Jerome Fire Department, **MVERT** issues still unresolved

Teams from Pocatello or Boise would need to be called if there ever is a hazmat incident

The Jerome Fire Department still has access to teams needed for hazardous materials emergencies, despite not participating in the Magic Valley Emergency Response Team.

The city's fire department, which recently ended its association with the team because of the fire chief's concerns about training and equipment safety, would call in a team from Pocatello or Boise for a hazmat incident in Jerome, Fire Chief Mike Hatfield

"Right now without the Magic Valley team, that's where our response would come from for the time being until this gets sorted out," he said, adding that the twohour lag in the response time isn't a concern and still meets requirements.

The city and regional response team are still trying to work out their differences. MVERT asked the Jerome City Council last week for help resolving the situ-

A work session is expected to take place later this month with both sides, though it hasn't been finalized yet.

"I foresee it will get resolved," Hatfield said, adding that MVERT would be his team of choice if all the issues are settled.

Local schools wrap up negotiations

T.F. teachers get more work days, potential for salary advancement

On Wednesday morning, Twin Falls School District trustees unanimously ratified next year's collective bargaining agreement between the school and its teachers.

Over the course of nine public meetings, which

lasted anywhere from two to six hours each, the Twin Falls Education Association and the school board wrote an agreement that defined the salary, benefits and leave time district educators will receive during the coming school year. The end result was a much smaller document compared to ones in the past, as education reforms signed into law this year limited the scope of negotiations. All other issues that were previously discussed in negotiations including working conditions and break times — will

Fireworks

The citizens' committee took over fireworks duty last vear from Southern Idaho Fireworks amid outcry that the former organizing and fundraising group proposed moving the display to Monday, July 5, in 2010 so it wouldn't land on a Sunday. Riding that wave, in which an observer at a Twin Falls City Council meeting waved a \$50 bill he touted as the first donation for a July 4 show, the new committee raised more than \$17,000 in nine days last

year. In that short burst of fundraising, the committee raised more cash than it had on hand Wednesday morning. This year, it had only raised about \$2,000 in new donations, had about \$5,100 rolled over from 2010 and an \$8,000 donation from the city of Twin Falls - \$15,000 total and \$20,000 short of its Monday goal.

The shortfall is made worse by the citizens' committee upping its fundraising goal by \$10,000 to include Jerome in the celebration. "I anticipated this (short-

fall) a little bit," Pierce said. "But I actually have been really surprised (at the shortfall) because there was a lot of passion related to the holiday, also. I mean, we had soldiers in Iraq and Afghanistan donating through PayPal" in The lack of passion this

year, without the turmoil of a potential July 5 show, contributed to the slow fundraising, officials said. Without a tight deadline for a Fourth of July show, some pledges told Pierce that time had simply gotten away from them. Others just needed to be asked or to find out the need, she said.

More fireworks Q&A

Will the fireworks show be canceled?

The Magic Valley Citizens' Fourth of July show is not canceled. though it is far behind its stated fundraising goal. The show is a combined effort between Jerome and Twin Falls fundraisers, and will be at the College of Southern Idaho.

Is the shortfall a result of fallout from last year's Fourth of July controversy?

All the organizers denied this and in 2010, the former fireworks organizers said they would be as supportive as possible.

Jerome County commissioners are considering a zoning ordinance change that would add commercial subdivisions to the county's regulations.

The county currently doesn't have an ordinance for commercial subdivisions.

The change would require a special use permit in commercial and commercial overlay zones and the city impact area along the frontage of U.S. Highway 25, U.S. Highway 93, and Interstate 84. Commercial subdivisions wouldn't be allowed in other zones.

The county has a public hearing on the matter scheduled for 9:30 a.m. June 28 in Room 300 of the Jerome County Courthouse, 300 N. Lincoln, Jerome.

The public can comment for up to five minutes per person.

Idaho couple's dream home turns into slithering nightmare

REXBURG - They slithered behind the walls at night and released foulsmelling musk into the drinking water. And they were so numerous that Ben Sessions once killed 42 in a single day.

Shortly after buying their dream home, Sessions and his wife discovered it was infested with thousands of garter snakes. For the next three months, their growing family lived as if in a horror movie. More than a year after they abandoned the property, the home briefly went back on the market, and they fear it could someday attract another unsuspecting buyer.

The five-bedroom house stands on nearly two pastoral acres in rural Idaho, about 125 miles southwest of Yellowstone National \$180,000, it seemed like a fall and winter. steal.

WASHINGTON — The arrival of nearly 100 freshmen did little to change the overall financial picture of Congress, financial disclosure reports showed Wednesday: On the whole, lawmakers are a wellheeled lot.

House Speaker John A. Boehner, R-Ohio, reported a net worth ranging from about \$2 million to \$6 million in 2010, much of it in blue-chip stocks.

Senate Majority Leader Harry Reid, D-Nev., reported net worth. Lawmakers do not on a private jet. a net worth of at least \$3.35 million.



Nobody's happy? Welcome to the world of emergency dispatch

orget bitter high school football and basketball rivalries: The nastiest disputes among neighboring communities of the Magic Valley in recent years have been over 911 emergency dis-

And now Blaine County and its cities are experiencing the same.

Blaine County's commissioners decided earlier this month to delay for at least a year a switch to a volumeof-service-based 911 funding method because cell phone calls are geographically hard to track. They instructed county employees to look for a better way.

Our view:

Can't we all just get along? Not when 911 emergency dispatch service is on the line.

As it stands, each city's share of the tab is allocated on the basis of the total number of parcels or addresses in each community.

Calls-for-service would be a good deal for Ketchum and Sun Valley; Hailey and Bellevue insist they couldn't afford it.

Exactly the same arguments have been heard throughout the 16-year history of the Southern Idaho Regional Communications Center, which serves Twin Falls, Jerome, Gooding and Lincoln counties. The city

of Twin Falls went its own way in 2003, partly over service concerns and administrative issues but largely because it disagreed with how much it was being charged.

Although Idaho law defines what's expected of cities and counties who agree to join forces on 911, emergency dispatch is basically a coalition of the willing. Since 1995, for example, the city of Hansen (population 1,051) has refused to pay its SIRCOMM assessment because emergency response is covered by the rest of SIRCOMM members.

So if Hailey — which has threatened to pull out of the consolidated emergency 911 dispatch center — is asked to pay substantially more than its current \$138,898 annual assessment, it probably will leave.

The only real clout that officials who run 911 systems have is a willingness to negotiate a better deal, as SIR-COMM's board has learned time and again.

So maybe Blaine County will come up with a more accurate system for tracking cell phone calls and figure out ways to compensate one jurisdiction's emergency responders who handle calls in another city.

Yet even if they do, emergency dispatch will be an issue for years to come.

Instead of unemployment benefits, offer a 'signing bonus'

ashington politicians are flailing for job-creation ideas like a drowning man lunging for a life preserver. President Obama probably remembers Ronald Reagan's setup and punch line: "A recession is when your neighbor loses his job. A depression is when you lose yours. And recovery is when Jimmy Carter loses his."

So it's no surprise that rumors of new payroll-tax cuts and dreams of a new infrastructure bank have followed the miserable jobs report released June 3.

Here's a simple idea to cut unemployment that won't cost the government any more money and won't require devaluing our currency: Turn unemployment benefits into a signing

Until the Great Recession, few economists could have imagined that the government would offer laid-off workers up to 99 weeks of jobless benefits, the maximum now allowed. Ninetynine is a very large number, and most likely the wrong number if you're trying to spark a recovery. And so, here we are with a 9.1 percent unemployment rate even higher when you count those millions of discouraged, marginalized Americans who've given up looking for work and are hoping to hang on to their sanity.

It's time to turn the joblessness machine into a jobs machine. By transforming unemployment benefits into a signing bonus, we can create new incentives to propel people back into the workplace sooner, rather than later. Too many Americans are sitting on the sidelines, waiting for the end of benefits or for a higherpaying job to come along. You can't blame them.

John Maynard Keynes pointed to the "sticky wages" problem. The laid-

off U.S. Steel worker who had earned \$60 an hour isn't eager to pack his lunchbox for a 25 percent pay cut. Eventually, unless his skills justify \$60 an hour, he will have to relent or retire permanently. This does no good for his mental health, and it damages the overall economy.

When you combine sticky wage expectations with 99 weeks of jobless benefits, pretty soon you've got a lot of depressed people sitting on their sofas watching daytime reality shows on the flat-panel TVs they bought on credit. You wind up with 2.1 million privatesector jobs created in the past 15 months, while actual hiring looks flat.

More than 6 million Americans have been out of work longer than six months, and the average span of joblessness is nearly 40 weeks and rising since last year, according to the Bureau of Labor Statistics. Unemployment benefits may have added between 0.4 and 1.7 percentage points to the jobless rate. even before benefits were extended to 99 weeks.

The federal government and the states must overhaul unemployment pay-

ments to prod people forward, not cushion them while they wait for the phone to ring. Here's my plan for structuring a better system to do that:

After 26 weeks of receiving benefits, a job-seeker would be eligible for a "signing bonus" equal to three additional months of benefits if he or she took a full-time job. It wouldn't matter whether the job paid more, less or the same as the worker's old one. We don't want the logistics mess of a "cash for clunkers" type of program, in which the government had to figure out which clunkers really clunked.

After 39 weeks, weekly benefits would expire, but the job-seeker would be eligible for a two-month signing bonus if he or she took a job. This bonus opportunity would expire after 52 weeks. This plan would create a

greater incentive to take a job after 26 weeks than after 39 weeks, and a huge incentive to go back to work before a year has passed. The longer one holds out, the less one gets.

While this proposal may sound harsh to some, since it would cut off weekly benefits at 39 weeks instead of

99, the signing bonus effectively would give the jobtaker 11 months of support. During the brutal recession of the early 1980s, which drove the jobless rate to 10.8 percent and bludgeoned factory workers with an uncompetitive dollar, benefits maxed out at 42 weeks.

Under my plan, the signing bonus would be available only as long as the national unemployment rate remains above 7.5 percent. This, too, creates urgency to get back into the workforce before the economy returns to normal.

Losing a job hurts deeply. For all the Dilbert cubicle jokes and television parodies such as "The Office," most Americans like to work and like their jobs. Gathering around a water cooler beats waiting around for the mailman to show up at the house. We want to feel that rush of dopamine when we face a new challenge at work. We need that forward momentum to be creative and to find some slivers of happiness in this crazy world.

And a signing bonus, like pro athletes and Wall Street guys get — albeit with fewer zeroes — could be a pretty nice push.

The knock on the door in the middle of the night

bet you didn't know that federal law enforcement officers representing the Department of Education can break down your front door if you are suspected of violating the law.

I was not aware of this until I heard what happened to Kenneth Wright of Stockton. Calif. On June 7, at 6 a.m., Wright was awakened by a knock on his door. According to his account, he came downstairs in his boxer shorts, but before he could reach the door, federal police officers stormed in. They were looking for his estranged wife, who was not in the house. Wright has no criminal record.

Wright told local TV station "News 10" he was grabbed by the neck and taken outside to his front lawn. He says officers then awakened his children, ages 3, 7

and 11, and put them in a Stockton patrol car while his house was searched. "They put me in handcuffs in that hot patrol car for six hours, traumatizing my kids," he

DOE spokesman Justin Hamilton told the TV station that federal agents with the Office of Inspector General served the search warrant. Hamilton would not say why the raid took place, but he said it was not because someone had defaulted on student loans, as some local media initially reported.

A statement from the OIG said: "The reasons for our

search warrant are currently under seal by the court and cannot be discussed publicly." The statement added: "OIG ... is responsible for the detection and prevention of waste, fraud, abuse and criminal activity involving Department of Education funds, programs and operations." If they were consistent, they'd be breaking down the doors of many failing public schools that are wasting taxpayer funds and allow especially poor and minority children out so they can choose better schools and have a brighter future.

Constitutional attorney John Whitehead, president of The Rutherford Institute in Charlottesville, Va., says the Stockton incident is one of a growing number of examples threatening the Fourth Amendment, which guarantees "the right of the

people to be secure in their persons, houses, papers, and effects, against unreasonable searches and seizures ..."

Whitehead says the passage of the U.S. Patriot Act "opened the door to other kinds of invasions" beyond the search for terrorist suspects. Worse, the courts are increasingly approving this cozy association between government and the police. "The problems inherent in these situations," he says, "are further compounded by the fact that SWAT teams are granted 'no-knock' warrants at high rates, such that the warrants themselves are rendered practically meaningless."

Two recent cases demonstrate the threat. In an 8-1 Supreme Court ruling last month (Kentucky v. King), Whitehead says the court "effectively decimated the

Fourth Amendment by giving police more leeway to break into homes or apartments without a warrant when in search of illegal drugs which they suspect might be destroyed if notice were given."

In the other ruling, the Indiana Supreme Court (Barnes v. State) said people do not have the right to resist police officers entering their homes illegally. Resistance, notes Whitehead, can be as simple as saying, "Wait, this is my home. What's this about?"

If governments are permitted to slowly erode the Fourth Amendment and the public won't resist, then not only that amendment, but others protecting speech, religion, the right to keep and bear arms and who knows what else could be in jeop-

Incidents like the one in Stockton should cause conservatives and liberals to be more vigilant about the encroaching power of government. If a gang of cops, acting on behalf of the Department of Education, can break down your door in possible violation of the Fourth Amendment, then none of us is safe.

The New York Times reports the FBI's approximately 14,000 agents are being given "significant new powers" that will allow them more freedom to search databases, examine your trash and use surveillance teams to scrutinize the lives of people who attract their attention.

We simply can't go on like this

ou really do have to wonder whether a few years from now we'll look back at the first decade of the 21st century - when food prices spiked, energy prices soared, world population surged, tornados plowed through cities, floods and droughts set records, populations were displaced and governments were threatened by the confluence of it all - and ask ourselves: What were we thinking? How did we not panic when the evidence was so obvious that we'd crossed some growth/climate/naturalresource/population redlines all at once?

"The only answer can be denial," argues Paul Gilding, the veteran Australian environmentalist-entrepreneur, who described this moment in a new book called The Great Disruption: Why the Climate Crisis Will Bring on the End of Shopping and the Birth of a New World. "When you are surrounded by something so big that requires you to change everything about the way you think and see the world, then denial is the natural response. But the longer we wait, the bigger the response required."

Gilding cites the work of the Global Footprint Network, an alliance of scientists, which calculates how many "planet Earths" we need to sustain our current growth rates. GFN measures how much land and water area we need to produce the resources we consume and absorb our waste, using prevailing technology. On the whole, says GFN, we are currently growing at a rate that is using up the Earth's resources far faster than they can be sustainably replenished, so we are eating into the future. Right now, global growth is using about 1.5 Earths.

This is not science fiction. This is what happens when our system of growth and the system of nature hit the wall at once. While in Yemen last year, I saw a tanker truck delivering water in the capital, Sana. Why? Because Sana could be the first big city in the world to run out of water, within a decade. That is

what happens when one generation in one country lives at 150 percent of sustainable capacity.

"If you cut down more trees than you grow, you run out of trees," writes Gilding. "If you put additional nitrogen into a water system, you change the type and quantity of life that water can support. If you thicken the Earth's CO2 blanket, the Earth gets warmer. If you do all these and many more things at once, you change the way the whole system of planet Earth behaves, with social, economic, and life support impacts. This is not speculation; this is high school science."

It is also current affairs. "In China's thousands of years of civilization, the conflict between humankind and nature has never been as serious as it is today," China's environment minister. "The depletion, deterioration and exhaustion of resources and the worsening ecological environment have become bottlenecks and grave impediments to the nation's economic and social development."

We're currently caught in a few short decades." two loops: One is that more population growth and more global warming together are pushing up food prices; rising food prices cause political instability in the Middle East, which leads to higher oil prices, which leads to higher food prices, which leads to more instability.

At the same time, improved productivity means fewer people are needed in every factory to produce more stuff. So if we want to have more jobs, we need more factories. More factories making more stuff make more global warming, and that is where the two loops meet.

But Gilding is actually an eco-optimist. As the impact of the imminent Great Disruption hits us, he says, "our response will be proportionally dramatic, mobilizing as we do in war. We will change at a scale and speed we can barely imagine today, completely transforming our economy, including our energy and

We will realize that the

consumer-driven growth model is broken and we have to move to a more happiness-driven growth model, based on people working less and owning less. "How many people," Gilding asks, "lie on their death bed and say, 'I wish I had worked harder or built more shareholder value,' and how many say, 'I wish I had gone to more ballgames, read more books to my kids, taken more walks?' To do that, you need a growth model based on giving people more time to enjoy life, but with less stuff."

Sounds utopian? Gilding insists he is a realist.

"We are heading for a crisis-driven choice," he says. "We either allow collapse to overtake us or develop a new sustainable economic model. We will choose the latter. We may be slow, but we're not stupid."



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



The term Big Blue has appeared in the press accounts since at least 1982. The "Big" refers to the global company's size, but there are several possible explanations for

The name may owe its origin to the IBM logo adopted in 1972. It depicts the three letters in bold horizontal stripes, often colored blue.

There also are suggestions that it is an allusion to the blue covers that IBM put on its mainframes in the 1960s or even the dark blue suits once worn by IBM's conservatively dressed salesmen.

Uncertainty hasn't deterred IBM Corp. from playing off the nickname. When the company put one of its computers up against Garry Kasparov in a chess match in 1997, IBM called the machine Deep Blue. More recently, it pushed frontiers in supercomputing with Blue Gene.







Severe spring weather leaves behind battered records – and Americans

WASHINGTON - It was a spring to remember, with America pummeled by torfloods, wildfire, nadoes. snowmelt, thunderstorms and drought.

Government weather researchers said Wednesday that, while similar extremes have occurred throughout modern American history, never before have they occurred in a single month.

The last time anything remotely looked like it was the spring of 1927, which also had a lot of tornadoes and flooding, said Harold Brooks of the Storm Prediction Center in Norman, Okla.

The tornado floods and drought during April were comparable to extreme events in the past, but never so close together. agreed Deke Arndt, chief of climate monitoring branch at the National Climatic Data Center in Asheville, N.C..

So far this year the United States has suffered eight disasters costing \$1 billion or more and the total damage to date is \$32 billion and rising, Karl said. If no more disasters occurred, 2011 would still rank in the top 25 percent of years for disaster costs, he said.



HANSEN - The Senator nuzzled a canvas knapsack, opening it with his large lips, trying to get to the food inside.

"You mooch," Chris Dickard said. "If there's any food to be found, he'll

The Senator isn't much inclined to politics, but the tan-colored Missouri Fox Trotter does like his snacks.

He also likes to walk the trails, which he did Friday afternoon with another tan-colored horse named Cotton.

Chris sat tall in the saddle on The Senator, while her husband, Jerry Dickard, rode Cotton. Another horse called Mr. T. so named because of the white "T" on his forehead, stayed behind at the trailer.

They started their ride at Wahlstrom Hollow and rode in about a 10-mile loop to Third Fork and Porcupine Springs before returning to the hollow.

With temperatures in the upper 60s, it was the perfect day to ride. They made it back to the trailer just in time: A few minutes later, gray clouds rolled across the otherwise blue sky, and a few minutes after that, rain drops began to fall.

"We come out as often as we can,"

The Dickards, who have been riding horses for as long as they can remember, own six horses on their ranch south of Kimberly.

Horses are a mainstay for the couple, who are members of different riding groups — the Thursday Sage Riders and the High Desert Backcountry Horse-

Chris meets Thursdays with the Sage Riders, who ride near the Cottonwood area south of Kimberly, and Jerry rides with the Horsemen's group.

Equestrian riders don't have as many South Hills. trail issues as off-road riders, but they haven't been exempt from them. There've been a lot of lobbying done by the groups for trail access, Jerry said. They work closely with the Bureau of Land Management and Forest Service, and often do trail maintenance.

The Dickards also helped found a therapeutic riding group that several times a week visits the Stargazer Ranch in Twin Falls, where children and adults with disabilities ride horses.

"It's been real successful," Jerry said. "But it takes a lot of volunteers. We have about 40 people, as far as clients go, and

Animals are just some of the things visitors can enjoy at the lake

RUPERT - In southern Idaho the occasional deer sighting is not uncommon. However, the wide variety of creatures and wild game that inhabit Lake Walcott State Park might surprise campers who haven't prepared for thieving raccoons and friendly porcupines.

"We've had instances where a raccoon will steal candy out of a kid's hand," said park ranger Travis Tay-

The park offers walking trails, horseshoe pits and gazebos, which are ideal for family reunions and barbecues. There are grills and throughout the park as well as playground equipment, basketball hoops and large grassy areas to keep kids, and adults that think they're kids, entertained.

The \$5 entrance fee for day use and \$10.60 for camping is worthwhile for those hoping to see a variety of native Idaho animals. The park is home to many birds including a great horned owl and a red-tailed come equipped with fire golf supplies. pits and grills.

Whatever your taste is for guns or game, Ruger fashions a Hawkeye to meet your needs.

Ruger's latest Hawkeye offers versatility, several improvements

egular readers of this column will notice that I have a definite prejudice toward Ruger firearms. I absolutely love the company's handguns, rifles and shotguns.

This affliction began in the early '60s when I started chasing cottontails and snowshoe rabbits in my native Maine. Through the years, a succession of .22LR and big-bore single-action pistols, .44 Magnum semiauto and lever-action carbines reliably took both large and small game from those impossibly thick spruce and cedar swamps and hardwood

Just before packing my bags for my move to the Wild West in 1975, I made a special trip to the Kittery Trading Post in the bordering state of New Hampshire. There I picked up a spanking new M77 chambered for the hot rod 7mm Remington Magnum. I'm proud to report that there has been an M77 or two in my gun rack ever

As much as I admire the original M77 and the improved M77 Mark II, I have to admit that since 2006, they have been suitably succeeded by the latest iteration in the prolific M77 bolt-action line: the Ruger Hawkeye.

Designed to fill a market niche between the bolt-ac-

tion sporters of Savage, Mar lin, Remington and Mossberg, and the higher end models marketed by Browning, Winchester, Remington, Weatherby and Sako, M77's have always provided a lot of bang for the buck.

Let's take a look at the latest evolution of the '77 de-

Whether fashioned from cast blue or stainless steel, the Hawkeye's action boasts the classic Mauser two-lug bolt, fixed ejector and large claw extractor — fail safe features favored by hardcore hunters everywhere. Boxed with each M77 are Ruger's proprietary scope rings. These hefty two-piece steel rings dovetail directly into slots milled in the rifle's re-

This practice negates the need for the weak link in the scope mounting equation separate bases. And the best part, the rings (a \$60-\$80 value) are included free.

Though it still falls short of the excellent mechanisms fitted to new Remington, **Browning and Winchester** rifles, the Hawkeye's LC6 trigger offers a noticeably

lighter and crisper pull than that of its oft criticized predecessor, the Mark II. Retained from the Mark II design, however, are the excellent receiver-mounted three position safety and patented floor plate latch.

Another change, which I truly appreciate as a big game hunter, is the substitution of a subdued matte finish to both the blued and stainless variants' metal work, in place of the Mark II's game-alerting high pol-

Perhaps the most noteworthy improvement involves the redesign of the Hawkeye's classically styled stock. Gone forever are the overly thick and squared forearm and pistol grip contours, replaced by the slimmer, rounder and more refined dimensions of its black synthetic or higher grade walnut stocks.

No matter whether you shoot from the left shoulder or right and pursue game from distant varmints to truculent Alaskan and African beasts, Ruger makes an affordable Hawkeye that will fit your needs.

Owner must have permission to stock private pond with fish

uestion: "I would like to put trout in a _pond on my proper ty. Are there any rules about stocking my pond with fish?"

Answer: Yes. Idaho law in part states, "No person shall establish and maintain a private park or pond on premises owned or leased by him and obtain, possess, transport, propagate, and process for his own personal pleasure and use only fish approved by the commission, ... in this state unless he has first obtained a permit from the director (of the Idaho Department of Fish and Game)."

Additional rules require private ponds to be "posted" in at least three locations. All water inlets and outflows must be screened to prevent fish from going into or out of the pond and the department must approve all fish species. No private ponds will be authorized "in or across any natural stream bed, lake or water course containing wild fish."

In simpler terms, the law requires you to license any pond on private property you want to stock with game fish.

The pond cannot be part of a natural stream or lake and must be posted to prevent trespass. Some kind of barrier must be installed so your fish don't escape and wild fish can't get in. And lastly, you are only allowed to stock fish species approved by the department.

Idaho fishing rules no longer apply in a licensed private pond. The fish in the pond are private property and are subject to rules of the pond owner. Holding



or raising fish in a private pond for monetary gain is unlawful. If the owner wishes to charge a fee for fishing, the pond should then be licensed with the Idaho Department of Agriculture as a commercial fish facility. Applications for private ponds require inspection by conservation officers to ensure compliance with the rules. Private pond permits are free of charge and last five years.

The department will only approve fish species that do not compete with wild populations and pose no disease risk. We request pond owners obtain "certified disease free" fish for their ponds to help maintain the health of their fish and reduce the risk of transmitting fish diseases to wild fish populations in nearby streams. For a list of certified disease-free commercial fish growers, contact the College of Southern Idaho's aquaculture program or the Idaho Aquaculture Association.

Requests for fish import ed from other states or species of concern must follow a strict application process. For example, species such as grass carp are often requested to reduce summer vegetation. A special request must be made for this exotic species. These fish must also have their genetic makeup certified as triploid so they are incapable of reproducing.

Most people purchase fish for their pond from local commercial fish growers. The commercial grower delivering the fish should verify a permit has been issued for a private pond before transporting and stocking any fish. Without this verification, the commercial grower risks a citation for an unlawful fish re-

lease. Fish and Game has stocked some private ponds. To do this we require a written agreement with the pond owner to allow public access for fish-

Having a licensed private pond is usually more complicated than "digging a hole, filling it with water and stocking it with fish." Water quality and quantity may not be sufficient to support the kind of fish you want. Moss and algae growth during the warm summer weather sometimes turns ponds into smelly mosquito factories. Low dissolved oxygen levels and high water temperatures are lethal to most fish. Winter kills are also common.

All these issues mean restocking on a regular basis. For technical assistance about water quality and species selection, you may contact Fish and Game, your county extension agent, the College of Southern Idaho's aquaculture program, or a commercial fish grower that is a member of the Idaho Aquaculture Association.

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

nswer: The Bankruptcy Code says that only debts that are properly identified on your schedules will be included in your bankruptcy discharge. The Federal Courts for the Ninth Circuit have carved out some exceptions, but the general rule is that in order for a debt to be discharged, it must be properly scheduled so that each creditor receives the necessary notices from the Bankruptcy Court. If you are not sure you can identify all your creditors and their assignees, you should get a credit report to help you. You are entitled to a free copy of your credit report from each of the three major creditreporting agencies. You can access your free report by logging on to annualcreditreport.com. This is a free service required by law; you can get one free report from each of the agencies one time each year.

But far too many young people in America grow up without their dads, and our families and communities are challenged as a result," President Barack Obama said Wednesday in calling for fathers to be more involved. Next Sunday is Father's Day.

Obama has often reminded Americans how his father left his family when the future president was a small child, describing a "hole in a child's life that no government

"Take Time to Be a Dad Today;" and the administration next week is expected to announce new support for local fatherhood programs.

The ads this year focus on Hispanic fathers and military dads sharing small moments with their children.

The Pew study, entitled "A Tale of Two Fathers," found sharp differences based on race and education. Black and Hispanic fathers were much more likely to have children out of wedlock, at 72 percent and 59 percent, respectively, compared to 37 percent for white men. Among fathers with at least a bachelor's degree, only 13 percent had children outside marriage, compared to 51 percent of those with high school diplomas and 65 percent of those who didn't finish high school.

Hackers say they hit CIA website

WASHINGTON (AP) - A group of hackers who breached the Senate computer system earlier this week claimed responsibility for problems with the CIA's website Wednesday. The group, known as Lulz

Security, tweeted "Tango down — CIA.gov," and there were difficulties throughout the early evening accessing the agency's website.

The computer mischief appeared to be targeting the CIA's public website, which does not include classified data and has no impact on the CIA's operation. CIA spokeswoman Marie Harf said the agency is looking into the reports.

It is sometimes difficult to tell if a website has been hacked, or if the claim alone drove so many people to the site that it crashed. Efforts to access the website were met with an error message long after the breach began, around 6 p.m. EDT.

Lulz has claimed credit for hacking into the systems of Sony and Nintendo and for defacing the PBS website after the public television broadcaster aired a documentary seen as critical of WikiLeaks founder Julian Assange.

On Monday, the group accessed a Senate server that supports the chamber's public website but did not breach other files, according to a Capitol Hill law enforcement official. The hackers said the release was a "just for kicks" attempt to help the government "fix their issues."

Senate Deputy Sergeantat-Arms Martina Bradford said in a statement that while the intrusion was inconvenient, it did not compromise the security of the Senate's network, members or staff.

Lulz Security claimed that it had added a Senate file to its list of successful, high-profile intrusions at a time when governments and corporations are on high guard for cyber intrusions.

The group has suggested it is trying to highlight cyber security weaknesses.



Police arrest 2 men near home of **Joss Stone**

LONDON (AP) - Two men have been arrested near Joss Stone's home on suspicion of conspiracy to rob and murder, after reportedly being found in a car with swords, rope, a body bag and plans of the soul singer's secluded house.

Stone said in a statement that she was "absolutely fine and getting on with life as normal" as police charged the men with conspiracy to commit robbery and conspiracy to commit grievous bodily harm.

Devon and Cornwall Police said Junior Bradshaw, 30, and Kevin Liverpool, 33, both from the Manchester area of northwest England, were arrested Monday morning near Stone's house in Cullompton, 175 miles southwest of London, after residents reported a suspicious-looking vehicle.

Detective Inspector Steve Parker said the men "had in their possession information relating to an individual in the Cullompton area and items which lead us to suspect that they may have intended to commit a criminal offense?"

The force would not confirm a report in The Sun newspaper that the men had swords, rope and a body bag, as well as maps and aerial photos of Stone's property.

Parker said it was "important to stress that no properties have been burgled and no individuals have been harmed."

Two police officers stood guard Wednesday outside the gates to the house. which is on a quiet country road.

Stone's London publicists, DWL, said the singer was aware of the arrests and was being kept up to date by

the police. They would not say whether 24-year-old Stone was at home when the men were arrested.

Experts say public should be wary of cancer warnings

You're sitting in a freshly drywalled house, drinking coffee from a plastic foam cup and talking on a cellphone. Which of these is

It might be the sitting, especially if you do that a

Despite all the recent news about possible cancer risks from cellphones, coffee, styrene, and formaldehyde in building materials, most of us probably face little if any danger from these things with ordinary use, health experts say. Inactivity and obesity may pose a greater cancer risk than chemicals for some people.

"We are being bombarded" with messages about the dangers posed by common things in our lives, yet most exposures "are not at a level that are going to cause cancer," said Dr. Len Lichtenfeld, the American parasites, and even some Cancer Society's deputy chief medical officer.

Linda Birnbaum agrees. She is a toxicologist who heads the government agency that just declared styrene, an ingredient in fiberglass boats and Styrofoam, a likely cancer risk.

"Let me put your mind at ease right away about Styrofoam," she said. Levels of styrene that leach from food containers "are hundreds if not thousands of times lower than have ocsetting," where the chemical in vapor form poses a styrene is not an issue," and exposure to it from riding in a boat "is infinitesimal," she

Carcinogens are things that can cause cancer, but that label doesn't mean that they will or that they pose a risk to anyone exposed to them in any amount at any

news because two groups that periodically convene something is a carcinogen issued new reports.

Last month, the International Agency for Research World Health Organization, said there is a possibility cellphones raise the risk of brain tumors.

"The operative word is 'possibility''' said Lichtenfeld, who among others has pointed out the thin evidence for this and the fact that cancer rates have not risen since cellphones came

Last week, the National Toxicology Program, part of the National Institute of Environmental Health Sciences - both of which Birnbaum heads - issued its report.

It adds to the list of known carcinogens formaldehyde, which is in building materials and some hair-straightening products, though Birnbaum said on-the-job exposure is the main concern. The list also adds a plant substance in some "natural" arthritis remedies, aristolochic acid. Six other things were dubbed "reasonably anticipated" to be carcinogens, including styrene and another herbal medicine ingredient, riddelliine.

Since 1971, the interna-

tional cancer agency has evaluated more than 900 substances. Just over 100 have been deemed carcinogens, 59 are called probable carcinogens, and 266 others are possible ones.

In this last category of most likely to be a cancer possibles - besides the electromagnetic from cellphones – are coffee, engine exhaust and talc-based body powder. Tale in its natural form may contain asbestos, though products sold for home use since the 1970s have been asbestos-free. Again, most risk is thought to involve occupational or unusual exposure to natural talc.

The evidence on coffee has gone back and forth for years, with no clear sign of danger and some suggestions of benefit.

However, known carcinogens include alcoholic beverages, estrogen treatments for menopause symptoms, birth control pills, certain viruses and drugs used to treat cancer, such as cyclophosphamide and tamoxifen.

"Most people would probably be shocked to see the number of things they interact with every day" on these lists, Lichtenfeld said.

Here's the problem: The agencies that pass judgment on a carcinogen don't regulate it or determine what levels or routes of exposure are a concern and for

It's human nature to fear risks we didn't choose, such as hazardous chemicals, more than those we did, such as lack of exercise, poor diets or smoking, he said.

"A risk that is imposed on us scares us more than a risk we take voluntarily," especially if it comes from companies we don't trust, Ropeik said.

Styrene is an example: The government says it is a component of tobacco smoke and that is the biggest way most people are exposed to it. Smoking, of course, is the most easily preventable cancer risk.

To minimize risk, people can take reasonable measures to avoid exposure to possibly harmful things, experts say.

"If you walk into a room you can smell formaldehyde, you probably want to vent the room before you spend a lot of time in it. That's just common sense," Birnbaum said.



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Arrests by Pakistan may include doctor who lived behind bin Laden

ISLAMABAD — The occupant of a large house about 100 yards behind the compound where U.S. special forces shot and killed Osama bin Laden may be among the people Pakistan has arrested for helping the CIA track the terrorist leader down.

U.S. and Pakistani officials acknowledged Wednesday that Pakistan has arrested several of its own citizens for helping the CIA spy on the house where bin Laden lived.

Officials declined to release the names of those being held. But the occupant of the house behind bin Laden's compound in Abbottabad, Pakistan, matches the description of one of the detainees, who one Pakistani official said had been a doctor in the army's medical corps.


The house's watchtowers would have provided a clear view of the walled compound where bin Laden is suspected of having lived for perhaps as long as five years. The humiliation it suffered as a result of nameplate outside the home identified the resident as Major Amir Aziz. Neighbors said he was a doc-

The Pakistan military, in a statement Wednesday, said no serving officer had been arrested; the name plate gave no indication of whether Major Aziz was serving or had monitored the bin Laden cial, those arrested may not have

have helped track bin Laden highlight the deep distrust that continues to plague relations between Washington and Islamabad, two anti-terror allies. Pakistan fears to spy on the bin Laden home. that the CIA has set up its own independent spy network in the country, a tactic apparently confirmed by the operation to eliminate bin Laden.

Washington is pressing Islamabad to urgently mount joint operations to strike at the remainder of al-Qaida in Pakistan, as the organization reels from the loss of its leader and the disclosure of a huge amount of data on its workings, gathered from the bin Laden compound.

White House defends legality of Libya mission

WASHINGTON – Defying congressional criticism, the White House insisted Wednesday that President Barack Obama has the authority to continue U.S. military action in Libya even without authorization from lawmakers on Capitol Hill.

In a detailed, 32-page report to Congress, the White House also put the cost of U.S. military operations and humanitarian assistance in Libya at about \$800 million, as of June 3, with the total increasing to \$1.1 billion by early September.

It was the first time the administration has publically detailed its legal rationale for continuing the Libya campaign without receiving congressional authorization within the 60-day window set in the War Powers Resolution. Officials argued that because the U.S. has a limited, supporting role in the NATO-led bombing campaign in Libya and American forces are not engaged in sustained fighting, the president is within his constitutional rights to direct the mission

"The president is of the view that the current U.S. military operations in Libya are consistent with the War Powers Resolution and do not under that law require further congressional authorization because U.S. military operations are distinct from the kind of "hostilities" contemplated by the resolution's 60-day termination provision.;" the White House said.

The administration's defense of the Libya mission comes in response to a nonbinding House resolution passed this month that chastised Obama for failing to provide a "compelling rationale" for U.S. involvement in Libya.

The resolution gave the administration until Friday to respond to a series of questions on the mission, including the scope of U.S. military activity, the cost of the mission and its impact on other U.S. wars in Iraq and Afghanistan.

But the report appeared to do little to quell congressional criticism. A spokesman for House Speaker John Boehner, R-Ohio, said the White House was using

additional questions.

Sen. Bob Corker, R-Tenn., who has introduced a resolution similar to the House measure, said he was amazed that the administration did not believe U.S. forces were facing "hostilities" in Libya, saying generals have told lawmakers otherwise in classified briefings.

"The way the administration handled this entire affair left people on both sides of the aisle very perplexed," said Corker, a member of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee.

Adding to the congressional pressure on Obama, a bipartisan group of 10 lawmakers on Wednesday sued the president for taking military action against Libya without war authorization from Congress. The lawmakers said Obama violated the Constitution in bypassing Congress and using international organizations like the United Nations and NATO to authorize military force.

While Obama did not seek congressional consent before ordering U.S. airstrikes against Moammar Gadhafi's forces nearly three months ago, the White House maintained that the president is not in violation of the War Powers Resolution. Boehner sent Obama a letter this week stating that the 90-day window runs out on Sun-

Previous presidents, Republicans and Democrats, have largely ignored the law, which was created as a check on their power to authorize military force.

While the U.S. led the initial airstrikes on Libya, NATO forces have since taken over the mission. The U.S still plays a significant support role that includes aerial refueling of warplanes and intelligence, surveillance and reconnaissance work. Obama has ruled out sending U.S. ground forces to Libya.

"U.S. operations do not involve sustained fighting or active exchanges of fire with hostile forces, nor do they involve the presence of U.S. ground troops, U.S. casualties or a serious threat thereof, or any significant chance of escalation into a conflict characterized by those factors," the report said.

Summer football helps in the fall

Pad crashes against pad. The football gets toted on the ground, or lobbed through the air. Teammates do the in-style flying body bump to celebrate

Just wait until it actually counts for six points.

This week in Twin Falls, a glut of teams has been scrimmaging and challenging its way through a rigorous week of summer football. It doesn't get them any points in August not directly, at least - but it does lay the groundwork for every touchdown, interception or sack that we'll see in 11 weeks' time.

These are the days teams get better. Coaches can have an idea of the best fit for certain players and positions within their roster, but you



never know how a 15-, 16-, 17year-old kid will respond to external competition.

Confidence in one's ability needs to be nurtured, and after that, trust in the team's collective talent must be forged. That's done through passing leagues, through full scrimmages, and through the pressure setting of 10-yard, four-to-score team challenges (a la high school over-

That's why this week is so important. This is the first,

last and only chance some of these teams will get an opportunity to test their players against unfamiliar opposition before the season begins in late August.

Most will get a jamboree, but not all will gain as much as they can from this week's set. At any preseason jamboree, teams like Oakley or Castleford would play against fellow eight-man teams.

Report: Football schools made more money

The latest NCAA annual report on revenue and expenses shows that 22 Football Bowl Subdivision schools made money in 2009-10, eight more than the previous year, and that schools in both Division I football subdivisions have figured out how to halt a rapid increase in expenses.

The report was released Wednesday, two days after NCAA President Mark Emmert announced he would hold a retreat later this summer to discuss the fiscal sustainability of athletic departments with about 50 university leaders.

The report isn't all good news for the schools.

Emmert is concerned the balance in findings show: college sports could be jeopardized by a growing gap between schools with self-sufficient athletic departments and those that rely on school subsidies to fund sports programs.

"That gap in revenue, either from self-generated or institutionally allocated sources, is significant," Emmert said in a statement posted on the

A scenic Pioneer League baseball road trip

MISSOULA, Mont. -Eight baseball games, eight different ballparks, eight days. We would have seen eight home-team wins, but the Missoula Osprey blew the ninth-inning lead in the trip open-

A motorcycle tour last summer through the stadiums of the Pioneer League took me and my dad through some of the most beautiful parts of Montana, Idaho, Wyoming and Utah, with some of the parks offering spectacular mountain range views. Catching games in all eight places makes a great theme for a summer road trip through the region, where nearby attractions include Yellowstone and the Grand

The league has a Rookie classification, the lowest class of the minor league farm systems, with many players right out of high school. A number of famous ballplayers started in the league, including George Brett, Jeff Cirillo, Andre Dawson, Sid Fernandez, Cecil Fielder, Andres Galarraga, Eric Karros, Pedro Martinez, Raul Mondesi, Gary Sheffield and Ryne

The league dates to 1939, though games were suspended during World War II. The current eight teams are broken into two divisions. The four Montana teams, the Missoula Osprey, Helena Brewers, Great Falls Voyagers and Billings Mustangs, make up the North Division. The South Division stretches from Idaho, with the Idaho Falls Chukars, to Wyoming, with the Casper Ghosts, and down to Utah, with the Orem Owlz and Ogden

It's a split-season format with the division winners in the first and second halves of the season making the playoffs. In 2010, the Helena Brewers won the league champi-

Our first game was in downtown Missoula, next to the Clark Fork River. The stadium opened in 2004 and features an osprey mascot. We even saw a real osprey nest on a pole just outside the right-center field wall.

We quickly noticed the small town, family-friendly environment. As we were parking our motorcycles just outside of the fee lot, an employee came over and invited us to use free motorcycle parking near the front gate.

It was a Saturday night and the stands were nearly full. A promotion that night gave away Osprey Snuggies to the first 750 fans (announced attendance was 2,841).

night home game. (The ballpark also hosts other events, including this year, on Aug. 2, when the team's away, an appearance by Willie Nelson and Lyle Lovett.)

The following day, we saw the winning walk-off hit. Helena Brewers (affiliated with the Milwaukee Brewers). Helena has the smallest market and the oldest stadium in the league. A half-hour before the first pitch, I counted 32 people in the stands, though more fans eventually arrived for the Sunday afternoon game. The park offers a weekend promotion of four tickets, four hotdogs and four sodas for \$25, and kids 13 and under get to run the bases after Sunday games.

It was a beautiful ride from Missoula, over MacDonald Pass in the Rockies, as we headed south toward Butte.

Idaho Falls has the longest continuous team (since 1976) in the Pioneer League. The Chukars are named for a partridge-like bird and their ballpark, Melaleuca Field, built in 2007, is next to Highland Park and the Snake River. Fans can use a hot tub on the right field line for an additional fee.

The Monday night announced attendance of 3,720 was the biggest crowd of the trip, fueled by free general admission tickets from a local credit union.

The next day we rode the most scenic parts of the trip, from Idaho Falls to Casper. Or maybe I should say from Idaho Falls to just outside of Jackson, Wyo. The route takes you right near Grand Teton National Park, with Yellowstone nearby. After that, though, we hit central Wyoming, which doesn't offer much to write home about except for the courage and fortitude of highway construction workers.

The stadium for the Casper Ghosts features a pale ale on tap called the Boo Brew made by the Grand Teton Brewing Company, which also makes root beer. We visited the brewery earlier in the day, in Victor.

Casper also offered the best beverage deal of our trip. During the game, a player from the opposite team was designated as the "brew guy," and after the home team struck him out in the fourth inning, beers were \$2 for the next 10 min-

But there was no beer available at our next stop, in Orem. Games there are held on the Utah Valley University campus, where alcohol is prohibited under state law. Obviously, that made it the most fami-

Orem is south of Salt Lake City, near Provo. The views from the stadium of the Wasatch Mountain Range and Utah Lake were beautiful, but something was missing from the baseball experience – drunken fans yelling at the um-

The umpires travel in two-man crews, and just like the players, they are in the early stages of their professional careers.

Players often say that life on the road in the minor leagues is not easy. A local article I read said the Orem Owlz arrived at 7 a.m. after an overnight bus ride from Mon-

Perhaps the Owlz know some travel secrets the other teams don't. They won the league's 2009 title, which gave them four championships in six years.

Another scenic riding highlight of the trip was traveling north 110 miles to Ogden. We rode on the eastern side of the mountains in-

After traveling near Park City earlier in the day, it was only fitting that the foul poles at the Ogden park were sponsored by a couple of ski brands – Salomon and Atomic. Here, too, the Wasatch Mountain Range offers a magnificent backdrop to the stadium.

with 91,551, Missoula at 87,345, Orem with 81,229, Great Falls at 66,106, Casper at 57,120, and Helena with 32,723, for a league season attendance total of 650,389. The numbers were down from 2009, likely due to the weak economy. Still, ticket prices for Pioneer League games are a bargain compared to Major League games or even the movies: adult tickets average \$6.13, kids \$5.06, according to Steve Densa, who handles communications for Minor League

The entrance to Lindquist Field says "Welcome to Dodgertown, Utah." The team is a farm team for the Los Angeles Dodgers.

Many fans feel a connection to their teams' affiliates. They track the players through the minors and applaud when winning scores are announced for the farm teams.

The next night in Billings, the players wore Cincinnati Reds jerseys. The Billings-Reds partnership began in 1974.

Dehler Park opened in 2008, and is the only ballpark in the league where fans can walk around the entire park without leaving the gates. There are no obstructed seats, and fans can watch the live game while waiting in concession stand lines.

That night fans were treated to a walk-off double to complete a comeback.

We ended our trip in Great Falls at Centene Stadium watching the Voyagers, affiliated with the Chicago White Sox. Great Falls was a stop on the Lewis and Clark Expedition of 1805, but local lore also includes stead of the more direct route on a 20th century tale, memorialized the western side, through Salt Lake in a team logo of a baseball on a spinning planet. Not this year.





In what could charitably be called a pre-emptive strike on the game's most buttoned-down event, Ben Crane and pals Rickie Fowler, Bubba Watson and Hunter Mahan released their sendup of a boy-band video titled "Oh Oh Oh" earlier this week poking fun at everything from how players dress to the exaggerated manners on display from tee to green.

To celebrate the launch, Crane, the band's leader and chief provocateur, arrived for the tournament's final practice session turned out in pink accents from the tip of his cap down to his saddle shoes.

show's over-40 hosts, gave the video a hearty thumbs up. In this era of Twitter and social networking, younger fans expect to see the curtain

pulled back on just about every endeavor, including golf. As Crane made his way from the range to the first tee, fans called out "loved the video" on either side of him. He politely said thanks and squelched any talk about the video transforming him into the game's version of a rock

"Just a golfer," he said pausing. "A golfer who likes

to enjoy himself." If the blue blazers who run the U.S. Golf Association had any problem with the video, they held their tongues during the organization's annual "State of the Game" news conference. The PGA Tour, on the other hand, is in the business of merchandising their golfers, which might explain why the video was prominently posted on its website.

Crane made no apologies, saying the timing was intentional.

"We planned it for this week. Everybody is excited about golf this week," he said. "I thought the timing was good."

If Limbaugh's inbox and voicemail count is any indication, Crane is spot on. "I think genuine interest -

this is interesting to me - ishow many people are crying for more. Just that simple statement: We need more of this in golf. If there's a constant theme, that's the theme I'm hearing.... "I think fans are dying to

Defending champ Serena seeded 7th at Wimbledon

WIMBLEDON, England combined for the past eight (AP) — Defending champion titles at the All England Club. Williams Serena was bumped up to No. 7 in the Wimbledon seedings – 19 places above her world ranking – on Wednesday, a position that will allow her to avoid playing the highestranked players until at least the quarterfinals.

Williams won her 13th Grand Slam title last year at the All England Club, but stepped on broken glass and needed two foot surgeries. She later had blood clots on her lungs, and missed nearly a year of competition.

She returned on Tuesday at Eastbourne, coming back from a set down to defeat Tsvetana Pironkova 1-6, 6-3, 6-4, but lost Wednesday to top-seeded Vera Zvonareva 3-6, 7-6 (5), 7-5 in the second round.

She was originally seeded No. 8, but the withdrawal of second-seeded Kim Clijsters moved the rest of the field up one spot.

"Listen, I don't ask for much. I would have been going to be in there fighting for every point and for everyseeded. I'm just going to give it 200 percent like everyone else in the draw." Wimbledon starts Mon-

day. The draw is scheduled for Friday.

On the men's side, defending champion Rafael Nadal was seeded No. 1, followed by Novak Djokovic at No. 2, Roger Federer at No. 3 and Andy Murray at No. 4 - inline with their rankings.

Federer and Nadal have

For Federer, it's the first time he's been outside the top two seedings at Wimbledon since 2003, the year he won the first of five straight titles at the grass-court Grand Slam.

Since her injury, Williams has dropped to No. 26 in the WTA rankings. If Wimbledon organizers had seeded her according to her ranking, the four-time Wimbledon champion could have come up against a top player in the third round.

Her sister Venus, a fivetime Wimbledon champion, was seeded No. 24. She has dropped to 33rd in the rankings since missing most of this season with a hip injury. She also returned to action this week with two wins at Eastbourne.

"The seeding order follows the WTA ranking list, except where in the opinion of the committee, a change is necessary to produce a balanced draw," Wimbledon organizers said. "The only changes happy with 25, because I'm this year are Serena Williams and Venus Williams moving to 8 and 24, respectively. This thing," Williams said. 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



THE ACES ON BRIDGE®

Bobby Wolff

"When we are planning for posterity, we ought to remember that virtue is not hereditary."

We all suspect that the true expert will always follow a line that results in a squeeze rather than take the pedestrian 50 percent chance. Certainly, a good player will know when an a priori 50-50 chance has been reduced by the bidding or play to a much less attractive probability.

Consider the play in today's six spades on a heart lead. (By th way, North's jump to five spades asked his partner to bid slam with a heart control. Declarer puts in the jack, losing to the king (and yes, if East intends to shift, he should win the first trick with a deceptive heart ace). East duly switches to the diamond 10 at trick two. Declarer wins dummy's king, cashes the top spades, then takes the two remaining high diamonds. This discloses that East began with two diamonds and one spade, and since West would have led the top of a doubleton heart, that East has six hearts. So East began with four clubs and West has just two clubs, making the club finesse irrelevant.

Declarer now simply plays off two more trumps, pitching clubs from the table to reduce to a fourcard ending. East is down to the guarded heart king and three clubs. If he throws a heart away, declarer cashes the club king, ruffs a heart, and dummy is high. If he pitches a club, declarer takes both top clubs and ruffs a heart to score his club jack at trick 13.

Here, your partner rates to have exactly four spades and approximately invitational values. While you could bid two no-trump, you can see the danger in the heart suit. Better is a simple call of three clubs.

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
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
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
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
