Weather suspends search for missing husband in Nevada

By Bradley Guire Times-News writer

Rita Chretien, 56, has been discharged from St. Luke's Magic Valley Medical Center in Twin Falls, according to the hospital.

Chretien was transported late Tuesday afternoon to a hospital in British Columbia, St. Luke's spokeswoman Laura Stewart confirmed this evening.

She had spent four days recovering in the Twin Falls hospital after being found Friday afternoon in a van in remote northern Nevada, where she had been stranded for seven weeks.

Rita and Albert Chretien, of Penticton, B.C., were traveling to a trade show in Las Vegas when their van became stuck in the Jarbidge area on March 19.

Feds consider protections for 250 species

BILLINGS, Mont. – The Obama administration on Tuesday announced a deal with environmentalists to work through a backlog of more than 250 imperiled animals and plants in order to determine which merit federal protection.

In south-central Idaho, the deal would set a fiscal 2015 deadline for a decision on whether the greater sage-grouse should be listed as threatened or endangered. A grouse listing would greatly affect ranching, recreation and other uses of public land across the region. Decisions would be made on three other species, but no deadlines were set for them in materials provided Tuesday.

Tough choices loom over city pay raises

While the city of Twin Falls grapples with falling revenues and crumbling infrastructure, it has another specter over it: increasingly below-average wages.

An employee pay survey completed about a year ago found that Twin Falls' compensation - benefits and wages – was about 7.6 percent below comparable regional employers. It did not take cost of living into account.

said other local governments have given raises, meaning Twin Falls pay may be closer to 10 percent behind others. And as the city deals with a \$2.4 million gap between what it can afford and what it wants to afford, employees may go a third year without a pay increase.

Councilman Lance Clow warned that the survey also doesn't paint a complete picture: Some cities that gave raises also laid off

Survivor of Alabama tornado returns to Gooding

Steve Egersdorf doesn't know if he wants to leave Gooding and go home.

His home is gone. His restaurant is gone. He knows that much. But he doesn't know what else he'll find just two weeks removed from one of the worst tornado outbreaks in American history.

He's not sure if he can handle knowing who made it and who didn't among his small town of barely 1,000 people in Phil Campbell, Ala.

"I don't know if I want to see who's missing," he said.

His house is no longer a safe place to stay, not after being tagteamed by heavy trees and a pickup truck. So he and his family moved to another small town, Gooding, his hometown where

Steve took his family to Alabama nearly 10 years ago. Most recently, he ran restaurants in Phil Campbell, which is 90 miles north of Tuscaloosa, the hardest-hit Alabama city with more than 40 dead. The life he knew came to an end on what looked to be a pleasant Wednesday.

"We've heard hundreds of alarms over the years and never saw a thing," Steve said.

While managing Good Cooks, a restaurant owned by friends, he got word that bad weather was on its way, so he closed the restaurant and walked the few feet to his home.

Within minutes, the tornado struck with such ungodly force that it decithe town before it was done.

Steve and his family had a scant few minutes to get to the restaurant, which land of zombies, people just walking featured a sturdier frame than the house next to it. When they emerged from the rubble, everything was gone. People just like them rose from the wreckage, taking in what was left of their town.

Idaho, said that a team of eight disaster volunteers will spend the next few weeks aiding survivors as other Red Cross chapters also help with providing shelter, meals and personal hygiene kits for the newly homeless.

The family was able to stay in a hotel in Haleyville, just a few miles south of Phil Campbell. With nothing left of their home, they rented a trailer, packed up what they could and made the 1,900-mile drive to Gooding. Steve said that the restaurant owners want him to come back and help rebuild, but he isn't sure of what kind of life his family would have now that nature has taken so much from Phil Campbell.

"We weren't making a gob of money, but we were making it," Steve said. "If they open it up, will we make it? People moved to Russellville and Decatur."

For now, Steve will do whatever is needed to provide for his family whether they remain in the Magic Valley or make another go in the South. But he is quick to admit his family is one of the fortunate ones.

"I didn't lose anyone that I know of," he said. "I lost my job, my house. But I feel bad about feeling bad because at least we're all alive."

With a long list of animals that scientists say need greater protections, but with too few resources to cover restoration costs, federal officials have put many species on a waiting list of "candidates" for greater protections. Some species have languished on that list for more Sage grouse than 30 years.

Deputy Interior Secretary David Hayes said the backlog has been made worse by lawsuits that have bogged down the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service.

"This plan will enable the endangered species program to function as it was originally intended," Hayes said. "Priorities are being set by plaintiffs in courts, instead of by wildlife professionals, by litigation instead of science."

Laptops and support go hand in hand

n 2013, \$3 million in laptops will flood Idaho schools. In 2014, \$11 million will be used for their purchase. The year after that, another \$14 million in laptops will be given to stu-

Within four years, there will be tens of thousands of new computers in the hands of Idaho teens.

And the state has yet to finalize how to support them. As Buhl School District Superintendent Byron Stutzman told the Times-News: "It takes money to run technology."

Ideas have been discussed, and Idaho schools chief Tom Luna's office says that the task force will have a plan ready sometime within the 30-month window before laptops start appearing in schools. However, a support system for these truckloads of

technology should have been drawn up long before the money was budgeted.

The state's goal is to handle the machines more like a service repair fees would be bundled with the price of technology. If a student's computer gets a virus or the batteries won't charge, it's shipped off to a support center somewhere instead of fixed locally. Luna has repeatedly said that the cost won't trickle down to the local school level. It's a goal that

makes sense on paper, but the reality may be different. Twin Falls School district currently has six employees to support its 3,300 computers. The number of machines will more than double by 2015, and in an era of razor-thin budgets, we don't expect more money to be allocated for tech support staff.

Even if those computers are shipped off and repaired out of state, somebody has to do the diagnosis. The schools' technology people will end up replacing batteries, checking to make sure software updates are running and that the system is indeed malfunctioning before they box it up and ship it off.

And that takes time.

Even if Twin Falls School District's six tech staffers can handle the increased workload, smaller districts are getting a raw deal. Murtaugh's school district has one part-time technology person (who's also a maintenance man). Dropping dozens of laptop-related problems into his lap doesn't seem like a particularly well thought out plan.

In many ways, it's like maxing out your finances to buy a Porsche, and figuring that, by the time the payments come due, you'll have figured out how to pay for those hefty insurance payments.

When coupled with the plans to teach educators how to use the new tools, the addition of technology is going to be a distinguishing factor in Idaho's education plans. We just wish that all of the costs had been figured out from the beginning.

Were Pakistan officials really unaware bin Laden was living among them?

here is something surreal about Pakistani officials' reaction to the killing of Osama bin Laden.

Their focus has been wholly on the violation of Pakistan's sovereignty by the U.S. raid, rather than the fact that bin Laden was living well in their country. The army chief, Gen. Ashfaq Parvez Kayani, warned he would not tolerate any repeat of such covert action; the country's foreign secretary, Salman Bashir, said any similar attack could lead to "terrible consequences."

"No self-respecting nation would compromise or allow others to compromise its sovereignty," Bashir insisted. But how could any self-respecting nation allow the world's top terrorist -aforeigner — to operate out of its heartland? How could any self-respecting state permit the leader of al-Qaida — a group composed of Arabs, Uzbeks and Chechens — to base in their country?

Unless Pakistani officials address these questions head-on, they are heading for terrible consequences. They are risking not just their relationship with the United States but their country's future existence as well.

No one believes the civilian government of President Asif Ali Zardari knew bin Laden was hiding in Abbottabad. And most experts doubt that Gen. Kayani, a square shooter, was aware of bin Laden's location.

But few security experts familiar with Pakistan doubt that some agents in Pakistan's Interservice Intelligence Agency (ISI) knew of bin Laden's hideout. How could they not? He was living practically next door to Pakistan's equivalent of West Point, in a city filled with serving and retired military personnel – a city where other top al-Qaida operatives had been captured.

If the fix wasn't in, wouldn't the ISI have been watching for unusual activities, especially since the mansion where bin Laden lived had already attracted attention? Wouldn't ISI agents have checked out who lived there?

"Did they know he was here? Surely, they knew he

was here," writes the astute Pakistani columnist Cyril Almeida, in *Dawn* newspaper. "Maybe they're so daft they didn't really take this whole business of al-Qaida seriously. Maybe they just didn't think it was their problem.

"If we didn't know, we are a failed state," Almeida adds. "If we did know, we are a rogue state. But does anybody really believe they didn't know?"

Upon the answer to this question will depend the future of U.S.-Pakistani relations. This administration, particularly Adm. Mike Mullen, the chairman of the Joint Chiefs, has tried hard to build bonds of trust with Pakistani counterparts, including Kayani and ISI chief Ahmed Shuja Pasha.

But unless the ISI comes clean on bin Laden, it will be hard to deflect congressional pressure to cut military and civilian aid to Islamabad. It may become impossible for the two countries to cooperate on a political endgame for the Afghan war that will stabilize that country, as U.S. troops exit. Without such cooperation, Afghanistan faces renewed civil war that will spill across the AfPak

border. This would be a selfinflicted tragedy for Pak-

The U.S.-Pakistani relationship was already on a downhill slide because of Pakistani ire over an expanded CIA presence in their country. But this presence which Pakistan wants to slash - would be unnecessary if the ISI was in vigorous pursuit of the leaders of al-Qaida and other hard-line terrorists on their soil.

Pakistani officials have taken on their own Taliban who threaten them. But they won't confront Afghan Taliban or terrorist groups such as Lashkar-e-Taiba, whom they view as useful tools in their struggle with India. And they failed to find bin Laden.

Assume they didn't know where he was, that they were just incompetent (after all, the CIA has had big lapses). Why didn't they try harder? "Maybe they just didn't think it was their problem," Almeida surmised in his column. Too true.

The Pakistani army and ISI are so obsessed with India that they can't grasp the bigger threat within their own borders. Their distinction between "good" terrorists who fight India and the West and bad ones who attack Pakistanis is reckless: these terrorists have links to each other, and allowing them to flourish in Pakistan eats at the core of the state. And what if — as most believe - some ISI agents were helping bin Laden. Why would they do it? As Almeida points out, "Pakistan has nothing in common with al-Qaida. They serve no purpose to us.

"Did we think we could produce him like a rabbit out of the hat when we needed to?" the columnist asks in frustration. "Or, assured in our assumptions about the world around us, did we simply think we could get away with it?"

These are the questions Americans are asking, and Pakistanis should be asking, too. We need the answers quickly. "The best way to confront

the situation is to come clean and tell people what is really happening," I was told by retired Pakistani Gen. Talat Masood, by phone from Islamabad. Instead, Pakistani officials are "posturing," doing damage control at home by focusing on the American incursion.

"This is a very dangerous way of deflecting the public's attitude from the real problem," Masood said. "Are they proposing to face the problem or not? We need to know."

FEDERAL JUDGE BLOCKS UTAH LAW

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — A federal judge on Tuesday blocked a new Utah immigration law that would allow police to check the citizenship status of anyone they arrest.

U.S. District Judge Clark Waddoups issued his ruling in Salt Lake City hours after the law went into effect, citing its similarity to an Arizona law currently before federal courts.

The American Civil Liberties Union and National Immigration Law Center had sued to stop the law, warning that its implementation could lead to racial profiling.

Utah Assistant Attorney General Jerrold Jensen said the ruling was 'not a surprise." Jensen said after the hearing that the law is "fully constitutional" and that his office plans to "argue it vigorously."

The law, signed by Republican Gov. Gary Herbert in March, would require police to check the citizenship status of anyone arrested on suspicion of a felony or class A misdemeanor, while giving officers discretion to check the citizenship of those stopped for traffic infractions and other lesser offenses.



Weighing heavy on Spencer Wells' chest is the cost of attending college.

To finance his higher education, Wells plans to work through his remaining two years at Canyon Ridge High School and save as much money as possible.

The Times-News caught up with the 17-year-old while he filled out job applications at the Youth Job Fair, held at CRHS Tuesday afternoon.

By comparison, adult unemployment held steady throughout 2010 at about 10 percent.





Internships and early searches lift chances for job

HACKENSACK, N.J. Darnell Stith will graduate from Fairleigh Dickinson University in about two weeks with a nursing degree and a job at Overlook Hospital in Summit, N.J., already secured.

"I guess I'm one of the lucky guys," said Stith, who also pointed to his early start in bulking up his resume for his success. "My experience had been a deciding factor. Ever since my freshman year, I have always worked in hospitals."

Stith is one of 1.7 million college seniors who will enter the job market this spring. This year's graduating class is in a better position to find work than their predecessors from the past couple of years, according to employment data, industry experts and the students themselves.

Employers this year plan to hire nearly 20 percent more college graduates than they did in 2010, according to the spring survey by the National Association of Colleges and Employers. Also, the Department of Labor reported in February the number of job openings reached the highest level since September 2008.

Local farmers markets grow DEEPER RO

Since 2010, most have expanded or added new products

By Ariel Hansen Times-News writer

Compared with coastal neighbors, Idaho is still a little behind the curve on farmers markets. But we're catching up fast.

"We're behind Oregon or Washington, but part of that is because we're very rural. It takes a lot of people to make a market survive," said Lacey Menasco, trade specialist for the Idaho Department of Agriculture. "Idaho has one of the fastest growths in the number of markets in the nation. They're growing within themselves, becoming more sophisticated and larger."

Last year saw the number of markets across the state more than double, but it leveled out for 2011, with a few new markets sprouting up and a few others dissolving. Organizers are getting a better sense of their local supply and demand, Menasco said, so she wouldn't be surprised to see some markets that closed reopen in coming years.

Supply and demand were on Art Hoag's mind this year. After running the Wednesday-night market in Twin Falls' Mary Alice Park for a few seasons, he's decided to hold off on opening this summer to see how downtown's new Friday Night Market does nearby

"Because they're trying to start something toward the center of town, it'd probably work better for the vendors down there where there's a little more traffic. I want to support that," Hoag said. "I'd like to see a market downtown in midweek, but I don't think we can really handle two of them."

A major trend for 2011 is diversity of products. At most markets, there have always been fresh fruits and vegetables, preserves and crafts, with baked goods and ready-to-eat snacks at some. Now, many are also expanding into eggs, dairy, meats, prepared meals, live plants, activities, demon-

strations and entertainment. "That's a consumer demand, to be able to buy more of their weekly groceries at

the market," Menasco said. Markets like those in Glenns Ferry, Shoshone and the Wood River Valley also are emphasizing their roles as community gathering places, offering information booths, demonstrations and seminars on growing and eating local food.





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Mild vinegar is the trick in this rice pilaf

I've borrowed a Japanese seasoning trick here, using a mild vinegar to flavor the rice. It adds a subtle taste and is especially good as an accent to the fragrant basmati. The spinach, mushrooms and garlic add their own punches of flavor, color and texture.

Serve with simple grilled meats. Because this dish is great at room temperature, you can prepare it before you go outside to grill.

Brown basmati is becoming increasingly common in supermarkets' rice aisles, but it doesn't work well in this pilaf; stick with white basmati varieties.

BASMATI RICE PILAF WITH BABY SPINACH AND MUSHROOMS

6 to 8 servings

1 cup uncooked basmati rice

Water, as needed

2 to 3 tablespoons extra-virgin olive oil

3 medium cloves garlic, finely chopped 8 ounces cremini (brown) mushrooms, cut into thin slices Freshly ground black pepper 4 ounces baby spinach, rinsed and drained 2 to 3 tablespoons sherry wine vinegar

Combine the basmati rice and water in a medium saucepan; use the package directions to determine the cor-

rect amount of water and the cooking time.

Meanwhile, heat 1 tablespoon of the oil in a large skillet over medium-low heat until the oil shimmers. Add the garlic; cook for 3 to 4 minutes, stirring occasionally, until it is soft and fragrant.

Increase the heat to medium-high; add the sliced mush-rooms. Season with salt and pepper to taste. Cook for 8 to 10 minutes, stirring occasionally so the mushrooms soften, release their liquid and eventually start to brown. Turn off the heat; immediately use tongs to incorporate the spinach, taking a few minutes to toss it until the spinach starts to wilt. Transfer to a large bowl.

When the rice is ready, stir in 2 tablespoons of the vinegar and 1 tablespoon of the oil. Add the seasoned rice to the spinach and mushrooms. Stir to evenly distribute the rice.

Taste, and add vinegar, oil, salt or pepper as needed. Serve immediately or at room temperature.

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

THE ACES ON BRIDGE®

Bobby Wolff

The best material for bridge reporters tends to come when declarer thwarts the best efforts of the defense, or vice versa. All this week's deals are selected from past Cavendish tournaments. Today's deal, from the 1998 Cavendish, features a fine example of both sides playing in top

Declarer was Jill Levin, who had just won a world title with her partner here, Irina Levitina. The latter had won a world chess team title when living in Russia, making her perhaps the most successful player in the world at both

Levitina elected to open the North hand with a 15-17 no-trump, a reasonable choice since a one diamond opening is guaranteed to give her a very ugly rebid problem. Levin transferred into hearts, allowing Mohan to over-call in spades. Now Levin introduced her second suit, and Levitina flirted briefly with the idea of a grand slam before settling for the small slam. The inference about North's having both black suits controlled was not lost on Mohan, who selected the diabolical opening lead of the club eight!

However, Levin had been playing the game long enough to draw the same inferences as Mohan. She rated him as capable of underleading an ace, and she decided that with the club queen instead of the ace, he might have pre-empted at his first turn to speak. So she put up dummy's club king and lived happily ever

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
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
