Family of slain CSI player files lawsuit

Report: Driver Reinhardt was intoxicated at time of fatal crash

CASE BACKGROUND

Sept. 12, 2010: Devon Austin, 19, and Ryan Reinhardt, 18, are killed in a onevehicle crash near Filer. Jessica Duran, a survivor of the crash, later tells police their group was chased from a house party near Filer.

May 5: Twin Falls County Prosecutor Grant Loebs files a charge of misdemeanor reckless driving against Kade Laughlin, 19, accused of chasing the group in an unsuccessful bid to retrieve property he said they stole from

June 3: Austin's parents file a wrongful death civil lawsuit against Reinhardt, Laughlin and three others.

The parents of one Coeur d'Alene teen killed in a single-vehicle crash in September 2010 are suing the people they say caused their son's death.

Tim and Paula Austin, along with Jessica Duran, the lone survivor of the crash, filed a complaint for damages for the death of 19Twin Falls County 5th District Highway 30. According to an Idaho Court. They name Kade Laughlin, Transportation Department vehi-Ryan Balles, Colt Robinson, Naccona Tegan Robinson and Ryan Reinhardt, the driver of the car, as defendants in the death of Austin, enough for him to be considered who came to Twin Falls last year to intoxicated. SNRA faces fire threat of dead trees killed by bark beetles

The Sawtooth National Recreation Area is preparing for a possibly heightened fire season this year, due to an overabundance of dead trees.

Many consider the mountain pine beetle's attack on SNRA forests to have crested. But while the beetles may be leaving, the trees they killed remain.

These dead trees are falling over. And according to recent research, they can ignite up to three times faster than the green needles on a healthy, liv-

"We've been removing trees near campgrounds and private land," said Jim Rineholt, SNRA forester for the Sawtooth National Forest's Ketchum district office. "We're focusing on removing dead trees in consideration of the public's safety."

As one beetle leaves one area, SNRA officials are fighting the attack of another.

The Douglas-fir beetle has aggressively invaded Bald



BEETLES IN THE SAWTOOTHS

Late 1990s: Mountain pine beetles begin massively invading lodgepole pines in the Sawtooth National Recreation Area. Officials don't begin spraying against the beetle until 2003. 2007: SNRA trees begin turning orange then red, a reflection that they are dying from the beetles' attack. The red needles pose an increased fire threat due to their lack of ability to hold as much moisture as healthy trees. An estimated 80 percent of mature lodgepole pine trees are killed over time.

2011: SNRA officials believe the worst of the beetle invasion is over. However, the trees have transitioned from red to gray and have begun falling throughout the Sawtooth Valley. The fallen trees serve as extra fuel to potential wildfires.

Army veteran pleads guilty to harassment of **Muslim woman**

John C. Larsen, the Army veteran accused of harassing a Muslim woman outside the Twin Falls Walmart, changed his plea to guilty on Wednesday before his jury trial for the crime resumed for its second day.

Minidoka County 5th District Judge Jonathan Brody accepted Larsen's entry of an Alford plea, which allows a defendant to maintain his innocence to gain the benefits of the plea agreement. The felony malicious ha-

rassment charge against him will not be amended or reduced as part of the plea. Larsen, 42, of Twin Falls, was accused of screaming at ent

Amna Schultz while both parties were shopping near Walmart's electronics department last December.

Larsen has described himself as a 20-year veteran who was declared 100 percent disabled based on a diagnosis of posttraumatic stress disorder. He appeared in court both Tuesday and Wednesday wearing an Army dress uniform that featured three chevrons and the shield of the 1st Cavalry Division.

Twin Falls County Prosecutor Grant Loebs said he will argue for a suspended prison term of three to five years so Larsen may apply for Mental Health Court as a means of joining the newly formed Veterans' Court, currently only available in Ada

Delta Air Lines bag fees for soldiers ignites backlash

WASHINGTON – Delta Air Lines hastily changed its baggage fees for troops Wednesday after a YouTube video showed soldiers complaining that they had to pay \$200 apiece to check extra bags as they made their way home from Afghanistan.

The video was posted Tuesday and was viewed almost 200,000 times before it was removed the next day by the person who put it up. By Wednesday afternoon, a Facebook page called Boycott Delta for Soldiers had sprung up, and the airline was backpedaling and apologizing to the soldiers.

In the video, titled "Delta Airlines Welcomes Soldiers Home," two Army staff sergeants say their unit was told it would cost \$200 apiece to check a fourth bag on a Tuesday morning flight from the Baltimore-Washington airport to Atlanta – a total bill of more than from Afghanistan to Fort

In the video, one sergeant, Robert O'Hair, wearing a camouflage uniform and sitting inside the plane, says his fourth bag was a weapons case containing an M4 carbine rifle, a grenade launcher and a 9-millimeter pistol that he had used in Afghanistan.

"The tools I used to protect myself and Afghan citizens while I was deployed," O'Hair says.

With a bite to his voice, the other sergeant — Fred Hilliker of Allendale, Mich. - closes the video: "Good business model, Delta. Thank you. We're actually happy to be back to America. God bless America. Not happy, not happy at all. Appreciate it. Thank you?"

Initially, Delta apologized to the soldiers but didn't change its policy. It posted a blog item attributed to an anonymous customer service representative explaining that Delta allows troops traveling in economy class up to three bags free but charges for the fourth.

As the storm of online complaints about the incident grew, the airline posted a new blog item Wednesday saying fourth bags will now be free for troops traveling in economy class and five bags will be free for those traveling in business class.

In a blog post, Delta said it regretted "that this experience caused these soldiers to feel anything but welon their return come home." Airline officials declined to answer further

"I don't know if Delta is aing to raimhurca thaca in dividual soldiers or not, but Boyce said. "In the past, the airlines, if there's been some sort of a misunderstanding, have done that?

At least some of the soldiers traveling on the flight were with an Army Reserve unit based in Oklahoma, Boyce said. He said troops on the plane were returning from a military training center in Kabul. He did not have the name of their unit.

It was not clear why the video was removed from YouTube. The soldiers in the video also did not explain the total bill of more than \$2,800 in detail.

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Idaho keeps smaller rate for wind, solar power production

A handful of Idaho wind energy developers will have to negotiate how much they'll be paid for the energy they produce after state regulators decided they'll offer special rates to only the smallest producers.

The Idaho Public Utilities Commission on Wednesday announced it won't reinstate for now a larger cap on the Public Utility Regulatory Policies Act rates that created a favorable climate for the development of wind energy in Idaho.

The state is required to determine and publish the special rate for projects that develop up to 100 kilowatts. During the state's wind industry infancy, the PUC opted to extend the rate to projects that produce up to 10 megawatts – 100 times the mandated cap — through Dec. 14, 2010.

The rate is based on the price of natural gas, and pays qualifying wind and solar producers based on the cost a purchasing utility — Idaho Power, Areva and Rocky Mountain Power in the Gem State – avoids by not having to generate or buy power from elsewhere.

Shell-owned Cotterel WindEnergy Center initially responded to a 2009 Idaho Power bid request as one large 150 MW project, according to the PUC. But after an agreement wasn't reached, it was divided into five 10 MW projects, for which Cotterel submitted five PURPA contracts scheduled to start in 2014.

Under the 10 MW cap, the projects' projected earnings stretched to \$716.4 million over 20 years.

"From the commission's perspective, a thorough review is appropriate and necessary prior to signing agreements that obligate ratepayers to payments in excess of \$70 million over the 20-year term of these agreements," the commission stated in a written release.

The PUC will examine the methodology used to calculate the avoided-cost rates for utilities, stating in a written release, "it is more appropriate to first establish the just and reasonable avoided-cost rates before we implement procedures for obtaining the rate."

PUC spokesman Gene Fadness said the commission is open to extending the rate to larger producers again in the future.

If accepted, Larsen will be placed on probation and required to meet all conditions of the treatment program. As with other problem-solving courts, his conviction will be voided if he successfully completes treatment and doesn't violate terms of his probation.

His suspended prison time and probation terms will be decided at sentencing on Aug. 1.

Witnesses to the confrontation between Larsen and Schultz testified on Tuesday that Larsen used vulgar language, bragged of having a concealed weapons license and moved his hand toward his hip. Further testimony also revealed that Schultz moved toward Larsen during the argument and was yelling as well.

The trial ended before Schultz could testify on the events of that evening.



But for now, that \$5,000 a month - \$60,000 ayear - could be used for other purposes.

It could pay for a new position at the Twin Falls Police Department — and then some. Or it could cover the \$52,506 deficit that the Twin Falls Golf Club ran last year.

As far as next year's city budget is concerned, we're getting down to cases: Just a month ago the City Council was talking about the prospect of lay-

The projected Twin Falls city deficit for the 2012 fiscal year is \$2.4 million. That grows to \$3.3 million in 2013 and \$5.4 million in 2014.

Clearly, \$60,000 will make a difference.

"In the future, communities across the country are not going to find much help forthcoming from the federal government as it finally confronts its own fiscal crisis," said U.S. Rep. Mike Simpson, R-Idaho.

That's the new normal. The city of Twin Falls needs to accommodate it.

The digital diet: How to break free of your gadgets

o you ever feel the urge to pull out your smartphone while someone else is making a point in a conversation?

Have you ever realized that you were texting or checking your email while your child was telling you about her day at school?

Have you ever felt that something hasn't really happened until you post it on Facebook?

If you answered yes, you're among the millions of Americans being overrun by technology.

I've been there. In 2009 I realized that technology had gotten the best of me. I was more distracted and, ironically, more disconnected than ever before. I was so immersed in technology and work that I'd neglected several important life events: my father's remarriage, a good friend's pregnancy, my stepbrother's divorce.

So I spent one year untangling my wires and streamlining my digital life, including checking out of social networks for eight months.

I say it's time to make peace with our gadgets and fold them into our lives more effectively. We need a strategy that that puts us back in control, rather than letting technology overwhelm us. Here's how.

Step 1: Rethink

Say you spend a total of two hours each day posting on Facebook or Twitter, mindlessly surfing the Web, sculpting your online image, or all of the above, in ways that don't relate explicitly to your job. Over a year that adds up to roughly 30 days an entire month vanished in the ether. What do you have to show for it? What else could you have accomplished in that time?

Even multitasking, the preferred excuse of the

gadget-obsessed, isn't all it's cracked up to be. A study published in April 2010 in the journal Science found that performing multiple simultaneous tasks leaves the brain somewhat baffled, while a 2009 Stanford University study found that massive multitaskers are easily distracted and have a hard time sorting out irrelevant information. This unfocused state often results in irrational decision-making.

Step 2: Reboot

Gadgets don't come with nutrition labels, so I've developed a Virtual Weight Index - sort of a Body Mass Index for the tech-dependent - that assigns values to your tech habits. Calculating your score can give you a sense of how much you need a digital diet.

If you're due for a detox, it's best done over a weekend.

First, put your assorted tech temptations in a box (yes, an actual box; it can be a shoebox or a dresser drawer). Second, and this is scary, give someone you trust the passwords to your social networking accounts (new for your bank or credit card accounts, of course), so they can change them to remove any temptation to log on. Third, set a message on your cellphone saying you won't

be checking in for a couple of smartphone to give no alerts days (let callers assume you're on a remote vacation). Fourth, stop sending texts. You can check your e-mail but only once each day.

Step 3: Reconnect

The point of the diet is not to eliminate gadgets from your life but to assign them their proper place. One way is by being vigilant about your e-day — the time you spend online each day, from when your digital use starts to when it ends.

After detox, start using some of your gadgets again - at first for just one hour. Record the time spent in your notebook. Has technology replaced something in your life that concerns you? Is your identity being shaped through social networks? W

Begin setting boundaries for your e-day. Establish limits on when people can expect to hear from you, for instance. Begin your e-day with a cup of coffee, sans gadgets, and end it by charging your devices in the kitchen overnight, not in your bedroom, where they will drain your personal energy and impede snuggle time. Buy an alarm clock; if your BlackBerry or iPhone doubles as your alarm, it will demand your attention the moment you wake up. For one day, at least, set your

for e-mails and texts. Check it when you choose to.

Note the times you reached for your gadgets. Was there a lull in the conversation, or were you just bored? Did you worry that you were missing something online — or something right in front of you?

Set a conscious, realistic time limit for your e-day.

Step 4: Revitalize

I've developed some digital rules to live by that can help in this stage. Repeat af-

Renewable energy carries environmental concerns

n April, Gov. Jerry Brown made headlines by signing into law an ambitious mandate that requires California to obtain one-third of its electricity from renewable energy sources like sunlight and wind by 2020. Twentynine states and the District of Columbia now have renewable electricity mandates. President Obama and several members of Congress have supported one at the federal level. Polls routinely show strong support among voters for renewable energy projects - as long as they don't cost too much.

But there's the rub: while energy sources like sunlight and wind are free and naturally replenished, converting them into large quantities of electricity requires vast amounts of natural resources. Even a cursory look at these costs exposes the deep contradictions in the renewable energy movement.

Consider California's new mandate. The state's peak electricity demand is about 52,000 megawatts. Meeting the one-third target will require about 17,000 megawatts of renewable energy capacity. Let's assume that California will get half of that capacity from solar and half from wind. Most of its largescale solar electricity production will presumably come from projects like the \$2 billion Ivanpah solar plant, which is now under construction in the Mojave Desert in southern California. When completed, Ivanpah, which aims to provide 370 megawatts of solar generation capacity, will cover

3,600 acres — about five and a half square miles.

The math is simple: to have 8,500 megawatts of solar capacity, California would need at least 23 projects the size of Ivanpah, covering about 129 square miles, an area more than five times as large as Manhattan. While there's plenty of land in the Mojave, projects as big as Ivanpah raise environmental concerns.

Wind energy projects require even more land. The Roscoe wind farm in Texas, which has a capacity of 781.5 megawatts, covers about 154 square miles. To have 8,500 megawatts of wind generation capacity, California would likely need to set aside an area equivalent to more than 70 Manhattans. Apart from the impact on the environment itself, few if any people could live on the land because of the noise (and the infrasound, which is inaudible to most humans but potentially harmful) produced by the turbines.

Industrial solar and wind projects also require long swaths of land for power lines. Last year, despite opposition from environmental groups, San Diego Gas & Electric started construction on the 117-mile Sunrise Powerlink, which will carry electricity from solar, wind and geothermal projects located in Imperial County, Calif., to customers in and around San Diego. In January, environmental groups filed a federal lawsuit to prevent the \$1.9 billion line from cutting through a nearby national forest.

Not all environmentalists ignore renewable energy's land requirements. The Nature Conservancy has coined the term "energy sprawl" to describe it. Unfortunately, energy sprawl is only one of the ways that renewable energy makes heavy demands on natural resources.

Consider the massive quantities of steel required for wind projects. The production and transportation of steel are both expensive and energy-intensive, and installing a single wind turbine requires about 200 tons of it. Many turbines have capacities of 3 or 4 megawatts, so you can assume that each megawatt of wind capacity requires roughly 50 tons of steel. By contrast, a typical natural gas turbine can produce nearly 43 megawatts while weighing only nine tons. Thus, each megawatt of capacity requires less than a quarter of a ton of steel.

Obviously these are ballpark figures, but however you crunch the numbers, the takeaway is the same: The amount of steel needed to generate a given amount of electricity from a wind turbine is greater by several orders of magnitude.

Such profligate use of resources is the antithesis of

the environmental ideal. Nearly four decades ago, the economist E. F. Schumacher distilled the essence of environmental protection down to three words: "Small is beautiful." In the rush to do something — anything — to deal with the intractable problem of greenhouse gas emissions, environmental groups and policy makers have determined that renewable energy is the answer. But in doing so they've tossed Schumacher's dictum into the ditch.

All energy and power systems exact a toll. If we are to take Schumacher's phrase to heart while also reducing the rate of growth of greenhouse gas emissions, we must exploit the low-carbon energy sources - natural gas and, yes, nuclear — that have smaller footprints.

Ending Medicare 'as we know it'

Almost everyone agrees that America's health care system has the incentives all wrong. Under the fee-forservice system, doctors and hospitals get paid for doing more, even if added tests, operations and procedures have little chance of improving patients' health. So what happens when someone proposes that we alter the incentives to reward better care, not more care? Well, Rep. Paul Ryan and Republicans found out. No surprise: Democrats slammed them for "ending Medicare as we know it."

This predictably partisan reaction must depress anyone who cares about the country's future. It is only a slight exaggeration to say that unless we end Medicare "as we know it," America "as we know it" will end. Spiraling health spending is the crux of our federal budget problem. In 1965 – the year Congress created Medicare and Medicaid – health spending was 2.6 percent of the budget. In 2010, it was 26.5 percent. The Obama administration estimates it will be 30.3 percent in 2016. By contrast, defense spending is about 20 percent; scientific research and development is 4 percent.

Uncontrolled health spending isn't simply crowding out other government programs; it's also dampening overall living standards. Health economists Michael Chernew, Richard Hirth and David Cutler recently reported that higher health costs consumed 35.7 percent of the increase in per capita income from 1999 to 2007. They also project, that under reasonable assumptions, it could absorb half or more of the gain between now and 2083.

Ryan proposes to change that. Beginning in 2022, new Medicare beneficiaries would receive a voucher, valued initially at about \$8,000. The theory is simple. Suddenly empowered. Medicare beneficiaries

highest-quality insurance plans providing a required package of benefits. The health-care delivery system would be forced to restructure by reducing costs and improving quality. Doctors, hospitals and clinics would form networks; there would be more "coordination" of care, helped by more investment in information technology; better use of deductible and co-payments would reduce unnecessary trips to doctors' offices or

It's shock therapy. Would it work? No one knows, but two things are clear.

First, as Medicare goes, so goes the entire health care system. Medicare is the nation's largest insurance program, with 48 million recipients and spending last year of \$520 billion. About 75 percent of beneficiaries have fee-for-service coverage. If Medicare remains largely fee-for-service, the rest of the system will too.

Second, few doubt that today's health care system has much waste: medical care that does no good; high overhead costs. In a paper, Cutler documented some evidence. In one survey, 20 percent of patients reported that doctors repeated tests because records were unavailable; the health care sector has twice as many clerical workers as nurses and nine times as many as doctors: care of patients with chronic con-

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that, for example, only 43 percent of diabetics receive recommended treatment.

Fee-for-service is openended reimbursement; the government's main tool to control Medicare's costs is to hold down reimbursement rates. Doctors and hospitals respond by ordering more services to offset the rate limits. For all its flaws, say Ryan's critics, this system beats his. Indeed, the Congressional Budget Office has estimat ed that in 2022, Ryan's plan would be more than a third costlier than the status quo, because Medicare's size makes it more effective at restraining reimbursement

If CBO is correct, Ryan's plan fails; beneficiaries' out-of-pocket costs would roughly double to cover the added cost. But CBO may be wrong. When a voucher system was adopted for Medicare's new drug benefit, CBO overestimated its costs by a third; the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services' overestimate was 42 percent.

Under Ryan's plan, incentives would shift. Medicare would no longer be an open ATM: the vouchers would limit total spending. Providers would face pressures to do more with less; there would certainly be charges that essential care was being de-

The Obama administration argues that better results can be achieved by modifying incentives within the existing system. Perhaps. But history suggests skepticism.

It's Ryan's radicalism versus President Obama's tinkering. Which is realistic and which is wishful thinking? This important debate should rise above cheap political rhetoric. Burdened by runaway spending, Medicare "as we know it" is going to end. The only questions are when and on whose terms.

Though they don't want to promote anti-Western terrorism, Pakistan's generals do want to cultivate the Afghan Taliban for an expected civil war with anti-Pakistani Tajiks backed by India. Our enemies might turn out to be their friends.

Just as Pakistan isn't an unconditional ally in the West's war on terrorism, it isn't always in the Taliban's corner, either. Pakistan's military gives the Afghan Taliban shelter, but it does not provide the fighters with sophisticated weapons such as antitank rockets or antiaircraft missiles. If Pakistan were fully on the Taliban's side, the Taliban would be

more militarily effective. And this suspicion runs both ways. Pakistan's military remembers that the Afghan Taliban spurned its advice before 9/11, refusing to moderate its radical ideology and expel al-Qaida. Pakistani generals disapprove of Islamist revolution but most back the Afghan Taliban because they think they have no choice, given the bitter anti-Pakistan sentiment of pow-

Who says teens aren't smart when it comes to money?

SACRAMENTO, Calif. - In Chad Posner's economics classes at Sacramento's Mira Loma High School, students are scoring off the charts when it comes to financial

On a recent national financial literacy exam, nearly half of his 84 students scored in the top 10 percent. One of those, 18-year-old Angela Liu, scored a perfect 100 percent on the 40-question online test, whose results were released in April by the U.S. Treasury.

Despite its clunky-sounding name, the National Financial Capability Challenge has a clear-eyed goal: to increase high schoolers' knowledge and impress upon teachers, parents and students the need for deeper understanding of basic financial concepts.

Liu, whose parents are Chinese immigrants, said many of the test questions are "common-sense" subjects that go beyond textbook economics. The senior said personal finance is "not just memorizing facts" but learning "real life" skills that everyone should know.

Apparently, she and her classmates know them well. Combined, Posner's classes scored 86 percent, compared with 69 percent for U.S. teens overall.

Last fall, in launching a financial literacy push, FDIC Chairman Sheila Bair said, "Teaching young people how to handle their finances ... isn't a luxury in today's economy. It is essential."

That's what Posner preaches to his three classes of 17- and 18year-olds. Students, he said, are "very receptive" to class instruction on personal finances. "They want to learn about this stuff. Money is important to them."

Posner, who worked several years as a financial planner, covers lots of real-life topics: Insurance. Credit and debt. FICO scores. College savings. Investing. Retirement.

He also lets his students solve real-life money problems, loosely based on his former clients. For instance, what's the best use of \$500 in monthly savings for a young couple with no children who have a condo mortgage, credit card debt, a car loan, life insurance and no retirement plan?

Obama to create White House Rural Council

WASHINGTON (AP) -President Barack Obama plans to create a special advisory council to recommend ways to boost the economic outlook and quality of life for the estimated 60 million people who live in rural areas of the U.S., a White House of-

ficial said. Obama was expected to sign an executive order today establishing the White House Rural Council and naming Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack, of Iowa, to be its

chairman. The official asked not to be identified in order to speak freely before a formal White House announcement about

the council. The panel will be responsible for providing recommendations to the president on investment in rural areas, as well as coordinating with a variety of rural interests, including agricultural groups, small businesses, and state, local and tribal governments.

It will focus on 10 areas that affect nearly one-fifth of the U.S. population of 308 million. But the panel's initial focus will be on job creation and

economic development. Rural residents are eager for better educational opportunities, transportation alternatives, better access to health care and reliable access to the Internet, among other issues.

The remaining subject areas will be: agriculture, access to credit, innovation, health care, education, Internet access, infrastructure, conservation and developing regional economies.

Don't let hantavirus spoil your time in the outdoors

If you're planning to spend time outdoors this season, take precaution to prevent han-

That's the message from South Central Public Health District.

Hantavirus pulmonary syndrome or HPS is a potentially deadly disease transmitted by infected rodents, which in Idaho are likely to be deer mice, distinguished by their white bellies. The virus is contained in their urine, droppings or saliva.

"There are simple ways to take precautions against HPS, including wearing a mask and rubber gloves when cleaning any rodent-infested areas," Mary Jensen, epidemiology manager for SCPHD, said in a news release. "Visitors to rural areas including campers, hikers and others who take part in activities outdoors should use other special precautions to avoid HPS.

"Although cases of HPS in campers and hikers are fairly rare, we still stress the importance of taking necessary and easy precautions."

To minimize the risk for hantavirus infection, campers and hikers should follow these precautions:

- Before occupying abandoned or unused cabins, open them up to air out. Inspect for rodents and don't use cabins if you find signs of rodent infestation until it has properly been cleaned.
- If you sleep outdoors, check potential campsites for rodent droppings and burrows.
- Do not disturb rodents, burrows or dens.
- Avoid sleeping near woodpiles or garbage areas that may be requented by rodents.
- Avoid sleeping on bare ground; use a mat or elevated cots, if possible.
- Store foods in rodent-proof containers and promptly discard, bury or burn all garbage.

There is no specific treatment, cure or vaccine for Hantavirus infection. With early diagnosis, however, and prompt medical attention, an infected individual can usually recover.

Free Fishing Day offers great opportunity for first-time anglers

If you haven't yet tried your hand at fishing, Saturday is a good time to start. That's Free Fishing Day in the Gem State.

To help get you in the mood for this special day - a day that can serve as your introduction or reintroduction to fishing - Scott Stanton, regional fishers biologist with the Idaho Department of Fish and Game, answered questions about how to best get hooked on one of America's favorite pastimes.

What type of fishing is best suit ed for a first-time angler?

The best fishing opportunity for the first-time angler is one where the angler can fully enjoy the angling experience. This opportunity is found by visiting a local fishing hole that has been stocked with fish. These conditions allow the first-time angler the opportunity to fish for fish that are willing to bite.

Often rod/reel combinations can be purchased, as well as small tackle boxes loaded with the essential hooks, weights, and swivels. These combinations are good options for the beginning angler and are made by many of the leading manufacturers in the sport fishing industry. Most anglers can find complete beginning tackle options in the \$50-\$100

Fishing for memories: Launch fishing offers an inexpensive, hassle-free way to enjoy a day on water

GARRISON, Minn. - "Fish on!" someone hollered.

A dinner bell clanged, signaling one of the 20 anglers aboard the 50foot launch had hooked one. Guide and boat captain Greg Eno scrambled for a landing net.

"Oh, it's a big one," an angler shouted, seeing Jay Maher's rod bent in half. After a couple hours of fishing on a choppy Lake Mille Lacs on a recent Wednesday evening, the group had landed several small walleyes and keeper-sized perch. But Maher clearly had something much bigger.

While fellow anglers ooed and aahed, Eno netted the walleye -a27-plus-inch dandy.

every day," said a grinning Maher, 49, holding his trophy for photos before slipping it back into the lake.

Nor do you often get to catch a dandy fish with a crowd of onlookers to congratulate you. But this is launch fishing, and it's

something special. The ingredients: the access convenient. a good-humored group of souls, wide-ranging in age and fishing experience. Add one of the great walleye fisheries in the nation. Stir in a mild, clear-skied spring

evening with a classic 'walleye chop' rocking the boat. Top it off with some classic '70s rock 'n' roll on the radio.

The result: a fishing experience unlike any other.

For years he used to fish Mille Lacs with his dad, but the trips ended when his dad passed away. Now Tony has returned, choosing to go out in a launch operated by Twin Pines Resort near Garrison. This was his third outing.

"We limited out on a trip last fall,"

caught a walleye and a jumbo perch he wasn't disappointed.

"Does it get any better than watching the sun go down over the water?" he said as dusk descended on the big lake.

The allure is simple. Launches long have been a common sight on Mille Lacs, and perhaps 30 or so ply the lake each summer. (Statewide, the DNR licenses 136 charter fishing boats 25 feet or larger.) While the size, style and amenities may vary, for anglers the allure is the same.

"People are just looking to go out fishing with family, friends or groups as an outing," said Bill Eno, who, with his wife, Linda, have owned Twin Pines Resort on the west shore of Mille Lacs for 16 years. They run two launches.

"Everyone has fun," Eno said. "If you have two people in a boat, and you catch two fish over a four-hour period, that's two catches you experience. But if you have 20 people on a launch, and everyone catches one fish, that's 20 catches. And even that's fishing," said Greg Eno. 
That was the case this Wednesday evening. It was an eclectic group, with three anglers from Nebraska and two from Florida. Nine were women. Though some anglers caught nothing, there were plenty of hoots and whoops whenever someone hooked a fish.

heard good things," Martha said. Around 8:30, something hit Margaret Kooiman's leech.

"Fish on!" she shouted as her rod Otremba, 51, have been coming to bent toward the dark water. The bell clanged and, after reeling the fish to the boat, guide Mike Gannon netted her dandy 23-inch walleye.

Her eyes lit up and she grinned like a kid at Christmas.

Listing brightest stars is an inexact science

ou'd think it would be pretty straightforward to make a list of the brightest stars (that is, the stars which appear brightest to the unaided eye, not the stars with the greatest energy output). But realworld complications make compiling such a list challenging.

First, what the eye perceives as a lone point of light in the night sky isn't always a single star. For example, Castor (rightmost of Gemini's twin stars, currently sitting low in the northwest around 10:30 p.m.) is actually a sextuple star system. Castor's stars are so close gether that a telescope is required to "split" them. But some multiple stars are just wide enough apart that stargazers with exceptional visual acuity will see them not as one bright star, but as two fainter ones.

Second, many stars vary their brightness over time. While most such variations are barely noticeable to the eye, and are too little to change their rank on a brightest star list, others are more dramatic.

Mira, in the constellation Cetus, the Sea Monster (currently in the daytime sky) is a long-period variable star that shrinks and grows over a 332-day cycle. To the eye, it goes from invisible without a telescope when at its dimmest, to rivaling the Big Dipper's stars at its brightest.

Third, there's your viewing location. Some bright southern stars don't make

Idaho's "brightest" list, because they never come above our horizon. The light from southern stars, which barely break the horizon, must traverse a long path through the atmosphere and thus never appear as bright as they would at lower latitudes.

So, a truly accurate "brightest stars" list would have to be tailored to the observer's eyes, location, and the time of the observation.

Sometimes, the universe resists being pigeonholed.

uestion: I handled my own bankruptcy case and it is closed. I'm trying to refinance my house, but the bank says there is a lien against my house in favor of one of the creditors I listed in my bankruptcy. What can I do?



nswer: Your creditor sued you and received a court judgment that was then recorded in your county, creating a lien on your home. Although the underlying debt was discharged in your bankruptcy, the lien remains and must be paid or otherwise cleared before your home can be refinanced or sold. In Idaho, you are entitled to a homestead exemption that protects the equity in your home from your creditors. If the judgment lien impairs your exemption, it could have been removed while your bankruptcy case was still open. In order to remove the lien now, your case will need to be reopened, then you will have to file the appropriate motion and documents. This can be a time consuming and expensive process. An experienced bankruptcy attorney can handle this matter easily. It's unfortunate, but what you saved by not using an attorney for your bankruptcy is probably less than you will spend reopening your case and removing the lien now. Bankruptcy is complex. Religion sticking point with Romney

LOS ANGELES - Mitt Romney is stepping away from the rest of the field for the GOP presidential nomination and is increasingly competitive against President Barack Obama, though the former Massachusetts governor faces a potential problem because of his religion, according to the Quinnipiac poll released Wednesday.

A quarter of Republicans or GOP-leaning independent voters said they would back Romney over the rest of field for the Republican nod. It was the best showing



for Romney months and the first time any Republican had garnered so much support from his own party, a sign that Re-

publicans may be coalescing a bit in these early days of the 2012

presidential campaign. Still, Romney faces a possible political problem because of his religion, the Quinnipiac poll and other surveys have found. Overall, only 45 percent said they had a favorable opinion of the Mormon religion, while 32 percent said they had an unfavorable one. Other polls have found different numbers, but most agree that between a quarter and a third of voters say they would have a problem voting for a Mormon, creating a tough situation for Romney and former Utah Gov. Jon Huntsman, who is flirting with a presidential bid.

"The fact that less than half of voters have a favorable view of the religion is likely to be a political issue that Gov. Mitt Romney, and should his campaign catch on, Gov. Ion Huntsman, will have to deal with as they pursue the White House?" said Peter A. Brown, assistant director of the Quinnipiac University Polling Institute.

The nation's anti-Mormon feelings aren't new. In 2007, Romney tried to defuse the issue with a speech

stressing common values. According to the poll, Romney has opened up a lead over the rest of the GOP field, which has been seen as weak and fluid. Ranking in second place was Sarah Palin, the party's 2008 vice presidential nominee, who received 15 percent.

Judges seem receptive to health care challenge

ATLANTA — Judges on a federal appeals court panel on Wednesday repeatedly raised questions about President Barack Obama's health care overhaul, expressing unease with the requirement that virtually all Americans carry health insurance or face penalties.

All three judges on the 11th Circuit Court of Appeals panel questioned whether upholding the landmark law could open the door to Congress adopting other sweeping economic mandates.

The Atlanta panel did not immediately rule on the lawsuit brought by 26 states, a coalition of small businesses and private individuals who urged the three to side with a federal judge in Florida who struck down

But the pointed questions about the so-called individual mandate during almost three hours of oral arguments suggests the panel is considering whether to rule against at least part of the federal law to expand health coverage to tens of millions of Americans.

Federal appeals courts in Cincinnati and Richmond have heard similar legal constitutional challenges to the law within the last month, and lawyers on both sides agree the case is headed for the U.S. Supreme

WASHINGTON, D.C. **Economy falters in several U.S. regions**

For the first time this year, the economy slowed in several U.S. regions this spring. High gas prices weakened consumer spending, and the Japan crises reduced manufacturing output.

Four of the 12 Federal Reserve bank regions suffered slower growth in April and May, compared with earlier this year, a Federal Reserve survey said Wednesday. Nationwide, the economy faltered in May. Hiring slowed, orders to factories declined, and home prices fell.

The report helped to confirm a slew of reports that point to an economy growing more slowly than at the end of last year.

Fed banks in New York, Philadelphia, Atlanta and Chicago said the pace of growth slowed. Boston, Cleveland, Richmond, St. Louis, Minneapolis, Kansas City, and San Francisco said growth continued at a steady pace.

The Dallas region was the only one to report accelerating growth, mostly because of higher oil prices that benefited the energy industry.

The report, known as the "Beige Book," is based on anecdotal information gathered by officials at the Fed regional banks from their business contacts. It is released eight times a year and provides a more inthe-trenches look at the U.S. economy.

FDA: Some chicken may contain arsenic

The Food and Drug Administration said Wednesday that some chicken meat may contain small amounts of arsenic, though the agency is stressing that the amount is too tiny to be dangerous to people who eat it.

The FDA said Wednesday that a new study developed by the agency shows that an ingredient in chicken feed that contains arsenic, called Roxarsone, may make its way into parts of the bird that are eaten. Previous studies have indicated that the arsenic was eliminated with chicken waste. Pfizer Inc., which makes the feed ingredient, said Wednesday that it will pull it off the market in the United States. Had the company not stopped sales, the FDA could have eventually banned the product since it contains a known carcinogen.

Many poultry producers have already stopped feeding their birds the ingredient, which has been used since the 1940s to kill parasites and promote growth. The FDA said that people should not stop eating chicken that may have been fed the drug. Michael Taylor, FDA's deputy commissioner for foods, said the study raised "concerns of a very low but completely avoidable exposure to a carcinogen."



Obama welcomes Auburn to White House

WASHINGTON (AP) -Cam Newton joined his former Auburn teammates Wednesday for one more celebration of their national championship, this time at the White House.

President Barack Obama congratulated the Heisman Trophy winner and the Tigers for their perfect sea-

"There's a guy named Cam Newton who had a pretty good season and went on to win the Heisman Trophy. So obviously that's really extraordinary," Obama said.

Newton left Auburn after one season and was drafted first overall by the Carolina Panthers in April.

Newton had a recordbreaking season in his one year at Auburn, but it was also filled with scandal. His father was found by the NCAA to have peddled his son to Mississippi State for money when Cam Newton was being recruited out of junior college.

Newton ultimately ended up at Auburn and he led the Tigers to their first national championship since 1957. despite all the controversy about his recruitment.

All-American defensive tackle Nick Fairley, who also gave up his senior season to enter the NFL draft not long after Auburn's 22-19 victory against Oregon in the BCS championship game, made the trip to the White House,

Auburn was set to visit the White House in late April, but the trip was postponed so Obama could fly to Alabama to survey tornado dam-

"Coach (Gene Chizik) and I were just talking about you don't understand the devastation until you see it firsthand," Obama said.

"But what was also inspiring was the amount of strength and generosity that was shown by so many people in the midst of so much tragedy. And that includes the members of this program. Two days after the tornado, almost 70 Auburn coaches, players, and athletic department staff - led by Coach - traveled to Pleasant Grove and Cullman to help out with relief efforts.

NHL general managers support broader penalties for head hits

BOSTON — The NHL's general managers agreed Wednesday with a recommendation to broaden the league's definition of illegal hits to the head, likely expanding the scope of a rule enacted last year to outlaw blindside head shots.

Hockey's inherent violence claimed the sport's spotlight again this week during the Stanley Cup finals. Boston forward Nathan Horton was knocked out for the series in Game 3 on Monday with a severe concussion after a late hit from Vancouver's Aaron

A panel of former players, including Brendan Shanahan and Rob Blake, has been investigating new ways to protect defenseless skaters from head hits since March. The panel and the GMs agreed the word "blindside" should be taken out of Rule 48, expanding the rule to allow referees to issue bigger penalties on more instances of contact with an opponent's head.

"Last year, Rule 48 was a very good step," said Shanahan, who will become the NHL's chief disciplinarian next season. "Good rules evolve. We felt we could do a little more, go a little further. We'll see if the NHLPA and the competition committee agrees with us. The GMs met in a downtown Boston hotel before

Game 4 of the finals. While they believe more can be done to protect vulnerable players from dangerous hits, most executives firmly believe the NHL will never outlaw all contact to the head. "The tightrope we walk is, this is a full-contact

sport," said Toronto GM Brian Burke, a former NHL disciplinarian. "It has been since we opened the doors for business. We cannot lose that part of the fabric of our game. What we've got to do is eliminate the most dangerous parts. ... If you go to that rule (eliminating all head contact), you're going to take

hitting right out of the game.'

"NASCAR decided to make the decisions that they felt were necessary," Busch said before the race at Eldora Speedway. "It's pretty much the end of it. It's not my fight." NASCAR also placed Childress on probation

through the end of the year, finding the team owner solely at fault for the incident last Saturday. He apparently approached Busch after the race, placed him in a headlock, and punched him several times.



He has won big races before in 18 years as a trainer, including a couple at the Breeders' Cup with Better Talk Now and Shared Account and a Whitney Handicap with Bullsbay.

Never, though, has the good-natured 47-year-old Englishman been through a Triple Crown grind like the one that will end with Saturday's Belmont Stakes, when he sends out his Derby winner against Preakness winner Shackleford and 10 other 3-year-olds.

Despite his unforgettable journey through Kentucky, Maryland and New York, Motion refuses to let the hectic pace get to him. Even family and friends say so.





THAT SCRAMBLED WORD GAME

"Justice is justly represented Blind, because she sees no Difference in the Parties concerned.

Occasionally a deal crops up that causes even the best players to have a blind spot. This one caught out world champion Norberto Bocchi.

First, cover up the East and West hands and consider declarer's problem. South declares four spades, and West leads the diamond seven to the 10 and king. Declarer plays the king and ace of trumps, finding that West started with Q-J-9. How should he contin-

What happened at the table was that declarer played his other two top diamonds and then led a low club. However, this allowed West to win with the king, cash the spade queen, and play the diamond nine, forcing declarer to ruff in hand with his last trump. Declarer could now play a club to dummy's queen, but couldn't get back to hand to cash the club ace. When the heart ace was wrong, he had to go down.

Can you see where he went wrong? After the spade king and ace, he should have played a club immediately. This does not give up on any of his chances since. once trumps fail to break, he needs either the club king or heart ace to be right. Now West again wins the club king, cashes the spade queen, and plays a diamond, but this time declarer can win, play a club to dummy's queen, a diamond back to his hand, and the club ace, discarding a heart from dummy. A club ruff followed by a diamond ruff sees him home.



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DEAR ABBY: I am severely myopic and can't see without my prescription eyewear. Yet people continually ask me if they can "borrow" my glasses to read the menu. (I work as a hostess.) Abby, my glasses are not reading glasses; they are my eyes - literally. When I explain this, I get snorts, grunts and muttered comments that I am "rude."

My husband says I should let them try on my glasses and cut out the explanation, as they would immediately realize that they can't see through them. I disagree. I think it is inappropriate to even ask, let alone become offended when I politely refuse. Abby, I would like to explain the concept of reading glasses versus prescription eyewear: Most people do not walk around with reading glasses fully on their face.
