker in Towson, Md., announced plans to lay off 4,000 of its

38,000 employees. Yet, according to *USA Today*, Stanley-Black & Decker CEO John Lundgren made more than \$32 million in 2010, up 253.1 percent from the previous year.

U.S. Bancorp Chairman Richard Davis was paid \$16.1 million in 2010, a 143 percent compensation boost. In January, U.S. Bancorp announced that 64 workers in its Milwaukee office would be cut.

If I were a CEO being paid such astronomical amounts and people were being laid off, or struggling in a recession, at least in part due to the lack of pay increases, I would feel morally obligated to take less money. I would ask the chief financial officer of my company to share some of my wealth with loyal employees so that they could continue caring for their families.

One doesn't have to be a liberal who believes in income redistribution to see the unfairness in disproportionate pay. Think of the kudos and favorable press coverage that would come to a corporate chief who shared his wealth, rather than lay off employees. It could change not only the media coverage of big business, but also the way the public perceives the super rich. Heck, some of them

might even start voting Republican!

Five CEOs saw a slight decline in compensation, according to the *USA Today/GovernanceMetrics* international data, but they still earned more than most lottery winners receive.

President Obama has spoken of some of these CEOs as not “needing” the money they get. Again, that is a subjective judgment. What he should be doing is shaming those companies that lay off workers while paying their top management such exorbitant salaries and benefits. Stockholders ought to demand that no competent worker should be laid off if a CEO earns above a certain amount of money. Stockholders also have a moral responsibility beyond the dividends they receive.

Making money is a noble American objective, making a living is a nobler one. Corporations ought to have enough decency and compassion to make sure no worker is let go solely to increase the bottom line or pad the boss's pockets with more money than he (or she) can ever hope to spend in a lifetime.

Kick independent voters out of the one election that counts — the GOP primary — and bill taxpayers \$100,000 for the privilege? Why not? Stop pesky citizens from holding their government accountable in court? Grand idea.

Interfere with the most personal of decisions — from end-of-life care to midterm pregnancies that have gone catastrophically wrong? You betcha ...

Rep. Phil Hart, R-Athol, could steal from the public's trust in government — and anything else he could get his hands on whether it's public timber or unpaid taxes. Two ethics complaints later, House Speaker Lawrence Denney, R-Midvale, waited to slap one of his loyalist's wrists until he had Hart's permission.

But Agricultural Affairs Committee Chairman Tom Trail, R-Moscow, and Transportation Committee Chairman Leon Smith, R-Twin Falls, bucked the conservative line and got dumped at the last minute Friday.

Tax committee chairman Dennis Lake, R-Blackfoot, printed a modest bill to explore how Idaho might collect sales tax owed on Internet sales. Denney yanked the pages from Lake's fingers and buried it in his desk.

Budget-writer Maxine Bell, R-Jerome, got a trip to the woodshed for having the temerity to suggest spending money held in reserves

rather than cutting programs.

These changes aren't merely drastic. They will be long-lived.

From reforming education to howling over wolves, the Idaho Legislature didn't back down from controversy during the 2011 session. But here's a bottom line question: With the economy the No. 1 issue and job creation the highest possible priority, how much did this session actually accomplish?

We agree with those who believe state spending had to be reduced, and in that sense, some fiscal sanity prevailed. When revenue is down, cutting expense is a step in the right direction. But it's not the only one and, at some point, cutting alone becomes destructive. Somewhere along the lines of economic recovery, revenue has to be raised, and the vast majority of citizens want revenue to increase without taxes rising commensurately. That's what economic development is all about, and the motor that drives economic development is jobs.

Our Legislature worked hard on issues that slapped the face of modern federalism, even if it inflicted no actual damage. Health care, wolf control, abortion, guns on campus and even arguing over patients' ability to die with dignity are all issues directly linked to Idaho's determined march against the tide of unwanted federal policy. Yet the call to rejuvenate the state's economy went largely unheeded.

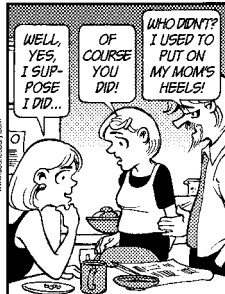
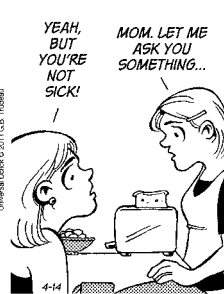
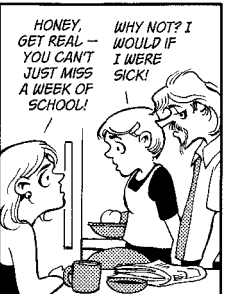
One miniature flashlight in the depths of economic midnight is “Hire One Act,” a tax credit to employers who make new hires. It's an incentive for employers to add to their workforce, providing a small percentage bonus at the end of the tax year. While it's a good move, it's a small one, and we'll have to wait awhile to benefit from it. It had been drafted to take effect retroactively this year, but in the compromise amendment process, the incentives now won't take effect until next year.

In some corners, this session will be honored as one in which Idaho stood tall for local control. Yet hypocrisy in much of the legislation was painfully and poignantly summarized by Senate

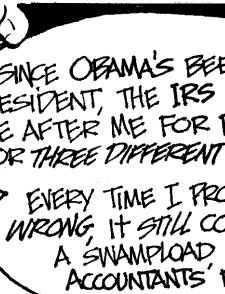

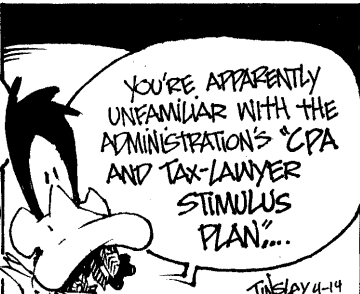

Many years, it is easy to criticize the Idaho Legislature for doing nothing.

On the 88th and final day of the 2011 legislative session, Senate President Pro Tem Brent Hill, R-Rexburg, addressed this perennial put-down head-on. “Anyone who claims we haven’t accomplished much wasn’t paying attention.”

We’d have to agree. But this was a Legislature that did a lot — yet may have done far more harm than good. A Legislature long on ambition and short on compassion. A Legislature with a wide reach but a narrow ideology.

A session to be proud of? Not even close.

Yes, lawmakers were handed a crisis when they arrived in Boise three months ago. With reserve funds and federal stimulus dollars depleted, legislators knew a shortfall loomed for 2011-12. The only question was the amount; eventually, budget-writers settled on a \$92 million figure.

Gov. Butch Otter and legislators had options, none very good. They could raise taxes during slow economic times, or they could cut education for a third consecutive year. Otter and Republican legislative leaders refused to even contemplate any new taxes — such as, for instance, a narrow cigarette tax increase that seem to enjoy considerable popular support. They instead took the axe to the budget, again.

The cuts to public education will force school districts to seek local property tax increases.

The cuts to higher education will saddle students and parents with ever-increasing tuition costs and a heavier burden of student loan debt.

And in Medicaid — now subject to \$108 million in federal and state cuts — the costs may be even more profound. Programs will be cut, and care compromised.

There were options. Lawmakers wouldn’t check their no-new-taxes preconceptions long enough to rationally weigh the pros and cons. That is neither smart nor sensitive governing.

This session will most be remembered not for its budget decisions, but for a far-reaching but dollar-driven overhaul of K-12. Engineered by state superintendent Tom Luna, with little consultation from education groups, the overhaul focused solely on fitting existing (and limited) K-12 dollars into the program. It was, as Luna said Friday, a matter of “spending what we currently have differently.” There was — again, because of the ideological line in the sand drawn on tax topics — little discussion about the adequacy of the budget.

This fundamental flaw threatens some of the good ideas in Luna’s overhaul. Teacher merit pay is promising, but unfunded. The technology initiatives will come

at the expense of teacher jobs and teacher pay, those difficult decisions left to school districts.

The issue dominated and defined the session — from the first week, when Luna unveiled a plan he had not discussed during the 2010 election; to the final hours, when lawmakers agreed to put the plans into effect immediately. That end-of-session move may preempt efforts to block and overturn the laws via voter referendum. It is unlikely, however, to silence widespread criticism of the plan.

It was a session of remarkable and perhaps unprecedented citizen engagement. In marathon hearings and a series of Statehouse rallies, Idahoans spoke out, largely in opposition. Ultimately, critics of the Luna plan went largely unheard.

But this Legislature certainly liked to hear itself make statements. Luna’s overhaul afforded GOP legislators a chance to exact political pain on the Idaho Education Association. Finally settling on a health care “nullification” vehicle, lawmakers took their obligatory annual poke at Uncle Sam.

But when so many key decisions were driven by ideology, it is hard to be very optimistic about the final outcome ...

Idaho Press Tribune, Nampa

Overall grade: B

Idaho lawmakers faced a tremendous challenge this session, facing another round of budget cuts amid pressure from public schools and higher education for more resources. The Legislature balanced the budget, and even managed to keep the cut for schools less than \$50 million ...

State budget: A

The Legislature held ground and kept Idaho among the states with no debt in the general fund budget. The grueling process

required painful cuts in programs ranging from Medicaid to other human services. In the end, Idaho became one of the few states to improve its Standard and Poor’s credit rating.

Health care nullification: A

Three Canyon County senators held their ground and voted their conscience against a proposal to reject the federal health care reform plan through “nullification.” Sens. Patti Anne Lodge, Curt McKenzie and John McGee said they couldn’t justify violating the constitution to do away with a law they felt was unconstitutional.

By the end of the session, lawmakers approved a lesser measure that made the same statement to the federal government in a different way — without the constitutional objections.

Education reform: D

While some aspects of State Superintendent of Public Instruction Tom Luna’s education reform package promise much-needed change, he and Gov. Butch Otter should have been more forthcoming about their plans during the November 2010 election.

Measures to give local

school boards more control that materialized in the session improved the initial proposals, and lawmakers deserve credit for spending the time needed to make sure the plan worked as well as possible ...

Cigarette tax: F

Lawmakers had the chance to raise additional revenue through a cigarette tax, but didn’t even give the idea a hearing. The merits of a higher tax are unclear — in large part because the Legislature didn’t debate the issue. Still, while many feel “sin” taxes are already too high or amount to social engineering, the issue merited serious consideration.

Political gamesmanship: F

The stormy session was marked by an unusual amount of politics.

In the final days, Democrats raised the ire of their GOP counterparts — and threatened to extend the session at a cost of \$30,000 a day — to protest the lack of a hearing on the cigarette tax. Likewise, powerful Republican committee chairs thumbed their noses at the minority party by holding bills without a hearing, such as one that would have ex-

panded sexual orientation to the state’s categories of anti-discriminatory practices. Let’s hope that in future sessions, members of both parties can find ways to cross the aisle rather than play politics as usual.

Idaho Mountain Express, Ketchum

Long legislative sessions leave lawmakers worn out, sometimes short tempered and always ready to close the session sine die and head home.

However, conducting business with overheated and inexcusably ugly language and acting frantic doesn’t inspire public confidence or make sound decisions.

Rather than let courts decide the legality of the new federal health care law, the state Senate approved a bill to nullify the law in Idaho. The bill would stop the state from accepting federal funds to implement the law. Idaho’s attorney general already calls the nullification unconstitutional.

Republican hysteria helped the bill’s momen-

tum. Sen. Sheryl Nuxoll flew into a flight of pure fantasy by claiming President Obama’s health reform “sets up a wealth of programs in the home to take our children away from us, which is the same way the Nazis did.” Where she read that in the law is an utter mystery.

In obvious panic about a public backlash, the state Senate also frantically rushed through the final phase of public schools chief Tom Luna’s so-called education “reform” as “emergency” legislation. Lawmakers thereby headed off an immediate petition drive that would have blocked implementation of Luna’s program until voters weighed in during the next general election in 2012. Opponents could still get the question before voters, but an initiative petition would not stop the state from going ahead with the law prior to the general election.

A larger question is, if Luna’s program is really reform and good for Idaho education and students, why would lawmakers need an emergency clause to stop a petition drive to repeal it?

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Mom drives van into Hudson, killing self, 3 kids

NEWBURGH, N.Y. — A woman upset with the father of her children packed her four youngsters into her minivan and drove into the frigid Hudson River, killing everyone except her 10-year-old son, who managed to roll down a window of the sinking vehicle and swim to shore.

The dead youngsters ranged in age from 11 months to 5 years.

A relative had called police Tuesday night to report a dispute at the home of Lashanda Armstrong, 25. Shortly afterward, she drove off a boat ramp several blocks away from her apartment in this struggling city 60 miles north of New York City.

Officials believe Lashaun Armstrong, 10, hit the button on a power window to escape from the driver's side as the minivan began to sink in the 45-degree water. Fire Chief Michael Vatter said the vehicle went under within two minutes.

"He got out of the car, got up onto the boat ramp, turned around and it was gone," Vatter said.

A passer-by found a soaked and cold Lashaun Armstrong along the shore and took him to a firehouse for help. The boy was so dis-

traught that he had difficulty talking but ultimately told firefighters what happened, the fire chief said. Rescuers went immediately to the river.

Divers searched for about an hour before finding the minivan submerged in 10 feet of water about 25 yards from the shore. They used a tow truck to pull it up the ramp. Everyone inside was dead.

Killed along with Lashanda Armstrong were Landon Pierre, 5, Lance Pierre, 2, and 11-month-old Laianna Pierre, police said. Lashaun is staying with his mother's aunt Angela Gilliam and "doing fine," she said.

Armstrong appeared stressed-out when she

picked up the children Tuesday at the Young and Unique Christian Development Child Care, said Shaniesha Strange, supervisor in the infant room.

"The only thing she'd say was that she was so alone," Strange said. "She's a single parent. She takes great care of her kids, goes to school and works. She really needed a helping hand."

The man police identified as the father of the three dead children, Jean Pierre, was questioned. Police would not give details. He apparently didn't live with the mother and children and could not immediately be located for comment.

Hetty Minatee, another teacher at the day care cen-

ter, said Armstrong had enrolled the four children there in September. At first Jean Pierre would come in with Armstrong and sometimes would pick up the kids.

"A couple weeks ago, she came in a little upset," Minatee said. "She said, 'Miss Minatee, I don't want the father to pick the kids up or have any contact with them.' She said she was trying to get a court order so he could never see the kids again."

Gilliam called Newburgh police on Tuesday night after getting a call from her brother. By the time police reached the apartment, Armstrong and her children were gone.

"She was a good mother. She was going through some stuff," Gilliam said. "Nobody knows what my niece went through." She would not elaborate.

Police said there was no history of domestic violence at the address.

Neighbors in the city of about 30,000 said the children seemed energetic and happy and would play on the block and ride bikes.

"She was a very good mom," said Tina Claybourne. "She took care of her kids. She always was with her kids."

Mourners immediately created a memorial of stuffed animals and flowers at the boat ramp.

ISP: Missing Kamiah woman may be in river

LEWISTON (AP) — The Idaho State Police have scaled back a search for a missing Kamiah woman, saying they have developed information that she "probably ended up in the Clearwater River."

The ISP issued a news release Wednesday saying it is not clear if Lavina Hietala's disappearance is the result of foul play. The agency also declined to say how they determined she could be in the fast-flowing river.

Officers from the Kami-

ah Marshal's Office and deputies from surrounding counties have been searching for the 72-year-old woman, who was last seen on April 1.

Last week, the ISP said Hietala's 27-year-old grandson was a possible person of interest. Officials say Justin Hietala he has been unable to provide any information about his grandmother's whereabouts. On Wednesday, the state police said no suspects have been identified.

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Toddler served sangria at an Olive Garden in central Fla.

ORLANDO, Fla. — A 2-year-old boy was accidentally served sangria instead of orange juice at an Olive Garden in Lakeland, Fla., last month, prompting Orlando-based Darden Restaurants to caution its employees to be more careful with alcoholic drinks.

Jill VanHeest of Lakeland said she took her son Nikolai to the hospital after the March 31 incident, where he was given fluids and was released a couple of hours later. He has suffered no lasting effects, she said in an interview with *The Orlando Sentinel* on Wednesday.

Darden spokesman Rich Jeffers blamed the error on "a failure to follow our strict operating procedures."

"The person poured the wrong container into the child's cup," he said. "We have absolutely no tolerance for failure to follow our operating procedures. We took swift and appropriate action to deal with the situation."

But Jeffers would not say whether anyone was fired or give details about how the restaurants try to keep such mistakes from happening.

VanHeest said it took employees about a half hour to realize something was wrong. She said she noticed a problem when Nikolai began acting up.

"His eyes were completely dilated and red," she said.

A waiter removed the child's drink and told VanHeest he needed to get a new one, but didn't tell her anything more, she said.

Eagle man charged with abusing children

BOISE (AP) — A father of two has been accused of physically, sexually and mentally abusing his children, including having them committed to a mental health facility to prevent them from reporting it, Ada County authorities said.

Prosecutors contend the children, now 13 and 15, had been subject to physical and mental abuse since October 2006, according to the *Idaho Statesman*.

The 55-year-old man is accused of physically, verbally and sexually assaulting the older teen, a girl. Prosecutors say he also engaged in sex in front of the younger child, repeatedly hitting him and calling him profane and demeaning names.

He also was accused of lewd conduct in front of the children, driving while intoxicated with them in the car, assaulting his girlfriend and battering his mother. Authorities say he threw the woman, causing her to break an arm.

The Associated Press is not naming the man to protect the identities of the children. The AP does not name victims of alleged sexual abuse.

He faces two counts of felony injury to a child and was scheduled to be arraigned Tuesday. As part of his arrest warrant, a no-contact order between the man and the children was issued Monday, when he surrendered to authorities.

He has been released after posting a \$50,000 bond. A

message left at a phone listing in the man's name was not immediately returned Wednesday.

Court records say he forcibly committed his children to an undisclosed mental facility "without justification." They did not indicate how long the children were held.

Deputies began investigating him in 2009, after they were alerted about evidence of abuse of the children. Both were declared to be in imminent danger in November 2009.

Prosecutors also did not explain why it took so long for criminal charges to be pursued.

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Obama eyes Medicare changes, tax increases

President rejects GOP budget plan of tax cuts for wealthy

WASHINGTON — Forcefully rejecting Republican budget-cutting plans, President Barack Obama on Wednesday proposed lowering the nation’s future deficits by \$4 trillion over a dozen years and vowed he would not allow benefit cuts for the poor and the elderly to pay for tax breaks for the rich.

“That’s not right and it’s not going to happen as long as I’m president,” Obama declared.

While the president recommended trimming health care

costs in Medicare and Medicaid, he also called for cuts in defense, an overhaul of the tax system to eliminate many loopholes enjoyed by individuals and corporations, and an end to Bush-era tax cuts for wealthier Americans.

“We have to live within our means, we have to reduce our deficit, and we have to get back on a path that will allow us to pay down our debt,” Obama said in a combative speech at George Washington University.

As much a policy speech as it was a political address, Obama laid the blame for the rising debt on the

spending increases and tax cuts enacted during the presidency of George W. Bush and the recession that struck in late 2007. “We lost our way,” he said.

Ensuring that the nation’s fiscal troubles will be at the center of the 2012 presidential election, Obama drew sharp contrasts with a Republican plan that cuts about \$5.8 trillion in spending over the next decade and which the White House says unfairly singles out middle-class taxpayers, older adults and the poor.

Hagerman enjoys weekly Fantastic Flea Market

HAGERMAN — After Chappel’s grocery store built a new facility, its original Main Street storefront sat empty for five years.

Last fall, the building got new tenants.

The building now hosts the Fantastic Flea Market, held every Saturday.

Shoppers wind in between Donna Jensen’s jalapeno cupcakes and Ronda Painter’s fleece hats, cut from a pattern she created.

There are antiques, cosmetics, knives, food in the back and even a black lab mascot named Midnight, who mingles with attendees, collecting an entrance fee of behind-the-ear scratches.

The move into the previously abandoned building is the brainchild of Kay Phillips.

Phillips started the market at nearby Billingsley Creek State Park, but moved to Hagerman in search of a more permanent location.

Phillips said the downtown location has captured the attention of people driving through Hagerman, either on their way to nearby hot springs or to local sports showdowns.

It’s also drawn a crowd of close-knit vendors.

“I’ve done a lot of shows and there are a lot of stick-in-the-mud people,” Phillips said. “These people are great.”

Each week, about 20 vendors pay \$25 for booth space. Most of the vendors earn about \$70 to \$200 a week, depending on the weather.

Victoria Holloway Berglund sells antiques and plants as a volunteer fundraiser for a local high school. She said sales have only once failed to cover her booth rent. Most Saturdays, she draws about \$70, but as much as \$150.

than others,” Berglund said. “It gets hot, it gets colder out. I really look forward to seeing my friends.”

That sense of community is shared among the other vendors. Ronda Painter runs a business of sewing alterations, but the flea market, where she sells hats, aprons and other stitched goods, is her break from the daily whirl of her sewing machine.

“This is my getaway because I’m away from home, from sewing 18 hours a day,” Painter said. “We’ve all be-

come such good friends. I look forward to it. It’s my day out.”

But it’s not just about the vendors. Customers also return to the flea market for its sense of community.

James and Lindsay Mills and their four children have been coming to the flea market since they moved to the

Government orders lenders to reimburse homeowners

Foreclosure process scrutinized

WASHINGTON— The U.S. government on Wednesday ordered 16 mortgage lenders and servicers, including four of America’s largest banks, to reimburse homeowners who were incorrectly foreclosed upon.

The Federal Reserve, Office of Thrift Supervision and Office of the Comptroller of the Currency also directed the financial firms to hire auditors to determine if they improperly foreclosed on homeowners in 2009 and 2010. The Fed said it believed financial penalties were “appropriate” and that it planned to levy fines in the future. All three government agencies said they would review the foreclosure audits.

In the four years since the housing bust, about 5 million homes have been foreclosed upon. About 2.4 million primary mortgages were in foreclosure at the end of last year. Another 2 million were 90 days or more past due, putting them at serious risk of foreclosure.

Critics, including Democratic lawmakers in Congress, say the order is too lenient on the lenders.

Waiting for your state tax refund? Find out where it is

If you want to know the status of your Idaho income tax refund, go to the Idaho State Tax Commission website at tax.idaho.gov, and click on “Where’s My Refund?” at the top of the home page.

You can also get a refund update by calling the Tax Commission’s toll-free automated phone number at (888) 228-5770 or 364-7389 in the Boise area.

Both refund services are available 24 hours a day. To get your refund status, you must provide your Social Security number and the amount

of your expected refund.

When you file your taxes online, your refund status is usually available three to five business days after filing the return. The refund should arrive in about four weeks. However, if you’re a first-time filer in Idaho or your return is stopped for further review, it can take an extra three weeks to receive your refund.

If you file a paper return, you can expect to wait five weeks for your refund status. The refund should arrive in up to 10 weeks.

Three years after opening, Ikea factory churns out unhappy workers

DANVILLE, Va. — When home furnishing giant Ikea selected this fraying blue-collar city to build its first U.S. factory, residents couldn’t believe their good fortune.

Beloved by consumers worldwide for its stylish and affordable furniture, the Swedish firm had al-

so constructed a reputation as a good employer and solid corporate citizen. State and local officials offered \$12 million in incentives. Residents thrilled at the prospect of a respected foreign company bringing jobs to this former textile region after watching so many flee overseas.

But three years after the massive facility opened here, excitement has waned. Ikea is the target of

racial discrimination complaints, a heated union-organizing battle and turnover from disgruntled employees.

Workers complain of eliminated raises, a frenzied pace and mandatory overtime. Several said it’s common to find out on Friday evening that they’ll have to pull a weekend shift, with disciplinary action for those who can’t or don’t show up.

Kylette Duncan, among the plant’s first hires, quit after six months to take a lower-paying retail job. “I need money as bad as anybody, but I also need a life,” said Duncan, 52. She recalled having to cancel medical appointments for her ailing husband because she had to work overtime at the last minute.

Some of the Virginia plant’s 335 workers are trying to form a union.

The International Association of Machinists and Aerospace Workers said a majority of eligible employees had signed cards expressing interest.

In response, the factory — part of Ikea’s manufacturing subsidiary, Swedwood — hired the law firm Jackson Lewis, which has made its reputation keeping

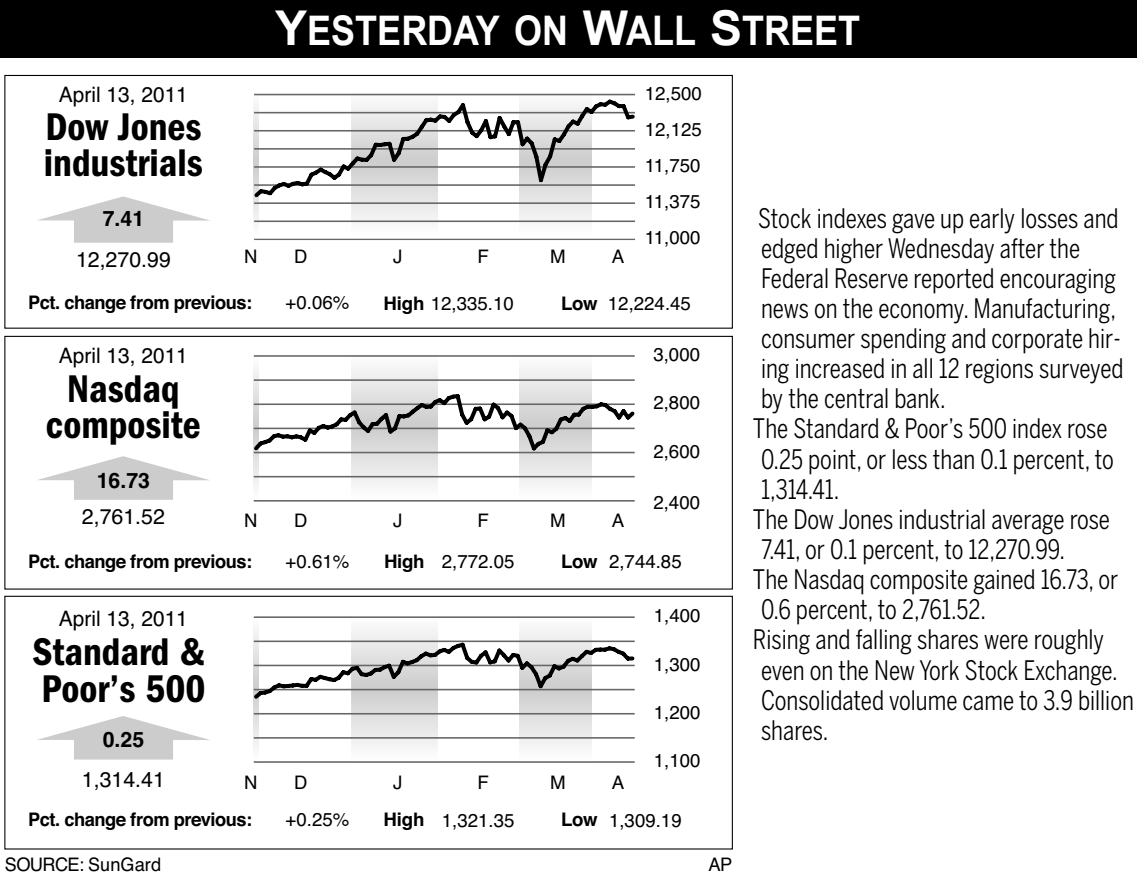

unions out of companies. Workers said Swedwood officials required employees to attend meetings at which management discouraged union membership.

Plant officials didn't return calls and declined to meet with a *Los Angeles Times* reporter who visited the Virginia facility. Swedwood spokeswoman Ingrid Steen in Sweden called the situation in Danville "sad" but said she could not discuss the complaints of specific employees. She said she had heard "rumors" about anti-union meetings at the plant but added that "this wouldn't be anything that would be approved by the group management in Sweden."

The dust-up has garnered little attention in the U.S. But it's front-page news in Sweden, where much of the labor force is unionized and Ikea is a cherished institution. Per-Olaf Sjöo, the head of the Swedish union in Swedwood factories, said he was baffled by the friction in Danville. Ikea's code of conduct, known as IWAY, guarantees workers the right to organize and stipulates that all overtime be voluntary.

"Ikea is a very strong brand and they lean on some kind of good Swedishness in their business profile. That becomes a complication when they act like they do in the United States," said Sjöo. "For us, it's a huge problem."

Laborers in Swedwood plants in Sweden produce bookcases and tables similar to those manufactured in Danville. The big difference is that the Europeans enjoy a minimum wage of about \$19 an hour and a government-mandated five weeks of paid vacation. Full-time employees in Danville start at \$8 an hour with 12 vacation days, eight of them on dates determined by the company.

What's more, as many as one-third of the workers at the Danville plant have been drawn from local temporary-staffing agencies. These workers receive even lower wages and no benefits, employees said.

Low prices have helped Ikea weather the economic downturn. The company made 2.7 billion euros in profit last year, up 6.1 percent from 2009, according to its most recent financial statements.

Still, last fall, Swedwood eliminated regularly scheduled raises and made cuts to some

pay packages in Danville. Starting pay in the packing department, for example, was reduced to \$8 an hour from \$9.75. Steen said the changes were made to free up more money to pay incentive bonuses to top performers.

The median hourly wage in the Danville area is \$15.48, according to the Virginia Employment Commission.

Current and former plant employees said they resented the unpredictable work hours and high-pressure atmosphere. The plant assesses penalty points for violations of work rules; workers who accumulate nine of them can be fired.

"It's the most strict place I have ever worked," said Janis Wilborne, 63, who worked at the plant for two years and quit last year.

Producers worry that his plan could unravel bipartisan deficit-cutting negotiations. And Republicans reject any proposal that includes tax increases.

The proposal calls for cutting \$770 billion from non-defense domestic spending by 2023. That figure does not include spending on major benefit programs like Medicare, Medicaid and Social Security. The plan also would reduce defense spending by \$400 billion during the same 12 years.

Obama envisions spending cuts in Medicare and Medicaid of \$480 billion through 2023. Those are in addition to the \$500 billion in reductions over 10 years from projected increases in Medicare spending contained in the health care law Congress passed and Obama signed last year.

The president's planned health care reductions include vague proposals to lower Medicaid costs and reduce Medicare prescription drug expenses.

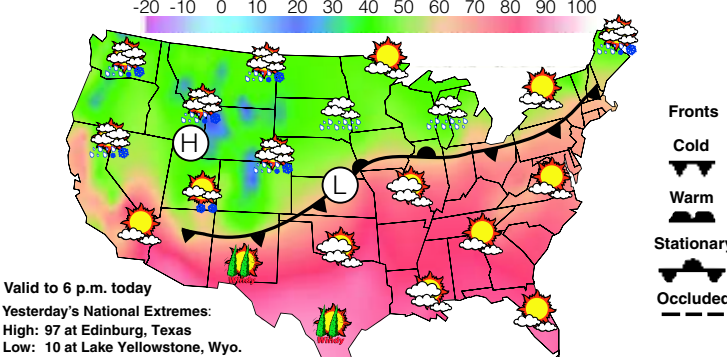

River dam near N.D. city of 1,200 at risk of failure

BURLINGTON, N.D. — Authorities on Wednesday considered dropping half-ton sandbags from a National Guard helicopter to shore up a dam that stands between 30 endangered homes and the swollen Des Lac River in northwest North Dakota.

State Homeland Security Director Greg Wilz called it a "crapshoot" because engineers say the sandbags could do more harm than good.

"At this stage of the game, it's more art than science,"

Wilz said.

About 200 people living near the river had been advised to evacuate because the dam might fail, leading to a 2-foot to 3-foot rise on the river.

After touring the area, Gov. Jack Dalrymple said he was "amazed" at the flooding conditions.

"I wish we could say with certainty what's going to happen in the next day or so," he told worried residents in a packed Burlington city hall.

The National Weather Service issued a flash flood watch for the area on the west

edge of Burlington, a city of about 1,200 people, saying a dam failure could lead to a 2-foot to 3-foot rise in the river. Assistant Police Chief Bill Hunt said he was not aware of anyone leaving their home yet, and that officials in a boat already have rescued one person whose home was surrounded by floodwaters.

Authorities placed a video camera on the dam to monitor water levels and were prepared to immediately contact affected residents if the structure burst.

It was a marked shift west for the North Dakota flood

fight, after authorities in the Fargo area reported floodwaters were slowly dropping in rural areas hit with unprecedented overland flooding. Officials were quickly building up dikes in Valley City, about west of Fargo, where the Sheyenne River was coming in higher and faster than expected.

The dirt-and-rock Burlington Dam No. 1 was built in the 1930s to help control the river's flow as it meets the Souris River and flows around Burlington. Authorities have been trying to plug holes in the dam with sand-

bags but can no longer access the site for safety reasons.

Todd Sando, an engineer with the state of North Dakota, said "there is a very high potential it could wash out."

Hunt told The Associated Press that Federal Emergency Management Agency officials were bringing equipment to monitor the dam. Fire Chief Karter Lesmann said the city had about 3,000 sandbags on hand for use in the town.

An evacuation could become mandatory if the dam were to fail or if officials became certain it was about to

fail, Hunt said. He said it was difficult to predict what sort of damage might result from a failure or how much time people would have to prepare for high water.

"It just depended on how it failed," he said. "If it completely failed, probably not much time ... if it eroded, we might have an hour or two."

Robert Kibler and his wife, Alex Deufel, decided to leave their home near the river on Tuesday but returned Wednesday to move their collection of 7,000 books to a main floor.

GEORGIA Gingrich: Obama's tax plan a job-killer

ATLANTA — Republican presidential hopeful Newt Gingrich on Wednesday blasted a budget address by President Barack Obama calling it a job-killer and not a serious proposal.

The former U.S. House speaker, in Atlanta scooping up money for his likely White House bid, told The Associated Press that Obama's new proposal to couple spending cuts with tax hikes on the wealthy was "a job-killing big-government defending avoidance of responsibility."

"To propose some \$2 trillion worth of tax increases in an economy such as this is to claim the Herbert Hoover award," Gingrich said. Hoover was president when the Great Depression began.

Gingrich accused Obama, his potential rival in 2012, of an "absence of seriousness."

And he said Obama's decision to focus on Wisconsin U.S. Rep. Paul Ryan's budget proposal made the Democratic president look weak.

"It was as if Ryan was the president and he was a desperate challenger," Gingrich told The AP

maneuver on foot for cadaver dogs and officers. Volunteer firefighters with aerial ladders and even mounted police units have been brought in to assist with the search. On Wednesday, police divers searched the waters north of the parkway for possible victims.

NEW YORK Government wants airlines to repay fee after losing bag

You've already paid \$15, \$20, even \$35 to check your bag on a flight. Then the airline loses it. You don't even get your money back.

The government wants to change that, tackling two of the biggest complaints about the air travel industry — poor service and the explosion of fees — at once. Major airlines, which collect \$3.3 billion in bag fees each year, are opposed.

The airlines charge \$15 to \$35 to check a bag, \$20 to \$45 to check a second and more for the third and beyond. Most airlines won't provide a refund, even if it takes days to return a passenger's suitcase. They say the rule would raise prices for everyone.

"I am going to pay you \$25 to deliver my bag to X destination, it should be there waiting," says Joseph S. Rosenberg of Roanoke,

Va., who had to buy a suit at the last minute this week after an airline lost his bag on a flight to a business meeting.

"They should return the fee for failure of service," says Rosenberg, whose luggage arrived after his meeting.

Transportation Secretary Ray LaHood has implemented a series of rules aimed at protecting passengers. Last year, the government limited how long passengers can sit on planes during ground delays to three hours.

Now the Transportation Department wants to make airlines pay passengers more when they're bumped off their flight, allow passengers to cancel reservations within 24 hours of booking with no penalty and require better disclosure of fees

CALIFORNIA Man accused of stealing \$280,000 from blind woman

NEWPORT BEACH — California authorities have arrested a man suspected of stealing more than \$280,000 from a 98-year-old widow who was deaf, blind and senile.

John Windsor of Costa Mesa was arrested in Newport Beach on Wednesday. He remains jailed and has been charged by Orange County prosecutors with forgery, caretaker theft from an elder, and other crimes. Windsor could face more than 11½ years in prison if convicted.

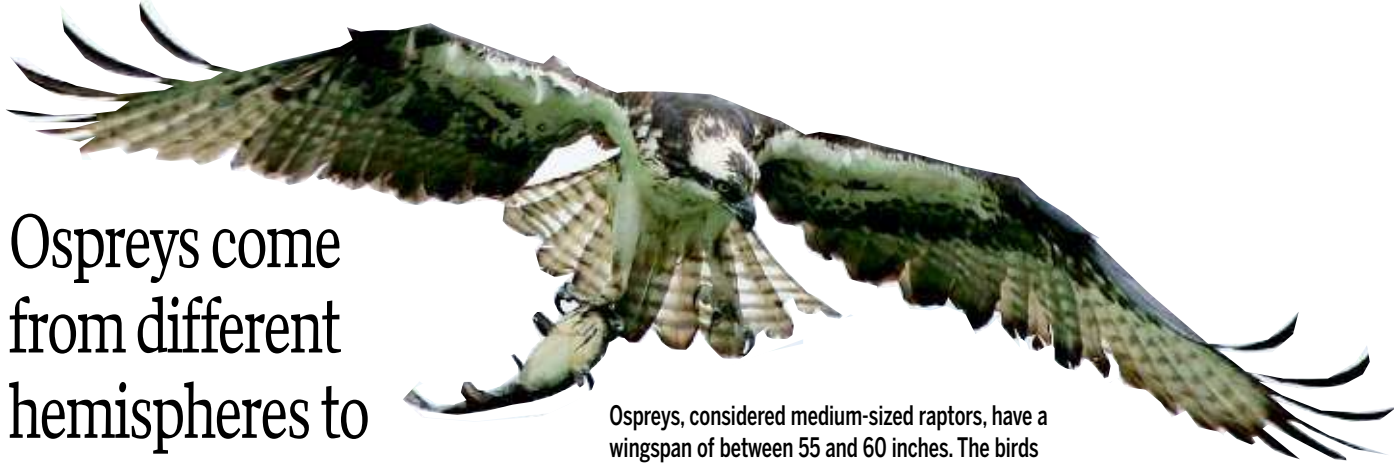

Bird tourists



Ospreys come from different hemispheres to nest in Idaho

Ospreys, considered medium-sized raptors, have a wingspan of between 55 and 60 inches. The birds visit Idaho every year from April to about September, nesting near large bodies of water. They come from as far away as Venezuela.

The ospreys have arrived. Your best chance to notice the medium-sized raptors is near parts of the Snake River, such as in Hagerman, or in places from Stanley to about North Fork in the Salmon Region.

The birds arrive in April and hang around until about September, said Beth Waterbury, a biologist with the Idaho Department of Fish and Game.

The birds come to Idaho every year, often returning to their former nests — unless the nests are being used by other birds, such as Canada geese, which, according to Waterbury, sometimes is the case. Most of the nests are built on artificial structures.

“They come from as far south as Columbia and Venezuela,” said Waterbury, who works out of Fish and Game’s Salmon Region office. “They’re basically coming from, in some cases, a different hemisphere. They come here because, basically, they’re exploiting a good food resource. They’re fish eaters, so they need easy access to water, whether it’s a river system or lake or, in some cases, the ocean.”

The birds migrate through southern Idaho — primarily near water sources — up to about Coeur d’Alene, she said. They arrive in small flocks, often taking different migration routes.

“They have a real dispersed migration route,” Waterbury said. “We call it the Pacific Flyway.”

In Stanley, most of the nests are along the main stem of the Salmon River, she said. There’s also a nesting colony at Redfish Lake and scattered in the mountains from about Alturas Lake to Stanley Lake.

The birds grab trout from the high-mountain lakes and thrive off suckers in the river.

“They eat a lot of suckers in the Salmon River,” she said. “It’s one of the most populous fishes in the river system.”

Regan Berkley, biologist with the Magic Valley Region office, said there are ospreys in the valley.

“We’re just as likely to have ospreys near any decent size

body of water as other parts of the state,” she said, noting the Hagerman portion of the Snake River is often home to a variety of migratory birds. “It wouldn’t surprise me at all if we had ospreys in Hagerman.”

Ospreys have a wingspan of about 55 to 60 inches, not quite as large as a bald eagle. Water-

bury calls them a “medium-sized raptor.”

She said ospreys were rare at one time in, but over the years they have made a good recovery.

Full falls

More water to tumble at Thousand Springs later this month

HAGERMAN — Beginning April 25, people will have the chance to see more falls at Thousand Springs.

Idaho Power will shut down its site operations for a six-month construction project, causing water to tumble from the cliffs right above the power plant. Work began April 4.

The falls at this particular spot will flow at about 300 cubic feet per second.

“It won’t be like Shoshone Falls. It won’t be as dramatic,” said Stephanie McCurdy, spokeswoman for Idaho Power. “But it’s a pretty view.”

The project won’t likely cause more water to flow at other existing springs, she said, except perhaps near the fish hatchery or Snow-bank Springs.

McCurdy said the increased falls near the plant happen only once every four years, when the site closes for a few days for maintenance. This time is different. People will be able to view the falls until the beginning of October.

The company will replace old concrete, steel piping and parts of the turbine. A crane already sits atop the cliffs, heralding the construction project.

“It’s a pretty substantial project that requires shutting down the plant,” McCurdy said.

Public access is limited at the plant, she said, so the best place to view the falls is at a pullout near Thousand Springs Resort along U.S. Highway 30.

“To have falls for this long period of time at Thousand Springs is a very rare event—a real spring treat,” Randy Hill, regional power plant manager, said in a news release. “We hope people will take advantage of this opportunity to view the water, while at the same time staying safe and enjoying from a distance.”

Water from the springs come from the Snake River aquifer. Idaho Power acquired the plant, formerly owned by the Thousand Springs Power Co., in 1916. It was updated in 1921.

Cindy Brown, of Hagerman, who was fishing with her family Tuesday at nearby Riley Pond said she’s looking forward to seeing the falls in full swing.

It’ll add to the already scenic drive along the Thousand Springs Byway.

“It’s really pretty,” she said.

On the trail of the cottontail: Hunt something to revisit

CAZENOVIA, Wis. — My first shot at a bounding bunny kicked up a silvery cloud of snow 2 feet behind its cotton tail, sending the rabbit into overdrive.

OK. Maybe the shot was 3 or 4 feet late. My shotgunning skills were rusty. Then again, 36 years had passed since my last serious rabbit hunt.

No matter. Tyson Hall’s shotgun blast stopped the rabbit’s run seconds later. Or maybe it took a .22 slug from Paul Neess’ nylon-



stocked Remington auto-loader, which had been popping off like a string of firecrackers. Either way, our seven-man group had its third rabbit of the morning.

We were hunting a brushy hollow behind the old Vince Duren family barnyard in Richland Coun-

ty. Our host, Doug Duren of Madison, grew up there, but like most hunters these days, he too had long forsaken rabbits for white-tailed deer.

Given that, it seemed fitting we waited until rabbit season’s final day, Feb. 28, to again hunt the cottontail. We’d probably still be waiting if not for Duren’s guest from New York, author Steven Rinella, host of “The Wild Within” on the Travel Channel.

Rinella grew up hunting rabbits in Michigan and Illinois. But unlike some of us, he hasn’t so easily forgotten rabbit hunting’s twisting,

turning, stop-and-startle charms. So, once Duren and Rinella squeezed rabbits into their schedules, Duren put together a posse to hunt them.

Also joining us was Mark Boardman, Neess’s co-worker at Vortex Optics in Middleton; and Karl Malcolm, a doctoral candidate in forest and wildlife ecology at the University of Wisconsin.

After Duren cooked and served us scrambled eggs with fried onions and potatoes for breakfast, we gathered guns and gear outside while he explained our first maneuver. Hall, Neess and Boardman

then circled uphill to get behind the nearby hollow. Once there, they’d watch likely escape routes. Duren, Rinella, Malcolm and I then spread out to push the hollow’s dense thickets of burdock, sumac, prickly ash, wild raspberry and multiflora rose.

Nasty stuff, that multiflora rose. I first mistook it for blackberry bushes, but when its long, hooked thorns dug into my scalp, legs and hands and held fast, I knew otherwise. How could a cottontail’s delicate fur and skin survive this

Refugee youths discover skiing with Utah program

BIG COTTONWOOD CANYON, Utah (AP) — Once the young refugees figured out that snow was slippery, it was all downhill from there.

Screams of delight, agony and fear rang out near the Link lift base at Solitude Mountain Resort as 17 youngsters, from 10 to 14 years old, joined volunteer instructors for a day of skiing.

“I went fast, too fast, and I fell,” said 12-year-old Jeebika Dahal, who arrived in Utah from Nepal one year ago. “I went again and didn’t fall the whole ride down.”

The April 3 ski trip was organized by Westminster College. Help in planning and staffing the event with volunteer instructors came from the Asian Association of Utah refugee and immigrant center in Salt Lake City.

“This is a great way to integrate them into the community,” said Rebecca Ely, of the Asian Association of Utah. “They hear other kids talking about skiing at school. Now, they can say, ‘I did that’ and enter the conversation.”

The lessons started on the flat area near the lodge. The kids learned how to click into their bindings, how to fall, how to get up and how, hopefully, to stop.

Those who quickly picked up the sport were on the lift before lunch. And, other than the young refugee who almost took out the “Slow” sign, things went well.

“It is most important to

always have fun, not to be scared,” said 13-year-old Jokie Riak, who came to Salt Lake City from Sudan. “You can’t worry about falling.”

Adoula Biar, 14, from Sudan, wasn’t sure if she liked skiing.

“This might be my last time,” she said. “I got scared.”

The refugees came from a diverse list of countries: Bhutan, Myanmar, Nepal, Burundi, Sudan, Somalia, Ethiopia and Congo. For some, it was their first time seeing people cruise down the mountain with planks on their feet. Some had never seen the snow piled so deep. The drive up Big Cottonwood Canyon was enough adventure for many of the kids, but it was the skiing that Ely was hoping would inspire the immigrants.

“Skiing shows them they can do things they didn’t think they could,” Ely said. “It shows them they can succeed if they get out of their comfort zone and apply themselves.”

Ely said she was encouraged by the community support that helped the first-time event to occur.

West High School student Arnaud Nodjigoto was one of those who picked up skiing quickly. After a couple of runs on Link, his instructors proclaimed he was ready for the “big lift.”

“I like to learn about everything,” said the 14-year-old from Banjul, Gambia. “It is good when it is hard to work on it and learn it. ... I am ready for more.”

stuff? It makes raspberries and prickly ash look friendly.

I considered retreating to the thicket’s perimeter, but then glanced toward Rinella and Malcolm. They were busting through the bristly brush with determination a beagle would admire. If I withdrew now I’d risk ridicule, maybe slander. Duren was within sight and sound, after all.

Malcolm fired minutes later, killing our first rabbit. Soon after, Duren shouted, “Pat, uphill to your left!”

A rabbit scooted atop the snow, weaving and dodging through brush on the hol-

low’s rim. Ripping free of the thorns, I hurried to a better vantage point. The rabbit responded by running toward Duren. When it paused, he rolled it with a blast from the bottom barrel of his .22/410 gun.

When we finished the push and regrouped atop the hill, Rinella gutted the two rabbits, scrubbed their cavities with snow, and slid them into his coat’s game pouch. After pushing a nearby pine plantation with no luck, we again swept the hollow on our way back to the house. That’s when Hall shot the rabbit I missed.

Washington teen photographs deer-baiting to test theory

CHATTAROY, Wash. — Riverside High School senior Erik Kemp wondered if baiting deer would change the animal’s behavior — a concern he’d heard from the Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife.

But no one had the answer, so the 18-year-old turned the question into a science project. Kemp set up four trail cameras in four different areas of his family’s multi-acre property and logged the whitetail deer’s behavior over three months.

“Two weeks of baiting them had no lasting effect on their behavior,” Kemp said of his research.

His curiosity, and the science project, has earned him a trip to the National Science Symposium in San Diego at the end of the month. The teen will also present his findings to the Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife’s eastern division on Tuesday.

The department has never

collected data on baiting deer, officials said.

Baiting deer is legal in Washington, but it is illegal in Idaho and many other states, said Kevin Robinette, regional wildlife program manager. “Hunters, mainly archers, find baiting useful because they can study the animal to know where to shoot the arrow.”

Wildlife officials worry that baiting deer will interfere with migration patterns. Other concerns include “habitat impacts from congregating deer; increase in disease transmission; influencing hunter success rates and overall harvest structure,” Robinette said.

When the issue has been put out to public opinion, the response about banning the practice has been split, wildlife officials say.

“If hunting success rates are very, very high because people are baiting, then we may shorten the season,” Robinette said. “But we don’t see that yet.”

The baiting debate sparked Kemp’s curiosity.

Kemp had several hypotheses he wanted to test: that adding corn or crab apples would increase deer visits; that after the food was gone, the number of deer visits would uniformly taper; that the addition of bait would increase the number of photos taken by his cameras because deer revisited the area; that the addition of bait would increase the number of deer who visited the sites.

Because his experiment was on private property where no hunting was allowed last year, he could not test for hunter success rates. He also could not test for disease.

To start, he set up the cameras but no food and received only a few visitors. When he put out corn, the visits spiked, then tapered off. He did this twice.

“Sometimes I would get 80 pictures per day,” Kemp said. “That was at the prime of the corn, and included all four areas.”

When the food was gone, the amount of game that

visited the areas went back to pre-corn levels. He then put out crab apples and saw another spike of visits, but not as many as with the corn. Again, once the food supply was depleted the numbers dropped back down.

Through these tests, Kemp was able to confirm two of his theories. But he wasn’t able to learn if deer revisited the area or if the bait drew new deer, “due to inability to distinguish different does and fawns.”

The trail cams were left up for several weeks after the food was removed, and there was no change from before the experiment began.

During the test, Kemp also learned a few more unexpected lessons.

“The deer liked the corn better,” Kemp said. And there was more than one peak eating time of day.

“I got pictures of cougar, bear, turkeys, moose and coyotes,” he said. “The bear and the turkeys ate the food, but not as much as the deer.”

Catching perch the Pan Man’s way

ON LEECH LAKE, Minn. — Before he even shuts off his pickup, Brian “Bro” Brosdahl drops a Macho Minnow down an ice-fishing hole he had used four days earlier. It hasn’t frozen over since then.

In less than five seconds, Brosdahl has a perch. His delicate rod bends double as he cranks up the fish. Brosdahl pops the tiny treble hook out of the perch and releases it. Nine and a half inches. Too small.

He drops the lure again. It’s tipped with the front half of a chub minnow. Bang. Another bite. Another perch. Up. Down.

Brosdahl is kneeling on the smooth ice of Leech Lake. He sends the Macho Minnow down again. It never hits bottom on this 12-foot flat. The rod arcs. Brosdahl cranks.

Three perch in less than a minute.

“It’s a tornado down there,” says Brosdahl, a summer walleye and winter perch guide in the greater Grand Rapids/Deer River/Winnibigoshish/Leech Lake area.

For five minutes this goes on. Nonstop action. I mention to Brosdahl that his pickup is still running. He quits fishing long enough to shut it off.

Back in action, Brosdahl pinches the real minnow off his Macho Minnow.

“Now, let’s try no bait,” he says.

No bait works just fine, too. It is hard to say how many fish he catches in this mini-bonanza. Fifteen? Twenty? They just keep coming. All of them go back.

“I think we’re outnumbered here,” Brosdahl says.

Brosdahl loves catching perch. When summer comes, he guides walleyes. But in cold weather, he guides almost exclusively for

perch. An ample man with sunburned cheeks and an auburn goatee, Brosdahl has always been captivated by perch — as well as bluegills and crappies.

Working with Northland Fishing Tackle, he has designed a collection of Bro Bugs — tiny bug-eyed jigs on tiny hooks made just for catching these diminutive

species. As long as the perch tornado is swirling beneath the ice, Brosdahl keeps feeding them the gold Macho Minnow.

“They love gold on Leech,” Brosdahl says.

Finally, the frenetic bite slows a bit, and we settle into a routine. I fish from a one-person shelter. Brosdahl trolls outside from hole to hole. He puts some water in a pickle pail, and we begin tossing some larger perch into it.

Brosdahl says he had to persuade Northland to make small bugs with small hooks to catch panfish and perch. John Crane, brand manager

at Northland Fishing Tackle in Bemidji, says he has seen the results.

“A lot of time, with this line of plastics Bro has developed, you don’t have to use bait,” Crane said. “A lot of time, you can outfish the guy sitting next to you using a minnow or waxworm.”

When our action slows, Brosdahl knows what to do. He puts away our rods with 3-pound-test line and, from an arsenal of 15 or 20 rods, selects a couple bearing 1-pound-test monofilament. He ties on the cute little Mud Bugs with their No. 10 hooks. Small.

“They look like larvae coming out of the mud,” he says.

We tip them with tiny red maggots, three to a hook. We have plenty: Brosdahl mail-orders maggots 10,000 at a time.

Sight-fishing in my shelter, I can watch the perch come in to hit the Mud Bug and maggot. When perch are aggressive, the heavier Macho-Minnow-with-minnow presentation is effective. But when the fury slows, the perch just peck at the real minnow without getting hooked.

That’s when it’s time for the Mud Bug and maggot offering. The perch ingest the whole offering.

“You’ll like this one,” Brosdahl said, standing outside my shelter.

I pulled the window covering down to see him holding a 12-incher.

“Aren’t they pretty?” he says. “I call ‘em peacock bass.”

Brosdahl is happy. We’ve had a fine day on the ice. He’ll have a few more before the ice is too sketchy to drive on.

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Fishing anywhere you please

Nationally known kayaking angler sports some good ideas

MADISON, Wis. — Most anglers view boats as floating platforms that let them fish almost anywhere they please.

Such boats come and go like cars and trucks. Some just look prettier and get you places faster than others. Most claims of heartfelt bonds between angler and boat stretch credibility.

Then there's kayak anglers. They wear their boats. They might not get places as quickly as they would in a motorboat, but fitness is their fuel and muscles their propulsion. They aren't troubled by fuel taxes, and they're immune from inflated oil prices and Middle East embargoes.

The advantages extend to fishing itself. When fighting a big salmon, kayak anglers can point their craft at the fish and play rodeo, tiring it while it pulls them like a dogsled. If they want to try putting the brakes on a muskie, they can turn broadside and dig in their heels.

On days too rough to tackle big water, kayak anglers can sneak into small lakes or rivers that big boats will never navigate, no matter the conditions. And when conditions allow, they can fish big waters and fight monstrous fish face-to-face, creating memories the rest of us envy.

One man who knows all about such things is Cory Routh, president of Ruthless Kayak Fishing in Virginia Beach, Va., (<http://www.ruthlessfishing.com>).

This nationally known guide and author has kayak-fished from Texas to New York City, but his guide service centers on the Virginia/North Carolina Tidewater region, including Chesapeake Bay.

Routh uses a 14-foot, 7-inch "sit-on-top" kayak with a specially designed bottom for great stability. Routh said anglers who cap-

size such kayaks probably rolled out and didn't know how to get back in.

These kayaks have an open cockpit so anglers can keep their legs free, not tucked inside as with traditional kayaks. This allows anglers to turn halfway around to reach gear behind them. And they can swing one leg outside the kayak to hoist a heavy fish aboard after clamping its lip with a fish-grabber. Try that maneuver with a traditional kayak.

Either way, Routh says kayak angling starts with personal flotation devices.

"If you have a paddle in your hand, you better be wearing a PFD," he said.

He also advises carrying an LED flashlight for emergencies and nighttime fishing. And to ensure other

boaters see you, mount a white light behind your seat on a pole about 4 feet tall. During daylight, attach a blaze-orange banner.

Next, strap a manual bilge pump to the kayak within easy reach and keep a big sponge handy. A sponge removes water the bilge pump can't reach and quickly removes fish slime and blood.

Space and efficiency are treasured, of course. Routh uses bow-mounted rod-holders with retaining rings to ensure he doesn't lose his rods should the kayak roll. It's also easier to unhook fish when rods are secured, not threatening to roll off the deck.

Whenever possible, use plastic watertight boxes that float. These boxes come in several sizes and designs to hold lures, smart-phones or

compact cameras. Second chances are everything to kayakers and it's much easier to see and retrieve floaters than sinkers.

In addition to the standard plastic milk crate kayak-anglers strap behind their seat for holding gear and mounting rod-holders, keep a triangular-shaped freezer bag in the forward compartment. Routh said a mere plastic bag turns fish to warm mush by midday.

He also suggests not using your kayak as an excuse to buy new fishing rods. Just make sure your old rods reach beyond the kayak's bow when you're seated. And when fighting fish, don't let them run beneath or behind you. Keep them out front.

Of course, with the money you'll save on gas by kayak fishing, it shouldn't be difficult justifying new rods at some point.

Assess child's maturity level before the hunt

Q: "I heard my 10-year-old son could purchase a hunting license and hunt with me this year. How can that be? I thought children had to be 12 to get a hunting license."

A: What you heard is partly correct. A law passed a few years ago allows 10 and 11 year olds to hunt under restrictive conditions.

Whether your son or daughter will be able to hunt with you depends on your assessment of their maturity, whether they complete an Idaho hunter education class, and the species of game you intend to hunt.

In the last 20-plus years, hunting participation in Idaho has declined by about one-third. The percentage of Idahoans who enjoy hunting has fallen from 25 percent to 17 percent. The number of junior hunting licenses has also declined.

The Idaho Department of Fish and Game brought together members of hunting groups, hunter education instructors and individuals to brainstorm methods of recruiting young people into the hunting fraternity.

Surrounding states have lowered their minimum age requirements for young hunters. Thirty-one states have no minimum age at all to hunt small game. Most of those states that allow youths under age 12 to hunt require adult supervision.

The research suggests individuals that start hunting early in life with adult mentors are likely to continue to hunt later in life with no increase in hunting accident rates.

To recruit and encourage youth participation in

hunting, the department revamped the hunter education program and 9, 10 and 11 year olds are now allowed to take hunter education. Following completion of the course, graduates 10 and 11 years of age may purchase a youth small-game hunting license. This license allows youth to hunt upland game and unprotected species when accompanied by a licensed adult. If they complete the hunter education course at age 11, and will turn 12 during the fall, they may purchase their junior hunting license, thus allowing them to apply for controlled hunts and purchase big game hunting tags.

Not all 9, 10 and 11 year olds are responsible enough to participate in this program. Parents should assess their child's level of maturity to be sure their son or daughter is truly ready for this responsibility.

For those children that are ready, this is a unique opportunity to provide a mentored upland game hunting experience to a young hunter and impart a positive ethical role model to guide their future.

Deconstructing the 'extreme supermoon'

Within days of Japan's catastrophic earthquake, the media was abuzz with stories that an "extreme supermoon" may have triggered the disaster.

With a month of hindsight, what have we learned?

Make no mistake: This was not a case of "retrofitting" (a popular gambit among psychics, who reinterpret deliberately-vague predictions to fit the facts, post hoc). The first articles — about astrologer Richard Nolle's prediction that March's close, full moon might cause natural disasters — appeared over a week before the Japan quake.

So, an astrologer predicted the quake? Not so fast! All the pre-quake prophecies warned of disasters within three days of the full moon on March 19. (The quake hit eight days prior.) Furthermore, the laws of orbital motion dictate that when the near point on the moon's orbit (perigee) is un-

usually close — as it was on March 19 — the far point (apogee, two weeks before and after perigee) will also be unusually distant.

The earthquake hit when the moon was more than a quarter of its orbit before perigee, and thus farther than average. Its gravitational pull on earth was below average, and the sun's tidal force was acting to counteract the moon's, not add to it.

And then the inevitable retrofitting began. Soon, Nolle was claiming that the danger could arrive up to nine days (not three) before or after the full-moon/close-perigee concordance.

By the time the "supermoon" arrived, the media's focus had shifted to the

moon's large appearance, with barely a peep about the fact that the "danger" had passed without incident.

As a final reality check, Nolle's prediction warned that April's full moon (this Sunday) might also trigger natural disasters. If he misses the mark this time, can we all agree that his 15 minutes are over?

DEAR READER: Pick's is a rare but permanent form of dementia similar to Alzheimer's disease. It has a tendency to affect only certain areas of the brain and can affect people as young as 20; however, it is more common in people closer to 55 or 60. People with Pick's have abnormal substances

known as Pick bodies and Pick cells inside nerve cells within damaged areas of the brain.

Tissue in the temporal and frontal lobes of the brain shrink over time and result in impaired thought processes, behavioral

changes and difficulties with speech. It's the early personality changes that allow physicians to differentiate between Pick's and Alzheimer's, which ordinarily presents with memory loss. People with Pick's behave inappropriately, might exhibit an inability to function publicly, be unable to maintain a job, may withdraw socially, have mood changes, and fail to exhibit concern and empathy. They may have difficulty speak-

ing or cannot speak at all, can't find the right word to say, have coordination problems, increased rigidity and weakness. There may be a problem with urinary incontinence.

Testing to rule out other dementia-related causes might include an EEG, MRI of the brain, CT of the head and neurological examination; however, a brain biopsy is the only test available for an accurate confirmatory diagnosis.

Treatment might include antidepressants or antipsychotic drugs to control mood swings and agitation. Depending on a person's symptoms and the severity of the Pick's, a person may require assistance with self-care and personal hygiene. Pick's will worsen with time, and a patient may become totally disabled in the course of the disease.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I am puzzled as to why eating lamb causes such an extreme reaction to my system. One bite of lamb cooked any way or lamb dishes of any kind causes me to become nauseated within 10 minutes.

DEAR READER: Meat allergy may be more common than thought.

An intolerance to any food is ordinarily caused by an enzyme deficiency. Either that or the intestines may be overly sensitive to this particular food. In an allergic reaction, the offending substance — in your case, lamb — the body perceives the protein (or sugar in other cases) as foreign, causing the release of histamine, which leads to the body's overreaction.

Reducing screen time can help prevent childhood obesity, and children who spend less time watching television in early years tend to do better in school, have a healthier diet, are more physically active and are better able to engage in schoolwork.

Hiwat ready to fill void for BSU

BOISE — Spend 10 minutes talking with Boise State receiver Geraldo Hiwat and you forget he's a sophomore. Spend 10 minutes watching him this spring and you forget about the Broncos' lack of experience at wide receiver.

Hiwat, the Dutch native with the different last name, is frequently mentioned when Boise State players are asked who will be the next breakout star this fall.

"I think people are going to be surprised by Geraldo Hiwat," senior linebacker Byron Hout said. "He looks good this spring."

Coach Chris Peterson thinks the same thing. So does linebacker Aaron Tevis. So does running back Doug Martin.

It might be wishful thinking to believe that Hiwat can help fill the gaping chasm left by the departure of school record holders Austin Pettis and Titus Young. But Hiwat sounds like he's ready to accept his share of the mantle.

"It's definitely going to be different this season without Austin and Titus around," said Hiwat, a 6-foot-4 red-shirt sophomore with soft hands and good speed. "We all have to step up. We're all getting older. I'm not the young guy any more. I'm going to try and impart what I learned to the younger guys. Hopefully, we can all help each other get better."

Hiwat, who moved to Boise his senior year to play at Capital High School to give himself a chance at playing football in college, has been getting better since the day he set foot in the U.S.

And he spent his time in the shadows paying close attention.

"What I learned from Austin and Titus was that during the game, you can see things you don't see in practice," Hiwat said. "You work hard and practice hard, but games are just a whole different environment."

"Austin was really good at showing me how to find soft spots in the zone to get open. Titus was gifted with speed, but he analyzed the guy defending him and figured out a way to beat him during the game. He would give me tips on what to look for in a defender and show me how to beat him."

"That stuff is always handy to keep in the back of your head and pass that on to the younger guys."

Last season, Hiwat was productive in his limited role, catching 11 passes for 160 yards. He expressed excitement about his opportunity to play a bigger role in the Broncos' offense, but was quick to point out that it needed to be a group effort.

"We've all got our own thing that we're good at and we just keep helping each other out," Hiwat said. "It's a good group of receivers and a good group of guys. I think we're going to be good."

Part of Hiwat's confidence in the young receiving corps, which includes senior Tyler Shoemaker and redshirt sophomore Kirby Moore, stems from the close-knit bond the group has formed.

"It feels good," said Buckner.

The CSI sophomores signed National Letters of Intent on Wednesday, the first day of the NCAA's late signing period, with Jackson headed to Baylor and Buckner inking with Boise State.

"Two Eagles leave the nest," said Gosar.

Jackson joins a Baylor program that is coming off an 18-13 season and has high hopes for the 2011-12 season. Especially with the 5-foot-10 Jackson on board.

"Pierre has a great work ethic and is always in the gym trying to get better every day," Baylor coach Scott Drew said in a school release. "For a player his size, he has

unbelievable athleticism which he displayed on the biggest stage at the junior college level."

Jackson, the Scenic West Athletic Conference Player of the Year, averaged 18.6 points, 3.8 rebounds and 4.4 assists in leading CSI to a 33-4 record and the NJCAA national championship. He shot 87 percent at the foul line, eighth best in the nation, and was named the NJCAA Tournament's most valuable player after averaging 24 points over four games in Hutchinson, Kan.

"Now that he's won a junior college national title at Southern Idaho as well as the tournament MVP, I know we would love to do the same here at Baylor," Drew said.

Jackson joins 6-4 guard Qudus Bello and 6-9 forward Quincy Miller in Baylor's 2011 class.

Buckner heads to Boise State eager to help the Broncos improve on last season's 22-13 record.

"It's going to be a good turnaround," said Buckner, who averaged

Kobe Bryant fined \$100,000 for gay slur

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The NBA fined Kobe Bryant \$100,000 on Wednesday for using a derogatory gay term in frustration over a referee's call.

NBA Commissioner David Stern issued a swift disciplinary ruling after the Los Angeles Lakers' five-time NBA champion guard cursed and used the homophobic slur when referee Bennie Adams called a technical foul on him during the third quarter of a victory over the San Antonio Spurs.

"Kobe Bryant's comment during last night's game was offensive and inexcusable," Stern said. "While I'm fully aware that basketball is an emotional game, such a distasteful term should never be tolerated. ... Kobe and everyone associated with the NBA know that insensitive or derogatory comments are not acceptable and have no place in our game or society."

Stern's action drew praise from gay-rights organizations that had demand-

ed a fuller apology from Bryant and condemnation of his words by the Lakers. Bryant, the sixth-leading scorer in NBA history, issued a statement earlier Wednesday saying his words came strictly out of anger and shouldn't be taken literally.

"We applaud Commissioner Stern and the NBA for not only fining Bryant but for recognizing that slurs and derogatory comments have no place on the basketball court or in society at large," Human Rights Campaign President Joe Solmonese said. "We hope such swift and decisive action will send a strong and universal message that this kind of hateful outburst is simply inexcusable no matter what the context."

Solmonese said Bryant also personally called him to apologize.

"He told me that it's never OK to degrade or tease, and that he understands how his words could unfortunately give the wrong impression that this is ap-

propriate conduct," Solmonese said. "At the end of a difficult day, I applaud Kobe for coming forward and taking responsibility for his actions."

Bryant's words and actions were captured by TNT's cameras during the network's national broadcast of the Lakers' regular-season home finale.

Bryant punched his chair before taking a seat on the bench, throwing a towel on the court near his feet in frustration after picking up his fourth foul in the third quarter. He got his 15th technical of the season for arguing the call, one shy of the cumulative trigger for a one-game NBA suspension.

"What I said last night should not be taken literally. My actions were out of frustration during the heat of the game, period," Bryant said in a statement issued through the Lakers. "The words expressed do NOT reflect my feelings towards the gay and lesbian communities and were NOT meant to offend anyone."

Penguins cruise to 3-0 victory over Lightning

Bonds guilty of obstruction; mistrial for other charges

SAN FRANCISCO — Just like the whole Steroid Era: We'll never really know.

Even the one charge that left Barry Bonds a convicted felon didn't specify steroids.

Instead, a federal court jury found the home run king guilty of obstruction of justice Tuesday for giving an evasive answer under oath more than seven years ago. Rather than say "yes" or "no" to whether he received drugs that required a syringe, Bonds gave a rambling response to a grand jury, stating: "I became a celebrity child with a famous father."

The decision from the eight women and four men who listened to testimony during the 12-day trial turned out to be a mixed and muddled verdict on the slugger that left more questions than answers.

U.S. District Judge Susan Illston declared a mistrial on the three charges that Bonds made false statements when he told a grand jury in December 2003 that he never knowingly received steroids

and human growth hormone from trainer Greg Anderson and that he allowed only doctors to inject him.

Defense lawyers will try to persuade Illston or the 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals to toss out the lone conviction. Federal prosecutors must decide whether it is worth the time and expense to try Bonds for a second time on the deadlocked charges.

Less than two miles from the ballpark where he broke Hank Aaron's career home run record in August 2007, Bonds walked out of the Phillip Burton Federal Building on a sunny, windy afternoon and looked on as his lead lawyer, Allen Ruby, held a sidewalk news conference. Ruby instructed Bonds not to comment because the case wasn't over.

Impeccably dressed in black suit and purple necktie, with a few days of stubble on his chin, Bonds flashed a victory sign to a few fans.

"Are you celebrating tonight?" one asked.

"There's nothing to celebrate," he replied.

While Bonds stood on the

sidewalk on the courthouse's north side, the jurors — whose names are being withheld until Thursday — went out the south entrance and many lingered to answer questions. For now, they only would give their first names.

Amber, a 19-year-old blonde woman who was the youngest juror, said the final votes were 8-4 to acquit Bonds of lying about steroids and 9-3 to acquit him on ly-

ing about HGH use. The panel voted 11-1 to convict him of getting an injection from someone other than his doctor, with one woman holding out, she said.

Jurors decided to convict Bonds on the obstruction count on Tuesday; on Wednesday they decided they could not come to unanimous decisions on the rest.

There was initial confusion when the jury informed

Illston's clerk, Tracy Forakis, that they had reached a verdict, and the court made a public announcement. But when Forakis went back to the jury room, the panel said the verdict form wasn't completed because there was a deadlock. The court then issued a retraction of its verdict announcement and Illston convened the lawyers, first without jurors, then with them, and learned they were deadlocked on at least some of the charges.

Bonds, the seven-time National League MVP, chatted with his lawyers while Illston and the jury went back behind closed doors. When they returned, Illston opened a manila envelope with the verdict and handed it to Forakis to read.

Bonds leaned forward, looked at the clerk, but never reacted when the verdict was read. His mother, Pat, watched from a second-row bench.

And then, just when it ap-

peared Bonds would escape unscathed, came the final word from the jury:

"Guilty," on obstruction of justice.

Dennis Riordan, one of the lawyers on Bonds' legal team that numbered as many as 13 some days, asked Illston to throw out the guilty verdict and for a new trial on that count. Assistant U.S. Attorney Matthew Parrella asked the judge to set a sentencing date. Instead, Illston set a May 20 date for a status conference.

"This case is about upholding one of the most fundamental principles in our system of justice — the obligation of every witness to provide truthful and direct testimony in judicial proceedings," Melinda Haag, the U.S. attorney in San Francisco, said in a statement. "In the United States, taking an oath and promising to testify truthfully is a serious matter. We cannot ignore those who choose instead to obstruct justice. We will decide whether to seek a retrial of the defendant on the remaining counts as soon as possible."

NFL's rookie pitch: divert \$300M from 1st rounders

NEW YORK — The NFL wants to cut almost 60 percent of guaranteed pay for first-round draft picks, lock them in for five years and divert the savings to veterans' salaries and benefits.

More than \$525 million went to first-rounders in guaranteed payments in 2010. The league wants to decrease that figure by \$300 million, according to documents obtained by The Associated Press.

The league's offer would free a total of more than \$1.2 billion over four years through 2015 — \$37.5 million per team overall — and slow the growth rate of guaranteed payments to first-rounders, which the documents show increased by 233 percent from 2000-10.

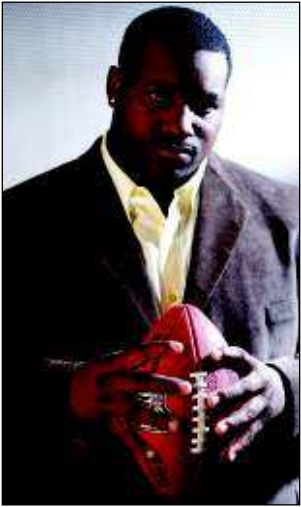
Such quarterback busts as JaMarcus Russell (\$32 million), Matt Leinart (\$12.9 million), David Carr (\$15 million) and Joey Harrington (\$13.9 million) received huge guaranteed payments that totaled \$367 million in the last 10 drafts.

Of course, Eli Manning (\$24 million), Philip Rivers (\$17.9 million) and Matt Ryan (\$34.7 million) have not done too badly for their teams.

Guaranteed money paid to top 10 selections since 2000 reached nearly \$2 billion. Guaranteed payments for all first-rounders were at \$3.5 billion. The average career length of a first-round pick since 1993 is 9.3 years.

Eagles president Joe Banner said the original aim of the draft is being compromised by the expenses associated with signing top picks.

"The whole concept of the draft and ordering of the picks is to maintain competitive balance in the league," Banner said. "Now teams get top picks who have become so expensive and there's the risk you can miss, and it makes the ability to trade in and out of those spots almost impossible. It can become a disadvantage to be in one of

NFL'S GOODSELL 'LOOKING FORWARD' TO MEDIATION

MINNEAPOLIS — Different state. Different mediator. Same disagreements.

One month and two days after the NFL and its players cut off negotiations on a new collective bargaining agreement and put the 2011 season in peril, the two sides will return to the table for court-ordered mediation Thursday with a key legal ruling on the lockout still pending.

NFL executives met with U.S. Magistrate Judge Arthur Boylan on Wednesday for five hours the day before the first talks between the league and the players since the middle of March.

Executive vice president Jeff Pash, the NFL's lead negotiator, was at the federal courthouse along with other officials and outside counsel. Lawyers for the players met with Boylan for about four hours on Tuesday.

"We appreciate the opportunity to meet with the magistrate and review the issues with him in preparation for our session tomorrow, and we're looking forward to seeing the players

and their representatives tomorrow morning," Pash said. He declined to comment further.

Larger contingents are expected today, when mediation begins in Boylan's chambers, including commissioner Roger Goodell himself. League spokesman Greg Aiello said Goodell will attend along with some of the owners.

This was posted on Goodell's Twitter feed Wednesday evening: "I am also looking forward to resuming mediation talks tomorrow with players and their representatives."

TENNESSEE TITANS PLAYER KENNY BRITT ARRESTED IN NJ

BAYONNE, N.J. — Tennessee Titans wide receiver Kenny Britt was arrested in his hometown of Bayonne, N.J., on Tuesday after an officer reported seeing him speeding.

Britt, 22, faces charges of eluding the officer, hindering apprehension and obstructing governmental function, Bayonne Police Chief Robert Kubert said.

Britt was driving his blue Porsche at 71 mph in a 50-mph zone Tuesday afternoon, according to Kubert, who said Britt drove away from the officer and was eventually found on side street walking away from the car. Kubert said Britt first denied being in the car, then denied driving and then finally admitted he was behind the wheel.

Police said a passenger in the vehicle with Britt also faces three criminal charges. Both men have been released on summons.

The agency that represents Britt said Tuesday it was not prepared to comment on his arrest. Titans spokesman Robbie Bohren said only that the team was aware of the reports.

Britt has an April 19 court appearance.

THE ACES ON BRIDGE® Bobby Wolff

"Judge not, that ye be not judged."

— Matthew 7:1

It is very dangerous for one bridge writer to criticize another. Who knows how revenge may be taken? So instead I'm going to show a deal that occurred in another syndicated column without mentioning the author, and ask you what you think before I give my views.

Against four hearts, the club king and ace were led, and the column suggests that declarer should ruff. Now the text says declarer is certain to come home if trumps divide 3-2. It recommends that South lead a trump to the king and a trump back to the ace. When the trumps prove to be 4-1, declarer runs the diamond queen and fails by one trick when East wins the diamond king and plays a third club. The defenders eventually score two more tricks, one way or another.

Can you spot the mistake? Better technique is to ruff the club, then cash the heart queen and jack, leaving the trump king on the board. Now you run the diamond queen, and East wins and plays a club. You ruff this trick, leaving West with two trumps while you have only one trump in each hand. However, you can still survive if the hand with the long trumps had at least three diamonds. You cash the diamond ace and jack, then take the spade ace and king. At this point you lead out the 13th diamond and can take your two high trumps separately, for 10 tricks.

ANSWER: When two suits have been bid, as here, the third suit tells, not asks. Now that you know about the spade weakness, your duty is to get to clubs. You do not have to commit yourself yet, though. In the context of having shown a minimum at your second turn, you have a great hand facing a singleton spade. Bid three hearts to show your feature there, and maybe you'll get to cuebid diamonds later.
