Obama details troop **pullout**

President Barack Obama says 10,000 troops will come home from Afghanistan by the end of this year as the U.S. mission shifts from combat to support after nearly 10 years of war. The president said a total of 33,000 troops would be withdrawn by next summer, as he announced what he called "the beginning but not the end of our effort to wind down this war." What are the details of the short-term troop withdrawal?

Obama said he will withdraw 10,000 troops by the end of this year, with another 23,000 out by September of next year at the latest. That would end the surge of 33,000 troops he announced in December 2009, and leave about 68,000 U.S. troops there.




A new role

Hot, but not for long

Summer heat reaches Twin Falls, but temps should level off

Blistering high temperatures have been a rare treat in Twin Falls for these first days of summer. After weeks of dreary skies and intermittent rain. Twin Falls is finally experiencing a much-needed heat wave.

However, the delayed snowmelt in higher mountain regions around the state has also raised river levels. The *Times-News* talked to Valerie Mills, a meteorologist for the National Weather Service, about how long this warm

What are the long term plans for a U.S. presence in Afghanistan?

Obama will meet with NATO allies next May in Chicago to plot the final drawdown of those and other allied troops by 2014, when they hope Afghan forces will be able to guard against any comeback by al-Qaida terrorists or the Taliban regime that had protected them.

Where do Obama's plans fall within the political spectrum?

After weeks of internal debates, Obama settled on a middle-of-the-road approach between the military's recommendations of a slower drawdown and the push for a faster withdrawal coming from members of both major political parties, including Vice President Joe Biden and Sen. SHOSHONE - Shoshone pedestrians will become more visible after Tuesday's City Council meeting.

Councilman Mike Wallace asked city staff to consider adding flags for residents crossing the street at the intersection of Apple Street and U.S. Highway 26.

"Just from a personal side of it, I'd like to address it," Wallace said. "I don't think flags are too expensive."

Wallace said the glare from the sun has made pedestrians, especially children walking to the movie theater and pool, difficult for drivers to see.

Barring accessibility issues, constructing flags and dirt to a paved street and stands for the four crossing points would be feasible, said City Maintenance Supervisor Aaron Aggeler.

Jerome City Council takes first steps to change speed zones

JEROME – The Jerome City Council met Tuesday to discuss changes to the city's speed zones along South Lincoln Avenue and its requirements of the Heritage Academy public charter school before it opens in the fall.

The council voted unanstudy to be done on South Lincoln this month. Members will have to wait until their next meeting, July 5, to actually make changes to the speed zones.

"I am a big supporter of this," said Councilman Chris Barber.

The proposed speed zones would affect the area of South Lincoln north of Interstate 84. The area that is currently 45 mph would be reduced to 35 mph, while the current 35 mph zone farther north would be limited to 25 mph.

The improvements include removing outdated lockers that create a fire hazard, installing fire doors, making fire extinguishers visible and installing a fire suppression system, some of which have already been completed.

The council also voted to increase city sewer rates as discussed at a May 3 public hearing. The new rates will offset the city's increased operating costs. There will now be a base rate of \$4.83 per month per residential user, plus a service charge be made to the former determined by the amount of water used. 

Burley vs. Cassia standoff over policing has wider implications

assia County commissioners on Monday wisely took the first step toward finding a mediator to help the county and the city of Burley sort out their impasse over how much the city should pay the county for law enforcement services.

The partnership, which has existed since 1986, is threatening to come apart after months of negotiations haven't yielded a number both sides can live with. And what eventually happens in Burley could influence decisions about law enforcement that communities in Twin Falls, Gooding and Lincoln counties must make in the months to come.

In this area, the Cassia-Burley contract is widely viewed as a model for consolidated law enforcement. Although not trouble-free, the fact that the partnership has endured for a quarter-century is remarkable by Idaho standards.

It's testament to two generations of Cassia and Burley elected officials who've recognized that the

public benefits when neighboring governments can successfully navigate the shoals of parochial self-interest.

Sharing law enforcement resources hasn't worked nearly as well elsewhere in southern Idaho, but new economic realities are forcing small towns to revisit the idea.

In an era when cities must make do with less, does it make sense anymore for Hagerman to try to support a

one-person police force or for Wendell to subsidize a three-man operation? Would they be better off contracting with Gooding County?

Of the 35 incorporated cities of south-central Idaho, 21 – Acequia, Albion, Bellevue, Bliss, Burley, Carey, Castleford, Declo, Dietrich, Eden, Fairfield, Glenns Ferry, Hazelton, Hollister, Ketchum, Malta, Minidoka, Murtaugh, Oakley, Paul, Richfield - contract all or some law enforcement services with their counties. In general, it's worked out well for those communities. In many cases, crime rates in county jurisdictions are lower than in comparably sized cities with their own police departments, according to statistics taken from the Idaho State Police's Crime in Idaho report. Still, yielding independence carries a price. In many cities that have given up their own police forces, the complaints are the same as Burley's: slow response times, not enough sworn officers or vehicles, and nagging impression that the city's taxes are contributing more to county law enforcement than what the community is getting back. But however rankled citizens of those communities may get, there are really a dwindling number of options. It would be prohibitively costly for Burley to start from scratch with its own police department, and as taxpayer dollars available for law enforcement dwindle it's simply not going to be feasible for some cities with police departments to keep them. Yet for south-central Idaho communities with middle-sized police departments - Hailey, Jerome and Rupert, for example - there are lessons to be learned from the Burley-Cassia impasse over law enforcement. All three of those agencies work closely with their county sheriff's offices, which are located in their communities. Should those police departments keep their separate identities? Can they afford to?


used to know what people were talking about when they called for a "grand bargain" on the deficit: Democrats would give in on spending cuts, and Republicans would give in on tax increases. Today, we're on the verge of a couple of grand bargains. But whatever the Republicans are giving in on, it isn't taxes.



The first grand bargain will come by August, when the clock strikes midnight on the debt ceiling. Insiders in both parties think they have a good sense of what that deal will include: about \$2 trillion in deficit reduction over the next 10 years, almost all of it from spending cuts, plus an agreement on a budget path for the next decade and a policy that makes deep. automatic cuts if we're not hitting our deficit-reduction targets by 2014. But what's the bargain here? Democrats give in on spending cuts and Republicans give in on not destroying the nation's credit?

The second deal will come in 2012, when the Bush tax cuts are set to expire. The tax cuts, which cost \$2 trillion over the past decade and will cost an additional \$4 trillion over the next decade, have done more than any policy initiative in the past decade to turn the surpluses of the '90s to the deficits we face today.

But we're not going to let them expire. The Republican Party wants to extend all of the Bush tax cuts and the Obama administration wants to extend most of them – the exception being the cuts for income over \$250,000. If all goes as the Democrats hope – and when does that happen? - the bargain here will be that they'll agree to make more than \$3 trillion in tax cuts

That's true. But it's created

American politics: There's never a good enough reason for the Democrats to say no, or for the Republicans to say yes. And letting that dynamic persist is not responsible either. Eventually, this White House has to figure out how to make Republicans say yes.

The administration often feels unfairly criticized by observers who demand that it get things done and then assail the compromises necessary to getting things done. Sometimes, it's true the naysayers are being unrealistic. Health-care reform would not have passed with the public option, and there were never anywhere near the votes needed to break up the big banks. When both sides don't want to get to "yes," the White House often has little leverage.

But that excuse is overused at 1600 Pennsylvania Ave. Sometimes, the two sides do need to get to "yes." That was the case with the 2010 expiration of the Bush tax cuts, and the White House negotiated a substantial round of stimulus in return for a temporary extension of the tax cuts.

It's also the case now. almost as much as Democrats do. The GOP's leadership does not want an economic catastrophe, and they need a deficit deal that

lets them move past Paul Ryan's unpopular budget proposal.

Democrats are still likely to end up with a deal they don't really like, but they should at least hold fast to some bottom lines. First, no enforcement mechanism that isn't equally divided between automatic spending cuts and automatic tax increases. Both parties need a reason to return to the table.

Second, if the GOP won't budge on raising taxes in this deal, then they need to budge on cutting taxes to provide the economy with more stimulus: The payroll cut they agreed to in 2010 should be kept for another year, and extended to employers as well as employees. And finally the expiration of the Bush tax cuts is the administration's only real shot to make revenue a serious part of the deficit solution. Extending everything in 2012 but the breaks for the very rich isn't good enough.

Will the political team like arguing for some taxes on some people who aren't clearly rich in an election year? Will the economic team like saying "no" with the nation's credit rating hanging in the balance? Of course not. But taking risks is part of being responsible, too.

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How to end the football deadlock

t will be bad for America if there is no NFL football in the fall.

Cancellation of the 2011 National Football League season would not only disappoint the sport's many fans and disrupt the social rituals (tailgating, Super Bowl parties) that surround the game; it would also have serious economic consequences.

Edgeworth Economics, a consulting firm, studied the cost of a canceled 2011 season (at the request of the players association) and estimated it to be about \$5 billion from lost jobs, decreased spending at local businesses and reduced tax revenue. In addition, billions of dollars in TV revenue and millions of dollars in ticket sales would vanish

With this much at stake, the country should not sit back and wait for the players and owners to reach an agreement on their own. Congress can – and should - intervene to force a resolution of the dispute.

Congress has considerable leverage over the NFL because it grants the league an antitrust exemption without which it could not oper-



ate as it currently does. The joint agreements among teams on matters like free agency and revenue sharing, as well as the league's single national TV deal, would otherwise run afoul of federal antitrust laws, which prohibit businesses (in this case, individual teams) from making deals that reduce competition.

To ensure an agreement between the owners and players in time for the 2011 season, Congress should place a special condition on the continuation of the NFL's antitrust exemption: the owners and players must abide by a settlement procedure known as last-bestoffer arbitration. This procedure would require the two sides to negotiate; if an agreement is not reached, each side would make its last best offer and an arbitrator would choose between the two. This arrangement creates an incentive for each side to make the more reasonable offer, lest the arbitrator pick the other side's.

Skeptics will note that in the past, Congress has been unwilling to use its leverage to compel the NF to alter unpopular or controversial practices. When the Philadelphia Eagles threat ened to move to Phoenix in the early 1980s, I introduced legislation that would have made the antitrust exemption conditional on the league's prohibiting such moves if the team was financially successful (as the Eagles were). That legislation did not pass.

Similarly, in the '90s, when several professional football and baseball teams threat ened to move in order to pressure cities to pay for stadium construction costs, I introduced legislation that would have made the antitrust exemption conditional on having the NFL and Major League Baseball (which has a similar exemption) pay three-quarters of such construction costs. Again, the legislation was opposed by lobbyists and did not pass.

But the political climate today is much more conducive to congressional action than past efforts to deal with local issues like franchise moves and stadium construction costs. The prospect of a lost NFL season has upset fans across the country, not least because the league has never generated more revenue or been more popular than it was last year.

There is already a starting point for the legislation I am proposing. A bill introduced in March by Rep. John Convers Jr., Democrat of Michigan, aims to strip the antitrust exemption from the NFL because the league, according to the bill, "acted in bad faith" by negotiating broadcast contracts that guaranteed it would be paid even in the event of a lockout.

This is a good moment for Congress to act. Gridlock on other issues has left the House and the Senate with time to spare. And even the mere threat of such legislation might induce a settlement.

The right way to shrink prisons

ROVO, Utah - Last month the Supreme Court ordered California to reduce its prison population after finding that the state's penal system was so overcrowded that it constituted cruel and unusual punishment. What the court didn't do, however, was provide any guidance about how to do it, giving rise to fears of violent convicts being set free and increasing crime rates.

Rather than seek major criminal justice reforms to reduce the prisoner numbers, including scrapping California's harsh "three strikes" sentencing laws, Gov. Jerry Brown has proposed simply moving the surplus state prisoners to county jails. This does nothing to reduce California's disproportionately high incarceration rates and could just transfer the overcrowding to local jails.



lasting solution to overcrowding, one that gets to the heart of exploding inmate populations nationwide: reform the rules governing pretrial detention, in part by using formulas to help judges better determine which defendants are unlikely to commit crimes while on bail. Doing so not only would make the system more fair, but also would significantly reduce the number of people who are unnecessarily jailed and even reduce crime rates.

Every year America spends close to \$66 billion to keep people behind bars. But almost 500,000 of the 2.3 million prisoners aren't con-Fortunately, there is a more victs; rather, they are accused ever, have begun to think

individuals awaiting trial.

While some defendants are able to pay their bail and go free, most cannot, because many judges, lacking firm insight into what types of prisoners are too dangerous to release, set high bail amounts knowing the accused can't afford them. Though some of these defendants will eventually be found not guilty and go free, keeping them incarcerated before their trials creates a burden on the prison system.

What's more, detention begets more detention. Defendants detained before trial are more likely to be convicted if they go to trial, more likely to receive prison sentences rather than probation when sentenced, and, given their weak bargaining power with prosecutors while locked up, are more likely to have longer sentences.

outside the prison cell. In line simply on a gut feeling. with recommendations endorsed by the American Bar Association, Miami-Dade County cut costs associated with detention by supervising defendants outside jail at a total cost of around \$400 per defendant per year, compared with \$20,000 for incarcerated defendants. In Iowa, alternatives to pretrial detention saved the state's Southern District \$1.7 million in 2009.

These and other jurisdictions have also cut costs using technology, like GPS trackers and ankle bracelets, that allow defendants to remain at home - with supervision – while awaiting trial. True, while these solutions

may make sense from a budgetary standpoint, critics worry that increasing pretrial releases will present a threat to public safety, especially since judges are typically left to make bail decisions based

The risk of release can be largely reduced by arming judges with more data to inform their decisions. Frank McIntyre, an economist, and I recently examined data from over 100,000 felony defendants over a 15-year period, and we found very clear trends regarding which defendants are more likely to commit crimes while free on bail.

For example, judges often detain too many older defendants (people over 30). defendants with clean records and defendants charged with fraud or public order offenses - in other words, people who are less likely to commit crimes while out on bail. On the other hand, judges release too many young defendants with extensive records, people who are more likely to break the law while awaiting trial.

This data could be used to

create a set of guidelines that would give judges a better sense of which defendants to release. Of course, judges must use individual discretion and carefully consider local data with pretrial detention decisions. However, our models indicate that such guidelines could safely lead to the release of up to 25 percent more defendants - and a significant reduction in prison costs and crime rates.

Given eye-popping local, state and federal deficits, it's unlikely that California will be the only state to face the tough choices involved in reducing its prison population. With the right data on pretrial defendants, though, judges can help make that task a lot easier.

What the Internet thinks it knows

nce upon a time, the story goes, we lived in a broadcast society. In that dusty pre-Internet age, the tools for sharing information weren't widely available. If you wanted to share your thoughts with the masses, you had to own a printing press or a chunk of the airwaves, or have access to someone who did. Controlling the flow of information was an elite class of editors, producers and media moguls who decided what people would see and hear about the world. They were the Gatekeepers.

Then came the Internet, which made it possible to communicate with millions of people at little or no cost. Suddenly anyone with an Internet connection could share ideas with the whole world. A new era of democratized news media dawned.

It's a beautiful story about the revolutionary power of the medium, and as an early practitioner of online politics, I told it to describe what we did at MoveOn.org. But I'm



increasingly convinced that we've got the ending wrong perhaps dangerously wrong. There is a new group of gatekeepers in town, and this time, they're not people, they're code.

Today's Internet giants -Google, Facebook, Yahoo and Microsoft - see the remarkable rise of available information as an opportunity. If they can provide services that sift through the data and supply us with the most personally relevant and appealing results, they'll get the most users and the most ad views. As a result, they're racing to offer personalized filters that show us the Internet that they think we want to see. These filters, in effect, control and limit the information that reaches our screens.

By now, we're familiar with

ads that follow us around online based on our recent clicks on commercial Web sites. But increasingly, and nearly invisibly, our searches for information are being personalized too. Two people who each search on Google for "Egypt" may get significantly different results, based on their past clicks. Both Yahoo News and Google News make adjust ments to their home pages for each individual visitor.

All of this is fairly harmless when information about consumer products is filtered into and out of your personal universe. But when personalization affects not just what you buy but how you think, different issues arise. Democracy depends on the citizen's ability to engage with multiple viewpoints; the Internet limits such engagement when it offers up only information that reflects your already established point of view. While it's sometimes convenient to see only what you want to see. it's critical at other times that you see things that you don't. Like the old gatekeepers,

the engineers who write the new gatekeeping code have enormous power to determine what we know about the world. But unlike the best of the old gatekeepers, they don't see themselves as keepers of the public trust. There is no algorithmic equivalent to journalistic ethics.

Mark Zuckerberg, Facebook's chief executive, once told colleagues that "a squirrel dying in your front yard may be more relevant to your interests right now than people dying in Africa." At Facebook, "relevance" is virtually the sole criterion that determines what users see. Focusing on the most personally relevant news - the squirrel - is a great business strategy. But it leaves us staring at our front vard instead of reading about suffering, genocide and revolution.

There's no going back to the old system of gatekeepers, nor should there be. But if algorithms are taking over the editing function and determining what we see, we need to make sure they weigh vari-

ables beyond a narrow "relevance." They need to show us Afghanistan and Libya as well as Apple and Kanye.

Companies that make use of these algorithms must take this curative responsibility far more seriously than they have to date. They need to give us control over what we see - making it clear when they are personalizing, and allowing us to shape and adjust our own filters. We citizens need to uphold our end, too – developing the "filter literacy" needed to use these

tools well and demanding content that broadens our horizons even when it's uncomfortable.

It is in our collective interest to ensure that the Internet lives up to its potential as a revolutionary connective medium. This won't happen if we're all sealed off in our own personalized online worlds.

A restive Congress shouldn't undercut Obama on Libya

he war that tugged the United States and its allies into Libya is in its fourthmonth.NATOwarplanes have flown more than 11,500 sorties against Moammar Gadhafi's regime.

Result so far: Nothing definitive. Gadhafi is nominally still in power. The rebels are still rebelling. And the United States so far has spent hundreds of millions to prop up a NATO alliance that Defense Secretary Robert Gates says isn't fully invested in its mission.

This stalemate isn't the swift military success that President Barack Obama anticipated when he sent U.S. forces into action in March. He said then that he wanted to prevent what he feared would be a mass slaughter in Libya. He didn't ask for congressional approval.

Flash forward three months: House Speaker John Boehner and many members of Congress from both parties argue that U.S. involvement in NATO's campaign violates the War Powers Act. They say Obama needs congressional permission to continue the war. Obama argues he doesn't need that OK because the U.S. plays only a support role and no U.S. military personnel are directly in harm's way. He's arguing unconvincingly - that Libya is not a war.

Congress holds a trump card: money. Later this week, the House could vote on a measure that would cut off U.S. funding for NATO's

mission in Libya.

We have not supported NATO's campaign because Obama has not offered a persuasive rationale for American intervention, a clear mission, or an exit strategy. We're wary of a protracted, expensive campaign when there is no vital U.S. security interest at stake.

We're also wary of the mission creep in Libya. What began as bombing to protect civilians has morphed into a campaign to kill Gadhafi and help the ill-equipped rebels prevail. It's not going well. NATO commanders over the weekend admitted an errant missile hit a civilian home, only a day after they admitted another errant attack mistakenly struck Libyan rebels.

Gates recently warned U.S. allies in NATO that they risk "a dim, if not dismal future" if they don't spend more on their own defenses and pitch in more to military operations in Afghanistan and Libya. "The mightiest military alliance in history is only 11 weeks into an operation against a poorly armed regime in a sparsely populated country, yet many allies are beginning to run short of munitions, requiring the U.S., once more, to make up the difference," Gates scolded.

That said, Congress can't

use its partners' finger-inthe-wind commitment as an excuse to stop funding this mission. Doing that in the middle of a military operation dangerously undercuts the U.S. commander in chief. This page opposed similar Democratic efforts to micromanage the wars in Iraq and Afghanistan from Capitol Hill during the Bush administration.

Nor are we certain that Obama's military reach exceeds his legal grasp. The law on when and how a president may commit armed forces is open to interpretation, depending on whether you sit in Congress or in the

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Oval Office.

What's clear is that Obama could have saved himself political grief, and put his administration on unassailable legal ground, if he initially had asked Congress to approve this venture. If NATO can't bring war in Libya to a reasonably quick and efficient end, the 535 would-be generals on Capitol Hill will only grow more determined to second-guess Obama.

Extremist groups find fertile ground for revival in Inland Northwest

KALISPELL, Mont. - With ergy boils over. its jagged peaks, glistening lakes and lush valleys, the Inland Northwest – stretching from eastern Washington to Montana's Glacier National Park – is a stunningly beautiful and remote part of the country.

It also is a cradle for sometimes-violent anti-government activity – a reputation most recently rekindled by the search for David Burgert. The former Kalispell militia leader is accused of opening fire on He was released in 2010. sheriff's deputies on a remote logging road in Lolo National Forest.

After a lull following the demise of the Idaho-based neo-Nazi Aryan Nations in 2000. supremacist groups and individuals may be reviving in the Inland Northwest. It's a mostly white, mostly rural area with few job opportunities and a history of extreme activists.

Experts say the number of radical right groups is growing across the country because of the poor state of the economy, rising immigration and fears that President Barack Obama's administration has an agenda to curtail individual liberties.

They include so-called patriot groups, which fear oneworld government and don't accept the federal government's authority. And they like northwest Montana because there is no dominant major city with liberal politics. 

How Fed policymakers control the economy

The Federal Reserve's chief policymaking group, the Federal Open Market Committee, has vast power over the economy through its ability to set monetary policy.

Here is a look at how the FOMC operates.

Q: What is the FOMC's primary role?

A: Its mission is to keep the economy, inflation and employment on a healthy track. When the economy weakens, Fed policymakers cut interest rates or keep them low. The lower interest rates are aimed at promoting increased borrowing and spending by consumers and businesses to spur economic growth.

When the economy grows so fast that inflation becomes a threat, Fed policymakers raise rates or keep them high. That makes it costlier for people to get loans and means less borrowing and spending. Economic activity slows and inflation pressures ease.

Q: How does the FOMC move interest rates?

A: Its policymakers decide whether to buy securities from banks. The banks sell those securities to the Fed and receive money from the Fed which they can use to make more loans. That acts to lower the interest that banks charge for those loans. Conversely, if the Fed wants to raise interest rates, it sells Treasury securities to the banks, pulling money out of the financial system and raising the cost for loans. The Federal Reserve Bank of New York is responsible for conducting these operations.

Toyota says Prius supply to improve in summer

DETROIT - Toyota says dealers will see increased supplies of the hot-selling Prius hybrid later this summer.

A company statement issued Wednesday says U.S. dealers will get 75,000 more Priuses by the end of the year. But the announcement was later withdrawn and a Toyota spokesman says the company can't confirm how many of the hybrids will reach the U.S. by the end of the year. The Prius is built only in Japan.

Toyota says the statement was issued in error by a news release distribution company

Priuses have been scarce due to a parts shortage caused by the March 11 earthquake and tsunami in Japan. But demand has been high since U.S. gasoline prices neared \$4 per gallon.

The company also plans to roll out a Prius wagon in October.

Low-income prepaid-card users face higher fees

WASHINGTON - Millions of poor Americans who use prepaid debit cards could soon face higher fees.

Under a rule to take effect in July, companies that issue debit cards must reduce the fees they charge retailers. To recoup their lost revenue, banks that offer the cards are raising fees for people who use them.

People who use prepaid debit cards, typically low-income consumers and those collecting government benefits, are supposed to be shielded from the fee hikes. To protect them, the rule provided an exemption: It let companies that issue prepaid cards keep charging retailers higher rates.

But that exemption could take up to a year to enact. In the meantime, card companies will likely charge users of prepaid cards higher fees to recoup the lost revenue.

About 70 percent of prepaid card rules and overdraft fees users earn under \$45,000, accord- before switching ing to data from Aite Group, a re- prepaid cards.



The Dow closed down 80.34 points, or 0.7 percent, at 12,109.67. The S&P 500 index fell 8.38 points, or 0.7 percent, to close at 1,287.14. The Nasdag fell 18.07 points, or 0.7 percent, to 2,669.19.

Among heavily traded companies, FedEx Corp. reported a 33 percent jump in income and said it expects global economic growth to continue. The package delivery company's stock rose 2.6 percent.

CarMax Inc. rose 7 percent, the biggest gain in the S&P 500 index. The dealership owner said profit rose 25 percent on higher used-vehicle prices.

Jabil Circuit Inc. rose 3 percent after the electronics part maker said its earnings doubled last quarter.

Three stocks fell for every two that rose on the New York Stock Exchange Wednesday. Volume was light at 3.3 billion shares, below the daily average of 3.9 billion over the previous two months.

WASHINGTON - President Barack Obama announced plans Wednesday to pull 33,000 U.S. troops out of Afghanistan well before next year's election, signaling a rapid drawdown sure to please Americans weary of the nearly decadelong war and its costs.

"America, it is time to focus on nation building here at home," he said in a nationally televised address from the White House.







The federal government earlier this year issued new dietary guidelines advising people to eat smarter. This month, it ditched the food pyramid - the longtime symbol of healthy eating - in favor of a dinner plate divided into four sections containing fruits, vegetables, protein and grains.

ALONG THE MINNESO-TA-ONTARIO BORDER -The hike into and out of Slim Lake is a half-mile long and straight up both ways. Lake trout were said to be there and also smallmouth bass.

Idaho Power to stock catfish at **Milner Reservoir**

Idaho Power fisheries biologists will complete the company's 19th annual catfish stocking at Milner Reservoir on the Snake River near Burley. The company will release about 20.000 six- to eight-inch channel catfish in the reservoir on Wednesday.

Fish are stocked at two locations in Milner Reservoir: the Lex Kunau Park boat ramp near the Highway 27 Bridge in Burley, and the North Freedom Park boat ramp near the Highway 30 Bridge in Heyburn.

The fish release is a requirement under the terms of the company's federal license to operate its 57.5-megawatt hydroelectric generation facility at the 104-year-old Milner Dam. Idaho Power has operated the power plant since 1992.

Only in rare circumstances can someone raise a big game animal

"I heard about someone that found an orphaned deer fawn and raised it to an adult. I'd like to do this. What kinds of permits are required?"

The short answer is, A only under very rare circumstances would the department authorize anvone to possess a wild fawn deer or calf elk.

In the past it may have been common in Idaho to allow a "Good Samaritan" to raise an orphaned fawn and "release it back into the wild."

When Idaho's human population was sparsely distributed, deer that were habituated to humans were often released on large ranches and farms.

Gracious landowners tolerated these deer that often lived out their lives within the security of the ranch. These deer were usually not marked, so the success of these animals returning to the wild could not be evaluated. No doubt some were successful and some were not. But nature decided, not people. Idaho's population is no longer sparsely distributed. Deer habituated to humans in urban environments damage property and threaten personal safety. Several years ago a buck deer that was raised in captivity as a fawn attacked and injured several people. One elderly lady was charged repeatedly, knocked down and left with numerous bruises on her legs. In the end, the deer was euthanized due to the danger it posed to the public. To add a layer of complexity of the issue, several wildlife diseases, unknown in the past, now pose a threat to other wild deer, domestic livestock, and people. Examples include chronic wasting disease, brucellosis, epizootic hemorrhagic disease, and tuberculosis. Chronic wasting disease has devastated wild deer populations across country and caused several states to prohibit importation of the carcass or skull of deer taken by hunters. Some think its spread is by contact with infected animals or body fluids. Brucellosis in elk, bison, and cattle in Wyoming threaten Idaho's livestock industry. Epizootic hemorrhagic disease (EHD) killed thousands of deer in the Clearwater drainage a few years ago. Two workers were infected with tuberculosis when exposed to infected elk in a game farm in Montana. Many state wildlife



agencies are restricting commercial game farms and private collections of wildlife. They are also developing quarantine protocols to prevent the movement of infected or potentially infected animals. These diseases pose significant threats to wild deer and elk populations throughout Idaho. Domestication of wild deer is one of the issues related disease transmission to wild populations.

The question remains, "What can we do with orphaned fawn deer."

First, is it really or phaned or was it picked up while the doe was away? How old is the fawn; can it fend for itself with a little protection?

Department employees understand the hur emotion generated by fawn deer and want to be compassionate about the fate of these wild deer fawns. Employees first go to great lengths to reunite the fawn with the doe. There is no better option than having the fawn raised in the wild with its mother.

Some may argue this is a cruel option, but the fawn can play an important role benefiting future wild deer populations.

If no other options exist, the fawn will be placed in a rehab facility. The people that run these facilities go to great lengths to maintain as much wildness as possible to maximize the fawn's opportunity for survival after release. There are very few of these facilities in Idaho and their abilities are overwhelmed quickly.

At this point in time, the department is strongly discouraging people from picking up young animals. Our first concern is quickly reuniting young animals with their mothers. We are obligated to use sound wildlife management principles to maintain Idaho's resources, and, in this case, other options are necessary but far less desirable.

Lifting the haze of bad lighting in the outdoors

- magine if homes and businesses emitted smoke that prevented anyone in the Magic Valley from ever seeing the mountains to the north. This smoke isn't toxic, but at the same time, those emitting it could save money by not doing so. Would you want something to be done about it?

The foregoing, obviously, is a parable. The "smoke" is poorly shielded outdoor lighting, and the "mountains" are the starry sky. While not seeing mountains or stars is unlikely to be detrimental to one's health, few would deny that such views improve southern Idahoans' quality of life.

The International Dark-Sky Association (IDA, www.darksky.org) is a nonprofit organization whose primary goal is the reduction of light pollution (that is, light shining where it serves no useful purpose and wastes energy).

The group's approach is a combination of education, advocacy, and acting as a clearing house for research into the negative effects of light pollution, which include health effects on humans, as well as an estimated \$2.2 billion of energy wasted in the U.S. each year.

The calculus of good lighting is pretty simple: By directing light only where it is needed, smaller wattage

fixtures can be used, and consequently less energy. While night-sky-friendly fixtures used to be more expensive, it's no longer the case (witness the new street lights illuminating Falls Avenue West in Twin Falls, which cast no light above the horizontal).

Ten years ago, a "good lighting" ordinance was voted down by the Twin Falls County commissioners. Nonetheless, many new businesses, recognizing the cost savings, are installing well-designed outdoor lighting.

This month, IDA posted a model lighting ordinance on its website. Read it, and ask yourself: What's the down side to a law that encourages energy savings, cost reduction, and clearing the "smoke" obscuring the starry heavens?

The most popular of these chasms are undoubtedly those in the Gooding City of Rocks complex, where towering pillars, hoodoos and other rock formations leave a lasting impression.

Farther west lie a couple of other wilderness study areas that while perhaps are not quite as dramatic, feature country a bit more expansive and have qualities that also beg for a visit.

Two weekends ago I spent a day and a half giving a couple of these locales a quick review.

Several roads access King Hill Creek, the Bennett Hills' most significant drainage, but I first chose the BLM road that leaves the highway just outside the town of King Hill.

This route, following the wilderness study area's east boundary, soon became rough enough that walking seemed like it might be faster than the grinding crawl up successive, rocky grades.





Dissident artist Ai Weiwei freed by China, says he's fine

BEIJING - Renowned artist Ai Weiwei, the most high-profile target of a sweeping crackdown on activists in China, returned home late Wednesday after nearly three months in detention. Looking tired and thinner, he said the conditions of his release meant he could not talk more.

The official Xinhua News Agency said Ai confessed to tax evasion, accusations his family had long denied and which activists had denounced as a false premise for detaining him. He has spoken out strongly against the ruling Communist Party, and his family and supporters say he was being punished for speaking out about the communist leadership and social problems.

Ai, who had been taken away on April 3, walked through the gate of his suburban home studio shortly after 11 p.m. with his mother man rights situation. and wife. He said his health was fine and thanked reporters for their support outside his studio, but said he could not speak further.

Self-help guru convicted of negligent homicide

CAMP VERDE, Ariz. -Aself-help guru was found guilty of three counts of

negligent homicide Wednesday in a case that shined a spotlight on a deadly Arizona sweat lodge ceremony that ended with unconscious participants being dragged to safety.

Ray Jurors reached their verdict with remarkable swiftness: They took less than 10 hours to convict James Arthur Ray following a four-month trial that included hundreds of exhibits and countless hours of testi-

mony. The eight men and four women were given the opmanslaughter but decided on the lesser charge instead. He faces a maximum of nearly 12 years in prison.

Ray fought back emotion as the verdict was read. His parents and brother sat behind him, while victims' friends and family members held hands and looked on from across the courtroom.

Prosecutors asked that Ray be taken into custody immediately, but the judge denied their request.

More than 50 people participated in the October 2009 sweat lodge that was meant to be the highlight of Rav's five-day "Spiritual Warrior" seminar near Sedona.

Three people died following the sauna-like ceremony aimed at providing spiritual cleansing. Eighteen people were hospitalized, while

holding them back in life. He warned participants in a recording of the event played during the trial that the sweat lodge would be "hellacious" and that participants were guar-

anteed to feel like they were dying but would do so only metaphorically. "The true spiritu-

al warrior has conquered death and therefore has no fear or enemies in this

lifetime or the next, because the greatest fear you'll ever experience is the fear of what? Death," Ray said in the recording. "You will have to get a point to where you surrender and it's OK to die?"

Witnesses have described the scene following the twohour sweat lodge ceremony tion of convicting Ray of as alarming and chaotic, with people vomiting and others dragging "lifeless" and "barely breathing" participants outside. Volunteers performed CPR.

More than 20 people were transported to hospitals. Kirby Brown, 38, of Westtown, N.Y., and James Shore, 40, of Milwaukee died upon arrival. Liz Neuman, 49, of Prior Lake, Minn., slipped into a coma and died more than a week later.

In court Wednesday. members of Neuman's family and a friend of Brown held hands and smiled when the verdict was read.

"Justice was served in there," Neuman's ex-husband, Randy Neuman, said later.

Silicone breast implants are safe, FDA says

WASHINGTON - Five years after allowing silicone breast implants back on the market, the Food and Drug Administration said Wednesday that further studies showed that the decision was sound.

The FDA was criticized by consumer groups in 2006 for approving the implants after a 14-year hiatus because of widespread fear range of illnesses.

But research by the two manufacturers of the implants, released in a report Wednesday, indicates that they have a "reasonable assurance of safety and effectiveness" when used properly, the FDA said.





Venus Williams, Nadal, Roddick win at Wimbledon

wWIMBLEDON, England (AP) -Time and again after losing a point, Venus Williams rolled her eyes, slumped her shoulders and let out a shriek of dismay that echoed through Centre Court, reverberating off its roof.

Facing the most, uh, experienced woman in the Wimbledon field -40-year-old Kimiko Date-Krumm of Japan – Williams was mired in a three-set struggle that lasted nearly three hours Wednesday, a tight, high-quality contest brimming with the sort of at-the-net, classic grass-court play seen so rarely nowadays.

"She doesn't play anywhere near her age," Williams said.

In the end, Williams, a five-time champion at the All England Club, mustered every bit of her competitive drive and considerable talent to pull out a 6-7 (6), 6-3, 8-6 comeback victory over Date-Krumm and reach the third round.

"She played unbelievable today. I thought she had some luck on her side, too, with net cords, balls hitting lines. I just thought today was a perfect storm for her to try to get a win," said Williams, who again wore her decidedly original lace romper, featuring draped sleeves, deep "V" neckline, gold belt and gold zipper.

"Thankfully," Williams added, "I break her." had some answers."

None more effective than her serve, in the late-going, anyway. That stroke delivered 12 aces, helped Williams escape several jams and was clocked at 120 mph even in her final service game. Contrast that with Date-Krumm's serves, mostly about 80 mph. One was 65 mph.

Date-Krumm, who reached the Wimbledon semifinals in 1996, quit Williams' serve afterward, saying: game. "Not only speed – it's on the cor-

In the second and third sets, though, Williams played tennis later that year, then came out much more cleanly, and she wound of retirement in 2008, marveled at up winning by breaking in the final

It was hardly easy.

"Venus came out slow, and that girl took off like a brand new motor." said Williams' father and coach, Richard. His daughter missed time with a bum hip and is playing only her fourth tournament since Wimbledon in 2010.

On Tuesday, his other daughter, Serena, needed three sets to win, too. After ambling out of Centre Court this time, Dad tapped his umbrella's wooden handle on his chest and said, referring to those matches: "They're tough on the heart. The heart's not as young as it once was."

He wasn't the only one toting an

umbrella around the grounds Wednesday, when rain prevented any action until after 3 p.m., other than under the retractable roof at the main stadium. After Williams managed to sneak through, fans with Centre Court tickets had a chance to see easy wins for twotime champion Rafael Nadal, then three-time runner-up Andy Roddick.

The top-ranked Nadal beat Ryan Sweeting of the United States 6-3, 6-2, 6-4, compiling 38 winners and only seven unforced errors. In the third round, Nadal will face Gilles Muller of Luxembourg – the only Mattek-Sands said. "Don't worry."

man other than Roger Federer to beat him at Wimbledon in the past six years. Since losing to Muller in the second round in 2005, Nadal is 28-2 at the All England Club; that includes defeats against Federer in the 2006 and 2007 finals, titles in 2008 and 2010, and missing the 2009 tournament with bad knees.

"Will be a big, big test for me," Nadal said.

Roddick's strong serve was clicking again in a 6-4, 6-3, 6-4 victory over Victor Hanescu of Romania. The No. 8-seeded American hit 15 aces, saved the only break point he faced and limited his unforced errors to six - all with a special pair of fans sitting at Centre Court: his parents.

"This is the first time they've seen me play here. ... I think today was the first time they ever sat in a box in my entire career," said Roddick, who won the 2003 U.S. Open. "They picked a good court to debut that on. I think they're having fun."

Other winners included No. 4 Andy Murray, No. 9 Gael Monfils and 72nd-ranked Alex Bogomolov Jr. of the United States, who reached the third round in his first trip to Wimbledon by knocking off No. 25 Juan Ignacio Chela of Argentina 6-0,6-3,6-4.

The only seeded woman to lose was No. 30 Bethanie Mattek-Sands of the United States, who caused a stir with her Lady Gaga-inspired jacket that had white tennis balls attached to it, then was beaten 6-4, 5-7, 7-5 by 133rd-ranked Misaki Doi of Japan.

When Mattek-Sands arrived at the court, she noticed a tour official scrutinizing her getup. So Mattek-Sands made clear her unusual accessory would be removed before warmup time.

LONDON (AP) - U.S. Open champion Rory McIlroy is confident he can handle the pressure that comes with being considered the heir apparent to Tiger Woods.

His status will undoubtedly soar as a result, but McIlroy said he'll try to stay grounded.
