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More gear to beat back blazes

T.F. readies to buy new \$450K fire engine

Tom McCully is a vagabond of a firefighter.

The 10-year veteran of the Twin Falls Fire Department works as a roving driver, spending a month at one of the city's four stations before rotating to the next. He and other drivers like him have to know the differences between the city's four main fire engines, which vary among three different models.

"I drive every truck," he said. "They give us tons of training — getting to know what gauges are for what (pump) and how much pressure each hose line is sup-

posed to be running. It's pretty technical. Every driver has to know it."

That knowledge will come in handy as the city prepares to open bidding for a new engine this fall. Since the city will take bids from multiple companies to do the work, the department won't know what make and model to expect until the contract is awarded. At that point, manufacturing a new truck can take about eight months, according to TFFD Battalion Chief Ron Aguirre, putting delivery sometime in the second half of 2012.

The city buys a new engine on

Obama details troop pullout

President Barack Obama says 10,000 troops will come home from Afghanistan by the end of this year as the U.S. mission shifts from combat to support after nearly 10 years of war. The president said a total of 33,000 troops would be withdrawn by next summer, as he announced what he called "the beginning but not the end of our effort to wind down this war."

What are the details of the short-term troop withdrawal?

Obama said he will withdraw 10,000 troops by the end of this year, with another 23,000 out by September of next year at the latest. That would end the surge of 33,000 troops he announced in December 2009, and leave about 68,000 U.S. troops there.

What are the long term plans for a U.S. presence in Afghanistan?

Obama will meet with NATO allies next May in Chicago to plot the final drawdown of those and other allied troops by 2014, when they hope Afghan forces will be able to guard against any comeback by al-Qaida terrorists or the Taliban regime that had protected them.

Where do Obama's plans fall within the political spectrum?

After weeks of internal debates, Obama settled on a middle-of-the-road approach between the military's recommendations of a slower drawdown and the push for a faster withdrawal coming from members of both major political parties, including Vice President Joe Biden and Sen. Richard Lugar, R-Ind., a top member of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee.

A new role

After a total of 10 years spent leading the Twin Falls Salvation Army, Maj. Eddie Patterson is retiring — only to move into a new role as the nonprofit's emergency disaster coordinator.

Patterson will retire as pastor and director of the local Salvation Army on July 1, and is looking forward to taking a month off before he begins his new role on Aug. 1.

It's in Patterson's blood to serve. The 66-year-old man is a fourth-generation Salvationist who grew up attending church and eventually became an officer. He's served for 42 years and plans another two or three more in his new position before he officially

Hot, but not for long

Twin Falls man accused of stealing relatives' truck

Zachary Hansen didn't go quietly when police confronted him about a stolen vehicle.

Twin Falls police say they had to use a Taser to detain Hansen, 19, as they arrested him on two counts of grand theft and one count of burglary on Sunday. According to the police report, Melvin Simpson, a relative of Hansen, reported his gray 2006 Ford F-150 pickup truck as missing earlier that day. Hansen had stayed with Simpson for a few months

during the winter but had since moved in with a female who lived on Jefferson Street. Police located the truck at a residence at 166 Jefferson St. and found Hansen trying to slip out of the house through a basement window.

Once Hansen was detained, police say they found him in possession of a spare key for the truck.

Hansen was held on \$1,000 bond for the three felonies and \$100 bond for misdemeanor resisting an officer. A preliminary hearing for the theft charges is set for July 1.

American Red Cross seeks O-negative blood

Facing critically low levels, the American Red Cross is asking for more type O-negative blood donors. Idaho, Montana and Utah could all see possible drops in their universal blood type supply.

"We usually see a drop in blood donations in the summer since people are usually going on vacation and schools host few blood drives," said Jane Stutzman, Idaho donor recruitment manager for the Red Cross. "But this year we are seeing a startling drop in O-negative."

While the Red Cross is always seeking every blood type, O-negative blood is important because it is used in

emergency situations the most, she said. That's because unlike other types, it can be given to anyone who needs blood. The Red Cross must have 1,200 people give blood and platelets each week to meet its needs at 40 hospitals across the three states.

The American Red Cross is urging those who have an opportunity to make an appointment to donate blood over the summer.

The next blood drive in Twin Falls will be on July 5-6 at the Magic Valley Mall and the College of Southern Idaho campus. However, those interested in blood donations can also go to the Red Cross website, redcrossblood.org, or call 1-800-RED CROSS.

average every five to seven years, and engines are retired and replaced after about 20 years of service. The budgeted amount of \$450,000 is spread evenly across fiscal 2012 and 2013. Aguirre figures \$375,000 will pay for the engine with the rest funding new equipment to outfit it, such as fire hoses, ladders and axes.

"Even though some of these engines have only 130,000 miles on them, the pumping systems have much more time on them," Aguirre said. "We had a 1976 (engine) we replaced in 2007. It couldn't pass a capacity test. We're in the same boat with our reserve truck now. It's still passing, but it's on its last leg."

The city's reserve truck is a 1992 E-1 model, which will be retired next year. The most recent purchase was a 2007 Boise Mobile Equipment engine that cost approximately \$325,000, Aguirre said.

Each of the city's three frontline engines can carry 1,000 gallons of water and

more than 3,000 feet of hose of varying capacities. The department performs regular tests on pumping mechanisms, hoses and other equipment to ensure they won't fail during fire response.

"A lot of motorized equipment, like small pumps, can't be recycled," Aguirre said of the cost to buy a new engine.

Also, equipment must meet certain requirements to retain the city's insurance rating, which takes into account other fire protection issues such as hydrant operation and staffing.

Most of all, keeping major fire protection equipment in rotation helps save lives — both civilian and firefighter.

"We certainly don't ever want to put ourselves in a position where we get out there and the truck won't work," Aguirre said. "It's really dangerous, not only for us but for the public."

The Twin Falls Fire Department has 13 vehicles that serve a variety of purposes, such as fire suppression, hazardous chemical cleanup and rescue missions. The core of that group are the frontline engines, which each have capacity to hold 1,000 gallons of water and can pump up to 1,500 gallons per minute. Two more engines are also in use — an older reserve engine and an airport-specific engine that resides at Joslin Field, Magic Valley Regional Airport.

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Shoshone council looks at safer pedestrian crossing

SHOSHONE — Shoshone pedestrians will become more visible after Tuesday's City Council meeting.

Councilman Mike Wallace asked city staff to consider adding flags for residents crossing the street at the intersection of Apple Street and U.S. Highway 26.

"Just from a personal side of it, I'd like to address it," Wallace said. "I don't think flags are too expensive."

Wallace said the glare from the sun has made pedestrians, especially children walking to the movie theater and pool, difficult for drivers to see.

Barring accessibility issues, constructing flags and stands for the four crossing points would be feasible, said City Maintenance Supervisor Aaron Aggeler.

much sidewalk we have there," Aggeler said. "You have to have 5 feet for your handicapped people."

Shoshone already has flags in place at another crossing of U.S. 26 near the Snack Bar.

Another project hasn't been so easy for the city. During a May meeting, the council and Mayor J.R. Churchman, who was absent Tuesday, discussed turning a portion of Beverly Street behind the Lincoln County Fairgrounds from dirt to a paved street and sidewalk.

But city employee Perry Silva said contractors looking at the work have produced more questions than poten-

tial construction plans.

"It has turned into a monster," Silva said. "Every contractor I've had, they have a question that I can't answer."

Some of the issues facing construction include the grade of road, how sidewalks will be shored up and the removal of tree stumps that were previously ground down. Though the project isn't cancelled, the council decided to push its completion date until after the fair this summer.

"We should back off and do it right," Councilman Dale Sluder said. "We're not going to get it done by fair time. We got a lot of cans of worms."

Buhl School District refinances bond

BUHL — The Buhl School Board unanimously agreed to refinance a district bond on Monday evening — a move to save the district and taxpayers money.

Eric Heringer with Seattle Northwest reviewed refinancing the district's Series 2003 bond. Previously high

interest rates made such a step inadvisable, he said, but rates have since come back down.

The \$9.65 million bond the district is refinancing is the bond money that was used to build the new high school, said Chairman Jim Barker.

The district still owes \$5.8 million at a current interest rate of 4.71 percent. By refinancing with a 2.75 percent

rate, the district could refund \$374,784 in net savings over the course of 12 years.

"I recommend negotiating a sale since you want to move quickly," Heringer said. "We're in for low, slow growth."

"I can't see waiting. The rate is as low as it's going to go," said trustee Mike Hamilton.

Barker said refinancing the bond "would decrease the amount we would have to levy on patron taxes and consequently lower the taxes for the school district taxpayers."

In a public hearing, the board approved the budget for the 2011-12 school year. It also approved a driver's education fee increase from \$125 to \$200.

Details of former Buhl school chief's retirement released

Few additional details emerged on Wednesday when part of a former Buhl School District superintendent's contract was disclosed as part of a civil judgment.

According to the judgment, Margaret Cox received a full year's salary and benefits for the school's 2010 fiscal year as part of an early retirement package, as well as an extra 48 months of service credited to her Public

Employee Retirement System of Idaho account. Buhl resident Rick Martin filed the civil suit last year, requesting details of Cox's compensation. The school district verified last year that Cox would receive her

\$82,500 salary despite her early departure.

Cox chose to forgo the final year on her revised four-year contract after retiring two years into the job in 2009. She did not receive additional severance pay.

Burley vs. Cassia standoff over policing has wider implications

Cassia County commissioners on Monday wisely took the first step toward finding a mediator to help the county and the city of Burley sort out their impasse over how much the city should pay the county for law enforcement services.

The partnership, which has existed since 1986, is threatening to come apart after months of negotiations haven't yielded a number both sides can live with. And what eventually happens in Burley could influence decisions about law enforcement that communities in Twin Falls, Gooding and Lincoln counties must make in the months to come.

In this area, the Cassia-Burley contract is widely viewed as a model for consolidated law enforcement. Although not trouble-free, the fact that the partnership has endured for a quarter-century is remarkable by Idaho standards.

It's testament to two generations of Cassia and Burley elected officials who've recognized that the public benefits when neighboring governments can successfully navigate the shoals of parochial self-interest.

Sharing law enforcement resources hasn't worked nearly as well elsewhere in southern Idaho, but new economic realities are forcing small towns to revisit the idea.

In an era when cities must make do with less, does it make sense anymore for Hagerman to try to support a one-person police force or for Wendell to subsidize a three-man operation? Would they be better off contracting with Gooding County?

Of the 35 incorporated cities of south-central Idaho, 21 — Acequia, Albion, Bellevue, Bliss, Burley, Carey, Castleford, Declo, Dietrich, Eden, Fairfield, Glenns Ferry, Hazelton, Hollister, Ketchum, Malta, Minidoka, Murtaugh, Oakley, Paul, Richfield — contract all or some law enforcement services with their counties. In general, it's worked out well for those communities.

In many cases, crime rates in county jurisdictions are lower than in comparably sized cities with their own police departments, according to statistics taken from the Idaho State Police's Crime in Idaho report.

Still, yielding independence carries a price. In many cities that have given up their own police forces, the complaints are the same as Burley's: slow response times, not enough sworn officers or vehicles, and nagging impression that the city's taxes are contributing more to county law enforcement than what the community is getting back.

But however rankled citizens of those communities may get, there are really a dwindling number of options. It would be prohibitively costly for Burley to start from scratch with its own police department, and as taxpayer dollars available for law enforcement dwindle it's simply not going to be feasible for some cities with police departments to keep them.

Yet for south-central Idaho communities with middle-sized police departments — Hailey, Jerome and Rupert, for example — there are lessons to be learned from the Burley-Cassia impasse over law enforcement. All three of those agencies work closely with their county sheriff's offices, which are located in their communities.

Should those police departments keep their separate identities? Can they afford to?

Dems won't say no, GOP won't say yes

I used to know what people were talking about when they called for a “grand bargain” on the deficit: Democrats would give in on spending cuts, and Republicans would give in on tax increases. Today, we're on the verge of a couple of grand bargains. But whatever the Republicans are giving in on, it isn't taxes.

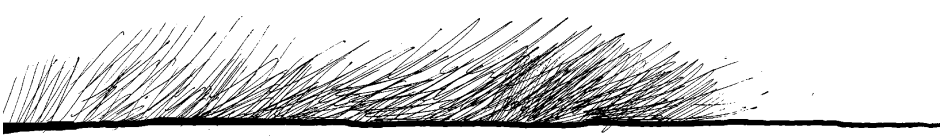

The first grand bargain will come by August, when the clock strikes midnight on the debt ceiling. Insiders in both parties think they have a good sense of what that deal will include: about \$2 trillion in deficit reduction over the next 10 years, almost all of it from spending cuts, plus an agreement on a budget path for the next decade and a policy that makes deep, automatic cuts if we're not hitting our deficit-reduction targets by 2014. But what's the bargain here? Democrats give in on spending cuts and Republicans give in on not destroying the nation's credit?

The second deal will come in 2012, when the Bush tax cuts are set to expire. The tax cuts, which cost \$2 trillion over the past decade and will cost an additional \$4 trillion over the next decade, have done more than any policy initiative in the past decade to turn the surpluses of the '90s to the deficits we face today.

But we're not going to let them expire. The Republican Party wants to extend all of the Bush tax cuts and the Obama administration wants to extend most of them — the exception being the cuts for income over \$250,000. If all goes as the Democrats hope — and when does that happen? — the bargain here will be that they'll agree to make more than \$3 trillion in tax cuts

permanent if Republicans agree to drop their demand to make more than \$4 trillion in tax cuts permanent.

The third deal is likely to come in 2014, when the enforcement mechanism Congress passed in 2011 threatens to make deep, automatic cuts. The optimistic souls on the Democratic side see this as the deal where they'll get some new taxes and those on the Republican side see it as the deal where they'll make structural, Ryan-esque reforms to entitlements.

I suspect both sides are wrong. But the optimism of the Democrats is particularly odd. What incentive will the Republicans have to come to the table if they get sharp cuts and limits on domestic spending this year, the permanent extension of most or all of the Bush tax cuts next year, and they're facing automatic spending cuts in 2014?

The Democrats, if you challenge them on this, don't necessarily disagree. But what's the alternative, they ask, let the debt ceiling cave in and the economy go into a tailspin? The Republicans might be willing to take that risk, but they're not. They control the White House and the Senate. They have to be responsible. Be the grown-ups. Govern.

That's true. But it's created a fundamental imbalance in

American politics: There's never a good enough reason for the Democrats to say no, or for the Republicans to say yes. And letting that dynamic persist is not responsible either. Eventually, this White House has to figure out how to make Republicans say yes.

The administration often feels unfairly criticized by observers who demand that it get things done and then assail the compromises necessary to getting things done. Sometimes, it's true the naysayers are being unrealistic. Health-care reform would not have passed with the public option, and there were never anywhere near the votes needed to break up the big banks. When both sides don't want to get to “yes,” the White House often has little leverage.

But that excuse is overused at 1600 Pennsylvania Ave. Sometimes, the two sides do need to get to “yes.” That was the case with the 2010 expiration of the Bush tax cuts, and the White House negotiated a substantial round of stimulus in return for a temporary extension of the tax cuts.

It's also the case now. Republicans need an increase almost as much as Democrats do. The GOP's leadership does not want an economic catastrophe, and they need a deficit deal that

lets them move past Paul Ryan's unpopular budget proposal.

Democrats are still likely to end up with a deal they don't really like, but they should at least hold fast to some bottom lines. First, no enforcement mechanism that isn't equally divided between automatic spending cuts and automatic tax increases. Both parties need a reason to return to the table.

Second, if the GOP won't budge on raising taxes in this deal, then they need to budge on cutting taxes to provide the economy with more stimulus: The payroll cut they agreed to in 2010 should be kept for another year, and extended to employers as well as employees. And finally the expiration of the Bush tax cuts is the administration's only real shot to make revenue a serious part of the deficit solution. Extending everything in 2012 but the breaks for the very rich isn't good enough.

Will the political team like arguing for some taxes on some people who aren't clearly rich in an election year? Will the economic team like saying “no” with the nation's credit rating hanging in the balance? Of course not. But taking risks is part of being responsible, too.

How to end the football deadlock

It will be bad for America if there is no NFL football in the fall.

Cancellation of the 2011 National Football League season would not only disappoint the sport's many fans and disrupt the social rituals (tailgating, Super Bowl parties) that surround the game; it would also have serious economic consequences.

Edgeworth Economics, a consulting firm, studied the cost of a canceled 2011 season (at the request of the players association) and estimated it to be about \$5 billion from lost jobs, decreased spending at local businesses and reduced tax revenue. In addition, billions of dollars in TV revenue and millions of dollars in ticket sales would vanish.

With this much at stake, the country should not sit back and wait for the players and owners to reach an agreement on their own. Congress can — and should — intervene to force a resolution of the dispute.

Congress has considerable leverage over the NFL because it grants the league an antitrust exemption without which it could not oper-

ate as it currently does. The joint agreements among teams on matters like free agency and revenue sharing, as well as the league's single national TV deal, would otherwise run afoul of federal antitrust laws, which prohibit businesses (in this case, individual teams) from making deals that reduce competition.

To ensure an agreement between the owners and players in time for the 2011 season, Congress should place a special condition on the continuation of the NFL's antitrust exemption: the owners and players must abide by a settlement procedure known as last-best-offer arbitration. This procedure would require the two sides to negotiate; if an agreement is not reached, each side would make its last best offer and an arbitrator would choose between the two. This arrangement cre-

ates an incentive for each side to make the more reasonable offer, lest the arbitrator pick the other side's.

Skeptics will note that in the past, Congress has been unwilling to use its leverage to compel the NF to alter unpopular or controversial practices. When the Philadelphia Eagles threatened to move to Phoenix in the early 1980s, I introduced legislation that would have made the antitrust exemption conditional on the league's prohibiting such moves if the team was financially successful (as the Eagles were). That legislation did not pass.

Similarly, in the '90s, when several professional football and baseball teams threatened to move in order to pressure cities to pay for stadium construction costs, I introduced legislation that would have made the antitrust exemption conditional on having the NFL and Major League Baseball (which has a similar exemption) pay three-quarters of such construction costs. Again, the legislation was opposed by lobbyists and did not pass.

But the political climate today is much more conducive to congressional action than past efforts to deal with local issues like franchise moves and stadium construction costs. The prospect of a lost NFL season has upset fans across the country, not least because the league has never generated more revenue or been more popular than it was last year.

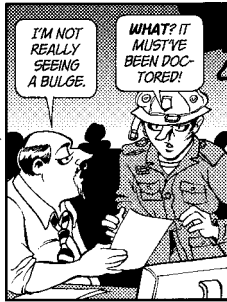
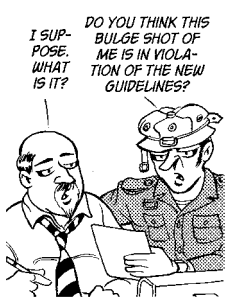
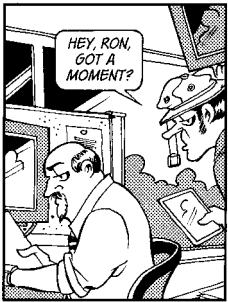
There is already a starting point for the legislation I am proposing. A bill introduced in March by Rep. John Conyers Jr., Democrat of Michigan, aims to strip the antitrust exemption from the NFL because the league, according to the bill, “acted in bad faith” by negotiating broadcast contracts that guaranteed it would be paid even in the event of a lockout.

This is a good moment for Congress to act. Gridlock on other issues has left the House and the Senate with time to spare. And even the mere threat of such legislation might induce a settlement.

Idaho won't raise No Child Left Behind benchmarks

BOISE — Idaho schools will not comply with some parts of the federal No Child Left Behind law until it is reformed to measure student academic growth from year to year, Superintendent of Public Instruction Tom Luna says.

Luna sent a letter Tuesday to U.S. Secretary of Education Arne Duncan saying Idaho will begin implementing a new statewide accountability system to measure whether students are making adequate progress.

Idaho will not raise the bench-

marks schools have to meet under 9-year-old federal law — or sanction schools that do not meet these higher testing goals — until No Child Left Behind is fixed to better gauge student achievement, Luna said.

The long-awaited overhaul of No Child Left Behind began last month in the U.S. House with the first in a series of targeted bills. But a comprehensive reform of the nation's most important education law appears far from the finish line.

Idaho can no longer wait, Luna said.

“The law has become a stumbling block to continued improvement in

raising student achievement,” Luna said.

New education laws backed by Luna and the governor focus on the academic growth of students, not on whether they can pass a test, he said.

The state cannot afford to implement the changes and also put money toward schools that will be placed in the “needs improvement” category under No Child Left Behind after benchmarks under the law are increased this year, Luna said.

“We don’t have the luxury of time and resources to continue on with the federal law that should have been rewritten four years ago,” he said.

More than two-thirds of Idaho's schools made gains under No Child Left Behind last year.

Schools are required to meet 41 benchmarks for student achievement under the law and a school's annual yearly progress, or AYP, is calculated based on test participation, academic achievement, graduation rates and other statistics.

But every few years, the percentage of students who must pass state tests increases.

Nationwide, millions of students remain far from reaching the law's ambitious goal of having 100 percent of students proficient in math

and reading by 2014.

Fewer students in Idaho made adequate progress last year, when benchmarks under the law were increased dramatically.

This year, a school would need 90.4 percent of its students to reach grade-level proficiency in reading to make adequate progress under the law, up from 85.6 percent last year. In math, a school would need 88.7 percent of its students to reach grade-level proficiency to achieve adequate progress, up from 83 percent.

The state will release all of the testing data on how schools performed, Luna said.

Extremist groups find fertile ground for revival in Inland Northwest

KALISPELL, Mont. — With its jagged peaks, glistening lakes and lush valleys, the Inland Northwest — stretching from eastern Washington to Montana's Glacier National Park — is a stunningly beautiful and remote part of the country.

It also is a cradle for sometimes-violent anti-government activity — a reputation most recently rekindled by the search for David Burgert. The former Kalispell militia leader is accused of opening fire on sheriff's deputies on a remote logging road in Lolo National Forest.

After a lull following the demise of the Idaho-based neo-Nazi Aryan Nations in 2000, anti-government and white supremacist groups and individuals may be reviving in the Inland Northwest. It's a mostly white, mostly rural area with few job opportunities and a history of extreme activists.

Experts say the number of radical right groups is growing across the country because of the poor state of the economy, rising immigration and fears that President Barack Obama's administration has an agenda to curtail individual liberties.

They include so-called patriot groups, which fear one-world government and don't accept the federal government's authority. And they like northwest Montana because there is no dominant major city with liberal politics. It also has a deep libertarian streak and live-and-let-live attitude, said Travis McAdam, executive director of the Helena-based Montana Human Rights Network, an anti-hate group.

“A lot of anti-government energy has been building up

over the last couple of years,” McAdam said.

Sometimes the energy boils over.

Burgert is accused of firing shots at Missoula County sheriff's deputies June 12 before he disappeared into the Lolo National Forest. Burgert is a longtime patriot activist who spent eight years in prison on weapons charges — he had a machine gun when he was arrested — and U.S. authorities charged him at the time with trying to spark a revolution. He was released in 2010.

“He harbors great animosity for law enforcement and government in general,” Missoula County Sheriff Carl Ibsen said.

In January, an attempt was made in Spokane to bomb the city's Martin Luther King Jr. Day parade. The bomb was found and disarmed before it could explode. The FBI called it an act of domestic terrorism that could have killed and injured many people.

White supremacist Kevin Harpham has been charged in the case and could face life in prison. His trial begins in August.

A patriot group called Flathead Liberty Bell held a convention just last weekend, featuring right-wing speakers and sale of survival gear for what organizers believe is a coming showdown with federal authorities. It was a flashback to the 1990s, when groups like the Militia of Montana regularly held such expos, McAdam said.

The number of hate groups and patriot groups, which do not all share beliefs and conduct, has been growing across the country since Obama was elected in 2008, according to an annual report by the

Southern Poverty Law Center in Montgomery, Ala., which tracks extremist groups and individuals.

“Montana is developing into a hotbed,” said Mark Potok, director of the SPLC Intelligence Project.

SPLC's 2010 compilation of active hate groups found 1,002 nationwide, with no more than 12 in the Inland Northwest between Missoula and Spokane.

Area residents complain hate group activities here seem to draw more attention than they do in other regions of the country.

“We have a small population, so they get noticed more,” said Travis Suzuki, a 22-year-old Missoula college student.

“We feel very safe around here,” said Kalispell Mayor Tammi Fisher, who said there is no indication tourism has been hurt by the presence of these groups, or that government employees have been threatened.

A fast-growing city of 20,000 hemmed in by the Rocky Mountains and Flathead Lake, Kalispell has a strong tourist industry thanks to its lakes, golf courses and ski resorts, and it's a major gateway to Glacier National Park.

Montana developed a reputation as a place for violent extremists in the mid-1990s with the capture of “Unabomber” Theodore Kaczynski and a standoff involving a patriot group called the Montana Freemen.

The Unabomber was the FBI code name for Kaczynski, who engaged in a mail bombing spree that spanned nearly 20 years, killing three people. He was living near Lincoln, Mont., when he was arrested in 1996.

The Montana Freemen were a Christian Patriot group based outside the town of Jordan. Members expressed belief in individual sovereignty and in 1996 engaged in an 81-day armed standoff with the FBI before surrendering.

Some of the more well-known figures in the anti-government movement are re-emerging in the Kalispell area, according to news reports and the SPLC.

They include former Aryan Nations member Karl Gharst, who last year screened a movie, “Epic: The Story of the Waffen SS,” at the Kalispell library. The showing drew 200 protesters.

White supremacist April Goede and her twin daughters — who once formed the racist pop singing group Prussian Blue — have moved to Kalispell.

OREGON State House votes to pay ranchers for wolf kills

SALEM — The Oregon House unanimously passed a bill Wednesday to pay ranchers for livestock lost to wolves moving into the state.

The legislation had appeared dead, but was revived after ranchers, conservation groups, and the governor's office spent three days in a closed room last week hammering out details of the \$100,000 package widely deemed crucial to getting ranchers on board with restoring wolf packs that were bounty-hunted to extinction in Oregon in the early 20th century.

Chief sponsor Rep. Greg Smith, R-Heppner, said it is a promising compromise between groups that started off far apart, but ultimately ranchers may have to be given broader rights to shoot wolves. Another bill will be introduced when lawmakers come back in February.



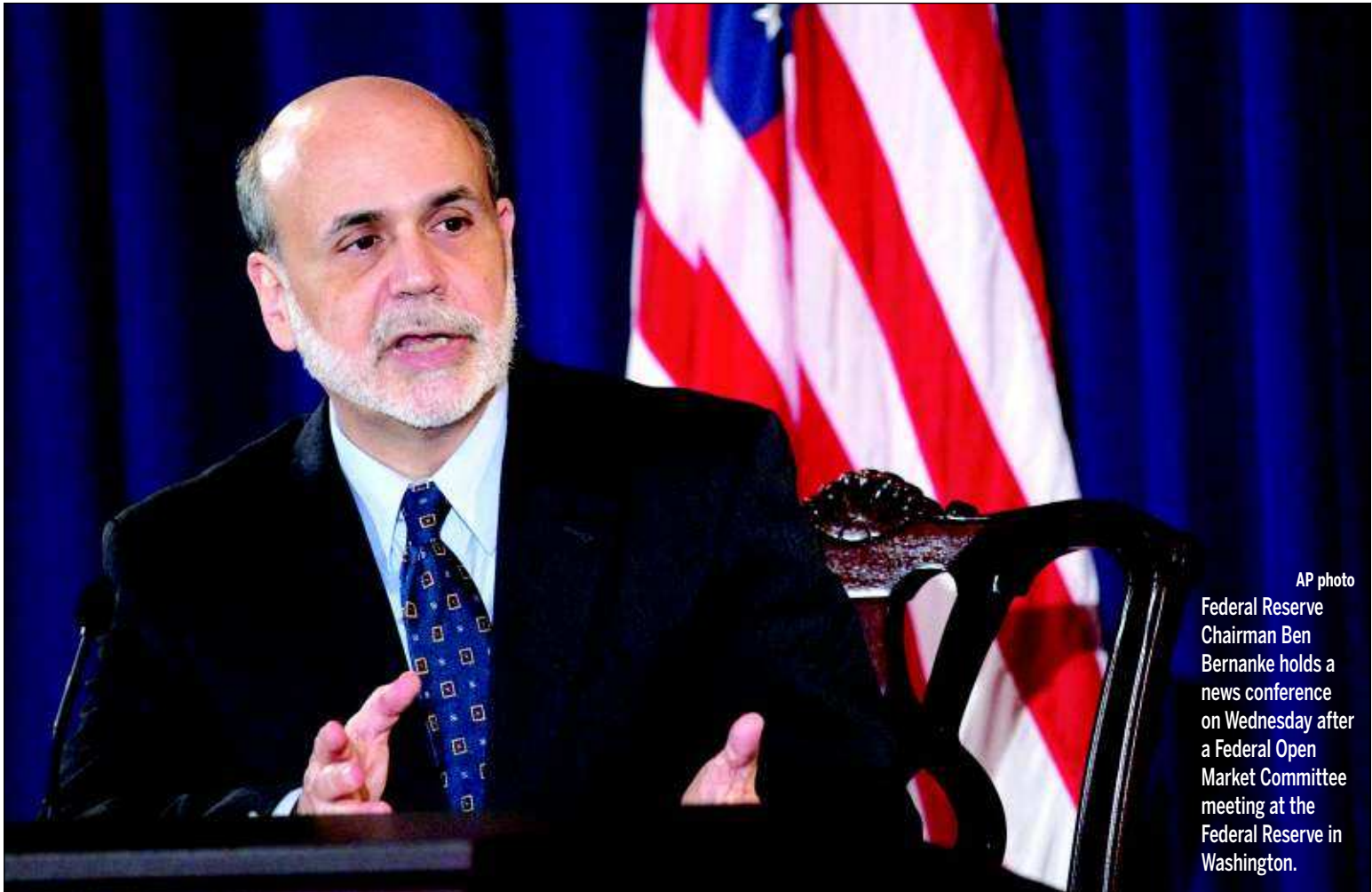

Economic trouble puzzles Fed chief Bernanke, too

WASHINGTON — The economy's continuing struggles aren't just confounding ordinary Americans. They've also stumped the head of the Federal Reserve.

Fed Chairman Ben Bernanke told reporters Wednesday that the central bank had been caught off guard by recent signs of deterioration in the economy. And he said the troubles could continue into next year.

"We don't have a precise read on why this slower pace of growth is

persisting," Bernanke said. He said the weak housing market and problems in the banking system might be "more persistent than we thought."

It was the Fed chief's most explicit warning yet that the economy will face serious challenges next year. For several months, he had said the factors working against economic growth appeared to be "transitory."

The Fed cut its forecast for economic growth this year to a range of 2.7 percent to 2.9 percent from an April forecast of 3.1 percent to 3.3

percent. It also cut its forecast for next year to a range of 3.3 percent to 3.7 percent from an earlier 3.5 percent to 4.2 percent. The Fed also said unemployment would stay higher than it had expected earlier.

In a policy statement issued at the end of a two-day meeting, the Fed blamed the worsening economic outlook in part on higher energy prices and the earthquake and tsunami in Japan, which slowed production of cars and other products.

But at a press conference afterward, the second of what the Fed

says will be regular question-and-answer sessions with reporters, Bernanke conceded the economy's troubles are more puzzling and potentially more long-lasting than a pair of temporary shocks.

The Fed announcement, at 12:30 p.m., had little effect on the stock and bond markets. Bernanke began speaking at 2:15, and stocks started falling at about 2:30, when he acknowledged that some of the economy's problems could linger into next year. The Dow Jones industrial

How Fed policymakers control the economy

The Federal Reserve's chief policymaking group, the Federal Open Market Committee, has vast power over the economy through its ability to set monetary policy.

Here is a look at how the FOMC operates.

Q: What is the FOMC's primary role?

A: Its mission is to keep the economy, inflation and employment on a healthy track. When the economy weakens, Fed policymakers cut interest rates or keep them low. The lower interest rates are aimed at

promoting increased borrowing and spending by consumers and businesses to spur economic growth.

When the economy grows so fast that inflation becomes a threat, Fed policymakers raise rates or keep them high. That makes it costlier for people to get loans and means less borrowing and spending. Economic activity slows and inflation pressures ease.

Q: How does the FOMC move interest rates?

A: Its policymakers decide whether to buy securities from banks. The banks sell those securities to the Fed and receive money from the Fed which they can use to make more loans. That acts to lower the interest that banks charge for those loans. Conversely, if the Fed wants to raise interest rates, it sells Treasury securities to the banks, pulling money out of the financial system and raising the cost for loans. The Federal Reserve Bank of New York is responsible for conducting these operations.

Low-income prepaid-card users face higher fees

WASHINGTON — Millions of poor Americans who use prepaid debit cards could soon face higher fees.

Under a rule to take effect in July, companies that issue debit cards must reduce the fees they charge retailers. To recoup their lost revenue, banks that offer the cards are raising fees for people who use them.

People who use prepaid debit cards, typically low-income consumers and those collecting government benefits, are supposed to be shielded from the fee hikes. To protect them, the rule provided an exemption: It let companies that issue prepaid cards keep charging retailers higher rates.

But that exemption could take up to a year to enact. In the meantime, card companies will likely charge users of prepaid cards higher fees to recoup the lost revenue.

About 70 percent of prepaid card users earn under \$45,000, according to data from Aite Group, a re-

search firm. The cards, preloaded with cash, give users easy access to their money. Others use them to receive government benefits.

Annual fees for the cards can run \$108 to \$320, according to data analyzed by the consulting firm Bretton Woods Inc. To make up the swipe-fee revenue they'd lose while the exemption is phased in, card issuers would need to raise fees by up to \$220.

If prepaid-card companies can't collect high swipe-fees, "lower-income people are going to get clobbered," said Todd Zywicki, a George Mason University law professor.

Michelle Coppola, a sales consultant near Roanoke, Va., says she struggled with banks' minimum-balance rules and overdraft fees before switching to prepaid cards.

"There's been times when I haven't made enough money on my job, and I couldn't keep up with the amount of money the bank wanted in the account," said Coppola, 50.

With a prepaid card, "If I don't have enough money, I don't have to worry about fees," she said.

Coppola's card costs \$9.95 for activation, plus \$8.95 a month and \$2.50 for each ATM withdrawal. If her fees jumped, Coppola said she'd switch to a bank account, even though she might pay more in fees,

The company also plans to roll out a Prius wagon in October.

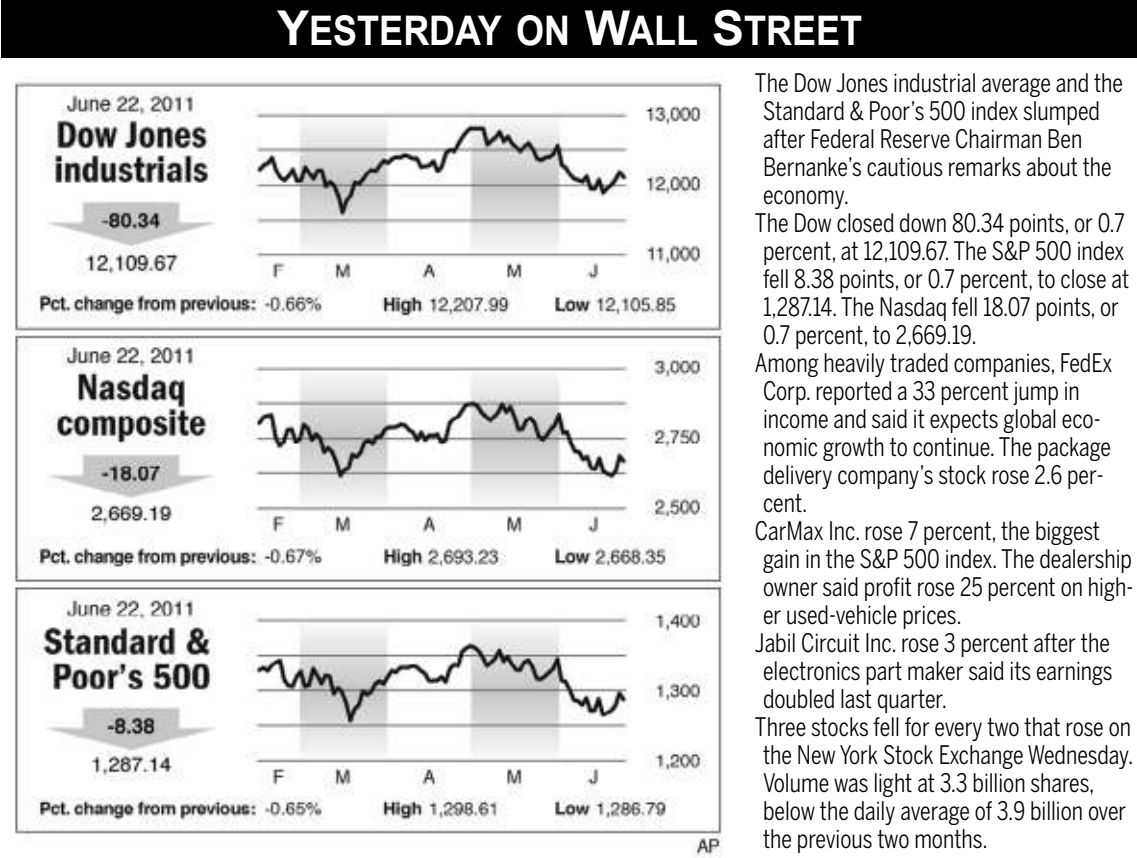

The Dow Jones industrial average and the Standard & Poor's 500 index slumped after Federal Reserve Chairman Ben Bernanke's cautious remarks about the economy.

The Dow closed down 80.34 points, or 0.7 percent, at 12,109.67. The S&P 500 index fell 8.38 points, or 0.7 percent, to close at 1,287.14. The Nasdaq fell 18.07 points, or 0.7 percent, to 2,669.19.

Among heavily traded companies, FedEx Corp. reported a 33 percent jump in income and said it expects global economic growth to continue. The package delivery company's stock rose 2.6 percent.

CarMax Inc. rose 7 percent, the biggest gain in the S&P 500 index. The dealership owner said profit rose 25 percent on higher used-vehicle prices.

Jabil Circuit Inc. rose 3 percent after the electronics part maker said its earnings doubled last quarter.

Three stocks fell for every two that rose on the New York Stock Exchange Wednesday. Volume was light at 3.3 billion shares, below the daily average of 3.9 billion over the previous two months.

Obama: 30k-plus troops leaving Afghanistan

President defers to public on speed of exit

WASHINGTON — President Barack Obama announced plans Wednesday to pull 33,000 U.S. troops out of Afghanistan well before next year's election, signaling a rapid drawdown sure to please Americans weary of the nearly decade-long war and its costs.

The quick drawdown will be faster than military commanders had recommended. Instead, it reflects growing public pressure to get out of Afghanistan and to stop spending hundreds of billions of dollars on faraway conflict at a time the U.S. government is grappling with record deficits.

"America, it is time to focus on nation building here at home," he said in a nationally televised address from the White House.

"The tide of war is receding. Fewer of our sons and daughters are serving in harm's way. We have ended our combat mission in Iraq, with 100,000 American troops already out of that country. And even as there will be dark days ahead in Afghanistan, the light of a secure peace can be seen in the distance. These long wars will come to a responsible end."

Obama said he will withdraw 10,000 troops by the end of this year, with another 23,000 out by September of next year — at the latest. Most will return to their home bases — the vast ma-

jority of those in the U.S.

That would end the surge of 33,000 troops he announced in December 2009, and leave about 68,000 U.S. troops there.

Obama will meet with NATO allies next May in Chicago to plot the final drawdown of those and other allied troops by 2014, when they hope Afghan forces will be able to guard against any comeback by al-Qaida terrorists or the Taliban regime that had protected them.

It's possible to draw down the troops now, he said, because the long war and surge of extra forces has achieved its goal: denying a haven to the al-Qaida terror network, which used Afghanistan as its base while planning its 2001 attacks on the U.S.

"We are starting this drawdown from a position of strength," Obama said. "Al-Qaida is under more pressure than at any time since 9/11. Together with the Pakistanis, we have taken out more than half of al-Qaida's leadership. And thanks to our intelligence professionals and Special Forces, we

killed Osama bin Laden, the only leader that al-Qaida had ever known."

After weeks of internal debates, Obama settled on a middle-of-the-road approach between the military's recommendations of a slower drawdown and the push for a faster withdrawal coming from members of both major political parties, including Vice President Joe Biden and Sen. Richard Lugar, R-Ind., a top member of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee.

Lugar plans to tell Secretary of State Hillary Clinton at a congressional hearing Thursday that the entire mission in Afghanistan should be redefined away from the broad counterinsurgency strategy that requires large troop levels to a narrower counterterrorism plan.

"No rational review would commit nearly 100,000 troops and \$100 billion a year to Afghanistan," Lugar plans to tell Clinton, according to an advance text of his remarks.

"The country does not hold that level of strategic

value for us, especially at a time when our nation is confronting a debt crisis and our armed forces are being strained by repeated combat deployments."

Obama was given "a range of options," including some that would have drawn down the troops at a slower pace, according to a senior administration official who spoke on condition of anonymity as a matter of White House policy. "Some of those options would not have removed troops as fast as the president chose to do," he said.

Those options came from Army Gen. David Petraeus, but also apparently from others within the administration. Biden, for example, has been an advocate for a much smaller troop presence focused on countering terrorism, as Lugar proposes.

"The president's decision was fully within the range of options that were presented to him and has the full support of his national security team," the official added.

Administration officials stressed that the 33,000

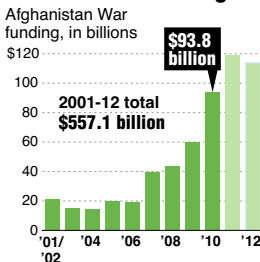


President Barack Obama delivers an address from the East Room of the White House on Wednesday on his plan to drawdown U.S. troops in Afghanistan.

troops could be withdrawn even faster, but left no room for a slower withdrawal.

"That will be no later than September. It could be before," one administration official said. "There will be flexibility in the precise timing, but by next summer the full 33,000 troops associated with the surge will be out of Afghanistan."

While Americans are eager to get out of the war — polls show a majority want out as soon as possible — Obama is gambling that the remaining U.S.-led NATO troops and Afghan forces can keep a lid on bloodletting as he enters the home stretch of his re-election campaign.

Some U.S. officials worry that Afghan forces — especially the police — will be hard-pressed to maintain security in the Taliban's former southern strongholds vacated by U.S. troops.

Already, there are reports that new U.S.-backed village militias are committing crimes that could prompt locals to invite the Taliban back to restore security, said Thomas Ruttig of the Afghan Analysts Network, a respected Kabul-based analysis group.

"There are more and more

reports that they are raping and robbing," Ruttig said. "That won't create stability."

Some experts — and privately, some U.S. officials — also question the administration's claim that the surge has succeeded in "reversing the Taliban's momentum." Instead, these experts said, the insurgents have laid low or shifted to other parts of the country to wait out the U.S. withdrawal.

"The surge has not worked in really weakening the Taliban. Yes, there were a lot killed, but they were replaced, and the Taliban is even extending into new areas," Ruttig said. "It's a zero-sum game, I would say."

Moreover, said former Afghan Interior Minister Ali Jalali, corruption remains rampant and the Afghan government still lacks the ability to provide basic services.

"When the surge was decided, they (the Obama administration) said it would be conditions-based," Jalali said. "If it really is conditions-based, there shouldn't be a major drawdown this year or next."

No charges against bar in 'Jackass' star's death

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Pennsylvania state police say no charges are planned against the suburban Philadelphia bar where "Jackass" star Ryan Dunn drank just before he and a passenger died in a fiery one-car crash this week.

Sgt. William La Torre of the police Bureau of Liquor Enforcement tells The As-

sociated Press that the agency has determined that Dunn was apparently not visibly intoxicated when he was served two beers and six shots by bar employees over four hours.

Police said 34-year-old Dunn had a blood-alcohol content more than twice the legal limit when the car crashed Monday morning.

La Torre said fans, not bar staff, apparently brought Dunn three more drinks at a back table out of sight of the bartender at the end of the night.

New poll: Slow recovery weakens Obama support

WASHINGTON — Mired in economic worry, Americans are growing gloomier about where the country is headed and how President Barack Obama is leading it. Opinions of the economy are at the lowest of the year as high gas prices, anemic hiring and financial turmoil abroad shake a nation's confidence.

Obama has hit new highs he'd like to avoid — in public disapproval over his handling of the economy in general and unemployment in particular — according to a new Associated Press-GfK poll. In addition, more disapprove of his handling of health care and the federal budget deficit than in the past.

The poll shows that four out of five people now believe the economy is in poor shape. And, separately, Federal Reserve Chairman Ben Bernanke said Wednesday that some causes of the slowdown, including a depressed housing market, could persist into next year. Bernanke said the Fed believes growth will pick up going into 2012 but at a slower

pace than expected.

How slow is a matter of high interest at the White House. A little more than 16 months before the November 2012 election, the public is split on whether the president deserves a second term.

For the first time this year in AP-GfK polling, respondents who say Obama deserves re-election have fallen below 50 percent into a virtual split of 48-47 in favor, a demanding challenge for him. Economic concern has quickly stripped away the gloss he briefly gained after the death of Osama bin Laden.

Obama's re-election team is no doubt concerned as well. The president has been traveling every week for months to campaign battleground states to promote job initiatives. He acknowledges

the sluggishness of the recovery, illustrated by May's uptick in unemployment.

The price of gasoline at the pump has declined a bit recently though it is still nearly 90 cents higher on average than a year ago. White House officials are also monitoring the precarious fiscal situation in Greece where a default by the government could send damaging financial tremors across world markets.

Obama's overall approval rating fell to 52 percent in the new poll, in line with his ratings before the daring raid in Pakistan by U.S. commandos last month that killed bin Laden.

The erosion of approval is primarily among women. Last month, 57 percent said they felt he deserved re-election, a figure that dipped to 48 percent this month.

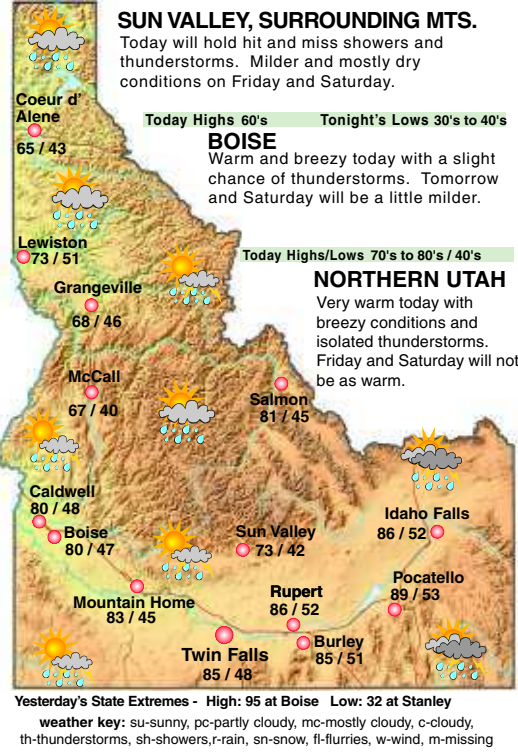

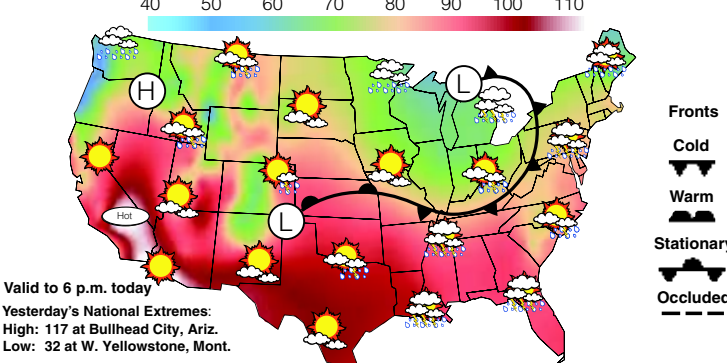

Small river could bring historic floods to N.D.

MINOT, N.D. — Plastic sheeting hung over the apartment building like a shroud, stretching from the eaves to the ground. Across it, someone had spray-painted the word “pray” and drawn a line labeled “1969” — the level where floodwaters had risen the last time the Souris River climbed out of its banks in Minot.

That line stood just 2 feet above the ground. But the water is expected to climb far higher in parts of this Air Force town over the coming days as the little-known waterway swells from rain and snowmelt. It could bring the region's worst flooding in four decades.

As many as 10,000 people raced to evacuate Wednesday as water began spilling over Minot's levees. The river, which begins in the Canadian province of Saskatchewan and flows for a short distance though North Dakota, was all but certain to inundate thou-

sands of homes and businesses during the next week.

A quarter of the city's 41,000 residents had been facing a 6 p.m. evacuation order, but emergency sirens blared at 1 p.m., warning people that the deadline had been moved up by five full hours. Before making their escape, city crews sandbagged critical structures such as the water-treatment plant, city hall and school buildings.

“I feel so bad for everybody,” said Robyn Whitlow, who lives outside the evacuation zone but was helping people load their belongings. She burst into tears when the siren went off.

The deluge along the Souris was expected to easily exceed a 1969 flood, possibly reaching 13.5 feet above flood stage by Monday. The river is expected to top the historical record set in 1881 by more than 5 feet.

Nearby, Steve and Michelle Benjamin were hard at work hauling an entertainment center, desk chairs and bicycles over an emergency levee

to a trailer pickup truck. It was the last of nearly a dozen loads.

Michelle Benjamin, 46, stood on the deck along the river, watching water trickle over the dike.

“Oh my God,” she said as she fought back tears. “It's not easy starting over at this age.”

The couple, who have lived in a landscaped five-bedroom modular home for 16

years, had moved their belongings out of the river's path twice in less than a month. Some 10,000 residents evacuated before the river hit 5 feet above flood stage. They were allowed to

return but were warned to be ready to leave again quickly.

The repeated moves were particularly taxing for Steve Benjamin, 51, who broke his back in 1984 and has had several surgeries, evidenced by a 20-inch scar spanning much of his bare back. The last item waiting to be loaded — other than their dogs Buster and Bear — was a water bed.

Benjamin said the couple was likely heading to his son's house, which was in Minot but on higher ground outside the evacuation zone.

“I don't think the reality will set in until tomorrow, when we see the water in the house,” he said.

Minot Mayor Curt Zimbelman warned that the river would top the levees earlier than expected and urged residents still moving their belongings to “be prepared to move quickly.”

The National Weather Service in Bismarck also issued a flash-flood warning along the river from Burlington through Minot and Logan to Sawyer.

Potato chips are piling on the pounds, study finds

LOS ANGELES — Blame the potato chip. It's the biggest demon behind that pound-a-year weight creep that plagues many of us, a major diet study found. Bigger than soda, candy and ice cream.

And the reason is partly that old advertising cliché: You can't eat just one.

“They're very tasty and they have a very good texture. People generally don't take one or two chips. They have a whole bag,” said obesity expert Dr. F. Xavier Pi-Sunyer of the St. Luke's-Roosevelt Hospital Center in New York.

What we eat and how much of it we consume has far more impact than exercise and most other habits do on long-term weight gain, according to the study by Harvard University scientists. It's the most comprehensive look yet at the effect of individual foods and lifestyle choices like sleep time and quitting smoking.

The results are in Thursday's New England Journal of Medicine.

Weight problems are epidemic. Two-thirds of American adults are overweight or obese. Childhood obesity has tripled in the past three decades. Pounds often are packed on gradually over decades, and many people struggle to limit weight gain without realizing what's causing it.

The new study finds food choices are key. The message:

Eat more fruits, vegetables, whole grains and nuts. Cut back on potatoes, red meat, sweets and soda.

“There is no magic bullet for weight control,” said one study leader, Dr. Frank Hu. “Diet and exercise are important for preventing weight gain, but diet clearly plays a bigger role.”

Doctors analyzed changes in diet and lifestyle habits of 120,877 people from three long-running medical studies. All were health professionals and not obese at the start. Their weight was measured every four years for up to two decades, and they detailed their diet on questionnaires.

On average, participants gained nearly 17 pounds over the 20-year period.

For each four-year period, food choices contributed nearly 4 pounds. Exercise, for

those who did it, cut less than 2 pounds.

Potato chips were the biggest dietary offender. Each daily serving containing 1 ounce (about 15 chips and 160 calories) led to a 1.69-pound uptick over four years. That's compared to sweets and desserts, which added 0.41 pound.

For starchy potatoes other than chips, the gain was 1.28 pounds. Within the spud group, french fries were worse for the waist than boiled, baked or mashed potatoes. That's because a serving of large fries contains between 500 to 600 calories compared with a serving of a large baked potato at 280 calories.

Soda added a pound over four years. Eating more fruits and vegetables and other unprocessed foods led to less weight gain, probably because they are fiber-rich and make

people feel fuller. For each four-year period, these factors had these effects on weight:

- An alcoholic drink a day, 0.41-pound increase.
- Watching an hour of TV a day, 0.31-pound increase.
- Recently quitting smoking, 5-pound increase.

People who slept more or less than six to eight hours a night gained more weight.

The study was funded by the National Institutes of Health and a foundation. Several researchers reported receiving fees from drug and nutrition companies.

“Humans naturally like fat and sweet,” said Dr. David Heber, director of the UCLA Center for Human Nutrition, who had no role in the study. “That's why we always tell people to eat their fruits and vegetables.”

Pi-Sunyer, who also wasn't involved in the research, said the study gives useful advice.

“It's hard to lose weight once you gain it,” he said. “Anything that will give people a clue about what might prevent weight gain if they follow through with it is helpful.”

The federal government earlier this year issued new dietary guidelines advising people to eat smarter. This month, it ditched the food pyramid — the longtime symbol of healthy eating — in favor of a dinner plate divided into four sections containing fruits, vegetables, protein and grains.

Glittering: trendy new tactic for some activists

NEW YORK — Many VIPs have gotten a pie in the face from protesters: Bill Gates, for one, and years earlier, Anita Bryant. President George W. Bush dodged a shoe hurled at him. This year, for some liberal activists, the guerrilla tactic of choice is a shower of glitter tossed from close range.

So far, three Republican presidential candidates — Newt Gingrich, Tim Pawlenty and Michele Bachmann — have been targeted by the so-called glitterati, primarily because of their opposition to various gay-rights causes.

Among the public, there's been lively online debate about whether the tactic is refreshing and effective, childish and rude, or even worse. Some critics wanted the perpetrators manhandled, Tasered and jailed.

Among gay activists, the question is whether to extend the glittering campaign or call it off.

“I think some glitter brings some magic into the debate,” said Michael Mitchell of Stonewall Democrats, a network of gay and lesbian Democratic clubs. “But it has to be done strategically and backed up

by effective messages.”

A rundown of the incidents to date:

- On May 17, Gingrich and his wife, Callista, were showered with glitter at a book signing in Minneapolis. The perpetrator was Nick Espinosa, an activist and occasional political prankster who yelled at the former House speaker, “Stop the hate. Stop the anti-gay politics.”
- On June 16, two activists from the left-wing group CodePink dumped glitter on Pawlenty while he was signing books at a health insurance conference in San Francisco. Before being led away, the activists berated the former Minnesota governor for his conservative views on gay rights and abortion.

- On June 18, an activist flung glitter toward Bachmann just after the Minnesota congresswoman finished a speech at a conservative conference in Minneapolis. The activist, Rachel Lang, said afterward that she was protesting Bachmann's “hateful and anti-gay rhetoric.”
- In each case, the targeted candidates and their staff have had little to say in public about the glitterings. Gingrich smiled as he brushed away the glitter, and said, “Nice to live in a free country.”



THRILL SEEKING AT 82

Twin Falls octogenarian’s BASE jump is latest episode in extreme adventures

Lena Thomas likes the adventurous side of life. And at age 82, there’s not much the octogenarian hasn’t done in outdoor recreation.

She swam with dolphins in Hawaii, jumped out of an airplane in California and floated the rapids in Colorado.

“Any time I go anywhere, I like to try something new,” the Twin Falls woman said.

Thomas checked off another item on her to-do list Friday, when she and 58-year-old daughter Terri Scott, of Concord, Calif., BASE jumped off the Perrine Bridge.

Both jumped tandem with an instructor, and an observer found Thomas remarkable.

“There’s no official record, but I can pretty much say that she’s the oldest person in the world to have BASE jumped,” said Mark Kissner, co-owner of Twin Falls-based Tandem BASE, who’s been jumping since 1998.

The last person credited by the jumping community with an unofficial record was

a 72-year-old man, he said.

If Thomas was nervous, Kissner said, she didn’t show it.

“It was fantastic,” Thomas said. “The instructors were so careful, they explained

everything to us at least twice. ... When you step out onto that platform, you feel like you’re going down head-first, right down to the water.”

The jump lasted only 45 to

60 seconds, but she completed it in style.

“I landed on my feet,” she said.

Thomas began seeking extreme adventure after her husband died in 1994. He

wasn’t a big fan of extreme sports, but Thomas always has been.

“I’ve water skied, done a lot of hiking and backpacking. But I don’t do dangerous things,” she said.

Others might consider jumping out of airplanes or off bridges dangerous, but Thomas doesn’t. Not when you’re connected to someone else, anyway.

“When I’m with an instructor, I know he’s going to get me down safely or he’s not going to be safe,” she said.

Scott said she’s been on a number of adventures with her mom, and BASE jumping is one of the most memorable.

“She’s always interested in doing something,” Scott said. “Once she had me skydive with her, I figured this couldn’t be any worse.

“Doing something new is exciting to her.”

Thomas once told a co-worker that if there’s a flight to Mars by the time she turns 100, she wants to be on it.

Whether on four wheels or two legs, Bennett Hills is an exciting place to explore

As current snowpack hangs onto the mountains much longer than normal, expeditions into the high country might be delayed. But don’t give up hope — plenty of elevated landscapes below the snowline are still ripe for exploration.

One such is the Mount Bennett Hills, which offers access via a handful of roads that thread through the serrated landscape and, for hikers, a half-dozen wilderness study areas with a variety of virtues.

The Bureau of Land Management’s official classification of wilderness study areas is unique to that agency. An initial inventory and subsequent evaluation resulted in a recommendation on whether each is “suitable” or “non-suitable” for a formal wilderness designation.

Their ultimate fate, however, is up to the discretion of Congress, said David Freiberg, outdoor recreation planner for the BLM’s Shoshone Field Office. And until something official comes from Washington, D.C., the wilderness study areas’ management will continue to ensure that their existing characteristics won’t be impaired.

Before physically exploring the Bennett Hills, first find a good relief map of Idaho and give it a proper inspection. The range stands out from nearly all other landforms in the state due to its relative isolation and unique east-west ridgeline.

The crest’s north slope plunges down steeply to the flat Camas Prairie, while in the opposite direction, a more gradual fall fosters the creation of numerous mystifying canyons and ravines cutting toward the Snake River.

IF YOU GO

While in the Bennett Hills, you might consider exploring these sites:

- Several roads access King Hill Creek, the Bennett Hills’ most significant drainage, including the BLM road that leaves the highway just outside the town of King Hill. The area has many rocky grades.
 - Deer Creek, a wilderness study area to the east, is accessed by the Davis Mountain Road, another route that turns into a four-wheel drive endeavor. The road climbs high into the Bennett Hills, offering a rewarding vista of Deer Creek and other scenic drainages. This road, if followed far enough to the east, will access the Gooding City of Rocks and hook back into Highway 46.
- Before exploring the Bennett Hills, find a good relief map. Detailed maps and travel restrictions for each of the area’s six wilderness study areas are available at blm.gov/id/st/en/fo/shoshone/02.html

Finding four species in three days on Minnesota-Ontario border

ALONG THE MINNESOTA-ONTARIO BORDER — The hike into and out of Slim Lake is a half-mile long and straight up both ways. Lake trout were said to be there and also smallmouth bass.

A canoe and a small boat were cached on its shore, and at the end of the portage we pushed onto the cold, clear lake in the two craft. Rain spat from a low sky. A downpour followed. We let out line, and more line still, falling easily into another day of fishing.

Izaak Walton said that God never has made a more “calm, quiet innocent recreation than angling,” and the four of us wouldn’t argue. Contented in the bow of the canoe that I paddled from the stern, Dan Steichen of West Lakeland, Minn., seemed dwarfed by the steep rock shoreline not far away. Nearby, brothers Bob (of Stillwater, Minn.) and Pete (of Grant, Minn.) Simmet trolled in their loaner boat, one rod extending to each side, like outriggers.

Cruising for lake trout, we pulled behind us variations of small, shiny spoons, and wondered just how deep these cold-water fish might be. Though lake trout inhabit only a relative handful of Minnesota lakes, they are bountiful a stone’s throw away, in Ontario, where a quarter of the world’s population swims.

There

A lake trout struck my lure just that quickly, its struggle disproportionate to its weight, and my line tightening nearly straight toward the lake bottom, telltale of the head-tossing protests these fish mount.

Turning toward me, and peering into the depths, Dan awaited the congealing in the clear water of a fish that is as pretty as it is stubborn.

Nice fish

Alongside the canoe, the trout was resplendent. Gray-brown on its sides, to silvery, with light-colored spots, the fish had suspended itself far beneath the canoe before succumbing to its fate.

Hoisting the fish by a gill plate, I introduced it briefly to the human netherworld, then removed the lure, releasing it again to roam its home waters.

A happy conclusion to the skirmish depended on the canoe staying upright, and Dan and I had accomplished that.

Now we again let out our lines, and more line still, our shiny spoons tightening their angles of descent as we did.

Let’s get another

The rain had let up. Not quite like glass, neither was the lake’s surface anything more than ripples, even to the far windward shore.

Again I pulled on my paddle, bracing the butt of my rod against the canoe’s floor, and sandwiching it in front of one ankle and behind the other.

Our plan for three days on giant Lac la Croix, which straddles the Minnesota-Ontario border, and other lakes thereabouts, was to catch as many fish as possible. More than that, we wanted to run the table on four species, landing some of each. Lake trout and smallmouth bass were two. Also we targeted northern pike and, of course, walleyes.

The day before we portaged into Slim Lake, we had fished for walleyes on Lac la Croix. The action had been good, and we also caught northerns, though none of them big. Wes Ot-

tertail, a longtime friend who lives in the Lac la Croix First Nation village on the lake, and Howard Brown, another village resident, had guided Pete, Bob, Dan and me in two boats a long distance up Lac la Croix, to Twin Falls, where the fast-moving Maligne River spills into the big lake.

It’s at Twin Falls where I often begin springtime canoe trips into Quetico Provincial Park, paddling upriver and eventually into Poohbah and other lakes. This year, however, we were fishing from a home base, a cabin at Zup’s Fishing Resort and Canoe Outfitters on an island on the Canadian side of Lac la Croix, and heading out each morning from there, fishing rods in hand.

We had come seeking fish, but not only that. The suspension of familiar lives and familiar schedules is a big part of these trips. Norman Maclean, in the 1976 novella “A River Runs Through It,” argued that three obligations should never be subject to tardiness: work, church and fishing. Not least of these should be fishing; alone as needed, but just as well also with others. Passing daylong good times on the water, cooking lunch beneath evergreen canopies, then motor-ing, in early evening, toward a homespun cabin, deflate pressure like pins into balloons. Vagrant anglers might even sit in a sauna upon their return to camp, as we did at Zup’s, unwinding in the Fin-

landers’ version of a sweat lodge and excising routine’s dulling effects on the spirit. Uncorking a dram of tangle-foot is also an option as a prelude to dinner. All of these and more are part of Zen and the art of vagabond angling, and can kick-start for the fisherman the return of original thought, the journey’s real whopper.

As we learned on Slim Lake, not all smallmouth bass had yet moved into the shallows, preparing to spawn. But some had, and some of those would hit poppers or similar floating baits, boiling the glassy lake surface before erupting, mouths agape.

Divvying up a large bay where smallies were likely to hang out, we deployed from our two boats electric trolling motors, while overhead a bald eagle pivoted in sweeping arcs, suggesting the handiwork of angels.

Just another day, perhaps, to the big bird. But to us, floating atop Lac la Croix, casting to shorelines framed by white and red pines, jack pines and aspens, with ravens on the wing throughout, the morning bore the promise of hope itself.

As it turned out, the catching on this morning was only pretty good. But the fishing was excellent, an important distinction.

As Thoreau said, “Many go fishing all their lives without knowing it is not fish they are after,” and we wanted not to make that mistake.

Idaho Power to stock catfish at Milner Reservoir

Idaho Power fisheries biologists will complete the company’s 19th annual catfish stocking at Milner Reservoir on the Snake River near Burley. The company will release about 20,000 six- to eight-inch channel catfish in the reservoir on Wednesday.

Fish are stocked at two locations in Milner Reservoir: the Lex Kunau Park boat ramp near the Highway 27 Bridge in Burley, and the North Freedom Park boat ramp near the Highway 30 Bridge in Heyburn.

The fish release is a requirement under the terms of the company’s federal license to operate its 57.5-megawatt hydroelectric generation facility at the 104-year-old Milner Dam. Idaho Power has operated the power plant since 1992.

“I heard about someone that found an orphaned deer fawn and raised it to an adult. I’d like to do this. What kinds of permits are required?”

A The short answer is, only under very rare circumstances would the department authorize anyone to possess a wild fawn deer or calf elk.

In the past it may have been common in Idaho to allow a “Good Samaritan” to raise an orphaned fawn and “release it back into the wild.”

When Idaho’s human population was sparsely distributed, deer that were habituated to humans were often released on large ranches and farms.

Gracious landowners tolerated these deer that often lived out their lives within the security of the ranch. These deer were usually not marked, so the success of these animals returning to the wild could not be evaluated. No doubt some were successful and some were not. But nature decided, not people.

Idaho’s population is no longer sparsely distributed. Deer habituated to humans in urban environments damage property and threaten personal safety. Several years ago a buck deer that was raised in captivity as a fawn attacked and injured several people. One elderly lady was charged repeatedly, knocked down and left with numerous bruises on her legs. In the end, the deer was euthanized due to the danger it posed to the public.

To add a layer of complexity of the issue, several wildlife diseases, unknown in the past, now pose a threat to other wild deer, domestic livestock, and people. Examples include chronic wasting disease, brucellosis, epizootic hemorrhagic disease, and tuberculosis.

Chronic wasting disease has devastated wild deer populations across country and caused several states to prohibit importation of the carcass or skull of deer taken by hunters. Some think its spread is by contact with infected animals or body fluids.

Brucellosis in elk, bison, and cattle in Wyoming threaten Idaho’s livestock industry. Epizootic hemorrhagic disease (EHD) killed thousands of deer in the Clearwater drainage a few years ago. Two workers were infected with tuberculosis when exposed to infected elk in a game farm in Montana.

Many state wildlife

agencies are restricting commercial game farms and private collections of wildlife. They are also developing quarantine protocols to prevent the movement of infected or potentially infected animals. These diseases pose significant threats to wild deer and elk populations throughout Idaho. Domestication of wild deer is one of the issues related disease transmission to wild populations.

The question remains, “What can we do with orphaned fawn deer?”

First, is it really orphaned or was it picked up while the doe was away? How old is the fawn; can it fend for itself with a little protection?

Department employees understand the human emotion generated by fawn deer and want to be compassionate about the fate of these wild deer fawns. Employees first go to great lengths to reunite the fawn with the doe. There is no better option than having the fawn raised in the wild with its mother.

Our next option includes locating a licensed zoo or research facility in need of deer fawns. In the past, we’ve successfully placed several fawns in chronic-wasting disease research facilities in Wyoming and Colorado. Some may argue this is a cruel option, but the fawn can play an important role benefiting future wild deer populations.

If no other options exist, the fawn will be placed in a rehab facility. The people that run these facilities go to great lengths to maintain as much wildness as possible to maximize the fawn’s opportunity for survival after release. There are very few of these facilities in Idaho and their abilities are overwhelmed quickly.

At this point in time, the department is strongly discouraging people from picking up young animals. Our first concern is quickly reuniting young animals with their mothers. We are obligated to use sound wildlife management principles to maintain Idaho’s resources, and, in this case, other options are necessary but far less desirable.

Pronghorn late during annual Wyoming trek

JACKSON, Wyo. (AP) — A heavy snowpack has delayed the annual spring migration of part of a herd of pronghorn antelope in western Wyoming.

Every spring, several hundred antelope trek up to 150 miles to Grand Teton National Park from their winter grounds to the south. Of all the mammals in the Western Hemisphere, only the Arctic caribou migrates farther. Only about a third have

reached their Jackson Hole destination so far this year.

The late arrival has some wildlife biologists wondering about the ramifications of the delay. Of particular interest are females that may have fawned before completing the journey.

Wildlife biologist Steve Cain tells the Jackson Hole News & Guide that it remains to be seen whether those offspring learn the entire migration route.

Natural Resources Camp connects youth to the environment

Now in its 52nd year, the camp offers youth, ages 12 to 14, the chance to learn hands-on about wildlife, rangeland, forests, water and soil during the camp.

Amber Moore, University of Idaho Extension soil scientist at Twin Falls, directs the summer camp, which drew 63 young people last year.

Early registrations are running ahead of normal this year, Moore said, so “we’re looking for a pretty full camp.”

The camp will begin its second year of a popular new cabin leader-in-training program to help groom participants for leadership roles, she added. The campers will learn how to protect the environment and use it wisely through activities in camp and in nearby

rangelands, forests and streams.

The camp is located north of Ketchum along Idaho Highway 21. The camp begins at 12:30 p.m. on June 27 and ends at 10:30 a.m. on July 2.

Activities during the camp encourage participants to think about and debate natural resource issues and help Idaho protect its abundant natural resources for the future by better understanding the trade-offs in environmental management.

When favorite fishing holes sour, it's hard to know when to quit

DULUTH, Minn. — Apparently, there is no help for guys like us.

We are like gamblers who have had one big pay-off at the casino and keep going back in hopes of another.

Seven of us made the almost annual trip to the secret walleye lake last week. We made the extended day trip to the little lake up north in the Boundary Waters Canoe Area Wilderness. We harbored visions of heavy stringers. Maybe one of us would catch a 29-inch walleye, as Bob had done on that first trip.

But we don't need big fish. Mostly, we want action. We're happy with modest walleyes whose fillets fit well

in a frying pan. We have found them there before in numbers that rival our best days anywhere. These were bonanza days, where everyone caught fish and we brought out limits.

In the past couple of trips, things haven't been quite so good. We caught walleyes, but we had to work for them, and we finished well short of our limit. Which would be no big deal except that getting to this lake is not easy.

The morning held all kinds of promise when we walked out of Britton's at 7 a.m. Blue sky. A light westerly breeze. Shirt-sleeve warmth.

By the time we reached our destination lake, the day had soured. The wind was brisk, now from the northeast. The day grew cool. The

sky spit mist, drizzle and full-on rain. It was one of those days when your hands were so cold that the water felt warm.

We fished all of our regular spots. Like gamblers plugging more quarters into a slot machine, we kept jigging with poor results.

The seven of us had just 11 walleyes on the stringers when we decided to scramble up slick rocks for lunch on a windswept island. Eleven. And we were none too proud of some of them.

We tried again after lunch, but the miserly morning bite had become a non-existent afternoon bite. We packed up and got out of there by 4 p.m. Like a litter of wet puppies, we flopped over the portages and paddled our injured psyches

back to civilization.

Granted, we love the canoe country, or we wouldn't work so hard to make this 18-hour day trip. Even our loved ones, with whom we have graciously shared the bounty of our previous catches, have questioned our judgment.

"Why do you do that?" they ask.

The answer was even harder to articulate. How do you divvy up 11 walleyes among seven guys, anyway?

The last portage was a long one, as it always is. We arrived at our vehicles sweaty and bedraggled and humbled. The ringleader of our little group dropped his soggy pack to the ground.

"Never again," he said.

We'll see what he says next June.

Kayak race returns to Red Lodge

RED LODGE, Mont. — Hooting at feats of athleticism, Eskimo rolls and big splashes, a crowd of enthusiastic spectators lined the roaring route of the Rock Creek Slalom Kayak Race on Saturday.

"It was a great place to hold the event as far as people being able to watch," said Nate Winning, who helped organize the event. "Hopefully we can build on it for next year."

The race was set between the Red Box Car Restaurant and Rotary Park along Highway 212. Kayakers had to pass through the multitude of white plastic pipe gates that hung from a rope over the top of the water, similar to an alpine skier running a slalom course. The course zigzagged across the stream to incorporate boulders, waves and rapids. The event was timed, with time added for missing gates. The three categories of racers were beginners, experts and women.

The race coincided with

Red Lodge's celebration of the 75th anniversary of the opening of the Beartooth Highway, a huge drawing card for summer visitors. With many people in town for the parade and other events, the kayak race made for another fun outdoor activity.

"A lot of people, I believe, are interested in the sport, but they only see kayakers doing intimidating stuff like going off waterfalls," said Tyler Warne, who helped organize the event. "It's less intimidating for people to see kayakers run realistic water."

The race used to be an annual event, sponsored by the Beartooth Paddlers Society, before dying out in the early 1990s, said Winning, a Red

Lodge-based kayaker. His buddy, Carl Peterson, used to organize the race but recently suffered a stroke and can no longer paddle. It was with him in mind that Winning worked to get the event off the ground again.

"We had been paddling together — up until the time of his stroke — for four or six years," Winning said. "We got to be good friends through kayaking, and he would always talk about the race."

Winning took his idea to revive the race to Tyler Warne, at Sunshine Sports in Billings. Warne hooked Winning up with the Beartooth Paddlers Society.

"I joined and started

working with them on this event," Winning said. "It worked out really well."

Winning had little time to advertise the race, partially explaining the turnout of only about 16 paddlers. Rock Creek didn't cooperate, either, with lower-than-normal flows — kind of surprising considering that rivers and streams across much of Montana are running at record high levels causing a rash of flooding.

The lower water meant there were no eddies to make the race more complicated by forcing paddlers to work back upstream.

"The course was a challenge to set," Winning said. "It was pretty much a drag race down the river."

Next year, Winning would like to see the races expanded, possibly including a boater-cross race.

In boater-cross, three to four kayakers would line up in an eddy and race downstream head to head, preferably through Class IV whitewater.

"That would draw more of a crowd," he said.

Into the wild

The most popular of these chasms are undoubtedly those in the Gooding City of Rocks complex, where towering pillars, hoodoos and other rock formations leave a lasting impression.

Farther west lie a couple of other wilderness study areas that while perhaps are not quite as dramatic, feature country a bit more expansive and have qualities that also beg for a visit.

Two weekends ago I spent a day and a half giving a couple of these locales a quick review.

Several roads access King Hill Creek, the Bennett Hills' most significant drainage, but I first chose the BLM road that leaves the highway just outside the town of King Hill.

This route, following the wilderness study area's east boundary, soon became rough enough that walking seemed like it might be faster than the grinding crawl up successive, rocky grades.

Temporarily abandoning four-wheel drive mode, I

headed toward King Hill Creek and climbed to a vantage point above the convergence of the main stem and its west fork. Gazing downstream, I tracked the single, deep canyon as it curved away to meet the Snake River rim at Kings Crown.

Across the creek from me, eight or 10 pronghorn antelope, the sunlight's reflection easily exposing them, moved across a plateau. With the help of binoculars I spied several fawns, including two that edged far enough away from their mothers that a worried pursuit soon followed.

The direction that pulled at me was north, however, where the jumbled uplands of the Bennett Hills spawned the creek below. But not wanting to follow the isolated, rough road in a truck with an odometer boasting over a quarter-million miles, I retraced my route down to the highway, returned to Bliss, and doubled back north towards Hill City. Making one last turn onto the Dempsey

Meadows road, I returned to the edge of the King Hill Creek wilderness study area.

I hiked back to the drainage at a spot only five miles from my previous overlook. Fifteen hundred feet gain in elevation had produced a significant change in scenery. Antelope habitat had vanished; this up-and-down landscape holds some of the biggest mule deer bucks in the state, although no muleys showed themselves that afternoon.

Instead, I simply savored the stone formations and wildflowers that peppered the steep hillsides, along with the aspen and fir groves tucked inside the canyon's moist northeast facing slopes. I fantasized about crawling down to fish the creek's cold runoff for its small, but native red-band trout, but running low on both ambition and sunlight, I reluctantly returned to my truck.

The next morning I headed toward Deer Creek, the next wilderness study area to

the east. This region is accessed by the Davis Mountain Road, another route that turns into a four-wheel drive endeavor. The road climbs high into the Bennett Hills, offering a rewarding vista of Deer Creek and other scenic drainages.

Freiberg confirmed that this road, if followed far enough east, will access the Gooding City of Rocks and hook back into Highway 46.

"It's a neat drive, but brutal," he said, adding that a trip takes up to four hours and is more popular with travelers utilizing ATVs and specialized jeeps.

Freiberg advises caution when traveling anywhere in the Bennett Hills.

"Most of the roads between the wilderness study areas are primitive and not maintained, with washouts making them virtually impassable," he said. "It's easy to commit to a road and not find a place to turn around for several miles, or worse, head downward and find it very difficult to get back up."

Lifting the haze of bad lighting in the outdoors

Imagine if homes and businesses emitted smoke that prevented anyone in the Magic Valley from ever seeing the mountains to the north. This smoke isn't toxic, but at the same time, those emitting it could save money by not doing so. Would you want something to be done about it?

The foregoing, obviously, is a parable. The "smoke" is poorly shielded outdoor lighting, and the "mountains" are the starry sky. While not seeing mountains or stars is unlikely to be detrimental to one's health, few would deny that such views improve southern Idahoans' quality of life.

The International Dark-Sky Association (IDA, www.darksky.org) is a non-profit organization whose primary goal is the reduction of light pollution (that is, light shining where it serves no useful purpose and wastes energy).

The group's approach is a combination of education, advocacy, and acting as a clearing house for research into the negative effects of light pollution, which include health effects on humans, as well as an estimated \$2.2 billion of energy wasted in the U.S. each year.

The calculus of good lighting is pretty simple: By directing light only where it is needed, smaller wattage

fixtures can be used, and consequently less energy. While night-sky-friendly fixtures used to be more expensive, it's no longer the case (witness the new street lights illuminating Falls Avenue West in Twin Falls, which cast no light above the horizontal).

Ten years ago, a "good lighting" ordinance was voted down by the Twin Falls County commissioners. Nonetheless, many new businesses, recognizing the cost savings, are installing well-designed outdoor lighting.

This month, IDA posted a model lighting ordinance on its website. Read it, and ask yourself: What's the downside to a law that encourages energy savings, cost reduction, and clearing the "smoke" obscuring the starry heavens?

CBO: Without policy changes, debt crisis looms

WASHINGTON — The rapidly growing national debt could soon spark a European-style crisis unless Congress moves forcefully, the Congressional Budget Office warned Wednesday in a study that underscored the stakes for Vice President Joe Biden and negotiators working on a sweeping plan to reduce red ink.

Republicans seized on the

report to renew their push to reduce costs in federal benefit programs such as Medicare.

The report said the national debt, now \$14.3 trillion, is on pace to equal the annual size of the economy within a decade. It warned of a possible “sudden fiscal crisis” if it is left unchecked, with investors losing faith in the U.S. government’s ability to manage its fiscal affairs.

The study reverberated throughout the Capitol as Biden and senior lawmakers

spent several hours behind closed doors. The talks are aimed at outlining about \$2 trillion in deficit cuts over the next decade, part of an attempt to generate enough support in Congress to allow the Treasury to take on new borrowing.

Biden made no comment as he departed, except to say the group would meet again on Thursday and probably Friday as well.

CBO, the non-partisan agency that calculates the

cost and economic impact of legislation and government policy, says the nation’s rapidly growing debt burden increases the probability of a fiscal crisis in which investors lose faith in U.S. bonds and force policymakers to make drastic spending cuts or tax increases.

“As Congress debates the president’s request for an increase in the statutory debt ceiling, the CBO warns of a more ominous credit cliff — a sudden drop-off in our ability

to borrow imposed by credit markets in a state of panic,” said House Budget Committee Chairman Paul Ryan, R-Wis.

The findings aren’t dramatically new, but the budget office’s analysis underscores the magnitude of the nation’s fiscal problems as negotiators struggle to lift the current \$14.3 trillion debt limit and avoid a first-ever, market-rattling default on U.S. obligations. The Biden-led talks have proceeded slowly and

are at a critical stage, as Democrats and Republicans remain at loggerheads over revenues and domestic programs like Medicare and Medicaid.

With Republicans insisting that the level of deficit cuts at least equal the amount of any increase in the debt limit, it would take more than \$2 trillion in cuts to carry past next year’s elections. House GOP leaders have made it plain they only want a single vote before the elections.

Dissident artist Ai Weiwei freed by China, says he’s fine

BEIJING — Renowned artist Ai Weiwei, the most high-profile target of a sweeping crackdown on activists in China, returned home late Wednesday after nearly three months in detention. Looking tired and thinner, he said the conditions of his release meant he could not talk more.

The official Xinhua News Agency said Ai confessed to tax evasion, accusations his family had long denied and which activists had denounced as a false premise for detaining him. He has spoken out strongly against the ruling Communist Party, and his family and supporters say he was being punished for speaking out about the communist leadership and social problems.

Ai, who had been taken away on April 3, walked through the gate of his suburban home studio shortly after 11 p.m. with his mother and wife. He said his health was fine and thanked reporters for their support outside his studio, but said he could not speak further.

“I’m sorry I can’t (talk), I am on probation, please understand,” Ai said, speaking in English.

The conditions appeared to extend also to Ai’s family, although his mother told reporters she was relieved to see him again. “I’m so happy that my son is back,” Gao Ying said.

The outspoken artist’s detention had sparked an international outcry, with the United States and other countries saying it was a sign of China’s deteriorating human rights situation.

That international condemnation, along with Ai’s party connections as the son of one of China’s most famous modern poets, had convinced authorities to strike a deal with Ai on his release, said Jerome Cohen, a top expert on Chinese law at New York University.

“As often happens with sensitive cases, it was too hot to handle and they had to find a way out,” Cohen said by phone from New York City.

He said Ai was most likely released on a form of bail that restricts suspects’ movements to their home city for one year. However, authorities can reopen the case at any time, meaning Ai faces the ever-present threat of being detained again on the same accusations.

Despite that, Cohen said Ai’s release under those terms was probably the best outcome that could be expected, given the degree to which he had angered those in power.

“It’s quite a step back for the regime. It demonstrates the utility of large amounts of international attention, plus international connections that had been suffi-

cient to keep him out of jail before,” he said.

Ai’s release might also have been a face-saving move, coming just days before Chinese Premier Wen Jiabao was due to travel to Hungary, Britain and Germany, countries where supporters of the artist have been vocal in their condemnation of his detention.

German Foreign Minister Guido Westerwelle was cautiously optimistic about Ai’s release.

“That would be a big relief for the artist and his family, even though the reported circumstances of his release on bail continue to appear depressing,” Westerwelle said in a written statement.

Silicone breast implants are safe, FDA says

WASHINGTON — Five years after allowing silicone breast implants back on the market, the Food and Drug Administration said Wednesday that further studies showed that the decision was sound.

The FDA was criticized by consumer groups in 2006 for approving the implants after a 14-year hiatus because of widespread fear that they caused a wide range of illnesses.

But research by the two manufacturers of the implants, released in a report Wednesday, indicates that they have a “reasonable assurance of safety and effectiveness” when used properly, the FDA said.

“I don’t know what the critics will ultimately say,” said Dr. Jeffrey Shuren, director of the FDA’s Center for Devices and Radiological Health, in an interview, “but what we can say is the current data doesn’t indicate

that silicone-gel-filled breast implants are linked to breast cancer or connective tissue disease or infertility.”

Until 2006, women seeking implants for cosmetic reasons had been limited to the less-popular saline variety, which stayed on the market.

But the report was also quick to warn consumers against the assumption that silicone implants are risk free. Patients should still get

MRIs every two years to screen for “silent ruptures” of the silicone implants, which don’t deflate when they break, as saline implants do.

The agency also stressed that women should not think of silicone implants as long-term devices. According to the data, as many as 1 in 5 women getting implants for strictly cosmetic reasons had to have them removed within eight to 10 years. For

patients undergoing reconstructive surgery — often after mastectomies — as many as 1 in 2 were forced to have them removed within that time frame.

The FDA effectively banned them in 1992, after fears arose of a possible link between the implants and certain autoimmune diseases. Their use was restricted to mastectomy patients participating in clinical trials.

At the time, some in the medical research community criticized the ban, saying the decision was based on public opinion, not science — and that in fact little evidence existed on either side of the debate.

What followed was a rash of lawsuits by women claiming leaked silicon from burst implants had caused ailments including lupus, cancer and arthritis. Dow Corning, the biggest manufacturer of silicone implants at the time, went bankrupt after settling a \$4 billion class-action suit brought by women claiming injuries.

Self-help guru convicted of negligent homicide

CAMP VERDE, Ariz. — A self-help guru was found guilty of three counts of negligent homicide Wednesday in a case that shined a spotlight on a deadly Arizona sweat lodge ceremony that ended with unconscious participants being dragged to safety.

Jurors reached their verdict with remarkable swiftness: They took less than 10 hours to convict James Arthur Ray following a four-month trial that included hundreds of exhibits and countless hours of testimony.

The eight men and four women were given the option of convicting Ray of manslaughter but decided on the lesser charge instead. He faces a maximum of nearly 12 years in prison.

Ray fought back emotion as the verdict was read. His parents and brother sat behind him, while victims’ friends and family members held hands and looked on from across the courtroom.

Prosecutors asked that Ray be taken into custody immediately, but the judge denied their request.

More than 50 people participated in the October 2009 sweat lodge that was meant to be the highlight of Ray’s five-day “Spiritual Warrior” seminar near Sedona.

Three people died following the sauna-like ceremony aimed at providing spiritual cleansing. Eighteen people were hospitalized, while several others were given water to cool down at the scene.

Prosecutors and defense attorneys disagreed over whether the deaths and illnesses were caused by heat or toxins. Ray’s attorneys have maintained they were a tragic accident. Prosecutors argued Ray recklessly caused the fatalities.

Ray used the sweat lodge as a way for participants to break through whatever was

holding them back in life. He warned participants in a recording of the event played during the trial that the sweat lodge would be “hellacious” and that participants were guaranteed to feel like they were dying but would do so only metaphorically.

“The true spiritual warrior has conquered death and therefore has no fear or enemies in this lifetime or the next, because the greatest fear you’ll ever experience is the fear of what? Death,” Ray said in the recording. “You will have to get a point to where you surrender and it’s OK to die.”

Witnesses have described the scene following the two-hour sweat lodge ceremony as alarming and chaotic, with people vomiting and others dragging “lifeless” and “barely breathing” participants outside. Volunteers performed CPR.

More than 20 people were transported to hospitals. Kirby Brown, 38, of Westtown, N.Y., and James Shore, 40, of Milwaukee died upon arrival. Liz Neuman, 49, of Prior Lake, Minn., slipped into a coma and died more than a week later.

In court Wednesday, members of Neuman’s family and a friend of Brown held hands and smiled when the verdict was read.

“Justice was served in there,” Neuman’s ex-husband, Randy Neuman, said later.

Ray quickly left the courtroom with his family after the hearing, saying “No, not at this time” when asked if he had any comment.

Ray’s attorneys maintained the deaths were nothing but a tragic accident, and said Ray took all the necessary precautions to ensure participants’ safety. They contend authorities botched the investigation and failed to consider that toxins or poisons contributed to the deaths and called two witnesses to support that argument.

JEROME — For a Jerome Cyclones offense that's struggled to score runs, visiting Idaho Falls presented the ultimate nightmare.

The Russets' Colben Maguire pitched a perfect game in the Cyclones' American Legion Class AA 9-0 loss in Game 1. Then Idaho Falls threw Anthony Brady in Game 2, and he tossed a one-hit shutout in a 10-0 game that ended in five innings.

"Besides seeing Cy Sneed (Twin Falls) once this year, neither of those arms are the type of guys we would see during the high school season. Not even close," said

Jerome coach Kenneth James. "It's an adjustment." Maguire struck out 12 in Game 1, working his high velocity fastball with a nasty slider and curveball.

"He had some great stuff going tonight. Of course the credit goes to him. I mean, he pitched a perfect game," James said. "But the disappointing part was that we didn't make the necessary adjustments at the plate."

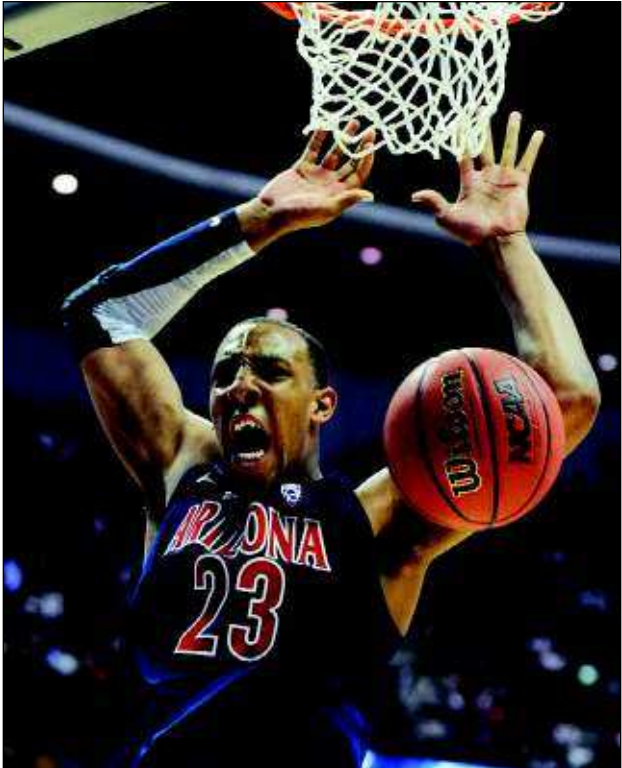
The Cyclones notched their only hit of the day in

the first inning of Game 2. Brady finished with six strikeouts, with two walks and a hit batsmen.

Jerome grounded into an inning ending double play in the first and two consecutive strikeouts ended the second inning with a runner stranded at second.

Cavs have options, starting with Irving

NEW YORK — Just in case the Cleveland Cavaliers need it, here's some advice for what to do with those two high picks.

Take Kyrie Irving first, grab Turkish big man Enes Kanter fourth, and start enjoying the postseason success you used to have when LeBron James was around.

"If I play with Kyrie, I believe we can make playoffs," Kanter said Wednesday. "I know we can make playoffs."

Or instead, pass on Irving and go with Arizona's Derrick Williams, who can play inside or out, either forward spot, and would bring the mixture of power and athleticism back to your frontcourt that was lost when James left.

"I feel like I am the most overall ready in this spot by my size and ready to make an impact," Williams said.

Even in what's considered a less-than-stellar NBA draft, the Cavaliers have plenty of options Thursday night at the Prudential Center in Newark, N.J., when they become the first team since the 1983 Houston Rockets with two picks in the top four.

They're expected to start with Irving, considered the favorite since the Cavaliers won the lottery last month. Though the Duke point guard played just 11 games during his freshman season because of a toe injury on his right foot, the numbers he put in his limited time seem too good to pass up.

"It definitely feels good, you know, knowing that I'm still projected to go No. 1," Irving said. "We'll see how it goes tomorrow, but it's an honor to be at the No. 1 spot right now."

The 6-foot-2 guard averaged 17.5 points while shooting 53 percent from the floor, 46 percent from 3-point range and 90 percent from the foul line. He returned from his injury in time to play in the NCAA tournament — where his Blue Devils were overwhelmed by Williams in Arizona's round of 16 victory — and he said that proves there should be no question about

his health.

"Playing in the NCAA tournament was the deciding factor for me," Irving said. "If I didn't play in the NCAA tournament, I would have been back at Duke for my sophomore season. I just wanted to kind of limit all the questions on my health and durability."

The Cavaliers also pick fourth — the No. 1 pick was acquired from the Los Angeles Clippers last season in the Baron Davis trade — giving them the ability to add a big man, perhaps Kanter or another from the lengthy list of Europeans available, if they selected Irving first.

They were still weighing their options as of Wednesday afternoon with their first No. 1 pick since James in 2003.

"They're keeping their cards closely, as they should, and we'll see how it goes tomorrow night," Irving said.

Minnesota holds the No. 2 pick and seems open to dealing it. Utah has Nos. 3 and 12, the latter potentially putting the Jazz in the difficult position of deciding whether they want to keep BYU star Jimmer Fredette in state.

Fredette led the nation with 28.9 points per game and was honored by The Associated Press and nearly other organization that gives out a player of the year award. But he is perhaps the most scrutinized player in this draft full of question marks, with doubts over whether he has the quickness to get his shot off in the NBA or defend the much quicker guards he will face on a nightly basis.

Not to worry. Fredette says during his carefully devised workout schedule — he performed for only Utah, Sacramento, Indiana, New York and Phoenix — he gained confidence that his game will translate.

"I learned that I'm a very confident guy and that I can play against anyone," Fredette said. "I feel like I can play all the guys out there, played against some of the toughest athletes and players that are guards in this draft. So it took away confidence and knowing that I can play in this league."

HOUSTON — Clint Dempsey scored in the 77th minute off an assist from Landon Donovan, and the United States advanced to the Gold Cup final with a 1-0 victory over Panama on Wednesday night.

The Americans will play in the biennial tournament's championship game for the fourth straight time after avenging a 2-1 loss to Panama on June 11.

Freddy Adu made a long-awaited return to American soccer in the second half,

and set up the winning play with a cross-field pass to Donovan, who played in his 27th consecutive Gold Cup match to extend his own record.

Donovan then threaded a pinpoint pass through the Panama defense to Dempsey, who slid as he redirected the ball into the low corner of the net.

The United States beat Panama in the knockout stage of the tournament for the fourth straight time. The Americans had never lost in the group stage of the

Source: NFL owners, players meeting

NFL owners and players met in the Boston area Wednesday in the latest attempt to work out a new collective bargaining agreement, a person with knowledge of the talks told The Associated Press.

Commissioner Roger Goodell and members of his labor committee resumed negotiations with players' association chief DeMau-

rice Smith and several players on Wednesday. A day earlier, NFL owners were briefed on recent progress about a new CBA.

The person spoke on condition of anonymity because the negotiations are confidential.

One NFL player told the AP that the NFLPA told him progress is being made "but there's still maybe two weeks to go" before a settlement is likely. The player also spoke on condition of

anonymity because he is not authorized to speak for the players association.

The main topic of discussion is the breakdown of total revenues. One person told the AP on Tuesday that the players' share would approach the 50 percent the NFLPA has said it has received throughout the last decade. But the expense credits — about \$1 billion last year — that the league takes off the top would disappear.

Also, there would no longer be "designated revenues" from which the players would share, the person said. Instead, the players would share from the entire pie, which they project will grow significantly over the course of the new CBA, which is expected to run anywhere from six to 10 years. So if they are taking 48 percent or more of a much higher revenue

Adu, the one-time teen phenom who turned 22 last month, drew cheers when he trotted onto the field in the 66th minute. Adu was playing in Turkey when he got the call to rejoin the Americans' roster for the Gold Cup.

Panama nearly took a 1-0 lead in the 71st minute, when Cooper fired a left-footed shot that U.S. goalkeeper Tim Howard leaped to deflect with his left hand.

The Americans finally broke through six minutes later.

Red, white and blue streamers floated onto the field as the Americans celebrated and the crowd roared.

Adu set up another chance with about five minutes left, but Michael Bradley passed up an open shot and lost the ball.

The United States is unbeaten in 22 of its last 24 games in the Gold Cup, a tournament with 12 teams from Central and North American and the Caribbean. The Americans improved to 7-1-2 against Panama all-time.

stream — without the initial NFL deduction for operating expenses — the players still would receive far more money than they got under the previous agreement.

A salary floor keeping teams within 90 percent of the cap also would be included. The players have been concerned that some teams whose revenue streams don't match up with the richer clubs would try to hold down salary spending, but the proposal would require the full salary cap spending to be in cash.

Both sides remained optimistic about reaching an agreement after owners were briefed on many details of a new CBA, and they did not carry their Chicago meeting into a second day.

"There's a lot of work to be done," Indianapolis Colts owner Jim Irsay said at those meetings. "It can be done, it's something we have to keep working at. Every day closer hopefully, that's the goal."

The owners' lockout of

the players began March 12. Training camps are scheduled to open in late July, and the Baltimore Ravens on Wednesday became the first team to change its pre-season plans. The Ravens will train at their facility near Baltimore rather than at McDaniel College in Winchester, Md.

The owners spent five hours Tuesday listening to updates on various CBA issues. Afterward, the league's chief negotiator Jeff Pash said "we're eager to accelerate the pace of the negotiations."

Goodell said ownership is "united and determined to reach an agreement and have a full 2011 season. The ownership has a better understanding of the framework (of a new CBA)."

Several owners were expected to have objections to some of the proposals. Goodell was asked if there was a consensus among owners, to which he replied that "is a little deceiving because we don't have an agreement" with the players.

Both sides sound eager to find common ground rather than return to court. A U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals is considering the league's appeal of a lower-court injunction that originally blocked the lockout. That injunction is on hold, and a ruling could come anytime.

Instead, the owners and players have ramped up their talks, and the meetings in New England are the fourth over the last four weeks. They also met near Chicago, in the New York area and on the Maryland shore.

"You always have incentive," Irsay said of getting a deal done sooner rather than later. "I remember '87, '82. You always have incentive ... but it's a process, and you have to let the process work and keep working through it. But I know it's better when you have labor peace on both sides."

Report reveals “compelling” evidence against bin Hammam

GENEVA (AP) — FIFA had “compelling” evidence that Mohamed bin Hammam and Jack Warner conspired to bribe voters in the organization’s presidential election before it suspended them from world soccer’s governing body.

FIFA’s ethics committee concluded that the allegations bin Hammam offered \$40,000 cash payments to Caribbean officials “constitute prima facie an act of bribery.”

A report into Warner’s case, seen by The Associated Press, said the then-FIFA vice president was an accessory to bribery who offered

“mere self-serving declarations” at a hearing last month.

The 17-page document was sent last week to Warner, a 28-year veteran of FIFA’s ruling executive committee who led the North, Central American and Caribbean regional body since 1990.

Days later, the Trinidad and Tobago government minister quit his soccer positions while insisting that he would have been “fully exonerated by any objective arbiter.”

The damning language in the ethics panel’s report stands out in contrast to FIFA’s official stance on Warner’s investigation, which was

dropped on Monday.

FIFA said it no longer had legal authority to pursue Warner and that he kept “the presumption of innocence.”

FIFA declined to comment Wednesday on the leaked report, which was first revealed by Britain’s Press Association news agency.

Warner issued a statement claiming the document was circulated by “pathologically mendacious” people within FIFA who would “stop at no length to destroy my legacy.”

“Let me once again reiterate for the sake of those with hidden agen-

das; I, Jack Warner, did not partake in the distribution of any cash gifts to my members,” the former Caribbean Football Union leader said.

Calls to Warner’s lawyer in Trinidad, Om Lalla, were not answered.

Bin Hammam and Warner were summoned to appear before FIFA’s ethics committee on May 29, and provisionally suspended based on a dossier of evidence relating to the Qatari candidate’s campaign visit to meet CFU members at a hotel in Port of Spain, Trinidad.

Hours before the hearing, bin

Hammam withdrew from the election scheduled for four days later against FIFA President Sepp Blatter.

The ethics panel, headed by Namibian judge Petrus Damaseb, studied witness statements from officials representing four Caribbean federations who were allegedly offered brown envelopes stuffed with \$100 bills after hearing bin Hammam’s election pitch on May 10.

“It appears rather compelling to consider that the actions of Mr. bin Hammam constitute prima facie an act of bribery, or at least an attempt to commit bribery,” the report said.

Venus Williams, Nadal, Roddick win at Wimbledon

WIMBLEDON, England (AP) — Time and again after losing a point, Venus Williams rolled her eyes, slumped her shoulders and let out a shriek of dismay that echoed through Centre Court, reverberating off its roof.

Facing the most, uh, experienced woman in the Wimbledon field — 40-year-old Kimiko Date-Krumm of Japan — Williams was mired in a three-set struggle that lasted nearly three hours Wednesday, a tight, high-quality contest brimming with the sort of at-the-net, classic grass-court play seen so rarely nowadays.

“She doesn’t play anywhere near her age,” Williams said.

In the end, Williams, a five-time champion at the All England Club, mustered every bit of her competitive drive and considerable talent to pull out a 6-7 (6), 6-3, 8-6 comeback victory over Date-Krumm and reach the third round.

“She played unbelievable today. I thought she had some luck on her side, too, with net cords, balls hitting lines. I just thought today was a perfect storm for her to try to get a win,” said Williams, who again wore her decidedly original lace romper, featuring draped sleeves, deep “V” neckline, gold belt and gold zipper.

“Thankfully,” Williams added, “I had some answers.”

None more effective than her serve, in the late-going, anyway. That stroke delivered 12 aces, helped Williams escape several jams and was clocked at 120 mph even in her final service game. Contrast that with Date-Krumm’s serves, mostly about 80 mph. One was 65 mph.

Date-Krumm, who reached the Wimbledon semifinals in 1996, quit tennis later that year, then came out of retirement in 2008, marveled at Williams’ serve afterward, saying: “Not only speed — it’s on the cor-

ner. So it was very, very difficult to break her.”

Not at the outset, actually. Date-Krumm won 13 of the first 16 points Williams served, breaking three times en route to a 5-1 lead. The 23rd-seeded Williams turned things around, taking five consecutive games to go ahead 6-5. Williams then wasted a set point, and Date-Krumm eventually won the tiebreaker. In the second and third sets, though, Williams played much more cleanly, and she wound up winning by breaking in the final game.

It was hardly easy.

“Venus came out slow, and that girl took off like a brand new motor,” said Williams’ father and coach, Richard. His daughter missed time with a bum hip and is playing only her fourth tournament since Wimbledon in 2010.

On Tuesday, his other daughter, Serena, needed three sets to win, too. After ambling out of Centre Court this time, Dad tapped his umbrella’s wooden handle on his chest and said, referring to those matches: “They’re tough on the heart. The heart’s not as young as it once was.”

He wasn’t the only one toting an

umbrella around the grounds Wednesday, when rain prevented any action until after 3 p.m., other than under the retractable roof at the main stadium. After Williams managed to sneak through, fans with Centre Court tickets had a chance to see easy wins for two-time champion Rafael Nadal, then three-time runner-up Andy Roddick.

The top-ranked Nadal beat Ryan Sweeting of the United States 6-3, 6-2, 6-4, compiling 38 winners and only seven unforced errors. In the third round, Nadal will face Gilles Muller of Luxembourg — the only

man other than Roger Federer to beat him at Wimbledon in the past six years. Since losing to Muller in the second round in 2005, Nadal is 28-2 at the All England Club; that includes defeats against Federer in the 2006 and 2007 finals, titles in 2008 and 2010, and missing the 2009 tournament with bad knees.

“Will be a big, big test for me,” Nadal said.

Roddick’s strong serve was clicking again in a 6-4, 6-3, 6-4 victory over Victor Hanesu of Romania. The No. 8-seeded American hit 15 aces, saved the only break point he faced and limited his unforced errors to six — all with a special pair of fans sitting at Centre Court: his parents.

“This is the first time they’ve seen me play here. ... I think today was the first time they ever sat in a box in my entire career,” said Roddick, who won the 2003 U.S. Open. “They picked a good court to debut that on. I think they’re having fun.”

Other winners included No. 4 Andy Murray, No. 9 Gael Monfils and 72nd-ranked Alex Bogomolov Jr. of the United States, who reached the third round in his first trip to Wimbledon by knocking off No. 25 Juan Ignacio Chela of Argentina 6-0, 6-3, 6-4.

The only seeded woman to lose was No. 30 Bethanie Mattek-Sands of the United States, who caused a stir with her Lady Gaga-inspired jacket that had white tennis balls attached to it, then was beaten 6-4, 5-7, 7-5 by 133rd-ranked Misaki Doi of Japan.

When Mattek-Sands arrived at the court, she noticed a tour official scrutinizing her getup. So Mattek-Sands made clear her unusual accessory would be removed before warmup time.

“I’m not hitting any balls in it,” Mattek-Sands said. “Don’t worry”

Tiger Woods to sit out National on “doctor’s orders”

Woods resting leg injuries, out since Players

ORLANDO, Fla. (AP) — Tiger Woods will miss another golf tournament as he recovers from injuries to his left leg, saying Wednesday he will not play in the AT&T National next week outside Philadelphia.

“Doctor’s orders,” Woods posted on Twitter.

He said he would be at Aronimink to support the tournament, which benefits

the Tiger Woods Foundation. Woods said he is “feeling stronger,” but is still not 100 percent.

Woods, who has slipped to No. 17 in the world ranking, has not completed a tournament since he tied for fourth at the Masters. He said he hurt his left knee and Achilles hitting a shot on the 17th hole of the third round from an awkward stance in the

pine straw.

He tried to compete in The Players Championship, but withdrew after nine holes.

The next tournament on the list is the British Open, which starts July 14 at Royal St. George’s in England. Woods did not mention whether he planned to play the next major. If he did, that would mean two months without any competition be-

fore playing the British Open.

Woods is scheduled to be at Aronimink next week, to sign the “We Salute Our Heroes” tribute wall in which fans can write personal messages to the U.S. military.

He has a news conference Tuesday afternoon, and is expected to take part in the military opening ceremony on Wednesday.

Woods won the AT&T Na-

tional in 2009 when it was played at Congressional.

It moved to Aronimink for two years because Congressional hosted the U.S. Open last week, won in record fashion by Rory McIlroy.

A year ago at Aronimink, Woods failed to break par in any of the four rounds — the first time he had done that in a regular PGA Tour event in 11 years — and tied for 46th.

Rory McIlroy: I can handle the pressure of stardom

LONDON (AP) — U.S. Open champion Rory McIlroy is confident he can handle the pressure that comes with being considered the heir apparent to Tiger Woods.

Comparisons were made between McIlroy and Woods after the 22-year-old Northern Irishman swept to his first major victory in record-breaking style at Congressional on Sunday.

His status will undoubtedly soar as a result, but McIlroy said he’ll try to stay grounded.

“I expect big things from myself, but as long as I can keep the commitment and dedication and put the hard work in, I don’t see why there’s any reason not to handle it OK.”

with a first major title.

McIlroy said McDowell’s victory was inspirational.

“I remember going up to Portrush and seeing Graeme when he came back home, and it’s nearly exactly a year later that I’m doing the same thing,” McIlroy said. “What Graeme did last year at Pebble Beach definitely inspired me to go on and believe that I can win major championships, to follow in his footsteps and bring the trophy back to Northern Ireland.

“To think that no European had won it in 40 years before Graeme and then the two of us won it back to back. Growing up in tough (golf course) conditions, like the US Open usually is, probably helped us. But I don’t think you can explain having two back-to-back U.S. Open winners from a country of 1½ million.”

McIlroy is taking the next three weeks off. His first event back is the British Open at Royal St. George’s in Sandwich, southeast England, starting July 14.

Clean-up of Former Training Area 3 Kimama Training Site Idaho Army National Guard

Lincoln County, ID - The Department of Defense (DoD) and the Idaho Army National Guard are in the process of completing a Remedial Investigation/Feasibility Study (RI/FS) for the former Training Area 3 at the Kimama Training Site (KTS) in accordance with the Military Munitions Response Program (MMRP). Historically, the DoD has conducted small arms training and maneuver exercises at the site. The former Training Area 3 has not been used by the Army since the early 1990s.

PREAMBLE
WHEREAS, certain parcels of land are adjacent and contiguous to the City of Paul, Minidoka County, Idaho, and

Today is Thursday, June 23, the 174th day of 2011. There are 191 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight:

On June 23, 1961, the Antarctic Treaty, intended to ensure that the continent would be used only for peaceful purposes, came into force.

TODAY IN HISTORY

On this date:

In 1860, a congressional resolution authorized creation of the United States Government Printing Office, which opened the following year.

In 1931, aviators Wiley Post and Harold Gatty took off from New York on a round-the-world flight that lasted eight days and 15 hours.

In 1938, the Civil Aeronautics Authority was established.

In 1947, the Senate joined the House in overriding President Harry S. Truman's veto of the Taft-Hartley Act, designed to limit the power of organized labor.

In 1956, Gamal Abdel Nasser was elected president of Egypt.

In 1967, President Lyndon B. Johnson and Soviet Premier Alexei Kosygin held the first of two meetings at Glassboro State College in New Jersey.

In 1969, Warren E. Burger was sworn in as chief justice of the United States by the man he was succeeding, Earl Warren.

In 1972, President Richard M. Nixon and White House chief of staff H.R. Haldeman discussed a plan to use the CIA to obstruct the FBI's Watergate investigation. (Revelation of the tape recording of this conversation sparked Nixon's resignation in 1974.)

In 1985, all 329 people aboard an Air India Boeing 747 were killed when the plane crashed into the Atlantic Ocean near Ireland because of a bomb believed to have been planted by Sikh separatists.

In 2005, a divided U.S. Supreme Court, in *Kelo v. City of New London*, ruled that governments may seize property for private development projects.

Ten years ago: Pope John Paul II arrived in Ukraine, seeking to reconcile divisions between Catholics and the Orthodox Church. Peru's fugitive ex-spy chief Vladimiro Montesinos, wanted on human rights and corruption charges, was captured in Venezuela. (Montesinos is serving a 25-year prison sentence.) A powerful offshore earthquake shook southern Peru, killing at least 71 people. Yvonne Dionne, one of three remaining Dionne quintuplets, died at age 67.

Five years ago: Vice President Dick Cheney denounced the revelation of an anti-terrorism program that tapped into an immense international database of confidential financial records. Transportation Secretary Norman Mineta announced he was leaving the Bush administration. Television producer Aaron Spelling died in Los Angeles at age 83.

One year ago: Following Gen. Stanley McChrystal's criticism of the Obama administration in a *Rolling Stone* magazine profile, President Barack Obama named Gen. David Petraeus to replace the Afghanistan commander. Gary Faulkner, who was detained by authorities in northern Pakistan during a personal quest to track down Osama bin Laden, was released.

THE ACES ON BRIDGE® Bobby Wolff

"But what is this Throng of startled beings suddenly thrown In confusion against my entry?" — D.H. Lawrence

There is a Monty Python sketch in which someone exclaims "Oh no! Not the comfy chair!" As you play this diamond slam, a similar thought may occur to you. The best contract in this deal from last year's European Championships might have been for South to play five diamonds, but a few players were sufficiently carried away to attempt slam on the auction shown. That was a lot of bidding, but if as declarer you can justify your overbidding by overplaying the cards, all will be forgiven.

A heart lead seemingly removes an entry to dummy, but allows you to win the ace, play the spade ace, and ruff a spade (but not with the three), cash the diamond ace, and lead a low diamond (but not the three) to the queen, ruff a spade (but not with the three), then give up a heart. You can win the club return, ruff a heart, ruff a spade (but ... you've guessed it!), and finally lead that carefully preserved diamond three to the four in dummy to cash your spade winner and discard the heart loser.

On an initial club lead the same approach of using the heart ace, diamond queen and diamond four as the three entries need to ruff out and enjoy the long spade will see you home.

Of the 64 tables in play, six bid and made the slam. My sympathy to the Welsh ladies who also reached slam and made 12 tricks ... but they tried seven diamonds.

ANSWER: This hand is too strong to jump to three spades to show an invitational hand — you'd make that call with one fewer spade. The right action here is to jump to four spades, bidding what you think you can make. Incidentally, cuebidding, then bidding spades, suggests a stronger hand in high-card terms.
