Gray wolves go back to state control

Federal protections for Rocky Mountain wolves to be lifted effective today with notice in Federal Register

BILLINGS, Mont. — The Obama administration on Wednesday moved to lift Endangered Species Act protections for 5,500 gray wolves in the Northern Rockies and Great Lakes, drawing the line on the predators' rapid expansion over the last two decades.

Public hunts for hundreds of wolves already are planned this fall in Idaho and Montana.

Conservationists have hailed the animal's recovery from near extinction last century as a landmark achievement — one that should be extended to the Pacific Northwest and New England.

But their return has stirred a backlash from agriculture and

sporting groups angry over wolf attacks on livestock and big game herds.

Interior Department officials said Wednesday that the most suitable wolf habitat already was occupied. No further introductions of the species are planned.

Many biologists say wolves recovered to sustainable levels a decade ago in some parts of the lower 48 states. But it took a rider to the federal budget bill inserted

Firefighters, airmen practice in T.F.

When summer fires break out, the planes and pilots tasked with snuffing out the blazes can come from near and far.

Training for that scenario took place on Tuesday at Joslin Field, Magic Valley Regional Airport, where a hulking C-130 aircraft landed and took off after filling up with 3,000 gallons of water for some practice drops between Twin Falls and Boise.

The exercise was a snapshot of the Modular Airborne Fire Fighting System (MAFFS), which blends people and re-

sources from different agencies that include the U.S. Forest Service, U.S. Bureau of Land Management, and military planes and air crew.

The plane and air crew that landed in Twin Falls on Tuesday came from the 145th Air Wing of the North Carolina Air National Guard, based in Charlotte, N.C. At the airport, they were briefed at the BLM's Twin Falls air base.

It's a training exercise that will familiarize the crew with the air base and the lay of the land, should they return later this firefighting season. Similar training exercises are also

Still putting Idaho to work

Faced with dwindling funding, Twin Falls nonprofit continues to help disabled Idahoans find jobs

More than 7,000 people with disabilities have walked through Magic Valley Rehabilitation Services' door throughout its 38 years in business, and walked back out with job skills and new work opportunities.

The private Twin Falls nonprofit serves about 50 to 60 people at a given time and helps people with disabilities ranging from severe back problems, traumatic brain injuries and developmental disabilities find job placement. But those services are starting to be more restricted as MVRS funding continues to dwindle. Idaho rehab services providers will share in the loss of more than \$100 million in state and federal funding in fiscal 2012, after the Idaho Legislature passed a Medicaid reform bill earlier this year.

Taliban release video of captured Hailey soldier

WASHINGTON (AP) — A newly released Taliban video shows the only U.S. soldier held captive in the Afghan war being blindfolded and led away by an insurgent. It appears a portion of the same video was released months ago.

The SITE Intelligence Group, which tracks militant websites, says the video released on jihadist forums Wednesday shows Spc. Bowe Bergdahl, of Hailey, standing next to Sangin Zadran, a senior official in the al-Qaida-linked Haqqani network in Paktika province. Sangin then blindfolds Bergdahl and leads him away.

The release is the fifth since Bergdahl was captured in June 2009. The beginning portion — with Bergdahl just standing beside Sangin — was released in December.

Army spokesman Gary Tallman said officials are studying the video and agreed it appears old.

being carried out this week at Gowen Field in Boise. After the Long Butte Fire scorched about 300,000 acres near Hagerman in August 2010, and area forests have been damaged by pine bark beetles, wildfire experts are forecasting an average fire season this year, though a wet spring could provide plenty of fuel to burn when things dry out.

For Col. Brian Ratchford, a pilot from North Carolina, the firefighting work is a mission that falls in line with the National Guard's minuteman tradition of responding to threats at home.

"The best part is that you are able to help people out," he said.

To achieve their mission, military pilots follow the lead of BLM and Forest Service planes that direct them to drop spots for dousing fires.

For C-130 crews, it's not flying as usual. The planes have to drop down to an altitude of about 150 to 200 feet, normally a level they don't fly at, except during landings.

"You just have to pay at-

tention and be totally aware of the airspace," Ratchford said.

Tuesday's exercise included 24 passes over a practice site — 16 of them dry runs and eight while dropping water.

Two compressors in the C-130 hold 3,000 gallons of pressurized retardant, controlling its level of saturation based on the intensity of the blaze. Because Tuesday's action was a training exercise, the plane held water instead of retardant.

The BLM's Twin Falls base was certified this year as an approved spot for C-130 planes to land as part of MAFFS operations. Certification came in March, after an Air Force inspection of the facility.

The base is a fueling place not only for fires on BLM land, but also those in national forests.

"This allows you to get training to make sure we're all on the same page," said Matt Mihalco, a MAFFS liaison officer who works with the California Department of Forestry and Fire Protection.

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Xavier report finds no mismanagement

A final report on Xavier Charter School's financial operations found no mismanagement by Paragon Schools LLC, school board members were told at a special Wednesday evening meeting.

The investigation into Xavier's finances came out of a Feb. 10 presentation by Board Trustee Joan Hurlock, who questioned the board's lack of oversight of bank accounts and miscommunication between the board and Paragon, the school's management company.

The final report, which included recommended changes to the financial process, was approved by a 3-1 board vote.

Trustees Shawn Willsey and Gerardo Munoz prepared the financial report and presented it at the special meeting. Willsey addressed the main issues

highlighted in Hurlock's presentations, including accounting principals, bank accounts, check signers, annual financial audits and late bills.

Willsey said due diligence was done in the investigation and nothing showed mismanagement of funds by Paragon. The two board members reached their conclusion after meetings with Paragon owner Brandon Fairbanks, and CPA and Xavier stakeholder Mike Burr. They also reviewed a letter from CPA and former board member Scott Hunsaker, financial records, the State Department of Education Idaho Financial Accounting Reporting Management System Manual and had a discussion with a personal banker and the spokesman from Smith, Griffiths, Smith & Co., the firm that audited Xavier.

Nine recommendations by Willsey and Munoz included more transparency,

using in-house accounting software, and switching to paying bills and receiving bill statements electronically.

Hurlock commended the men for their report and said her intention in her presentation was to present questions and concerns, rather than put Paragon in a bad light. But she voted against the report, saying she didn't agree with the personal attacks made against her in the conclusion. One sentence states that while her presentation was perhaps well-intentioned, it was conducted in an "unprofessional and reckless manner based on incomplete data."

Willsey, Munoz and Board Chairwoman Teresa Berry openly chastised Hurlock for her presentation and said she needed to have done more research before she brought her questions to the public.

Berry said Hurlock never talked to Xavier's bookkeeper and didn't try to find an-

swers with the right sources. But Hurlock said she had given the research her best interest, and didn't think the sentences calling her out in the conclusion should be included in the report.

Lacking any evidence of mismanagement, the board will not conduct a forensic audit of Paragon. The board offered an apology to Paragon for any fallout, and Willsey noted the relationship between Paragon and Xavier has been damaged and a decision to exit from the contract early is still up for discussion.

In other business, Trustee Emily Huber wrote a letter of resignation that was read at the special meeting. Berry said the board will discuss the process to appoint or elect a new member at the next board meeting on May 12.

by Western lawmakers to overcome years of lawsuits and lift protections for 1,300 wolves in the Northern Rockies.

The rider barred any courtroom challenges and marked the first time Congress has removed an animal listed under the endangered act. Protections for the Rockies wolves are to be lifted effective with a notice today in the Federal Register.

About 4,200 wolves listed as threatened in the western Great Lakes also are slated to lose protections. That could happen by the end of this year, following the review of public comments received on the proposal over the next two months.

"From a biological perspective, gray wolves have recovered," said Interior Secretary Ken Salazar. "That is a remarkable milestone for an iconic American species."

The Great Lakes proposal also includes portions of North and South Dakota, Iowa, Illinois, Indiana and Ohio, although government biologist Laura Ragan said no wolves permanently reside in those states.

A pending petition before the Interior Department seeks to extend the government's wolf recovery plan nationwide. But Noah Greenwald with the Center for Biological Diversity, the sponsor of the petition, said Wednesday's announcement made clear that the government has no such intentions.

"In our view wolf recovery is not done," Greenwald said. "We're disappointed with seeing the Fish and Wildlife Service attempt to get out from under it."

Fish and Wildlife officials said they plan to review the gray wolf's status in the Pacific Northwest and the

desert Southwest.

Gray wolves also are coming off the list in eastern states, but officials say that's because emerging science indicates that another predator, the Eastern wolf, is the region's native wolf species. Those are now largely absent from the United States but occasionally wander from Canada into New England.

Idaho officials previously said they want to reduce their state's wolf population to about 500 animals, versus current estimates of more than 700. On Wednesday, Department of Fish and Game Director Virgil Moore said he'll make sure Idaho's wolf population remains well above the 150-animal threshold that would invite the federal government to consider reinstating protections.

Rancher Royce Schwenkfelder, whose family arrived in the western Idaho town of Cambridge in the 1880s, said he feels more comfortable with wolves under state jurisdiction. But he was doubtful that wolves could

be reduced to levels that will eliminate attacks on cattle that he runs on Indian Mountain. "The feds have filled us up with more wolves than we can handle," Schwenkfelder said.

Montana wildlife officials this week proposed a public hunt for up to 220 wolves this fall, out of a population estimated to number at least 566 animals. The state's Democratic U.S. senators, Max Baucus and Jon Tester, said Wednesday that turning over control of wolves to state wildlife agencies was the right thing to do.

"State biologists need to manage them like any other recovered species," said Tester, who worked with Idaho Republican Rep. Mike Simpson to get the rider in the budget bill.

No hunts are planned immediately for small populations of wolves in Oregon, Washington and Utah.

In addition to the hunts, officials say wolves that attack livestock will continue to be removed by wildlife agents. More than 1,500

wolves have been killed for livestock attacks since the animals were reintroduced to the Northern Rockies from Canada in the 1990s.

Michigan, Minnesota and Wisconsin have plans meant to keep the populations at healthy levels while allowing government agents to kill animals that can't be driven away. None would allow hunting or trapping for at least five years, although states could revise those plans.

Wednesday's announcement leaves the fate of about 340 wolves in Wyoming unresolved. Salazar and his staff have been negotiating for months over the issue with Wyoming Gov. Matt Mead.

Mead said Wednesday that he was hoping for an agreement with the administration to get a bill through Congress lifting protections in his state.

The governor suggested legislation that was the only way to prevent lawsuits from environmentalists that could otherwise derail the effort.

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Jerome man faces charges related to drugs, stabbing

A Jerome man awaiting a preliminary hearing for felony battery faces another felony charge.

Todd L. Hall, 36, was arrested and charged with possession of a controlled substance over the weekend, less than two months after he appeared in Twin Falls County 5th District Magistrate Court on an aggravated battery charge. Hall is accused of stabbing Donald Cordell, who was a co-worker of Hall's at TDK Auto Service in Twin Falls, in the abdomen on Feb. 11.

The latest felony charge resulted from a traffic stop last Friday. The police report claims that Hall was stopped for cutting off another vehicle while making an abrupt lane change near the intersection of Addison Avenue West and Washington Street North.

A K-9 unit was dispatched, as Hall has a history of multiple driving-under-the-influence convictions. This time, he was also allegedly driving on a suspended license. A search of Hall's gray/black 1997 Pontiac Grand Am turned up a methamphetamine pipe.

Hall is held on \$100,000 bond as he awaits a May 13 preliminary hearing for possession of a controlled substance, and a May 20 preliminary hearing for aggravated battery. Hall was also charged with two misdemeanors from the stop: driving without privileges — online court records show he has 16 prior convictions on this charge — and driving without insurance.

Buhl man faces felony assault charge

Duarte Nunes is held at the Twin Falls County Jail on \$100,000 bond, charged with felony aggravated assault with a deadly weapon.

The 29-year-old Buhl man is accused of threatening himself and family with a shotgun on Saturday night at their home, approximately four miles southwest of Buhl. The police report noted that Nunes' wife and a friend he had gone fishing with earlier in the day both told of Nunes' outburst and how he fired a shot outside of the house before kicking in a door to gain entry. No one was injured, and Nunes was arrested by Twin Falls County sheriff's deputies.

Nunes faces a May 13 preliminary hearing.

T.F. County joins federal ID program

Twin Falls County will begin using the Secure Communities program to help the federal government identify criminal aliens in local jails and state prisons, the U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement agency announced Tuesday.

The program uses inmate fingerprints to scan federal immigration databases to single out individuals in the country illegally and remove them from the U.S.

Idaho readies for wolf management

It's official: State management of gray wolves in Idaho begins today.

There's still plenty of work and decisions ahead for the Idaho Department of Fish and Game, which is charged with overseeing the state's wolf population. Fish and Game officials have been down this path before with the 2009 delisting of the gray wolf, which led to a popular hunt aimed at paring back the predator's impact on both livestock and deer and elk herds.

The full picture of the state's wolf management plan is yet to unfold, but hunts are on the horizon. The animal's Idaho population stood at an estimated 87 packs with 705 wolves at the end of 2010.

Idaho Fish and Game Director Virgil Moore told reporters in a conference call on Wednesday that commissioners haven't decided the exact parameters for wolf hunts, including how many tags will be issued. But he expects it to be similarly structured to the state's 2009-10 season. In that hunt, the quota was 220 wolves, and hunters killed 188.

"Wolves are here to stay," Moore said. "They're part of the landscape."

The U.S. Interior Department will publish a rule today that immediately

delists the gray wolf in Idaho and Montana, the result of language inserted into a budget bill that recently went through Congress and was signed into law by President Barack Obama. The wolf was initially delisted in 2009, but then put back on the federal endangered species list in 2010 by a federal judge after environmental groups sued.

There are other unknowns. The state's 2002 management plan required a minimum of 150 wolves in the state. That provides a buffer above a 100-wolf threshold that, if the population drops below it, triggers an immediate review by federal wildlife officials of the state's plan.

Moore said it's critical to continue having a buffer that ensures the wolf population doesn't dip too low, but said he can't give a hard number because he doesn't know yet what kind of buffer is necessary. In a fact sheet released Wednesday, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service stated that Idaho's 2002 plan "may continue to be adequate," but the genetic dispersal of wolves across the region would be hampered if the population is managed at minimum levels.

The state's 2008 wolf management plan called for keeping the wolf population between 518 and 732 animals.

Ultimately, the state

Fish and Game Commission will make the final decision about the threshold. Commissioners will be briefed at their meeting this month about what's needed for wolf management, with decisions made in July or August. Officials hope to start a hunt by early September.

Moore said it's his hope that sport hunting will become the most valuable management tool for the wolf. But that doesn't mean the state won't consider other tools.

Other management methods the department is looking at include controlled aerial hunts by wildlife officials and working with federal wildlife agents to address growing packs in the Lolo area of northern Idaho.

Other officials welcomed the return to state management.

"In '09 our quota was 220," said Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter, referring to the state's wolf hunt. "We successfully took 188 wolves and it will be that same kind of response and that same kind of responsible management plan."

U.S. Rep. Mike Simpson, R-Idaho, played a key role in getting the language inserted into the bill that delisted the wolf.

"No one can rationally argue that the Rocky Mountain gray wolf is still endangered," Simpson said in a statement. "Wolf populations in the west are robust and far exceed recovery goals. If the Endangered Species Act is going to be effective at all, we need to remove recovered species from the list and consider it a victory."

High noon for Cassia County deal on law enforcement

Nobody in Idaho has done a better job of consolidating government services than Cassia County. Its 5,100 students are served by a single school district, and since 1988 the county and the city of Burley have combined law enforcement.

That’s the template of the future for Idaho communities, especially since Superintendent of Public Instruction Tom Luna’s “Students Come First” initiative envisions encouraging school districts to consolidate services by making less state money available.

Our view: Cassia County took up the issue of consolidated government services years ago. Because of that, it’s ahead of most Idaho cities, counties and school districts.

But consolidation isn’t perfect, as the current dustup between Cassia County and Burley over law enforcement services demonstrates.

With a May 16 deadline looming, Burley officials have held off on signing a contract to continue to receive law enforcement services through the Cassia County Sheriff’s Office in fiscal 2012, which begins in July. City officials have questioned Burley’s \$1.53 million share of the office’s overall \$3.37-million cost this year, and whether the city can police itself for less.

Cassia County Sheriff Randy Kidd has said Burley is getting a good deal, considering that the majority of his office’s work originates within city limits.

“It’s what is best for the citizens,” Kidd said of the jointly funded office. “I told the Mayor (Terry Greenman) this: If I was a selfish man and I was looking out for me, I would tell the city of Burley to get their law-enforcement program and get it tomorrow, because it would cut my work by two-thirds and my pay would probably stay the same.

“I keep fighting for this because it’s what’s best for the citizens. We’ve had this together for almost 30 years, and if this thing splits up, we’re taking law enforcement in Cassia County back 30 years, and I think that would be a tragedy.”

Since 2006, Kidd said, Burley’s share hasn’t kept pace with the rising cost of operating his office. The city paid 47.5 percent of the office’s costs in 2006, and that percentage has since dropped to 45.3 percent.

According to Kidd, 2,897 of the 3,660 cases his office has investigated since January 2010 originated in Burley.

Former Burley Mayor Jon Anderson said he’s concerned that city residents are paying twice for the same law enforcement services through city and county property taxes. Anderson also voiced concerns about sending city tax money to elected officials outside the city’s purview, as the county holds fiscal control over Kidd’s office.

But, Anderson said, Burley citizens would be “poorly served” by a city police department. He also recounted what he called “horrible problems.”

“I remember when we had a city police department and a county sheriff’s department,” he said. “They lied to each other. They wouldn’t tell the truth.”

Former Burley City Councilman and Cassia County Commissioner Clay Handy says he was on the City Council when the departments joined forces, adding that the police department “was in deep trouble” at the time.

Kidd said the joint law enforcement contract prevents duplicated services, offers no liability costs for the city, benefits from grants because it is a multijurisdictional agency, and offers better law enforcement for all citizens due to its larger size and specialized services like the SWAT and dive teams.

Bottom line: Consolidated law enforcement isn’t perfect for either Cassia County or Burley, but it’s a whole lot better than the alternatives.

And so it goes with consolidated government services. The Cassia County School District — consolidated since 1948 — always treads a fine line when it needs to replace the roof on a school in, say, Malta. What will folks in Burley, Oakley and Declo think about paying for that?

But the reality is that the resources available to local governments in Idaho are shrinking. And conversations about consolidation are no longer just an academic exercise.

Imagining a world without the dollar

The dollar doesn’t have much clout these days. The greenback has lost 12 percent of its value against foreign currencies since the chaotic period after the failure of Lehman Brothers in 2008, and nearly 5 percent since the end of 2010.

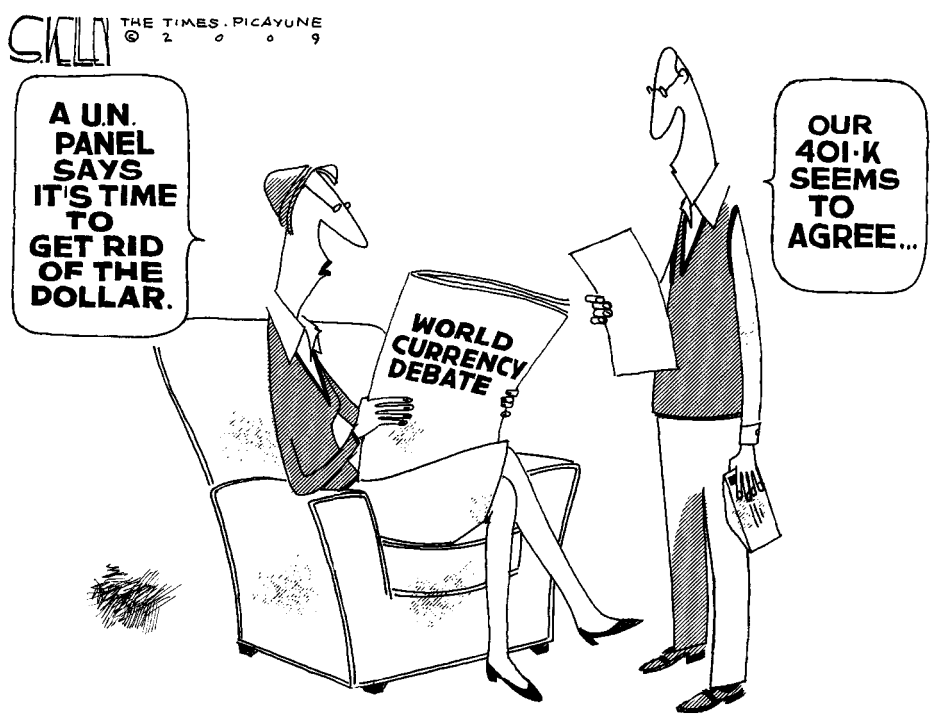
Economists are debating the end of the era of the dollar, while news organizations paint it as a 98-pound weakling. Our so-called “fiat” currency, backed only by the full faith and credit of the government, no longer commands respect. So wouldn’t we be better off without it?

Imagine you woke up tomorrow and the dollar had vanished. The Federal Reserve was out of the business of supplying money. How would you go about your affairs?

The obvious answer is that life would become one big swap meet. It would be like your local farmers market, except that instead of a vendor selling carrots in exchange for dollars, she would have to trade them for the onions in the neighboring stall or for the paring knife of the cook with no vegetables at all. The problem with this is what economists call “non-coincidence of wants” — the carrot seller may not want onions, and those onions may rot before she finds someone who does.

This highlights the convenience of currency as a medium of exchange and a store of value. It follows that in a world where the United States no longer had a currency, there would be an incentive to use someone else’s.

Just look to our history. Britain’s 13 North American colonies were prohibited from operating a mint or otherwise coining money. So



the colonists turned to Spanish silver coin, which they obtained by exporting dried fish and whale oil to the West Indies. Were the dollar to magically disappear, Americans would again resort to using other monies. When Ron Paul says “end the Fed,” he presumably doesn’t realize that he would be giving a valuable franchise to the Bank of Canada.

Realistically, our currency needs could be met only by another large economy, and Canada might be too small an issuer of currency. But the only other potential candidates — Europe and China — both have drawbacks. Europe is bogged down in a debt crisis, while China limits the use of its currency abroad partly to prevent its exchange rate from rising.

So imagine instead that we do not start using another country’s money. Figuring out how many carrots to offer for an onion, how many onions to offer for a potato and how many potatoes to offer for a paring knife would be complicated without a common measuring rod. We would therefore gravitate to one commodity as the standard by which the value of all other commodities was expressed.

In colonial Virginia, tobacco initially served this purpose. The next step was to settle transactions using not actual tobacco but warehouse receipts for stored tobacco. This was more convenient, but it was also riskier. The operators of the warehouse had an incentive to issue more receipts — to themselves, of course — than they had tobacco in storage. As a result, Virginia’s tobacco warehouses were highly regulated, and the penalty for issuing fraudulent receipts was death.

In a world without dollars, it follows, the right to issue notes would have to be limited to a set of regulated entities — call them banks. This was how currency entered circulation before the Civil War. Banks printed up and lent out engraved bank notes. State legislatures required them to hold gold or securities sufficient in value to redeem their notes.

The problem, predictably, was that not all states enforced their regulations vigorously. Some allowed banks to carry government and railway bonds on their books at full value when they were worth only cents on the dollar. If there was a rush to redeem bank notes, the issuer

would find it impossible to do so.

Hence, not all bank notes were created equal. It mattered greatly by whom they were issued. Sensing a need, specialized collectors of financial intelligence leapt into the breach, publishing newsletters known as “note reporters” that listed the prices at which different bank notes traded, reflecting the issuer’s good reputation or lack thereof.

The 21st-century analog would be our local farmer scanning each individual bank note with a smartphone to see exactly how many carrots it was worth before taking it in payment. Doable, perhaps, though this would certainly slow down the payment process.

Critics of the dollar are having a field day. But when I think about our current monetary arrangements, I am inclined to paraphrase Winston Churchill on democracy: Ours is the worst possible system, except for all the others.

Animal agriculture is not a pretty picture

A heated debate is under way in Minnesota over legislation that would criminalize the production or possession of videos of animal agricultural facilities. This bill follows on the heels of similar efforts in Florida and Iowa that aim to provide enhanced shielding from scrutiny for only one industry: large-scale animal agriculture.

The large companies pushing this bill claim that farmers need protection from environmental and animal welfare activists, who in turn insist that the general public and the animals need safeguarding from the industry.

The truth is that both farmers and animals need protection — but not from photographers or animal activists. What they need is less political support directed to an industry that increasingly consolidates and integrates food animal production in ways that harm consumers, rural communities, the animals and farmers themselves.

Industrial animal agriculture is not practiced on family farms, although the industry would like to have the public think so. But these are factories — concentrated animal feeding operations that house

hundreds of thousands of chickens or thousands of hogs in a single operation.

According to the U.S. Department of Agriculture, from 1950 to 2007 the number of U.S. poultry farms dropped from more than 1.6 million to fewer than 30,000, even though the number of broiler chickens produced grew by more than 1,400 percent over the period. Similarly, between 1992 and 2007, the number of hog farms fell by more than 60 percent while the number of hogs grew by about 10 million animals.

The CAFO model relies on having the maximum number of animals in the smallest amount of space, with the minimum number of employees to provide care. “Production units” (which we used to call animals) are kept in appalling conditions that require constant low-level doses of antibiotics to prevent disease — increasing the threat of drug-resistant illness for all of us. These oper-

ations also generate high levels of waste, much of which ends up in our water supply. It should come as no surprise that the industry doesn’t want anyone to see these facilities, hence the push to criminalize any effort at filming.

The harm generated by this unsustainable model of animal agriculture also extends to farmers. Today, USDA figures reveal that almost 90 percent of all poultry sold in the United States falls under production contracts, where the chickens themselves are no longer owned by the farmers. Instead, those who actually tend the animals have been relegated to the role of “contract growers” by an industry that dictates how and under what conditions the animals will be fed, raised and slaughtered. This same model is increasingly used for hogs.

As a result, farmers assume enormous risk, including liability for waste disposal and mortgages on immense barns, the design and size of which are dictated by the industry. Marketing power is concentrated in the hands of a small number of large, vertically integrated companies that own, process and sell the

animal products.

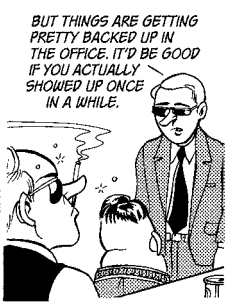
Problems in the system have grown so widespread that last year the U.S. Department of Agriculture and the Department of Justice initiated an unprecedented series of nationwide workshops to hear from farmers who talked about unfair demands, lack of transparency in the contract process, loss of independence — and fear of retaliation from the industry if they spoke out.

The legislation under debate in Minnesota, like its predecessors in other states, will make it harder for the public to know how their food is produced. Contract farmers have no version of whistleblower protection from predatory contract practices and food animals cannot speak for themselves. Undercover videos often provide the only glimpse we have into the unfair and harmful way our meat is produced. Policymakers seeking to criminalize whistleblower-type actions should reassess their priorities.

Guns-on-campus movement too much for even Arizona

Early this year, we learned that Utah was considering a bill to name a Browning pistol its official state firearm. Meanwhile in Washington, Sen. Frank Lautenberg of New Jersey was pushing for a bill that would make it more difficult to sell guns to people on the terror watch list. I am excited to report that one of these pieces of legislation finally has been passed into law.

Yes! Utah now has an official state gun. It beat out Arizona, which this week bestowed its honor on the Colt Single-Action Army pistol.

Lautenberg's bill, meanwhile, has gone nowhere whatsoever. It would require that gun purchases by people on the terror watch list be vetted by the attorney general's office to make sure that arming the individual in question would not pose a danger to homeland security. Opponents point out that the terror watch list is not always reliable, and the bill might therefore force innocent Americans to go through an entire additional step while purchasing arma-

ments and explosives.

"It's taking a little bit of a back seat," the senator conceded. "But we're on it." Like all advocates of sensible gun regulation, he has, by necessity, developed an incredibly optimistic outlook.

Speaking of the sunny side, the Brady Campaign to Prevent Gun Violence is happy to report that so far this year, no state has passed a law prohibiting colleges from banning guns on campus. This is pretty notable, since failure to require that institutions of higher learning be gun-friendly is the only thing that stands between some states and a perfect 100 percent rating from the National Rifle Association. "It's failed 51 straight times in 21 states," said Brian Malte of the Brady Campaign.

Actually, it did pass in Arizona recently, although it was vetoed by Gov. Jan

Brewer. We have had cause to make fun of Brewer in the past, sometimes for matters as trivial as making up stories about illegal immigrants leaving piles of severed heads in the desert. However, this woman has had a heck of a lot of crazy legislation to plow through. Besides the "campus carry" bill, she nixed a "birther" bill aimed at knocking President Obama off the next state presidential ballot. So, really, even though Brewer did sign the bill making the Colt pistol Arizona's state gun, you cannot say she had a bad April.

The Colt bill, which had originally failed during the Arizona Legislature's rush to adjournment, was resuscitated and passed in the wee small hours of the morning just before everybody left town. You'd have thought this would be a hard sell, what with the memory of the Tucson massacre so fresh, not to mention the fact that, as a lawmaker of Navajo descent pointed out, the Colt's role in winning the West has somewhat less pleasant connotations to Arizona's American Indian

population.

However, in the end, the majority conceded to the logic of people like Sen. Steve Smith, one of the sponsors. "One would argue the white men themselves were instrumental weapons of mass destruction against the Native Americans. Should we not honor any white people?" he demanded.

What with all this excitement, the lawmakers did not have enough time to make a minuscule change in state law that would have allowed 20,000 residents to get extended unemployment benefits, which would have been paid for entirely by federal funds. The state has a 9.5 percent unemployment rate.

But, you know, they had the official state gun thing to work out. "It wasn't their priority," said the House minority whip, Anna Tovar.

Besides deliberately ignoring the long-term unemployed and caving in to lobbying by the gunmakers, I'm sorry to say that Arizona also gave the whole state thing-naming tradition a bad name.

I have always been a big fan of official state rocks and birds and flowers, in part because selecting them really does tend to distract legislatures from other more alarming activity. Also, the nominations usually come from groups of schoolchildren, who then get to watch democracy in action as the contenders for state fern or state song go head to head in a battle down to the wire. Many years ago, I was privileged to watch a fight over the official state mammal of Connecticut, in which the whale beat out the deer, to the edification of all homeowners who have never once woken up to discover that overnight, a whale had eaten their tulips.

But it's pretty creepy to imagine a bunch of third graders debating the merits of potential state guns. There are plenty of other

routes to go here. I believe New York is working on a state dog. Neither Arizona or Utah has a state dog, although I was impressed to note that Utah has both an official state vegetable (Spanish sweet onion) and an official state historic vegetable (sugar beet).

Opportunities abound. If you want to name something, states, go for a beagle.

Bin Laden: The boy who watched 'Bonanza'

Osama Bin Laden's mother was about 15 at the time of his birth. Nicknamed "The Slave" inside the family, she was soon discarded and sent off to be married to a middle manager in the Bin Laden construction firm.

Osama revered the father he rarely got to see and adored his mother. As a teenager, he "would lie at her feet and caress her," a family friend told Steve Coll, for his definitive biography "The Bin Ladens: An Arabian Family in the American Century."

Like many people who go on to alter history, for good and evil, Bin Laden lost his father when he was about 9. The family patriarch was killed in a plane crash caused by an American pilot in the Saudi province of Asir. (Five of the Sept. 11 hijackers would come from that province. His brother was later killed in a plane crash on American soil.)

Osama was an extremely shy child, Coll writes. He was an outsider in his new family but also the golden goose. His allowance and inheritance was the source of his family's wealth.

He lived a suburban existence and was sent to an elite school, wearing a blue blazer and being taught by European teachers. As a boy he watched "Bonanza" and became infatuated by another American show called "Fury," about a troubled orphaned boy who goes off to a ranch and tames wild horses. He was a mediocre student but religiously devout. He made it to university, but didn't last long. He married his first cousin when she was 14 and went into the family business.

I repeat these personal facts because we have a tendency to see history as driven by deep historical forces. And sometimes it is. But sometimes it is driven by completely inexplicable individuals, who combine qualities you would think could never go together, who

lead in ways that violate every rule of leadership, who are able to perpetrate enormous evils even though they themselves seem completely pathetic.

Analysts spend their lives trying to anticipate future threats and understand underlying forces. But nobody could have possibly anticipated Bin Laden's life and the giant effect it would have. The whole episode makes you despair about making predictions.

As a family man, Bin Laden was interested in sex, cars and work but was otherwise devout. He did not permit photography in his presence. He banned "Sesame Street," Tabasco sauce and straws from his home. He covered his eyes if an unveiled woman entered the room. He liked to watch the news, but he had his children stand by the set and turn down the volume whenever music came on.

As Coll emphasized in an interview on Monday, this sort of devoutness, while not everybody's cup of tea, was utterly orthodox in his society. He was not a rebel as a young man.

After the Soviets invaded Afghanistan, he organized jihadi tourism: helping young, idealistic Arab fighters who wanted to spend some time fighting the invaders. He was not a fighter himself, more of a courier and organizer, though after he survived one Soviet bombardment, he began to fashion a self-glorifying mythology.

He was still painfully shy but returned with an enormous sense of entitlement. In 1990, he wanted to run the Saudi response to the Iraqi invasion of Kuwait. He also thought he should run the family business. After he

was shot down for both roles, the radicalism grew.

We think of terrorism leaders as hard and intimidating. Bin Laden was gentle and soft, with a flaccid handshake. Yet his soldiers have told researchers such as Peter Bergen, the author of "The Longest War," that meeting him was a deeply spiritual experience. They would tell stories of his ability to avoid giving offense and forgive transgressors.

We think of terrorists as trying to build cells and organizations, but Bin Laden created an anti-organization — an open-source set of networks with some top-down control but much decentralization and a willingness to embrace all recruits, regardless of race, sect or nationality.

We think of war fighters as using violence to seize property and power, but Bin Laden seemed to regard murder as a subdivision of brand management. It was a

way to inspire the fundraising networks, dominate the news and manipulate meaning.

In short, Osama Bin Laden seemed to live in an ethereal, postmodern world of symbols and signifiers and also a cruel murderous world of rage and humiliation. Even the most brilliant intelligence analyst could not anticipate such an odd premodern and postglobalized creature, or could imagine that such a creature would gain such power.

I just wish there were a democratic Bin Laden, that amid all the Arab hunger for dignity and freedom there was another inexplicable person with the ability to frame narratives and propel action — for good, not evil.

So far, there doesn't seem to be, which is tragic because individuals matter.

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Obama decides against releasing bin Laden photos

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Barack Obama ordered grisly photographs of Osama bin Laden in death sealed from public view on Wednesday, declaring, "We don't need to spike the football" in triumph after this week's daring middle-of-the-night raid. The terrorist leader was killed by American commandos who burst into his room and feared he was reaching for a nearby weapon, U.S. officials said.

Several weapons were found in the room where the terror chief died, including AK-47 assault rifles and side arms, the officials said. They spoke on condition of anonymity as they offered the most recent in a series of increasingly detailed and sometimes-shifting accounts of bin Laden's final minutes after a decade on the run.

Obama said releasing the photographs taken by the Navy SEAL raiders was "not who we are" as a country.

Though some may deny his death, "the fact of the matter is you will not see bin Laden walking this earth again," the president said in an interview taped for CBS' "60 Minutes."

He said any release of the photos could become a propaganda tool for bin Laden's adherents eager to incite violence.

White House press secretary Jay Carney said the president's decision applied to photographs of bin Laden, said to show a portion of his skull blown away from a gunshot wound to the area of his left eye, as well as to a video recording of his burial several hours later in the North Arabian Sea.

The president made no public remarks during the day about the raid, apart from the taped interview. But he arranged a visit for today to ground zero in Manhattan, where the World Trade Center twin towers once stood.

Researchers study beetle-kill forest fires

HELENA, Mont. (AP) — Researchers are taking the first steps toward closing wide knowledge gaps in the behavior of wildfires in millions of acres of Western forests devastated by the mountain pine beetle epidemic, a University of Idaho professor said Wednesday.

Over the past decade, the rice-sized beetle has decimated some 9 million acres of forest in the Rocky Mountain West and nearly five times that in Canada. But there is relatively little scientific research into how fire behavior changes in forests with beetle-killed trees, particularly in stands where there is a mix of live and dead trees.

Research has been slow in developing because of the difficulty to conduct fire experiments in forests near populated areas, said professor Jeffrey Hicke. There also are disagreements between existing studies because they often failed to consider the

same criteria, he said.

Many of the gaps are baseline information, such as how fire behavior changes depending on the percentage of dead trees in one stand. But new studies presented at a Helena seminar on pine beetles and wildfires show that progress is being made.

"We're pretty close to making large steps to greater understanding," Hicke said.

One such study by U.S. Forest Service ecologist Matt Jolly shows for the first time that the needles of beetle-killed trees contain 10 times less moisture and a different chemical makeup than healthy trees. That means the red needles of beetle-killed trees can ignite three times faster and burn more intensely than healthy trees, Jolly found.

Jolly called his findings a "duh" moment that should seem obvious, but his is the first such study conducted. It's necessary to answer these base questions to dispel theories that there is no significant difference in fire threat between a healthy

pine tree and one killed by mountain pine beetles.

"We're going back to these roots to dispel the folklore," he said.

Jolly's findings are being used by Forest Service ecol-

ogist Russ Parsons to develop a model that will eventually aid crews who fight blazes where forest canopies have turned from green to red from the beetle outbreak.

Mexican brewers seek recipe for microbrewery success

MEXICO CITY — It sounds like a movie where high jinks ensue: A teetotaling Mexican hotel worker travels to England, befriends a whisky-drinking Irishman and scrubs toilets in a pub while learning to brew killer beer.

Such is the odd path Jose Morales has taken since a sweltering day five years ago when he found himself wondering how to make a beverage he doesn't even drink. The day-

dreaming has led Morales, then a hotel warehouse manager, to an unlikely new calling as a beer maker.

Morales, 36, is among a burst of Mexican brewers who are testing recipes and investing in imported equipment in hopes of finding the same formula for success that microbreweries

north of the border have found.

Mostly self-taught, the Mexican brewers have launched an array of offerings, from Belgian-style wheat beers and imperial stouts to an ale aged in tequila barrels. They want to translate a hobby into commercial success in a country that is increasingly quick to embrace

foreign trends, from smartphones to designer coffee.

"There's a niche. People are looking for something different," said Jaime Andreu, commercial director of the Primus Brewery and spokesman for the Mexican microbrewers association, which has 16 members.

Some brands of cerveza artisanal have won awards abroad. But the entrepreneurs have found that peddling fancy \$4 beers in Mexico means battling a couple of Goliaths.

YOUR MONEY: Beware of investor traps

The turmoil in the credit, securities and real estate markets has led some investors to seek higher returns in non-traditional, speculative investments.

Gavin Gee, director of the Idaho Department of Finance, warns that investors who choose to navigate these products should keep in mind:

- **Gold and precious metals.** High gold prices have trapped some investors in gold bullion scams in which a seller offers to retain "purchased" gold in a "secure vault" and promises to sell

the gold for the investor when it gains in value. In many instances the gold does not exist. Investors have also been harmed by promoters pitching investment pools in precious metal commodities and gold mines.

- **Green schemes.** Investment opportunities tied to the development of new energy-efficient "green" technologies are increasingly popular with investors and scammers alike. Scammers exploit headlines to cash in on unsuspecting investors, whether from investments

related to the clean-up of the Gulf of Mexico oil spill or the rising national interest in environmental innovations tied to "clean" energy.

- **Private or special deals.** Some investors encounter investment opportunities or deals couched as "private" or only for "special" clients. While securities laws do offer businesses the opportunity to raise capital by selling securities to a relatively small number of investors in a non-public offering, these securities are not subject to the same

review as others. Many state securities regulators have seen continued or increased abuse of fraudulent private offerings made under federal exemptions or not regulated at all. Although properly used by many legitimate issuers, private offerings have become an attractive option for con artists looking to steal money from investors by promoting the special or private nature of these schemes and by making false and misleading representations.

Ralcorp rejects \$4.9B bid from ConAgra

NEW YORK — ConAgra Foods Inc. made a \$4.9 billion bid for Ralcorp Holdings Inc., which the maker of Post cereal and store-brand products rejected Wednesday.

ConAgra has made two offers to acquire RalCorp in an effort to expand its business into private-label products.

Ralcorp said the \$86-per-share bid from ConAgra is not in shareholders' best interests. It followed an \$82-per-share offer in March that Ralcorp also refused.

The latest offer is a 3.2 percent premium over Ralcorp's most recent closing stock price of \$83.33 but well below what some analysts estimate it could fetch.

ConAgra's brands include Chef Boyardee and Slim Jim. Closing the deal would make the company the third-largest packaged food maker in the U.S. The company also owns and oper-

ates the Twin Falls based Lamb Weston processing center.

Ralcorp's Chairman William Stiritz said the company has a proven track record of delivering share-

holder value and the company is confident that its team and strategic plan will continue to do so as an independent company.

Ralcorp also said its board has adopted a shareholder rights plan, details of which are unavailable until it files it with regulators. Such a plan would reduce the likelihood a person or group could gather up shares to influence future decisions.

"Ralcorp has made significant progress with its businesses, and we are excited about the prospect of building on its number one position in private label and enhancing its iconic brands, like Post, in very important categories," ConAgra CEO Gary Rodkin said in a statement.

Swiftly formed coalition dooms Amazon's bid for S. Carolina tax break

COLUMBIA, S.C. — The seeds for Amazon's departure from South Carolina were planted upon its arrival.

As political and business leaders celebrated the online retailer's decision in December to open a distribution center with 1,249 jobs near Cayce, S.C., other retailers suspected the incentive package it received included a sales tax collection exemption that Amazon sought elsewhere with mixed success.

Amazon's competitors

were quick to protest, an effort that was rewarded last week when the state legislature voted down the tax break. Amazon canceled plans to start hiring staff and equip the center within hours after losing the show-down.

The sales-tax exemption wasn't announced publicly, but a coalition of opponents; including Wal-Mart, Target, Lowe's, Best Buy and other major national retail chains, quickly confirmed it was part of the deal that state commerce officials made with Amazon.

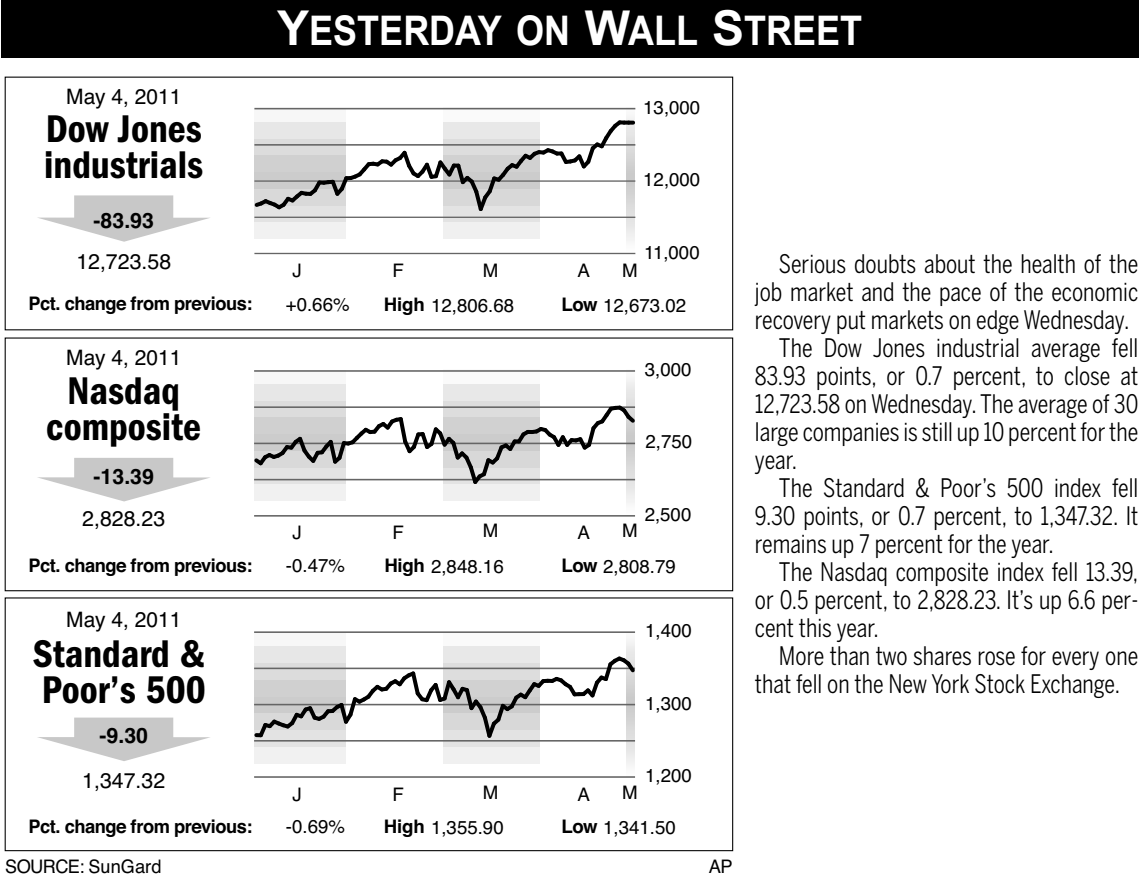

When a terrorist dies, is it OK to gloat?

Some saddened by Americans' response to bin Laden's death

NEW YORK (AP) — When Hyojin Jenny Hwang wrote on Facebook that she was saddened by the sight of young Americans like herself jubilantly cheering Osama bin Laden's death, the angry response was swift, even from friends.

"One friend told me she felt judged for feeling happy," said the 30-year-old mother from New Jersey. "And another one simply unfriended me on Facebook."

As the hours passed, though, and the initial giddiness settled a bit, Hwang received messages of support, too, from people similarly unnerved by the scenes of euphoria: chants of "USA! USA!" at the White House gates and ground zero; signs such as "Obama 1, Osama 0"; or T-shirts now available online, saying "GOT HIM!" and illustrated by a stick figure of a dead bin Laden.

It's one thing to be satisfied that the world's most wanted terrorist has been brought to justice. But where does satisfaction end and gloating begin? It's a question being posed online by ordinary Americans, religious figures, various commentators and several 9/11 widows. And it's bound to be on President Barack Obama's mind as he treads that fine line in a visit Thursday to ground zero in New York.

Could Obama's visit in itself be interpreted as gloating? The president seemed well aware of the dangers. He planned a somber and quiet visit — no speech, the White House said, just laying a wreath at the World Trade Center site and meeting privately with families and first responders.

"The president thinks it's entirely fitting and appropriate to visit the site ... in the wake of this significant and cathartic moment for the American people," said

White House spokesman Jay Carney.

One of the city's tabloids, the *Daily News*, had a bit of advice for the president: It urged him not to defile the site by mentioning bin Laden's name, "the six syllables that memorialize savagery."

It was impossible to tell whether those Americans feeling uneasy with the celebrating were in the majority or minority; the few polls conducted since the news broke haven't asked the question. For three women who lost husbands on 9/11, the jubilant scenes that took place Sunday night were disturbing.

Kristen Breitweiser said they brought back images of bin Laden supporters celebrating in the streets on that infamous day in 2001.

"Forgive me, but I don't want to watch uncorked champagne spill onto hal-

lowed ground where thousands were murdered in cold blood," she wrote Monday on the Huffington Post. "And it breaks my heart to witness young Americans cheer any death — even the death of a horrible, evil, murderous person — like it is some raucous tailgate party on a college campus. Why are we not somber?"

Another 9/11 widow, Marian Fontana, wrote on Salon of how her son, Aidan, who was 5 when his father died, had gone to school on Monday and called at lunchtime, wanting to come home.

"Everyone is talking about bin Laden. In every class, they are happy he is dead, but I don't feel happy," she said he told her.

And Deena Burnett Bailey, of Little Rock, Ark., who lost her husband Tom Burnett, said she was struggling with how to talk to her teens about bin Laden's death.

"To say that I'm happy that he was killed just seems odd, and it goes against my Christian faith," she said. "The girls and I were talking

about it. ... One of them said, 'What can we say, Mom? We can't say praise the Lord, he's dead! I said, 'I know. You just have to know that someone else made that decision, and that he will now stand before judgment for having killed so many people.'"

Online, some Americans said they saw absolutely nothing wrong with Sunday's outpouring.

"If you cannot cheer about the demise of a truly wicked man who took so much from us, what do you celebrate?" asked Edward Hannigan, 45, of Chico Hills, Calif., editor of an online music magazine, on Facebook. In another post, he added: "I'm damn happy he's dead. And on top of that, I hope it hurt. A lot."

But Donna Guhr, a waitress in Crestone, Colo., refused to cheer. "Out of ALL the people here in my town I've spoken with I only know two people who agree with the celebrating," she wrote, also on Facebook. "Gives me hope."

Foul weather can't stop Wood River Valley birders

I should have known better than to ask if the bird watching trip was being cancelled due to a spring snow squall.

Apparently, bird watchers do not hunker down, even if birds do.

That's how I ended up donning my ski parka, ski pants and snow boots to head down the highway away from Sun Valley ski resort instead of toward it.

Our destination, as is often the case on bird watching trips originating in the Wood River Valley, was Silver Creek.

But first we pointed our rigs north of Hailey's Main Street for some urban bird watching. We hadn't gone two blocks before Jean Seymour stopped her black SUV with the "Bird On" license plate and excited jabbering ensued.

Nils Ribi trained his 400-power camera lens on a merlin — a small falcon with a blue cape — despite big fat snowflakes rushing at him.

"Holy cow. That's a life bird for Lisa," remarked Poo Wright-Pulliam, nodding toward Lisa Huttinger, the Environmental Resource Center interim director who had organized the trip. "Good start," she added, describing how the bird used to be known as the "pigeon hawk."

Excited over that find, the caravan of birdwatchers began

Archers hit bull's-eye at Niagara Springs 3D shoot

WENDELL — Niagara Springs was the place to be on Saturday.

About 180 archers — family groups and seasoned professionals — participated in the Magic Valley Bowhunters Niagara Springs 3D Shoot this past weekend. The two-day event was held in Snake River Canyon on the Niagara Springs Wildlife Management Area south of Wendell.

The line of registrants included shooters decked in sponsor apparel as well as families with young kids that could barely carry their bows alone. Two loop areas were set up with 3D targets that ranged from small skunks to large elk to colorful turkeys.

Markers were placed on the ground to indicate where shooters were to stand or sit, distanced according to age. Points were given for hitting the bull's-eye, within the target area or on the target at all, excluding horns or feet.

Greg and Gloria Misbach, 20-year members of the Magic Valley Bowhunters, said they enjoy helping to make sure the shoots are a success.

"We love to see families come through," Greg Misbach said. "We shoot as a family with our three kids."

The couple said they chose archery as a family hobby because it's challenging. They use 3D shoots during the off-season as a way to prepare for hunting in the fall and winter. Misbach said it isn't a team sport, and anything that needs adjusted or improved is in the hands of the shooter.

"The shoots help provide the money we need to maintain our indoor range," Magic Valley Bowhunters chairman Brandon Higley said. "The range is used by the Fish and Game for classes, to teach Boy and Girl Scout groups and youth groups."

The range is in downtown Twin Falls. Members can pay an extra fee to obtain their own key to the range. The club currently has about 100 members.

Hunting late-season toms is anything but a turkey shoot

As the turkey season progresses, it's relatively common to go into the woods and not even hear a turkey sound for hours at a time. It's difficult to find a location where turkeys haven't been pressured by hunters this spring.

The result of this pressure is that many of the toms are now call-shy and very cautious. Both hens and toms are less vocal and their level of excitement diminishes as the turkey season dwindles

down to the last few weeks of the season. The one thing that late-season hunters have on their side is the below normal temperatures and unseasonable weather which has some turkeys behind schedule.

Late in the season, many hunters employ a "run and gun" technique. I prefer taking a more patient approach as the season winds down.

Another problem during the late season is that a few dominant toms have done most of the breeding and gobbling, while the turkeys that have lost their territorial

fight often remain quiet for fear of the boss bird. These subordinate toms will come to a call, but often they will sneak in quietly.

This is where having patience comes into play. These toms also react to other turkeys by totally avoiding them or by skulking through the woods, hoping to find a hen without running into a rival male. Turkeys have changed much of their behavior by now and savvy hunters must do the same for success.

Minnesota sturgeon ‘ambassador’ helps customers land the big ones

BAUDETTE, Minn. — Grant Slukynsky is playing a sturgeon now, and judging by the bend in his pole, the fish is giving the 9-year-old everything he can handle.

We’ve been fishing less than 10 minutes.

Compared to this, scoring goals might be a walk in the park for the third-grader from Warroad, Minn., a boy of few words. It takes a bit of prodding, but Slukynsky admits he tickled the twine 19 times in five games during a recent hockey tournament in the Twin Cities.

Right now, though, he’s too busy fighting a sturgeon to revel in that past glory.

Wade Boroos, ringleader of this Easter Monday sturgeon excursion, stands at the ready, just in case Slukynsky needs help reeling in the fish.

First, though, he offers this bit of advice:

“Just pretend it’s a Roseau hockey player,” Boroos, 49, of Warroad, Minn., says.

And Roseau, as everyone on the planet knows, is Warroad’s biggest hockey rival.

The tip is good for a few laughs, but it also seems to work; Slukynsky’s first-ever sturgeon is in the boat minutes later. He takes a pass on holding the 38-inch fish for a photo — he leaves that to Boroos — but the smile on Slukynsky’s face says all there is to say.

That, and his single-word description:

“Fun.”

It’s not a bad way to start a day off from school.

Hooked on sturgeon

Also joining Boroos on this sunny April morning is Nick Marvin and Clay Heppner, 12. Boroos and Marvin, 29, who serves as unofficial first mate and “sturgeon lander,” are co-workers at Streiff Sporting Goods west of Warroad.

Slukynsky’s mom, Jenny, and Heppner’s mom, Connie, also work at the store.

Sturgeon fishing can mean long waits between bites, and Boroos has a cooler stocked with candy bars, venison jerky, pepper sticks and other goodies to keep the boys occupied in case the fish don’t cooperate.

“You might not be able to eat that much candy at home, but in my boat,

“If you catch a fish in a spot, you’re going to catch more,” Boroos said. “The key is to get the bait in the same spot every cast if you’re catching fish.”

Boroos also fishes the edges of holes or channels rather than the deepest areas. Too many anglers spend all their time fishing holes, he says, and that’s a mistake.

“Sturgeon are not in those holes to feed,” Boroos said. “They’re in there resting.”

Boroos uses 3/0 circle hooks baited with a gob of nightcrawlers and leaves the rods in holders until he sees the slightest evidence of a fish tapping at the end of the line.

Sturgeon, even the biggest ones, can be dainty when they take the bait. Circle hooks are designed so the fish hook themselves. Not having to “set the hook” reduces the risk of novice anglers missing bites. The key, Boroos says, is to pay attention for even the faintest hint of a bite. And once the fish is hooked, hang on. Boroos spools his baitcast reels with 100-pound-test Power Pro braided line and tightens the drag as far as it will go. If he breaks a rod or two ... well, that just means he’s hooked a good fish.

you can,” Boroos tells the boys.

Don’t tell their moms, but by day’s end, the candy will be gone.

An avid sturgeon fisherman who occasionally takes regular store customers fishing, Boroos said he got hooked on the prehistoric-looking fish nearly a decade ago. This time of year, he spends every possible day targeting sturgeon, both in the Rainy River and in Four-Mile Bay of Lake of the Woods, where the fish tend to congregate in the spring.

In many ways, Marvin says, Boroos has become a sturgeon ambassador for the store.

“He’s become pretty successful

with it and because of that, people have, No. 1, come here for information, so he’s been very helpful in setting people up and teaching the techniques and tactics,” Marvin said. “He’s been able to help the rest of us in the company become better fishermen, as well, and with that has come the opportunity for people to go out and fish with him.”

Boroos’ biggest sturgeon stretched the tape at 73 inches, and the largest to come into his boat so far this year measured 63 inches.

The attraction?

“Probably the pure power of them,” he says. “That’s why I started.”

Try some of these tactics for hunting late season turkeys:

- Keep your calling to a minimum and try to use calls (maybe a tube call) that you haven’t used much during the early seasons.
- Using a call such as this helps because the birds are less wary of sounds that they haven’t heard this hunting season. Turkeys aren’t doing much calling this time of the year, so you shouldn’t either.
- Try being silent for up to 30 minutes at a time and then softly repeating your calls.
- Professional turkey guru Ray Eye says decoys are a must during the late seasons. When you’re sitting and not calling much, the decoys give turkeys something to zero in on, especially when you’re set-up in open terrain where they (the decoys) can be seen from a distance.
- Be patient and try to employ some of the deer hunting tactics that you use in deer season.
- Try to make the turkeys hunt and look for you.

If you’ve done your scouting, you should know where the birds are during the day and then try to set up as close to them while being super quiet.

Make a few “soft” calls and sit back against your tree (wider than your shoulders) and relax. The tom hears your calls before and he knows where you are. Be comfortable, patient, sit in one place, and wait for Mr. Tom to come to you.

Cluck and yelp softly while scratching some nearby leaves. Turkeys are social creatures and very curious and if you don’t

seem threatening, they’ll come looking for you and where the quiet calls are coming from.

- Plan to sit for at least a couple of hours to give the turkeys plenty of time before getting up and moving. I know successful hunters that stay in the same location all morning and afternoon.
- Try hunting later in the day, after the majority of the hunters have left the woods to try a new location or stretch their legs. Gobblers that have spent the beginning of the day with their hens are often alone by later in the day and looking for the company of hens.

Drive around and find field edges and clearings with a quality pair of binoculars (Vortex) looking for birds. If you spot some turkeys, try to slip into a good position to call to them.

Then, sit and wait for the turkeys to come to you instead of charging through the woods looking for toms and spooking everything in the immediate area.

- Pattern your birds for success.

Most turkeys have routines that they follow daily. First, they’ll roost near and with their hens for the first few hours of the day. Turkeys will be hard to call this time of the day and this season.

But after they part with their hens, they will visit their strut zones and areas where they can be seen, such as open fields and logging roads and trails.

The toms will still silently display, relying on their fans and drumming to attract hens. Beat the toms to these “good” spots and you should be on the path to success.

“I’ve always been into hunting,” Petersen said. “I want to pass that down to future generations.”

shooting during the off-season. The group enjoyed a fun day teasing each other about missing shots, even though they hit the bull’s-eye time and again.

proceeding even more slowly down one street and up another. Seymour flashed her left signal alerting the two cars behind her to look to the left. She flashed her right signal when someone in her car spotted a bird on the right.

After 30 minutes, I began wondering if we’d ever leave Hailey, what with the juncos, redwing blackbirds and Bohemian waxwings we were spotting.

“I see redwing blackbirds up behind the SNRA headquarters by Valentine’s Day. I thought they would be down here before that,” said Ann Christensen.

She pulled her coat around her as the snow fell harder. “I didn’t even tell my husband where I was going,” she said. “He would have rolled his eyes at the thought of me go-

ing out in this weather like this to watch birds. You know the chickadees fluff up their feathers like down sleeping bags in weather like this. The feathers hold the air and the air holds the body heat.”

Wright-Pulliam spotted two Eurasian colored doves sitting together in a spruce.

“Fifteen years ago one was spotted in eastern Idaho and everyone flocked to see it because it was so rare. Now they’re everywhere you go,” she noted.

Eventually, we made our way down Gannett Road, turning onto a soppy, mud-covered road that would take us to Highway 75. These were serious birders, I thought, as I watched brown mud splatter Seymour’s once-clean SUV.

Muddy as it was, the road turned out to be a bonanza for the bird watchers, start-

ing with a prairie falcon sitting on a fencepost munching away on an afternoon snack.

“We’re hoping for a gyrfalcon today,” said Wright-Pulliam. “It would be a lifer for Jane.”

We found that gyrfalcon in the next half-hour, along with a northern harrier sitting on a fence post preening itself and a killdeer standing on one leg in a pond. We saw a red-tail hawk with its distinctive belly band, and a Swainson’s hawk, which we were told is not as skittish as a red tail.

We had just started up again when Jean stopped her car.

“We heard an owl in that tree,” she pointed, as we zeroed in on two great-horned owls — one sitting on a nest.

“Bird on,” said Ribí, as we

got back in the car.

Coming to the highway, we stopped once again to check out a bald eagle nest near the Loving Creek Ranch.

A great heron took off in flight while a merganser and kingfisher dove into shallow water.

“Must be good fishing around here,” Christensen said.

At long last, we arrived at Silver Creek where we proceeded to watch swans that looked as if they were doing a ballet as they sailed along the creek.

The trumpeter swan used to be found across North America, said Wright-Pulliam. Now it’s just in a few places, including Idaho and Wyoming: “They’re trying to reintroduce it in other areas to spread it out.”

She paused, counting the

birds we’d seen so far: “We’re up to 34,” she announced.

Seymour recounted how she was first introduced to birding in 1993 but got serious about it only 10 years ago.

“I was down in the Thousand Springs area and I saw this bird sweeping its bill from side to side through the water looking for insects. I sat down and figured out it was an American avocet. It felt so good I had figured it out myself. Since, I’ve gone bird watching in Arizona, Texas, Costa Rica, Washington ... and I joke that I’m going to have to move to see some new birds.”

Jay Carlisle, research director for the Idaho Bird Observatory in Boise, interrupted Seymour’s tale.

“There’s a goshawk flying to the right, real low,” he said. “See how long the tail is?

Whoa! The raven is going to get it! Goshawks are cool because they act like fighter jets.”

Ribi recalled how his wife was knocked to the ground by a goshawk when they unknowingly trespassed on its territory in the mountains north of Ketchum.

“Patti had nightmares after that,” he said.

The snow had stopped and the weather had begun clearing by the time we headed home. And I went home with a new revelation:

Birds do indeed seem to hunker down in bad weather. But birders don’t. And the combination of those two facts makes for some dandy bird watching.

Banks raise prime fishing rate

No boat? Here are some tips you can take to the bank

DALLAS — In the spring, a young man's fancy may turn to love, but an angler's fancy looks toward the water. The winter chill is over and a lot of fish are in shallow water near the bank. That situation changes somewhat as temperatures rise and the fish move into deeper, cooler water.

Spring is prime time for fishing from the bank. Many anglers don't own a boat, but they still enjoy catching fish. Here are some tips on how to get a bite with your feet firmly planted on dry ground:

Select the correct lures or baits for bank fishing. Since you have no boat to retrieve lures that are tangled in submerged cover, you'll need to fish with lures and bait rigs that are relatively snag-free.

For bass fishing, this means plastic worms or other soft plastic lures that are rigged Texas style, with the hooked point buried in the body, as well as safety-pin-style spinnerbaits and topwater lures. With these three lure types, you can cover the water column from top to bottom and avoid most hang-ups.

If you're fishing for catfish, bluegills or crappie with live or natural bait, use an adjustable slip bobber to float the bait at whatever depth proves productive. A bobber serves double duty by signaling a bite. The slip bobber is also easier to cast than a float that stays attached to a predetermined spot on your line.

Fish around structure that's attractive to game fish. Because of the aforementioned problems with hang-ups, many novice anglers studiously avoid casting near weeds, submerged bushes or stumps.

That's where the fish live, how-

ever, and you must learn to identify those spots and fish them thoroughly. Reading structure is much tougher for bank anglers who lack the sonar used by most boaters.

Visible structure is easy to identify because you can see it. Submerged structure is not so easy, and you must visualize what the bottom does within casting distance of the bank. Fishing under bridges is popular and productive because the bridges usually span a creek or river, and deep water near bridge pilings, shade and riprap rock used to slow erosion is a good

spot for just about any game fish species.

When possible, steer clear of a bank with a gentle slope. Fish prefer a more abrupt drop-off, and such a spot puts fish within casting range of the bank. A point that juts out into deep water is always a good fishing spot.

In spite of the fishing pressure they attract, piers are also good. Each support post has the potential of holding fish, and many of the posts are connected by horizontal or diagonal braces.

Make repeated casts to a likely spot. Repeated casts may agitate a game fish into a striking a lure that invades its territory one time too many. Boat fishermen keep moving to cover as much water as possible, but bank anglers don't have that luxury.

Remember the spots where you catch fish and return time and again. Even if you can't identify it, there's a reason the fish were there in the first place, and they will be there again.

When water levels are lower than normal, visit your favorite fishing spots and look for the fish-holding structure that's usually covered by water. Take photos of the exposed structure or at least make notes for future reference. Although you think you will remember what you need to know, it's not that easy a year from now.

Fish early and late in the day when the light is not so bright. A cloudy day is usually better for shallow fishing than a bright, sunny day. It's difficult to fish in windy conditions, but the fish often bite better when waves break up the light penetration. Choose a bank that the wind is blowing into. Casting into the wind is difficult, but the wind often blows bait fish species up near the bank, and game fish follow.

FISHING REPORT

Rivers are starting to come up in Magic Valley

Fishing at the upper end of Magic Reservoir near Hot Springs Landing is good but has slowed down some. The fish are still robust and in the 14- to 20-inch range. The fishing is considered slow and steady at the dam. Bait fishermen are doing best when they keep bait suspended a couple feet off the bottom.

Use caution, as boaters have a higher than normal amount of debris to navigate. The high water this spring exceeded the high water mark of the last two years. The large shallow bay west of the dam has water and float tubers should see some good action there.

Little Camas Reservoir is ice free with some shoreline ice developing nightly. Road is open. Hatchery trout have been stocked and it appears there was some carryover from last year.

Salmon Falls Creek Reservoir is ice free and Lud Drexler boat ramp is open. The road going into the bays on the south end are intermittently dry; use the roads with caution. Anglers report decent catch rates from the shoreline.

Rivers are starting to come up. The Magic Valley Region is expecting a significant runoff, making places like the Big Wood River, South Fork Boise, Little Wood River, and Rock Creek very muddy and difficult to fish.

Hatchery trout have been stocked in a number of Magic Valley fisheries. More info: fish-andgame.idaho.gov/apps/stocking.

Perfect varmint rifle depends on your personal hunting style

The other day I received an email inquiry from long-time correspondent and Jerome Gun Club mainstay, Brad Rice. Believing that many of you may have the same question, I decided, with Brad's permission, to base today's column on his question. It reads, "Rich, haven't talked with you for some time. As you know, I'm a shotgunner, but I've got the itch to acquire a varmint rifle. Something small caliber, accurate, and utterly reliable. Have any suggestions?"

I do. Please keep in mind that since varmint range considerably both in size and toughness and the ranges and conditions that we pursue them under, your best rifle will likely be a compromise tailored to your personal style of hunting. For convenience, I have categorized suitable weapons (all scoped, of course) by cartridge class. Here are my selections:

SHOOTING THE BULL

Rimfires — standard and magnum

When the critters are small (ground squirrels, prairie dogs) and the distances relatively short (up to 100-plus yards), the standard rimfire cartridges rule. At the top of the heap are the high and hypervelocity 22LRs. Many serious rimfire varminters dote on CCI Stingers, Quik-Shot and Aquila Super Maximums for their screaming velocities and sterling accuracy. Marlin, Savage, Ruger, Winchester, Remington and CZ market superbly accurate and affordable bolt guns.

For high-volume shooting, nothing beats an accurate autoloader and high capacity magazines. I really love my bull-barreled Ruger 10-22. With a Weaver 2X7 onboard, it's pure death on a rancher

friend's pasture poodles.

If you anticipate rock chucks, prairie dogs, raccoons, skunks, foxes or crows dancing around under your crosshairs at 150-plus yards, it's time to rack the .22LR and reach for one of the magnum rimfires.

The immensely popular .17 HMR, potent .22 Winchester Magnum, and resurrected 5mm Remington all possess the accuracy and gusto needed to slip these vermin a one-way ticket to the Great Scavenging Ground in the Sky.

.22 centerfires

Up the ante to include fox, coyote, bobcat, badger or any of the aforementioned smaller species at long range (200-

plus yards) and we enter the domain of the hot .22 center-fire cartridges. Here the ubiquitous .223 Remington with its seemingly limitless selection of firearms, factory and hand-loaded ammunition rules the roost.

The market is awash in incredibly accurate bolt-action, single-shot, lever-action and semi-auto rifles and carbines. Select the rifle and scope combination best suited to your needs and you'll be well equipped for 90 percent of all long-range varminting.

If you want the ultimate expression of commercial .22 centerfire performance in an affordable, readily available package, you'll consider the marvelous .22-250 Remington. Handloaded up or down to suit your needs, the .22-250 may well be the ultimate compromise varmint.

Spring is in the air and game animals are bearing their young. Why not give these wild mothers a hand by thinning the ranks of the varmint hordes? They'll rest easier today and you'll reap the rewards of more wings in the air and hooves on the ground this fall. (But remember that in Idaho you need a valid hunting license to hunt varmints.)

Good varminting!

Clear nail polish comes to the rescue — again!

DEAR DR. GOTT: First, I want to say that I've been a fan of yours for a long time. Then I want to tell you it makes me furious to have everyone assume that a person who has herpes has been promiscuous.

I, too, have herpes outbreaks at a spot on my buttocks, and there is no doubt in my mind where I got it — at the hospital. Having been monogamous for at least 12 years at the time, I had to have emergency surgery, and the herpes popped up within a week of discharge. The

outbreak was exactly where I got all my pain shots. The location migrates just a bit every time it crops up, but it's never been anywhere close to my genital area, thank heavens. A friend of mine also says she got herpes in the same hospital, years earlier. We've been friends for 30 years, and I

just found that out last year. Her outbreaks are on her inner thigh, much closer to her knee than to her genitals.

I hope this makes some of your readers feel better.

That said, I want to recommend nail polish to your readers. The dermatologist I went to (because I did not know what the "rash" was) gave me pills and cream that upset my digestive system, so I tried what I use on anything that itches — clear nail polish! Applied three or four times a day, the outbreak will usually be gone by the

third day.

DEAR READER: Thank you for sharing your experience. There are a number of different forms of herpes (80, to be exact), referred to as herpes simplex virus 1 (HSV-1) and herpes simplex virus 2 (HSV-2).

HSV-1 can cause genital herpes but more commonly causes infection around the mouth and lips, as in fever blisters. Other areas of the body can be affected, but that's uncommon. HSV-1 is caused by the herpes simplex virus, and is estimated

to be present in up to 80 percent of the entire American adult population. Both HSV-1 and -2 can be released from the sores the virus causes but is also released between outbreaks from clear skin that doesn't appear to be affected at all.

Genital herpes most commonly results from HSV-2. It is estimated to be present in up to 20 percent of the American adult population. Oddly enough, many people are completely unaware they even have this sexually transmitted disease because

it can remain dormant in the system for years. Transmission of HSV-2 occurs during sexual contact with someone who has the infection, who may not have a visible outbreak and who may be completely unaware he or she is infected.

You are correct in that the herpes virus can be contracted in a hospital setting. The most common site is the delivery room, where an infected mother may transmit the virus to her infant at the

time of delivery. Treatment, as you were likely prescribed, consists of antiviral medication. I must admit that you have opened up another avenue with the use of clear nail polish. My guess is, it acts as an occlusive dressing and keeps the air and moisture from

reaching the open-wound site.

I have never had anyone else tell me that HSV can be controlled through this method, but if it works for you without unwanted side effects, I guess you should stick with it! Thank you for sharing the information.

Boise St. imposes sanctions for NCAA infractions

BOISE — Boise State football coach Chris Petersen, in the wake of a series of NCAA violations, will have fewer scholarships to hand out in the next two years and less time on the practice field to prepare for tough season openers against Georgia this fall and Michigan State in 2012.

The sanctions already imposed on the Bronco football team are part of a broader penalty package put in place by university officials this

week for men's and women's tennis and track and field after an NCAA inquiry identified nearly two dozen violations by coaches in those sports.

The NCAA said its inquiry, along with an internal investigation by Boise State, identified 22 infractions and an absence of institutional controls necessary to fully comply with rules governing collegiate athletic programs.

University officials say the penalties for Boise State's high-profile football program and other sports, first reported by the *Idaho*

Statesman, are part of its overall response to the NCAA investigation. The NCAA can impose even tougher sanctions against the university after its Committee on Infractions meets next month to review the Boise State case.

But Boise State administrators are confident the self-imposed penalties, which include a three-year probation period, and steps to bolster its compliance office will satisfy college athletics' governing body.

"A lot of thought went into what the appropriate sanctions should be for us," Boise State athletic director Gene Bleymaier told The As-

sociated Press on Wednesday. "We believe these sanctions are what's warranted and needed to correct the mistakes."

The university's 1,500-page response to the NCAA details a series of "secondary" violations by football staff during a four-year period. During that time, coaches arranged for incoming players to get cheap transportation, meals and housing — in some cases nothing more than a couch at a current player's apartment — during voluntary summer workouts. The report states 63 prospective players received those benefits, valued at less than \$5,000. Bleymaier said new rules and

policies have been put in place to help the football staff avoid similar missteps in the future. The university also issued a letter to Petersen and his staff detailing the rules and infractions committed between 2005 and 2008.

The report and penalties come as Boise State, which has never before been found in violation of NCAA rules, and its highly successful football program transition from the Western Athletic Conference to the more competitive Mountain West Conference. Bleymaier, who was attending MWC meetings in

Dialed In is early Kentucky Derby favorite

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP) — Nobody wanted to be No. 1.

No. 20 wasn't too popular, either.

Dialed In managed to avoid both — the inside rail and far outside — at Wednesday's post-position draw for the Kentucky Derby.

He was made the early 4-1 favorite for Saturday's race after drawing the favorable No. 8 post, prompting owner Robert LaPenta to let out a cheer. Uncle Mo was the second choice in a full field of 20 horses.

Ten horses have won from the No. 8 position; the last, 50-1 shocker Mine That Bird two years ago.

"It's a big thing, and he deserves it," two-time Derby winner Nick Zito said, referring to his horse's status as the favorite. Dialed In has won 3 of 4 career races.

Three times in the last seven runnings the favorite has worn the garland of roses, most recently Big Brown

in 2008.

"So far, so good," Zito said. "If he has another couple of good days we'll be happy. Things are doing all right."

Things haven't been quite so right for Uncle Mo, who drew the No. 18 post, three slots from the outside. The colt is being treated for a gastrointestinal infection, which was blamed for his stunning first-ever defeat in last month's Wood Memorial.

Owner Mike Repole has said if Uncle Mo isn't sufficiently recovered, he won't run in the 1 1/4-mile Derby. Trainer Todd Pletcher, however, said Uncle Mo might be able to win even if he's at less than his best.

"But we're committed to bringing him over there at 100 percent, anything less than that, we won't accept," he said.

Uncle Mo, last year's 2-year-old champion, jogged a mile around the dirt track at Churchill Downs and later

stood in the starting gate to familiarize himself with the surroundings. He is scheduled to gallop on Thursday.

"I've always said I think he's the best horse of his generation," Pletcher said. "We proved that last year and identified what we thought was the reason for the poor performance in the Wood. I think if he shows up and he's the Uncle Mo from the Breeders' Cup or the Champagne or even the Timely Writer, he's the horse to beat."

Uncle Mo would have to overcome a bit of history.

Only one horse since 1900 has come out of the No. 18 hole to win and that was Gato Del Sol in 1982.

Still, Pletcher and Repole were relieved to have avoided the rail.

"We had this overlying fear we were going to get the 1," the trainer said. "Once it was anything besides that we were happy."

Repole's other colt, Stay

Thirsty — also trained by Pletcher — landed in the No. 4 post and is 20-1 on the morning line set by Churchill Downs oddsmaker Mike Battaglia.

Pletcher ended an 0-for-24 skid in the Derby last year when Super Saver won from the No. 4 post.

Nehro was the third choice at 6-1. The other 17 horses were listed at double-digit odds.

The dreaded No. 1 post — the last position revealed — went to Arkansas Derby winner Archarcharch. That spot did in last year's Derby favorite, Lookin At Lucky, who was blocked behind horses and finished sixth for trainer Bob Baffert.

"I have always wanted to be No. 1, but not in the Kentucky Derby starting gate," said Jinks Fires, the 70-year-old trainer of Archarcharch who will give specific race instructions to jockey Jon Court, his son-in-law.

Phoenix this week, said his new colleagues are sympathetic to the complexities of heeding the NCAA rule book.

"We're always concerned about perception," Bleymaier said. "That's why we want it to be very clear what the issues are and how we've dealt with them."

The infractions were not limited to the football team. Similar secondary violations were unearthed in the men's tennis program and the men's and women's track and field programs.

As a result, the university is cutting scholarships and imposing recruiting restrictions for track and field, and reducing practices and eliminating bonuses in 2011 and 2012

for the head men's tennis coach.

The most serious violation was discovered in the women's tennis program as part of the university's own internal investigation. The university's report says the head coach and an assistant violated rules by providing cash, lodging, entertainment and other benefits to a recruit and allowed her to take part in practices and other NCAA events before she was officially enrolled.

The university also alleges former head coach Mark Tichenor and assistant Tiffany Coll gave false statements to investigators about their actions, claims that expose the program to NCAA ethics violations. Both coaches are no longer with the university.

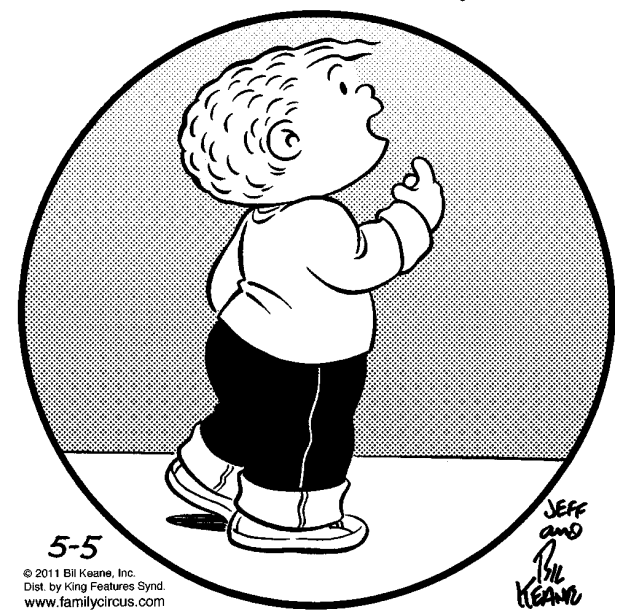

Today's deal comes from a major pairs event and features a defender making a natural but unsuccessful play. However, had West, before playing to trick two, asked himself the right question — “Whom do I want to be on lead at trick five?” — he would have had a better chance of success.

Against four spades West guessed extremely well to lead the club 10 rather than the unbid suit. Declarer took the lead in hand with the king and continued with the spade eight. West followed with the nine, which held the trick. West returned his second club, won by dummy's ace. A heart back to the ace was followed by another low spade. West's jack won, but with no outside entry to East's hand, no return from West's side of the table could do damage. After a third round of spades, declarer was home when the suit split.

If West had unblocked his spade jack at trick two, admittedly a hard play to find but one that could scarcely cost, then returned his second club, the outcome would have been different. Now, when a second trump is led, East is forced to overtake West's nine with the 10. Then East can deliver the club ruff that sets the game.

True, declarer rather than East might have held the spade 10, but even in that case this trump play is still available to West without cost, the only difference being that West's nine will hold the lead at trick four.

ANSWER: If all good heart raises start with a cue-bid, and a jump raise is pre-emptive, this hand falls in between. One route is to raise to two hearts, then compete again to three hearts, but you may not get that second chance. Another route is to subvert a jump cuebid to three clubs as specifically 6-9 points with four trumps. This is called a Mixed Raise — more on this later.
