From there, though, it catches on quickly. "If you judge it on the tonnage that we are no longer taking to the landfill, it's been good because our tonnage has been down,"

Redistricting journey begins:

Twin Falls County districts in play

The journey from Twin Falls County into Owyhee County isn't known for its heavy highway traffic.

Obscure county roads connect the two counties, marking a path through a long rural swath of Idaho.

The lack of state or interstate highways connecting the two counties will come into play for the Magic Valley as the Redistricting Commission starts redrawing boundaries of Idaho's 35 legislative districts.

The roads are important, since District 23, which includes western Twin Falls County and Owyhee County, doesn't meet the rules passed by the Legislature in 2009 requiring counties in one district to be connected by a prominent highway system.

It's one more hurdle that the Magic Valley will face in trying to maintain its political clout during redistricting. Ultimately, however, drawing new lines will reflect

Body found after blaze burns down

"I can conceive of ways in which we can go north or west," Pickett said, stressing that the most important thing is meeting all the legal requirements.

THE RULES

About redistricting: It happens once every decade following the U.S. Census and redraws congressional and legislative districts to reflect changes in population. The districts must be similar in population, with a margin of 5 percent in either direction. The time, the range is 42,548 to 47,024 residents.

- The commission is required to approve a plan within 90 days of beginning its work.
- Commissioners must be registered Idaho voters and cannot be a registered lobbyist, a current legislator, or have served as a legislator in the past two years.
- Commissioners cannot run for legislative office for five years following redistricting.
- Meetings are open to the public.
- At least four votes are needed to pass a plan.
- Plans from the public are accepted for consideration.
- The plan cannot be amended by the Legislature or vetoed by the governor.

"We have one well that tends to read higher, and that could cost us, so we're trying to make some modifications. This thing's still going on and open for public comment."

In 1958, as Interstate 80 inched its way through Wyoming and northern Utah toward the Idaho border, the Idaho Highway Board decided that when it reached the Magic Valley, the freeway would skim the north rim of the Snake River

 but barely. It was a compromise, and a delicate one, between the 58,000 people who lived on the river's south bank at the time and the 46,000 who resided on the north.

Minidoka, Jerome and Gooding counties would get the interstate, but Twin Falls and Cassia counties would get new bridges to keep truck traffic moving across the river.

U.S. Highway 30, of course, ran to the south, but it was a mess - overcrowded and unloved by an underfunded State Highway Department.

That question sparked the the west of Twin Falls," the Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce wrote to the highway board in 1959.

> The de facto main eastwest route through the valley was Idaho Highway 25, which ran west from Rupert to Bliss. Towns like Eden and Hazelton thrived, and the freeway threatened to take that traffic away.

Worse, it would cut through the heart of the North Side Canal Co. and prime farmland.

So a group of Eden and Hazelton farmers formed a committee and embraced a more northerly route - past Wilson Lake and into the badlands beyond.

The freeway would have run almost 20 miles from Twin Falls. Not surprisingly, the south side went ballistic.

There quickly followed a proposal from the Twin Falls Chamber for a southside route — much to the consternation of a group of Twin Falls County farmers who feared loss of agricultural land.

The new route would have

run from Burley through Kimberly, then veer south of Twin Falls to Buhl. From there, it would have cut across the desert through what's now the Saylor Creek Bombing Range to Glenns

The politically vulnerable State Highway Board found itself in a tight spot.

The agency was only nine years old, and many Idahoans preferred the old way for siting highway routes letting the governor do it.

The Republicans, who then as now dominated the Magic Valley, were in a minority in the Legislature, and the increasingly nasty split between northside and southside Magic Valley lawmakers over the highway issue threatened to wreck their chances of regaining control.

District Judge Gilbert Norris of Weiser ordered the highway department to hold a new round of hear-

When the Legislature convened in January, Rep. James Martin, a Jerome Republican, introduced a bill that would restrict the power of the highway board to decide future road routes. Not a chance, thundered

the southsiders.

"We believe roads should

be placed where the greater number of people, particularly Idaho people, can use them," wrote Twin Falls Chamber president William Koch. "We believe that all factors should be considered, not just whether it goes through Joe Doe's and Joe Doake's farm."

"We simply don't want our homes and farms destroyed uselessly and feel that we have proved that the destruction is unnecessary," countered Irvin McDonald, an Eden farmer. "This is not a partisan southside or northside question."

The following December, the Idaho Supreme Court resolved the issue by finding a loophole. State law, it ruled, didn't provide for an appeal to the courts of highway board decisions in cases in which the road in question didn't replace an existing route.

Construction of that leg of I-80 North - later I-84 - began the following year along the original route.

The State Highway Board kept its authority to put roads where it saw fit. And the Republicans got the Legislature back.

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Huge Arizona wildfire rekindles debate over old-growth logging

SPRINGERVILLE, Ariz. history is rekindling the blame game surrounding ponderosa pine forests that have become dangerously overgrown after a century of fire suppression.

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

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Idaho drug czar, campaign vet resigns

BOISE - Debbie Field, a former lawmaker from Boise and a veteran political strategist who helped many of Idaho's most notable Republicans win state and congressional campaigns, is stepping down as head of the state's Office of Drug Policy.

Field, appointed Idaho's so-called drug czar by Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter four years ago, officially notified her staff this week of her plans to leave her post Friday to spend more time with family, according to a letter provided to The Associated Press Thursday by the governor's office.

"This is the best job I've ever had," Field, 56, told the AP. "But I really want to go back now and spend some time with family. It's hard to leave a job that you love. It has been an incredible opportunity that has been worth every step on the path."

Mail processing operation should stay in T.F. – for now

ll across the federal government, the consequences of hard decisions like those facing the U.S. Postal Service will soon be commonplace.

USPS — which lost more than \$2 billion during the first three months of 2011 — is considering consolidating its Twin Falls mail processing operation with Boise's. The potential merger is part of the government corporation's nationwide downsizing effort, as

mail volume has tumbled by 20 percent since 2007, much of it lost due to the popularity of the Internet over "snail mail."

The USPS estimates it could make the switch without affecting service in the Magic and Wood River valleys and save \$600,000 in the process.

We're not so sure about that. Is it realistic, as many of the 99 employees of the Twin Falls post office have asked, to ship a letter from one Twin Falls address to another via a 260-mile detour and always expect it to arrive the next day?

Four years ago, the USPS backed off a similar proposal after it concluded it wouldn't be able to guarantee overnight service in the Wood River Valley.

But the USPS doesn't have a lot of good options. By law, it's self-supporting - no taxpayer funding - and it's hemorrhaging money right, left and center.

It seems to us the logical step would be to eliminate Saturday mail delivery, but that would require Congress' permission – and lawmakers are sensitive to complaints from constituents about Saturday mail.

The day may be coming when it's simply no longer economically feasible to maintain overnight service in places like the Wood River Valley and the small towns across the Magic Valley.

That's a problem, because of south-central Idaho's agricultural economy. Many farmers and businesses ship perishables with a short shelf life via the USPS because, for logistical reasons, there are no workable

alternatives. Magic Valley Labs Inc. of Twin Falls is an example. It does water testing, and if the samples aren't processed within 30 hours of collection, they're use-

Before knowing if savings would come from a merger, the USPS will complete a study that looks at the Twin Falls and Boise operations and factors such as the amount of mail and power and transportation costs. This assessment will look only at the mail-processing side of the USPS and whether local mail can be routed to Boise for sorting without increasing delivery time.

It's not certain how many — if any — postal workers' jobs would be lost by consolidating Boise and Twin Falls operations, although fewer of them would be here.

We believe the continued presence of a Twin Falls mail processing center is justified because of the volume -545,000 parcels and letters are sorted each day - and the realities of local geography and the econo-

But that may change as the USPS confronts the new math of smaller government.

Do bad times produce bad people?


ounter to the prevailing expectation that crime would increase during a recession," it actually dropped last year and violent crime is now at nearly a 40-year low. So said The New York Times last week. But what the *Times* did not report is precisely why it was so surprised to learn, yet again and probably not for the last time, how the "prevailing expectation" may be limited to people who think as did Marx (Karl maybe, Groucho for sure) that money is the root of all evil. On the contrary, evil is.

I pick on the Times out of tough love. The paper's evident surprise at the falling crime rate shows a remarkable tenacity in clinging to shopworn and disproved dogma. Crime is not committed by good people who lose their jobs. It is committed by criminals who never had real jobs in the first

The drop in the crime rate is indeed newsworthy and a bit mysterious. No one is exactly sure what is going on. Is the reduction caused by changed demographics fewer young men – or an increased incarceration rate (no longer the case) or the good ol' zeitgeist? Whatever the reason, the results are wonderful. The chances of being murdered or robbed are now half of what they were in the early 1990s, although there are some disquieting signs that the good days may be coming to an end. New York City, which

for some time has led the nation in crime reduction, is having an itsy-bitsy crime wave - murders, rapes, robberies and assaults are up. Still, a little perspective is in order. New York had 536 murders last year. In 1990, the figure was 2,245.

Certain kinds of crime might be affected by a recession. Domestic abuse, even murder, might be triggered by overcrowding and unemployment. But the key category of robbery, the one that numerous experts thought would rise on account of the recession, fell 9.5 percent nationwide. The Times dutifully quoted experts who were puzzled by this.

I am not. A person who loses his or her job is not likely to pick up a gun and rob someone in the street or climb through a second-story window. There are several reasons for this, the first being that people who had jobs are not likely to be criminals or criminally minded. Even if they had engaged in whitecollar crime, violent crime would hardly be the next step. Another reason is the

social safety net. Before the unemployed reach for a gun. they are more likely to reach for an unemployment insurance application. This, I think, is a much easier way of replacing some income.

My own expert in such matters is Neil Gilbert, Chernin professor of social welfare and co-director of the Center for Child and Youth Policy at the University of California at Berkeley. He points out that recessions are periods of social conservatism - the '20s roared, the '30s most definitely did not. $When \,people \,lose \,jobs, they$ move back in with their parents or with relatives. Families enforce social norms. People need one another. It's no time for general mayhem.

I would never argue that economics is not an important — and sometimes paramount - factor in social behavior and, surely, a truly starving person will resort to crime, if need be. But the expectation that bad times will produce bad people is a consequence of the belief that social welfare programs will solve social welfare problems: The more you have of the former, the less you have of the latter. This is sometimes the case - food stamps, etc., are a necessity - but the belief that crime rises as budgets are cut is a fallacy. It infantilizes the poor: Without bread and cir-

cuses, they will riot. The shock inherent in the New York Times story, the bafflement over crime rates that seem unaffected by unemployment, is a meme of the left. It has its roots in an admirable desire to help the less fortunate and to enlist government in that effort. It's no more perverse than the right's insistence that culture is everything and all social programs are a waste of money. But we have known for a long time that, if just from stories our parents and grandparents tell, hard times do not make hardened criminals. Robbers don't rob because they're out of work; they rob because robbery is the kind of work they do.

Why did the Army let his guy handle anthrax?

■ t would be hard to iden tify many crimes of greater ongoing consequence to Americans than the anthrax letter attacks of nearly a decade ago. Coming in the aftermath of Sept. 11. 2001, the mailings provoked deep-seated fear, and understandably so. The country appeared to be in the grip of a second wave of terrorism, a biological attack of unknown scale.

Operations of the federal government were briefly paralyzed as buildings were decontaminated or tested for Bacillus anthracis. the hardy bacterium that was placed in a handful of envelopes in powdered form and sent to three news organizations and two U.S. senators. Five people were killed; 17 others were sickened or injured.

Members of Congress cited the anthrax attacks in rushing to pass the Patriot Act, legislation to eavesdrop on communications and disrupt would-be terrorists. Advocates of making war on Iraq immediately sought to link the anthrax letters to al-Qaida, Saddam Hussein, or both. Finally, Congress and President George W. Bush approved an expensive and risky expansion of U.S. biocontainment laboratories staffed by thousands of scientists who will have access to anthrax and other deadly yet highly portable microorganisms.

Americans are owed a rigorous reassessment that distinguishes between emotional conjectures and verifiable facts surrounding the anthrax letters.

The evidence points most convincingly to one of our own - a trusted Army scientist at what was presumed to be the most secure of American biodefense facili-

Bruce Ivins, a civilian microbiologist at Fort Detrick. Md., created the unique batch of anthrax that was ultimately matched by DNA testing to the material used in the letter attacks. He spent unusually long, solitary hours in the biocontainment "hot suites" at Fort Detrick during the nights leading up to the mailings. Ivins had no plausible explanation for this burst of ac-

Ivins was the product of a frightening home life in Lebanon, Ohio. His volatile mother regularly attacked her pharmacist husband with whatever might be at hand: a broom, a fork, a skillet. From an early age Bruce found it difficult to make friends. At the University of Cincinnati, he carried a

loaded gun on campus and relieved his inner rage by firing inside empty buildings. After a young woman turned colleague as the "scariest" him down for a date, he bore a grudge against her sorority, Kappa Kappa Gamma.

Anonymously punishing the sorority became a lifelong obsession for Ivins. After he became a lab researcher at the University of North Carolina, a KKG sister there, Nancy Haigwood, did not reciprocate his repeated overtures. Ivins responded by stealing Haigwood's lab notebook – jeopardizing her goal of earning a doctorate.

To a psychiatrist, Ivins confided more: He had thought through plans to kill Haigwood.

In December 1980, the Army hired Ivins at Fort Detrick, where he was entrusted with growing and purifying spores of anthrax. His secretive pursuits of vengeance continued. In May 1983, the local newspaper in Frederick, Md., published a letter Ivins had written but which he signed "Nancy L. Haigwood." In it, "Haigwood" expressed pride in Kappa Kappa Gamma and outrage at "vitriolic attacks on our practices of 'hazing,' which non-Greeks fail to realize serve numerous valuable functions." The letter derided "the media and other outsiders," adding: "No matter what the press may say about us, I'm still proud to be in a sorority."

A private psychiatrist who treated Ivins in the late 1990s described him to a patient he had ever known.

On Oct. 6, 2001, a photo editor in West Palm Beach, Fla., employed by the parent company of the National Enquirer, died from inhalational anthrax. On Oct. 15, a letter bearing anthrax, addressed to Senate Majority Leader Tom Daschle, was opened on Capitol Hill.

That same day, authorities delivered the Daschle envelope to Fort Detrick, where Ivins would be assigned to analyze the remaining contents. At this point, only the perpetrator knew of another twist: All the poisoned envelopes had been deposited in a curbside mail box in Princeton, N.J. - almost directlybeneath the fourth-floor office of Kappa Kappa Gamma.


After he learned that federal prosecutors intended to charge him with murder, Ivins took a massive overdose of Tylenol PM. He died July 29, 2008.


Ivins should not have been allowed anywhere near anthrax. The present danger is that few if any lessons appear to have been learned from the Army's supervision of this deeply troubled man.

U.S. immigration system: It ain't that broken

he nation recently received two contradictory signals about the importance of immigration reform. President Obama stood near the Mexican border in El Paso on May 10 and called (again) for immigration reform. The next week, Gallup released a poll showing that a scant 4 percent of Americans consider immigration to be the nation's most important problem. That's down from 11 percent four years ago.

What's happened to our national immigration angst? Clearly, the economic slump

that began in late 2007 has given us other things to worry about. The long recession and slow recovery have had more direct effects on our perception of immigration problems too.

The recession brought immigration to a virtual halt, and in the process smoothed over the differences between home, the average differimmigrants and natives that provoked so much worry in headier times.

The recession affected immigrants more severely than natives. This led some migrants to leave the country, and undoubtedly caused some would-be migrants now living in other countries to stay put. The immigrants most likely to leave were, by and large, recent arrivals to the United States. When some of these new arrivals depart, and other would-be new arrivals decide to stay

ences between immigrants and natives narrow. As these differences fade into memories, our collective concern with immigration policy naturally declines.

Will we start worrying about immigration again once the economy heats up? A Manhattan Institute report provides some additional perspective on these questions, by comparing the experiences of immigrants in the United States and 10 other advanced nations. Though many of us have

been conditioned to think of international comparisons as unflattering to the United States, handling immigration turns out to be one thing we do better than most of the rest of the world.

This conclusion leaps out from study of many indicators in many countries. The homeownership rate among immigrants to America exceeds that of immigrants to Italy by 20 percent. The employment rate of American immigrants exceeds that of immigrants to the Netherlands by 13 percent. Immigrants here are more

likely to be naturalized citizens than those in many European countries.

Our immigration system is clearly not perfect. But it is, in fact, quite good. The first task of any proposal for reform should be to preserve our innate advantage in incorporating immigrants into society.

Merchants beat bankers in debit card vote

Merchants triumphed over bankers in a battle for billions Wednesday as the Senate voted to let the Federal Reserve curb the fees that stores pay financial institutions when a customer swipes a debit card. It was murkier, however, whether the nation's consumers were winners or losers.

As a result of the roll call, the Fed

Stone art: Find your destination in Hansen store's new mural

HANSEN - Angi Campbell began a new project by remembering an old one. During her childhood, Campbell's father would point out her family's vacation route on a map painted on the outside of Daw's Mar-

By the time Campbell and her husband, Stace, moved into the building and turned it into the Quick Stop & Go, the mural had been painted over. But now, with help from Hansen businesses and artist Gary Stone, the Campbells are turning memories of the map into the reality of a new mural.

Campbell said Stone's manager, Bill Knopp, asked her if she would be interested in the artist doing work inside the

Stone has been working on the mural since November. When it's installed Monday, it won't be the same as the old one.

The first change, Stone said, was preserving his artwork from future house paint. Stone worked on 10 panels instead of directly on the wall. If the building needs repainting or the mural needs repairs, the panels can be taken down and put back up instead of painted

"I've painted murals years and years ago and they've been painted over, and that doesn't really work for me," Stone said.

Stone also expanded the mural's scope from the original map. Though he added the South Hills, just as in the original, he also included the Snake River Canyon and Sawtooth Mountains. But more than just a map, Stone said, he's worked to create something entertaining as well as informative.

Stone, who also painted a mural at Twin Falls' airport, said his favorite work is integrating Idaho history and people. For Hansen's mural, that means depictions of the Oregon Trail and local businesses and families.

"I like to get a lot of Idaho history in my artwork," Stone said. "I've made my living as an artist for 40 years and I make paintings and all that, but the history and making things for the families is re-



St. Jean — like many other square dancers — has used the hobby as a reason to travel. The National Square Dancing Federation holds a national festival every spring, and a statewide square dancing festival is today and Saturday in Kuna. These festivals create an opportunity for clubs from $around\,the\,state\,and\,country$ to dance together. Because the callers' commands to dancers are uniform, clubs can integrate for one large dance. At workshops throughout the day, dancers can mingle and practice with other dancers.

Dawn Hutchinson of Twin Falls always comes prepared to do a little dancing when she travels.

"Every time I go anywhere I bring a square dancing outfit," Hutchinson said.

Though square dancing requires people to partner up, it isn't necessary to have a partner to be involved. St. Jean is part of the Magic Valley Singles square dancing club in Twin Falls.

Jack and Mary-Ann Sears of Gooding met while dancing and later married.

"After my first wife died in 2000 I needed a social activitv." said Tack Sears, a Buttons and Bows square dancer. "I started back in 2004 and met Mary-Ann at one of the first dances."

Square dancing takes considerable time and dedication. The Sears, experienced dancers, swing through and sashay more than six times a month. Beginners have to spend even more time attending workshops and memorizing hundreds of

calls, Jack Sears said. He and Mary-Ann travel three times a year to Idaho square dancing federation meetings and have attended one National Federation Festival.

"We have made a lot of friends through the years." said Sears, who started dancing in 1985 at 55 years old.

Square dancing clubs hold regular workshops and dances between October and May, and the state and national festivals mark the end of the season, Sears said. However, most groups hold periodic lessons and dances throughout the summer.

Magic Valley's four clubs all welcome beginners to watch or participate, and the traditional matching costumes aren't required for workshops. Some youngsters are even getting involved; in May, Magic Valley Singles gave lessons to children ages 7-10, St. Jean said. Although most of the dancing is square, all of the Magic Valley dance groups also practice round dancing, which is led by a cuer instead of a caller and keeps dancers in pairs.

"Square dancing is more interactive between couples," Sears said. "In round dancing you stay with your partner."

The Left Footers primarily practice round dancing, but many of their members are also members of square dancing groups. Round dancing is even incorporated into the Idaho square dance federation's festival – a tip, or two musical numbers, of square dancing followed by a tip of round dancing.

It's all about drawing in more dancers – and giving them a chance to get hooked on the do-si-dos and prome-

All eyes on Terrelle Pryor as he tries for the NFL

COLUMBUS. Ohio — The next step may be the most important one for former Ohio State guarterback Terrelle Pryor.

Done with college football and through with talking to the NCAA, now he'll have to convince NFL teams he can fully realize the potential that he has shown since he was a high school quarterback in Pennsylvania.

Pryor attorney Larry James said Thursday that the QB turned down a chance to play in the Canadian Football League and is now focusing his energies on being selected by an NFL team later this summer.

There are risks and rewards aplenty, both for Pryor and any team considering taking him.

'Some time ago I put up a top-100 list (for the 2012 draft) and I had Pryor right around 100 on that list," said Gil Brandt, an NFL draft analyst and former general manager of the Dallas Cowboys. "And that was before all of this came to fruition."

The "all of this" Brandt was referring to is the smoking rubble at Ohio State: coach Jim Tressel's forced resignation, an ongoing and allencompassing NCAA probe and, on Tuesday night, Pryor's announcement that he wouldn't return to school and play his senior season.

Pryor, considered the nation's No. 1 quarterback recruit when he signed with Ohio State in 2008, had already been suspended for the first five games of the 2011 season for trading autographs and memorabilia for cash and discounted tattoos. The NCAA also is looking into the cars Pryor has owned or was loaned while at Ohio State. But the NCAA will get no more answers from Pryor.

James said Thursday that, since Pryor is no longer a student, he felt no compunction to speak with NCAA investigators anymore.

going to get even harder. But we're ready. We're determined, and this is our time."

James, who called this game "now or never," responded from his worst playoff performance with 17 points, 10 rebounds and 10 assists, and Dwyane Wade battled through a sore left hip after a first-quarter collision to finish with 23 points.

They get the final two games at home, but history is against them as they try to win a title in their first season together: In the 26 previous times finals that were tied 2-2, the Game 5 winner won 19 of them.

The Mavs shot 60 percent through three quarters, briefly gave up the lead in the fourth, then controlled the final few minutes, just as they had in thrilling comebacks in Games 2 and 4.

This time, they got to play from ahead thanks to some sizzling shooting: 56.5 percent from the field, including 13 of 19 (68 percent) from 3-point range.

Terry scored 21 points and J.J. Barea had 17 for the Mavs, with Nowitzki briefly throwing both arms in the air as he walked off the court surrounded by a sea of blue fans who hope he'll bring home a championship trophy if they can pull out another victory in Miami.

"I felt great. I felt great. I was in rhythm tonight," Terry said. "I came out aggressive, something we have to continue to do. We're not happy with our defensive performance, but offensively, if we score 100, I told you what would happen."

Their offense was simply too good, despite a good bounceback for James.

James scored points, going just 3 of 11 in Game 4, the first time in 90 postseason games he didn't hit double figures. It's been a rough first finals in Miami for James, who has been accused of everything from "shrinking" to "checking out" in the fourth quarters, when he had just nine points through the first four games.

Trying to pump himself up, James wrote "Now or Never!!" on his Twitter page early Thursday morning, later calling this the biggest game of his career.

But they feel the same urgency in Dallas, where the slogan "The Time is Now" is printed on those blue Tshirts that surround the court, and where the Mavs are loaded with 30-somethings — late 30s, in Jason Kidd's case — who could be on their last shot at an NBA

Nowitzki said earlv Thursday he felt "great," having shaken the fever that rose to 101 degrees Monday night. This time, the health concern was Wade, who banged his hip in the first quarter and appeared to be limping at various points

from there. He remained in the locker room to start the second half, coming back onto the floor about the midway point of the period. By then, the Mavs seemed in too good a groove to be cooled off no matter who Miami

had out there. A disgusted Heat coach Erik Spoelstra was already walking onto the court to call time out by the time Tyson Chandler went up to dunk after catching the ball all alone under the basket, giving Dallas a nine-point lead that matched its largest of the series. Miami trimmed it to 84-79 after quarters, then three stormed into the lead midway through the fourth with a 9-0 run, all layups, dunks and free throws until Wade's 3-pointer made it 99-95 with 4:38 to play.

The Mavs tied it at 100 on Terry's 3-pointer with 3:23 left, and after James missed, Nowitzki drove for a baseline dunk and a 102-100 lead with 2:45 to go.

James was called for an offensive foul and missed a 3-pointer on Miami's next two possessions before Kidd drilled a 3-pointer to make it 105-100, sending the crowd into a delirious chant of "Beat the Heat! Beat the Heat!"

Barcelona cuts historic baseball team

BARCELONA, Spain (AP) -Barcelona fans and athletes gathered in front of Camp Nou stadium on Thursday to protest the elimination of the club's 80-year-old baseball team and the decision to slash funding for 12 minority sports

About a hundred adult and children players from a variety of Barcelona's amateur sports teams held a long banner in support of the endangered baseball team that read: "Don't think about the season, think about the history: 80 years."

"The feeling is one of shock," FC Barcelona pitcher and first baseman Jason Friedman, a Chicago native, told The Associated Press. "Until this point it felt very secure, we felt that baseball was important to the club.... It has been a real blow to us."

Barcelona has long prided itself on being "more than a club," partly by supporting sports teams other than soccer. But the heralded club is also deeply in debt.

It owes more than \$531 million and lost more than \$30 million last season, despite its soccer team winning the Champions League and Spanish league titles and implementing cost-control measures.

To tighten its belt further, the club plans to reduce the funding of its minority sports teams from 10 percent to 5 percent of its total budget over the next five years.

According to the club, Barcelona's minority sports ran a deficit of \$63.5 million last season. The largest losses came from the highly successful professional basketball, handball, indoor football and roller hockey teams. The club's amateur teamsfield hockey, volleyball, rugby,

skating, ice hockey and baseball – lost \$4.09 million.

"Barca can't continue to lose money," Barcelona vice president Javier Faus said Wednesday. "If (soccer player Javier) Mascherano takes a pay cut to come to play for Barca and if we almost lost Dani Alves, why shouldn't we ask the minority sports teams to make a sacrifice?"

It's still a difficult decision to accept for the club's 1,200 amateur

The soccer team has been allocated at least \$65 million, roughly the equivalent of the minority sports teams' deficit, to make one or two wheelchair basketball, athletics, big signings. The amateur athletes

say that their collective costs do not even reach half a percent of the total club budget.

The club's amateur teams, which until now competed throughout Spain, will be limited to the Catalonia region. Many will therefore have to compete in a lower division.

At least they're still playing. That won't be the case for baseball.

Friedman, who is in his third season with Barcelona, teaches English classes during the morning and arrives 90 minutes before practice along with his teammates to coach the kids that make up the club's five little league baseball teams, which will also be eliminated.

"Some of the things that the club

has been insinuating, like that these guys go back home each summer and play for the Yankees, is not the case," Friedman said. "These are very humble guys who represent Barca on the field.

"It is a real shame, especially from the stance that this was more than a club, being multi-sport and giving back to the community. Personally, the hardest part is that I think a lot of the kids are going to have to stop playing."

Barcelona said it would try to place as many kids as possible with

While baseball is largely ignored in the soccer-crazed country, it has been played in Spain as an organized sport since 1944 and has always had a dedicated - albeit low profile fan base in the industrialized Catalonia region. Presently, 10 teams play in Spain's top division.

"Baseball is a minority sport in Spain, but it has a lot of history," said Luis Melero, a spokesman for the Spanish baseball and softball federation. "Losing a team with the renown of Barca is very bad for Spanish and European baseball."

Barcelona's baseball team has won three Spanish championships and established itself as one of the top teams in Europe, winning backto-back continental championships in 2007 and '08.

At least the team has a chance to go out on a high note by winning its first Spanish league title since 1954. It currently sits atop the standings at 22-2 with 10 games to play.

"Our coach told us the biggest statement we can make is to win the championship," Friedman said, "and show what a good team we

Alabama passes tough illegal-immigration law

MONTGOMERY, Ala. – Alabama vaulted past Arizona on Thursday with what is being called the most restrictive law in the nation against illegal immigration, requir-

ing schools to find out if students are in the country lawfully and making it a crime to knowingly give an illegal immigrant a ride.

Advocacy groups promised to challenge the sweeping measure, legal immigration in this country," which like Arizona's law also allows police to arrest anyone suspected of being an illegal immigrant if the person is stopped for some other ing tirelessly to create the strongest reason. In addition, it requires all businesses to check the legal status

of workers using a federal system 120,000 illegal immigrants, a nearly called E-Verify.

"It is clearly unconstitutional. It's mean-spirited, racist, and we think a court will enjoin it," said Mary Bauer, legal director for the Southern Poverty Law Center.

It takes effect Sept. 1.

Republican Gov. Robert Bentley, who signed it into law on Thursday, expressed confidence it would withstand any legal challenges.

"We have a real problem with ilhe said. "I campaigned for the toughest immigration laws, and I'm proud of the Legislature for workimmigration bill in the country."



Scalia rips lawmakers as sleepy and lazy

Scalia has laid out an approach to the law over his quarter-century on the court that rests on the



meaning of the Constitution as it was understood by the people who wrote it and on the plain language of laws, not the legislative record that accompanies many bills. He also embraces the view that people should turn to their elected officials, not the courts, to solve many problems.

Commenting in a case involving cocaine sentences, Scalia wrote briefly to criticize one part of Justice Sonia Sotomayor's majority opinion that delved into legislative history. In particular, Scalia did not like that Sotomayor made reference to congressional testimony by a Yale medical school professor.

Scalia said the outcome of the case would be the same even if the professor "had not lectured an undetermined number of likely somnolent congressmen on the 'damaging effects of cocaine smoking on people in Pe-

In the other case, he dissented from the court's holding that upheld a longer sentence for a repeat offender whose earlier crimes included fleeing police custody in a vehicle.

The court has entertained several cases about what constitutes a violent felony under the Armed Career Criminal Act.

The federal law makes defendants eligible for longer prison terms if they have three prior convictions for crimes that are either violent felonies or serious drug offenses.

The problem is that while the law names some violent crimes, it also leaves open to interpretation whether other offenses should qualify.

Scalia said Thursday he has had enough of these kinds of cases, which he said result from imprecise criminal laws written by Congress.

"Fuzzy, leave-the-details-tobe-sorted-out-by-the-courts legislation is attractive to the congressman who wants credit for addressing a national problem but does not have the time (or perhaps the votes) to grapple with the nitty-gritty," Scalia wrote.

With one escape route, Syrians stream into Turkey

GUVECCI, Turkey - Syrian troops and heavy armor encircled a restive northern town on Thursday and hundreds of people fled through a single escape route across the lush Turkish border, sharply escalating the upheaval that threatens Syria's authoritarian regime.

The town of Jisr al-Shughour emptied as its residents crossed olive groves and traveled gravel roads, trying to get away from the tanks and elite forces surrounding them, a resident and activist said. Turkey's government, which opened its borders with Syria, said more than 2,000 people had crossed to the Guvecci area in the past day.

As more Syrians took up temporary residence in tents and with Turkish relatives, the uprising that targeted President Bashar Assad drew increasing scrutiny



In 1940, Italy declared war on France and Britain; Canada declared war on

In 1942, the Gestapo massacred 173 male resi-Lidice, of dents Czechoslovakia, in retaliation for the killing of a Nazi official.

In 1967, the Middle East War ended as Israel and Syria agreed to observe a United Nations-mediated cease-fire.

1971, President Richard M. Nixon lifted a two-decades-old trade embargo on China.

In 1985, socialite Claus von Bulow was acquitted by a jury in Providence, R.I., at his retrial on charges he'd tried to murder his heiress wife, Martha "Sunny" von Bulow.

In 1991, 11-year-old Jaycee Dugard of South Lake Tahoe, Calif. was abducted Phillip and Nancy Garrido; Jaycee was held by the couple for 18 years before she was found by authorities.

Ten years ago: The Supreme Court, without comment, turned down a request to allow the videotaping of Oklahoma Citv bomber Timothy McVeigh's execution, scheduled for the following day. The death toll from the flooding caused by the remnants of Tropical Storm Allison rose to 16 in Texas and Louisiana. Defending champion Gustavo Kuerten won his third French Open title, beating Alex Corretja 6-7 (3), 7-5, 6-2, 6-0.

Five years ago: Two Saudis and one Yemeni were found hanged at the Guantanamo Bay military prison, the first successful suicides at the base after dozens of attempts. Justine Henin-Hardenne won the French Open, beating Svetlana Kuznetsova 6-4, 6-4. Jazil cruised to victory, holding off Bluegrass Cat in the Belmont Stakes.

One year ago: Army Secretary John McHugh announced that an investigation had found that potentially hundreds of remains at Arlington National Cemetery were misidentified or misplaced. Nelson Mandela's 13-yearold great-granddaughter, Zenani Mandela, was killed in a car accident while on the way home from a concert in Soweto on the eve of the World Cup.
