Rita Chretien, 56 , has been discharged from St. Luke's Magic Valley Medical Center in Twin Falls, according to the hospital.

British Columbia, St. Luke's spokeswoman Laura Stewart confirmed this evening. She had spent four days recov-
ering inthe ering in the Twin Falls hospital after being found Friday afternoon in a van in remote northern Neva-
da, where she had been stranded da, where she had been stranded
for seven weeks.

Penticton, B.C., were traveling to a trade show in Las Vegas when their van became stuck in the Jarbidge area on March 19.

BILLINGS, Mont. - The ObaBILLINGS, Mont. - The Oba-
ma administration on Tuesday announced a deal with environmentalists to work through a backlog of more than 250 imperiled animals and plants in order to determine which merit federal protection.
In south set a fiscal 2015 Idaho, the deal would set a fiscal 2015 deadline for sage-grouse should be listed as threatened or endangered. A grouse listing would greatly affect ranching, recreation and other uses of public land across the region. Decisions would be made on
three other species, but no deadlines were set for them in materials provided Tuesday.

Steve Egersdorf doesn't know if he wants to leave Gooding and go he wants to leave Gooding and go
His home is gone. His restaulHis home is gone. His restau-
rant is gone. He knows that much. But he doesn't know what else he'll find just two weeks removed from one of the worst tornado outbreaks in American history.
He's not sure if he can handle knowing who made it and who didn't among his small town of barely 1,000 people in Phil Campbell, Ala.
"I don't know if I want to see who's missing," he said
His house is no longer a safe place to stay, not after being tag teamed by heavy trees and apick-
up truck. So he and his family moved to another small town,

Even if those computers are shipped off and repaired out of state, somebody has to do the diagnosis. The schools' technology people will end up replacing batteries, checking to make sure software updates are running and that the system is indeed malfunctioning before they box it up and ship it off. And that takes time.
Even if Twin Falls School District's six tech staffers can handle the increased workload, smaller districts are getting a raw deal. Murtaugh's school district has one part-time technology person (who's also a maintenance man). Dropping dozens of lap-top-related problems into his lap doesn't seem like a particularly well thought out plan.
In many ways, it's like maxing out your finances to buy a Porsche, and figuring that, by the time the payments come due, you'll have figured
pay for those hefty insurance payments.
When coupled with the plans to teach educators how to use the new tools, the addition of technology is going to be a distinguishing factor in Idaho's education plans. We just wish that all of the costs had been figured out from the beginning.

similar attack could lead to "terrible consequences." "No self-respecting na tion would compromise or allow others to compromise its sovereignty," Bashir in
sisted. But how could any sisted. But how could any
self-respecting nation allow self-respecting nation allow
the world's top terrorist - a foreigner - to operate out of its heartland? How could any self-respecting state permit the leader of al-Qaida - a group composed of Arabs, Uzbeks and Chechens

Unless Pakistani offici address these questions head-on, they are heading for terrible consequences. They are risking not just their relationship with th United States but their country's futur
well.
No one believes the civilian government of President

Pakistan's equivalent of West Point, in a city filled with serving and retired military personnel - a city where other top al-Qaida operatives had been captured.
If the fix wasn't in, wouldn't the ISI have been watching for unusual activities, es
pecially since the mansion pecially since the mansion
where bin Laden lived had already attracted attention Wouldn't ISI agents have checked out who lived there?
"Did they knowhe was here? Surely, they knew he


was here," writes the astute
Pakistani columnist Pakistani columnist Cyril Almeida, in Dawnnewspa-
per. "Maybe they're sodaft per. "Maybe they're so daft
they didn't really take this they didn't really take this

may become impossible for the two countries to cooperate on a political endgame for the Afghan war that will stabilize that country, as U.S. troops exit. Without such cooperation, Afghanistan

will spill across the AfPak
border. This would be a selfinflicted tragedy for Pakistan.
The U.S.-Pakistani relationship was already ona

Compared with our coastal neighbors, Idaho is still a little behind the curve on farmers markets.
we're catching up fast. "We're behind Orego Washington, but part of that is because we're very rural. It takes a lot of people to make a market survive," said Lacey Menasco, trade specialist for the Idaho Department of Agriculture. "Idaho has one
of the fastest growths in the number of markets in the nation. They're growing within themselves, becoming more sophisticated and \(\underset{\text { last }}{\text { larger." }}\)
Last year saw the number of markets across the state
more than double, but it leveled out for 2011, with a few new markets sprouting up and a few others dissolving. Organizers are getting a better sense of their local supply and demand, Menasco said, so she wouldn't be surprised closed reopen in coming years.
Supply and demand were on Art Hoag's mind this year. After running the Wednes-day-night market in Twin Falls' Mary Alice Park for a
few seasons, he's decided to hold off on opening this summer to see how downtown's new Friday Night Market does nearby.
"Because they're trying to
start something toward the start something toward the center of town, it'd probably
work better for the vendors down there where there's a little more traffic. I want to support that," Hoag said. "I'd like to see a market downtown in midweek, but I don't think we can really handle two of them." A major trend for 2011 is diversity of products. At
most markets, there have always been fresh fruits and vegetables, preserves and crafts, with baked goods and ready-to-eat snacks at some. Now, many are also expanding into eggs, dairy, plants, activities, demonstrations and entertainment. "That's a consumer demand, to be able to buy more of their weekly groceries at the market," Menasco said. Markets like those in
Glenns Ferry, Shoshone and Glenns Ferry, Shoshone and
the Wood River Valley also are emphasizing their roles as community gathering places, offering information booths, demonstrations and seminars on growing and eating local food.

CEDAR RAPIDS, Iowa don't want to be financially (AP) - After the raging punished because of the Cedar River filled his home with 13 feet of water and ruined most of his posses sions, Justin Van Fleet pleaded for help from the agement Agency to get back on his feet.
Dead broke and living in a FEMA trailer following the 2008 flood, Van Fleet repeatedly submitted paperwork and made count less phone calls arguing his
case. After seven months, the agency finally gave him more than \(\$ 20,000\), which he said gave him his life back and allowed him to move into a house.
Then in March, a lette ment with a shocking message: He should never have gotten the money. And he had just 30 days to pay it all back.
The
The agency is asking Van Fleet and thousands of other Americans who were
victims of natural disasters victims of natural disasters
to return more than \(\$ 22\) million in government aid, acknowledging it mistakenly made payments to many people who were ineligible.
FEMA is required by law to recover improperly
spent money, but most of spent money, but most of
the people who were helped say they used the cash years ago, and they
