It does
It does, and here's why: Twin Falls has the seventh-highest crime rate in Idaho - higher than Boise, Meridian, Nampa, Idaho Falls, Pocatello, Caldwell or Lewiston. And its arrest rate increased 7 percent in the last three years for which statistics are available, according to the Idaho State

Simply put, there aren't enough Twin Falls officers ocover the beat, and those who do make 18 percent less than their counterparts lsewhere in the state. So they take higher-paying jobs, leaving the citizens of Twin Falls even more vulnerable. That's why when Twin Falls City Councilman Will Kezele says other needs may be more important than what Twin Falls pays its key employees, we have to disagree.
The salary gap is striking. The average firefighter in Idaho's largest cities earns it's $\$ 11.82$ This is Twin Fall nity that in additiontoits 44,000 residents, doubles , oinles in size during a typical weekday
We simply can't afford to lose any more of the experienced help we have
Police Chief Brian Pike says it takes two to five years of experience for officers to develop the level of service he wants. Pike won't even let them patrol on their own with less than a year on the job.
So when a cop with five years on his or her resume gets a better offer from Boise, or Meridian, or Idaho Falls, the impact is greater than just trying to replace a single officer.
Does that mean roads or infrastructure are less important? No. But it does mean the opportunity that for filling a pothole
The city of Twin Falls simply can't afford not to be competitive with comparably sized communities in Idaho on wages for critical jobs. When it is, the city risks a repeat of the disaster of 2005 and 2006 when 16 cops quit, mostly for higher-paying jobs elsewhere. At the time, that represented almost onefifth of the force
In some ways, the city still hasn't caught up. According to Pike, there are adequate numbers of experienced and rookie officers on the Twin Falls po lice force, but not nearly enough in between. Those are the middle managers of law enforcement who will be the chiefs of police of tomorrow. Personnel costs are only part of the equation for a cash-strapped city, but in some areas they're paramount. Let's hire enough cops to keep Twin Falls safe - and pay them enough to keep them here.

Studies of the herb black cohosh as well as soy products are inconsistent on hot flashes, Blacker said. Brownstein suggests that women first minimize processed foods, drink plenty of water and undergo blood tests to ensure they're getting adequate vitamins and minerals.
