Magic Valley voters mixed on supplemental school levies

Voters on Tuesday sent a mixed message to four Magic Valley school districts, showing varying levels of willingness to reach into their pocketbooks to support

public education. The decisions come amid financial challenges and a statewide education overhaul that's heavy on technology and online learning. Among the changes: Two seasoned Twin Falls School District trustees were ousted in favor of while an effort in Buhl narrowly close, but not close enough. Buhl

DIETRICH VOTES FOR CHANGE

Voters in Dietrich opted Tuesday to allow their hometown to spend \$2 million on improvements to the city's domestic water system, a change the city said was needed to facilitate growth.

But only just — it passed 38-35.

Also, voters in and around Dietrich reaffirmed their November 2010 vote to form the Dietrich Cemetery District, a new taxing district that will allow the town to develop and maintain its own cemetery.

The original November vote to form the district was later voided, as proper public notice of the election wasn't sent out in time.

School District didn't get enough support for a one-year, \$571,903 supplemental levy to keep its schools operating as they do now.

It wasn't the first try, either. Voters last year defeated a twoyear \$466,000 request, forcing the district to dip into half of its reserves to keep programs intact.

Without the levy, the district expects to look at charging students to participate in sports and other extracurricular activities and trim at least two positions.

While the sheriffs of Twin Falls and Gooding counties are enthusiastic about leasing a shared jail, Twin Falls County commissioners still have a cell block full of questions for which they need answers.

Twin Falls County Sheriff Tom Carter, county jail administrator Capt. Doug Hughes and Gooding County Sheriff Shaun Gough met with commissioners on Tuesday to continue discussions about the possibility of the counties working together to "lease, operate, and share" a 150-bed regional jail based in Wendell.

Stalled truck holds up traffic between Shoshone, Gooding

SHOSHONE U.S. Highway 26 between Shoshone and Gooding was closed to traffic from both directions on Tuesday afternoon when a truck with an oversized load broke down just west Shoshone.

Some background information in a Tuesday story about the voluntary manslaughter sentencing for Juan Carlos Fuentes Pina was incomplete.

Pina has remained incarcerated since 2005 on convictions that include aggravated assault, a charge amended from an original second-degree kidnapping charge related to the death of Jesse Naranjo.

Pina's accomplice in the Naranjo shooting, Johnny A. Shores, will be eligible for parole on a 23-year prison sentence in about two years. Though convicted of voluntary manslaughter in June 2007, he was given credit for time served since December 2005.

Trial set for Dietrich home invasion suspects

Three suspects in a home invasion case in Lincoln County pleaded not guilty on Tuesday.

Aaron Donabedian, Jeremiah Bennett and Gabriel Baker are each scheduled for an Aug. 30 jury trial, with 5th District Judge John ordered for T.F. batterer Butler presiding. The fourth suspect, Jamie Taylor, filed for a continuance on Tuesday and is set to enter a plea on June 7.

The four are accused of breaking into the Dietrich home of David and Colleen Conner in the early morning of March 9.

The Conners testified at a preliminary hearing for the group on May 11, stating that individuals wearing masks and brandishing guns forced their way into their home to take cash and other valuables. The Conners could not identify any of the suspects because of the masks used during the

WYOMING Trailer traffic over **Teton Pass restricted**

JACKSON — The Wyoming Department of Transportation says a mudslide that closed a highway between Alpine and Jackson is still moving and dumping debris into the Snake River.

State officials said Tuesday that they don't know when U.S. 26-89 in the Snake River Canyon will reopen. The slide closed the highway about 25 miles south of Jackson over the weekend.

Motorists traveling between Jackson and Alpine in northwest Wyoming must take a detour through Idaho and over Teton Pass that adds about an hour of drive time. The transportation department is closing Teton Pass to trailer traffic 6 a.m. to 9 a.m. and 3 p.m. to 6 p.m. while the canyon is closed.

POCATELLO — A 19-year-old Pocatello man is charged with first-degree murder in the death of his 7-month-old son.

The Idaho State Journal reports bail for Lee Ross Barbone was set at \$1 million during an initial court hearing Tuesday.

Court records say the baby, Richard Lee Barbone, died of abusive head trauma. Officials say the infant was born about 16 weeks premature last fall and spent four months in a Salt Lake City hospital. Police say the infant was unresponsive when he was brought to the hospital Monday morning.

COLORADO Feds hold meetings on roadless plan

DENVER — Federal officials Tuesday began conducting a series of public meetings to discuss Colorado's proposed plan for managing roadless areas in national forests.

Colorado is one of two states along with Idaho — that has petitioned federal officials with plans for managing its undeveloped national forest land amid a lingering dispute over federal regulations for almost 60 million acres of untouched land across dozens of states.

Colorado's plan for managing about 4.2 million acres of its undeveloped national forest areas would more than double the amount of land suggested for higher protection than what was offered under a 2001 federal proposal.

NEW YORK (AP) - Treasury Secretary Timothy Geithner said Tuesday that if Republicans insist on passage of their budget plan as a condition for approving an increase in the nation's borrowing limit, they will be responsible for the consequences.

Speaking to a New York audience, Geithner said that Republicans would bear responsibility for the first debt default in the nation's history if they insist they will not vote for an increase in the \$14.3 billion borrowing limit unless they win approval of a House Republican budget plan.

"If Republicans try to impose that plan on this country as a condition for raising the debt limit, then they will own the responsibility for the first default in our history, with devastating consequences," Geithner said in a it," Geithner said. speech to the Harvard Club of New York.

So long to Killebrew, the best ballplayer Idaho ever saw

daho may have produced better athletes, but never a greater sportsman than Harmon Killebrew. Killebrew, who died Tuesday at 74 of esophageal cancer, was a small-town Idaho boy who made it all the way to the major league baseball Hall of Fame. He got there by hitting 573 home runs in 22 seasons with the Washington Sen-

ators, Minnesota Twins and Kansas City Royals. No Idahoan before or since has come close to an achievement of that mag-

nitude in professional sports.

Killebrew's dad, the Payette County sheriff who paid the bills by painting houses, put young Harmon to work on a farm, hefting 10-gallon milks cans. By high school, the lad had set every record in every sport in his hometown of 4,100.

But Killebrew was unknown until U.S. Sen. Herman Welker told Senators' owner Clark Griffith about a kid back in his state who was hitting .847 for a semipro baseball team. Killebrew signed for \$50,000, but because of baseball rules at the time, played little for the Senators in his first two years.

Then he made up for lost time: Killebrew ended up 11th on baseball's all-time home run list, including eight seasons with 40 or

more homers. He was an All-Star 10 times at three positions - first base, third base and in the outfield - and was voted National League most valuable player in 1969.

Idaho never had a better ambassador to the wider world. His nickname was Killer, but Killebrew was a quiet, gentle soul little given to the lifestyle enjoyed by his peers. Asked once what he did for fun, Killebrew replied, "Well, I like to wash dishes, I guess."

After he retired from baseball, Killebrew returned to Payette and opened a car dealership, but he faced some adversity in later years. In 1988, a year after Killebrew and his wife divorced, his house went into foreclosure. In 1989, the Minneapolis Star-Tribune reported that he had fallen \$700,000 into debt. Soon after, his health failed.

In 1990, Killebrew was rushed to the hospital with a collapsed lung and damaged esophagus. Together with a subsequent abscess and staph infection, Killebrew endured three surgeries and nearly died. He used a wheelchair for a time after surgery.

But Killebrew remarried and slowly regained his health. He was involved in a Boise insurance and securities business, and founded the Danny Thompson Memorial Golf Tournament in 1977 with former Idaho congressman Ralph Harding. Played each August in Sun Valley, it has raised more than \$8.6 million to leukemia and cancer research.

Killebrew lived for the past 20 years in Arizona, where he became a wry, low-key ambassador for baseball. David Letterman once invited Killebrew on his TV program and hung his guest's sport coat in the rafters of the studio in mock tribune to Killebrew's career. At the end of the show, Killebrew asked Letterman to return the jacket because it "was kind of expensive."

e is Yammering Man, the One Who Speaks Loudly On A Cellphone In Public. He was once the terror of public spaces. Now listen.

It's where all this new communications technology has taken us. It's what we thought we wanted.

You had to figure out some way of sharing the mammoth, so you wound up talking to the guy in the next cave. You read faster on a glarefree device that allows you to mark your place, is easily portable and doesn't require batteries. There's a word for that.

conversation that you'd hear in an elevator. I miss the days when the people around me were engaged in anything other than checking their phones repeatedly. I miss when I wasn't doing the same. I miss the voices. I miss the awkwardness.

So the next time I hear someone yammering into his phone on an escalator, I hope my face will light up with a beatific smile. "Good for you, sir," I will intone. "At least you're talking."

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

Homebuilders miss out on economic recovery

Unemployment, tightened lending standards reduce pool of buyers

WASHINGTON – For homebuilders, it hardly feels like an economic recovery.

Nearly two years after the recession ended, the pace of construction is inching along at less than half the level considered healthy. Single-famithe market, has dropped 11 percent in that time.

Builders are struggling to compete with waves of foreclosures that have forced down prices for previously occupied homes. The weakness is weighing on the economy: Though new homes represent a small portion of overall sales, they have an outsized effect on jobs.

The Commerce Department said Tuesday that newhome construction plummeted in April to a seasonally adjusted rate of 523,000 homes per year. A major drop in volatile apartment building pulled down the monthly figures. And strong tornadoes and flooding also disrupted construction

throughout the South.

Still, through the first four months of this year, the pace of new-home construction is barely ahead of 2009's — the worst year on records dating back a half-century.

"There are very few signs of recovery in residential construction," said Celia Chen, senior director at Moody's ly home building, the bulk of Analytics. "Absent evidence of stronger demand for housing, homebuilders will remain reticent to put up new homes."





Senate blocks bill repealing tax breaks

WASHINGTON - The Senate blocked a bill Tuesday that would repeal about \$2 billion a year in tax breaks for the five biggest oil companies, a Democratic response to \$4-a-gallon gasoline that might fare better when Congress and the White House negotiate a deal later this year to increase the government's ability to borrow.

The bill was defeated on a procedural vote. But Democrats hope to build their case to include the measure in a deficitreduction package being negotiated by key lawmakers and the administration. Lawmakers from both parties are demanding deficit reduction as part of deal to increase the government's ability to borrow and avoid an unprecedented default on U.S. Treasury bonds.

"This bill says that even the most rich and powerful among us must do their fair share to help us reduce the deficit," said Sen. Robert Menendez, D-N.J., the bill's sponsor. "Their high-priced lobbyists cannot stop us from doing what is fair and what is right."


Man eats 25,000 Big Macs in 39 years



 ${\tt JACKSON, Miss.\,(AP)-The\,Coast}$ Guard reopened the swollen Mississippi River north of New Orleans on Tuesday, allowing cargo vessels on the nation's busiest waterway to pass slowly, one at a time in the latest effort to reduce pressure from rising

A 15-mile stretch at Natchez, Miss., was closed entirely earlier in the day, blocking vessels heading toward the Gulf of Mexico and others trying to return north after dropping off their freight. Had the channel remained closed, it could've brought traffic to a standstill up and down the river, which moves about 500 million tons of

cargo each year. That sort of interruption could've ost the U.S. economy hundreds of millions of dollars for every day of idled barges carrying coal, timber, iron, steel and more than half of

America's grain exports. Coast Guard officials said wakes generated by passing barge traffic could increase the strain on levees designed to hold back the river. Authorities were also concerned that barges could not operate safely in the flooded river, which has risen to the level of some docks and submerged

Shipping companies had hoped for a swift reopening.

On a typical day, 600 barges move along the river and all vessels must up and down the river, according to Bob Anderson, spokesman for the Mississippi Valley Division of the Army Corps of Engineers. A single barge can carry as much cargo as 70 tractor-trailers or 17 rail cars.

President to explain Mideast strategy

WASHINGTON - President Barack Obama will seek to define his administration's stance toward the rapid changes in the Middle East and North Africa in a major address Thursday in which he will cast U.S. as a facilitator rather than the instigator of political change in the Arab

As uprisings have swept through the region, Obama has been criticized from both the left and the right for taking too passive an approach. In Egypt, as demonstrators began demanding the overthrow of President Hosni Mubarak, a longtime U.S. ally, the administration seemed to vacillate on its course, and ended up angering both Mubarak's supporters in the region and his opponents.

In Bahrain and Syria, the U.S. has largely remained on the sidelines as authoritarian regimes have sought to crush domestic opposition. And in Libya, the U.S. has backed the use of NATO military power against Moammar Gadhafi's regime in a limited fashion.

Critics have said the administration is merely reacting to events and lacks an overall strategy. The speech, aides say, will provide the president an opportunity to lay out the argument for his approach.

One senior administration official said Obama wants to prevent critics of the Arab democracy movement from being able to accuse the U.S. of meddling. He wants the U.S. to be in position to offer support for expression of the popular will without "inserting the U.S. into the process."





Some of the immigrants were suffering from dehydration after traveling for hours from the Guatemalan border.

The trucks had air holes punched in the floors of the containers, but migrants interviewed at the state prosecutors' office said they lacked air and water.

## **Activists call general** strike in new tactic

BEIRUT - Syrian protesters called Tuesday for a one-day nationwide general strike, urging students to skip school and workers to bring commerce to a halt in a new strategy of defiance against government crackdowns that appear to be turning more brutal and bloody.

The strike, planned for today, marks a shift by opposition forces to strike at President Bashar Assad's regime from new angles: its economic underpinnings and ability to keep the country running during two months of widening battles.

## Fields of watermelon burst in farm fiasco

BEIJING - Watermelons have been bursting by the score in eastern China after farmers gave them overdoses of growth chemicals during wet weather, creating what state media called fields of "land mines."

About 20 farmers around Danyang city in Jiangsu province were affected, losing up to 115 acres of melons, China Central Television said in an investigative report.

All of those with exploding melons apparently were first-time users of the growth accelerator forchlorfenuron, though it has been widely available for some time, CCTV said in the report broadcast Monday night.



HAGERMAN - It's easy to see that Evelvn Simon cares about her goats. Her breeding stock and all the kids have names, and she can tell apart by sight all 70 animals in her herd.

As she entered their pen Friday, her prize-winning does ran up, and she reached down to stroke and scratch their faces. Their kids scampered around Simon, bleating. Another leaned down to scoot its head under a gate to get closer to her, then temporarily caught its stubby horns on the bottom-most bars before freeing itself.

"When they're so tame, they're pesky," Simon said, describing how they chew fence posts or anything else remotely edible, and jump on fences, rocks, their feed troughs and even each other. "The saying around goat people is, if (a fence) can hold water, it can hold a goat."

Simon has been raising goats for meat for about six years and has been converting southern Idahoans to the lean, high-protein meat – properly called chevon – lespite a little skepticism at

"I was amazed by the clean flavor of it," said Jane Deal, chef for Ballard Cheese and co-owner of Sweet Deal Catering in Gooding. "Most people will be very surprised at the taste, and that goat meat is good for you. It's definitely something people should try and not be fright-

ened of." Grill's chef de cuisine, said the restaurant sells out of goat every time it's offered on the menu there. "They're just delighted to have it, something local they may not get at The Pioneer or a

French restaurant," he said.

Because the goats aren't in their traditional environment, which is much rockier than the Hagerman valley, their hooves don't naturally wear down. So hooves must be cut or the goat will get uncomfortable and could suffer diseases. Imagine walking directly on toenails that never got cut and you'll get an idea of what untrimmed hooves can do to a goat.

Trimming is a fairly quick process. Simon leads each goat out of the pen and up a ramp onto a small platform a few feet above the ground. She lifts its face into a raised trough and uses a chain

# Keep seafood healthy and crunchy without frying

Remove the fish from the refrigerator and turn each fillet in the buttermilk mixture to recoat. Transfer to the cornmeal mixture, turning the fillets to coat completely. Lightly mist the fillets on both sides with the cooking spray and place on the prepared rack (they should not touch).

Broil 4 inches from the heat source for 3 minutes, then carefully flip the fillets and broil for another 3 minutes, or until the fish is opaque at the center.

Assemble the po'boy sandwiches by spreading the cut side of each piece of bread with the reserved sauce. On the bottom half of each bread section, layer with a catfish filet, shredded lettuce, sliced tomato and the top piece of bread. Serve immediately.

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Place roast in a shallow baking dish and cut slits on the top of the roast for the garlic cloves. Push whole cloves into the cuts on the meat. Season the roast with salt, pepper and rosemary and cover with sliced onions. Lay bacon strips over the top. Pour wine over the roast and place in the oven. Cook roast for approximately one hour, or until meat temperature probe reads 160 degrees. Place foil over roast and allow to rest while preparing cheese.

Cut cheese into 1/4-inch slices. Heat a non-stick skillet to medium-high, and place some of the cheese slices in the skillet in a single layer. Cook cheese slices, turning once, until they have browned on both sides, then remove from pan. Keep slices warm while continuing to brown the rest of the cheese.

Cut the roast into thin slices. Place spinach onto a large serving platter and drizzle with a small amount of balsamic vinegar. Arrange the cheese slices on top of the spinach and lay slices of meat over the top of the cheese. Serve immediately.

## MEDITERRANEAN BRAISED GOAT LEG

From Daniel Pastick, chef de cuisine at Ketchum

All ingredients should be measured to taste:

1 goat leg Olive oil

Lemon juice

Sea salt

Fresh rosemary

Garlic Thinly sliced fennel

Fresh oregano

Sliced onions White wine Chicken stock

**Preheat the oven** to 425 degrees. Open up the goat leg and moisten with olive oil, lemon, sea salt and rosemary. Let sit in the refrigerator for a few hours, then tie up into a roast or large cubes. Sear the roast or cubes in the pan and add garlic, fennel, oregano, onions, a little more salt and black pepper. Be sure the roast is kept moist, or it will dry out and be tough. Add white wine, lemon juice and chicken stock to cover at least halfway, then cover or cook in a Dutch-oven style pot. Bake for at least 2 1/2 hours, but check occasionally and turn the meat at least once in the broth.

Pastick recommends that the goat be accompanied by roasted potatoes, sauteed green beans or a Greek salad with kalamata olives and tomatoes. He noted that the meat is best used in recipes that call for slow cooking, but it can be substituted for nearly any recipe that calls for lamb.

"You don't want to overcook it. It is quite lean; if you cook it nice and slow, it would be fine," Pastick said. "Sear it, braise it, grill it or slow cook it and you really can't go wrong."

When you're looking for low-fat meats, turkey breast is a good choice and a nice alternative to chicken. It pairs especially well with tarragon.

Turkey tenderloins come trimmed and are quick and easy to cook. Brown them on the stove and finish in a 350-degree oven; that will take about 25 minutes from start to finish.

The salad can be refrigerated for up to three days.

Whether you're mixing up a batch of margaritas for friends in your backyard or ordering a round of mai tais for the table, pitchers are a quick and easy way to re-

think your drink for a crowd. At Spoonbar in the wine country town of Healdsburg, Calif., bar manager Scott Beattie knew early on that he wanted to serve cocktails by the pitcher. So he ordered a Kold-Draft ice cube machine capable of making big, dense cubes that keep drinks cold without diluting them.

It's also efficient. With the cubes and a really big shaker, "it takes just about as long to make one drink as it does to make five," he points out.

The drinks are shaken, strained and poured into a pitcher ready to go.

"It's been great, people really dig it," says Beattie, author of "Artisanal Cocktails."

Other cocktail enthusiasts also are shaking up pitcherperfect cocktails.

At Philadelphia's Square 1682 restaurant, one night a week is dedicated to tiki cocktails and with the weather warming up and the patio open they've introduced a new tiki pitcher cocktail: Kama'aina Punch.

The drink blends gin, triple sec, fresh lemon juice, coconut syrup, pineapple juice and black cherry puree and can be given a little extra sparkle with the addition of prosecco.

"Everyone loves a pitcher," manager. "It's social, fun, basically happy hour in a bowl."

And Young Lee of the Yellowtail Japanese Restaurant makes a refreshing cucumlemon sour, white cranberry juice, simple syrup and cucumber puree.



Grilling season is here, and spice rubs are an easy way to pump up the flavor. Grocers offer a huge selection of rubs intended for steak, chicken, pork, seafood, even veggies. But consider saving your money and making your own. They are easy to assemble, and you can better cater to your tastes.

We created these four rubs with versatility in mind. While wonderful on steak, also try them tossed with chunks of zucchini and summer squash, skewered shrimp and chicken breasts.

In general, dry rubs such as these can be applied directly to the seafood or meat you want to flavor. But you also can use them as wet rubs. Just mix a portion of the dry mix with a bit of oil olive or canola work fine then rub that into the meat.

# Fish with a spicy, tropical touch

Any firm-fleshed fish would work well in this recipe. I like to pick what's freshest: halibut from Alaska, grouper from Florida or even the old standby, salmon, especially when the stores are well stocked with the wild variety. The main thing is to pick a meaty fillet, at least an inch thick, or to get one cut from the center. The thin fillets or tail ends tend to overcook quickly.

I've made many versions of this dish, but this is my current favorite. Heating the fruit, even for just a few minutes, brings out its tropical flavor. Allspice lends a healthy kick of spice. The lime, brown sugar and jalapeno pepper balance it all. If you love mango, you might want to double the amount of salsa.

This dish is best served while the salsa and fish are still warm.

Place the fillets on a plate and sprinkle them with the spice mixture, turning and rubbing the fish to evenly distribute the spices.

Heat the oil in a large skillet over medium-high heat. Add the fillets, skinned side down. Cook for 1 to 2 minutes, until seared, then carefully turn over the fillets. Cook for 1 minute, then use a spatula to transfer them to the lined baking sheet. Transfer to the oven; bake for 5 to 8 minutes, until the fish is iust done.

Meanwhile, place same skillet used to sear the fish over medium heat. Add the onion and cook for 3 to 4 minutes, stirring once or twice, until the onion softens. Add the jalapeno pepper; cook for 2 minutes. Add the mango and cook for 2 to 3 minutes, stirring, until the mango is heated through. Stir in the lime juice and zest and the brown sugar; season with salt to taste. Cook for 2 minutes, then remove from the heat.

Place the fillets on individual plates. Divide the salsa among the portions, spooning it on top of each fillet. Serve immediately.

It seems everyone I know - most recently, my longtime hairdresser, David - is into juicing these days. I'd never considered getting a juicer myself. Who needs another space-hogging appliance? But the more I learn about juicing fruits and vegetables, the more I think it might be a good way to eat (or drink) more of those key foods, especially for those who fall short of the recommended daily intake. Plus, David (who is 50, like me) looks fabulous.

If you're thinking of giving juicing a try, here are some things to keep in mind.

## Did you know?

A main difference between juicing and blending is the thickness of the juice. A blender's blades mix pulp and juice together, whereas most juicers use centrifugal solids, producing a thinner liquid. With a juicer, you can use whole fruits and vegeta-

#### **PROS**

- Juice can be "a very healthy addition to a healthy diet," says Jolia Allen, online managing editor for Vegetarian Times. Fresh juice delivers a concentrated dose of vitamins (particularly antioxidants such as Vitamin C), minerals and other nutrients without filling you up. Allen notes that a single glass of carrot juice may contain the nutrients of up to 10 whole carrots.
- You can put whole fruits and vegetables in a juicer, letting the machine do the work of removing the inedible parts.



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

## Nowitzki's 48 leads Mavs past Thunder

DALLAS (AP) - Dirk Nowitzki showed no rust from a long layoff, making 10 of his first 11 shots and an NBA playoff-record 24 straight free throws on the way to 48 points, leading the Dallas Mavericks to a 121-112 victory over the Oklahoma City Thunder in Game 1 of the Western Conference finals on Tuesday night.

Jason Terry scored 24 points and J.J. Barea added 21 points as the Mavericks picked up where they left off in a sweep of the Lakers nine days before. They broke open a tight game with a 13-0 run late in the second quarter and never trailed again, stretching their franchise-record postseason winning streak to seven games.

Game 2 is Thursday night in Dallas, where the Mavs are 6-Othis postseason.

The Thunder — fresh off a seven-game series against Memphis that included a total of four overtimes — led by nine early in the second quarter, then went 6:28 between baskets. They missed 10 shots during that drought and were down by 11 when it ended. They eventually trailed by 16 before clawing within five points with 3:42 left, and six with 48.5 seconds to play.



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

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

The late Boris Schapiro was one of the dominant players of the postwar game. Helen Schapiro, his widow, is no mean player either. Here she is, in partnership with Evan Harris, a liberal democrat MP.

Strong Acol two-openings have gone out of fashion of late, but it made reaching slam easy here. But how would you play six hearts on a spade lead?

The best line is to win the spade ace, play the heart queen to dummy's king, and ruff a diamond high. Then play the heart five to dummy's eight, cash the diamond ace (pitching a club), and ruff another diamond. Now, assuming both red suits have broken, play a club to dummy's queen.

If this holds, you can ruff another diamond, then cross back to dummy with a spade ruff to reach the established diamonds. However, if East has the club ace, you can cross to dummy with a spade ruff to finesse the club jack.

The trap is to ruff a spade in dummy too early. You would still be able to set up the diamonds, but would not know if you could reach them. If you played a club to the queen and East had the ace, he would play back a spade, and you would go down unless the club jack were to fall. Alternatively, you could run the club 10 from hand, but then you have put all your eggs in one basket - namely, that the club jack is with West.

Having passed to start with, you are full value for a jump to three spades now, suggesting these values and five spades. Indeed, bidding game in spades would not be absurd, though it seems reasonable to give partner the chance to make the final decision.


Financial Advisor.
