Idaho public schools chief Tom Luna's staff ordered an additional panic button for their office while emotions ran high and state lawmakers weighed his proposed education overhaul in late March.

Public expense records show that the state paid \$868.31 on March 31 to for installation of a third panic button in the State Department of Education office in Boise.



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Idaho's Jeff D. lawsuit revived

BOISE — A federal appeals court on Wednesday revived a decades-old lawsuit against the state of Idaho over claims substandard children's mental health care.

The case began in 1980 when a little boy known only as Jeff D. brought a class-action lawsuit against the state for institutionalizing mentally ill children instead of providing care for them.

Jeff D. won, and several years ago the court settled on 250 action items — a to-do list of sorts — that the state had to complete in order to be in compliance with the ruling. In 2007, U.S. District Judge B. Lynn Winmill decided that the state had substantially complied with the action items, and closed the case.

But in Wednesday's ruling, the 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals found that setting a list of action items wasn't enough to show indigent and mentally ill kids were getting the care they needed. Instead, the court must consider whether the state was meet-

ed by the list - providing community-based mental health care to indigent children with severe emotional he couldn't immediately and mental disabilities.

Now, just like before the lawsuit, kids with severe emotional disturbances are left untreated until they're sick enough to be institutionalized or have a major crisis and end up in the custody of the Idaho Department of Juvenile Corrections, Belodoff said.

"Mental health is no different than cancer or any other kind of physical ailment: It can be treated in most cases;" Belodoff said. "It's not fatal unless it's left untreated, and it's blatant discrimination to not provide these families with the treatment that is

Interest in Skousen, a former FBI employee and Salt Lake City police chief who died in 2006 in Utah, soared in tea party circles after praise from talk show host Glenn Beck. "It's indoctrination, not education;" said Kendall, director of the Constitutional Accountability Center in Washington, D.C. "They're so far from the mainstream of constitutional thought that they are completely indefensible."

Though the National Center for Constitutional Studies is best known for its promotion of Skousen's work, including "The 5,000 Year Leap," a 1981 book that suggests Biblical inspiration for the Constitution, those materials aren't included in the packet being touted by the Tea Party Patriots.

But not everyone is convinced the film and study guide are the best resources.

David Gray Adler, who directs the University of Idaho's McClure Center for Public Policy Research, said some of its assertions — that "Americans' confidence in republicanism stemmed largely from their shared commitment to Christianity;" for example - exaggerates religion's impact on the framers while neglecting European enlightenment figures who shaped early American views on government.

"Give them (the Tea Party Patriots) credit for urging adherence to the federal law," Adler said. "But there are many other, better, more scholarly documents on the Constitution." Another constitutional

education group, the federally funded Center for Civic Education in Woodland Hills, Calif., suggested those unhappy with the Tea Party Patriot's choice of educational materials should promote alternatives.

"The Tea Party Patriots are doing what Americans are supposed to do," said Robert Leming, who directs his

"It's helped us preach beyond the choir," Nelson said.

The organizers behind an effort to put this year's state education reforms to a public vote say they've accomplished their goal.

More than 48,000 Idahoans have signed petitions to put a referendum on the Students Come First laws on the November 2012 ballot according to Mike Lanza, chairman of Idahoans for Responsible Education Reform.

The group that has vehemently opposed state public schools chief Tom Luna's three-pronged public education reform laws says it has 47,432 signatures of Idaho voters that have been verified by county clerks across the Gem State.

Signatures gathered will not be considered official until they're reviewed by the Idaho Secretary of State's Office.

Idaho Education Association President Sherri Wood said in a post on the effort's website that members of the state teachers' union have worked to collect the signatures in 40 days.

"Unfortunately, we won't have a chance to vote on the laws until November 2012, but by then, Idahoans will have seen ample evidence on just how damaging these made solely based on senlaws are," Wood stated.

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

Idaho's system of choosing school trustees isn't working

mid great fanfare, the last Legislature consolidated Idaho elections and limited voting to four dates each year. The current Legislature needs to make a few more election reforms.

This month, Idahoans went to the polls to choose school trustees and, in 36 districts, to vote on supplemental levy requests. Statewide, turnout was less than 20 percent; in Pocatello's District 25, it was 1 percent, despite a contested trustee race on the ballot.

And in the 1,114-student Gooding School District, only 31 voters went to the polls.

Something has to change about how Idaho picks school boards.

For starters, the Legislature should scrap the re-

quirement that trustees chosen from each zone can only be elected by residents of that zone. There isn't one Idahoan in 10,000 who knows in which school zone he or she lives, where to vote or even if there's an election in a given year (by state law, uncontested school board elections are canceled).

The present system discourages not only voters but potential candidates. Want to challenge an incumbent school trustee? That's hard if you can't even vote against him or her.

There's no reason why school board members couldn't be chosen by all the

voters in the school district, just as county commissioners — who must live in the district they represent - are elected by all voters in the county.

Secondly, school board elections shouldn't be held in May of odd-numbered years. They could be consolidated either with city elections staged in November of odd-numbered years or paired with the May primary elections held in even-numbered years.

With the Legislature cutting state support for public schools, the balance of responsibility for education in Idaho is shifting back to local districts. This year, 65 of the state's districts asked patrons to approve supplemental levies, and voters said yes in more than four-fifths of them.

Idaho needs the best and the brightest serving on our school boards - and an electorate engaged and informed enough to put them there.

1. Our schools are failing. It's true that schools with

large numbers of low-income and English-as-asecond-language students don't perform as well as those with lots of middleand upper-middle-class students who speak only English. But the demonization of some schools as "dropout factories" masks an important achievement: The percentage of Americans earning a high school diploma has been rising for 30 years. According to the Department of Education, the percentage of 16- to 24year-olds who were not enrolled in school and hadn't earned a diploma or its equivalent fell to 8 percent in 2008.

Average SAT and ACT scores are also up. On international exams such as the Trends in International Mathematics and Science Study, U.S. elementary and middle school students have improved since 1995 and rank near the top among developed countries. Americans do lag behind students in Asian nations such as Singapore, Taiwan, Hong Kong, South Korea and Japan on these tests, but so do Europeans.

2. Unions defend bad teachers.

Reformers who attack unions for school problems

should mind their logic: Some school systems show better results than others, yet most have teachers' unions. If unions are universally problematic, why are some students succeeding while others languish?

3. Billionaires know best. Bill Gates, real estate developer Eli Broad and Facebook chief Mark Zuckerberg argue that merit pay creates the same incentives for public-sector employees that bonuses do in the private sector.

But the emerging research on merit pay for teachers disputes that.

In a three-year, \$10 million study released last fall, Vanderbilt University researchers found no significant difference in performance between students who were taught by middle school teachers eligible for cash bonuses and those who weren't. That's no surprise to most teachers; they know

that teamwork is key to success. Individual pay-forperformance schemes create the opposite incentive, fostering competition, not collaboration.l.

4. Charter schools are the answer.

President Obama certainly thinks so. He's said that state limits on the number of charter schools aren't "good for our children, our economy or our country." He and Education Secretary Arne Duncan want more charters - taxpayer-supported schools that operate independently of traditional public school systems. About 1.5 million children, or 3 percent of public school students, attended a charter school this past school year. Some have outperformed their noncharter peers, particularly in inner cities.

But charter school results are not uniformly impressive: A 2010 study of 2,330 middle school students at charter schools in 15 states found that they performed no better in math and science. And a Stanford University study in 2009 concluded: "Nearly half of the charter schools nationwide

have results that are no different from the local public school options and over a third, 37 percent, deliver learning results that are significantly worse than their students would have realized had they remained in traditional public schools."

5. More effective teachers are the answer.

Teachers aren't miracle workers. There's only so much they can do to address problems that troubled students bring to class every day, including neglect, abuse, and unaddressed medical and mental health issues. The obvious and subtle ways that poverty inhibits a child's ability to learn – from hearing, visual and dental problems to higher asthma rates to diminished verbal interaction in the home - have been well-documented.

So let's seek to improve the state of families. Attacking schools and teachers makes everyone feel like a reformer, but the problems begin long before a child steps through the schoolhouse door.

'Porkulus' fallout: Tax cheats win; private sector loses

hen President Obama signed the trillion-dollar stimulus law in 2009, he proclaimed that he was "keeping the American dream alive in our time." The stimulator-in-chief failed to mention that billions would be spent keeping American tax scammers afloat.

At a congressional hearing on Tuesday, federal auditors reported on the latest porkulus spending gone wild. According to a new General Accounting Office audit conducted over the past year, nearly 4,000 stimulus recipients received \$24 billion in

Recovery Act funds – while owing more than \$750 million in unpaid corporate, payroll and other taxes.

And this is just the tip of the Cash for Tax Cheats iceberg. The GAO acknowledged in its report that "the estimated amount of known unpaid federal taxes we identified is likely understated" because of rampant

underreporting of income and because the analysis did "not include Recovery Act contract and grant recipients who are noncompliant with or not subject to Recovery Act reporting requirements."

The official response of the Obama administration's stimulus oversight board? The Recovery Accountability and Transparency Board pointed out that "federal law does not prohibit tax delinquents from getting government contracts or grants."

Similarly, last week, the Treasury Department inspector general found that

the IRS failed to prevent fraud in the stimulus law's energy tax credit program. Some \$6 billion in stimulus energy credits for homeowners have been claimed but the inspector general's audit found that 30 percent of credit-claimers had no record of homeownership. "I am troubled by the IRS's continued failure to develop appropriate verification methods for distributing Recovery Act credits," the Treasury Inspector watchdog said.

Obama's notorious slush fund has redistributed wealth to prison inmates,

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Smart speaks to kidnapper as he gets sentenced to life

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) Elizabeth Smart finally got her chance Wednesday to confront the street preacher convicted of holding her captive and raping her for months when she was just 14. Now 23, she stood tall in the courtroom – stoic, with an even voice and a strength Brian David Mitchell clearly

Mitchell, frail and skinny with a long, peppery white beard, sang hymns softly and closed his hollow eves. just as he did throughout his trial, just as he would moments later as the judge gave him two life sentences without parole. That did not stop Smart from looking right at him and coolly speaking her piece.

It took her about 30 seconds.

"I don't have very much to say to you. I know exactly what you did," said Smart, wearing a houndstooth checked skirt, an ivory jacket and pearls. "I know that you wrong. You did it with full wonderful life now and no never affect me again.

Mitchell, who outlined his religious beliefs in a rambling 27-page manifesto he called "The Book of Immanuel David Isaiah," took Smart to California for five of the months she was held captive. She recalled being forced to live homeless, dress in disguises and stay quiet or lie about her identity if ever approached by strangers or police. She said he threatened her life and the lives of her family every day.

U.S. District Judge Dale Kimball said Mitchell deserved a life sentence because the facts of the case were "unusually heinous and degrading?"

Carlie Christensen, U.S. attorney for Utah, said the resolution was long overdue for Smart and her family. "It is a measure of justice for Elizabeth and it will certainly ensure Brian David Mitchell will never inflict such intolerable and unspeakable cruelty on anyone else again;" Christensen said.

The defense waived its closing remarks before sentencing. Parker Douglas, a fense team, said outside the courthouse that the sentence was not unexpected.

"I wish Elizabeth Smart and her family the best. I hope they get to move on," Douglas said.



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

wind rates arguments

On Wednesday, the Idaho Public Utilities Commission announced it will hear oral arguments between the developer of four proposed Cassia County wind projects and Rocky Mountain Power on June 9.

Exergy Development Group, of Boise, is asking for oral arguments in response to Rocky Mountain Power's request to dismiss Exergy's complaint against the utility.

According to a prepared statement, "Exergy maintains the yetto-be-constructed wind projects near Malta should be eligible for a higher rate from Rocky Mountain Power because it submitted a proposed power purchase agreement with the utility in January 2009, well before the commission lowered a published rate wind developers receive in March 2010."

Under the provisions of the federal Public Utility Regulatory Policies Act (PURPA), regulated electric utilities are required to buy power from qualifying small-power producers or co-generators. In March 2010, qualifying PURPA project developers signing a 20-year levelized contract would be paid \$79.19 per megawatt hour. The previous rate was \$90.90 per MWh.

Rocky Mountain Power filed a motion to have the complaint dismissed, alleging Exergy did not and still does not — have the necessary interconnection and wheeling agreements with Raft River Electric Cooperative and the Bonneville Power Administration needed to deliver the wind projects' output to Rocky Mountain Power territory.

Exergy alleges that securing firm transmission and interconnection rights before creating a legally enforceable power purchase agreement is not a requirement in Idaho.

Exergy is asking that Rocky Mountain provide a detailed explanation for the utility's alleged failure to earlier realize that transmission would not be a problem "and its reliance on that non-existent problem to stall negotiations," the statement said.

Rocky Mountain Power alleges Exergy delayed negotiations by not responding to discovery requests as to how it planned to deliver its output from the wind farms to the Brady substation. Further, Rocky Mountain Power states, Exergy did not file its complaint requesting grandfathered rates to pre-March 2010 rates until July 29, four months after the March 16 rate change.

PUC spokesman Gene Fadness said the commission has a few options following the hearing.

It can decide whether or not to grant Rocky Mountain Power's request to dismiss Exergy's complaint or dismiss Exergy's claim that it qualifies for the higher rate as other PURPA projects, further along in development than Exergy, have been ordered to receive the newer, lower rate for power.

KETCHUM - An arbitration panel has rejected a bid by actor Tom Hanks and his wife, Rita Wilson, for financial compensation stemming from a long-running dispute with the contractor hired to build the couple's multimillion dollar villa in Sun Valley.

The three-member panel of the American Arbitration Association has concluded the couple failed to make a compelling case that alleged defects in their \$10 million home

should be pinned on Storey Construction, based in Ketchum.

Hanks and Wilson sought \$3 million in damages from the builder. They claim the home north of the ritzy resort town was built with a series of flaws, including a roof that leaked and nearly collapsed after the house was finished in 2002.

GAZA STRIP Egypt to open crossing to Gaza

CAIRO - Egypt's decision Wednesday to end its blockade of Gaza could ease the isolation of 1.4 million Palestinians there.

The Rafah crossing will be opened starting Saturday, Egypt's official Middle East News Agency announced.

The decision puts the new Egyptian regime at odds with Israel, which insists on monitoring people and goods entering Gaza for security reasons.

U.S. says bin Laden knew of Europe plot

BERLIN - The United States has told Germany that evidence pulled from Osama bin Laden's hideout shows the terror chief was linked to a plot to attack targets in Europe last year, a senior German official told The Associated Press on Wednesday.

Separately, bin Laden encouraged multiple attacks on Danish targets because of disparaging references to the Muslim prophet Muhammad in Danish media, the U.S. officials said.

MEXICO 500 villagers flee drug cartel violence

MORELIA - Drug cartel violence has prompted as many as 500 frightened villagers to flee hamlets in the western state of Michoacan and take refuge at a swimming park, an official said Wednesday.

It is at least the second time a large number of rural residents have been displaced by recent drug violence in Mexico. In November, about 400 people in the northern border town of Ciudad Mier took refuge in Ciudad Aleman following cartel gunbattles.

How the shepherd's club constellation went to the dogs

oughly half the constellations trace their roots to the Greek astronomer Ptolemy's great tome, the Almagest, written in the second century. Most of the rest were invented in the 17th and 18th century to fill in the spaces left blank by the ancients. One, however, owes its very existence to a string of mistranslations.

Follow the curve of the Big Dipper's handle to the bright orange star Arcturus, at the feet of Boötes the Shepherd. Ptolemy described Boötes as wielding a club (Greek: "kollorobos"), but when the ninth century Baghdad translator Hunayn ibn Ishaq found himself at a loss to understand the word, he chose a similar-looking Arabic phrase "al asa dhat al-kullab" ("the spear shaft with a hook"). For a shepherd, a shaft with a hook at the end is a plausible substitute for a club.

During the Dark Ages, the Almagest was lost in Europe, and only reappeared when the Arabic versions were translated into Latin in the 12th century. Among the Latin translators was Gerard of Cremona, Italy, who misread Ishaq's "kullab" as "kilab" (Arabic for "dogs"), thus rendering Ishaq's phrase as the nonsensical "spear shaft having dogs." And with that, Boötes gained two canine companions.

In the 16th century, when star atlases began to transition from written descriptions of constellations to illustrations, German astronomer Peter Apian was the first to draw Boötes ac-

Now's the time to protect property from nuisance birds and animals

uestion: "I'm having problems with _skunks around my house. What can I do to keep them away?"

Answer: Spring is the time when many wild animals begin looking for places to make their summer home, find easy foraging for food, and raise their young. Warm temperatures also mean people start spending more time outdoors.

Now should do a thorough evaluation of your property for things that attract nuisance birds and animals. Scattered garbage or refuse, pet food, and bird feeders should be cleaned up and put away for the summer. Holes in foundations of buildings or in the skirting of trailers are inviting places for wild animals to take up residence.

Now is also the time to repair woodpecker holes and close up other inviting openings in your eaves for squirrels, starlings and bats.

Homeowners must also be vigilant to prevent swallows from packing mud into the eaves of a house. Continuous removal of the mud and providing an alternate nesting site usually results in the swallows moving to the alternate. For plans for an alternate nest area for swallows, contact your local Idaho Fish and Game regional office.

Most wild animals easily adapt to human food. Skunks, foxes and raccoons will take young fowl raised for human table fare. They are also adept at eating birdseed, fruit, and pet food left outside intended for the cats or dogs.

Porcupines pose a threat to many pets and can girdle valuable landscaping, but if handled carefully can be easily removed from residential areas and released back into the wild. Once they are on the ground, a broom or long-handled shovel can be used to sweep them into a garbage can. Place the lid on the upright can and transport them out

of the area for release. Hawks and owls thrive in close proximity to humans and agriculture. For many farmers, they are worth their weight in gold because they prey on crop-eating rodents.



Great horned owls are an important predator on skunks. If owners fail to take precautions they can also prey on small domestic pets. Hawks and owls have also been known to draw blood while protecting the nests. In areas where this is a problem, we usually recommend allowing the birds to raise their young and leave the nest and then remove the nest the following

In the Hailey area, now is the time to make plans for bear-proof refuse containers. Bear-proof garbage bins used in subdivisions and around restaurants make those areas less attractive to black bears. I strongly suggest all concessionaires uti-

lize bear-proof Dumpsters. As bears develop patterns of use on human food sources, our attempts to protect landowners and the public become less effective. With each success at getting the "easy meal" bears get

bolder and more determined to defeat attempts to protect private property.

In several cases last year, bears entered residences and made a shambles inside the houses. Bears that habituate to human food present a significant threat to public safety. Those showing aggressive tendencies will be humanely killed. It's much easier to prevent a bear problem than it is to correct

it once it develops. Hikers need to b wildlife in the springtime as well. Sow bears with cubs and cow moose with calves are not fond of human intrusion. They are even less fond of fido walking at your side. The lesson here is, make sure they know you're coming. Make lots of noise and they will move out of

Like old Ben Franklin said, "An ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure." Take inventory of your situation and decide how to best protect yourself from nuisance animals.



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Attorneys paint 2 sides of mother

ORLANDO, Fla. (AP) -The mother accused of killing her 2-year-old daughter was a party girl who promoted events at nightclubs, Florida though at times she was also an attentive, devoted parent, witnesses testifying at her murder trial said Wednesday.

The prosecution and defense offered jurors strikingly different portrayals of what Casey Anthony was doing in the days immediately after her daughter Caylee was last seen alive.

Anthony, 25, is charged with first-degree murder. Prosecutors said Caylee died from three pieces of duct tape being placed over her mouth and nose, while Anthony's attorney has claimed the toddler accidentally drowned in her grandparents' pool.

Caylee was last seen June 16, 2008. One of the grandparents' neighbors, Brian Burner, testified that Anthony asked him two days later if she could borrow a shovel to "dig up a bamboo root." She returned the shovel about an hour later, he said.

Burner also said he remembered seeing Anthony's white car backed into the garage on the night of June 16.

About a month before that, Anthony met Tony Lazzaro during a party. They soon became romantically involved and she moved into an apartment he was sharing with four other people.

Lazzaro and his exroommates testified that they met Anthony's daughter several times and then at some point in early June, they never saw her again.

When they asked about Caylee, her mother told them she was with her nanny at a theme park or going to the beach.

Lazzaro and the roommates said Anthony's demeanor never suggested anything was wrong. She would cook, clean and help out around the apartment, they said.

"She was a regular 22girl," year-old said Cameron Campana, a club promoter who was a college student at the time. "Peppy. She seemed normal?'

roommate. Another Nathan Lezniewicz, said Anthony liked going out and having a good time.

"She was not an introvert by any means," he said.

Lazzaro echoed their sentiments and also identified Anthony in several nightclub party photos, including a "hard body contest" in which Anthony danced in a short skirt. Prosecutors also showed jurors surveillance videos of Anthony and Lazarro going to the video store and shopping at JC Penny after the time Caylee was believed to be missing.

"She was the way she was every day - happy;" Lazarro said.

RALEIGH, N.C. — The Justice Department plans to bring criminal charges against John Edwards after a two-year investigation into whether the former presidential candidate illegally used money from some of his political backers to cover up his extramarital affair, a person familiar with the case said Wednesday.

An indictment could come within days unless the 2004 Democratic vice-presidential nominee reaches an agreement with prosecutors to plead guilty to a negotiated charge, said the person, who spoke on condition of anonymity because of the case's sensitivity.

Diplomats ordered to leave Yemen

WASHINGTON — The State Department on Wednesday ordered nonessential U.S. diplomats to depart Yemen and urged all Americans there to leave as security conditions deteriorated with the country's embattled leader refusing to step down.

The decision to tell most nonessential personnel and the families of all American staff at the U.S. Embassy in San'a to leave was a sign of Washington's increasing concern about the **geographic bee** situation in Yemen, where street battles between supporters and opponents of Yemeni President Ali Abdullah Saleh raged for a third day. The clashes have left at least 41 dead and dozens badly injured.

Mets find not all gambles pay off

esperate men do desperate things, not that Fred Wilpon needed an excuse to speak out. Forced to watch the players he made rich underperform season after season. it's a wonder the Mets' owner was able to hold his tongue this long.



Maybe there's something about facing possible financial ruin that makes it easier to say what you really think. Kind of cathartic in a way, a small price to pay for peace of mind even if some of Wilpon's high-priced talent might take offense.

Somewhat surprising in the wake of Wilpon's comments is that the talent didn't. Not publicly anyway, even when Wilpon went so far as to call himself a "schmuck" for signing Carlos Beltran to a seven-year, \$119-million deal and say that David Wright is nothing more than a decent player.

Wright's way of firing back? He issued a statement calling Wilpon "a good man" who is "obviously going through some difficult times."

Not exactly the kind of fight that plays well on talk radio in New York. But there's always reason to spend some air time on one of Wilpon's connections from outside baseball.

We're talking about Bernard Madoff here, whose friendship with Wilpon is the major reason the Mets' owner is in such a mess. Wilpon's "investments" with Madoff helped fund the Mets during good times, and they could conceivably cost him the team if a trustee trying to recover more than \$1 billion for Madoff victims from Wilpon and his partners is successful.

Wilpon's current plight is the subject of a sympathetic article in Sports Illustrated this week, where he said the team was "bleeding cash" and may lose \$70 million this year. He's in search of a minority owner to help shore up the ballclub's finances, though even that may not be good enough to hold onto the team if the trustee is successful. But it was the comments

that Wilpon made in another interview to The New Yorker about Wright, Beltran and Jose Reyes that overshadowed his own dire situation simply because owners — at least those not

Lakers reach deal with Mike Brown

LOS ANGELES (AP) - The Los Angeles Lakers have reached an agreement in principle with former Cleveland coach Mike Brown to succeed Phil Jackson, the team said Wednesday.

"We've met with Mike and are very impressed with him," said a statement issued by the Lakers. "In addition, we have an outline for an agreement in place and hope to sign a contract within the next few days."

Brown will get a four-year deal worth roughly \$18 million, a person with knowledge of the discussions told The Associated Press on Wednesday on condition of anonymity because the Lakers hadn't yet formally hired Brown.

With a strong interview last weekend, Brown jumped to the front of the line of candidates for the daunting challenge of succeeding the 11-time NBA champion Jackson with one of the NBA's iconic franchises. Brown will be the 22nd coach of the Lakers, whose 16 NBA titles trail only the Boston Celtics' 17 in league history.

Rather than promoting one of Jackson's assistant coaches, the Lakers are changing course after an abrupt end to their two-year title reign and the longanticipated departure of Jackson, the coach with the most championship rings in NBA history.

Jackson retired earlier this month after the Dallas Mavericks swept the defending two-time champion Lakers out of the second round of the playoffs.

A respected young tactician with a strong coaching pedigree, Brown also has ample experience with big games and big stars, even if he couldn't guide LeBron James to a title.

"I think it's great," James said in Miami, where he's preparing for Game 5 of the Eastern Conference finals.

ESPN, which employed Brown as an analyst this season, first reported Brown had been hired.

The 41-year-old Brown led the Cavaliers to the 2007 NBA finals and went 272-138 in five years with Cleveland, becoming the most successful coach in franchise history while compiling the league's best regular-season record in each of his last two seasons.

But the 2009 NBA coach of the year was fired last spring following the Cavs' dissension-filled exit from the second round of the postseason, and James left for Miami a few weeks later.

Although James was critical of Brown's strategies during their final playoff run together, the two-time NBA MVP strongly endorsed his former coach Wednesday.

"Mike Brown is a great coach," James said. "He brought us success that we hadn't had before in that city, and it started with his defensive concepts. He brought in a defensive mindset that we

Reports: NCAA rejects Southern Cal's bid to ease sanctions

LOS ANGELES — The NCAA has rejected Southern Filer holds faculty-staff game California's bid to reduce some of the penalties imposed last year on its football program, including a two-year bowl ban and the loss of 30 scholarships over three years, according to media reports.

A USC spokesman confirmed on Wednesday that the school has received a response from the NCAA regarding its appeal, but he says that NCAA rules prevent USC from commenting on the decision until it is

released today. The denial of the appeal was first reported by

uscfootball.com. USC officials, including athletic director Pat Haden, went before the NCAA's Infractions Appeals Committee in January and asked that the panel reduce by half the harshest penalties handed down against the football program.

The NCAA had cited USC for a lack of institutional

control. Haden and the school's lawyers argued that the bowl ban and loss of scholarships was excessive. USC had asked for the bowl ban to be reduced to one year, which it served last year, and to have the scholarships reduced to five a year over three years.

NFL sees signs fans are turned off

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) -The NFL is seeing the early signs of cracks in fan loyalty.

Ticket sales also are down. "Fans want certainty," Goodell added. "We can't underestimate that the fans are going through challenges just in the general economy."

A decision probably won't come for several weeks, and while another set of mediation sessions is scheduled to start June 7, not much is expected from those discussions while the appeal is being considered.

Luck comes in all shapes and sizes. At the Dyspeptics Club, South is the big winner — though all the other players in his foursome would swear this was simply because of the rock-crushers that he picks up. He would tell you that the cards never lie well for him. Judge for yourself, given today's deal, who had the best of the argument.

West not unnaturally led a top heart against four spades. Declarer won and cashed the top trumps, discovering the loser there, then reverted to hearts West won his heart queen and after much thought played a club. Declarer could win and lead hearts, but when East ruffed in and played a diamond through declarer, the contract was one down. South pointed to the combination of bad breaks as conclusive proof that he was born under a black cloud. Do you agree?

South failed to understand the need to keep East off play for the duration of the hand in case the diamond honors were offside. While it is normal to play for the drop when there are four trumps out missing the queen, this is the exception that proves the rule.

Win the heart ace, cash the spade king, then play a small spade to your seven. If this loses to West, he can do you no harm. You can win his return and knock out the heart queen, establishing a winner on which to discard a di-





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
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
