Falls. Patients can walk across the Falls. Patients can walk across the
street to receive treatment and can street to receive treatment and can
stay for a reasonable price - typistay for a reasonable price - typi-
cally from $\$ 16$ to $\$ 21$ per night, de-
pending on financial need. The one- and two-bedroom
apartments along Martin apartments along Martin Street are rented from Valley House
homeless shelter, which also prohomeless shelter, which also pro-
vides transitional housing for its clients at the complex. St. Luke's will continue to rent the three units after its new Twin Falls hospital opens May 21.
But with the move comes a loss of proximity for patients, and St. Baxter said plans are in the works Baxter said plans are in the works
to build temporary housing closer to the new facility to assist patients and families who need to stay for long periods of time and need to be near hospital facilities.

Stan Crowley knows firsthand that the Fellowship Hall helps people.
He first entered its doors in 1994
to seek help in overcoming alcoto seek help in overcoming alco-
holism. It's a path familiar to other holism. It's a path familhar to other support groups each evening the modest Twin Fals building. The Fellowship Hall, open since 1987, provides space for anony-
mous support groups regardless of mous support groups regardless of the challenge their members face.
People come in battling alcohol, People come in battling alcohol,
methamphetamine, other narcotics and gambling, to name a
few. But the nonprofit has fallen on hard financial times in recent years, and its expenses have
grown. In a couple of places inside grown. In a couple of places inside
the Second Avenue building, removed ceiling tiles show where roof leaks have opened.
Crowley, now vice president of the nonprofit's board, says the estimate to fix the hall's leaky roof has been put at $\$ 25,000$. So far, the hall has raised less than $\$ 1,000$, profit isn't used to raising such large sums.

million. Their average federal income tax rate was 17 percent, down from 26 percent in 1992 .

age federal income tax rate for all
taxpayers declined to 9.3 percent from 9.9 percent The top income tax rate is 35 per-
cent, so how can people who make so much pay so little in taxes? The nation's tax laws are packed with breaks for people at every income
level. There are breaks for having level. Thildren, paying a mortgage, going chil cren, paying a mortgage, going
to college, and even for paying other taxes. Plus, the top rate on capital gains is only 15 percent.
There are so many breaks that 45 percent of U.S. households will pay no federal income tax for 2010, ac-
cording to estimates by the Tax cording to estimates by the Tax
Policy Center, a Washington think tank. "It's the fact that we are using the tax code both to collect revenue, which is its primary purpose, and to deliver these spending benefits that we run into the situation where so
many people are paying no taxes" many people are paying no taxes,"
said Roberton Williams, a senior fellow at the center, which generated the estimate of people who pay no income taxes.

FAA gives tired air traffic controllers an extra hour to rest

WASHINGTON - The government said Sunday it

trollers an extra hour of between shifts so they don't doze off at work, a
problem that stretches problem that stretches
back decades. But officials back decades. But officials
rejected the remedy that make a real difference: on-the-job napping. "On my watch, con-
trollers will not be paid to take naps. We're not going to allow that," Transporta tion
said.
That's exactly the oppo-
site of what scientists and site of what scientists and the Federal Aviation Administration's own fatigue working group say is needed after five cases disclose since late March of sleeping controlers. The latest one Saturday at a busy regional radar facility that handles high altitude air traffic for much of Florida, portions of the Atlantic Ocean and
the Caribbean Sea. Several other countries,
including Germany and Japan, permit controllers to take sleeping breaks and they provide quiet rooms with cots for that purpose. "Given the body of sci-
entific entific evidence, that deci-
sion clearly demonstrates sion clearly demonstrates
that politics remain more important than public important than pubic
safety," said Bill Voss, pres-
ident safety," said Bill Voss, pres-
ident of the Flight Safety Foundation of Alexandria, Va. "People are concerned about a political backlash if they allow controllers to
have rest periods in their have rest periods in thifts the same way firefighters and trauma physicians do."
It has been an open secret in the FAA dating to at least the early 1990s that controllers sometimes sleep on
the job. Toughest are the midnight shifts, which usually begin about 10 p.m. and end about $6 \mathrm{a} . \mathrm{m}$.

surprising if controllers cause they are trying to stay cause they are trying to stay day when the body naturally craves sleep.
Studies show that 30 percent to 50 percent of falling asleep at least once week while on the job, according to Dr. Charles Czeisler, chief of sleep
medicine at Brigham and Women's Hospital in Six of ight Six of eight present and
former controllers interviewed by The Associated Press acknowledged they briefly fell asleep while working alone at night at least once in their careers asked not to controllers because they didn't want to eopardize their jobs or the obs of colleagues.
Much more common is they said. On midnight hifts, one controller will work two positions while the other one sleeps and trollers said. The unsanctoned arrangements sometimes allow con-
trollers to sleep as much as three hours or four hours out of an eight-hour shift,
