Otter swaps health care block

Gov. trades nullification bill for his own executive order

Wednesday vetoed a bill legislators passed to prevent the federal health care overhaul from taking root in Idaho, opting instead to issue his own order to block "Obamacare."

Otter, a vocal opponent of the federal health care changes, issued an executive order that prevents

state agencies from putting the federal agencies in that effort. His Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter on order also bars the state from refederal Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act.

"No one has opposed Obamacare more vehemently than me," Otter wrote in his veto letter. "I truly believe the insurance mandate is an unconstitutional overreach by Congress and the President."

Unlike the vetoed bill, Otter's new program in place or aiding order will allow the state to continue working on a state health insurance exchange. Otter said that's ceiving federal money tied to the crucial to prevent the federal government from controlling the state's insurance market and setting up a separate exchange in Idaho.

Idaho has a deadline of Jan. 1, 2013, to show to the federal government that it can implement an exchange in 2014.



Regional jail: A real possibility?

Talks emerge for joint jail between Twin Falls and Gooding counties

By Nick Coltrain Times-News writer

Representatives from Twin Falls and Gooding counties discussed the possibility of working toward a jointly operated jail Tuesday, though talks are so preliminary that only more meetings are guaranteed to come from them. Jerome County representatives were also invited but did not attend Tuesday's meeting, Gooding County Sheriff Shaun Gough said. Jerome County Sheriff Doug McFall said a Twin Falls-Gooding jail wouldn't solve his county's problem of a decaying jail. Gough said he hopes for a jail that will address his county's problem of operating an outdated facility that requires double the manpower of more modern facilities. He said it could also help Twin Falls County with its overflow problem. But that's provided a jointly operated jail, currently suggested to be located in Wendell, is financially feasible, he said. The next meeting between the counties should produce more substantial cost estimates, he said.

BOISE (AP) - A 31-yearold Middleton woman has been sentenced for her role in stealing \$177,000 from a nonprofit agency that operates drug and alcohol treatment centers.

Bobbi A. George was ordered to serve five years of probation for wire fraud and pay more than \$230,000 in restitution to the Port of Hope Centers office in Nampa. George must also serve six weekends in jail, eight months of home detention and perform 100 hours of community service.

George's mother, 55year-old Connie Stills, has pleaded guilty to mail fraud for her role in the scheme. She is scheduled to be sentenced in June.

George and Stills each worked for Port of Hope, which until 2008 operated a center in Twin Falls. Prosecutors alleged they diverted money between 2004 and 2008 from the nonprofit's account to George's personal credit card and banking account.

"That's going to bring the water level up in the Big Wood River as it flows through Lincoln and Gooding counties, but these levels aren't going to be very high," Breidenbach said.

And those discharges aren't expected to reach the levels of flooding seen in 2006, he said, adding that preparation is key.

"If you have property along the Big Wood River, you should prepare for some higher water levels," he said. "Just move things back and you should be OK."

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Former Buhl youth pastor held in La. for alleged child sex crimes

A former youth pastor at Buhl's Calvary Assembly of God has been accused in 2006, Golatt was ar-Louisiana of committing rested more than 60 felony sex crimes against children.

Angelo Deboray "Doogie" Golatt, a youth pastor at the Buhl church in 2006, faces 50 counts of aggravated rape, six counts of juvenile molestation, four counts sexual battery and two counts attempted aggravated rape. His alleged crimes happened between 2003 and 2007.

Golatt, 28, has been held in Louisiana's Rapides Parish Jail on \$480,000 bond since his March 29 arrest.

In Louisiana, aggravated participating in sexual intercourse with a victim vounger

than 13 years old, and is punishable by the death penalty or life in prison.

December In in Ierome County on two counts of sexual abuse/exploitation of

a vulnerable adult, and later Steven Phillips told the pleaded guilty to a reduced *Times-News* that all alleged charge. Jerome battery County Sheriff's Detective Rick Cowen said the sheriff's department issued a warrant for Golatt's arrest in September 2007 for a misdemeanor probation violation. Since the violation isn't a felony, the department couldn't extradite Golatt once he moved to Louisiana.

Cowen said he is aware of Golatt, but said no allegations have been made against when Golatt worked there,

him locally.

"If there are victims or people out there with information, we urge them to contact the department," Cowen said

Golatt Rapides Parish Sheriff's Detective victims are males between the ages of 9 and 19, who knew Golatt from his time working as a youth leader for the Donahue Family Church in Pineville, La.

Phillips said the charges have not yet been turned over to the parish's prosecuting attorney because the investigation is ongoing.

Shoshone awards bid to seal leaky roof

SHOSHONE – Small fixes loomed large at Shoshone's Tuesday City Council meet-

"When it heats off, it kind of sloughs off the side there, the metal cap," City Clerk Mary Kay Bennett said.

Otter puts Idahoans ahead of ideology

ear the end of a political career spent showing the federal government where to get off, Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter did something surprising on Wednesday.

He vetoed a bill to block portions of the year-old federal health insurance overhaul in the state.

Otter, a Republican, said that while he's among the strongest opponents of national health care, legislation approved in the 2011 session would require Idaho to forego the creation of an insurance exchange.

That, he explained, could open the door for the feds to step in and develop the system.

governor in the country to sign a law requiring his state to sue over the federal health overhaul, branding it a government overreach. But on Wednesday, Otter effectively offered up a smokescreen by issuing an executive order to prohibit Idaho from implementing the health care law while still allowing the state to develop its own "health care solutions."

In case you don't recognize it, that's a figleaf. The Legislature considered and then rejected a sterner measure during the just-adjourned session to declare the 2010 national health care law "null and void." To do so, Attorney General Lawrence Wasden warned, would be unconstitutional. Opponents ar-

gued the bill could slash millions of dollars worth of federal benefits to Idahoans who receive Medicare and Medicaid.

Instead, lawmakers passed a watered-down bill barring state employees from cooperating in the health care reform law. That meant little, except potentially excluding Idahoans from benefits the rest of America will enjoy.

Legislators were full of sound and fury the past few months, oftentimes signifying little. "Nullification light," as the bill Otter vetoed was dubbed, was a prime example. But that would have hurt Idahoans. Good for the governor for putting their interests ahead of political posturing.

Air-traffic snoozers risk sky-hopping wakeup

S ome mistakes are such doozies, with conse-quences so serious, that the only honorable thing for the perpetrator to do is own up, resign and make amends. In Washington, that rarely happens.



6,600 mislabeled or unmarked graves at Arlington National Cemetery, and the closest thing to accountability so far is that two cemetery officials were allowed to retire. In January and again in April, a controller at Seat tle's King County International Airport dozed off a total of three times, twice during the same shift. At Reno-Tahoe International Airport in Nevada, an airborne am-



Five myths about why women earn less than men

his year, Equal Pay Day fell on April 12, meaning that women had to work nearly three and a half additional months into 2011 to earn what men earned in 2010. If these extra 102 days of work are extended over 40 years – about how long people will work between schooling and retirement - women need to work more than 11 additional years to earn as much as men. Since the establishment of Equal Pay Day 15 years ago, the gap has barely budged, with women making between 74 percent and 77 percent of what the guys earn. To understand this injustice, let's first dispense with some of the misconceptions about why guys get bigger paychecks.

1. Women earn less because they enter low-paying fields and become moms.

While it's true that men tend to enter higher-paying fields than women, that difference alone does not explain the gender wage gap. Even when they work in the same occupations, men earn more. For instance, the median weekly salary for full-time male pharmacists was \$1,954 in 2009, compared to \$1,475 for female pharmacists, according to the Institute for Women's Policy Research. And men even earn more than women in traditionally femaledominated occupations. For example, full-time female registered nurses earned an average of \$1,035 per week, whereas men earned \$1,090 – or an extra \$2,860 per year.

2. The wage gap is not an issue for today's young women.

Young women today have opportunities their mothers and grandmothers never had and they are seizing them - women are now



more likely than men to attend and to graduate from college, while Census data analyzed by the New Yorkbased Reach Advisors suggests that childless, nevermarried women in their 20s out-earn their male peers in some major metropolitan areas.

3. The "he-cession" reduced the pay gap between men and women.

Men were hit first by the recession, as the construction industry received the first blow. But as the downturn continued to unfold, the service sector (which employs 20 percent of all female workers and 13 percent of male workers) was hit hard. In addition, as states made drastic cuts to their budgets, jobs in education and public services which employ more women than men – have also faced drastic cuts.

Women also did not fare well during the mortgage meltdown because they were more likely than men to be targeted by predatory lenders and consequently to have subprime loans. The Consumer Federation of America found that at every income level, women were more likely to receive subprime loans than men. Women of color were especially disadvantaged.

4. Only sexist employers discriminate against women.

Pay discrimination is not necessarily the result of sexist beliefs. In fact, discrimination is often carried out by well-meaning people who are not even aware of it. All of us are affected by unconscious biases that affect how we evaluate men and women's expertise and skills. In a famous study of symphony auditions, economists Claudia Goldin and Cecilia Rouse found that women musicians were more likely to be hired or promoted when they auditioned behind a screen so that judges could not know whether they were a man or woman. Were those evaluating musical talent sexist? More likely they were simply succumbing to unconscious biases. Since then, numerous studies have shown that even with identical resumes and qualifications, men are viewed more favorably than women. 5. Closing the wage gap

will create economic equality between women and men.

Wealth – the value of your assets minus your debts – is a much more comprehensive and accurate way to measure a person's economic well-being than income. Regardless of how high one's income is,

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without wealth people are a paycheck away from economic disaster. Perhaps not surprisingly, single women have less than half of the wealth of single men.

Even if men and women had the same incomes. women would have less wealth for two reasons. First, women are more likely to be single parents and have to support more people on one income, leaving less left over to save and invest. Second, women are still less likely than men to work in jobs that come with fringe benefits - such as employer-sponsored retirement plans, subsidized health insurance and paid sick days - that either put wealth in people's hands directly or provide things that people would otherwise have to pay for themselves.

Oil, gas on the rise, but will it continue?

Price is supposed to be based on supply and demand but speculation of disaster in the Middle East is pushing fuel prices higher and higher.

Over the last month, the cost for a gallon of regular unleaded has risen \$0.24, in Idaho, now sitting at \$3.68.

Idaho and U.S. gas prices continue to rise, the result of a bullish market where investment dollars and future uncertainty in the Middle East and Northern Africa have overshadowed supply and demand fundamentals, according to AAA Idaho.

Fuel in the Gem State remains well below the \$3.84 average U.S. price, but both represent sizable increases of 16 cents and 18 cents, respectively, since just April 1, the travel organization said.

"Headline grabbing events in the Middle East and Northern Africa have led investors to bet heavily that an investment in crude oil will be a profitable one as oil prices move higher," said AAA Idaho Director of Public and Government Affairs Dave Carlson. "But these same investors are overlooking evidence that demand is down and that supplies worldwide are adequate."

30 percent, or \$26.59, in just seven weeks, despite demand actually decreasing over the same period.

A report from SpendingPulse showed domestic gasoline demand for the previous week was down 1.8 percent week-on-week and 3 percent versus the same week in 2010, raising questions about a Department of Energy report that showed a drawdown of

7 million barrels of gasoline stocks. And an increase in interest rates in China and a declaration by an OPEC official on Monday that crude oil market is oversupplied may signal a change in investment behavior.

"Though it may not be likely that market sentiments will switch from bullish to bearish overnight, it does suggest that there may be some light at the end of the tunnel for Investment dollars and future uncertainty motorists who are tired of seeing gasoline have driven crude oil prices up about prices move higher every day," Carlson said.

Diesel continues to be more expensive as well. In Twin Falls diesel price is now at \$4.27 a gallon, up from \$3.22 a year ago.

Carlson said that AAA has been told by the Oil Price Information System that diesel produced in the U.S. makes its way to Europe where most of the vehicles use diesel, and there's an even bigger profit motive.

"If that's true, that would mean that tight supplies here in the U.S. would warrant higher prices here. A year ago, diesel in the U.S. was priced at \$3.06; diesel in Idaho was priced at \$3.22 a year ago," Carlson said.

Prices remain below the historic July 19, 2008 high of \$4.16 a gallon for regular unleaded and \$4.85 for a gallon of diesel but that doesn't make paying for it now any less painful.

INL to lay off 50 armor makers

IDAHO FALLS – Idaho National Laboratory officials say about 50 of the lab's armor-making workers will be laid off by September 2012 because the U.S. Army doesn't need as much tank armor.

INL's human resources director Mark Holubar said the laboratory will continue making armor for the Abrams tanks, but the Army isn't ordering as much of it.

Deputy Laboratory Director for Management Juan Alvarez says more layoffs across the laboratory may come. Alvarez says the current fiscal mood among lawmakers means the lab will have to do more with less, and that means personnel cuts may be necessary.

Idaho phone companies appeal lawsuit

BOISE - A consortium of Idaho telephone companies is asking the state's highest court to revive its lawsuit against the Idaho Department of Administration, Qwest Communications Co. and others.

The consortium Syringa Networks sued the state in 2009 claiming the Department of Administration illegally handed Qwest a \$60 million contract to install the broadband infrastructure for the Idaho Education Network, a project to link public schools, universities and businesses in Idaho.

But last month Ada County 4th District Judge Patrick Owen dismissed Syringa's lawsuit, finding in part that the consortium failed to file an administrative appeal of the state's contract decision before it sued.

Now Syringa Networks is asking the Idaho Supreme Court to decide if it was legally required to exhaust all administrative remedies before turning to the courts.



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

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

CALIFORNIA Obama calls GOP Medicare plan radical but predicts accord on deficits

PALO ALTO - President Barack Obama said Wednesday that congressional Republicans are pushing a radical plan to trim Medicare and Medicaid, ramping up the rhetoric as he and Congress approach crucial decisions on spending and the nation's debt.

"I think it's fair to say that their vision is radical," Obama told a town hall gathering at the headquarters of Facebook, the huge social network company.

"I don't think it's particularly courageous," he said of the GOP plan to convert Medicare to a voucher program and make big cuts to the federal-state Medicaid program for the poor.

"Nothing is easier than solving a problem on the backs of people who are poor, or people who are powerless, or don't have lobbyists, or don't have clout," Obama said.

Other Democrats have called the GOP plan radical, but the president generally has used less pungent language. Even as he sharply criticized the Republicans' spending proposals Wednesday, he said he believes the two parties can reach an accord on long-range plans to cut deficits by about \$4 trillion over the next decade.

LOUISIANA One year after the BP oil spill disaster: A day of remembrance dawns on the Gulf Coast

NEW ORLEANS - Relatives flew over Gulf of Mexico waters on Nednesday where 11 oil rig workers died a year ago, residents gathered in quiet prayer vigils onshore and President Barack Obama vowed to hold BP and others accountable for "the painful losses that they've caused." Somber remembrances marked the one-year anniversary of the rig explosion that caused the worst offshore oil spill in American history. But all is not bleak. Beaches, restaurants and hotels are filling up again, and experts say the resilient Gulf is on the mend. The disaster began on the night of April 20, 2010, when the Deepwater Horizon rig burst into flames and killed the 11 men. The rest of the crew evacuated, but two days later the rig toppled into the Gulf and sank to the sea floor. Over the next 85 days, 206 million gallons of oil - 19 times more than the Exxon Valdez spilled - spewed from the well.

The government has blocked U.S. gamblers from logging on to the offshore sites, which are accused of tricking and bribing banks into processing billions of dollars in illegal profits. Now gamblers who dreamed of enormous prizes in Las Vegas, or even used online poker to make a living, can't access online bankrolls that in some cases reach six figures.



HAGERMAN - If you're doubting that spring has sprung, try driving the Thousand Springs Byway.

Green and white are currently the colors of choice along this 67-mile stretch of roadway that takes passersby through open rangeland, lush farmland and, of course, the Thousand Springs.

The green farmlands and white waterfalls are what stood out in my mind during a recent drive. But in some places purple, white and yellow flowers grabbed my attention.

The best thing about the byway is that it's not just a drive. There are a number of places to stop and recreate along this stretch that goes from about Buhl to Bliss.

Nestled in the backcountry near the Hagerman Wildlife Management Area are two fish hatcheries: the Hagerman State Fish Hatchery and the Hagerman National Fish Hatchery.

Currently, nearly 1.4 million steelhead are being raised in the national hatchery, said project leader Bryan Kenworthy. The site has 66 raceways where the fish grow before being released into the wild.

The state hatchery, located near Riley's Pond, also grows trout and offers a show pond where visitors can view golden trout, rainbow trout, tiger muskie and sturgeon. For the price of a quarter, you can purchase food to feed to the fish.

Today, a number of fossils are still embedded in the banks of the Snake River and give a glimpse to what life might have been like before the Ice Age.

There's also a must-see visitors center in downtown Hagerman, where you can see a replica of the skeletal remains of the famous horse and other fossils retrieved from the area.

View a waterfall

You likely won't see thousands of springs at Thousand Springs State Park, an area that offers an abundance of waterfalls along the Snake River Canyon, but it's an impressive stop nonetheless.

Water from the springs comes from the Snake River Plains Aquifer, one of the largest groundwater systems in the world. Water travels hundreds of miles under southern Idaho's porous volcanic rock and emerges from the springs into the cliffs, where it then cascades to the river below.

Beginning Monday, a waterfall will pour near the cliffs above the Idaho Power plant, creating flows of 300 feet per second. The marvel only happens every four years for just a few days, but this time people will be able to view the waterfall until about October as the power company does construction work at its Hagerman plant.

The best place to view the waterfall is from lookout points along U.S. Highway 30.

WARSAW, Mo. - It had been two hours since Steve Liles started jerking a heavy weight and three big treble hooks through the murky water of Lake of the Ozarks, and he was starting to feel the pain.

"This will make an old man out of you," joked Liles, 43. "This paddlefish snagging is work.

"I'm spoiled. I'm used to fishing for crappies. This is a little different than that."

A fishing rod as stiff as a pool cue, 100-pound test line, 16-ounce sinkers, 10-ought hooks - veah. that's a little different than the ultralight equipment Liles uses for crappies.

When you're going after the biggest fish in the lake, you don't go to battle with a switch and a prayer.

Try fishing with that stuff all day. You too will feel the pain.

But it's worth it, Liles will tell you. When you go snagging at this time of the year at Lake of the Ozarks, there's always a chance of hooking into a giant.

"It's like looking for a needle in a haystack," Liles said. "But they're out there.



"I told her, 'If you want to be a spoonbill snagger, you have to reel in your own fish? She did and it weighed 72 pounds.

Now Liles and his friend, Albert Bailey, who both live in Peculiar, were looking for a fish like that. And about two hours into the trip, they found one.

As Liles maneuvered his boat through an armada of other snaggers Wednesday morning, he felt his line come to an abrupt stop. He was snagged - and on something other than a gaff, then hooked the mon-

stump, rock or brush pile.

The braided line raced out of the reel as the giant made a run, and Liles held on. He and the fish played tug-ofwar for a few seconds, but eventually Liles got the upper hand.

He looked down to see a giant gray creature slowly float to the surface, and he got excited.

"That's a good one," he said to Bailey. "We've got to get it in the boat."

in, Liles finally exhaled and celebrated the moment.

"We don't have a scale, but I'm guessing that fish will go 60, 65 pounds," he said. "That's what we came out here for."

Moments later, Bailey also snagged a paddlefish, though it was much smaller than the first.

"You measure mine in inches, not in pounds," Bailey said with a laugh.

Still, the two fishermen went home with plenty of meat for future fish fries, and memories of another successful snagging trip.

They are two of many who look forward to April, when the Missouri paddlefish snagging season is in full swing. Thousands of fishermen descend on Lake of the Ozarks, Truman and Table Rock lakes and their tributaries in search of the fish of a fish like this live in our lifetime.

They keep chiropractors in business. They spend long, back-wrenching hours Bailey scrambled for a trying to snag into one of the monsters.

But the lure - the dream of catching a fish almost as big as some humans keeps them coming back.

The Missouri state record is 139 pounds, 4 ounces, a fish snagged at Table Rock in 2002. But each year, a few fish in the 100-pound class are caught.

Bailey came close to that mark years ago when he snagged a 90-pound paddlefish on the Osage River at Taberville, Mo.

"I've been snagging in this area before Truman Lake was even built," he said. "My dad and I would come down here and snag off the bank when this was just a river.

"We'd catch some big fish. But there still are big fish out there."

On Wednesday, many fishermen had paddlefish tied to the side of their boat, a snagger's status symbol.

"It's hard to believe that reservoirs," Liles said. "I think that's why this spoonbill snagging is so popular.

"You have a chance of catching a giant."

n these inflationary times, everyone is looking for a bargain. If you're a dedicated shooter, there is no greater value for your shrinking dollar than today's versatility king, the humble .22 rimfire.

Like any true classic, the .22 rimfire's virtues have only improved during its 120-plus years of existence. Here's what the various it erations of the .22 casing has to offer.

Short and CB short

This cartridge features the shortest casing and the lightest bullet of the breed. It also shares the distinction of being the oldest metallic cartridge still being commercially loaded today.

The 22 Short served as the original chambering in Smith & Wesson's introductory pocket revolver, the model No. 1, and was marshaled by some Union soldiers. Nowadays, loaded with the traditional lead round nose bullet, the 22 Short is favored by international and Olympic rapidfire pistol competitors for its low recoil and report and premium accuracy.

These same traits make the 22 Short CB (conical ball) ideal for introducing fledgling shooters to the sport. Each of my daughters and stepdaughters were introduced to the joys of plinking with the same Marlin single shot rifle, Ruger Single Six revolver, and a hefty supply of 22 Short ammo.

The lowly 22 CB Short really comes into its own as a pest eliminator, particularly in crowded suburban set-



tings. One friend loves the 22 CBs for zapping trapped weasels, skunks and feral cats intent on raiding his pigeon coops.

22 Long Rifle

This is easily the best selling cartridge in the world today. Practically every type of rifle, pistol and revolver has or is currently being chambered for this worthy round. By varying the powder charge, bullet weight and style, the 22 LR can metamorphose into an efficient target, standard velocity, high velocity and even hypervelocity round.

The target loads are pricey, specialty ammo loaded to subsonic velocities (below the speed of sound) and tailored to keep their waxed lead bullets in the X-ring.

Innovative Subsonic 22LR ammo is becoming increasingly popular with small game hunters wanting to enhance the accuracy and minimize the game-alerting muzzle blast of their hunting rifles. It also maximizes the efficiency of today's sporting and military muzzle suppressors.

The biggest sellers are the standard and high-velocity rounds, particularly those marketed in the bulk or value packs. Their 36-40 gr lead or plated bullets are offered in round nose or hollow point form, with the high-velocity hollow points providing the best performance for anchoring small game.

For maximum clout in the field or for personal defense, many shooters lock/load the hypervelocity rounds, typified by CCI's Stinger and Quik-Shot, Remington's Yellow Jacket, and Mexico's Aquila Super Maximum.

Although the prices just rose slightly, a bulk pack of 500-550 rounds can be had for less than \$20. That's a lot of bang for one Andrew Jackson.

My personal favorite for hunting and plinking is Federal's Champion Value Pack. hotmail.com.

They are wonderfully accurate, deadly on small game, and seem to have fewer misfires than most other brands.

This weekend, why not dust off the ole 22, load the kids in the car, buy a recession-busting bulk pack of 22s and enjoy the uniquely American freedom of plinking the afternoon away. As Ted Nugent reminds us, "You can't do this in France!"

Guide finds high-water walleyes

ON THE MISSISSIPPI RIVER, Minn. – Last week. amid warnings of floods and impending floods, Dick "The Griz" Grzywinski backed his john boat toward this very flush river near Red Wing, Minn. The launch ramp itself was invisible, swamped.

"I've never seen the river this high," Griz said.

Then he dumped his boat into the Mississippi, essentially launching it from a parking lot.

This would be the second day in a row Griz was on the big river. Wednesday near Red Wing, Minn., he and a friend boated 83 walleyes and sauger. The biggest walleye weighed a hefty $4^{1/2}$ pounds, the largest sauger was a pound more. The latter was a relative monster: The Minnesota record sauger is 6.275 pounds.

"There's a lot of water in the river right now, and a lot of current," Griz said as he angled his boat into midstream. "But the fish are biting."

The river bore no obvious boundaries. Trees that once grew from high ground were wrapped in waves of current. Docks floated helter-skelter with both ends in deep water. And river shacks stood meekly, as if fearing inundation, water rising all around them, seemingly by the minute.

Griz took all of this in: the gauzy clouds that framed a sun that shone brightly in a cobalt sky; the temperature that was headed toward the middle 60s; the slight wind from the southwest.

Then he gunned his outboard, and said, "Better'n sittin' at home."

Which it was, and by the time Griz settled his big john along a juncture of current seams, anything we

He's been doing it since he was a kid, growing up poor on St. Paul's East Side, fishing first on the St. Croix, then the Mississippi. A Huck Finn type, in grade school on pleasant spring days he simply walked out the door and hitchhiked to the nearest moving water.

Casting from shore until dark, he later thumbed it home, a stringer of fish in tow.

"Griz, you gettin' 'em?"

Fish with Griz virtually anywhere in Minnesota, and all day, every day, you hear this question from anglers in nearby boats. Of whom there usually are plenty. With his shock of silver-black hair and trademark beard, he's easy to spot at the tiller of an outboard.

Some of these fishermen watch him from a distance, through binocular, trying to steal Griz's methods. Others virtually tie up alongside him, thinking where he fishes is his secret.

Which it is, partly. But there's more.

Griz rigs his minnows, for example, with a surgeon's precision, impaling them exactly the same way every time. And his jigging method is unique.

Which is why he catches so many fish - sometimes in summer on the Mississippi in a single day a dozen or more walleves over 10 pounds, all released.

Spinner baits offer old school fun, even for veteran anglers

DALLAS - Two weeks ago, when the weather was pretty much ideal for shallow-water bass, I tied on an \$8 spinner bait, turned the trolling motor on and started covering water. The fish responded even better than I expected.

Spinner baits were once my favorite bass lure, but these days I usually select a slow-moving plastic worm or lizard. Those require less effort than a spinner bait, which must be constantly retrieved.

Two weeks ago, I remembered how much fun a spinner bait can be. The fish slammed that high-dollar lure so hard that they managed to bend the stainless steel wire shaft, causing the lure to spin erratically on retrieve. That made me a little mad until I considered how many fish I'd already caught. Then I clipped the bangedup lure off my line, tied on another one just like it and got the same result.

At one point, I'd pulled into a spot that always seems to produce fish and was plumbing the depths with a plastic lizard when I noticed schools of bass frv. fish that were hatched just weeks ago.

In schools numbering in the hundreds, the tiny fish were moving cautiously through dense cover right next to the bank. As I watched, a school of fry venimmediately paid the price when a three-pounder crashed through their midst.

I laid down the lizard, picked up the spinner bait and caught five bass in 10 casts. The shimmering fry and their nervous skittering resembled the flash of the spinner bait blades, and I

USING A SPINNER BAIT

Here are some tips to improve your spinner bait fishing beyond the idiot realm: Use a lure with tandem blades for fishing in the shallows. Single spinner lures are generally used for slower retrieves in deeper water.

Elongated, willow leaf blades work best around grassy cover because they don't hang up as readily. A more oval Colorado or Indiana blade creates more vibration.

The pulse of a good spinner bait can be felt through the rod. If the spinner becomes misaligned, it's not effective. If you can't feel the pulse, jerk on

If you're getting bites without catching the fish, add a trailer

The problem with an H&H was that it had two hooks that the angler was required to attach. In a hurry when the fish were biting, I'd sometimes put the hooks on upside down. I even forgot the hooks one day. Assembled properly, those dual hooks caught fish like crazy, but they also caught any bush they came in contact with.

Sam Rayburn was new and full of brush. I was fishing from the bank and had no way to retrieve a snagged lure. I would have caught a lot more fish had I not been afraid to cast near the visible cover.

Surgery declined for senior – should she get 2nd opinion?

DEAR DR. GOTT: I have reached my 79th birthday and have been diagnosed with pelvic prolapse, affecting mostly my bladder. However, my OB-GYN describes it as bladder, bowel and cervix. Owing to my heart skipping occasionally, I went through an EKG and all stress tests and blood testing preparing me for surgery. I was given approval for the surgery until my OB-GYN told me that she would not perform the necessary surgery as it would be a long procedure and she didn't want to put my body through that much stress.

A pessary was ruled out because it did not work for



me. So, for the time being, I have decided to live with the situation but am now asking your advice on whether I should get a second opinion or do nothing? What problems do you think I would encounter later on? It is not that easy to talk about, but in doing so, I find it is not all that uncommon.

DEAR READER: Pelvic prolapse is a weakening of the muscles and ligaments of the pelvic organs with the end result being that the organs slip downward out of their normal position. As you have determined, this is a rather common condition that affects almost 50 percent of all women who have had children.

Symptoms include loss of bladder and bowel control, an increased sensation of urgency to urinate with a sensation of being unable to fully empty the bladder, repeat infections and excessive vaginal discharge.

To document the diagnosis, there are bladder-function tests plus pelvic floor strength tests, ultrasound, MRI or cystoscopy.

Because there are several

types of prolapse, I will explain them briefly. If the anterior vaginal wall and bladder fall, the condition is known as a cystocele. If the posterior vaginal wall and rectum fall, the condition is known as a rectocele. If the uterus falls, a person has uterine prolapse. Small bowel protrusion through an area between the vagina and rectum is an enterocele.

Initial treatment might begin with medication. For example, menopause causes a decrease in estrogen levels in a woman's body that results in a weakening of vaginal muscles. Estrogen-replacement therapy can restrengthen those muscles;

however, this therapy is not appropriate for all women. That decision must be left to each patient's primary-care physician or gynecologist.

The next step might be physical therapy to include either biofeedback or electrical stimulation - then surgery. The procedure depends on what specific type of prolapse a person has.

I don't know your full medical history and can only suggest you return to your surgeon with a list of questions. Bring a trusted family member with you who might have a different perspective on the situation. Ask why the doctor has chosen not to perform the procedure after all

your testing. Perhaps she found something in the test results that she failed to share with you. Then, if you remain dissatisfied, ask for a referral to another specialist for a second opinion. Bring all your test results when you go. He or she will either agree with the first doctor, or will feel your quality of life is compromised enough that the procedure should be performed.



At the Gold Coast Tournament in Australia last year, the quarterfinal teams match between a Polish squad and the Australian Ju-niors squad led by Barry Goren of the United States was dead level with one deal to go. At one table the Poles played in

four no-trump, while the Goren team played in five clubs. You would not fancy the Goren team's equity here, would you? If the notrump game made, the Polish team would gain at least an IMP and win the match. In four notrump the Polish declarer (North) won the heart lead and tested clubs. Then he followed the perfectly sensible but disastrous line of taking two diamond finesses against the 10 and queen. Since West had shifted to spades rather than continuing hearts at trick three, the defenders beat the

game by only one trick. Thus the fate of five clubs would determine the need for overtime. Andy Hung finessed the heart at trick one, won the heart return, and played three rounds of diamonds at once, ruffing low when the queen appeared.

Now came the top trump from dummy, but it was plain sailing from here on. Two rounds of hearts stood up, then came the spade ace and a spade ruff, followed by the fourth diamond, ruffed by West and overruffed by dummy. In the three-card ending, declarer led a plain card from dummy and ruffed it low. West could overruff, but then had to lead into the trump tenace at trick 12 to concede the contract.





DEAR ABBY: "Heartbroken" should invite Isaac and his parents over to see Layla with their own eyes so they can understand the extent of the dog's injuries. Isaac needs to learn that if he hurts another living creature, there will be consequences. Because his parents missed teaching their son this lesson, "Heartbroken" should do it. Childhood is not about being protected from essential life lessons; it's a time to learn how to become caring, responsible adults.

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
