# Dredge miners strike Idaho environmentalists' ire

BOISE - As a recreational suction dredge miner, Michael Emerson has encountered numerous obstacles in his smalltime bid to hit big-time pay dirt: Angry property owners trying to boot him off an impromptu claim in the Owyhee Mountains, a 4 1/2 day stranding deep in the forest near Grangeville, even near-Salmon River.

Now, the 51-year-old Kuna resident has a new foe: The Boisebased Idaho Conservation League, which wants the Environmental floating,

Protection Agency to enforce cleaners with 5-inch hoses. long-neglected federal pollution laws that would, if they were followed, shut down recreational river mining in Idaho, at least for this

"Oh, yeah. They (environmentalists) shut it down in California," Emerson says, adding that opponents have been "screaming up and down" in Oregon, too.

Not one permit has ever been issued for recreational mining. The EPA says it just doesn't have the resources, even if somebody actually applied.

That means everybody who lugs a suction dredge to Idaho's gold country rivers this summer will be breaking the law.

The fear, ICL activist Bradley Smith says, is that neither Idaho nor the federal government has any idea of the cumulative impacts of hundreds of small mining outfits on rivers from the Canadian border to Utah. The rivers are home to sensitive species like bull motorized vacuum trout and spawning salmon and out by high water rushing from the

Last year, more than 400 people applied for the \$10 state permit to use a recreational suction dredge on open Idaho rivers. The state permit, however, doesn't cover the federal Clean Water Act permit –

# Fire officials mum on injuries to occupant

BUHL - A mobile home in Buhl was totally destroyed in a fire on Sunday, with the question unanswered of whether the blaze took any lives.

In the mobile home park along Buhl's Manor Drive, neighbors said the home's occupant is Johnnie Blair, an elderly retired man who lived there alone. Firefighters responded to his home, located at 17 Manor Drive, at about 5 p.m. Sunday, arriving to find the fire roaring.

"There was fire throughout the whole building," said Buhl Assistant Fire Chief Nathan Fawcett. "It was fully engulfed when we arrived."

A neighboring mobile home to the east had slight exterior damage from the blaze, with firefighters preventing it from spreading further. Fawcett wouldn't confirm or deny that there were any fatalities, saying it's still under investi-

"I can't talk about that right now," he said. "We are looking, though. We are looking to make sure nobody was inside the fire. We're just going to comb the area."

Fawcett said the cause of the fire is unknown, along with what part of the building it

Only a handful of candidates involved in 15 contested area races chose to speak publically about their reasons for running. Even fewer up for a taxing district or school board seat campaigned. Still, it's an important day for representative government, especially to the area educators and municipal leaders who are asking voters to approve spending more than \$4 million for new facilities or just to maintain the services they provide.

Not even a potential infusion of \$50 million in unexpected state funding for Idaho's K-12 public schools is helping paint a rosy picture for area education budgets.

School districts in Buhl, Hansen, Richfield and Cassia County hope voters will give them about \$1.5 million in combined supplemental funding wiggle room for the coming fiscal year.

Bond opponents say a potential funding bump from better-than-expected state revenues means districts are unnecessarily reaching into taxpayer pockets with these propos-

#### School board elections pit experience against idealism

Tuesday's election will bring new blood to multiple area school boards, as more than 20 newcomers are running unopposed or against fellow prospective board newbies.

While 13 board incumbents are unopposed in their bids to keep their seats, three people are challenging two board mainstays — and both races are in Twin Falls.

Twin Falls School Board incumbents Lori Ward and Kenney Young have touted their experience and familiarity with the tough financial decisions of the past couple years as vital to steering their district through Idaho's changing educational landscape.

But Young's challenger, Paul Mc-Clintock, and retired educators Mary Catherine Barron and Dixie Lee Siegel - both challenging Ward - say it's time to bring a new perspective to district decisions.

#### Water, cemetery could mean big changes for little Dietrich

Voters in Dietrich – population 332 — will decide if they're willing to pay up to \$2 million to improve the city's domestic water system. Bond funding would pay for a new well and water storage tank, along with other system improvements.

The downside? The project's expected \$3.7 million in bond principal and interest garnered over 40 years can only be repaid through water system revenues. That'll mean bigger numbers on residents' water

Voters in the Dietrich area will also decide if they still want to form a taxing district that would give them a place to bury and honor their dead. The proposed Dietrich Cemetery District passed a November 2010 election, but a hiccup in the public notice process for the elections means a new vote is needed.



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# Dietrich pins growth hopes on water upgrade

Dietrich's population has more than doubled in the past decade.

But that's not likely to happen again unless the Lincoln County town and its 332 residents figure out how to fund the expansion of Dietrich's "maxed out" domestic water system. Voters will get a chance to do so on Tuesday, when the city hopes they'll approve a \$2 million bond issue to bring a new backup well and other improvements to town.

Dietrich Mayor Don Heiken said the city has been unable to run water or sewer service to its west subdivision, which it annexed into town six years ago. He hopes that approval

of the bond issue will allow the city to run new water line down Waucanza Street, and facilitate further city growth by offering more residents city water service.

something that we've needed for quite a while," he said. "And I do suspect the town will keep growing."

While Heiken said the 160-gallon-percity's minute pumping system runs between 18 to 24 hours per day in the summer, strain on the current system isn't the only reason Dietrich is seeking an expansion. Two years ago, Heiken said, the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency said the city couldn't continue to use the Dietrich School's well as a backup.

Building a new backup

well is expected to cost about \$745,000, while the \$2 million total would also be spent on delivery line improvements and potential construction of a storage tank that's larger than Dietrich's current 100,000-gallon tank.

While details depend on what kind of loans and grants Dietrich can secure for the work, the bond would be repaid through an increase to residents' water bills. Heiken said Dietrich can take advantage of a \$1.4 million EPA loan at 2 percent interest - some of which may be forgiven and is looking into further grant funding.

# Residents puzzle over man who died near Ore. town

A U.S. Forest Service crew found his body Thursday in a sleeping bag in the back of his 1997 baby blue GMC pickup, about 60 miles east of Salem, the state capital. McDonald kept a log as he stayed in his pickup on a small road from Marion Forks, detailing a 68day ordeal that ended in his death from hypothermia and starvation.

"He could have walked right down here to this restaurant," said Boenisch, who was having brunch with her husband in Marion Forks. The couple from Newberg, Ore., own a cabin in town and often walk, even with a couple feet of snow on the ground.

"Instead, you sit there and write in your journal for nearly 70 days," she said Saturday. "That's a long time. It's downhill. He's not out far enough to be doing that, to be lost in the woods." His body was discovered

nearly a month after his last entry, on April 15, which read "rain." His first entry was Feb. 7, when he arrived in the area to camp, authorities said. Days later, he awoke to find himself in the middle of a heavy snowstorm, said Linn County Sheriff Tim Mueller.

# Arab protesters descend on Israeli borders

MAJDAL SHAMS, Golan Heights – Mobilized by calls on Facebook, thousands of Arab protesters marched on Israel's borders with Syria, Lebanon and Gaza on Sunday in an unprecedented wave demonstrations, sparking clashes that left at least 15 people dead in an annual Palestinian mourning ritual marking the anniversary of Israel's birth.

In a surprising turn of events, hundreds of Palespoured across the Syrian frontier and staged riots, drawing Israeli accusations that Damascus, and its ally Iran, orchestrated the unrest to shift attention from



Even though Posada wasn't in the starting lineup Sunday, the Bleacher Creatures chanted his name during their daily "roll call," and the rest of the Yankee Stadium crowd cheered. The 39-year-old Posada, who has helped New York win five World Series titles and seven AL pennants, stood up in the dugout and waved.

### Djokovic beats Nadal again, win streak reaches 39

ROME — Novak Djokovic is starting to realize what an impact he's making on tennis with his recent domination of Rafael Nadal — and everyone else in the game, too.

Djokovic beat the top-ranked Nadal 6-4, 6-4 in the Italian Open final Sunday to stretch his unbeaten start this year to 37 matches. Djokovic trails only John McEnroe's 42-0 start in

1984. Overall, the Serb has won 39 consecutive matches stretching to Serbia's Davis Cup triumph in December, sixth best in the Open era, seven behind Guillermo Vilas' record set in 1977. "It's an incredible honor to be a part of tennis his-

tory in some way and part of an elite group of players — Federer, Nadal, McEnroe, (Ivan) Lendl, guys who were winning so many in a row," Djokovic said. "I don't know how much good it brings to tennis, but it's good that someone else is able to win other than just Federer and Nadal. It makes it more interesting."

The second-ranked Djokovic has beaten Nadal in all four finals they've played this year and defeated the Spaniard for the first time on clay last week in

#### **Boogaard's brain donated for** research; fans, family mourn ST. PAUL, Minn. - Relatives and fans of Derek

Boogaard shed tears Sunday as they remembered the former NHL tough guy as a "teddy bear" who was as generous and kind as he was burly and tough, a somber end to a weekend during which his distraught family agreed to donate his brain to medical researchers.

The 28-year-old Boogaard was found dead in his Minneapolis apartment Friday, five months after he sustained a season-ending concussion with the New

Boogaard's agent and a spokeswoman for the Boston University School of Medicine confirmed Sunday that his brain will be examined for signs of a degenerative disease often found in athletes who sustain repeated hits to the head.


Minneapolis police said there were no outward signs of trauma, but results of an autopsy are expected to take several weeks. There is no known concussion connection to his death, but at Boogaard's wish his family signed papers to donate his brain to the BU Center for the Study of Traumatic Encephalopathy. The donation was first reported by the Star Tribune of Minneapolis.

Boogaard's parents, Len and Joanne, sister, Kyrsten, and brothers, Aaron, Ryan and Curtis, all attended the memorial inside Xcel Energy Center, where the 6-foot-7, 265-pound enforcer became a fan favorite with the Minnesota Wild for his fighting prowess despite scoring all of two goals in five seasons with the team. They did not address the cause of Boogaard's death or comment on his decision to donate his brain to science. With a few hundred fans, many wearing replicas of

Boogaard's No. 24 jersey with the Wild, standing in the arena lobby, general manager Chuck Fletcher, former teammate Wes Walz and Boogaard's sister and brother took turns telling stories and reading tributes. A funeral is planned for Saturday in Regina,

Saskatchewan.

oes it matter that the average Twin Falls police officer earns \$3.37 less per hour than cops in similar-sized cities in

has the seventh-highest crime rate in Idaho - higher than Boise, Meridian, Nampa, Idaho Falls, Pocatello, Caldwell or Lewiston. And its arrest rate increased 7 percent in the last three years for which statistics are available, according to the Idaho State

Police. Simply put, there aren't enough Twin Falls officers to cover the beat, and those who do make 18 percent less than their counterparts elsewhere in the state. So

jobs, leaving the citizens of

Falls City Councilman Will Kezele says other needs may be more important than what Twin Falls pays its key employees, we have to disagree.

The salary gap is striking. The average firefighter in Idaho's largest cities earns \$16.25 an hour; in Twin Falls it's \$11.82. This is a community that in addition to its 44,000 residents, doubles or triples in size during a typical weekday.

We simply can't afford to lose any more of the experienced help we have.

Police Chief Brian Pike says it takes two to five years of experience for officers to develop the level of service he wants. Pike won't even let them patrol on their own with less than a year on the job.

So when a cop with five years on his or her resume gets a better offer from Boise, or Meridian, or Idaho Falls, the impact is greater than just trying to replace a single officer.

Does that mean roads or infrastructure are less important? No. But it does mean the opportunity cost for getting an experienced cop is greater than that for filling a pothole.

The city of Twin Falls simply can't afford not to be competitive with comparably sized communities in Idaho on wages for critical jobs. When it is, the city risks a repeat of the disaster of 2005 and 2006 when 16 cops quit, mostly for higher-paying jobs elsewhere. At the time, that represented almost onefifth of the force.

In some ways, the city still hasn't caught up. According to Pike, there are adequate numbers of experienced and rookie officers on the Twin Falls police force, but not nearly enough in between.

Those are the middle managers of law enforcement who will be the chiefs of police of tomorrow.

Personnel costs are only part of the equation for a cash-strapped city, but in some areas they're paramount. Let's hire enough cops to keep Twin Falls safe — and pay them enough to keep them here.

# The medical mystery of Mitt

 $rom\,China\,this\,week$ came the rare news that twin girls had been born with a single body and two heads.

Here in America, though, we have an even more unusual case: Two people conjoined in the body of a 64year-old man. His name is Mitt Romney.

One head of Romney defends his health-care reform in Massachusetts, the model for President Obama's version, which also uses an "individual mandate" to force people to buy health insurance - an idea that enrages conservatives.

The other head of Romney denounces Obama's health care reform as a "power grab," a "government takeover of health care" and an "economic nightmare."

The conservative Romney head, which aspires to be the Republican presidential nominee, is trying urgently to separate itself from its conjoined liberal twin - but the brightest minds in health care have been unable to help him with this logical leap.

And so the Romney twins presented themselves to the University of Michigan medical school on Thursday for a consult. Based on the symptoms, the prognosis is grim.

"Good morning," he told his audience – a little after 2

"You've got companies here in Massachusetts like Parago," he told them - in Ann Arbor. Parago, by the way, is based in Texas.

He shuffled his notes and tripped over words, turning "human resources" into "human rights." Asked a question by a member of the audience, he hunted for a paper on his lectern, saying, "Yeah, I'm going to — I'm going to — well, I had my



my list here - well, I can't quite find it."

It was difficult not to feel pity for Romney in his effort to separate from himself. He's the titular Republican presidential frontrunner. whose business smarts should make him a solid bet to defeat Obama in this economy. But on the issue that matters most to Republicans, health care, he might as well be, as the Wall Street Journal dubbed him Thursday, "Obama's Running Mate." The Journal editorialized that Romney was "compromised and not credible" because of his Massachusetts law, "the prototype for President Obama's."

Adding to Romney's misery, a liberal group in Massachusetts uncovered a 1994 quote in which he supported a plan that would have imposed a nationwide individual mandate – the exact thing Romney now criticizes Obama for doing.

On Thursday, Romney pretended that he had never held such a position, maintaining that only states, not the feds, should be able to force people to buy insurance. Yet even then, Romney gave a more powerful defense of the mandate than Obama



Romney embraced health care reforms that go beyond Obama's. He praised France's co-insurance system, and he hailed "capitated rates" - an idea often associated with ra-

The other Romney twin, though, argued the other side, using the word "Obamacare" 15 times to disparage the reforms he inspired. Obama and his advisors, he determined, "fundamentally distrust free enterprise." Romney's current health care plan, he boasted, "includes no mandates."

Romney has what might be called an Al Gore problem: Even if he's being genuine, he seems ersatz. He assumed a professorial air by delivering a 25-page PowerPoint presentation in an amphitheater lecture hall - but the university issued a statement saying nist for The Washington it had nothing to do with the

event, for which the sponsoring college Republicans failed to fill all seats. His very appearance - a suit worn without a necktie - shouted equivocation. His hair was so slick that only a few strands defied the product.

But Romney's slippery air comes less from pomade than from policies - abortion, gay rights and now health care - changed over time as expedience required. His calibrations continued Thursday. 

The lawsuit, filed in U.S. District Court in Idaho, names the U.S. Forest Service, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service and Interior plaint, the Montana-based Secretary Ken Salazar.

The environmental groups claim agency officials also neglected to properly consider the impact the commercial forest-thinning project could have on lynx, its habitat and the government's own efforts favor industry. to recover the species. Logging the parcel, located in the Caribou-Targhee National Forest in eastern Idaho, would also force out the snowshoe hare, a primary source of food for lynx in winter months.

"Although these federal of agencies are required by the Endangered Species Act to try and recover lynx populations, logging 7,000 acres of critical lynx habitat does just the opposite," said Dr. Sara Johnson, a former wildlife biologist for the Caribou-Targhee National Forest and current director of the Native Ecosystems Council.

Lynx compare in size to bobcats, but are equipped with longer legs and bigger paws to make it a more efficient hunter in deep snows found in the boreal forests where it lives. A decade ago, the species was deemed a threat for extinction across the lower 48 states based on climate change, timber harvests, expansion of ski areas and development and offroad vehicles.

Earlier this year, federal wildlife officials backed off an appeal of a federal court ruling that forced the agencies to rethink and revamp its strategy for protecting critical habitat for the species in Idaho, Montana and Colorado.

# Avoid damage to ears during summer concert season

When Donald White listens to his MP3 player, he cranks the volume.

But what are the longterm repercussions of rocking out? Mary Whitaker, audiologist and instructor at Idaho State University, said repeated exposure to loud music - from headphones, speakers or at concerts – can damage hair cells in the inner ear, causing ringing in ears or hearing loss.

The human ear can safely take eight hours of continuous noise at 85 decibels, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention and the National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health. For every 3 decibels over 85, the permissible exposure time is cut in half to avoid damage. So if a noise comes in at 88 decibels, the safe time limit drops to four hours; two hours for 91 decibels, and so on. What does this mean for music fans? According to The Noise Navigator database, concerts blast music at an average of 106 decibels — a safe exposure limit of 3 minutes and 45 seconds. How does that compare with other

Sam Hobert, 19, has suffered for his flip-flops. A few years ago, he broke his right big toe after slamming his foot into a rock while hiking in New Hampshire in his favorite summertime footwear. On a warm day a few weeks ago, the George Washington University freshman was nursing foot blisters, courtesy of a pair of new brown leather 'flops from the



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# Rethinking hormone therapy: Armed with better info, menopausal women take charge of their choices

DETROIT - Johanne Erickson could handle two to three hot flashes a week when her perimenopause symptoms began two years ago, when she was 44.

But by February, 40 to 50 hot flashes a day plagued the Oxford, Mich., woman.

Erickson, a human resources manager for an automotive supplier, turned into the office joke. Friends bought her a cache of fans.

"At some point you either have to laugh about it and have a sense of humor, or otherwise you jump out the window," she said.

#### WHAT ARE THE TREATMENT CHOICES?

**Prescription hormones:** Once loved, then scorned, prescription hormones are again accepted as a viable option for many premenopausal women.

"I think there's consensus. If you're early menopausal (and) you don't have cardiovascular disease, it's safe and effective to use hormone therapy," said Beaumont obstetrician-gynecologist Luana Kyselka. "But I would use the FDA-approved bioidentical transdermal estrogen."

**Bioidentical hormones:** Chemically the same as those produced by a woman's body, bioidentical hormones are either plant-based or produced in a lab.

Board-certified family physician Dr. David Brownstein, author of "The Miracle of Natural Hormones" (Medical Alternatives Press, \$18), said he saw a jump in women looking for alternatives to prescription hormones after a study in the early 2000s indicated that some prescription therapies increased women's risk of heart disease and cancer.

'Definitely women got the message, and there was an increase in interest in non synthetic hormones," said Brownstein, who encourages the use of hormones that have not been chemically altered and that are custom-mixed in compounding pharmacies. The prescriptions he writes combine drugs produced in FDAapproved facilities and are custom-mixed for a woman's size and

Other drugs: Detroit Medical Center's Dr. Susan Hendrix, coauthor of a "Chicken Soup for the Soul" Healthy Living Series book about menopause, at times will look to medications other than hormones to treat symptoms. She prescribes selective serotonin or selective serotonin/norepinephrine re-uptake inhibitors, like the antidepressants Prozac and Effexor, which research has shown reduce hot flashes and night sweats. She also sometimes prescribes the seizure medication gabapentin to reduce the intensity of hot flashes.

Alternative treatments: Dr. Charla Blacker, a Henry Ford Health System obstetrician-gynecologist, said many of her patients have reduced their hot flashes with acupuncture, deep breathing exercises and yoga.

Studies of the herb black cohosh as well as soy products are inconsistent on hot flashes, Blacker said.

Brownstein suggests that women first minimize processed foods, drink plenty of water and undergo blood tests to ensure they're getting adequate vitamins and minerals.

'No. 1 is cleaning up their diet and eating a better diet," Brownstein said. "When women clean up their diet, their menopausal symptoms get much better.'

COST OF CONNECTION TO THE WASTEWATER TREATMENT SYSTEM; REQUIRING A SEPARATE CONNECTION TO THE WASTEWATER TREATMENT SYSTEM FOR EACH INDIVIDUAL BUILDING OR STRUCTURE; PROVIDING SPECIFICATIONS FOR PIPE AND OTHER MATERIALS USED IN CONNECTION TO THE WASTEWATER TREATMENT SYSTEM; FORBIDDING THE CONSTRUCTION OF CONNECTIONS TO THE WASTEWATER TREATMENT SYSTEM IN CERTAIN LOCATIONS; PROVIDING STANDARDS FOR INSTALLING ARTIFICIAL MEANS OF LIFTING WASTEWATER AND FOR EXCAVATIONS REQUIRED FOR CONNECTION TO THE WASTEWATER TREATMENT SYSTEM; REQUIRING ANTI-FLOWBACK VALVES FOR SOME CONNECTIONS TO THE WASTEWATER TREATMENT SYSTEM; PROVIDING SPECIFICATIONS FOR THE MANNER OF ENTRY INTO THE WASTEWATER TREATMENT SYSTEM; REQUIRING PROPERTY OWNERS TO CONTACT CITY PERSONNEL FOR REQUIRED INSPECTIONS; REQUIRING BARRICADES AND LIGHTS FOR EXCAVATIONS RELATED TO CONNECTION TO THE WASTEWATER TREATMENT SYSTEM; PROHIBITING THE DISCHARGE OF CERTAIN SUBSTANCES TO THE WASTEWATER TREATMENT SYSTEM; PROVIDING FOR THE DISCHARGE OF STORMWATER AND OTHER UNPOLLUTED DRAINAGE TO THE WASTEWATER TREATMENT SYSTEM; REQUIRING THE CONSTRUCTION AND MAINTENANCE OF GREASE, OIL AND SAND INTERCEPTORS IN SPECIFIC CIRCUMSTANCES; REQUIRING THE INSTALLATION OF A CONTROL MANHOLE UNDER SPECIFIC CIRCUMSTANCES; ALLOWING FOR WRITTEN AGREEMENTS TO BE MADE WITH USERS WHO PROPOSE TO DISCHARGE INDUSTRIAL WASTE TO THE WASTEWATER TREATMENT SYSTEM; PROVIDING FOR MONTHLY CHARGES TO BE PAID WASTEWATER TREATMENT SYSTEM; PROVIDING FOR MONTHLY CHARGES TO BE PAID BY PERSONS DISCHARGING WASTEWATER TO THE WASTEWATER TREATMENT SYSTEM; REQUIRING THE PROVISION OF A DEPOSIT CHARGE FOR CONNECTIONS TO THE WASTEWATER TREATMENT SYSTEM AFTER OCTOBER 1, 2011; PROHIBITING THE DEPOSIT OF SEPTAGE INTO THE WASTEWATER TREATMENT SYSTEM; ESTABLISHING PROCEDURES FOR THE APPEAL, REVIEW AND ADJUSTMENT OF CHARGES RELATED TO THE TREATMENT OF WASTEWATER; PROVIDING FOR DISCONNECTION FROM THE WASTEWATER TREATMENT SYSTEM FOR LACK OF PAYMENT AND ESTABLISHING A RESTORATION OF SERVICE FEE; PROVIDING FOR PROCEDURES FOR THE SETTLEMENT OF DISPUTED CLAIMS; AND, PROVIDING THAT VIOLATIONS OF THE ORDINANCE SHALL RESULT IN A NOTICE TO OFFENDERS WHICH WHEN NOT TIMELY CURED WILL BECOME A

D. The provisions of the ordinance, including penalties provided and the effective date, are summarized as follows:

The definitions of important terms used in the ordinance are provided.

CRIMINAL CHARGE PUNISHABLE AS A MISDEMEANOR.

2. The ordinance requires owners of real property within the City of Bliss to connect to the City's wastewater treatment system such that all wastewater generated from the real property will flow into that system.

3. Connection fees are required of owners of real property connecting to the wastewater treatment system after October 1, 2011.

4. The ordinance prohibits the discharge of wastewater onto real property or into natural outlets, other than into the wastewater treatment system.

5. Damage or destruction of the wastewater treatment system is prohibited.

6. The City's duties of inspection, monitoring the wastewater treatment system, and limitation of its liability under certain circumstances are provided.

7. Permits to connect to the wastewater treatment system are mandated and classified. Fees are established for each class of permit.

8. Permits for opening or altering any portion of the wastewater treatment system are required and a fee for such permit established.

9. Connections to the wastewater treatment system are required to be made by the property owner under the supervision of the City. A separate sewer connection for each building, including mobile homes or manufactured homes, is required.

10. Specifications for construction of individual building sewers; their size and slope; location restrictions; artificial lifting; excavations and the installation of anti-flowback valves are specified.

11. The manner of discharge of storm water and other unpolluted discharges are provided for. Discharge of specified substances to the wastewater treatment system is prohibited. Circumstances under which grease, oil and sand interceptors, and control manholes will be required to be installed are specified.

12. A system of monthly charges, including the right to provide special fees for industrial users by contract, is adopted.

13. A system for appeal of charges and for the review and adjustment of charges is provided.

14. Disconnection from the city water system for failure to pay wastewater treatment fees is provided, along with a reconnection fee once service is terminated.

15. Section 37 of the ordinance entitled "VIOLATIONS; PENALTIES" provides in full that: "A. Any person found to be violating any provision of this ordinance, except Section 5 of this

ordinance, shall be served by the city with written notice stating the nature of the violation and providing a reasonable time limit for the satisfactory correction thereof. The offender shall, within the period of time stated in such notice, permanently cease all violations.

B. Any person who shall continue any violation beyond the time limit provided for in this ordinance

shall be guilty of a misdemeanor.

C. Any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall become liable to the city for any expense, loss, or damage occasioned the city by reason of such violation."

E. The ordinance was passed April 20, 2011, and will be effective upon the publication of this

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# THE ACES ON BRIDGE®

In today's deal the level of the slam dictates the line of play, whether it is the small or the grand slam that is reached. The hand came along during the foursession Swiss Teams Championship, the main event of the second weekend of the 2007 10-day **Brighton Summer Congress in** England.

When six spades was the contract, declarer rose with dummy's ace on the club lead, then drew trumps. The 2-1 trump break leads to a 100 percent line for the slam: Cash the diamond ace, then lead the diamond queen. If East covers with the king, ruff. Then comes the heart ace, followed by a heart ruff in dummy, to allow South's losing club to be jettisoned on the diamond 10. And if East does not contribute the diamond king, declarer discards the losing club. West may take the diamond king, but that is all. The diamond 10 takes care of one heart loser, and the other three are trumped in dummy.

However, when it is the heady heights of seven spades that has been reached, following an excess of zeal by South, it is to the heart suit that declarer turns for the extra tricks. As it is dummy's and not declarer's club losers that must be disposed of, the straightforward heart finesse will not suf-

After drawing trumps, play out the heart ace, then the queen for a ruffing finesse. So long as West has the heart king, two heart tricks can be established in hand for club discards from dummy.

ANSWER: My best guess would be to lead the heart ace, playing partner for heart shortage. East appears to have passed initially with six spades, so may well have four hearts on the side, making your decision to play for heart ruffs more appealing. You also have trump control, often important when playing for ruffs.

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




