Young said there are still accomplishments and challenges ahead for the school board, and cautioned there's a rough road for Idaho educators.

Secret corporate spending on political campaigns may face the sharp rays of sunshine. A draft executive order awaiting

President Barack Obama's signature would require all companies bidding for federal contracts to show the public how much money they spend

on political campaigns, and where

it goes. The proposal also covers corporate donations to nonprofit fronts that, in turn, pump the money into independent political spending to either help or harm certain candidates.



that allows corporations and unions to make direct political donations to candidates. But since such donations would show up on a candidate's disclosures, many trade and industry groups have kept their donations secret by creating nonprofits that aren't required to name their fiscal supporters.

Those organizations don't donate directly to candidates. Instead, the thirdparty groups put money into efforts like their own political ads, literature and phone calls during election season. Those groups spent nearly

\$133 million from secret donors in the 2010 elections, with \$119 million – or 90 percent – going toward Republican causes, according to data compiled by the nonpartisan Center for Responsive Politics.

Government openness advocates say that showing who donates to political spending groups would be a welcome step toward transparency and away from back-door deals. On the other side are business advocates who contend that the change would bring undue political scrutiny to companies' bids for federal work.

Corporate and business interests are lobbying fiercely against the proposal, including the U.S. Chamber of Commerce, one of the biggest political spenders.

'If you have to disclose to the awarding officials what political spending you've done, the natural result would be for the awarding officials to consider that

during the award process," spokeswoman Chamber Blair Latoff said, adding that contracts should be awarded based on the best value for taxpayers. "... They should not be based on those contractors' political views and prior to Obama's decision. they should not enlist the naughty and which are nice."

Bellevue considers fire department consolidation

BELLEVUE - There aren't any easy solutions when you need to provide more services with less money, but the city of Bellevue has been trying to do more with less each year of this recession. City leaders want to ensure that one critical service, the fire department, isn't left with too little, too late.

On Monday, they presented the results of a study assessing the costs and benefits of consolidating fire services with Wood River Fire and Rescue, Hailey's fire department, or both, to several dozen citizens in the Bellevue Elementary School gym. The public would be heavily instudy was funded by the other two departments. Public reaction was mixed, although most lauded what the department has been able ing is just a first step, said former firefighter who repreto do with its resources. Money was their primary concern, including the cost for individual homeowners' fire insurance policies and taxes and levies that might be assessed on their homes. However, those who spoke also acknowledged that providing adequate fire response is a basic function of government, and many said they would be willing to pay more to improve the department. "Seventy-two thousand dollars is a drop in the bucket; it's not something we're going to be able to survive on," said Bellevue firefighter Trent Shoemaker, describing the importance of the work and how much he enjoys it. "I'll do it for free if that's what it takes, but everyone else has to say they'll do it for free too." Councilwoman Barb Patterson said she wanted to ensure the council didn't opt for something that firefighters weren't in favor of, while several council members said the

Two write-ins seek Shoshone schools seat

SHOSHONE - Shoshone School District voters may possibly be scratching their heads as they enter the polls on May 17.

Both candidates for the only item on the ballot, the Zone 2 school board seat, are write-ins.

This is also the first contested school board election for the Shoshone board in as long as 10 years.

Candidate Rian Pine was raised in Rupert and works as an information technology specialist for the Idaho Transportation Department. He and his wife have four children, three of whom are enrolled in Shoshone Elementary School.

Though rather new to Shoshone, Pine said he and his wife have both quickly become integrated with the school and the community.

"I'm just a concerned parent," Pine said. "I've never ran for anything, but I do want the chance to voice my opinion and can't very well do that while just sitting back idly."

Pine said he wouldn't want to jump right in to the board seat with grand ideas or changes in mind, but wanted to learn and be able to share opinions with other trustees.

"I'm positive that the superintendent and board are doing great," Pine said. "I just want to get involved and help where I can."

Fellow candidate Tammi Hall was raised in Oakley and works part-time as a finance manager for an engineering surveying firm in Sun Valley. She and her husband have six kids, the fifth of whom will graduate from Shoshone High School this year.

The couple has organized the Senior Celebration, a drug-freelock-in that follows graduation, for several years.

"I know what a challenge budget cuts are," Hall said. "I have the ability now and I guess it's just time I stepped up and did my part."

FEMA's all wet

f it seems as though it hasn't stopped raining this spring, you're right. March and April both had higher than normal precipitation and lower than average amounts of sunshine, and May is well on its way to continuing the trend. And yet the high desert version of "wet" pales in comparison to what we see and read about happening in Memphis and southward into Mississippi and Alabama.

In Memphis alone, flood damage is estimated in excess of \$320 million and a state of emergency was declared weeks ago. One of the advantages of the "State of Emergency" declaration is that it allows

those that have sustained damage to apply for disaster $relief \, funds-much \, of \, this$ flowing through the Federal **Emergency Management** Agency (FEMA). And therein lies the problem.

Because at the same time that thousands of new claims are getting ready to come in FEMA's direction, more than 5,500 people that have already received funds have just been given notice to pay it all back. And they have only 30 days to doit.

You read that right. In the past six years FEMA has paid out over \$22 million to victims

of floods, tornados and other disasters that they now want back. But guess what? The recipients of the money – many of whom had to fight tooth and nail to get it in the first place - spent it to repair and replace damaged homes; exactly what you'd expect them to do. It's not like they invested in the local savings bank where they've been accruing a hefty percent and a half interest. They spent it as the first step to restoring their lives.

Or so they thought. Apparently FEMA is required by law to recover money that is spent "improperly". We would like to think that they should first be required by law to be competent. When piled on top of the administrative disaster following Hurricane Katrina in 2005, we begin to wonder whether FEMA manages disasters or simply exacerbates the ones that have already occurred.

We may be tempted to react by asking, "What do floods 1,700 miles away in Memphis have to do with us in south-central Idaho?" The answer is simple: there have been four disaster declarations in Idaho over the past six years and although in a different FEMA district - it's the same Federal Emergency Management Agency in Idaho as it is in Tennessee or Louisiana. Is China's bad news good for America?

he best news about the American economy isn't coming from America. It's coming from China.

The inexhaustible labor pool that has fueled China's rise as the world's dominant low-cost manufacturer is beginning to get exhausted. The nation's decades-old one-child policy has collided with its decades-old industrial development policy to produce something hitherto unimaginable: a labor shortage. China's labor force will begin to shrink in the next year or two, the Wall Street Journal reported on Monday.

The result, as the Journal documents, is steeply rising wages - during the past year, up 14 percent in Shanghai; 18 percent in Guandong (China's industrial belt); and 28 percent in the inland province of Chongqing, a lower-wage region to which manufacturing has only begun to relocate.

The implications for the U.S. economy are potentially major. With labor costs soaring in China and the yuan slowly rising, while in the United States productivity soars and the dollar slowly declines, the economic advantages that American companies reap by off-

shoring production begin to

By 2015, the study reports, the gap between American and Chinese labor costs adjusted for productivity differentials will have so narrowed that China's labor costs will come to fully 69 percent of U.S. labor costs.

So what's the catch? Just this: The two regions that the group compared are the Yangtze River Delta (which includes Shanghai) and Mississippi.

Mississippi? The state that ranks 49th or 50th in virtually every measure of U.S. living standards? Is Mississippi the new normal for an America that's competitive in the global marketplace?



For Americans, to infinity and beyond

resident Obama tried to use the announcement of the death of Osama bin Laden to get Americans to think big again. The successful end of a 10-year manhunt, he declared last week. was a "testament to the greatness of our country and the determination of the American people."

But bin Laden's death instead seemed to feed stubborn domestic divisions and conjure thorny geopolitical stalemates. Maybe the president should take a different tack to get the public to embrace the "big things" rhetoric he launched in January's State of the Union address.

Maybe he should use the final days of the space shuttle program - the penultimate flight is scheduled for next week; the final flight is set for June - to get Americans to turn their attention to the heavens, literally and figuratively. Talk about thinking big.

Obama is right to try to pump us up. It isn't just the gnawing self-doubt of the past globalized decade that has dampened our national aspirations. Or even the recession, though that hasn't helped. It's the earthbound, utilitarian side of our national character, let loose by

our insecurities, that has been strangling our idealism and our imagination.

Historians long ago identified the ongoing tension between idealism and pragmatism that lies at the core of the American character. In 1915, Van Wyck Brooks described the nation's "quite unclouded, quite unhypocritical assumption of transcendent theory ('high ideals')" and its "simultaneous acceptance of catchpenny realities?' In 1920. philosopher George Santayana argued that of all the people in the world, Americans had a unique ability to bring realism and idealism into harmony.

A half-century ago, President John F. Kennedy jumpstarted the can-do side of our national character, leveraging Americans' competitive spirit and our love affair with technology to get us thinking about the great unknown. In less than a decade, we planted the Stars and Stripes on the moon.

Back then. the ultimate symbol of technological ad-

vancement was the spaceship. Today it's the newest computerized gizmo.

That shift is powerfully reflective of a change in our values. It seems that these days, we're most excited about technologies that better connect us to each other or better navigate the known world. We pursue links among the like-minded and access to knowledge that has already been catalogued. In other words, we're excited by exploring the universe horizontally not vertically. We've replaced wonder with a search algorithm.

Worse yet, we increasingly see our world through the prism of cost/benefit analysis and risk management. We seek to monetize all aspects of life; I recently saw a study that calculated the economic costs of office rudeness. We constantly ask, "Is it worth the cost?"

In recent years, NASA officials have begun to see that strident utilitarianism as an abiding threat to the future of space exploration. In 2007, Michael Griffin, then the NASA chief administrator, urged people to look bevond what he called "acceptable reasons" for recharging the U.S. space program, to embrace the "real," "intuitive" reasons

for going deeper into space. "The cultural ethos in

America today," he said in a speech in Houston, "requires us to have ... reasons that pass analytical muster, that offer a favorable cost/benefit ratio that can be logically defended."

The problem is that acceptable reasons alone national security, economic benefit, scientific discovery - don't fully explain why we should launch ourselves into space. Rather, the true justification for space exploration is that such enterprises "speak abundantly to our sense of human curiosity, of wonder and awe," and because they "lift up human hearts everywhere when we do them."

But perhaps the best reason to once again turn our eyes and our dreams toward space is that it helps defeat what Lewis Mumford called the "idols of utilitarianism." We can't do big things unless we think big. We can't think big unless we allow our imaginations go beyond the mundane. There's nothing less mundane than galaxies far, far away.

We urge everyone to vote on May 17 and encourage you to vote yes on the levy. This is an investment in the future of our community, state and nation. Our children are worth it.

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

911 tape highlights lost **Canadian woman's plight**

MOUNTAIN CITY, Nev. – Even for 911 operators, the idea that a woman had spent seven weeks in the Nevada wilderness alone in a van and survived was unbelievable.

"She says March 19," replies Chad Herman. "She's about dead, and her husband took off about a month ago and never came back, so I'm sure he's dead."



Where to look for your first employee?

EW YORK – You've decided to hire your first employee. But where do you go to find the best candidate?

There are several traditional ways: posting the job online, or contacting an employment agency or school. All these methods have pros and cons.

You might find, though, the best way to find an employee is by asking around. Tell business associates, family and friends that you want to hire a staffer. Chances are, someone you talk to knows somebody who's looking for work.



ONLINE JOB SITES

If you're comfortable working online, you'll probably find it easy to post your job opening on local or nationwide sites. You'll need to create an account and pay a fee. Fees can differ dramatically from one site to another - for example, \$25 to\$100. How much you spend may depend on how many

postings you have - the more openings you post, the less you pay for each.

The hard part, though, is going through potentially hundreds of resumes and trying to decide which candidates to pursue. This can be very time consuming, especially since some people apply for jobs they aren't suited for.

You'll also need to do some investigating when you start choosing candidates to interview and possibly hire. Depending on the nature of the position you may want to request background and credit checks in

addition to talking to their references.

EMPLOYMENT AGENCIES

Using an employment agency can be expensive, sometimes thousands of dollars. But the services you get in return for that investment will save you a lot of time and effort.

An agency will interview candidates and then send you those who look like they might be a good fit. If necessary, the agency may handle



Yesterday on Wall Street

Tumbling demand for commodities and a drop in the euro led to a broad stock selloff Wednesday that pulled the Dow Jones industrial average down 130 points. Stocks fell broadly, with energy and materials companies suffering the worst declines. The Dow lost 1 percent to close at 12,630.03. The S&P 500 fell 15.08, or 1.1 percent, to 1,342.08. The Nasdaq composite lost 26.83, or 0.9 percent, to 2,845.06. The market's broad sell off, which sent all

10 industry groups in the S&P 500 index lower, is a sign that the economic recovery still seems uncertain at times. Strong earnings have been carrying the market higher since the beginning of 2011. On Tuesday the S&P 500 climbed for the third straight day to within 0.5 percent of its highest close for the year. Three stocks fell for every one that rose on the New York Stock Exchange. Consolidated volume came to 3.8 billion shares.

NEW YORK - A former Wall Street titan was convicted Wednesday of making a fortune by coaxing a crew of corporate tipsters into giving him an illegal edge on blockbuster trades in technology and other stocks what prosecutors called the largest insider trading case ever involving hedge funds.

Rai Raiaratnam was convicted of five conspiracy counts and nine securities fraud charges at the closely watched trial in federal court in Manhattan. The jury had deliberated since April 25, and at one point was forced to start over again when one juror dropped out due to illness.

Prosecutors had alleged the 53-year-old Rajaratnam made profits and avoided losses totaling more than a rarity for him at the trial, \$60 million from illegal tips. His Galleon Group funds,

Using an agency can have another big plus: The agency may be willing to let you hire a temporary staffer, and then, if the staffer succeeds, allow you to make a permanent hire. You'll have to pay a fee to the agency on top of the worker's salary. But you won't have to pay benefits or employment taxes. And if a temp doesn't work out, letting him or her go will be less complicated than having to fire your own employee.

COLLEGES AND TRADE SCHOOLS

Placement offices at colleges and trade schools help current students and alumni find jobs. Whether you're looking for an assistant to do clerical work, or want someone with a particular skill, placement offices may be helpful. They may have screened students or alums to be sure they're connecting the right candidate with the right company. But they won't be in a position to handle the background and credit checks that an employment agency does.

NETWORKING

Just as networking can help job seekers, it can help employers find staffers. Talking to people you know is one of the best ways to find out who's looking for a job. Your brother, friend or client may know someone third-hand who will be a great hire.

But be careful about hiring someone who's a close relative or friend of your networking partner. Hiring your business associate's son or your friend's sister, for example, could be a disaster. If it doesn't work out, you may lose an associate or a friend as well as a staffer. And maybe find yourself bad-mouthed in the process.

Also be sure that the person who gives you the recommendation is someone whose judgment you can trust. If you have a business associate who loves everyone and can't look at a possible candidate with a critical eye, maybe that recommendation is one you want to take a pass on.

OTHER RESOURCES

Trade and professional organizations may keep lists of their members who are looking for work. The upside of this method is that you're looking at a candidate pool that is likely to be familiar with your kind of business. And it can be another form of networking - someone who won't work out for your company may know somebody else who will.



Four steps can ensure success of application for controlled hunt

uestion: "Last year I had a problem with my controlled-hunt application. I thought I applied for a deer hunt in one unit but it showed up for a different hunt on the application receipt I received from the vendor. What should I do if this happens again this year?"

Answer: The controlledhunt application period is a chaotic time of the year for many vendors and anxious big game hunters. Many hunters have found it difficult and frustrating to deal with the application period, mostly because of miscommunication with the vendor entering the application.

In the end it's not the vendor's responsibility, it is the hunter's responsibility to make sure their controlled hunt application is entered correctly into the drawing.

Here are suggestions to help sportsmen with the controlled-hunt application process:

1. Read the regulation brochure, either an electronic version on the department's website or a hard copy available free from all vendors.

This sounds simple but many individuals don't realize there are changes that occur from year to year. Hunt numbers, season dates, and exceptions vary from year to year. Doing a little homework before showing up at your local



3. Double-check your application.

While at the vendor make sure the clerk understands which hunt you are applying for. When they hand you your application receipt double-check the hunt number, big game unit, dates and license number before you leave. Make sure the applicant or applicants in the group are all correct on the application, because transposed numbers may result in an application for someone else or a rejected application.

If you notice a mistake, the vendor can immediately cancel the application, make necessary corrections and re-enter the application. If you notice errors at a later time or wait to make changes, you must go to your local regional office to cancel the original application

At this later time, you will be charged a second application fee of \$6.25 for Idaho residents. \$14.75 for nonresidents. Ultimately, it is your responsibility to make sure your application is correct.

4. Don't wait.

Question: Like many people, fishing has been a favorite pastime of mine since childhood. I have fond memories going fishing with my dad, and today enjoy taking my own son fishing. Are there certain things that you recommend when teaching a child to fish?

Answer: If possible start young. Statistics show those children exposed to outdoor activities as young children will likely embrace those activities as adults.

Make it positive: Assuming you're starting out the family fishing adventures with a younger child (ages 3-4), I would recommend you keep it simple, short and fun.

You want to make the first ever fishing trips memorable and positive, so try to avoid long road trips, miserable weather, complicated fishing techniques, etc. Keep your fishing trips short and appropriate to the attention span of the child. Even if fishing is good, change up the pace a bit - take breaks, throw rocks, look for frogs, pick up trash; it's all equally cool with young children.

Make a big deal about giving them their first fishing rod and tackle box. There is something magical to kids about going fishing and using their very own stuff.

Remember, going fishing is simply spending some quality time with your children outdoors.

Avoid the negative: Even if you're a die-hard angler yourself, remember the trip is about them and not you. Don't over-teach or push the kids too hard to bait their own hook or gut their first fish if they're showing a reluctance to do so. I've often seen young children instantly lose interest if their adult fishing partner gets frustrated if the child can't cast right (even after repeated demonstrations), can't hook a nibbling bluegill, drags a hooked fish into the weeds instead of shore, walks away from the fishing rod, etc.

Don't take (i.e. grab) the fishing rod away from your child to show them

Fly fishing typically requires the angler to be wading in streams, which requires some serious physical exertion, coordination and concentration. If I were to throw out an age where most children can begin tackling the art of fly fishing, I'd say between 12 and 14 years old.

region to fly fish before the official season kicks off?

A: When people call me and ask the same question I usually have to help them narrow down, or better define their definition of "best." A good day fishing usually isn't described the same way between anglers. Some folks want to fish in remote areas where they never see another angler, while others want a short drive to a place where they're likely going to go home with a limit of trout.

So, I'll provide some recommendations based on a relatively new fly fisherman who wants to go fishing this week and hopes to hook a few trout. special regulations - found in the Idaho heritage I'm passing on.

I'd also recommend folks visit the IDFG website and click on the "Idaho Fishing Planner," which helps the angler plan their fishing trip (http://fishandgame.idaho.gov/). Folks can view recommended fisheries or search for bass fisheries within 30 miles of Twin Falls and view a map of the area.

Q. How about bait fishing? Where are some good places for that?

A: I'd recommend Dierkes Lake, Magic Reservoir, Salmon Falls Creek Reservoir, Roseworth Reservoir, Little Camas Reservoir, Rock Creek, Oster Lakes, Riley Pond (Hagerman WMA) and Filer Ponds.

Most of these fisheries are stocked by IDFG and have already been stocked this year. You can also see where we've stocked this year by going to the IDFG website, selecting the fishing page and choosing "stocking records". We also try to post general fishing conditions on the web under "fishing reports".

Q. Besides trout, what is the best types of fish for young ones to catch?

A: When I think of young children and fishing, I think of bluegill, bass and stocked trout.

Some places to find bluegill include Oster Lakes, Dierkes Lake, Anderson Ponds, West Highway Pond, Bruneau Dunes Ponds and Carey Lake.

Observatory to reopen near Mount St. Helens

LONGVIEW, Wash. From whatever direction visitors gaze at Mount St. Helens this summer, they'll be able to soak up more information along with the volcano views.

When the Johnston Ridge Observatory opens for the season on Saturday, the displays will include new movies and touch screen kiosks, which will also be installed elsewhere around the peak as part of \$1.6 million worth of improvements.

New informational signs are going up at several locations, replacing ones that have faded. By mid-July, the JRO's new 200-seat amphitheater is scheduled to open next to the visitor center at the east end of Spirit Lake Memorial Highway.

Representatives of the U.S. Forest Service and the nonprofit Mount St. Helens Institute, which offers educational programs at the peak, discussed the new

tourist attractions Tuesday at the Cowlitz County Historical Museum.

The center of attention was a touch-screen "Return to Life" kiosk loaded with hundreds of photos and videos. Visitors can touch on a location on the main screen to access a science lesson from a Mount St. Helens expert.

"We're trying to bring the three decades of biology research to the exhibits," said Peter Frenzen, a scientist with the Mount St. Helens National Volcanic Monument.

The Forest Service filmed researchers who gathered at the peak last summer to mark the 30th anniversary of the volcano's most recent major eruption in 1980.

"It was the cream of the crop of St. Helens scientists," Frenzen said. The scientists provided hundreds of photos, and the Forest Service also got footage from an Austrian film, "Life from Zero," filmed for the 30th anniversary.

BOISE - You can reach out and touch the sand dunes at Bruneau Dunes State Park, or you can reach out and touch relatives anywhere on Earth

Thanks to Wi-Fi at Bruneau Dunes and 13 other Idaho state parks, campers can connect with nature and their families and offices. The first 20 minutes of Internet access are free, then there's a daily fee.

For Linda and Bob Gladman of Boise, Wi-Fi at the park this spring was a convenience that allowed them to not only enjoy the dunes, bird watching and paddling on the park's lakes, but also keep in touch with family members.

"I'm checking in with my daughter every morning," said Linda Gladman as she powered up her laptop on the table of their camp trailer to check email.

While she sent messages on the computer, right out the window of the camper were the beige-gray sand dunes highlighted against a blue sky.

You'd think campers would want to get away from it all when camping. Not so.

Internet access is attracting people to state parks and keeping them there longer.

A twin star for Roman goddesses

ver since Jupiter's egress from the evening sky at the end of March, Saturn has been the lone naked-eye planet in the night sky. As the slowest moving planet, it is currently trudging through Virgo, the largest zodiac constellation.

Since the end of January, Saturn's nearest visual companion has been Porrima, Virgo's second brightest star. Porrima is the Latin name for a mythological figure also known as Antevorta. Together with her sister, Postvorta, they were the goddesses of the future and past, respectively, and protectors of expectant mothers. What the ancients

couldn't have known is that Porrima really is a pair of close sisters. Porrima is a binary pair of stars who dance around each other every 169 years. Because Porrima is close (only 31 light years away) a backyard telescope can separate the stellar siblings. And they move quickly enough that they shift noticeably from one year to the next.

The sisters are, as best as we can measure, nearidentical twins. Both are white, hydrogen fusing stars with surface temperatures of 12,000 degrees Fahrenheit (2000 degrees hotter than the sun). Each is about 40 percent heavier than the sun, four times as luminous, and 20 percent wider. Their mutual orbits are elongated, bringing them close together (as they were in 2005), then wide apart eight decades later.

To find Porrima, first locate Saturn, the mediumbright, pale-yellow object in the south-southeast at 10 p.m. Porrima is dimmer, above and to the right of Saturn by less than the width of your pinkie at arm's length. If you have a telescope, see if you can separate Porrima's sister stars at high power. And while you're at it, swing

expect a sizeable settlement. Will the settlement have any effect on my bankruptcy?

A nswer: When you file a bankruptcy, all your assets become part of your bankruptcy estate. You can keep the assets if they are exempt under Idaho law. Your lawsuit and potential settlement would become part of your bankruptcy estate, and the bankruptcy trustee would take your place in prosecuting the lawsuit. From the settlement, you would be allowed to keep amounts necessary for continuing medical care and for medical appliances in addition to amounts reasonably necessary for your support and the support of your dependents. You would probably not get to keep amounts paid for pain & suffering and emotional distress. Worse yet, the trustee would probably settle for less than you would want. You AND your injury lawyer should consult with an experienced bankruptcy attorney before proceeding.

WASHINGTON - Deep in hiding, his terror organization becoming battered and fragmented, Osama bin Laden kept pressing followers to find new ways to hit the U.S., officials say, citing his private journal and other documents recovered in last week's raid.

The Yemen group, for instance, has embraced the smallerscale attacks that bin he regarded as unsuccessleading fundraising, propaganda and operational arm.



WASHINGTON - Was the U.S. right to kill Osama bin Laden? Absolutely, and about time, Americans say.

A new Associated Press-GfK poll shows the nation supporting the raid with rare unanimity, and the glow from the operation is also boosting approval for President Barack Obama's handling of terrorism and the war in Afghanistan.

Few events have sparked such soaring approval from the nation, and almost nothing has since George W. Bush's handling of the U.S. campaign against terrorism in the months following the Sept. 11, 2001, attacks. sion, 52 percent of Americans now approve of Obama's stewardship of the economy, giving him his best rating on that issue since the early days of his presidency.

Overall, Obama's approval rating is up to 60 percent from 53 percent in March and the 47 percent low point following last fall's congressional elections. It was 64 percent in May 2009, just months after he was sworn into office. Independents, who are likely to be a key voting bloc in the 2012 presidential election, caused the new uptick in support by sliding back to Obama.

The AP-GfK results were striking in that they found Obama with a higher approval rating than other recent polls that generally said he was in the low 50s. Polls often produce varying results because of differences in question wording and polling methodology. Also, during periods when public opinion about an issue is particularly volatile, and at times when the public is being presented with rapidly changing information, it is not uncommon to see wider variations across polls, even those conducted around the same time.

AL-QAIDA LEADER VOWS STRIKES

CAIRO (AP) - The leader of al-Qaida's Yemeni offshoot has warned the U.S. that Osama bin Laden's death does not signal the end of the fight and threatened to carry out worse attacks in the future.

Nasser al-Wahishi, the head of al-Qaida in the Arabian Peninsula and once a close associate of bin Laden, posted a eulogy for the slain al-Qaida leader on Islamic extremist websites Tuesday.

Al-Wahishi warned Americans "the matter will not be over" with bin Laden's death and that "what is coming is greater and worse.

He said "jihad is glowing brighter" now than during bin Laden's life, according to a transcript provided Wednesday by SITE Intel group, which monitors militant messages.

Some U.S. lawmakers to view photos

ANNAPOLIS, Maryland (AP) - Some members of Congress will be allowed to view photographs of Osama bin Laden's body, a spokeswoman for a Maryland congressman said Wednesday.

Heather Molino, a spokeswoman for U.S. Rep. C.A. Dutch Ruppersberger, said the Democratic congressman is planning to view the photos at CIA headquarters.

"He is interested and wants to see them," Molino said.

Ruppersberger is a member of the House Intelligence Committee. All of that committee's members are among the congressional representatives who have been offered a chance to view the photographs, Molino said.

Last week, Ruppersberger said he agreed with the White House's decision not to publicly release photos of bin Laden's body.

"Why enrage the rest of the world who don't like us? And we don't want them to rally behind his death to hurt us again," Ruppersberger said last week.

IRAN Spy trial for three Americans not held

TEHRAN - Iranian authorities postponed the long-awaited espionage trial of three Americans on Wednesday, their lawyer said. Two of the accused, still jailed in Tehran, did not appear in court as expected and the authorities gave no explanation.

Shane Bauer and Josh Fattal have been held since July 2009 after being taken into custody on the Iran-Iraq border. A third American who was taken with them, Sarah Shourd, was released in September on \$500,000 bail and returned to the United States. She is being tried in absentia.

Bauer and Fattal, who are both 28, remain in jail. The three claim they were hiking in Iraq's northern Kurdish region and any crossing into Iran was inadvertent.

EUROPE **Europeans call** in Syrian envoys

BERLIN - European countries summoned Syrian ambassadors Wednesday to threaten a new round of sanctions that will target the country's leadership if it doesn't halt the repression of protesters, Germany said.

As Europe stepped up the pressure on Damascus, U.N. chief Ban Ki-moon demanded full access for humanitarian workers in Syria, which has blocked an international team from entering to make an independent assessment of the country's aid needs.



Hill panel seeking documents on Libya operations

WASHINGTON - Lawmakers who believe President Barack Obama didn't properly consult with Congress before launching air strikes on Libya are pressing the Pentagon for documents and material on all communications.

The House Armed Services Committee, beginning a marathon session Wednesday to craft a \$553 billion budget for the Defense Department next year, unanimously approved the measure seeking "any official document, record, memo, correspondence, or other communication of the Department of Defense that refers or relates to any consultation with Congress" on Libya.

Republicans and some Democrats have complained that Obama failed to consult with Congress before initiating the military operation to protect civilians from Moammar Gadhafi's forces in Libya. "Although select members were invited to a conference call during a con-

stituent work week, immediately preceding the president's press conference, a phone call can hardly be considered significant consultation," Rep. Howard "Buck" McKeon, R-Calif, the panel chairman, said Wednesday.

On the agenda for the committee's day-intonight session were the pace of withdrawing forces from Afghanistan, gays in the military and the transfer of detainees from the military prison at Guantanamo. The first hours of the session focused on military aircraft, carrier ships and a request to the Navy for a timeline on reopening a trap and skeet shooting range at the Miramar Air Station in California.

Obama envisions cuts of \$400 billion in defense over the next 12 years as the nation faces a fast-growing deficit. Lawmakers on the committee are resisting some of the cuts while imposing tougher scrutiny on the Pentagon's bookkeeping.

The defense blueprint takes a step toward reviving an extra engine for the next generation F-35 fighter plane despite objections from the administration and Defense Secretary Robert Gates that the engine is not needed.







Fiesta Bowl fined \$1M, stays in BCS

WASHINGTON (AP) -The Fiesta Bowl will be allowed to remain part of the Bowl Championship Series, though it must pay a \$1 million fine for apparent illegal campaign contributions and inappropriate spending.

The BCS presidential oversight committee, which made the decision Wednesday, also attached several conditions as it let the Fiesta Bowl remain part of the system for deciding college football's national champion. The demands include strengthening the Fiesta Bowl's board and imposing greater supervision of bowl executives so the problems others. Junker has been fired. are not repeated, according to materials obtained by The Associated Press.

"The message is they had cleaned house and addressed their problems, but our group doesn't believe they went far enough," Bill Hancock, executive director of the BCS, said in a telephone interview with the AP. He added that the \$1 million fine was meant to reflect the "serious nature of the matter."

The BCS called for the \$1 million to be donated to charities serving Arizona youth.

In a statement, Fiesta Bowl Chairman Duane oversight committee are Woods said: "The Fiesta Bowl Board of Directors understands and accepts the sanctions imposed by the BCS. We think that these tough but fair measures are consistent with our commitment to reform the Fiesta Bowl's governance and rebuild trust. The fine is substantial, but we are pleased that the BCS has directed that the funds benefit the youth of Arizona."

Those actions, the task force said, strongly suggest "that the bowl's executive staff frequently acted with scant regard for ethics and proper conduct. Further, it is the opinion of the task force that the bowl's board of directors over the years was negligent in its oversight responsibilities."

In 1932, the body of Charles Lindbergh Jr., the kidnapped son of Charles and Anne Lindbergh, was found in a wooded area near Hopewell, N.J.

In 1943, during World War II, Axis forces in North Africa surrendered.

In 1949, the Soviet Union lifted the Berlin Blockade, which the Western powers had succeeded in circumventing with their Berlin Airlift.

In 1958, the United States and Canada signed an agreement to create the North American Air Defense Command (later American the North Aerospace Defense Command, or NORAD for short).

In 1970, the Senate voted unanimously to confirm Harry A. Blackmun as a Supreme Court justice.

In 1978, the Commerce Department said hurricanes would no longer be given only female names. In 1982, in Fatima, Portugal, security guards overpowered a Spanish priest armed with a bayonet who attacked Pope John Paul II. (In 2008, the pope's longtime private secretary revealed that the pontiff was slightly wounded in the assault.) Ten years ago: Singer Perry Como died in Jupiter Inlet Colony, Fla., at age 88. Five years ago: Tony Snow made his debut as White House press secretary. A ruptured gas pipeline in southwestern Nigeria exploded as villagers were collecting fuel, killing up to 200 people. South Korean prosecutors indicted disgraced scientist Hwang Woo-suk on charges of fraud, embezzlement and bioethics violations linked to faked stem cell research. (Hwang was convicted in 2009 for embezzling research funds and illegally buying human eggs; he received a suspended prison term.) One year ago: An Afriqiyah Airways Airbus A330-200 jetliner plunged into the Libyan desert less than a mile from the runway in Tripoli after a flight from Johannesburg; a 9-year-old Dutch boy was the sole survivor of the crash that killed 103 people. An attacker hacked seven children and two adults to death in a rampage at a kindergarten in northwest China before taking his own life. Republicans chose Tampa, Fla., as the site of their 2012 presidential convention. Kelly Kulick, the first woman to win a PBA Tour title when she beat the men in the Tournament of Champions, won the U.S. Women's Open for her second women's major victory in 15 days.


