Four charged with Dietrich home invasion

By Bradley Guire Times-News writer

SHOSHONE - The four individuals accused of terrorizing a Dietrich family in March are behind bars.

Gabriel Baker, Jeremiah Bennett, Aaron Donabedian and Jamie Taylor made their initial appearances in a Lincoln County courtroom this week, each charged with multiple felonies tied to a reported March 9 home invasion. Baker, 30, and Bennett, 27, are each held on \$750,000 bond. Taylor, 30, the only female in the group, is held on \$100,000 bond, and Donabedian, 22, is held on \$50,000 bond. As of Wednesday afternoon, none of the

four had posted bail. The Lincoln County Sheriff's Office reported in March that a Dietrich family was held at gunpoint by multiple individuals while being robbed on the night of March 9. According to a police report filed by Lincoln County Sheriff's Deputy J.R. Gregory, David and Colleen Conner were asleep in their home when David heard the dog barking. He got out of bed, grabbed his shotgun and went to the porch, where he was jumped by the invaders.

North Idaho College mulls 'free speech zone'

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) while allowing for the free Idaho College board of trustees are considering a policy that would create a won approval of the "free speech zone" on the school's campus, a move they say would limit potentially disruptive picketing, leafleting and other free speech activities to a designated area.



Prosecutors: Man angered by affair in 'hit' case

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

trictly in terms of total employment, the Magic Valley weathered the Great Recession better than most areas of Idaho.
But paychecks? That's another story. If you lived in the Magic Valley in 2009, chances are that your income fell faster than other Idahoans?

The six-county region saw the largest decline in personal income during 2009, according to the U.S. Bureau of Economic Analysis.

Gooding County saw the largest decline in the state, falling 19 percent in 2009 from a total of \$576.3 million to \$466.8 million, according to a re-

port released this week. Lincoln County reported the third-largest decline of 10.2 percent, Jerome fell 7.1 percent and Twin Falls declined 3.1 percent.

All counties in southcentral Idaho - with the exception of Minidoka and Camas – were among the top 15 in Idaho in terms of declining personal income.

Those are pretty stark numbers, and they reflect two realities.

The first is that the dairy industry's decline over the past three years has been steep, jarring and protracted. And Gooding and Jerome counties are No. 1 and No. 2, respectively, for the number of dairy cattle in Idaho.

The second is that two of the valley's traditional highpaying job sectors - con-

struction and light manufacturing - have ebbed as a consequence of the recession.

What does that mean to the region's economic strategy? Simply this: Development that leverages the area's economic powerhouse – agriculture – is likely to produce the quickest rewards.

If you doubt that, look no farther than Minidoka County. Less than a decade ago, its biggest employer - J.R. Simplot's Heyburn french fry plant - closed, yet Minidoka rebounded by providing an attractive option for out-of-state food processors looking for a cost-effective, well-trained workforce and low energy costs.

South-central Idaho fared as well as it did during the recession largely because commodity prices except for dairy - remained respectable. Partly as a consequence, we have jobs.

Now we need to concentrate on prosperity.

Polls reflect the calm before the storm

n one level, Ameri-can politics looks amazingly stable. President Obama's approval rating is about 47 percent, and it hasn't changed much in well over a year. Health care reform is mildly unpopular, and the public's view hasn't shifted much since before it was passed.

According to Pew Research Center polls, the public is evenly divided over which party can do a better job of handling foreign policy, the job situation, Social Security reform, health care reform and many other issues. It looks as if we're back to the 50-50 stasis that has been the norm for the past few decades.

Also, the two parties are about to run utterly familiar political campaigns. The Democrats are going to promise to raise taxes on the rich to preserve the welfare state, just as they have since 1980. The Republicans are going to vow to cut taxes and introduce market mechanisms to reform the welfare state, just as they have since 1980.

The country is about to be offered the same two products: one from Soviet Production Facility A (the Republicans), and the other from Soviet Production Facility B (the Democrats). It will react just as it always has.

From this you could easily get the impression that American politics are trundling along as usual. But this stability is misleading. The current arrangements are stagnant but also fragile. American politics is like a boxing match atop a platform. Once you're on the

platform, everything looks normal. But when you step back, you see that the beams and pillars supporting the platform are cracking and rotting.

This cracking and rotting is originally caused by a series of structural problems that transcend any economic cycle: There are structural problems in the economy as growth slows and middleclass incomes stagnate. There are structural problems in the welfare state as baby boomers spend lavishly on themselves and impose horrendous costs on future generations. There are structural problems in energy markets as the rise of China and chronic instability in the Middle East leads to volatile gas prices. There are structural problems with immigration policy and tax policy and on and on.

Yet the public mood is darkening, not brightening. The New York Times/CBS News poll showed a 13 percentage point increase in the number of Americans who believe things are getting worse. The Gallup Economic Confidence Index is now as low as it has been since the height of the recession

Public opinion is not behaving the way it did after other recent recessions.

If you dive deeper into the polling, you see the country is not mobilized by this sense of crisis but immobilized by it. Raising taxes on the rich is popular, but nearly every other measure that might be taken to address the fiscal crisis is deeply unpopular. Sixty-three percent of Americans oppose raising the debt

pose measures to make that sort of thing unnecessary.

There is a negativity bias in the country, especially among political independents and people earning between \$30,000 and \$75,000 (who have become extremely gloomy). It is hard to rally majorities behind immigration, energy or tax reform.

At some point something is going to happen to topple the political platform - maybe a debt crisis, maybe when China passes the United States as the world's largest economy, perhaps as early as 2016. At that point, we could see changes that are unimaginable today.

New political forces will emerge from the outside or the inside. A semi-crackpot outsider like Donald Trump could storm the gates and achieve astonishing politica stature. Alternatively, insiders like the Simpson-Bowles commission or the Senate's bipartisan "Gang of Six" could assert authority and recreate a strong centrist political establishment, such as the nation had in the 1950s.

Neither seems likely now. But in these circumstances, rule out nothing.

Ten million Americans are mad about Internet poker ban

one of the few constants as well as one of the great joys has been playing poker. It's also something I'm quite good at. Like the time I was playing Texas hold 'em against an aggressive player who had been throwing down big bets all night. I remember matching him, bet for bet. The dealer laid down the final card - "the river" - and, since the straight I was working for never appeared, I had only a pair of jacks. I almost folded before I saw my opponent grab a \$50 chip and rub it with his thumb in a clear "tell" that his hand was weak. I knew I had him, and raised. He folded. He'll never know that I was bluffing, but he sure knew that I won the

That's the beauty of poker. My ability means that I can beat my opponent in spite of what hand I am dealt. Like any game, poker also brings heartbreaking losses. When I was in college, I once held four of a kind, a great hand with about a one in 4,000 chance of turning up. Still, I got beat by a straight flush dealt once every 72,000 hands. But as any poker player knows, your skill at the game determines whether you win, not necessarily the cards.

I think that's why Ameri-

cans, including politicians, are so enamored with poker: At the table, we control our own destiny.

With so many poker players, you would never think that Congress would pass such ambiguous laws to regulate card-playing. Congress knows that poker is a game of skill. Congress knows that playing games of skill in American homes needn't be outlawed. And Congress knows that, since poker is a game of skill that is legal in the home, it should be legal to play it online. Safe assumptions, right?

Wrong, according to the President Barack Obama's Justice Department as run by Attorney General Eric Holder. On April 15, the U.S. attorney for the Southern District of New York indicted 11 peo-

ple involved with the three largest Internet poker sites that welcome U.S. players, alleging money laundering and fraud. The domain names of the sites have been seized, and they have ceased domestic operations. Ten million Americans who play poker on the Internet cannot do so — and they are angry about it. Only after players protested did the Department of Justice agree to allow access to money deposited in personal accounts on these websites.

Through these strongarm tactics, prosecutors think they can ban Internet poker. Instead, they are making millions of Americans victims in an attempt to make online poker illegal without the support of legislators or the public.

Internet poker does not violate any federal law or the laws of most states. The highest court that has ruled on the issue — the U.S. Court of Appeals for the 5th Circuit in the 2002 In Re: Master-Card decision - stated that the 1961 Wire Act, antigambling legislation routinely cited by the Justice Department to malign online poker, applied only to online sports betting. Most federal and state laws define gambling as games of chance. But poker is a game where a player's success is predominantly determined by that player's skill. Although the Department of Justice continues to insist that Internet poker is a game of chance, the law and any poker player's experience – just doesn't support that contention.

No one suggests that it is illegal for an individual to play poker on the Internet. And that is as it should be. It is unfathomable that policymakers would tell adults that they cannot enjoy a game of Texas hold 'em - in which the player's ability has direct impact on the outcome - in the privacy of their homes on computers and Internet connections they pay for. Yet these same lawmakers think it's perfectly fine for folks to bet on horses or play the lottery, two other forms of gambling.

Here's how the script reads in Boise: A well-heeled corporate lobbyist asks for a tax break.

Either he claims the incentive will entice his boss to bring a new endeavor and jobs to Idaho.

State University study. Without it, Exergy Development Group lobbyist Roy Eiguren told lawmakers, hundreds of millions of dollars worth of projects would be halted.

"Your client would announce tomorrow that they are canceling those projects?" Sen. Joe Stegner, R-Lewiston, asked.

"That would be correct,"

Eiguren replied. is the difference between a wind turbine making or losing money? Not whether or where the wind blows.

Not the availability of appropriate sites.

Not the regulatory environment.

Not the market for electricity.



Stegner voted no. And down went Exergy's tax break by a 17-18 margin.

Did Exergy carry out its plan? Not exactly.

First, Exergy founder James Carkulis allowed that the 100-megawatt wind farm he's planning for southern Idaho was "more than likely unprofitable" without the tax break.

Then he said he'd honor his contractual obligations to proceed.

"Despite facing a devastating blow, Exergy is a company committed to Idaho in the long term before we are committed to making a profit in the short term," he wrote in the Idaho Statesman.

So for the first time in recent memory, Idaho lawmakers turned down a corporate tax break and found out the claims behind it were just a bunch of hot air.

Not that it's an entirely

new story. A decade ago, the state lined up about \$1.5 million in state and local tax breaks to entice Dell Computers to launch a call center at Twin Falls. Eight years later, the call center departed, throwing 500 people out of work just as the Great Recession

was sinking in. In 2005, Idaho Gov. Dirk Kempthorne and lawmakers were desperate to keep the Albertsons grocery store chain headquarters in Boise. So they passed a package of investment tax credits, job credits, property improvement credits and relief from sales and property taxes for corporate headquarters that created at least 500 jobs paying a minimum of \$50,000. Over time, it could have been

• Idaho's public school system is entering its third year of a historic budget crunch. The schools will sustain another \$21.3 million cut in 2011-12 - a 1.3percent decrease.

Afghan military officer kills 8 American troops, U.S. contractor after argument at airport

KABUL — A veteran Afghan military pilot said to be distressed over his personal finances opened fire at Kabul airport after an argument Wednesday, killing eight U.S. troops and an American civilian contractor.

Those killed were trainers and advisers for the nascent Afghan air force. The shooting was the deadliest attack by a member of the Afghan security forces, or an insurgent impersonating them, on coalition troops or Afghan soldiers or policemen. There have been seven such attacks so

Although the individual circumstances may differ, the incidents of Afghans turning against their coalition partners seem to reflect growing anti-foreigner sentiment independent of the Taliban. Afghans are increasingly tired of the nearly decade-long war and think their lives have not improved despite billions of dollars in international aid.

The Taliban, who are currently staging their opening salvos of the spring fighting season, boasted that the gunman in Wednesday's airport attack was a militant impersonating an army officer.

This claim did not seem credible, however.

A park visitor reported finding the injured 21-yearold man along a stretch of Desert View Drive at about 7:45 p.m. Monday. The man told the visitor he had accidently driven his vehicle over the edge of the canyon.

He told responding park rangers that he had extricated himself from the crashed vehicle and climbed up to the rim to seek help.

The driver was treated at Flagstaff Medical Center for non-life threatening injuries, Oltrogge said. She declined to release the man's identity or hometown until park rangers have finished their investigation.

The crash happened about 6 miles east of the Grand Canyon Village near a spot known as Twin Overlooks.

The man's car was still at the scene on Wednesday and park officials were beginning to develop a plan to retrieve it, Oltrogge said. In similar cases, officials have used a heavy lift helicopter to pull out vehicles that have driven off the canyon's edge.

Bernanke sees risks in further steps to spur jobs



WASHINGTON - Federal Reserve Chairman Ben Bernanke said Wednesday that the Fed can't take additional steps to try to ease high unemployment without escalating inflation.

If inflation were to accelerate, the Fed would have to raise rates to slow borrowing and spending and blunt price increases. Hiring might then slow.

Speaking at a news conference reporters, Bernanke sketched a picture of an economy growing steadily but still weighed down by a prolonged period of unemployment,

now at 8.8 percent. He acknowledged the pain that is causing, noting that around 45 percent of the unemployed have been without a job for six months or longer.



Bernanke

"We know the consequences of that can be very distressing because people who are out of work for a long time, their skills tend to atrophy," Bernanke said. But he added:

"It's not clear that we can get substantial improvements in payrolls without some additional inflation risks, and in my view we can't achieve a sustainable recovery without keeping inflation

under control." The news conference was the first time in the Fed's 98-vear history that a chairman has begun holding regular sessions with reporters. Bernanke appeared relaxed with reporters, projecting a calming presence and saying nothing that might rattle in-

vestors. The Fed chairman offered some clues about when and how the Fed would begin raising inter-

est rates. For more than two years, the Fed has kept a pledge to hold its key rate at a record low near zero for an "extended period." At his news conference Wednesday, Bernanke said that at this point, that phrase means "a couple of meetings." The Fed, which ended a two-day meeting Wednesday,

gathers about every six weeks. Once the Fed abandons the "extended period" language, it would be viewed as a signal that it was preparing to start boosting interest rates.

Stocks rose after Bernanke said he expects the economy to continue growing through next year and 2013. The Dow Jones industrial average, which was up about 50 points when Bernanke began speaking, gained another 50 points half an hour before the market closed.

Chevron environmental oil case turns into duel in the Amazon

LAGO AGRIO, Ecuador - Donald Moncayo walks to the edge of a flat grassy field that once held two large pits that brimmed with a stew of water and crude from an oildrilling operation. He lifts a heavy auger above his head and prepares to plunge it into the ground.

They always show you the shirt, the coat and the tie," he said of the area, called Sacha 53, which is now pastureland and spindly trees. "They never show you the tumor underneath the shirt."

For almost a decade, celebrities, journalists and shareholders have tromped through Ecuador's jungles on competing excursions that have become a routine part of what could be the world's most expensive environmental case.


The "Toxic Tour," led by Moncayo, is held on behalf of some 30,000 Ecuadorian villagers who claim Chevron's predecessor poisoned their environment with shoddy environmental practices that included pumping millions of gallons of oil-tainted wastewater into creeks and streams.

The other tour is led by Chevron. The oil giant shows idyllic agrarian landscapes, like Sacha 53, where Texpet, a subsidiary of Texaco, helped pump crude from the 1960s to 1992 when it was a minority partner of the state-run oil company.

When Texaco left Ecuador, it spent \$40 million to clean up its share of the operations, and the government absolved it of any further legal responsibilities in 1998.

But Ecuador's courts found that the government deal did not cover third-party claims. When Chevron and Texaco merged in 2001, Chevron inherited the legal battle.

The company contends it's the victim of a global shakedown engineered by greedy lawyers, environmental groups and unscrupulous government officials.



Small fish puts up a big fight

Redband trout is largely ignored in Idaho, official says

Redband trout might be small fish, but they put up a good fight. Getting to them, however, might be a challenge.

About 20 people showed up at Rock Creek Restaurant in Twin Falls last Thursday night to learn about redband trout in Idaho. Dan Schill, fisheries research supervisor for the Idaho Department of Fish and Game, addressed members of the Magic Valley Fly Fishers Club.

His slide show presentation, "High Desert Redband Trout in Southern Idaho," discussed the biology of the fish, its presence in Idaho waters, and angling tech-

At one time, he said, redband trout, so named because of the red stripe across its sides, was the least studied trout in Idaho. But over the past decade or so, they've been studied a lot.

There are at least two species of redband trout - the Columbia River redband, found in Washington, Montana and Idaho; and the Great Basin redband trout, found in southeastern Oregon and parts of California and Nevada.

As a game fish, redband virtually are unexploited in Idaho, Schill said.

"There's a whole lot of 'em out there," he said.

There might be at least two reasons for this. The species are found in often hard-to-reach waters, such as rivers in deep canyons and in places v from Schill's experience, there's a lot of poison ivy. The fish also don't draw the attention of some anglers because of their size.

Redband trout don't get very big, but they put up a good fight when caught on the fly. Finding them might be tricky, though, because they often inhabit hard-to-reach rivers, sometimes in areas where there are snakes and plenty of poison ivy, says Dan Schill. If you plan to fish for redband, he recommends you bring along gloves, sunscreen and water. It's probably also a good idea to bring along a GPS unit, food and a first-aid kit.

Everything you ever wanted to know about salmon

With full-fishing season approaching, it won't be long before the banks of lakes and rivers will be filled with anglers trying to catch their limit.

Savvy fishermen already have been on the water, casting their flies for chinook. But as Doug Megargle has said, catching that first salmon is a memorable experience for younger fishermen as well.

Salmon is one of Idaho's most popular fish species, and one of the most fun and challenging to catch.

Megargle, regional fisheries manager for the Idaho Department of Fish and Game, recently answered questions from the *Times*he had to say:

Question: What is a salmon?

Answer: A salmon is a fish species in the salmonidae family (trout family) that is born in fresh water streams, migrates to the a few words. In Idaho, the state

Q: How many different kinds of salmon are there?

A: Worldwide there may be hundreds of different species and/or stocks of salmon. A "stock" is a sub-population that has shared genetics and is classically loyal to spawning in a specific drainage. In Idaho, we typically deal with the with the salmon spawning migracoho, chinook and sockeye salmon.

Q: How do they differ from

trout? **A:** Most people differentiate salmon from "trout" in that salmon live part of their lives in the ocean, and part of their lives in freshwater streams (anadramous). A: That's a very large question in

Q: What makes ideal salmon

A: First and foremost, lots of fish in the water. With that said, good conditions might be best described as good spring conditions and good fall conditions. In the spring, water temperatures start to come

ing, but stream flows too high conditions.

Most anglers fish before the big spring runoff (snowmelt) passes through or wait until after when the water drops a bit and clears up. If you hear people say "the salmon river blew out" you probably don't want to go fishing that week-

In the fall, water is typically clear and there is less of it. The fish are typically found in deep holes or runs in the rivers - fishing condi-

tions during the fall are usually more dependent upon the weather; big rain events can mess things up.



nswer: Yes you can, although there are pitfalls. The new bankruptcy law requires that you report ALL household income, so your girlfriend's income will have to be considered in

determining whether you qualify to file a traditional Chapter 7 bankruptcy as opposed to repaying some of your debts in a Chapter 13 bankruptcy. Also, if you have purchased anything jointly (like a car or house) your individual exemptions provided by state law may not be sufficient to protect all your property, because as a non-debtor, your girlfriend may not claim any exemptions in your bankruptcy. As an example, if your name is on the title of your girlfriend's car, you may not be able to protect it in bankruptcy. The trustee could seize it. This is a situation where you definitely need the advice of a professional bankruptcy attorney. There are probably multiple solutions to your problem, including marriage.

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License required to shoot rock chucks

uestion: "In a previous article about rock chuck hunting you mentioned the need for a hunting license. I thought a guy could hunt predators and unprotected animals without a license. Please explain the licensing requirements for shooting rock chucks, jack rabbits and coyotes."

Answer: You are correct. I did write that a valid hunting license was required for shooting rock chucks. In some states licenses or permits are not required to hunt predatory or unprotected wildlife, but in Idaho a valid hunting license is required. Idaho law specifically reads, "No person shall hunt, trap, or fish for or take any wild animal, bird or fish of this state, without first having procured a license."

Landowners or lessees of property may destroy unprotected and predatory animals in order to protect private property without having first obtained a hunting license. However, recreational hunting by landowners and others re-



quires a valid hunting license.

For nonresidents, the department offers a reduced price non-game gun license to accommodate "varmint hunting." This license is available at license vendors after the close of the waterfowl season in January and is valid through August. It is only valid for unprotected and predatory wildlife. The cost is \$35.50.

In summary, landowners are allowed to protect their property from predatory and unprotected wildlife without first purchasing a hunting license. Everyone else needs a valid hunting license.

Sport hunters' polar-bear trophies stuck in legal limbo

WASHINGTON - Until they were classified as a threatened species in the United States three years ago, a Canadian polar bear was the ultimate trophy for many elite American sport hunters.

Led by Inuit guides, hunters traveled for days by dog sled to the far northern reaches of iced-over Nunavut and the Northwest Territories. They endured temperatures so far below zero that they had to cover all exposed skin. And they paid dearly for it: Each trip cost \$40,000 to \$60,000, and few hunters were satisfied until they brought home

Today, the rare trophies from those hunts – generally a skin and claws, along with the skull and the penis bone, known as an "oosik" in the Native language - are in a legal limbo that stretches from the Arctic Circle to the Canadian capital in Ottawa to the halls of the U.S. Congress.

The Endangered Species Act prohibits importing animals that are listed as endangered or threatened. As a result, sport-hunted polar bear trophies from Canada can't be imported, the government argues, even if they were hunted before the bears were considered threatened.

The dispute over the trophies spans the intertwined

If the Arctic continues its melting trend, government scientists have projected that polar bear populations worldwide could decline as much as two-thirds by midcentury. They could be nearly extinct by the end of the century.

Although the bears have a special status in Canada, the Canadian government objected to the 2008 "threatened" listing. Each Canadian province within the bears' range has established its own harvest rules. Some have quotas; others don't. The hunting licenses go to Native people, who determine in their communities how to divide them.

Planetary alignments need not be perfect to be worth watching

clock's hour, minute, and second hands simultaneously line up only twice a day (noon and midnight). Now imagine a clock with eight hands, each moving at different speeds. How often would all eight overlap?

The "clock" is the solar system, with each of the eight planets moving at a unique speed. Mercury orbits in just under 88 days; Neptune takes more than 165 years. All eight can't line up until the outermost slowpokes get in position, and even then it's a slim chance. And the two slowest planets, Uranus and Neptune, only pass each other every 172 years.

However, planets can line up on the same side of the sun ("noon"), or on opposite sides ("six o'clock"). If we only consider the naked eye planets, and leave the sun out, many more alignment configurations are possible, decreasing the wait time.

Now the bad news: While around it with binoculars. the planets orbit in nearly The next brightest is Jupiter, the same flat plane, each has followed by Mercury and

Thoughts on hypothyroidism testing

DEAR DR. GOTT: Quite a while ago, you published a letter from a person who inquired about whether he or she should be treated for hypothyroidism with a TSH level of 6.7.

Hypothyroidism is rampant in my family. I think it is important to identify the consequences of untreated hypothyroidism, which include a greater likelihood of high blood pressure, high cholesterol, diabetes and early-onset dementia.

Also, it is worthwhile to note that the European standards for diagnosing hypothyroidism are much narrower than in this country. In Europe if a person's TSH is higher than two, he or she is diagnosed with hypothyroidism. If it is between one and two, the person may have it. If it is less than one, the person definitely does not have it.

The American Association of Clinical Endocrinologists issued a paper in 2002, stating that anyone with a TSH of three or higher should be treated.

And then there is the issue of treating with a natural

source of thyroid, such as Armour thyroid, versus treating with a synthetic form, such as levothyroxin. In a study done in another country, 60 percent of people with hypothyroidism felt better when taking both T3 and T4, compared to taking just T4.

Thank you for the helpful information in your column.

DEAR READER: Hypothyroidism (underactive thyroid) can be a somewhat complex issue. The area about which you have written, subclinical thyroid disease, is particularly complicated. Until adequate scientific studies have been performed, it will continue to be difficult to determine at what levels treatment should be given when levels fall within those gray areas.

You are correct in that there are very real and sometimes serious consequences in not treating hy-

pothyroidism. These can include heart disease, goiter (enlarged thyroid gland), infertility, peripheral neuropathy and myxedema (cold intolerance, drowsiness, profound lethargy and unconsciousness). These are most commonly associated with long-term uncontrolled hypothyroidism. Women with untreated hypothyroidsm who are pregnant, have a higher risk of having child with birth defects. The child may also be more likely to have serious developmental and intellectual problems. Babies born with hypothyroidism who go untreated past the first few months of life are at risk of serious mental and physical development problems.

Added to that, many people don't want to take prescription medications if alternatives or home remedies will be beneficial, so in simply describing treatment options, several paragraphs of my limited space can be used. Never mind describing the condition, symptoms, diagnosis and testing!



Judge denies request to freeze ruling

By Dave Campbell Associated Press writer

MINNEAPOLIS - The NFL is falling behind in its court fight with the players over the future of the \$9 billion business.

The federal judge who lifted the lockout two days ago dealt another blow to the league late Wednesday, denying its request to put her ruling on hold pending appeals and guaranteeing more limbo for the 32 teams, thousands of players and millions of fans.

U.S. District Judge Susan Richard Nelson wrote that the NFL "has not met its burden for a stay pending appeal, expedited or otherwise." She dismissed the NFL's argument that she didn't have jurisdiction and that it is facing irreparable harm because of her decision to end the 45day lockout.

"The world of 'chaos' the NFL claims it has been thrust into - essentially the 'free-market' system this nation otherwise willfully operates under - is not compelled by this court's order," Nelson wrote.

And yet chaos there may be, perhaps as early as today - the first day of the NFL draft.

James Quinn, a lawyer for the players, said free agency – perhaps the biggest question for owners and

DEAR ABBY: I hope you will share the following tips for dealing with orphaned or injured wildlife. Once people understand how to handle an encounter with an injured animal they will make safe decisions and possibly have a positive impact on nature:

1. The animal may NOT be orphaned! Deer leave their babies hidden in clumps of bushes or tall grass while they search for food. A baby bird that has fallen from the nest can be gently picked up and returned.

2. If you find an orphaned or injured animal, be very cautious. Frightened animals and animals in pain will bite. Opossums, raccoons and other mammals can carry rabies.

3. Do not bring the animal inside to nurse it back to health and keep as a pet. It will probably need the care of a veterinarian, and it's illegal in most states to keep a native species without a license. Contact a wildlife rehabilitation center. Your local park service can point you to the nearest rehab center.

4. After any contact with an injured/orphaned animal, wash your hands and change your clothing as soon as possible. You don't know what germs the ani-

mal may be carrying. 5. Teach children about local wildlife. If they find an animal that is sick or injured, make sure they know they should tell an

adult right away. 6. You CAN make a difference. Severely injured animals may not be able to return to the wild, but many rehab centers keep them as display animals and use them to teach the public more about them. Unless you are a veterinarian, you cannot accurately determine if an animal will survive or not. Animals that really have no chance will be humanely euthanized instead of left to suffer, which in a case like that, is the kindest thing that can be done.
