Several districts back Luna on 'No Child'

Some prefer measuring how much students improve each year rather than their scores on proficiency tests

Several Magic Valley school district superintendents say they support Idaho's move away from some parts of the federal law that tracks their students' and schools' progress.

State public schools chief Tom Luna told U.S. Secretary of Education Arne Duncan in a Tuesday letter that Idaho won't adopt higher No Child Left Behind benchmarks, nor will it like trying to have all students jump

sanction schools that fail to meet them until the federal law is reformed.

Luna wants to move toward a model that measures students' growth. Currently, all students are required to take standardized tests to prove they are proficient in different subjects before they graduate high school.

It's something Minidoka County Superintendent Scott Rogers said is

Thief hits two golf pro shops

Thieves swipe cash from Jerome, Gooding golf course clubhouses

JEROME – The burglar did not take sleeves of Titleist balls nor carry off the Callaway oversized drivers, but he did make off with a little cash.

Both the Jerome Country Club and Gooding Country Club pro shops were burglarized within an hour of each other early Friday, according to employees of both courses.


John Peterson, PGA professional at Jerome Country Club, said he arrived at the course around 3:40 a.m. Friday to find the glass door to the pro shop smashed. The thief took only the petty cash from the shop's till, rather than the $thousands\ of\ dollars'\ worth\ of\ golf$ shirts, balls, clubs, bags and other accessories.

"They didn't get enough to justify breaking in," Peterson said on Friday morning.

Bug fighters seeing more mosquitoes, black flies

There aren't many people who don't like kiddie pools, but Kirk Tubbs is one of them.

"People call me all the time asking me to help them with their mosquito problem," he said. "They usually don't like it when I say it's their kid's pool creating the perfect nesting ground for thousands of mosquitoes."

If it was up to him, every small pool, bucket of water and feeding trough would remain empty.

As manager for the Twin Falls County Pest Abatement District, Tubbs says he is seeing a rise in the amount of mosquito and black fly swarms throughout the county. The district has been actively treating for the insects

BEATING MOSQUITOES

- If you or someone you know is facing a mosquito problem, here are some tips the TFCPAD suggests:
- Drain standing water. This could be as simple as draining containers or small swimming pools.
- Use goldfish to eat the mosquito larva in livestock watering troughs.
- Don't overwater. Let the ground dry between waterings of fields or lawns.

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Cassia County asks BLM for Gateway West info

BURLEY - Cassia County officials want to do their homework ahead of time when it comes to a proposed

high-voltage transmission line. County commissioners signed off Friday on a public records request to the U.S. Bureau of Land Management, seeking information they say they'll need to de-




have a horrible year, but we have the potential for it," Tubbs said. "But we've also been treating for awhile, so I'm hopeful things won't get too bad."

High river flows from above-average spring precipitation have increased mosquito swarms, thus raising concerns that West Nile virus carriers are also on the rise. As of Thursday, TFC-PAD officials had found no mosquitoes carrying the dis-

Mosquitoes lay their eggs on the high water edges, Tubbs said. Most years the river and stream levels never reach the high water mark, so the eggs never hatch. However, the eggs can remain undeveloped for years.

"We could be seeing eggs hatching that were laid five to seven years ago," he said. "Normally we'll go out to the streams and see cup samples holding four or five mosquitoes. This year we are seeing samples with 40 to 60 mosquitoes."

TFCPAD tries to use nonchemical treatment methods to control mosquitoes and black flies. The district uses a combination of live and dead bacteria to kill the bugs.

The American Century is over

he American Century just ended. This was the phrase d by Henry Luc which so aptly described America as the modern-day colossus, more powerful than any nation had ever been. Last Wednesday night, President Obama said that power had reached its limit. He was bringing 10,000 troops home from Afghanistan. The war was not finished, but we are.

"America, it is time to focus on nation building at home," the president said.

There it was, the theme of the speech. We had done what we could in Afghanistan, and there was, of course, more to do. But the purse was empty and the nation was tired - this is me, not Obama, talking, but he said much the same thing. "We must be as pragmatic as we are passionate; as strategic as we are resolute," Obama said. In other words, we are going to pick our fights more carefully, and when we do, we can use the new weaponry of drones and the units of SEALs and

such. No need for massive armies anymore. From the president's mouth to God's ear, I would add.

I have heard this speech before. I heard echoes of Richard Nixon explaining "Vietnamization." Gonna turn the war over to our stolid allies. We put them on their feet. We trained them. We supplied them. We schooled them at our elite military academies. They looked splendid in their uniforms. But when the U.S. pulled out, South Vietnam collapsed. It will happen again in Afghanistan. I think Obama knows that. He fought this war - authorized the West Point surge because he did not know how to get out. Now, he does. As any previous president could have told him, it's by getting out.

Something similar has happened in Afghanistan. Bin-Laden is dead. Al-Qaida has been riddled by drones. The job is done, or done enough, and we are broke and in need of some R&R. Obama surely knows his history and does not want it repeated — neither as tragedy nor as farce. We are not Henry Luce's America – not because we no longer want to be, but because we no longer can


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



Deputy Ada County Whitney Prosecutor Faulkner confirmed a charge of felony malicious injury to property was dropped against 18-yearold Sequoia L. Adams, of Boise. The Idaho Statesman reports Faulkner did not say why the charge was dismissed.

Another teen, 18-yearold Daniel S. Saylors, was arraigned Tuesday on the same felony charge.

Boise man gets at least 17 years for shooting death

BOISE (AP) - A 28-yearold Boise man has been sentenced to at least 17 years in prison for shooting a man to death during a drug-related argument last fall.

The Idaho Statesman reports Jorge Baird was sentenced Wednesday to 37 years in prison. Fourth District Judge Michael Wetherell said Baird cannot seek parole until he serves 17 years.

Baird pleaded guilty to seven charges in March, including manslaughter for the October 2010 death of 43-yearold Jake P. Roach. Baird also pleaded guilty to drug. firearms and theft charges under a plea agreement that called for a 40-year sentence with the possibility of parole after 15 years.

The jury also found that Mays, who originally asked for more than \$75,000 in damages in a tort claim. wasn't entitled to any punitive damages. Mays was awarded nearly \$2,000 for his medical expenses.

The incident happened when Mays' then-girlfriend called police to say she was worried he was suicidal and had a weapon, according to court records. 



The Dow Jones industrial average fell 115.42 points, or 1 percent, to 11,934.58. The Standard & Poor's 500 index fell 15.05, or 1.2 percent, to 1,268.45. The Nasdaq composite fell 33.86, or 1.3 percent, to 2,652.89.

The decline erased all of this week's gains for the Dow Jones industrial average and S&P index. The broad stock market has now fallen for seven of the eight last weeks, largely because of concerns that the U.S. economy is slowing and that Europe's debt problems may lead to another financial crisis. The S&P 500 is down 7 percent since it hit a high for the year April 29.

Technology stocks were broadly lower. Micron Technology Inc. fell 14.5 percent after the company said lower sales of computer chips hurt its earnings, which were far less than analysts had expected. Oracle Corp. fell 4 percent after its sales of computer hardware fell sharply. Cisco Systems Inc. fell 3.5 percent, and Microsoft Corp. lost 1.3 percent.

Obama to meet with key lawmakers on debt reduction

WASHINGTON - A day after debt-reduction talks led by Vice President Joe Biden appeared to have broken down, the White House announced that President Barack Obama would directly intervene in the negotiations, beginning one-onone meetings with key lawmakers next week.

Obama will start by meeting with Senate Majority Leader Harry Reid, D-Nev., and Senate Minority Leader Mitch McConnell, R-Ky., on Monday.

Speaking Friday Carnegie Mellon University before the announcement, Obama said that although the government must cut spending to reduce the deficit, it is also crucial to invest in new technologies that would create jobs and keep the United States economically competitive.

Rut seemed unlikely on Friday as House Speaker John Boehner, R-Ohio, reiterated his pledge to oppose any comprehensive deficit-reduction deal that increases taxes. The issue of tax increases is one of the fundamental philosophical differences between both parties that the congressional negotiators this week tried to address in the Biden talks.

"The president and his party may want a debt limit increase that includes tax hikes, but such a proposal cannot pass the House," Boehner said in a statement Friday morning.

Boehner said any deal to raise the country's \$14.3 trillion debt limit by the deadline must include spending cuts that exceed the amount of the debt limit hike and budget reforms that will restrict Washington's ability to spend in the future — not tax

"If the president wants this done, he must lead," Roehner sa

On Thursday, congressional Republicans had abruptly pulled out of debtreduction talks with the White House. Senior Republicans said negotiations led by Biden had ceased making headway as Democrats pressed for as much as \$400 billion in new taxes on corporations and the nation's wealthiest households.

The breakdown comes after seven weeks of negotiations that all sides say made real progress toward a plan to restrain the swollen national debt. Biden and six lawmakers from both parties had tentatively agreed to more than \$1 trillion in savings and had begun to tackle the toughest issues: Democratic demands for higher taxes and spending cuts at the Pentagon, and Republican demands for sharp cuts to health and retirement pro-

"There's still such a large gap, we feel that any move for us is real dollars we'd be giving back from where we currently stand, as opposed to where our owners have proposed numbers that in our estimation don't exist right

now," union president Derek Fisher of the Lakers said. "They're asking us to go to a place where they want us to go, so we've expressed our reasons why we don't want to continue to move eco-

The sides aren't scheduled to meet again until Wednesday or Thursday, hours before the June 30 deadline.

The owners could make their next move by then, voting to authorize a lockout when they meet Tuesday in Dallas. Deputy Commissioner Adam Silver, the NBA's lead negotiator, said it would be "premature to talk about where we're going to find ourselves next week." Billy Hunter, the union's

Top-ranked American exits before quarters in seventh straight Slam

WIMBLEDON, **England** (AP) – Head bowed, Andy Roddick trudged off Centre Court, his purple Wimbledon towel dragging along the turf.

As the three-time runnerup at the All England Club headed for the exit, he passed some kids clamoring for an autograph from their frontrow perch. Roddick paused and tossed his blue-framed racket underhand. Thanks to his latest earlier-than-anticipated Grand Slam loss, the American won't be needing it next week.

The eighth-seeded Roddick departed quickly Friday, beaten 7-6 (2), 7-6 (2), 6-4 in the third round by unseeded Feliciano Lopez of Spain. Lopez served spectacularly well, hitting 28 aces, and finally got the better of the 2003 U.S. Open champion after losing all seven previous matches they played.

Roddick turns 29 in August, and he was asked whether, as the years go by, one particularly depressing thought creeps into his mind: He might never win Wimbledon.

"Well, sure. You're human. I mean, of course it does," he replied. Then, speaking directly to the reporter, Roddick added: "You know, you may never get your favorite job, either – no offense to your current employer."

Roddick lost to Roger Federer in the 2004, 2005 and 2009 finals -16-14 in the fifth set of that last one — but only made it as far as the fourth round last year, and second round in 2008.

Trustee: OSU scandal requires "soul-searching"

COLUMBUS, Ohio (AP) - Ohio State needs to do a lot of "soul-searching" in the wake of the memorablia-for-cash and tattoos football scandal that forced coach Jim Tressel to resign and quarterback Terrelle Pryor to leave school, a university trustee said Friday.

After weeks of silence, the oversight panel for Ohio State – a school of more than 50,000 students - is beginning to comment on the memorabilia scandal. It will spend up to six weeks reviewing the athletic department's entire response to the scandal, though members say they do not know of any other NCAA rules violations right now.

"We have a lot to look at in sort of the soulsearching of what is most important in the game of life," trustee Jerry Jurgensen, retired chief executive officer of Nationwide Insurance, said in remarks to the full board on Friday.

"The cracks here weren't really cracks of rules and procedures," he said. "They were cracks in a value system."

Jurgensen, often an independent voice on the board, was quickly contradicted by board chairman Les Wexner, billionaire chairman and founder of Limited Brands and a major donor to the university.

"I don't think we have a lot of soul-searching to do, not at all," Wexner said. "We have a lot of heart celebrating to do for the good that this university does."

Neither Wexner nor Jurgensen would comment after the board meeting. Ohio State President Gordon Gee took Wexner's side, saying "the university is moving forward and we feel very strongly about the fact that we have much to celebrate today."

Tressel's 10-year Ohio State head coaching career, which included a national championship and seven Big Ten titles, ended in disgrace when he stepped down May 30 after failing to tell alert his superiors that players were getting improper benefits under NCAA rules.

The coach knew players received cash and tattoos for autographs, championship rings and equipment and did not tell anyone at Ohio State or the NCAA for more than nine months. NCAA rules — and Tressel's contract — specified that he had to disclose any and all information about possible violations.

Wexner defended the board's silence Friday, saying that, rather than making public pronouncements, trustees decided to devote their energy to working with university administrators to make sure the proper processes, reviews and protocols were in place.

"We've got a very sound process of work," Wexner said.

"I'm pleased and I think the board is pleased with the work to date and the way we've progressed that work in an orderly, focused and thorough manner."

Trustee Robert Schottenstein said on Friday that Ohio State's athletic compliance program is good but there might be room for improvement.



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Amateur Cantlay fires second-round 60 at Travelers

UCLA frosh sets PGA amateur record for lowest score

CROMWELL, Conn. -Patrick Cantlay showed up at the Travelers Championship with no intentions of turning pro until he finishes his last three years at UCLA.

A record round Friday on the PGA Tour - just one week after he was low amateur at the U.S. Open makes that a tougher deci-

In what already has been a month to remember, the 19-year-old Cantlay turned in his most inspiring moment yet by breaking the course record at TPC River Highlands with a 10-under 60 for the lowest round ever on tour by an amateur.

Last week, the sophomore-to-be at UCLA said the earliest he would turn pro would be "after I get my degree."

But after two strong rounds put him atop the leaderboard in the rainsuspended second round, he was starting to soften.

"I'm going to stay amateur definitely for the Walker Cup," Cantlay said of the premier amateur event in September at Royal Aberdeen. "And my plan is to stay amateur until I finish college."

Taking advantage of soft conditions and preferred lies on the soggy TPC River Highlands, Cantlay tied the tournament record set by Tommy Bolt in 1954 when it was played in Wethersfield.

Cantlay birdied the final two holes to reach 13 under. After shooting a 67 on Friday morning in the rain-delayed first round, he had eight birdies and an eagle in the afternoon.

It was his second eagle of the day on the par-5 13th.

He said he had no idea that he was setting an amateur record.

"I knew where I was. I knew I needed to make eagle on 18 for 59," he said. "It's tough to hole it from

But he came close. His approach landed just above the hole and rolled back to just over 2 feet below the

"I thought it had a chance, it was covering the flag pretty good," he said. "It takes some luck."

The way his month has been going, he might have expected it to go in. Cantlay received the Jack Nicklaus Award from the Golden Bear himself on June 5 at the Memorial, and the next day qualified for the U.S. Open at a sectional site filled with PGA Tour players.

Then after opening with a 75 at Congressional, he followed with rounds of 67-70-72 to be low amateur, finishing in a tie for 21st.

Despite his youth, he has been around the game long enough to realize he still is only halfway there – and 77 players have yet to even finish their second round. Cantlay was at 13-under 127.

D.J. Trahan (62), Webb Simpson (65) Alexandre Rocha (66) and Vaughn Taylor (66) were tied for second at 9-under 131, while Andres Romero was 9 under through five holes of his second round.

Play was suspended because of darkness just after 8 p.m. local time.

Players had perfect scoring conditions Friday with rain-softened greens and little wind.

And because of the wet conditions, players were allowed to lift, clean and place their golf balls hit in the fairway, another big advan-

The projected cut line was 3-under par.

An amateur hasn't won a PGA Tour event since Phil Mickelson in the 1991 Northern Telecom Open in Arizona.



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

Romney, Huntsman compete in **Mormon** primary

SALT LAKE CITY - Distant cousins Mitt Romney and Jon Huntsman each have deep ties to their Mormon community and, they hope, its pocketbooks.

As Romney and Huntsman jostle for support, Mormons are watching two of their own compete in what could become a nasty, intra-faith contest between two scions of Mormon royalty. Both families are steeped in The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, and

Huntsman and Romney are planning trips to Utah in the coming days to pitch their White House bids and round up campaign dollars.

Yet neither should assume they have a lock on the traditionally conservative, 5 million-strong Mormon community in the United States. Theirs is the first Mormon-versus-Mormon contest for a presidential nomination and it puts two dynasties in competition for their faith's small bloc of votes yet sizeable

clutch of campaign cash. "It's not automatic that this Mormon is going to support a Mormon," said Gary Lawrence, a Mormon who is a political

pollster in Southern California. He pointed to Romney's 2008 campaign that included a speech on his faith that helped assuage some of the public's concerns over Mormons.

"I would say Mormonism will be a factor in the candidacy of these two men," he said, "but not as big of one as it was the last time."

That could help or hurt.

'I really believe most of the Mormon population is going to vote for the person, not for the religion. That's what we're taught," said Mac Robinson, the GOP chairman of rural Kane County. some 300 miles southeast of Salt Lake City near the Arizona state line.

"I'm a very active Mormon, but it does not matter to me whether (the candidates) are Mormon or not," said Robinson, who is leaning toward Romney but isn't decided. "I'm not going to vote for anybody because they are a Mormon. I think some people will."

That's why Romney and Huntsman are trying to set themselves apart - in this state that is more than half Mormon despite looking a lot alike on paper.

Both are former Republican governors and sons of industrial giants. Both have matinee idol good looks and businessheavy resumes. Both are Mormons with big families. Both are running for the White House with positions that fall outside the GOP's orthodoxy.

Yet they are hardly friends, let alone similar campaigners.

Romney is a product of the 1950s and at times comes across with a formality of a bygone era. Huntsman came of age during the 1960s. The generational difference is evident in their styles on the

Romney struggles to chat up voters on the campaign trail, awkwardly filling in the silences with small talk. Huntsman is a natural retail campaigner who sidles up to tables for long conversations about work and family.

Romney polls and meticulously tests messages. Huntsman prefers to go from his gut - much to the chagrin of his advisers at times. His campaign has yet to conduct a single poll.

Neither is eager to criticize the other and both try to play down the rivalry.

"It's a lot of hyperbole. It sounds good. Everybody loves drama," Huntsman said in Wolfeboro, N.H., during a campaign trip that took him within miles of the Romney clan's vacation home.

"I met Gov. Romney as governor a few years ago. My grandfather and his father used to fish in the same stream in Idaho 300 years ago. I have nothing but respect for Gov. Romney and his family. He's an accomplished professional," Huntsman





Faith healer with 86 wives has been married 107 times

BIDA, Nigeria - He fell in love with his first wife because she was sincere and eager to please.

His second wife, a cousin, was irresistible because she did everything he wished and nothing he didn't.

"That alone made me love

His third wife won him because she submitted to his every request.

"I saw her, I liked her. I went to her parents and asked for her hand in marriage."

Wife No. 4 was very obedient. So was wife No. 5. Wife No. 6, the same. As were wives 7 and 8 and 9 and...

Well, by then - it was the late 1980s - things had taken off for Bello Maasaba, an Islamic faith healer from this city in Niger state. He went from a wedding every few months to one every few

All told, the 87-year-old has married 107 women, which, even in a society with a tradition of polygamy, is on the high side. The Nigerian government is not amused. Neither are Islamic authorities in the state.

But he's still marrying, every time Miss Right comes along. He now has 86 wives, the youngest 19 and the oldest 64. Nine have died and 12 he divorced (for disobedience).

But how on earth does he ...?

To ask the delicate question about how a man with so many wives, well, manages, one first has to cross a dusty street in this hot city in northern Nigeria where the sun bleaches the color from the street. Droning Chinese motorcycles belch choking fumes. Women in flowing garments sit under umbrellas in the market, selling fruit and vegetables.

A looming four-story house with 89 rooms and a broad veranda supported by gold columns overlooks the street with an air of faded grandeur. But its view is inauspicious: an open gutter running from a bank of rickety street toilets, their wooden doors askew.

Choruses of "You are welcome" echo like bells as visitors are seated on a red couch beside a large, patterned red rug. The carpet, an island in the sea of Maasaba's followers, pillow and one white face-

The pillow awaits. Suddenly, the crowd of males leaps to its feet, bursting into a traditional song of praise. He is coming.

At the doorway, his long, pointy white shoes are re-



Opponents file suit over San Francisco's proposed ban on circumcision

SAN FRANCISCO - Opponents of a measure that would make it a misdemeanor to circumcise male children in San Francisco filed a law suit Wednesday morning to get the initiative stricken from the November

The plaintiffs called the measure anti-Semitic, a threat to the religious freedom of Jews and Muslims and an infringement on parental and medical rights. But during a news conference on the steps of City Hall here, attorney Michael Jacobs said that the group is suing on the grounds that state law prohibits local governments from restricting medical procedures.

That's the job of the state flanked by two Muslim women in head scarves and a doctor in a white coat. He said the California Business and Professions Code contains a "clear" prohibition on "exactly these kinds of ballot measures. ... This is not about local control."

Male circumcision, Jacobs said, is safe, sanctioned, and the most widely done medical procedure in the country. The ballot measure is a "distraction" to Jews, Muslims and doctors.

"To parents and physicians, the law protects you against this proposed initiative, which we feel is so misguided," Jacobs said.

The measure, which will be on the November ballot here, would prohibit what it San Franciscans, parents, calls the "genital cutting of male minors." Anyone who performed a circumcision would face a fine of up to \$1,000 and up to a year in lot.

OREGON Prosecutors seek jail for convicted **Oregon couple**

OREGON CITY - Prosecutors plan to ask a judge to sentence an Oregon couple to 90 days in jail after they were convicted of criminal mistreatment for failing to seek medical care for their intant daughter.

Rebecca and Timothy Wyland of Oregon City belong to the Followers of Christ Church, which practices faith healing and rejects doctors.

Their daughter, Alayna, developed a growth above her left eye as a baby that eventually threatened her with blindness because it went untreated.

Doctors said the growth would never have posed a threat if the Wylands had sought medical care when they first noticed

The Oregonian reports the couple are the fourth and fifth church members convicted in the past two years of crimes involving medical neglect of children. Sentencing was scheduled Friday morning.

MARYLAND **Tabernacle stolen** when Md. church is vandalized

NORTH EAST, Md. - A Catholic church congregation in North East is planning a reconsecration service after vandals made off with a \$2,000 brass tabernacle and caused \$8,000 in damage to the building.

The crime occurred late Sunday or early Monday at St. Jude Mission Church. A worker on Monday saw several doors had been damaged. The Rev.

Joseph J. Piekarski, the pastor, arrived to find the tabernacle, which houses the Eucharist, was missing. With the Eucharist gone, the church is considered desecrated and cannot hold

Piekarski notified the Diocese of Wilmington, Del., of which the church is a member, and officials there contacted the Vatican.

On Friday, a reconsecration service will offer penance in atonement and have the church ready in time for Sunday services. Police have no suspects in the crime.

LOS ANGELES — Three men have filed Los Angeles lawsuits claiming Lutheran church leaders knew a Bell Gardens pastor was a pedophile but tried to cover it up and silence the vic-

Frank Brundige was relieved of his ministry at Lutheran Church of San Pedro y Pablo in 1997 and the 51-year-old disgraced pastor is now serving a 24-year prison sentence for child molestation. He was pastor at the Bell Gardens church from 1989 until his arrest.

Three men filed Los Angeles lawsuits on Wednesday seeking compensation from the church.

Attorney Anthony DeMarco tells the Los Angeles Times that his clients, who are now 32, 20 and 19 years old, suffered abuse at various ages and times.

Pacific Southwest District of the Lutheran Church Missouri Synod president Larry Stoterau says he cannot comment.

THE ACES ON BRIDGE®

In today's deal from last year's European Championships, four spades would have been easy if declared by North on a club lead. However, Marianne Harding as South received the singleton club lead and had to win this in dummy to draw four rounds of trump. West pitched two diamonds and a heart, and declarer now astutely led a diamond to the 10.

When that held, she decided to play East for a doubleton heart honor. She cashed the diamond ace, then the heart ace, and exited with a heart to endplay East, who had to lead a club into the tenace. Had East unblocked her heart honor under the ace, Harding would have taken her remaining club winner, then exited with a diamond to West, who would have had to concede a heart trick to dummy.

Very nicely done, but could the defense have done better? West does best to pitch two hearts and a diamond on the run of the spades, coming down to five diamonds and three hearts, and then split her honors when declarer leads a diamond toward the A-10.

Declarer wins and plays the heart ace, again forcing East to decide whether to unblock. If she does not, she is endplayed with the heart queen to lead clubs. If she does unblock, declarer cashes the club king to squeeze West.

If West bares her heart king, declarer establishes a heart. If West pitches a diamond, declarer leads the diamond 10 from dummy and eventually collects a second heart trick.

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

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
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
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
