LITTLE FUNDING FOR FELLOWSHIP

Twin Falls nonprofit struggles to find money for new roof

By Ben Botkin Times-News writer

Stan Crowley knows firsthand that the Fellowship Hall helps people.

He first entered its doors in 1994 to seek help in overcoming alcoholism. It's a path familiar to other addicts who make their way to support groups each evening the modest Twin Fals building.


The Fellowship Hall, open since 1987, provides space for anonymous support groups regardless of the challenge their members face. People come in battling alcohol, methamphetamine, other narcotics and gambling, to name a

But the nonprofit has fallen on hard financial times in recent years, and its expenses have grown. In a couple of places inside the Second Avenue building, removed ceiling tiles show where roof leaks have opened.

Crowley, now vice president of the nonprofit's board, says the estimate to fix the hall's leaky roof has been put at \$25,000. So far, the hall has raised less than \$1,000, and the small, unaffiliated nonprofit isn't used to raising such large sums.

"The main purpose of being open is to give a safe environment for people in recovery," Crowley

RATHDRUM - Northern Idaho firefighters in Rathdrum want their 114year-old bell back.



No one answered the door at the homes of family members on Sunday, and a person who answered phone at one of the homes declined comment.

The machine will move material faster "without needing all the additional ground support to ensure the safety of our rescue teams," the company said in the statement released Sunday morning. "In the meantime, rescue crews continue to safely advance and progress on the removal of material."

Hecla President Phil Baker said earlier that the remote-control "mucker," similar to a front-end loader, was being flown in from the East Coast.

A Marek family member, who spoke on condition of anonymity as per an agreement with the rest of the family, told The Associated Press that two of her brothers were in the mine; one got out and the other did not.

She said most of her family was at the rescue site. She described her family as longtime area miners, but declined to provide any more information. The mine is tucked into

the forested mountains of Mullan, a historic mining town of 840 people in Idaho's Panhandle. spokesman Company

The company said all mining activity has been halted for the rescue effort.

The mine employs roughly 275 workers, about 50 of whom were underground in various parts of the mine when the collapse occurred, company spokeswoman Melanie Hennessey said.

Glen Gotcher, 57, who worked in the mine for 28 years and spent the last seven working in the mill above ground, said the community is staying positive as they await word about the missing miner.

"This is something people are used to feeling, because when the rock burst happens, you can feel it all over town," Gotcher said as he gathered with other miners at the Smokeshop Bar in downtown Mullan.

Others have died in the mine, but not recently, Gotcher said.

On its website, Hecla describes itself as the oldest U.S.-based precious metals mining company in North America and the largest silver producer in the U.S. It is headquartered in Coeur d'Alene, Idaho. Hecla currently produces silver from two mines, Greens Creek and Lucky Friday, a mine

that has been operational since 1942 and is one of the nation's deepest underground mines.

Baker said the collapse was in an area where mine material is watered down and cooled before being processing. No cause for the

collapse has been identified "We're not yet focused on how and why it occurred," Baker said. "All of our efforts now are on rescuing the

miner." Hecla Mining has been expanding its Lucky Friday Mine in the Silver Valley, spending \$200 million in recent years to increase silver production by about 60 percent and extend the

mine's life beyond 2030.

The company appears to have a good record of health and safety at Lucky Friday. There have been no fatalities dating back to 2000, according to a Mine Safety and Health Administration database. The federal regulator has cited the mine for violations, but none in the last year specifically tied to the kind of accident that oc-

curred Friday. In 2009, the company agreed to pay \$177,500 in fines for violating federal clean water laws at Lucky Friday. EPA investigators said the mine exceeded discharge levels for metals such as lead, zinc, cadmium and suspended solids between September 2008 and February 2009. Discharges flow into the South Fork Coeur d'Alene River above the town of Mullan.

Idaho's rebate, originally passed in 2005, will expire on June 30 — not just for Carkulis and other wind developers who emerged as a lobbying force over the last three months, but also for other alternative energy wildcatters building landfill gas, anaerobic digesters and geothermal power projects.

The brinksmanship Exergy employed to keep it alive is nothing new to the Idaho Legislature, especially when millions are at stake.

Grocery chain Albertson's Inc. did it in 2005, threatening then-Gov. Dirk Kempthorne's administration it would move elsewhere without lucrative concessions. Lawmakers went along, but Albertson's was sold just months later to an out-ofstate competitor.

Stegner, who opposed the extension on grounds that companies should sink or swim in a free market, believes wind companies' threats to blow out of Idaho may have been hyperbole to scare lawmakers. With wind developers, a majority in the Senate just didn't blink.

"It's logical that companies are going to tell us that they are vitally important," Stegner said. "The responsibility of the Legislature remains one of a certain amount of caution and a certain amount of suspicion when it comes to these types of tax incentives."

N. Carolina gets worst of deadly storms that ravaged swath of U.S.

ASKEWVILLE, N.C. -Atornado-spewing storm system that killed at least 45 people across half the country unleashed its worst fury on North Carolina, where homes broke apart, trees snapped and livestock were swept into the air. Residents in the capital city and rural hamlets alike on Sunday mourned the dead, marveled at their own survival and began to clean up devastated neighborhoods.

Observers reported more than 60 tornadoes across North Carolina on Saturday, but most of the state's 21 confirmed deaths occurred in two rural counties. A thunderstorm spawned a tornado that killed four people in southeastern Bladen County, then kept dropping tornadoes as it hopscotched more than 150 miles, eventually moving into Bertie County and killing 11 more.

Heavy winds swept some homes from their foundations, demolished others and flipped cars on tiny rubetween roads Askewville and Colerain, Bertie County Manager Zee Lamb said. At least three of those who died were from the same family, he said.

FAA gives tired air traffic controllers an extra hour to rest

WASHINGTON - The government said Sunday it is giving air traffic controllers an extra hour off between shifts so they don't doze off at work, a problem that stretches back decades. But officials rejected the remedy that sleep experts say would make a real difference: onthe-job napping.

"On my watch, controllers will not be paid to take naps. We're not going to allow that," Transportation Secretary Ray LaHood

That's exactly the opposite of what scientists and the Federal Aviation Administration's own fatigue working group say is needed after five cases disclosed since late March of sleeping controllers. The latest one occurred just before 5 a.m. Saturday at a busy regional radar facility that handles high altitude air traffic for much of Florida, portions of the Atlantic Ocean and the Caribbean Sea.

Several other countries, including Germany and Japan, permit controllers to take sleeping breaks and they provide quiet rooms

with cots for that purpose. "Given the body of scientific evidence, that decision clearly demonstrates that politics remain more important than public safety;' said Bill Voss, president of the Flight Safety Foundation of Alexandria, Va. "People are concerned about a political backlash if they allow controllers to work shifts the same way firefighters and trauma physicians do."

It has been an open secret in the FAA dating to at least the early 1990s that controllers sometimes sleep on the job. Toughest are the midnight shifts, which usually begin about 10 p.m. and end about 6 a.m.

Scientists say it would be

surprising if controllers didn't doze sometimes because they are trying to stay awake during the time of day when the body naturally craves sleep.

Studies show that 30 percent to 50 percent of night-shift workers report falling asleep at least once a week while on the job, according to Dr. Charles Czeisler, chief of sleep medicine at Brigham and Women's Hospital in Boston.

Six of eight present and former controllers interviewed by The Associated Press acknowledged they briefly fell asleep while working alone at night at least once in their careers. Most of the controllers asked not to be identified because they didn't want to jeopardize their jobs or the jobs of colleagues.

Much more common is taking a nap on purpose, they said. On midnight shifts, one controller will work two positions while the other one sleeps and then they switch off, controllers said. The unsanctioned arrangements sometimes allow controllers to sleep as much as three hours or four hours out of an eight-hour shift, they said.

The FAA does not allow have rest periods in their controllers to sleep at work, even during breaks. Controllers who are caught can be suspended or fired. But at many air traffic facilities the sleeping swaps are tolerated as long as they don't affect safety, controllers

"It has always been a problem," said former controller Rick Perl, who retired last year.

Unlike in South, Civil War sites, events long 'forgotten' in North

FRAMINGHAM, Mass. - The gravesite of a Union Army major general sits largely forgotten in a small cemetery along the Massachusetts Turnpike.

A piece of the coat worn by President Abraham Lincoln when he was assassinated rests quietly in a library attic in a Boston suburb. It's shown upon request, a rare occurrence.

A monument honoring one of the first official Civil War black units stands in a busy intersection in front of the Massachusetts Statehouse, barely gaining notice from the hustle of tourists and workers who pass by each

As the nation marks the 150th anniversary of the Civil War, states in the old South - the side that lost - are hosting elaborate re-enactments, intricate memorials, even formal galas highlighting the war's persistent legacy in the region. But for many states in the North – the side that won – only scant, smaller events are planned in an area of the nation that helped sparked the conflict but now, historians say, struggles to acknowledge it.

Meanwhile, states like Arkansas, Virginia, North Carolina and Missouri not only established commissions months, if not years ago, but also have ambitious plans for remembrance around wellknown tourist sites and events. In South Carolina, for example, 300 Civil War re-enactors participated last week in well-organized staged battles to mark the beginning of the war.

To be sure, some Northern states have Civil War events planned and have formed commemoration commissions. Connecticut's 150th Civil War Commemoration was set up in 2008 and has scheduled a number of events and exhibits until 2015. Vermont, the first state to outlaw slavery, started a similar commission last year to coordinate activities statewide and in towns.

And some Massachusetts small nonprofit and historic groups are trying to spark interest through research. planned tours and town events.

That difference highlights Northern states' long struggle with how to remember a war that was largely fought on Southern soil, said Steven Mintz, a Columbia University history professor and author of "Moralists and Modern-

racial inequality after slavery.

"We've spent a century and a half turning (the war) into a gigantic North-South football game in which everybody was a hero," Mintz said. "In other words, we depoliticized the whole meaning of the war. And insofar as it was captured, it was captured by the descendants of the Confederates."

Sons of Confederate Veterans, a group open to male descendants of veterans who served in the Confederate armed forces, boast 30,000 members across the Old South.

The Sons of the Union Veterans of the Civil War has 6,000 members.

Kevin Tucker, Massachusetts Department Commander for the Sons of the Union Veterans, said some Northern descendants don't even know they're related to Union veterans. "I found out after my father did some research and discovered that my greatgreat-grandfather had collected a Union pension," said Tucker, of Wakefield. "Until then, I had no idea."

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

TALLADEGA, Ala. – Jimmie Johnn won a Talladega two-step Sunday, edging Clint Bowyer by about a foot with a big push from Dale Earnhardt Jr.

The official margin was 0.002 seconds, tied for the closest finish in NASCAR Sprint Cup history.

The tag-team race came down to an eight-car sprint – actually, four pairs of cars — with only the guys at the front of the duos having a chance to win the Aaron's 499.

After laying back most of the day, five-time series champion Johnson came on strong at the end for his 54th career victory and first of the season.

"We were just the lucky guy at the end with a good run," Johnson said. "We had some big mo on our side, and off we went."

Coming out of the fourth turn, the No. 48 car dipped right next to the yellow line, surged past Hendrick Motorsports teammates Jeff Gordon and Mark Martin and got to the finish line just ahead of Bowyer in a four-wide dash down the long finishing straight at Talladega Superspeedway.

"What a bummer," said Bowyer, who led a race-high 38 laps. "I saw him

Earnhardt, the fourth Hendrick driver, finished fourth and essentially

gave up a chance to claim his first win choreographed by pairs who were getting pushed.

"I can't thank Junior enough," said Johnson, who gave Earnhardt the checkered flag as a reward for being such a team player. "He made the decision that my car was faster leading. And the way these things are finishing up, the lead car's going to get the win. In some respects, he was more worried about the team having a good performance than anything."

Kevin Harvick, who was Bowyer's pusher, wound up fifth. Carl Edwards almost got into the mix as well, going right up against the outside wall with Greg Biffle on his bumper but didn't have enough room to pull it off, finishing sixth.

Biffle was seventh, while Martin it. dropped back to eighth.

"With as crazy as it gets in these closing laps, sometimes a third is almost like a victory at these type of race tracks." Gordon said.



Just how are Luna's reforms workable for small districts?

f you're a school board member or an administrator in, say, Dietrich, Bliss, Richfield or Wendell, you'll be acutely interested in the State Board of Education meeting scheduled for Friday in Moscow. Because what the trustees do there will have a lot to says about how - or if - small Idaho school districts can do their jobs.

Superintendent of Public Instruction Tom Luna's education reform package, passed by the Legislature and signed by Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter, has scrambled the way local school districts

get state funding.

Under the old system, a school district got paid for every day one student attended one class. No more.

In Luna's brave new world, If a student takes online courses at home, the district won't be compensated for those hours.

That's a problem. How are small districts supposed to keep the lights on the teachers paid, and still adapt to the high-tech changes being mandated by Luna's "Students Come First" initiative?

The board has only a few months to determine how many online courses will be mandated, and some members were less than pleased to hear Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter's recent pronouncement that his opening bid would be four online classes required for graduation from high school.

Not, we think, until some fundamental issues are resolved.

Average Daily Attendance, the metric that allows Idaho school districts to function, no longer makes sense in a system in which students can take online courses over which the district has no control but for which they still must pay.

What happens, for example, if all 316 students at Wendell High take four online classes? And then eight? And then 12, or 15? And as a consequence, let's say half of those students don't turn up at school two or three days a week.

That's an existential question for small Idaho school districts, and one that Luna hasn't addressed convincingly. Which means the State Board of Education must.

Luna's education reform package is a nice theory that became a law less than three months after it was proposed. Nobody, so far, has tended to the details.

The dawdlers and demagogues in Washington aren't winning the future? They're robbing it.

Make 70 the new 65

t's time for a 21st-century retirement age. If 40 is the new 20 and 50 is the new 30, why shouldn't 70 be the new 65? The last time Washington politicians tinkered ever so gingerly with the government-sanctioned retirement age, Ronald Reagan was in office and Generation X-ers were all in diapers. Since then, American life expectancy has increased by half a decade and continues to rise - while the "traditional" retirement age (established eight decades ago) has only recently begun phasing up to 67 and the official "early" retirement age (established four decades ago) remains stuck at 62.

There is simply no good reason 21st-century workers should operate under obsolete 1930s - era expectations and 1970s rules. We're living longer, working longer and, in general, holding down jobs that are far less physically taxing than those of previous generations.

The reasons we should update these relics of our teetering federal entitlement programs are myriad. Demographic, actuarial and fiscal realities demand it. As powerless blue-ribbon entitlement reform panels have warned for years, the number of younger workers supporting Social Security beneficiaries is dwindling. It's a global phenomenon. The Economist magazine reports that, based on declining fer-

tility rates, "by 2050 there will be just 2.6 American workers supporting each pensioner and the figures for France, Germany and Italy will be 1.9, 1.6 and 1.5 respectively."

This amounts to a budgetbusting wealth transfer scheme whose lousy "investments" cannot be sustained unless basic structural reforms are made. Shared sacrifice means that every able-bodied worker - including federal employees and elected officials - must get with the times. Americans can no longer feel entitled to some 20 to 30 years of subsidized retirement, often collected over the course of many more years than retirees actually spent paying into the system.

Raising the traditional and rly retirement ages will mean extending workers' taxable earning years, fueling economic growth and putting a dent in our unfundedliabilities crisis by delaying payouts. Some senior citizens' lobbying groups fret that today's workforce wouldn't be able to handle longer careers. Tell that to Betty White or Joan Rivers or Helen Mirren.

More to the point, as domestic policy analyst Andrew Biggs of the American Enterprise Institute observes, "Perhaps the best evidence that future Americans can work longer is that past Americans did: Despite poorer health, shorter lives and more strenuous jobs, in 1950 the typical individual did not claim Social Security until age 68.5. In 1950, more than 20 percent of Americans worked in physically demanding jobs; today only about 8 percent do. While today's technology-driven service economy places demands on older workers, it is hard to imagine that things were easier when Americans typically worked on farms or in factories."

At the rate we're going now, my kids and the Obamas' kids will never see a dime of what they are forced to put in. They'll already be waist-deep in the red as they enter their prime earning years. A truly modern government pension plan would follow the private sector by moving from a defined benefits plan to a defined contributions system - and by injecting free-market competition to improve

Ivory Coast warlord admits heavy toll in battle for capital

ABIDJAN, Ivory Coast -A renegade warlord who began the battle to wrest Ivory Coast's commercial capital from soldiers who fired rockets and mortars on a poor neighborhood said Sunday that a lack of military coordination cost too many lives, infrastructure damage and unnecessary looting.

Ibrahim Coulibaly, whose so-called "Invisible Commando" suddenly emerged two months ago to fight soldiers loyal to strongman Laurent Gbagbo, denied rumors his fighters might challenge the authority of the government installed at the cost of thousands of deaths and injuries.

In an exclusive interview Sunday with The Associated Press, he called himself a general, used his nickname IB, and pledged his allegiance to democratically elected President Alassane Ouattara.

"IB came to solve the problems, not create problems. IB is part of the solution," he said, adopting the campaign slogan that calls Ouattara "The Solution."

"IB wants this country to be unified," he said. "I don't understand why people say IB wants to take power from Ouattara. What lies!"

Coulibaly denied there tween the pro-Ouattara comrades from central and northern Ivory Coast descended on the capital after a lightning assault across the south of the country, but he admitted there were problems.

"If we had united, we would have been able to avoid much bloodshed there would have been fewer lives lost, less damages and looting," Coulibaly said. "Now we have many armed individuals who are out of control."

He also denied there had been a bloody shootout between his fighters and other pro-Ouattara around the state television station, creating a huge setback that delayed the liberation of the besieged commercial capital of Abidjan while Gbagbo's soldiers, militia and hired foreign mercenaries were beating Ouattara supporters to death with bricks, dousing some with fuel and burning them alive and slitting throats of others.

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





'Everyone' wants a pill for some z's

With almost a third of Americans reporting sleep problems, it's not surprising that sales of Ambien, Sonata high: It's a \$1.8 billion market.

Pharmacists filled close to 48 million prescriptions for such non-benzodiazepines or "Z drugs;" so nicknamed because most of their chemical names start with the letter Z - in 2009, according to health-care research company IMS Health. That's more than twice as many as were filled in 2002.

"Everyone is looking for something to help them sleep," said Lawrence Epstein, an instructor at Harvard Medical School and medical director of Sleep HealthCenters, a network of medical centers and clinics for people with sleep disorders.

Z drugs - Ambien was the first to reach the U.S. market, in 1992 – are less likely to cause dependency and side effects than the older generation of benzodiazepines such as Ativan and Dalmane. Both classes of drugs activate the neurotransmitter that induces sleep, the gammaaminobutyric acid (GABA) receptor complex.

But the benzodiazepines also relax muscles and reduce anxiety - effects that can be beneficial but have the potential to cause respiratory failure and other muscle-related problems. And they often left users feeling drowsy for hours after awakening.

Z drugs are more targeted; designed to activate a specific part of the GABA complex, they get you to sleep with fewer concerns about dependency and side ef-

A generic, less expensive form of Ambien (zolpidem

tartrate) went on the market and similar sleep aids are in 2005 and instantly "became a 'best-buy' drug from a safety, effectiveness and affordability point of view," said Ion Schommer, a professor at the University of Minnesota's College Pharmacy in Minneapolis. In October 2010, a generic version of Ambien CR was introduced. Generic Lunesta is expected to hit the market next year.

Most Z drugs get you to sleep in less than an hour, according to the 2008 Consumer Reports Best Buy Drugs analysis, and their effects last at least four hours. Market leaders Ambien, Ambien CR and Lunesta can sustain sleep as long as six to eight hours. Epstein said both new and old classes of sleep aids add only 20 to 30 minutes to a night's sleep, on average, but even that amount makes most people feel more rested.

If you take one of these aids, doctors recommend you go to bed immediately and allow enough time to rest. After actor John Stamos appeared to be drunk on an Australian talk show in June 2007, he said he had taken a morning dose of Ambien to help with his jet

"Now I know that Ambien is an eight-hour sleeping pill, so if you take it, you better get eight hours' sleep," Stamos told TV Guide.

The Food and Drug Administration has approved Ambien and Sonata for short-term treatment of insomnia, up to five weeks. Lunesta and Ambien CR are approved for long-term use, up to six months.

None of the Z drugs have been studied or FDA-ap-Analysts expect patients proved for use longer than short-term Band-Aid."

Sleep medications "are best used for a short-term intervention (for patients) where you can break their cycle, reset their sleep pattern and get them back on a more appropriate schedule," Epstein said.

With short-term use under the direction of a clinician, sleep aids should not cause big problems, Epstein said, but dependency and withdrawal effects remain concerns.

When patients stop taking sleeping pills, doctors say, they should do so gradually because they could experience "rebound insomnia," where their sleep problems get worse than they were before.

And patients should be aware that the most effective tactic is to attack whatever physical or emotional problems are causing sleeplessness.

"Sleeping pills are not going to cure you," said Charles Cutler, an internist in Norristown, Pa. "It's not like a shot of penicillin and you move on with your life."

"The overwhelming percent of patients with sleep disturbances have emotional concerns that are bothering them and keeping them awake," Cutler said. "There may be other things going on in your life that we have to fix."

Cutler says he feels comfortable prescribing sleep aids only when he has talked with patients about a variety of possible causes for their insomnia: an old mattress, watching television before sleep, sleep apnea, gain, financial weight strain, relationship problems, etc.

THE SCIENCE: Cinnamon is a good source of manganese, an important component of a healthful diet. It contains a substance that activates formerly inhibited insulin receptors. Garlic

USES: High cholesterol, heart disease, high blood pressure and certain types of cancer, including stomach and colon cancers. Garlic cloves can be eaten raw or cooked. They can be dried or powdered and used in tablets and capsules. Raw, the cloves can be used to make oils and liquid extracts.

THE SCIENCE: Garlic may slow the development of atherosclerosis (hardening of the arteries), and may slightly lower blood

SIDE EFFECTS: Breath and body odor, heartburn, upset stomach

Aloe vera

USES: Clear gel from the leaves is often used as a topical ointment for burns and other conditions. The green part of the leaf that surrounds the gel can be used to produce a juice or a dried substance taken orally for diabetes, asthma, epilepsy and

sions. Other uses have not been heavily researched. SIDE EFFECTS: Gel can inhibit healing of deep surgical wounds. Abdominal cramps and diarrhea have been reported with oral use, which can decrease the absorption of many drugs.

AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR THE CONSTRUCTION AND INSTALLATION OF IMPROVEMENTS TO THE DOMESTIC WATER SYSTEM OF THE CITY OF DIETRICH, IDAHO; CALLING A SPECIAL ELECTION FOR THE SUBMISSION TO THE QUALIFIED ELEC CTORS OF THE CITY THE QUE OF INCURRING AN INDEBTEDNESS AND ISSUING WATER REVENUE BONDS IN A PRINCIPAL AMOUNT NOT TO EXCEED \$2,000,000 TO PAY A PORTION OF THE COST THEREOF; ESTABLISHING THE DATE, TIME, AND PLACE OF ELECTION; PROVIDING FOR PUBLIC NOTICE OF ELECTION; PROVIDING FOR REGISTRATION OF VOTERS; PROVIDING FOR RELATED MATTERS; AND PROVIDING AN **EFFECTIVE DATE**

SHALL THE CITY OF DIETRICH BE AUTHORIZED TO INCUR AN INDEBTEDNESS AND TO ISSUE AND SELL ITS WATER REVENUE BONDS IN A PRINCIPAL AMOUNT NOT TO EXCEED \$2,000,000 TO PAY THE COSTS OF IMPROVEMENTS AND BETTERMENTS TO THE CITYICS DOMESTIC WATER SYSTEM, THE BONDS TO MATURE OVER A PERIOD WHICH MAY BE LESS THAN BUT WHICH SHALL NOT EXCEED FORTY (40) YEARS AND TO BE PAYABLE SOLELY FROM THE REVENUES OF THE DOMESTIC WATER SYSTEM, ALL AS MORE FULLY PROVIDED IN ORDINANCE NO. 2011-02, ADOPTED ON APRIL 4, 2011?

Section 5: Defines qualified electors as persons eighteen (18) years of age or older who are United States citizens who have resided in the City for at least thirty days prior to the election and who are registered as provided by law.

Section 6: Provides for registration of voters. Section 7: Provides for preparation of official ballots and sample

Section 8: Provides for publication of Notice of Special Bond

Election. Section 9: Provides for canvass of votes. Section 10: Provides for Debt Disclosure Statement pursuant to

Idaho Code § 34-439. Section 11: Provides for the issuance of water revenue bonds

maturing over a period which may be less than but which shall not exceed forty (40) years, and provides for other matters relating to the water revenue bonds.

Section 12: Authorizes the officers of the City to take appropriate actions to effectuate the provisions of this Ordinance. Section 13: Ratifies previous actions.






