## Idaho fines prisons health care company

BOISE — The company responsible for providing medical care to Idaho prison inmates has been fined nearly \$400,000 by state officials for failing to meet some of the most basic health care requirements outlined by the state.

The fines against Correctional Medical Services, totaling more than \$382,500, were uncovered through a series of public records requests by The Associated Press.

Among the problems detailed in the records: The South Boise Women's Correctional Center was without an OB/GYN for two years, and the Idaho Maximum Security Institution was without a staff psychologist for at least 8 months. Idaho's contract with CMS requires that vacant positions be filled within 60 days.

The Creve Coeur, Mo.-based CMS bills itself as the nation's largest prison health care provider, caring for more than 250,000 inmates in 19 states.

## T.F. Council to hear union's concerns about post office plan

The postal worker's union will give a presentation to the Twin Falls City Council today about a proposal to consolidate the Twin Falls postal processing center with the one in Boise.

A study by the U.S. Postal Service supports consolidation from a financial perspective: It estimated savings of \$623,000 with no major changes to local service. But in a message to the city, a union representative estimated 20 to 30 jobs will be lost from the area and consolidation would "have a major impact on the city, the county and postal customers in the Wood River Valley, Magic Valley and the Mini-Cassia area."

"This will affect many local businesses not just the postal employees and their families," Donna Meyer, of American Postal Workers Union Local 179, wrote.

The USPS will host a public meeting on the study's findings at 6 p.m. Tuesday at the College of Southern Idaho's Fine Arts Theatre.

Also on the council's agenda:

- Modifying the Senior Citizen Center's lease with the city to allow the center to host events. The city does not directly support the center, and making the change will allow the center to earn more funds "to continue to offer low-cost services" to customers, according to a city staff report.

## Habitat, Thrivent build Twin Falls teacher a new house

Leah Dow is involved in just about everything she can get her hands on.

The Twin Falls woman, who teaches fifth grade at Oregon Trail Elementary School, coaches the Robert Stuart Middle School dance team, is producing a musical at Oregon Trail, belongs to three different theater groups and raises two sons, Jalen, 9, and Langdon, 4. The private company, which merged with Prison Health Services on Friday and now goes by the name Corizon, has contracted with Idaho to handle medical care at all of the state-run prisons since 2005. Its new regional director for Idaho, Tom Dolan, says CMS has recently fixed the problems and the fines stopped a couple of weeks ago.

According to the records obtained by the AP, CMS had a long history of failing to meet contract standards. Nevertheless, Idaho officials turned down four other bidders and renewed the state's contract with CMS last year — not without some changes, however.

Idaho Department of Correction Director Brent Reinke said his department had learned that in order to get CMS to pay attention to problems, the state had to hit them in the pocketbook. The new contract steeply increased the amount of fines, called liquidated damages, that could be levied against CMS. More than two-thirds of the fines — \$270,201 — have been brought under the new contract, which began July 1, 2010.

“They’re bottom-line driven,” said Reinke of CMS. “They have shareholders, so we’re learning from them and they’re learning from us.”

Rona Siegert, the head of health care for the Idaho Department of Corrections, said the state's tactics are working. “The money was racking up, and they’ve done a really great job of curing these and getting rid of the liquidated damages,” he said.

The fact that Idaho renewed CMS's contract after a competitive bidding shows that the company has done a good job caring for inmates, said CMS spokesman Ken Fields. He said the fines accrued under the new contract were largely for new administrative and paperwork requirements that go beyond national standards.

He said none of the issues had negatively impacted inmate patients.

Recruiting and retaining health care workers has “been a challenge,” Fields said, because of a national shortage of health care workers. But the vacant positions — including the OB/GYN and psychologist vacancies — have since been filled, he said.

Some problems found by the state auditors involved the way CMS ran its non-emergency health care services, its infirmaries and extended care units, pharmaceutical operations and mental health services. The company's staff training, diagnostic services, record-keeping, chronic care planning, inmate screening and other services were also found to be deficient enough to warrant fines.

Despite the problems, IDOC officials maintain no inmate's health was damaged and no one went without medical care. Instead, inmates were transported off-site — usually at the state's cost — or a doctor that worked for the state was brought in to fill the gaps. For instance, when the Idaho State Correctional Institution south of Boise went without a dialysis nurse for

two months in 2008, the state had to transport several offenders to an offsite facility daily for several hours each day. The effort cost Idaho nearly \$19,000 in personnel costs, an amount that it recovered from CMS through the fines.

The findings of some state audits of CMS's operations suggest that it was at least likely that some inmates had longer waits for care or didn't receive immediate care at all. For example, an audit found that inmates that were sick on the weekends weren't getting their requests for treatment triaged by medical professionals. Siegert said that if inmates were visibly sick, correctional officers probably would have noticed while making their rounds and would probably have gotten the inmates help.

But correctional officers are trained in security, not in how to determine if someone is seriously ill.

Inmates at the Idaho State Correctional Institution — where nearly all of Idaho's sickest inmates are housed — have long complained about the quality of medical care. In a class-action lawsuit dating back to the 1980s, ISCI inmates said they were forced to wait too long for medical care and in some cases were denied access to medical treatment.

Though the lawsuit began long before CMS came to Idaho, the inmates have used the testimony of a former CMS worker to show that the problems with medical care continue today.

Dr. Ralph Heckard, a primary care physician who contracted with CMS to treat inmates at the Idaho State Correctional Institution between June 2009 and January 2010, described several potentially serious problems in a court affidavit filed in the Balla case.

In his affidavit, Heckard said there was just one doctor for every 1,500 inmates, compared to a statewide average of one doctor for every 450 Idaho residents. He said ISCI had no pharmacist, and that often unlicensed and unauthorized staffers handled nursing duties, even giving inmates injections.

Prisoners frequently experienced weeks-long waits for medical care, Heckard said. One inmate had biopsy-confirmed cancer, and Heckard said CMS delayed providing the inmate with the recommended surgery and chemotherapy. Inmates with mental illness were deprived of necessary (and often expensive) medication because there was no psychiatrist to renew their expiring prescriptions and because CMS would not allow primary care doctors like Heckard to prescribe or renew any psychoactive medications, he said.

Fields said that Heckard's characterizations weren't accurate. Few prisons have on-site pharmacists, he said, and he noted that ISCI inmates get prescriptions within 24 hours, or sooner when necessary. When the company didn't have an on-site psychiatric staffer, a psychiatrist from the corporate office and local community mental health professionals met the needs of inmates, he said. He also refuted Heckard's assertion that unlicensed professionals were administering health care.

## Montana, Idaho forest projects to get money

MISSOULA, Mont. (AP) — Forest restoration projects in Montana and Idaho for the second year will receive money under a federal restoration program meant to unite groups such as loggers and conservationists, according to U.S. Forest Service officials.

Officials said Montana's 1.5-million-acre Southwestern Crown of the Continent project will receive \$3.5 million and Idaho's 1.4-million-acre Clearwater Basin project will receive \$3.4 million.

“There's going to be a lot of good work done in the forest, and a lot of jobs created because of this,” said Bill Higgins of the Idaho Forest Group.

The 2011 federal budget passed in April included \$25 million for 10 forest

projects. Lolo National Forest Supervisor Debbie Austin in Montana said Forest Service officials late last week informed the projects in Montana and Idaho how much of that money they would receive.

“This program is supported all the way from the chief (of the Forest Service, Tom Tidwell) down to the forests, and that's a pretty exciting thing,” Austin told the Missoulian. “It's the first time I've been involved where we're able to concentrate a lot of restoration money in one place — enough to make a difference.”

In Montana, the project includes the Blackfoot, Clearwater and Swan River watersheds. In Idaho, the project includes the Clearwater and Nez Perce

national forests, on Nez Perce tribal lands, and in Idaho and Clearwater counties.

The \$25 million is for the U.S. Forest Service's Collaborative Forest Landscape Restoration Program signed into law in 2009. In the first year, the program received \$10 million for the 10 projects.

The type of work done in the forests will vary.

“There will be some of everything, depending on the status of the forest we're working in,” Austin said. “Much of the work is thinning from below, taking out smaller trees and undergrowth for biomass and chips, but there will also be some medium trees removed as well for lumber.”

Thrivent has paid for 55 percent of the home's cost, and other sources of volunteer funding and materials will help out. Dow will pay off what's left through a 30-year mortgage.

Dow said she's excited to provide a home for her two sons, who for the last month have been living with their grandmother, Sue Langdon.

“It will be nice to have a backyard,” Dow said.

The family has handled Langdon's battles with multiple behavioral disorders, and will have a place for him to play with their dog, Coda, which Dow said has been a

source of therapy for her youngest son.

“She is just really good at helping to deal with him when he is having a bad moment,” Dow said. “Coda helps to draw him out of it quicker. They told me we can build a fence for the dog.”

Dow's sons are equally excited about the prospect of a new home. Langdon's room will have a dinosaur theme, while Jalen's will be decorated in sharks.

This year is Habitat's 20th in the Magic Valley and its fourth year working with Thrivent to provide homes for area families.

“Thrivent provides some

of the funding and about 50 percent of the volunteers,” said local Habitat Executive Director Linda Fleming. “It's all a matter of coordination.”

The major challenge Dow and Habitat must meet is getting all the different contractors, city officials and volunteers to cooperate in the time allotted for the build.

“They all have to work as one unit instead of a bunch of different businesses,” Fleming said. “Its not often you see plumbers, electricians and HVAC working on the same house at one time.”

The coordination that has

Rupert, prepare for the state pageant, held Wednesday through Friday in Boise, they spoke with us about some of the Gem State's pressing issues.

**Question: What do you think of the new public education reform?**

**Federico:** I think it will do good. People are worried about teachers losing their jobs, but using technology and the Internet is a good idea. I think it will help teachers do their jobs better and live up to the standards they signed up for as teachers.

**Webster:** It's a good thing they are making changes, especially with the way the budget is. There has to be a reform. Not looking at seniority (for teachers) anymore is good and finding ways to supplement education is a good idea. Education is one of my biggest priorities. Idaho is No. 1 as far as college dropouts and education is something we need to focus on to stay competitive.

**Adams:** With cutbacks, a lot of students will miss out on the opportunities I had in school. They won't have as many activities, and that worries me because that's what made high school what it was for me.

**Edmunds:** It's going to be important because technology is so important for my generation and the next generation. Online classes are good, but it's not as productive to tell kids the classes they have to take rather than letting them choose their own.

**Q: How have you used your platform in the community?**

**Federico:** I've been involved in music my whole life and it's a wonderful way

for kids to express themselves. It's getting cut in schools, so the goal was to start a music program like Jive, which started as an after-school program. I went to schools and talked to kids about getting involved in music.

**Webster:** Originally I wanted to do my own blood drive and then I realized we had enough blood drives but not enough donors. The Red Cross says there are two reasons people don't donate blood. The first thing is people are scared of needles, and the second is they don't think about it. So I focused on educating people and publicizing drives.

**Adams:** Operation Smile is an organization that raises money for cleft palate surgeries around the world, but it starts here in our own community. Preventive care and taking care of your smile is so important. Your smile is the greatest gift you can give anyone. I talked to elementary schools about taking care of their teeth.

**Edmunds:** My platform is redefining service, which was started and promoted at BYU to encourage and remind people that service isn't an action, it's a way of mind. It was geared toward middle school students. I worked with student councils and gave presentations at schools telling them my story about treating people well and how you can change people's lives by how you treat them.

**Q: What are some ways we can improve economic development in the Magic Valley?**

**Federico:** Get people involved in the community. If people care about where they live, they will give more of their time to serve. Caring about others and not just

themselves can make people say, “It's my life, it's my community.”

**Webster:** Being open to inviting new businesses to the area and encouraging that growth is important to build jobs and stimulate the economy. Local lawmakers need to make that doable for new businesses.

**Adams:** Becoming involved in the community would help. We all need to serve to give us a boost. Coming together as a community would help us in a lot of ways.

**Edmunds:** Keep supporting local companies and businesses that are already here. I think that will create jobs. Focus on your community and not the outsourcing of our community.

**Q: What have you learned about yourself in your role as Miss Magic Valley?**

**Federico:** You have to be yourself. You hear you have to lose weight, be out in the community all the time, but I had to learn to be Tysha. I want the community to think of me as Tysha Federico, the girl who did great things for the community. It's changed me a lot. I love

being Miss Magic Valley.

**Webster:** I used to be shy, but being in the program has helped me come out of my shell. I can be a force for change, but I never saw that I had the power to do that. I signed up 36 people to donate, and each donation can save three lives. I can make a change, I just have to get out there and do it.

**Adams:** I've learned self-confidence and being able to support myself and encourage myself. I love who I am and do what I can with what I have.

**Edmunds:** I learned I can achieve a lot. This community is really supportive of people reaching their dreams. It's humbling having so much support, it was almost overwhelming when I realized people were supporting me just as much as my family. I've become a more well-rounded woman because of the Miss America organization, because I want to learn, want to be physically fit and want service to be a part of my life.

# Arizona forest fire triggers new evacuation orders

GREER, Ariz. (AP) — Authorities ordered more eastern Arizona residents to evacuate their homes Sunday as a 225-square-mile blaze that has grown into the third-largest in state history crept toward more buildings.

The Apache County sheriff's office told an unknown number of people east of the town of Alpine along U.S. Highway 180 to get out as the forest fire crept closer.

Alpine itself has been under mandatory evacuation orders since Thursday night, along with the community of Nutrioso and several lodges and camps in the scenic high country.

Subdivisions close to the New Mexico border that were ordered emptied Sunday included Escudilla Mountain Estates, Bonita, Dog Patch, and the H-V Ranch east of Highway 180, fire information officer Eric Neitzel said.

People packed up their belongings as smoke covered the mountain vacation towns in a smoky fog, and

wind blew smoke from the burning pine forest well into nearby New Mexico and Colorado.

Crews have zero containment of the fire, which has been burning for a week.

In the vacation town of Greer, which has fewer than 200 year-round residents, many people voluntarily left Saturday. Those who remained, mostly business owners, dealt with haze heavily tinged with smoke.

Among them was the owner of the 101-year-old Molly Butler Lodge, who was hauling out his most valuable items.

Allan Johnson spent Sunday morning getting antiques, including an 1886 table brought by covered wagon from Utah and a 1928 Oldsmobile the lodge uses for weddings, out of the fire's path. He said he was not taking reservations but was keeping the restaurant

open, mainly as a meeting place.

Greer is within miles of the fire, which officials expect will grow given a windy forecast and expected dry lightning Sunday and Monday. If the blaze comes within two miles of a containment line nearby, the town will be evacuated.

"We're all waiting for the word," Johnson said. "It could be 24 hours, could be eight hours. It might not

happen at all — that's what we're all rooting and praying for."

Winds died down overnight, allowing crews to burn 30 miles of containment lines between active and unburned areas that create a buffer from the most violent wind-driven runs.

"It gives a much greater chance of it having diminished fire behavior as it approaches the lines," fire information officer Peter Frenzen told The Associated Press. "And that's the concern, that you might get intense fire activity that might throw embers over the line and spot beyond our control lines!"

## Barn catches fire in Dietrich, causing \$35,000 in damage

DIETRICH — A milk barn near Dietrich caught fire Sunday afternoon, drawing out Shoshone and Dietrich fire departments to battle the blaze for about two hours.

Incident Commander Brandon Rasmussen said it

appears an electrical problem sparked the fire at about 2 p.m. He said the roof of the structure is probably a total lost and estimated at least \$35,000 in damage.

The fire never threatened other structures, he said. About 13 firefighters, two fire engines and two fire tenders were on scene.

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# Are wild horses native to U.S.?

## Horse protection advocates challenge BLM view

RENO, Nev. — American history textbooks teach generation after generation that the wild horses roaming the Western plains originated as a result of the European explorers and settlers who first ventured across the ocean and into the frontier.

But that theory is being challenged more strongly than ever before at archaeological digs, university labs and federal courtrooms as horse protection advocates battle the U.S. government over roundups of thousands of mustangs they say have not only a legal right but a native claim to the range-land.

The group In Defense of Animals and others are pressing a case in the 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals that maintains wild horses roamed the West about 1.5 million years ago and didn't disappear until as recently as 7,600 years ago. More importantly, they say, a growing stockpile of DNA evidence shows conclusively that today's horses are genetically linked to those ancient ancestors.

The new way of thinking could carry significant ramifications across hundreds millions of acres in the West where the U.S. Bureau of Land Management divides up livestock grazing allotments based partly on the belief the horses are no more native to those lands than are the cattle brought to North America centuries ago.

Rachel Fazio, a lawyer for the plaintiffs, told a three-judge appellate panel in San Francisco earlier this year that the horses are "an integral part of the environment."

"As much as the BLM would like to see them as not, they are actually a native species. They are tied to this land," she said. "There would not be a horse but for North America. Every single evolutionary iteration of the horse is found here and only here."

Judge Mary Schroeder, former chief of the circuit, asked: "Just like polar bears?"

"Yes," Fazio answered, "they belong there."

The lawsuit cites researchers who say the most recent science backs her up and that the concept is widely accepted by most of the scientific community, with the most notable exception being the BLM itself.

"It's significant because BLM treats the wild horses like they are an invasive species that is not supposed to be out there," Fazio said in a recent interview with The Associated Press.

A reversal of that long-held belief could have the effect of moving the native horses to the front of the line when divvying up the precious water and forage in the arid West.

BLM maintains the horse advocates are perpetuating a myth, and many ranchers claim it's part of a ploy to push

### WILD HORSES AT A GLANCE

The U.S. Bureau of Land Management manages more than 245 million acres of federal land in 12 western states with about 30 million acres currently designated as horse management areas in 10 of those states under the authority of the Wild and Free-Roaming Horses and Burro Act of 1971 signed into law by President Nixon. As of May 27, BLM reported these statistics:

**10 STATES WITH WILD HORSES ON U.S. LANDS.** Arizona, California, Colorado, Idaho, Montana, Nevada, New Mexico, Oregon, Utah and Wyoming.

**POPULATION.** About 33,000 horses currently roam the 10 states, roughly half of those in Nevada, with another 5,500 burros for a total of about 38,500 animals under the jurisdiction of the U.S. Bureau of Land Management. The BLM maintains that's about 12,000 more than the range-land can sustain and plans to roundup most of those to get to the formal appro-

priate management level it has set for the current year at 26,600.

**2010 ROUNDUPS.** BLM removed 9,715 horse and 540 burros from the range in the 2010 fiscal year that ended last Sept. 30.

**HOLDING FACILITIES.** In addition to animals on the range, the BLM currently has 41,700 wild horses and burros in short-term corrals in the West (about 13,100) and long-term pastures in the Midwest (about 28,600).

livestock off public lands.

"There are plenty of horses out in the Nevada desert," said Tom Collins, a Clark County commissioner who has a ranch outside of Las Vegas and has run cattle on U.S. lands in Arizona, Idaho and Utah.

"Most of these folks, maybe their father slapped them or their mother didn't love them, so now they are in love with these wild horses that aren't really wild," he said

BLM devotes "Myth No. 11" on its Web site to the "false claim" that wild horses are native to the United States.

"American wild horses are descended from domestic horses, some of some of which were brought over by European explorers in the late 15th and 16th centuries, plus others that were imported from Europe and were released or escaped captivity in modern times," it says.

"The disappearance of the horse from the Western Hemisphere for 10,000 years supports the position that today's wild horses cannot be considered 'native' in any meaningful historical sense," BLM explains. It acknowledges the horses have adapted successfully to the Western range, but biologically they did not evolve on the North American continent

Jay F. Kirkpatrick, a leader in horse reproduction research who directs ZooMontana's Science and Conservation Center in Billings, Mont., is among those who say BLM's view is outdated.

"On the face of the science, it is just absolutely incorrect," said Kirkpatrick, who has studied reproductive physiology for decades since earning his degree at the College of Veterinary Medicine at Cornell University.

"It wasn't the predominant horse on the continent but it was here. It is native to North America," he told AP.

Kirkpatrick, who actually supports roundups as a necessary tool to control

herd populations, said the key to determining if an animal is native is where it originated and whether or not it co-evolved with its habitat.

The mustangs "did both, here in North America," he said, beginning about 1.4 million years ago. He said they eventually crossed the Siberian land bridge into Asia before going extinct locally as recently as 7,600 years ago.

"This isn't about history, it's about biology," Kirkpatrick said. "The Spanish were bringing them home."

Ross MacPhee, curator of the Department of Mammalogy at the American Museum of Natural History in New York, agrees. He said the mustangs are classified as *Equus caballus*, which "evolved from more primitive forebears" in North America.

"There is therefore no question that it is 'native' within any reasonable meaning of that word — much more so than bison, for example, whose immediate ancestry is Asian," MacPhee said. "Yes, it disappeared from our shores for a few thousand years, but that has no bearing scientifically on whether it is historically 'native.'"

BLM officials said they can't comment on pending litigation, but referred AP to their Web site descriptions and a leading scientist who agrees the agency's version is closer to the truth.

"Horses did evolve in North America but they went extinct 10,000 years ago," said Michael Hutchins, executive director of the Wildlife Society, a non-profit scientific and educational association in Bethesda, Md.

Today's mustangs are "a domesticated, feral version that had gone through many, many generations of selective breeding to use as beasts of burden and were brought back to North America," he told AP. "They are a mishmash of domestic horses. They are not native. They are not wild horses."

## Two Disney legends die within day of each other

ANAHEIM, Calif. (AP) — They shared a stage at Disneyland five days a week for nearly three decades and died within a day of each other.

Betty Taylor, who played Slue Foot Sue in Disney's long-running Golden Horseshoe Revue, passed away Saturday — one day after the death of Wally Boag, who played her character's sweetheart, Pecos Bill.

The 91-year-old Taylor died at her home in Washington state, Disneyland announced on its web site. Boag, who was 90, died Friday. He was a resident of Santa Monica, Calif.

The causes of death were not announced.

"Betty's role as leading lady in Disneyland's Golden Horseshoe Revue helped turn it into the longest-running stage show in entertainment history," George

Kalogridis, the president of Disneyland Resort, said in a statement. "It is a tragic coincidence that her passing comes just one day after the death of longtime co-star Wally Boag."

Boag, a former vaudeville performer, signed a two-week contract with Walt Disney in 1955. He originated the role of Pecos Bill in the revue, taking the stage three times a day and logging nearly 40,000 performances before retiring in 1982.

Most of those shows were alongside Taylor, who joined the revue a year after Hoag. Her run on the show — which closed in 1986 — lasted nearly 45,000 performances.

The Golden Horseshoe Revue is listed in the Guinness Book of World Records as the longest running stage production in show business history.

## Abortion showdown with feds could cost Indiana \$4.3 billion

INDIANAPOLIS — A looming showdown over Indiana's new law that cuts funding for the Planned Parenthood organization may test how far Republican-led states are willing to go in pressing their tough new anti-abortion agendas.

The stakes are high. The future of health care for more than 1 million poor and elderly Indiana residents hangs in the balance.

Indiana became the first state this year to cut off all government funds to Planned Parenthood, fulfilling conservatives' goal of financially weakening organi-

zations that provide abortions. Other conservative states have considered such action in recent years but backed away under the threat of loss of all federal money for their Medicaid programs.

The willingness of Indiana, led by a Republican governor and GOP-controlled Legislature, to challenge the federal government and risk a huge financial penalty could take the issue into uncharted legal and political territory. Conservative leaders in other states will be watching the confrontation as they plan their own action on abortion and other social issues.

"I think this is an instance

in which a state is really trying to overturn national policy and in so doing is likely to forego federal funding," said Christopher Arterton, professor of political management at George Washington University and an expert on federal-state issues.

Is Indiana willing to risk \$4.3 billion in Medicaid money to strike a blow for the right-to-life movement? Some conservative members of Republican-controlled legislatures argue it's time for states to risk serious penalties to defend their principles and throw off federal mandates. And the Medicaid program, with its rising costs and strict rules, has been a particular target of ire.

# Driver injury overshadows MVS racing

## McKean suffers severe concussion, bruising

At the conclusion of the first main event race Saturday night at Magic Valley Speedway, former track champion Jerry McKean was in the winner's circle proudly giving his victory speech. By

the end of second main he was headed to the hospital.

The Budweiser Super Stocks driver was knocked unconscious during an accident that turned out far more serious than it looked, but the track said Sunday that the veteran driver is OK.

Contending for the lead with Kris McKean late in the race, Jerry McKean brushed the wall in Turn 4, got stuck in the dirt embankment and slid down the track sideways. With nowhere to go, Jenna Quale hit the driver's door on McKean's car. Casey Pehrson, who also did not have time to adjust, collided with Quale.

Quale and Pehrson were able to climb out of their vehicles under their own power, but emergency personnel extracted the unconscious McKean from his car. From there, he was placed on a backboard and transported to St. Luke's Magic Valley Medical Center.

"He just came out of nowhere," Pehrson said. "It looked like somebody just dropped that car in front of us."

Jerry McKean was treated and released Sunday. The Facebook page for MVS said he suffered a severe concussion and bruising but should make a full recovery.

The race was already not without controversy. Just prior to the incident, Kris McKean, Pehrson and then-leader Willie Dalton were sent to the rear of the field after all three were deemed to be involved in Dalton's spin-out. After several minutes, McKean was given his position back, setting up the restart alongside his uncle Jerry.

"We looked on the film and saw that nobody ever touched (Kris McKean). Casey hit the 8 car and he spun," explained track owner Eddy McKean.

Daniel Shirley, who was running in third just before

the race-ending accident, was eventually awarded the win.

Jerry McKean's victory in the first main event came after getting around Kris McKean with 11 laps remaining in the race.

Shirley came in third, followed by Pehrson and Kyle Burrill.

Brennan's Carpet Pony Stocks driver Justin Slocum found the new race route for the division very much to his liking. Winding their way in and out of the infield, Slocum captured both main event wins holding off Devon Colson in the first main event race and J.C. Brookshire in

the second.

Other main event winners were Morgan Rasmussen with the Pro Hornets and Chad Everett in the TV-GoldandSilver Thunderdogs. Kendel Woll visited Victory Lane once again this season with a convincing win in the Project Filter Street Stocks.

## Heat bounce back, take Game 3 88-86

DALLAS — The Miami Heat didn't blow this one. Now they're just two wins from being crowned NBA champions.

Chris Bosh made a 16-foot, go-ahead jumper from the baseline with 39.6 seconds left and the Heat held on for an 88-86 victory over the Dallas Mavericks on Sunday night for a 2-1 lead in the NBA finals.

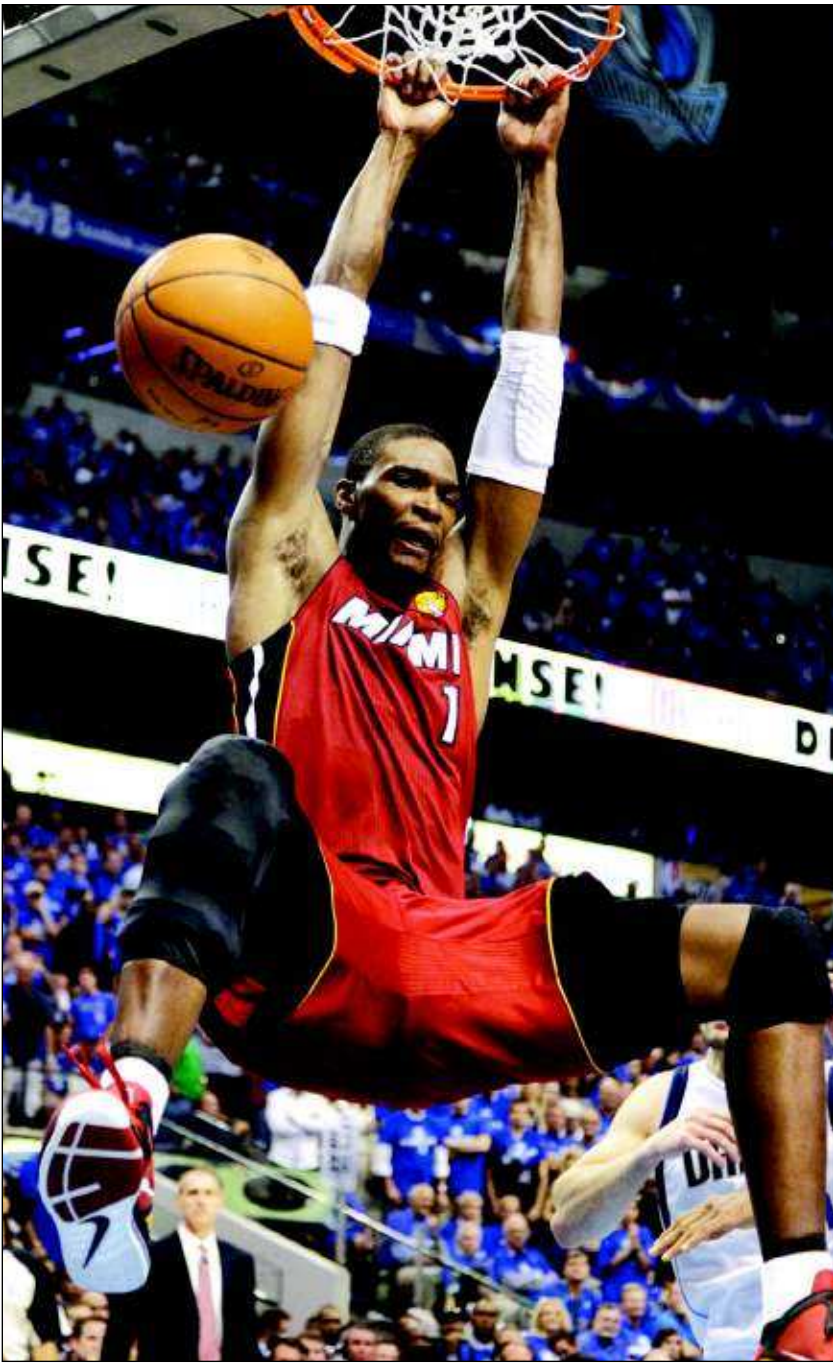
Recent history says this is a huge win for the Heat. The Game 3 winner in a tied finals has won the championship all 11 times since the 2-3-2 format began in 1985.

Miami got into this tight of a series by blowing a 15-point lead in the last quarter of Game 2. The Heat already had wasted a 14-point lead in this game when they went back ahead 81-75 with 6:31 left. They knew Dirk Nowitzki would drive Dallas' rally, but he burned them anyway for 12 straight points — six free throws, a layup, a dunk and a tough jumper.

But after Bosh's clutch shot, Nowitzki's streak ran out. He tried passing out of a double team and threw the ball away, then hit the back iron on a jumper at the buzzer.

"This is a total win," said Dwyane Wade, who led Miami with 29 points and 11 rebounds. "You want to win the game on the defensive end of the floor and we got a stop?"

The Heat go into Game 4 on Tuesday night with a chance to do what they did

## THE "NEW" BEST EVER? Nadal beats Federer for sixth French, 10th Slam

PARIS — Regardless of the setting or the surface, Rafael Nadal confounds Roger Federer the way no other man can.

Put the two greats of the game on opposite ends of a court in a Grand Slam final — particularly at Roland Garros, on the red clay that Nadal rules — and the one-sided nature of the rivalry grows even more pronounced.

Grinding along the baseline, using every inch of his wingspan to extend points, whipping fearsome forehands this way and that, Nadal flummoxed Federer yet again Sunday in a riveting, highlight-filled match, beating him 7-5, 7-6 (3), 5-7, 6-1 for a record-tying sixth French Open championship and 10th major title overall.

"He plays better against the better ones, and that's what he showed today," said Federer, owner of 16 Grand Slam trophies. "He's a great champion, on clay, especially."

There's no question that Nadal is as good as it gets in Paris — 45-1 for his career, and the same number of titles there as Bjorn Borg — but the Spaniard already also has shown that he is much more than the King of Clay. And Sunday's victory only will raise more questions about whether Federer truly deserves to be called the Greatest of All Time if he is not even the Greatest of Right Now.

Nadal leads their head-to-head series 17-8. That includes a 6-2 advantage in Grand Slam finals and a 5-0 edge at the French Open (in the 2005 semifinals, and the 2006, 2007, 2008 and 2011

finals).

When a reporter recited those numbers and asked for an assessment, Nadal replied: "Well, it means I can play well, too."

"When you talk about these statistics, when you try and make these comparisons, really it's not very interesting to me," continued Nadal, who would have ceded the No. 1 ranking to Novak Djokovic with a loss Sunday. "I'm very happy with what I have, with who I am. I'm not the best player in the history of tennis. I think I'm among the best. That's true. That's enough for me."

He's rapidly gaining on Federer. Nadal turned 25 Friday, making him about six months younger than Federer was when the Swiss star collected his 10th major title.

Their rivalry is a friendly — not heated — one.

Nadal conceded a point Sunday when he saw Federer's shot landed in but was called out. A few years ago, Federer gave Nadal a lift on a private jet from one tournament site to another after learning his on-court nemesis had trouble finding a commercial flight.

This was their first meeting in a Grand Slam final in more than two years. It also was the first major championship match contested by any two men who already completed career Grand Slams.

And Nadal and Federer put on a worthy show, more than 3½ hours chock-full of lengthy exchanges, brilliant defense, sublime shotmaking, and some dizzying shifts of momentum.

"A big occasion," the third-seeded Federer said. "I was aware of it."

KANSAS CITY, Kan. — Dale Earnhardt Jr. was charging again, hoping that this time he'd come out on top in a frantic late fuel-mileage battle.

But leader Brad Keselowski stretched his tank perfectly Sunday to win the Sprint Cup race at Kansas Speedway — and extend Earnhardt's winless streak to 106 races.

"There are some secrets to it and I just maximized them all. I had plenty (of fuel) left," Keselowski said.

Earnhardt appeared set to make a late charge on Keselowski. That push never came — though Earnhardt did move up to third in the standings and is just a point behind Jimmie Johnson.

For the second week in a row in a fuel-mileage race, Earnhardt came up just short.

He ran out of gas near the finish in Charlotte and wound up seventh.

"Anytime you win a fuel mileage race you've done something as a driver," Earnhardt said. "We don't know what we're doing really trying to save gas or how much we're saving. But (Keselowski) had a hand in it."

Denny Hamlin was third, followed by Jeff Gordon and Carl Edwards, who holds a 40-point lead over Johnson.

Johnson fought from 31st position and finished seventh.

Polesitter Busch led 152 laps and finished ninth. He had to stop for gas as the leader with 10 laps left.

# Stricker outlasts field, weather at Memorial

DUBLIN, Ohio — The toughest test Steve Stricker faced Sunday at the Memorial was when he wasn't even playing golf.

With a three-shot lead and just more than five holes remaining, Stricker had to spend two hours in the clubhouse waiting out a storm delay, leaving him plenty of time to imagine what could go wrong.

Never mind that he played the front nine in 20-under par, including a 30 in the final round. Or that on his last hole before the delay, he saved par with a bunker shot behind the 12th hole that Jack Nicklaus said was the best shot he hit all week.

"It's hard not to think about those last closing holes and just the unknown," Stricker said. "You don't know what's going to happen with the other players, you don't know how you're going to perform under the stretch, under the gun. At that point, you just want to get it done."

The way it ended was no surprise at all.

Stricker faced two clutch par putts down the stretch — from 15 feet on No. 16 and from 7 feet on No. 17 — and poured them both in the center of the cup. He closed with a 4-under 68 for a one-shot victory over Matt Kuchar and Brandt Jobe to finally find the winning formula at Muirfield Village.

"I feel good when I've got the putter in my hand," Stricker said.

He felt even better when it was over, and he walked off the green to meet Nicklaus with a handshake and a hug.

"You've seen so many guys do that over the years, the winners coming off the green and getting greeted by Mr. Nicklaus," Stricker said. "And you always think one day that could be you. And it turned out it was me this year. It's a great thrill. It's a dream come true."

Stricker moved to No. 4 in

the world to become the highest-ranked American for the first time in his career. He won for the 10th time in his career — seven of those since turning his game around five years ago — and went over \$30 million in career earnings.

## LINCICOME WINS SHOPRITE LPGA CLASSIC

GALLOWAY TOWNSHIP, N.J. — Brittany Lincicome made a 4-foot birdie putt on the final hole to win the ShopRite LPGA Classic for her fourth LPGA Tour title and first in two years.

Lincicome closed with a bogey-free 5-under 66 for a one-shot victory over third-ranked Jiyai Shin (6) and No. 4 Cristie Kerr (69). It was Lincicome's first win since the 2009 Kraft Nabisco.

The 60-year-old Gilder earned his 10th victory on the 50-and-over circuit but first since 2006. He closed with a 6-under 65 for a 14-under 199 total.

Long story short, downtown T.F. meters must go

For years, this newspaper has argued editorially that downtown Twin Falls should remove its parking meters in order to encourage people to shop. And it should come as no surprise that a majority of respondents to a recent survey agree. Five-eight percent of respondents said that parking downtown shouldn't be regulated, just as it's not regulated in other major shopping venues in Twin Falls. If that's not a clear enough mandate for the city to pull the meters out of downtown, we don't know what would be. More than 200 people have answered an ongoing online survey about downtown Twin Falls parking so far, the vast majority identifying themselves as customers. Fifty-three percent say the parking meters, at a rate of 25 cents an hour, don't affect their decision to come downtown, but three-fifths say they don't think downtown parking should be regulated.

“(Paying to park) doesn’t necessarily keep me from coming downtown, because A) it’s not that expensive, and B) there’s usually plenty of free parking available if you’re willing to walk a little bit,” one anonymous respondent, who said he or she was a consumer, wrote. “... In the end, it

doesn't seem very customer-friendly ... instead of enticing people to come spend time downtown, you're hitting them with a fine.” More than four-fifths of respondents said property taxes should pay for parking maintenance and management, and two-thirds believe meters are a detriment to attracting customers. But interestingly, almost an equal number — 68 percent — thought there should be a parking maintenance/management program downtown. Tom Ashenbrenner, owner of Rudy's — A Cook's Paradise, found the preliminary results encouraging, especially because of the large number of customers that responded. “They have an interest in the parking situation, which means they still have an interest in downtown,” he said. That's critical, for when downtown parking ceases to matter to visitors, then so will downtown. So it's time to lower the last barrier — parking meters — to local folks shopping in the city's core.

We don't have to accept high unemployment

Unemployment is a terrible scourge across much of the Western world. Almost 14 million Americans are jobless, and millions more are stuck with part-time work or jobs that fail to use their skills. Some European countries have it even worse: 21 percent of Spanish workers are unemployed. Nor is the situation showing rapid improvement. This is a continuing tragedy, and in a rational world bringing an end to this tragedy would be our top economic priority. Yet a strange thing has happened to policy discussion: on both sides of the Atlantic, a consensus has emerged among movers and shakers that nothing can or should be done about jobs. Instead of a determination to do something about the ongoing suffering and economic waste, one sees a proliferation of excuses for inaction, garbed in the language of wisdom and responsibility. So someone needs to say the obvious: inventing reasons not to put the unemployed back to work is neither wise nor responsible. It is, instead, a grotesque abdication of responsibility.

What kinds of excuses am I talking about? Well, consider last week's release of the latest report on the economic outlook by the Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development, or OECD. The OECD is basically an inter-governmental think tank; while it has no direct ability to set policy, what it says reflects the conventional wisdom of Europe's policy elite. So what did the OECD have to say about high unemployment in its member countries? “The room for macro-economic policies to address these complex challenges is largely exhausted,” declared the organization's secretary general, who called on countries instead to “go structural” — that is, to focus on long-run reforms that would have little impact on the current employment situation. And how do we know that there's no room for policies to put the unemployed back to work? The secretary general didn't say — and the report itself never even suggests possible solutions to the employment crisis. All it does is highlight the risks, as it sees them, of any departure from orthodox policy.

But then, who is talking seriously about job creation these days? Not the Republican Party, unless you count its ritual calls for tax cuts and deregulation. Not the Obama administration, which more or less dropped the subject a year and a half ago. The fact that nobody in power is talking about jobs does not mean, however, that nothing could be done. Bear in mind that the unemployed aren't jobless because they don't want to work, or because they lack the necessary skills. There's nothing wrong with our workers — remember, just four years ago the unemployment rate was below 5 percent. The core of our economic problem is, instead, the debt — mainly mortgage debt — that households ran up during the bubble years of the last decade. Now that the bubble has burst, that debt is acting as a persistent drag on the economy, preventing any real recovery in employment. And once you realize that the overhang of private debt is the problem, you realize that there are a number of things that could be done about it. For example, we could have WPA-type programs putting the unemployed to

work doing useful things like repairing roads — which would also, by raising incomes, make it easier for households to pay down debt. We could have a serious program of mortgage modification, reducing the debts of troubled homeowners. We could try to get inflation back up to the 4 percent rate that prevailed during Ronald Reagan's second term, which would help to reduce the real burden of debt. So there are policies we could be pursuing to bring unemployment down. These policies would be unorthodox — but so are the economic problems we face. And those who warn about the risks of action must explain why these risks should worry us more than the certainty of continued mass suffering if we do nothing. In pointing out that we could be doing much more about unemployment, I recognize, of course, the political

obstacles to actually pursuing any of the policies that might work. In the United States, in particular, any effort to tackle unemployment will run into a stone wall of Republican opposition. Yet that's not a reason to stop talking about the issue. In fact, looking back at my own writings over the past year or so, it's clear that I too have sinned: political realism is all very well, but I have said far too little about what we really should be doing to deal with our most important problem. As I see it, policymakers are sinking into a condition of learned helplessness on the jobs issue: The more they fail to do anything about the problem, the more they convince themselves that there's nothing they could do. And those of us who know better should be doing all we can to break that vicious circle.

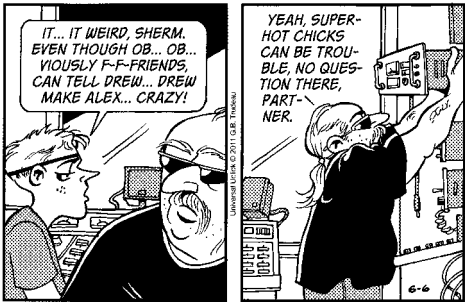
**Correctional system in Idaho is questionable**

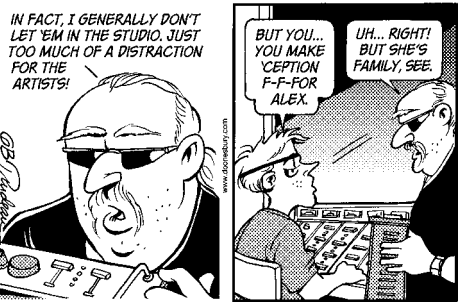

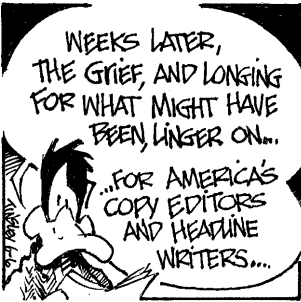

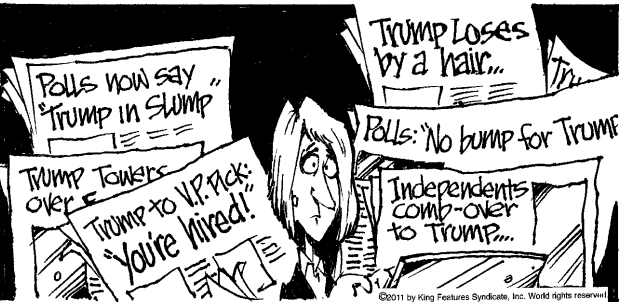

# THROWING for the HOLE

For mild exercise with a competitive twist, try disc golf

The courses are free, the competition is multiplying, the sun is shining. No wonder Magic Valley's disc golf courses are seeing more action.

The area's courses range from downright challenging (such as Rock Creek Park) to, well, a walk in the park (say Buhl's Eastman Park). The more difficult the disc golf course, the more exercise the thrower gets while playing a round, said Scott Rogers, College of Southern Idaho recreation coordinator.

Players throw discs from a tee-pad to a basket on a pole. The sport uses not just the upper body but also core muscles, depending on the thrower's technique. Rock Creek Park's course provides a leg workout, too, as many of the holes have an elevation change that requires climbing hills and scaling canyon walls.

"There isn't a lot of cardio involved in disc golf," Rogers said. "I've seen some people speed golf, and that might be a more strenuous workout."

Speed golfing requires throwers to run after discs and complete the

course as quickly as possible.

"My shoulder and arm are sore after every time I play," said Charlie Laub, a member of Southern Idaho Chuckers Disc Golf League. "It requires a lot of walking, and if you are going to throw a full round or more you are definitely working your upper body."

The league started four years ago with about six members and now boasts at least 25. They play disc golf every Sunday, alternating between two Twin Falls courses.

"It is a social game," Rogers said. "It is good because it gets people

off the couch and moving."

In Twin Falls, the Chuckers league takes the game a little more seriously than the recreational players who populate the CSI course. The Chuckers have organized two Magic Valley tournaments in the past year for avid disc golfers, and they participate in tournaments across the state, playing up to 72 holes in one weekend. They stretch their arms and shoulders before starting out on a day of throwing.

"It definitely works your upper body, but it's not about size," said

## Not all bikinis risk wardrobe malfunctions

Forget the pear-vs.-apple and curvy-vs.-curveless shape charts for a minute. There's another divide in the two-piece swimwear discussion: What if you actually have to get up and move around instead of lying on the chaise with a cool drink in hand?

The runway swimsuits and magazine-shoot bikinis, with their thin straps, triangle bottoms, decorative hardware and high ratio of white fabrics, make for great photos — especially on the glamazon models.

But some other women, perhaps those who trudge across the sand carrying a beach chair or who use swimming as a form of fitness, like two-piece suits, too.

Designer Nanette Lepore, a bikini wearer and lap swimmer, says she personally tests all the swimsuit styles in her collection. "I'm aiming for across-the-board fit. That means higher bottoms and built-up tops.

My friends ask, 'How did most bottoms get so skimpy, anyway?'"

But just because you don't want a string bikini doesn't limit you to dowdy, Lepore says. "I think cute, retro styling keeps them sexy."

No one is calling a Katy Perry-type or even a Dita Von Teese lookalike, with pinup looks that evoke old Hollywood swimsuit glamour in a flirty, high-waist skirt bottom, of being frumpy or boring, says Amy Tara Koch, a Chicago-based style expert.

It's a win-win, she says, because it's a feminine look with little chance of a wardrobe malfunction.

"To me, Swimwear 101 is about the four Cs: compression, cover-ups, construction and quality — OK, that's a Q but it makes the C sound," says Koch.

She adds, "You need to think about how it looks and performance. ... There definitely is a middle of the road."

Modern swimsuit manufacturers have innovative fabrics at their disposal that offer softness, control and color that lasts even after many cycles in the sun, sand and pool, according to Koch. She also notes that many of the lingerie brands that specialize in shapewear, such as Spanx, now make swimsuits.

Koch, Lepore and Kay-Lin Richardson, director of sales at Panache Swimwear, all emphasize fit over any other factor in choosing a swimsuit, especially a two-piece. It's important in a one-piece, too, but there's usually more leeway, they say.

(They all also say white is a risky color choice for anyone who gets wet — no matter the fabric or lining.)

## Proper posture: One big reason to stand up straight

After running for more than 10 years, Paul Ward has figured out how to maintain his posture while working out. He keeps his shoulders square and back straight — tips he picked up from experience and from running magazines.

"For the most part, it comes naturally," the Twin Falls man said.

But not if you ignore it. Whether you're lifting or running, pay heed to your posture.

The biggest danger of poor posture, of course, is injury. Improper bending and twisting can result in a herniated disk, said Tyler

Hurst of Hurst Chiropractic Center in Burley.

"If you don't have proper posture, the muscles

will pull funny," Hurst said. Those movements can tear and pull ligaments or result in strains and sprains.

And if your technique isn't good, your results won't be, either. "You're actually breaking your body down" instead of building it up, said Justin Aslett, trainer at Anytime Fitness in Twin Falls.

So what can you do?

**Listen to your body.** Muscle fatigue and soreness are normal, Hurst said, but joint and back pain aren't. "There's a difference between sore and pain," Aslett said. If you feel pain, stop.

**Pay attention to your spine.** You want a strong, straight back — but not too

straight, said Scott Rogers, recreation director at College of Southern Idaho. Your spine has a natural curvature, so don't make it unnaturally straight. Take extra special care when you're lifting, Aslett said.

**Check your alignment.** When lifting, your feet should be shoulder-width apart so that your toes are positioned right under your knees, "so you can absorb that load the way your body is biomechanically built," Rogers said.

**Look at your shoes.** Your footwear can tell you if your running style is wrong. Take a look at the bottom of your running shoes, Hurst suggested. "If

there's any kind of uneven wear pattern, that's telling you that your running posture is not correct," Hurst said.

**Get a trainer to help.** You can keep an eye out for major problems by yourself, but nothing beats getting a professional to show you how to do it the right way. It's not enough to read a book or watch videos online, Rogers said. And even when you know the proper posture, always use a spotter or a mirror.

"If you don't know, don't fake it," Rogers said.

people to throw a few holes of disc golf. The college's recreation center offers free disc rentals with a \$5 deposit; find the center by the CSI gym on the west side of campus.

"Anyone can disc golf," Rogers said. "The CSI course is set up so that you can golf from a wheelchair."

People of all ages are getting into the laid-back sport, Larry Laub said.

"I bring my kids. It's a great way to do some family bonding and get your kids active," Larry Laub said. "My son is 7, and I take him to tournaments with me."

The potential payoff? "Disc golf provides upper and lower body conditioning, aerobic exercise and promotes a combination of physical and mental abilities that allows very little risk of physical injury," according to the Professional Disc Golf Association website.

But it might not be a good idea to play disc golf if you have a shoulder or arm injury, Rogers said. "Other than that, it is not very physically demanding."

- **Location:** Hole one is on the corner of Poplar Street and Sixth Avenue North, Buhl.
  - **Type of course:** Nine permanent holes.
  - **Landscape:** Mostly flat and moderately wooded.

- Rock Creek Park**
- **Location:** Hole one is at the corner of Filer Avenue and Briar Cliff Drive, Twin Falls.
  - **Type of course:** 18 permanent holes.
  - **Landscape:** Hilly and moderately wooded with water hazards on most holes.

- College of Southern Idaho**
- **Location:** Hole one is at the corner of Falls Avenue and Frontier Road, Twin Falls.

How many women do you know who are different sizes on the bottom and top? asks Richardson. Probably most of them.

Panache makes its bathing suits based on bra sizes. "The idea is a properly fitted top — more of a custom fit," Richardson explains. "If you're chasing after kids, you don't have to feel self-conscious about a possible spill."

When you're trying a swimsuit on in the dressing room, be sure to move around, she suggests. And for any mother picking up kids or who carries a lot of gear, Koch, author of the maternity style guide "Bump It Up," recommends closures that tie, not hook. A one-strap halter is probably the most secure, she says.

An underwire top is going to give the support of a bra, where a triangle top won't, says Richardson. Thick tank straps are another possibility.

For the truly active woman — think beach volleyball player or a boater — then the tankini should be seriously considered, Richardson says.

On the bottom, Koch says that higher-cut leg openings will create the illusion of longer legs, but boy shorts cut off most people in an unflattering way.

One of the most effective styling tricks is to draw attention up toward your face, says Koch, who recommends color or embellishment at the neckline. Be aware of metal hardware, though, which can get very hot in the sun.

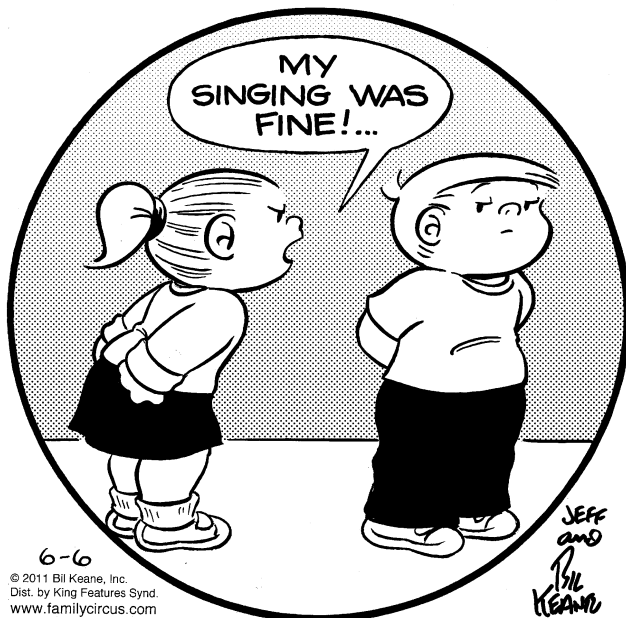
**Ten years ago:** Democrats formally assumed control of the U.S. Senate after the decision of Vermont Republican James Jeffords to become an independent. A jury in Los Angeles awarded more than \$3 billion to lifelong smoker Richard Boeken, deciding that tobacco giant Philip Morris was responsible for his incurable lung cancer. (The jury award was reduced by a Superior Court judge to \$100 million, then cut to \$50 million by an appeals court; the U.S. Supreme Court refused in March 2006 to consider tossing out the award altogether; Boeken died in 2002.)

**Five years ago:** Veterans Affairs Secretary Jim Nicholson acknowledged a stolen computer contained personal data on about 2.2 million active-duty military, Guard and Reserve personnel – not just 50,000 as initially believed. Iran and the United States had a rare moment of agreement, using similar language to describe “positive steps” toward an accord on a package of incentives aimed at persuading Tehran to suspend uranium enrichment. Soul musician Billy Preston died in Scottsdale, Ariz., at age 59.

**One year ago:** The Vatican released a working paper which said the international community was ignoring the plight of Christians in the Middle East, and that the Israeli-Palestinian conflict, the war in Iraq and political instability in Lebanon had forced thousands to flee the region. Rafael Nadal won his fifth French Open title, beating Robin Soderling 6-4, 6-2, 6-4.

## THE ACES ON BRIDGE®

Bobby Wolff

One of the best tournaments in England is a double-elimination event, the Spring Foursomes. In the 2005 event David Price's squad was undefeated in the double-elimination phase. At the end of their allotted boards in their next match, Price was down by 48 IMPs, but they exercised their option, as an undefeated team, to play a further eight deals. They garnered an incredible 52 IMPs to win the match and reach the final. The fairy tale ended there, however, since they lost in the finals.

In this deal from the tournament West led the club four against Price's contract of three no-trump, suggesting that he had led from a four-card suit. Dummy's ace won, but as the bidding had cried out for a major-suit lead, Price placed West with no five-card suit, relatively short holdings in both majors, and inferentially, three cards in diamonds. Therefore at trick two he led a low diamond to his ace. Seeing East's 10 drop, he continued with the jack. When this held, the nine to dummy's king allowed the suit to be run.

There are eight tricks, but any attempt to try for a ninth in hearts would see East take his ace, and an avalanche of clubs would follow. As it was, though, East was squeezed on the last diamond. To protect the heart ace and spade queen, he had to let a club go. Now declarer could afford to play a heart, as all that the defense could then cash were three club tricks. Contract made.

ANSWER: When you have trump control, the lead of a doubleton has rather more to recommend it than usual. Here, while a spade lead might work (or even a club lead, to give partner a ruff), it is somewhat easier to envision diamond ruffs, so I would lead the diamond 10.
