## Fatal horse virus reported in Western states, Canada

So far, at least 17 horses in Idaho, Utah, Colorado, California, Washington and
Canada have been infected with the highly contagious Equine Herpes Virus-1, and at least thriee have died. The
disease poses no threat to disease poses no threat to

Then he made up for lost time: Killebrew ended up lith on baseball's all-time home run list, including eight seasons with 40 or more homers. He was an All-Star 10 times at three positions - first base, third base and in the outfield - and was voted National League most valuable player in 1969.
Idaho never had a better ambassador to the wider world. His nickname was Killer, but Kille brew was a quiet, gentle soul little given to the lifestyle enjoyed by his peers. Asked once what he did for fun, Killebrew replied, "Well, I like to wash dishes, I guess."
After he retired from baseball, Killebrew returned to Payette and opened a car dealership, but he faced some adversity in later years. In 1988, year after Killebrew and his wife divorced, his
house went into foreclosure. In 1989, the Minneapolis Star-Tribumereported that he had falle $\$ 700,000$ into debt Soon after, his health failed $\$ 700,000$ Killebrew was rushed to the hospital with a coll apsed lung and damaged esophagus. To wether with a subsequent abscess and staph infecgether with a subsequent abscess and staph infecdied. He used a wheelchair for a time after surgery But Killebrew remarried and slowly regained his health. He was involved in a Boise insurance and securities business, and founded the Danny Thompson Memorial Golf Tournament in 1977 with former Idaho congressman Ralph Harding Played each August in Sun Valley, it has raised more than $\$ 8.6$ million to leukemia and cancer research.
Killebrew lived for the past 20 years in Arizona, where he became a wry, low-key ambassador for baseball. David Letterman once invited Killebrew on his TV program and hung his guest's sport coat in the rafters of the studio in mock tribune to Kille brew's career. At the end of the show, Killebrew asked Letterman to return the jacket because it
"was kind of expensive."

Miss., was closed entirely earlier in the day, blocking vessels heading toward the Gulf of Mexico and others trying to return north after
