Tighter resources for a still-troubled grouse

ROGERSON – The Jarbidge partment of Lands tagged along. Sage-Grouse Local Working Group is in the middle of inspecting its past projects. Unfortunately, very few will see them.

Film mirroring 2008 crash near Jerome seeks to steer teens away from distracted driving

JEROME - Denise Gibbs said the crash she responded to on an early August morning still haunts her.

State Police veteran of 18 years, Gibbs has seen her share of deaths. But the early morning call to Jerome on Aug. 8, 2008,

Idaho adopts new WIC food program guidelines

BOISE — The state is adopting new income guidelines for a federal nutrition program that serves women, infants and children.

The new guidelines set to take effect on July 1 are higher, which means more families will be eligible for the program commonly called WIC. The program provides nutritious foods like milk, eggs, cereal, juice and beans at no cost to families who qualify.

The program targets women who are pregnant, breast-feeding or those who have recently been pregnant, along with kids under age 5. The Idaho Department of Health and Welfare oversees the program in the Gem State.

Under the new guidelines, a family of three can earn up to \$34,281 a year and qualify. Under the old income guidelines that family's income would have been limited to \$33,874 in order to qualify for the program.

Hazelton celebrates its centennial today, Saturday

The town of Hazelton, which will celebrate its centennial with a slew of events today and Saturday, was founded in 1911 by J.B. Barlow and Fred T. Chittenden.

Preliminary work begins Monday on I-84 resurfacing project

Bridge repairs and some highway patching associated with a \$7.8 million Interstate 84 resurfacing project will get under way Monday.

Crews will begin work at the North Side and Milner-Gooding canal bridges east of

I-84 at various places between the Idaho Highway 50 the Burley interchange at Exit 208.

That work is expected to take about a week to complete, before a full-width asthe Ridgeway Road exit near after the Fourth of July week-

Hazelton, and will also patch end. That 26-mile overlay project, done in eight-mile stretches at a time, will reduce junction near Hansen and traffic to one lane in each direction through the construction zone. A 45-mph speed limit will be enforced, as will a 14-foot width restriction.

Gibbs went to the morgue later that morning to check Hine's body for bruises relating to the accident.

"No one was there with him. I didn't want to leave. I just wanted somebody to be with him," she said. "I just can't seem to put all of this away."

On Wednesday night, Gibbs, alongside the rest of the first-responders who arrived that morning to Lutz's accident, faced her memories of the crash to film a short feature film warning Idaho teens about the dangers of distracted driving.

The film was born out of the juvenile court sentence Jerome County 5th District Magistrate Judge Thomas Borresen gave Lutz after he pleaded guilty to vehicular manslaughter for Hine's death. It started as an idea for a school assembly, but morphed into a video to be shown in driver's education classes and high schools across the state.

The judge has been involved in the whole process, attributing his interest in this particular case to the boys' reputations.

"Both of the boys were poster children for being good kids. They were straight-A students, involved in sports and government," Borresen said. "I kept thinking, what can I do to get a message out to kids to get them to not text or be on their cell phones?"

Lutz, 18, said the assembly sounded like a tougher option. Facing his peers without the barrier of a camera would have felt like a trial, he said Thursday. The film has given him time to work through his grief and will be seen by more Idaho students than one auditorium can hold. While Lutz didn't attend



f ever there was an all-American boy, it was Jim Akutsu.

Born and raised in Seattle, he excelled at baseball, wrestling, swimming and fencing. Akutsu studied civil engineering at the University of Washington. And in the weeks after the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor that thrust the United States into World War II in 1941, he tried three times to enlist in the Washington National Guard and in the ROTC program at Washington.

Three times he was rejected, and by the following September Akutsu found himself staring out through the barbed wire of the Minidoka Relocation Center in Jerome County. Thousands of Japanese Americans, most of them U.S. citizens, were locked up for the duration of the war under orders from President Franklin Roosevelt.

"Not long after that, he received an induction notice that instructed him to report to the camp hospital," Dickerson writes. "It was dated three weeks before he received the notice, so it was impossible for him to keep the appoint ment. It was all a setup calculated to frame him. As a result, he was prosecuted for draft evasion and for stealing government documents."

Akutsu was convicted of draft evasion and served two years at McNeil Island Corrections Center in Washington, along with other draft resisters from the Japanese American relocation center at Heart Mountain, Wyo.

Released after the war, Akutsu returned to Seattle where he worked for the city as an engineer. He died 13 years ago.

But his story had legs. In 1957 his friend John Okada published a novel, "No-No Boy," using Akutsu as the model for "Ichiro Yamada." The book was adapted into a play two years ago.

Akutsu's saga, as told by filmmaker Frank Abe in his documentary "Conscience and the Constitution," will be part of the sixth annual Civil Liberties Symposium at the College of Southern Idaho next week. The movie will be screened at 1 p.m. July 1 in the CSI Fine Arts Theater.

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After 16 years on lam, Boston mob boss found hiding in plain sight

Capture ends one in nation's history

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

Luna opts out, but what if local schools did same?

uperintendent of Public Instruction Tom Luna is no fan of No Child Left Behind, the decade-old federal law designed to hold schools accountable. Neither, in fact, are most Idaho educators.

But Luna took a remarkable step Tuesday when he wrote to U.S. Secretary of Education Arne Duncan saying, in essence, Idaho won't be playing anymore.

The Gem State won't raise the benchmarks schools have to meet under federal law - or sanction schools that don't meet these higher testing goals - until No Child Left Behind is fixed to better gauge student achievement, Luna said.

Our view: No

Child Left Behind is a deeply flawed law, but it is the law, and now it seems Idaho has no effective standards aside from telling parents whether their kids' schools tested well or poorly.

The long-awaited overhaul of No Child Left Behind began last month in the Congress with the first in a series of targeted bills. But a comprehensive reform of the nation's most important education law is a ways down the road.

Idaho can't wait, Luna said.

"The law has become a stumbling block to continued improvement in raising student achievement," he said.

We wonder what would happen in local school boards decided they don't want to participate in the education reforms that Luna pushed through the Legislature earlier this

What if local school districts decided not to divert

money previously earmarked for teachers in order to buy technology? Or hand out merit pay under the system Luna devised? Or buy laptops for teachers and students?

They'd receive a stern warning from the attorney general — and they wouldn't get state funds to run their districts.

But the rules are different at the top.

"We don't have the luxury of time and resources to continue on with the federal law that should have been rewritten four years ago," Luna wrote to Duncan.

More than two-thirds of Idaho's schools made gains under No Child Left Behind last year. Schools are required to meet 41 benchmarks for student achievement under the law and a school's annual yearly progress, or AYP, is calculated based on test participation, academic achievement, graduation rates and other statistics.

But every few years, the percentage of students who must pass state tests increases. Fewer students in Idaho made adequate progress last year, when benchmarks under the law were increased dramatically.

This year, a school would need 90.4 percent of its students to reach grade-level proficiency in reading to make adequate progress under the law, up from 85.6 percent last year. In math, a school would need 88.7 percent of its students to reach grade-level proficiency to achieve adequate progress, up from 83 percent.

The state will release all of the testing data on how schools performed. Luna said.

"But we're not going to classify them as needs improvement if they don't hit that higher goal and then put sanctions on them," he said.

The trouble, of course, is that No Child Left Behind lacks teeth. No Idaho school has been closed down because of poor performance; failing districts just limp along from year to year.

In his letter to Duncan, Luna explained that the new Idaho education reform laws focus on the academic growth of students, not on whether they can pass a test.

But how, we wonder, do you measure that growth if they can't pass a test?

Don't just save Social Security, raise it

s a labor lawyer, I cringe when Democrats talk of "saving" Social Security. We should not "save" it but raise it

Right now Social Security pays out 39 percent of the average worker's preretirement earnings. While jaws may drop inside the Beltway, we could raise that to 50 percent. We'd still be near the bottom of the league of the world's richest countries - but at least it would be a basement with some food and air. We have elderly people living on less than \$10,000 a year. Is that what Democrats want to "save"?

"But we can't afford it!" Oh, come on: We have a federal tax rate equal to nearly 15 percent of our GDP — far below the take in most wealthy countries. Let's wake up: the biggest crisis we face is that most of us have nothing meaningful saved for retirement. I know. I started my career wanting to be a pension lawyer. In the 1970s, lawyers like me expected there to be big pots of private pensions for hourly workers. By the 1980s, as factories closed, I was filing hopeless lawsuits to claw back bits and pieces of benefits. Now there are even fewer bits and pieces to get.

A recent Harris poll found that 34 percent of Americans have nothing saved for retirement - not even a hundred bucks. In this lost decade, that percentage is sure to go up. At retirement the lucky few with a 401(k) typically have \$98,000. As an annuity that's about \$600 a month - not exactly an uppermiddle-class lifestyle. It's too late for Congress to come up with some new savings plan - a new IRA that grows hair, or some thing. There's no time. We have to improve the one public pension program in

place. Should we meanstest it? No. I don't care if they go out and buy bottles of Jim Beam: let our elderly have an occasional night out at a restaurant.

The most paralyzing half-truth in this country is that people hate taxes. People are willing to pay taxes that they spend on themselves. Two-thirds of those surveyed in a CBS/New York Times poll in January were willing to pay more taxes to save Social Security at its modest level. To "save" it, most of us don't need to pay. We could lift the cap on high earners, the 6 percent of workers who make over \$106,800 a year. If earnings above the cap were subject to the payroll tax with no increase in benefits to high earners, there would be no deficit in the Social Security trust fund in 2037, as projected.

If people are willing to pay more just to "save" Social Security, they should be

glad to pay more to raise it. What does it take to get Social Security up to half the average worker's earnings? According to the National Academy of Social Insurance, to close the nearly half of average worker earnings, we would need to find an additional 5 per-

cent of taxable payroll, or find the money elsewhere. If we lift the cap on the payroll tax without paying more benefits to those above it, that gets us 2.32 percent (or a bit less if we slightly increase benefits to the rich). Dedicating revenues from the estate tax at its 2009 levels to Social Security gets another half percent. A few other tweaks, like covering new public employees, add another 0.42 percent. The remainder can be found by raising the payroll tax by roughly I percentage point for both employees and employers.

I can hear the argument: It will discourage jobs, blah, blah. While I sympathize with the health costs employers pay (I am an employer, at our tiny law firm), they have had a windfall on pensions. In 1975, when I left law school, around two-fifths of American workers were in definedbenefit plans. Now it's just a fifth, and dropping. For employers, that's not the real bonanza.

Retirees today are shortchanged on Social Security because they have been shortchanged on wages their entire working lives. The labor economist Richard B. Freeman points

out that the hourly earnings of workers dropped by 8 percent from 1973 to 2005 while productivity shot up 55 percent or more. The United States is one of the few developed countries where workers are routinely cheated of a share in higher productivity.

And where has the money from the extra productivity gone? It's gone right to the top, to the top few percent. If wages had been paid fairly based on productivity, there would have been enough money subject to the payroll tax to avoid even a modest shortfall.

As I write, the Democrats are proposing to cut payroll taxes - supposedly to create jobs. But the last cut in the payroll tax, a few months back, led to little or no hiring. And did I mention the Paul Ryan plan? Just wait until the Democrats accept some "reasonable" version of this Republican document.

A bigger pension -araise in Social Security benefits — is the stimulus this demoralized country needs. Come on, Democrats: think of FDR, Robert Wagner, or heck, even Lyndon B. Johnson. Let's ask ourselves: Who are we for?

More teenagers may be homeless than you think

Teenage homelessness is a concern of mine as there is no current transitional housing available for young adult coming out of foster care or high school who find themselves homeless.

With this in mind, I conducted a survey of the number of teenagers who are homeless or are in danger of becoming homeless in the Twin Falls area; 537 high school-age students were surveyed. The survey indicated that 22 students are

homeless and 103 feared homelessness in the near future. The number of homeless may be higher as people don't realize that staying elsewhere because you have no home is considered homelessness. I thought it important to outline resources for others who may not know of services available to them and stress that it is OK to ask for help. Amy Rothweiler is the lo-

cal liaison for homeless education. She can be contacted at 737-5208, ext. 3763. The school district can provide assistance with housing, clothing and full access to education. Amy went on to recommend several other resources, such as the navigators at the Department of Health and Welfare (734-4000). South Central Community Action (733-9351) can assist a family with rent, utilities, food, clothing and transportation issues. Valley House (734-7736) can assist in housing opportunities. The Department of Labor provides assistance for adolescents 16 and up in finding career alternatives (for more information, contact Aleah Latin, 735-2500). The Boys and Girls club provides Elev8 during the school year. This mentoring program is free and provides life skills for ages 14 to 21 (for more information, contact Melissa Rowe, 404-4747, or Tahna Cooper, 731-2624).



CENTRAL ISLIP, N.Y. (AP) – Two years ago, they posed for a wedding photo: Him beaming broadly in a dark suit, she a pudgy fresh-faced bride. They soon started a promising life together in the suburban New York home where he was raised.

Police mug shots of David Laffer and Melinda Brady released Thursday portrayed an altogether different couple: Gaunt, stone-faced suspects charged with a drug-store robbery and the killings of two pharmacy employees

and two customers on Father's Day.

Laffer, 33, had two black eyes and bruises all over his face during



his arraignment on firstdegree murder charges, where a court-appointed attorney entered a not guilty plea on his behalf.

A police complaint says Laffer sustained the injuries when he grabbed for a police officer's weapon during a raid at his Medford home on Wednesday. He was tackled to the ground and placed in handcuffs, the complaint

Brady, 29, now many pounds lighter than her wedding photo, was being treated at a hospital for an undisclosed ailment, forcing authorities to temporarily postpone her arraignment. She is charged with robbery and obstructing governmental administration, although a prosecutor said Thursday that upgraded charges were likely.

Both were high on drugs when they were arrested, police said.

Assistant District Attorney John Collins described the shootings Sunday at Haven Drugs in Medford as "the most cold-blooded robbery-homicide in Suffolk County history." He said the methodical killings were captured on surveillance video.

Laffer, his wife waiting outside in the car, went into the pharmacy and commenced the carnage, Collins said.

U.S. and other countries plan biggest release of reserve oil

NEW YORK — The United States and other nations that depend on oil imports said Thursday they will release and sell 60 million barrels of crude from emergency stocks in an effort to ease the strain high oil prices are putting on the global economy.

The release by the Intertional Energy Agency, a group of more than two dozen countries, covers only what the world uses roughly every 16 hours. But it was enough to send oil prices lower, at least for the moment.

In addition to helping the struggling economies of the U.S. and Europe, analysts said the move was meant as a rebuke to OPEC, which has refused to increase oil production to bring down prices.

It will be the largest sale of crude ever from world strategic reserves and only the third since the IEA was formed in 1974 after the Arab oil embargo. The IEA released oil in 2005 after Hurricane Katrina and in 1990 and 1991 after Iraq invaded



YESTERDAY ON WALL STREET



NEW YORK (AP) — What began with a steep drop in the stock market ended with a modest decline Thursday. The Dow Jones industrial average lost just 60 points after being down nearly 240 points earlier in the day.

A jump in the number of people applying for jobless benefits and plummeting oil prices drove stocks lower at the market open. By 11 a.m., the Dow was down 234 points. Then came late afternoon reports that Greece may have reached a deal for a new austerity plan. The Dow made up nearly 100 points between 2:45 and 3 p.m. alone.

The Dow finished with a loss of 59.67 points, or 0.5 percent, to 12,050. The Standard & Poor's 500 index, down as many as 24 points, closed down just 3.64, or 0.3 percent, to 1,283.50.

Two House members want to end U.S. pot ban

WASHINGTON (AP) -Two House members introduced a bill Thursday that would remove marijuana from the list of federal controlled substances and cede to the states enforcement of laws governing pot.

The legislation would eliminate marijuana-specific penalties under federal law, but would maintain a ban on transporting marijuana across state lines. It would allow individuals to grow and sell marijuana in states that make it legal.

The bill was introduced by Democrat Barney Frank of Massachusetts and Ron Paul, a Texas Republican running for his party's presidential nomination.

Four Democrats are cosponsors: John Convers of Michigan, Barbara Lee of California, Jared Polis of Colorado and Steve Cohen of Tennessee.

"Criminally prosecuting adults for making the choice to smoke marijuana is a waste of law enforcement resources and an intrusion on personal freedom," Frank said.

"I do not advocate urging people to smoke marijuana. Neither do I urge them to drink alcoholic beverages or smoke tobacco. But in none of these cases do I think prohibition enforced by criminal sanctions is good public policy," he said.

Image of ancient mammoth or mastodon found on bone

WASHINGTON - Some of the earliest Americans turn out to have been artists.

A bone fragment at least 13,000 years old, with the carved image of a mammoth or mastodon, has been discovered in Florida, a new study reports.

While prehistoric art dehas been found in Europe. this may be the first in the Western Hemisphere, researchers report Wednesday in the Journal of Archaeological Science.

The bone fragment, discontains an incised image about 3 inches long from head to tail and about 1 3/4 inches from head to foot.

"There was considerable skepticism expressed about the authenticity of the incising on the bone until it was examined exhaustively by archaeologists, paleontologists, forensic anthropologists, materials science engineers and artists," lead author Barbara Purdy of the

University of Florida said. The bone was found by a fossil hunter near a location, known as the Old Vero Site, where human bones were found side-by-side with the bones of extinct Ice Age animals in an excavation from 1913 to 1916.

Former university head jailed in prostitution case

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. Former University of New Mexico President F. Chris Garcia was arrested and jailed Thursday in connection with a multistate, online prostitution ring that authorities say was run by a physics professor from New Jersey.

Police said Garcia, 71, and Fairleigh Dickinson professor David Flory, 68, were among seven members of the top echelon of the ring. Six have been arrested, and warrants have been issued for one more, Albuquerque police Chief Ray Schultz said.

Investigators said the ring had some 1,400 members, including 200 prostitutes, but there was no indication that any other universities or students were involved.

"At this point it looks purely coincidental" that two of the top members were academics, police Lt. William Roseman said.

Schultz emphasized the investigation had just started and that human trafficking and racketeering charges were possible.

Members of the site paid anywhere from \$200 for a sex act to \$1.000 for a full hour of time, Roseman said. The prostitutes were paid in cash by the clients, not through the site, police said.

Garcia was part of the "hunt club," whose job was to look for new pros-

titutes for the site known as Southwest Companions, police said, declining to release a range of ages for the women.

Garcia was arrested at his home. Police said he used the handle "Burque Pops" and was trying to delete his postings and other information linking him to the site.

Police said the site operators did not appear to be in it for the money.

"This was about sex;" Roseman said, noting that a lot of the clients had too much to lose to go looking for prostitutes on the street.

"They needed a safe place where they could go to do this?

Roseman said Flory described the site to police as a hobby.

The operators were also using the site to build a database of undercover police officers to help members recognize them and avoid arrest, police

Police said the site was started in 2005 by Cara Garrett, who first tipped vice officers to its operation after she was arrested on drug, child abuse and prostitution charges in December.

alk into The Pocket and wait for your eyes to adjust to dim light, and you might hear people talking about skill, passion and competition. Members of a summer nine-ball league, just getting under way, have hearty respect for pool.

Most of those shooting pool at the Billiard Congress of America's Thursdaynight league in Twin Falls have been playing for some time, but newcomers are welcome and encouraged.

"You can't get better unless you play," said Scott Wade of Twin Falls. "It's a social sport, and the people are friendly and respectful regardless of how good you are."


Wade has been playing off and on for 15 years and said pool has allowed him to meet new friends and reconnect with old ones.

"It gives people a night to connect and socialize," said Larry Web of the North Side Lounge in Jerome, which sponsors three pool leagues during fall and winter. "Everyone can compete on

equal grounds." Pool is an ideal sport for those who might not be able to partake in more physical competition, Web said. Although it doesn't require physical exertion it does need focus, determination and some math skill.

"It takes a while to be able to see the angles you have to make to get the ball in the pocket," said Teresa Curry of Hansen, president of a winter women's league in Twin Falls.



Symposium explores wartime vulnerability of civil liberties

A few days before the Fourth of July, history professor Russ Tremayne will celebrate the holiday with talks of protests and segregation. The College of Southern Idaho associate professor will lead CSI's sixth annual Civil Liberties Symposium, focusing this year on a theme of wartime.

"It's going to be a very sort of patriotic event, a highpowered academic event," he said. "It's a learning opportunity."

The symposium, with speakers specializing in disciplines from history to law, will explore some of the ways civil liberties can become vulnerable during wartime.

That history includes the Americans at Minidoka's Hunt camp during World War II, but the symposium is more than a recapping of the internees' experience. Tremayne said speakers will range from Dave Adler, specializing in constitutional law, to Larry Matsuda, a poet born in the Minidoka relocation camp. Author and historian Todd Moye will talk about the paradoxical life of black airmen who signed up to fight for a country that

NFL owners, players meet, plan to continue talks

Round 5 is coming soon — perhaps to a suburban locale near you.

NFL owners and players met for the second as they attempt to close in on a collective bargaining agreement.

'The players and owners were here over the last two days," Commissioner Roger Goodell said Thursday as he stood next to players association chief DeMaurice Smith. "De and I were here for the entire meetings also. And it's complicated and it's complex, but we're working hard and we understand the fans' frustration. But I think both of us feel strongly that we're going to continue to work hard at it.

A league statement said the sides will have more meetings. Those talks are expected next week; in the last four weeks, the owners and players have met outside of Chicago, New York and on the Maryland shore before heading to the beachside in New England.

Among those at the meetings were owners John Mara of the New York Giants, Jerry Richardson of the Carolina Panthers, Clark Hunt of the Kansas City Chiefs, Robert Kraft of the New England Patriots and Dean Spanos of the San Diego Chargers.

Players association chief DeMaurice Smith was there along with several players, including Jeff Saturday of the Indianapolis Colts, Tony Richardson of the New York Jets, and Domonique Foxworth of the Baltimore Ravens.

The two sides have exchanged proposals on a variety of issues after meetings over the last three weeks in suburban Chicago and New York, and on the Maryland shore. The main topic has been how to divide revenues — \$9.3 billion last year — and league owners were briefed this week on a plan that would

U.S. determined to end title drought at Women's World Cup

Americans' last World Cup championship came in 1999

By Nancy Armour Associated Press writer

The last time the United States won the Women's World Cup, Mia Hamm and Julie Foudy were still playing, Abby Wambach had just led Florida to the NCAA title and Alex Morgan was all of 10.

That 1999 title is so far in the distance, in fact, that captain Christie Rampone is the only current U.S. player who was part of the watershed tournament.

"It's been way too long -12 years — since we brought home that trophy," goalkeeper Hope Solo said. "Twelve years is a long time."

Ending that drought is the Americans' sole objective at time and getting some the Women's World Cup, which begins Sunday and runs through July 17 in nine cities across Germany. One of the four top seeds, the U.S. opens group play Tuesday against North Korea in Dresden, then faces Colombia on July 2 in Sinsheim, and Sweden on July 6 in Wolfsburg.

Two-time defending champion Germany and Brazil, silver medalist at the last two Olympics and runner-up at the 2007 World Cup, are also top seeds, as is Japan.

"Everyone has the final game on our minds, and winning it," Wambach said. "But we can't skip any steps to get there."

Despite coming up short at the last two World Cups, the Americans haven't exactly been in a slump. They've won the last two Olympic gold medals, and begin the World Cup as the No. 1 team in the world. They have the world's best goalkeeper in Solo, and one of the best goal-scorers Wambach.

Yet the Americans aren't have played in a World Cup. the juggernaut they once

were. Part of that is a credit to

they poured into their pro- for the semifinals. grams over the last decade. But the U.S. has also been that normal consistency of uncharacteristically inconsistent as of late, particularly

over the last year. After going more than two years without a loss, the U.S. dropped three games in five months. The Americans were stunned in the semifinals of regional World Cup qualifying by Mexico, a team that had been 0-24-1 against its northern neighbor. The U.S. had to win a home-andhome playoff with Italy just to get to Germany.

The United States lost to Sweden in the Four Nations opener, though it did go on to win the tournament, and then was beaten by England for the first time since 1988.

And now the Americans take a relatively inexperienced squad into the World Cup, where the stadiums will be loud and the pressure intense. Thirteen of the 21 players on the roster were part of the gold medal squad in Beijing, but only eight

Should the U.S. win its group, it would face the runner-up in Group B — Japan,

"They just haven't shown excellence that the U.S. is known for," said Tony DiCicco, the U.S. coach in 1999 who is now an analyst for ESPN, which will broadcast live all 32 matches from Germany. "(The team) has had great games and then all of (a) sudden it has a game that seems sub-par. I'm not sure why that is."

Injuries have been a big factor in the Americans' fickleness. Solo missed qualifying after having shoulder surgery in September, and didn't return until March. Wambach missed Four Nations with a heel injury. Heather Mitts, one of the team's best defenders, struggled with a hamstring early in the year. Lindsay Tarpley, a key player in the midfield, was ruled out of the World Cup just last month after tearing her right ACL with 15 minutes left in a tune-up game against Japan.

Slow starts haven't helped. Morgan scored in the 83rd minute against China in October to salvage a 1-1 draw and preserve the Americans' six-year unbeaten streak at home. Her goal in stoppage time gave the U.S. a muchneeded 1-0 win in the first playoff game against Italy. Lauren Cheney scored in stoppage time to lift the team to a 1-0 victory over Mexico in a June 5 send-off match.

"Our biggest weakness has been how we start the games," Rampone said. "We have acknowledged it and now we are working on it and implementing things to start quicker. We know we can't afford any (slow starts) in Germany. I think we are ready and we've had enough time together and we're hitting our stride on the field. We're now playing our way." And if the U.S. hits its

stride, look out. After losing the opening game in Beijing to Norway,

their next five opponents 12-3, including a 1-0 overtime victory against Brazil in the gold medal game. Even in a year when they've "struggled," the Americans have posted six shutouts in 11 games, and outscored oppo-

nents 23-8. "I've talked with (teammates) about it, what everyone needs to do in order to win," Wambach said. "It comes down to playing well all the time and getting some lucky breaks. Really, luck plays so much into it. To win any championship in the world, you need some luck,

1. Towers must be painted in seven, equal, alternating bands of aviation orange and white. Beginning with orange at the top of the tower, and ending with orange at the base. 2. Towers must have a flashing light at the top of the tower with a

minimum of 3.75 km visibility when flashing. 3. The surface area under the entire footprint of the tower and six (6) feet past the outer anchors must be free of vegetation, or

planted in vegetation that is distinctly different from the vegetation surrounding the tower. 4. Guy-Wired towers must have a total of eight (8) marker balls

attached as follows: four (4) marker balls attached to guyed wires at the top of the tower at a distance no further down than fifteen (15) feet from the top wire connection to the tower; four (4) marker balls at the bottom of the guyed wires at a height of 5 10 feet above the tallest crop to be grown in the immediate vicinity of the tower.

5. Guy-Wired towers must have a seven (7) foot long safety sleeve at each anchor point, plus one sleeve located six (6) feet outside the outside anchor, and one sleeve at the lift anchor. B. SPECIAL USE PERMIT APPLICATION

THE ACES ON BRIDGE

In today's deal from last year's match between the Swedish and English women's teams from the European Championships, both

declarers played six no-trump. In the room not shown here, the Swedish declarer (North) ran into a challenging defense when Nevena Senior (East) found the spade lead, then shifted to a heart when she got in with the diamond queen. However, the declarer could have succeeded even then.

But let's say you receive a diamond lead (as did the English declarer), won by dummy's king. A reasonable plan would be to win the club ace and continue with a club to your hand. With the actual layout, you are rewarded by finding out that clubs are 5-1. When you cash the diamond ace and clear that suit, you might discard one card from each of dummy's

East now probably plays back a heart (best for the defense), which you win with the ace, then play the spade ace and a spade to the king. Now you cash the two diamonds to reduce to a three-card ending, discarding the heart 10 and the club eight from dummy (unless West unguards that suit)

To retain two clubs, West will be able to keep just one heart. Now when a club is played to the king, East will likewise have to retain her spade queen and be reduced to one heart. So you will win the last two tricks with the king and eight of hearts.



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


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DEAR ABBY: My husband, "Ed," and I have been together for six years, married for two. This is the second marriage for both of us. We have children from our first marriages.
