## Fish & Wildlife’s wolf man retiring after 23 years

Point man for recovery found wolves boring, humans fascinating

HELENA, Mont. — Ed Bangs, who for 23 years led the effort to reintroduce and recover healthy wolf populations in the northern Rocky Mountains, is retiring from the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service in June.

As the federal agency’s wolf recovery coordinator, Bangs was the face of the polarizing wolf reintroduction, conducting thousands of international, national, state and local interviews and holding hundreds of highly charged meetings, all to explain the effort as part of a

massive public outreach effort. At various times, depending on the stage of the reintroduction, he was heralded as a hero while simultaneously being denounced as a wolf lover or hater, depending on people’s perspective.

Yet somehow he managed to charm many on both sides of the wolf wars, with a mix of humor tinged with a reputation for fairness.

“He would get in front of a group trying to ridicule and criticize him, and Ed would beat them to the punch,” recalled Carter Niemeyer, a former Wildlife Services supervisor who worked closely with Bangs for decades. “One time, we were in Grangeville, Idaho, in front of a hostile crowd, with one guy leading the charge. He said ‘Tell me what the hell good the blanked-blank wolves ever did.’ Ed chimed

up and said ‘They gave me this cushy job’ and the whole audience cracked up. The man got up and left because he was so angry.”

### Carpet work to disrupt some services for 2 months

On its own, the carpet in the Twin Falls Public Library doesn’t look like it’s been the path for two decades worth of knowledge seekers and patrons.

But when the new carpet — a style appropriately titled “Hit the

Books” — is held up against it, you see that the current carpet doesn’t accent the shelves and books in a way that makes them pop, at least not the way its replacement does.

The library staff hopes that vibrancy will have at least a subconscious effect on patrons, even if it means about two months of disruptions beginning after normal

library hours on Friday.

“The current carpet has actually held up very, very well,” said Erica Littlefield, the library’s youth services supervisor and member of the carpet committee. “But this new carpet will just give the library a whole new look.”

## They’re not guys: New gear to fit female soldiers

WASHINGTON — Throughout history, military gear has been made with the male physique in mind. But for women in today’s combat or close-to-combat jobs, that can mean body armor that fits so poorly it’s tough to fire a weapon, combat uniforms with knee pads that hit around mid-shin and flight suits that make it nearly impossible to urinate while in a plane.

With women taking on new roles, the issue is getting fresh attention from the military.

Seven hundred female Army

troops are testing a new combat uniform for women with shorter sleeves and with knee pads in the right place for their generally shorter legs. A committee on women’s issues has recommended that flight suits be redesigned for both men and women so it’s unnecessary to disrobe before urinating. And engineers have been looking at ways to design armor that better fits the contours of a woman’s body.

Some military women are reluctant to embrace changes that would set them apart from their male colleagues, but several said in interviews that the changes beat the consequences of the cur-

rent one-piece flight suits or being unable to engage in battle or defend themselves because of uncooperative gear.

Female troops are about 20 per-

cent more likely than their male counterparts to report musculoskeletal disorders, and poorly fitting body armor could be a factor. For female aviators, dehydration can be a hazard if they opt not to drink water before flights, and those who wait too long to use the bathroom can experience urinary problems.

Some of the challenges for women came up in focus groups conducted with both male and female service members. A majority of them reported that equipment given to females was inadequate, “including, but not limited to poor

## CSI renews request for student apartments

Twin Falls council to also consider downtown market

The College of Southern Idaho will again seek approval for a student apartment complex east of its campus at the Twin Falls City Council meeting tonight.

The Twin Falls Planning and Zoning Commission unanimously recommended last month that the city deny the request because the commission felt the proposed complex would negatively impact neighboring subdivisions.

Several potential neighbors testified against CSI’s apartment complex, saying they were worried about extra traffic, loss of privacy due to top-floor tenants looking over backyard walls, and additional light and sound pollution.

CSI is proposing a 40-unit low-cost complex to meet the growing need for student housing. The plans would allow for a second 40-unit complex in the future, if demand for it occurs. CSI Vice President for Administration Mike Mason estimated the first complex would cost about \$4.7 million and could be completed by spring 2012.

Also on the council’s agenda:

- A presentation by local legislators on the 2011 legislative session.
- A special events application from downtown consultant Mark Rivers for a Friday Night Market on Main Avenue. The proposed market would run every Friday evening from May 6 through Oct. 28.

The initial proposal expects mostly food vendors, live music and children’s activities. No alcohol is planned for initial markets, though that may change for future events, according to a city staff report.

quality or outdated equipment, lack of necessary equipment and equipment not sized or designed for women,” according to a 2009 report by the Defense Department Advisory Committee on Women in the Services. The report noted that the problems weren’t always confined to women.

“When your gear doesn’t fit right, it’s going to make you more vulnerable and less effective,” said Spc. Chandra Banks, 27, an Army reservist who has done two tours in Iraq and now works as a research fellow for the nonprofit Iraq and Afghanistan Veterans of America.

Banks said she noticed improvements in her body armor during her second deployment, but because the armor was so large it still chafed her hips when she had to sit for hours in a Humvee, and its unevenly distributed weight aggravated a knee injury. She said better-fitting body armor would also make it easier to position a rifle or machine gun for shooting.

In January, the congressionally appointed Military Leadership Diversity Commission recommended to Congress and President Barack Obama that women be allowed to fully serve in combat. The reality, however, is that women already are serving in war zones in positions such as truck drivers and helicopter pilots. About 14 percent of all service members are women, and about 220,000 women have gone to the wars in Iraq and Afghanistan.

The Army is well under way in developing a woman’s combat uniform that would replace the “unisex” one designed primarily for a man’s body. It is similar to combat uniforms in women’s sizes offered by the Air Force and Marines. The Army Uniform Board will vote this fall on whether to adopt it.

The goal is to give the approximately 70,000 women in the Army a better-fitting and more professional looking uniform that doesn’t stand out when they are in formation, said Maj. Sequana Robinson, assistant product manager for cloth-

ing at the Army’s Program Executive Office Soldier at Fort Belvoir, Va.

A better-fitting uniform “raises motivation and the performance level because a person feels more professional,” Robinson said. “So, it’s the same uniform. It is not, not a form-fitting uniform. It’s just a uniform that’s based on female body dimensions. It’s less material because women are different than men.”

For the first time since 1988, engineers at the Natick Soldier Research, Development and Engineering Center in Massachusetts are doing an anthropometric survey of thousands of troops to better gauge body shapes and measurements within the Army’s force. They are measuring 13,000 troops, including 5,000 female active duty and National Guard members.

The measurements are expected to help the center design body armor that better fits women.

If body armor is too small, it can be painful. If it’s too large, it can be difficult to walk in or otherwise maneuver.

Former Army Staff Sgt. Maria Canales, 30, of New York City said that during her Iraq deployment in 2005-2006 she first wore body armor that was painfully snug, but after she upgraded to a larger size she worried about her safety.

“Thank God, nothing happened where my body was compromised, but it was looser and I guess that’s the disadvantage because what if ... we have contact, it would be easier for something to happen,” Canales said.

Since women tend to be smaller than men, the issue of body armor weight can cause “physical performance degradation” in a number of ways, David Accetta, a spokesman for the Natick center, said in an email. While that’s also true for many male troops, the problems tend to be more pronounced in smaller women, Accetta said.

Engineers are attempting to design armor that takes into account women’s breasts as well as their typically narrower shoulders and smaller waists. Accetta said it’s not clear when it will be done.

“He would win the crowd over, because they thought he was kind of funny, and that would get things going.”  
Suzanne Stone with the environmental group Defenders of Wildlife also worked with Bangs on the wolf reintroduction, and said he had a huge impact on the effort, writing the environmental impact statement — which drew more than 180,000 comments from throughout the world — and fighting for federal funding.

“He set the course,” Stone said. “He was willing to work with us, but not much would deter him from the course he had in mind.”

Jay Bodner with the Montana Stockgrowers Association noted that Bangs always brought a lot of professionalism to the wolf reintroduction debate and never shied away from controversial issues.

“He didn’t take things personally, and when he provided his point of view he was all right when folks disagreed with him,” Bodner said. “You might not agree with everything he said, but he knew how to move discussions forward.”

“He was able to reach a standpoint where people respected him. He would make the call and make it fairly quickly to either remove problem packs or to do nothing.”

Bangs laughs at people’s impression of him, noting that “wilderness groups loved me” when he was reintroducing the wolves, and the ranchers hated him. That flipped once he decided the science showed that wolf populations had recovered enough to take them off the list of animals protected under the federal Endangered Species Act.

“Now (environmentalists) say I’m in the ranchers’ pocket and the ranchers say I’m not such a bad guy,” he joked.

He came to head the gray wolf reintroduction in a roundabout way. Bangs grew up in Ventura, Calif., and worked through high school and college as a chemical plant laborer, a cattle ranch/feedlot hand and an oil field roughneck. He also loved to hunt and fish.

“I was going to be a welder, but my dad said that by god, I was going to be a college-educated welder,” Bangs said. “So I went to a junior college to be a welder, took some biology classes and said, ‘You mean you’ll pay me to walk in the woods

and hunt and fish?’”

After earning a degree in game management from Utah State University, he got a job at the Kenai National Wildlife Refuge as a seasonal biological technician in 1975.

“The reason they hired me was they had a new garbage truck with hydraulics, and I was the only guy who applied for the job who knew how to work those,” Bangs said. “So they said I was going to do biological studies, but my first job was picking up garbage in the campground. The refuge was a Quonset hut where we’d get snowed in some days and have to take a snowmobile to work. It was a great life.”

He helped reintroduce caribou in Alaska, studied the effects of oil and gas development on wintering moose and worked on lynx conservation and management, and recalls jumping from helicopters in the morning to tag brown bears, and return to town in time for breakfast. It was a dream job, but when he heard about a new position being created to help states, the federal government, tribes, ranchers and others figure out how to deal with what seemed to be a growing population of gray wolves in northwestern Montana, he was intrigued.

At that time, gray wolves were listed as an endangered species, and only about 10 wolves were known to live in the Glacier National Park area in the Northern Rockies. Then wolves started killing livestock in 1987, and no one knew how to handle it. The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service was looking for someone to figure out how to deal with depredations and to do research, outreach and education, which was right up Bangs’ alley. He applied, two days before the application deadline, and changed the course of his life.

Around that time, Carolyn Sime was in Kalispell, doing a study on radio-collared deer for Montana Fish, Wildlife and Parks. Bangs, the USFWS service project leader for wolf recovery, approached the department and proposed a swap: he would help find federal funding if they

would help monitor radio-collared wolves.

“So I started flying to check out the Murphy Pack and any other collared wolves in the mid- to late-1990s,” Sime said. “What struck me then, and it’s been that way throughout Ed’s tenure, is his amazing ability to engage other people, both professionally and personally.”

She eventually became Montana’s wolf management coordinator until the position recently was discontinued.

“He always pushed us to really make data and science the basis of the state plan, and that set us up to succeed,” Sime said. “It was a real privilege and honor to work with him. I’ve learned so much and it’s been a priceless experience.”

Mike Jimenez, who is now in charge of Wyoming’s wolf recovery program, also worked with Bangs in the early years, and said he created the blueprint for bringing together people with a wide range of interests to work out the issues.

“He set the template for what came later on, creating a tightly knit organization, with a general policy for interaction on the ground with everybody,” Jimenez said.

Bangs led the team that captured wolves in Canada and released them, in the mid-1990s, in Yellowstone National Park. Niemeyer recalls how Bangs would fend off the bureaucrats and deal with all the “unpleasantries” in the pre-introduction arena.

“I consider him to be the guy who made it happen,” said Niemeyer, who recently released a book called “Wolfer” about his experiences. “I admired Ed for his tenacity in dealing with bureaucrats and politics. I don’t think anybody wanted that part of the job.”

Bangs said he felt a personal responsibility to reduce conflict and damage caused by wolves, but believes that their reintroduction to the landscape was the correct route to take. He jokes that wolves are actually kind of boring — calling them “just big dogs” that have been studied to death

— but that people are fascinating, which is one reason he didn’t hesitate when walking into rooms filled with angry people.

“I’m a big believer in interaction with the public, so I made a special effort to reach out to hunting groups, livestock groups, environmental groups; I’ve probably given 500 presentations myself,” Bangs said. “I’ve met some really interesting people. You have to face people and hear their concerns firsthand to help resolve the conflicts.”

He notes that one of the biggest issues he initially faced was the sense from the public that the wolf reintroduction in the Rockies was forced on people here by bureaucrats back East. So he empowered his people to make decisions on the spot regarding how to handle problem wolves, and had few reservations about shooting those that preyed on livestock repeatedly. Those same practices continue today.

“The first thing we did was try to make it a local person with faces that they could call, and the field person had full authority to deal with the problem right here and right now,” Bangs said. “I think that helped recover wolves while it minimized the damage.”

Bangs said another important part of his job was to keep science at the forefront of the emotionally charged political debate and keep the reintroduction and recovery effort moving forward. With the removal of wolves from the list of endangered species in Montana and Wyoming this week by an act of Congress, Bangs said he feels he’s successfully completed his job.

“The bottom line is science is being followed,” Bangs said recently, sitting behind a desk covered with scientific journals, studies and reports, many of which he’s authored, and walls dotted with awards and art. “The heavy lifting is over, and that’s cool. My upbringing was to complete your job. When we started there were 10 wolves near Glacier; now there’s 1,700 in six states and they’re being delisted. That’s pretty rewarding.”

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# Workers recover body of trapped miner in N. Idaho

BOISE (AP) — Workers at a northern Idaho silver mine have recovered the body of a miner who was trapped when a tunnel collapsed nine days ago, the mine's operator said Sunday.

The body of Larry Marek, 53, was discovered Sunday afternoon, Hecla Mining Co. said in a news release.

"Words cannot express the deep sorrow we feel at the tragic loss of our friend, colleague and 30-year veteran of the mining industry. Our thoughts and prayers are with his family, loved ones and friends," the statement said.

The announcement follows more than a week of efforts to reach Marek, who was caught in the cave-in more than a mile underground. By Sunday, officials had determined he could not have survived.

"Based on crew observations of the area where the fall of ground occurred and crewmember experience in similar situations, we believe Larry is deceased," company spokeswoman Stefany Bales said earlier Sunday as she announced the transition to a recovery operation.

Marek's family had been told of the change late Saturday. The family has not spoken with reporters since the cave-in, and they asked for privacy in the statement announcing that Marek's body had been found.

Marek and his brother, Mike, had just finished watering down blasted-out rock and ore in the mine when the ceiling collapsed in the 6,150-foot deep tunnel. Mike Marek escaped unharmed.

Rescue efforts included an attempt to dig through the collapsed tunnel and building a second intersecting tunnel, but the first effort was stopped by dangerous conditions and work on the second tunnel slowed as crews encountered increasingly difficult conditions that required a special tunneling technique to prevent the new tunnel from collapsing.

# More drunk drivers face felony charges in Idaho

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — The number of felony prosecutions of drunk drivers in Idaho increased 25 percent in 2010 from the previous year, state officials say.

The recently released Idaho Supreme Court Report also said felony DUI filings are up 100 percent since 2006.

Bonneville County Deputy Prosecuting Attorney Danny Clark said the increase in felony prosecutions is the result of a 2006 change in the law and enforcement. He said the Idaho Legislature made a change so that a person convicted of two DUIs in the last 10 years faced a felony if caught driving intoxicated a third time. Previously, the length of time was five years.

He also said greater use of blood tests could be a factor in the increased felony DUI filings. Drivers who refuse a Breathalyzer, under Idaho

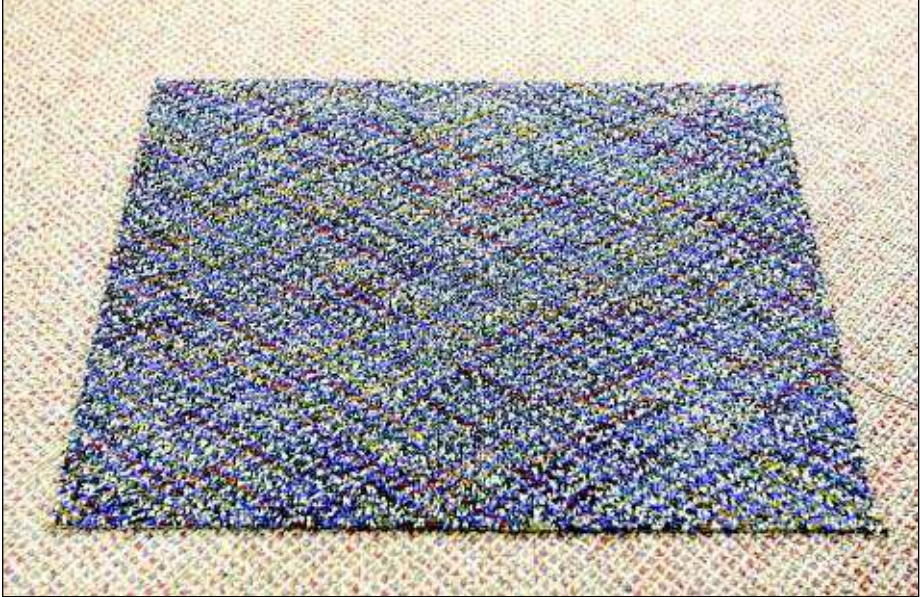
law, are subject to a blood test without their consent.

"All of our local agencies now request a breath test," Clark told the Post Register. "If (people) say no, generally speaking, (police will) take them to the hospital and perform a blood test. That has raised the level of felony convictions over the last couple years."

He noted that when a person gets an Idaho driver's license, they consent to have their blood, breath or urine tested to determine if they are driving intoxicated.

"To be very frank, at this point the challenges (to cases) have really subsided quite a bit by having that blood draw," Clark said.

Idaho Falls attorney John Cutler said a third of his practice involves DUI cases, partly because if a person is found guilty it could lead to a loss of driving privileges.

The new carpet will cap off a year of renovations at the building, and will provide the most noticeable visual difference. The paint job the library received in December featured the same color palette the library already had, and the other major update was to the building's heating and air conditioning system. The updates cost about \$180,000 and were paid for by the city.

"This is such a beautiful landmark facility in the city, and we want to maintain it," Library Director Susan Ash said. "Give it some of that 'wow' factor, but hopefully keep it looking good for the next 20, 30, 40 years."

Ash asks that patrons be patient with the library for the next two months or so as the carpeting work is be-

ing done. About three-quarters of the 42,000-square-foot facility will be getting new carpet — the rest will be the original 1939 tile — which means some library services may be unavailable during parts of the project. The work will be done after regular library hours in hopes of minimizing disruption to the patrons, library staff members said.

Ash said the library will showcase its new look at an open house in September.

## Selig has long memory but forgets quick

**B**ud Selig prides himself on being a student of history. In two judgments last week, though, baseball's long-serving steward reminded us he can be a fan of selective memory, too, so long as it suits his purpose.

First things first: In a decision that generated little comment but has far-reaching implications, Selig said he would let Barry Bonds' career (762) and single-season (73) home run records stand — that, despite the slugger's recent conviction on an obstruction of justice charge that grew out of an investigation into the use of performance-enhancing drugs in sport.

That was Selig at his best. The decision displayed pragmatism, since it's almost impossible to erase one set of facts from the record book without altering all the related ones. But it also showed a healthy respect for the connective tissue that makes comparing the feats of one era with another possible, and so binds each generation of fans to the next.

By handling the Bonds dilemma as he did, Selig reaffirmed his trust in the game's fans to get it right on their own; to understand both the times and the context in which those records were set. That way, those upset by the idea of a chemically fueled Bonds — and who-knows-how-many other players during the supersized era — soaring past several of the most important offensive milestones can add as many asterisks to the retelling as they see fit.

Not surprising, perhaps, Selig's decision kept faith with both well-established precedent and his own recent history.

Fifty years ago, as Roger Maris closed in on Babe Ruth's hallowed single-season home-run mark, there was plenty of talk — including from then-commissioner Ford Frick — about adding an asterisk to the record book to note an expanded schedule gave Maris eight more games to eclipse the Babe. Eventually, though, the dissent turned out to be just that — talk — and fans decided for themselves which version of events was the more impressive.

Similarly, Selig refused to amend the record book and award a perfect game last season to Detroit's Armando Galarraga, even after replays showed that umpire Jim Joyce clearly missed the call on what should have been the 27th and final out of the ballgame. By doing so, Selig understood the controversy swirling around the "imperfect game" guaranteed it would be as memorable as all the other perfectos, yet remembered in its unique context.

That trust in the game's fans, Selig said

## Boston becomes first to advance

NEW YORK — The Boston Celtics never let this develop into the intriguing series that was expected.

Instead, they turned it into the easiest one their current group has ever experienced.

Kevin Garnett had 26 points and 10 rebounds, Rajon Rondo added 21 points and 12 assists, and the Celtics swept their way into the Eastern Conference semifinals, holding on for a 101-89 victory over the New York Knicks on Sunday.

Ray Allen and reserve Glen Davis each added 14 points for the Celtics, the first team into the second round after sweeping a series for the first time since a 3-0 victory over Indiana in 1992, the last series victory for their old Big Three before Larry Bird retired.

"It's what we expected coming in. We knew it wasn't going to be easy, obviously Games 1 and 2, but we found a way to put it away," Rondo said. "We haven't swept a team in a long time, so it's good feeling."

And it gives their aging group plenty of rest before an expected showdown with the Miami Heat. The Celtics had a 23-point lead

cut to four in the fourth quarter, but pulled away again behind Garnett, who scored 20 after halftime.

The current Big Three of Garnett, Allen and Paul Pierce twice was extended to seven games in the first round, but this one was far easier than expected against the injury-weakened Knicks. The Celtics could now have a week off while they wait for likely opponent Miami, which was forced to a fifth game earlier Sunday after a late rally by Philadelphia.

Rally by Philadelphia. The Celtics almost faced the same scenario, but a Knicks comeback attempt stalled in the final minutes before they were saluted by their orange-clad crowd after delivering the best season in New York in a decade.

"Everybody understood what was at stake. Give a team some confidence, even in a 3-0 series to win a game, you never know what can happen," Pierce said. "So it was just very important for us to withstand the run. They made a great run and the crowd really got behind them, but in the fourth quarter we just really settled down in the last six or seven minutes, executed the offense and were able to put the game out of reach."

Carmelo Anthony had 32 points and nine rebounds, and

Amare Stoudemire, who decided to play after his back felt better, finished with 19 points and 12 boards but shot only 5 of 20 from the field.

"It was all heart. He just gave it all. With him and Carmelo going forward, the Knicks are in good shape," Knicks coach Mike D'Antoni said.

The Knicks shot 34 percent and were quickly dispatched in their first playoff appearance since 2004, when they were also swept in the first round. They haven't won a playoff game in 10 years.

"Tonight was one of those games that we have to leave it all out on the court. Wasn't no need to take anything home with us, and we did that," Anthony said. "So I'm pretty sure that we gained a lot of respect from a lot of people right now, but this is the first step of something great."

The Celtics were only 10-11 in their last 21 games of the regular season, struggling to adjust to a changed lineup after trading center Kendrick Perkins to Oklahoma City at the deadline and renewing questions they were too old.

The Knicks believed they could challenge them, but Chauncey Billups was lost for good after straining his left knee in the final

minute of Game 1 and Stoudemire was never the same after hurting his back during warmups before Game 2.

Meanwhile, the Celtics got better as the series went along, pulling out two close victories in Boston and saving their best for Madison Square Garden, surrounded in orange as it was finally open for postseason basketball again.

But that couldn't shake the Celtics, who held the Knicks to three field goals in the second quarter to seize control.

Garnett made three straight field goals to make it 70-48 in the third quarter before the Celtics let the Knicks back into it. Consecutive run-out dunks by Anthony cut it to 14, and New York had it all the way down to 10 when Shawne Williams' 3-pointer with 36 seconds remaining trimmed it to 82-72 after three.

Stoudemire opened the fourth with a basket and Anthony followed, bringing it within six and forcing coach Doc Rivers to put Garnett back into the game. He made a pair of free throws, but baskets by Stoudemire and Anthony Carter made it 84-80 with 7:34 to go.

# Wising up to Donald Trump

Don't be fooled by The Donald. Take it from one who knows: I'm a South Jersey gal who was raised on the outskirts of Atlantic City in the looming shadow of Trump's towers. All through my childhood, casino developers and government bureaucrats joined hands, raised taxes and made dazzling promises of urban renewal. Then we wised up to the eminent-domain thievery championed by our hometown faux free-marketters.

America, it's time you wised up to Donald Trump's property redistribution racket, too.

Trump has been wooing conservative activists for months and flirting with a GOP presidential run — first at the Conservative Political Action Conference in Washington and most recently at a tea party event in South Florida. He touts his business experience, “high aptitude” and “bragadocious” deal-making abilities. But he's no more a standard-bearer of conservative values, limited government and constitutional principles than the cast of *Jersey Shore*.

Too many mega-developers like Trump have achieved success by using and abusing the government's ability to commandeer private property for purported “public use.” Invoking the Fifth Amendment takings clause, real estate moguls, parking garage builders, mall developers and sports palace architects have colluded with elected officials to pull off legalized theft in the name of reducing “blight.” Under eminent domain, the definition of “public purpose” has been stretched like Silly Putty to cover everything from roads and bridges to high-end retail stores, baseball stadiums and casinos.

While casting himself as America's new constitutional savior, Trump has shown

reckless disregard for fundamental private property rights. In the 1990s, he waged a notorious war on elderly homeowner Vera Coking, who owned a little home in Atlantic City that stood in the way of Trump's manifest land development. The real estate mogul was determined to expand his Trump Plaza and build a limo parking lot — Coking's private property be damned. The nonprofit Institute for Justice, which successfully saved Coking's home, explained the confiscatory scheme:

“Unlike most developers, Donald Trump doesn't have to negotiate with a private owner when he wants to buy a piece of property, because a governmental agency — the Casino Reinvestment Development Authority — will get it for him at a fraction of the market value, even if the current owner refuses to sell. Here is how the process works.

“After a developer identifies the parcels of land he wants to acquire and a city planning board approves a casino project, CRDA attempts to confiscate these

properties using a process called ‘eminent domain,’ which allows the government to condemn properties ‘for public use.’ Increasingly, though, CRDA and other government entities exercise the power of eminent domain to take property from one private person and give it to another. At the same time, governments give less and less consideration to the necessity of taking property and also ignore the personal loss to the individuals being evicted.”

Trump has attempted to use the same tactics in Connecticut and has championed the reviled *Kelo vs. City of New London* Supreme Court ruling upholding expansive use of eminent domain.

He told Fox News anchor Neil Cavuto that he agreed with the ruling “100 percent” and defended the chilling power of government to kick people out of their homes and businesses based on arbitrary determinations:

“The fact is, if you have a person living in an area that's not even necessarily a good area, and government,

whether it's local or whatever, government wants to build a tremendous economic development, where a lot of people are going to be put to work and make (an) area that's not good into a good area, and move the person that's living there into a better place — now, I know it might not be their choice — but move the person to a better place and yet create thousands upon thousands of jobs and beautification and lots of other things, I think it happens to be good.”

Like most statist promises of bountiful job creation, government-engineered redevelopment math rarely adds up. Trump's corporations have backed casino industry bailouts and wealth-redistributing “tax-increment financing” schemes — the very kind of taxpayer-subsidized interventions we've seen on a grand scale under the Obama administration.

Championing liberty begins at the local level. There is nothing more fundamental than the principle that a man's home is his castle. Donald Trump's career-long willingness to trample this right tells you everything you need to know about his bogus tea party sideshow.

# Five myths about church and state in America

Liberals claim that the Founding Fathers separated church and state, while conservatives argue that the founders made faith a foundation of our government. Both sides argue that America once enjoyed a freedom to worship that they seek to preserve. Yet neither side gets it right. Let's end some misconceptions about religion and politics in America.

**1. The Constitution has always protected religious freedom.**

Many Americans believe that the First Amendment's separation of church and state safeguards religious liberty. But when the First Amendment was ratified in 1791, it did not apply to the states and would not until well into the 20th century. As a result, the First Amendment did not prevent states from paying churches out of the public treasury, as Maryland, Massachusetts, New Hampshire, Vermont, Connecticut and South Carolina did when that amendment was written. And those states that did not fund churches still favored Christianity. Blasphemy was forbidden in Delaware in 1826, and officeholders in Pennsylvania had to swear that they believed in “the being of a God and a future state of rewards and punishments.”

**2. The founders' faith matters.**

Christians who consider the founders saintly won't have much luck backing that up. Thomas Jefferson wrote a version of the New Testament that removed references to Jesus's divinity. Ben Franklin was a deist. And George Washington may not have taken Communion.

But whatever the founders' religious beliefs were, the First Amendment merely preserved the church-and-state status quo. There had never been an official religion in the 13 colonies, and the new states favored different faiths. The South was traditionally Anglican but had a growing Methodist and Baptist population. New England was traditionally Congregationalist, but evangelicals moved there nonetheless. The middle colonies mixed Lutherans, Catholics (in Maryland), Presbyterians and Quakers. A small number of Jews lived in early America, as well.

So the framers punted the issue of religion to the states, promising only that the power of the federal government would not be used to advance, say, Congregationalist beliefs over Presbyterian ones.

**3. Christian conservatives have only recently taken over politics.**

Christian partisans mobilized early in U.S. history, seeking to impose an interdenominational — but still Christian and, more specifically, Protestant — moral order on the new nation.

Initially, Christians were more successful in exercising political and legal control at the state level. They

passed blasphemy laws. They required Sabbath rest on Sundays. In Massachusetts, they mandated devotional exercises in public schools, a practice that spread to every state with public education.

**4. America is more secular than it used to be.**

The American Revolution was actually a low point in American religious adherence. Sociologists have shown that no more than 20 percent of the population in 1776 belonged to a church. Then, under the influence of evangelical expansion during the Second Great Awakening in the early 19th century, church membership grew rapidly until, by 1850, more than one-third of Americans belonged to a church. In 1890, after another round of Protestant evangelization and Catholic immigration from Ireland, Italy and elsewhere, the proportion rose to 45 percent. And in 1906, church members became a majority — 51 percent of the population.

The trend continues. In 2000, 62 percent of the populace belonged to religious institutions, if not specifically Christian churches.

**5. Liberals are anti-religious.**

In 1947's *Everson v. Board of Education*, the Supreme Court demanded a more thorough separation of church and state. States could no longer endorse specific religions, and prayer and Bible reading in schools and blasphemy laws went on the chopping block. This led religious conservatives to accuse the high court of, well, irreligion.

But liberals such as Justices Robert H. Jackson and William Brennan argued that they sought to honor the multiple religious traditions that had been repressed in the United States. They pointed out that Catholics had been made to recite the Protestant version of the Ten Commandments in public schools; that observant Jews labored at an economic disadvantage because they had to close their shop on the Sabbath; that Buddhists, who could not swear that they believed in God, were banned from office in several states; that Jehovah's Witnesses were made to say the pledge of allegiance in violation of their religious beliefs; and that secular humanists could be drafted without regard to their conscientious objection.

Liberals on the court sought to do away with this heritage of official discrimination, but they did not seek to do away with religion.

bridge, but the speed limit is still 60 miles per hour with warnings of road construction ahead.

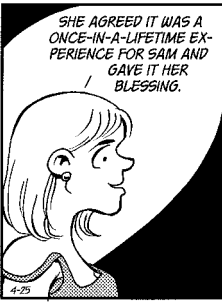
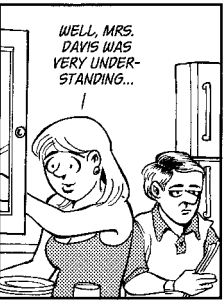

# Kelly: Rep. Giffords cleared to attend shuttle launch

HOUSTON (AP) — Rep. Gabrielle Giffords will attend husband Mark Kelly's space shuttle launch in Florida on Friday, Kelly said, allowing the Arizona congresswoman to travel for the first time since she was flown from Tucson to Houston more than three months ago to recover from a gunshot wound to the head.

In an interview with CBS' Katie Couric, Kelly said Giffords' doctors had given her permission to travel to Cape Canaveral, Fla., for the launch of Endeavour, which is scheduled for 3:47 p.m. Friday. Kelly is the commander of the shuttle mission.

CBS released excerpts of the interview Sunday, and it was scheduled to air Monday on "CBS Evening News with Katie Couric," according to a network statement.

"I've met with her doctors, her neurosurgeon and her doctors, and ... they've given us permission to

take her down to the launch," Kelly said in the interview in Houston. The network statement did not specify when the interview occurred.

James Harsfield, spokesman for

NASA's Johnson Space Center in Houston, referred all questions about Giffords to the congresswoman's office, where there was no immediate comment.

President Barack Obama and the first family also are scheduled to watch the launch, although it's unclear if they will watch it with Giffords.

Families view launches at Kennedy Space Center from a restricted area, and there are no plans for Giffords to make a public appearance.

It will be the first time Giffords has traveled since she was flown from Tucson, Ariz., to Houston on Jan. 21 for rehab. The Democrat was shot in the head Jan. 8 in a shooting in Tucson that killed six people and injured 12 others.

Giffords' spokesman, C.J. Karamargin, and her chief of staff, Pia Carusone, plan to hold a news conference after the launch to discuss the congresswoman's reaction, but Giffords will not go to the news conference because it could be an emotional moment for her, Karamargin said.

Giffords went to Kelly's last launch in 2008, when he commanded the space shuttle Discovery. The two married in 2007.

Obama last saw Giffords on Jan. 12, just four days after the shooting, when he visited her intensive care hospital room in Tucson and reported that she opened her eyes for the first time a few minutes after he left.

More recently, he wrote a tribute about the congresswoman in Time magazine's list of 100 most influential people in the world, saying that she wasn't known before the shooting, but now "she's got the prayers of a nation rooting for her."

He also wrote that Giffords is "a needed voice that cannot return soon enough."

# New York state case highlights privacy dangers for Wi-Fi users

BUFFALO, N.Y. — Lying on his family room floor with assault weapons trained on him, shouts of "pedophile!" and "pornographer!" stinging like his fresh cuts and bruises, the Buffalo homeowner didn't need long to figure out the reason for the early morning wake-up call from a swarm of federal agents.

That new wireless router. He'd gotten fed up trying to set a password. Someone must have used his Internet connection, he thought.

"We know who you are! You downloaded thousands of images at 11:30 last night," the man's lawyer, Barry Covert, recounted the agents saying. They referred to a screen name, "Dol-drum."

"No, I didn't," he insisted. "Somebody else could have but I didn't do anything like that."

"You're a creep ... just admit it," they said.

Law enforcement officials say the case is a cautionary tale. Their advice: Password-protect your wireless router.

Plenty of others would agree. The Sarasota, Fla. man, for example, who got a similar visit from the FBI last year after someone on a boat docked in a marina outside his building used a potato chip can as an antenna to boost his wireless signal and download an astounding 10 million images of child porn, or the North Syracuse, N.Y., man who in December 2009 opened his door to police who'd been

following an electronic trail of illegal videos and images. The man's neighbor pleaded guilty April 12.

For two hours that March morning in Buffalo, agents tapped away at the homeowner's desktop computer, eventually taking it with them, along with his and his wife's iPads and iPhones.

Within three days, investigators determined the homeowner had been telling the truth: If someone was downloading child pornography through his wireless signal, it wasn't him. About a week later, agents arrested a 25-year-old neighbor and charged him with distribution of child pornography. The case is pending in federal court.

It's unknown how often unsecured routers have brought legal trouble for subscribers. Besides the criminal investigations, the Internet is full of anecdotal accounts of people who've had to fight accusations of illegally downloading music or movies.

Whether you're guilty or not, "you look like the suspect," said Orin Kerr, a professor at George Washington University Law School, who said that's just one of many reasons to secure home routers.

Experts say the more savvy hackers can go beyond just connecting to the Internet on the host's dime and monitor Internet activity and steal passwords or other sensitive information.

A study released in February provides a sense of how often computer users rely on the generosity — or technological shortcomings —

of their neighbors to gain Internet access.

The poll conducted for the Wi-Fi Alliance, the industry group that promotes wireless technology standards, found that among 1,054 Americans age 18 and older, 32 percent acknowledged trying to access a Wi-Fi network that wasn't theirs. An estimated 201 million households worldwide use Wi-Fi networks, according to the alliance.

The same study, conducted by Wakefield Research, found that 40 percent said they would be more likely to trust someone with their house key than with their Wi-Fi network password.

For some, though, leaving their wireless router open to outside use is a philosophical decision, a way of returning the favor for the times they've hopped on to someone else's network to check e-mail or download directions while away from home.

"I think it's convenient and polite to have an open Wi-Fi network," said Rebecca Jeschke, whose home signal is accessible to anyone within range.

"Public Wi-Fi is for the common good and I'm happy to participate in that — and lots of people are," said Jeschke, a spokeswoman for the Electronic Frontier Foundation, a San Francisco-based nonprofit that takes on cyberspace civil liberties issues.

Experts say wireless routers come with encryption software, but setting it up means a trip to the manual.

The government's Computer Emergency Readiness Team recommends home users make their networks invisible to others by disabling the identifier broadcasting function that allows wireless access points to announce their presence. It also advises users to replace any default network names or passwords, since those are widely known, and to keep an eye on the manufacturer's website for security patches or updates.

People who keep an open wireless router won't necessarily know when someone else is piggybacking on the signal, which usually reaches 300-400 feet, though a slower connection may be a clue.

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# Bodies recovered of missing Wyo. skiers buried in avalanche

JACKSON, Wyo. (AP) — Two skiers swept up in a massive avalanche while they slept were found dead Sunday after a six-day search, a Grand Teton National Park official said.

Rescuers recovered the bodies of 27-year-old Walker Pannell Kuhl and 31-year-old Gregory Seftick after digging into about 15 feet of snow, said park spokeswoman Jackie Skaggs.

Skaggs said investigators believe Kuhl and Seftick were in their tents and inside their sleeping bags when they were swept up in an avalanche last week either Saturday night or Sunday morning.

Skaggs said the pair may have thought they were camping in a safe spot be-

cause they were next to a large boulder.

"This was a significant avalanche. An entire snowfield gave way," Skaggs said. She estimated the avalanche was at least 200 feet wide and about 300 yards long.

"There's lots of avalanches up in the Teton but this was a really big one," she said.

Kuhl was from Salt Lake City, and Seftick was a Minnesota native who was living in Columbia Falls, Mont. Skaggs says Seftick was an emergency room doctor and Kuhl worked for the Treasury Department in Salt Lake City.

They were reported missing after Kuhl didn't come to work Monday.

A search crew of about 35 and teams of dogs were in-

involved in the search. Skaggs said searchers recognized Monday there had been an avalanche after flying over the rescue area in Garnet Canyon. However, it wasn't until Saturday night that a ranger heard sounds believed to be avalanche beacon signals coming from the snow.

## Revered Hindu guru Sathya Sai Baba dies

PUTTAPARTI, India — Hindu guru Sathya Sai Baba, revered by millions worldwide, died after nearly a month of hospital treatment near his southern Indian headquarters. He was 84.

The news that Sai Baba died Sunday brought an outpouring of grief from his followers, including high Indian officials, who remembered him as a pious person who worked selflessly to help others with the billions of dollars donated to his charitable trust.

Women selling marigold garlands broke down in tears outside his ashram, or spiritual retreat, while devotees began flocking to the temple complex where the guru's body will lie through Tuesday.

The Sri Sathya Sai Institute of Higher Medical Sciences, where Sai Baba spent the past weeks on breathing support and dialysis, appealed for calm. Police, heavily deployed since Sai Baba was hospitalized March 28, kept tight control over road traffic and crowds. Shops were told to close to limit the number of people in town.

Sai Baba had a huge following, with ashrams in more than 126 countries and devotees in India including high-placed politicians, movie stars, world-class athletes and industrialists.

He was said to perform miracles, conjuring jewelry, Rolex watches and "vibhuti" — a sacred ash that his followers applied to their foreheads — from his halo of wild, frizzy hair.

But rationalist critics led campaigns against him, calling him a charlatan and his miracles fake. Several news reports alleged that he sexually abused devotees — accusations he denied as vilification campaigns.

Hundreds of thousands are expected to pay last respects in Puttaparti, where a funeral with state honors is planned for Wednesday morning.

Indian television ran non-stop news coverage Sunday of the guru's death, while

officials and celebrities expressed sadness over an "irreparable loss."

"Sri Satya Sai Baba was a spiritual leader who inspired millions to lead a moral and meaningful life, even as they followed the religion of their choice," Prime Minister Manmohan Singh said in a statement. "The nation deeply mourns his passing away."

## Airstrike damages Gadhafi compound

TRIPOLI, Libya — NATO airstrikes targeted the center of Moammar Gadhafi's seat of power early Monday, destroying a multi-story library and office and badly damaging a reception hall for visiting dignitaries.

Gadhafi's whereabouts during the attack on his sprawling Bab al-Azizya compound were unclear. A security official at the scene said four people were lightly hurt.

Monday's strike came after Gadhafi's forces unleashed a barrage of shells and rockets at the besieged rebel city of Misrata, in an especially bloody weekend that left at least 32 dead and dozens wounded.

The battle for Misrata, which has claimed hundreds of lives in the past two months, has become the focal point of Libya's armed rebellion against Gadhafi

since fighting elsewhere is deadlocked.

Video of Misrata civilians being killed and wounded by Gadhafi's heavy weapons, including Grad

rockets and tank shells, have spurred calls for more forceful international intervention to stop the bloodshed in the rebel-held city.

In Washington on Sunday,

three members of the Senate Armed Services Committee said more should be done to drive Gadhafi from power, including targeting his inner circle with air strikes.

## In Easter message, pope urges diplomacy in Libya

VATICAN CITY (AP) — Pope Benedict XVI offered an Easter prayer Sunday for diplomacy to prevail over warfare in Libya and for citizens of the Middle East to build a new society based on respect.

He also called on Europeans to welcome refugees from North Africa.

"In heaven, all is peace and gladness. But, alas, all is not so on earth!" the pope lamented as he delivered the traditional "Urbi et Orbi" message from the central balcony of St. Peter's Basilica to a crowd of more than 100,000 that overflowed from St. Peter's Square.

"In the current conflict in

Libya, may diplomacy and dialogue replace arms, and may those who suffer as a result of the conflict be given access to humanitarian aid," he said.

Referring to North Africa and the Middle East, the pope prayed that all citizens, especially young people, would "work to promote the common good and to build a society where poverty is defeated and every political choice is inspired by respect for the human person."

Uprisings, repression and civil warfare have triggered an exodus of people to Italian shores as well as other countries in the region. Europe has been split over whether

to accept or deport tens of thousands of migrants, many of them from Libya and elsewhere in northern Africa.

Benedict rallied to the side of refugees, urging people of good will to "open their hearts to welcome them."

"Here, in this world of ours,

the Easter alleluia still contrasts with the cries and laments that arise from so many painful situations: deprivation, hunger, disease, war, violence," said the pontiff, resplendent in gold-colored robes as he sat on a chair and read his speech in Italian.

## Utah measles prompts local health district warning

Verify that you and your children are current on measles vaccinations, Idaho's South Central Public Health District advised following confirmation of measles in Utah.

The measles, a highly contagious virus, causes rash, a cough, runny nose, eye irritation and fever. Symptoms appear a week to three weeks after exposure. The virus can lead to ear infections, pneumonia, seizures, brain damage and death. Measles spreads easily through coughing and sneezing. It is contagious three to five days before and four days after a rash starts.

"The virus resides in the mucous found in the nose and throat of an infected person," said Mary Jensen, epidemiology manager for the health district.

"Measles is so contagious that if one person has it, 90 percent of the people close to that person who are not vaccinated will also become infected with the measles virus."

The vaccine requires two doses for 99 percent effectiveness. Children take the first dose when they're 12 to 15 months old. At least 28 days must separate the two doses, but children typically take the second dose between the ages of 4 and 6. Adults born after 1957 should get at least one dose of the measles vaccine unless they've had either the vaccine or the disease.

## Take the advice of these southern Idaho athletes

Cyclist Richard Feldman has won five world championships in master's time trials and 10 national time trial and cyclocross championships.

Ask him the secret to his success and he points to something you wouldn't expect of a hardcore athlete: Regular time on the couch.

He found that out the hard way in 2009 when he trained too hard and placed second and third in his races. He cut back the following year and resumed his place atop the podium.

"A day off is one of the hardest things to get athletes to do because you know someone else is training while you're sitting. But, just as you don't go to the office on your days off, you don't want to get on your bike or run or even hike with your wife on your day off," said Feldman, who owns Durance Cycleworks in Ketchum. "It's OK if you do some deadheading in your garden. But you don't want to lay sod for four hours."

With summer coming on, we asked Feldman and three other southern Idaho athletes for advice for weekend warriors who want to lose weight or train for an athletic event.

### Promise yourself a reward

Setting goals is Jaime Tigie's key to making sure she works out at least three

to four times a week.

"I do a lot of half-marathons, and one full marathon. I do it for fun and it keeps me running," Tigie said.

As assistant professor of physical education at the College of Southern Idaho, Tigie constantly thinks about ways to motivate her students to set fitness goals.

Want to lose weight? Reward yourself with a new

pair of running shoes instead of an ice cream sundae, she said.

She cautions those who want to follow in her running tracks to start out in walk-jog mode — walking three minutes for every minute of running, then increasing the running gradually. And strike the ball of the foot, rather than the heel, as you land.

"We walk heel to toe, but we don't have time to do that when we're running," Tigie said.

Good running shoes are necessary, too, as well as good hydration.

"You should drink 30 minutes before you exercise and continue to drink while you're running," Tigie said.

"And be sure to drink up 30

minutes after you finish."

### Track what you do

Heidi Cartisser, who coaches women's volleyball at CSI, gives her athletes summer homework: They must document all their summer activities.

That list should include some cardiovascular activity every day, whether a track workout or bicycle riding. There also should be some strength work, such as weightlifting or plyometrics, at least every other day, she said.

Cartisser says she doesn't feel the need to do a crash course to get in shape for summer, as she stays in shape all year.

"And that's what's great about volleyball," said Cartisser, whose favorite summer activity is grass volleyball. "You don't have to be in the best of shape. It's easy to pick up the ball and toss it around."

That said, a commitment to walking and hiking provides a pretty good workout

For many people, crossing items off a bucket list — a list of things to do before they die — might mean jumping out of an airplane or finally seeing a favorite band in concert.

For Randy Neerdaels, it meant turning back time.

The Twin Falls man spent 12 weeks working out to drop to his college weight, run with

his college-aged daughter and trade in the car he's driven since 1986.

Neerdaels spent most of his life playing sports — three in high school, then football in college and softball in the years since. But after his wife died six years ago in a car accident, Neerdaels' life was taken over by caring for the couple's then-14-year-old daughter, Jordyn.

"All along the way, I've always been in shape, but the last six years, I've kind of let it go," Neerdaels said. "I took care of my daughter first and me second. Finally, I said, 'It's time.'"

Neerdaels signed on to Gold's Gym's 12-week challenge, a motivator the company hitches to

weight loss and workout resolutions that come with the new year. Participants design their own workout plans.

Neerdaels got tips from a trainer and scheduling help from his daughter, now a college sophomore, and set out on a regimen of running, core work and weight lifting. In addition to his goals of getting in shape and winning the Hyundai Santa Fe that Gold's Gym put up as an exercise incentive, Neerdaels was training for a lifelong victory.

"With the support and encouragement from my daughter my training over the last 12 weeks has been geared to preparing me for something that has long been on my bucket list

to complete by the time I was 50, a full marathon race, 26.2 miles," Neerdaels wrote in an essay about his participation.

The effort got Neerdaels ready to run those 26.2 miles with his daughter May 1 in Eugene, Ore., and put the 50-year-old father in the body of his younger self. Neerdaels dropped 56 pounds from his formerly 250-pound frame; now he clocks in at 194, one pound lighter than during his college football days.

Neerdaels wore out his running shoes and won the new wheels. Now he wants to lose another 15 pounds and keep running.

"To qualify for the Boston marathon at my age, you need to run it in three hours and 35 minutes, which is an eight-minute mile. I'm doing nine-minute miles right now," he said. "I always say I'm only going to do *this* and then I end up giving it 110 percent."

# How to care for your toothbrush

Brushing (and flossing) is the best way to protect your teeth and gums — but not if your toothbrush is in bad shape. "Toothbrush bristles that are worn or frayed from use cannot effectively remove plaque, which is critical to maintaining healthy teeth and gums," says Sebastiana Springmann, a dentist in Williamsburg, Va.

Some advice:

**Don't cover up brushes between uses.** Allow them to air-dry instead. Bacteria and other organisms will grow faster on bristles kept in a closed, damp environment.

**Rinse them thoroughly.** After each use, hold brushes under running tap water until you've cleaned off all remaining toothpaste and visible debris.

**Store them correctly.** Place brushes in an upright position to best air them out. Also keep them at least 6 feet away from a toilet to avoid contamination with (yuck) airborne particles after a flush.

**Don't share brushes.** You'll be swapping germs with the other user, which can make you sick. If you store more than one brush in the same container, keep their heads completely separated.

**Replace them often.** Get a new brush at least once every three or four months, and after each time you've been sick, according to the American Dental Association, or ADA. If bristles look worn or frayed, the brush needs to go. Children may need replacements more often than adults.

**Consider disinfecting them.** Some dentists recommend soaking brushes in an antibacterial mouthwash such as Listerine for five minutes a day. You also can buy an ADA-approved sanitizer machine, which uses ultraviolet lamps or steam and dry heat to fry nearly all bacteria and viruses. Just note: Studies to date haven't confirmed a health benefit, and not all dentists believe frequent disinfecting is necessary.

## Have fun while you're at it

Heidi Watanabe has thrown herself into the treacherous waters of the San Francisco Bay on an "escape from Alcatraz" — twice.

Both times she joined several hundred swimmers who braved strong current, 48-degree water and great white sharks to swim from that legendary prison to San Francisco. The Hailey woman swam the mile and a half in just more than 34 minutes, placing her first in her age class both times and third among all the women who finished.

Watanabe, mother of Olympic snowboarder Graham Watanabe, is a former NCAA collegiate alpine ski racer. But she swims in the Alcatraz race and skis in the 90-kilometer ultramarathon over the Continental Divide in Colorado just to see if she can do it.

"Even when I'm doing the Boulder Mountain Tour I just

like being out there enjoying the beauty all around," Watanabe said.

Eight years ago she joined a group of Masters swimmers at 6 a.m. in an outdoor Hailey pool because it was a beautiful way to watch the sun come up. She enjoyed the group so much that she wound up swimming with them in the winter, eventually accompanying a few to World Masters competition in Australia where she placed fourth in the 800-meter free.

"Swimming is therapeutic. It lengthens the muscles, stretches them out. And the water feels so soothing versus the pounding you get with other activities," she said.

But she's adamant about cross-training — something that helped her recover from shoulder surgery six months before an Alcatraz swim. Watanabe works out at Hailey's 5B Crossfit on barbells, squats, pull-ups, kettle ball and boxjumps.

"I'm not a weightlifter, but I figured I needed strength training to avoid osteoporosis, and it made me much stronger. It also cut down on my other workouts. I don't feel I need to swim or Nordic ski as much now to

stay fit," she said.

"Now I need to concentrate on stretching more. My husband gets up every morning to do yoga poses, and he tells me, 'You should be doing this, too.'"

**Plan ahead and start easy**

Feldman, two-time winner of the grueling Leadville Trail 100 Mountain Bike race in Colorado, says the principles he uses for himself and the athletes he coaches can be applied to anyone — someone who wants to lose 15 pounds this summer or someone trying to win a local bicycle race.

Feldman makes copious daily notes, detailing his workout and what he ate so he can look back later and see what worked and what didn't. And he plans ahead — way ahead — in order to meet his goals of racing in cyclocross and other events.

"The important thing is to set a goal. It can be losing a certain amount of weight. But even better would be to have an event to look forward to. If your main goal is weight control, do it in concert with something else. It doesn't have to be the world championship. But it should

be your world championship."

Have a realistic goal, Feldman advised. It's preposterous to think a couch potato is going to do the Tour de France. But not so preposterous to consider the Twin Falls triathlon.

People striving to get fit or train for a summer competition in the first flush of spring make three major mistakes, Feldman cautions: not having a plan, not following a plan and trying to do too much too soon.

Feldman, for instance, orders his bicycle parts months ahead to ensure he has them

when he needs them. At the same time, he says, he tries to dissuade weekend cyclists from ordering new components immediately after their first ride of the season.

"Often people come in after the first 60-degree day of the season wanting a new saddle. If I was unscrupulous, I would sell it to them. But, in most cases, it's not the saddle. It's the fact that they tried to do too much too fast and their rear end is simply not used to the saddle yet."

One more piece of advice: Don't do something poorly.

"If you start tiring or find

yourself hitting balls poorly, stop," Feldman said.

"Chances are you're going to start using poor technique. And you don't want to get in the habit."

Also, we wish to provide you with information on the upcoming **Bond Election scheduled for May 17, 2011.** The election is to vote on passage of a **Revenue Bond** to help finance improvements to our water system, including drilling a new backup well, constructing a waterline along Waucanza Street, and improving fire protection to the community and the School with more water storage and transmission pipelines. This will require an increase in monthly water fees to pay off the debt incurred by these projects. Anyone who is a registered voter in the City of Dietrich may vote in this election.

**Maximum Water Bond Amount \$2.0 Million**

**CURRENT PROBLEMS:** The City's current water system is facing insufficient water supply, low system pressures, and inadequate fire protection to the community and the school. These inefficiencies are leading to increased operational costs to maintain our aging water system and putting the City out of compliance with State drinking water standards.

**SOLUTION:** Over the past year, the City, along with our engineers, has reviewed several alternatives to address the water system. We believe that we have come up with the most cost-effective solutions and direction for the City to proceed. We acknowledge that this will be a significant financial commitment and undertaking for the community and it will not solve all of our issues. However, it is a direction that needs to be taken at this time. City leaders are considering the following projects to ensure the water supply system can continue to meet the needs of the City:

- oDrill a new backup well
- oImprove fire protection to the community and School with more storage
- oExtension of water service along Waucanza St.

**COST IMPLICATION:** Repayment of the bond will require an increase in the monthly water user rate to pay off the debt and cover operation and maintenance costs. The rate increase will depend on the City's success in securing grant funds from the Department of Commerce (CDBG), Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ), and/or US Department of Agriculture-Rural Development Program (USDA-RD). The City will be applying for grant funds through several sources which are identified in the adjacent table. These grant funds are highly competitive and not guaranteed. A phased user rate increase schedule has been proposed to bring our rates to the level they need to be at by 2013 when the projects are anticipated to be complete.

## THE ACES ON BRIDGE®

Bobby Wolff

*"All too long  
Seems the unjust to prosper and  
be strong,  
Till the dark Furies come,

Today's heart grand slam has 12 easy tricks but no obvious route to the 13th. Instead of blaming partner for his aggressive bidding (it was really more your fault than his), focus on trying to find a way to find an extra trick.

One possibility is to win the spade lead, draw two rounds of trump, then play your clubs, discarding a spade from dummy. If all this passed off peacefully, you could then ruff a spade in the dummy. However, this needs clubs to be 4-2, and the long clubs to be with the long trump. Your chances of success are slim indeed.

Much better is to play on a dummy reversal. This esoteric-sounding technique is hard to spot because the approach is somewhat counterintuitive, but it is easy to execute. Dummy reversal means that you draw trump with the short trump hand, having used up the long trumps earlier by taking ruffs with them. Here, with a 5-3 trump fit, you take three ruffs with the five-card suit and draw trumps with the triplet.

Let's see how that works in practice: Win the opening lead, play a diamond to the ace, and ruff a diamond high. Now play a heart to the nine, ruff a diamond high, play a heart to the 10, and ruff your last diamond high. Finally, lead a club to dummy, draw the last trump, discarding your small spade, and your hand is high.

ANSWER: It feels natural to attack the unbid suit, so lead the diamond queen. This may not work, but it is surely your side's best chance to generate tricks. My second choice would be a trump. This might be right if declarer cannot establish dummy's clubs.

An al-Qaida front group in Iraq confirmed the deaths of its two top leaders a week after a raid by Iraqi and U.S. security forces on the leaders' safe house near Tikrit, north of Baghdad. 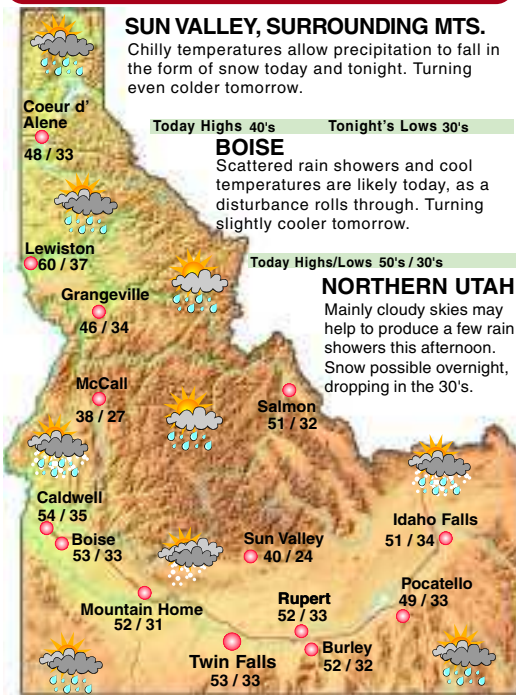

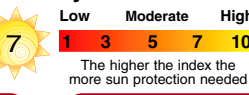

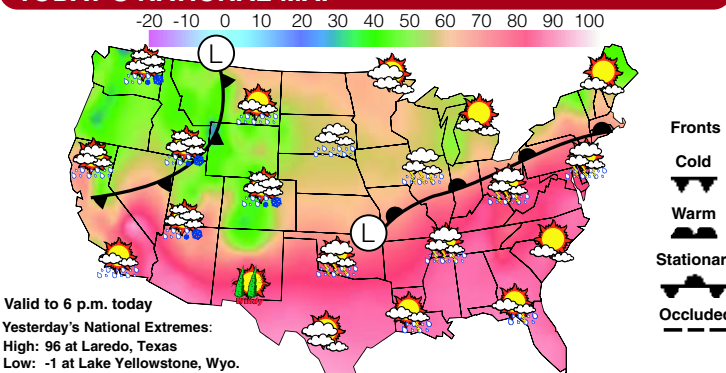
